Schedule set for 2001 General Assembly

After a brief organizational session in early January, state lawmakers will return to Frankfort Feb. 6 for the bulk of the General Assembly's 2001 legislative session.

That's the schedule agreed upon Wednesday by General Assembly leaders during a Legislative Research Commission meeting at the State Capitol.

According to the approved schedule, state lawmakers will spend four days in Frankfort, beginning Jan. 2, primarily focusing on organizational work, such as making committee assignments and choosing legislative leaders. Bills can also be filed for consideration at that time.

Lawmakers will break for the rest of the month, though interim joint committees will be allowed to meet to study the issues before the General Assembly.

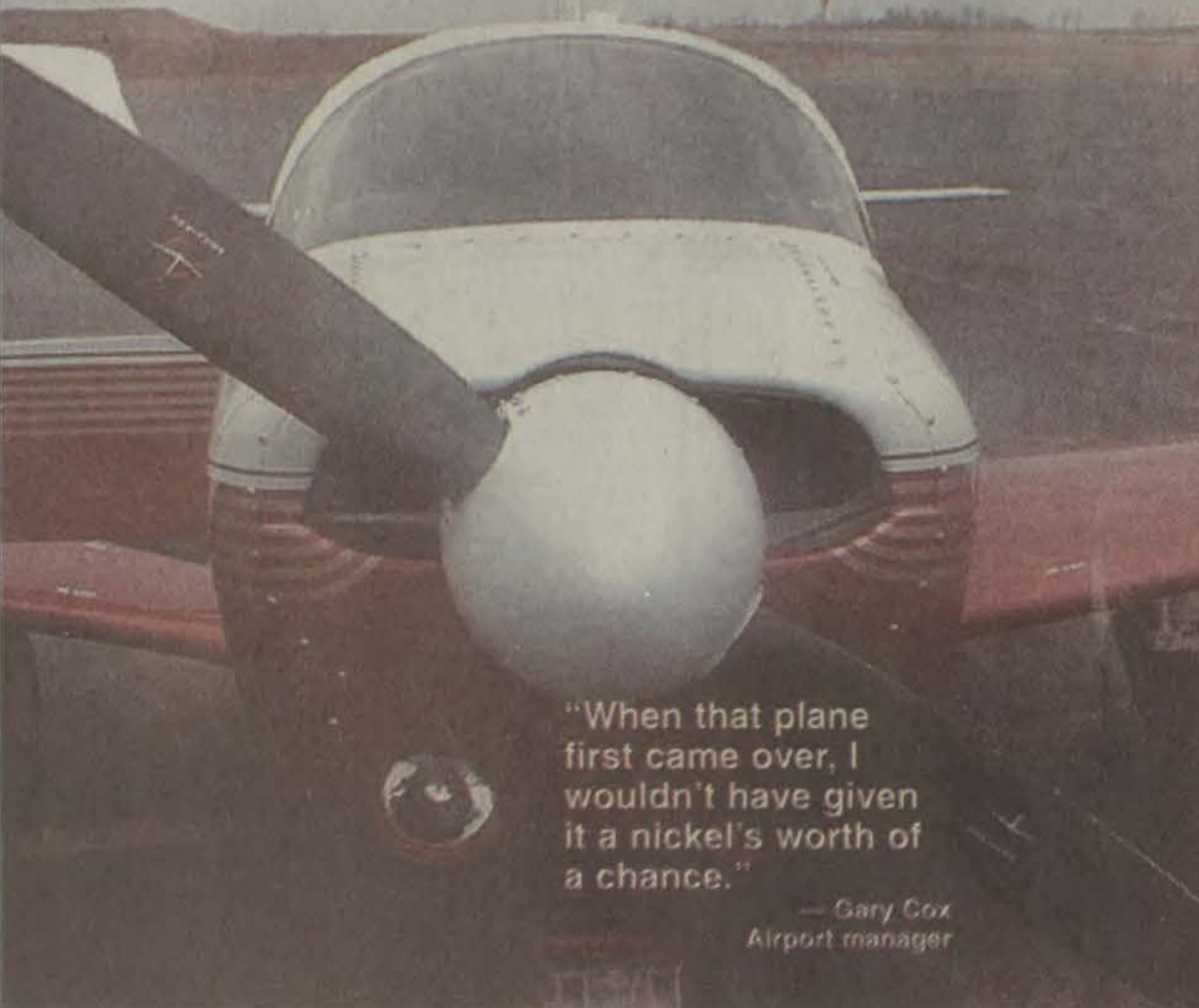

Plane lands at Big Sandy after pilot passes out

Airport manager says incident shows need for emergency planning

A western Kentucky family had a near-miss with catastrophe Thursday as carbon monoxide filled the cabin of their single-engine airplane over the hills of eastern

Kentucky during a return trip from Virginia.

