Office of Education Accountability :

We growl and sometimes we bite. . .

Readin', 'ritin and 'rithmetic, education's legendary "three Rs," have a new sibling thanks to Kentucky's General Assembly. Dr. Penney Sanders announced Monday at Prestonsburg Community College.

What's it called? "Revolution," Sanders said. Speaking to a crowd of future teachers at PCC Monday, Sanders, head of the state's Office of Education Accountability, said 1990 legislation establishing the Kentucky Education Reform Act (KERA) would be appropriately titled the "Kentucky

Education Revolution."

"This is a massive overhaul of a system which has not served the children of Kentucky," Sanders told professor Leo Weddle's Modern Social Problems class. "During the next three years we won't just focus on changing our schools, we'll focus on changing our way of thinking."

The need for an education revolution, Sanders added, was prompted by a variety of issues including "disgusting" high school graduation rates and equally disturbing dropout rates. "Our graduation rate in Kentucky is between 60 and 65 percent," Sanders said. "That means we have a failure rate of 40 percent."

"One out of four ninth graders won't finish high school," she added in reference to the state's 25 percent dropout rate. "I for one am not ready to write off 25 percent of the ninth grade."

Addressing those in the class who indicated they were studying to become teachers, Sanders offered some pointed advice.

"If you can't treat every child as a cherished item," she said, "do us all a

favor...don't teach."

Sanders said the "true heart" of the education revolution was in "systemic change," which she explained was a shift in the way Kentucky schools are operated.

The "true promise" of that type of change begins with school based decision making, she said.

"Imagine what we're doing," she stressed. "With school based decision making, we're turning control of the school over to school councils made up of two teachers, the principal and, God forbid, two parents."

"Parents become partners in the process," Sanders continued. "They have to be involved. After all, the

parent is the first teacher. Some are good, some aren't."

Sanders said the shift in the educational power structure would be "painful," particularly in areas like Eastern Kentucky where schools are often a county's biggest employer and often the centers for political patronage.

Sanders said some long-time educators, school administrators and board members would not be able to adapt to the changing power structure and they would become the casualties of change.

"In any revolution," she noted,

Defense is next :

Round one is over in teacher-abuse case

Testimony will continue Wednesday (today) in the trial of Adams Middle School principal Thomas Tackett who is charged with abusing and harassing a teacher at the school in May.

A charge of terroristic threatening was dismissed Tuesday afternoon by special Judge Miller Kent Carter of Pike County, who sustained a motion by the defense for a directed verdict on that charge.

Gwendolyn Hammonds, who brought the charges against Tackett, spent approximately an hour and a half on the witness stand Tuesday, describing the incident which allegedly occurred May 14.

Hammonds testified that she was taking a student who had cut her wrists in a suicide attempt to the guidance counselor's office when Tackett verbally harassed her over a cartoon that had been placed on Tackett's desk early that morning.

Hammonds said that she had to go through the school's office complex, where Tackett's office is located, because there was no answer to her knock on the outside door of the counselor's office. She explained that there are two access doors to the office; one in the outside hallway and one through the vice principal's office.

"I saw the counselor, Miss Meek, in the hallway and told her I had a student who needed to see her when Mr. Tackett recognized my voice and began screaming at me, 'You put that FCEA trash on my desk,'" Hammonds said. "He kept screaming that at me and said he hated me and all FCEA teachers. He screamed that all administrators hated all the teachers."

Assistant County Attorney Dan Rowland asked Hammonds how close Tackett was to her when he was screaming at her.

"He was so close I could feel his spit on my face," Hammonds testified. "He kept pointing his finger in my face and touched me on the chest

with his finger."

Hammonds testified that the student being taken to the counselor's office was present during the episode and Tackett "jerked" their hands apart and told the student "if she was injured, to call her parents."

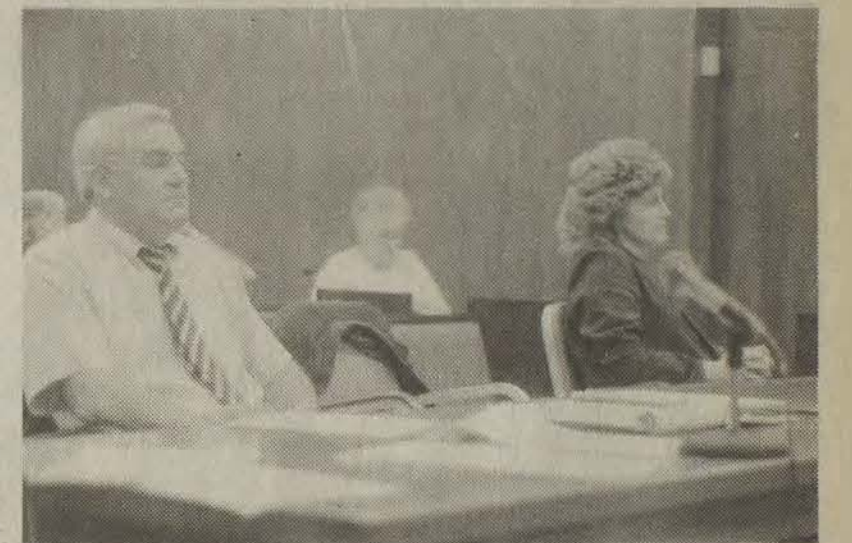
"I screamed to Miss Meek to take the child to her office immediately," Hammonds said. "I was afraid for that child to call her parents until the

counselor had talked to her."

Under cross-examination by defense attorney Bill McCann, Hammonds was asked why she waited six days after the incident to file the abuse of a teacher charge and why additional charges were filed and/or amended.

Hammonds explained that she

Protesters stage event for national reporters

A long-standing struggle between a local citizens' group and a medical waste incinerator received national attention Monday when an environmental magazine came to Eastern Kentucky.

Free-lance reporters for Audubon magazine, the national magazine for the National Audubon Society, came to Floyd County Monday in conjunction with a feature story on Ken-

tuckians For The Commonwealth (KFTC), a citizens' action group based in Prestonsburg. The Audubon reporters attended a protest rally at Medisin Inc.'s Highlands Regional Medical Center incinerator staged by Floyd Countians In Action (FCIA), a group which KFTC helped to organize.

"We're interested in democratic political action groups," said Cate Wild, one of the reporters for

Accusations, arguments heat up court meeting

Relocation of a county road and a continuing feud between a magistrate and a David Fire Department volunteer were the top issues discussed at Friday's Floyd County Fiscal Court meeting.

Fiscal court members heard from Sammy Hall and Freddy Osborne of Osborne Branch at Hunter about road conditions and allegations of public

officials doing work on private property.

Hall presented a petition to the court of behalf of Osborne Branch residents requesting that their road be re-routed because a creek runs through the road when it rains.

Hall also claimed he had proof of public officials doing work on private property, but did not offer it to the court.

Osborne accused magistrate Betty Caudill of letting her husband, ex-

magistrate Eddie Caudill run her district.

The two exchanged some heated words and Caudill said her husband worked for her.

Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo interrupted the exchange by saying residents at Osborne Branch would not donate the necessary land to re-route the road. Stumbo said he had been talking with C & O Railroad

Fasten your seatbelts, bumpy flight assured

Airport or industrial park? Those are the questions circling the future of Combs Field, but whether the answers will be buzzards or bluebirds is yet to be determined.

The debate over the fate of Combs Field, an airport jointly operated by the cities of Prestonsburg and Paintsville, was rekindled last week during a meeting of the Prestonsburg City Council and the flames of controversy continued to be fanned this week.

The issue is fairly simple: should the airport continue to operate as an airport or should it be closed to make way for the development of an industrial site?

The solution appears to be considerably more complex, with a cast of dozens forming battle lines on either side of the issue.

Proponents for closing the airport include Mayor Ann Latta of Prestonsburg and Mayor John David Preston of Paintsville, the state's Office of Aeronautics and the board of directors for the Big Sandy Area Development District, which last

week adopted a resolution endorsing an effort to designate the airport as an industrial site.

Opponents include officials of

dentproponents of converting Combs Field into an industrial site, indicating the prospect of new jobs is their top concern.

Paintsville Mayor John David Preston has taken the lead on the effort to close the airstrip, often running afoul of his own council along the way. Preston's efforts earlier this year to stack the Combs airport board with appointees who favored converting the airport to an industrial site drew immediate rejection from the Paintsville City Council, who didn't object as much to the idea as they did to Preston's methods.

"We didn't necessarily take a stand one way or the other on the proposal to close the airport," Paintsville City Councilman Robin Cooper said of the panel's rejection of Preston's airport board appointees. "We just didn't like the way he tried to do it."

Cooper said Paintsville members of the airport board had been replaced by Preston without notice and it seemed "unfair to treat them that way after they had spent so much time and effort" maintaining the airport.

officials about acquiring several hundred feet of the company's right of way for the road.

Hall maintained he owned land located about 100-feet from where the road needs to be moved and he was willing to give it to the county in order to correct the problem.

"Kids who ride the school bus in that area have to wade the water in order to get to school," Hall said. "It's about the worst road conditions I've ever seen in Floyd County."

The court took no action of the issue, but promised to work toward resolving the problem.

In other action, a feud between David Volunteer firefighter Larry Adams and magistrate Jackie Owens continued over the actions of volunteer fireman using their personal radio transmitters to report suspected criminal violations.

Adams asked Owens for an apology for remarks Owens made at the September meeting that David firemen misused fire department funds and "played policemen."

"I think we both said some things at that meeting that we shouldn't have," Adams told Owens. "If a David fireman sees a drunk on the highway or someone peddling dope and gets on the radio to notify authorities, I support that. But, I think you owe us an apology."

Owens said he didn't feel he owed Adams an apology, but agreed that he had made some remarks that he probably shouldn't have.

"I don't feel I owe you an apology and I didn't call anybody a crook," Owens said. "And I think that the person that was misusing the radio got suspended from the department

for a DUI charge. He might have called it in on himself. But, I do agree that you all do a good job."

- In other actions the court:

- agreed to see if funds were available to give to the Floyd County Ministerial Association in order to purchase food for needy families; and
 - approved all bills and claims.
- All court members attended Friday's meeting. The next scheduled meeting of the fiscal court is Friday, November 16 at 10 a.m. at the courthouse annex. The meetings are open to the public.

Vietnam bonus deadline to apply is October 31

"The deadline to apply for the Amended Vietnam Veterans Bonus Program is almost here," warned Adjutant General Tebbs S. Moore.

"We have received about 71 percent of the application that our initial estimates called for based on the veterans population in the state," said Adjutant General Moore. "We hope to receive an application from every eligible veteran in the state before the October 31 deadline," continued Moore.

The Vietnam Veterans Bonus Branch has received over 5,000 application. The average bonus payment is \$173.

The amended bonus applies only to Vietnam era veterans who also had served in Korea or World War II and who did not previously receive the maximum bonus of \$500.

