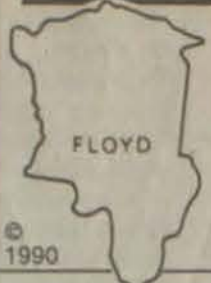

## Grand Jury reports :

### True bills name 101 on counts

A Floyd County Grand Jury returned indictments Monday naming 101 persons on charges including wanton endangerment, arson, assault, theft and drug possession.

The grand jury met September 10-12 but had to meet in another session to present the indictments to the court and to consider a few other cases.

The grand jury also returned three sealed indictments.

Donald Warren Williamson, 35, of Melvin, was indicted on wanton endangerment charges when he allegedly tried to set fire to a mine with 10 people inside. The indictment said the charge was brought "when he, manifesting extreme indifference to human life, intentionally and unlawfully set fire inside the Barnett Coal Enterprises Mine at Bill Hall Branch in McDowell, knowing that David Martin, Vaughn Watson, Hiram Carroll, Vick Vernise McCoy, Steven Lowell Crum, Benny Rav Carroll, Billy James Mullins, Brad Dwayne Tackett, Paul Kilburne and Estill Bentley Jr. were inside the mine."

A Wayland man was charged with first degree wanton endangerment for allegedly pointing a loaded gun at a nine year-old boy. Virgil Crum, 31, was accused of pointing a loaded hotgun at the youth.

A former Floyd County Solid Waste employee was indicted on theft by failure to make required disposition of property and forgery charges. Myrna L. Williams, 48, of Drift, was charged for allegedly converting a \$150 money order made payable to the solid waste department for her own use. The forgery charge stemmed from Williams allegedly altering a U.S. Postal money order in the amount of \$150.

A Prestonsburg man was indicted on first degree wanton endangerment charges after he allegedly tried to injure a Prestonsburg City Police officer. Ronald Burchett, 54, was charged in connection for allegedly pulling a knife and trying to cut John Hunt, a city police officer.

Others indicted and charges were:  
• Johnny Joe Poe of West Prestonsburg was indicted on first degree arson charges for allegedly setting fire to the home of Robert and Janice Hopkins which resulted in the serious physical injury to a firefighter.  
• John Sherman Allen, 29, of

### Prestonsburg gets certified for sixth year

For the sixth consecutive year the city of Prestonsburg has achieved certification under strict judging criteria administered by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce's Certified Cities Program.

Last year, Prestonsburg was named a Gold Certificate City, after achieving certification for the fifth straight year. The city retains that designation with re-certification in 1990.

To achieve certification in the voluntary judging program, communities must undergo a process of evaluation. Once certified, cities must go through increasingly difficult assessments to maintain certification.

Prestonsburg Mayor Ann Latta said Tuesday that the Floyd County Chamber of Commerce "deserves the credit" for the city's re-certification this year, adding that "we are very proud that we have retained the designation."

The Certified Cities Program, Latta added, "makes us look at our shortcomings as a city so we may address and correct those problems." To remain in the program, cities must be re-evaluated each year.

Other Big Sandy communities earning certification this year include Pikeville, for the third year and Paintsville, for the first time.

### Request for mistrial is denied :

## Jury proposes three-year sentence on pot conviction

A Gilbert, West Virginia man was found guilty by a Floyd County Circuit Court Jury Monday of possessing more than eight ounces of marijuana and the jury recommended he spend three years in jail.

Delmas May was convicted on a lesser charge of having more than eight ounces of marijuana after he was arrested on November 7, 1989 with over seven pounds of marijuana in the car he was driving. May was arrested and indicted on possession of marijuana with the intent to sell along with Michael Cline, also of Gilbert, West Virginia and a juvenile. Charges against Cline were dismissed Monday after it was determined Cline was unaware the marijuana was in the car.

Kentucky State Police Trooper Les Stapleton testified he received a tip from a confidential informant that occupants of a black, IROCZ Camaro with West Virginia license plates traveling toward Prestonsburg on U.S. 114 would be carrying marijuana. Stapleton said he advised other officers to be on the lookout for the vehicle.

The car was stopped on U.S. 23 south of Allen directly across from the Al Pike Motel by KSP Trooper Eddie Crum. Crum and Stapleton testified May got out of the car and

came toward them and was immediately taken into custody.

Stapleton, who worked for two years as an undercover narcotics investigator, testified a strong odor of processed marijuana came from the car. May and Cline were taken into custody along with the juvenile.

Commonwealth Attorney Jerry Patton told the jury the marijuana, which was found bagged in 17 smaller, clear plastic bags inside a large garbage bag, was packaged for sale. He claimed it was the logical reason for the marijuana to be bagged in such a manner.

Ned Pillersdorf, who represented May, asked for a mistrial two times in

the case after Stapleton referred to the informant's call and when he testified it "was obvious whose possession (the marijuana) was in."

Circuit Judge Hollie Conley overruled Pillersdorf's call for a mistrial. Cline, who was represented by Dan Rowland, testified he was working for May clearing a trailer site when May asked him and the juvenile to come to Prestonsburg. Cline and the juvenile was dropped off at a local restaurant by May and later picked up again just before being arrested, Cline said.

### Nearly five pounds of marijuana confiscated :

## City police arrest three in raid

Members of the Prestonsburg Police Department arrested three people and confiscated nearly five pounds of marijuana in a raid Monday.

Detective Sergeant Jeff Stumbo said that the arrests came as the result of an undercover investigation of marijuana trafficking in the city of Prestonsburg.

James B. Hunter, of Prestonsburg,

was lodged in the Floyd County Jail on charges of possession of marijuana (less than five pounds but more than eight ounces) and trafficking a controlled substance. A second suspect, William Joe Skeens was also taken into custody in connection with the raid. A third subject, whose name is being withheld by police, was also taken into custody.

### Baders are home at last :

## '...It's just like freedom regained'

He was an American in the wrong place at the wrong time.

Just visiting friends in a friendly country that suddenly, too suddenly, became an unfriendly place to be, particularly unfriendly for an American.

For most of two months Dr. Syed Badrudduja lived a nightmare, caught in Kuwait during the August 2 Iraqi invasion of that country. His wife and children were caught, too.

This week Dr. Bader, as he is known locally, is home in Prestonsburg and the nightmare is over. Tuesday he relived his ordeal and recounted his brief life on the run—seven weeks of fear, a secret identity and an eleven-hour escape to freedom. This is his story...

On August 2, Dr. Bader, his wife Meraj, son Mustafa, 13, and daughters Falaha, 11, and Shulma, 10, were returning home from a vacation in Dr. Bader's native India, landing in Kuwait for a visit with friends. It was to have been just a short stopover, but those plans changed when the Baders returned to Kuwait City airport to catch their flight home. It was at the airport the Dr. and others discovered that Iraq had invaded Kuwait.

"By going to the airport," Dr. Bader said Monday, "(we found) that the invasion had already occurred. In America we have radio and television all the time. There (in Kuwait) it's not like that. We didn't know the invasion had happened until we saw (Iraqi) tanks in the road. A soldier asked us for water."

The Baders returned to the friend's home, a place which became his home for the next six weeks.

While there Dr. Bader felt the pinch of a United Nations blockade of the country.

"I personally had to stand in line two hours for bread," Dr. Bader said. "There (weren't) many shortages for the first two weeks but now it's getting worse day by day. The stores are

not open and whatever stores are open, they are open for only a few hours and they are government run stores."

Dr. Bader said food supplies in Kuwait included rice, flour, bread and powdered milk, adding that after the first two weeks all food supplies began "getting scarce."

Dr. Bader said he was in contact with other westerners, some Americans, during his stay in Kuwait and he and his family communicated with U. S. Embassy officials.

"My family was indoors all the time, for six weeks, I got out several days," Dr. Bader said. "The apartment buildings were checked all the time by the (Iraqi) military. Our apartment was not checked by the military while I was there."

Dr. Bader said his family coped with their dilemma "very well," stay-

## Dad delivers baby then goes to jail

What began as a story of human triumph Sunday night ended as a tale of law and justice Monday morning.

A family of five approached the desk clerk at the Blue Sky Motel on Sunday and asked if they could stay at the motel, explaining that they had no money for the room. The clerk reportedly contacted Reverend Tim Jessen, who is involved with a local ministerial association, to ask if the group could help the family. Although funds were low for such projects, Jessen agreed to find the money for the family's room.

"When I talked to him on the phone he said his wife was pregnant and the family had three children," said Jessen. "I talked to another person staying there (at the motel) the next morning and she told me that the wife had the baby that night. The husband was apparently a midwife and delivered the baby himself right there in the room."

The story turned sour only when police ran a standard background check on the family while investigating the health of the newborn child. Police found the father was wanted on fugitive from justice charges in Murphy, North Carolina.

Roy Clemens, was arrested by Prestonsburg Police and lodged in the Floyd County Jail, where he awaits extradition to North Carolina on one charge of fraud and one charge of swindling.

The child, a boy, was reportedly taken to a local doctor who pronounced the child in excellent health.

### Two candidates show, two don't for Chamber forum :

## Adams, Billips debate on Floyd school needs, plans

Two candidates for one seat on the Floyd County Board of Education exchanged polite barbs Monday but avoided confrontation during a question-answer session sponsored by the Floyd County Chamber of Commerce.

The candidates, incumbent board chairman Dr. James D. Adams and opponent Eddie Billips, both of whom seek election to the District 1 board seat, agreed Monday that restoration

was a top priority for the school system, but they differed on how it should be accomplished.

Billips, seeking his first elective audience, told Chamber members Monday that his restoration plans centered on improving morale in the Floyd County system.

"Morale is a chief ingredient for improving our schools," Billips said. "We must have open meetings and encourage input from our teachers, parents and community."

Billips said that the school system must not wait until

new school reform laws take effect to implement aspects of the education legislation and he proposed that the board should begin work on reform mandates now.

"We should go through the lumps and bumps of House Bill 940 (the state Education Reform Act) before we're faced with a last-minute effort to get it in place," he said. Billips also proposed development of a four-week summer program which would offer students the opportunity to work with

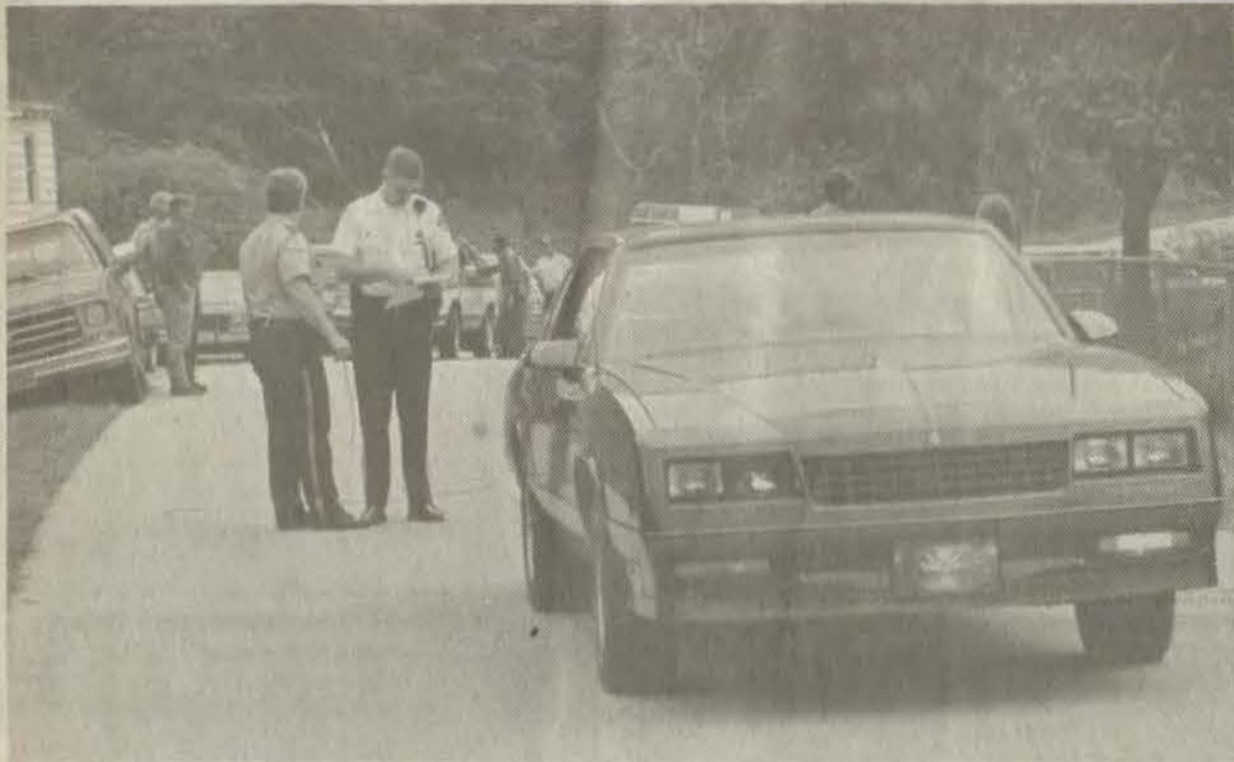

## Coffee Break

It appears that a special session of Kentucky's General Assembly will be held in January, with solid waste disposal and drunk driving laws topping the legislative agenda.

The January date was picked by Governor Wallace Wilkinson as an apparent compromise with lawmakers who had frowned upon a previously suggested October date for the special session.

October was no good because it came before the November election and many legislators apparently were concerned that they might suffer at the polls if they took unpopular actions in an October session.

Last January, if you will recall, legislators accomplished little during the opening days of the 1990 General Assembly because they preferred to await the filing deadlines...to see who might run against them...before taking any meaningful action on meaningful legislation.

In both cases it would appear that lawmakers set their legislative priorities on what's good for their political careers as opposed to what's good for the state and its people.

Now those legislators want the state constitution changed to allow the General Assembly the right to call itself into special session. There's an amendment on the November 6 ballot which will make that change if voters approve.

It's not a bad amendment, but it is amusing to watch lawmakers seek authority for something they've rarely wanted to do...meet in special session.

If voters do approve the constitutional change, they can be certain that no special sessions will be called by the General Assembly at any time that might conflict with members' re-election efforts.

In Kentucky politics, job one is taking care of number one.

School performance reports are in for the 1989-90 school year and they indicate that there is much

work yet to be done to improve education in Floyd County.

Scores on basic skills tests remain below national averages, attendance rates, while improving, are still low in some areas and too few students are graduating and going on to college.

But, while performance grades may be less than ideal, they are showing signs of improvement.

That's important.

The progress, to be real, must be sustained from year to year. There must be two steps forward for each step back.

For too long now Floyd County has been Kentucky's educational whipping boy. It's time for someone else to take a turn.

There's gold in them thar hills.

Kentucky Chamber of Commerce officials have announced that the city of Prestonsburg has retained its gold rating in the state Chamber's Certified Cities program. And, for the sixth straight year, Prestonsburg has qualified as a state Certified City.

That means, basically, that the city is one of the most progressive in the state and one of a handful that have met strict judging criteria year after year.

City officials, the Floyd County Chamber and dozens of other concerned citizens should stand and take a bow.

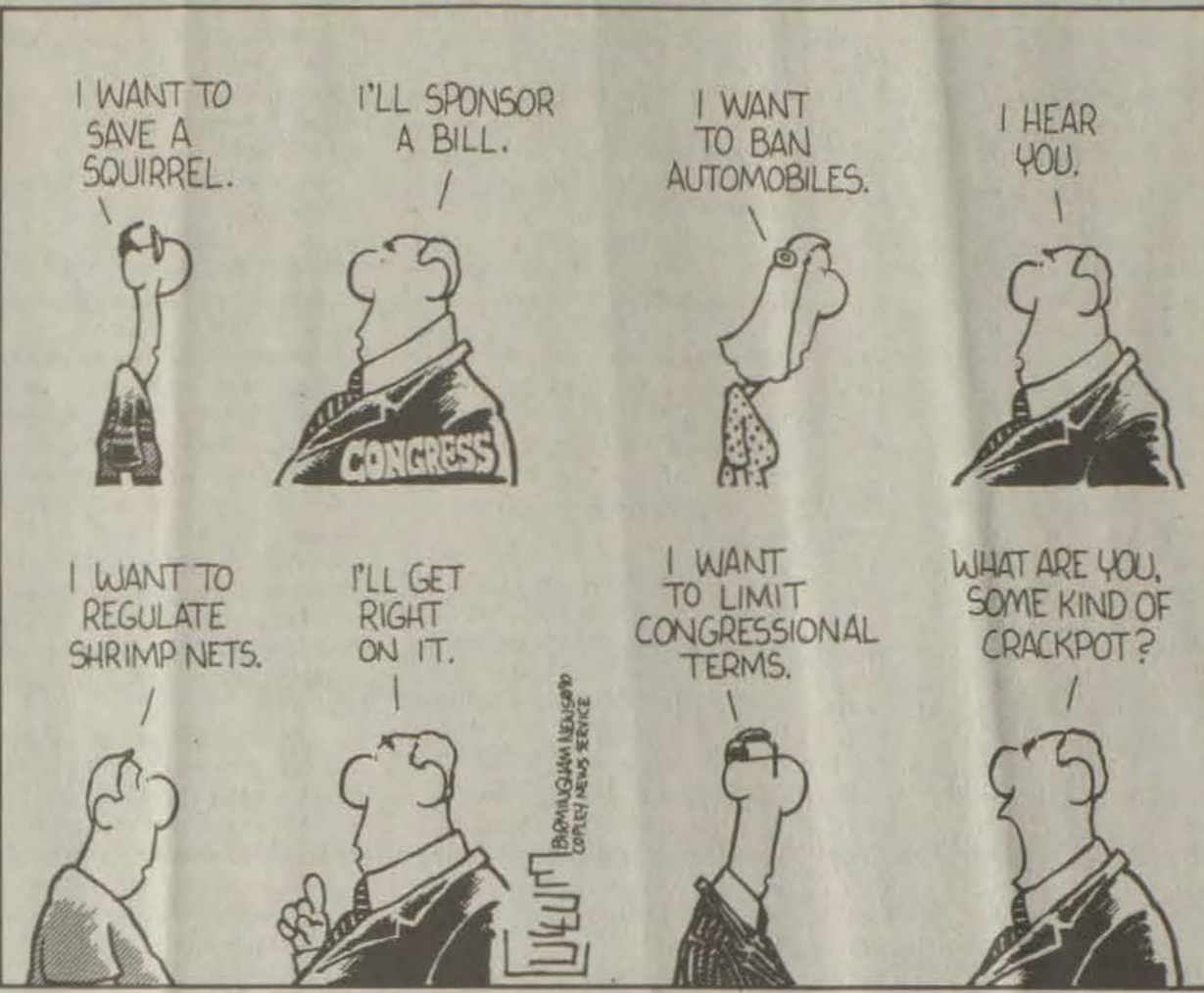
Our applause for a job well done.

