At the Mud Creek Clinic at Grethel Monday, national political leader Rev. Jesse Jackson was greeted with handshakes and hugs — and a request by a precocious ten-year-old that a lot of adults were hesitant to ask.

Devan Carroll, the son of Alex and Beverly Carroll of Grethel, presented Jackson with a photo. On the back of the photo, he had written, "Mr. Jackson, may I have a job when you are president?"

"This is the man who's getting in on the ground floor," Jackson responded. He kept the youth by his side as he talked to a crowd of people gathered at the clinic Monday as part of his "Leave No American Behind" tour.

Jackson embraced the cause of miners crippled by Black Lung disease, saying that too few people know about the issue and pointing out that America has focused on the hazards of cigarette

and second-hand smoke.

"Surely, we can understand sucking up coal dust can create problems ... Americans have become conditioned to stepping on coal miners, we're going to end that," Jackson said.

"We're not talking black skin," Jackson said. "We're talking black lungs."

He added that occupational safety rules must be enforced and the government has an obligation to ensure those laws are observed.

The political activist told the Mud Creek gathering that he will conduct a "big march in Kentucky."

"We're not talking black skin," Jackson said. "We're talking black lungs."

Jackson compared Appalachia's poverty to the sinking of the Titanic and explained that people aboard the ship were sepa-

rated by class.

"They had gates separating them — except when the water came in. (It) came in from the bottom up ... When the water comes in, none of us are real safe. There's a Titanic ... in these mountains. Every year, America is blessed with surplus enough to take care of its people. That's why we march."

He stressed the need for a managed health care system for the whole nation. He called current health care a "retarded system," and said he wanted the same type of health care for the nation's poor that members of Congress receive.

"Managed health care has become a money health care," Jackson said. "... The system has to change. We need a comprehensive plan — the same plan we have for Congress, we need for Eastern Kentucky."

Jackson praised the efforts of

County holds deeds to Garth and Clark

Back-scratching seemed to be the consensus of members of the Floyd County Fiscal Court Friday regarding the transfer of property from the county to the school board.

A recent title search by the Appalachian Land Title Company in Pikeville found that Clark Elementary and Garth Area Vocational Education Center (the Floyd County Technical High School) are owned by the Floyd County Fiscal Court and not by the Floyd County Board of Education. Apparently, the past administrations of the fiscal court failed to transfer the deeds to the Floyd County Board of Education when the bonds for the schools were retired in 1982, Floyd County

Judge-Executive Ben Hale told magistrates.

School districts are prohibited by the state Constitution from financing construction projects. Kentucky law states that the county government can issue bonds for construction of those schools by holding the title of the school board property and leasing it back to the school system until the bonds are retired.

When the judge-executive asked for authorization to transfer the title to the school board, he received a counter-proposal from the magistrates.

"Ask the school board if we can work out a deal with the Garrett Park," magistrate Jackie E. Owens said. "I'd like to see the fiscal court (own the park). Right now, we've got to pay stuff out of the court's

pockets. If it was fiscal-court owned, we can get grants."

Hale agreed with the proposal.

"The Garrett Park ... has a 30-year lease. I didn't think it necessary to go ahead and buy the property, but if it's at the right price, we'll go ahead and buy it. You make a valid point, Jackie," the judge-executive commented.

Magistrate Gerald DeRossett said the court was in the same situation with Auxier. Both pieces of property are owned by the Floyd County Board of Education and leased by the county.

The fiscal court has a three-year lease on the Auxier Park property, but the school board wants to liquidate that property, Hale said, adding

Leslie is killed in crash

A Bull Creek man died Sunday as a result of injuries sustained in a Saturday evening accident on KY 1428 near Worldwide Equipment, south of Prestonsburg.

Bernard Leslie, 44, was traveling north when his vehicle left the road and struck a pole shortly after 8 p.m. on September 19, according to a Kentucky State Police report.

Leslie was taken first to Highlands Regional Medical Center and

then transferred to Cabell-Huntington Hospital in Huntington, West Virginia. He died Sunday evening, according to the Wayne County (WV) Medical Examiner's Office.

KSP Trooper Damon Gayheart is continuing to investigate the accident.

A construction worker, the victim was born in Floyd County on April 25, 1954, a son of Aretta Wright of Prestonsburg and the late Edgar Leslie.

He is survived by his wife, Wilma Wallen Leslie; his in-laws,

Ollie P. and Emma Grace Wallen; two brothers, Donald Wright of Morehead and Eugene (Buddy) Wright of Reynoldsville, Ohio; and three sisters, Betty Sue Pitts of Columbus, Ohio; Lois Faye Walke of Marysville, Ohio, and Ernestine Ward of Martin.

Funeral services will be Thursday, September 24, at 1 p.m. at Nelson-Frazier Funeral Home in Martin, with Manford Fannin and Russ Taylor officiating. Burial is to follow in the Wallen Family Cemetery on Bull Creek.

Water up, water down

Members of the Floyd County Rescue Squad were sent to rescue people trapped in their homes at Stratton Branch Monday when a flash flood sent water gushing down their hollow.

When the rescue squad arrived on the scene, the water had subsided. "The water went up, crested and went back into the banks within an hour," Lon May, Floyd Coun-

ty Disaster and Emergency Services coordinator, said Tuesday.

Rain gauges at Dewey Dam showed approximately one-inch of rain fell in that area within the past 24 hours. May said most that rain fell within a one-hour time frame.

The water roared down the hillside with so much force that it knocked buildings off their foundations, pulled a culvert loose, and tore up chunks of pavement, Tom Greathouse, a resident of Stratton

Branch, said Monday evening.

Greathouse said the water tore up the blacktop, picked up huge pieces of pavement and deposited it on grass near the roadway. It also created ripples in the blacktop.

"It's like a rollercoaster," he said. "I've never seen the effects of something like this — and within an hour. It's amazing."

Greathouse said the creek, which had overflowed from a creek, raised

Fiscal Court puts hold on ethnics revisions

The Floyd County Fiscal Court tabled an ethnics ordinance Friday that will change the way it looks at nepotism.

John Rosenberg, chairman of the Floyd County Ethics Commission and director of the Appalachian Defense Fund, and Peggy Bradford, a member of the commission, presented revisions of the Floyd County Ethics Code to the fiscal court Friday in the Floyd County Courthouse.

Rosenberg said the commission's main concern was nepotism. The current code says the county officials may not hire members of their immediate family.

The commission expanded that definition to mean "spouse, parent, child, brother, sister, mother-in-law, father-in-law, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, grandparent, grandchild, aunt, uncle, niece, or nephew."

Rosenberg said his group based their definition on the Kentucky Education Reform Act. (KERA)

"KERA uses a broader one," Rosenberg said. "You ought to look at that because it is in use by the school system throughout the state. It's a good model. You should at least add brother and sister (to the definition.)"

Floyd County Judge-Executive Ben Hale called for a reading of the ordinance, but stipulated that magistrates can amend ordinances before the second reading.

"For the most part, the code is an excellent code," Hale said. "Where we came to the wall was family member."

Magistrate Jackie Edford Owens asked that the issue be tabled because he did not have a chance to review the ordinance before Friday's meeting. Owens' wife, Hattie, is a crew leader for the county system.

"My wife was hired before this ever happened," Owens said. "I wasn't notified of (a work session with the ethics commission) until you were going out the door."

Owens' wife, as well as other family members of county officials will not be affected by any changes in the ordinance, because they were "grandfathered in," Floyd County Judge-Executive Ben Hale said later.

In June, the Floyd County Ethics Commission held a working meeting with members of the fiscal court to discuss changes in the code. The changes regarding the hiring of family members were not popular with some members of the court at that meeting, Rosenberg reported earlier.

Fiscal court members attending the June meeting suggested that family member be defined as "spouse,

parent, child."

Friday, court members only briefly discussed the definition and asked for a delay on the reading of the ordinance.

"The fiscal court needs time to study this. The one we've got now is state approved," Jackie Owens said. "We do have an administrative code now that is pretty strict."

Rosenberg disagreed.

"Although the code looks strict, (it covers) only the persons living in the household ... It does not include adult children living outside the home. It's pretty narrowing. We're asking you to step way beyond that," Rosenberg said.

Floyd County Judge-Executive Ben Hale recommended that the court schedule another work session

with the ethics commission to iron out their difference in opinion.

Members of the ethics commission include Lorena "Sis" Hall, Peggy Bradford, Patty Murphy, Bobby Joe Akers, and John Richard Porter. Hall and Bradford were reappointed to the commission during the fiscal court meeting Friday. Their terms of office expire on June 30, 2002.

that he has been discussing the situation with the school system.

Magistrate Elmer Ray Johnson said he didn't think the county should just hand over the deeds.

"One hand ought to wash another," Johnson said. "Why is it every time anybody wants something, the county gives it away, but when we want something, we must buy it? ... We've got the deed ... We might be sitting in the sissy seat."

Hale said he thought that Kentucky law requires that the county release the titles when the bonds are required. He asked Floyd County Attorney Keith Bartley to check into the law regarding the bond sale.

The court authorized Hale to

work out an agreement with the Floyd County School Board after he and Bartley reviewed the law.

The original contract between the board of education and the fiscal court stipulates that the court "convey said properties to this board free of all liens, encumbrances, pursuant to the provisions of sections 162.120 through 162.300 of Kentucky Revised Statutes."

three or four feet from the ground and swirled around, and into, trailers in the community.

At least two mobile homes in the area sustained flood damage, May said.

"The water may have gotten in or around a couple of others," he added.

He advised residents who had received flood damage to contact the American Red Cross, the Christian Appalachian Project, or the Floyd County Ministerial Association for assistance. He said the area did not sustain enough damage for federal assistance.

In addition to rescue workers and the DES personnel, representatives of the state Department of Surface Mining were at the site Monday evening to investigate surface mining operations in the area by Lodestar Energy.

Jerome Franklin, an environmental inspector for the Department of Surface Mining, said Thursday that investigators uncovered no evidence that mining operations had contributed to the high waters.

"The sediment structures were in compliance. They were functioning properly," Franklin said. "The flooding was mainly due to excessive run-off."

May said that sparse vegetation in the area could have been a contributing factor. Trees and plants help to absorb water, and their roots also help to keep soil from washing away, May said.

The Army Corps of Engineers placed a boom at the mouth of Stratton Branch to catch debris and keep it from entering the lake, May said.

The heavy rainfall also caused some streets to flood in downtown Prestonsburg.

Fiscal court purchases property for parking

Additional parking will soon be available to people using the Floyd County Justice Center and the

courthouse.

At its meeting Friday, the Floyd County Fiscal Court paid title search fees for the Chalmer Frazier and Rose Collins properties. Floyd County Judge-

Executive Ben Hale said the fiscal court recently completed purchase of the properties and will soon begin site preparation for parking lots.

The Collins property is adjacent to the justice center parking lot; the Frazier property is located across from the Prestonsburg Post Office.

The property was purchased with funds left over from the construction of the Justice Center due to one-half of one percent changeover on the building project, Hale said. The savings also earned interest, which made revenue available for the purchase, he added.

The purchase was approved by the Administrative Office of the Courts, which oversees administration of county facilities.

