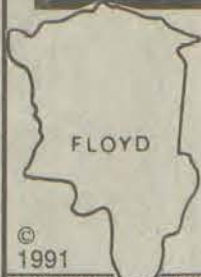

It's Red, White and Blue at Martin



Freedom will be flying this Saturday at Martin during the 22nd annual celebration of Red, White and Blue Days.

This year's event will be dedicated to our country's veterans.

The celebration begins Friday, October 18, with store

window display judging in the afternoon followed by live music in the Martin municipal parking lot at 6 p.m. A horse-shoe tournament, sponsored by First Commonwealth Bank, will also begin at 6 p.m. Friday. Registration starts at 5:30 p.m. and the entry fee is \$5.

City caught in crosswind over Combs Field future

It took about an hour to get to the first item on the agenda and then another three hours to work through it Monday as Prestonsburg's City Council clawed its way past festival foibles and airport agitation before going to the dogs.

After some bickering over some bills associated with the recent Jenny Wiley Festival, council was caught Monday in an hour-long crossfire over the fate of the Paintsville-Prestonsburg Airport, also known as Combs Field, which included heated exchanges between Mayor Ann Latta and a pair of Paintsville brothers.

C.K. Belhasen, a Paintsville attorney

and pilot, and his brother Ron Belhasen, plant manager at American Standard, addressed council Monday as opponents to what they called an "organized effort" to close the Paintsville-Prestonsburg landing strip and convert the property into an industrial site.

C.K. Belhasen opened the occasionally stormy debate noting that

"misinformation" about the airport was being circulated and that it should be considered a valuable asset for future development.

"Combs Field is the busiest airport in Eastern Kentucky," C.K. Belhasen said, "and, contrary to misinformation, it is the safest airport in Eastern Kentucky."

Belhasen said the airport was self-supporting, using no tax dollars for operation, and it was the destination point "for important business travelers."

He also read a letter from Wilford Delker, a corporate vice-president for American Standard, which hinted that Combs Field's future was closely tied to the future of the Paintsville plant.

Plant manager Ron Belhasen followed his brother at the podium, issuing a lightly veiled warning to council, suggesting that a project under-way between the local plant and state officials would "make it very foolish to say one ill word about that airport."

Ron Belhasen said the Paintsville American Standard plant employed 322, adding that 150 of those workers were from Floyd County. He said the Big Sandy Regional Airport, located in Martin County near Floyd and Johnson County lines, "certainly will not serve the interest of the Paintsville plant."

"To sum it up," he added, "American Standard's interest in the (Paintsville-Prestonsburg) airport ought to be the interest of Prestonsburg and Paintsville."

In response to the brothers' allegations that "misinformation" about the airport was being circulated, Mayor Ann Latta suggested the Belhasens were "misinformed" themselves.

"I know of no organized effort to close the airport," Latta said, "and we have not reached a decision with (Paintsville) Mayor (John) Preston on the future of Combs."

Latta said she had been "summoned" to Frankfort recently to discuss the airport's future, noting that state officials had recommended the airport be phased out and that an agreement to do just that was part of the original plans for building the Big Sandy Regional Airport.

Latta also noted that Prestonsburg was currently without representation on a joint Paintsville-Prestonsburg Airport Board, adding that she had been unable to find appointees for the city's three vacant seats on the board.

Runaways jailed for car thefts

Three Ohio juveniles, the oldest of which is 14, ended up in the Floyd County juvenile detention center in Prestonsburg Monday after taking police on a high speed chase in Floyd and Pike counties.

The three, two boys and a girl, were identified as runaways from Columbus, Ohio, who apparently were en route to Florida. Three cars were reportedly stolen by the trio, the last of which was wrecked during the police chase Monday. That car was stolen in Paintsville.

According to Pikeville police, Sgt. Larry Sanders attempted to stop the car in which the three were riding early Monday after suspecting the driver was under the influence on an intoxicating substance. The driver of the car refused to stop and a chase, assisted by Pikeville patrolman Gordon Carter and Pike County deputy Paul Mullins, led back into Floyd County.

The suspect vehicle turned at Ivel, backtracking south on Route 23 before it was wrecked in a curve near Indian Hills.

The juveniles, who had reportedly stolen cars in Columbus and Ashland before taking the vehicle from Paintsville, were arrested and lodged in the Floyd County juvenile detention center. They were charged with receiving stolen property, reckless driving and attempting to elude. Two of the juveniles reportedly are on probation, one for auto theft, and another for drug trafficking.

Fed judge lectures Prestonsburg official

A member of the Prestonsburg City Council was reprimanded last week by U.S. District Judge Joseph Hood for failing to report for jury service in federal court. According to Hood, this was the councilman's second no-show for jury duty.

William O. Goebel appeared before the judge in a show cause hearing to present evidence why he should not be held in contempt of the court. He gave a medical condition as his defense.

"I was under the doctor's care," he said, "I had a real bad cold, simple as it might sound."

He continued that medicine prescribed by his physician on Sunday

had caused severe drowsiness and that he slept until early afternoon on Monday, October 7, when he was scheduled to be in court.

Hood asked Goebel if he had tried to contact the court or the clerk's office to report his condition and to be excused from jury service that day. Goebel said that no one was in on Sunday and he did not make an attempt on Monday.

"I realize that jury duty is an imposition on your rights as a citizen; that one of the privileges of being a citizen of the United States is that you get to serve on a jury," Hood told Goebel, "You have to admit that the last time you missed jury service, I wrote you a letter and said, 'Don't let

Record cocaine bust ends with probation

A Prestonsburg business man who pleaded guilty to cocaine trafficking received a five-year probated sentence in Floyd County Circuit Court.

James Dale Mosley, 38, of Prestonsburg was indicted by grand jury earlier this year and charged with trafficking in a schedule II narcotic; possessing a schedule II narcotic; and trafficking in marijuana. The trafficking in marijuana charge was dismissed.

Mosley pleaded guilty in circuit court May 9 and was sentenced September 27. The court order, issued October 8, said Mosley received a

five-year probated sentence because of a pre-sentencing report by the Division of Probation and Parole and because of his history and character.

In what was called "the largest cocaine bust in the city of Prestonsburg" by detective Jeff Stumbo, Mosley was arrested at his place of business, Dale's Cigo on North Lake Drive, by Prestonsburg city police last November after he allegedly sold an undercover officer cocaine. Police confiscated 53 grams of cocaine worth \$5,300. Police also seized a Chevy truck and \$900 during the arrest.

Mosley was originally charged

Floyd man indicted for rape in Johnson County

A Floyd County man has been indicted by a Johnson County Grand Jury on a charge of third degree rape.

The indictment, returned last week, named Jack Akers, of Weeksbury, on the charge in connection with an alleged incident involving a woman "incapable of consent."

The Floyd County Sheriff's department said Tuesday that a warrant had been served on Akers, but there was no record of his arrest at either

the Floyd County jail or the Big Sandy Regional Detention Center in Paintsville.

Bond was set at \$5,000. A charge of third degree rape carries a potential sentence of 1-5 years in prison and a maximum fine of \$10,000.

The identities of alleged rape victims are not published by The Floyd County Times.

Bare cupboards send local group in search of funding

Cupboards are bare in Floyd County's six food pantries and will have to depend on community resources to continue to provide food to needy families for the rest of the year.

The Floyd County Ministerial Association reported that a 20 percent cut in federal funding this year has tightened even further their small budgets.

Now, efforts are being stepped up to seek aid from the city of Prestonsburg and the Floyd County Fiscal Court, said Rev. Tim Jessen, treasurer of the association.

"The city often refers transients to us to help," Jessen said, "and we feel the entire community should help in meeting these needs. The churches have simply not been able to meet the

many needs that have come to their attention this year."

The association receives Federal Emergency Management Assistance (FEMA) funds to give to the pantries to purchase food through the Cooperative Christian Ministries of Floyd County (CCM). The CCM coordinator dispenses money to the pantries

and provides limited funds for emergency housing and utilities.

The six food pantries are located in Prestonsburg, David, Wayland, Estill, Drift and Mud Creek.

While each pantry determines its own times and method of distribution, the pantries together agree to serve only persons in their designated areas and to refer requests for help to the appropriate pantry.

An additional resource available to the Floyd County pantries is the food bank located in Prestonsburg, God's Pantry East. While it does not provide food directly to the needy, it serves agencies and provides food to the pantries at a reduced rate.

Reverend Wayne Burch, president

Donna Blackburn, another opponent to closing Combs Field, advised the mayor that "there are plenty of people willing to serve on the board," suggesting that Latta seek them out.

The mayor responded that she would not have her appointment decisions "dictated."

C.K. Belhasen interrupted the exchange saying that the airport could function without Prestonsburg's participation.

"If Prestonsburg's council feels they don't want to be involved," Belhasen said, "move to withdraw. Then it will be a one city airport." He said the Paintsville City Council had "voted 6-0" to oppose the airport closure. That claim, Paintsville Mayor John David Preston said Tuesday, was inaccurate. Preston said the council had issued no resolution in connection with the airport. The council did, however, reject three of Preston's appointees to the airport board.

C.K. Belhasen, who earlier had labeled Preston a "dictator" who "does not believe in compromise," softened his stance a bit near the end of the airport discussions, suggesting he would be "the first one to disassemble my hangar" if an industrial prospect expressed interest in the airport site. He added that use of the airport for that purpose would be difficult because it was under the 100-year flood plain.

Belhasen's confrontational posture reappeared after Mayor Latta offered a list of airport shortcomings, including her suggestion that three recently constructed homes near the airport were "built in the flight path and would have to be removed" if the airport remained open.

Belhasen responded with an accusation that Latta, Preston and Martin County Judge-Executive John Callahan were "lobbying to close" the airport.

"We know who is behind trying to close the airport and we will make it known in a public relations campaign," Belhasen said.

"I wish you'd let me know right now," Latta answered, adding that it was her understanding that American Standard had withdrawn its objection to closing the airport and repeating that state officials had recommended the field be phased out of use.

"Whoever said American Standard was on record saying they would not oppose closure is a liar," Ron Belhasen said.

Council members took no action on the issue.

Prior to the airport exchange, Jenny Wiley Festival committee member Mary McDonald approached council, seeking waivers of a \$100 parade permit fee and a \$180 bill for emergency medical personnel, and that request led to a discussion of the future of that and other annual events in the city.

Council agreed to the waivers on condition the festival committee would also waive a booth fee charged

to the city's volunteer fire department, and the panel launched into a general discussion of future festival plans.

Noting he fully supported the fall festival's goals, councilman Mike Vance said the city hosted "two major festivals each year and neither makes much money." Vance recommended that the city's economic development committee "see if there is some way to pull (the Jenny Wiley Festival and the annual Festival of F.A.C.E.S.) together to have one major festival a year."

City pastor Tim Jessen noted that a Prestonsburg Bicentennial Commission was "considering just that" and the commission would propose "one homecoming celebration" for the spring of 1992.

Council accepted Vance's recommendation to have the city's economic development committee review the proposal.

After settling into routine business, which was interrupted by an hour-long executive session called to "discuss personnel and pending litigation," council was confronted by an irate resident of Goble-Roberts who sought city action on a problem with stray dogs in the neighborhood.

Phillip Harless told the panel Monday that had recently spent \$300 to repair damage to his home caused by stray dogs, adding that "people are getting fed up with the problem." Harless said he had filed numerous complaints with the city police department over his problem with strays but little had been accomplished to resolve those problems.

Council took no formal action on the complaint, but agreed they would ask the area animal shelter for help.