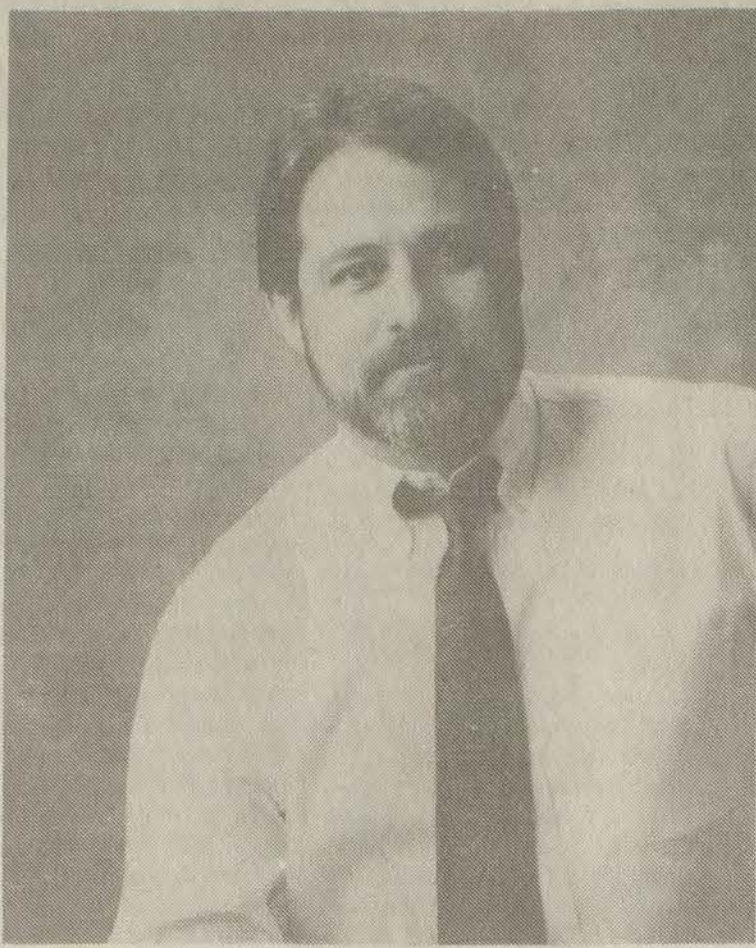

TAG field trip okayed by board

Forty-nine talented and gifted (TAG) students won approval to attend a field trip to Florida from the Floyd County Board of Education at a special meeting Monday.

Concerns that only 49 of the county's 200 TAG students could make the field trip to Earth Shuttle at Florida's Epcot Center were raised at the board's October meeting.

At that meeting, board member Dr. Mary Hall said she felt that if all the students couldn't go on the field trip, no students should attend.

Mary Lee Frazier, spokesperson for the county's three TAG teachers, convinced the board that all the TAG students had had the opportunity to raise the funds needed for the trip and that some parents of the students did not want their children to go.

The trip, which costs \$579 per student, includes a day long visit to Earth Shuttle at the Kennedy Space Center and a cultural day at the Epcot Center.

Frazier told the board the trip was planned last school year and several fund raisers held raised over \$8,000 toward the \$25,000 it will cost to take the trip.

The voted 4-0 to approve the trip. Board member Eddie Billips was absent at Monday's meeting.

We Must Build On Good News From TVA In Averting Coal-Market Disaster

Recent staff recommendations from the Tennessee Valley Authority come as nothing but good news for Western Kentucky coal miners, their families, our coal industry and the entire economy of this state.

These very gratifying recommendations call for the continued use of Western Kentucky coal at the TVA's Paradise power plant in Kentucky and its Cumberland plant in Tennessee.

Under this very promising plan, we can look forward to maintaining crucial TVA markets now absorbing about 18 million tons of Western Kentucky coal each year.

As many Kentuckians know, we have been fighting for months to head off the potential loss of these markets to low-sulfur coal producers from Western states in connection with the implementation of the Clean Air Act of 1990.

I believe that this new plan reflects great credit on the TVA and on the many Kentucky leaders who have been doing everything in their power to find a solution to this potential economic disaster for our state.

I hope and believe that this bill — extending the jurisdiction of state public utilities commissions to TVA implementation of acid-rain provisions of the Clean Air Act — will no longer be necessary.

The TVA has made a good start toward solving a great problem. But we must build upon this foundation by doing all we can to see that this new plan is finalized and carried out successfully by the TVA.

It is gratifying to me that this plan is based on provisions we were able to include in the Clean Air Act with the goal of improving our environment without wreaking havoc on our economy.

The plan takes advantage of the act's incentives for installing scrubbers to reduce emissions from high-sulfur coal. By virtue of these incentives, the TVA can become eligible for so-called bonus allowances leading to adjusted emissions standards in a later stage of implementing the act.

The TVA now sees an opportunity to gain the allowances needed to develop a cost-effective plan by adding scrubbers at Cumberland. With this plan, the TVA can keep burning Western Kentucky coal at Cumberland and Paradise, preventing a significant loss of TVA markets for Western Kentucky coal.

I plan to cooperate fully with the TVA in this effort to save more than 5,000 Western Kentucky coal-mining jobs. I also plan to continue the fight for clean-coal technologies and other energy-efficiency and conservation programs under the National Energy Security Act of 1991 now pending before the Senate.

The approach to alcohol: Positive education—not negative controls

Getting tough on suppliers, dealers and users of illegal drugs may well be the best policy for a nation committed to the goal of a "drug-free America."

But for a different set of social problems, those relating to misuse of alcohol—which is a legal product and socially accepted—getting tough on the product and its consumers is precisely the wrong posture to assume.

Very few people today would consider an "alcohol-free America" a realistic goal. We went down that road earlier in this century, through 14 years of disastrous Prohibition.

A positive, broad-based educational approach to alcohol-related problems; sound, peer-reviewed research; and improved treatment capabilities have proven effective—not stricter controls. The alcohol-beverage industries have long been concerned and have made significant contributions in helping to reduce these problems.

In recent years, the beer, wine and distilled spirits trade associations and their member firms—often in partnership with health and public-interest groups and universities—have dramatically increased their support for education, consumer information programs and independent research.

Training for Intervention Procedures by Servers of Alcohol (TIPS), for example, has been growing steadily throughout the 1980s. More than 200,000 individuals have been trained in preventing alcohol misuse or in dealing with the situation after it has occurred in settings ranging from bars to private parties.

Numerous national and local public service campaigns also have been initiated. "Think When You Drink," "Healthy Mothers-Healthy Babies" and "Friends Don't Let Friends Drive Drunk" are three with widespread distribution. Brewers also produce responsible drinking commercials.

The Alcohol Beverage Medical Research Foundation supports research on alcohol issues at schools across the country.

These efforts, along with campaigns carried out by other organizations, such as Mothers Against Drunk

Driving and the National Commission on Drunk Driving, have created a much needed increase in public awareness and public support to deal effectively with these problems.

Other vital improvements have taken place only after decades of hard work. One is the greatly reduced stigma on alcoholism and alcoholic

people. The other is the reduction in the power of the forbidden fruit and macho mystiques associated with alcohol among youths.

If we listen to the control advocates regarding how best to reduce problems associated with the misuse of alcohol, we will do a great social disservice. We will be writing a less-than-happy ending to what otherwise could be one of the more dramatic success stories in the area of health and social problems.

filed the initial charge against Tackett six days after the incident because she had filed a grievance with Floyd superintendent Ron Hager. "I was waiting to see what Mr. Hager would do," Hammonds said. "He came to the school and was supposed to return two days later for a full investigation, but he never came back. Hager didn't take care of it."

The charges were amended, Hammonds said, on the advice of the county attorney's office.

McCann asked why the initial charge did not include allegations that Tackett had threatened to kill her or harassed her.

"When I came to the county attorney's office, I told them everything," Hammonds said. "That (the complaint) was typed incorrectly and that's why it was amended. There's not room on that page to put down what he did to me that day."

McCann made an issue of the location in the office complex where Hammonds encountered Tackett. He walked Hammonds through a diagram of the complex and asked specific questions as to how she entered the complex and what rooms were located in the area.

Hammonds explained she did not enter Tackett's office and met him in the hallway leading to the counselor's office. Hammonds also said Tackett

had a second private office in the complex that was originally designated for a first aid room.

McCann tried to tie the August 1990 teacher's strike issue into the case, but Judge Carter would not allow that line of questioning.

Middle school teacher Tom Pack testified to a conversation with Tackett in the school's lunchroom on that same day where Tackett allegedly said he would kill FCEA members at the May 14 school board meeting.

"Mr. Tackett said Jodi Sword (principal at Allen Central High School, the site of the May board meeting) said that they (administrators) could use the outer office at the high school to store their guns and shoot them some teachers."

Pack said Tackett told him that "battle lines had been drawn" and that "there would be a lot of trouble."

McCann asked Pack if he took Tackett's statements seriously.

"I think it was an irrational statement that he made," Pack said. "I didn't feel personally threatened. If it was a joke, it was in bad taste. I didn't think it was funny then and I still don't think it was funny."

Pack said he told Tackett that guns didn't bother him because his house looked like an arsenal.

Also testifying was middle school teacher Jane Spurlock who was a witness to the exchange between Hammonds and Tackett. Spurlock said Tackett first accused her of placing the cartoon on his desk.

"I put my hand on his arm and said 'Mr. Tackett calm down. I don't think you want to do this,' Spurlock said. "But, he didn't calm down."

Spurlock said she also filed a grievance with superintendent Hager concerning the situation, but she did not file any criminal charges. She said she felt uncomfortable around Tackett.

Pat Dye, also a teacher at the school, said she was the one who placed the cartoon on Tackett's desk and apologized to him the next day because she did not think it would create "so much trouble." She said she left the cartoon on Tackett's desk because he was not in his office.

"Mr. Tackett keeps a list of articles and things taped on his wall," Dye said. "I thought he would laugh it off. I didn't think it would make him so angry."

School secretaries Gaye Hatfield and Brenda Vanderpool nervously testified they witnessed part of the incident and said Tackett was loud and yelling at Hammonds "nose to nose."

Both secretaries testified they did not see Tackett push his finger into Hammonds' chest.

Also testifying Tuesday was Floyd County chief deputy sheriff Linzie Hunt who was directed by Sheriff Paul Hunt Thompson to attend the May school board meeting because a complaint had been received concerning Tackett.

"We had a call that they needed an officer at the meeting because there might be trouble," Hunt said. "I spoke to Mr. Tackett and told him I'd been called there because there could be trouble and he had a gun."

Hunt said Tackett raised his arms and turn around to show him he had no weapon. Hunt said he was assured

Tackett would not cause a disturbance and the board meeting was held without an incident.

Also testifying were teachers Janie Lyons and Ann Welch.

Expected to testify for the defense Wednesday is superintendent Hager, counselor Meek and Tackett. The trial is scheduled to resume at 9:30 a.m. in Floyd County District Court.

"we're going to lose some brothers and sisters."

Sanders also issued a warning to those who might interfere with the reform movement, noting her office was established as a "watchdog" against such activities.

"We watch, we growl and sometimes we bite," she said.

The most recent examples of the Office of Education Accountability's bite have come in Boyd County, where superintendent Delmis Donta has been suspended, and in Harlan County, where a full-scale OEA investigation is currently underway.

Sanders hinted Monday that Floyd County schools were also under scrutiny, but she offered no specific information on the situation here.

She did say, however, that the answers to all school problems were not as easy as the removal of school administrators, noting that in some areas such removals would be similar to "rearranging the deck chairs on the Titanic."

"We won't make real changes," she explained, "by removing one person and replacing that person with someone similar."

Sanders summed up her talk Monday suggesting that the remedies for Kentucky's school problems "won't occur overnight, but they will come." The timing for change, she added, will depend on how quickly and how deeply parents and other concerned people become involved.

"Evil persists," Sanders said, "when good people fail to speak out."

Airport

Preston, however, denied that claim, indicating that the board members' terms had expired and he had notified them of that before appointing new members.