Frasure Creek than any place I know.

It would be hard for the average reader to understand how Eastern Kentuckians truly can rely on their friends and neighbors since we are generally depicted as uneducated and uncaring. If readers from other parts of the state could witness the community spirit that is shown when we have a flood (which seems to be every other season), they would see neighbors of the highest order. Even some of the people who use the welfare system as a career will work very

hard to help his neighbor in a time of crisis.

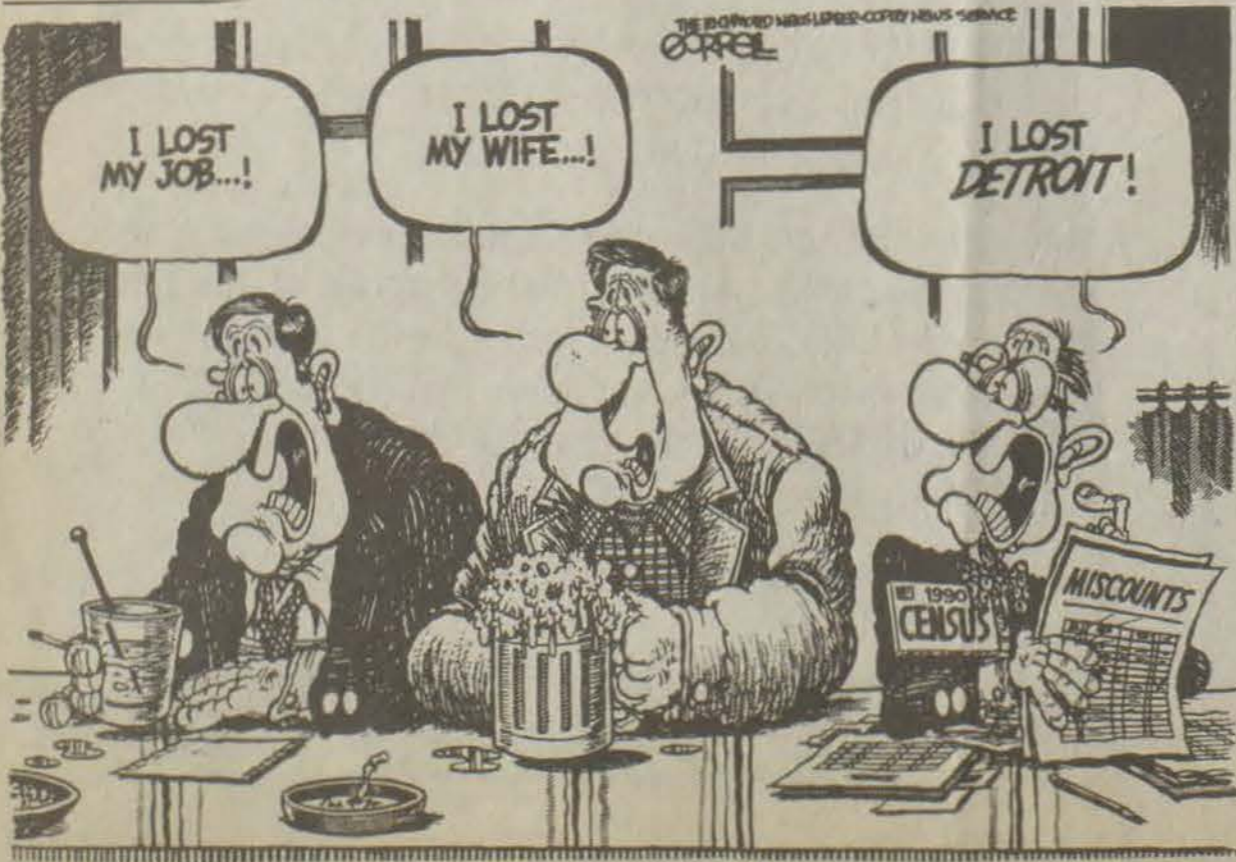

ing indoors for six weeks. "The kids played cards," he said, "and my wife listened to the radio. They never got out of the house, and we listened to the BBC (British Broadcasting Corporation) every hour. It was boring," Dr. Bader added, "but the neighbor kids would come, we would see other people in the same building, meet each other, console each other."

Iraqi troops routinely conducted unannounced searches in Kuwait apartment buildings, Dr. Bader said, but the apartment where the Baders were staying was not searched.

"A building next to where we were staying was searched," the doctor said, "and I personally saw some Americans taken away."

While his family remained indoors, Dr. Bader ventured out of the apartment building several times, traveling to the Indian embassy where he began the process of changing his identity.

An Indian by birth, Dr. Bader approached Indian officials at a makeshift embassy set up in a Kuwaiti school and he told those officials he was a visitor and he had lost his passport.

"Lost passports were not that unusual at the time," the doctor explained. "All foreign employees in Kuwait were required to leave their passports with their employers. When the invasion happened, many of those employers left. There were many lost passports."

Dr. Bader said the Indian government issued him a "certificate of travel which said I was an Indian citizen." The certificate, he added, allowed him to move about the city with more ease.

"There were checkpoints, literally, at each intersection and at the entrance to each house," the doctor said. "Your papers were checked at every one."

During the first days after the Iraqi invasion, Kuwaiti resistance was fairly evident, Dr. Bader said.

"There were reports on television of Iraqi soldiers being killed and tanks being burned weeks after the invasion," he said. "There was also one report of women and children who had been killed while protesting."

After six weeks, an agreement was reached between the U.S. and other western nations and Iraq which led to the release of some foreign detainees. Dr. Bader's wife and children were among those allowed to leave the country.

"So many people were allowed to leave each day," the doctor said. "When it was time for my family to go, we went to the spot where we were supposed to gather and buses took them to the airport. They came out without any problem."

But his family's departure did create problems for Dr. Bader.

When his wife and children signed up to leave the country as Americans, Dr. Bader said Iraqi officials were made aware of the fact that Americans and other foreign nationals had been staying in his friend's apartment complex.

The building was searched the next day by the Iraqi military.

Evacuees, Dr. Bader said, were questioned about where they had been staying in Kuwait, and that information led the military to search homes for any foreigners who might have stayed behind.

"The military would surround the buildings," he added, "and systematically search every room, every closet."

But Dr. Bader had not returned to the apartment that had been his home for the previous six weeks. Aware that the building would likely be searched, he moved to another location, staying with another acquaintance.

"We had planned that once my

family left," Dr. Bader said, "that I would not stay in that place. I got out that night and at 5:30 the next morning they (the Iraqi military) came and searched the building."

After staying with the second acquaintance for "three or four days" Dr. Bader and others made plans to leave the country. The escape route would take them to Baghdad, the capital of Iraq.

The trip out of Kuwait went without a hitch—at first.

Dr. Bader and others rented a car and hired a driver to take them to Baghdad, where they could catch a flight out of the country.

But at one of the checkpoints on the road to Baghdad, Iraqi officials informed the group that they could not proceed in the rented car.

"We were told that a new law had been passed just two hours before," Dr. Bader said, "that required the drivers of cars to be the owners. Our car was rented and our driver did not have registration papers. They would not let us take the car on."

With their hopes of escape fading, Dr. Bader said the group located another vehicle, "a much smaller one which had us cramped for space," and the trip continued.

"At one point our luggage rack broke, but the driver would not stop because there were reports of Iraqis looting cars stopped on the roadside."

The trip to Baghdad, normally an eight-hour journey, took 15 hours.

In Baghdad, arrangements were made to fly to Aman, Jordan. From there he returned to America.

How does it feel to be home? "Like my boy (Mustafa) said 'gosh dad it feels good to sleep in my own bed.' It's hard to describe the feeling," Dr. Bader said, "but it's getting back to normal now. It's just like freedom regained."

**Two enter pleas in circuit court**

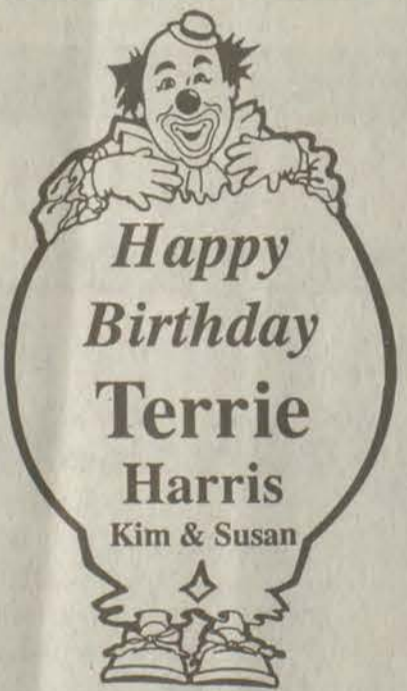
Two men entered guilty pleas in Floyd County Circuit Court last week relating to drug and burglary charges.

Ervin P. Ginther, who is currently serving time in Florida, was flown back to appear in circuit court where he pleaded guilty to possession of a schedule three controlled substance and received a two-year sentence. Ginther was indicted in November 1988 for possession of Tylenol with codeine.

Mike Keenes, who was scheduled to stand trial last Monday, pleaded guilty to second degree burglary charges for allegedly entering the home of Denny Martin with the intent to commit a crime. Keenes received a four-year sentence.

Keenes was indicted in February along with Heath Brown.

Final sentencing in both cases has been set for October 12 in circuit court.

On October 1, 1990, at an open luncheon held by the Floyd County Chamber of Commerce, I appeared with my opponent, the present chairman of the Floyd County Board of Education, James D. Adams. In that open meeting, James D. Adams once again stated that all it takes to solve our problems in the Floyd County schools is more of your tax money. I say that it takes all of us together! We need to roll up our sleeves, get involved, make responsible decisions, and put pride back into our schools. We cannot spend our way out of bad management, and that is a fact we can no longer ignore. Let's look at the facts that no one can deny:

1. My opponent, James D. Adams, wants to build a new high school for District No. 1 several miles north of Prestonsburg. He says that he can build this school for 6.6 million dollars, and will include tennis courts and soccer fields. **DON'T BE FOOLED!** The Floyd County School Board has spent nearly 6 million dollars for the new middle school that bears my opponent's name, and they cannot even get the sign to light up. How are they going to acquire property, fill it, run sewer and water lines, and construct facilities that exceed those of the middle school in luxury and accommodations, for just a few dollars more? The simple answer is—they cannot, and at the right time and place (after the election) my opponent will admit this by again asking for more tax money.

I propose that we not follow the plan of James D. Adams, which includes taking the existing Prestonsburg High School and making it into offices for the central office.

I believe we should follow the recommendations of the state, which they made in 1988, and renovate the existing high school to a condition equal to any school in this area, then use the remaining monies for the renovation of Prestonsburg Elementary School, Clark Elementary, and Auxier Elementary.

2. Examine the figures below and you will see that it is not a question of money. With current tax increases, the Floyd County School System is **NUMBER ONE IN OUR AREA** for new money coming into the system. On the right side below, you have the figures for "spending per pupil" which is the money that actually makes it through the central office, gets past high salaries, favored contracts, and big budget spending projects. This amount of money is that which is **ACTUALLY SPENT ON THE CHILD** for hands-on education in the classroom! Even though Floyd County School System is **NUMBER ONE IN NEW REVENUE**, we are **FOURTH FROM THE BOTTOM IN OUR AREA** for money spent per pupil. We are below our neighbors in Knott & Magoffin counties. This tells the whole story. So I ask you, when the children do not get their fair share of this new money, what will it soon mean? That my opponent, James D. Adams, will be asking for more revenue that they might supposedly educate our children.

Let's spend your tax dollars wisely and not grab for more. Let's put our money on the children and their future. The answer is not more money alone, it's the wise and responsible use of the money the board now has! I personally witnessed the attitude of the chairman on this October 1, 1990 meeting. He held up his right hand and rubbed his fingers together as he spoke of the need for more money to get the job done. He is speaking of your money and my money. Look again at the chart below and see what we have compared to the other systems around us, and see how little of it actually goes to the children. local business and industry leaders on career-oriented curriculum.

Following Billips, Dr. James D. Adams, a five-term incumbent, also suggested that renovation was a top priority for the system, but his plan for improvements took a bricks-and-mortar approach.

Adams contended that a school-building program was a top priority, noting that many school buildings were beyond the age of repair.

"Many of our buildings," Adams said, "are 50 years old and older. They are not conducive to good education and many are not safe for our children."

Adams said education reform laws would allow for rebuilding and he proposed that the school system adopt a structure providing for elementary teaching in kindergarten through grade five; followed by middle school and high school programs. Adams admitted that his middle-school proposals had not been embraced by other members of the board.

Adams and Billips differed on plans to build a new high school to replace Prestonsburg High, with Adams supporting on-going plans to build the new school outside the downtown area. Billips said he preferred that the existing high school be renovated with excess construction funds to be allocated to other areas.

The board is currently planning reconstruction of the city high school about four miles from the current location, on Route 114.

Adams also differed somewhat on Billips suggestion that community involvement in the schools be increased.

"Involve the community in

schools? It can be good, it can be bad," Adams said.

"If you come in united, with a workable proposal, it gets done," Adams added. "If you come in disorganized, all you get is chaos."

Adams also noted that he had "always tried to cooperate on workable projects" with school Parent Teacher Associations (PTAs), but he said those organizations should "organize the first day of school."

Responding to questions concerning tax increases proposed or implemented by the school board, Adams said those measures had been mandated by House Bill 940. He said he didn't necessarily agree with all reforms in the new legislation but added that it was the law.

"I am a law-abiding citizen," Adams said. "I do not break laws, I will comply with the law."

Taking his turn at the podium, Billips said the three major problems facing the school system included low morale among teachers and students, aging facilities and the transportation of students.

"Some of these students," Billips contended, "are leaving home at six in the morning and getting back home at six in the evening. They're spending more time (getting to and from school) than their parents spend on the job."

Monday's candidate forum coincided with the regular October meeting of the Floyd County Chamber of Commerce. Incumbent school board candidate Ray "Shag" Campbell and opponent Franklin D. May, who seek election in board District 2, were also invited, but did not attend the Monday session.

## Forest fire season begins

The Kentucky Fall Forest Fire season began on October 1 and will run through December 15 of this year. During the period, the Corps of Engineers is urging all park visitors, hunters and fishermen to be extra careful with fire when visiting the lake.

The accumulation of dry ground litter combined with gusty winds and a careless person can result in devastation to a forest.

It is unlawful during the fire season to set a fire to any flammable

material capable of spreading a fire located in or within 150 feet of any private woodland or brush land, except between the hours of 7:30 p.m. to midnight, local time.

The Corps of Engineers reminds you that fires are not permitted, except when contained in fire grills designed especially for that purpose. When fires are built, care must be taken to completely extinguish them to prevent a restart that could get out of control. Smokers should make sure that a cigarette is completely safe before it is discarded.

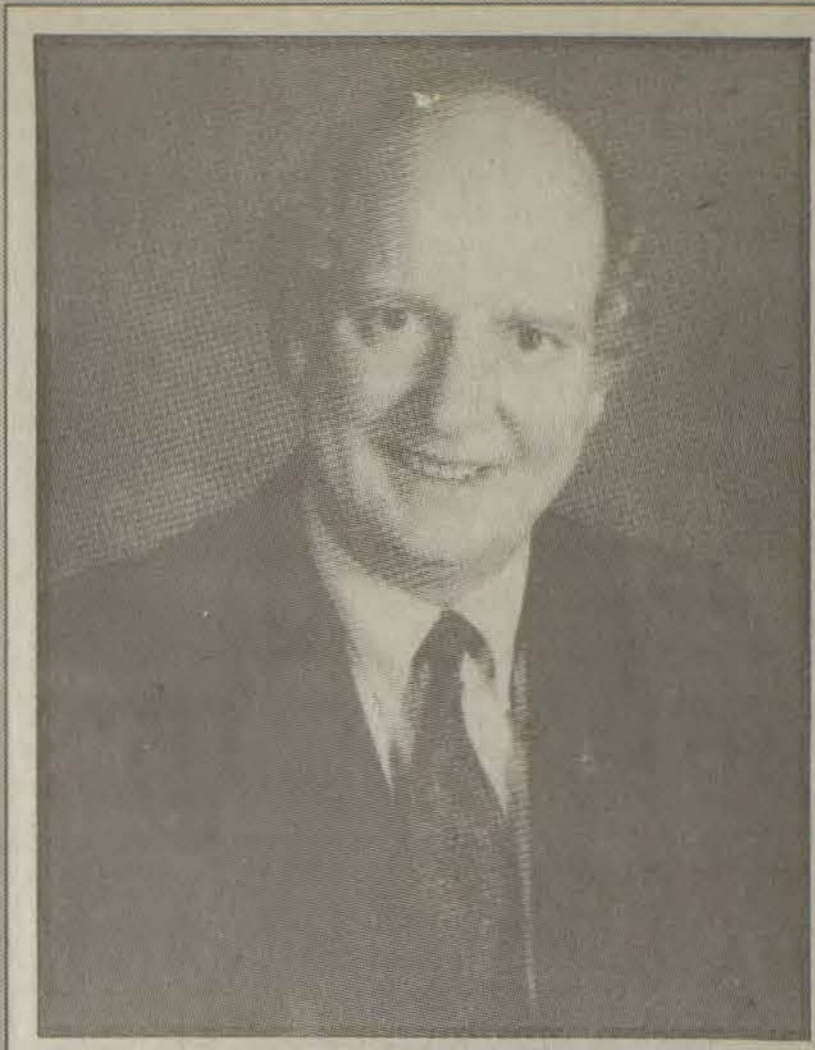

## Pollution prevention grants available for small businesses

The Kentucky Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet encourages small businesses to apply for grants to provide assistance in demonstrating innovative approaches to pollution prevention. The program will give grants up to \$25,000 to enhance pollution prevention research in the small business environment, which should promote a marketwide awareness of innovative solutions to the problem.

The University of Pittsburgh's Center for Hazardous Material Research (CHMR) is administering the grant program — "Pollution Prevention By and For Small Business" — for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Funding for the grants will come from EPA's 2 Percent Pollution Prevention Set-Aside Program.

"This program represents a major initiative at EPA to reach out to small businesses and promote their use of pollution prevention technologies," said Dr. Edgar Berkey, president of CHMR. "We want to encourage as many small businesses as possible to apply for a grant so we can identify the best projects for support."

