Census Bureau to gather information

Data on characteristics of the country's labor force, including hours worked, earnings and people unemployed or retired, will be collected during the week of

September 13 when representatives of the Commerce Department's Census Bureau visit the area to conduct the Current Population Survey (CPS).

By law, the Census Bureau keeps all information about survey respondents and their households strictly confidential.

"The Current Population Survey is the primary source of information for governments and businesses about the country's labor force," said Susan B. Hardy, director of the Census Bureau's Charlotte regional office.

On October 2, the U.S. Department of Labor will release labor force statistics for the United States based on the data provided by a sample of households across the country in the September CPS.

Local households selected for the sample receive a letter from James F. Holmes, acting director of the Census Bureau, informing them of the survey.

Census Bureau interviewers carry an official identification card bearing their photograph and signature.

"I don't see that they're going to do anything but let us replace it," the judge said. "The steel — the point it's in is a dangerous situation. It's rusted out at the footers," he said.

"We can't overpower the state, but at the same token we want to get the bridge opened back up to these people," Owens responded.

Hale had an engineer look at the bridge Saturday and Hale visited the site again Monday.

"We're trying to figure out the most efficient way to open this up and get rid of the suspension — get rid of the danger," he said as he looked at the bridge.

"It's rusted real bad. They're saying there's no way we can reinforce this. The bolts are so rusted, they're almost gone," he added.

Hale pointed to a bolt that was half rusted away and said once that bolt, which is located at an end of the middle suspension bridge, was gone, that part of the bridge will collapse and the rest of the bridge will fall, too.

The bridge is about 75 to 80 feet long from pillar to pillar and it gets its support from the suspension and not from any beams underneath, Hale said.

He hopes to install I-beams under the bridge, as well as additional pillars to support the bridge.

"We might as well put in new flooring. It may be concrete," he said. "We're going to treat this as an emergency situation."

Residents must travel three

miles out of their way on a curvy road that leads to Route 2929 at Salt Lick just to get to the post office, Hale said.

His office has received numerous calls from folks in the Hueysville area regarding the closure.

Frank Reffitt of Southern Camp Road is one of those residents who used the bridge daily. The area doesn't have a mail delivery route so residents must visit the post office to retrieve their mail, according to Reffitt.

It used to take him about five minutes to go the post office or visit his church; both are located less than a mile from Reffitt's home. With the closing of the bridge, Reffitt must now travel an eight-mile round trip.

The road he must travel, old Route 7, is a "winding, narrow, one-lane road," Reffitt said. The road has become heavily traveled and made it more dangerous, he added.

"It puts you eight miles out of your way. It puts you on a narrow one-lane road. There's occasional places you can pass. There's several narrow curves in it. It's dangerous. The road is dangerous with a lot of traffic on it," Reffitt said.

He expressed concern about a school bus that travels the road to pick up children in the area and about the amount of time it will now take an ambulance to reach residents in emergencies.

"(It could be) a matter of life or

death," he said. "It's inconvenient; it's not safe; it's a devaluation of your property."

Reffitt said he spoke with the Floyd County judge-executive and was told the bridge will be replaced.

"We're very happy to be getting a bridge," he said. "All the families that live here are very happy and very thankful to Ben Hale and everyone involved in getting the new bridge. It's money well spent."

From time to time, Reffitt and other residents of the area have repaired the bridge. About two months ago, he and another resident hammered 40 spikes into the bridge to secure loose boards.

The security thread glows green under ultraviolet light and the numeral 20 in the lower right corner of the bill's face is printed in color-shifting ink.

The numeral 20 will also appear larger on the face to make it easier for people with low vision to read.

The old \$20 bills will remain in circulation, according to Hamilton.

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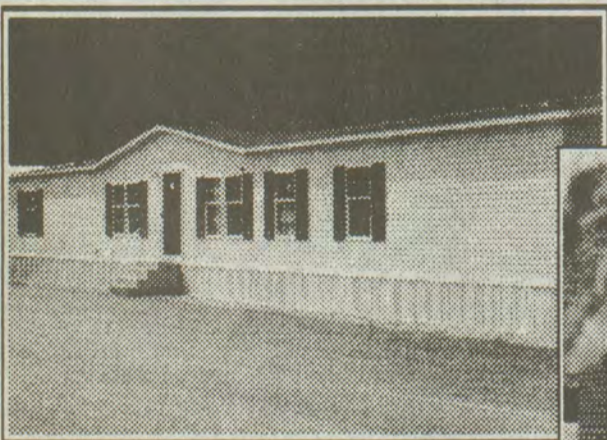
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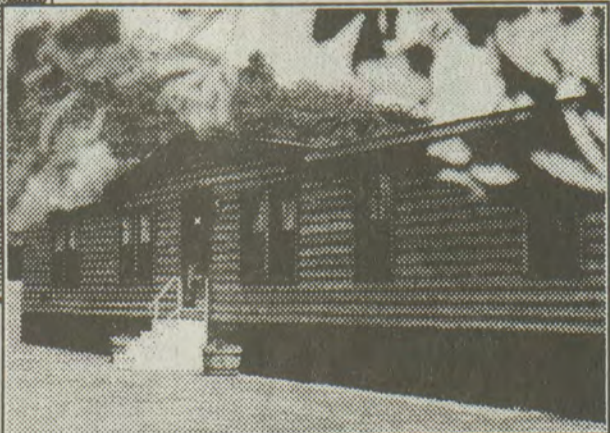
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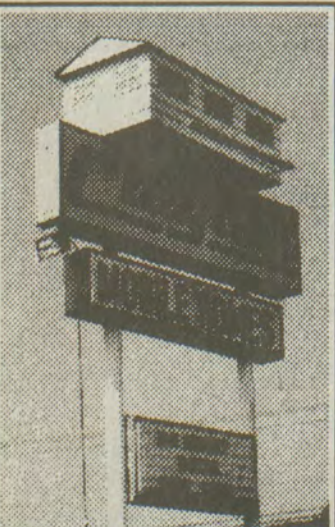