Hale said the properties will add about 100 spaces for parking. The court is putting finishing touches to parking located near the annex that created 49 additional spaces, he said.

Also at Friday's meeting, the fiscal court received some good news regarding senior citizens centers in the county. Wayland, Betsy Layne, McDowell and the Mud Creek senior citizens centers will receive \$50,000 each for improvement projects.

The funds are available through the state's surplus spending plan, Hale said. The fiscal court agreed Friday to act as administrator of the funds.

Mike Vance, director of Floyd County Solid Waste, presented some bad news to the court.

"We've noticed a downward trend in revenues," Vance said. "It won't be a surprise to everybody, but there will be a change."

Vance said he will bring a full report to the fiscal court at its October 16 meeting.

In other business, Friday, court members:

- held the first reading for an ordinance to amend the budget to receive \$200,000 through the Department of Local Government's state surplus spending plan that will go to the Floyd County Rescue Squad to renovate its building and to purchase a crash truck and rescue equipment, and to the Left Beaver Rescue Squad to buy a new four-wheel drive Suburban and a four-wheel mini pumper;
- hired Ricky J. Blackburn on a temporary, full-time basis at Allen Park at an hourly wage of \$5.15;
- increased by \$5 the reimbursement to county employees for the cost of physical examinations for CDL licenses;
- paid Floyd County Sheriff Paul H. Thompson \$266 for the state audit report of the 1996 tax account;
- appointed Donald Ray "Bunker" Tackett on the Floyd County Board of Assessment Appeals;
- paid Hamilton Construction Company Inc. \$5,456 for work on the parking lot behind the courthouse;
- accepted a monthly report

from Floyd County electrical inspector William Joe Kendrick;

- conducted the second reading of an ordinance to amend the budget to accept \$71,428 from the Finance and Administration Cabinet for the Big Sandy Family Abuse Center;
- issued a check to the Big Sandy Area Juvenile Detention Center for \$5,660.56, which will be reimbursed to the county

through educational grants;

- agreed to pay Floyd County Justice maintenance employees Claude Newberry \$823.84 (bi-weekly); Tom Poe, Eddie D. Tackett, and Gary Beverly, \$514.89 (bi-weekly); and Rebecca Moon, \$8.03 per hour;
- approved emergency transfers to cover road materials, motor vehicles, and DES training, travel and supply costs; and

- dispersed various bills and claims.

Magistrates attending the meeting were Jackie Edford Owens, Ernal Tackett, Elmer R. Johnson, and Gerald DeRossett; and

Also attending the meeting were Floyd County Attorney Keith Bartley, Floyd County Court Clerk Carla Boyd, and Floyd County Treasurer David Allen.

Roads adopted into county system

At their meeting in the Floyd County Courthouse Friday, members of the fiscal court adopted nine roadways into its system, and agreed to do repair work on a cemetery road.

Those roads included:

- 500 feet of Ed Ousley Drive. The road is located off State Route 122 on Spurlock Creek and two families use the road for access to their properties.
- 1,000 feet of Frasure Drive. The road is located off State Route 1427 at Abbott. Two families use the road.
- Reynolds Drive, 500 feet, located off State Route 3386 at Corn Fork. The road is used by four families.
- Creek Side, 200 feet, located off State Route 122 at Spurlock. Three families use the road for access.
- Church House Street at Emma. A distance of 250 feet was adopted into the county road system.
- Matt Jones Cemetery road, 2,000 feet. The road length is approximately 2,000 feet, according to court records.
- Emmies Branch road at Spewing Camp. The fiscal court

adopted approximately 40 feet of the road into its system. Ten families live along the roadway.

- Johnson Road at Bryant Branch, 1/4 mile. The road is used by five families.
- And, Howell Subdivision on Hunts Fork at Prater Creek.

County resident Preston Collins asked the court at its meeting Friday to fix drainage problems on Lucy Hall Cemetery Road. Collins said lack of a drain pipe near the cemetery gate causes water to stand in the road.

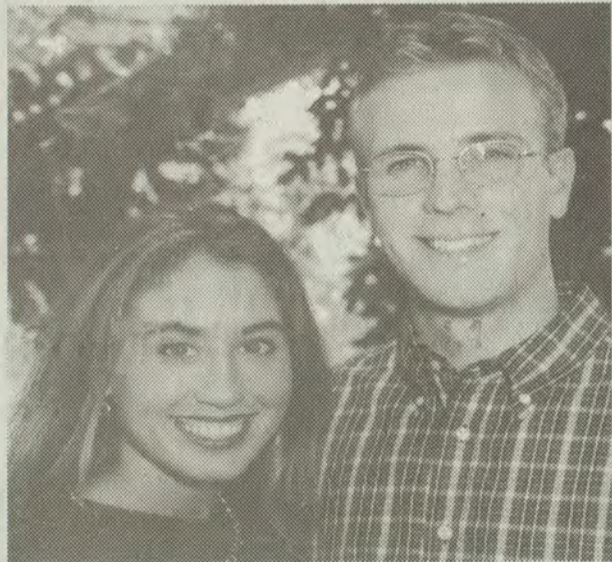
"It freezes in the wintertime," Collins said, requesting that the road be repaired before the advent of cold weather.

Magistrate Jackie Owens told Collins that the cemetery road was in county road system and that the county "can legally fix it."

"If it's on the map, they'll blacktop it," Owens said.

Floyd County Judge-Executive Ben Hale told Collins that the road was "already down for blacktopping," and Elmer Ray Johnson, magistrate for Collins' district, said he would have his crew fix the problem.

ANNEXATION

A city expands its jurisdiction into outlying areas through the method of annexation. The procedure is controlled by the Kentucky Statutes passed by the legislature in Frankfort and is not established by either the city or the county fiscal court. In most cases annexation is voluntary, where people asked to be annexed into the city. Annexation is the extending of the city's artificial boundary line and does not take the property away from the person being annexed. What are the benefits of annexation and why would someone ask to be annexed?

1. Police protection provided by the city's police force.
2. Fire protection provided by the city's fire department.
3. City water and sewer.
4. Garbage collection.
5. Protecting the integrity of a neighborhood through zoning laws.
6. Protecting the owners and occupants of buildings from unsafe conditions through building code enforcement.
7. Lower insurance premiums.
8. Right to vote in city elections and have a voice in the operation of the city government.
9. City maintenance of streets and sidewalks.
10. Being able to participate in city operated recycling efforts.

What are the detriments to being annexed?

1. City property tax. In the City of Prestonsburg the real property tax rate is \$.21 per \$100 valuation. The North Floyd Fire Tax rate is \$.10 per \$100 valuation. On a piece of property valued at \$100,000.00 the city tax would be \$210.00 and the North Floyd Fire Tax would be \$100. It would cost an extra \$110.00 to be annexed.

An abuse built on a lie

The record is long, but easy to read. It shows that the coal industry always predicts doom if government acts against its unsafe operations, its environmental defilement, its illegal haulage, its aesthetic intrusions. Doom never descends.

Industry leaders have demanded regulation that is "closest to home," cynically confident that state regulators will be easier to reach and to intimidate. Strip mine operators have promised to leave the terrain, the waterways, the wildlife habitat, the local economies better off, only to break that pledge at site after site. And when government on occasion has roused itself to act, they've simply retreated and regrouped, or nodded politely and forged ahead. And government has hid its face.

All of these themes are restated in the story of mountaintop removal, which flattens coal-filled Appalachian knolls into moonscapes.

The industry begged to be allowed this practice, in recompense for the 1977 passage of the sensible federal law that required most hillside strip locations to be returned to their approximate original contour.

Only the coal industry would have urged a reward for itself for enduring a new law that was necessitated by its own outrageous conduct.

Operators promised to make the land better, more usable. But the truth is that vast stretches of remote flat

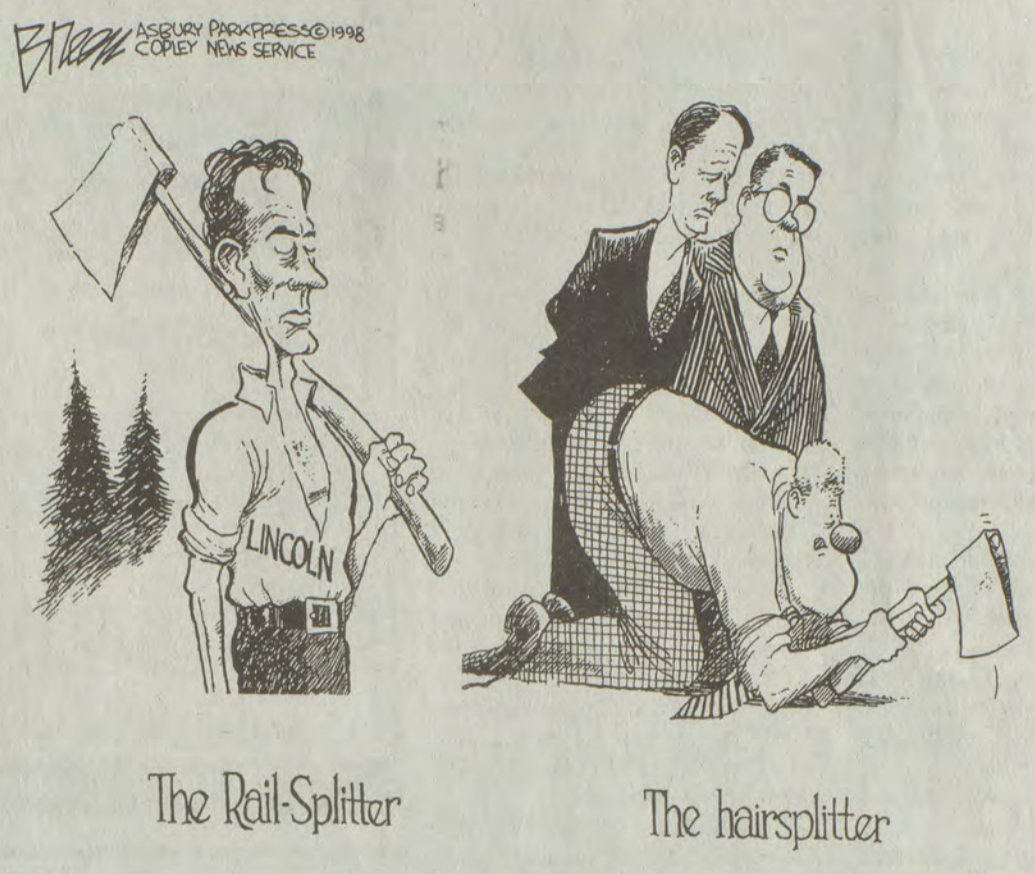
land are not going to be sites for new Appalachian cities, factories and farms. Building such things there, and extending services to them, is almost never feasible, as all but the most unashamedly cynical coal people will admit.

As Courier-Journal reporter Gardiner Harris pointed out last week, for 74 of the 367 mountaintop removal permits that have been issued since 1978, there is no post-mining land use listed. None. Even though it is required. And for another 94, the listed use is for forest land, which is what it was to begin with. And for another 57 it is "fish and wildlife," as if none lived there before the hills were scalped and made prostrate.

