## Road project moving along

Sally Ann Chaney says she "grieved a lot at first, but now I'm happy with the way things worked out.

Chaney is talking about the loss of the house and property she and husband Ernest Wayne Chaney owned on KY 114 across from Comfort Suites Hotel.

The Chaneys are among the first homeowners to leave the area at the juncture of KY 122 (Spurlock Road) to allow for the initial phase of the rewidening of KY 114, the extension of the Mountain Parkway.

The couple, who had lived in the hillside home for 24 years, moved to Paintsville two weeks ago, shortly after selling their property to the state. "At first, I cried a lot," said Chaney, who works at nearby Clark Elementary School. "I didn't want to is scheduled for completion by leave, but we knew we had to, and now I'm very well satisfied."

On behalf of the state, American Consulting Engineering of Lexington is charged with buying the property along the almost two-mile stretch from KY 404 to US 23, which is slated to be four

On the western section of the targeted roadway, work has already begun to move water and gas lines, said Keith Damron, district design engineer with the Kentucky Department of Highways, District 12 in Pikeville.

"The consulting engineers are buying rights-of-way with the intent of having the area cleared by December," Damron said. "We hope to let bids for construction by next May and to complete this section within two years."

The rest of the four-laning from Prestonsburg to Salyersville 2004. The project is just now in the design phase, Damron said, adding that the Jackson district will handle the rewidening of the other 16 or so miles.

Damron said the local project is expected to cut down on traffic problems around the Mountain Arts Center, giving patrons an easier entrance and exit to shows.

The project will have "no significant effects" on the historic Middle Creek battleground, Damron said. He added that district officials have been working with Frank Fitzpatrick, whose family owns the battlefield, to ensure that the acreage remains

Cost estimates for the present phase of the rewidening project include \$18 million for road construction, \$3.7 million for rightof-way, and \$1.5 million for design, Damron said.

## Shots fired in Lancer

A 17-year-old Job Corps student was arrested late Saturday night after a shooting incident in Lancer Bottom in Prestonsburg.

The juvenile led Kentucky State Police, Floyd County Sheriff's deputies and Prestonsburg police officers on a foot pursuit through Lancer after he allegedly attempted to steal stereo equipment from the vehicle of a Lancer resident around

The youth apparently also tried to steal a van in his effort to escape

The incident began on a carport and Willow Lane in Lancer when the suspect removed a radio from a vehicle, Prestonsburg Police officer Gerald Clark said after the pursuit.

When the homeowners confronted the youth, he ran. Police officers gave chase.

A few blocks away, on Cardinal Drive, he allegedly attempted to steal a Dodge van. There, he apparently encountered the homeowner's son and fled.

Police officers began their foot pursuit of the youth.

On Cooley Street, Prestonsburg Police officers heard a women scream and the sound of five or six gun shots, officer George Tussey

Officer Gerald Clark said he immediately took cover behind a tree when the shots were fired.

The shots escalated the incident and created a more dangerous situa-

tion, Prestonsburg Police Officer Darrell Conley said later. He said a in his attempt to escape and for bystander admitted firing some

shots during the incident.

In the dim light that night, the bystander fit the description of the youth fleeing the scene. The man was shirtless and wearing a pair of short pants, but police recognized him when he stepped into the light,

Conley said. The youth had pulled off his white t-shirt, jumped over a fence and fled on foot. Officers chased him about one-half mile through Lancer Bottom. Kentucky State Police and Floyd County Sheriff's

deputies joined the chase. Kentucky State Police officer Ricky Conn caught up with the youth on a riverbank just off Evergreen Street. In the capture, the 17year-old apparently resisted arrest. It took five officers and some pepper spray to subdue the juvenile enough to handcuff him and get him in a county police cruiser.

No weapons were found in his possession nor near the capture site.

Officers continued their search of the riverbank for a second suspect in the attempted burglary. That suspect was described as having blonde hair, but authorities were unable to locate the second man.

The juvenile was transported to Highlands Regional Medical Center for treatment of injuries he received

## Fire destroys park equipment

The cause of the fire is still under investigation, but Newsome said it "could be something electri-

Besides the golf carts, Newsome said the loss included large mowing machinery, weed eaters, push mowers, spare tires, tools, grass seed, fertilizer and other groundskeeping materials.