CHMR will make available approximately \$800,000 in grants over a two-year period starting in 1991. Grant applications can be obtained from CHMR by calling 1-800-334-CHMR; or from the EPA Small Business Ombudsman Hotline by calling 1-800-368-5888. The application deadline for 1991 grants is Monday, Oct. 15, 1990. CHMR must

receive five copies of the completed application by the Oct. 15 deadline. Grant winners will be announced on November 15. Applications for the 1992 grants will be available around August 1991.

Applicants must offer a technical approach to waste reduction rather than a programmatic solution. (EPA is not interested in someone writing a manual on how to implement a waste reduction program.) Only source reduction, not treatment solutions (other than unique recycling), will be considered. Applicants should stress reduced exposure to toxic and hazardous products.

Those small businesses in Kentucky interested in beginning a waste reduction program on their own, should contact Kentucky Partners, the state's waste reduction center at the University of Louisville. The state waste reduction program, established through the Kentucky General Assembly, began in 1988. Kentucky Partners is a free, confidential and non-regulatory service to help all Kentucky businesses and industries reduce, recycle, reuse and recover the the hazardous waste generated through their plants, processes and products.

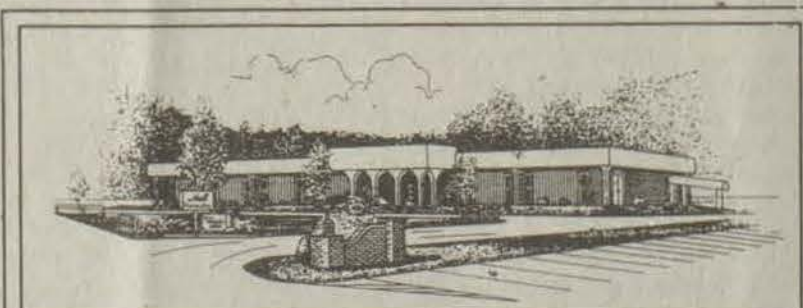

### Elderly program expands with retirement research grant

The Retirement Research Foundation in Illinois has given the Christian Appalachian Project a grant to increase the number of participants in the project's elderly program.

The \$30,000 grant is the second time in two years that Retirement Research has provided funds for expanding the scope of the project's elderly program.

Last year about \$22,000 was given to expand into Estill County. This year the money, which will be twenty percent of the elderly program's total operating budget, will be used to increase participation in counties where the Christian Appalachian Project offers elderly services.

The elderly program serves approximately 339 people in Floyd, Estill, Garrard, Lincoln, southern Madison, Magoffin, Pulaski and Rockcastle counties. Project staff and volunteers visit the elderly in their homes; have group activities for them;

drive them to medical appointments and church; help with various insurance problems; help them adjust to

living in a nursing home during their first month; and celebrate their birthdays.

The program in both Floyd County and Magoffin County will use part of the grant to establish a special fund to help people already participating with health related items. In the other counties, the money will be used to support more staff and possibly introduce the services in another county.

The Retirement Research Foundation supports programs that improve the quality of life for older persons in the United States. It encourages programs that maintain independent living skills, improve nursing home care, provide volunteer and employment opportunities, and seek causes and solutions to significant problems of the aged.

### Explosion hits state police building

Leslie County-An explosion at about 3 a.m. Tuesday, Oct. 2, damaged a communications building and tower used by the Kentucky State Police in Leslie County. Because the communication equipment was used as a relay station, the blast knocked out telephone lines and cut radio communications to the state police post in Harlan, which covers Bell, Harlan and Knox counties. Kentucky State Police Capt. Tim Hazelette said that although no evidence has been discovered that links the explosion to marijuana growers, he suspects a link between the explosion and the hundreds of thousands of marijuana plants destroyed in Leslie County during the past few months. The explosion is being investigated by the Kentucky State Police Hazard post and the Hazardous Devices Unit of the Kentucky State Police. (Lexington Herald-Leader)

### Change of venue denied for Freeburn woman

Pikeville-Pike Circuit Judge Charles Lowe Jr. denied a motion for a change of venue for murder and theft charges in an indictment against Carolyn Runyon Smith. Smith is charged with murder and theft in the death of Clyde McCoy whose body has never been found. Smith's attorney, Robert Greene, asked for the change of venue due to pretrial publicity. (Appalachian News-Express)

### Reform law helps Perry County schools graduate to new level

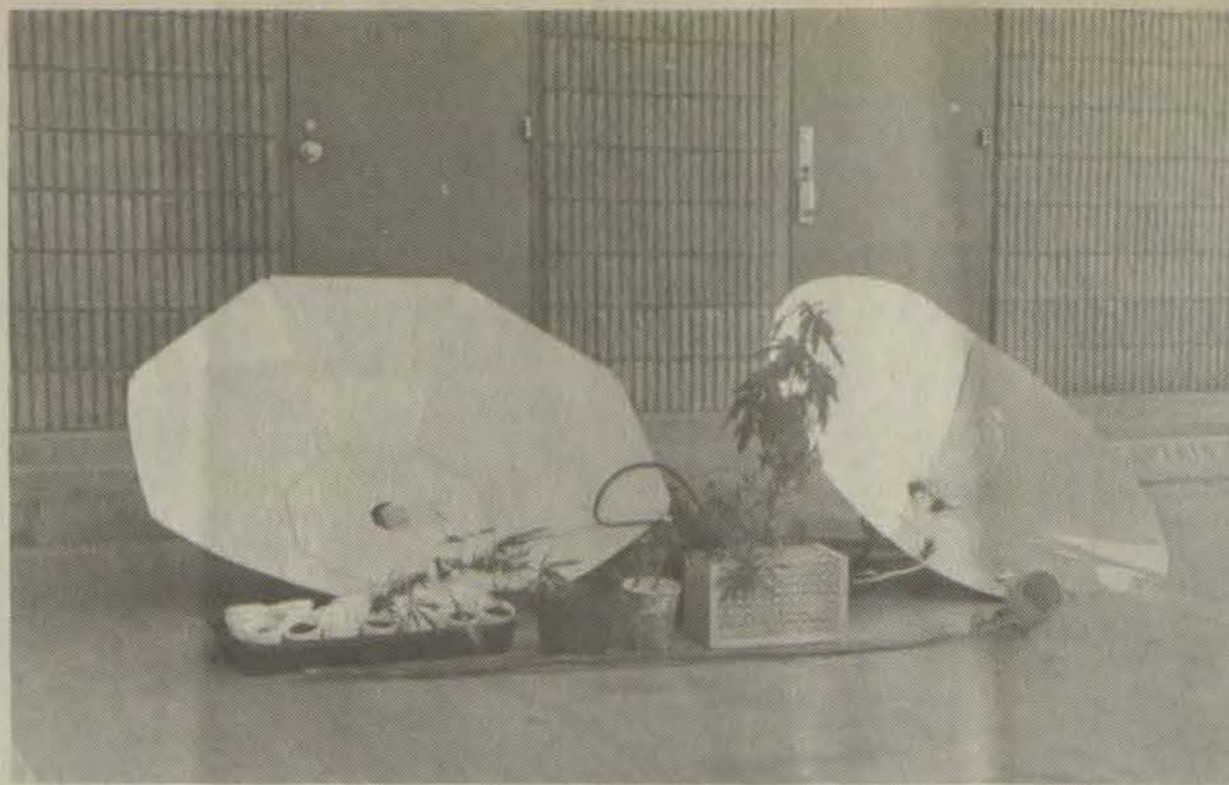
Hazard-As the inaugural year of Kentucky's education-reform effort begins, the air of change is palpable at Robert W. Combs Elementary School in Perry County. With the new money that came with the new reform law, the school district hire more counselors and teachers for art, music and special education. It scheduled computer purchases and granted raises of 15 percent for teachers and 12 percent for support workers. The county school board tightened restrictions on fund raising and abolished an annual \$12 per child fee for instructional supplies. Instead of the fee, schools will get a \$20 per child allotment of reform money. (The Courier-Journal)

### Litigants fighting over who owns coal

Cadetsburg-A tangled web of litigation surrounding bankrupt Ashland businessman Eric Charles continued to grow this week. At least five companies are now fighting over who owns coal-worth perhaps \$1 million-that Charles' W.E.C. Coal Sales Inc. bought but allegedly didn't pay for. Steven F. Graves & Co. Inc., of Hazard, joined the fracas Thursday. The Graves complaint was added to a lawsuit filed Sept. 14 by Pikeville-based Hatburn Coal Co. Inc. (The Daily Independent)

### School Board Employees file suit to challenge council's tax ordinance

Salyersville-Employees of the Magoffin County School Board filed suit in Magoffin Circuit Court Wednesday, Sept. 26, against the City of Salyersville in an attempt to block an occupational tax ordinance adopted last week by the city council. Members of the Salyersville City Council passed a one-percent occupational tax in September. The tax, to include all employees currently working within the city's corporate limits, went into effect Oct. 1. School board employees say the ordinance is illegal and excessive. The group claims that a public hearing was not properly advertised according to state law governing special meetings and public hearings. The law suit claims that the city council exceeded its power in enacting the tax ordinance and failed to specify public purpose for the tax. (The Salyersville Independent)

### Indoor pot garden nets one arrest

Kentucky State Police raided the home of a Collins Branch man Sunday morning and found an elaborate system used for indoor cultivation of marijuana plants.

Officers at the scene confiscated 40 grown hemp plants, 103 cups with seeds in sprouting or germination stage, and an elaborate lighting system which was used in conjunction with self-watering growing trays and automatic timers for the lights. Police also confiscated one .45 caliber rifle.

Police arrested Jimmy Joe Jones, 38, of Collins Branch Road near the Knott and Floyd County line in the Wayland area. Jones was lodged in the Floyd County Jail and charged with felony cultivation of more than five marijuana plants. Jones was reportedly using two rooms of his house as a greenhouse for the marijuana cultivation operation.

The arrest came after a joint investigation between Trooper Tim Lucas of Post 13 at Hazard and Trooper Les Stapleton of Post Nine at Pikeville.

The raid on the home was conducted by Trooper David Watkins, Trooper James Justice, Trooper Tim Lucas, Sergeant Larry Prater, Detective Joel Newsome and Trooper Stacy Trees with Canine Unit Rex. The case remains under investigation by Trooper Les Stapleton.

**A flaw or a thorn?**

On Tuesday, Sept. 18, the UK Board of Trustees announced that Dr. Charles T. Wethington, Jr. would become the University's next president. This decision came at the end of a search process that some would have the public believe was flawed from the beginning. Having been a part of the selection process some two-and-a-half years ago when Dr. David Roselle was selected as UK's ninth president, I have observed as closely as possible this last search

from its beginning. Quite honestly, like many of my colleagues within the system, I knew this process would be very complicated and that it would generate a magnitude of public concern. But a flawed search process? No way.

In my opinion this search process was never flawed, granted that a majority of the trustees are Governor Wilkinson appointees. One only has to look at the members of the entire board and those board members who served on the selection committee. In either case, look at the backgrounds of these folk taking into consideration character and integrity. Are they types which can be manipulated? Is Board Chairman Foster Ockerman

the type who can be used as a pawn? I say, emphatically, no. On the contrary, you are talking about an exceptionally intelligent group of individuals who are making important decisions on a daily basis.

No, there was no flaw in this selection process, but if one looks closely enough, I think you will find a very sharp thorn. The thorn presented itself through one of Kentucky's finest newspapers, the Lexington Herald-Leader. It is not that the newspaper was wrong in its position. Neither individual nor corporation can ever be wrong when ever taking a stand on public issues regardless of outcome. This is democracy — the American way. However, approach and reaction can oft times be in err and I feel very strongly that this is the status of the Herald-Leader on the issue. Whenever I tell my two young daughters, as I already have, that winning is secondary to how one plays the game, I truly mean it. With some individuals and some groups of individuals it is obvious that this philosophy is not dominant. I think that the straw which broke the camel's back came in the editorial section of the Sunday Herald-Leader on Sept. 16. My immedi-

ate response to the Herald-Leader letters to the Editor Column was as follows:

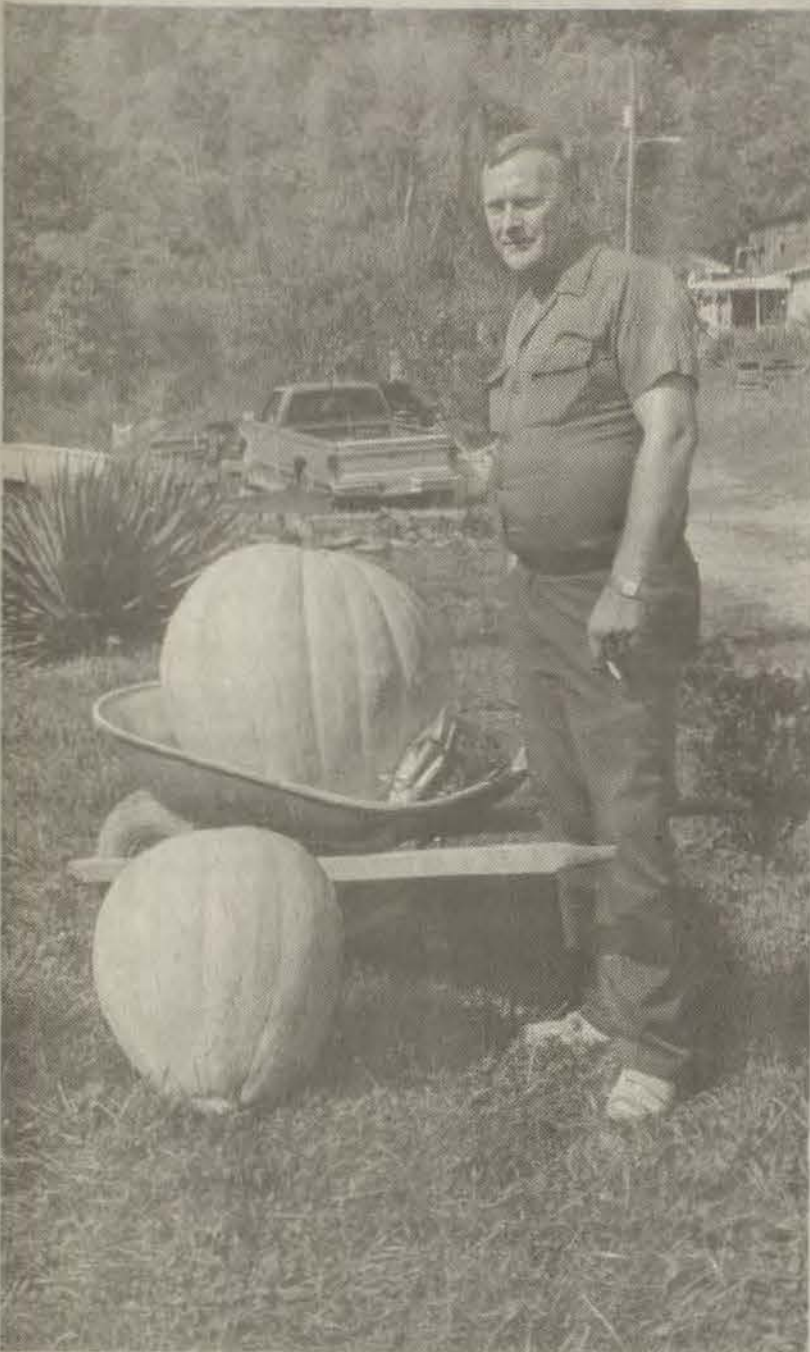
"Has the Lexington Herald-Leader become the very type of entity which in numerous instances in the past it has opposed? In reading the editorial, 'Is this UK or Salyersville?,' which appeared in the Sunday, Sept. 16 edition, one would have to conclude yes. I have never read, in this or any other newspaper, a more distasteful editorial. You have inferred that one of this state's most capable academic administrators is nothing more than a

crony and you have demeaned the integrity of the folks of Magoffin County for no apparent reason."

"The type of irresponsible journalism found in this article is scary, to say the least. There is an undercurrent here which says 'take heed to those who defy the wishes of the Herald-Leader lest you incur its wrath'. There was a time in Kentucky's past when this newspaper would never have used such antics. Is the Herald-Leader so strong and powerful it no longer cares about self-image? Has it become so vain

that intimidation of the innocent no longer matters? Kentucky deserves and should expect more in terms of persuasive journalism than articles written out of more desperation."

One can only hope that we have all learned a valuable lesson from this somewhat unpleasant experience. It is my personal desire that all of Kentucky will unite behind Dr. Wethington and give him the support and encouragement necessary to make the University of Kentucky the quality institution which we all envision for this truly great commonwealth.

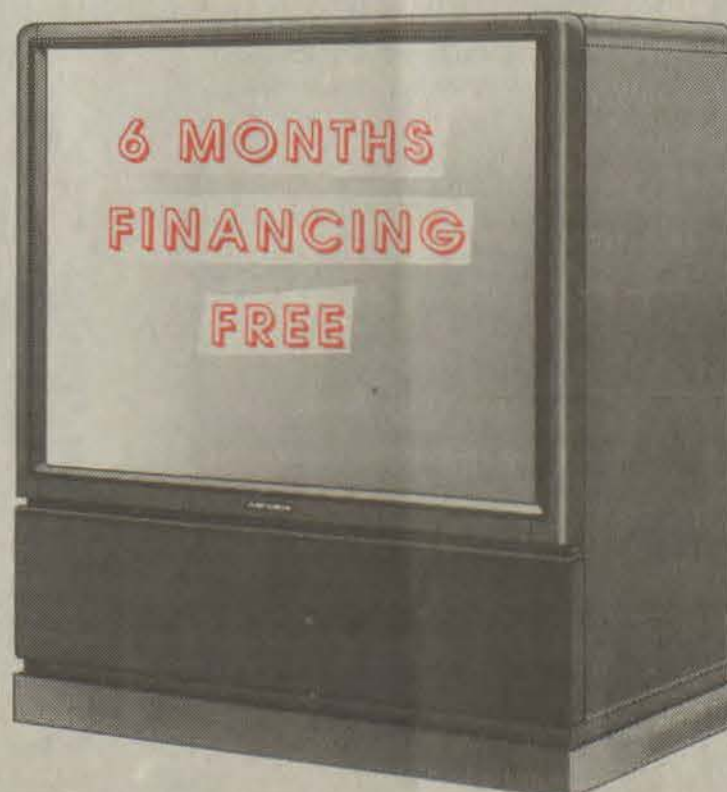

On the first play from scrimmage, with John Thomas Clark at quarterback for the Blackcats, Clark hit Allen James with a 16-yard pass for a first down. On the second play of the game on a sweep around right end, Clark fumbled the ball and Gibbs recovered.