Prestonsburg Mayor Ann Latta has been less vocal in the bid to have Combs converted to an industrial site, but she called the switch "inevitable."

Latta said last week that state Transportation Cabinet Secretary Milo Bryant had recommended closure of the airport and she pointed to various shortcomings at Combs which supported that proposal. Latta said Combs presented a potential safety liability for both cities if it remained opened but, if closed, it could become a job-producing asset.

Bob Bodner, director of the state's Office of Aeronautics, confirmed Monday that he had "recommended closing" the airport, stressing though that the final decision would be a local matter. Bodner said the state no longer contributed funds toward the operation or maintenance of the airport.

Ron Bland, administrator of the Office of Aeronautics Zoning Commission, said Tuesday his office had serious concerns about the recent construction of two homes near the north end of the Combs runway, but added that no action would be taken until the matter of proposed closure of the airport was resolved "one way or the other" locally.

Bland said the homes were constructed without required approval from his office and one of the homes "presents an obstacle" to the airport's approach. He added, however, that while it was within his office's authority to require those two homes to be removed, he could recall no instances when the removal of a structure was ordered by his department.

Last week, the board of directors for the Big Sandy Area Development District, including representatives from Johnson, Floyd, Pike, Magoffin and Martin counties, endorsed the effort to convert Combs to an industrial site, adopting a resolution in support of that plan.

STILL AN ASSET

Since it was jointly developed in 1959 by the cities of Paintsville and Prestonsburg, Combs Field has been regarded as one of the safest landing strips in the Eastern part of the state. No fatalities have been recorded in its three decades, though a number of mishaps have been noted.

The airport, located just north of the Floyd County line in Johnson County, is situated near the spot where Jenny Wiley was rescued after escaping from the Shawnees who had taken her captive in 1789.

Those who oppose the airport's closure argue that the strip is still a viable asset in the area's economic development and one has even hinted that closure could adversely affect the future of an existing plant.

Ronald Belhasen, plant manager for American Standard's Paintsville

operation, warned Prestonsburg's City Council last week that "it would be very foolish to say one ill word" about the airstrip. Wilfried Delker, a corporate vice-president for the New Jersey-based company has also offered written objections to the proposed closure, indicating in a January 16, 1991 letter that "American Standard strongly opposes closing the airport and such closure would have to be considered in any future evaluation of the Paintsville plant."

Paintsville attorney C.K. Belhasen, who leads the opponents of closure, vowed last week to initiate "a public relations campaign" against that closure if it appeared that action was inevitable.

Belhasen, a pilot, called the airport a haven for pilots of small planes and he contended that its alternative—the Big Sandy Regional Airport—presented a flying hazard because pilots often faced crosswinds when attempting to land.

Belhasen said Combs was "the busiest airport" in Eastern Kentucky and it remained a valuable tool in the area's economic development. He said the airport could co-exist with the regional airport, but suggested he would be the first to "dismantle my hangar" if an industrial prospect expressed interest in location on the airport site.

Belhasen also contended that use of the site for industrial development could be limited because it is situated in the flood plain of the Big Sandy River.

Belhasen's stance has been endorsed by Senator David LeMaster, D-Paintsville, and a variety of other business and civic leaders from Johnson County.

Rumors were also circulating this week, suggesting that Democratic gubernatorial candidate Brereton Jones had joined the opposition to Combs' closure and that Jones, if elected, was committed to keeping the airstrip open.

A Jones aide responded Tuesday, however, that Jones had taken no side in the issue and he had made no promises.

Jones has agreed, however, to review the situation if and when he takes office.

CAUGHT IN THE MIDDLE

Caught squarely in the middle of the airport fray are Johnson County residents Walt Lauffer and Martin Crider, who have already been the victims of development and who now hope to be the beneficiaries.

Both Lauffer and Crider families lost their homes to the reconstruction of new Route 23 between Prestonsburg and Paintsville, and both have built new homes near the north end of the Combs runway. Both were built as state-approved relocation projects connected with the Route 23 project, but both appear to have been built without required approval from the state's Office of Aeronautics.

Without approval from the state,

both homes could conceivably be ordered razed and that possibility has quite naturally swayed Lauffer and Crider to the side of those proposing that the airport be closed.

In a letter dated October 17 to Prestonsburg Mayor Ann Latta, both homeowners endorsed that closure effort.

"It is very important to us to be able to keep our homes," Lauffer and Crider wrote, "but we also need to look at the closing of the Combs airport as an opportunity for all our people... (in) Johnson, Floyd and Martin counties to be able to utilize this site as an industrial park. Not just a few would enjoy the good life, but thousands in all three counties could enjoy a piece of the pie as far as jobs coming to this area are concerned."

"As far as American Standard is concerned," the writers added, "I am sure they want the best for this area. If jobs could come to this area by having an industrial park, American Standard, I am sure, would be the first to express their approval, being the fine company they are."

State officials said this week that they would take no action on the airport obstructions created by the new homes until a decision was reached locally on the future of Combs Field.

THE REST OF THE STORY

Dozens of other concerns have been raised in association with the Combs Field debate.

Atop the list are questions over ownership of the airport property should it no longer be used as an airport. Rumors that the property would revert to original landowners under that circumstance are unfounded, Paintsville Mayor John David Preston said Tuesday. Preston, an attorney, said he had reviewed individual deeds for the property and he had found no clauses permitting the land to revert to original owners.

Other questions concerning title to the airport property were addressed in a December, 1980 letter from Edward LaFontaine, director at that time for the state's Division of Aeronautics, to Transportation Secretary Frank Metts.

"The matter dates back to March 1959 when the Paintsville-Prestonsburg Airport Board was created and efforts were initiated to acquire nine tracts of land," LaFontaine wrote. "Condemnation was required for all tracts. Four of the nine tracts subsequently were tried in Pikeville federal district court; three of which were finally settled in April of 1972; the fourth had been settled out of court prior to that time. The five remaining tracts were assigned to Johnson Circuit Court. A third trial," LaFontaine continued, "resulted in an order and judgment in favor of the airport board March 31, 1975."

The decision was upheld on appeal.

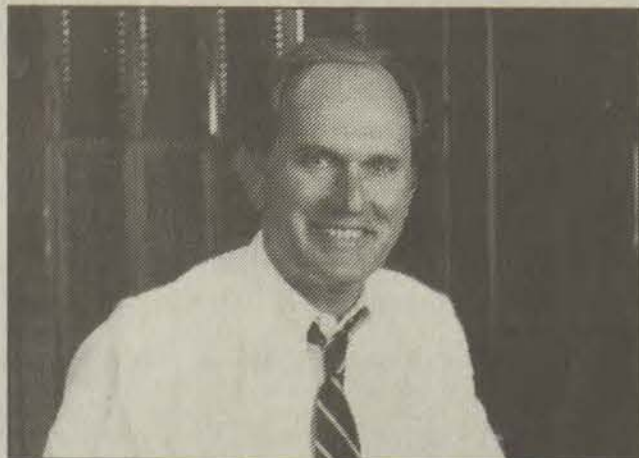

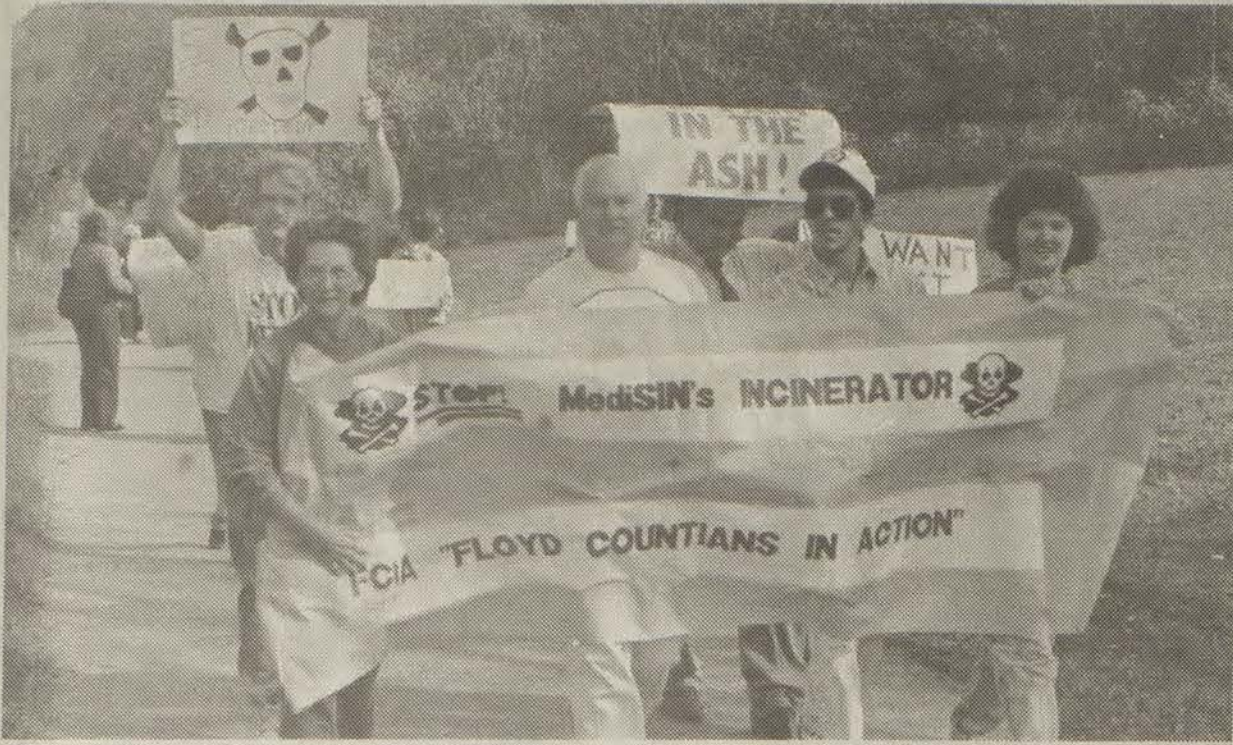

Audubon. "We're concerned with environmental issues, and KFTC has done significant work in the past, especially with respect to the broadform deeds and water rights cases. We recently attended KFTC's 10th anniversary meeting, but we wanted to document them in action. The FCIA rally was a good opportunity to show their concerns."

Approximately 20 people attended the Monday rally, at which time FCIA member Phyllis Walker said they were staging the protest to "demand the closure of Medisin's incinerator." Walker, wearing a bloodstained white lab coat and a "Medisin Inc." button, produced a thick binder with "documentation of 100 people affected by the incinerator." She made a claim that "people have died from this" and that "all but one of the board of directors have not returned our calls."

Following Walker's introduction, Elizabeth Honeycutt, another FCIA

member, produced a plastic bag containing two dead birds from her purse. She said that the birds will be sent "immediately" to state toxicologists for analysis. She added that "dozens of birds like this have been found, but most have been rotted." She claimed to have seen birds eat at a feeder and then "fall over, unable to fly" on mornings after the incinerator had been burning all night.

FCIA member John Spurlock felt that "Highlands Regional is not viewing all the alternatives." Spurlock spoke about a hospital in Winston-Salem, North Carolina that is now shredding and microwaving their medical waste. The hospital said that the process was "more economical," said Spurlock.

Robert Ford, vice president of Medisin Inc, said that he believes "it is very time-consuming to continue to address unfounded claims from a couple of people. Extensive tests by private and state organizations con-

clusively show that there is no contamination."