The fire did not interrupt golfing activity. "You can still play, but you have to walk," Newsome said.

Although park officials have already begun replacing some of the lost items, "we will probably go into next year before we can replace everything," Newsome

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## Disease rumors unverified

Floyd County Health Department had not received notification of any case of meningitis in the county as of Tuesday (September 29).

Hospitals are required by law to notify the health department within hours of diagnosing a communicable disease that could have consequences for the community, said Thursa Slone, director of community health nursing for the department.

Slone said her office has received numerous inquiries concerning the disease which, depending on the variety, can be fatal. The

Despite a rash of rumors, the rumors are particularly rampant in variety of symptoms that could continue to encourage precautions, schools where children frequently pass along diseases.

> A diagnosis of meningitis can take a week or more because doctors try to eliminate other possibilities before they administer a cerebral spinal fluid tap, Slone said.

Diagnosis is difficult, she said, because the viral strain of the disease affects different people in different ways. By the time it is diagnosed in some people, the symptoms may have abated, but for others they may be more serious.

Slone said meningitis also has a

apply to other illnesses, including stiffness of the neck, overall achiness, listlessness and fever.

Viral meningitis, the more common strain, is seldom fatal, she said, unlike the more rare bacterial

Slone assured that her office would be actively involved in investigating and providing information if there were confirmed incidents of the disease. "However, we have had no such notification," she said.

#### Teaching teachers

Morehead State University President Ronald Eaglin's interest in strengthening teacher training is encouraging.

In a commentary published by the Herald-Leader Monday, Eaglin wrote: "I am challenging the academic leadership and faculty of our institution to broadly re-examine everything we do in teacher preparation.'

Eaglin raised some provocative questions about how teachers are educated. He called for a statewide initiative to improve the quality of the teaching force and for stronger partnerships between universities public and schools. Good ideas.

We urge Eaglin to follow through. We urge his counterparts to undertake the sort of proposes. We urge a state task force that starts work on teacher training next month to

But most of all, we urge teachers to view this rising interest in their profession as an opportunity, not a threat.

Unfortunately, anyone who points out shortcomings in teacher training risks offending teachers and their many supporters.

While this defensiveness may be understandable, it's regrettable. It blinds people to reality and erects a roadblock to progress. Morehead has a huge constituency of teachers among its alumni, which is one reason Eaglin's openminded attitude, his willingness to admit there are weakmore significant.

Herald-Leader was in part a response to criticism by our columnist Bill Bishop. Bishop has taken Morehead to task for falling short in its duty to produce teachers capable of overcoming the historic disad-Kentucky's schools and chil-

The

But many people, inside and outside the region, worry about the same realities that Bishop decries and Eaglin acknowledges.

Carol Stumbo, the state Education Department's Region 8 Service Center supervisor, is among those sounding the alarm. So is former state school board member Tom Gish of Whitesburg.

In a memo to her superiors in Frankfort, Stumbo, a Morehead graduate and acclaimed Floyd County teacher, wrote of the self-reinforcing problems at all educational levels.

"A majority of the teachers working in the region were born and grew up here," Stumbo wrote late last year.

"They attended area institutional soul searching he schools, leaving the region only briefly to complete teaching certification. The quality of their education, both within the area and at regional universities, has been questioned by many within the region. Many believe that the education of teachers and administrators needs to be improved at both the undergraduate and graduated levels at these universities. The Regional Service Center has worked extensively with Morehead State University on this problem and progress has been made," Stumbo said, "but more work is needed."

The work she's talking about is some of the most important work facing Kentucky today. Stumbo's concern is regional, but concerns about nesses and to search for ways' teacher preparation stretch to shore them up are all the statewide. The Prichard Committee for Academic Excel-Eaglin said his piece in the lence has put the issue at the top of its to-do list.

If Eaglin and the educators at Morehead lead the way in opening their minds and rolling up their sleeves to pound out solutions, they will do their region and state a vantages faced by Eastern huge service.—Lexington Herald-Leader

#### **Moving mountains** moves the economy

As I unfurled the Sunday Morning Edition of The Herald-Leader, I immediately recognized the headline photograph of the road and rock cut of US 23 between the Kentucky/Virginia border at the higher elevated Pound Gap and the lower elevated Payne Gap. What a sense of pride and accomplishment came over me at that time, recognizing the engineering and construction feat performed by the Kentucky Department of Transportation (KDOT), Bizzack, Inc. and Bush and Burchett, Inc.