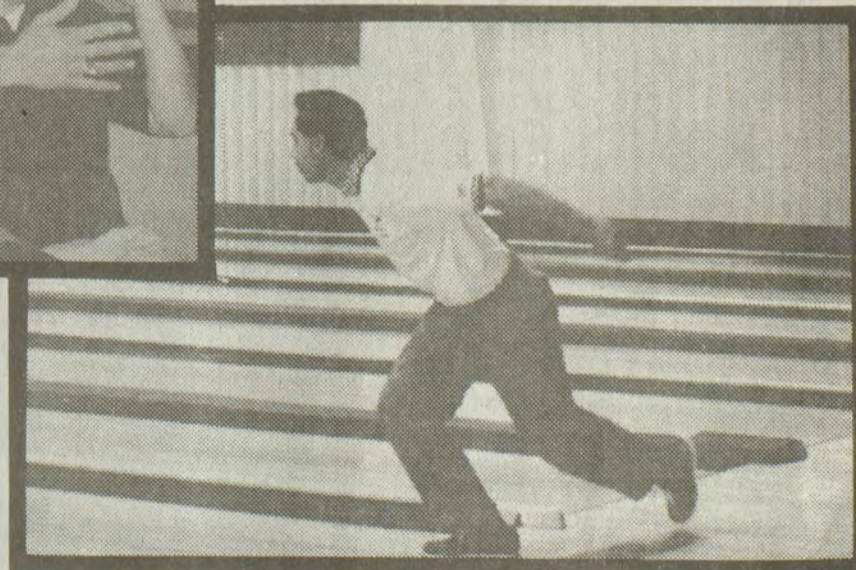

Police stakeout nets three auto theft suspects

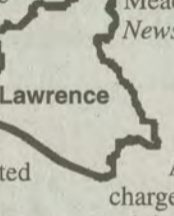
A police stakeout at Ron Perry's Auto Mall last Tuesday night netted three men thought to be part of a multi-state auto theft ring.

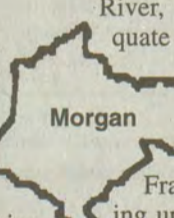

West Liberty water supply not impacted by drought

While drought conditions have prompted a number of communities throughout Central and Eastern Kentucky to issue conserve-water advisories in recent days, no shortages are foreseen at West Liberty at this time, due in part to the new raw water pipe line from Cave Run Lake and in part to the fact that Licking

River, while very low, continues to maintain an adequate flow at the water plant's intakes at Twenty-Two Hollow.

"If we didn't have Cave Run to draw from I'd be starting to worry a little, though," Waterworks superintendent Frankie Keeton last Friday. "The river's still holding up pretty good but we're pulling a lot (of water) out of Cave Run," Keeton said.

He noted that while river flow continues to be adequate, falling leaves are beginning to adversely affect the quality of water in the river, "causing it to turn black and making the water more acidic."

The water plant is currently producing an average of about 810,000 gallons of treated water a day, with about 370,000 gallons a day coming from the lake and the remainder from the river. Keeton said that on peak days, production occasionally goes past a million gallons a day. — *The Licking Valley Courier*

Former Knott County man found guilty of manslaughter

On September 21, in Knott Circuit Court, Jonathan Stamper, 37, of White Bluff, Tennessee, formerly of Knott County, was adjudged guilty of second degree manslaughter for the September 2, 1996, death of Donald C. The ARC funds will be combined with \$182,723 from the Knott County Fiscal Court, bringing the total project cost to \$913,616. — *Troublesome Creek Times*

The Knott Fiscal Court unanimously adopted the recommendation of the Knott Industrial Authority September 16 to apply for \$2 million in coal severance tax funds to purchase and develop a 305-acre industrial site with hopes to land a state prison there.

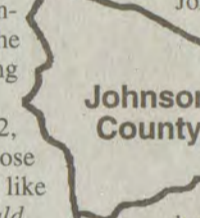
The Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) has approved a \$730,893 grant to the Knott County Fiscal Court to create a multi-purpose educational facility.

Murder is charged in hit-and-run

In an indictment returned Friday, the grand jury

charged Shawn Holbrook, 19, of Van Lear, with murder in the December 3, 1997 death of Mark Allen Justice, 21, of Grayson.

The indictment claims Holbrook "drove his pickup truck under circumstances showing an extreme indifference to human life and doing so wantonly created a grave risk of death to others on or about the roads of Johnson County," killing Justice as he walked along Route 321 on Starfire Hill. — *The Paintsville Herald*

Secretary is indicted for theft of funds

A former secretary arrested last week on charges she stole money from a Paintsville law firm has been indicted by the Johnson County Grand Jury.

