Conspiracy alleged by pilots' association :

## Lawsuit greets new airport board

Six new members were appointed Tuesday to the Paintsville-Prestonsburg Airport Board and they immediately became the defendants in a lawsuit.

The new members, three from Prestonsburg and three from Paintsville, were appointed Tuesday at Combs Field by Mayors Ann Latta and John David Preston. They include Ted Narin, Sam Isbell, Dr. David White, Scott Perry, J.K. Wells and Mike Schmit.

No sooner had the new board

members taken their oaths of office than they were served with a lawsuit challenging the appointments. The complaint, filed by Paintsville attorney C.K. Belhasen, alleged that Latta and Preston were involved in "a conspiracy" to close the airstrip and to deprive a group known as the Floyd/Johnson County Pilots' Association of its due process rights.

Belhasen's suit contended that the new board appointments were "illegal" because they had not been approved by the city councils in

Paintsville and Prestonsburg, and he was expected to have received late Tuesday a temporary restraining order from Johnson Circuit Court blocking any actions by the new board.

Paintsville Mayor John David Preston countered Belhasen's claim, however, citing a state law which indicates members of joint city airport boards may be appointed jointly

by the mayors of participating cities and without city council approval.

The new board's only official action during the brief meeting Tuesday included the election of officers with Ted Nairn chosen as chairman and J.K. Wells selected as secretary/treasurer. Unofficially, the board asked that current financial statements and insurance policies be provided

for review at the next meeting, set for 4 p.m. November 12 at Combs Field.

Mayor Latta was also asked to obtain written commitments from state Transportation Cabinet Secretary Milo Bryant concerning Latta's recent meeting with Bryant. Latta said at Tuesday's meeting that Bryant had agreed to assist Paintsville and Prestonsburg in the pursuit of grants to pay off an estimated airport indebtedness of \$250,000 that would become due if the airport was closed.

Latta also indicated Tuesday eve-

ning that she had discussed use of the airport site with a potential industrial client, indicating there was "a substantial possibility of creating new jobs" on the site. She offered no specifics on the interested company.

Conflict over the future of Combs Field arose recently when Belhasen addressed the Prestonsburg City Council with a plea that the airstrip not be closed and converted into a joint industrial site. Latta has indicated that state officials have endorsed the closure of the airport.

## Expo will usher in holidays

Art exhibits by Floyd County high school students will also be on display and receptions will be held each Saturday for exhibitors.

- A talent search
- An elderhostel workshop
- Musical performances

Hepatitis cases dwindling :

## Virus outbreak under control

An outbreak of hepatitis in two areas of Floyd County appears to be under control, said Floyd County Health Department director Earl Compton.

The community of Dwale near Allen has had the most cases reported, approximately 20. Several cases have been reported in the Wheelwright area which prompted questions about the sanitary condition of the city's water supply, said Audrey Yates, business manager for the Wheelwright Utility Commission.

Yates said Tuesday that an inspection by the state's Division of Water in early October showed the commission's water supply to be in compliance with state regulations.

"We've had a lot of inquiries from concerned residents about our water supply," Yates said. "There's a lot of rumors going around. But, our inspection showed no hepatitis in our water."

Compton said Tuesday that the hepatitis virus could not be transmitted through a water system, due in part to the use of chlorine to purify the water.

"Hepatitis is not spread through

the water supply," Compton said. "It's not a water borne virus. Even if it was a water borne disease, there is so much chlorine in a water system it (the virus) would be killed before it could get out of the system."

The first cases of hepatitis showed up in the county in March, Compton said. The number of confirmed cases gradually increased over the summer and evolved into an outbreak.

"This was a slow outbreak," Compton said. "It came in from outside the state and was gradually passed from family to family. We think we

Emergency is declared :

## Fires spark call for aid

Governor Wallace Wilkinson is expected to declare an emergency in the eastern half of the state today due to an outbreak of forest fires. National Guardsmen are expected to be activated to the area once the order is signed, said a governor's spokesperson Tuesday.

Floyd County Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo and Prestonsburg Mayor Ann Latta declared a state of emergency Tuesday afternoon and have banned any burning the county or city.

State Department of Forestry officials declared a forest fire emergency in Floyd, Johnson, Pike, Magoffin, Martin and Lawrence counties Tuesday.

Forestry crews have been battling three major fires at Stephens Branch, Little Mud Creek and Stone Coal in Floyd County since Saturday. Approximately 350 acres have burned or are burning in the county, said Zondra Woods, a forestry department spokesperson.

National Guardsmen are expected to be involved in fighting the fires in the air by flying helicopters over the areas and dropping water, said Mike Molloy, executive director of the state's Disaster and Emergency Services. Molloy said that National Guardsmen would not be activated until the governor signs an emergency order.

Woods said that 78 fires have been reported in Floyd County since Friday and all are believed to be related to arson. A spotter plane used by the department was unable to fly over the area Monday and Tuesday due to heavy smoke.

Many local fire departments have not had an unusual number of fires

reported. Cow Creek, Left Beaver, Martin, Southeast and Prestonsburg fire departments had had from one to six fires reported in their district by Tuesday. Wayland, Auxier and Allen fire departments did not have any

## Patton says court order is erroneous

Floyd County Commonwealth Attorney Jerry Patton has filed a motion in circuit court asking that a controversial court order be amended.

Patton has asked in his motion that a final court judgment in a case involving confessed drug trafficker James Dale Mosley be changed to correct what Patton called "a typographical error."

Patton said this week the final order indicated that Mosley had been handed a five-year probated sentence on charges of trafficking in cocaine "on the recommendation of the Commonwealth," but he said he made no such recommendation in the case.

"...In fact," Patton's motion said, "the Commonwealth clearly objected to the Defendant being probated in this case, both at the entry of the Defendant's guilty plea and when the Defendant was sentenced in this case."

Patton has asked in his motion that the final order be amended "clarifying that the Commonwealth objected to the Defendant being probated..."

## Theft ring snapped

Two adults and one juvenile were arrested Monday in connection with a four-county theft ring, Floyd County Chief Deputy Linzie Hunt said Tuesday.

Alvin "Tiger" Branham, 20, of Auxier was charged with theft by unlawful taking for allegedly taking a dirt bike belonging to Lorrie Slone of David. The motorcycle was recovered by the sheriff's department.

Also arrested were Ronnie Spradlin of Prestonsburg and a 17-year-old Wayland juvenile, Hunt said. Other arrests are pending, he added.

The sheriff's department and Kentucky State Police have been investigating the theft of motorcycles, videocassette recorders, televisions and typewriters in Floyd, Johnson, Pike and Magoffin counties, Hunt said.

"We've been investigating this ring for about a month," Hunt said Tuesday. "We expect to have several more arrests in the case. The ring has been operating in this area for about two and a half months."

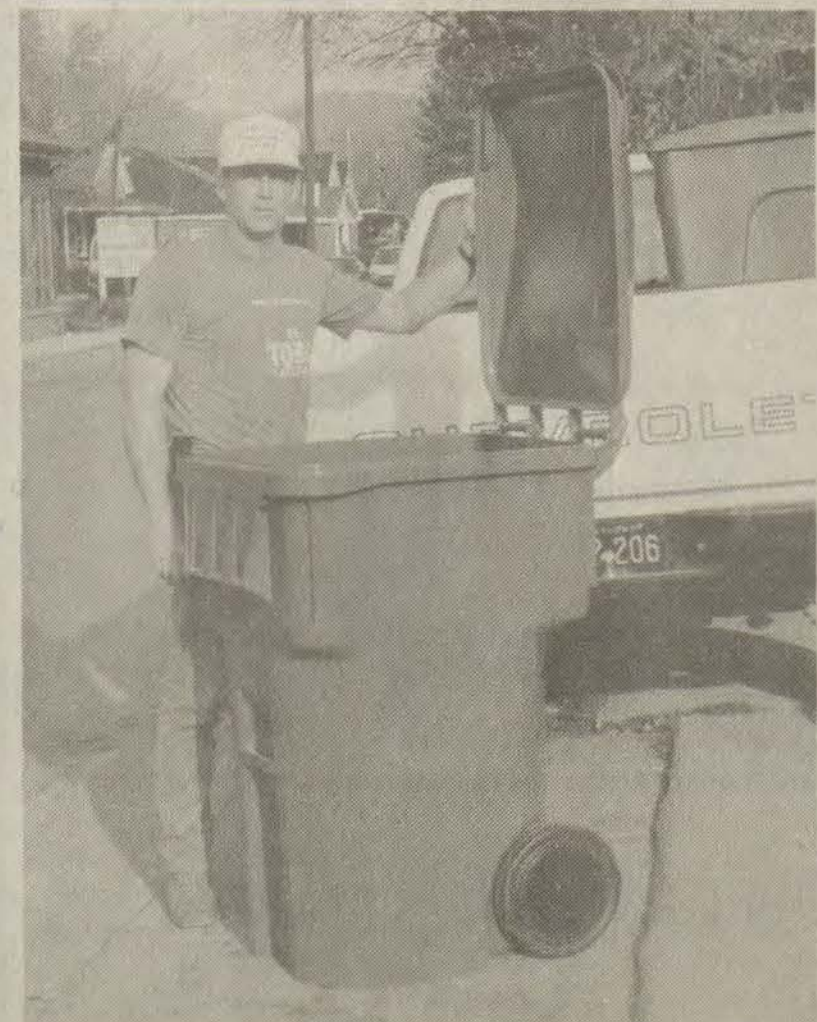
In a development unrelated to the arrests, the department also recovered a dollar bill change machine stolen from Prestonsburg High School earlier this month.

### Grants go to two county groups

Auxier Fire Department and Allen Park were recipients of state grants last week totaling \$81,703.97.

A \$71,703.97 grant from the state's Area Development Fund was awarded to Floyd County for improvements at the Allen park golf course and to pave the walking track. The Big Sandy Area Development District board of directors recommended the project to the department.

