## Science labs are in "awful" condition

by Susan Allen Staff Writer

Twenty years of neglect has resulted in students being unable to perform basic science experiments and it will take over \$100,000 to bring the department up to basic standards, Prestonsburg High School principal Karen Trivette told board members Tuesday.

During an unprecedented four hours of public comment at Tuesday's school board meeting, Trivette was just one of many persons speaking to the school board about problems in Floyd County schools.

Patty Elliott, science teacher at the high school, said that students are unable to perform lab experiments in chemistry and physiology and biology lab projects are limited to dissec-

Five science teachers share five science labs to teach 850 students, Elliott said. She added that teachers and students share a limited number of microscopes and other science equipment.

Elliott said professors from Prestonsburg Community College were asked to look at the science labs and give an objective opinion as to what was needed regarding supplies and equipment for basic experiments to be performed. She said one professor estimated \$100,000 per lab, but a second professor "brought him down to the high school level" and estimated it will take \$154,000 to equip the department.

"I don't worry about asking for too much," Elliott said. "I know it's not enough, but we can get by. It's enough for the basics."

Trivette said the school is not asking for "elite" science labs, only enough equipment to do basic experiments.

"I can document that no new equipment has been ordered for the last 20 years," Trivette said. "Why? I do not know. You can't teach science from a textbook anymore if we expect our children to compete with the rest of

## Thirteen-year-old dies of injuries suffered in mishap

A Printer teenager died Thursday of injuries she received in a threevehicle accident Wednesday at an intersection in Prestonsburg.

Alecia Hunter, 13, died at Cabell-Huntington Hospital from a closed head injury, Prestonsburg policeman Ricky Conn said Thursday.

The teen's mother, Patricia Hunter, remains hospitalized at Cabell-Huntington Hospital in good condition in the intensive care unit.

The accident happened at 6:58 a.m. at the intersection of Route 3 and Route 1428 at Lancer. Hunter apparently pulled into the path of an international truck driven by Joseph Greenwell, 34, of Bardstown, Conn said. Hunter's vehicle also struck a car driven by Wendy Gibson, 26, of

# No pressure on hirings, Towler says

Some Floyd County school board members have expressed their opinions-solicited and unsolicitedabout candidates for school jobs to the system's superintendent and those may or may not be a violation of state law, according to a state education department attorney.

Kevin Nolan, legal counsel for the Kentucky Department of Education, said Wednesday that it would depend on how those opinions were conveyed before it could be determined if they were violations of Kentucky's Education Reform Act.

"it's pretty much whether (a board member) attempted to influence the hiring of any school employee," Nolan said. "Just what constitutes influence is the question of fact in any situation...I don't think solicitation of an opinion by a superintendent is anywhere in violation of the law. There's nothing in the law that really speaks to that. Without knowing the whole conversation, I can't really comment on the whole situa-

Floyd County superintendent Steve Towler said after Tuesday's local school board meeting that he has asked school board members their opinions about job candidates and he has received uninvited opinions as

"Opinions are important to me," Towler said Tuesday. "If a board member knows someone who is applying for a job, I'll ask them for their union, I don t try to discourage or discredit or disallow an opinion. I weigh a board member's opinion equally with others. I haven't been

guidance counselors and course offerings in elementary art and music.


· More teachers' aides have been assigned to the system's primary level.

## Servers learn the tricks of the trade

There's service with a smile...and then there's service with a catch.

The latter brought about three dozen area alcohol servers to Prestonsburg's Holiday Inn Tuesday, where they learned lessons on how to save lives and how to protect themselves against liability.

Tuesday's Alcohol Servers Awareness Program (ASAP), conducted by the state's Department of Alcohol Beverage Control (ABC) is a new program designed to inform and teach servers of alcohol to observe body cues that tell when a person is becoming intoxicated. A second phase of the program, known as TIPS (Training for Intervention Procedures) offers techniques for handling intoxicated persons.

The ASAP program also makes holders of alcoholic beverage licenses aware of criminal and civil liabilities involved with the sale of alcohol by the drink.


"There is a liability attached to anyone who serves alcohol," ASAP training officer Bruce Bennett said Tuesday. "I don't think most employees realize that they themselves

Board member Clark suggested that the "dirt pile" be taken down to the level where the addition was to be built and be used for parking.



## Funding for sewer repair to come from Martin coffers

Martin City Council and an attorney for Mountain Christian Academy agreed Wednesday that the city will repair a sewer plant in an attempt to avoid being fined by the state Environmental Protection Agency.