One would have had to travel this road the past 45 years, as I have, to appreciate the transformation of this dangerous and unsightly piece of road to what it looks like today.

This road is not all about money, it is about Kentucky being ready for the 21st Century and handling the commerce and tourism that this magnificent road will create and enhance. Virginia and Tennessee have completed their portions of US 23, and North Carolina is now completing their last section. This will totally complete the project from Asheville, North Carolina and its crossroads with Interstate's 40 and 26 to Eastern Kentucky. Manufacturing companies have been unable to use our portion of US 23 due to the restricted height clearance of the overhead railroad trestles combined with the extreme curves at those particular points. Delivered prices for products have been higher for Eastern Kentuckians because of increased travel distances and time. Better roads and easier access will directly affect us as these bottlenecks are completed. This is just one of the many benefits that will accrue to Kentucky.

I have an enormous amount of respect for the Kentucky State Nature Preserves Commission (KSNPC) and their correct concern for migrating wildlife and the obstacles that this road will present to the entire Pine Mountain habitat, but I am of the opinion that if they had interceded during the design stages of this project, the KDOT would have accommodated and built the structures needed to correct this deficiency. I would hope that a dialogue would begin to address this valid concern and how to enhance our wildlife migration routes.

Lastly, I will finally be just as proud of arriving at Pound Gap on my northbound travels heading home as I was traveling southbound viewing Virginia. This piece of road work is the difference as day is to night.

In February, 1996, my Father, Carl Johnson, passed away at the age of 74. He was a veteran of World War II and served with Company M of the 60th Infantry. After his discharge from the army he received a small pension. When he passed away my mother, Helen, filed for survivor's benefits.

For the past two-and-half years she has received a check each month for \$188.00 in benefit payments. This may not seem like a lot of money, but it pays several of her bills. Since she is still making mortgage payments on a VA loan, this money is an important part of her limited/fixed income. Due to her age and health she is not able to work to supplement

On July 24, 1998, my mother received a letter from the Department of Veterans Affairs in Cleveland, Ohio, telling her that she is receiving too much money from her other benefits, which are social security and black lung miner's benefits. This letter stated that she had

#### School days, school days: getting and staying high!

A handsome, 17-year-old, male, high school Senior explained why the Judge ordered him to have therapy: "Was arrested at 5 a.m. for driving under the influence of drugs. Main thing was marijuana-was smoking almost constantly whenever I was awake, for four years. Got money by cutting grass, asking parents, working odd jobs, and selling some pot. Cocaine, not much until (someone special) was killed in an accident. Then did cocaine constantly every day and sometimes every night for more than a month. Also did pills-Valium and Loratabs. Had Lorasets that night. Have mood swings. Think about

forcer for him). On probation now. Worry that I might break over. He admitted to feeling anxious more than depressed or angry). Can't remember nothing. Takes up to two hours to go to sleep. Wake up about three of seven nights and have problems going back to sleep. Feel tired in the mornings." He had problems controlling himself; "explodes easily." In the past, Senior had difficulties with school personnel due to using drugs. He had never failed a grade. He made C's, but thought he could do better. He reportedly had always demanded attention throughout the years.

Based on national averages, "15,600 teens will use drugs for the first time in the next 24 hours...More than 50 percent of all teens use alcohol or drugs." Hopefully, this very brief summary of youth abusing and depending upon substances will help parents become more acutely aware and accept that their teen could be using drugs. Besides the ones Senior gave, possible indicators of drug usage are: excessive use of breath mints (hides the smell of alcohol and marijuana), a high level of irritability with explosive behaviors; unnecessary or obvious lying; different eating habits; tends to be aggressive; appears unkempt; lower grades; absent or tardy from school often; changes friends; unexplained spending of unusual amount of money; gradual disappearance of valuables; changes in behaviors—hyperactivity or listless; hides liquor in unusual places; long stays in the bathroom; wears sunglasses to hide dilated, constricted or bloodshot eyes; and has needle marks, usually on arms, hands, neck, and legs, from injecting drugs. A recent study showed that high school athletes received good grades, but that more were drawn to alcohol and drugs than students busy in other activities.