Since the era when Bill Sturgill and others pioneered this shameful mistreatment of mountain communities and Kentucky's natural heritage, operators have driven livestock onto the strip benches and called them cattle operations, abandoning them after a seemingly interval.

The mountaintop removal exemption is, by and large, a 151-square-mile travesty. It's an abuse built upon a lie. The Environmental Protection Agency is onto the lie, and is deciding what to do about it. Operators may find that both EPA and the U. S. Office of Surface Mining are more difficult to push around than the friendly folks at the state agencies "closest to home."

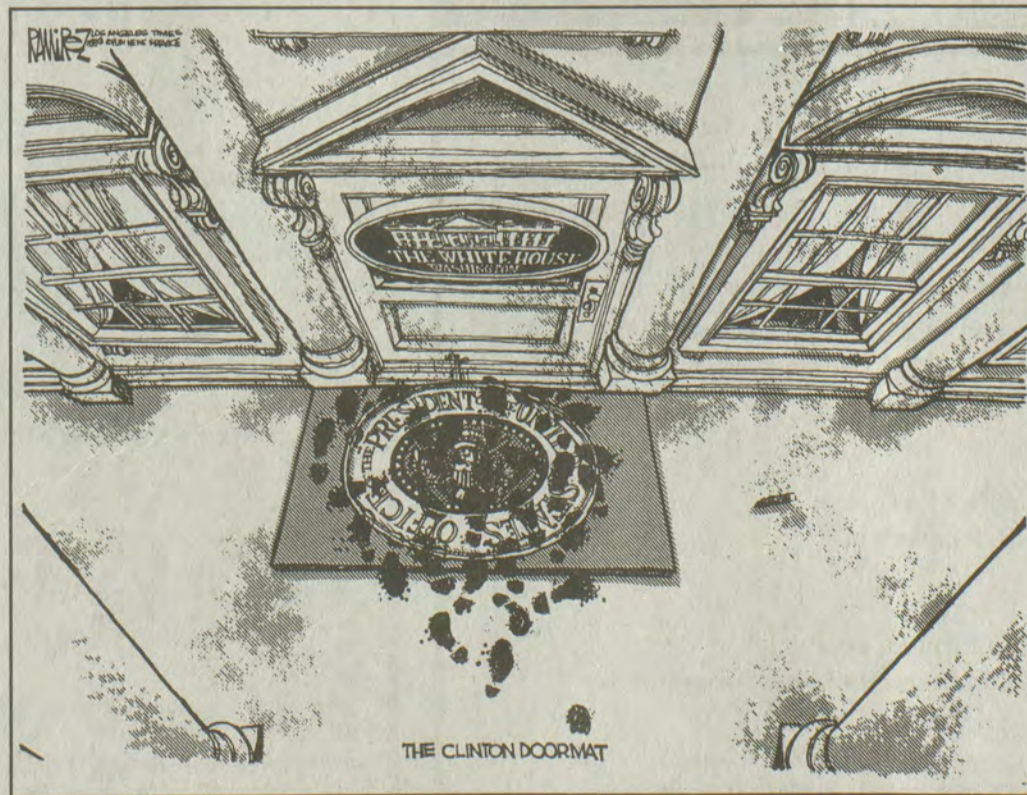

SCHOOL DAYS, SCHOOL DAYS: WHO'S IN CHARGE?

Many of us still remember the song, "School days, school days. Good old golden rule days. Readin' and writin' and arithmetic taught to the tune of a hickory stick." We are also likely to recall stern teachers with their hair in buns, the only male teacher being the principal, and the paddle being used whenever the teachers thought it was necessary to enforce the well-known rules. Now, parents fill out permission slips for students to be "paddled." Even with paddling looming in the background, the Annual Gallup Poll, for most of its 22-year existence, has found that the public "identified 'lack of discipline' as the most serious problem facing the nation's educational system." Others (1990) found that approximately one-half of all classroom time involves activities other than teaching with discipline problems being responsible for a significant amount of time lost from teaching.

Things to Ponder

Since everyone values the facilitating of learning and minimizing disruptions, "What Helps Students Learn" (1994) focused on the disciplining of students in educational settings. After reviewing 60 reports, 28 factors were identified as influencing student learning with the teacher's classroom management skills making the main contributions.

After the above study compared preventive discipline practices, significant characteristics of well-disciplined schools were as follows: It was found that school staff were more likely to make a commitment to establishing and maintaining appropriate student behavior as a necessity for learning. In addition, staff shared and communicated high expectations for appropriate student behavior. Students were expected to participate in the development of discipline programs and then efforts were made for students and staff to completely understand what were acceptable behaviors. Also, teachers and administrators revealed an interest in the students—their goals, achievements, and problems—and supported the students in their in- and out-of-school activities. A visible, supportive principal was seen talking informally with teachers and students in the hall, knew students by name, and showed interest in the students' projects. The principals assumed responsibility for solving serious problems, while teachers were allowed to be responsible for "run-of-the-mill" classroom discipline problems. The staff's development needs were addressed as necessary. (Several well-known "packaged" programs have been designed for teachers to improve their discipline techniques, such as Assertive Discipline and Teacher Effectiveness Training). High levels of communication and partnership with communities and parent involvement were recognized as making a difference in well-disciplined schools. One writer's summary (1988) was: "Research on well-disciplined schools indicates that a student-centered environment, incorporating teacher-student problem solving activities, as well as activities to promote student self-esteem and belongingness is more effective in reducing behavior problems than punishment."

As expected, problems will occur even in school settings with an excellent preventive discipline program. The following practices were found helpful for discipline problems by most schools, either school-wide or classroom levels. Punishment is effective in remediating the student's misbehavior if it: (1) matches the offense committed; (2) is viewed by the student as punishment. Depriving students of privileges has been the most effective and frequently used method; and (3) is presented with support, such as encouraging students to improve their behavior with assistance in learning how to make changes. Counseling is also beneficial; acting-out students are assumed to lack insight and need to learn to accept responsibility for their behaviors and consequences. Several studies found that in-school suspension with guidance, support, planning for change, and ways to build new skills was effective in increasing students' acceptable behaviors. Another approach to discipline problems by well-managed schools included contingency contracting that involved cooperative development and use of contingency contracts. In this way, the students knew exactly what would happen if they did not behave. The benefits of parents reinforcing school behaviors was also stressed, such as parents giving rewards and sanctions at home that evening, based on the student's behaviors that day.

"How a teacher manages a classroom—is not disciplines—is the most important factor influencing student learning" was repeated often. Teachers, as effective managers, had orderly

the staff at the Mud Creek Clinic, which was founded by Eula Hall. The clinic provides medical services to low-income families on a sliding-fee scale.

The civil rights leader said it's his intent to bridge the gap between Wall Street and Mud Creek. He urged local residents to vote and let their voices be heard by their senators.

"There's 12 U.S. Senators depending upon you not voting. If you vote, you'll change the dialogue ... You are giants; you must not have grasshopper complexes ... If we can increase voter turnout by 15 percent, you can change the dialogues (of the senators)... Power

comes when we change our minds. When we march ... things happen... Vote health care, vote education, vote decent housing, vote your hopes."

Jackson's national tour will conclude with a march in Nelsonville, Ohio, Sunday. A bus will be available at the Mud Creek Clinic to transport Floyd County residents to Ohio to participate in the march.

the House to ease the bureaucracy imposed by the agency that oversees the Medicare program on home health care providers. These regulations are not only causing many home health care services to go out of business, but they also threaten our seniors' ability to receive the care that best suits their own personal needs. On a similar front, I'm also co-sponsoring legislation that would re-establish venipuncture home health benefits, which will bring peace of mind to hundreds of home-bound residents.

Social Security is also facing financial insolvency, and Congress is tackling this problem head on. Earlier this year, the House passed legislation that sets up a bipartisan commission to identify ways to shore up the Social Security Trust Fund. We are also preparing to pass a bill that would set aside 90 percent of our budget surplus, or \$1.4 trillion, to help ensure Social Security's financial stability until we reach a bipartisan plan to save the program.

Lastly, I continue to fight for other programs on which seniors depend to make sure they get the money they need—programs like Meals on Wheels, the Low Income Housing Energy Assistance (LIHEAP) Program, and Green Thumb, which provides jobs for seniors. I am also trying to ensure that enough federal funding is provided this year so Kentucky can move ahead with its plans to build a new veterans home care facility in Hazard.

During my years in Congress, I have always fought for the seniors of Southern and Eastern Kentucky, and I will continue my efforts to ensure that their golden years shine brightly.

classrooms, a minimum of student misbehavior, and high percentages of students working. Although effective and ineffective managers did not differ significantly in approaches to disruptions, effective managers were much more skilled at preventing disruptions from happening in the first place; i.e., displayed in their behaviors to students that they knew what was going on; paid attention to several things at the same time; conducted smooth lessons with momentum; tried to keep all students focused on the task; and provided stimulating seat work.

In addition to communicating clear rules and consequences, teachers have found that the use of humor benefits in holding student interest and reducing classroom tensions. A good teacher has many ways to have a very exciting and creative classroom where students can enjoy learning new material, gaining insight, and not repeating their mistakes. Do you really know what happens in your child's classroom?

CDW state conference held

"Caring for children, dedicated to children, without judging children!"—that was the theme for the 1998 state conference for court-designated workers (CDWs). Charlotte Weddington, CDW for Floyd County, attended the conference, held this year at Lake Barkley State Resort Park.

A new program piloted by Street Law Inc. in Washington, D.C. was presented to the CDW's for use in their local communities. The program "Save Our Streets" (S.O.S.), targets young people who live in neighborhoods permeated by gun violence. S.O.S. is a diversion program for youth age 13 to 17 who have been charged with weapons offenses. The youths examine public policy issues concerning handguns and safety in their neighborhoods. Critical thinking and negotiation skills help youth become part of the solution, rather than part of the problem. CDWs will begin

implementing the S.O.S. program, particularly in the urban areas of the state.

Another highlight of the conference was the introduction of a new Juvenile Services Computer Program being developed for usage by CDWs to track juveniles in diversion. Other conference topics included domestic violence, substance abuse, and administrative procedures.

Among the speakers at the conference were representatives from Street Law Inc., SoftTec, the Kentucky Supreme Court, the Administrative Office of the Courts, the Attorney General's office, the Cabinet for Families and Children, and the Kentucky Retirement System.

The CDW program is administered through the AOC. Each of the state's 59 judicial districts is serviced by at least one CDW, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The purpose of the CDW program is to serve the best interest of the child.

First and second time, nonviolent juvenile offenders can avoid going to juvenile court by entering into diversion agreements with CDWs who monitor the progress of the juveniles and ensure completion of the diversion agreements. A recent survey of district judges found that 85 percent of the judges were very satisfied or satisfied with the CDW program.



1925 sixth-grade class of P'burg

The Great Depression was four years into the future of Prestonsburg Grade School's sixth grade class when they had their school picture taken during the spring of 1925.

It was the best of times—the Good Old Days, but there is not a smiling face in the group, not even the teacher and her two children show the slightest trace of a smile.

The lives of two class members ended in tragic accidents in and near Prestonsburg. Bessie Branham was crossing a rain-swept street near her Branham Street home when she was struck by an automobile.