A \$10,000 grant to the Auxier Volunteer Fire Department will go toward the purchase of a fire truck for that community. The grant will be combined with \$28,000 in local funds for the purchase. With the addition of the new truck, the I.S.O. rating of the department's coverage area is expected to drop from ten to eight.

# Place your garbage can orders now

City officials are taking orders now for new residential and commercial garbage containers which could make Prestonsburg cleaner and safer—all for a low monthly fee.

Council agreed Monday evening to purchase the containers, at a price of \$53.49 each, from Auto Industries, Inc. and to offer them to residential customers of the city's sanitation department for a fee of \$2 per month. Commercial customers will be charged \$15 per month.

City public works supervisor Mike Meade said Monday that orders for the containers will be taken through this Friday, November 1. Meade said the plastic, wheeled containers would

help cut down on litter in the city, provide a safer handling system for sanitation department employees, and provide an easier method of curbside disposal for homeowners and businesses.

Residential customers are being asked to participate voluntarily in the container program while commercial customers who do not use larger dumpsters will be required to participate. Public housing units within the city have already agreed to use the new system.

In other business during council's second regular monthly meeting Monday, the panel:

- approved a fund-raising roadblock for Prestonsburg High School girls

basketball for November 9;

- adopted an ordinance requiring an update on the city's code of ordinances;

- approved, on a 7-1 vote, a city fire department policy dealing with electrical hazards. Councilman Charles Hale voted "no;"

- approved standard operating procedures for fire department hose testing; and

- approved closure of an Archer Park bridge and a bid of \$70,000 from Bush and Burchett for replacement of that span.

Council also recognized city fire chief Tom Blackburn, who recently marked his 25th year as a member of the city fire department. Blackburn returned the favor to councilman William O. Goebel, naming Goebel an honorary fire chief in recognition of the councilman's involvement with

the city department.

Council closed the regular business session with an executive session to "discuss personnel." No action was reported from the closed meeting.

All members were present for the October 28 session.

Floyd community wins in nation's capital :

## Harold to get FM radio frequency

A new FM radio frequency was approved for the Harold area by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) in Washington, D.C. last week, beating out two requests to award it in Pike County.

Harold businessman Paul Gearheart on behalf of Inter-Mountain Broadcasting Company persuaded the FCC to allot the frequency in that community rather than in Belfry in Pike County. Ed Billips, d/b/a Belfry Broadcasting and Floyd County Broadcasting Company, licensee of station WMDJ in Martin, were pushing to have the additional frequency allocated for Belfry.

FCC's decision to allocate the frequency in Harold, however, does not give preference to Inter-Mountain for the channel, said Dan J. Alpert, a Washington attorney who specializes in representing and acquiring new broadcast stations.

Alpert said Friday that applications for the frequency will be taken by the FCC from December 10 until January 9, 1992.

"Realistically, nearly all applicants file on the very last day," Alpert said. "At the present time, there are no applicants for the frequency."

Alpert explained that after the filing deadline has passed, applications will be designated for a comparative hearing before an FCC Administrative Law Judge and only one applicant will be chosen.

Preference is given to applicants who do not own any other broadcast interests; and whose owners promise to actually work at the proposed station once it is constructed and is operational.

For owners who will work at the station, additional preferences are given to owners who are members of minority groups; are female; who have past broadcasting experience; are local residents; and who are involved in civic activities.

In the FCC report, Belfry Broadcasting and Floyd County Broadcasting Co. argued that Belfry should receive the frequency because of its population; because the county's largest high school is located there; and that several Pike County government agencies were located in that town. The two companies contended that Harold was not a community; it doesn't have a government of its own; and it lacks any governmental services.

Inter-Mountain countered that Harold is growing at a rapid rate; it lists 50 businesses in the community; and it has its own post office, elementary school, and four churches.

Inter-Mountain's proposal also said that no transmitter site exists in

Belfry which can be used to serve Belfry without unacceptable shadowing. The statement alleged that a tower of 1,000 feet in height would not be enough to overcome severe diffraction losses at Belfry.

FCC officers decided that Harold showed a population of 600 and that it need not provide every public service, such as police, fire protection, water and electricity services on its own in order to merit community status.

"We believe the public interest would be served by allotting Channel 285A to Harold, Kentucky, as that community's first local service," the

report said.

The frequency would be located at 104.9 on the FM dial.



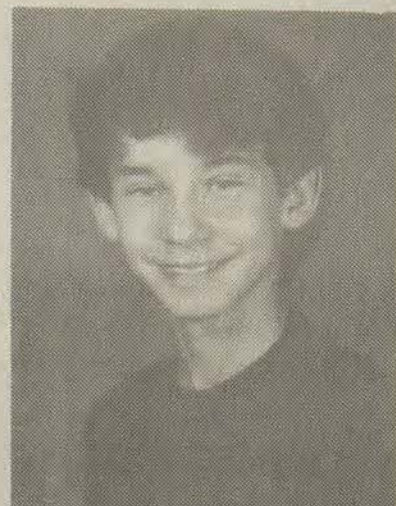

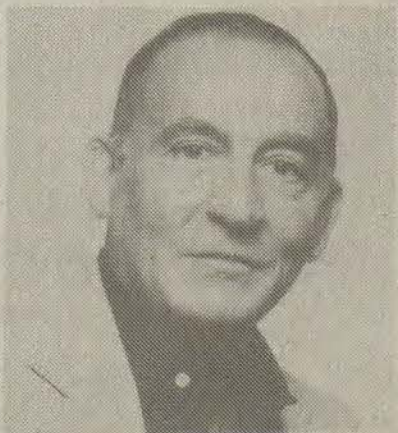

## Coffee Break

By this time next week the election guesswork will be over and a brand new batch of state officials will be raring to go into office and to begin their important state duties which, for most, involves campaigning for the next election. In Kentucky politics, continuity, not quality, is job one.

That counts on both sides of the ballot.

Fewer than half of Kentucky's registered voters routinely decide who will run and who will be elected to state offices, and many of those voters make their decisions on a basis of who they think will win rather than by deciding who should win.

This election isn't likely to be any different, nor is the next.

After all, we've got an image to maintain.

As a rule, we don't make endorsements in local races because, more often than not, local voters are well enough informed about their choices to make their decisions without our input.

• Am I voting for the candidate most qualified for the job?  
That's all there is to it.

As you might well imagine, we lose a lot of votes to political machines and good 'ol boy networks which don't count on a whole lot of people answering that question honestly.

Try it on for size yourself this coming Tuesday and see what a difference you can make.

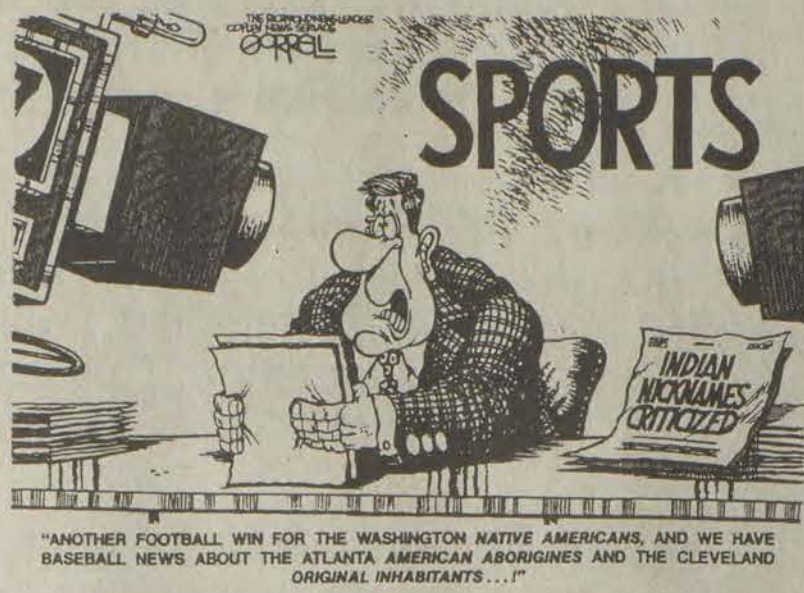

## Report to Kentucky

by Senator Wendell Ford

### JOBLESS KENTUCKIANS STILL NEED UNEMPLOYMENT BILL

"It's a recession when your neighbor loses his job, but it's a depression when you lose yours."

With the Kentucky unemployment rate having reached 7.7 percent in a continuing recession, approximately 200,000 Kentuckians know exactly what Harry Truman meant when he made that statement many years ago.

They are among more than 10 million Americans, counting discouraged workers not officially listed as unemployed, who are now without jobs in this recession. The ranks of the unemployed continue to grow by more than 200,000 a month.

Many of these struggling Americans recently suffered yet another setback when the President vetoed our latest unemployment bill and the Senate fell two votes short of the two-thirds majority needed to override this unfortunate action.

This vote was especially disappointing in view of one simple fact: Our federal government is sitting on an \$8 billion surplus in a trust fund created exclusively to assist hard-working Americans who have lost jobs through no fault of their own.

Our bill would have provided this sorely needed assistance. It offered up to 20 weeks of extended benefits for more than three million Americans who have already exhausted regular unemployment benefits in this recession.

The current trust-fund surplus is more than enough to meet this need—a need very similar to those met by Presidents Eisenhower, Kennedy, Nixon and Ford in previous recessions.

We have created an unemployment safety net, and I believe that we are going back on a promise by pull-

ing this net out from under millions of struggling families when they need it most.

We can't meet any of our domestic obligations by turning away from unemployed Americans while offering billions of dollars worth of emergency assistance to Egypt, Turkey, Kuwait and other nations around the world.

Determined Americans have always found a way to overcome our problems in a changing world—and we will overcome the problems we face today.

But we won't do it by using our unemployment trust fund to hide the true size of the federal budget deficit. We won't do it by withholding economic remedies when median household income in this nation is actually falling for the first time since 1982.