In other business Monday, council:

- approved second reading of an ordinance relating to electrical contractors;

- approved by a 6-2 vote second reading of an ordinance changing council meeting times from 7 p.m. to 6 p.m. Councilmen Charles Hale and William Goebel voted no;

- set Trick or Treat for Thursday, October 31 from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m.;

- agreed to review the legalities of a request from the city's ministerial

association for financial assistance for a program to help needy transients;

- agreed to reject bids and rebid for replacement of a bridge at Archer Park;

- referred bids on new garbage containers to committee for review;

- authorized the sanitation department to seek best possible interest rates for a loan to purchase those new containers; and

- adopted a resolution to be sent to Governor Wallace Wilkinson acknowledging the city's appreciation for assistance the governor has provided Prestonsburg during his four years in office.

All members of council were present for the October 14 meeting.

it happen again."

"And it happened again without anybody letting my clerk's office know that you were going to be sick," Hood continued. "You could have called in and left a message on the code phone and it didn't happen."

Hood gave Goebel two directives to follow to prevent his being held in contempt.

First, Goebel was to submit a written statement from his doctor specifying the sickness, medicine prescribed and any natural side-effects of those medicines.

Secondly, he was to write a letter to be filed in the clerks office apologizing to his fellow jurors for his failure to appear.

"I hope you're ashamed and embarrassed," Hood said. "What you're doing is you're imposing on those people because you're not taking your turn and fair share. The next time if you're sick let the court know."

of the ministerial association, said recent efforts to get more churches in the county involved in the food pantry outreach program have been discouraging.

"It is disappointing to me that more people are not interested in helping to feed the hungry," Burch said, "since it is something on which we can all agree."

The association members hope that since October 16 has been proclaimed World Food Day by Governor Wallace Wilkinson more attention will be focused on the plight of hungry families in the Commonwealth.

One community group that has supported the food pantry work on an annual basis has been the Floyd County Bar Association, Jessen said. For the last five years the association has given a substantial contribution at Christmas.

Another way of dealing with the food crisis could be through a county wide food drive and the association is considering such an effort, Jessen said.

"Many individual churches and groups, such as the Boy Scouts, have already conducted food drives," Jessen said. "But, the efforts have not been coordinated in a united push."

"We need to raise the consciousness of this community about the needs of our hungry," Jessen added. "If food drives can do it, it needs to be done on a cooperative basis."

Jessen suggests that a sharing of all available resources—federal money, local resources and individual contributions—of the entire community have help the food pantries survive their current financial crisis.

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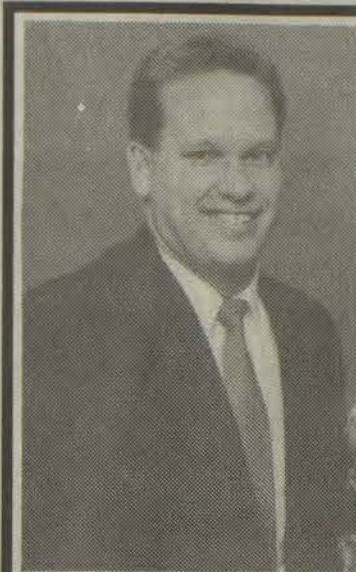

In Kentucky you don't have to raise the dead to be elected, though some of our officials are, in fact, quite adept at getting the dearly departed to vote.

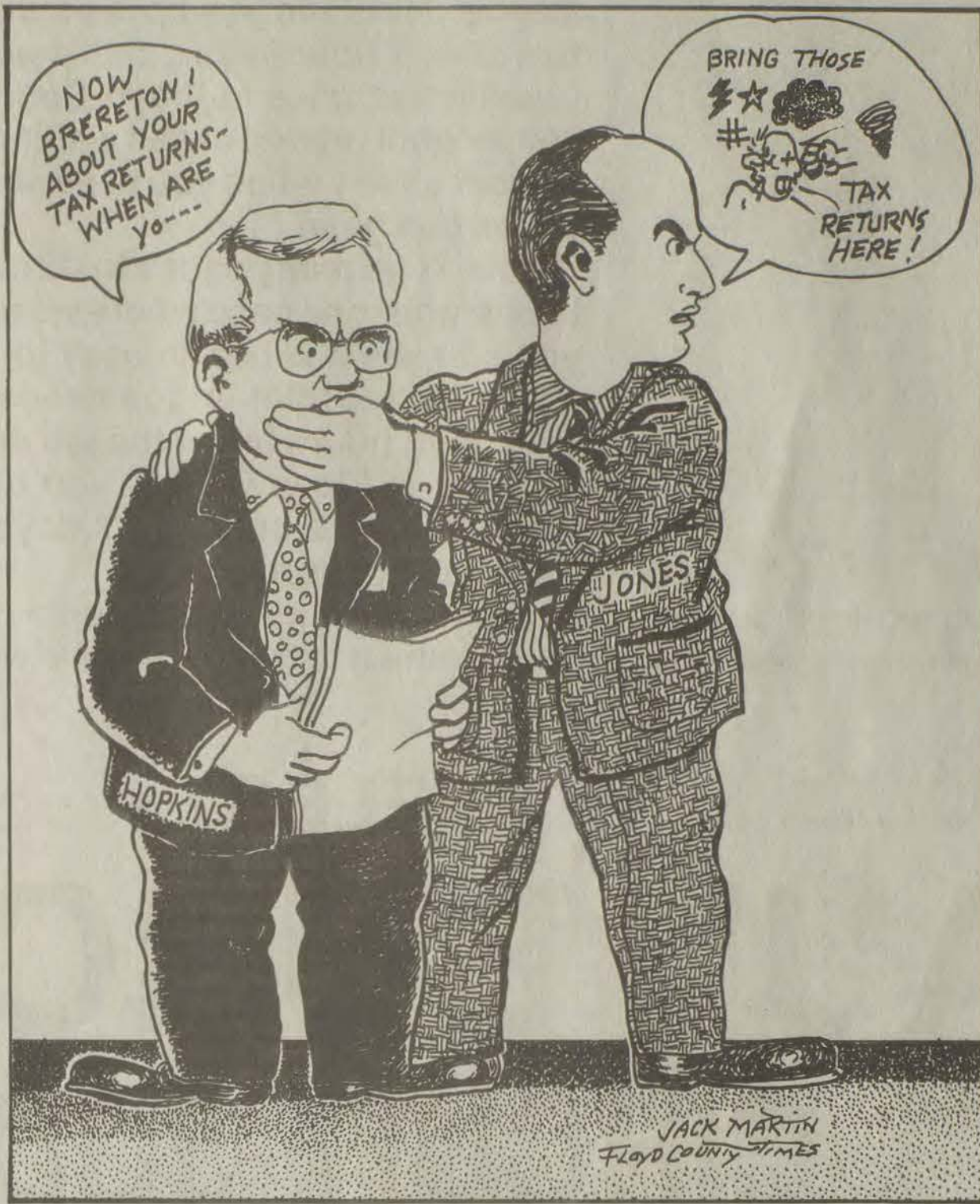
If any good has come of the debates on Capitol Hill, it is that the hearings pre-empted Saturday morning cartoons.

Legislative Perspective

(FRANKFORT) For those living in coal producing counties, the long wait is over for the anticipated recommendations from the legislative Coal Revenue Allocation Task Force. They were released by the panel last week and received approval from all members excepting one abstention.

As co-chairman of the task force with Senator Charlie Berger of Harlan, I can ascertain that everyone involved worked extremely hard to achieve reasonable recommendations that could be agreed upon by the variety of regions represented in the membership of the panel. To obtain a larger share of severance tax revenue for my coal producing areas has been one of my major objectives during my tenure in the General Assembly.

The proposals that were endorsed would increase the portions of the severance tax that coal counties now receive of the \$186 million the tax raises from twelve percent to 50 percent. While, the current severance tax program allows "coal impact" counties to receive that amount also, the task force report recommends that those "impact" counties be eliminated. One East Kentucky legislator who is a member of the panel said he did not think this would affect the favorable attitude toward a bill because most coal impact counties receive such an insignificant amount of revenue from the program. "Coal impact" counties initially received their allocation of the severance tax to repair road on which coal trucks traveled. Now most coal trucks use state and federal highways. Forty one Kentucky counties were designated "coal impact"

the current twelve percent return — would be placed in a special fund according to the proposal. And, counties would submit applications to the Kentucky Development Finance Authority as to how the money would be spent before the revenue could be released.

And, in addition, the recommendations contain a provision that bars any county from receiving severance tax revenue if local magistrates salaries were higher than the statewide average.

But some of the members who voted for the task force proposal in committee said they would work to change parts of it during the 1992 legislative session beginning in January.

For instance, one member expressed concern as to how the state budget would compensate for the loss of the severance tax money.

Also mentioned was the inclusion of including infrastructure installation, repair and replacement into the new money usage. An argument was made to the panel that many of these coal producing areas have no clean water supply as a direct result of the mining that is going on now or that has occurred in the past.

Now that the proposal is on the table, the issue is open for public scrutiny. I believe that legislation giving additional revenue back to the coal producing counties will be passed in 1992. 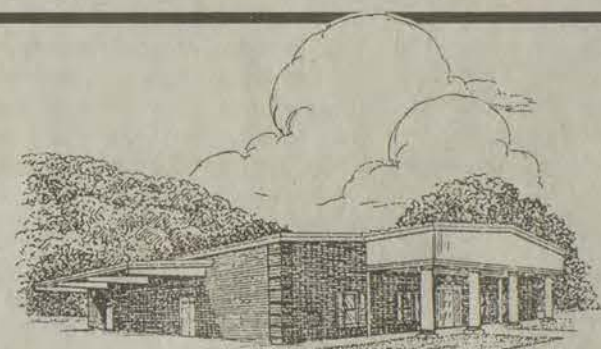

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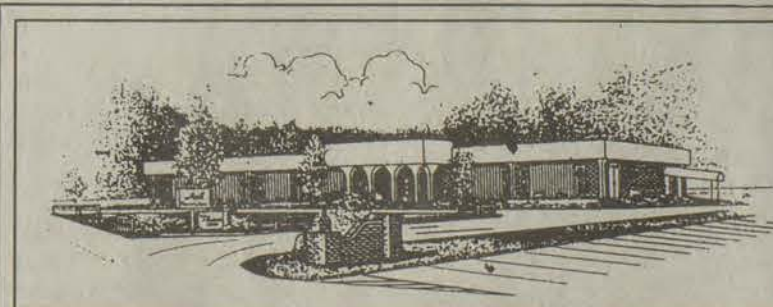

Breast cancer on the rise; new treatments available

One of the most devastating and frightening things any woman can experience is to discover a lump in her breast. With American Cancer Society statistics now indicating that one of every nine women will develop breast cancer, the odds of finding a lump seem to be increasing. October has been designated National Breast Cancer Awareness Month by the American Cancer Society (ACS), and Highlands Regional Medical Center urges all women to become more aware of the very real danger of this potential lady killer.

Highlands Regional, since opening its Breast Center in 1987 has been collecting information about breast cancer specific to patients in eastern Kentucky. In 1987, 29% of the breast cancer treated at Highlands was diagnosed at local stage (meaning that the cancer was confined to the breast and had not spread into any other areas of the body—also the form most easily treated). Sixty-six percent of the breast cancer cases diagnosed in 1987 continue to be disease free even though the disease had spread outside the breast in 65% of the cases.