Years later, Arthur Stephens was one of the three persons who died in the Spradlin Mine explosion across the river from Prestonsburg, and less than one-half mile from the street where Bessie died.

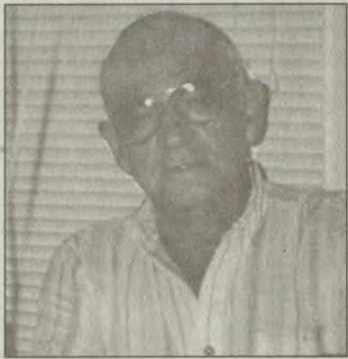
There were at least 22 members of the class. Estill Burchett, brother of twins Cotrell and Beverly, was not present for the picture. So far as I know, only three members of the class survive; Jack Allen who lives in Nashville, Tennessee and Prestonsburg residents Chester Meade and Delmas Saunders.

About one-half of the class stayed in the area and graduated from Prestonsburg or county high schools. A fourth moved away and the other four dropped out of school.

Arthur and Ray Stephens completed the seventh grade before quitting to work with their father in the coal mines. George Earl Craft may have quit for the same reason. So far as I know, those who stayed in school had successful careers and did quite well in life. This is probably true for those who left the area.

Jack Allen and Mary Elizabeth Auxier were at the top of Prestonsburg High School's graduation class of 1931. The Burchett brothers had successful careers as engineers and building contractors; Jack Allen, a high school textbook author and retired Vanderbilt professor may be the best educated member of the class. However, several members attended college. David May was a graduate of West Point Military academy, saw service in World War II, the Korean Conflict and retired with the rank of Major. Joe Hill was a businessman; Thomas Herald spent his working years repairing automobiles; Chester Meade had a long and varied career, saw service in World War II; worked as mail carrier and electrician; and in retirement, was manager of the Prestonsburg Low Rent Housing units. Delmas Saunders retired as supervisor for Kentucky-West Virginia Gas Company. Pauline Archer and Mary Elizabeth Auxier had long and successful careers as public school teachers. The last I heard from Gracie Craft she was living in Utah.

THIS & THAT

This Labor Day weekend was like many holidays in the past. There was the steady stream of south and eastbound traffic, Friday, into Eastern Kentucky and the west and northbound traffic of Sunday and Monday, out of Eastern Kentucky.

The high-rising tree-covered mountains of Eastern Kentucky with their deep valleys all filled with memories of youthful days is like a magnet drawing on the anticipated excitement of seeing old but endearing friends. Like the watchful towering oak tree on a mountain point, the guardians of our past are sadly disappearing. The friends and families of long ago are now holiday or 72-hour returning residents, who will soon slip into the past era. Their roots are deep and many-branched like the guardian old oak tree. Like autumn's flying leaves—some flat, some curled and twisted into different shapes, some clinging to the branch like our memories—the full moon of that weekend made the memories of old friends just a little more memorable in some hearts and more tearful in the eyes of others.

There are many family reunions taking place, but the granddaddy of all the reunions, are the school and hometown reunions. These events took place all over Eastern Kentucky on Labor Day weekend. This was the case in the town of Wayland, a small community in Floyd County, on the Right Fork of Beaver Creek. It has remained steadfast to its annual school and town reunion. The grade school has been demolished, but the high school building and gym still stand, no thanks to past closings by the school boards.

I met and got into another's toolbox of memories over Labor Day weekend, a former resident and student of Wayland, whose career in the field of education has touched many Kentuckians lives. I sat talking with this tan, softly spoken but vibrant man in the lobby of the Holiday Inn. At the age of 79, he looked like a distance runner; he still has a full head of hair; but it was graying in the right places, to give him a very distinguishing 50-ish appearance. He was wearing a short-sleeved white shirt and light-blue denim trousers. The man was Claude Frady, former principal of Hindman High School, former teacher of, as he stated, "six classes a day of English at Garrett High School, and the basketball coach of Garrett High in the years of 1948-49.

As I reached into Mr. Frady's toolbox of memories, I could see a long-ago young teenage boy as he described his days of growing up in Wayland's Coal Camp town. His father was a coal miner during the 1920's. It was during this time in the coal fields that miners moved from coal town to coal town. The miners followed the work, much like migrate workers follow vegetable crops today. Families of miners of that era would ask each other "how many times have you moved?" If you hadn't moved at least six-eight times you weren't classified as an experienced miner and the families hadn't been around much.

Frady was born in Wilder, Tennessee. His father, Claude Frady, and mother, Fannie Hall Frady, were also born in Tennessee. In the 1920's, they picked up their belongings and children and moved into Pike County Kentucky, at Marrowbone, then to Weeksbury in Floyd County, then on to Dwale, where he attended the second through the sixth grade. Then his father moved to Wayland. His father began working for Elkhorn Coal Corporation. He cut coal as a machinist. He finished his grade and high school days at Wayland High School, graduating in 1937. He journeyed into his past with friends such as Francis Harmon, Joe Hobbs, and Arthur Haywood and recalled the skills of Mabe Martin, to name a few who played baseball, basketball, and football at Wayland. He talked of his school days as a student at then Caney Creek Jr. College (Alice Lloyd College). The two of us had a time remembering to call it by its present name. He recalled living at Caney's Cottage on the campus at the University of Kentucky, then being drafted in his junior year. He graduated later and his first teaching days were at Wayland. Later he became principal of both the grade and Wayland High School.

Our conversation then pro-

gressed to his coaching and teaching days, first as a teacher at Garrett High School. I could see faces and hear the memories of the students and ballplayers flooding his thoughts and eyes. I could hear the referee's whistle and hear the bouncing basketball. I compared his memories to the blowing leaves

Labor Day and long ago faces

of that day as he described his teaching and coaching days. The branches of the guardian oak trees swayed in a blowing wind as he talked of his students and players. That was like comparing the uniqueness of a leaf. Each student had their place; each leaf is important as to the guardian oak. He named a student and then another, and the same thing would happen as he named his famed ballplayers. He told me of many of his outstanding English students and basketball players. I will try to name a few in this short article.

Frady was the basketball coach in 1948 when the Garrett High School "Black Devils" went to the state tournament. Many of his players were on the All District team: Dewey Duff, Jackie "Cougar" Slone, and Eugene Mullins. On the All Tournament

Team in Regionals were Dewey Duff, Jackie Slone, James and Eugene Mullins. Honorable mention on the State Team went to Dewey Duff.

Frady had forgotten in his modesty, as I reminded him, he was honorable mention as Coach of the Year in 1948. The school buildings

and its once young, energetic principal, Charles Clark, and many teachers live on in the fond memories of its former students. Frady stated one of Eastern Kentucky's foremost educators was Charles Clark.

Frady and his wife Eloise, live in Bowling Green. Garrett High and grade school, along with its

gymnasium and classrooms full of memories, have been leveled to the ground to build a park. All that remains of the school with once the largest enrollment in Floyd County and proud with tradition and memories, is a long-standing elm tree that stood behind the high school. Its long hanging branches, as if crying gracefully awaiting the arrival of the voices of children and the ringing of bells. Hopefully, in the wisdom of some, for the memories it will remain Garrett High School and sports field.

Mr. Frady and I hope to continue or travel into times past at "Our Appalachian Day" at Alice Lloyd College in October.

Mullins carries Prestonsburg past Cawood

Prestonsburg's Hank Mullins wasn't feeling too well at game time when the Blackcats hosted an undefeated Cawood Trojan team this past Friday night in one of the big district matchups this past week.

But it was Mullins' play on the gridiron that preserved a 32-22 win for Prestonsburg and improved their overall record to 3-1 on the season. It was the third straight win for the Blackcats since dropping their

opener to Lexington Catholic.

Mullins rushed for 77 yards and scored two touchdowns in a game that saw the Blackcats get very little on the ground against the Trojans. In fact, Mullins was

the leading ground gainer as Prestonsburg totaled only 114 yards rushing. Grant Castle rushed for 59 yards on 15 carries. Ortega finished with 39 yards and 15 carries.

Mullins had a catch good for 16 yards. But the passing game found a little success as Prestonsburg completed two halfback passes from John Ortega. Ortega hit Seth Crisp with a 34-yard pickup and found Nathan Leslie in the end zone for a 15-yard TD completion. Quarterback Adam Hall completed his one pass to Mullins. The Cats picked up 65 yards through the air for 179 yards total offense.

But Cawood didn't fare much better against the Blackcat defense with only 228 yards on offense. Sophomore Johnny Napier was hard to bring down as he rushed for 117 yards on 18 carries. But outside of Napier, there was very little for the Trojans. Quarterback Brad Lovely completed four of seven passes for 43 yards, giving the Trojans 271 yards for the game.

Cawood, who like to use the on-side kick, found success only once and that came in the fourth quarter when Prestonsburg coughed up the ball. The Trojans dominated the fourth quarter, but it was too late as Prestonsburg had built a surmountable lead. Cawood, a team that put 68 points on the scoreboard the previous week, had only two points after three quarters, that on a safety with 3:32 left in the second period.

Prestonsburg took a 6-0 lead on their first possession that started on the Trojans' 49-yard line after an unsuccessful on-side kick. With excellent field position, Prestonsburg went the 49 yards on nine plays with Mullins scoring from 8-yards out with 7:37 left.

Mark Branham led the Prestonsburg defense when Cawood had their first possession. Branham had three tackles that slowed the Trojans' running game, and they ended up losing the football on a fumble.

Cawood fumbled the football away to start the second quarter, setting up the second Prestonsburg touchdown. The Cats recovered the loose ball at the Cawood 23 and Adam Hall scored on a one-yard plunge. Ortega added the conversion for a 14-0 lead at the 10:08 mark of the second period.

Cawood got on the scoreboard just before the first half ended when Brook Stinnett had a punt blocked.

South Floyd slips at Pikeville, 46-26

Football is a game played in quarters, but Friday night, it was more like hockey — split into three periods. Homestanding Pikeville stormed out of the gates, posting a 20-0 lead by the 9:55 mark of the second period. South Floyd, however, got off the deck, and with a score on the first drive of the second half, tied the game at 26.

In the end, however, the Panthers scored the final three touchdowns to pull out a 46-26 win.

The Panthers improved to 4-1 on the season and prepare for Belfry this week winners of three straight, all coming against district opponents. South Floyd slipped to 1-3, 0-2 in district competition. The game was also Pikeville's first without the services of senior tailback Jonathan Chapman, who left last week's game early with what proved to be a torn ligament in his left ankle. Chapman, who transferred to Pikeville when his father, John, was hired to coach the Panthers, will likely miss the remainder of the season and see his next action playing for Hal Mumme's Kentucky Wildcats.

Judging by the offensive numbers the Panthers put up Friday, they didn't seem to miss him. The senior Chapman turned loose the passing game, and senior signal-caller Ben Howard completed 17-24 passes for 294 yards. Combine that with 218 rushing yards, and the Panthers totaled 512 yards worth of offense.

Early on, it looked like a cakewalk for the home team. Pikeville led 14-0 before the Raider offense hit the field.