We won't end this recession with policies virtually ensuring that millions of job-seeking families will be unable to meet mortgage payments or make the most essential purchases during this difficult period in our national life.

We don't need to make economic scapegoats of the unemployed. We need to work together for far-sighted and fair-minded economic policies, including a sound unemployment bill, and we need to do it now.

It is time for a national dialogue on the economic policies of this nation, and I urge all Kentuckians to make their voices heard with regard to unemployment insurance and other issues of vital importance to all Americans.

## McConnell's Comments

### Confirmation of Judge Clarence Thomas

Outrage. That was the operative word this last week as Americans viewed the spectacle that was the confirmation of Judge Clarence Thomas as an Associate Justice to the Supreme Court of the United States. An already scandalous confirmation process became a circus after confidential FBI documents concerning sexual harassment were leaked to the media.

Despite the tortuous, marathon Judiciary Committee hearings to hear testimony over the sexual charge, the Senate voted on Tuesday to confirm Clarence Thomas. I voted in favor of Judge Thomas. The 52-48 vote, though not resounding, was a clear victory for those who value the fundamental right of all Americans to due process.

In America, people—even Supreme Court nominees—are innocent until proven guilty. Denying Judge Thomas's confirmation based on an unproven allegation would be a dangerous precedent and contrary to established American principles of justice. Keeping this in mind, I carefully followed the latest hearings.

I believe Clarence Thomas. The charges leveled against him were not consistent with the Clarence Thomas the Senate had voted to confirm to high office on four previous occasions.

In reaching this decision, I took into account the latest hearings, earlier testimony of 100 witnesses, and the 36,000 pages of documents which have been provided during the course of this nomination process. I supported Judge Thomas because of his professional qualifications, his distinguished record, his ethical propriety, and his sound judicial temperament which make him uniquely qualified to serve as a Supreme Court Justice.

I do not discount the seriousness of sexual harassment. It was a serious charge, and it remains a serious

issue. Sexual harassment is deplorable, destructive, and illegal. That is why I adopted for my office a strict policy against sexual harassment, recommended by the Capitol Hill Women's Political Caucus, long before it became fashionable to do so.

It is important to note the chaos which surrounded the Thomas nomination from the very beginning, and particularly in the last week. From the outset, certain special interest groups vowed to "Bork" him. They set the adversarial tone of these proceedings and it was appalling. The release by Senate staff of confidential documents to the press describing the sexual harassment charge was the culmination of this concerted effort to discredit and destroy Judge Clarence Thomas—at any cost.

Americans understandably viewed this spectacle with a profound sense of disgust. These highly unethical, and possibly illegal, leaks to the media must not go unpunished. Such scurrilous behavior has forever tarnished the reputation of at least two people. Further, it threatens the integrity of the entire nomination process, and the judiciary system.

Whoever leaked the confidential FBI documents established a dangerous precedent in which anonymous character assassination can be an effective means of short-circuiting the nomination process. As a result, I introduced legislation which will hold the executive and legislative branches to the same standard as the general public. This legislation would make it a criminal offense to unlawfully disclose an FBI background report and could result in a prison term and substantial fines to anyone guilty of this offense.

I plan to work together with all of my colleagues to restore the integrity to our system and ensure that Americans are not further harmed by calculated leaks.

have it under control now. No new cases have been reported in about a week and a half. Each time we had a confirmed report we took immediate action."

Once a case is reported to the health department, usually by a physician, department nurses will immediately make a home visit and explain proper sanitizing procedures to prevent the disease from spreading. Household members are immunized against the virus. Families that are affected by the virus are advised not to visit with other families for approximately three weeks.

The disease is spread by either eating or drinking after a family member who is infected or through unsanitary conditions, Compton said. "We explain to the families that

they shouldn't eat or drink after one another and especially that children should wash their hands after going to the bathroom," Compton said. "But, people don't always listen. It's hard to make children understand. We also teach families how to properly sanitize their homes."

Compton said the department has made several visits to Allen Elementary to educate the students about how the disease is spread.

There are five types of the hepatitis virus, said health department nurse Carrie Branham, types A, B, C, D, and E. The majority of the cases in Floyd County have been type A, Branham said.

Symptoms include: nausea, vomiting, loss of appetite, muscle and joint aches, yellow skin, yellow eyes,

dark urine, abdominal pain, and skin rashes and itching.

Branham said that not all of the symptoms have to be present before it can be confirmed as hepatitis by a laboratory blood test.

## Tucker Passes For 207 Yards In 29-22 Win

Coach Bill Letton's Prestonsburg Blackcats assured themselves a place in the upcoming playoffs with a thrilling come-from-behind win over a very tough Morgan County team Friday night at Morgan County.

The game was played under ideal weather conditions as the tempera-

tures were in the 60's. Two years ago when the Blackcats played at Morgan County, temperatures were freezing and blankets were in demand. But it was the strong arm of Blackcat quarterback Aaron Tucker that led Prestonsburg to their fifth consecutive win and fifth district victory to

assure them of a spot in the high school football playoffs.

Prestonsburg can finish either first or third in the district. Currently, the Blackcats are holding to first place even though the Sheldon Clark Cardinals are also 5-1 in district play. Prestonsburg holds the edge by vir-

tue of their win two weeks ago over the Cardinals.

Tucker passed for 207 yards, unofficially, as Prestonsburg collected 407 total yardage. The Blackcats rushed for 200 yards on 38 carries in the game.

It was a 35-yard completion pass to tight end James Derossett, with 1:52 left in the game, on an option play that saved the game for Prestonsburg. Tucker had been going to John Thomas Clark all night and for good yardage. Clark had five receptions in the game for 133 yards and the Pirates were trying to cover the split end. On the option, trailing 22-21, Tucker found Derossett all alone up the middle and threw a perfect strike to the big end as he lumbered his way into the end zone. Dwayne Garza ran the two point conversion to put the Prestonsburg squad in front 29-22.

"We had been going to John (Clark) most of the night and we figured that Morgan County would have him covered," explained Derossett of his catch. "So, it was an option play where Aaron could have gone either to John or myself. They had coverage on John and that left me open." Derossett was quick to point out it was the blocking of the offensive line that created the play. "David Thacker and others did a great job for us."

Hung heads were noticeable among the Prestonsburg faithful who traveled to West Liberty for the top district match up. Morgan County trailed Prestonsburg 21-16 entering the final quarter and Prestonsburg with the football. The Cats had just picked up a first down on a 5 yard run by Tucker moving the football to the Morgan County 19 yard line. On first play from scrimmage, Garza fumbled the football and Morgan County recovered on their own 25 yard line with 11:25 left in the all important game to both clubs.

Morgan County used up a lot of time as they controlled the football for seven minutes and forty-three seconds scoring with 3:42 left in the game. Morgan County quarterback Chalmers Adams scored on a keeper from 1 yard out to put the host team up by one point, 22-21.

Morgan County tried to kick the ball to the sidelines on the ensuing kick off to the Blackcats. However, the ball did not travel the required yardage and a 5 yard penalty was tacked on the second try. The second kick wasn't any better as the ball went out of bounds on the 50 yard line. Prestonsburg, figuring they

couldn't get any better field position, elected to decline the penalty and take over the football at midfield. Fullback John Goble carried for a 5 yard pickup moving the ball to the 45. Tucker connected with Josh Hyden for a 10 yard gainer placing the football on the Morgan County 35 yard line. Garza moved to the 30 with a 5 yard pickup but an offside call against the Blackcats moved the ball back to the 35 yard line for a second-and-ten play. On the option play Tucker hit Derossett with the game winning pass.

Morgan County had ample time to move the football upfield as they took over on their own 42 yard with 1:55 left in the game. But it was the Blackcats' defense that rose to the occasion in the final 1:55 as Morgan County, who did manage to get into Prestonsburg territory, had to turn the ball over to Prestonsburg on downs.

"We kept our poise," said Blackcat mentor Coach Letton. "We came fighting back and never quit. We had run the play (game winning play) three times in the game with Clark. We had an option of whom to throw the pass to and James was open."

Letton said that his ball club was still giving up the big plays to the opposition, something they need to improve on. Coach Letton in comparing his team's improved play in the second half of the season as compared to the first half when they struggled early, was a "matter of coming together as a ball club, getting some experience and maturing."

"We have several sophomores on this club that has matured for us. Dwayne (Garza), Brian (Elliot) and Hyden (Seth) all have improved. James Derossett certainly has improved at the end position after having been a lineman most of the time. I feel that we are getting better each week and we have been fortunate. We just hope that we continue to do that."

Prestonsburg took a 7-0 first quarter lead on a 4 yard run by Tucker in a drive from the Morgan County 48 yard line that took five plays. Tucker hit Clark with a 35 yard pass completion to begin the drive.

Morgan County made it an 8-7 game when Derrick Finch carried the ball into the end zone from 8 yards out and Mike Perry added the two-point conversion. The drive began on the Morgan County 29 yard line and totaled 71 yards on seven plays.

Prestonsburg took a 13-8 halftime lead to the locker room with them on

and Robbie Sexton returned the football three times for 27 yards. Slone had five punts for 95 yards.