At the end of 1990, 65% of the breast cancer was diagnosed at the local stage. This increase was attributed to early detection through monthly breast self exams, screening mammograms and physician examinations. Eighty percent of the breast cancer cases diagnosed and treated in 1990 have no evidence of reoccurrence or spreading to other parts of the body.

Although the percentage has increased to 1 in 9, odds have also increased for recovery and survival. The good news is that when detected early, Breast Cancer is very treatable and curable. Women who follow the American Cancer Society recommendations for breast cancer detection

have a better chance of cure because they are more likely to seek medical attention early.

Of all the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society, one of the most important is that women have a screening mammogram at age 35; at age 40 every two years; and age 50 and over, every year. The use of a dedicated mammography unit for screening mammograms such as the one used in the Breast Center, makes it possible for more breast cancer to be diagnosed in the local stages through the use of compression views, sonograms, and mammography directed biopsies. Each year over 3,000 mammogram procedures are performed in Highlands' Breast Center.

New treatment options are also available for women who have breast cancer. Instead of radical mastectomy which involves removal of the entire breast, the tendency now is toward less radical procedures. Radiation and chemotherapy, in addition to less aggressive surgery (lumpectomy), is now used for small tumors. The use of radiation and/or chemotherapy is determined by the size of the tumor and whether the cancer has spread beyond the breast to lymph nodes or other organs. Treatment decisions are made on an individual patient basis with input by the surgeon, medical oncologist, and radiation oncologist as well as other specialists, when necessary. Treatment may consist of surgery, radiation, hormonal therapy, chemotherapy, or any combination of these. If breast cancer remains undiagnosed until after it has spread into other parts of the body, treatment can be given for control of pain and local growth, and to slow the disease process.

Increased options are also available to post-mastectomy patients.

Because of advances in medical research these patients need not suffer the disfigurement previously associated with breast cancer. Plastic surgeons can now perform breast reconstructive procedures within a short period of time following the Mastectomy. Options available to patients include prosthesis, implants under the skin, permanent implants (tissue expander), and TRAM flap. (Transverse Rectus Abdominus Myocutaneous) The TRAM flap, a new and very successful procedure, has several advantages. In this procedure, skin and fat are taken from the patient's abdomen and put on the chest wall to reconstruct a natural breast. The advantages to this procedure over other procedures are that it totally uses the patient's own tissue; uses no foreign implant; and gives the patient a flatter abdomen. Breast reconstructive procedures are covered by most insurance plans.

Although new advances in the diagnosis and treatment of breast cancer have given women weapons to win the war against breast cancer, the human error factor still remains. Meaning this—if you have already found a lump in your breast and have done nothing about it, you are playing a dangerous game and ignoring the facts. You will either win or lose and the odds are 1 in 9 that you will lose. Be a winner and see your doctor as soon as possible.

Women stress how to prevent rape

She knew him. He was a nice guy. Quiet and sort of shy, the type who opens doors for women. He was also a friend of her boyfriend, so it wasn't unusual that he should ask to wait at her apartment for friends to pick him up.

Only the friends didn't show. And she didn't know him at all. Jan Oaks was raped at gunpoint before her captor finally left her Tennessee apartment five hours later. It happened 13 years ago, but the memory lingers.

"It was — and is — a nightmare. Sometimes, I can still smell him, feel him," said Oaks, 32, who now lives in Lake Worth, Florida.

"He reduced me to such a hysterical mess in that five hours that I went from begging him not to kill me to begging him to do it — I just couldn't take it anymore. I wanted it to be over. I wanted to die."

It was when she voiced that request that the rapist finally backed off and left.

It was over. She was alive. But then another hell began.

"One of the first things the authorities asked me was what I had been wearing," Oaks remembers. "At first, I thought the question made sense, but later, it didn't at all. Why should that have mattered? A woman should be able to walk down a street buck naked and nobody — nobody — has the right to touch her."

Unable to find counselors who could relate to or understand her feelings, Oaks began her own therapy.

She started Crisis Control, an organization through which Oaks and two staff members offer free seminars to teach women — and men — how to protect themselves against attacks.

An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, they say.

"I don't know if I could have prevented what happened to me, but I really believe that if I had then some of the information I teach in the seminars now, I might not have been in the situation that allowed the rape to happen in the first place," she said. "I would have been more aware of what was happening."

That lesson can't be taught too early, according to St. Lucie County Sheriff's Department Cpl. Joseph Mutter, who supervises the Florida county's school resource program. It is his job to make sure teenagers realize potential dangers — including the possibility of sexual assault.

"It is disheartening to hear, but there is a belief among some young men that if they take a girl on a date and spend money on her, then they are deserving of other affections," Mutter said. "The boys must be taught that that is not the case, and the young ladies must be taught to communicate their wishes. They have a right to say no, and mean it."

That goes for all women of all ages from all social backgrounds.

"Women are warned practically from birth not to accept rides or candy from strangers, but somehow they never believe rape is something that is going to happen to them," Oaks said.

Although it makes sense to take precautions among strangers, police say the majority of rapes are committed by someone the victim already knows or is at least acquainted with.

"The rapist is not always a dirty, grungy, trench coat-wearing pervert," Oaks said. "More often, they are good looking, unassuming men you may otherwise want to date."

Oaks believes that only 10 percent of rape assaults are reported. And eight in 10 women who have been raped never tell anyone about it, she said.

"There is some shame, maybe a fear that somehow they brought it upon themselves, or a worry about how people around her will react to the news," she said.

Recently, more men are reported being raped.

"Men always snicker when we say that, because they assume we mean the raping will be done by women," Oaks said. "Their smiles fade pretty quickly when we say it is other men who are doing the raping."

Rape is not as much about sex as it is about control, Oaks says. Rapists, who generally suffer from low self esteem, seek control and dominance over their victims. "Overpowering a woman is one thing, but doing it to another man is a real boost to the rapist's ego," she said.

Which means male victims may not be reporting the crimes, either.

"That was the most frustrating part for me," Oaks said. "People who do this kind of thing usually do it again."

Talking about it helps. For Oaks, it has been therapeutic.

"It took a long time, but I can talk about it now. If I can prevent what happened to me from happening to another woman, I'll talk even louder," she said. "I'll shout it from the mountaintops. It's that important."

As Blackcats Shut Down Magoffin County 63-0

Prestonsburg coach Bill Letton used the game against Magoffin County to give his younger players some valuable playing time as the Cats scratched the Hornets 63-0 in a

district matchup at Prestonsburg Friday night in front of a large homecoming crowd.

Traveling down Arnold Avenue, that leads to the school's field, fans

couldn't help but notice the cat paws painted on the street surface that welcomed the Hornets as they came to town.

Magoffin County is in a rebuild-

ing year at the Salyersville based school and first year coach Pete Greene's (former Blackcat) ball club is still looking for their first win.

Prestonsburg scored quick and often enroute to their third consecutive win to run their overall record to 3-4. But, more importantly, they stayed tied for second place in District 2 competition with a very good 3-1 mark.

John Thomas Clark got the Blackcats on the scoreboard on the opening kick off when he gathered in the football and scampered 65 yards for a touchdown. Clark then added the point after and it was 6-0 with only 53 seconds off the game clock.

Magoffin County, who only had a plus 5 yards at halftime, failed to move the football on their first possession and the Cats took over on their own 25-yard line. Five plays later Blackcat quarterback Aaron Tucker, on a keeper, galloped 51 yards for a TD. On a bootleg play Clark threw a strike to Dwayne Garza for the two-point conversion to make it a 15-0 game.

The early play of Prestonsburg was to the approval of Coach Letton.

"I thought we executed well in the game. We came out and looked sharp," the Prestonsburg mentor said. "I thought we had good down-field blocking from our players."

It didn't take long for Prestonsburg to add to the lead when Tucker connected with Clark for a 44-yard touchdown pass with 1:51 remaining in the first period. Right away the Prestonsburg starters knew that their playing time was going to be limited

in the second half.

But Coach Letton didn't wait until the second half to get his bench onto the gridiron.

Ten seconds had elapsed off the stadium clock when Garza, on the first play from scrimmage, broke a couple tackles and jaunted into the endzone from 38 yards out and Clark added the two-point conversion on a fake PAT attempt to give Prestonsburg a commanding 29-0 lead.

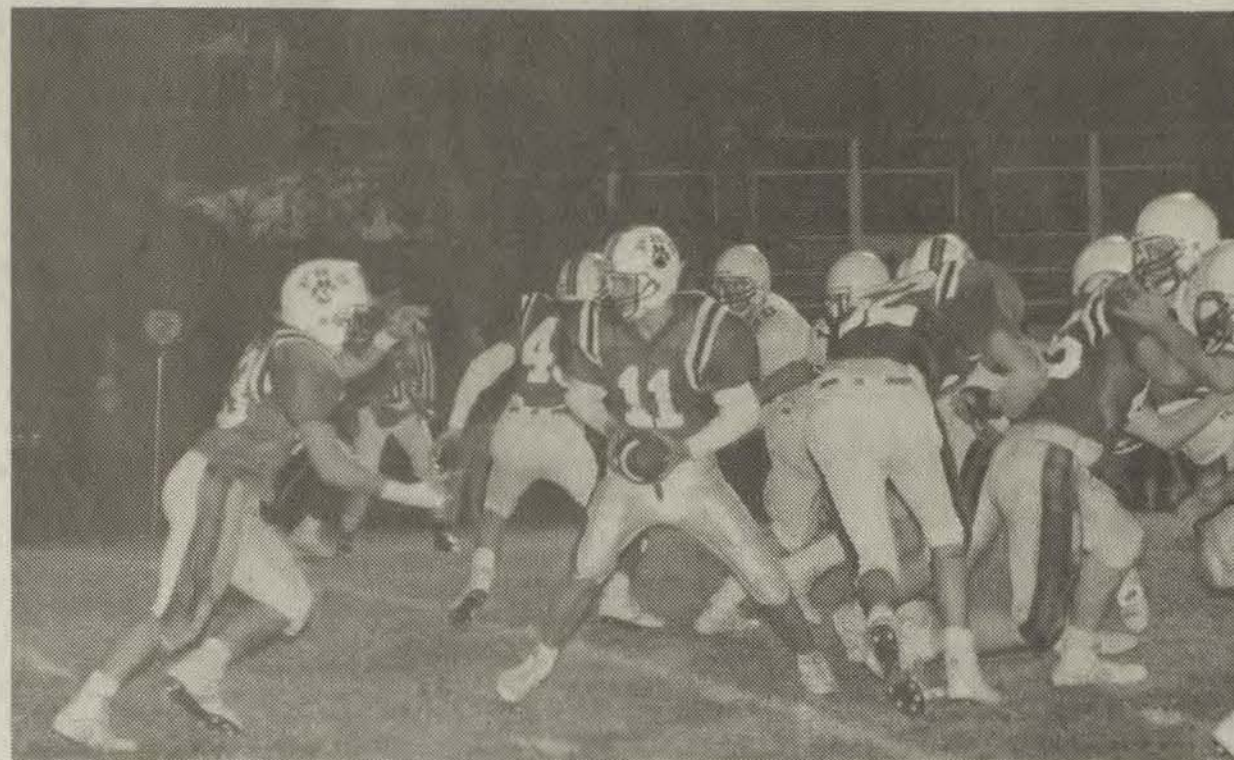
It was heartbreak and rejoicing time for the Blackcats in second quarter. John Goble had a 78-yard touchdown run nullified by a clipping call. The rejoicing came one play later when Seth Hyden carried the football in from 64 yards out for the touchdown. Clark hit Ronnie Goodman with a pass for the two-point conversion and it was 37-0.