Pikeville took the opening kickoff and moved 65 yards on only seven plays. Howard's third pass completion of the drive — all to junior end

Jeremiah Akers — covered the final 25 yards for the score. Howard proved early he knew who the money man was on this night, as he eventually completed 13 passes to Akers for an amazing 209 yards. After Kyle Bow booted the PAT, senior Aaron Collins recovered a fumble on the kickoff, and Pikeville needed only eight plays to move 37 yards for the score. The touchdown was another Howard-to-Akers pass, this one for 24 yards.

Bow was again good for the 14-0 lead with 5:39 still to play in the opening period.

South Floyd moved the ball to the Panther 23 before turning it over on downs. Pikeville ran 10 plays — including four more passes from Howard to Akers for another 54 yards — on its next drive, scoring on an eight-yard run by freshman Barrett Rogers. The lead was 20-0 with 9:55 left in the half.

"We had some pretty good defensive stands," said Raider Coach Don Daniels. "We had them fourth and long a couple of times early, but we gave up the big play. We told them all week we couldn't do that. Our guys needed to step up."

The veteran coach should remember what he told his team, as the Raiders rallied to within six points by intermission. Keyed by a series-opening 51-yard pass from Charlie Williams to Kyle Tackett, South Floyd quickly scored. The final three yards came on a

run by sophomore B.J. Bryant. After a penalty for illegal substitution, Williams hit Jarrod Johnson for the conversion.

Pikeville fumbled on its third play of the next drive, and the Raiders capitalized. They needed nine plays to move 55 yards, scoring on a pass from Williams to Tackett from 11 yards out. The conversion run failed, but the Panther lead had been trimmed to 20-14 with 4:43 to play in the half. Pikeville responded quickly though. The next drive was a short one — four plays covered 65 yards, including a pass from Howard to sophomore Chase Gibson for the 46-yard touchdown.

While the conversion failed, Pikeville's lead was back to 26-14. South Floyd wasn't finished for the first half either, responding with a nine-play, 56-yard drive which ended when Darren Newsome scored from a yard out with 33.3 seconds left in the half. The pass for the conversion was incomplete, sending the teams to the locker rooms at 26-20. The Raiders took advantage of having the opening possession of the second half, capping the 11-play, 63-yard drive with another one-yard run by Newsome. Again the conversion failed, but the game was knotted at 26.

"Our kids play hard," Daniels said of his team's rally. "It doesn't matter what the score is; they don't look at the scoreboard. I'm tickled to be coaching a group like this. They play hard, and play hard the whole game."

Daniels said the game could have been different had the conversion pass been complete and the Raiders took the lead.

"We could have put some pressure on them," he



18th Annual Dirt Track World Championship comes to Thunder Ridge Speedway in October

The Thunder Ridge Motor Speedway will be the home of the 18th annual Dirt Track World Championships in October in a shootout that dirt track fans will not want to miss.

Track promoter Brad Martin said he wants local fans to have first choice at the tickets.

"They need to get them ordered early," Martin said. "I want our fans to have the first shot at the tickets. They have been good to us this race season, and I want them here for the World Championship."

The Dirt Track World Championship is considered the jewel of dirt track racing, according to Herman Staads, director for D.T.W.C. It will come to Thunder Ridge for three dates: October 16, 17, 18. Rain dates will be October 24 and 25.

Pennsboro Speedway, located in Pennsylvania, was recently flooded, causing damage to the speedway that officials determined could not be repaired in time for the October dates. The committee, led by Staads set out to find an alternate facility. Thunder Ridge was placed at the top of the list of places.

"The facility at Thunder Ridge was one of the reasons for picking the site," Staads said. "It is a beautiful facility. I mean it is gorgeous."

Staads also commented that the central location of the speedway was a determining factor.

"The location of Thunder Ridge is excellent," he said. "We will have drivers from Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia, Kentucky, Ohio, Illinois and

those dates," Staad said. "It will affect all the places of business, restaurants. People will be eating out and it is just going to be a big boost to the local

said. "So, it is doubtful the race would have returned there."

Could Thunder Ridge become the permanent home for the World Championship?

"There is that possibility. We will wait and see how it goes after this year," Staad said.

Staad cited the cooperation of the City of Prestonsburg in helping with preparation of the track.

"Mayor (Jerry) Fannin has been most helpful," Staad said. "We are adding more seating for the race, and he has been working to get us portable bleachers from Allen Central High School. I talked with Patty Maynard (Allen Central principal) and she is willing to help anyway she can."

Staad, like Martin, said fans should get their ticket orders in early and avoid standing in line.

"And there will be a lot of standing in line," he said. "Those who have advance tickets will be met at the door, put on a wrist band and go on their way."

"We like the atmosphere at Thunder Ridge with the horse barns," Staad said "It is something like what Pennsboro used to be like."

Pre-entry fee in the race is \$100 per car with the winner of the Steel Block Late Model feature, which will run on Friday, October 16, receiving \$1,500 to win. Gates open on Friday at 5 p.m. General admission seating will cost the race fan \$10 and \$15 for the pit area.

On Saturday, October 17, the time

Kenseth's coming out party

You wouldn't think a track with the nickname of "The Monster Mile" would be the site of a driver's first Winston Cup race. Winston Cup racing is one sport that has opportunity sometimes knocking at odd times and odd places. Such was the case this past weekend for 26-year-old Matt Kenseth.

Kenseth found himself being offered the opportunity to drive for one of the biggest names in the sport when he was asked to fill in for Bill Elliott last Sunday in the MBNA Gold 400 at Dover Downs International Speedway. Elliott was back at home attending the details associated with the death of his father this past week.

The number of drivers out there each week available to fill in for a driver is quite numerous. The problem is that the talent level of this pool of drivers is limited at best. Sure, the list has some very recognizable names in it, but just how many of these good ol' boys have ever really tasted any success in Winston Cup.

For Elliott the timing of having to miss a race couldn't have come at a more critical time in the schedule. His sponsor, McDonalds has a new paint scheme on his Ford and you can bet was counting on Bill to get it as much exposure

as possible. Also adding to Elliott's woes was the fact that the former Winston Cup champion has yet to post a top five finish this year.

Taking all of this in consideration, then it probably wasn't that hard of a decision to pick Matt Kenseth as his replacement driver. Matt just may be one of the best

drivers in either the Winston Cup or Busch Series that few people know much about. Kenseth rewarded the confidence that Elliott placed in him with a solid sixth place finish at Dover.

Thanks to the headlines that Dale Earnhardt Jr. keeps grabbing in the Busch Series, the year that Kenseth has quietly put together has almost gone unnoticed. Last Saturday in the MBNA Gold 200, Kenseth drove his Monte Carlo to victory lane for the third time this season.

Kenseth is presently in second place in the Busch Series point standings trailing Earnhardt Jr. by 140 points. On the year he has recorded 12 top-five's and ten top-10s finishes to go along with his three victories. Just as important is his ability to bring a car home, as he has only failed once to be running at the end of an event.

Like most young drivers, Matt was introduced to racing through his family. His dad made him a deal when he was 13, he would buy a race car and drive it if he would work on it and keep it up. Then at age 16, Matt would take over the driving chores.

By age 19, Kenseth had already moved up to the ultra-competitive Wisconsin super late model ranks taking on the likes of Dick Trickle, Ted Musgrave and Rich Bickle. He became the youngest driver to ever win in the ARTGO Challenge Series. The old record was held by Mark Martin, which puts him in good company.

He kept moving from track to track and in the process won numerous track championships. He became one of the dominating drivers in the Late Model Series in 1994-95 as he registered 34 feature event wins during that time.

Eventually the urge to pack up and travel south to compete in the Busch Series became too great and in 1997 he started in 21 Busch Series events. Even though he didn't run the full schedule last year he still finished 15th in points and finished second in rookie points. He had a couple of third place finishes at Dover and California and also recorded seven top-ten finishes.

All of this may have been going on unnoticed to the general race fan, but it didn't get by the eye of

Jack Roush. Earlier this year Roush signed Matt to a service contract for the future and it seems that he is assured of some day ending up in one of Roush's stable of cars.

In a time when NASCAR is desperate for young talent, Matt Kenseth more than fits the bill.

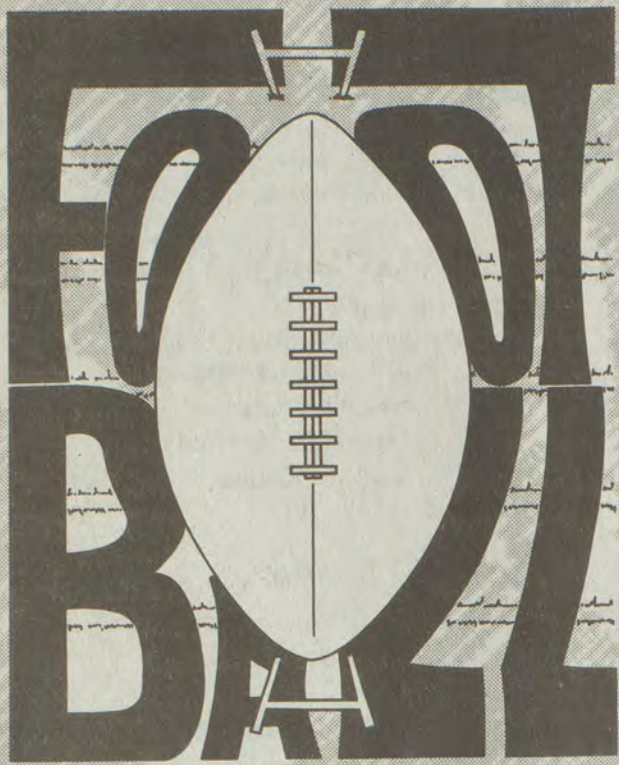

DRIVER SPOTLIGHT:

KENNY WALLACE

Kenny Wallace has been there and done just about everything in racing, including sleeping in his car in order to save money. After five years with Filbert Martocci, Wallace is packing up his driving gear and moving to the Andy Petree team at the end of the 1998 season.

Born and raised in St. Louis, Wallace started his career by helping his brother, Rusty, with his American Speed Association (ASA) car. He became a "jack-of-all trades" around the race car while developing his mechanical skills. While traveling the ASA circuit with Rusty, Wallace met Winston Cup driver Joe Ruttman. In 1984, at the age of 19, he moved to Charlotte, North Carolina, to crew for Ruttman on the Benfield/Levi Garrett race team. The team folded at the end of that season and Wallace returned to St. Louis where he worked as a vacuum cleaner repairman for his father.

In June of 1985, Wallace was given the opportunity to drive an ASA car. Along with his wife, Kim, and their newborn baby, Brooke, they lived on a shoe-string budget while traveling the ASA circuit. At one point in time, Kim held down two jobs to pay household and racing bills.

"Those were tough times," said Wallace. "Kim was always working, and I was traveling and racing. Sometimes I would sleep in the car just to save a few dollars. That sure seems like a long time ago, now."

When older brother Rusty decided to start a Busch Grand National team in 1989, he offered the driving job to his younger brother. He first had to drive in a Busch series race in 1988 before NASCAR would allow him to go to Daytona for the season-opener in 1989. He was able to land

a ride at Martinsville in a car owned by Dale Earnhardt and finished eighth.

Wallace won the pole that next season in his first super speedway race. During 1989, he ran the full 31 race BGN circuit and earned Rookie of the Year honors.