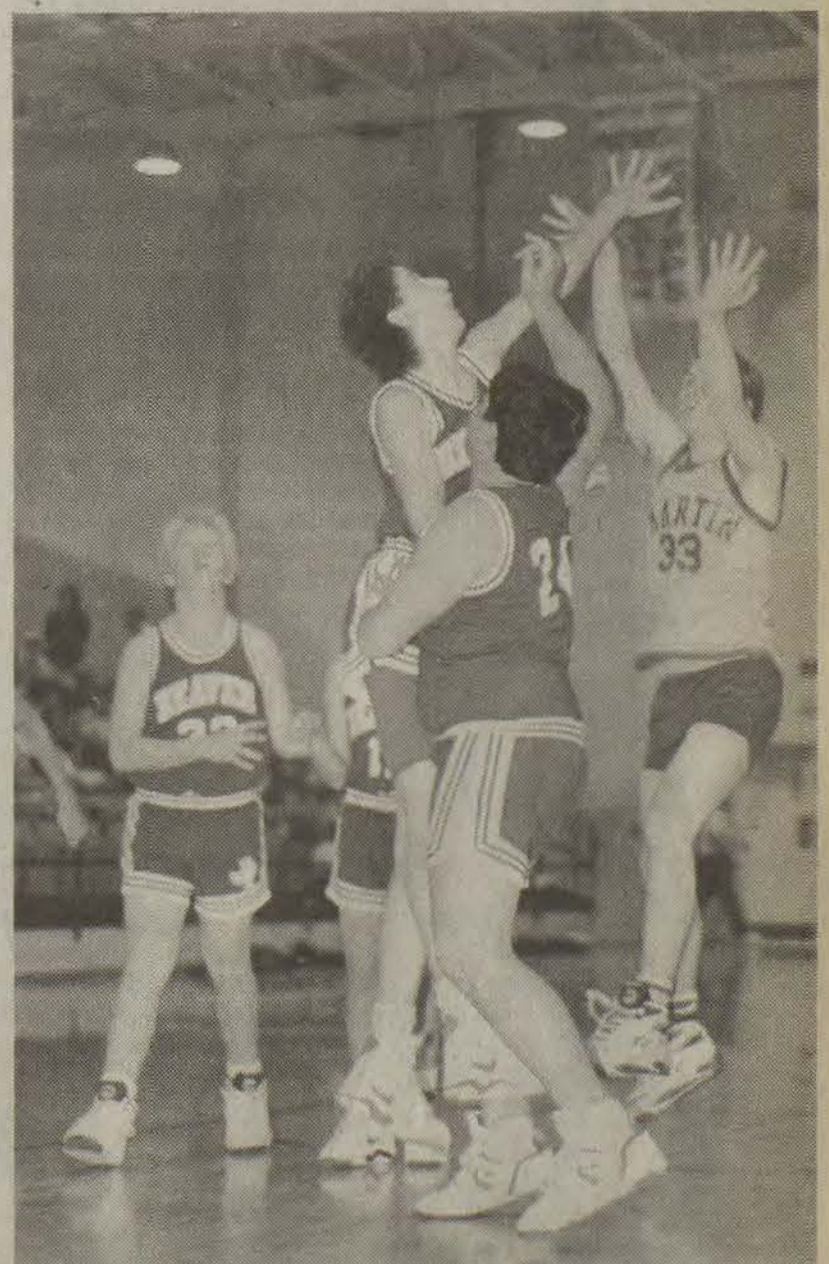

The Rebels held Leslie County scoreless in the third quarter, the first time the Rebels have been able to do that this season.

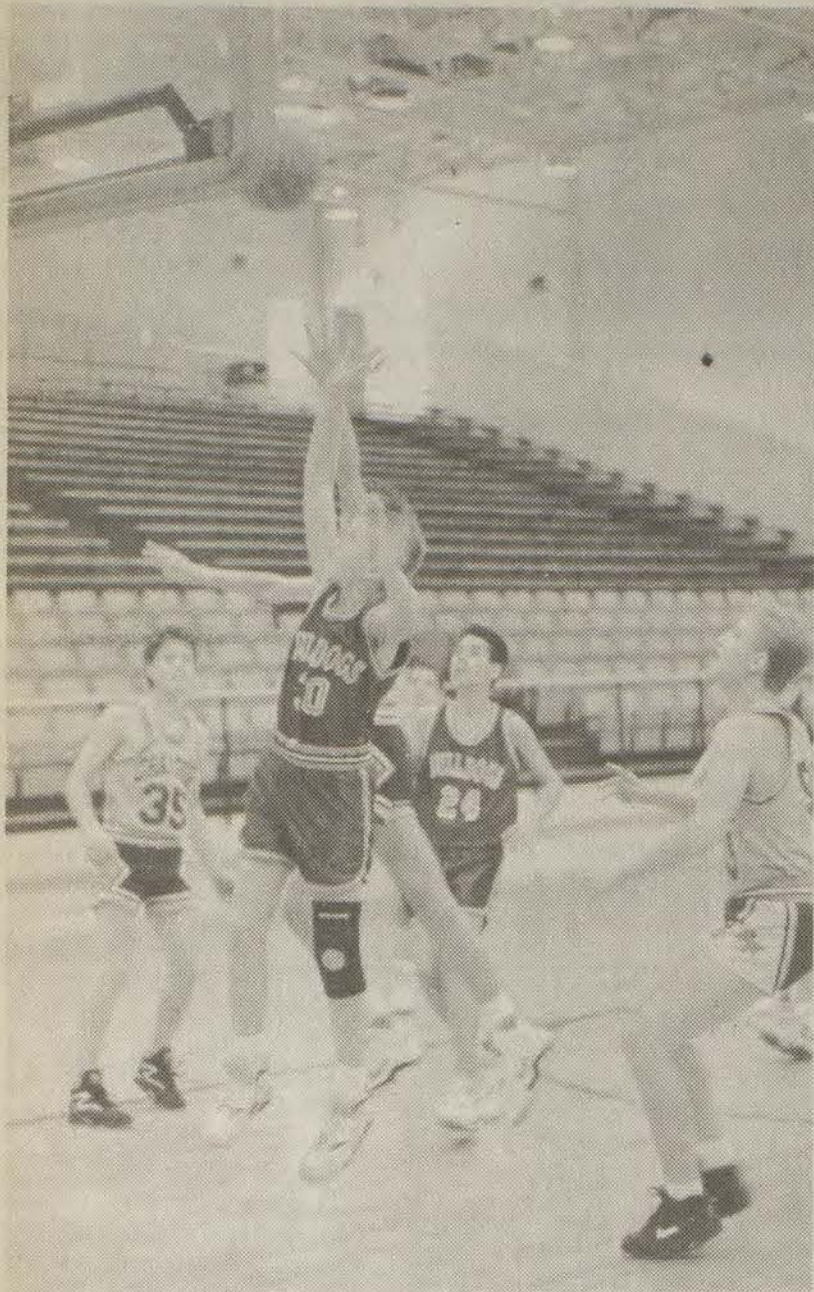
"We played against their first string players too," said Jamerson. "We just played better defense and our intensity was higher."

# Kentucky Afield

## WHAT DO YOU PAY?

Do you enjoy some form of wildlife-related recreation in Kentucky? Are you an angler? Hunter? Birder? Hiker? Outdoor photographer? Wildlife watcher?

If you enjoy one or several of these outdoor pursuits, you belong to the majority. Seventy-five percent of all Kentuckians participate in some form of outdoor recreation related to wildlife.

But do you know who pays for wildlife recreational opportunities in the commonwealth?

Anglers and hunters know. They pay.

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, which is charged with protecting and conserving the commonwealth's wildlife resources for sport, recreation, food and commerce, gets its revenue to carry out this mandate primarily from sportsmen who purchase hunting and fishing licenses. Sportsmen, however, represent only one-third of Kentucky's wildlife-resource users.

This means the minority pays for wildlife recreation the majority enjoys.

## What do you pay?

Kentucky's fish and wildlife department, which receives no general fund tax dollars, is concerned with much more than fish and game. It carries out work with endangered and threatened species and other wildlife not hunted or fished, in addition to its more familiar stocking and restoration programs. The department manages 60 public wildlife areas for everyone to enjoy. And the agency routinely offers, at no cost to users, numerous informational publications, technical guidance on pond management and developing wildlife habitat areas as well as provides knowledgeable personnel to speak to conservation clubs and other organizations.

Educating Kentuckians about

Kentucky's wildlife has been an important department effort since the late 1940s. Currently, more than 100,000 fifth and sixth graders learn conservation ethics and practices each year through the department's conservation education program in schools across the state. Each summer three conservation camps are filled to capacity with 6,500 youngsters who have opportunities to participate in nature studies and gain skills in fishing, casting, swimming, safe boating, first aid and archery and firearms safety.

These represent only a few of the programs and services provided year after year by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources—programs and services which benefit all Kentuckians but are financed solely by anglers and hunters.

## IT COSTS YOU NOTHING

Did you know deer check station operators are volunteers?

Each year, thousands of harvested Kentucky whitetails are checked by volunteers who aren't paid a penny for their services. During this November alone, hunters will bring about 60,000 deer to official deer check stations where volunteers fill out game check cards, one for each animal.

These volunteers obviously play a vital role in helping the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources keep track of what's happening with the state's deer herd—at no cost to the department or sportsmen.

Many volunteers run deer check stations from small businesses they own such as mini-marts, filling stations, rural grocery stores, "mom & pop" shops and sporting goods outlets. And good business calls for putting customers first. So, if you have to wait your turn to have your deer checked because the owner is waiting on customers, be patient. All you're out is a little time.

Remember, a hearty "thank you" is always welcome and purchasing items from the business helps the owner to continue offering that location as a deer check station.

## SCOUTING FOR DEER

Experienced deer hunters know preseason scouting pays off.

Being in the right place at the right time rarely happens by chance. It takes planning and effort to successfully (and legally) harvest a whitetail, even though Kentucky has plenty of the animals.

One of the first things a deer hunter needs to do, besides boning up on hunting regulations, is contact landowners and get permission not only for hunting but for scouting that land several times before the hunting season opens. If the locations are near your home, so much the better, because you'll be able to go more often and spend more time on them.

Since deer are most active early and late in the day, you're probably planning to hunt during those times. And logically, that's when you'll do most of your preseason scouting. (Let's make sure we know what "preseason" means. Deer tend to change feeding and traveling patterns seasonally, so it's a good idea to begin your scouting activities about four weeks before the season opens or no more than a month before you plan to hunt.)