Lisa Frank Coburn, 42, of Van Lear, was indicted Friday on one count of theft by unlawful taking and two counts of second-degree forgery for allegedly stealing over \$5,000 from the law firm of Johnson and Johnson PSC. — *The Paintsville Herald*

Who's gone feel they're (his) shoes?



These lines from a country music song by George Jones pretty much tell the story around the University of Kentucky's recruiting camp. That is especially true regarding the all important quarterback position - where a working legend must be replaced and that may happen sooner than later. Due to QB Tim Couch's outstanding numbers and performance on the football field last season and two games into 1998 - the Heisman Trophy is possible as well as a fat pro contract in the offer. So as the season unfolds and the legend continues to grow the questions on what Couch will do after the season will remain.

Nobody is more aware of the situation than recruiting coordinator Claude Bassett as he works daily to recruit the best possible candidates to replace the legendary quarterback.

The state of Kentucky has produced several great record setting QBs' the last few seasons including the names Redmon, Gumm, and the legend himself (Couch) and they're a couple of possible future Kentucky stars right here on the bluegrass football fields of the commonwealth.

The early favorite is Jared Lorenzen of Fort Thomas Highlands in northern Kentucky. At 6-foot-4, 240 pounds, Lorenzen passed for 221 and rushed for 122 more yards in a recent 51 - 41 victory over Louisville Male High school and it's own top quarterback candidate Gerry Ahrens.

The left handed Lorenzen does not look the part of the prototypical type quarterback, in fact he looks more like a linebacker that plays on offense. But, if you question the reasoning about recruiting a big line-

backer type to run the UK Air-Raid attack, you must look at the intangibles. Lorenzen, who passed for over 2000 yards last season, has a rocket of an arm. Baseball scouts have drooled over the lefty as a future professional pitcher, but now football is his focus. Even beyond the size, strong arm, and not to mention great agility for a big kid, it is his attitude and demeanor that he carries onto any field of competition that really makes him stand out. "I just like to play and compete," said Lorenzen. "It's a trill to put yourself in position to achieve the goals you set as a team, I like to win!"

With Lorenzen, the unique player with the cool QB number (22) as the in-state front runner it is not the only choice the Cat coaches have to consider. Because of the numbers that the Air-Raid offense of Coach Hal Mumme are putting up and the national publicity that comes with it, the Cats are getting looks from other big name high school senior quarterbacks.

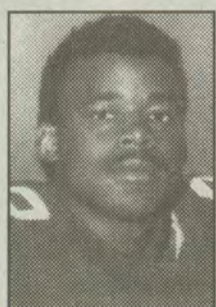
Chris Simms, the son of former Kentucky native Phil Simms, (Louisville Southern, Morehead State, New York Giants QB) has reportedly considered to come to UK for a visit. Also, if the name Simms is not recognition enough, Eli Manning - the brother of Peyton and son of Archie is also looking at the Cats as a possible place to continue the family tradition.

Just the fact that these players are considering the "BLUE" as a place to put on their helmets and play the game, tells you something about the turnaround in the fortunes of UK football and the job Coach Mumme and his staff have done in just one year. The Cats are now being consider by top players along with the Tennessees, Michigans, and Penn States of the world and that makes it much easier to find the right shoe size.

Bill Elliott misses race to mourn loss of 74-year-old father

DOVER, Del. — Bill Elliott did not race at Dover Downs.

The 42-year-old Ford driver, a four-time Dover winner, was in his hometown, Dawsonville, Ga., to mourn the loss of his father, George Elliott, who died on Sept. 17 at the age of 74, was instrumental in the NASCAR careers of his three sons: Dan, Ernie and Bill.

Matt Kenseth chauffeured Elliott's No. 94 Taurus in Sunday's MBNA Gold 400, finishing sixth in his Cup debut.

Elliott's most recent top-five finish occurred at Martinsville, Va., on Sept. 29, 1997, a span of 30

races. He has not won since the Southern 500 at Darlington on Sept. 4, 1994, the 40th victory of his career.

WHAT A MESS: The Tabasco sponsorship bit of a mess is continuing, though at a subdued pace.

A week ago, a Louisiana judge denied a restraining order that would have immediately removed Tabasco from the side of the car driven by Darrell Waltrip. The company has sued to invalidate its deal with car owner Bob Hancher.

But ... with the Tabasco deal in jeopardy, Earnhardt is rumored to be considering adding a second

team for, yes, Darrell Waltrip next year. That way Waltrip, the three-time champion, could warm a seat for Earnhardt Jr., while at the same time Waltrip's farewell tour would be handled under the marketing direction of the Earnhardt brain trust.

TWO CELEBRATIONS IN ONE: Both Earnhardt and Terry Labonte made their 600th career starts in Sunday's 400-mile Earnhardt, in fact, started his 600th race in last place, having taken the ex-champion's provisional normally reserved for Waltrip, who had taken it seven races in a row before he netted the 33rd position in Dover qualifying.

News of the Weird

— During the summer, the city councils of Fostoria, Ohio, and Victoria, British Columbia, adopted codes of conduct for its citizens, in Fostoria's case to provide a "moral compass" for youngsters and in Victoria's case to restore "courteous behavior." Fostoria implores people to "in all cases, try to do what is right and try to help others," and also gives specific guidance against littering and being loud, among other things; Victoria urges its folks not to get in other people's way and not to drink and urinate in public places.

