Jury finds Crace guilty :

Incest case is decided

At 5 p.m. on Wednesday, May 29, a Floyd County Circuit Court jury returned a verdict of guilty before Judge Hollie Conley in the case Commonwealth of Kentucky v. Dallas Crace. Crace was charged with incest, a class E felony carrying a sentence of five to 10 years in prison

without parole. The jury settled on a sentence of six years.

In his opening statement, Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jon Johnson read the indictment wherein Crace was alleged to have been committing sexual acts with his daughter during a four-year period from 1985 through December 1989.

In the opening statement by the defense, attorney Danny P. Caudill said that this was a sad case involving a family that had disintegrated. Caudill said that little physical evidence existed, but that the physical evidence was convincing. Assisting with the defense was attorney Gerald DeRossett.

The prosecution's first witness was Dallas Crace's 17-year old daughter, who now resides in Cincinnati. She stated that her father began sexually abusing her when she was 11. Her father would "make the rest of the family go to the store" while keeping her at home "to do chores." This would happen two or three times a week.

The daughter said that Crace initially used "his hands only" in touching her in a sexual manner. After approximately two years, she said that Crace began performing sexual acts with her. She didn't tell anyone about her father's actions because, "If I told anyone, he said he'd kill me." The acts stopped when the girl told one of her teachers at Prestonsburg High School about them and she was referred to Alice Howard, a family service worker of the Department of Social Services. During cross-examination, the youth said that no birth control was ever used. She also said that she tested positive for venereal disease in December 1989 and that she took medicine for seven days to clear it up.

The Commonwealth once more questioned Crace's daughter, who said that she was afraid to go home after telling her teacher about the incidents because of her father's previous threats. She said her father was very restrictive and added that her father was her only sexual partner.

The next witness to take the stand was Alice Howard. Howard said Crace's daughter "is a member of a client case that I have." The case was opened after she received allegations of sexual abuse, a situation with which she deals regularly. Howard interviewed the youth and arranged for her to have a pelvic exam.

Board asked to help with area water lines

A proposal to construct water lines in the Left Beaver area and expand the Beaver Elkhorn Water District's capacity is underway and the Floyd County Board of Education is being asked to contribute to the project.

Big Sandy Area Development District director Roger Recktenwald asked the board Wednesday to contribute \$500,000 to help complete the

local funding required for the project.

Completion of the water system in Left and Right Beaver would affect water quality and pressure at Melvin, Osborne and Duff grade schools and provide water to the new Left Beaver High School.

Recktenwald explained that the money to link the water systems would be provided through a loan

Federal charges dropped :

Axed game warden to take case to court

Ex-conservation officer Jimmy Goble has vowed to continue legal action in connection with his dismissal from the state Fish and Wildlife Department in June 1989.

Goble was dismissed from the department for a deer kill incident at the Dewey Lake Wildlife Management Area. Criminal charges were brought against Goble by the United States government in United States District Court in Pikeville for allegedly "knowingly and unlawfully killing a deer." The charges were brought by the government because the wildlife management district is federal property.

The charges against Goble were dismissed on August 8, 1990 by federal judge Joseph Hood.

Goble said he was offered reinstatement by the department as a fisheries assistant, "a lower position within the department." He did not accept the job offer.

Don McCormick, commissioner of the Fish and Wildlife Department, said the offer of reinstatement was not intended to be viewed as a lower position in the department.

Goble said he intends to pursue legal action in civil court and possibly federal court against individuals involved in his dismissal.

Goble maintains he was not involved in any illegal activity concerning the deer kill.

Board tour is resumed

The Floyd County Board of Education resumed its tour of schools in the county Wednesday during a special called meeting of the board.

The meeting began at Allen Central High School at 10 a.m., where the board members heard from principal Jodi Sword about problems with the school's gym floor and swimming pool. Sword took the board to the gym where it was agreed the floor of the gym needed to be replaced.

The flooring, similar to a foam padding, has lost its spring and is like "playing on a concrete floor," said board member Tommy Boyd. "That's not good for those kids."

Sword showed the board the Olympic-size swimming pool in the lower level of the gym. The pool is currently not operational and the area surrounding the pool is in dire need of repair. Sword said septic pipes running over the pool needed to be covered and the area painted. The principal said students planned to paint aquatic scenes on the walls.

Board members, who opted not to ride in a school mini-bus because of the 90 degree temperature, drove in separate cars to the new Duff Elementary school.

Duff's construction manager Sam Martin was at the school and showed board members the new water pressure tanks that were installed to provide adequate water pressure to operate the school's sprinkler system. Martin said the tanks will have to be moved approximately four feet in order to provide building space for additional classrooms and physical education facilities. The tanks will be moved after school is dismissed for summer vacation.

The board moved on to Maytown, Martin and Prater elementary. Board members were concerned about an area on the right side of the Martin school that is cluttered with automotive parts and other large pieces of metal.

Chairman Ray "Shag" Campbell and James Duff asked superintendent Ron Hager to see that the clutter is removed.

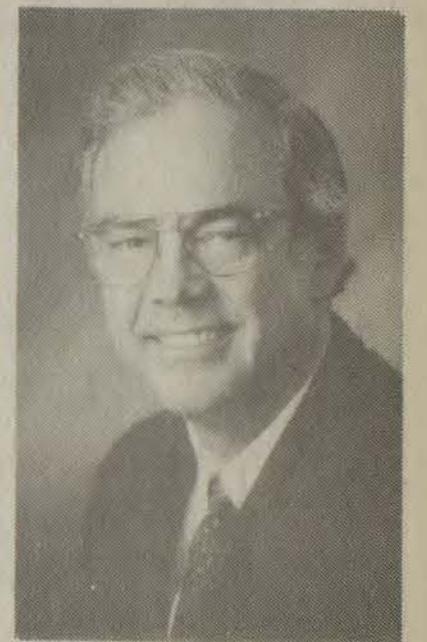
Board member Mary Hall took questions from students in Bud Reynolds' seventh grade class at Martin. Students said they needed lockers and more computers at their school. Students currently use milk crates for lockers.