In 1991 he finished as runner-up to Bobby Labonte for the championship and was voted Most Popular Driver by the fans.

He raced in 1992 for Felix Sabates, finishing sixth in the final Busch driver standings. The next year he turned his attention to Winston Cup racing. He recorded three top-10 finishes but wound up 23rd. At the end of the season, Wallace left the Sabates team.

In 1994 Wallace went back to the Busch Series, this time for car owner Filbert Martocci, a Nashville, Tennessee businessman. The team had immediate success. They had three wins, one pole, 11 top-five's and 15 top-10s. And he was named Most Popular Driver for the second time in his career.

The following year, Wallace ran both the Busch and Winston Cup circuits. In 1996, Wallace turned all his attention to Cup racing. At the end of the year, he was 28th in overall driver points. In 1997 he had two top-10s and won two poles, and almost \$1 million, but wound up 33rd.

After 25 events into the 1998 season Wallace is back in the 33rd driver position. Much of the team's problems have been DNF's. They had several engine failures, plus lots of just plain bad racing luck. The team finished 43rd in Sunday's MBNA Gold 400.

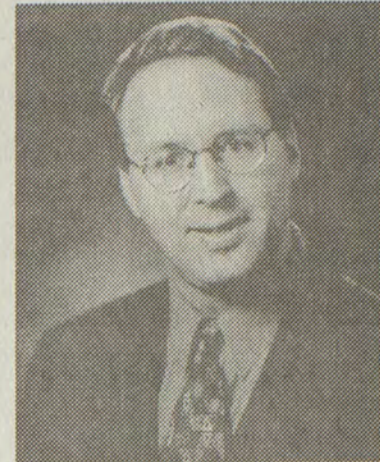

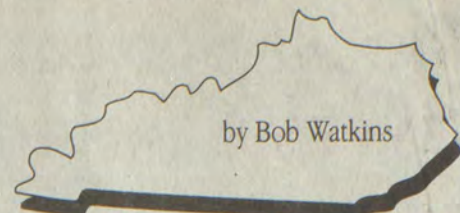

Kentucky football Wildcats turning corners, but it's 'Florida week'

Notes from a Commonwealth Stadium surprise package during Florida week.

Turning corners. Yes, the most cautious among us must concur—even during Florida week—Kentucky football may have rounded a corner or two.

• Bulletin: Headline that says: Defense rescues Wildcats.

• Words Kentucky and opportunity in the same sentence?

• The word win in the same sentence with UK, five fumbles and six turnovers?

• A 14-point fourth-quarter and a come-from-behind victory. Impressive.

• John Rader. In another year a kid from Breathitt County would be told politely, "...check the OVC schools, kid, you can't play here."

• If you really, really like Marlon McCree, stand up. Next to me.

• Next subject: Arithmetic. Lemme see if I have this straight ... SECers South Carolina lost to Marshall; Mississippi State lost to Oklahoma State; Vanderbilt lost to Ole Miss; Georgia escaped Wyoming. All come to Lexington. Hmmm.

• A 3-0 record is a marvel, but no surprise. Against this schedule anything less would be a disappointment.

• Gators? Bad mood. Real bad, after a 20-17 overtime loss in Knoxville. When is the last time Florida lost in The Swamp after losing on the road? Under Steve Spurrier, never.

Now, Florida week. The SEC season begins Saturday. In 11 years, the Kentucky Wildcats have not only lost to Florida but played the Gators to a one touchdown or less decision twice. The most dramatic was a 24-20 loss on the game's final play in 1993.

'93 excepted, the Wildcats have not played the Gators 'respectable' since the Reagan years, surrendering monstrous and embarrassing point totals to Steve Spurrier's mouthy teams. But there is optimism in the Bluegrass.

Respect? Nobody in Kentucky's camp will say so, but in their last two games with Florida, the Wildcats have gotten precious little respect from game officials either. Damning calls in 1996 and again in 1997 doomed UK early and set the stage for landslides losses.

This Saturday, we, and a CBS-TV audience, we get a look at how Mumme-prepared players handle themselves in a severe environment. The Swamp. We will see how these Wildcats react to a clearly superior opponent.

NCAA COMMITTEE CAN DO FOR HOOPS WHAT SOSA, MCGWIRE DID FOR BASEBALL

What Sammy Sosa and Mark McGwire have done for baseball, the newly formed NCAA committee can do for college basketball.

The 27-member panel—including UK's C.M. Newton—will begin soon to study ways to get back to the primary mission, good basketball within the context of college sports.

Instead of spinning wheels on numbers of 20-second time-outs (to accommodate television), or toy with the 3-point distance or the shot clock, this NCAA committee can make a real difference by legislating academics back into college athletics. And there are no good reasons to drag out the process for 18 months to two years either.

I see linkage and opportunity here between streamlining college hoops, and the NBA lockout. The NCAA committee will study ways to solve declining graduation rates and recruiting ugliness while the greed-absorbed NBA's dirty laundry hangs in full view for all to see the corrupted side of this sport. One obvious and important tenant is to craft a recommendation to re-institute a freshmen-not-eligible rule discarded 26 years ago.

The NCAA has a clear field to stop us winking and laughing at big business basketball pretending to be an amateur undertaking and do the right things. Prove that Shawnee

Mission's suits can look beyond millions of dollars in receipts and embrace the stated mission of academics first, and basketball 1-A.

Note to NBA players and owners: Psst, you're doing great, fellows. We miss you terribly. We know your pain. Don't give an inch.

Clearly, college freshmen basketball signees should come to campus like every other first year student. With an attitude to learn effective study habits, socialize, adjust and enjoy being a student. Practice basketball too.

Johnny or Jill Jump Shot not interested in campus life but more inclined to shake 'n bake and hangin' out with the guys until the next NBA/WNBA Drafts, it's cool. He or she can go sign up for the CBA or the YMCA, or jet off to Paraguay.

Along with Penny and Christian, Kobe, Shaq and 'Spree, we will miss Johnny too.

While the NBA players and owners demonstrate what a stiff upper lip stance can do, NCAA committees can make a difference and the first best step would be to make freshmen ineligible.

COUCH TOP PICK?

Dennis Dillon of The Sporting News writes: "Don't be surprised (April 17) to hear NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue say, 'With the first pick in the 1999 draft, the Cleveland Browns select University of Kentucky quarterback Tim Couch.'"

Dillon predicts "a passel of underclassmen" will opt for the draft and be among the first 10 picks.

SLAP AT UK QB

In its September 14 issue The Sporting News offered up this sober view that bodes perfect for Kentucky during 'Florida week.'

"Yeah, we know all about Tim Couch and his big day against Louisville. But let's see Couch lead the Wildcats to a victory over a team with a winning record—something he hasn't done in his career—before

we give him the Heisman." Comment: Let's ask Steve Spurrier what he thinks.

UK BASKETBALL

Coach Tubby Smith will fill four scholarships this year and could wrap up Kentucky's harvest during November's early signing period. Expect UK to land 6-10 Marvin Stone, 6-5 Keith Bogans, 6-9 Marquis Estill, and one from a long list of others still on the board.

Still, the spring signing period could produce another UK recruit if Jamaal Magloire opts for the NBA draft. Arguably the best prospect to whom UK would like to give its fourth scholarship, is 6-8 Jason Kapono of Lakewood, Cal. Artesia High.

Rated a strong, versatile worker, Kapono is considering several schools, among them Stanford, N.C. State, California, Utah, Kentucky, Syracuse, Duke and Rhode Island.

Meanwhile, UK's current roster will undergo a dramatic face-lift after the 1998-99 season with the departure of tri-captains Scott Padgett, Wayne Turner and Heshimu

Evans. And possibly Magloire to the NBA Draft.

Padgett and Turner are being touted as All-America candidates, Evans and Magloire for All-SEC. Given his versatility, strength and attitude, Evans could well be the best professional prospect.

PREP MILESTONES

Breathitt County quarterback Kyle Moore is moving up the statistical lists in four categories. According to KHSAA figures the Bobcats QB is closing on the competition in passing yards (7,154, fourth all-time), pass completion percentage (60.7, second to Tim Couch's 63.5), pass completions (382, 9th all-time), and touchdown completions (76, fourth all-time).

Last week this space asked for the state record for fumble returned for a touchdown. Records at Breckinridge County High School show that in 1974 Danny Ray Sears of Breckinridge County returned a fumble 95 yards for a touchdown in a win over Nelson County. The records also show that in 1995 Chris Ledford of Breckinridge County

returned a pass interception 100 yards for a touchdown in a victory over Edmonson County.

"There will be free food and drinks for everyone," said Derossett.

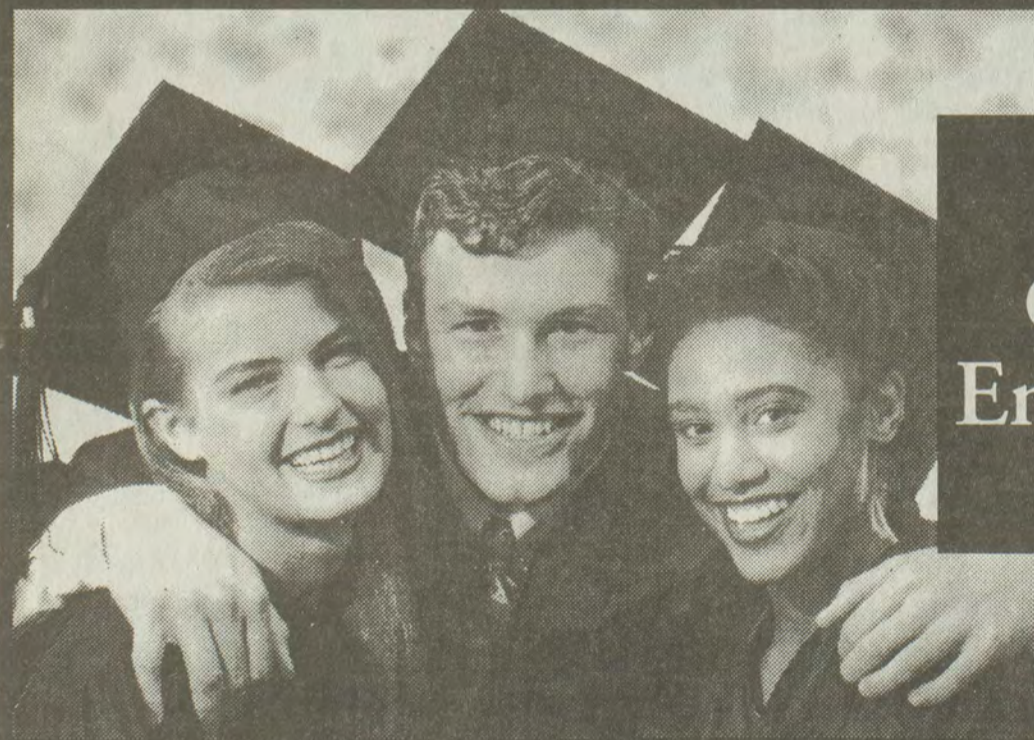
"I want all my former players and their parents from both Betsy Layne and Prestonsburg to be there as well as all current players and parents from both teams."