Look for well-used trails as well as feeding and resting areas. Large depressions in grass and hairs caught on trees or fences are good deer signs.

If the air conditioning were turned off in the Houston Astrodome, the entrance of warm humid air could cause it to rain in the stadium.

# Bassin' with the Pros

## BAITFISH MIGRATE BEFORE BASS DO

Have you ever wondered why the most reliable autumn bass pattern is fishing the backs of tributary creeks? "It's because that's where the baitfish are," explains Johnson Outboards

Pro Staff angler Randy Fite. "The shad have migrated up from deeper water to find more agreeable conditions, and the bass have followed them." Baitfish, according to Fite, who, as a professional guide has studied them for years, are more sensitive

to temperature and oxygen changes than bass are and thus migrate sooner. "In late summer," he explains, "the oxygen levels improve in the tributaries because of the flowing water, and also because this water is cooler, the shad begin to migrate up from deeper main lake points and channels and into the creeks.

"Because this is the main food supply of the largemouth bass, they follow with a migration of their own within a few days." An opposite migration occurs later in the early part of winter, continues the Johnson pro, when colder temperatures in the creeks push the baitfish — and the bass — back toward deeper water.

"Sometimes baitfish also migrate during the day from place to place," adds Fite, "going from the mouth of a creek out to the edge of a treeline a quarter mile away, or from a deep channel up onto a shallow flat. "The things that make them move are changing water conditions, so when they begin to move, the entire school of bait moves, and you can see them on a depthfinder. Largemouth bass often follow underneath the baitfish, or close behind them." This autumn when you begin fishing the backs of creeks, Fite suggests looking for baitfish before you even begin fishing. Because the water will be relatively shallow, you'll usually see the shad pushed ahead of your boat.

"One of the things professional bass anglers always pay attention to, no matter where or how they're fishing," Fite notes, "is the activity of baitfish. If we see a single shad flip out of the water, or start skipping across the surface, we know bass are nearby, and we'll often toss a plastic worm right out to that spot. "We don't always have to see the baitfish, either," he continues. "If we see herons feeding along the shorelines or on shallow flats, we also know baitfish are present.

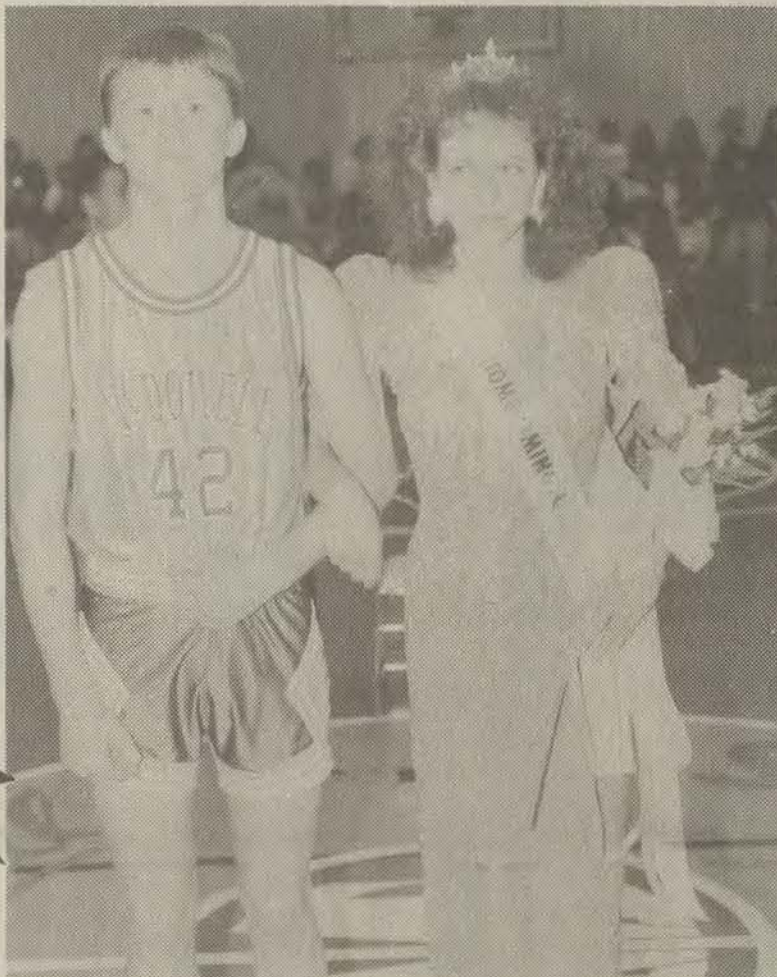

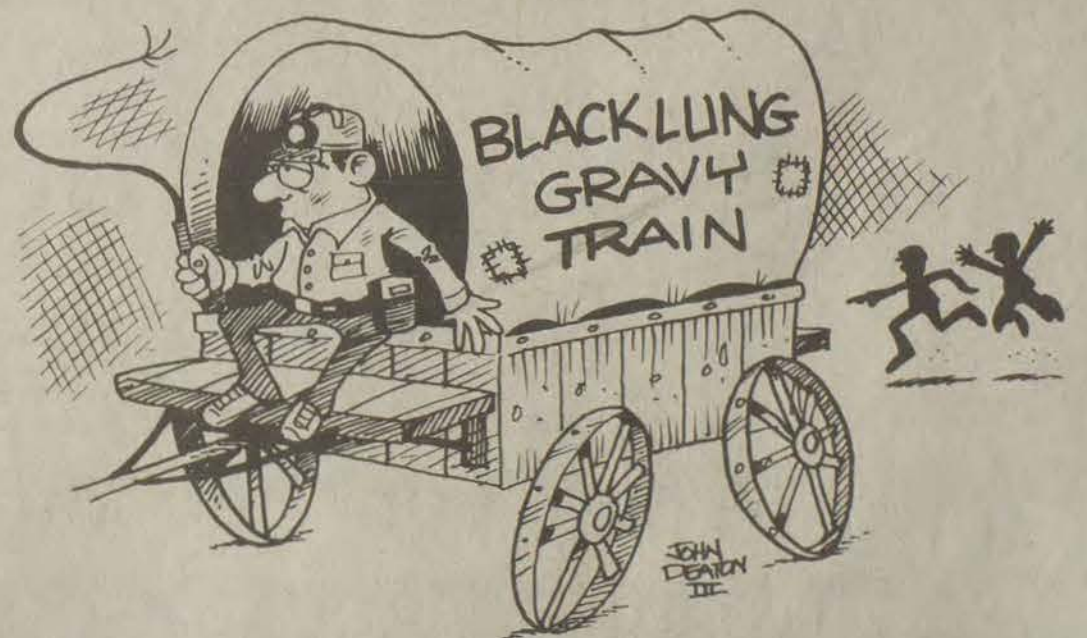

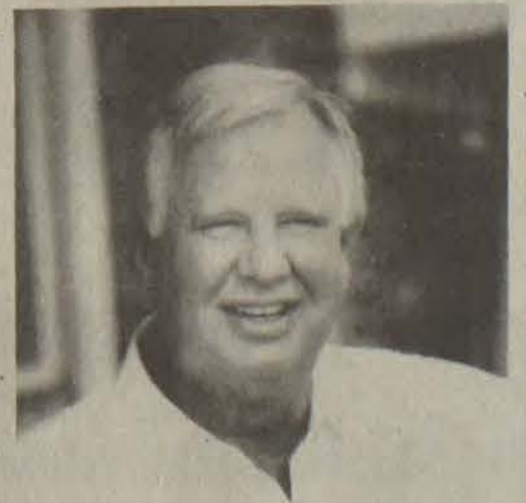

### PITINO PLEASED WITH EARLY WORK

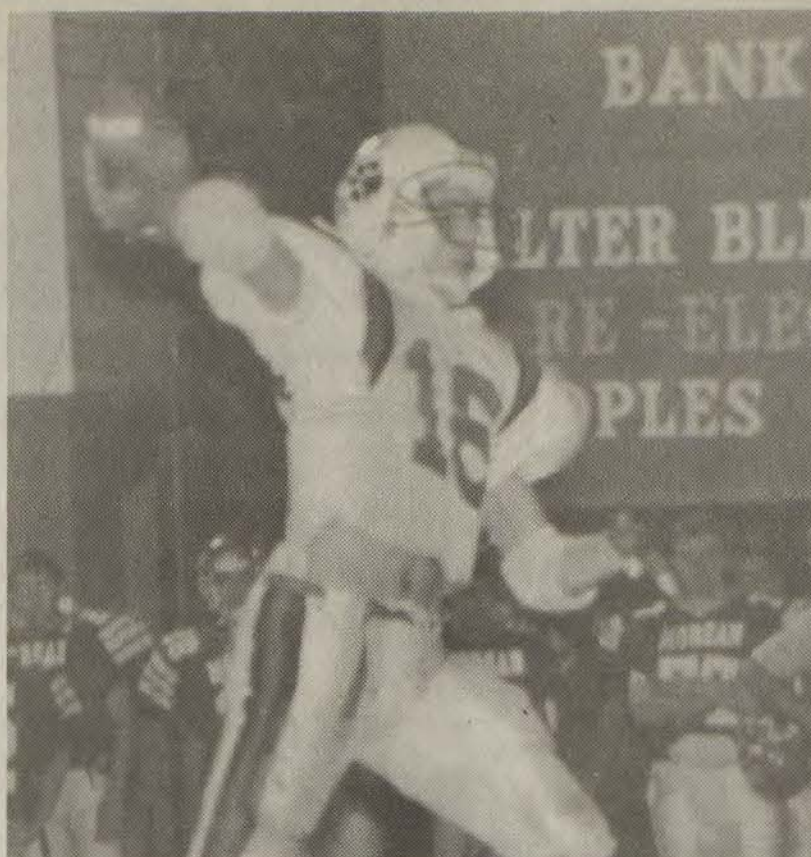

## TACO TOSSED SALAD

(for all couch potatoes)  
1 lb. ground beef  
1/2 c. taco sauce  
1 c. epsom salts  
1 small head of lettuce, torn into bite size

1 med. green pepper, cut into strips  
1 1/2 c. pitted ripe olives  
1 med. tomato, cut into 8 wedges  
2 c. shredded cheddar cheese  
1 pkg. taco-flavored tortilla chips, crumbled

1/2 c. thousand island dressing  
Cook and stir ground beef over medium heat until light brown, drain. Stir in taco sauce and epsom salts, heat. Toss lettuce, green peppers, tomato wedges, olives, cheese and chips. Spoon mixture and salad dressing over lettuce. Garnish with dried bats eyes, if desired. This will put the couch potato on the move!

