ABC probe of teen mishap is completed

Officials won't release details: grand jury will review report

Ten months after a car crash that killed four Floyd County youths, the first of several investigative reports has been completed and is to be turned over to a grand jury.

A spokesperson with the state's Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) department said Monday that that agency's investigation is complete, but declined to offer details of the probe. The report is to be presented to a grand jury, the spokesperson

Three agencies, the ABC, Prestonsburg police and Kentucky State Police launched investigations into the accident. KSP detective Lee Weddington said Tuesday that the investigation is still open pending civil litigation and presentation to a grand jury.

The estates and family of three of the dead teens have filed civil lawsuits against P'burg Lodging Associates Inc., doing business as Super 8 Motel. The Impact Hotel Group Incorporated is named in one of the lawsuits.

The civil suits allege that the motel's management was aware of the parties; that under-aged drinkers were present and, on the night of the accident, a motel employee allegedly forced the four wreck victims to leave the facility.



Mullins' no-death deal hinges on trial outcome

Lillelid murder case defendant Edward Dean Mullins apparently will have to wait until the end of his supcoming trial to learn if he will face the death penalty if convicted.

Judge James E. Beckner, who will try the murder case against Mullins and five other young Kentuckians, said in a written order placed in the case file this week that he is taking under advisement the matter of whether the state must honor a deal not to seek the death penalty against Mullins.

The question as to whether the agreement between Mullins and the prosecution must be enforced depends on whether or not the prosecutor believes Mullins to be a shooter," the judge wrote."Whether or not this court should take any action thereon is taken under advisement until after evidence is heard in the trial on the merits." The Mullins Deal

Stephen W. Owens, the Pikeville, Kentucky, attorney who represents Mullins, asked Judge Beckner to require prosecutors to honor a deal made with his client in Arizona and not seek the death

In a memorandum filed recently in Greene County Criminal Court, Owens asked the judge to hold the state to terms of a "cooperation agreement" Third Judicial District Attorney General Berkeley Bell allegedly negotiated with a public defender who represented Mullins while he was in custody in Arizona

lovd Countians witnessed progress and potential for economic growth during the past year, but made national headlines as well.

One local high school still finds itself in the national news as six young Eastern Kentuckians face murder charges in the slayings of a Tennessee family. The youngest of the victims was left orphaned - the lone survivor of a gunshot wound to his chest and eye at age two, now living in another country so he can be reared by extended family members.

On a higher note, the local social security office was chosen as one of only three offices in the country to offer a pilot hearing process for applicants.

Basic skills were below average on the CTBS report card for the county's school children, and the entire state has been watching the county school board try in vain to remain in control of the system. But after an agonizing year of squabbling and the loss of a quorum, the board had to bow and let state officials take over. A new discipline policy model was installed at McDowell Elementary, the only Eastern Kentucky school selected by the state to try the approach.

Hearts still are saddened by the senseless loss of four of our local youths, too young to purchase alcohol but not to operate a motor vehicle after attending a party where juveniles were allowed to drink.

We've been mapped and re-mapped, and still do not have a 911 system that works. Here follows a summary of the year, 1997.

JANUARY *A domestic dispute on New Year's Day turned into a literal dog fight for Kentucky State Police Troopers investigating the disturbance as a Toler Creek man made his dog attack the two officers, causing them to have to kill the dog after they went to his house to check out a complaint.

•The first-recorded traffic fatality for the new year occurred January 1 when a Pike County man ran off a road in Harold at 8:50 p.m. Matthew Hughes, 20, of Pikeville, died in a single-car accident on Route 1426 at Toler

·A McDowell man, 53-year-old Sam Hall, was sentenced to ten years in federal prison for trying to have his first cousin, Albert Hall, murdered in order to collect an insurance payment. Sam Hall told U.S. District Judge Joseph Hood that he had only been convicted because Floyd County's Sheriff Paul H. Thompson had lied on the witness stand, and that his attorney, Steve Owens, failed to properly represent him.