Freshman Thomas Ratliff replaced Aaron Tucker at the signal calling position for a series of plays with 3:07 remaining in the first half. Ratliff, on a keeper, ran for 31 yards in the drive that ended at the horn.

Prestonsburg picked up where they left off in the second half. Magoffin County had first possession and had to punt the ball over to Prestonsburg. On a first-and-ten play Goble took the handoff from Ratliff at the Magoffin County 46-yard line and ran into the endzone for the TD. Clark kicked the PAT for a 44-0 game.

The young Hornets experienced more woes after taking the kick off. Quarterback Shawn Perkins was sacked in the backfield and fumbled

Wheelwright Disposes of KSD 42-26; Has Chance For Best Season Since '85

The Wheelwright Trojans football team has not had a winning season since 1985 when they finished with a 6-4 mark. This year's Trojans have an excellent chance of posting a winning season if they can come up with wins in their final three games.

Wheelwright traveled to Danville this past Thursday night to take on a good Kentucky School for the Deaf with their eighth grade sensation Pat Harris. The Trojans got a scare early but posted a 42-26 win for their third win of the season — the most for a Trojan team in some years.

If the Trojans can pull out victories over Allen Central, Berea, and Elkhorn City, they could finish the season 6-4 same as the '85 team.

"We don't have a shot at placing as one of the top four teams in our district," said Trojan head coach Donnie Daniels, "and it doesn't look as if we will be in the playoffs. But we have had a good season and a 6-4 record would be real good."

Steven Jackson led the Trojans in rushing with 80 yards on 12 carries. Eddie Shelton, carrying the ball more since his injury, picked up 64 yards on nine carries. Arnold Adams rushed for 62 yards while carrying the football 13 times. Chuck Hutton managed 51 yards on six carries.

Other Trojans had an opportunity to run the ball as Matthew Johnson had 44 yards on nine carries and Mutu Oden carried five times for 35 yards.

Trojan quarterback Steven Shelton had two completions for 47 yards. Shelton had the golden toe for the Trojans as he kicked four of five extra points.

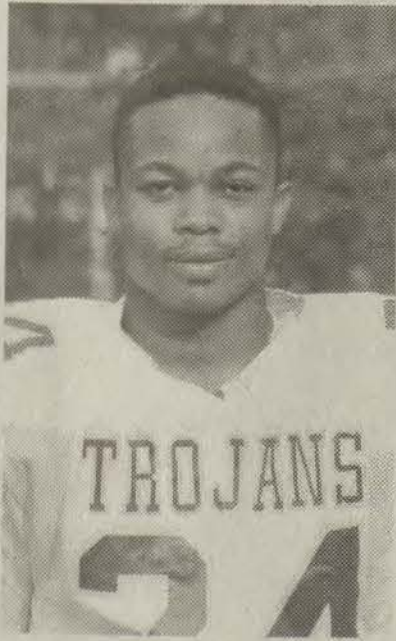
"We haven't really used our kicking game this season," explained Daniels, "so I decided to try against KSD."

Wheelwright amazed their coach by carrying the football 65 times in the game for 269 yards. "That's a lot of times to carry the football," he said. "We did pretty much what we wanted to on defense. We scored about every time we had the football so we never did punt in the game. And with us carrying the football so

much, we did not have to spend that much time on defense."

Mention the name of Pat Harris and Daniels will tell you how impressed he is with the youngster.

"He is just an eighth grader and is



the second leading rusher in the state," the Wheelwright coach explained. "Boy, he has a lot of speed."

Harris took the opening kick off from the Trojans and raced 85 yards for the touchdown that gave KSD an abbreviated lead of 6-0.

"He went to the right and we hemmed him in, and then he went to the left and we hemmed him in," said Daniels, "and then he just went up the middle on us and scored."

The Trojans tied the game and took the lead, 7-6, in the first period on Steven Jackson's 5-yard touchdown run and Shelton's first PAT. KSD charged back in the first period to assume a 12-7 advantage on Terry Hensley's 33-yard run.

Eddie Shelton put the Trojans on top to stay with a 13-yard run in the final minutes of the first period. "Teeter" Shelton's extra point kick gave Wheelwright a 14-12 first quarter lead.

Wheelwright added another TD in the second period to take a 20-12

lead to the lockerroom at halftime. Arnold Adams scored from 3 yards out just before the half.

In the third period it was all Wheelwright as Chuck Hutton scored from 11 yards out and Shelton added the extra point. Before the quarter had ended Oden had scored his first touchdown of the season in the period.

Steven Shelton added the final score for the Trojans in the fourth quarter on a touchdown run from 12 yards out. He also added the extra point.

Hensley put the final two touchdowns on the scoreboard for KSD on runs of 50 and 20 yards.

"We got lost going down there," stated Daniels of his team's travels. "We were about 45 minutes late getting there and we just weren't ready to play. I think the kids thought all they had to do to win this one was to show up."

"The Harris kid just about beat us himself," explained the Trojan coach. "He played for about two and a half quarters and then we sort of stuck him a couple of times in the third quarter and he went out. I don't think he wanted to come back in."

Harris led the KSD ground attack with a 165 yard outing. Hensley finished with 148 yards on just six carries, scoring three touchdowns.

"We played slow as a team and just couldn't find out what we wanted to do early," Daniels said. "But once we got adjusted we played well. I wasn't totally pleased with the way we played, but overall we played well."

Wheelwright will face county rival Allen Central tomorrow night (Thursday) at Allen Central in a big district and county match up.

"We'll just regroup and practice and treat it as any other game," said Daniels of the rivalry. The game will be homecoming for Allen Central. On Saturday night, Wheelwright will host Berea in their homecoming game that will get underway at 7 p.m. Homecoming festivities will start at 6 p.m.

First Win Continues To Escape Rebels As Elkhorn City Posts 45-6 Win

Allen Central is still looking for that first win of the 1991 football season. The Rebels fell to the Cougars of Elkhorn City Thursday night at Elkhorn City 45-6 for their seventh loss in as many games this season.

Allen Central could only manage 95 yards rushing while the Cougars were piling up 246 yards on the ground. Joe Williams led the Cougars in rushing with 86 yards. Cougar quarterback Kevin Rose rolled up 74 yards for the Cougars while Eddie Morton picked up 61 yards.

Rose was three for 10 in passing for 46 yards. Allen Central intercepted one Rose pass.

Allen Central's freshman quarterback Brad Blackburn had a good percentage with seven completions in 19 attempts but the frosh signal caller also threw five interceptions.

Morton put the Cougars on the scoreboard early with a 66-yard kick off return for a 6-0 lead. The try for the extra point failed when the Rebel defense blocked the kick.

Allen Central came right back in the first quarter and made it a 6-6

The Yellowjackets took a 40-6 halftime lead with 7:15 left on a 42-yard scoring pass from Rose to Greg Amburgey.

Betsy Layne looked like a much better defensive team in the second half as they held the Yellowjackets scoreless in the third period and much of the fourth. Whitesburg scored their final points on a 3-yard run by Shane Campbell. A pass from Rose to Shiloh Campbell completed the two-point conversion play and a 48-6 game.

Offensively for Betsy Layne, there wasn't much yardage on the ground as they Bobcats managed only 55 yards on 25 carries. Leading rusher for Betsy Layne was James Keathley with 18 yards on eight carries. Jamie Kidd rushed for 14 yards on four attempts while Doug Hammond managed 14 on five carries.

Combs was just shy of 50 percent in the passing department with six of 14 passes good for 139 yards. Betsy Layne had a total of 194 yards offensively. Hammond had the 83-yard reception plus a 9-yard catch for 92 yards receiving. Randy Woods had a reception of 26 yards. Kidd caught one pass good for 6 yards.

Betsy Layne was penalized five times for 45 yards. Combs was intercepted once while the big quarterback was sacked three times for a minus 22 yards. The Bobcats fumbled the football four times but recovered all four miscues.

Defensively, Jamie Kidd had a great game with 18 tackles, 10 solos. Bush finished the game with 10 tackles, five solos. Combs, had a good defensive game with eight tackles and six being solos. Chad Wilson had five hits with four being solos.

This Thursday night at the Don Daniels Athletic Field two county rivals will get together for a second part of the Clash of the Beavers. This will be the sixth time the two teams have met on the gridiron with Wheelwright holding a 3-2 edge.

Allen Central enters the contest with a 0-7 record after experiencing their first winning season last year. Wheelwright, on the other hand, is enjoying their best season in a while with a 3-4 record. Allen Central lost to Elkhorn City last Thursday night 45-6. Wheelwright will be coming off a 42-26 win over the Kentucky School for the Deaf, also played last Thursday night.

This will be more than just a district game. More than just a homecoming game for the Rebels. A season for Allen Central could be had here if they could post a win over the Left Beaver school. Bragging rights of the Beavers are at stake.

"We will just treat it as another game," said Wheelwright coach Donnie Daniels. But is that impossible. Take into consideration that two years ago Daniels was on the other side of the log, coaching against Wheelwright. In fact, the Trojan is a former student at Wheelwright. He, along with his father Don Daniels Sr., were instrumental in starting the Allen Central program.

Consider this. Dewey Jamerson is a former Wheelwright student that played his football under his father, Shorty Jamerson in Trojan country. Don't think either team will treat it as just another game. How about this one. Jody Sword, present principal at Allen Central, was at one time the principal at Wheelwright.

But the real issue will be settled on the field when the two Beaver schools collide.

It will be the experienced backfield of the Trojans against a very young and inexperienced Allen Central team. Coach Jamerson has gone the last two games with freshman quarterback Brad Blackburn. Blackburn has a lot of potential to be a

varsity signal caller and Jamerson wants to give him that experience this year. Jamie Slone has been the number one ball carrier for the Rebels. Slone will face a very stingy Trojan defense. However, the quickness of Slone could prove to be a problem for the Trojan line.

The Rebels, a team that has been mentioned in the press much of late, and not because of any great win they have pulled out, but for the performance of Jesse Watts of Sheldon Clark two weeks ago, will find the Trojans more to their liking. In this game it will be the backfield of the Trojans that must be of concern to Allen Central.

Arnold Adams, Steven Jackson, Chuck Hutton, Eddie Shelton and Ryan Hamilton are experienced and possess very good speed. The passing game of the Trojans has not been all that spectacular, but with the runners that Daniels has, passing the football is not needed but to mix one up now and then to keep the defense honest.

Steven Shelton quarterbacked the ball club and of late has handled the kicking chores for the Trojans.

"If someone would have told me before the season started that we would be in the position for a .500 or a winning season I would have thought they were crazy. But as I saw this team play and practice I thought this is a pretty good little team," commented Daniels. "When we started scrimmaging I thought that perhaps we could win four games." But now the Trojan mentor envisions a winning season if not a .500 year.

The Rebels will have three things going for them tomorrow night. First,

it will be homecoming and every team gives an added effort on homecoming night. Second, it is a county game and against Wheelwright with all the Wheelwright connections. That should be incentive enough. Third, the Rebels desperately need a win and the Trojans could provide them with one.

The Rebels know that down the road the next two weeks lie the likes of Leslie County and Phelps. The game with Leslie County was a scheduling mistake and could prove to be a nightmare or just a good opportunity for a young team to grow up. A win over Phelps is a possibility, especially if the Rebels could come away with a win over Wheelwright and have at least a good showing at Leslie County.

Coach Jamerson realizes that his team is in a rebuilding year after graduating 16 seniors from last year's 6-5 team. Coach Jamerson takes it all in stride and just tries to encourage his young ball club.