## SALEM CHEESECAKE

3 tbsp. margarine  
3/4 c. graham-cracker crumbs  
2 c. molded cream cheese  
2 green eggs  
2 tbsp. flour  
1/2 c. stale yogurt  
2 tsp. vanilla  
Spray 9-inch pie plate with cook-

ing spray, set aside. In a small bowl, melt margarine on HIGH for 43 seconds to 1 minute. Stir in graham-cracker crumbs. Press into bottom and about 1 inch up sides of pie plate. In medium bowl cook molded cream cheese on MEDIUM-LOW 3 to 4 minutes, until softened, stirring once during cooking. Beat in sugar, then remaining ingredients. Cook on

HIGH 4 to 6 minutes, until mixture is hot and begins to thicken, stirring often during cooking. Spoon into prepared pie shell. On microwave rack cook cheesecake on MEDIUM 5 to 8 minutes, until softly set, rotating dish twice during cooking. Let stand in dish 30 minutes. Refrigerate cheesecake about 3 hours or until set and chilled.

## PAELLA PRONTO

1 tbsp. oil  
2 lb. bat wings  
1/2 lb. large shrimp  
2 pkgs. rice and Spanish sauce mix  
1 pkg. frozen green beans

In a 12-inch skillet over medium-high heat, in hot oil, cook bat wings in batches until brown on all sides, about 15 minutes. Meanwhile shell shrimp. Do not devein. Into skillet with bat wings stir rice and Spanish-sauce mix and 4 cups water, over high heat to boiling. Reduce heat to low, cover and simmer 5 minutes. Stir in shrimp and frozen green beans; over high heat; heat to boiling. Reduce heat to low, cover and simmer 10 minutes, or until bat wings are fork-tender, shrimp turn pink, and water is absorbed, stirring occasionally. Makes 4 servings.

## HARTY HALLOWEEN CHILI

1 med. green pepper chopped  
2 med. onions, chopped  
1 tbsp. oil  
1 lb. lizard tails chopped  
3 tbsp. flour  
2 tbsp. oil  
2 cans whole tomatoes  
2 c. bat livers, chopped  
1 can tomato sauce  
10 tbsp. chili powder  
3 c. salt

Cook and stir peppers and onion in 1 tablespoon oil in a Dutch oven over medium heat until onions are tough. Remove from Dutch oven. Coat chopped lizard tails with flour, brown in 2 tablespoons oil.

Stir in tomatoes, bat livers tomato sauce, chili powder, green pepper mixture and salt. Cover and simmer, stirring occasionally, until lizard tails are tender, about 1 week.

NOTE: if desired more salt can be used.

## BLACK BOTTOM PIE

1 graham pie shell  
2 boxes instant pudding mix, vanilla  
1 carton whipped topping  
1 cup 30 weight motor oil  
Pour the motor oil into the pie crust. Let it absorb as much as pos-

sible. Blot with a paper towel. Mix the instant pudding as directed using water instead of the milk called for. Pour the pudding mixture into the pie shell. Top with whipped cream topping. Freeze until time to serve to prevent the oil from coloring the pudding.

## GRASSHOPPER PARFAITS

12 grasshoppers  
1/4 c. milk  
1/2 tsp. vanilla  
4 to 6 drops peppermint extract  
1/2 c. frozen whipped topping, thawed

4 to 6 drops green food color  
2 tbsp. chocolate-cookie crumbs  
In medium bowl cook grasshoppers and milk, covered on HIGH for 1 1/2 to 2 minutes, until melted, stirring half way through cooking. Stir in vanilla. Refrigerate 15 to 20 minutes until mixture cools and thickens slightly, stirring occasionally, with rubber spatula. Fold whipped topping into grasshopper mixture, divide in half. To one half add peppermint extract and food color. Spoon into 4 parfait glasses, cookie crumbs, white and green grasshopper mixture, alternately.

## CUSTARD MERINGUE PIE

1-1/2 c. thick molasses  
4 tbsp. flour  
1/2 c. salt  
3 green egg yolks  
3 c. blinky milk  
3 tbsp. tallar  
1 tsp. vanilla

Combine molasses, flour, salt and mix well. Add beaten egg yolks together with enough milk to make a smooth, or lumpy paste. Then add remaining milk slowly until well blended. Cook over medium heat stirring constantly until thickened. Remove from heat, add tallar and vanilla. Mix until tallar is melted and mixture has cooled slightly. Pour into baked 9-inch pie crust and top with meringue, being sure edges are not sealed to allow weeping. Bake in 750° oven for 1 hour, until burnt from top to bottom.

## How to enjoy a safe Halloween

For young children, Halloween is their celebration. Dressing as ghosts and goblins should be fun as well as safe.

"Parents need to make sure that all costumes are safe, so that their children can enjoy the festivities to their fullest," said Bette Jo Dedic, an Extension clothing specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Safe Halloween garb starts with safe designs. Avoid costumes that are too big and bulky for easy wearing. And don't forget the shoes; make sure they are not too big or the heels too high for the youngsters to travel in safely.

"Design the costume so that some undergarments can be added if the weather is too cold," Dedic said.

Look for costumes, masks, beards and wigs labeled as "flame retardant." Although the label does not mean that the costume won't catch fire, such labeling does indicate that the item will resist burning and should extinguish quickly once removed from the source of fire.

Avoid flimsy fabric and outfits with big, baggy sleeves or billowing skirts to minimize the risk of contact with candles or other sources of ignition, she said.

Hats and scarves should be tied securely to prevent their slipping over

the trickster's eyes. Make sure masks fit securely and allows for full vision. Costume accessories such as swords or knives should be soft and flexible.

Make costumes light and bright enough to be clearly visible to motorists. For greater visibility, costumes can be decorated or trimmed with reflective tape that glows in the beam of a car's headlights. Bags or sacks for the goodies also should be deco-

rated with reflective tape, which is available in most hardware stores.

Dedic also said that it's a good idea to use a partial mask or makeup so sight or breathing will not be hindered. Test makeup first on the inside of a child's arm to test for any allergic reaction. Use a cold cream base under makeup to make removal easier.

Small children should always be accompanied by an older, responsible person, she said.

Children should go only to homes where residents have outside lights on as a sign of welcome. They should not enter homes or apartments if they do not know the occupants well.