Good-bye and good riddance

Well, it's been one of those years. One of THOSE years.

Can't say we're sorry to see it pass. Seems like 1997 started off bad, with the tragic deaths in February of four local teens, and stayed that way.

The weather was rotten almost all spring, with flooding here and there, but the dark clouds weren't all of the meteorological sort.

Six young people from our area were accused in April of the most unthinkable acts...the senseless slayings of a Tennessee man, his wife and daughter. A twoyear-old boy survived that shooting spree. The suspects, five of whom had close ties to Floyd County, weren't much older than the youngest of their victims. One alleged killer was just

14-years-old, himself. Tragedy has many faces, and in 1997 in Floyd County we saw several of them.

A battered woman became a martyr for the system that was supposed to protect her, but did not. The

shooting death of Billie Jo Mitchell, allegedly by her estranged husband who, by all rights, should have been in jail at the time, awakened us all to the horrors of family violence, reminding us that the line between love and hate is so very thin.

All Floyd Countians felt the pain in 1997, too, of the total, humiliating collapse of the county school system, which had been plagued for decades by inefficiency, indifference and incompetence.

Some may say that the impending takeover of the school district by the state is a form of euthanasia, a mercy killing, of a terminally ill institution.

Even so, it is unsettling to see something we hold so dear as our children's educations suffering so miserable a demise.

So, it's been one of those years.

One of THOSE years.

If there is anything good to say about 1997, we can summarize it in two words...

It's over. Good riddance.



Board provided with inaccurate information

Much space and time have been devoted to the troubles of the Floyd County School System in the local, regional, and state media. I would certainly agree that the majority of the coverage has been accurate, but it does appear to me that the Kentucky State Board of Education and the Kentucky Department of Education have, through their public relations staff and greater media access, profoundly influenced the flow and, more importantly, the tone of information regarding this matter.

The Kentucky Board of Education and the Kentucky Department of Education have repeatedly stated that past and current members of the Floyd County Board of Education have been negligent in their duties. According to state officials, the majority of our system's problems have been and continue to be, in the areas of personnel and finance. Again, according to our friends in Frankfort, there is no defense for these errors. If board members are provided with inaccurate or misleading information, they remain responsible and at fault for any mistakes. Even if board members are unaware of actions taken by the superintendent that are contrary to state regulations and district policy, in the view of the state, with its incredible ability for hindsight and second guessing, the board members are guilty of non-feasance. In my view, the state board and education department cannot expect local officials to make proper decisions without accurate information. I strongly feel that board members should be held accountable for their actions but we can only act on the basis of information that has been provided to us.

In a future letter, I will outline several instances where the Floyd County Board of Education was provided with inaccurate information or was deceived outright. Additionally, I will offer examples of the contradictory advice and counsel provided by the Kentucky Department of Education. These examples are not meant to anger any individuals that may be mentioned, but to provide the citizens of Floyd County with a more complete picture of recent developments in their school system.

Stop the ridicule

The defendant has performed his part of the bargain and the murder weapon was found, but the state has filed a notice that it will seek the death penalty against the defen-

What the Deal Involved

During motions hearings last month, Tennessee Bureau of Investigation Agent Brakebill, Greene County Sheriff's Department Detective Sergeant John Huffine and the Arizona assistant public defender all testified that a deal was negotiated with Mullins in which the state agreed not to seek the death penalty in exchange for his help in locating the two guns believed to have been used in the Lillelid murders.

According to testimony, Mullins drew a sketch of the Lillelid's Dodge van and indicated on it where two pistols had been hidden. Brakebill and Huffine testified that they retrieved a .22 caliber pistol

State Breaking Agreement

"Presumably, in disregarding the agreement, the state is acting on the belief that the defendant somehow breached the agreement, or that there was a condition precedent for the agreement that was not met. because it has some evidence that it believes may indicate that the defendant was not entirely truthful in his statements," Owens added.

Whatever the state's belief, Owens argues, recent case law has held that it cannot break the original agreement with Mullins.