Thomas Bailey was flying his Mooney aircraft from Lynchburg, Va., to Benton in far western Kentucky when he passed out at the controls, apparently having been overcome by carbon monoxide fumes.

Bailey's wife radioed for help from the Indianapolis Air Route

Traffic Control Center, which provides air traffic control support for much of the eastern U.S. and is known to pilots simply as "Indy Center."

Mark Clements of Hazard, a former helicopter pilot in Vietnam, was in the air in a Cessna 172 about eight miles from the Baileys when the distress call came in. He was soon dispatched to help talk the woman, who had some flying experience but had not piloted an airplane in 20 years, down to the

Five drop out of fight with P'burg

Had faced \$318,000 bill, loss of sewer

A motion to withdraw has been filed in Floyd Circuit Court by attorney Ralph Stevens on behalf of three Abbott Creek residents named in a countersuit brought forward against them by the City of Prestonsburg.

The countersuit was filed as a response to a class action lawsuit brought about by 13 residents of the Big Branch of Abbott Creek area. The suit seeks to block annexation of the area into the city's corporate limits.

The city claims in its countersuit that five of the residents — Dr. Terry Wright, Roland Gray, Kent Dingus, Debbie Dingus and Debbie Leslie — waived their rights to challenge annexation of their property when they signed an agreement upon receiving sewer service from the city.

Under city ordinance 51.04, property owners outside of city limits are required to sign an agreement waiving "any objection to future annexation" of their property in order

Bull Creek woman dies in one-car wreck

A fatal accident involving a single vehicle occurred on the morning of November 30 on Route 2030, near Printer. The accident claimed the life of Yvonne Looney, age 45, who was a resident of the Bull Creek area.

According to a report issued by Kentucky State Police, the vehicle, driven by Randall Conn, veered out of control as it rounded a curve in the road, and came to a stop as it crashed into a nearby tree.

Looney was pronounced dead at the scene by Deputy Coroner Glen Frasure.

Conn was transported immediately to Our Lady of the Way Hospital at Martin, then transferred on to Highlands Regional Medical Center.

Responding to the scene were Kentucky State Policemen Troopers Hunt and Watkins, members of the Floyd County Sheriff's Department, Left Beaver Rescue Squad, and Left Beaver Ambulance Service.

The accident is being reconstructed by KSP Trooper Henry Banks and charges are pending the results investigation by KSP Detective Lee Weddington.

Mountain Manor given OK by state, won't rehire aides

A difference of opinions among some still exists concerning the walk-out staged by seven certified nurse aides from the Prestonsburg Health Care Center (formerly Mountain Manor Nursing Home) on the morning of November 21.

There are those who persist in their opinions that the walk-out was justified and that nurse aides perform stressful, thankless jobs.

According to Doug Hornsby, director of operations of Home Quality Management Inc., which now owns Prestonsburg Health Care Center, that is a problem which has always existed within the health industry. And, says Hornsby, it is a problem that exists in many of the varied service industries that exist nationwide.

Hornsby is in town this week to oversee the conditions at the health center. It had been formerly reported that Joe Steier, executive vice

president of operations, and Shaira O'Connor, vice president of human resources, would be flying to Kentucky from the home office in Florida this week in order to meet with the seven aides. Because of illness, Steier and O'Connor were unable to make the trip.

Hornsby, however, has been in close contact with Steier and together they are working on the situation.

Hornsby reports that on Friday, November 24, a surprise visit was paid to the Prestonsburg facility by Ora Mae Roark, a dietetic inspector from the Office of the Inspector General, Division of Licensing and Regulations, of the Kentucky Cabinet for Health Services.

After extensive examination of the facility, Hornsby reported that Roark found the claims against the facility to be "unsubstantiated."

Hornsby says that the facility has no lack of supplies and that three weeks worth of food is maintained at all times in order to assure cov-

The Carl D. Perkins Job Corps

Center held an intra-school competition this past week among its student body. The focus of the competition was to increase team-building

skills. Each team was given a pre-cut, completely unadorned wooden house face. Instructions were given to decorate the houses, keeping in mind the theme, "Holiday Village." Each team was awarded the same amount of money to be used for supplies, but they were also allowed to spend more, out of pocket, if so desired.