— In August, Deborah Gaines, 31, filed a lawsuit against the Brookline, Mass., abortion clinic shot up by John Salvi in 1994, asking it to pay the cost of raising her kid, now age 3. She was queuing up for an abortion that day when the clinic's allegedly lax security permitted Salvi to start firing and said she was so traumatized that she could not bring herself to go to another clinic, and eight months later, little Vivian was born. Gaines said she loves her daughter but that her daughter shouldn't be here.

— Researchers from the United States and France, writing in the Journal of Biological Chemistry, announced in August that aspirin given to plants blocks "pain" receptors in much the same way that it blocks them in animals. However, blocking such receptors in plants is also harmful to neighboring plants, as it suppresses a distress signal that causes them to produce a defensive, sour-tasting chemical to ward off preying insects.

— British historian and conservative moralist Paul Johnson, whose recent essay on marriage to honor his 40th wedding anniversary so annoyed his mistress of 11 years that she rattled him out to British newspapers, admitted in a subsequent interview in London's Observer in May,

"I've been having an affair, but I still believe in family values." And in August in Fort McMurray, Alberta, the attorney for Jonathan Tupper, who recently started a Students Against Drunk Driving chapter and who was subsequently jailed for DUI, told reporters, "(W)hen (Tupper's) sober, he's very much against drinking and driving."

Idol Worship

The Los Angeles Daily News reported in August on the recent fad among little girls (girls aged 3 and 5 were identified in the story) to erratically cut big clumps of their own hair off to emulate Mulan, the animated-film heroine who cuts off her hair with a sword so she can appear to be a man and defend her family. And in Chicago in August, Lauryn K. Valentine, 21, petitioned a court to change her name to "Carol Moseley-Braun," in tribute to the U.S. senator who Valentine said inspired her to finish high school after a shaky start. (The Senator said she hoped Valentine would change her mind.)

Worst Possible Ideas

In July, a juror in Judge Esmond Faulks' court in Newcastle upon Tyne, England, eagerly asked the judge for the defendant's date of birth so he could draw up a star chart to help him decide the case. (He was removed.) Also in July, a 31-year-old woman in Oakley, Calif., felt a mysterious bump as she was pulling out of her driveway, and to help determine what it was, she drove over it again, and then a third time. (It was her 3-year-old son, who suffered a broken leg.) And in August, Wall Street Journal reporter James S. Hirsch, writing a story on the Boston Globe's recent troubles with columnists making up things, noted in his story that The New York Times (owner of the Globe) had no comment on the matter, a fact he later admitted he made up. (He was fired.)

It's Still Vacant

On July 11, according to Tom Martin of a bee-removal service in Tucson, Ariz., while a landlord was showing three prospective tenants a

vacant rental house, a 175-pound honeycomb that had been there awhile fell through the ceiling, sending 15,000 buzzing bees into the house before they could be removed.

— Former Glen Ellyn, Ill., multiple-personalities patient Patricia Burgus, who accepted the diagnosis of psychiatrist Bennett Braun (that her personalities included a cannibal and a satanic cult member) for years until it dawned on her that she wasn't crazy, told a Chicago Tribune reporter in August: "I began to add a few things up and realized there was no way I could come from a little town in Iowa, be eating 2,000 people a year, and nobody said anything about it." (Last year, Braun settled a \$10.6 million lawsuit brought by Burgus and is this month facing revocation of his medical license.)

— British Army Sgt. COUNTRY CHATTER

TIPPIN IS TOPS!

Million-selling honky-tonk titan Aaron Tippin marks a career milestone this year with "Greatest Hits...And Then Some," a collection that looks back at some of country music's most distinctive hits of the 1990s and forward at music that will take his name into the next century. The RCA Records star has made his mark as a champion of hard-core country, a believer in song-writing integrity and a passionate supporter of tradition. The

music is honest; so is the man.

Tippin's unashamedly country delivery made him a hero to purists who cherish honesty in music. His workingman lyrics and blue-collar pride shined like a beacon of hope during the pretty-cowboy/dance Nashville era.

Tippin moved to Music City in 1987 and worked in a factory while honing his song-writing abilities. He also became a weight lifter who developed his physique enough to compete in body-building contests.

Tippin's tunes were recorded by The Kingsmen, David Ball, The Mid-South Boys, Mark Collie and others. Charley Pride sang Tippin's "A Whole Lot Of Love On The Line," which the songwriter reworked into a pile-driving single of his own in 1984. But until 1990, Tippin had assumed his future was in composing. The first time he ever played in Nashville, it earned him a contract with RCA.

That performance was the first

of many that made him famous. His RCA output has demonstrated his song-writing mastery; and his unmistakable vocals speak for themselves. In fact, he was the first singer to entertain troops during the Gulf War Crisis in 1990.

During the past couple of years, Tippin's music has undergone an evolution. His 1995 marriage to Thea Corontzos strongly affected his outlook. For the first time, Aaron Tippin began singing love songs.

"My musical philosophy is pretty simple. I don't care what is hip and what is cool. I just pick out what I think is the truth and I pursue it. The way I look at it, somebody has got to look out for country music, for its history, for its roots. I figure that somebody might as well be me."