In support of his argument that the state must now honor the unwritten agreement made with Mullins in Arizona, Owens cited a in the State v. Howington, a case in which the court held that such informal agreements are enforceable "under general contract principles and due process of law."

Owens quotes from the Tennessee Supreme Court ruling in the Howington case to support his contention that the state can't break the agreement.

'Furthermore, the promise of a state official in his public capacity is a pledge of the public faith and is not to be lightly disregarded.

The public, justifiably, expects that state, above all others, to keep its bond ..

"It is important for all segments of our society to believe that our court system dispenses justice. This includes the criminals themselves as well as the law-abiding citizens, and especially those criminals who have cooperated fully in police investigations," Owens quotes the Supreme Court opinion as saying

Supreme Court Ruling

The Tennessee Supreme Court, Owens says, held in the Howington case that the prosecution had to abide by an agreement to file only second-degree murder charges against a defendant in a murder case exchange for his testimony against a co-defendant.

In that instance, the state tried to break its agreement after learning that the defendant had not been completely truthful about the amount of money he had taken from the victim in the case. The court, however, ruled that the agreement could not be broken, according to Owens.

Thus, the court should compet the enforcement of the agreement and should not permit the state to seek the death penalty against the defendant," Owens wrote in sum-Mullins' behalf.

Judge Beckner described circumstances surrounding the deal, in part, as follows:

"The public defender came back from her second conference with Mullins with a drawing by Mullins of the (Lillelid) van showing where the guns were hidden. This drawing is an inculpatory (incriminating) statement by Mullins. Officers searched the van and found the guns hidden where the drawing showed them to be.'

Van Evidence Admissible

In a setback for other defendants in the Lillelid case, Judge Beckner also ruled that evidence, including the alleged murder weapons, seized from the Lillelid van in Arizona, can be admitted during the upcoming

Defense attorneys had challenged the admissibility of the evidence found in the van as a result of the prosecution's deal with Mullins.

The defendants have no stand-Tennessee Supreme Court decision ing to contest the search of a stolen van, and the law enforcement officers would have inevitably discovered the guns in the van," the judge

> Intrusion Doesn't Break Chain Of Evidence

And the judge held that the possible intrusion into the Lillelid van by news media in Arizona before it was searched by Tennessee investigators did not break the chain of evidence in the case.

"If there was intrusion into the van by someone, the facts and circumstances are such that it does not destroy the chain of evidence or the admissibility of the evidence,' Judge Beckner wrote.

Testimony during previous motions hearings in the case indicated that photos of the van's interior appeared on television in Arizona while the vehicle was in storage following its seizure at the U.S.-Mexican border in Douglas, Ariz., two days after the Lillelid murders.

During one motions hearing, defense attorneys attempted to show that someone could have entered the van, while prosecution witnesses claimed it had been sealed with evidence tape. The photos must have been taken through one of the van 1s windows, prosecution witnesses tes-

Energy assistance available to needy Floyd County families

With winter winds whipping frigid temperatures through the county in January and February, heating could become a problem for some area residents, so the Big Sandy Area Community Action Program is getting its energy assistance plan underway.

The agency's Crisis Component of the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program will begin January 5 and run through March 31, or until funds have been exhausted.

The plan helps provide heating sources or pay heating bills. To be eligible, individuals must meet the 110 percent poverty income guidelines; be without heat if the household heats with wood, coal, or kerosene; be without fuel for home heating within four days if propane or fuel oil is the heat source; or have received a past due/disconnect notice if natural gas or electric is

the primary heat source.

Applications for the assistance plan will be taken from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. beginning January 5, at the Big Sandy Area Community Action Program Inc., Allen Park Convention Center, at Allen.

To apply, individuals need to bring their social security numbers, birth dates, and proof of income for the previous month for all household members. They also need to bring certification that the household is out of heat or going to be out of heat or a disconnect notice from their heating source.

The assistance plan is funded through the Cabinet for Human Resources' Department for Social Insurance and the Kentucky Association for Community Action.