It looked as if the Blackcat were going to strike themselves as they put together a nice drive down field on their next possession. On a third and fourth play, Clark found Worthie McGuire for 16-yards and a Blackcat first down moving the football to the Belfry 44-yard line. Jonathan Leslie came out of the backfield for a nine yard gain, and on the next carry the Blackcats were in good position on the Pirates 38 with a first down. On a second and 10 situation, Clark fired up field only to have his pass picked off by Bryan Swords, ending the drive.

The Pirates made it 12-0 in the first quarter when Dale Oliver carried the ball on a 37-yard run for the TD. Oliver, 6-0, 180 senior, bounced off of tacklers in his second and third efforts before he found running room and struck paydirt.

The first period ended with Belfry in control of the football and on the Prestonsburg 27-yard line. On the first play from scrimmage in the second period, on a scoring play that took eight seconds, Belfry quarterback J.J. Hylton ran 27-yards for the

touchdown and Brad Barker kicked the extra point for a commanding 19-0 Pirate lead.

Clark was filling in for Aaron Tucker at quarterback against Belfry. Tucker had been under the weather and unable to practice and sat this game out, although he was in uniform. Clark was thrown for losses on two carries for Prestonsburg forcing the Blackcats to give up the football. Belfry took over the ball on the Prestonsburg 47-yard line where Hylton connected with Ryan Martin for a 35-yard pass. Chris Phillips moved the ball to the Prestonsburg 3-yard line and on the next play, Phillips carried over for the touchdown. Barker kicked the extra point for a 26-0 lead.

The ground game just wasn't there for the Blackcats against the Pirates, the state's number 13 team. The Pirates had their linemen pinch in, closing up any holes up the middle, forcing the Blackcats to go to the ends. From their own 36-yard line, Prestonsburg was forced to punt again and four plays later it was 33-0 on a 22-yard pass play from Hylton to Mark Carroll. Barker added the extra point. On the ensuing kickoff, the Blackcats fumbled the football and the Pirates recovered.

In the third quarter, after Belfry was forced to give up control of the ball, Prestonsburg again put together a good drive. The Blackcats took the ball from their own 30-yard line and moved to the Pirates 41 where offsetting penalties upset Blackcat coach Bill Letton. Letton was flagged for unsportsmanlike conduct and penalized 15-yards. On a fourth and 20 play, the coach was flagged for another 15-yards for the same call.

Belfry had a total offense of 259-yards. The Pirates rushed for 211 on 33 carries. Hylton had three completions in seven attempts for 48-yards. The Pirates were penalized 30-yards on six flags. They turned the ball over twice on fumbles.

Dale Oliver was the Pirates leading rusher with 75-yards on six carries. Oliver scored one touchdown.

Hylton had 36-yards on just two carries and he also had a TD.

For Prestonsburg, the Blackcats managed just 49-yards on the ground on 24 carries. Clark was five of 12 passing for 62-yards. McGuire had 46-yards with four receptions. Leslie was the leading rusher for the Blackcats with 17-yards on five carries. John Goble, a sophomore, managed 16-yards on six attempts.

Prestonsburg was penalized for 35-yards on three flags, and they turned the ball over twice — one interception and one fumble. Clark was sacked twice for losses of 10 and 12-yards.

The Blackcats were playing without Tucker and Mike Hobson in the backfield. Out also for the Cats was Todd Goodman, who has been a leading force on the Blackcat defense.

Allen James was hurt in the first minute of the game and was out with an injury the remainder of the contest. Ronnie Goodman was lost to the team for the Belfry game also. Ditto Charlie Thompson.

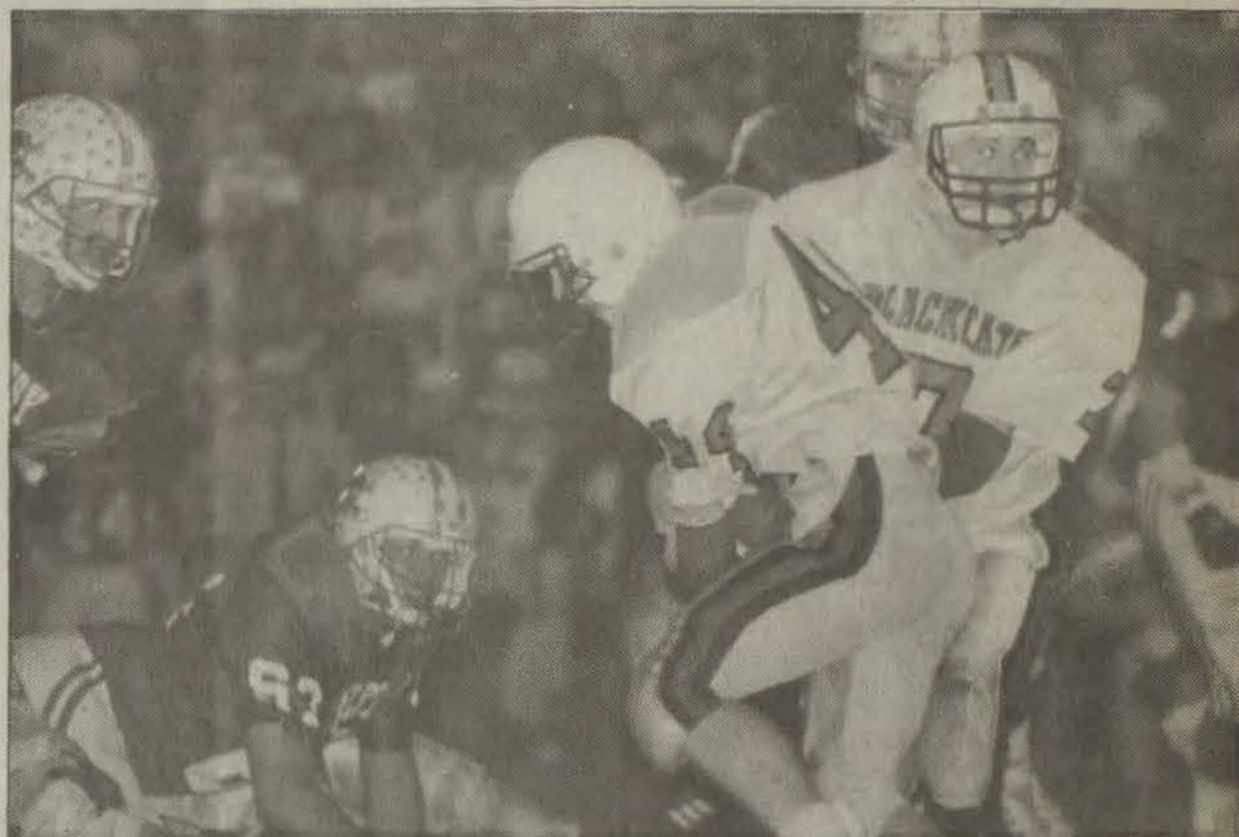

## Rowe Scores 5 TDs As Elkhorn Handles Betsy Layne, 60-0

The high school football season hasn't gotten any better for the Betsy Layne Bobcats since the opening game of the season — a 22-0 loss to the Wheelwright Trojans. Friday night you could more than double that score as the Bobcats stumbled to a 60-0 loss to the Elkhorn City Cougars at Elkhorn City. The week before it was a 72-0 setback at the hands of Leslie County. The loss to the Cougars was the seventh of the year for coach Gerald Newsome's Bobcats. Betsy Layne has yet to win.

It was all Shawn Rowe for the Cougars as the 5-7, 155 senior scored five touchdowns in leading the Cougars to their third victory of the year against four setbacks. Rowe also was the game's leading rusher with 139-yards on 13 carries.

The Cougars seemed to have good field position on every possession against the Bobcats. The Cougars not only had a good productive game offensively, but the defense shined for Elkhorn also.

Elkhorn scored on their second possession of the game after returning a Bobcat punt to the Betsy Layne 32-yard line. A face-masking penalty moved the ball to the Bobcats 17-yard line where Rowe scooted in for his first touchdown. Jason Dales added the extra point for a 7-0 lead at the 9:39 mark of the first period.

Rowe struck again in the first quarter, two minutes later. The speedster carried the ball 9-yards for a touchdown and Dales added the extra point for a 14-0 lead.

Kevin Rose, 6-0, 165 junior, got in on the scoring act with 5:55 remaining in the first stanza when he ran a punt return 52-yards for a TD to make it 20-0. The Cougars tried for the two-point conversion, but failed. Rowe's 13-yard run in the period made it 26-0 at the end of the first quarter.

Rowe made it 33-0 with a 23-yard gallop in the second quarter and Dales added his third extra point as the Cougars went to the dressing room at halftime.

When play resumed in the third

quarter, the Cougars picked up where they had left off when, just 29 seconds into the second half, Rowe crossed the goal line from 15-yards out. Quarterback Kevin Rose hit Joey Thacker with a pass to swell the margin to 41-0.

Rowe's fifth TD of the game pushed the score to the final margin, 60-0, on a four-yard run with :38 to go.

The defense for the Cougars was led by Mark Aragon, who had six quarterback sacks.

For Betsy Layne, Tony Lykins carried the ball 14 times for 49-yards. Blaine Depoy carried 17 times for 43-yards.

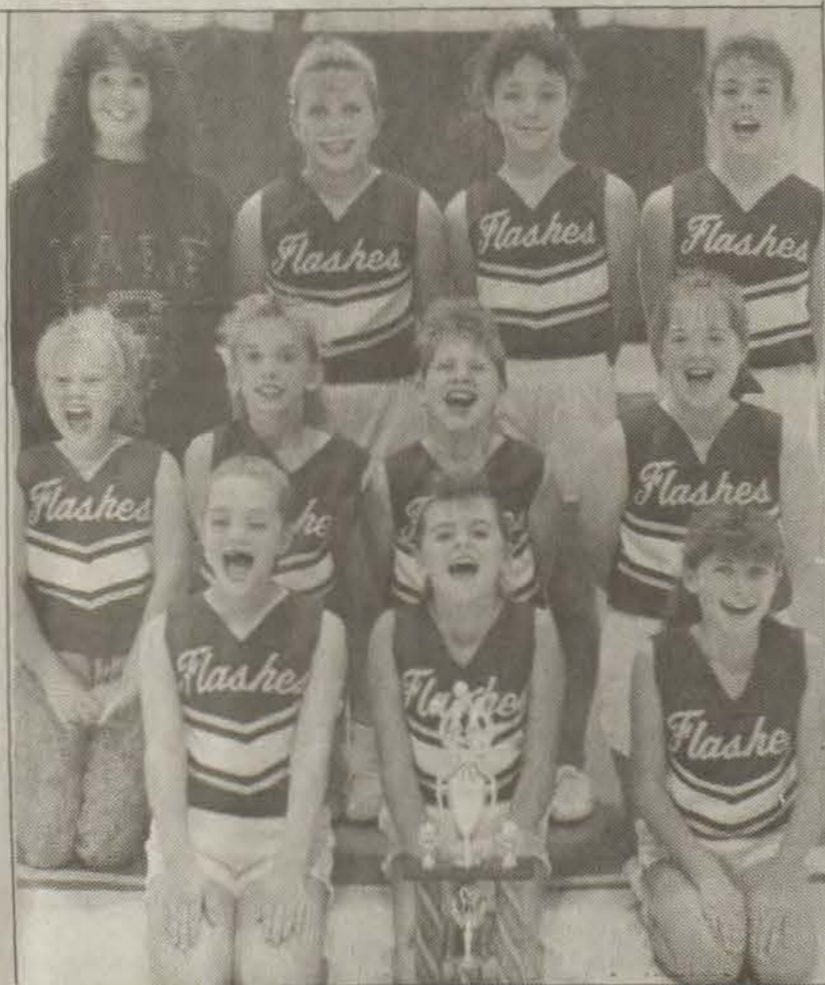
All of Elkhorn City's yardage came on the ground as they had a total

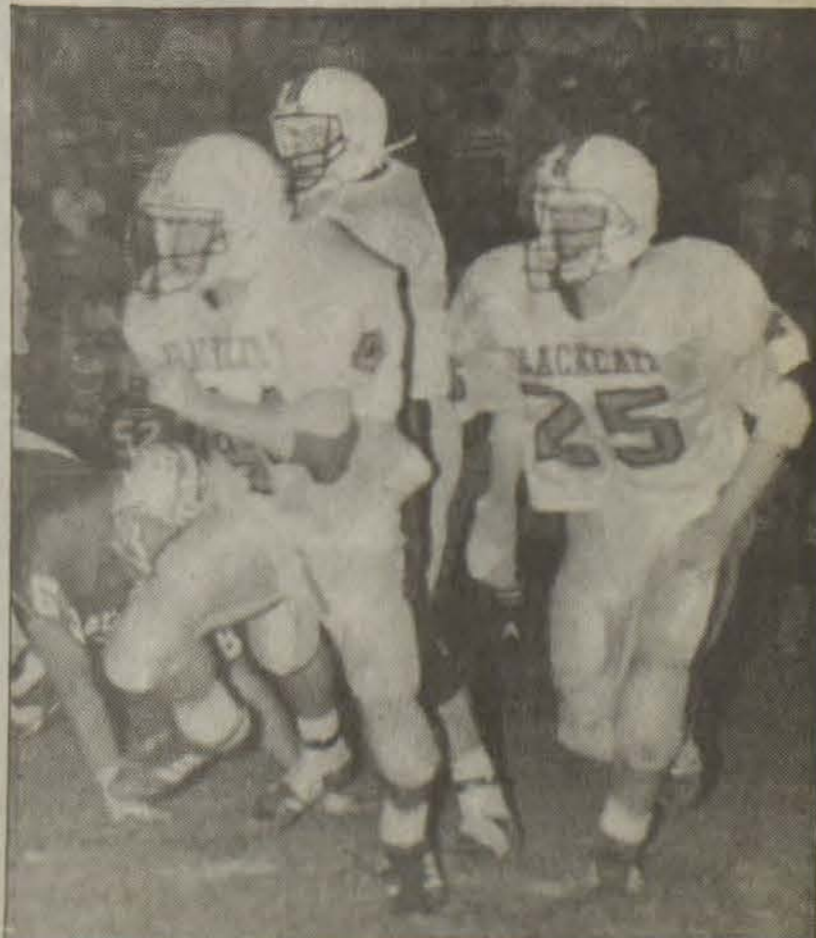

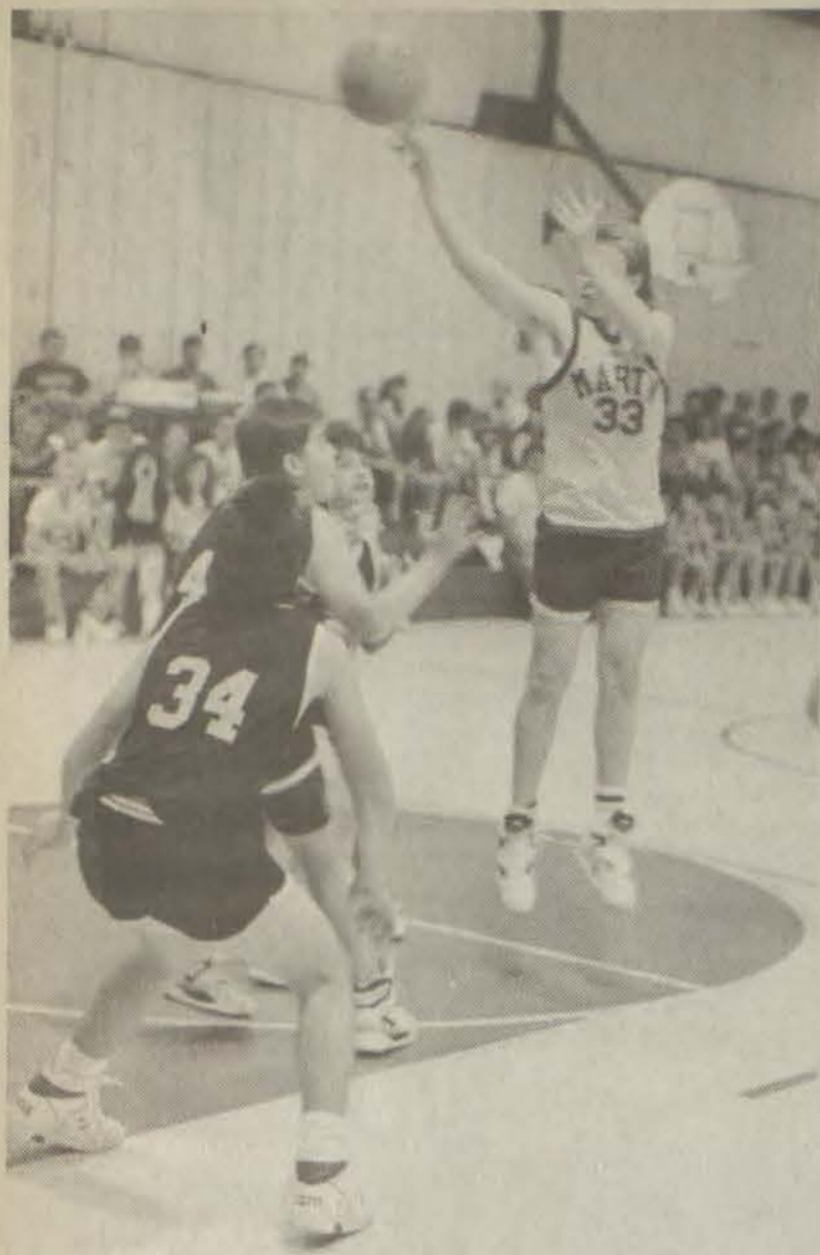

**Martin captures first Right Beaver Classic over Stumbo Mustangs, 58-50**

"Mustangs, Mustangs, Mustangs!" "Flashes, Flashes, Flashes"

So the chants went at the Martin gym Saturday night as the fans from two schools competed against one another in support of their teams. Not many high school games had the atmosphere that this game possessed.

The game that everyone had waited for since the Right Beaver Invitational began on Monday night of last week, took place in the championship game at Martin Saturday night before a packed house. The noisy fans saw the Martin Purple Flash come from behind and hold off a good John M. Stumbo Mustang team and capture the first-ever Right Beaver Classic, 58-50, over the Mustangs behind the 27-point performance of Chad Slone. Derrick Newsome, Stumbo, was the game's leading scorer with 30 points.

The game was just two minutes old when controversy took over. When the action got rough under the Purple Flash basket, Toby Newsome received a cut above his right eye, causing extensive bleeding. Stumbo coach, Paul David Tackett, rushed onto the floor and the officials immediately stuck him with a technical foul, causing a disturbance between coach, fans and officials.