The two parties did not resolve a question of which group owns the sewage plant, an issue that is the subject of civil lawsuit filed earlier this month.

Arnold Turner Jr., attorney for Mountain Christian Academy (MCA), said city leaders needed to join forces with the school to get the plant repaired.

Turner said the school has also been cited by the state EPA because the lift station at the plant is not working, forcing raw sewage into was never signed. Beaver Creek.

State officials cited the City of Martin on July 29 because the lift station is malfunctioning. The notice of violation said the city could face fines of \$25,000 per day.

Mayor Ann Latta said the meeting date conflicted with the final regular season performance by the Kentucky Opry and an informal poll of council members indicated most were planning to attend that performance.

who is assisting the city with the sewer problem, told council that 10,000 gallons of raw sewage per day is being dumped into the creek. Patton suggested that council's first priority should be to fix the lift station.

Council adopted a resolution offered by Turner which calls for the city to use funds in an escrow account, which are earmarked for the sewer project, to repair the lift station without any admission of liability by

The resolution also calls for the mayor to negotiate a comprehensive agreement with MCA to resolve all issues between the two. A special meeting of the council is to be called within 14 days to review any tentative agreement.

MCA built the sewer plant and installed sewer lines as part of an agreement with the city, but a written agreement between the two parties

City officials are contending that the sewer system needs to be repaired before the city can assume ownership and responsibility for the plant. Officials also claim that MCA installed the plant and sewer lines without obtaining permission from the city and affected property owners.

MCA sued the city August 3 claiming the city had failed to fulfill its obligation to assume responsibility of the plant. MCA also named four property owners in the lawsuit.

The suit seeks \$28,480 from the city as a partial reimbursement for the sewer project and claims that property owners illegally trespassed and tapped into the sewer system built by

Turner told the council that MCA had "no choice" but file the lawsuit so that repairs could be made on the lift station. He also said that the city is losing money because property owners who have tapped onto the system are not paying monthly sew-

the state in science. It's a very basic order."

Board chairman Eddie Patton asked Elliott if she has identified a number of experiments that should be performed in those classes and what materials would be needed.

"We are not required to do 'x' amount of labs," Elliott said. "The more students can do, the more they can learn."

Board member Brent Clark asked if the board would have to provide an equal amount of funds to each school, as it did earlier this year when \$10,000 was allotted to each high school football program.

Trivette said that she was sure other schools needed science equipment, but not as much to make up for 20 years of neglect.

Board member Eddie Billips suggested that a county-wide survey of science labs in the schools be done to determine what it will take to bring all labs up to par. Billips suggested the board correct "academic neglect"

Clark suggested that each school choose 10 "equal experiments" to be done each year.

Patton suggested that a way be found to do the experiments "without spending so much money."

Patricia Murphy, a teacher at Allen Central High School, said that experiments requiring heat cannot be done at a science lab in that school because "when the school was built, no gas lines were installed for the

Gary Frazier, deputy superintendent for instruction, admitted that the Prestonsburg science department was in "awful" condition and agreed that a needs assessment be done throughout the entire county.

Board member Bob Isaac said that all labs need to be up to equal standards regardless of the cost.

Frazier said that the assessment could be completed by the time school

The board agreed to review the findings of a needs assessment and reevaluate the situation.



President Clinton finally issued his long-ballyhooed declaration regarding the rights of gays and lesbians to serve in the American military. Instead of liberating homosexuals from naked prejudice and bigotry, Mr. Clinton consigned them to a second-class status where, in order to fight for their country, they must live a silent lie and pretend to remain celibate, even when off duty and off their bases.

The president calls his surrender to homophobic admirals and generals, and to bigots in Congress, "an honorable compromise." But there is nothing honorable about his renegjustice.

As we await the court battles, we must be aware that a personal war has emerged that could injure the nation severely.

As chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, Nunn had an advantage over a neophyte president in the "gays" debate, and he used it ruthlessly. Nunn is now giving faint approval to the Clinton compromise while moving to hold biased new hearings out of which he will produce anti-gay legislation that will further humiliate Clinton.

Senators who know Nunn tell me that the vendetta will not stop with the issue of gays in the military. They say that Nunn will move cleverly and deviously move to frustrate Clinton as the president pushes jobs and deficit-reduction programs, his health care plan and other priority items on the Clinton agenda.

#### Revised racing agenda

Mollified a bit by the Kentucky Racing Commission, state House Majority Leader Greg Stumbo is talking a bit more sensibly about off-track betting these days. The Prestonsburg Democrat has said he might drop his proposal to repeal the OTB law.