At Prater Elementary the lack of space was obvious to the board members. Children were playing whiffle ball outside in front of the school because there is no physical education facility at the school. The small lunchroom serves approximately 135 students a day and has

four small tables.

Prater Elementary received a flag of progress last year from the state Department of Education for high test scores and high attendance.

The board adjourned the meeting at approximately 2 p.m. and decided it would probably take two more special meetings to finish a tour of all the schools in the county.

Pike hails Patton's victory

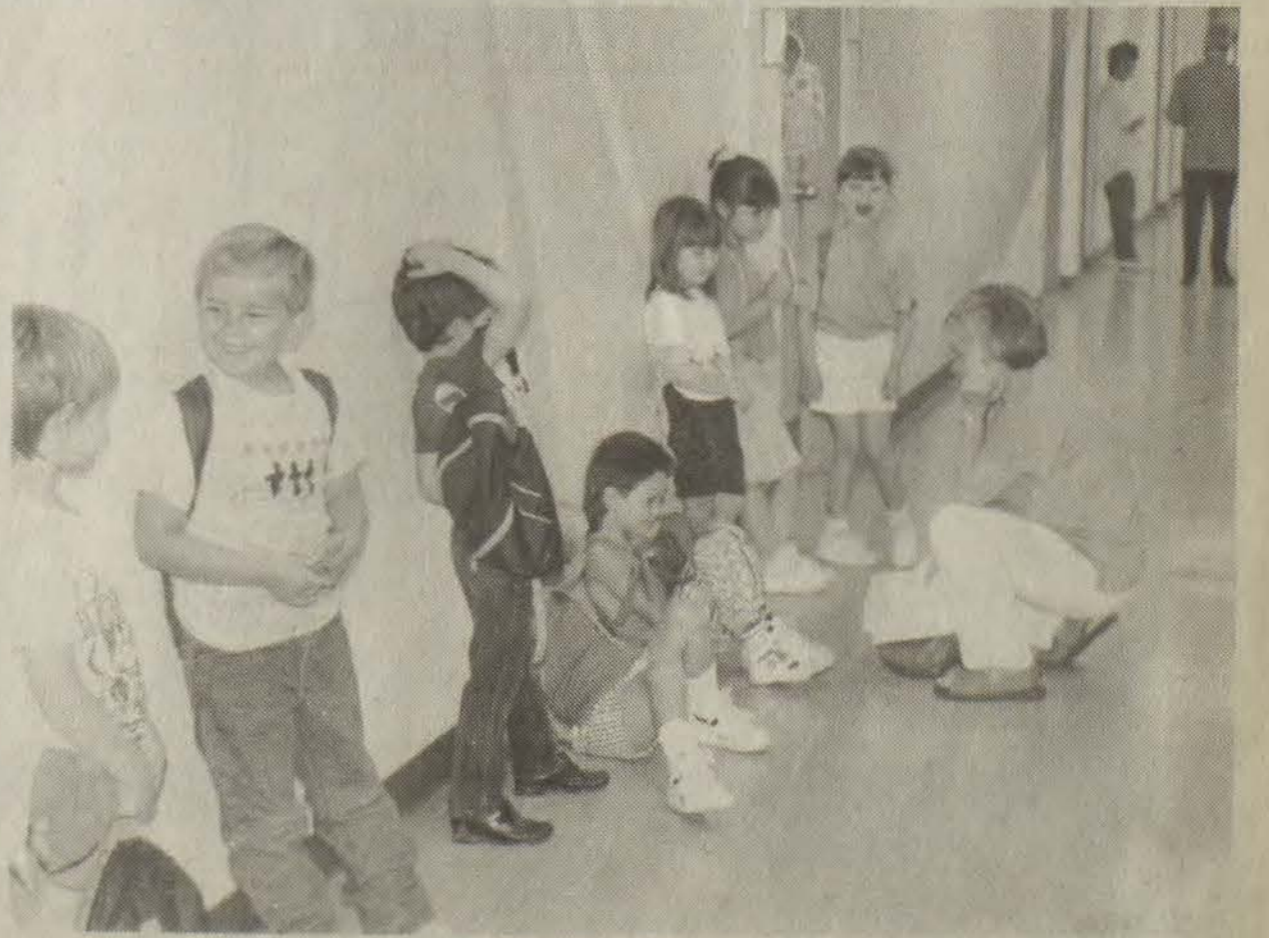
After winning the Democratic nomination for lieutenant governor, Paul Patton has announced that he already has his sights set on "making Pike County the home of the next governor of the state."

On his way home from Louisville to Pikeville Wednesday, Patton was welcomed by a motorcade of more than 50 cars, trucks and vans. The well-wishers waited in Betsy Layne to escort Patton for the final 15 miles of his victory ride into Pikeville.

"It's certainly been a tremendous two days for me, my wife and my family," Patton said to a crowd of more than 100 in front of the Pike County Courthouse. "But coming home is what it's all about."

Patton said that his nomination — and that of Republican nominee for lieutenant governor Eugene Goss of Harlan — proved that "Eastern Kentucky has some leadership to offer the rest of the state."

Patton, who finished third in his 1987 bid for the same nomination, got 32 percent of the vote Tuesday to defeat six opponents.