Ford said that he believes that the FCIA is not correct in their accusations. "Our tests and their tests deny their claims. [FCIA] is giving people false impressions. They have nothing to substantiate their claims. They have yet to provide physical evidence. They also hide data that denies what they claim."

A risk assessment was performed by the state Department of Natural Resources that stated that concentrations of contaminants are "below a toxic level." However, levels of barium and cadmium, both contaminants, were slightly elevated. Barney Walker of FCIA said "the risk assessment said that the soil is not toxic enough to hurt us. However, why would the state do a risk assessment if there weren't contamination. [FCIA] only asked for an analysis of the soil sample. The state did the risk assessment on its own."

Solid waste permit renewal review to involve comparison with local plan

Kentucky Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet Secretary John Nichols said Tuesday that "the spirit of local determination is alive and well at the Cabinet." The comment came as Nichols clarified his agency's position about the point at which local solid waste planning should take effect in the circumstances of a disposal permit with sizable, already-approved acreage.

The issue arose in connection with the BFI landfill in Franklin County, which has an estimated permitted lifespan of about 19 years. An earlier Cabinet interpretation of Kentucky's solid waste legislation—known as Senate Bill Two—pegged the time for local determination in the BFI case at the point when the facility runs out of space.

Nichols said that as of now, the Cabinet will review permit renewal applications for their consistency with the local plan, approved by the local waste management authority. In addition, Kentucky Waste Management Division reviewers will also examine the permittee's compliance history, updated facility information, key employees' disclosure statements and other data critical to the renewal process.

Secretary Nichols also pointed out that the Cabinet has an obligation under the law to assure disposal ca-

capacity for all wastes generated in Kentucky, "and with half our facilities closing in 1992, it may be necessary to divert waste to other counties."

Statewide poll reflects state employees desire for political freedom and collective bargaining

The Kentucky Association of State Employees released the results of a statewide salary, benefits and working conditions survey today. The survey, which was mailed to all 34,000 state merit employees in the spring of 1991, measured their responses on important issues as their salary benefits and working conditions.

Over 4,800 state employees responded to the survey conducted by KASE of those who responded 29% of the state employees were KASE members and 71% were not. The 4800 responses reflect a return rate of 14% which by industry research standards produce a very credible measurement of state employee opinions.

According to KASE President Lee A. Jackson, "Two of the most important findings that came out of this survey are how state employees feel about Political Freedom and collective bargaining. According to the

survey, two out of every three state employees want more political freedom. This confirms what we have been hearing from state employees across the state for years." In terms of collective bargaining for public employees, the KASE poll showed that 78% of those who returned their surveys supported collective bargaining for state employees.

KASE worked during the 1990 Legislative session to pass legislation that would have increased protections for state employees against political harassment while restoring their political freedom (Kentucky Law now prohibits state employees from most political activities). Jackson stated, "This survey dispels earlier arguments against our freedom legislation that state employees don't want more political freedom, it is now clear that they do."

The survey also reveals that 68% of state employees do not feel that the

merit system adequately protects them from political patronage. "The reason the legislature passed these political restrictions was to protect the employees. The freedoms are gone but we continue to see the political abuse. Its time to stop punishing the victim in order to stop the crime" continued Jackson.

Other results from the survey showed:

—48% cited low pay as the most troublesome aspect of their job while 26% pointed to lack of promotional opportunities.

—78% supported the right of state employees to choose a union to represent them for the purpose of negotiating a contract which would spell out hours, wages and working conditions.

—35% called their job conditions excellent or very good, while 38% rated conditions no better than average. The remainder rated their job conditions as poor.

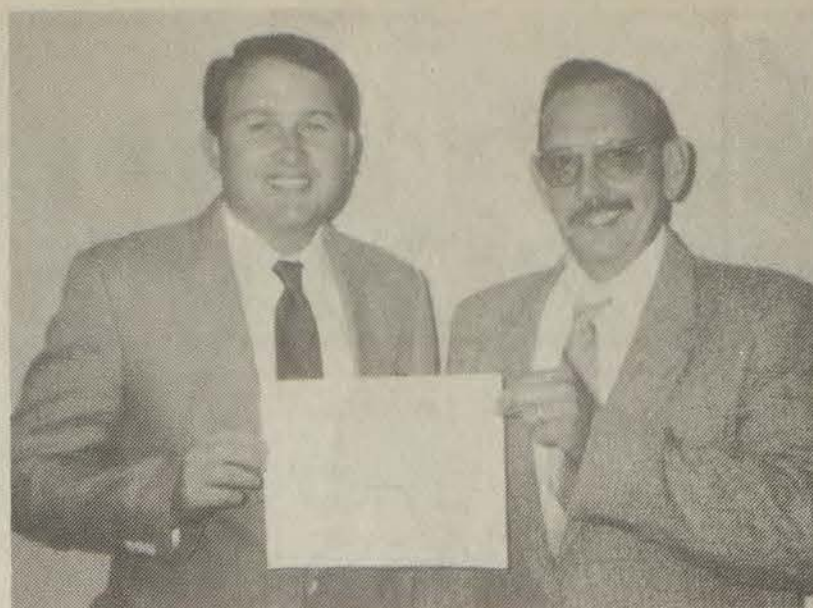

When freon gas began to escape, Bays immediately evacuated the building. Risking his own safety, he led repairmen to the break and aided in a quick solution to the problem.

Forest fire damage has long-term effects

Fires do more than damage the beauty of the 12 million acres of hardwood timber in Kentucky. The blazes also cause economic damage that is not immediately evident, according to a forestry management specialist at the University of Kentucky.

"A fire doesn't kill trees right away, so people don't see the extent of damage," said Doug McLaren, specialist with the UK College of Agriculture. "The real damage is to the quality of the remaining trees. And this damage has a tremendous economic impact on the nearly 42 million board feet of hardwood sawlogs sold annually."

The danger of forest fires is greatest now through mid-December, according to McLaren.

"What people don't see is the hidden damage," he explained. "A fire moving through a hardwood stand normally burns close to the ground, affecting the lower part of the tree which is the most valuable. The first 16 feet of a tree is the highest quality because it has the fewest defects—except when burned. As the fire surrounds the base of a tree, it raises the internal temperature of the trunk, killing the bark and underlying cambium layer."

"It usually takes a year or so for the bark to drop off. But by this time insects and diseases have already entered the trunk and begun the process of lowering the potential quality of the tree. Continued fires increase the process."

"If you must burn, remember the burning law prohibits fires after 4:30 p.m.," McLaren added. "Always create a 'fire break' in case the fire gets out of control. It's a good idea to contact the local representative of the Kentucky Division of Forestry beforehand."

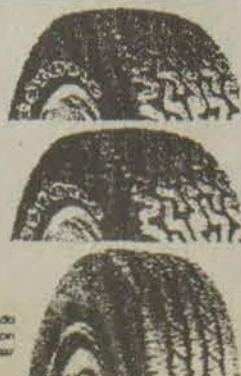

The prize winning '68 Camaro chrome engine drew the onlookers who gazed at the detailed work that went into the car.

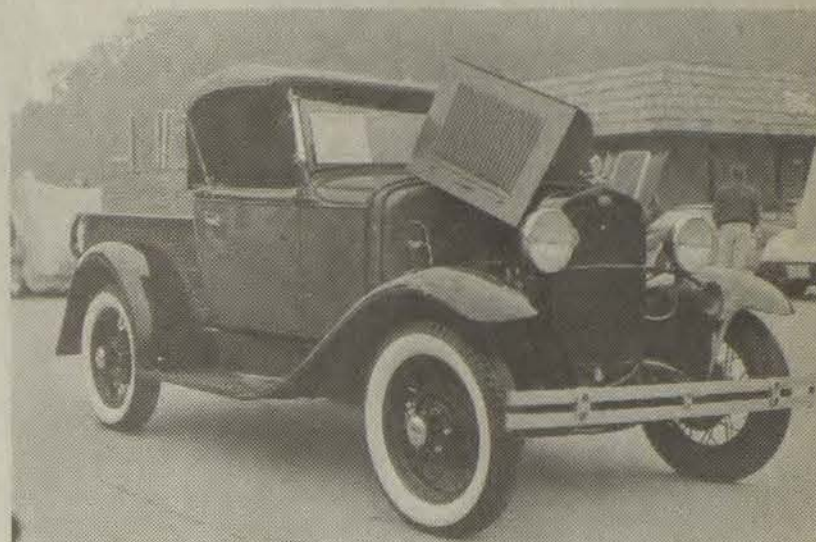
"We have to start on it a week in advance of a show," explained Mrs. Salyers. "Joe built the car himself. He did all the body work and every-

Blackcats Stun Sheldon Clark Cardinals



Rushes for 75 yards

There's a saying among high school football fans that your backfield is only as good as your offensive line. That was true of the Prestonsburg Blackcats when they nailed previously undefeated Sheldon Clark 28-24 in a big district game for both clubs last Friday night at Cardinal Stadium. It was the young offensive line that has grown up since the 1991 football season began back in late August. The Blackcats line opened the holes for runners like Dwayne Garza, Seth Hyden and John Goble. The result was 173 yards on the ground for the Blackcats.

But, it wasn't just the ground game of the Blackcats that gave Prestonsburg their fourth district win and, at the present, the top spot in the district with the playoffs on the horizon, it was the air attack of the Cats which was very evident, also. Blackcat quarterback Aaron Tucker just kept improving as he had four completions for 92 yards passing — one being a 42 yard strike to receiver John Clark. Clark, on an option play, connected up with Josh Hyden on a 49 yard pass play for the first score of the game. The Cats had a total of 141 yards passing on five completions.

It was evident that the offense was moving the football, but when it became crunch time with Prestonsburg clinging to a precious 28-24 lead and the Cardinals with the football, it was the defense that arose to the challenge of stalling a late effort on the part of Sheldon Clark to take the game away.

The Cardinals, on the strength of an on-side kick that resulted in a touchdown to pull Sheldon Clark to within four points, had the football in Prestonsburg territory with 4:11 showing on the scoreboard. Sheldon Clark's outstanding running back, Donnie Slone, moved the football from the Cardinals' 14 yard line to the Prestonsburg 44 for excellent field position. After Jesse Watts' pass was incomplete to wide receiver Bruce Stepp, Watts elected to go to the air once again, only to have the ball intercepted by strong safety Seth Hyden.

Prestonsburg took control with 3:45 remaining in the all important district match up. The Cats were called for a clipping and were unable to pick up the first down as they were forced

Wheelwright Posts 54-24 Win Over Berea

The Wheelwright Trojans guaranteed themselves a .500 season with a solid 54-24 win over visiting Berea this past Saturday night, homecoming for the Trojans. All the pomp and pageantry was held before the start of the football game and Missy Slone was chosen "Miss Homecoming Queen, 1991" at the ceremonies.

Wheelwright came into the game with a 4-4 record, the best record since 1985 for the Trojans when Roger Johnson's ball club finished 6-4. The Trojans have a chance to equal that mark but must win the final game of the season against Elkhorn City at home.

It was an easy victory for the Trojans as coach Donnie Daniels gave his bench plenty of playing time. Leading rusher Steven Jackson saw limited playing time as did Arnold Adams due to the large margin between the two teams.

Jackson carried the football only three times during the game for 28 yards, but he scored the first touchdown in the first quarter. Adams, although he carried only three times, had 95 yards and two TD's. A third was called back on a facemasking call against the Trojans.