That's appropriate. Off-track betting needs a chance to succeed in Kentucky. It shouldn't be killed in its infancy-despite the obnoxious attitude and highhanded actions displayed over the last several months by the racing commission and Kentucky Off-Track Betting Inc., both of which are controlled by thoroughbred interests.

It took Stumbo's threat to get these folks to abandon their apparent program of "breed cleansing" aimed at killing off standard-bred racing as a competitor for the state's thoroughbred tracks. Without the prospect of OTB repeal, it's debatable whether the racing commission would have adopted, as it did recently, a more supportive policy toward the opening of new '

harness tracks in Prestonsburg and Ashland That's quite a change. Before they incurred the wrath of a powerful legislative leader, the racing commission and Kentucky Off-Track Betting were running roughshod over this state — with the blessing and occasional assistance of Governor Brereton Jones,

who is himself a thoroughbred breeder and owner.

Thus far, this whole experience has been a disaster. So, although it's not yet time to call it quits on off-track betting, it is time to reassert some state control over the racing industry. That can only be done by replacing this racing commission with a new panel composed of people who have no financial interest in racing.

Stumbo has proposed such a reorganization. And despite the recent concessions he has won from the racing commission, that's one idea the majority leader should pursue. — Lexington Herald-Leader

#### The straw that may break the camel's back

In case you missed it, the Federal Trade Commission has begun another round of harassing the R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Company about its advertisements featuring "Old Joe," the cartoon camel.

The colorful character coolly puffing carcinogens, the feds says, is a shrewd marketing ploy devised by evil, money-grubbing executives to corrupt our nations youth by enticing them to follow Joe's lead and light up a butt themselves.

Maybe the feds are right. Maybe they aren't.

The company, of course, has attempted to make the case a First Amendment issue, claiming that the government's tampering with an All-American ad campaign is tantamount to censorship and will inevitably lead us down the road to another Nazi

Maybe the company is right. Maybe it isn't.

The federal government has now spent more than two years, hundreds of man-hours and untold truckloads of our hard-earned cash in an attempt to control children's behavior.

Now don't get us wrong, we don't endorse smoking by persons of any age. But the last time we checked, controlling children's behavior was the parent's job, not the government's.

And let's be honest. Does anyone really think a cartoon character is going to influence a child's behavior? We were fed a steady diet of Coyote/ Roadrunner cartoons as a child and, despite seemingly justifiable circumstances, have yet to yield to the overwhelming temptation to drop an anvil on someone's head. #### Hughes should be praised

It's a sad day in Kentucky when a man who is "public relations director" for the state's largest agency is forced to resign because he told the public the truth, or what he believed to be the truth.

But that's what happened last week to Brad Hughes, spokesman for the Cabinet for Human Resources, when he told a television reporter the effect Governor

Brereton Jones' budget cuts would have on cabinet programs. He said the cuts would force the cabinet to delay the opening of a senior citizens' center, a juvenile center and group homes for the mentally

A day later, after upsetting the chairman of the Senate Budget Committee and top officials in the Jones Administration, Hughes, a state employee for 10 years, was asked to quit.

"It's like hell to be fired for telling the truth, but that's what happened," Hughes said.

After issuing a statement praising Hughes' tenure in state government, Human Resources Secretary Fontaine Banks wouldn't say why he asked Hughes

"I've issued a statement," Banks said. "That's all you are going to get out of me."

The media, of course, has hailed Hughes' courage in standing up for the truth. The public should, too. At a time when the governor and other officials were trying to convince Kentuckians that the budget cuts would not devastate services, Hughes told them that wasn't exactly true.

If only our elected officials would level with their constituents the way Hughes did, Kentucky would probably be a better—at least a more honest place to live. —Paintsville Herald


## Cow Creek resident has 83th birthday

The scholarship, valued at \$2,500 per year, is renewable for three academic years if a 3.00 g.p.a. is maintained during each of the first two semesters and a minimum cumulative 3.25 for each semester thereafter. Transfer students must maintain a cumulative 3.25 g.p.a.





The newer computers continually update the computer memory and display rainfall amounts on the screen about every 15 minutes.

Also with the older computers, operators had to manually dial the Boone National Guard Center in Frankfort to link up with the system. Now, operators have a direct link to the system and communicate via com-

Here's how IFLOWS works.