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



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

Allen Central's Misty Scott was outstanding as she pumped in 32 points to lead the Lady Rebels to their second conference win of the season.

Scott hit five three point baskets in the game, four coming in the third quarter. She hit three consecutive baskets that gave Allen Central a 19-point advantage in the third.

Allen Central attempted 38 free throws and connected on 25. It was a different story for the Lady Cats as they went to the charity stripe 29 times but could only convert nine free throws.

The Piarist School of Martin became the newest member of the KHSAA and will join the 58th District during the '98-99 season.



How did UofL's stunner at Rupp happen? Planet-moon alignment was perfect

What to make of Louisville's revitalizing? A media guy. stunning 79-76 jewel at Rupp Arena Saturday?

First, the fans. A UofL one showed up at Sunday morning church service with a piece of paper taped to the front of him. "79-76. Who won?"

Since fans make this sport what it is, this is where we begin.

Through the blessing of VCRdom, UofL fans have a highlight video for the ages. A rescue from an otherwise dismal 1997 that included more NCAA humiliation for the basketball program; and a football season disaster that included a loss to Kentucky.

Through it all, this New Year's season in-state, Cardinal fans can bask in the warmth of Saturday's stunner for a time and look forward to 'Our House 1998' theme when UK's football and basketball teams travel I-64

No matter where Conference USA competition and the NCAAs take the Cardinals this season, UofL fans have Dec. 27, 1997 to enjoy.

Kentucky fans? Bad taste in the mouth for months and a bruise in the heart that will linger at least a season. Even if the Wildcats win an SEC title and an NCAA one, the specter of losing at home to Denny Crum's team will be haunting. And Bill Keightly won't sleep easy

Second, the big picture. What's the meaning of UofL's victory over UK? Revitalizes the series, right? Wrong! Who decided it needed

victories the last seven years, have filed quietly into Rupp Arena, any tickets gone unsold? If so, then it is news. And, this year's game, like everyone before it, drew a television network crew to the state. A series revitalized? Baloney. For those paying attention, history tells us these things oscillate and that, along with the unexpected, is the beauty of it.

Third, the metro media.

Amusing to see preachy metro columnists beat a hasty retreat a day after predictions gone badly. Form? Cutie columns entitled 'Wha' happened?' and 'Good old Denny Crum ... isn't he something after all?'

Even when a game is not played very well it can be a marvelous experience of underdog rising up to bite its uppity neighbor.

The study of eschatology (end-time events) was non-existent within our

Christian circles. I often hear, "Why not go back to a simpler time?! I don't understand all these complicated Biblical prophecies, and what I don't understand, I don't trust! Give me that ole' time religion." Modern Charismatic Fundamentalist movements were

born from such attitudes. For example, if you were in charge of an evangelistic organization depending upon the financial support of those who agreed with you, would you "target" your messages to theologians who graduated from accredited seminary colleges, or would you appeal to the average person? Would you try to gain their support with difficult theological issues, or would you win their financial favors with doctrine they WANTED to hear? Would you adhere strictly to the truth regardless of how many it offended, or would you compromise your message to please the broadest spectrum of the Christian population? In 2 Timothy 4:3, Paul wrote, "For the time will come when men will not put up with sound doctrine. Instead, to suit their own desires, they will gather around them a great number of teachers to say what their itching ears want to hear." That time has come, and oversimplification of the Bible, regardless of how appealing that may sound, has introduced much

heresy into orthodox Christianity. Nevertheless, I agree; let's go back to that "ole' time religion!" But let's not stop with our grandparents or great-grandparents. Let's go back to the really "ole" time religion," and examine the beliefs of 1st, 2nd, and 3rd century Christians. They were much closer than our grandparents to the true Christian theology taught by the

Victorinus, a bishop of Petau (A.D. 240-304), in his "Commentary of the Apocalypse," wrote that the Church would be "removed" to escape the wrath of God "when the Church shall have

gone out of the midst" of the coming tribula-The tion. "Didache," (A.D. Hippolytus (A.D. 170-236) Treatise on the Christ