Berea received the football on the initial kickoff and picked up a first down on the first play of the game when Shane Cope carried the ball for 10 yards. However, the Pirates quarterback was sacked for a long loss on a third down play and the Pirates were forced to punt. The punt was a poor one and the Trojans took control on the Berea 22 yard line. Jackson ran the first play for the Trojans and went in from 22 yards out for the score. Quarterback Steven Shelton kicked the point after touchdown (PAT) for a 7-0 Trojan lead.

The game bogged down on just one of the field, Berea's, for most of the first quarter. Berea punted the ball after their second possession and Wheelwright had the ball on the Pi-

rates' 48 yard line where Shelton, on a keeper, raced in from 18 yards out and then kicked the extra point to give the Trojans a quick 14-0 lead.

Wheelwright struck again in the first period on an Arnold Adams' 48 yard TD run Shelton's extra point made it a 21-0 ball game.

Speaking about the play of his backfield, Daniels said, "I like to think that we have one of the most talented backfields in the region. They are good kids who work hard and give forth a good effort."

Many players saw some playing time for Wheelwright in the backfield as nine players carried the football.

Adams scored his second TD on a 36 yard run in the second quarter, a score that was set by Jonathan Carroll's 22 yard run at the start of the period. Shelton kicked his third extra point for the 28-0 game.

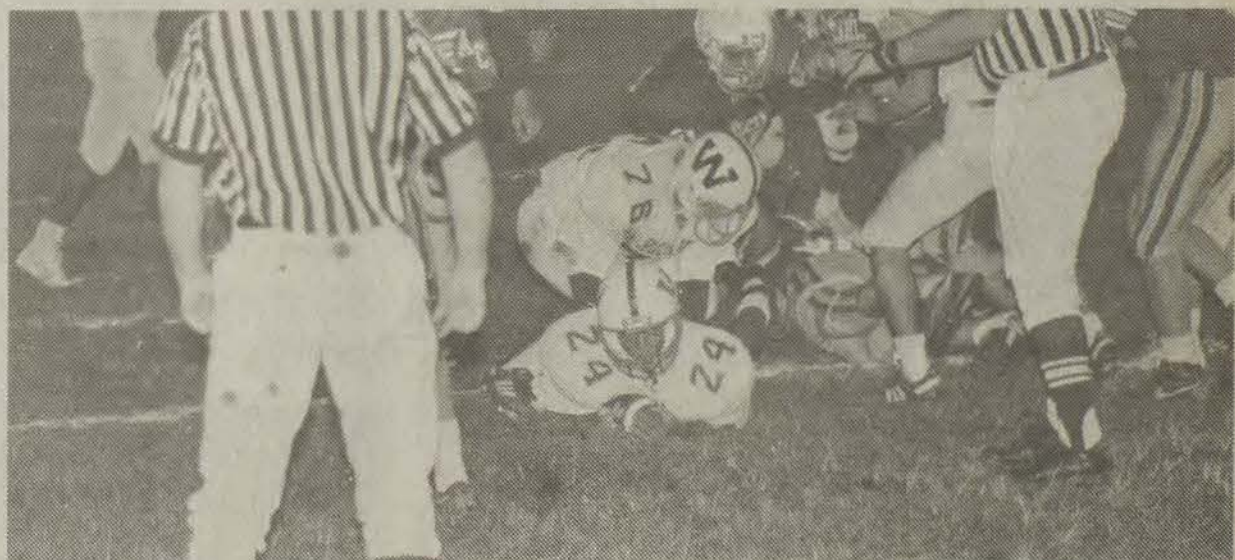
The game quickly slipped away from Berea after Muntu Oden intercepted an Ashley Pennington pass on the Pirates' 44 yard line. On first down, Hutton found an opening and jaunted in from 44 yards out for the touchdown to give Wheelwright a 34-0 advantage at half time.

In third quarter action, Shelton hit Oden for a 49 yard completion and then connected with Cruise Caudill for a touchdown pass. Shelton PAT but the Trojans up 41-0 as the rout was on.

Daniels started running his younger Trojans in and Berea finally got on the scoreboard on a 15 yard touchdown run by Shane Cope. Wess Vasey ran the two point conversion to make it a 41-8 game.

Adams scored his third touchdown of the game on a nice 30 yard run but the score was nullified after the Trojans were flagged for a face mask call. Two plays later Hutton scored from 23 yards out and Marty Tackett

once again won yet another first place prize — Modified Camaro 1969 and below. The Camaro was also voted Best of Show.

Judging a car show could be a very hard thing to do. Many of the people looking at cars stated that they were glad they didn't have to do the judging. That part of the car show fell to several people who were not strangers to the task.

"I have been judging cars for the past six years," said Joe Bailey. "I used to help Tom Williams and then he quit. I just kept on doing it."

Bailey said that cleanliness of a car is very important when a judge looks one over. Originality and exterior of the body are closely examined. Exterior paint and chrome are checked for cleanliness, finish and originality or the degree of modification. Glass is checked for cracks and cleanliness also. Same size of tires and wheels are important in judging a car.

The general interior of the carpet (cleanliness, condition, fade) are looked at by the judges. The trunk, engine compartments and under carriage are also taken into consideration. Each part of the car judged is awarded points of 12, 10, 8 or six. The one totaling the most points is declared the winner in each class. Total points possible are 220.

Pikeville's Steve Porter has been entering car shows with his '88 S10 pickup that has a dump bed.

"I have to work on my truck around two weeks in advance of a car show," explained Porter. "Eighty-Five percent of getting one ready is washing and waxing one. Then, when I get to the show, I just have to detail it out."

Porter, like the Salyers, built his truck himself, but unlike the Salyers, he did his own painting. Under the hood of the 88 S10, the motor looked as if someone slung purple and gold paint all over it.

"No, I did that myself," said Porter laughing. "I took a screwdriver and after I thinned my paint down, I dipped the screwdriver into the paint and just slung it over the parts of the motor. Of course, I had the parts all out when I did it."

Walking away with the hardware for this car show was Martin's own Tom Williams. Williams' 1957 Chevy (everyone's favorite) was the People's Choice winner. Williams came away also with two first place finishes, one second place and a third place finish.

Bassin' with the Pros

FOLLOW THESE TIPS FOR SPINNERBAIT TRAILER HOOKS

Normally, spinnerbaits are weedless lures that can be cast into bushes and weeds without danger of snagging. Why, then, would bass anglers add a trailer hook that takes away the weedlessness and limits the places the lure can be used?

"A trailer or stinger hook may be the answer if bass are just nipping at the lure and not taking it aggressively," explains Guy Eaker, a member of the Evinrude Outboards Pro Staff and a 20-year veteran of professional tournament competition. "Sometimes you find bass that just won't engulf the lure, and you'll never catch them because all they're doing is biting the skirt."

In situations like this, Eaker uses a short shank trailer hook he hides in the skirt. He doesn't want a long trailer hook dangling out behind the lure, and he doesn't use a plastic trailer, either. The trailer hook is attached by inserting the spinnerbait barb through the trailer hook eye. It is held in place with a small piece of surgical tubing or even a tiny piece of plastic worm.

"What I usually do," explains the Evinrude pro, "is to pull the skirt further down so it helps hide the trailer. Sometimes I even use scissors to trim the skirt a particular way so it's a little thinner, too."

"It extends just past the barb, so if a bass nips at the skirt, I'm going to hook it." Eaker remembers just such an incident at Georgia's Lake Lanier where he was missing as many as half the strikes he was getting. After he added the trailer hook and changed the skirt, he caught nine of the next 10 fish that hit.

"The best way to use a spinnerbait," explains Eaker, "is to throw it where other anglers don't, which is

right into the thickest cover you can find. If you use a long-arm spinnerbait, it will usually come through brush without getting snagged and the brush is where you're going to catch bass.

"When you add a trailer hook, you lose this weedlessness, but if bass are biting over submerged cover or in fairly open water you can use a trailer hook very successfully."

position for the first time when they started out on the Trojans' 46 yard line. But prosperity was not the thing for Allen Central when they fumbled the football again on a third and 10 at the 46. Wheelwright recovered the football when Jamie Slone was hit at the 40 yard line.

Wheelwright took advantage of the turnover and, on a 1 yard run, Chuck Hutton put the Trojans on top 26-0 with Shelton adding his third PAT.

With 8:09 remaining in the first half, Allen Central lost the football on their third consecutive fumble with Wheelwright recovering on the Rebels' 41 yard line. However, on a fourth and four play, the Trojans returned the favor when Slone recovered the football at the Trojans' 38 yard line and Allen Central marched the 38 yards when Slone carried the ball in from 1 yard out for the touchdown. Slone ran the conversion play for a 27-8 half time score.

The Rebels received the kickoff to start the second half and put together a good drive that stalled out on the Trojans' 44 yard line. Wheelwright took over the football and on the first play from scrimmage, Jackson jaunted 56 yards for the score. Shelton's PAT gave Wheelwright a comfortable 34-6 advantage.

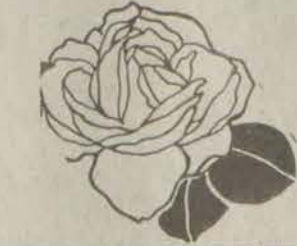
The Rebels fall to 0-8 overall and are 0-5 in the district. Wheelwright evens their record at 4-4 overall and goes to 2-3 in the district.

to punt the ball from their own 39 yard line with 1:18 on the clock.

On the punt, Prestonsburg was called for a personal foul and a 15 yard penalty ensued, placing the football into Prestonsburg territory. First and ten for the Cards, Watts looked to pass with 1:13 left in the game. The pass was intercepted on a great catch by free safety John Clark on the Prestonsburg 16 yard line, ending the Cardinals' drive. Sheldon Clark was out of time outs and Tucker just downed the ball as the clock ticked down and the Blackcats celebrated.

The inability of the Cardinals to score their extra points was a big factor in the final score. Sheldon Clark did not successfully complete a conversion play.

Trailing 28-12, Sheldon Clark pushed across a touchdown with 7:19 left in the game on a 1 yard run by Jason Stephens to make it a 28-18 game. Prestonsburg took 16 plays to move the football 65 yards for the score. The ball was spotted on the Cardinals' 4 yard line where the Cats moved to the one-on-three plays as Sheldon Clark tried for the goal line stand. But, on a fourth-and-goal, Garza scored his third touchdown of the game on the 1 yard plunge, and Clark was a perfect four-for-four as he added the PAT.

"Dwayne can really carry the football," said Blackcat assistant coach Bill Hoppman. "He can get hit and just bounce off tackles and keep going."

Garza rushed for 96 yards on 18 carries for the Blackcats, scoring three touchdowns. John Goble managed 75 yards on 26 carries in the Prestonsburg win.

James Derossett was the leading receiver for Prestonsburg with three receptions for 50 yards. Hyden had one for 49 yards and Clark had one for 42 yards. Defensively for Prestonsburg, Robby Watson and Seth Hyden had six solo hits with Hyden getting one assist. Brian Horn had five solo hits plus one assist. Glenn May and James Derossett each had three hits. Derossett had four assists on defense. Todd Clark had two solos but five assists, and Brad Wells finished with four assists and two solo hits. Adam McGuire and Kyle Fitzpatrick each had two solo tackles. Ronnie Goodman collected two assists and one solo while Tucker had five assists and one solo.

Prestonsburg was penalized three times for 35 yards, and they had no turn overs in the game. Prestonsburg picked up 11 first downs.

Sheldon Clark had 11 first downs,

also, and had a total yardage of 387 yards. Watts was 10 of 30 in passing for 250 yards. The Prestonsburg defense kept Sheldon Clark's ground game in check as the Cardinals rushed for 137 yards on 24 carries. Donnie Slone picked up 89 yards for the Cardinals on six carries as the leading gainer for Sheldon Clark.