Wheelwright on the other hand is an experienced team sprinkled with youth. Jackson is perhaps the quickest player in the county this year. Arnold Adams has greatly improved as a runner since his freshman year. Add the ability of Hutton and Shelton at quarterback and you have a pretty good backfield. The Trojans' problems have been on the both sides of the line.

"We need to improve both our offensive and defensive lines," explained Daniels. "That has been a weak area for us. Hopefully, we can strengthen that with some players that will be coming into the program

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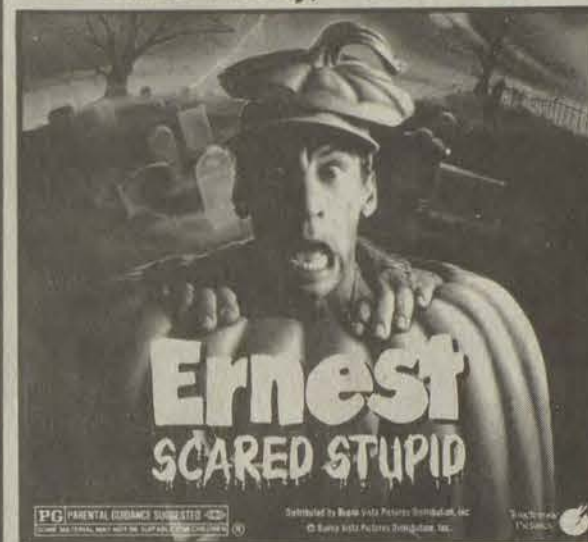
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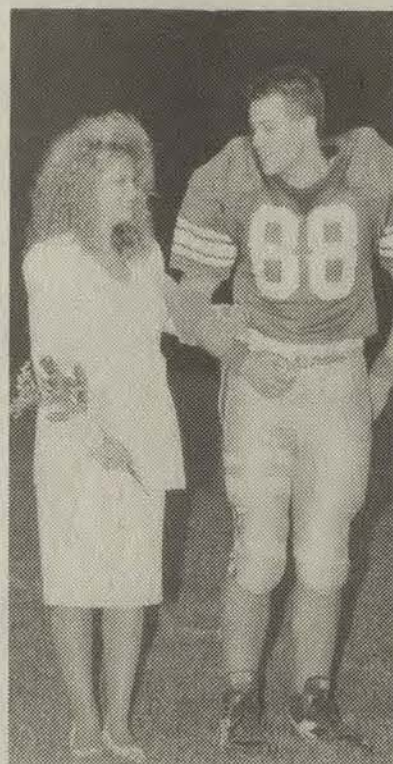

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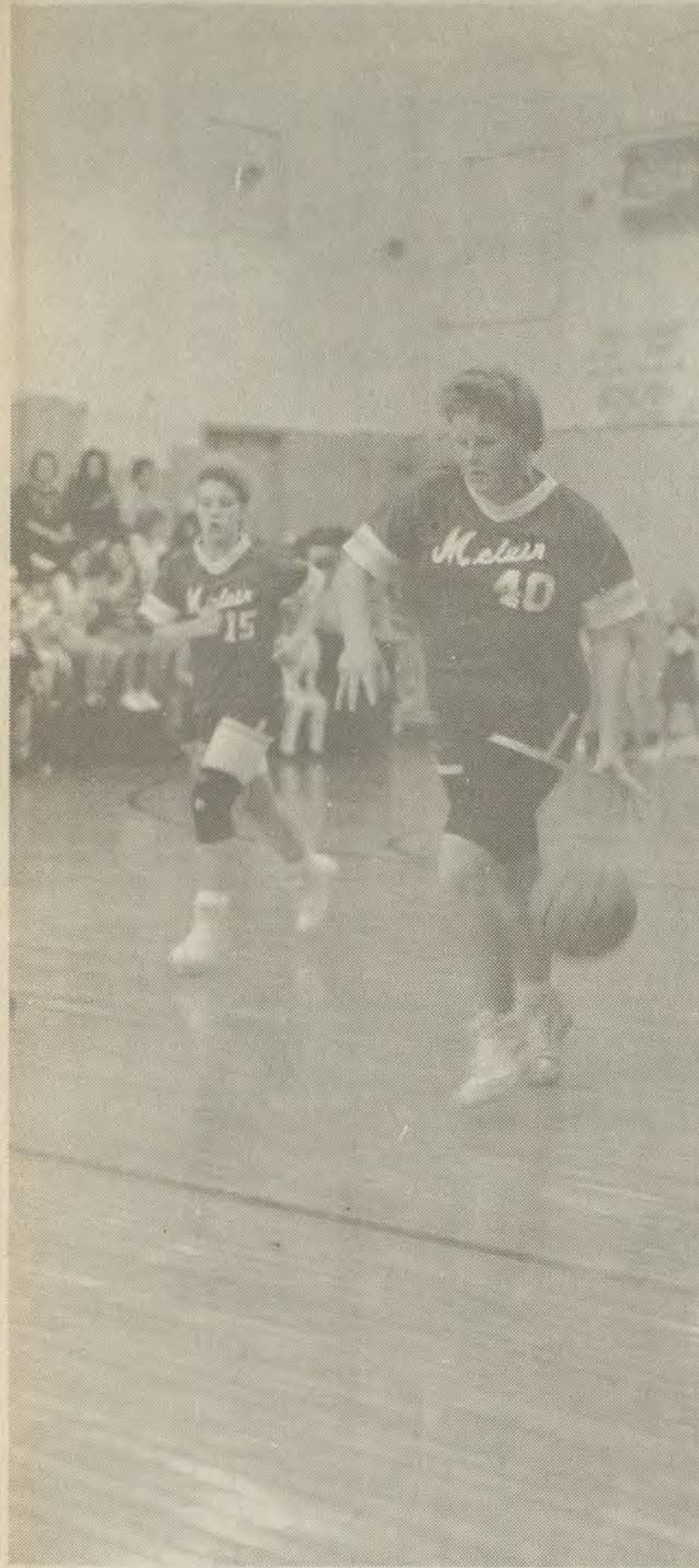

Modifications Make Carolina Rig Versatile

Bass anglers across the nation have long been singing praises about the Carolina rig lizard, the heavy sinker/long leader lure that catches fish with ease in both deep and shallow water. Naturally, professional tournament anglers have tried to modify the rig to make it even more effective.

"This is one lure that really is a genuine fish-catcher," explains Evinrude Outboards Pro Staff angler Mickey Bruce, "because it is so versatile. You can literally rig it for the types of water and cover conditions you're fishing." Basically, says Bruce, the most common modifications the pros make are changing either the sinker weight or the leader length, and adding extra beads.

The standard Carolina rig consists of a 3/4 to 1-ounce slip sinker threaded on the line ahead of a small swivel. A leader of up to four feet in length is tied to the swivel, and the lure, usually a worm or lizard, attached to the end of the leader. "One of the favorite places to fish a Carolina rig is over submerged grass," explains the Evinrude pro, "when you use a heavy sinker, it usually snags in the grass so you have trouble feeling bites."

"This is where a lighter sinker, or a much longer leader can be used. A lighter sinker lets you keep the lizard or worm above the grass easier, while a longer leader (with a heavier sinker) simply lets the lure float higher above the vegetation." Bruce also adds two extra beads to his Carolina rig when he's fishing grass. The standard bead placement is between the sinker and swivel; many believe the noise created by the sinker clacking against the bead helps attract bass.

"Yes, that bead is for noise," admits Bruce, "but if you put another bead on the leader ahead of your worm or lizard, it will help the lure come through the vegetation much easier. The grass just seems to slide around it, rather than clog on the head of the lure and foul it."

If the pros are fishing in extremely shallow water vegetation, they occasionally eliminate the sinker entirely, letting the swivel serve as a weight. "Another modification that helps the Carolina rig is changing the length of the leader," Bruce continued. "There

is no rule that says the leader has to be four feet long, which is the standard leader length."

"Basically, if you are fishing the lure around heavy cover like stumps or treetops, you want a shorter leader so you don't get snagged as much. It's more manageable.

"In more open water, however, or where the vegetation is fairly high off the bottom, a longer leader may be used. Some of the pros may have a leader as long as seven feet." The service experts at OMC recommend bass boaters and other high performance enthusiasts install a water pressure gauge on their boats. Outboards can lose water pressure if the motor is trimmed or raised too high, or if the water intake is covered with weeds or mud. This can lead to overheating and possible engine damage.

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Prater Lady Cougars Impressive In Opening Round Of Classic

The Prater Creek Lady Cougars took charge early against McDowell, then held off a late charge by the Lady Daredevils and went on to post a 32-15 win in the opening round of the Right Beaver Elementary Classic at Maytown Monday night.

Prater jumped out to a 6-1 first quarter lead and led 15-4 at half time. The Lady Cougars built a 19 point advantage after three quarters only to see the Lady Daredevils putting together a rally in the final period behind the scoring of Latita Wilhite. Wilhite, who did not start the game, tossed in six points in the fourth period to lead the late McDowell charge.

Myra Akers led all scorers with 14 points for Prater. Christine Boyd and Heather Nelson each scored nine points.

The Lady Cougars used a pressure half court trap to cause the Lady Daredevils some problems in getting into their offense. Boyd scored first for Prater and Akers hit two baskets to give Prater their 6-1 first quarter lead. Rachael Howell scored a free throw for McDowell's only point.

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Bassin' with the Pros

Ken Cook used a spinnerbait to win the 1991 BASS Masters Classic® world championship, but he didn't retrieve it the ordinary way. Instead, he fluffed, fluttered and shook it.

"It sounds like the spinnerbait was dancing all the way to the boat," laughs Cook, a member of the Evinrude Outboards Pro Staff and a former fisheries biologist for the state of Oklahoma, "but what I was really trying to do was create an erratic action that triggered strikes from inactive bass." The technique worked, for Cook brought in a five-bass limit on each of the three competition days, one of only six contestants to do so in the 40-angler field.