The Piarist Catholic School

Ever hear of a Catholic school with a college prep program complete with Advanced Placement, a teacher to student ratio of 1:7? Looking for a faculty that has advanced (even Ph.D.) degrees, furnishes transportation, has athletics and other extra-curricular stuff, not to mention computer application programs and historic field trips all over the northeastern USA, and even Canada?

Maybe you have, but this one, the Piarist School of Martin, is tuition free. In fact, as the founder and administrative head, Father Thomas Carroll, remarks, "In many cases we wave the expenses to allow students to receive an education here."

The concept of a tuition-free academic school in this poverty stricken Appalachian area began when Fr. Carroll

was a student in Pennsylvania parochial school. Students there were asked to donate and textbooks to schools who were in dire poverty.

"I kept that in mind, and while teaching eighteen years outside of Philadelphia, I kept thinking that someday I would be teaching in West Virginia." The priest was later challenged by his superior general: "There is no such thing as just getting involved in education. Start a school."

A school existed on the present site, one established in 1984 by a private, non-sectarian program called the Christian Appalachian Project. This first school was closed in 1988. When the opportunity to reopen under the Piarist Fathers occurred, for a lease of one dollar a year, "...we took it, following the example of our founder (Saint Joseph Calasanz, in Spain) who

Rape can victimize anyone, anywhere, anytime. It can happen to a friend, a relative, your spouse. And it could happen to you.

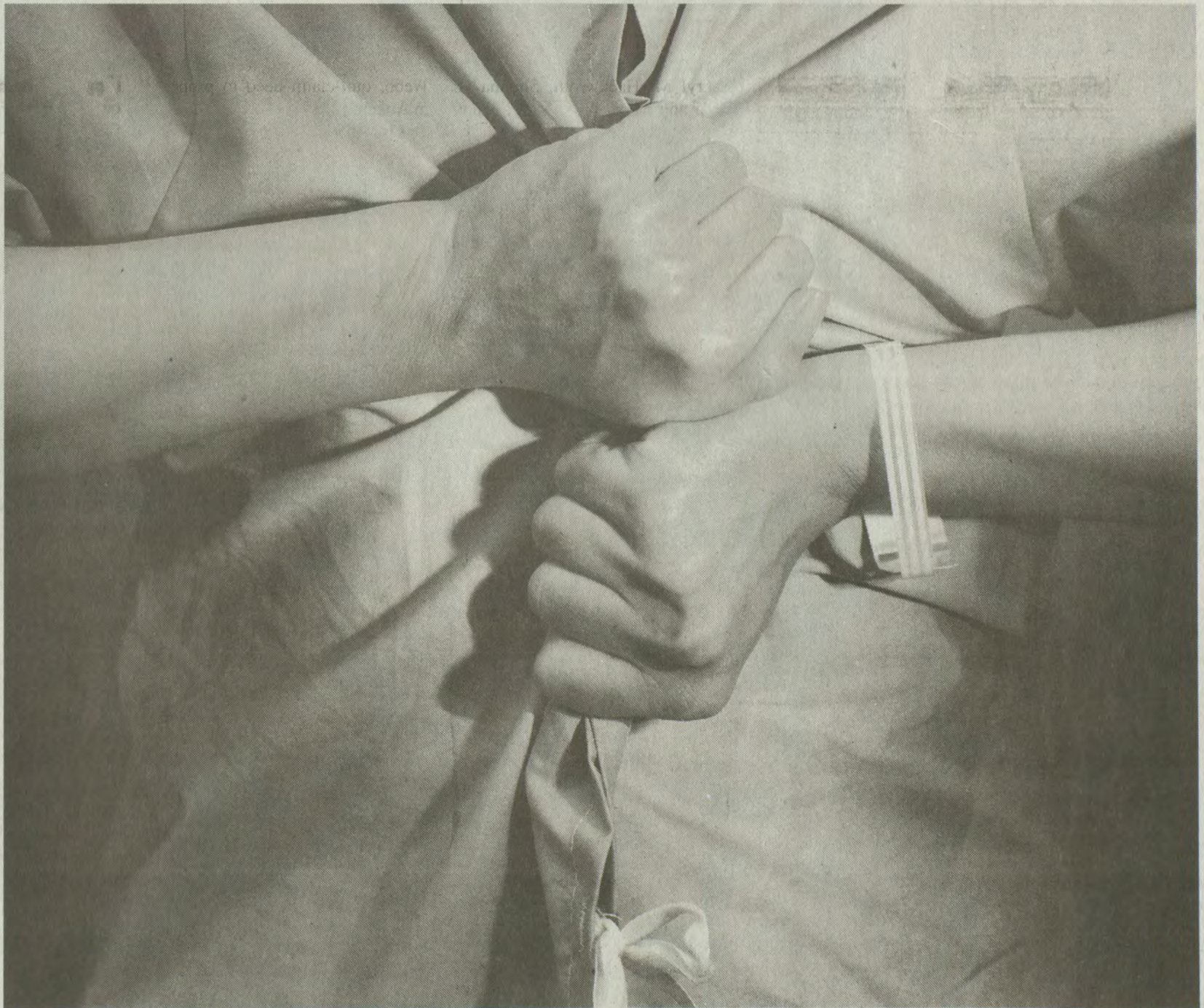

- assistance with Victim Compensation Claims.

began tuition-free schools in poverty areas four hundred years ago."

The order was recognized in 1621 by Pope Gregory XV. The word "Piarist" come from the Latin "Scholarum Piarum" (of the Pious Schools). Since then, members take the traditional vow of poverty, chastity, and obedience, to which is added the dedication of their lives to the education of youth. Alumni of Piarist schools include Gregor Mendel, Amadeus Mozart, Victor Hugo, and the American Revolutionary hero Thaddeus Kociusko.

The Piarist campus accommodates 50 to 60 students and includes six classrooms, a large gym, chapel, science lab, and computer lab. An adjacent private, non-denominational lower school shares the lunchroom and gym.

However, the confines of the school grounds are not the limit to a Piarist education.

"One of the philosophies of the Piarist School is to get the students out of the classroom. So we have a program here that, by the time they graduate, they have become familiar with the northeast part of the United States."

This year the juniors, to augment American history and literature, will visit and study in Philadelphia, and en route, see Gettysburg, Fort McHenry, and Washington, D.C. The seniors will see New England sites and Quebec, Canada. Fourth-year French students especially enjoy the latter.

On these outings-students usually stay in churches or private homes. The only student costs are food and incidentals, since the school vans are used for traveling. With a grin, the amiable priest adds, "We eat a lot at McDonald's."

The nearby state park provides facilities for graduation and proms as well as a site for cross-country competition. In liaison with public schools, auditoriums and stages are available. In short, "getting the student out of the classroom" is an integral application of the school's operation.

Two Piarist priests at the Martin campus and three others located in other parts of the country raise funds for the schools by making

appeals in churches. This is part of the mission cooperative plan of a respective diocese.

"I have just finished my fourteenth appeal this summer," comments Father Tom, as he is called affectionately by students. "And, I will be out eighteen or nineteen trips in my appeals. That brings in some money, but in each parish there may be one person who becomes a regular contributor." Most of the money comes from the latter source. The priest's replacement vehicle already has passed 15,000 miles on its odometer.

Other American Piarist schools are in Philadelphia and Fort Lauderdale, with more than two hundred schools operated by the Piarist order around the world.

The specific mission of the Kentucky campus is to provide academic programs to the youth in the Appalachian area of Kentucky. Floyd County remains at the bottom or near the bottom in poverty statistics, statewide and nationally. In recent years the area continues to lose population, as well as bankruptcy of public school systems and subsequent reductions of educational programs and personnel.

Father Carroll suggests the key to resolving such population trauma is to "...provide the basic education, and someday they may return and put a dent in the poverty here."

Visitors see fifty plus boys and girls, grades nine through twelve, in navy blue or black pants, and in addition a colored shirt (freshmen don blue, others white) with "Piarist" over the pocket.

The school rules are typical of such a Catholic environment. "I think students, not parents, are the main reason kids come to our school. We have minor problems, but no big ones."

This reporter asked about suspensions. Father Carroll thought a moment, and then recalled, "Yes, I had one, I think back around the third year."

Faculty may consist of contract teachers and volunteers. Presently two teachers of English and history respectively are natives of Eastern Kentucky, a French teacher hails from outside Chicago, a math/chemistry teacher comes from

Utah, a physics teacher traveled from New York along with a volunteer Columbia Ph.D., also from New York. In addition to other professionals, Fr. Dave Powers hails from New Hampshire and Fr. Carroll from Pennsylvania. The diversity is important, said the school head, in the school environment.

"They bring a variety of experiences. Also, we are always seeking volunteers."

Students participate in a variety of community projects, including Christmas presents (150 last year), clothing distribution, and program cooperation with other churches. Sometimes lists of needs from elementary public schools are obtained and the Piarist kids try to provide these.

The school is 85 percent non-Catholic, but the strict academic regimen includes four years of religion. In the academics, personal one-on-one instruction is evident everywhere.

The school is a member of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association and participates in several activities. When asked how the athletic teams were faring, Father Tom laughed and replied, "Terrible! Last year was our first. We now

have boys' and girls' basketball, cross country, and softball."

Piarist has no cheerleaders. All the girls are playing a sport.

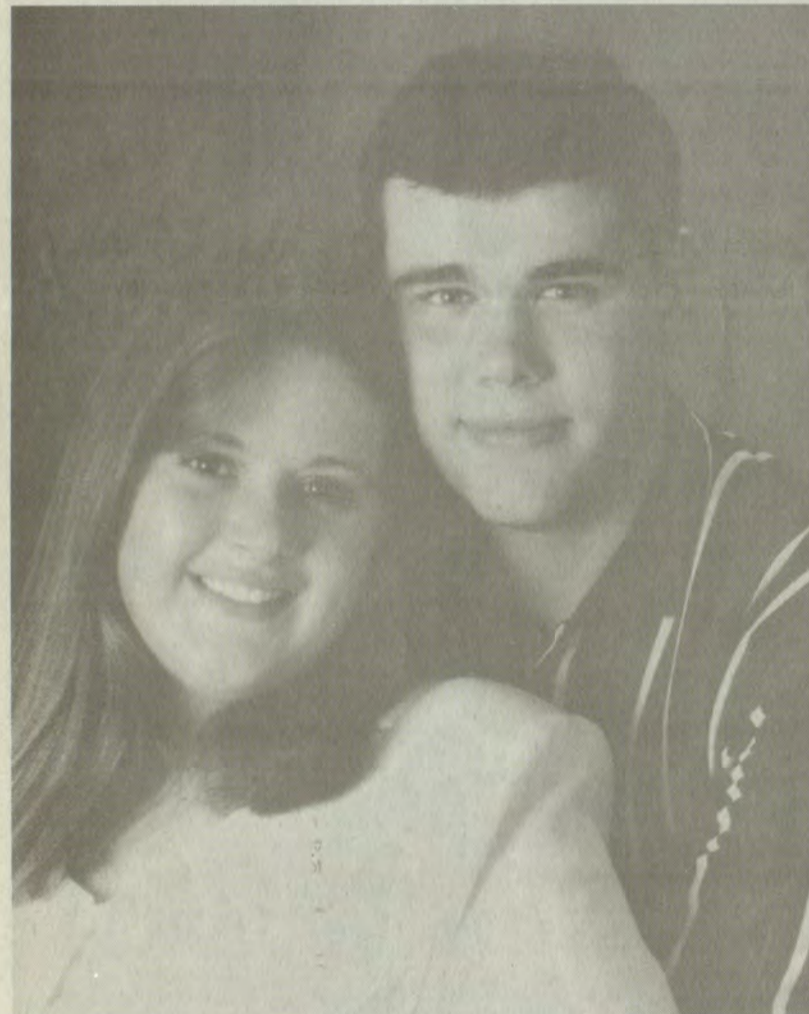
Does it all work? Last year seven of the twelve graduates received full college scholarships. One is a National Merit Scholar at the University of Kentucky.