Prestonsburg improves to 4-4 on the season in winning their fourth consecutive game. Prestonsburg needs to win their remaining two games to assure themselves of the top spot in the district and a home field advantage in the upcoming playoffs. The Blackcats will travel to Morgan County to face a 3-2 Pirate team in a district match

up. Prestonsburg then will finish the regular season with the Navajos of M.C. Napier on November 2.

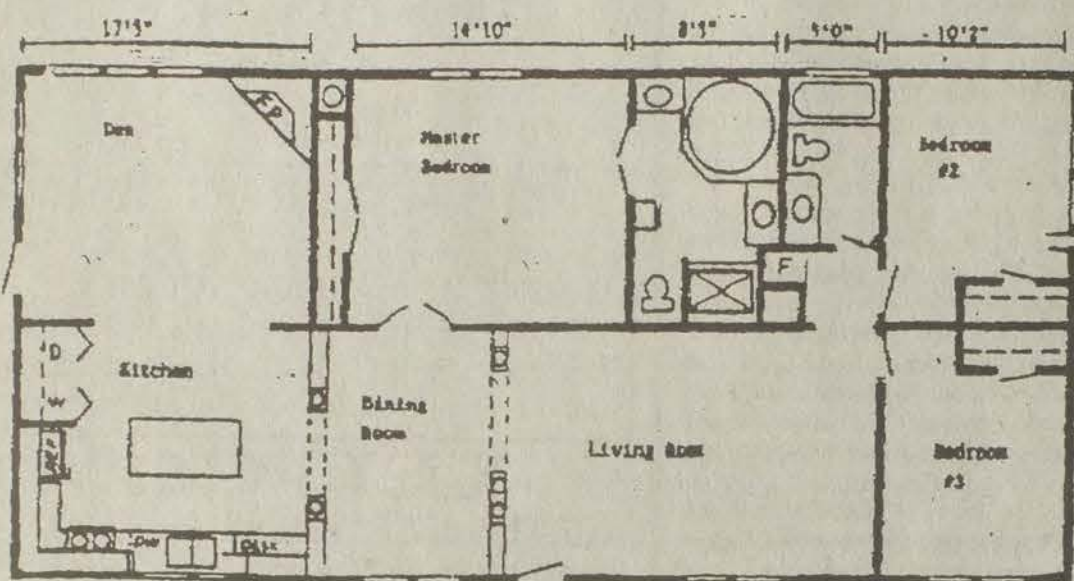

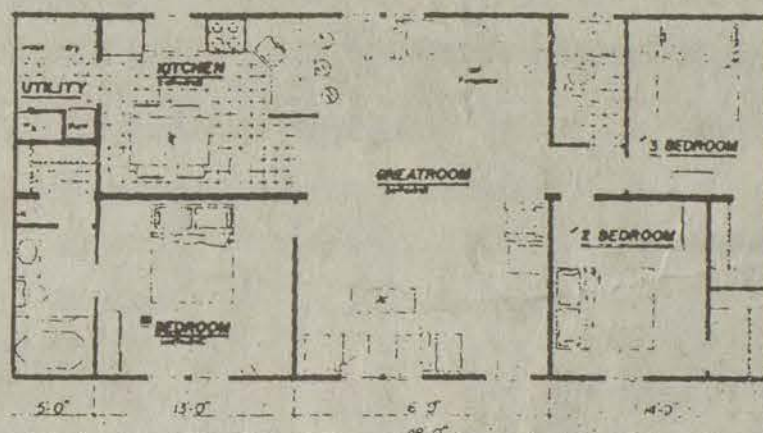

How Parents Can Help Children Cope With Grief

Parents of small children sometimes ask funeral directors questions like:

"Do small children really grieve?"
"How should I explain Grandpa's death to my child?"

And, "Should I take my child to the funeral?"

Although our profession brings us into almost daily contact with people who are grieving, we funeral directors don't profess to be grief experts, counselors or therapists. On the other

hand, we do have a special concern for individuals and families we serve, a feeling for what they are going through and a strong desire to be helpful. So we try to keep abreast of what experts in the field have to say about grieving.

Specialists in helping children cope with emotional stress tell us the answer to the first question is yes...young children grieve deeply when someone close to them dies. If they are old enough to love someone, they are old enough to grieve the loss of that person.

But they haven't yet learned the

words to express their feelings. So they usually show their grief through their behavior. This behavior is likely to be much different than the kind we adults may consider an appropriate response to a significant loss. And parents may not recognize it as being related to grieving.

In some ways, grieving children behave as "little adults." Where grownups who encounter grief may lose themselves in work, children may seek relief in active play that can be unusually noisy, disturbing those around them. And as parents may face the reality of the loss by focusing

their minds on experiences surrounding the death, children may seek to understand what has happened by "playing dead" or staging a funeral with playmates.

Some children may choose to react in negative ways. Feeling rejected and deprived because of their loss and the fact that their parents' attention is distracted, they may become angry. And they may express their feelings through destructive behavior directed at others or toward objects such as toys. Experts say that, if such children are reprimanded for their behavior rather than understood, they may feel doubly rejected.

Children often substitute feelings they can handle for those they can't. They may giggle or laugh at things that are not at all funny. Behavior specialists say that parents would do well to interpret these and other unusual behaviors as grief reactions. The children are expressing feelings in the only way they know how.

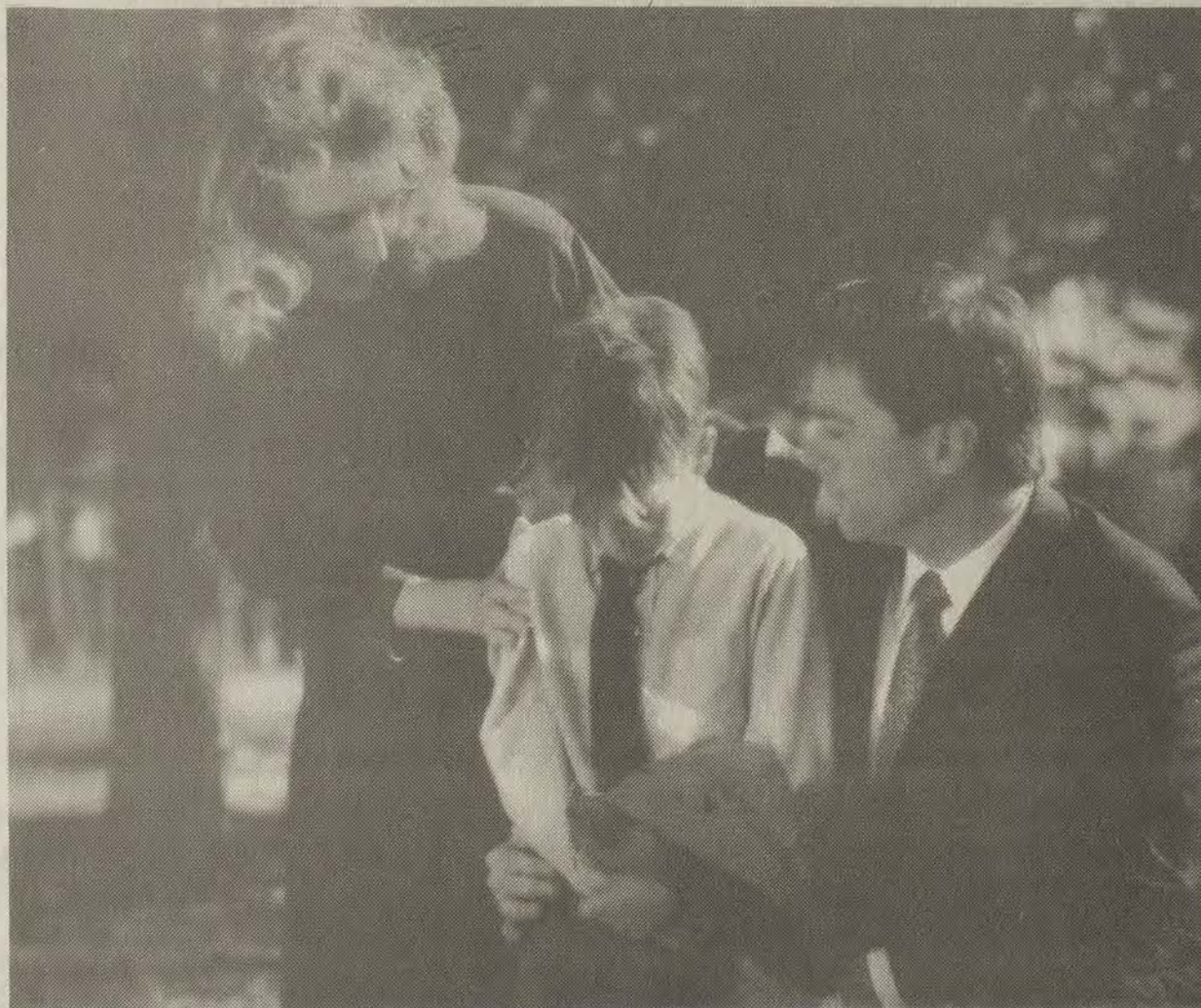
All grieving children need understanding, acceptance, warmth, reassurance and the certainty that others love them. Unusual behavior will work itself out more quickly if it is understood and accepted as the child's feelings in action than if it is ignored or suppressed through scolding.

When a death occurs in a family, what should a parent tell a child about what happened? It's natural for parents of small children to try to protect them from being touched by harsh reality. But parents can't grieve without their children sensing that something is wrong, even if they aren't sure what has happened.

Children become anxious and begin to ask questions. Experts say that parents would do well to answer those questions truthfully and carefully.

Young children accept what their parents tell them without question, and parental "truths" become permanently etched in their minds. To tell children half-truths about a death, or

Like, for instance, his report of the little girl from France who was born with only one eye — right slap in the middle of her forehead. He didn't give her name, but it might have been Cindy Cyclops. I liked the one, too, about the chicken, owned by a James Cook of New Bedford, Massachusetts, that laid a perfectly square egg.

Hmmm? Square eggs? Do you suppose that's where they get chicken nuggets?

I also discovered several interesting little trivia things. Did you know, for example, that Buffalo Bill never

in his life ever shot a buffalo? That the world's smallest church is near Lolon, Kentucky, and seats only three people? Or that Panama hats don't come from Panama?

Robert Ripley died in 1949 and it's really too bad that someone didn't continue his search for the bizarre. Of course, one doesn't need a Ripley to realize that the world is still filled with oddities. Just this past weekend, I read in the paper that President Bush had been invited to the funeral of a Frederick, Maryland man described as a "hard-working, patriotic American". The only problem was that the fellow hadn't died yet. His family explained that the man was on a life-support machine and when the president could fit it into his schedule, they'd pull the plug.

County Kettle

Here I go again trying to lose about 40 to 50 unwanted and unneeded pounds, writing this column which makes me so hungry I eat a horse then too I have a large pot of home made vegetable soup simmering on the back burner. Oh well.

Come the 25th we will have been married 38 years. Guess what I am getting as a gift? I just found out—a cookbook. It sounds great. My husband told me he had ordered something I could use and would help me out with this column. He did show me the add, over 400 recipes for one dish meals.

I think he's trying to tell me something. Bet I don't pay any more attention this time than I have in the past. The first two recipes this week will be in the up-coming cookbook.