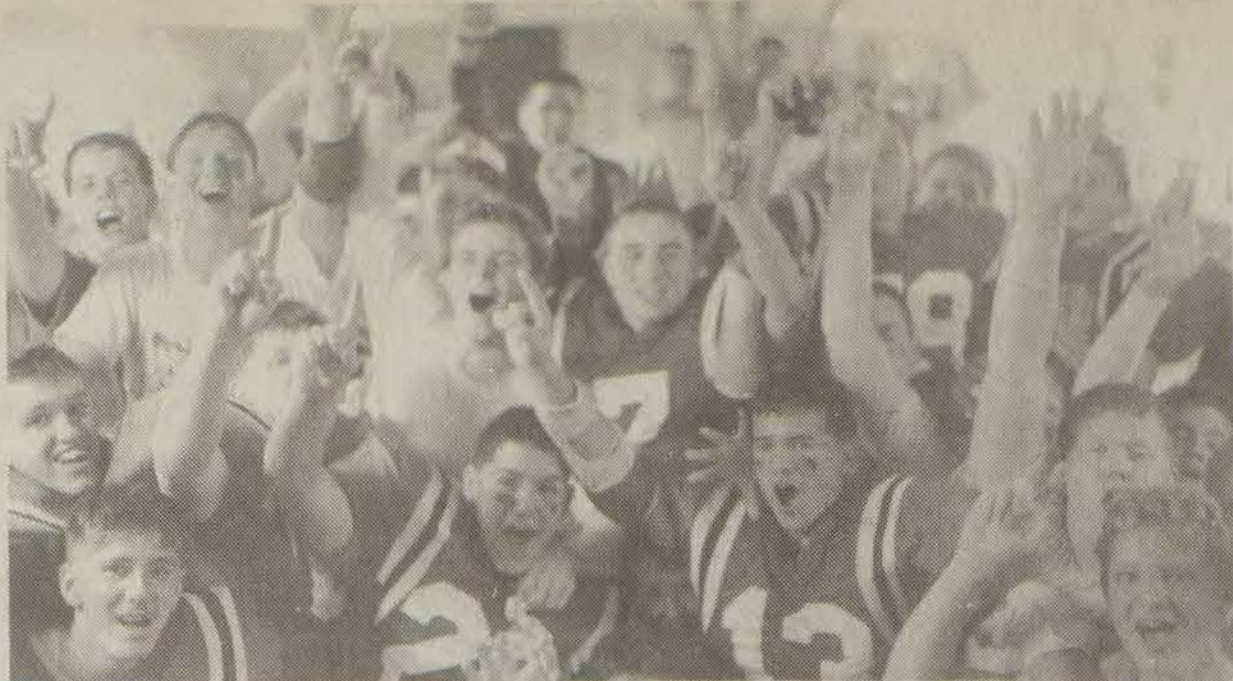
"I had located fish around isolated clumps of vegetation several feet below the surface," explains Cook, "but they were not aggressive. I wanted to use a spinnerbait because I could cover the water more rapidly, so I started shaking my rod tip as I retrieved each cast." Holding his rod tip down, Cook not only shook the spinnerbait, he also stopped his retrieve periodically. The two actions caused the spinnerbait blade to stop and start repeatedly, and also allowed the lure's skirt to fluff open and then close, as well.

"Each time I stopped the retrieve around the grass, the spinnerbait would start to flutter down beside the vegetation, too," notes the Evinrude pro. "All in all, the lure presented something totally different and unpredictable, which is sometimes the key that triggers a strike." Cook was especially pleased at the results, as the spinnerbait was one of his own design. He had spent months developing the lure and having it manufactured to his exacting specifications. It features one single willow leaf blade, rather than the more common tandem blade arrangement. "Inactive bass usually pose a major problem to anglers," continues Cook, "and, unfortunately, this is the way we find them most often."

"I learned through my experiences as a biologist, and now as a tournament angler, that to trigger a reflex strike from these fish you have to really excite them."

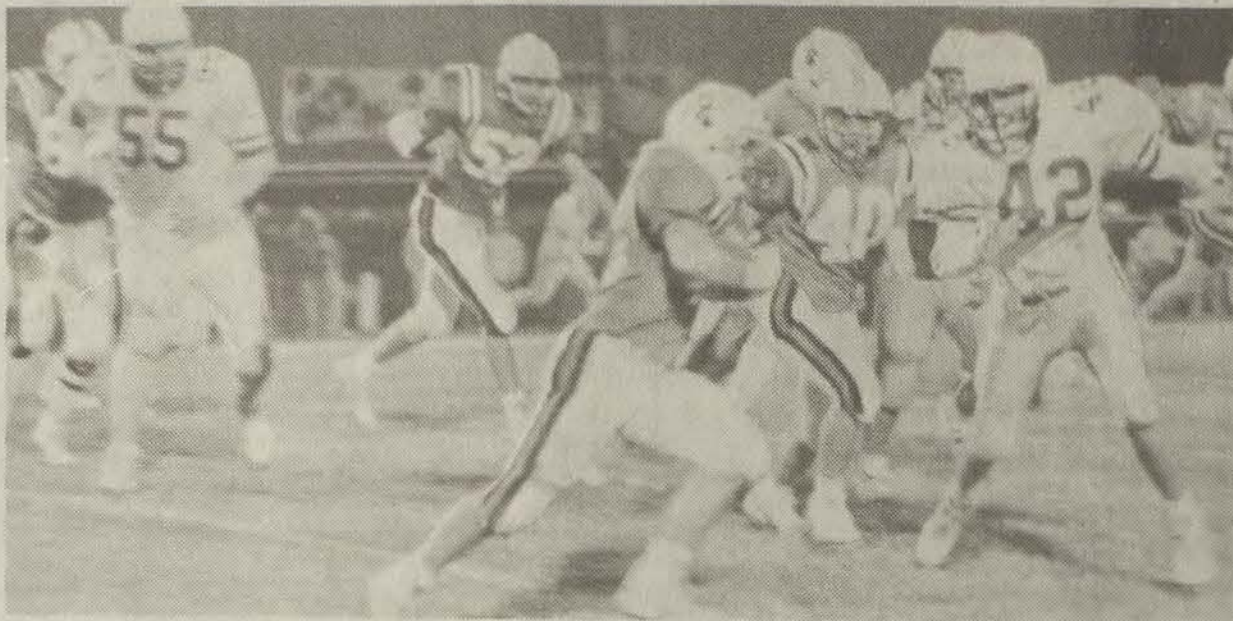
"You can do the same things with other lures. With crankbaits, a stop-and-go retrieve that bounces the lure off logs or rocks is often very productive, and with worms and jigs you can hop and jump them up and down instead of simply crawling them along the bottom."

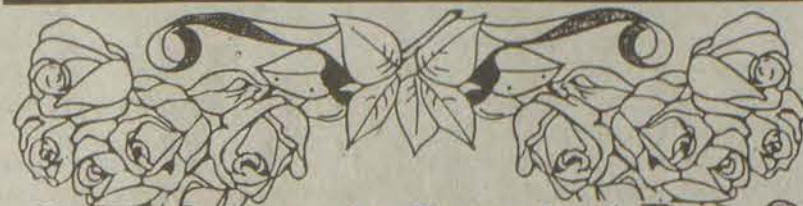

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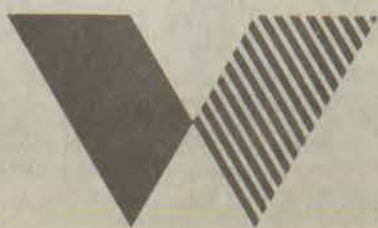

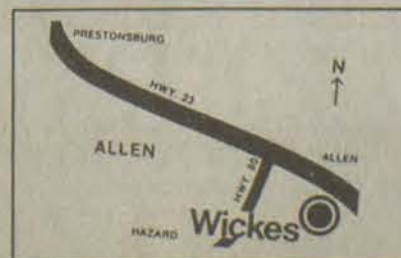
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Maytown Lady Cats Spoil Opener For Auxier In Right Beaver Classic

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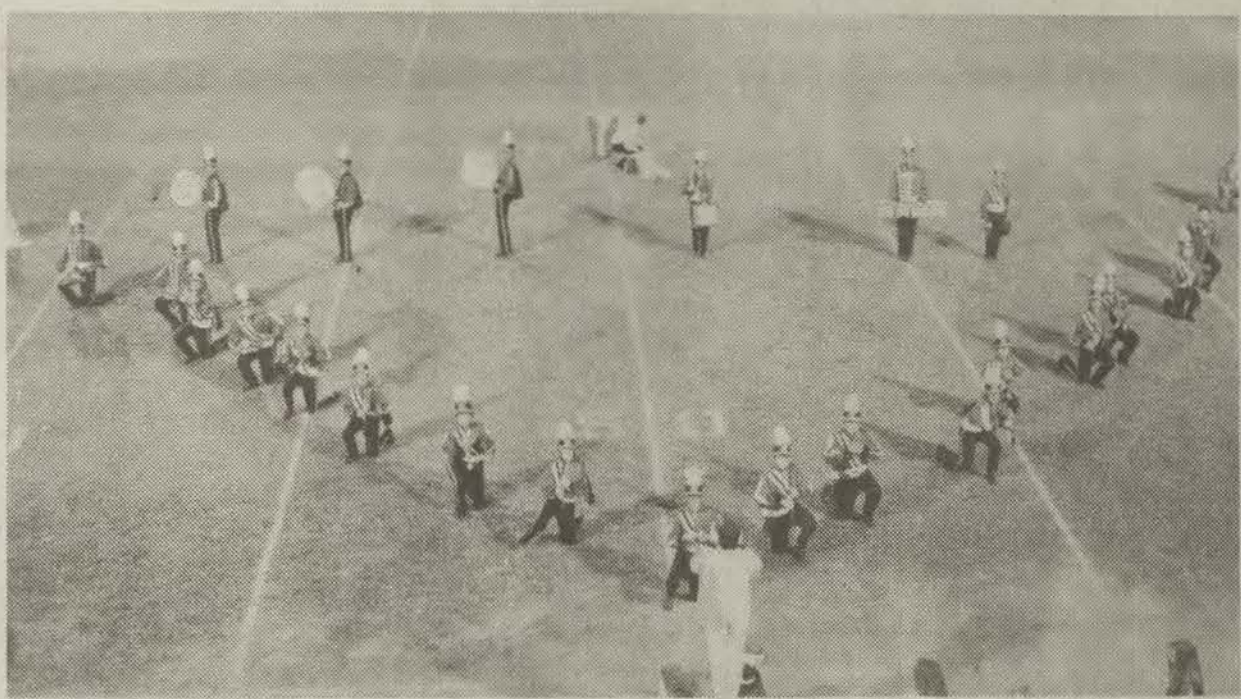

Artful eating:

Holiday Inn chef prepares masterpieces

The Holiday Inn has seen some great improvements in the last year, due largely to their new general manager, Gene Luka, and their new food and beverage director, Don Jahoda. The elaborate display presented to those visiting the Holiday Inn during the recent Floyd County Chamber "Business After Hours," is an example of some of those changes.

Jahoda's and Luka's goal is to create a first class facility in keeping with the quality reputation of the Holiday Inn. Jahoda likes to view his customers as guests and treat them as he would company in his own home.

He strives to create a relaxing, friendly atmosphere for those who visit the Inn. Many of the improvements at the Holiday Inn have come from Jahoda's extensive background in the food service industry.

The 30-year old, former Pennsylvanian, has been in the food service business since he was 18. Although he has a Bachelor's degree in chemistry, he realized shortly after graduation that his real love is food creation and design.

Following his heart, he attended the Culinary School at Westmoreland Community College (ranked 9th in the nation for culinary schools) and graduated with a chef's certificate.

Jahoda then began work under some experienced chefs and spent four and a half years working at the Four Seasons Resort in Somerset, Pennsylvania. There he was also able to gain management experience, being the coordinator for two gourmet restaurants, a deli, three snack bars and various other aspects of the ski resort.

He explained that he came to Floyd County for a chance to relax and work in a slower paced atmosphere. He said the adjustment was difficult at first, from the constant high energy level he had to keep at his last place of employment, but he was getting used to it. He also added that Luka was the primary reason for his decision to work at the Holiday Inn.

"I was looking for someone to learn from and Mr. Luka has a wealth of experience... I wanted to be his protege," Jahoda explained. Jahoda said that most of his knowledge has come from watching other people work. "I'm naturally nosy and I was always in the kitchen looking over the chef's shoulder wanting to know how an item was made and what style he was using," he said. "You can't be afraid to experiment either," he added. "Much of my work has come through imagining how things should look and how they can look. You just let your imagination go and you can come up with some spectacular dishes." Jahoda is happy with the changes that have occurred during his 10-month tenure at the Holiday Inn, noting that the staff has worked hard and are willing to learn.