"I just went out onto the floor to see about Toby," explained Tackett of the technical foul. "Any coach, when he sees one of his players hurt like Toby was, will naturally rush to attend to him. The official should have called an official's timeout so he could be properly looked after." No official timeout was called by the officials and Tackett was stuck with the call.

Newsome hit an open basket to put the Mustangs up 2-0. Slone tied the game at 2-2. On Martin's next trip down the floor, Byron Gearheart went up for a shot under the basket where he was fouled. Newsome was injured on the play and the technical was

called. Gearheart hit one of his foul shots and tossed in one of two technical shots. Martin then ran off six straight points for a 10-2 lead.

Stumbo then went to a pressure defense that caused Martin some problems and the Purple Flash turned the ball over 12 times in the first half (four in the first quarter and eight times in the second).

Newsome began to ripple the nets as Martin failed to take care of the basketball and Stumbo fought back to take a 14-12 first quarter lead.

After Martin scored first on a basket by Toby Robinson, who finished the game with 14 points, Stumbo took a five point lead, 19-14 on a basket by Steve Johnson and a three point play by Newsome.

With Stumbo holding a 26-22 lead with 2:40 remaining in the half, the Mustangs went into a stall, only to turn the ball over with :18 showing on the clock. Slone hit a baseline jumper just before the clock expired and the two teams went to the dressing room with Stumbo holding onto a slim two point advantage, 26-24.

A 10-2 run by Martin in the early going of the third period put the Purple Flash ahead 34-30 following two Mustang turnovers. Joe Bryant hit a nice turnaround jumper to make it 34-30. Martin's attack was set back some when Gearheart picked up his fourth personal foul and got some "pine time." The game was tied at 34, 36 and 38 before Johnson's short jumper made it 40-38 at the third stop.

A charity toss by Newsome tied the score at 44-44 with 3:34 remaining in the game. After a Martin time out, Gearheart fouled out with 3:26 to go and, 14 seconds later, Bryant

picked up his fifth personal. Martin took a 47-44 lead on a bucket by Slone and Brian Conn's freethrow with 2:22 showing.

Martin began to get behind the Mustangs pressing defense and picked up some easy baskets to pull out to a six point advantage, 51-45.

"We tired there in the end," said Tackett. "The boys have played three nights in row and they have to be tired."

Martin turned the ball over on three straight possessions but the Mustangs failed to take advantage of the mistakes as they missed some easy baskets underneath. It was then that Robinson took over and picked up six points against the Stumbo press to put the game out of reach.

The game was tied nine times; the last being at 44-44. Stumbo turned the ball over seven times and Martin committed a total of 20 turnovers.

For Martin, Slone had 27, Robinson added 14 and Gearheart tossed in 12.

Newsome's 30 led the Mustangs and Johnson finished with 9. Joe

Bryant scored six before fouling out. Stumbo shot 50 percent from the foul line hitting eight of 16 tosses. Martin attempted 22 free throws, 12 coming in the final 51 seconds of the game when Stumbo was forced to foul, hitting 12 for 22 for 54 percent.

For Betsy Layne, who was led by Clark's 12 and Ratcliff's nine, got six points from Eplin and two from Misty Reynolds. Osborne had one.

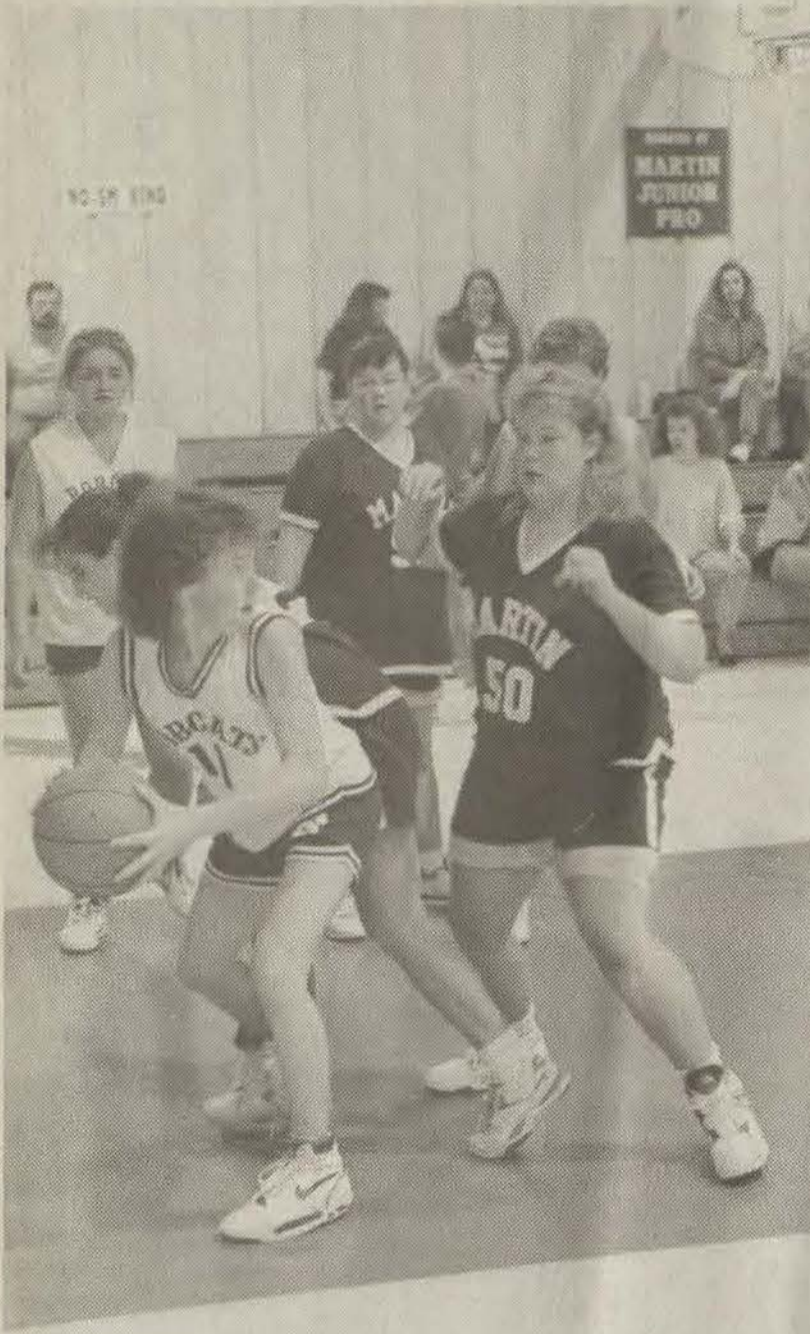
Martin coach Doug Derossett talked of his team playing harder after falling behind early 10-0.

McKinney figured it was up to her to do something if her team was to win.

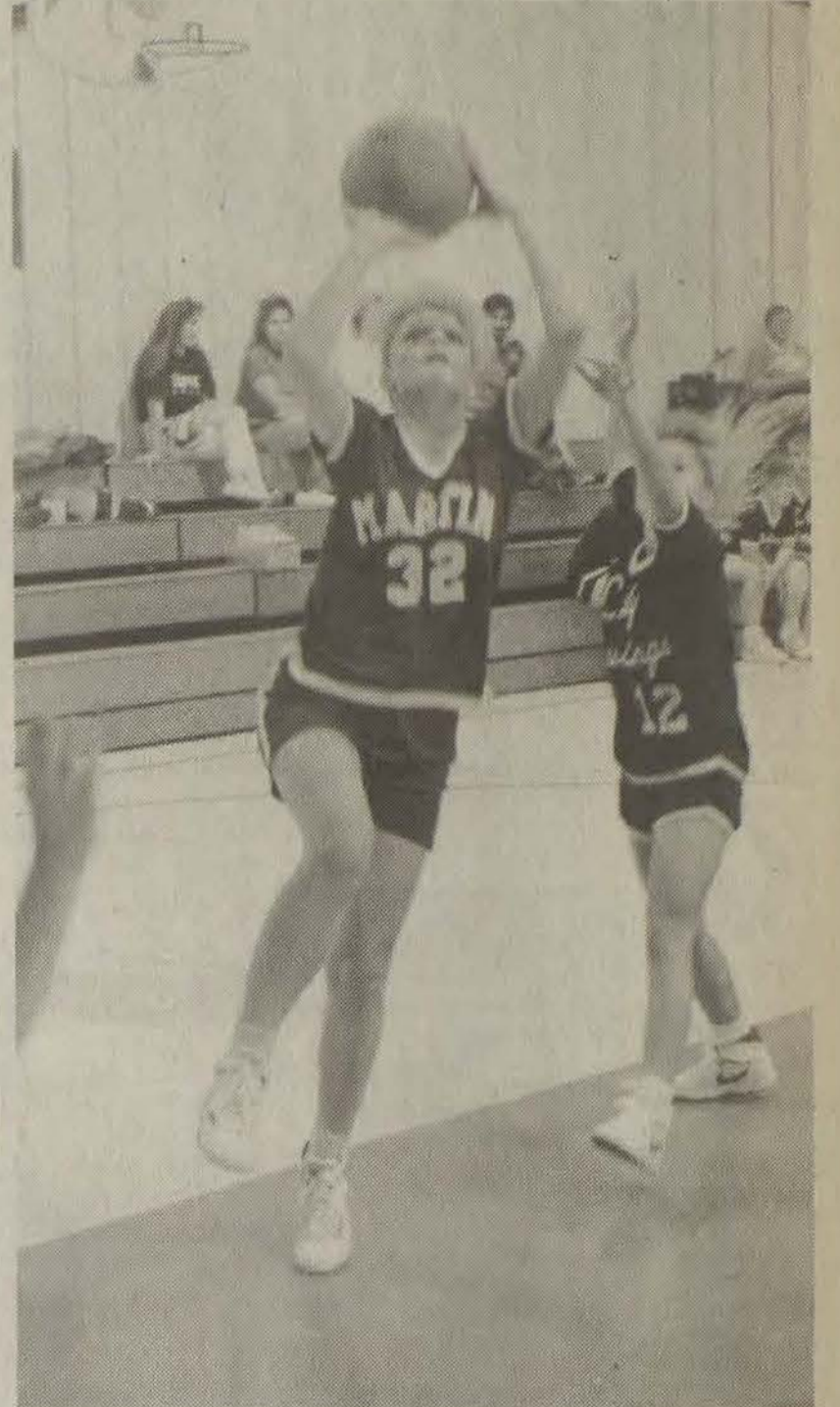
"I figured it was going have to be up to me if we were going to win," she said. "I didn't want to lose the game so I sort of took charge."

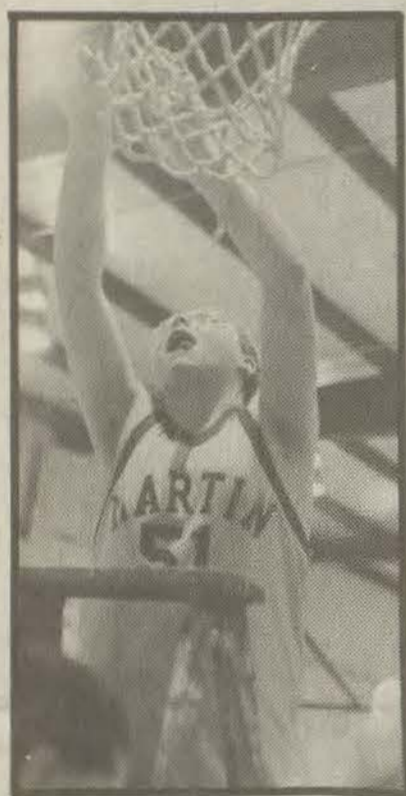

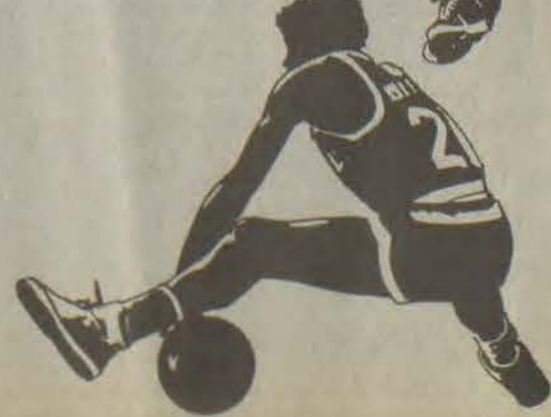
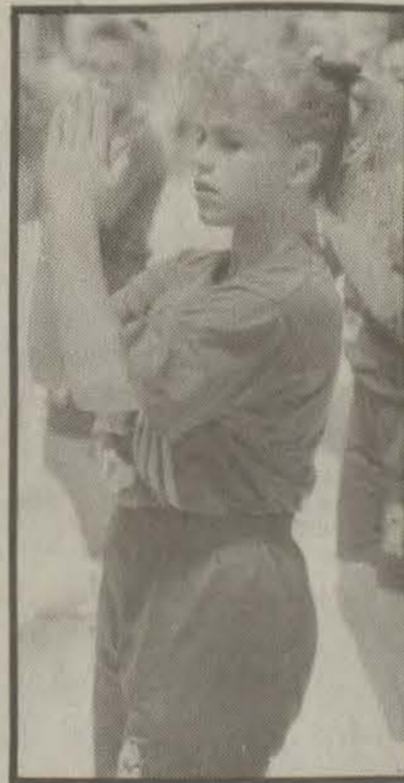

# Goble One Of Three Kentuckians Chosen To Fish BASS Masters Tournament

It is the dream of every bass fisherman in the country — to be able to fish in a B.A.S.S. Masters fishing tournament. For one Floyd County fisherman that dream will become a reality on October 15 when he registers to have his name drawn by a B.A.S.S. Masters pro.

James Edward Goble of Prestonsburg was one of only three from the state of Kentucky to have the privilege to fish with one of America's foremost bass fishermen. The other two chosen were from Pineville, a dentist, and Berea, an employee of IBM. The 1990 Virginia Top 100 B.A.S.S. Pro-Am Tournament will be held at Lake Kerr (also known as Bugs Island) in Alabama. Goble is a member of the Appalachian B.A.S.S. Masters Club in David. The club meets the second Thursday of each month. Dan Ison is the club's president.

For Goble, this is a dream come true as he has sent in his entry fee and name for the past four years in hopes that he would be chosen for the prestigious tournament. "Each year I would enter and each they would send my \$400 entry fee back and say 'sorry'," Goble said.

"There were around 2,500 entries sent in," recalled Goble. "They chose 100 out of all the entrants. Anglers from all over the United States try to get into the tournament. I have for the past four years sent in my entry and this year my name was drawn."

Goble, as an amateur, will be teamed with a pro during the four days of fishing. Each day he will be fishing with a different pro, as the pros draw out the name of the amateur they will fish with. For Goble, the realization of what is about to happen in his fishing career is starting to dawn on him.

"I'm getting nervous about it," he said. "I'm starting to realize what I have gotten into, and fishing with some of the best fishermen in the world is starting to get to me."

"I've never have fished, let alone seen Lake Kerr and I'm trying to find out all I can about it," said the fishing enthusiast. Goble relates how that he

has a stack of B.A.S.S. Masters magazines by his bed and he reads them all. Sometimes he will read article three or four times trying to find out all he can about Lake Kerr.

Goble used to teach fishing at Camp Webb in Grayson, Kentucky, to fifth and sixth graders 12 weeks each summer. He has the knowledge of how to fish and expects to use that knowledge to try and win the new Ranger fishing boat, valued at \$15,000, to be awarded to the top amateur in the tournament. The winning pro will pocket \$45,000.

If he won it, would he keep the boat?

"I don't know," said Goble. "People in the club says that if I win the boat they wanted to buy my old one."

Goble reflects on his childhood days when his father, Jimmy Goble, used to take him fishing at a very young age. "I have been fishing ever since then," said Goble, who is a self-employed air conditioner installer.

"My dad had me fishing ever since I had been walking."

Goble also has a corporation that will sponsor him in the tournament. York Air Conditioning out of Nashville, Tennessee has furnished Goble with 12 shirts, 24 pairs of pants, a set of insulated coveralls, five jackets, sweatshirts and will pick up the fisherman's motel expenses as well.

Goble says that he is going into the tournament with the attitude that he is going to win it.

"A positive mental attitude that you are going to win the tournament is very important," he said. "You cannot go down there with a defeatist attitude. If you do you have lost already."

Goble says that his fellow fishing buddies at the David club are behind him all the way and want him to win. The tournament will be paying off to the top 20 amateurs in the tourney.

The local amateur said that he has had a down year as far catching any fish this year. However, he said that if he can win this one it would more than make up for the bad year he has

experienced to date.

"This would be a good time for me to come out of it," he said of his slump. "This is a big one."

Goble said he doesn't really know how much equipment or what equipment he needs to take with him, but that he will be prepared whatever he needs.

"I am just going to enjoy being around guys who I have seen on television and heard so much about," he said of his trip to Lake Kerr. Goble says that if he should win the tournament as an amateur he doubts he would have any aspirations to turn pro himself.

"Personally, I couldn't do it because of being in business for myself and there is a lot of time spent at shows and endorsements that other companies would want a pro to do," he said. "There is such a demand on a professional bass fisherman's time."

Goble stated that he would be making the trip alone, but has hopes to hook up with another amateur who may be going that way. The Floyd County says that he will not need to take a boat as he will be sharing the boat owned by the pro he fishes with.

The rules of the tournament re-

quire the amateur to fish out of the rear of the boat while the pro has the front part. The secret to winning a B.A.S.S. Masters tournament is knowing where the fish are. That is the responsibility of the pro, knowing the lake waters. Amateurs are prohibited from fishing the tournament waters 14 days prior to tournament competition. Each amateur is also prohibited from fishing with a guide before the tournament.

Goble says that his wife, Ella, likes to fish but doesn't fish that much. He has two children — Matt, 14 and Sara, 12 — who attend school at the Mountain Christian Academy in Martin.

For many — it is still a dream that may never come true. For James Edward Goble it will become a reality come October 15.