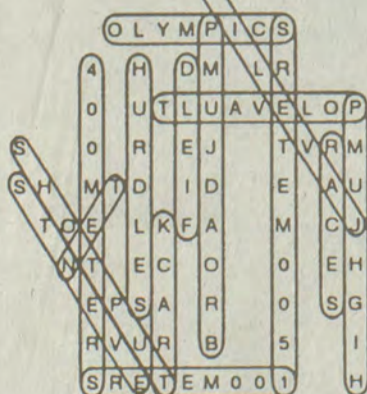
Recurring Themes

News of the Weird last mentioned the Gotmar festival in Pandburna, India, in 1989, noting that despite the village's relative modernization (e.g., 10,000 TV sets at that time for the 45,000 people), males still stop work for the annual festival, take sides against the adjacent town, and for 24 hours hurl rocks at the enemy, after which they bury the dead (in 1989, 4), nurse the wounded (612), celebrate the holiday with their opponents and return to work. At this year's festival, none was killed, but 800 were injured, including 25 hospitalized in critical condition.

Thinning the Herd

Daniel Mark Henderson, 20, was accidentally run over and killed by a road roller at a construction site near La Grange, Ore., in August. Police said he apparently had hotwired the 5-ton vehicle to go joy-riding but then fell off, and it rolled over him. And a 17-year-old boy in Jackson, Tenn., was hospitalized in critical condition in July with burns over 90 percent of his body. Police believe he soaked himself with gasoline and then dared his best friend to set him on fire, which the friend did. Police confirmed in both incidents that, of course, alcohol was involved.

NO. 98-06
SUMMARY**

An ordinance amending the Zoning Ordinance to allow the placement of mobile homes in the city limits of the City of Wheelwright, Kentucky, provided that said mobile home is not placed within thirty feet of any other structure, and complies with other stipulations provided herein.

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Wheelwright desires to change the Zoning Ordinance of the City to allow the placement of mobile home within the city limits, provided that they meet certain guidelines.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED AS FOLLOWS:

That the Zoning Ordinance is amended as follows:

SECTION 2.1 (11) is amended as follows:

Dwelling Unit-Mobile Homes: A mobile home is a structure that does not comply with the modular description above. Mobile homes require building permits for initial installation and not for replacement. Mobile homes are underpinned with block structures and are situated on an approved mobile home lot, or are situated at least thirty feet (30') from any other structure, must be inspected by a certified electrician, no other structure is to be built on or around it except a porch, must be underpinned and the wheels taken off, must be presentable, must obtain a \$25.00 building permit before the mobile home is brought in on lot, be inspected by a Building Inspector, must be responsible for water and sewer hook up and pay all of hook up, otherwise they shall be considered as trailers and may not be permanently occupied. So ordained, this the 21st day of September, 1998.

An ordinance relating to fixing the tax rate for the year 1998.**

Now, therefore, be it ordained by the City of Wheelwright:

Section 1. 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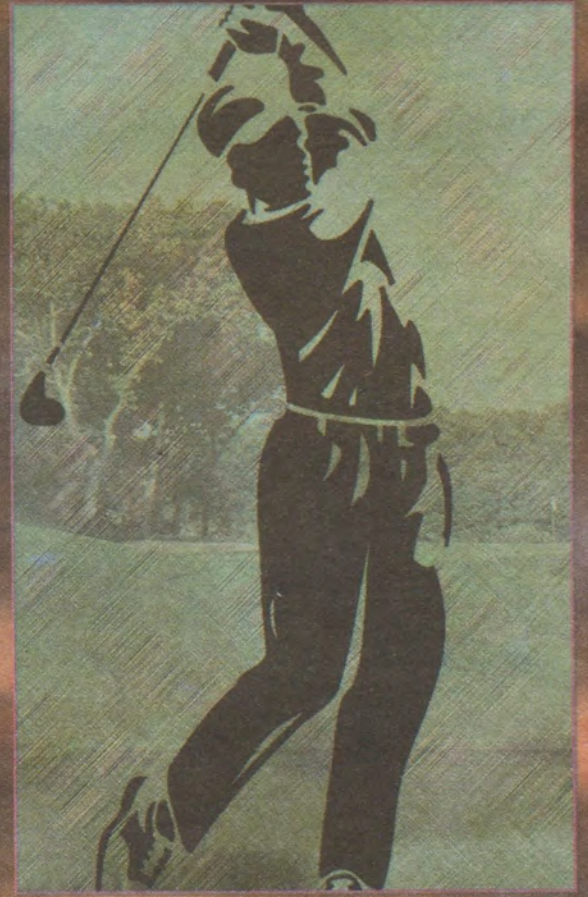
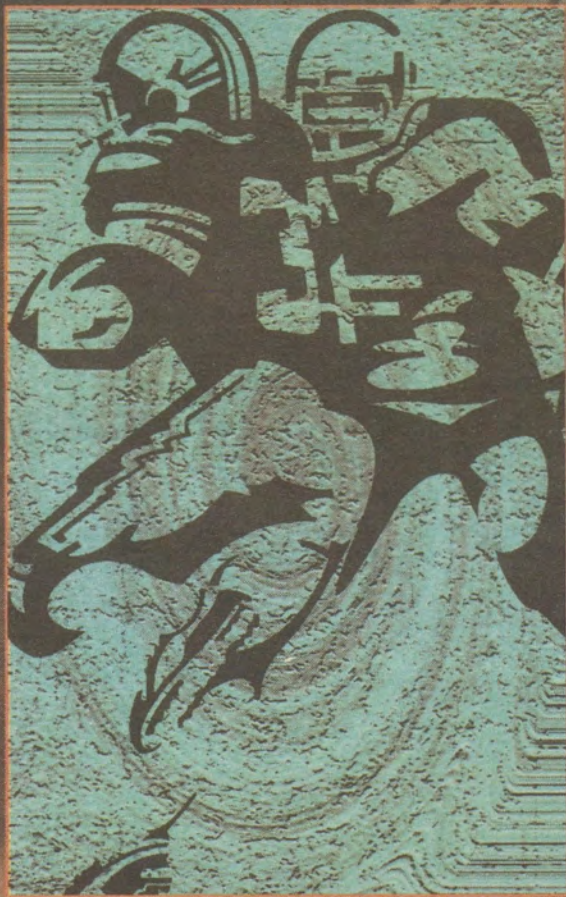
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A Look at Sports