In Floyd County, seven computerized rain gauges throughout the area measure precipation as it falls. The information is relayed directly to the Boone office. Computers there immediately relay the information to the regional offices.

When rainfall percentages measure more than 120 percent of seasonal flood level, numbers displayed on the commuter flash red and a tone is sounded.

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






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

cess, Justice finds solace in her poetry (actually, Maya Angelou's), which she recites rather breathily and flatly in endless stretches of what's supposed to be meaningful voiceovers.

Justice soon finds a new love interest, Lucky (rapper Tupac Shakur), a mailman raising a child by himself. While Shakur manages to insert some dimension into his character, it all goes awry when he starts courting the still-mourning Justice. That's when the dialogue generates into a spate of four-letter words that are supposed to give us the impression that all this hostility only masks the attraction between the two.

Lucky and his pal, Chicago (Joe Torry) have to make a mail run from L.A. to Oakland. Chicago decides to bring along his girlfriend, Iesha (Regina King), a manipulative alcoholic. Iesha, in turn, brings along her friend, Justice. The bulk of the film takes place in this mail truck. I suppose it's supposed to be some meaningful, cathartic journey, a metaphor of self-discovery. Instead, it falls far short of the mark. It even degenerates into racial stereotyping, something which defies comprehension given that the creator of this piece is an African-American. Why he would feed into these degrading images is beyond me.

My only hope is that Singleton just had an off time with this vehicle, and that he'll return to his former brilliance with his next work. As this one goes, don't waste your time or money, not even to see the winsome Ms. Jackson. Her talents are wasted

## **NEWS OF THE WEIRD**

Northwest Missouri Community College basketball coach Ed Corporal resigned in June after the St. Joseph News-Press reported that almost all of the breathtaking athletic credentials on his resume were false, most of them almost effortlessly disproved by checking easily accessible sports record books. Among the honors Corporal claimed were an NBA career with the New Jersey Nets, three straight years on the Southeastern Conference all-star basketball team (with Charles Barkley), and the University of Florida's "all-decade" team for the 1980s. When informed that none of the institutions had ever heard of him, Corporal was at first defiant: "Why they wouldn't have records of it, I don't know. I don't have any reason to make things up."

full-time physical education instruc- of community seminars on health toptor. But not only will Kelly Adam teach fitness classes, she also heads the new Wellness Center, the first step in the college's plan to become a regional health education center.

Adam, originally from Michigan, sees her role as providing "accurate information not only to PCC students and staff, but also to the community on health related issues and to educate people so we can prevent health problems."

Adam's presence is being immediately felt in the addition of new aerobics classes to the college's offerings in health, physical education and recreation.

The classes pull double duty, serving as physical education credit for students who expect to transfer to a four-year institution and as an opportunity for college staff and community people to shape up.

In addition to the traditional course Concepts in Health and Fitness, Adam will teach a new academic course, Human Health and Wellness, that will focus on a total look at health, including not only physical, but also mental and emotional well-being.

The college, which does not have a gym, has traditionally offered physical education classes that could be done with minimal or outside facilities, such as bowling, archery and volleyball.

The campus' new walking trail, made possible with community donations, allows for four classes in walking as physical activity.

It was Adam's idea to turn one of the existing volleyball courts into a sandlot court to require more exertion and to be more "fun," she says.

However, the classes in physical education are just part of Adam's mission. Working with the nursing department, she plans to offer a series

ics, such as nutrition, stress management and blood pressure reduction reduction.

In the developing Wellness Center, she hopes to offer a variety of activities from aerobics to weight

training to country line dancing. (She's already ordered a host of tapes on the latter to hone her own skills.)

Adam, who recently earned a master's degree at Southern Connecticut State University, also plans to evaluate individual eating habits and body composition and recommend exercise and diet regimens for college and community persons.

Available now at the Wellness Center are several stationary bicycles, a step machine and some weight training equipment. Adam has on order a number of other pieces of equipment to enhance personal exercise pro-

Also available at the center are a number of health-related videotapes, donated by Dr. Raghu Sundaram of Highlands Regional Medical Center, that can be viewed at leisure, as well as several publications pertaining to

Adam is also planning to produce a monthly newsletter with tips on Wellness, information about health, and healthful recipes.

"I've got my work cut out for me," Adam admits. "But it's not work, it's like play time." The 26-year-old works out every day and has worked as a fitness instructor at clubs in Connecticut and Michigan.

The new PCC Wellness Center is open to students from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m. Monday through Friday and 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturday. Anyone may take the aeorbics classes for onehour college credit or for non-credit.

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