A "guess" is that alcohol is the most frequently used recreational drug in our area. It is the second most commonly used one nationally. A little alcohol may produce minimal behavior change—become more relaxed, euphoric, withdrawn or even violent. As the amount of blood alcohol increases, the chance of an accident, coma, or even death increases. Another 'guess" is that marijuana is the second drug of choice for our kids. Its physical effects include a faster heartbeat, bloodshot eyes, and a dry mouth and throat. The drug can impair functions up to six hours; i.e., short-term memory, alter sense of time, and decrease reactions, concentration, and coordination. Alcohol combined with marijuana increases the danger. "Pills"pain medications and stimulants-"speed" and Valium, are readily available for our youth. Our teens often have easy access to the pain and "nerve pills" that many adults in the region use. Cocaine, a mood elevator that peaks within 8 to 12 minutes and deteriorates within 30 to 40 minutes, creates a quick and easy "habit" that is very hard to break. Cocaine has often been connected to cardiac problems and sometimes sudden death. An extremely dangerous drug is LSD, due to its effects being unpredictable depends upon the amount taken, the user's personality, mood, and expectations and the surroundings in which the drug is used. Inhalants are addictive and are frequently used by the 7 to 17 year old group; i.e., hair sprays, lighter fluid, gasoline, and model airplane glue-found around every household, and cheap.

Some researchers think addictions tend to be inherited, while others think the teen learns from the environment where the adults abuse substances. For example, Senior's family history included a grandfather and his brothers who had been alcoholics. "Street" drugs and alcohol are also used to self-mediate for depression, anxiety, and to relieve stress. A hypothesis was that the sport "hero" who drinks may believe that he can do whatever he wants and will not be caught. Another major contributing factor for our teens abusing alcohol and drugs, may be that parents help set up the situation by trying to keep the kids happy. Often parents do not want or are unable to say "No" to the teens and the teens have not learned to say "No" to themselves and others. Some youngsters are able to

The letter also indicated that she would most likely have to repay money she received after May 1, 1998, even though she did not receive the letter until July.

My mother was never aware that an income ceiling existed and has based her living for the past twoand-a-half years on the total of all benefits she receives. The fact that her VA benefit payments will be discontinued is outrageous enough, but, even more outrageous is the ceiling limit for yearly income, which is \$5,688.00.

I am sure that there are a lot of veterans who are not aware of this yearly income ceiling. I wonder how many veterans think that their survivors will be taken care of (above poverty level)? Those survivors who are not able to work, as my mother is not, would be hard pressed to survive on the income restrictions being placed on their income and benefits.

I think it is a disgrace and shameful! These benefits are not "freebies!"!These men and women worked all of their lives, fought and died in the military and earned

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

Deadline to register to vote or change precincts or political parties for the general election in November is October 5, according to Floyd County Court Clerk Carla Boyd.

Offices on the November ballot include U.S. Senator; U.S. Representative for the 5th Congressional District; State Representative for the 95th District; property tax administrator; county judge-executive; county attorney, county clerk, sheriff; jailer; coroner; county surveyor; justice of the peace; constable; commissioners; city council members; city commission members; school board representatives; and mayor.

This will be the first time that Floyd County voters will cast their ballots for county commissioners in a general election, and some voters are confused about the issue, according to the county court clerk.

Boyd said that voters will cast three votes for commissioners.

"Each registered voter in all of Floyd County will have the choice

Amendment No. 1 asks voters if they want to have a legislative session every year, Boyd said Tuesday.

"The proposed amendment would alter ... the Kentucky Constitution in two ways: it would reduce the organizational session held in odd-numbered years from 10 days to five days, and it would allow for an interim legislative session of not more than 25 days, to be convened on the first Tuesday in February in odd-numbered years," according to a brochure explaining the amendment.

If the amendment is defeated, the odd-year organizational session of not more than 10 days would still be held, but the General Assembly would not meet again in regular session until January 2000, the brochure explains.

Amendment No 2 concerns

"It asks 'do you want to do away with personal property tax when you license your car?" Boyd said.