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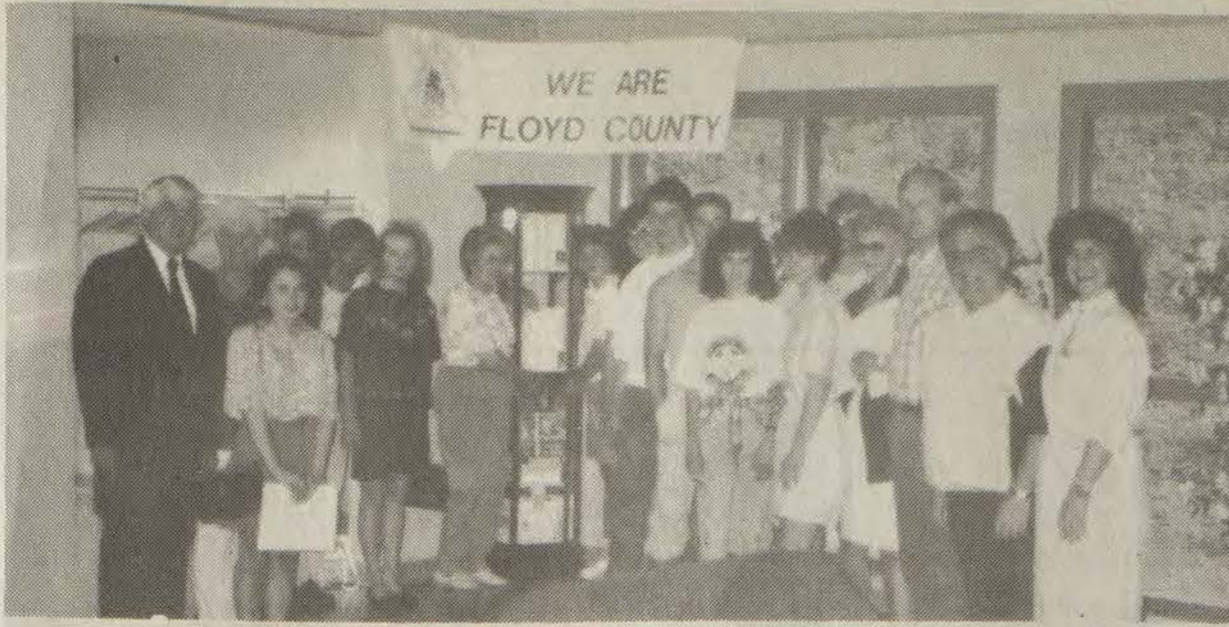
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Encapsulated for time

Under cross-examination, Howard revealed that the youth's pelvic exam had come back positive for venereal disease while a similar test performed on Mr. Crace shortly after his arrest came back negative.

Dr. Chandra Varia came to the stand as an expert witness. Varia had performed the pelvic exam as well as a complete physical. Varia reported that there were "no bruises, bleeding or any other marks" on the youth, but that the teen "had engaged in regular sexual activity."

The venereal disease test that Varia performed came back positive for gonorrhea and chlamydia. Varia prescribed antibiotics for the diseases.

James Stephens, trooper for the Kentucky State Police and detective for this case, came to the stand next. Stephens said he had spent all of his 19 years at KSP Post 9 in Pikeville investigating sexual abuse cases.

Stephens said that KSP received a report from the Department of Social Services on the case and had conducted an interview with Mr. Crace on December 14, 1989. Crace denied the allegations at that time, but gave permission for his daughter to move in with her maternal grandparents.

In cross-examination, Stephens said that his next contact with Mr. Crace was at his arrest on December 29, 1989. Crace was tested for venereal diseases at that time, but had to be retested on January 3. The tests were negative. Stephens said that Crace was incarcerated between the tests, so he had no access to any kind of antibiotics.

After a break for lunch, May Crace, Mr. Crace's ex-wife, took the stand. Ms. Crace said that she was unaware of the abuse and of her daughter's venereal diseases until after the youth had moved in with her grandparents. She said that Mr. Crace would ask her to take the family to the store but leave the youth because he said it was "too heavy on the car." Ms. Crace sometimes noticed that the chores were sometimes only partly done or not done at all. She said that this was repeated over the four year period.

Ms. Crace said that Mr. Crace was continually complaining of headaches and stomach-aches, and that she would give him pills, often antibiotics, to help him out. Ms. Crace added that she loved her daughter.

Under cross-examination, Ms. Crace did not remember the specifics

of her pill distribution to Mr. Crace and that occasionally other children would stay at home, but not often.

Vicky Gilstrap, Mr. Crace's stepdaughter, took the stand after her mother. She remembered that everyone left the house except for Mr. Crace and the alleged victim. Gilstrap left home in 1986 for the Eastern Kentucky Vocational Rehabilitation Center (Voc-Rehab) at Thelma.

Under cross-examination, Gilstrap spoke of Scott, a boy at the Voc-Rehab center to whom her sister sent notes. The defense produced an affidavit from Gilstrap, signed January 12, 1990, in which Gilstrap said that her sister had a crush on Scott, was writing love letters to him and would "do anything" to be with him.

The Commonwealth's further questioning revealed that Gilstrap had been coerced into making the statement, since Mr. Crace had allegedly threatened to hurt her sister and her grandparents if she didn't comply. He also allegedly told her what to say in the statement. Gilstrap denied the truth of the statement she had signed, and said that she believed her sister, but wouldn't say anything out of fear.

The prosecution's final witness was Morris Miller, the teen's maternal grandfather, who confirmed that she had come to live with them in December 1989 and had enrolled at the Voc-Rehab center in late January or early February 1990. With no cross-examination following, the prosecution rested.

The defense's first two witnesses were sisters, Helen Fraley and Jo Ann Powers, formerly of Floyd County. Both women testified that Mr. Crace's daughter had come to Fraley's home sometime prior to December 1989. Powers added that she came to visit her paternal grandparents, who lived next door.