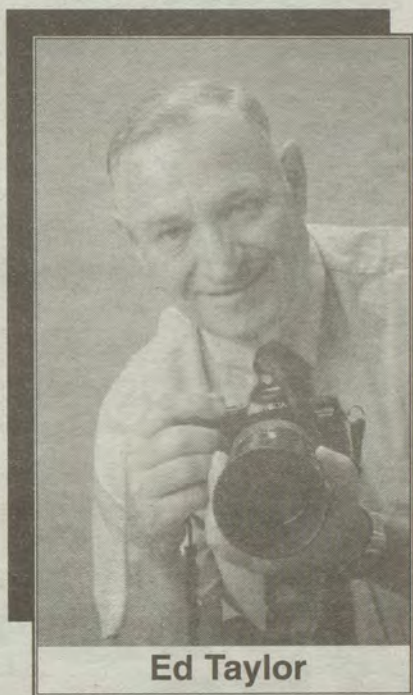
With the falling temperatures and the turning of the leaves, it is a sure sign that fall is upon us. But the sports scene in Floyd County also picks up.

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SEVEN SITES IN ALABAMA

Rules for High School Volleyball

SERVING:

8-1-1 SITUATION A: The server hits the ball before the referee signals for the serve: (a) there was a whistle blown on another court; (b) the crowd noise made it difficult to hear a whistle throughout the game; (c) the server appeared confused or overly excited. RULING: Replay.

8-1-2 SITUATION A: After the referee's signal to serve, the server runs up to the line, jumps into the air, contacts the ball while over the court and lands 10 feet inside the end line. RULING: Legal. COMMENT: The jump must be from legal position within the serving area.

8-1-2 SITUATION B: After the referee's signal to serve, the server runs from outside the left sideline extension to jump serve from within that line extended and behind the end line. RULING: Legal.

RE-SERVE

8-1-4 SITUATION A: Player A on Team S is awarded a re-serve, then serves two more points before being replaced by Player B. Player B is awarded a re-serve during her term of service. RULING: Correct procedure. COMMENT: Each player is entitled to one re-serve during any one team's term of service.

8-1-5 SITUATION A: After the referee's signal for serve, the server: (a) swings and misses the tossed ball; (b) swings, misses and the ball contacts her shoulder; (c) lets the ball drop to the floor; (d) catches a bad toss; (e) tosses the ball, then lets it drop without swinging at it, but it touches the server's knee as it drops to the floor. RULING: (a), (c), (d) and (e) Re-serve; (b) Illegal serve, side-out. COMMENT: In (b), if the ball had not touched the server, but dropped to the floor, it would have been a re-serve; (e) no attempt was made to serve the ball.

8-1-5 SITUATION B: Player No. 12 of Team S is awarded a re-serve. The coach of Team S requests and is given a time-out. RULING: Incorrect procedure; timeout request is denied. COMMENT: A re-serve is considered a part of a single attempt to serve. Therefore, no requests such as a time out, substitution, etc. can be recognized.

ILLEGAL SERVE

8-2-5 SITUATION A: Player No. 7 is serving and has scored two points when the coach realizes player No. 7 is serving out of order. The coach requests a timeout. When the teams return to the floor following the time-out, player No. 9 (the proper server) serves and the team scores an additional three points. The officials then realize that a different player has been serving since the time-out and discover the error. The points scored by No. 7 are canceled, but the team retains the points scored by the proper server. Side-out is awarded to the opponent. RULING:

Correct procedure. COMMENT: If the error had not been discovered until there was a side-out and the opposing team had contacted the ball for serve, no points would have been canceled.

SERVICE FAULT

8-2-6 SITUATION A: At the moment the ball is contacted for serve, CB and RB on Team R are overlapping. However, (a) the server commits a foot fault; (b) the serve lands out of bounds. RULING: (a) illegal serve, side-out; (b) illegal alignment, point.

8-2-PEN #3 SITUATION A: Server A recognizes that he/she is the improper server so tosses and catches the ball to force a re-serve. Before the five seconds for the re-serve have elapsed, the proper server takes his/her place and makes a legal serve, then makes a bad toss for the second serve and catches the ball. RULING: Illegal serve; side-out. COMMENT: The improper server has already used up the proper server's re-serve privilege for that player's term of service.