"They (the staff) were real excited about the 'Business After Hours' reception because they worked hard on making it such a success," he said. "They are very proud of their accomplishment and I think we can look forward to seeing even more changes because of what they learned that night." Jahoda says he always listens to his staff's suggestions because they are the ones on the floor, closest to the guests, and they know what the guests want. He teaches his servers to put themselves in the customer's place and look at things from their viewpoint. Jahoda will incorporate what the servers say with what he knows and then make the appropriate changes.

"We are striving to give a good presentation and make it worth the guests' money," Jahoda said. "You're paying for a little more quality and that's the reputation the Holiday Inn has and it's our job to provide it."

Other changes that Jahoda has been working on, include the menus for the dining room and banquets. What the guests for the Chamber 'After Hours' saw was the Holiday Inn's most lavish display, and would run around \$10,000. However, Jahoda has created an extensive banquet

menu with greatly varying price ranges to chose from, adding, "If it's not on the menu and the customer wants it, we will try to accommodate them." Jahoda also pointed out that the inn is starting an outside catering business and will soon be able to bring your favorite cuisine to a company party or private celebration.

One specialty of Jahoda's, that he does himself for special occasions, is ice sculptures. Beginning with a 30-pound block of ice and an electric chain saw, Jahoda turns his imagination into reality. "You just imagine what shape you want and picture how you would get it out of a block of ice and start cutting," he said. After the basic shape is cut, Jahoda will then use a hammer and a chisel to add detail, and about one and a half hours later the final product is done.

"You can only have them out on display for about two hours before they begin to melt into nothing," he

explained. "So you set it out about 15 minutes before the guests arrive."

Jahoda explains, the difficulty comes when something happens to the sculpture as it's being set out. "Nothing is funny when your talking about ice sculptures, but probably the most frustrating thing is when the head will fall off a carving as they often will," he laughed. "One time we had the head of a swan fall off our Mother's Day display just before the doors opened. Luckily someone caught it before it fell into the salad and we were able to repair it with a saltwater solution."

Because people eat with their eyes first, Jahoda strives tirelessly to create beautiful dishes and to arrange items attractively.

"It's fun to experiment and create. The whole business is something that gets into your blood and you can't get rid of it," Jahoda said.

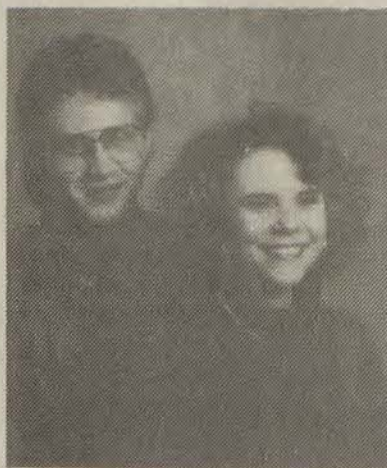

To date I have not received two recipes alike for chicken. To me, I always thought of baked or fried, no way.

I will use the other chicken recipes in later issues, rather than in this one week. Gotta go to the store and stock up on chicken as my supply is running low and we all like it, better now that I am trying new and different recipes. Thanks to all.

TEXAS STRAW HAT

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 c. chopped onions
- 2/3 c. chopped celery
- 2/3 c. chopped green pepper
- 2 (6-oz.) cans tomato paste
- 1 c. water
- 2 tsp. chili powder
- 1 tsp. worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. dried thyme
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- dash of hot sauce
- 1 (6-oz.) pkg. corn chips
- 2 c. shredded cheddar cheese

Combine first 4 ingredients in a large skillet; cook until meat is browned, stirring to crumble. Drain off drippings. Stir in remaining ingredients, except corn chips and cheese; bring to a boil. Cover, reduce heat and simmer 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Serve over corn chips and top with cheese.

LEMON MOUSSE

- 1 1/2 c. undiluted evaporated milk

- 1 c. sugar
- 4 tbsp. lemon juice
- 1 1/2 c. graham cracker crumbs, divided

Place milk in a large mixing bowl; chill in freezer until partially frozen. Whip until stiff. Slowly whip in sugar; add lemon juice and mix until blended. Spread 3/4 cup graham cracker crumbs in bottom of shallow 2-quart casserole; Pour mousse over crumbs. Chill or freeze for several hours.

TOMATO-CRAB ASPIC

- 3 c. tomato juice
- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
- 2 slices onion
- 1/2 c. beef broth
- 2 bay leaves
- 1/4 tsp. celery salt
- 1/2 c. beef broth
- 2 tsp. lemon juice
- 1 c. chopped celery
- 1 (6-1/2 oz.) can crabmeat, drained
- 1/2 c. chopped green peppers
- lettuce leaves (optional)

Combine first 6 ingredients in a heavy saucepan; bring to a boil. Stir in remaining 1/2 cup beef broth and lemon juice. Chill until consistency of unbeaten egg white. Stir in celery, crabmeat, and green pepper. Spoon mixture into 8 lightly oiled 1/2-cup molds; chill until firm. Unmold on lettuce leaves, if desired. Yield 8 servings.

BAKED SCALLOPED CORN

- 1 (17-oz.) can whole kernel corn, drained
- 1 (17-oz.) can cream-style corn
- 1/4 c. milk
- 1/4 c. crushed butery (round) crackers

Combine first 4 ingredients in a heavy saucepan; bring to a boil. Stir in remaining 1/2 cup beef broth and lemon juice. Chill until consistency of unbeaten egg white. Stir in celery, crabmeat, and green pepper. Spoon mixture into 8 lightly oiled 1/2-cup molds; chill until firm. Unmold on lettuce leaves, if desired. Yield 8 servings.

- 1/4 c. chopped onion
- 2 eggs beaten
- 1 (2-oz.) jar chopped pimento, drained
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 2 tbsp. grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 tbsp. butter

Combine first 9 ingredients; mixing well. Pour into a greased 1-1/2 quart casserole. Sprinkle top with cheese, and dot with butter. Bake uncovered, at 350° for 40 to 45 minutes, or until center is set. Let stand 5 minutes before serving.

SESAME CHICKEN

- 1 med. onion, chopped
- 1/4 c. plus 2 tbsp. soy sauce
- 1 tbsp. sugar
- 3 tbsp. chery
- 3 tbsp. oil
- 1/4 tsp. ginger
- dash of pepper
- 6 chicken breast halves, skinned
- 1-1/2 tsp. sesame seed

Combine first 7 ingredients; stir well. Place chicken, meat side down, in a lightly greased 13-x9-x2-inch baking dish; pour sauce mixture over chicken. Cover and bake at 350° for 40 minutes. Turn chicken, and sprinkle with sesame seeds. Bake uncovered an additional 10 minutes, or until chicken is done. Yield 6 servings.

SALMON SALAD SHELLS

- 14 jumbo macaroni shells
- 1 (15-oz.) can salmon, drained and flaked
- 1/2 c. mayonnaise
- 1/2 c. chopped green peppers
- 1/4 c. chopped onion
- 1/4 c. sweet pickle relish
- 2 tsp. lemon juice
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 tsp. hot sauce
- leaf lettuce

Cook pasta according to package directions; drain. Rinse with cold water; cover and chill.

Combine next 9 ingredients, mixing until blended; cover and chill. To serve, tear lettuce into small pieces. Line each shell with lettuce; spoon salmon mixture into shells. Yield 4-6 servings.

KAHLUA VELVET DESSERT

- 1 (6-oz.) pkg. semisweet chocolate morsels
- 2 eggs
- 2 tbsp. kahlua or other coffee flavored liqueur, divided
- 1/2 tsp. instant coffee granules
- 1/2 c. sugar
- 1/2 c. water
- 1 c. whipping cream, whipped

Place chocolate morsels in a 2-cup glass measure; microwave at HIGH for 1-1/2 to 2 minutes, stirring once. Stir morsels until smooth and melted. Let cool several minutes.

Combine chocolate, eggs, 1 table-spoon Kahlua, and coffee granules in a mixing bowl; set aside.

Combine sugar and water in a 2-cup glass measure. Microwave at HIGH for 2-1/2 to 3 minutes, stirring once, until mixture boils and sugar dissolves.

Beat chocolate mixture at medium speed and gradually add hot sugar syrup in a thin stream. Continue beating until well blended. Chill several hours or until mixture is thickened, fold in whipped cream.

Divide ladyfingers evenly among 8 (6-oz.) dessert dishes. Lay halves against sides of dishes, cut side facing center of dish. Spoon chocolate mixture into prepared dishes. Cover and chill at least 1 hour. Garnish with sweetened whipped cream and crushed candy before serving. Yield 8 servings.

LASAGNA PIZZA

- 16 lasagna noodles
- 4 c. (1-lb.) shredded mozzarella cheese
- 1 pkg. (3-1/2-oz.) pkg. sliced pepperoni
- 1 c. sliced, drained mushrooms
- 1 small green pepper, cut into strips
- 1 small onion, sliced and separated into rings
- 1/2 c. Parmesan cheese

Cook noodles according to package directions; drain. Rinse with cold water, and drain again.

Cover a buttered 15-x10-x1-inch jellyroll pan with half of the noodles, arranging the noodles lengthwise in pan, overlapping sides slightly. (Maybe necessary to cut one noodle in smaller pieces to cover pan.) Sprinkle noodles with half of the mozzarella; top with remaining noodles. Spread pizza sauce over noodles. Bake, uncovered at 375° for 12 minutes. Arrange pepperoni, mushroom, green pepper and onion rings over pizza, sprinkle with remaining mozzarella and Parmesan cheese. Bake an additional 15 minutes.

PIZZA SAUCE

- 1 (8-oz.) can tomato sauce
- 1 (10-1/4-oz.) can tomato puree
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 tsp. oregano
- 1 tsp. basil
- 1 tsp. fennel seeds
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/8 tsp. salt

Combine all ingredients, mixing well.

TARRAGON VEGETABLE SALAD

- 1/4 c. red wine vinegar
- 3 tbsp. oil
- 1 tsp. worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 tsp. dried whole tarragon
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 1 c. sliced, fresh mushrooms
- 1 c. thinly sliced carrots
- 1 med. sized green pepper, cut into stripes