Fraley said that the youth told them "she wanted to get away from Dallas in any way possible" and that "she had a boyfriend at Thelma she wanted to be with." Both women agreed that there was never any mention of sexual abuse.

In cross-examination, both women revealed that they were related to Mr. Crace through marriage.

The defense's final witness was Dallas Crace himself. Mr. Crace flatly denied that he sent his family away to be alone with his daughter. He also stated that he never took anything

other than Tylenol and that he never let his wife get pills for him "I always have my own stuff," said Mr. Crace.

Mr. Crace said that he refused to let the youth go to Voc-Rehab because the first of his daughters to go there became pregnant. He said that he and his daughter had a falling-out over this argument.

Mr. Crace said that he had never had nor had ever been treated for venereal disease and he flatly denied ever having sexual relations with his daughter.

Following the closing arguments, the jury retired for deliberation at 4:20 p.m. The jury returned 40 minutes later with their verdict of guilty. The jury retired again at 5:30 p.m. to determine a sentence and returned at 5:43 p.m., recommending a sentence of six years.

Johnson said that he was "satisfied with the verdict" and that he was "confident in the case and became more confident as the trial went on." Mr. Crace had no comment following the trial.

from the Kentucky Infrastructure Fund. The loan would total \$3 million.

Recktenwald said 1,600 families in the Left Beaver area, that have no primary source of water, could hook onto the water system. The tap fee would be \$425 and it would generate approximately \$500,000 toward the project cost.

"We see this as a once in a lifetime opportunity for Left Beaver," Recktenwald said.

Left Beaver High School construction manager Sam Martin said it would cost approximately \$400,000 to provide water to the school site.

Recktenwald said the district would know within 60 days after the proposal is submitted if it would be approved by the Division of Water in Frankfort. If approved, the project would "take off immediately," he said.

The board made no decision on the issue, but said if the funds were available they would favor contributing to the project.

Smith was pleased with how the session went and feels it is only the beginning of something bigger to come.

"The kids liked it and had fun while contributing to the future of the community," Smith said. "Our goal was to the children's increase awareness of things going on in the county so they wouldn't feel helpless. Now they know they can contribute and this provides an avenue for them."

Those attending the session were tasked with taking the project back to their schools and continuing the work there. McDowell and Wheelwright have already started planning a joint cleanup project which, according to Smith, works out well since the two schools will soon become one.

House approves flood control money

Almost \$14 million in funding for a variety of federal projects benefiting Eastern Kentucky was approved by the full House Wednesday night, a week after they had been passed by the House's Appropriations Committee, according to U.S. Congressman Chris Perkins.

Perkins said he was pleased to see so many projects receive funding despite Congress being constrained by unusually limited budget.

"It is critical that we receive funding to continue work on these important flood control and other projects in Eastern Kentucky," Perkins said. "These projects are worth their weight in gold because they protect people and improve our chances of attracting businesses and tourism to our area. I'm happy that at a time when purse strings are especially tight in the Congress, we were successful in getting the funding we need to continue this work," Perkins said.

Here's a breakdown of projects that were passed by the House:

Flood Control Projects:
 1.) \$300,000 to continue the design of Beaver Creek's flood project. This includes the left and right forks.
 2.) \$160,000 to continue the study to solve Jackson's flooding problems.

3.) \$300,000 for pre-construction engineering and design of the Hazard flood control project.

4.) \$8,070,000 for continuation of South Williamson's flood proofing and floodwall construction.

5.) \$225,000 to continue the study of flood control solutions for West Liberty in Morgan County.

Other Projects:

1.) \$600,000 for continuation of a Salyersville cut-through project.

2.) \$3.5 million for "finish-up" work on Yatesville Lake, including funds to build a permit office, visitors' center, cultural resource presentation and to provide part of the cost share of the Barker Marina.

3.) \$300,000 to dredge a stretch of the Ohio River for the city of Ashland's Riverfront development program that is now underway. The city has already committed \$800,000 for a Riverfront Park in downtown Ashland.

In addition, Perkins received \$400,000 to look at the economic potential of expanding recreational activities on existing reservoirs along the Levisa Fork of the Big Sandy River, the Little Sandy River, the Upper Licking River, and the Kentucky River's North Fork.

This study also includes money to check whether existing reservoirs can be used to increase water supply for communities in Eastern Kentucky. This particular funding has been endorsed by the East Kentucky Jobs Creation Authority, who has stated that opening up the lakes for more tourism is one of its top priorities.

The Congressman also got \$7,578,000 to keep these Corps of Engineers projects at current operations: Dewey Lake (\$947,000), Buckhorn Lake (\$1,031,000), Carr Fork Lake (\$930,000), Cave Run Lake (\$561,000), Fishtrap Lake (\$1,179,000), Grayson Lake (\$860,000), Paintsville Lake (\$659,000), Yatesville Lake (\$704,000), and dredging at the mouth of the Big Sandy River (\$1,031,000).

In a related development, the House also allotted \$170 million to the Appalachian Regional Commission, an important operating arm for providing money to Appalachian areas.

The funding projects, part of the overall energy and water appropriations bill, now go to the Senate for consideration and a vote.

Forgy wants a recount

If just a portion of the 392,572 non-voting registered Republicans in the state had cast ballots Tuesday, results may have been different in the GOP race for governor.

Congressman Larry Hopkins won the Republican nod for governor by just 2,211 votes over Larry Forgy in the closest race during the May primary.

Forgy said Wednesday that he would ask for a recount of votes in

several counties. He declined to say which counties, but said that Perry and Harlan counties were two he might ask to have recounted.

Forgy carried Perry by 871 votes (78 percent) and Harlan by 1,105 (82 percent).

A candidate has 96 hours after the polls close to ask for a recount. Requests must be made, in writing, to the clerk of each county in question. Each county board of elections must meet and certify its results by June 6. The results will then be sent to the state Board of Elections which plans to certify the statewide results in a meeting June 17.