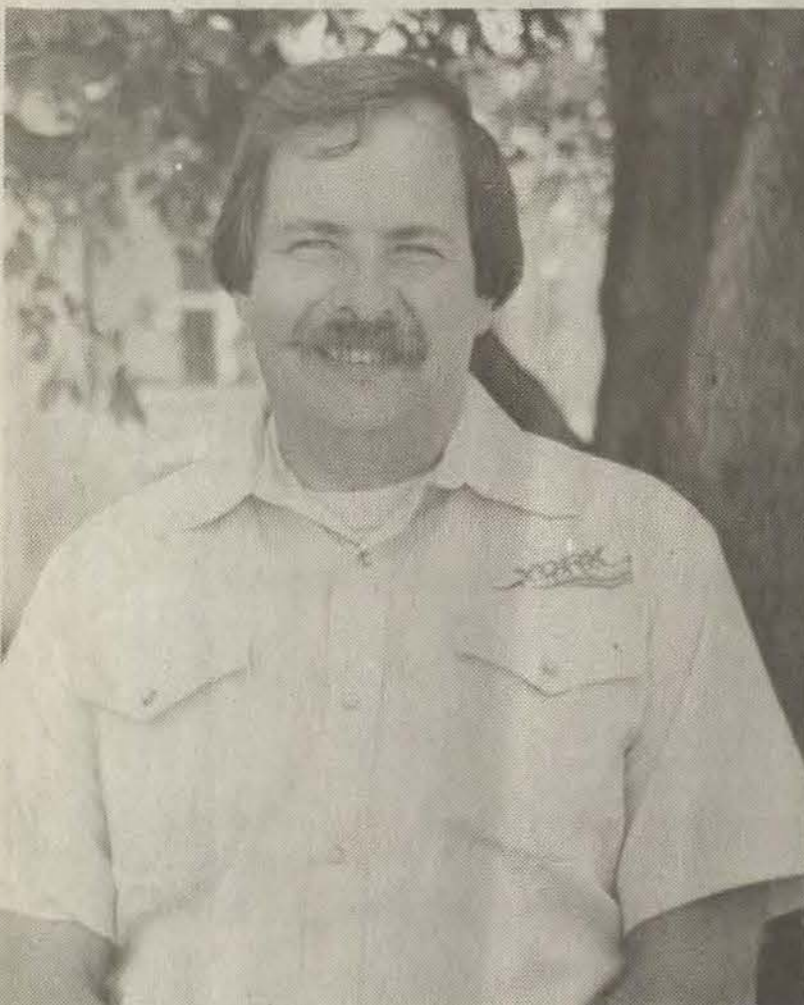

## Float Fishing With Stacey King

When he's not scorching the water in his Nitro White Lightning bass boat, Stacey King can most likely be found floating a quiet river somewhere in the Ozarks.

Float fishing for smallmouth bass happens to be one of the Reeds Spring, Missouri pro's favorite past times. And he is an expert at it.

A float trip down a tranquil stream can provide a host of memorable experiences. Having the proper equipment, knowing the habits of the quarry you seek and applying the proper techniques can enhance the chances of the average angler. King offers the following helpful tips:

Two popular boats for floating a stream are a flat bottom aluminum jon boat and a canoe. When more than two are planning a float, a flat bottom boat best serves the purpose.

A throwable cushion for each angler adds to their comfort in addition to providing individual safety.

A cooler can double as a seat plus provide storage for food and drinks. On hot summer days the drinks will be welcomed.

A small cooler or watertight container serves as storage for license, billfolds, car keys, etc. Also a good place to store sandwiches or snacks. The section of tackle for a float

is entirely dependent upon the species sought. Since most streams share a mixture of largemouth, smallmouth, spotted and rock bass, in addition to sunfish and catfish, light action spinning or bait casting provides the most excitement. In very clear streams, four to six pounds test works best. Slightly heavier line can be used when throwing a spinner bait or buzz bait.

During a normal float it is a rule of thumb to estimate the time at one mile per hour. A faster moving stream will cut this time considerably.

It is suggested that one paddle per person be aboard. A 12 volt trolling motor will help move the boat through stretches of still water. It also allows more fishing time. An anchor along with a 20 foot length of rope provides opportunities to stop and thoroughly fish productive waters.

Always provide life jackets for everyone. Study your maps when floating unfamiliar stretches and position your pick up vehicle where easy accessibility is available. Remember you will always be more tired at the end of a long float trip.

Finally, carry a small 35mm camera to photograph an exceptional catch. And practice catch and release as often as possible. Good luck and enjoy your float.



# Football Pro on safety in sports

As an All-American tight end at Notre Dame and a first round draft choice of the San Francisco 49ers, Ken MacAfee has seen his share of sports injuries caused by blows to the head, face and neck. But, unlike most other professional athletes, MacAfee now treats people who are injured during contact sports.

Ken MacAfee, D.M.D., an oral and maxillofacial surgeon and spokesperson for the American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons, is a vocal advocate of sports safety among children.

### PREVENTION IS FIRST PRIORITY

Whether on the sports field, in the backyard or on the playground, young athletes should always wear protective gear.

Mouthguards are the absolute minimum protection any child should wear. Dr. MacAfee also urges young athletes to use facemasks and helmets during football and hockey, and to use helmets with clear plastic shields when playing baseball.

"In contact sports, the face and mouth are particularly vulnerable to injuries," Dr. MacAfee said. "Hits from playing sticks, flying balls and other players can cause serious and instant damage."

### FIRST AID TIPS

For all injuries to the face and mouth, request an examination by an oral and maxillofacial surgeon upon arrival at an emergency care center.

—Knocked out tooth — Rinse it and replace it in the socket covered with a piece of gauze. Or, store in cold milk, salt water or saliva. Make sure it does not dry out.

—Facial bleeding — Cover the wound with cloth and apply pressure. Do not remove the soaked cloth; add more cloths and continue to apply pressure.

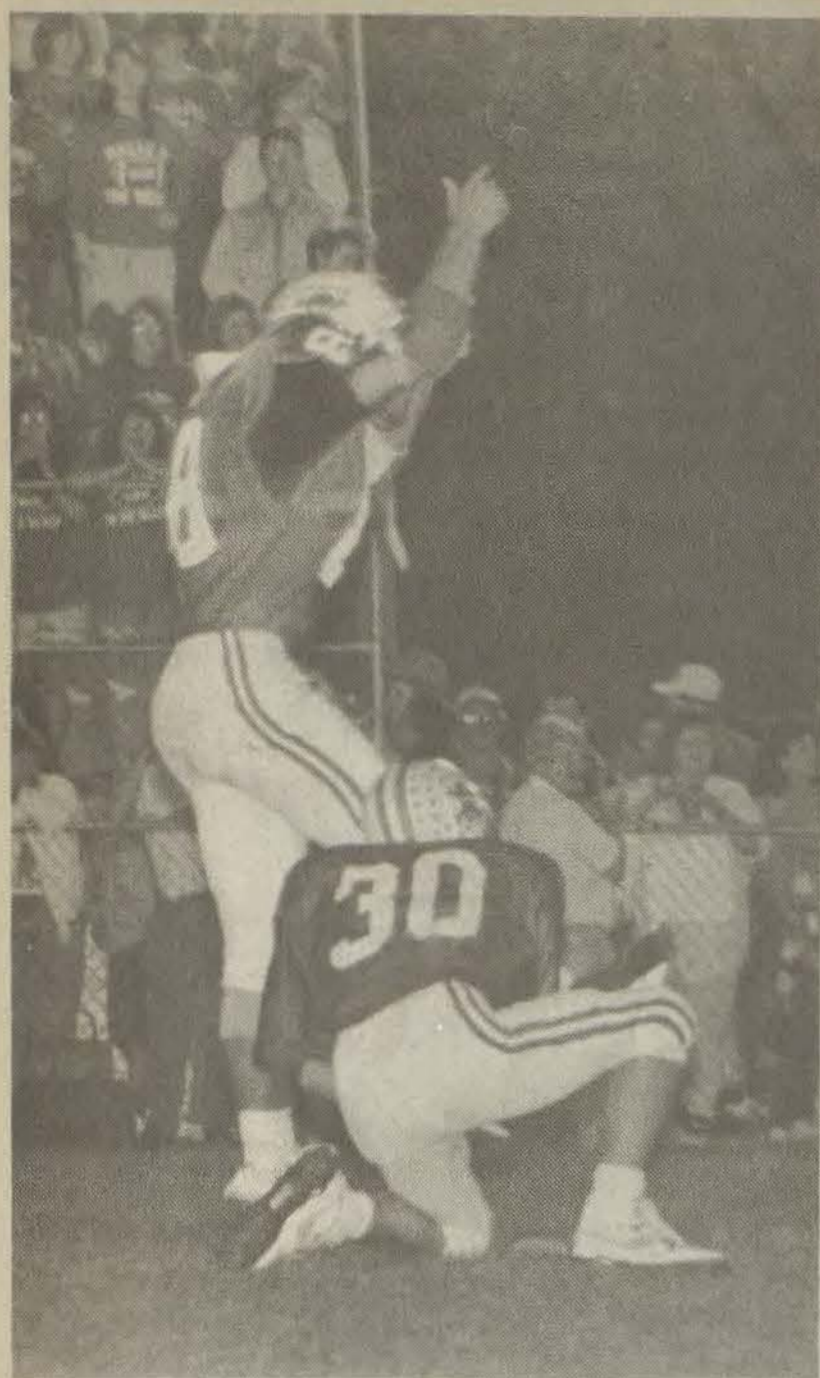
—Jaw fracture — gently align jawbones. Immobilize the jaw by wrapping a bandage under the chin and tying it securely over the head.

Apply ice.

—Nasal fracture — Gently pack the nose with gauze. Apply ice.

—Head or neck injury — Do not move the victim without professional assistance. Immobilize the head by placing rolled towels on either side. Keep victim warm. If unconscious, clear out mouth and hold tongue forward to maintain open airway.

"Since young athletes are still developing, if an injury is not treated correctly, it can lead to long term problems," Dr. MacAfee said. "Coaches and parents should always take an injured athlete to the nearest hospital emergency room as soon as possible."

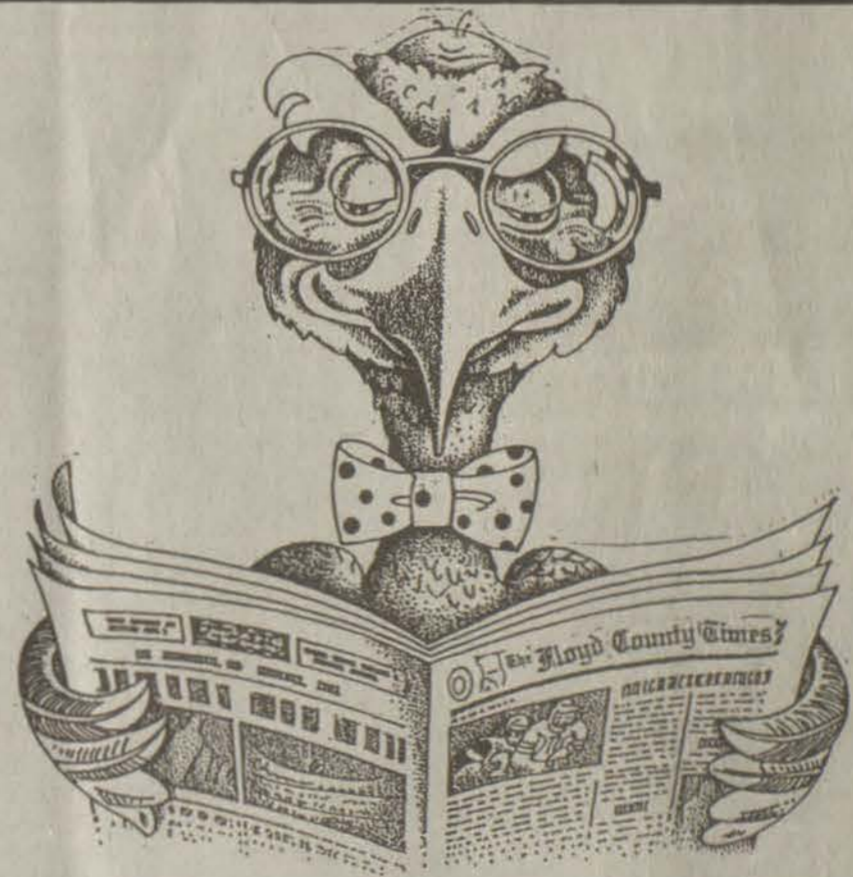

# Ky. Fishing Report

Fishing activity over the September 29-30 weekend was light to moderate on most of the major lakes. Water temperatures ranged from 68-75 degrees. Largemouth bass and crappie were the most consistently active species. The lake-by-lake report:

### DEWEY LAKE

Crappie were hitting minnows and jigs 10-15 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles, catfish and bluegill were hitting cut bait, nightcrawlers and red worms. 5-10 feet deep over drop offs and along creek channels; clear, stable, at summer pool and 71 degrees.

### PAINTSVILLE LAKE

Largemouth bass were taking nightcrawlers and crankbaits 5-10 feet deep along the shoreline; crappie and walleye were taking minnows and jigs 20-25 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; clear, stable, at summer pool and 72 degrees.

### FISHTRAP DAM

Largemouth bass were active on crankbaits and spinnerbaits 5-10 feet deep along the shore line; crappie were hitting minnows 10-15 feet deep over brush piles and stump rows; clear, stable, at summer pool and 71 degrees.

### CAVE RUN

Muskie were active on crankbaits and spinnerbaits 5-10 feet deep in heavy timber; crappie were taking minnows 10-15 feet deep over drop offs and brush piles; clear to murky, falling, at summer pool and 70 degrees.

### DALE HOLLOW

Kentucky bass were hitting crankbaits and spinnerbaits 1-5 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; bluegill were hitting nightcrawlers and crickets 10-15 feet deep over drop offs and around submerged trees and brush; clear, stable, 11 feet below summer pool and 70 degrees.

### GRAYSON

Largemouth bass were hitting crankbaits, spinnerbaits and plastic

worms 1-10 feet deep along the shoreline; catfish were taking cut bait 1-5 feet deep along the shoreline; clear, falling, one foot below summer pool and 72 degrees.

### LAUREL

Largemouth bass were active on plastic worms 5-10 feet off rocky points; bluegill were active on red worms and meal worms 15-10 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; clear, falling, at summer pool and 74 degrees.

### BUCKHORN

Largemouth bass were hitting spinnerbaits and buzzbaits 1-5 feet deep along the shoreline and off rocky points; bluegill were hitting crickets and wax worms 1-5 feet deep over stump rows and brush piles; clear, rising, two feet above summer pool and 74 degrees.

### KENTUCKY

Largemouth bass were hitting crankbaits, buzzbaits and spinnerbaits 1-10 feet deep over submerged trees and along drop offs; crappie were active on minnows 10-15 feet deep over submerged and brush piles; clear, falling, three feet below summer pool and 72 degrees.

### BARKLEY

Largemouth bass were active on crankbaits and spinnerbaits 5-10 feet deep over submerged trees and along drop offs; white bass were taking spoons and buzzbaits 5-10 feet deep in open water; clear, falling, three feet below summer pool and 72 degrees.

### BARREN

Largemouth bass were hitting crankbaits, spinnerbaits and buzzbaits 1-5 feet along the shoreline and around stump rows; crappie were hitting minnows and jigs 10-15 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; clear, falling, one foot below summer pool and 68 degrees.

### NOLIN

Largemouth bass were active on buzzbaits and spinnerbaits 1-5 feet deep along the shoreline and off rocky points; crappie were hitting minnows and jigs 15-20 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; clear, falling, one foot below summer pool and 70 degrees.

### ROUGH RIVER

Largemouth bass were active on crankbaits and buzzbaits near the surface along the shoreline; crappie were hitting minnows 5-10 feet over submerged trees and brush piles; clear, falling, one foot below summer pool and 70 degrees.

### TAYLORSVILLE

Largemouth bass were hitting buzzbaits near the surface around stump rows; crappie were active on minnows 10-15 feet deep over stump rows and brush piles; murky, stable, at summer pool and 74 degrees. (Anglers Take Note: A 15-inch minimum size limit applies to hybrid striped bass.)

### HERRINGTON

Largemouth bass were hitting plastic worms and crankbaits 5-10 feet deep around submerged trees and along the shoreline; bluegill were hitting crickets 5-10 feet deep around brush piles; clear, stable, one foot below summer pool and 72 degrees.

### GREEN RIVER

Largemouth and Kentucky bass were hitting plastic worms, crankbaits and spinnerbaits 5-10 feet deep along the shoreline around stump rows and submerged trees; crappie were hitting minnows 10-15 feet deep over submerged trees and brush piles; clear, stable, at summer pool and 72 degrees.

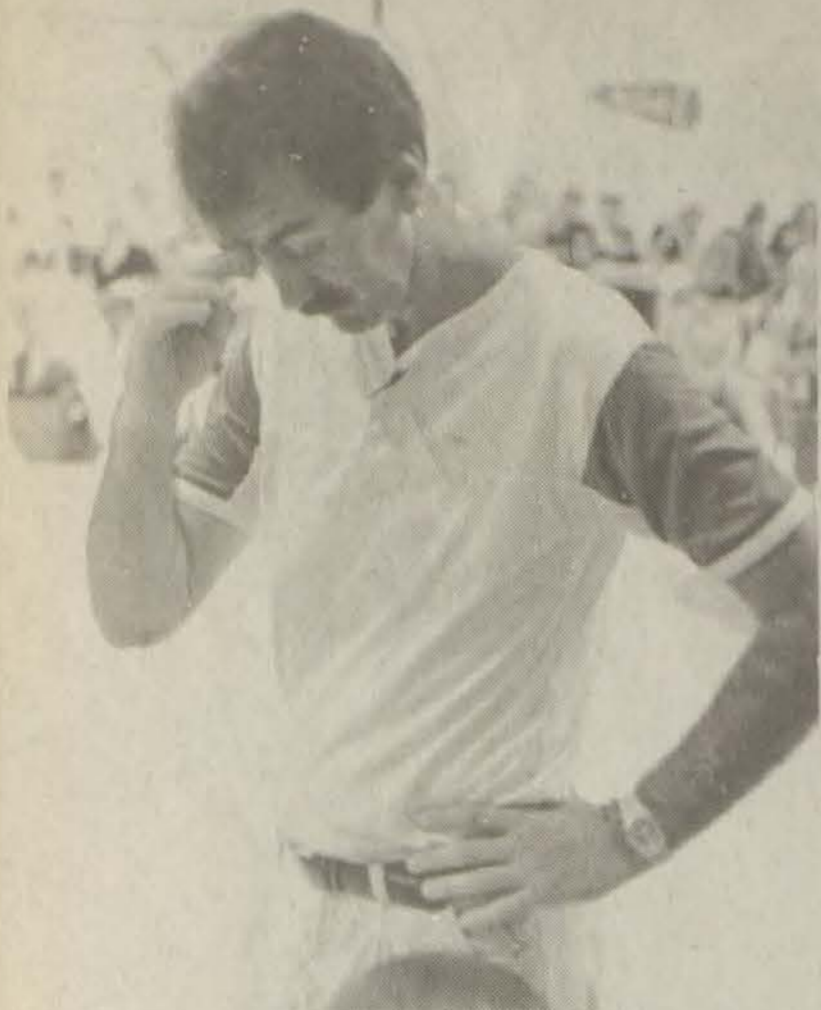
### LOWER CUMBERLAND (above dam)

Striped bass were active on shad 20-30 feet deep in open water; largemouth, smallmouth and Kentucky bass were hitting buzzbaits, spinnerbaits, plastic worms and minnows 5-10 feet deep along the shoreline, off rocky points, over creek channels and in open water; clear to murky,

falling, 21 feet below summer pool and 73 degrees.