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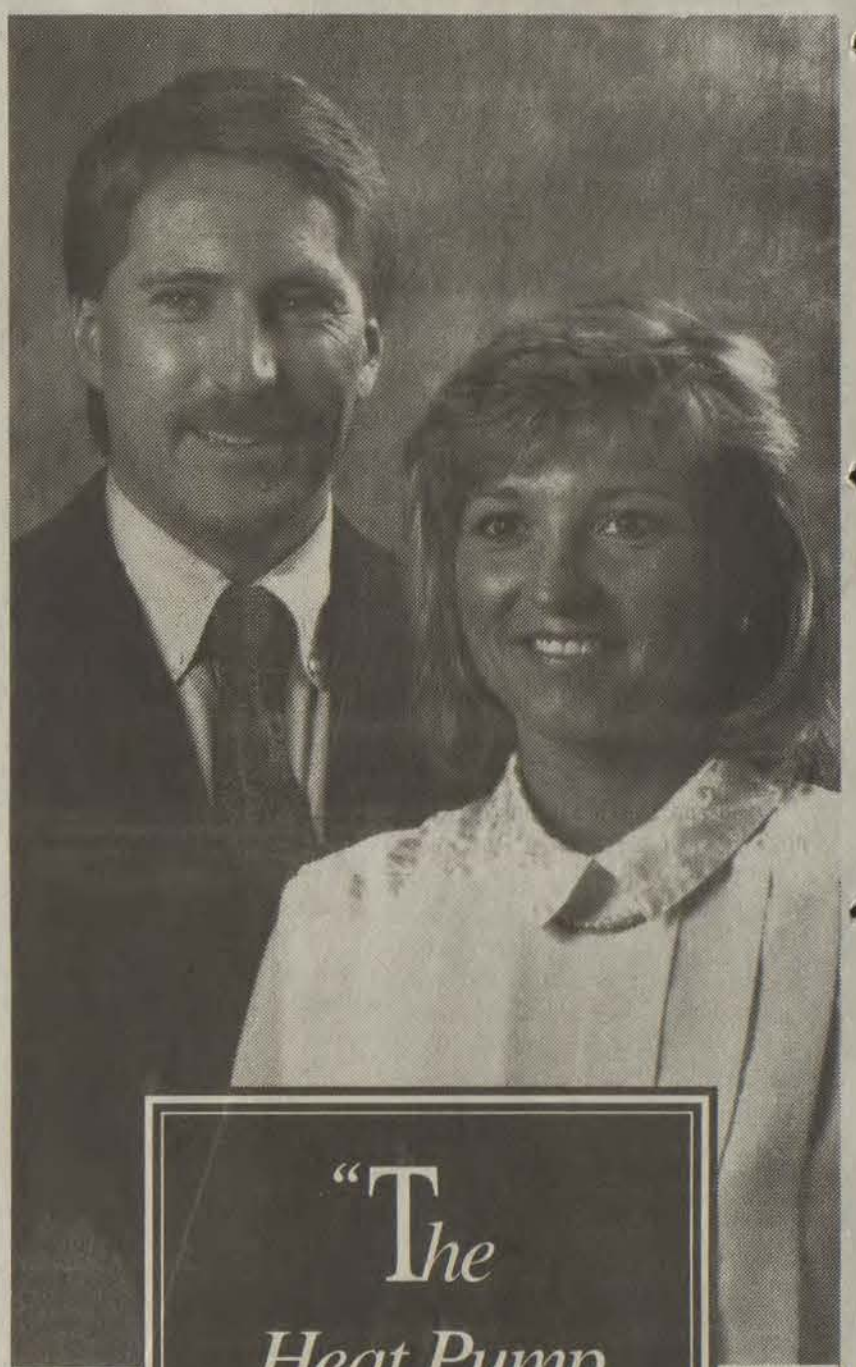
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Cabbage Patch

Making compost is a sure-fire way to transfer life from the plants of this season to those of next year. It is part of nature's never ending cycle. And with fall's arrival, there is a good opportunity to start that one project so important to improving your soil.

Composting and fall go together like Thanksgiving and turkey. Heat and the regular chores of summer are over, harvesting too is ending, and with it comes an abundance of raw materials for a compost heap—corn and weed stalks, roots, canes, hulls and all the other end of the year crop waste. There are also the trimmings

and residues of vegetables and fruits being readied for storage, canning, drying or freezing. Don't forget nature's multi-colored avalanche of leaves.

Some people have told me that to them composting is just like making soup. Essentially the basic recipe calls for piling, or heaping certain natural ingredients in layers or mixed proportions, providing the needed air and moisture, plus turning to assure contact of outer material micro-organisms in the center. I hope I have done justice in comparison.

Beginners or old timers at composting will always be amazed at

how many things can and do go into that "soup"—and how nutritious your soil will find the humus it turns out.

The first step, and the main one, is to pile weeds or small brush on the ground to provide a base. Then build the heap in layers of 6-8 inches deep, starting with green material on the first layer. Next comes a 2-inch layer of barn yard manure, if you have it, if not or you prefer not use barn yard manure, use a high nitrogen material, which is in turn covered with a sprinkling of top soil and limestone. Repeat these layers until the compost heap is 5-feet high, ending with soil and limestone.

The pile must be turned after 2 to 3 weeks and again after 5 weeks to allow the air to penetrate all parts of the heap. After three months, the compost should be ready.

To shorten the time of composting, making better and smoother compost, all materials should be shredded. If you, like me, are not one of the fortunate one who own a shredder, you can use your lawn mower. The compost can be used as early as 14 days if you shred it first. Shredding with a lawn mower is fast and safe, but you will find yourself hunting digging, and even begging your neighbors for their garden waste.

About 1 foot of shredded materials will make a 3-foot high unshredded material compost pile. The turning is easier, for me, with the unshredded materials, and I am in no hurry for the compost as it will not be used before my spring planting.

If you read many articles they will tell you that you will have tons of compost from your back lawn. If you do, you surely must have the largest back lawn in the country. If you get over, or as much as 1-foot of compost from a 5-foot pile to begin with, you are very fortunate. It takes a lot to make a little, but it is pure gold for your soil and vegetables.

Home is the center of living

Economists and census analysts speak in terms of "housing units" and "dwellings," but symbolic values make shelter more than just a roof over our heads. After all, "home" for many people is the most significant—and perhaps the most accurate—mirror of who we are. "Make yourself at home," we say, and, of course, "welcome home." "We don't get country-sick or city-sick, we get homesick," Witold Rybczynski, a McGill University professor of architecture notes, reeling off a list of derivative words that express the fondness for the home: homemade, home-grown, homespun and home-brew—not to mention homecoming, home fire, homestead, hometown and homeland. And "homeless," one might add, expresses a need for more than a house. "Housing was always more than shelter," says Amos Rapoport, professor of architecture at the University of Wisconsin in Milwaukee. Frequently a home's meaning—its place in our lives—is its most important function," he contends. But the role of the home and our relationship to it is rapidly changing, according to these and other contributors to the wide-ranging book, *Housing: Symbol, Structure, Site*, published by the Cooper-Hewitt Museum, the Smithsonian's National Museum of Design. Edited by Director Emeritus Lisa Taylor, the new book covers almost every conceivable aspect of housing, from its history, to mobile homes and underground living, to future colonies in space. Not long ago, home was the center of life, the place where people were born, lived, worked, played and ultimately died. Home provided continuity, stability

and tradition. But "there is no longer the same feeling toward home," Taylor says. "How could there be?" she asks, pointing out that 42 percent of the U.S. population moved between 1980 and 1985, more than half of all women worked, and enormous numbers of young people grew up in broken homes. The U.S. Census Bureau's 1987 American Housing Survey provides the latest revealing look at the changes on the homefront. That year, the nation's 100-millionth housing unit was completed, and the average population per household dropped to 2.67, from 3.67 just 13 years before. That decline reflects not only greater affluence, but also trends like low fertility and high divorce rates. The study also found that more people now live alone—about a quarter of all Americans—and the elderly are more likely to maintain their own homes and less likely to live with their adult children or other relatives. Yet young adults—between the ages of 18 and 24—are more likely to be found in their parents' home—54 percent now compared to 43 percent in 1960. "That's equivalent to the entire population of Chicago packing their bags and going home to mom and dad" if they divorce, lose their jobs or simply can't afford high housing costs, says Larry Long, a Census Bureau demographer. "The large size of the baby-boom generation has worked against its getting on the home-ownership bandwagon as quickly as its parents did." Addressing "Self-Identity and the Home," Clare Cooper Marcus, professor of landscape architecture at the University of California at Berkeley, suggests that some people have a lesser need these days to find their place in the home. For them, the office may be their avenue for self-expression. The identity of the busy executive, targeted by marketing campaigns for fully furnished "instant homes," may be more attentive to the business returns of living in the right place than the role of homelife itself. Other cultures have thought of shelter as something more than roof and hearth. The people of Mali, for instance, associate every room with parts and organs of the human body. To the American Navajo, the dwelling symbolizes the cosmos: the roof associated with the heavens, the floor with the earth and the corner posts dedicated to the deities. For them, the house is a temple.

Even in European societies, from which the American concept of home was transplanted, the house was not always a cozy setting for family life. As Rybczynski points out, before the 1700s, the home lacked almost all the attributes of privacy, warmth and comfort. A late-medieval merchant's house, for example, was large by modern standards, but it also contained many inhabitants. Above all, it was a public place for visitors, customers and clients. And for travelers, it served as hotel and restaurant in an

age without them. "All—low and high—rubbed shoulders with easy familiarity," Rybczynski says. "Apprentices slept in the same bed as the children of the house. Servants, if they did not sleep with their masters, slept beneath them, on truckle beds." But this is relatively recent history. Humans began building remarkably early—in Olduvai Gorge in Africa, some 2 million years ago, following the use of stone tools but preceding the discovery of fire. Rapoport speculates that because of the climate in the African region, shelter was not the

motivation but rather the desire for "special places where food was brought back and shared." In early Middle Eastern settlements, about 1,000 B.C., residential styles developed that are still in use today—unpretentious, inward-looking houses that focused on an interior courtyard rather than on the street. Here, villagers combined both their work and leisure. Later, Greeks and Romans adopted the inward architectural plan, but embellished their structures with decorative details. As the exchange of surplus agricultural goods and raw materials grew a thousand years ago, small fortified cities developed in Europe and the Near East. Houses still combined work and leisure but their focus now turned to the street, in a sense "advertising" the owner's business. Offices and shops occupied the ground floor, family quarters on the second level, sleeping above. But by the late medieval period, "one senses the beginning of a need for privacy," Rybczynski says. "During the Renaissance, aristocratic homeowners began to make the one major functional adjustment that would come to characterize modern housing—the separation of work and home," writes Eugenie Ladner Birch, who teaches demography at Hunter College in New York City. By the 18th century, the home became an idea—something besides a utilitarian setting. "This is a subtle distinction," Rybczynski contends "but an important one. People became attached to their homes, and devoted to home life." "Domesticity" became the ideal for all classes in the 19th century. Houses were divided into various rooms, some for private use by the family, others for social functions. Corridors developed so that no one passed through rooms, but beside them. Even furniture now took permanent positions in rooms, no longer taking on temporary duty depending on the activity. Within the Victorian house layout, distinctions arose—libraries for gentlemen, nurseries for children, "withdrawing" rooms for ladies. "The 20th century was a watershed in the evolution of

domestic comfort—but paradoxically, it left domesticity diminished," Rybczynski says. Americans began to look outside their comfortable homes for amusements—to shopping malls, restaurants, beaches, all accessible by car, for parents and youth alike. And yet, there is renewed fascination with the Victorian ideal, from its interior decoration to the home as entertainment center, now equipped with VCRs and CD players. "For most of us," Clare Cooper Marcus believes, "a permanent dwelling where we can put down roots is both a necessary component of physical security and a significant psychological expression of who we are." However, growing numbers of people today—as many as 600,000 according to some groups—are homeless,

without basic physical shelter. In the Cooper-Hewitt publication, as elsewhere, government officials and citizens call for long-term, private and public efforts to help the homeless gain control over their lives, to hold jobs and leave life on the streets behind. Additionally, there are countless other individuals who are "homeless" in the sense that they have been uprooted by world events or, as Lisa Taylor notes, "have never found what in one's heart is home." "The promise of America represented a decent place to live for the millions and millions of 'tired, poor and homeless' who emigrated here from all over the world," she says. "We should make it a shared national goal to fulfill that promise for all Americans by the end of this millennium."

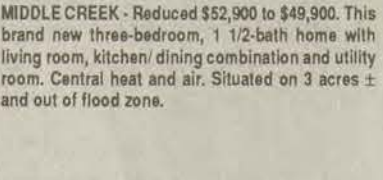

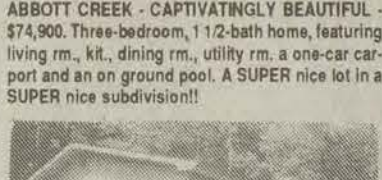