According to George Russell, director of the state Board of Elections, the last person to ask for a statewide recount was Harvey Sloane, who lost to Martha Layne Collins in the Democratic primary for governor in 1983. Sloane gained a couple of votes in many Kentucky counties, amounting to 50-70 votes overall, Russell said.

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LONG-TERM CARE CASE MANAGEMENT PROGRAM IN FLOYD AND MAGOFFIN COUNTIES

GETTING THE HELP YOU NEED.

Long-Term Care Case Management is being offered by the Kentucky Cabinet for Human Resources in Floyd and Magoffin Counties. Sponsored by Sen. Benny R. Bailey (D-Hindman) and enacted by the Kentucky General Assembly, a portion of the "Health Care Reform Act of 1990", requires the Cabinet for Human Resources to provide single-entry point, comprehensive case management for long-term care clients receiving Cabinet services.

This service is available to persons living in the community and in nursing homes, regardless of age. The 2-year pilot project will help a person who needs long-term care stay at home and live independently as long as possible. The program will also help those who need nursing home services apply for nursing home admission. It will help the person return home after a nursing home stay and arrange for the services he needs at home.

To be qualified for the program a person must live in the Floyd and Magoffin counties, be receiving or applying for a long-term care service provided by the Cabinet, and need services for 6 months or longer due to a functional impairment. Functional impairments include, but are not limited to, reduced ability to eat, bathe, dress, keep house, cook, shop, and do laundry.

Case managers will help eligible clients apply for the service they need to stay at home or help them enter the long-term care system and obtain the services they need.

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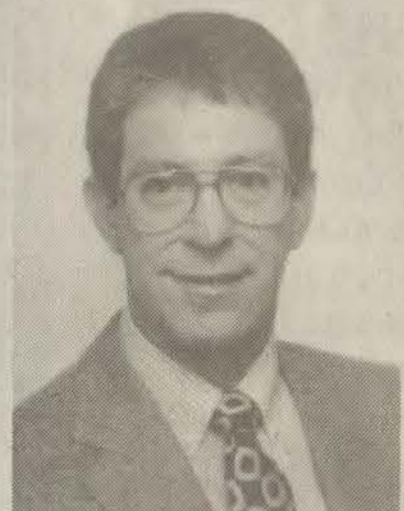

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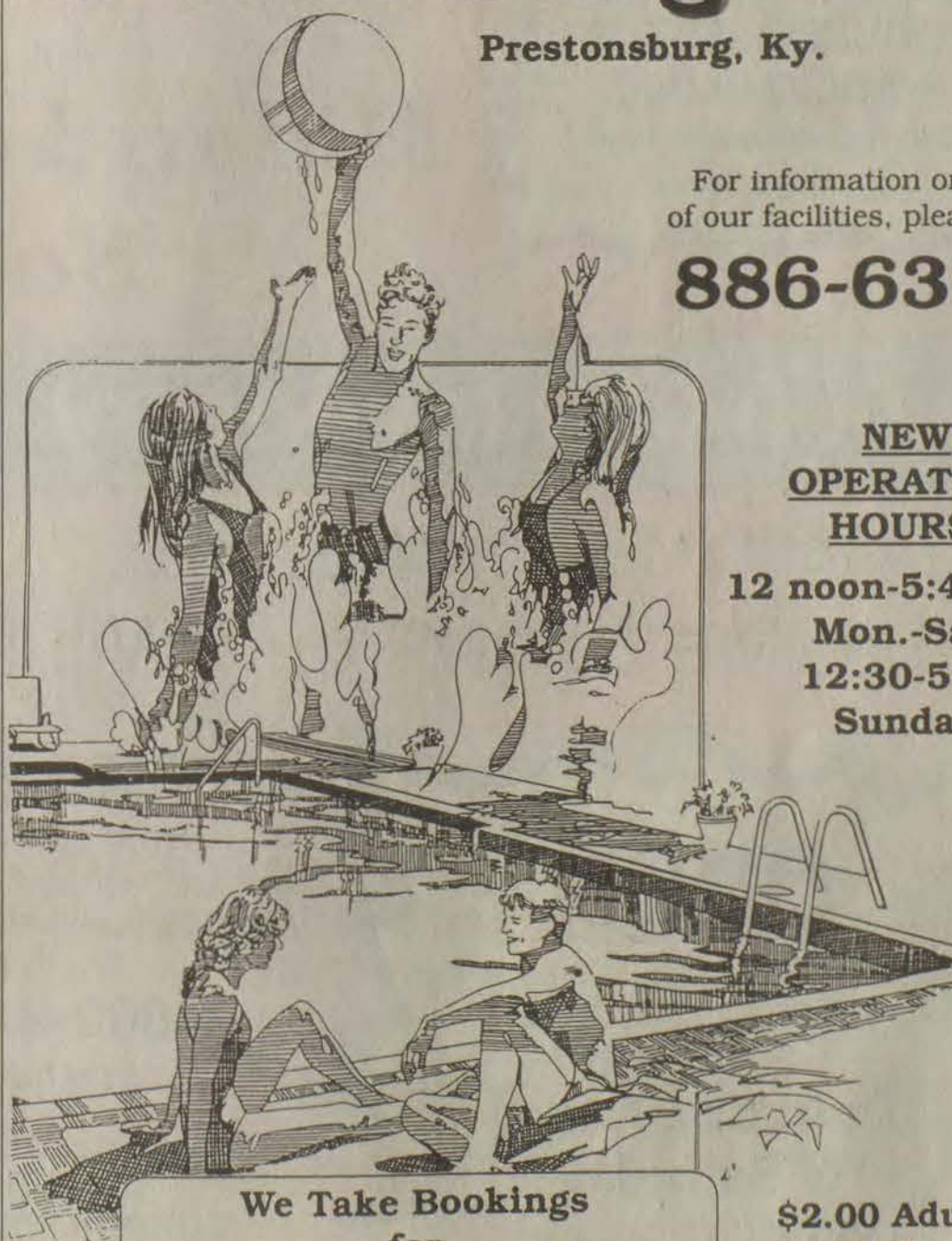

Allen Central's Brian Wallen Places Second In State Finals

It has been a very good year for Allen Central's Brian Wallen in track and field at the Right Beaver school. Wallen placed first in nine of the 11 meets he competed in this spring. But the one second place finish did not set too well with the determined thrower.