CHICKEN AND CORN BREAD SKILLET

1 lb. boned and skinned chicken thighs cut in 1-inch cubes
1/2 tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. pepper
1/4 c. unsifted flour
1/4 c. olive oil
1 med. yellow onion, finely chopped
3 cloves garlic, minced
1 small carrot, peeled, halved lengthwise and thinly sliced
2 c. chopped canned tomatoes with their juice
2 med. stalks celery, coarsely chopped
1-1/4 tsp. grated orange rind
1 whole bay leaf
2/3 c. frozen green peas, thawed and drained
For The Corn Bread
3/4 c. yellow cornmeal
1/4 c. unsifted all-purpose flour
2 tsp. sugar
1-1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. soda
1/2 c. buttermilk
1 large egg, lightly beaten
2 tsp. melted margarine or oil
Preheat oven to 400°. Sprinkle chicken with salt and pepper; then

dredge in flour, shaking off excess. Heat 2-1/2 tablespoons oil in a 10-inch ovenproof skillet, over medium heat. Add chicken and saute; about 5 minutes, turning occasionally, until no longer pink on the outside. Transfer to a large plate. Add remaining oil, onion, and garlic to the skillet. Saute until soft, about 5 minutes. Stir in tomatoes, celery, orange rind, and bay leaf. Cook until slightly thickened, about 7 minutes.

Return the chicken to the skillet and cook uncovered for 4 to 5 minutes. Remove skillet from heat and discard bay leaf. Stir in peas.

For the cornbread, in a medium size bowl combine cornmeal, flour, sugar, baking powder, salt, and soda. In another bowl whisk together buttermilk, eggs and butter. Form a well in the center of the dry ingredients and stir in the liquid mixture until just combined. Spoon batter over top of chicken, bake in oven 15 minutes.

BEST EVER CHICKEN'N' DUMPLINGS

2 tbsp. unsalted butter
1 large yellow onion, coarsely chopped
3 cloves garlic, minced
1 lb. skinned and boned chicken thighs, cut into 1-1/2 in. wide pieces
1/2 tsp. dried marjoram
1/2 tsp. sage
1/4 tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. pepper
1 c. canned chicken broth
1 pkg. frozen mixed vegetables, thawed and drained
For The Dumplings
3 tbsp. minced parsley
1-1/2 c. self-rising flour
3 tsp. oil
2/3 c. buttermilk
If these dumplings are to be fluffy, cook them covered—NO peeking. Melt butter in a 4-quart Dutch oven, over medium heat. Add onions and garlic and saute, stirring occasionally, until soft—about 5 minutes. Stir in the chicken and saute until no longer pink—about 5 minutes. Stir in

marjoram, sage, salt, pepper, stock and vegetables and keep over medium heat while you make the dumplings.

For the dumplings

Mix the parsley and flour. Cut in the shortening with a pastry blender, until mixture resembles coarse meal. Stir in the buttermilk and stir until dough just holds together, yet firm. Bring the chicken mixture to a boil over medium heat. Drop on top by teaspoon, without letting them touch. Reduce heat to low, cover and simmer for 12 minutes without removing the lid.

CREAM CHEESE CLOUDS

1-8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
1/2 c. powdered sugar
1/4 tsp. vanilla
1 c. heavy cream
1 can cherry pie filling
Mix cream cheese, sugar and vanilla at medium speed. Gradually add heavy cream mixing well. Whip until thickened. Using the back of a spoon maketen 3-1/2 inch shells. Place on wax paper in a cookie sheet. Freeze two hours or over night. When ready to serve, fill with cherry pie filling. Sprinkle chopped nuts on top if desired.

MARMALADE-GLAZED SAUSAGES

1 lb. pork sausage meat
6 knackwurst sausages
6 weisswurst sausages
1/2 c. orange marmalade spread
1/2 tsp. caraway seeds
apple wedges, orange and pineapple slices for garnish
Cut sausage meat into 1/2 inch slices, crosswise. Cut each knackwurst and weisswurst into 2 or 3 pieces. In a 12-inch skillet cook sausage slices over medium heat until browned and cooked through, removing slices as they brown to paper towels to drain.
In drippings in skillet, over medium heat, cook knackwurst and weisswurst until browned. Spoon off fat from skillet. Return sausage slices and stir in orange marmalade and caraway seeds; cook, stirring until marmalade melts and sausages are well glazed, 5 minutes. To serve spoon sausage mixture onto large warm platter garnish with fruit. Makes 6 servings.

HUNGARIAN-STYLE GOULASH

3 tbsp. margarine, or butter
2 lb. onions, thinly sliced
2 lb. stew beef, cut into 1-inch chunks
1/4 c. paprika (yes, this much)
1-1/2 tsp. salt
1 c. sour cream
4 c. buttered, hot cooked noodles
In a 5-quart Dutch oven over medium-high heat, in hot butter or margarine, cook onions until lightly browned. Add meat, paprika, and salt. Reduce heat to low, cover and simmer 2 hours, or until meat is fork-tender.
Stir in sour cream, heat through (DO NOT BOIL!!) Serve over noodles, if you like. Makes 8 servings.

OATMEAL RAISIN COOKIES

no-stick cooking spray
1 c. flour
1 c. quick oats
1/2 c. sugar
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
2 egg whites
1/2 c. light corn syrup
1 tsp. vanilla

1/2 c. raisins
Preheat oven to 375°. Spray cookie sheet with cooking spray. In large bowl combine dry ingredients. Stir in egg whites, corn syrup and vanilla.

Mix well. Add raisins. Drop by rounded teaspoonfuls onto cookie sheet. Bake 10 minutes or until firm. Do not over bake. Cool on wire rack. Makes 2-1/2 dozen.

RANCHERO EGGS BURRITOS

4-8-inch flour tortillas
1 tbsp. oil
1/4 lb. pepperoni chopped
1 medium onion diced
1 small red pepper, diced
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. ground cumin (optional)
8 large eggs
1/4 c. mild taco sauce
cilantro sprigs, for garnish
Wrap tortillas in foil and heat in 300° oven. In a 12-inch skillet over medium-high heat, in hot oil, cook pepperoni, onion, red and green peppers, salt, and cumin until vegetables are tender, stirring frequently. In a bowl, with a wire whisk or fork, beat eggs and 1/2 cup water until blended. Pour egg mixture over vegetables in skillet. As egg mixture begins to set, with rubber spatula, stir slightly so uncooked eggs flow to the bottom. Continue cooking until egg mixture is set but still moist, stirring occasionally.
Remove tortillas from oven. Along center of tortillas, spoon 1/4 of scrambled egg-egg mixture; top with 1 tablespoon taco sauce. Fold sides of tortillas over to enclose filling. Arrange burritos on platter. Garnish with cilantro sprigs. Serves 4.

PARMESAN-HERB BREAD

1/2 stick margarine
1/4 c. grated Parmesan cheese
1 tbsp. dried parsley flakes
1/4 tsp. garlic powder
1 12-inch-long loaf Italian bread
1/4 c. roasted red peppers, drained and thinly sliced
Preheat broiler, if manufacturer directs.
In a small bowl, mix margarine, grated Parmesan, parsley flakes, and garlic powder. Slice bread horizontally in half. Spread both sides with cheese mixture. Place bread, cut side up, on a cookie sheet. Place cookie sheet on rack at closest position to source of heat; broil bread 1 to 2 minutes until cheese mixture is golden and bubbly. Remove cookie sheet from broiler. Sprinkle roasted red peppers over top of bread. Cut each half into 4 pieces. Makes 4 servings.



Cabbage Patch

The gardener's biggest problem is not, as many think, blights and bugs. It is crows, pigeons and ground squirrels. How many times have we gone out into the early corn patch after a warm rain, in the mornings expecting to see our sweet corn coming through the ground. When we get there all we see is every hill of the corn has been pulled up or a tiny hole along the side where it has been dug up. The work

of either or all three of the above mentioned varmints. Generally people accuse all birds of the damage. Not so. After you kill one of our regular birds (if you do), please cut it open and see what it has eaten. 99 times out of a 100 you will find only cut worms and other such insects. NO corn.

Raising a garden is a toss up between you and the varmints from the day it is planted until the day it is harvested. Each and every year we think we have maybe found the magic folklore to keep out the wild life. We try about every scare tactic known; if

I were to try to list all the different things I have used the list would be at least two columns long. The only thing that will work is proper fencing.

Scarecrows, strips of plastic, plastic owls, rubber snakes on tree limbs, string stretched across the plants, along the outside of the garden, blinking lights or recordings of loud noises;

NONE of these things will work, for long. Maybe at first for a little while. Regular fencing will not do a job good enough to pay for the cost of the wire and work of installing it.

My husband and I have both re-

fused to shoot at crows—they seldom bother our crops, yet they will riddle a near patch owned by someone who uses any excuse to shoot them. Why? I have no idea. One year I ask my husband to go out into the new corn patch to gather us some for dinner. He came back in asking why I had gathered it and piled the cobs up in the patch. I had not been out there, but the grey fox had as we found out that night after

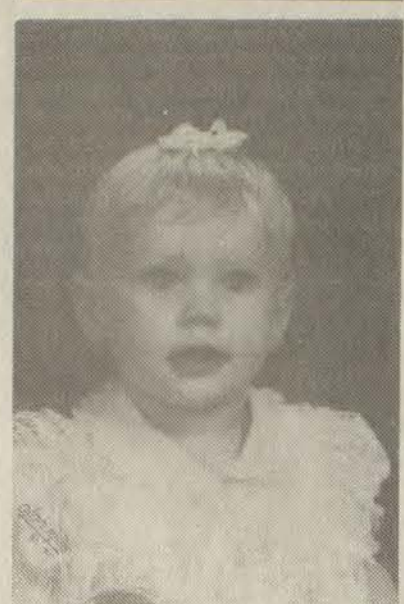
setting some steel traps throughout the patch. I think he trapped and killed around a dozen in that one small patch of corn right next to the house.

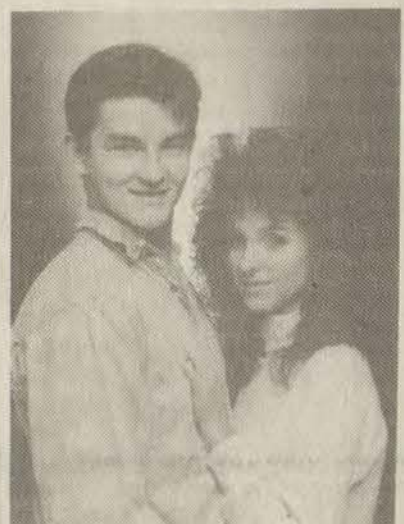

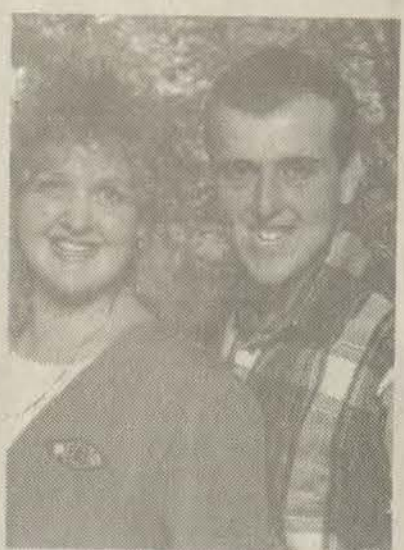

Grief

to make up stories in an effort to soften the impact of the loss, can do more harm than good over the long term, psychologists say.