Antichrist," "The Epistles of Cyprian" (A.D. 200-258), "The Shepherd of Hermes" (A.D. 130), "Lactantius' Commentary on the Apocalypse" (2nd century), "The Epistle of Barnabas" (A.D. 100), and "The First Epistle of Clement' (A.D. 30-100), all teach of a rapture of the church and insinuate an "escape" or "removal" of the church during the tribulation period. The concept of a pre-tribulation rapture is definitely not new; it was obviously an integral concept of the Church in its infancy!

Lactantius, Hippolytus, and Victorinus also taught of the 7-year rule of the antichrist in fulfillment of Daniel's seventieth week prophecy, a literal "Mark of the Beast," a literal false prophet, a literal one-thousand-year reign of Christ on the earth, the antichrist and seven kings would come from the Roman empire, 10 kings will give their power to the antichrist, the nation of Israel would be restored, the Roman empire would be revived, the Jewish temple would be rebuilt in Jerusalem, and the sun-clothed woman of Revelation 12 is Israel. Sounds just like Hal Lindsey or John Hagee on TBN, doesn't it?

In addition, Justin Martyr, Eusebius, Tertullian, Irenaeus, Hippolytus, and many other ancient writers (and writings) adamantly support a pre-millennial return of Christ and a literal (not allegorical) interpretation of the Bible. It is important to recognize that these aforementioned writings are not inspired, but they accurately reflect the attitudes of Christians within the first three centuries of Christianity - and there are virtually no dissenting opinions by other early Christian writers of the aforementioned subjects.

So, the next time I sing "Give Me That Ole' Time Religion," I'll sing it with gusto. The old time religion of the apostles and early Church fathers required study and the development of Christian maturity (see Hebrews 6:1-3). Dedicated Christians should progress beyond the "spiritual



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
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

— Tickets to Prosperity: According to the Malaysian minister for culture and tourism, speaking to a reporter in December, the country should exploit as a tourist attraction its frequent, potentially lucrative mass-circumcision events. And in October, a prominent Thai surgeon told a Bangkok seminar that his country could become the sexchange-operation capital of the world and boost the country's ailing economy. (He pointed to Thailand's price friend-liness: about \$5,000 to change biological males and \$10,000 to change biological females.)

— In August, The New York Times reported on a movement in Montana to declare as a national historical park the decaying city of Butte (described as "one of the worst industrial crimes against nature" in history). In the center of Butte is the Berkeley Pit, "a Grand Canyon of open-pit mining," wrote the Times, "an 874-foot-deep chasm filled with 26 billion gallons" of "toxic stew" that grows by 3 million gallons a day. In 1995, 300 snow geese landed by mistake in The Pit, believing at night that it was a normal lake, and were killed when their stomachs corroded. On the plus side, the surrounding area is picturesque, and the city has some of the oldest brothel edifices in the West.

— According to the Times of London in a July report, 85-year-old Giovanni Beghini is organizing Italy's elderly who want to avoid the country's often-frightening old-folks' homes by allowing themselves to be adopted by strangers. In exchange for part of their pensions and for mentions in their wills, families will care for seniors as honorary grandparents.

subsequent punishment. The Voice published photos of Belgian UN troops "roasting" one live Somalian child over an open fire in 1993 and force-feeding vomit and worms to another. — The government of the Indian state of Tamil Nadu announced in August that it would offer stepped-up welfare benefits to poor women who give birth to female babies, in exchange for the mother's promise not to kill the baby, which is an increasing problem as males are more economically valuable. Also, the government will require 30-day hospital stays for mothers with baby girls, to increase the bonding, which it believes will decrease the murders.