"I was real disappointed that I didn't place first," said Wallen about his second place finish. "I don't know what happened. (Jason) Yates just came out and threw a great discus." Yates is from Bellevue and captured the state title with a toss of 156-feet and 8-inches. Wallen placed second

with a throw of 132-feet and 11-inches.

"I could hit in my warm ups, but when it came time to throw, I just couldn't hit then," explained Wallen, who was one of the top favorites to win the state Class A title.

Wallen scratched on two of his preliminary tosses. His first toss in the preliminaries was the one that gave him second place. He then scratched on the next two tosses and each throw was estimated to be in the 140-foot plus range.

Wallen landed his discus with

tosses of 127 feet and 3 inches, 131 feet and 3 inches and 130 feet and 2 inches in the finals. Yates had throws of 140 feet, 7 inches; 147 feet, 10 inches and the winning toss of 156 feet, 8 inches in the finals.

Wallen seemed to have problems throwing the discus all year compared to the way he performed last year. He explained that he blames the week he went to Daytona for a week and fell behind everyone else.

"While everyone else was getting in shape, I just fell behind," he said, "and I never did seem to be able to throw like last season."

Wallen drew attention in last year's regional meet at Pikeville when he recorded a 148-foot toss to win the meet. This was Wallen's third trip to the state finals, going there as a sophomore and junior. He placed fourth in the state as a sophomore and finished fifth as a junior.

"I feel that with Brian going to the state finals the last three years is more impressive to me than winning the state finals," said his coach, Dewey Jamerson. "There are not too many who can say they have been there three straight years. And he has placed in the top five those three years."

"I can understand Brian being disappointed," Jamerson continued. "You set your sights on winning the title and anything less has to be disappointing in anything that you do. I know that Brian would have liked to have thrown better. But he has closed out a good career."

Forrest Hughes, who was the one that placed a discus in a seventh grader's hand and told him to see what he could do with it, said that he could never be prouder of Wallen.

"Everyone around here is proud of Brian," said Hughes, who teaches at Maytown Elementary. "I know that he would have loved to had first

place, and I know that he is disappointed, but he was competing against a kid that was just as good as he was."

"Brian doesn't have to hang his head, he did a great job and we all are very proud of him," Hughes said.

Wallen's mother said that she saw a difference in her son after the Allen Central senior lost the state title. "He wasn't bitter like he was last year," said Mary Wallen, "and he was one of the top three in the state and it was just good to be there."

"Brian has had a good five years," said Mrs. Wallen. "It was the highest finish he has had in the state finals. He lost points when he scratched two times. Our kids are handicapped in that we just don't have the facilities for them to practice on. Our county is just behind all the others," said Mrs. Wallen, who has been an advocate in trying to get track and field facilities in Floyd County.

"It took a perfect throw to beat Brian — and Yates made a perfect throw," said Coach Hughes. "You have those days when everything goes your way and when you get in a groove, you are impossible to beat."

"What he accomplished was not bad for a kid who had no pad to practice on until he got one for Christmas. Dewey (Jamerson) and I are proud of him. No one at Allen Central has ever finished any higher in state competition."

Hughes said that Wallen has succeeded in spite of all the obstacles that was against him. "Brian has had to go through three coaches, no facilities to practice on and he had to drive all the way to Pikeville just to practice. He did that for four years, and if we had had track and field facilities we could be state contenders every year."

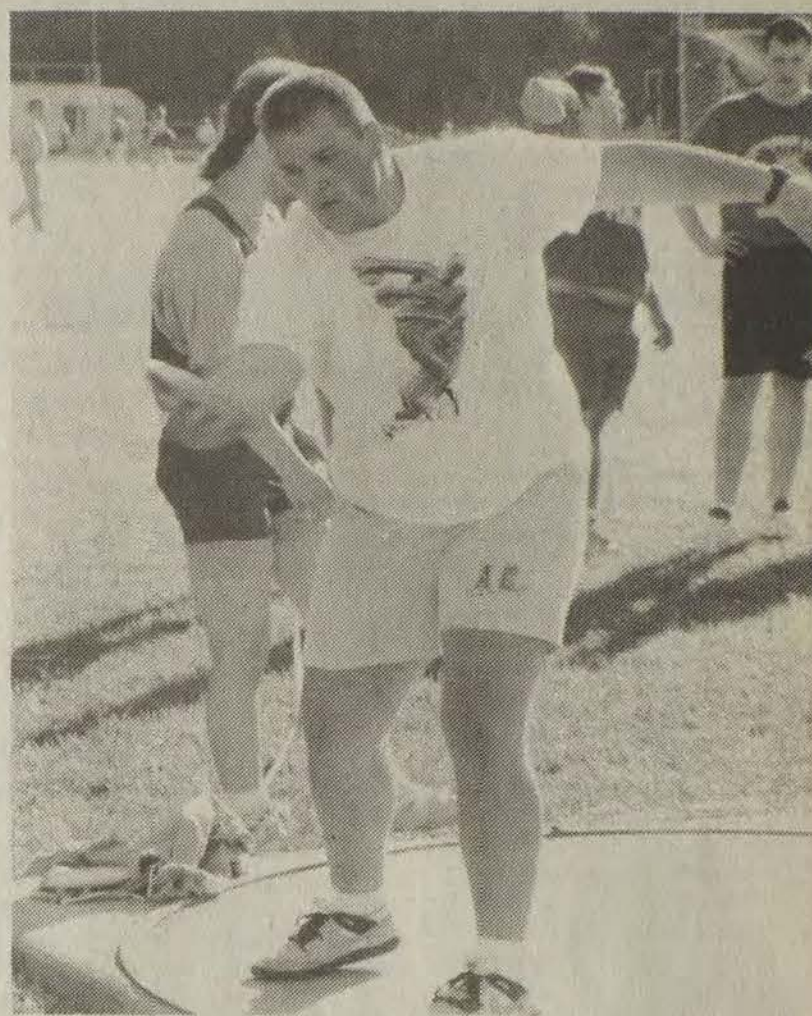
"Brian could have thrown up his arms and quit, but the word quit is not in Brian Wallen's vocabulary."