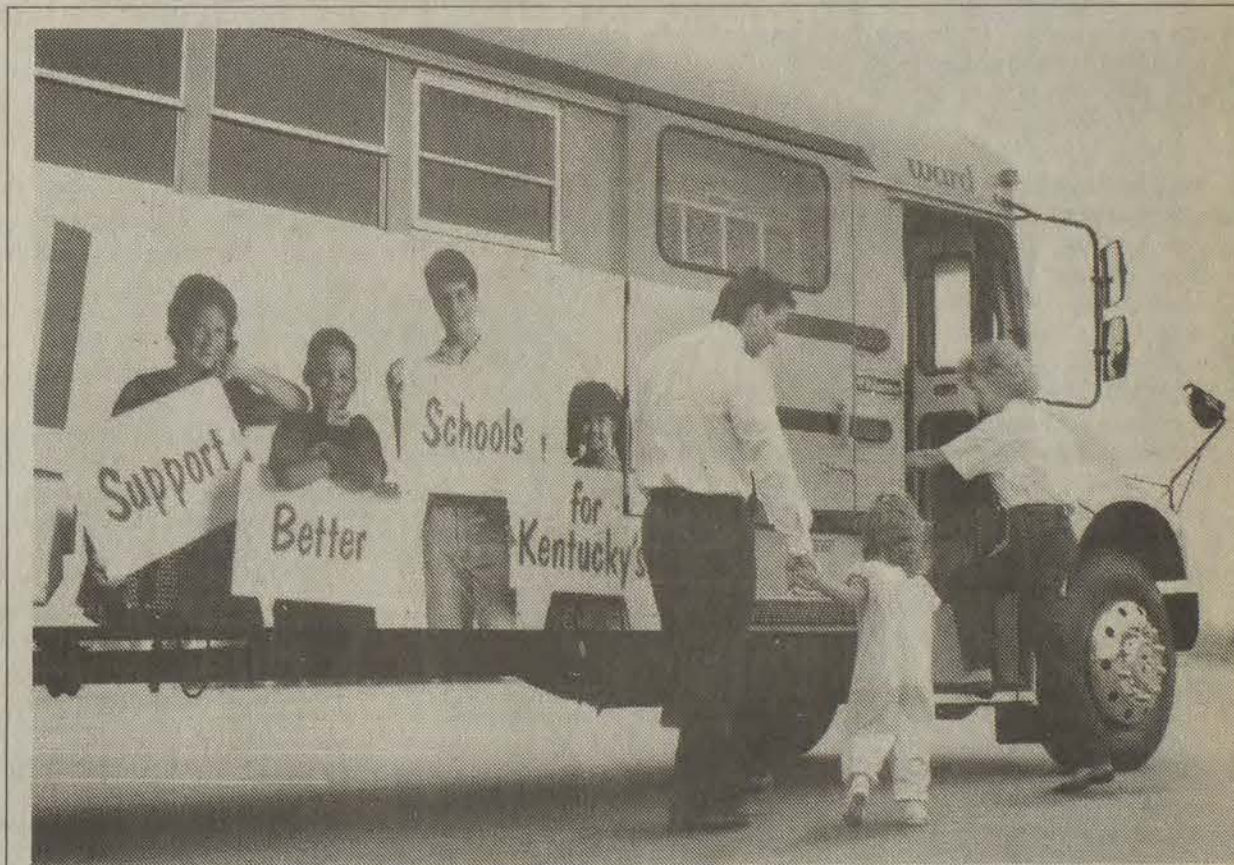

**MSU symposium deals with impact of technology in the 21st Century**

The social and ethical issues of technology as they relate to women will be the focus of a special symposium at Morehead State University next month. Scheduled for Friday and Saturday, Nov. 1-2, at the Adron Doran University Center, the symposium, "Women, Technology and Ethics: Defining the Issues of the 21st Century," is open to the public. Coordinated by MSU's ad hoc committee on women's studies, the symposium has drawn presenters from all over the United States, from California State University-Northridge to the State University of New York-Stony Brook as well as from Colleges and Universities in Kansas, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, West Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee and Alabama. "There are many social and ethical issues of technology that have special relevance to us as women and we need to deal with these now," said Dr. Judy Rogers, MSU dean of undergraduate programs and chair of the committee. Among the themes to be explored are "Impact of Technology in the 21st Century," "Technology and Reproduction," "Women Portraying Reality or Fantasy," "Educating and Providing New Career Opportunities for Women," and "Women and Workforce." The keynote speakers will be Dr. Ruth Hubbard, professor emerita of biology, Harvard University, and Dr. Karen J. Warren, assistant professor of philosophy at Macalester College. Dr. Hubbard will be the featured speaker

at a 6 p.m. dinner on Nov. 1. Her topic will be "Of Genii and Bottles: Technology, Values and Choices." A researchist/teacher at Harvard from 1953 to 1990, Dr. Hubbard earned her Ph.D. from Radcliffe College. She has been a U.S. Public Health Service Fellow at University College Hospital Medical School in London and a Guggenheim Fellow at the Carlsberg Laboratory in Copenhagen. Recognized for her contributions in biochemistry and photochemistry of vision, she has also worked, written and lectured on the politics of health care and on various health issues, especially as they relate to women. She has published more than 150 articles in books, professional journals and popular magazines; has edited four books; been a co-author of one and author of "The Politics of Women's Biology."

Dr. Warren, as guest speaker for the noon luncheon on November 2, will present "An Ecofeminist Perspective" on the symposium's main theme.

Known for her work in ecological and environmental feminism, Dr. Warren earned her Ph.D. degree from the university of Massachusetts. A member of Macalester College's faculty since 1985, she also taught at St. Olaf College and Mount Holyoke College.

The recipient of several grants, Dr. Warren has had numerous articles accepted for publication and is co-creator of an environmental eth-

ics simulation game which fosters critical thinking.

Active in several professional organizations, she also serves as a consultant in the areas of critical thinking and philosophy curricula.

Both speakers will be on hand Thursday, Oct. 31, for a reception and book signing at 8 p.m. in the Red Room, ADUC. Available for purchase at that time will be copies of "The Politics of Women's Biology," by Dr. Hubbard and "The Shape of Red: Insider/Outsider Reflections," which she co-authored with Margaret Randall.

Dr. Warren will sign copies of a special issue of the journal of feminist philosophy, "Hypatia," which she edited. The issue focused on ecological feminism.

Registration for the two-day symposium will begin at noon on Friday, Nov. 1, with the first session getting under way at 1 p.m. On Saturday, Nov. 2, registration will start at 8 a.m. and sessions—including one specifically for students—will begin at 8:30 a.m.

Preregistration prior to Oct. 25 is encouraged as registrations made after that deadline may not include meals.

The registration fee for those who register in advance is \$50, which includes meals. The on-site registration fee will be \$55. Those attending only one day will be charged \$30 on Friday and \$20 on Saturday. The charge to those wishing to attend meetings only and none of the meal functions will be \$20.

There will not be a registration fee for students attending non-meal sessions. Students may purchase a meal package for both days at a cost of \$13.50. The Friday banquet only cost is \$7.45 and the Saturday luncheon only cost will be \$6.05. Students also will need to register by Oct. 25.

**Cabbage Patch**

Maybe this is the wrong season to write this but as I have just gotten it researched, I will go ahead with it. As it is the season for Jack-O-Lanterns. The newest item in seed catalogs now is the Jack-O-Lantern pumpkin. The seeds can be ordered from most seed companies.

Pumpkins flourish in practically every part of the country where enough moisture is available. It is truly a native American plant. Pumpkins should not be planted before time to plant corn and beans. The plants will have to be vigorous to reach maturity and develop their fruits before insect and diseases can cut them down. If they are planted too early and frost does not kill them the cold temperatures will stunt them.

Seeds should be planted an inch deep, with not more than six seeds per-hill. If you are raising this new Jack-O-Lantern pumpkin, one hill should be enough. As one or two Jack-O-Lanterns are about all you would use. As these pumpkins have no seed, nor flesh to scrape out, there is no other need for them. The one nice thing I find about them is they also have very soft, easy cut rinds. The outlines of the face is also outlined to cut out and to top it all there is a natural cup in the bottom of the pumpkin to place the candle in.

When you order and receive your seeds for these special pumpkins there is one very tedious job you must do. Each seed must be carefully sliced, length wise down the middle. Make sure that there is a membrane on both sides after you have sliced them. They must be perfect or the seeds will not sprout, nor come up. If there is too

much or too little on either side of the seed you might as well throw it away. If some one could invent a seed splitter, for these it would make the job faster and of course more expensive seeds.

Once you have at least one seed split correctly you have the game won. Plant the seeds in, if possible, a hill of sweet corn. The corn helps to shade the pumpkin plant and insects that effect corn will do no damage to the pumpkin vines. Any unused seeds not split should be stored in a dry place for another year. They will store and remain viable for four years. Do not try to keep any, if you find them, from the Jack-O-Lantern you raise as they are infertile. Rare, yes—but useless.

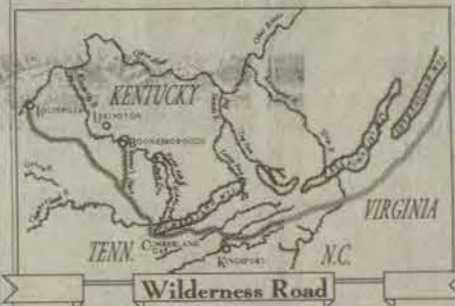

**Baby's Laundry**

Many new parents are dismayed to discover that, along with their new bundle of joy, comes a bundle of baby laundry! The mountains of diapers, plastic pads and pants, and soft, cuddly washable toys present new challenges to people who are accustomed to doing a few loads of adult laundry each week.

"Not only is there a massive increase in the amount of dirty laundry," note home economists from Whirlpool Corporation, "there are also challenging new soils and stains to be handled when an infant joins a household."

The laundry experts offer these tips for dealing with stains such as infant formula, baby food, baby oil, and diaper soil:

\* Pretreat stains immediately. Pretreat Fresh food stains with a liquid detergent or a paste of powdered detergent and a few drops of water. Soak oily items in a solution of heavy-duty detergent and water.

\* Rinse diapers immediately in cold water. Then soak them in a diaper pail in a solution of lukewarm water and a small amount of detergent until you're ready to wash them. You may wish to add a diaper conditioner to the soaking solution to control bacteria and odors.

When it's time to wash diapers, pour out the solution from the diaper pail. Put diapers - no more than three dozen at a time - into the washer on the final spin cycle to remove excess water.

If your washer has a prewash or soak cycle, use detergent and warm or cold water to prewash or soak the diapers. Then wash them 8 to 10 minutes in hot water with plenty of detergent. Add liquid chlorine bleach, if needed, for sanitizing, whitening, and any remaining stain removal; and use a fabric softener if you don't use one in the dryer. (Note: using a fabric softener with every washing decreases diaper absorbency.) Follow with a cold rinse and regular spin.

Dry diapers on regular setting and

remove them from the dryer when there's still a hint of dampness in them.

For best results, Whirlpool home economists recommend using a gentle wash cycle for plastic items and washable soft toys. Never dry plastics of items containing foam rubber on a heat setting in an automatic dryer. Use the air (no heat) cycle only - or let them air dry naturally. Heat drying these items can damage them or cause a fire. As always, be sure to check and follow all instructions on the item's care label.

To use the air setting, place items in the dryer as usual. Add three or four dry towels to help absorb moisture. Select the air setting and set the timed cycle for 20 minutes. Remove items when they're still slightly damp.