— According to a 1996 FBI surveillance tape of suspected U.S. spy James M. Clark, 49, who was arrested in October 1997 with two other 1970s radical leftists, Clark says, while alone in his apartment, "Oh, yes, I think we should. — In July, Roy Bruce Smith, 50, was executed in Virginia for killing a police officer in 1988, but he was a busy man in the years before his death, promoting the obsession that he acquired behind bars: that, in the words of his lawyer, "the whole world is being poisoned" by soy products (which cause, for example, diabetes and Parkinson's disease) and that magnesium is the remedy. Accordingly, he ate Rolaids incessantly and requested Epsom salts with his last meal. His lawyer said Smith would also have

— Last week, News of the Weird reported that in October an Australian judge had decided to impose national law instead of tribal punishment for an Aborigine who had killed a nephew. In November, the judge changed his mind, let the man off with time already served, and released him to his community, where he was immediately taken and speared nine times in the left thigh and six in the right by various family members, and hit three times in the head with a club by his sisters. Kempner had admitted to relationships with assistants and patients that Ryan called a sex cult and to incidents of spanking patients who strayed from his unique rice-and-fruit diet.

There was millions of tons of soil from the beds of the rivers regurgitated and placed on land. This river bed soil helped promote new life and growth from its rich soil full of plant nutrients. Fruit trees of every kind have had some fruit, although late frost killed some. If you observe next year's fruit spurs, you'll see they are loaded for a heavy fruit crop of

apples and pears. There is another way of looking at the areas that have a scarcity of nuts and berries. Maybe in those areas, that had heavy spring fruit and other plant losses due to late killing frost will have a milder winter than the rest of us

milder winter than the rest of us.

The beautiful fall coloring of trees.
Every year they are breathtaking. But to borrow half a line, sometimes we don't see the trees because of the beauty of the forest. Did you also notice that the trees were also heavy with sailing seeds being deposited in every direction far and wide? I noticed this at seed disposal time for ash and maple trees because I wanted to go fishing. I didn't get to go because it was too windy. Mother Nature was seeding

seeds of not only trees but ragweed, asters of every type, and nodding thistle to name a few into the air. I also noticed this fall, many young trees that germinated

from spring seeds such as elms, popular and sycamore due to the cool wet spring they grew vigorously. Walk outside your

Walk outside your home and look at flowering shrubs such as; Rose of

Sharon, rhododendrons, azaleas, and dogwoods are all loaded with next year's heavy spring and summer blooms.

As I've said before, I believe Mother Nature and the good Lord take care and provide for the survival of plants and animals. The bumper crop of wildlife could be telling us that this is going to be a cold hard winter, and that many animals will die as a result of cold temperatures and snow cover. It may take a bumper crop of animals to maintain a high rate of survival. To feed this bumper crop of wildlife, as I stated, there is also a bumper crop of nut and seed bearing trees for wildlife to gather and store.

Predatory birds have had a feast on the heavy population of small game animals. The wet spring provided for vigorous growth of plants that larger game such as deer like to browse. There were plenty of worms and soil insects for turkey and other birds.

The warm ocean temperatures have made it possible for fish to travel to other areas that they haven't been in years. Plant and tree seeds have been scattered to also possibly give a higher survival rate.

I want to mention that in a coal mine the rats that are inside know instinctively when there is going to be a roof fall. When you see rats on the move heading for the outside, it's time for everyone to get out. This is the internal alarm or sensor that I am referring to that plants and animals have.

My forecasts for the winter is the same as "Mother Nature's." There will be very below normal cold temperatures and above normal precipitation in the form of ice and snow. The ground could be covered for extended times. Some areas will be worse than others, and I believe that in our little corner of the world in Appalachia it will be worse than normal. I think this is the same forecast that the scientists who are studying El Nino are making. Seems we all are in agreement.

Big Blue Crush brings in thousands of donors

Lineberger said she appreciated the sentiment, but declined the offer of reimbursement, indicating that she had no intention of being reimbursed and that she would prefer that the May House's financial account not be diminished because of her party. She said her intent was to help the May House increase its profits and public visi-

Despite her objections, Robert Perry made a motion that the May House approve giving Lineberger

\$500. The vote was six in favor and

four opposed.