"My coaches have helped me an awful lot," said Wallen of his coaches at Allen Central. "Mr. Hughes and Mr. Jamerson have done me a world of good and I would have never been where I am in discus now."

Wallen advises young discus hopefuls to build the weights in preparing for the sport. "They will need to build up their chest muscles. Running is good for them also and to lift weights with their arms not the legs."

"We've had a good season here at Allen Central," said Jamerson, "we did alright. Next year we will be very young at the discus spot but strong in other areas. We have some promising young throwers coming up. Shawn Bailey, an eighth grader at Maytown, Levi Wells, a sixth grader at Maytown as well as Shawn Robinson."

"We will lose most of our talent in the field events next year," explained



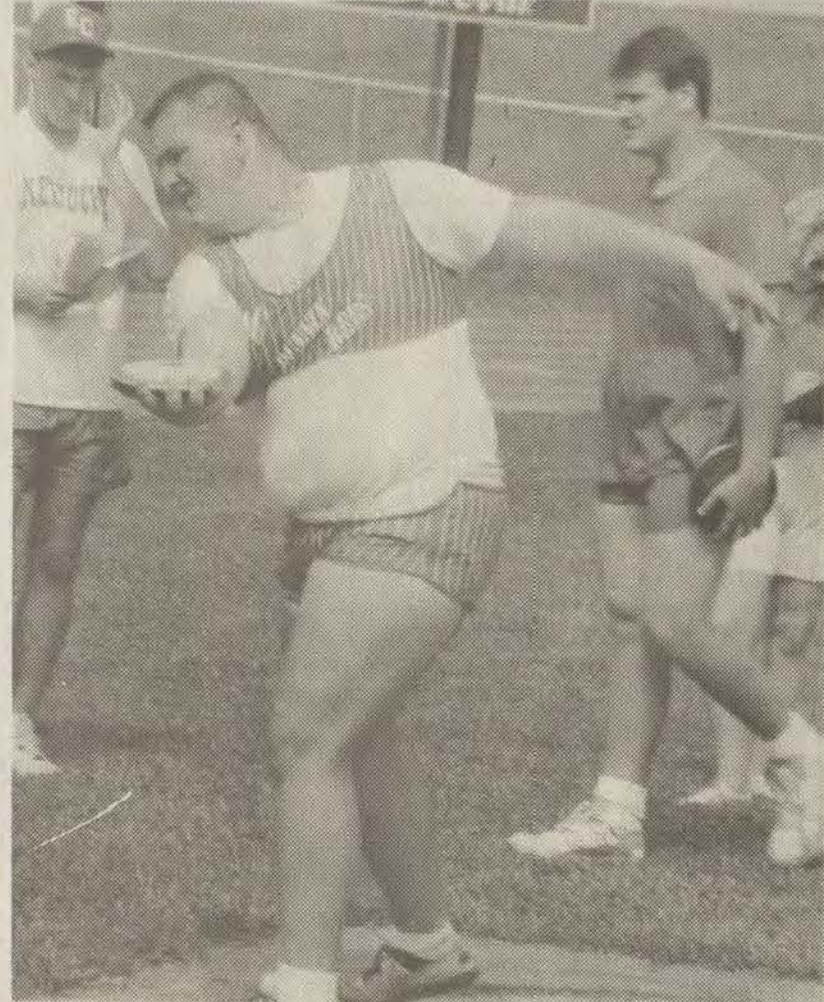
Jamerson. "But we will have Jessica Wade and as a matter of fact we will have all of our girls back. Gary Webb, in triple jump, will be back along with Jamie Slone, Todd Howard and others."

Jamerson hopes to get his team into more invitationals next season. The squad took part in the FCA Invitational and an invitational at Boyd County.

"We had a good season," he said. "A lot of surprises. The biggest surprise was not necessarily the amount that came out for track and field this season but how many stayed with it."

Jamerson said he would like to see our county officials develop a track and field facility for all the schools in the county and thinks the Allen Park would be an ideal location for one.

Some of the Allen Central runners as well as Wallen plan to enter the Bluegrass State Games in late July.

He had two strike outs.