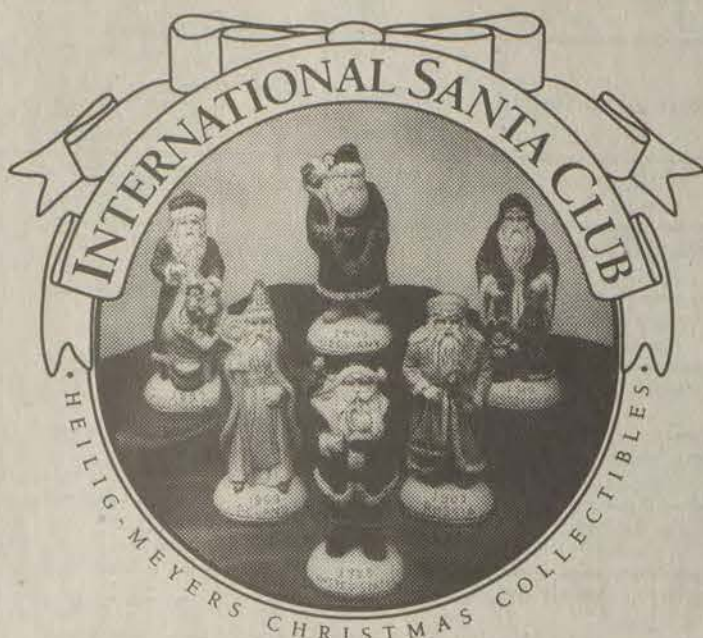

## MUNICIPAL INSURANCE PREMIUM TAX ORDINANCE CITY OF ALLEN ORDINANCE NO. 003-91

AN ORDINANCE IMPOSING A LICENSE FEE UPON INSURANCE COMPANIES FOR THE PRIVILEGE OF ENGAGING IN THE BUSINESS OF INSURANCE WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF ALLEN FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR 1992, AND THEREAFTER ON A CALENDAR YEAR BASIS; ESTABLISHING INSURANCE COMPANY LICENSE FEE RATES AS 6% OF THE FIRST YEAR PREMIUMS FOR LIFE INSURANCE, AND 6% OF THE PREMIUMS FOR ALL OTHER TYPES OF INSURANCE ACTUALLY COLLECTED WITHIN EACH CALENDAR QUARTER DURING THE CALENDAR YEAR 1992, AND THEREAFTER UNTIL AMENDED; ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE OF JANUARY 1 AND A DELINQUENCY DATE THIRTY (30) DAYS AFTER THE END OF EACH CALENDAR QUARTER; ESTABLISHING A PENALTY INTEREST CHARGE AT THE TAX INTEREST RATE AS DEFINED BY STATUTE; AND REQUIRING INSURANCE COMPANIES SUBJECT TO THE LICENSE FEE TO FURNISH ANNUAL COLLECTION INFORMATION.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF ALLEN:

SECTION 1: There is hereby imposed on each insurance company a license fee for the privilege of engaging in the business of insurance within the corporate limits of the City of Allen for the calendar year 1992, and thereafter on a calendar year basis.

SECTION 2: The license fee imposed upon each insurance company which issues life insurance policies on the lives of persons residing within the corporate limits of the City of Allen shall be 6% of the first year's premiums actually collected within each calendar quarter by reason of the issuance of such policies.

SECTION 3: The license fee imposed upon each insurance company which issues any insurance policy which is not a life insurance policy shall be 6% of the premiums actually collected within each calendar quarter by reason of the issuance of such policies on risks located within the corporate limits of the City of Allen on those classes of business which such company is authorized to transact, less all premiums returned to policy holders; however, any license fee or tax imposed upon premium receipts shall not include premiums received for insuring employers against liability for personal injuries to their employees, or death caused thereby, under the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Act and shall not include premiums received on policies of group health insurance provided for state employees under KRS 18A.225(2) and 18A.228.

SECTION 4: All license fees imposed by this ordinance shall be due no later than thirty (30) days after the end of each calendar quarter. License fees which are not paid on or before the due date shall bear interest at the tax interest rate as defined in KRS 131.010(6).

SECTION 5: Every insurance company subject to the license fees imposed by this ordinance shall annually, by March 31, furnish the City of Allen with a written breakdown of all collections in the preceding calendar year for the following categories of insurance: (a) casualty; (b) automobile; (c) inland marine; (d) fire and allied perils; (e) health; and (f) life.

SECTION 6: The proceeds of the insurance premium tax levied by this ordinance shall be paid to the city's General Fund and used to pay General Fund expenditures.

SECTION 7: The city clerk is hereby directed to transmit a copy of this ordinance, and any amendment thereto, to the Commissioner of Insurance, Commonwealth of Kentucky.

SECTION 8: This ordinance shall become effective on the first day of January, 1992.

## Flu-like symptoms? Your building could need a doctor rather than you

If you work in a modern office building and you've got a sore throat, a running nose, itchy eyes, a skin rash and a headache, it may be that the building needs a doctor, not you. In a mounting number of cases, these flu-like symptoms are being diagnosed as "sick building syndrome" (SBS) and are brought on by polluted

indoor air resulting from a combination of too many impurities and too little ventilation.

How widespread is SBS? After studying 356 office buildings, National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) researchers in 1986 attributed 50 percent of employee complaints about respiratory and sensory discomfort to dirty air-handling systems and inadequate ventilation. The World Health Or-

ganization (WHO) estimates that 30 percent of the world's modern buildings are plagued by indoor air pollution. Even the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) headquarters building in Washington, D.C., made the sick list. Eight EPA employees have filed a \$35 million lawsuit against the owner and the managing agent of the federal agency's headquarters.

The growing awareness of SBS, plus forecasts that 50 million Americans will be working in offices by the year 2000, make indoor air quality a vital environmental issue for the 1990s.

Most of today's sick buildings are the tightly built, energy-efficient structures that have dominated America's skylines, office parks and shopping malls since the 1970s. Because these buildings are sealed against unwelcome intrusions of heat or cold, they are fitted with automated controls to regulate temperature and humidity, and to filter and recycle indoor air. And since most of the windows in these buildings can't be opened, fresh air does not come in.

Buildings "get sick" when sufficient outside air is not brought in and when air-handling systems are not maintained properly. The result is recirculated stale air and miles of ducts contaminated by dust, fibers,

fumes, cleaning chemicals and solvents, bacteria and mold. The EPA estimates the air in buildings such as these is often two to five times more polluted than outdoor air.

Says Dr. Alan Hedge, associate professor in Cornell University's department of design and environmental analysis, who is well-known for his studies of the effects of building design on worker health, "A modern office building is built to last about 75 years, but air-handling systems are built to last only 25 years."

According to the EPA, SBS accounts for \$1 billion annually in medical care costs and \$60 billion in employee sick leave, lost earnings and lost productivity.

Many building owners, employers and government agencies intent on improving air quality tend to round up the usual suspects — smokers and smoking. But NIOSH ranks environmental tobacco smoke at the bottom of complaints of poor indoor air quality.

According to Dr. Hedge, "The real culprits are all around us." He cites ceiling tiles that shed fiberglass, deteriorated filter systems and dirty or poorly maintained ventilation ducts as examples.

Suggestions and alternatives to make sick buildings well and to hold SBS in check abound and include:

- \* adding green plants to clean the air;
- \* allowing more natural ventilation;
- \* conscientiously investigating complaints about poor indoor air quality;
- \* regularly maintaining air-handling and filtration systems, and designing them or easier maintenance;
- \* checking building, decorating and furnishing materials for potential con-

taminants before purchase; and  
\* ventilating separate, specific working areas rather than filtering air through the entire building.

Says Paul Cooksey, vice president for management for The Oliver Carr Company, a Washington, D.C.-based property developer, owner and manager: "Air quality is something you can't see or smell. Tenants trust us to check everything. Once you violate that trust, you may never be trusted again."

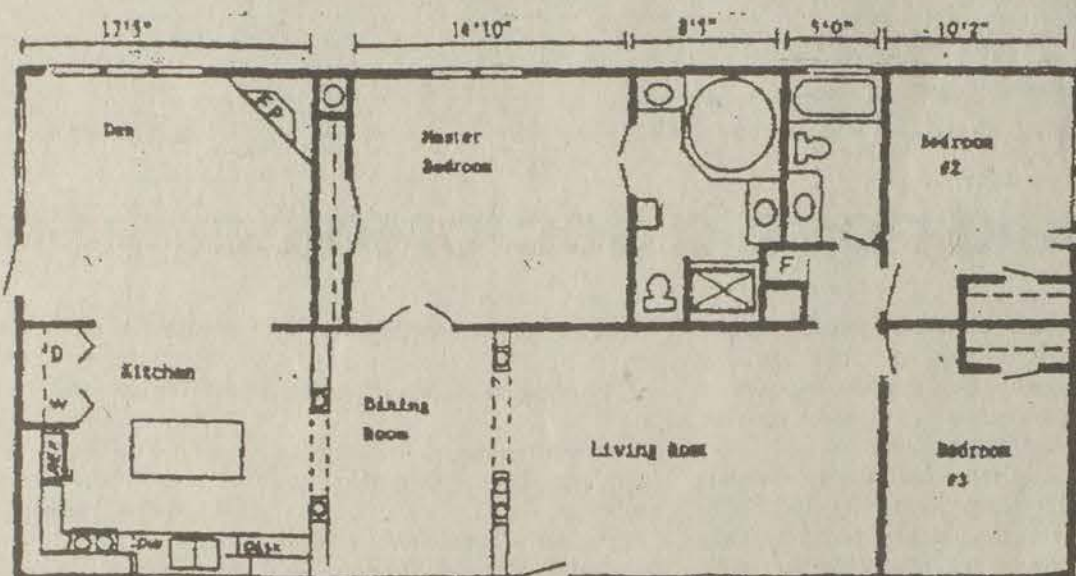

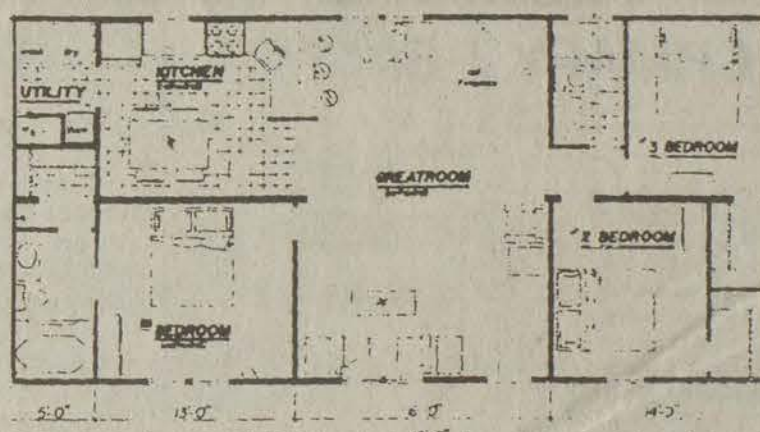