"The proposed amendment does not, by itself, propose to remove the current taxes on any items of personal property," according to the brochure. "The effect of the proposed amendment, if adopted, would be to allow the General Assembly to provide exemptions by enactment of specific legislation."

Boyd expects voters to say yes to both amendments.

"Usually, they say no," she said. She added that even if voters approve the amendments, legislators must also approve them, and they must be signed into law.

#### Just a matter of time

Last Sunday at Martinsville, Tide driver, Ricky Rudd, continued one of the most remarkable streaks in all of Winston Cup racing. His win in the NAPA Autocare 500 stretched his consecutive years of winning at least one Winston Cup race a year to 16. This is the longest active streak in the Winston Cup

The victory was his 20th of his career and puts him in seventh place among active drivers with Winston Cup wins. His 20 victories also put him in a tie for 25th place on the alltime Winston Cup win list.

The year 1997 was perhaps Rudd's best in his 23-year Winston Cup career. He won two races, including the biggest purse of the year at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway in the Brickyard 400.

He finished a disappointing 14th in the final point standings, but it wasn't really a true reflection of the numbers that he posted during the year. In fact it was the first time since the 1988 season that he had finished out of the top 10 at season's end. Looking back further into Rudd's career, it was only the third time since he started racing Winston Cup full time in 1977 that he has failed to finish in the top 10. Last season turned into one of those years that he either ran very competitively or was so far off the pace that he became a non-factor in the race's outcome.

Last year saw Rudd post some of the best numbers of his career. Besides his two victories, he notched six top-five and 11 top 10 finishes on his way to winning a career best \$1.9 million. The money no doubt was a welcome sight not only to Ricky Rudd the driver, but also to Ricky Rudd the team's

Rudd tried to form a partnership with a couple of teams just to share information with, but the results seem to have been of little benefit.



At that very instant, Joe was coming back around the house and the hammer just barely missed him. He stopped, looked up, looked at me, grinned and wheeled and ran into the house. In no more than five seconds he came running out with a bottle of catsup. He stopped by the porch, dumped the catsup on his head, sat the bottle down and went over and stretched out, face down, in the yard, his catsup-stained head next to the hammer.

The roof was high, the ladder was long, and I was speechless. As Dad placed his foot on the first rung, he looked down. Thinking he'd mortally wounded his youngest son, his feet touched no other rungs.





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

#### SPICY STEAK AND **ONION HEROES**

1 pound flank steak 1 tablespoon olive oil

I large onion, cut in half and

1 1/2 teaspoons TABASCO® brand Pepper Sauce

1/2 teaspoon sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt 4 hero rolls

#### **GRILLED BALSAMIC** AND SOY MARINATED **FLANK STEAK**

Serves Four 1/2 onion, small roughly,

chopped 3 garlic clove, roughly chopped

1/4 cup olive oil

1/4 cup balsamic vinegar 1/4 cup soy sauce

1 tbsp. Dijon mustard

1 tbsp. rosemary

1 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. freshly cracked black

1 ea. flank steak, about 1 1/2

Prepare the grill. Combine onion, garlic, oil, vinegar, soy, mustard, rosemary, salt and pepper in a mixing bowl using a wire whisk or hand blender until wellcombined, about 30 seconds.

Place meat in large casserolestyle dish. Pour marinade over meat. Marinate for a minimum of 30 minutes or up to 2 days.

Place marinated flank steak on grill over hot coals. Brush with extra marinade throughout grilling. Grill until golden and cooked to desired doneness, about 6-8 minutes on each side (medium-rare). Transfer grilled flank steak to a serving plate or dish to collect juices.

Using a sharp knife, slice the meat thinly.

Serve slices with desired accompaniments; drizzle with collected meat juices.

#### SUPER CRISP **COUNTRY FRIED** CHICKEN

To serve four:

1 frying chicken (2 1/2 to 3 pounds) cut-up, or use chicken

Crisco Shortening

1/2 cup milk

1 egg 1 cup flour

2 teaspoons garlic salt

2 teaspoons Monosodium Glutamate (MSG)

1 teaspoon paprika 1/4 teaspoon poultry seasoning 1 teaspoon black pepper

1/4 teaspoon poultry seasoning 1 teaspoon black pepper





You will bloom forth like a beautiful