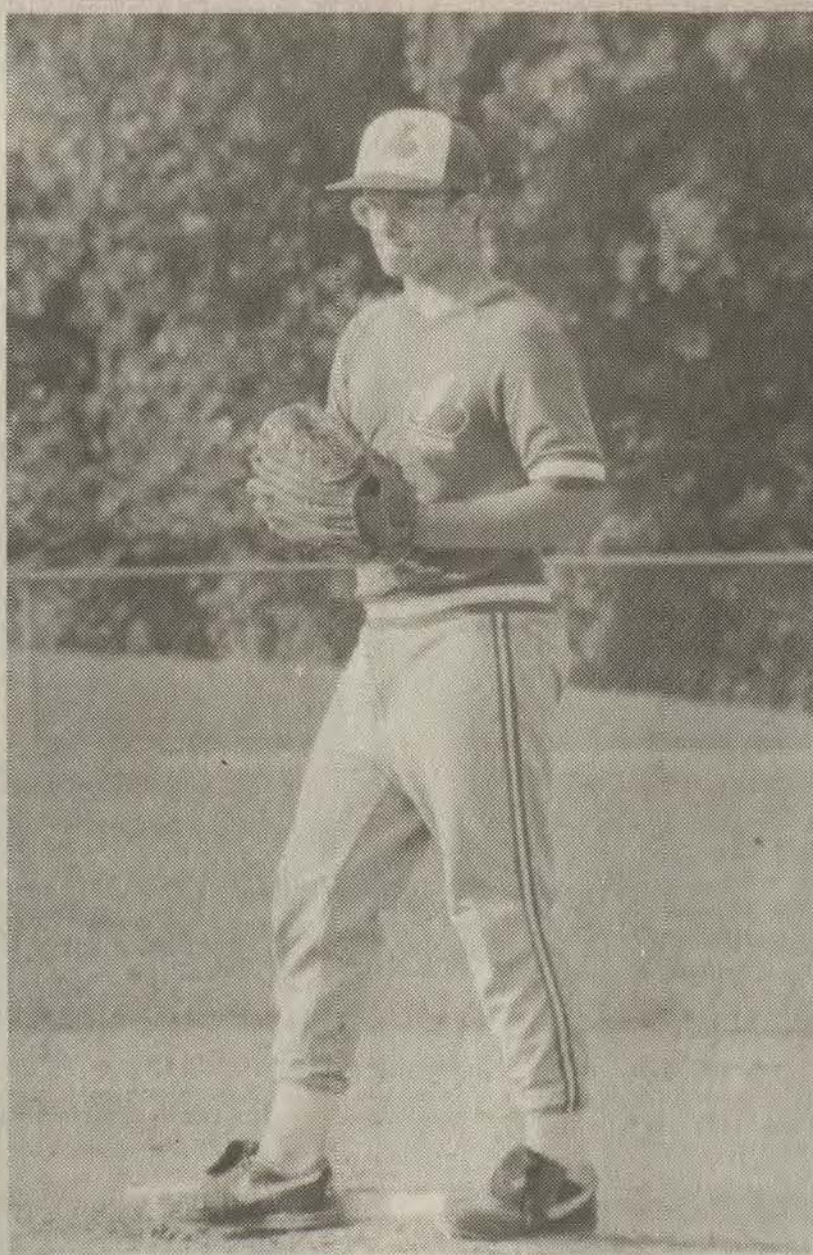

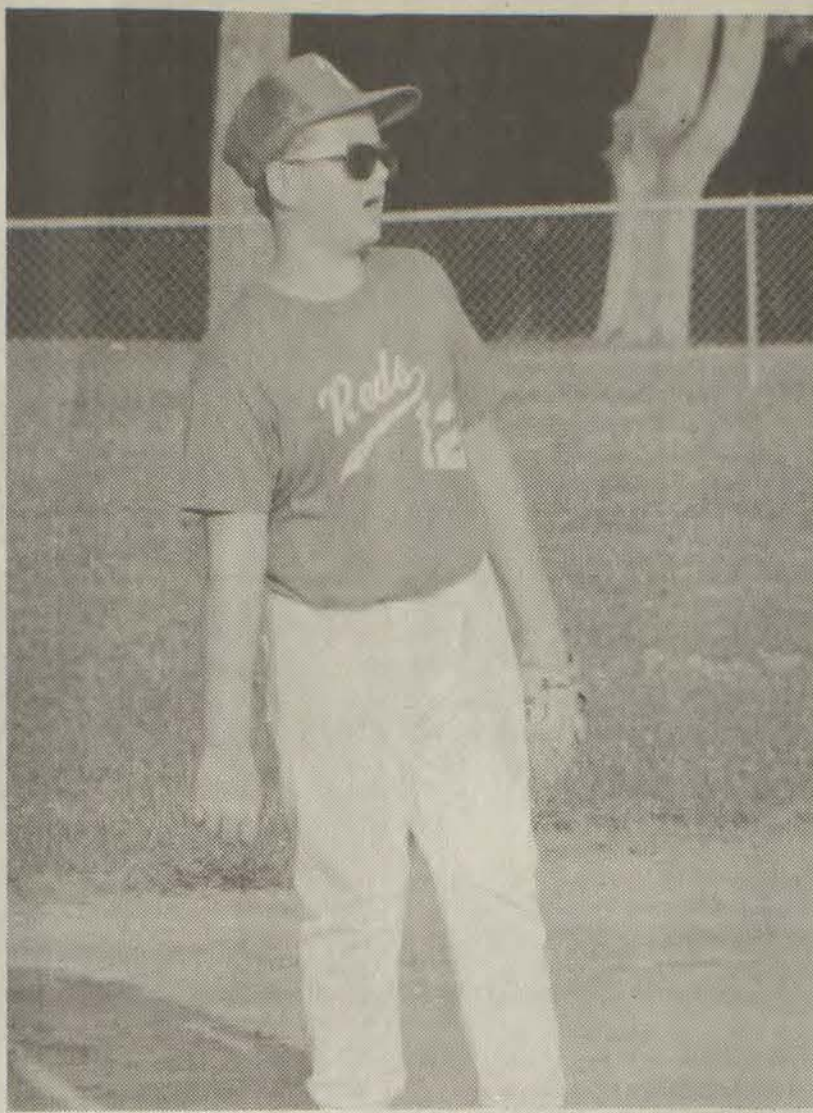