COURT PROTOCOL

9-2-2 SITUATION A: After match point of the final game, the referee signals "end of game" directing the teams to their respective end lines. Team A is celebrating their victory and does not respond to the signal. The officials: (a) signal "end of game" and sign the scoresheet; (b) repeat the end-of-game signal directing both teams to the end lines; (c) penalize Team A by taking away game point and resuming the game. RULING: (a) Correct procedure; (b) and (c) incorrect procedure.

CONTACTING THE BALL

9-4-3 SITUATION A: CF on Team R jumps to block a spike by an opposing player. The jump is too early, so CF is on the way down when he/she contacts and deflects the ball which is: (a) still partially above the top of the net; (b) completely below the top of the net. RULING: (a) Legal, Team R has three hits remaining; (b) Legal; Team R has two hits remaining. COMMENT: The play in (b) is not a block because contact is not near the top of the net.

9-4-3 SITUATION B: RF on Team R fakes a spike and tips the ball. Team S's CF, attempting to block the anticipated spike, blocks the ball into Team S's side of the net. Team S's CB plays the ball out of the net, the LB sets the ball and the LF spikes the ball. RULING: Legal.

9-4-3 SITUATION C: The CF and LF of Team S go up for a block. The ball hits the wrist of both players. RULING: Legal. COMMENT: This play is considered one block and the team shall be permitted three more hits.

9-4-5 SITUATION A: LF

on Team R contacts the ball at the sideline and returns it to the middle of the playing area by turning his wrist during contact. RULING: Legal. COMMENT: If prolonged contact occurs while the hand is turning, an illegal hit is called.

9-4-5 SITUATION B: CB on Team S contacts the ball: (a) with both hands, while his/her back is to the net; (b) with both hands as she rises from a squat position; (c) with one hand above the head to set the ball. RULING: (a), (b) and (c) Legal unless the official sees prolonged contact.

9-4-5 SITUATION C: CF on Team S contacts the ball: (a) with one hand to tip the ball and changes the direction of the ball; (b) with two hands to set it from chest level. RULING: (a) and (b) legal unless the official sees prolonged contact.

9-4-6 SITUATION A: CF on Team S and RF on Team R contact the ball simultaneously above the net. The ball falls to Team S's side of the net where CF on Team S plays the ball again. RULING: Legal; Team S has two hits remaining.

9-4-7 SITUATION A: CF on Team R blocks a spike sending the ball straight into the air over Team R's court. The CF plays the ball next. RULING: Legal; Team R has two hits remaining.

MULTIPLE CONTACTS

9-4-8 SITUATION A: The CF jumps to block a spiked ball. The ball contacts the left wrist, deflects to the right forearm, then to the head before rebounding into the air. The CF then sets the ball to the RF. RULING: Legal. COMMENT: The deflection from the wrist to forearm to head are legal multiple contacts on one attempt to block, and the set is a legal successive contact after a block.

9-4-8 SITUATION B: In an attempt to save a hard-driven spike, already touched by a blocker on Team S CB of Team S allows the ball to deflect from one fist to the other. RULING: Legal. Team S has two hits remaining. COMMENT: Multiple contacts are permitted on one attempt to save a hard driven spike provided there is no setting action, regardless of whether or not it is touched by a blocker(s).

CENTER LINE

9-5-2 SITUATION A: LF on Team S steps completely across the out-of-bounds extension of the center line: (a) to hit the ball, which has not completely crossed the vertical plane of the net extended, to teammates; (b) as a result of momentum from the play of the ball on Team S's side of the center line; (c) in order to get out of the way of a play by a teammate. RULING: (a), (b) and (c) Legal.

9-5-2 SITUATION B: RF on Team S spikes the ball for a point after which the RF: (a) steps completely over the center

line; (b) touches the net. RULING: (a) and (b) Legal. COMMENT: The ball must be live for a net foul or line violation to occur.

9-5-2 SITUATION C: A player from Team S, attempting to save a ball that is outside the boundary of the court in a playable area, steps across the extension of the center line to play a ball which has: (a) partially crossed the vertical plane of the net extended, (b) completely crossed the vertical plane of the net extended. RULING: (a) Legal (b) out of bounds side-out.

BACK ROW PLAYER

9-5-4 SITUATION A: On the second hit, CB of Team S is in front of the attack line and sets the ball which is higher than the top of the net. The set is (a) partially, (b) completely across the net when it is blocked by an opponent. RULING: (a) Play continuous; (b) back row attack, side out.

9-5-4 SITUATION B: Team R's CB sets the ball from in front of the attack line while the ball is completely above the top of the net. Her teammate misses the set and it is blocked while: (a) a completely on Team R's side; (b) partially across the net; (c) completely on Team S's side of the net. RULING: (a) and (b) play continues; (c) back row attack, point. COMMENT: In (a), the hitter had the opportunity to complete the attack, but missed the ball, so the block is legal.

9-5-4 SITUATION C: On Team R's second hit, the RB attempts to play a ball at the net which is higher than the net and the opponent legally blocks the ball into: (a) RB's hand as he/she is attempting to set the ball; (b) RB's fist as he/she attempts to save the ball; (c) RB as his/her hand turns to block the ball. RULING: (a) and (b) are legal and play continues; (c) back row player foul; point. COMMENT: In (c) the RB turned the palm towards the net, and thus was considered to be blocking.