### UPPER CUMBERLAND

Largemouth and Kentucky bass were active on spinnerbaits and plastic worms 5-15 feet deep off rocky points and over drop offs; clear, falling, six feet below summer pool and 72 degrees.

## Courier-Journal To Send Free Mini-Sports Section To Mideast

The Courier-Journal will send a free mini-sports section each week to military personnel from Kentucky and Southern Indiana stationed in the Mideast.

## Northerns lure anglers into a fantastic battle

The Northwoods Slasher had struck again.

Fishing guide Steve Collette was staring at the evidence. Hanging from the end of his hook was half of the minnow he had been using for bait—the aftermath of a vicious strike.

The other half was being digested by a northern pike someplace in Gull Lake. "Whatever sawed that minnow in two had some teeth. Big teeth," Collette said as he sat in his boat on the lake in central Minnesota. "It had to be a big 'scissorbill' cruising the weeds.

"But he didn't feel the hook. Maybe he'll hit again."

Collette quickly dropped a six inch redtail chub to the weedy depths and began pumping it off the bottom. As the bait fluttered down, there was another jolting strike. And this time, the northern got more than just half of the minnow.

Collette set the hook and watched his rod bend sharply under the weight of a heavy fish. The pike stayed deep for several seconds, then rocketed to the surface and burst out of the water.

But it didn't take long for Collette to win the battle, easing the fish into a waiting landing net.

"Just look at those teeth," Collette said as he unhooked his catch. "They can do some serious damage.

"It's no wonder they mangle baits the way they do."

Especially when they grow as big as the one Collette had just caught.

"That's a big pike in Minnesota,"

Collette said as he admired his catch before releasing it. "That one will probably push 12 pounds.

"Any time you can catch a pike like that, you're going to have some fun bringing him in."

The Northwoods Slasher. Along with the muskie, no fish is looked upon as a bigger villain in the north country.

Get one in the boat and the first thing that becomes apparent is the fish's razor sharp teeth and its seeming anger at being caught. They even look mean.

Collette has been chasing northerns, as well as walleyes, bass and panfish, for more than 15 years now. Each summer he is out searching the

deep weedbeds for the fish he calls scissorbills.

Though Gull and other lakes in central Minnesota can't match some trophy lakes in Canada for size of pike, Collette will tell you there are still some big northerns roaming the waters. Consider the fish he caught five years ago on North Long Lake. Casting a crankbait in the fall, he landed a 16-pound northern. And he has guided clients to fish 10 pounds or bigger.

"An average northern up here is three to five pounds," he said. "Usually, you can go out and get a lot of action from fish that size."

A recent trip was no exception. After a morning at Bass Lake and an afternoon at Gull Lake, Collette and two partners had caught and released 45 northerns.

But Collette wasn't using the same methods many fishermen do. Instead of casting spoons or crankbaits to the shallow reeds and weedlines, he was working the deeper vegetation.

"When I can find some good underwater structure like a bar, a hump, a sunken island or a dropoff with weeds, I know I have a chance of catching northerns," Collette said.

Unlike some pike fishermen, Collette doesn't use wire leaders. That might keep the northerns from cutting the line—a common problem when fishing for the species—but Collette thinks it also scares some fish away. That's why he uses heavy monofilament line for a leader.

He usually uses minnows attached to either a jug or a spinner rig (a spinnerbait without the skirt). He casts to the weedbed and lets his bait sink for a second, then begins to work it much the same as you would a plastic worm, slowly raising it and letting it flutter back down.

"When they hit it, there's usually not much question that you've got a fish," Collette said with a smile.

# Memories Of A Leaping Brown Trout

I always get suspicious when a fishing trip starts off too good. In a long and misspent life, I've been on too many fishing trips that began with a bang but ended up a bust.

Therefore, when my boy Jeb caught a nice, eating sized rainbow as soon as we launched our canoe on East Tennessee's Clinch River, I didn't necessarily regard it as a good omen.

I didn't tell Jeb that, though. Instead, I nodded in agreement when he said, 'Hey, we're getting off to a good start.'

There's no sense dampening a young man's enthusiasm with an old man's soured pessimism. Time and grim experience will do that soon enough. However, when my second cast produced a hard strike scarcely a minute later, even I began to think maybe we were onto something.

After that came a dry spell, but it wasn't too dry — at least not for Jeb. After three or four hours, he had four trout to his credit while I had but one, which is certainly no proper way for a boy to be treating his old man.

Although it was the last week of August, the fishing trip was our first of the summer. As soon as college adjourned in May, Jeb lit out for Miami, where he spent the summer working construction.

Having a boy spend the summer in the shoot-out capital of the South didn't exactly suit my druthers. But knowing that my son remains a boy only in my eyes and not in his, I kept my sentiments to myself, and he survived it. I sure felt better, though, when he told me he'd already lined up a job for next summer on a ranch in Wyoming.

Jeb had me down five to one when Lady Luck decided to balance the scales. We were floating near the bank and casting into the shadows of the overhanging tree limbs. I was using a floating minnow plug now, which works a lot better for big fish than a spoon.

I put a cast right up next to the bank, and when I started my retrieve, I hooked into something so solid it felt like a tree root. Fearing I was snagged, I didn't set the hook. Instead, I applied mild pressure to see if the plug would come free. When I did that, deep down in the water I saw a golden flash that could only be a brown trout.

"Oh boy, Jeb!" I shouted. "I've got a real dandy on this time."

The flash had not appeared very large, but the pull on the other end of my line surely indicated a fish with some size to it. In fact, the trout was pretty much going wherever it wanted to go, and all I could do was hang on.

I kept waiting for the brown to break water, but it hugged bottom like a carp. We fought a seesaw battle. Every time I gained a little line, the trout responded with a strong surge and took it all back.

This went on for what seemed like 10 minutes but probably wasn't more than two or three. Then all of a sudden I found myself pulling against some immovable object.

I knew what had happened. The bottom of the Clinch is festooned with old trees and snags washed down in past floods, and obviously the trout had wrapped my line around one.

"Son, you take the rod," I said to Jeb and picked up my paddle. "I'll paddle us upstream so we can pull from the opposite direction, and maybe it'll come loose."

That's what we tried, but it didn't work. When Jeb pulled on the line, it obviously was as tightly snared as ever. "Oh well," I said, "we can forget that one. Hand me the rod and I'll break the line."

Jeb gave the line one last pull as he passed the rod to me. "Hey, it feels slack," he said.

I gave the line a pull. "It is slack," I said, and started reeling. When the line came tight, the trout blasted out the water not 20 feet from the boat. His leap carried him nearly as high as out heads. And he really was a dandy.

"Get ready with the net, son," I said. "It won't be long now."

And it wasn't. The trout made a few more steadily weakening runs, then turned on its side. A quick scoop of the net, and it was all over.

"How big is he," asked Jeb.

"About five or six pounds."

"You gonna put 'im on the wall?"

Until then, consideration of the fish's fate hadn't entered my mind. I thought it over, then said, "Nope. By all rights, he ought to've got away. So I'm gonna let 'im go."

A couple of hours later, as we were nearing the end of our float, Jeb grinned and shook his head. "Dad," he said, "I can still see the jump that fish made just as clear as anything in my head."

"I know, son. And 50 years from now you'll still be able to see it just as plain as you do today."

Which is what keeps men and boys going fishing.

A popular method for catching bass in Dixie is a system called "Do-Nothin'" fishing. For years, a closely guarded southern secret. But recently the method has proven effective across the country.

A small, colorful plastic worm, with two exposed hooks is rigged on a four foot length of monofilament leader line, then tied to a bronze swivel. Behind the swivel is placed a 1 oz. bullet sinker and a fluorescent plastic bead. Generally, this unorthodox worm rig is fished with a bait casting reel and 6 1/2 to 7 foot "Trigger Stick".

The important thing to remember is, always keep the sinker bumping something. The sound and commotion caused by the heavy sinker making contact, seems to be the element that triggers a strike.

Add different colored tails on your worms by heating both ends and fusing together.

# Kentucky Afield

### NEW LAW AFFECTS HUNTERS

It's that time of the year again — deer archery season opened October 1 — and it should be another great season for whitetails in Kentucky!

As usual, there are several new regulations with which hunters should become familiar.

All deer (and turkey) hunters must have WRITTEN permission to hunt, signed by the landowner, in their possession while in the field.

It is now illegal to discharge any firearm, bow and arrow or crossbow upon, over or across any roadway. Don't shoot from the road!

Spotlighting is illegal. Spotlighting is defined as "deliberately casting rays of a spotlight or other artificial light, with the intent to poach, where wildlife or domestic livestock could be located."

Another reminder: All deer hunters (including archers) who hunt during any season when firearms are permitted — this includes the October 20-21 muzzleloader season — must meet the hunter orange requirement, which states that solid, unbroken orange must be worn as outer

garments on the head, chest and back.

When you buy hunting license and deer permits, ask the seller for a copy of the 1990-91 Kentucky Deer Hunting Guide — and take the time to read through it carefully.

### BUT OFFICER, I DIDN'T KNOW....

Failure to obtain (written) permission from the landowner is one of the most common deer season violations, according to the law enforcement division of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

And yes, the law now requires deer (and turkey) hunters to obtain — and carry with them — written permission while hunting. Verbal permission isn't good enough anymore.

"But officer, I thought...." Hunters should pay careful attention to their location. When hunting on Mr. Jones' property with his written permission, be careful not to wander onto Mrs. Smith's property — without written permission.

The 1990-91 edition of the Kentucky Deer Hunting Guide includes a handy "permission to hunt" form,

which makes obtaining proper, written permission more simple.

"But officer, it's at home...."

Failure to carry both the hunting license and the deer permit while in the field is another frequent violation. Just like your driver's license and the deer permit while in the field is another frequent violation. Just like your driver's license, you have to have these important papers with you.

Remember too, the deer permit must be signed, and harvested deer must be checked-in at a designated check station.

"But officer, isn't this enough...."

Finally, camouflage-pattern orange garments do not meet the hunter orange requirement. Orange "netting" does not meet the requirement. The regulation says "solid, unbroken" orange must be worn as outer garments on the head, chest and back. Orange "camo" won't do it.

### HELPFUL HINTS FOR TAKING DEER

Although deer are color blind, they are extremely sensitive to light. Hunters would do well to wear hunter orange fabric instead of plastic or vinyl. The plastic and vinyl-like materials often used to manufacture caps and vests are highly reflective, and although deer cannot detect the orange color, they can detect light reflection.

Archery hunters are not required to wear hunter orange during the "bows only" portions of the season although doing so is strongly recommended.

All deer hunters (including archers) who hunt during any season when firearms are permitted are required to wear solid, unbroken hunter orange on their head, chest and back as outer garments.

Another good idea is to take along an extra set of hunting clothes in

plastic bag. Many hunters go to great lengths to mask their human scent with special soaps and cover ups. But, by the time they reach their actual hunting spot, perspiration and natural body odors have already undone all those careful preparations. Experts recommend changing into fresh clothing at the hunting site and putting the already "human scented" clothing into the plastic bag.

Remember, the most often overlooked item when masking human scent is the head. Many archers will hunt wearing the same camo cap they wear year around. Throw a fresh or scent-treated cap — for hunting only — into the plastic bag.

### COURTS CRACK DOWN ON WILDLIFE VIOLATORS

A man charged with illegally taking two buck deer out of season was convicted last month in Meade County (KY) District Court.

The court ordered the poacher to make restitution to the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources in the amount of \$1,507.68 (\$753.84 for each buck) and pay a \$1,000 fine. Additionally, he forfeited his Marlin 30-30, lost all hunting rights for three years and received a one-year jail sentence.

### EXPENSIVE DEER!

Sportsmen across Kentucky should applaud the efforts of the court system when it upholds the conservation laws of the commonwealth. And sportsmen should monitor the track records of the judges and officers of the court in their respective counties. In order to be successful in its conservation and restoration efforts, the fish and wildlife department depends on the wholehearted support of the judiciary. Any judge who routinely refuses to punish wildlife violators should be remembered — by true and caring sportsmen — on (re) election day.

### Bassin' with the Pros

#### Difficult Highway Travel Doesn't Stop Female Anglers

The net time you have to change a flat tire on your boat trailer, Linda England and Fredda Lee can give some tips on how to do it.

The two Johnson Pro Staff anglers pull a double deck boat trailer thousands of miles annually to fish professional bass tournaments for women, and during a recent trip they had seven blown tires and two flats.

"No one ever stopped to help us change a tire, either," laughs Lee, a former fashion model and movie actress. "So Linda and I have developed our own system for changing tires."

"I hold the lug wrench in place and Linda jumps on it to loosen the wheel nuts. Then we just jack up the trailer, wrestle the spare in place, and tighten it."

The first flat occurred just 30 miles after they began, and set the stage for a nightmare of tire changes lasting more than 1,500 miles. The final flat stopped them less than 10 miles from home.

The two women, among the nation's most highly respected female bass anglers, smile at skeptics who think tournament fishing is too physically demanding for women.

"I think driving a well prepared high performance bass boat across an open lake is easier than driving a car in rush hour traffic," says England, "and today's fishing rods are certainly lighter than vacuum cleaners and sacks of groceries that we have to carry."

"Most of the women who do fish professional tournaments are active ladies who are also very health conscious," adds Lee. Spending eight or nine hours a day in a bass boat for four or five consecutive days is demanding physically, but it isn't as difficult as many jobs I know."

The women who do participate in national bass tournaments fall into two fairly distinct age groups, according to the Johnson pros. One group ranges from about 20-25, while the other is basically over 40.

"The younger women generally have not started families," explains England. "With the older ladies, the children have grown. There is a very definite lack of ladies in the 25 to 40 age group because these women are home taking care of families."

The women who do compete in national bass tournaments are very intense but extremely polite to each other, says Lee.

"Everyone is excited about competing, but never too busy to help a competitor," she says. "After a day on the water, we often spend a lot of time comparing notes on where and how we caught fish."

England recommends women who may be interested in fishing a professional bass tournament prepare themselves as much as possible by studying lake maps, checking their tackle, and gaining an understanding of bass patterns.

"It probably wouldn't hurt to learn how to change a flat tire, either," she laughs.