To tell them that "Grandpa is sleeping" may lead them to believe he will soon wake up and play with them. And to try to explain death by saying "To die is to sleep," can cause severe sleeping problems for the young child.

If children are told "Grandpa has gone away for a very long time," their young minds may reason that Grandpa has deserted them because of something they did that displeased him. Young children often blame themselves for bad things that happen in their lives.

"Grandpa is now in heaven" can be confusing to children because they may know that Grandpa is buried in the cemetery. Even telling them that "Grandpa died because he was sick" can spark fear that anybody who gets sick will die.

One of my fellow funeral service professionals who is especially sensitive to the emotional needs of children has suggested this approach to explaining the death of an aged grandfather:

"A very sad thing happened to Grandpa. He was very old, so old that his body wore out and stopped working. Sometimes when a person is as old as Grandpa was, his body doesn't get better when it is sick, like ours do. It's not as strong as our bodies are. It stops working and it can't be fixed, so the person dies. That's what happened to Grandpa. And that's why everyone is so sad."

Child psychologists say that, by holding children lovingly, explaining Grandpa's death as calmly as possible and allowing them to grieve in their own way, parents can provide the reassurance that is badly needed by youngsters who are facing the loss of someone they loved.

Experienced professionals also recommend that youngsters seven and older be encouraged, but never forced, to attend the funeral of someone who played an important role in their lives.

This advice is based on their opinion that children, as members of the family, should participate with the family on every important occasion, including sad ones.

They point out that attending the funeral helps children face the reality that a death has occurred and helps them to acknowledge their personal loss. The funeral ceremony recognizes the value of a life that has been lived and helps all of us give vent to honest feelings of grief and pain at our loss.

Being with others at a funeral helps the child realize that he or she is not alone in experiencing the loss. This is important, experts say, because children often interpret a death in the family as punishment for any negative feelings they may have held toward the deceased. The support and comfort provided by parents and others at a funeral can help relieve those feelings of guilt.

Rites, rituals and ceremonies are the means by which people throughout the world work through their feelings. And experts say that these rituals can be particularly helpful to children, who may not fully comprehend what is happening but need to feel that others share the pain they are feeling.

As a funeral service professional, I have seen many children attend funerals for someone they loved. And some of their parents have told me that, although they had hesitated to bring their youngsters to the services, they were glad they did.

Experts say that parents can also help youngsters by openly showing their own grief. Since parents serve as role models for their children, their honest expressions of emotions can help children feel free to let grief out. By encouraging, but not forcing, children to talk about and grieve their losses, parents can help them move through one of life's most difficult experiences with few emotional scars.

AN ORDINANCE IMPOSING A LICENSE FEE UPON INSURANCE COMPANIES FOR THE PRIVILEGE OF ENGAGING IN THE BUSINESS OF INSURANCE WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF ALLEN FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR 1992, AND THEREAFTER ON A CALENDAR YEAR BASIS; ESTABLISHING INSURANCE COMPANY LICENSE FEE RATES AS 6% OF THE FIRST YEAR PREMIUMS FOR LIFE INSURANCE, AND 6% OF THE PREMIUMS FOR ALL OTHER TYPES OF INSURANCE ACTUALLY COLLECTED WITHIN EACH CALENDAR QUARTER DURING THE CALENDAR YEAR 1992, AND THEREAFTER UNTIL AMENDED; ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE OF JANUARY 1 AND A DELINQUENCY DATE THIRTY (30) DAYS AFTER THE END OF EACH CALENDAR QUARTER; ESTABLISHING A PENALTY INTEREST CHARGE AT THE TAX INTEREST RATE AS DEFINED BY STATUTE; AND REQUIRING INSURANCE COMPANIES SUBJECT TO THE LICENSE FEE TO FURNISH ANNUAL COLLECTION INFORMATION.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF ALLEN:

SECTION 1: There is hereby imposed on each insurance company a license fee for the privilege of engaging in the business of insurance within the corporate limits of the City of Allen for the calendar year 1992, and thereafter on a calendar year basis.

SECTION 2: The license fee imposed upon each insurance company which issues life insurance policies on the lives of persons residing within the corporate limits of the City of Allen shall be 6% of the first year's premiums actually collected within each calendar quarter by reason of the issuance of such policies.

SECTION 3: The license fee imposed upon each insurance company which issues any insurance policy which is not a life insurance policy shall be 6% of the premiums actually collected within each calendar quarter by reason of the issuance of such policies on risks located within the corporate limits of the City of Allen on those classes of business which such company is authorized to transact, less all premiums returned to policy holders; however, any license fee or tax imposed upon premium receipts shall not include premiums received for insuring employees against liability for personal injuries to their employees, or death caused thereby, under the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Act and shall not include premiums received on policies of group health insurance provided for state employees under KRS 18A.225(2) and 18A.228.

SECTION 4: All license fees imposed by this ordinance shall be due no later than thirty (30) days after the end of each calendar quarter. License fees which are not paid on or before the due date shall bear interest at the tax interest rate as defined in KRS 131.010(6).

SECTION 5: Every insurance company subject to this ordinance shall annually, by March 31, furnish the City of Allen with a written breakdown of all collections in the preceding calendar year for the following categories of insurance: (a) casualty; (b) automobile; (c) inland marine; (d) fire and allied perils; (e) health; and (f) life.

SECTION 6: The proceeds of the insurance premium tax levied by this ordinance shall be paid to the city's General Fund and used to pay General Fund expenditures.

SECTION 7: The city clerk is hereby directed to transmit a copy of this ordinance, and any amendment thereto, to the Commissioner of Insurance, Commonwealth of Kentucky.

SECTION 8: This ordinance shall become effective on the first day of January, 1992.

Billions available for home repair grants & subsidized loans

Most homeowners are unaware that regardless of their income there are Federal, state and local programs that will help them repair and remodel their homes.

Government at all levels recognizes that neighborhoods are the basis of life in our country. When a neighborhood deteriorates, many things happen both physically and socially. Some of the other home improvements covered under these programs are: attic and wall insulation, new windows, outwall siding, security doors and locks, window guards, sidewalks and masonry work, bathrooms and

kitchens, electrical and plumbing work, new roofs, gutters or downspouts.

Consumer Education Research Center, a national non-profit consumer group, has just published Consumers Guide to Home Repair Grants and Subsidized Loans, a 208-page book which lists over 8,500 sources of loan and grant programs offered by all levels of government, utility companies and others, typical programs offered and eligibility requirements. Form letters for inquiries to these loan and grant sources are included as well as detailed instructions on determining your debt-to-income ratio for eligibility. The book can be obtained for \$10.95 plus \$2 shipping and handling from CERC Grants, 350 Scotland Road, Orange, New Jersey 07050 or by calling 1-800-USA-0121 for credit card order.

Robert L. Berko of CERC, tells us, "Some of these programs have no income ceiling and others allow income of as much as \$100,000 per year. There are even programs for which tenants are eligible and many allow loans or give grants to poor credit risks. One of the authors of this book received a \$5,000 New Jersey grant plus a \$4,000 interest free loan from his utility company. In many areas, people with disabilities can receive grants to pay for needed repairs such as access ramps and widening of doorways."

Since it is important that the work be done properly, the book describes in detail how to pick a reputable contractor, negotiate a contract and insure that work is done properly and for a fair price.

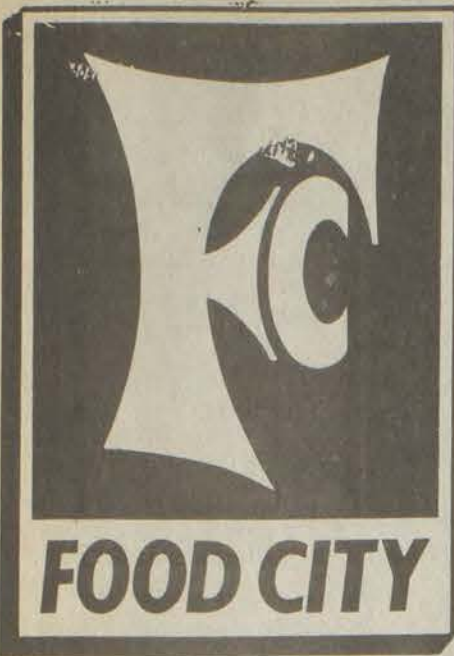

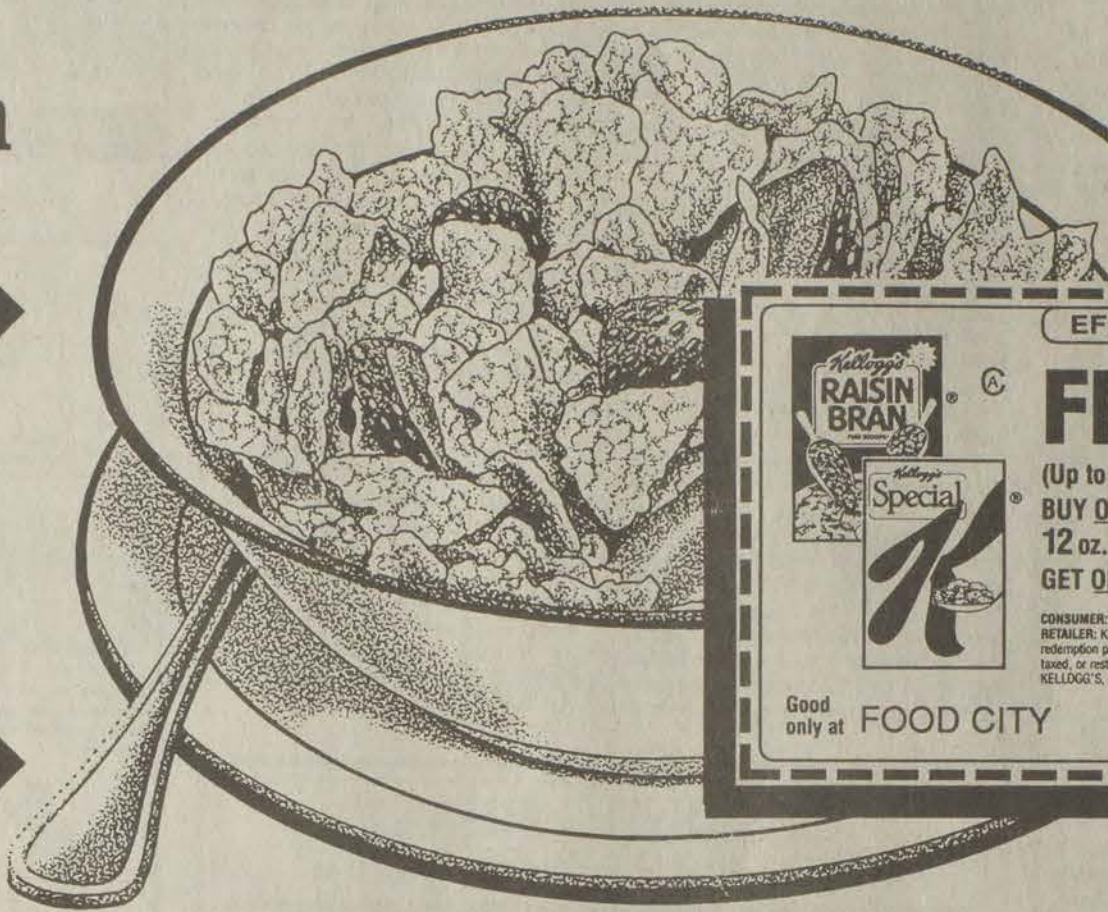