9-5-4 SITUATION D: The CB of Team R who is in front of the attack line, sets a ball which is completely above the top of the net. Before a teammate can play the ball, it partially crosses the net and the CF of Team S blocks it back into the CB of Team R. The ball: (a) stays on Team R's side of the net; (b) rebounds off the CB and returns to Team S's side of the net untouched. RULING: (a) Legal, play continues with the next play by Team R being its second hit; (b) point, back row player foul.

9-5-5 SITUATION A: After the ball is blown dead, the referee notices that the CB on Team R blocked the ball at the net. RULING: Back row block, point.

9-5-5 SITUATION B: A back row player jumps from behind the attack line, contacts

the ball which is completely above the top of the net, then lands in front of the attack line. The ball crosses the net into the opponent's court. RULING: Legal.

9-5-5 SITUATION C: On the team's first hit, CB on Team S jumps from in front of the attack line and spikes the ball which is completely above the top of the net. The ball goes down the net on Team S's side where CF on Team S retrieves the ball to the RF who returns the ball. RULING: Legal. COMMENT: The intent of the CB might have been otherwise, but the CB did not return the ball completely over the net.

9-5-5 SITUATION D: The RB on Team S who is close to the net and in the vicinity of the ball, fakes a: (a) spike; (b) block. RULING: (a) Legal; (b) back row block, side-out.

9-5-5 SITUATION E: While the ball is: (a) partially; (b) completely above the net, a back row setter on Team S who is near the net fakes a set and dumps the ball over the net. RULING: (a) Legal; (b) back row attack, side-out.

NET PLAY

9-6-3 SITUATION A: CF on Team S reaches across the net, but does not contact the ball. RULING: Legal.

9-6-3 SITUATION B: No one on Team R is able to save a teammate's bad pass. Before it reaches the net, the opposing CF: (a) blocks it; (b) spikes it. RULING: (a) Legal; (b) over-the-net foul, side-out.

9-6-4 SITUATION A: There is simultaneous contact by Team S's spiker and Team R's blocker on a ball which is: (a) directly above the net; (b) completely on Team R's side of the net; (c) completely on Team S's side of the net. RULING: (a) Legal; (b) over-the-net foul on Team S, side-out to Team R; (c) over-the-net foul on Team R, point. COMMENT: In (b), the offensive team must have the first opportunity to contact the ball. In (c) it is illegal to attack a ball which is completely on the opponent's side of the net.

9-6-5 SITUATION A: A ball is served by Team S and is partially over the net when the RF of Team R: (a) blocks; (b) attacks the ball. RULING: (a) Illegal block; and (b) illegal hit.

9-6-6 SITUATION A: Player A of Team R stands at the net with her hands raised above her head. The served ball passes over the Player A's head only to be spiked while above the height of the net by the Player B. The spiked ball goes into the net and is recovered by Player C. RULING: Legal, Team R has one hit remaining. COMMENT: The ball is not considered attacked until it crosses the vertical plane of the net.

9-6-7 SITUATION A: A player: (a) contacts the referee's platform; (b) falls into the referee's platform, shaking the platform; (c) grasps the standards

for support; (d) touches the net cable between the net and standard. RULING: (a) Legal; (b), (c) and (d) illegal, net foul.

9-6-7 SITUATION B: At the moment the CF on Team S makes incidental contact with the net standard, the LF on Team R brushes the net on a block. RULING: Net foul on Team R, point. COMMENT: The incidental contact with the net standard is legal.

9-6-7 SITUATION C: RF on Team R reaches over the net to block, misses the ball and contacts the LF on Team S who has just tipped the ball over the net. RULING: Legal, no interference occurred.

9-6-7 SITUATION D: Front-row player on Team S comes down from an attack with her foot partially across the center line. A front-row player on Team R blocks the ball, comes down on top of the Team S player's foot and it causes her to fall into the net. RULING: Interference on Team S, side-out.

9-6-7 SITUATION E: The LF on Team R comes down from an attack with her foot partially across the center line. As she tries to return to her position at the net, a Team S player comes down on her foot. This causes the LF of Team R to fall into the net. RULING: Net foul on Team R, point.

DOUBLE FOUL

9-7-2 SITUATION A: During play at the net, the ball is simultaneously: (a) contacted by opponents; (b) held over the net by opposing players. RULING: (a) Legal; (b) double foul, replay. COMMENT: Simultaneous contact by opponents is not an automatic replay. The official must determine if the ball becomes motionless during the contact. If so, the prolonged contact is a foul by each player. If the ball is not held, play continues.

SIMULTANEOUS FOULS

9-7-4 SITUATION A: The score is 10 to 10. Team R's captain requests a third time-out and a player on R's bench makes derogatory remarks to the umpire. RULING: Simultaneous fouls during a dead ball; both penalties are assessed. No time-out is given.

REPLAY

9-8-1 SITUATION A: The second volley by Team S goes up into the rafters over its playing area where it: (a) bounces and falls; (b) rolls along a beam and falls; (c) sticks momentarily on the rafters, then falls. RULING: (a), (b) and (c) play continues.

UNNECESSARY DELAY

9-9-1 SITUATION A: After being warned, Team S continues to huddle after each point. RULING: Unnecessary delay; Team S is charged a time-out and given the 60 seconds. COMMENT: If Team S has used its allotted time-outs, side-out.