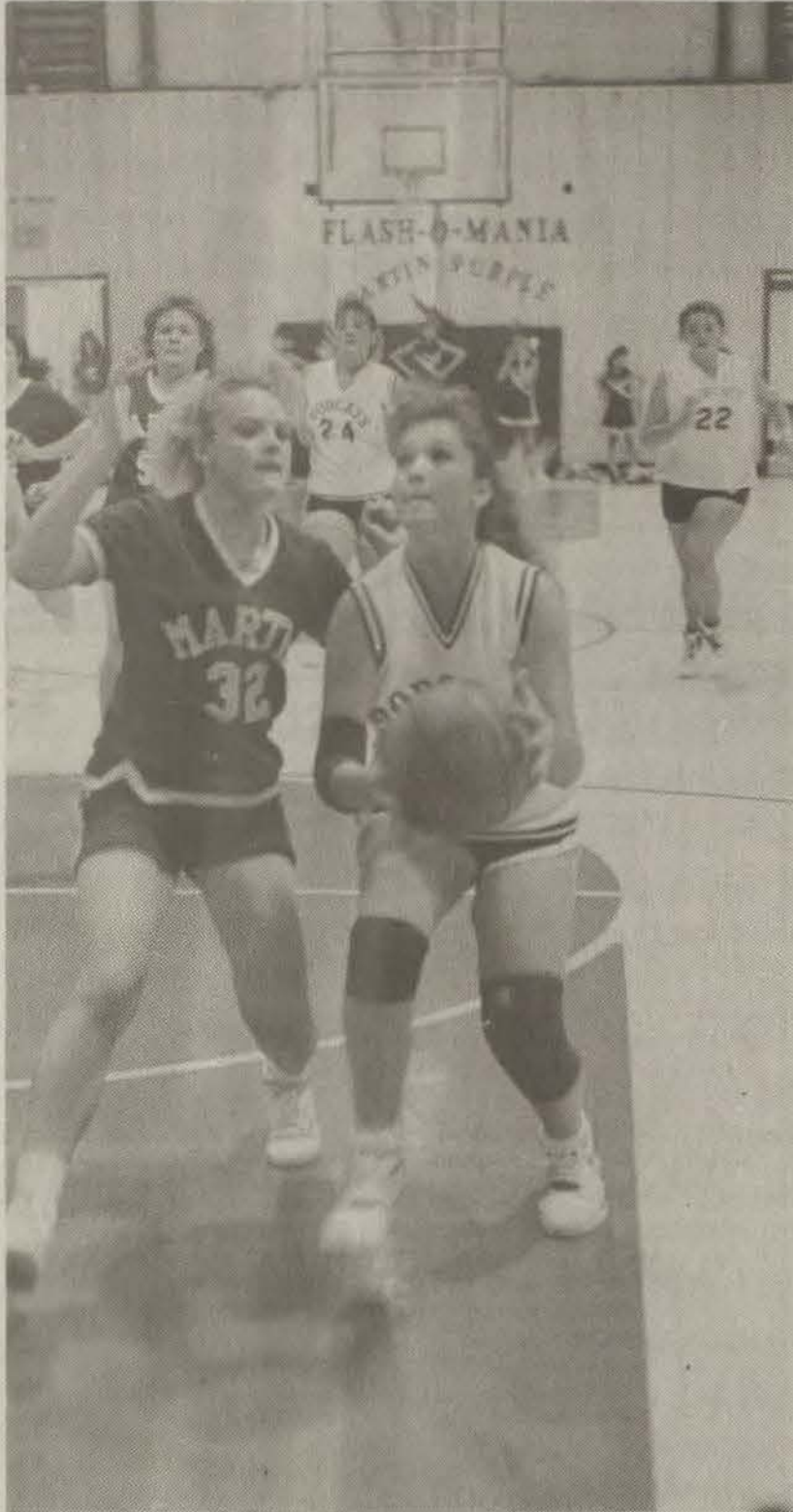

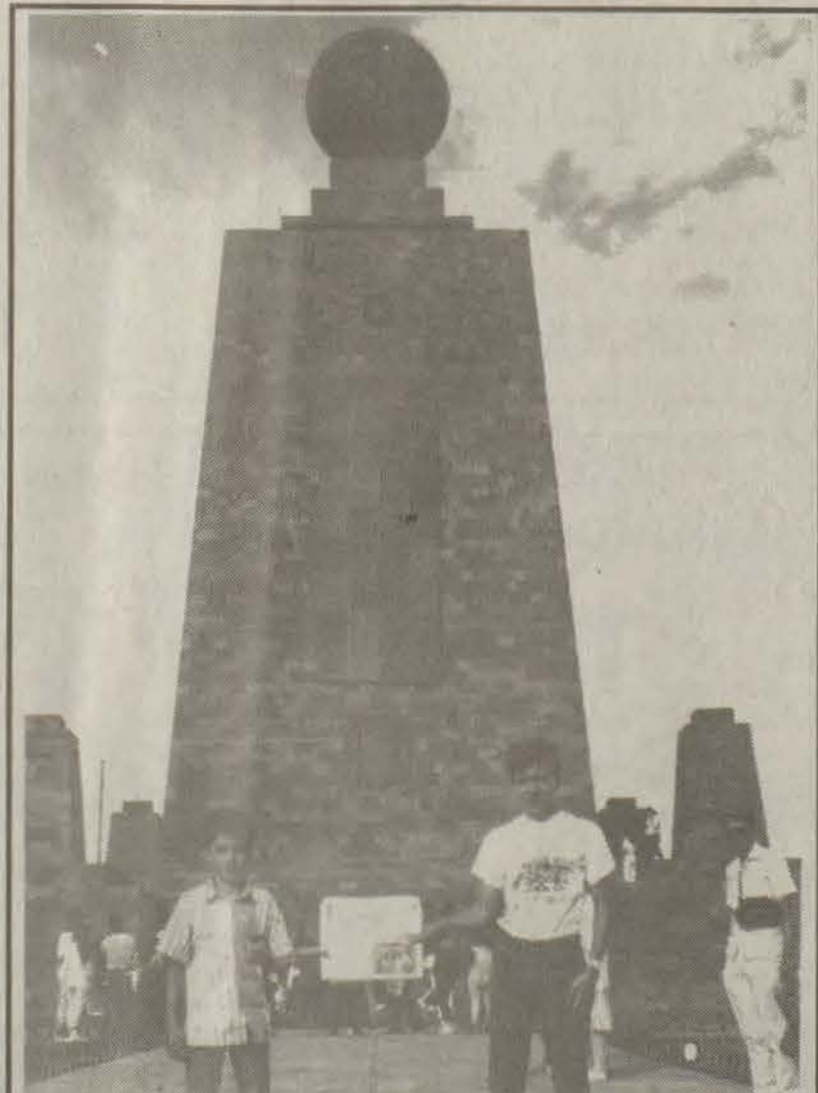

### "GREAT PUMPKIN" MEANS MORE THAN GREAT PIE

Cinderella saw her coach turn into one. Ichabod Crane fled in terror as the Headless Horseman chased him, holding one in his hand. And Linus, of "Peanuts" fame, waits all Halloween night for the "great" one.

The "one" referred to, of course, is the pumpkin, that most American of fruits and as popular as ever with lovers of its distinctive texture and taste.

Although Linus has never met the "Great Pumpkin," perhaps he is on the right track. Now that autumn is here, "great pumpkins" are readily available for carving and baking. Like corn, tomatoes and potatoes, pumpkins are native to America and are thought to have been cultivated in Mexico and Central America as long as 5,000 years ago.

Native American Indians taught the Pilgrims how to grow, cook and dry pumpkins. In fact, early colonists of Jamestown and Plymouth were said to have survived on the native pumpkins when their own failed.

The colonists adapted the Indian method of making custard by filling the scooped-out pumpkin with milk, spices, molasses or honey and baking. Eventually an early American homemaker, remembering the English meat pie with its pastry crust, put shell and filling together and concocted the modern-day version of the pumpkin pie.

The early pies were baked on grand scale, in large, rectangular dishes called "coffins." Through the years, as various recipes and baking methods evolved, the round, shallow, smaller pie came into being. The search for the "Great Pumpkin" pie continues today, as the following recipes illustrate:

#### FAMOUS PUMPKIN PIE

1 deep dish pie crust shell (frozen)  
2 eggs, slightly beaten

1 can (16 oz.) solid pack pumpkin  
3/4 cup sugar  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. cinnamon  
1/2 tsp. ginger  
1/4 tsp. cloves  
1 can (12 fl. oz.) evaporated milk  
Whipped topping

Preheat oven and baking sheet to 375 degrees. Remove pie crust from freezer. Meanwhile, combine filling ingredients in order given above. Recrimp edge of pie shell to stand 1/2 inch above rim. Place pie shell on preheated baking sheet. Pour filling into pie crust. Bake in the center of oven on preheated baking sheet for 70 minutes, or until knife inserted in center comes out clean. Cool on wire rack. Garnish with whipped topping, if desired. Makes 8 servings.

#### OLD-FASHIONED PUMPKIN PIE

2 regular pie crust shells (frozen)  
3 eggs, slightly beaten  
1 can (16 oz.) solid pack pumpkin  
2/3 cup sugar  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 1/4 tsp. cinnamon  
3/4 tsp. ginger  
1/4 tsp. cloves  
1/4 tsp. nutmeg  
1 1/3 cups evaporated milk  
1/2 cup molasses  
Whipped topping

Preheat oven and baking sheet to 375 degrees. Remove pie crusts from freezer. Meanwhile, in large mixing bowl, combine eggs and pumpkin. Add sugar, salt and spices to pumpkin mixture. Stir in evaporated milk. Add molasses. Blend. Pour one-half mixture into each crust. Bake on preheated baking sheet 40 to 45 minutes or until knife inserted 2 inches from edge comes out clean. Cool. Garnish with whipped topping, if desired. Makes 12 servings.

#### PUMPKIN CHEESECAKE PIE

1 deep dish pie crust shell (frozen)  
1 package (8 oz.) cream cheese  
1/4 cup sugar  
1/2 tsp. vanilla extract  
1 egg  
1 cup canned solid pack pumpkin  
1/3 cup sugar  
1/4 tsp. ginger  
1/4 tsp. nutmeg  
3/4 tsp. cinnamon  
dash salt  
1 small can (5 fl. oz.) evaporated milk  
2 eggs, slightly beaten

Preheat oven and baking sheet to 350 degrees. Remove pie crust from freezer. Meanwhile, in a small bowl, combine cream cheese, 1/4 cup sugar, vanilla and egg. Beat until smooth and creamy. Spread over bottom of unbaked pie crust. In a medium bowl, combine pumpkin, 1/3 cup sugar, spices and salt. Add milk and eggs; mix well. Pour over cream cheese mixture. Bake on preheated baking sheet for 50 to 55 minutes or until puffy and set. Cool on a wire rack. Makes 8 servings.

#### HOT HOMECOMING IDEA!

Tailgating: An All-American tradition

The approach of fall, with leaves changing colors and the weather cooling, inspires many people to head for the nearest football stadium. On a crisp autumn day, what could be better — especially with homecoming games right around the corner. Only the added attraction of a tailgate picnic.

Tailgating is an all-American tradition enjoyed by generations of football fans. The first college football game featured Princeton and Rutgers in 1869, and tailgating could not have been far behind.

A tailgate party traditionally involves staking out a parking spot

outside the stadium prior to the game. The party is centered around the tailgate of the car (preferably a station wagon or a hatchback), usually with tables and chairs set up alongside. Creative tailgaters often embellish their picnic with decorations commemorating their team. Others endeavor to give their tailgate a unique theme with ornaments, banners or balloons to set them apart from the crowd. TRY A TAILGATING DECORATIONS CONTEST FOR HOMECOMING.

With the exception of good friends, the most important component of a successful tailgate is good food — and lots of it. Some go for relatively maintenance-free eats prepared before the big day such as fried chicken, hoagies, potato salad and chips. One sure hit is the deli-garden sandwich round:

#### DELI-SANDWICH GARDEN ROUND

1/2 cup salad dressing  
1/4 cup finely chopped, seeded cucumber  
1/2 tsp. dried basil leaves, crushed  
1 (1 1/2 lb.) round sourdough bread loaf  
6 salami slices  
6 green pepper rings  
6 American cheese slices  
6 red onion rings  
6 cooked turkey slices  
6 red pepper rings

Mix salad dressing, cucumber, basil. Chill. Cut slice from top of bread loaf; remove center of bottom of bread loaf, leaving 1/2 inch shell; discard removed bread. Layer salami, green pepper and half of salad dressing mixture in shell. Cover with cheese, onions and remaining salad dressing mixture; top with turkey and red pepper. Cover with top of bread loaf. Chill three hours, or overnight. Cut into six wedges to serve.

Other ambitious tailgaters dress the event up a bit with a tablecloth, silver and fresh flower arrangements. They complement the decor with a more elaborate menu, including exotic dips and salads. Others go as far as serving hot foods right from a grill set up behind the car. Bowls full of steaming hot chili and homemade soups also are real crowd pleasers on a cold autumn day.

Popular beverages at tailgate picnics include soft drinks, hot chocolate or coffee, and beer.

And who can forget dessert? Quick pick-me-up desserts are a favorite, especially ones that travel well and serve easily. One delicious choice is chocolate caramel nut bars.

#### CHOCOLATE CARMEL NUT BARS

1 (14 oz.) bag of Kraft caramels  
1 (5 fl. oz.) can evaporated milk, divided  
1 two-layer German chocolate cake mix with pudding

1/2 cup margarine, melted  
1 cup Baker's real semi-sweet chocolate chips  
1 1/2 cups chopped walnuts, divided

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In medium saucepan, melt caramels with 1/2 cup milk over low heat, stirring until smooth. Set aside. In large bowl, mix together remaining milk, cake mix and margarine. Press half of cake mixture into bottom of ungreased 13 x 9 inch baking pan. Bake 8 minutes. Sprinkle chocolate pieces and 1 cup of walnuts over crust; top with caramel mixture, spreading into edges of pan. Top with teaspoonfuls of remaining cake mixture; press gently into caramel mixture. Sprinkle with remaining walnuts. Bake 16 to 18 minutes. Cool. Cut into two dozen bars.

Whatever your taste, tailgate picnics are lots of fun. Let's hope you make it into the stadium in time for the kickoff.

# Preserving family lands to be topic

David L. Morgan, state historic preservation officer and director of the Kentucky Heritage Council, announces a series of talks on preserving family lands, by Stephen J. Small, national expert on tax and estate planning. Many citizens are interested in preserving the character and the quality of life of the Bluegrass Region. In particular, many farm owners desire to keep all or part of their land intact and pass it on to future generations. However, they are concerned about placing a great tax burden on their families.

On Monday and Tuesday, Oct. 8 and 9, Bluegrass Tomorrow Inc., and the Kentucky Heritage Council, in conjunction with the National Association of Estate Planning Councils, present the national expert on this topic, Stephen J. Small, to introduce easements and other ways to combine saving family lands with saving taxes. Small is a featured lecturer at the National Association of Estate Planning Councils national conference in Lexington in October. This is an organization made up of lawyers, accountants, trust officers and other estate planning professionals. Small will speak to the estate planning professionals on Tuesday, Oct. 9 at 8:15 a.m. at the Hyatt Hotel in downtown Lexington.

Small is an attorney specializing in income and estate tax planning for families and individuals with important land holdings. Before entering private practice, Small worked for the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) where he wrote the IRS regulations on tax deductions for conservation easements. He is the author of Preserving Family Lands and The Federal Tax Law of Conservation Easements.

In a series of public discussions, Small will explain and discuss some of the options that are available to landowners for protecting their land, and the tax consequences associated with those options. He will address

landowners on Monday, Oct. 8 at 9:30 a.m. and will make a presentation to conservation groups interested in learning more about easements on Monday afternoon at 2 p.m. For more information on conservation easements or for reservations for Small's talks, call the Kentucky Heritage Council at (502) 564-7005.

Nationally, well over two million acres of private land are protected through conservation easements, most of which are in areas other than the southeastern United States. The use of conservation easements as a private land preservation tool is gaining popularity as development pressures amount and individuals seek ways to protect their land while retaining ownership.

A conservation easement is a legal agreement in which a landowner retains ownership of private property and conveys certain specifically identified rights to a conservation organi-

zation like the Kentucky Heritage Council. Conservation easements are particularly attractive to landowners because they ensure that their property's conservation values will never be destroyed; they possibly provide tax incentives and deductions; and they allow the owner to maintain control of his property.

AN ORDINANCE IMPOSING A LICENSE FEE UPON INSURANCE COMPANIES FOR THE PRIVILEGE OF ENGAGING IN THE BUSINESS OF INSURANCE WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF WHEELWRIGHT FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR 1991 AND THEREAFTER ON A CALENDAR YEAR BASIS: ESTABLISHING INSURANCE COMPANY LICENSE FEE RATES AS FIVE (5%) OF THE FIRST YEAR PREMIUMS FOR LIFE INSURANCE AND FIVE (5%) OF THE PREMIUMS FOR ALL OTHER TYPES OF INSURANCE ACTUALLY COLLECTED DURING THE CALENDAR YEAR 1991 AND THEREAFTER UNTIL AMENDED; ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE OF JANUARY 1 AND A DELINQUENCY DATE THIRTY (30) DAYS AFTER THE END OF EACH CALENDAR QUARTER: ESTABLISHING A PENALTY INTEREST CHARGE AT THE TAX INTEREST RATE AS DEFINED BY STATUTE: AND REQUIRING INSURANCE COMPANIES SUBJECT TO THE LICENSE FEE TO FURNISH ANNUAL COLLECTION INFORMATION.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF WHEELWRIGHT, KENTUCKY:

SECTION 1. There is hereby imposed on each insurance company a license fee for the privilege of engaging in the business of insurance within the corporate limits of the City of Wheelwright for the calendar year 1991, and thereafter on a calendar year basis.

SECTION 2. The license fee imposed upon each insurance company which issues life insurance policies on the lives of persons residing within the corporate limits of the City of Wheelwright shall be Five (5) % of the first year's premiums actually collected within each calendar quarter by reason of the issuance of such policies.

SECTION 3. The license fee imposed upon each insurance company which issues any insurance policy which is not a life insurance policy shall be Five (5) % of the premiums actually collected within each calendar quarter by reason of the issuance of such policies on risks located within the corporate limits of the City of Wheelwright on those classes of business which such company is authorized to transact, less all premiums returned to policyholders; however, to transact, less all premiums returned to policyholders; however, any license fee or tax imposed upon premium receipts shall not include premiums received for insuring employers against liability for personal injuries to their employees, or death caused thereby, under the provisions of the worker's compensation act and shall not include premiums received on policies of group health insurance provided for state employees under KRS 18A.225(2) and shall not include individual and group health or disability policies.

SECTION 4. All license fees imposed by this ordinance shall be due no later than thirty (30) days after the end of each calendar quarter. License fees which are not paid on or before the due date shall bear interest at the tax interest as defined in KRS 13.010(6).

SECTION 5. Every Insurance company subject to the license fees imposed by this ordinance shall annually, by March 31, furnish the City of Wheelwright with a written breakdown of all collections in the preceding calendar year for the following categories of insurance: (a) casualty; (b) automobile; (c) inland marine; (d) fire and allied perils; and (e) life.

SECTION 6. The City Clerk of the City is hereby directed to transmit a copy of this ordinance, and any amendment thereto, to the Commissioner of Insurance, Commonwealth of Kentucky.

SECTION 7. This ordinance shall become effective on the first day of January, 1991.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF MARTIN:

SECTION 1: Section 2 of Ordinance No. 03-1990 is hereby amended to read in its entirety as follows:

SECTION 2: That the tract or parcel of land hereinafter described are necessary, proper and convenient for the construction and operation and extension of the sewer system as ordained herein and that suit be filed to condemn said property as hereinafter described and further that the necessity of securing said property is urgent and that the property described hereinafter is hereby declared to be taken for the use of the City of Martin for extension of its sanitary sewer system and for the construction of said system pursuant to KRS 96.150 and KRS 416.540 through KRS 416.670 with said property to be condemned being more particular described as follows, to-wit:

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall become effective upon its second reading and subsequent publication as required by Kentucky Revised Statute.

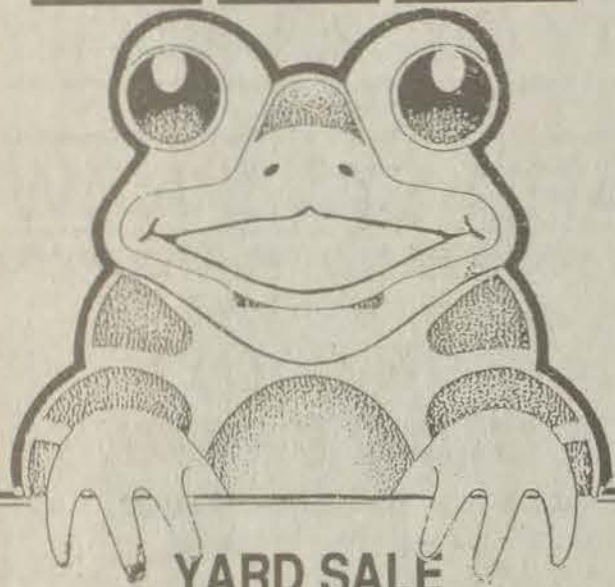

**Real estate roundtable**

**Q.** A friend of mine recently bought a new home. She has a shared equity mortgage. Can you explain what this is and the advantages in obtaining such financing?

**A.** Shared equity mortgages were created to assist homebuyers (usually first-time) who do not have the funds for a down payment or sufficient income to make the monthly house payment.

A buyer and an investor are brought together to share the down payment, closing costs, and other related expenses. An agreement or contract is drawn up between the buyer and the investor and usually includes a specified time period for either party to buy out the other.

The agreement should specify each party's responsibilities for payment of the mortgage, taxes, insurance, repairs, and the contributions of each toward the down payment and closing costs.

At the end of the agreed-upon time, one party may buy out the other's interest, the agreement may be extended, or the parties may elect to sell the property and split the proceeds.

There are advantages and disadvantages in securing this type of financing. In order to determine if this type of mortgage best fits your needs, you should seek advice from a tax attorney or CPA. As with any contract, make sure you understand all of the provisions contained in the contract before signing it.

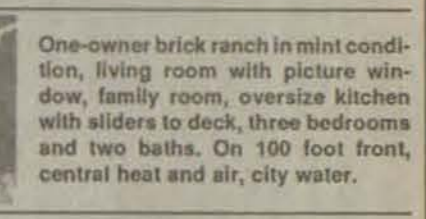