While admission to the school is based on entry tests and other assessment in April, Father Carroll expresses sadness that even then many students must be turned away. As a remedy, grant money may be sought to enlarge facilities and program.

In an era when some critics bemoan many parochial schools in the United States for abandoning the needy and pursuing affluent communities, the success Father Carroll, his staff, and the Piarist School are having is, indeed, a "miracle in the making."

Aspiring leaders must learn to trust others

As Navy Cmdr. Howard Gilmore lay wounded and alone amid enemy shelling on the bridge of the submarine USS Growler in February 1943, he called out his last order to the crew below: "Take her down!"

The submarine dove swiftly beneath the waves, leaving Cmdr. Gilmore to his fate. Though the crew had wanted to attempt a rescue of their captain, they nonetheless understood his plan for them. Both ship and crew were saved. Gilmore received the Medal of Honor, posthumously.

These days a person can walk into any bookstore and find the shelves devoted to management groaning under the weight of countless tomes touting "new" ideas on how to get older people to do their

jobs. Apparently, many of us in business today are still trying to figure out something that Cmdr. Gilmore understood back in '43: Leadership.

If Americans in the 1990s seem obsessed with the topic of people management, perhaps it's because we are trying to run businesses using a highly educated and increasingly mobile work force. The company town of decades past, where people either worked for that industry or they went without, was left behind as post-World War II public-school graduates went elsewhere in search of the American dream. Today, people can even apply for jobs via the internet.

Faced with this increasingly sophisticated work force, business executives and managers have turned to books, workshops and seminars for help in managing their employees better. The goal is to grow the business through increased customer satisfaction with the aid of a more productive work force.

One wonders why these management efforts, though highly commendable, are necessary, given that people have been working for other people for eons. You'd think the best management techniques would have been figured out long ago. And if they were, why are business people and management gurus still struggling to reinvent the wheel?

I believe that when the ideas offered by many of today's books on management are distilled, a fun-

damental rule of thumb remains: treat people fairly. If this rule doesn't seem like such a radical new concept, it isn't. The problem has been that too few employers

good leader knows when to step out of the way and trust people to do the work for which they were hired.

The concept of leadership implies that employees are free to move toward the goal the boss has shown them, while the term "management" suggests an omnipresent gaze over the worker's shoulder.

In a speech to a group of young executives, Thomas Nethery, of Eastman Chemical Co., has suggested that "faith" is the most important aspect of leadership: "Managers have lots of ways to mandate their ends—rules, schedules, plans and procedures. Leaders go beyond the mechanics—to inspire people to have faith in a vision...faith in their own abilities to carry out that vision. Faith begins with trust. You have to trust people." Nethery said a good leader is not someone to lean on, but someone who makes leaning unnecessary.

Renowned newspaper columnist Walter Lippmann once wrote that the final test of a leader is that he or she inspire in others the conviction and will to carry on: "The genius of a good leader is to leave behind a situation which common sense, without the grace of genius, can deal with successfully."

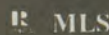

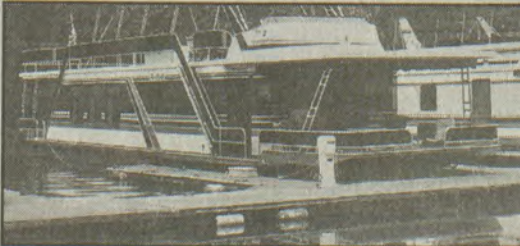

SUNSHINE LINES

Seniors, the Pikeville Senior Citizen Center (PSCC) has a unique history.

This week, as your "Sunshine Lines" column continues its series on the Senior Citizen Centers (SCC's) in the Big Sandy area, we will learn interesting facts about the PSCC to include fascinating tidbits about its director and her family and the seniors and their activities.

Like all centers in Floyd, Johnson, Magoffin, Martin and Pike counties, it is basic in nature to its sister centers. Yet, because of its personality of its own, just as every center does. And, like the other centers you've read about, its seniors make that difference.

The Pikeville Senior Citizen Center started in the fall of 1977 in an old five-room house on Cline Street. This center was scheduled to open during the previous spring, but because of the devastating flood of '77, occupancy had to be postponed until the fall of that year. They remained here for the next 4-5 years until they moved to a larger facility, where their growing needs could be better served.

This move took them to the historic Perry-Cline house that was built by the WPA for the purpose of educating minorities. The PSCC called this house "home" for the next three or more years. Today, this facility is used as a temporary homeless shelter for people in need of housing in Pike County.

When the center moved from the Perry-Cline house, it moved nearer to the heart of downtown into a newly-built high-rise, Pike Counties know as Myers Towers. Here, they remained for about 12 years. About four years ago, they were able to move into their very own newly-built senior citizen center at 218 Bank Street where they meet today. The center is a neighbor to the Pikeville College gym and the Model City Day Care Center.

The director of this senior citizen center, Betty Hughes, is an interesting lady who was born on Island Creek. She was part of the student-body of the first class to complete a four-year curriculum before graduating from Mullins High School.

Some college was in her future, but she found herself in love with a young man, one year her senior, who made her heart skip beats. Fearful that this could cause her serious heart damage, he popped the question. Today, after more than 40 years, Betty and Gary's hearts have been in sync. That's not only beautiful, but the duration of their marriage is about as unique for this day and time as the history of the Pikeville Senior Citizen Center's migration to its permanent location. The Hughes' have one daughter, Victoria, who makes her home in Pike County where she lives with her two children. The children's father, Robert, and his wife and family live in Michigan where the girls like to visit in the summer and during extended school breaks.

Victoria and her daughters live in a newly-built home provided by

the Habitat for Humanity 'Hammering In The Hills' team this past summer. This team consisted of former President Jimmy Carter, his wife Rosalynn, The Oak Ridge Boys, Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich and many, many others, including Pike County dignitaries. Betty said, "I was so impressed by (former) President and Mrs. Carter. Before they left they were joined in this endeavor by team members of all faiths. The Carter's gave each new home owner and his/her family a Bible."

Betty and Gary's grandchildren are special to them, just as our grandchildren are to us. Their eldest granddaughter, Tabitha Kay is 14 and attends Pikeville High School where she is a Freshman. Her younger sister, Elizabeth Marie, is 12 years of age and is in the seventh grade at the same school.

Elizabeth was born with Spina Bifida. Her disabilities are all physical. She must rely on modern medical mechanical marvels for movement, but fortunately her mind was not affected by this disease.

I choose to interject a few thoughts now, about this child's disability, because I feel it is important for all of us to remember how fortunate we are. Too, it helps parents and grandparents who have children and grandchildren with similar disabilities to know that they are not alone. At this moment I am thinking of my husband's niece, April, and her family. And, most importantly, it should make us who are relatively healthy cognizant of the fact that all human beings have a role to fill here on earth. It is our humane responsibility to share the joys of life and living with the less fortunate whomever they are, wherever they are, regardless of the color of their skin, their handicap or their age. I personally believe that our lives cannot be complete if we fail to share our resources and blessings with deserving people when our health and finances will allow us to do so.

Prior to becoming the PSCC director in 1978, Betty was employed by the Pike County Board of Education as a reading aide. She attended evening and Saturday classes through the Pikeville College at a time when the college professors traveled into the counties to teach. Gary was a mechanic for a construction company. However, for the past eight years he has been the principle van driver for the center.

When I asked, "Betty, what got you interested in becoming a center director for senior citizens?" she answered, "I began working on behalf of senior citizens as an outreach worker. At that time, Barbara Disney was the center's director and my boss. Later, when Barbara accepted a teaching position, I applied for the job she vacated. I feel I got it because I was already qualified, having worked in this center and having been involved with its seniors."

During our discussion, Betty indicated that attendance ranges

from twenty-five to thirty seniors per day at PSCC. The attendance is greatest, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, when they have exercise classes. Seldom are there single men at this center. Most of the males who do attend come with their spouses.

The PSCC serves 35 home delivered meals per day, Monday through Friday, in the Pikeville, Chloe Creek and Shelby areas. With desperation in her voice, the director said, "At least fifty more people qualify (in our service area) but funding to provide additional meals are not available."

Betty bragged on all of her seniors. She gave special recognition to those that attend the center who live at Myers Towers. "Those who live in the high-rise check on other seniors who have apartments there," she said. It is my understanding that these people report illnesses, needs or unusual circumstances to Betty, who, with the help of her seniors at the center, try to assist the person(s) in whatever way they can.

The PSCC staff, in addition to the director and her husband, consists of another part-time bus driver and two Title V workers. One of the latter workers delivers meals, the other is in charge of the exercise classes. It is evident that her seniors like to eat and exercise. (What a lesson for some of us with the middle-aged spread!) But, you might be wondering, what else do these

folks like to do?

These seniors like to travel. One trip they enjoyed was their recent tour of our State Capitol. Before that, there was Branson, Montana; three sight-seeing trips to California; Seattle, Washington and Hawaii. This year they plan to return to Branson, but they are disappointed that they will not be able to take in the Passion Play during this visit.

The PSC's enjoy competition. They look forward to the Senior Games held each July at Jenny Wiley. Now they are "wired" for competition at Elizabethtown on September 23. Seniors who wish to complete at the national level must qualify next week. This is an extremely exciting and tense time for this center's athletes. When they are not fired up over the forthcoming competition, these seniors relax at the center enjoying each other's company in a much more relaxed atmosphere, playing horseshoes, football toss, shuffleboard, billiards and spin casting—the sports they will compete in next week. Of course, there are games like Casino, Rook, Bingo, Dominoes and basketball for both the men and the women. These gals are up with the times.

Seniors at this center are also involved in fund-raising activities. They realize it is only by their money-raising efforts that their center can function as smoothly as

it does. This money is used by the center for the seniors. The monies they raise also helps others in times of emergency. It helps to prepare for their special dinners, parties and other social activities, and it helps to keep their center modern and cheerful."

When asked about her hobbies, Betty replied, "I used to have some. Gary still likes to go to Jenny Wiley. He's an old-time worm fisherman." (Is there a better bait???) She continued, "Gary's mother turned ninety about 6 weeks ago. Recently she fell. Of late my hobbies have been limited to trips with my seniors and keeping an eye on her."

If you are a senior citizen who lives near the Pikeville Senior Citizen Center I urge you to make it a part of your day. Membership is free! For more information about the PSCC, call Betty Hughes at 432-4250.