John Rosenberg urged the need for general guidelines for public use of the May House. He said that from a legal perspective, no board member can receive any special benefits that others from the com-

munity would not normally receive.

For example, he said, if the group gave \$500 to Mabel for her party, then they would have to give at least \$500 to the next person who rented the May House for a function. Given that, Rosenberg said, the policy would defeat the group's fundraising efforts.

Member Sam Hatcher called for a re-vote on the motion that Lineberger be reimbursed. The vote was one in favor and nine opposed.

Also discussed at the meeting was a segment airing on television regarding the May House. A series, entitled "Big Sandy Memories," kicked off its programs with an interview with Robert Perry, Sam Hatcher, and Prestonsburg tourism director Fred James.

Several members of the group mentioned that they saw the pro-

gram on television. A second episode is planned and includes an interview with E.B. and Bill May, former owners of the home.

Spoon about 1/4 cup refried beans on each tortilla; top with turkey mixture and 1 tablespoon sour cream and roll up. Serve on a bed of shredded lettuce. Makes 6 servings.

CUBED POTATO SOUP

4 large potatoes

2/3 cup low-fat margarine

2/3 cup flour 7 cups skim milk

I tablespoon instant minced

I package (16 ounces) Farmland Bacon, fried crisp and crumbled, divided

1 1/4 cups (5 ounces) shredded Cheddar cheese, divided

1 carton (8 ounces) sour cream

1/2 teaspoon white pepper

Bake or boil potatoes until fork tender. Allow to cool slightly, peel and cut in 1-inch cubes. Melt margarine in large saucepan. Blend in flour with wire whisk, stirring until smooth. I teaspoon Oriental sesame oil Cut pork across grain into 1/2inch wide strips; coat with mixture of garlic and 1 Tbsp. stir-fry sauce.

cook noodles only in 2 quarts boiling water, 2 minutes; drain. Rinse with cold water, drain thoroughly. Heat 1 Tbsp. vegetable oil in hot wok or large skillet over high heat. (5 oz. uncooked dry) 1 can (1 1/2 oz., about 1 cup)

shoe string potato sticks Pour egg product into small microwaveable bowl. Microwave at HIGH (100%) for 1 minute. Stir. Microwave at HIGH 45 seconds longer or until set. Cool. Cut into

HONEY DIJON

PEANUT-CRUSTED CHICKEN 2 tablespoons butter or mar-

garine 1/2 cup plain yogurt

2 tablespoons honey 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard 1/3 cup flour

1/3 cup finely chopped dryroasted peanuts

1/2 teaspoon paprika Salt and fresh ground pepper to

4 (5-ounce) boneless, skinless chicken breast halves or legs

1/4 cup whole dry-roasted peanuts

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Place butter or margarine in 13- by 9- by 2-inch baking dish in oven while preheating. Remove when butter is just melted; set aside.

In a small bowl or pie plate, combine yogurt, honey and mustard, mixing until smooth; set aside. In another bowl or pie plate, combine flour, chopped peanuts, paprika, salt and pepper. Coat chicken in yogurt mixture, covering both sides, then dredge in flour mixture.

Place chicken in prepared baking dish, turning to coat with melted butter or margarine. Scatter whole peanuts over chicken. Bake 30 to 35 minutes or until juices run clear. Makes 4 servings.

PIZZA-STYLE MEATLOAF

11/2 pounds lean ground beef 3/4 cup Quaker oats (quick or old fashioned, uncooked) 1/2 cup finely chopped onion

1/2 cup water

2 cloves garlic, minced I teaspoon dried oregano

leaves 1/2 teaspoon salt (optional)

1/2 teaspoon black pepper

1 (141/2 oz.) can Italian seasoned diced tomatoes, drained 1/4 cup sliced ripe olives



Heat oven to 375° F. In large bowl, combine first 8 ingredients, mixing lightly but thoroughly. On rack of broiler pan, shape beef mixture into round patty about 9 inches in diameter.