Woodworking, electricity, and facility maintenance classes were also involved in other aspects of putting the "village" together, such as creating patterns for the houses and running electrical lines in order to establish lighting for the houses and the village.

The students had three days to adorn their houses and set up their village. At the end of this time, judging took place and prizes were awarded.

Among the houses seen in the village are a rustic mountain cabin, complete with its very own "mountain man" ascending a ladder in order to string some bright lights on the home to please his loved ones.

There also is a pet store, with a "doggie" peering out from behind a "plate glass window" while a little girl peers in from the outside. A sign situated beside them asks the question, "How much is that doggie in the window?"

There is also a delicious looking gingerbread house, done up, of course, by the culinary arts students. It is replete with a roof made of cookies, and candy canes and icing all around. It looks to be a true confectioner's dream, straight off the pages of the "Nutcracker."

There was also a very detailed two-story home all dressed up for the holidays in bright yellow and green, with Christmas trim all around.

There were also some houses

that were obviously created by some of the more humorous natured students, as they were decorated in motifs resembling the "Peanuts" and "South Park" cartoons.

Each house came with its own set of unique and individual characteristics and details that made judging an almost impossible task, but with instruction to judge with regard to the categories of creativity and holiday spirit, the judges took a deep breath and began.

On hand to do the judging were, Chuck Stamper, Floyd County extension agent for 4-H and Youth Development, Ray Tackett, Floyd County extension agent for agriculture, Jimmy Joe DeRossett, newly elected Prestonsburg city councilman, his wife, Becky DeRossett, and Regina Becknell, executive director of the Prestonsburg Chamber of Commerce.

Clements' job was made even more difficult due to the fact that the carbon monoxide was also beginning to affect Bailey's wife, making her disoriented. Two attempts to land the plane, first at Hazard, then in Pikeville, were abandoned because the woman failed to yield to Clements' instructions in time.

Clements said he had his doubts about how the emergency would turn out.

"I was trying to make her turn and circle and keep her in a circle so I could catch up, but she would not turn when I'd tell her to. She'd turn right, then left," Clements said. "I was trying to get her in a circle so I could catch up with her. I finally got her to slow. There was some panic in there ... I was scared to death that we were going to watch this airplane smack into a hill."

Clements then made a third attempt to talk the plane down, this time at Big Sandy Regional Airport, located in Martin County near the Floyd and Johnson county line.

Big Sandy airport manager Gary Cox said he had just received a call from Indy Center informing him of the need to use the airport's runway for an emergency landing and was still on the phone when Bailey's plane first buzzed overhead.

Cox said that first approach turned out to be an attempt to land, which had to be abandoned because the plane was traveling too fast to safely land. He added that what he

saw during that first look at the plane did nothing to reassure him.

"When that plane first came over, I wouldn't have given it a nickel's worth of a chance," Cox recalled.

The situation became even scarier on the second attempt.

The woman was able to prepare the plane for landing when her husband regained consciousness.

"We found the airport, got lined up, got her gear to come down. At that point her husband woke up," Clements said. "The man regained consciousness about two miles out. The lady had put the landing gear down when he came on the radio and said he was going to land the plane."

But even though Bailey woke up and was able to land the plane, Clements said he still had his doubts because the man was obviously disoriented from the carbon monoxide.

"I kept asking him his name and his air speed and he couldn't answer those questions," Clements said.

Cox said when the plane reached the ground, it made a "wobbly" landing with its flaps up (instead of down for braking), and turned sideways before stopping.

"That was a situation we could have very easily had a fire out there today," Cox said.

Once the plane touched down, cars pursued it down the runway, ready with fire extinguishers in the event of a fire.

"The man was very incoherent when he got out of the plane, and

the lady, she was dying to get out of the airplane," Cox said. "The oldest girl (about 7) seemed not sick, but terrified. The youngest girl (about 5) was just as calm as can be."

All four had vomited as a result of carbon monoxide poisoning, Cox noted.

Once on the ground, all four members of the Bailey family were taken to Highlands Regional Medical Center to be treated for carbon monoxide poisoning. They refused to speak to the media about incident.

Cox hopes a lesson was learned from yesterday's tense situation. He said the near-tragedy highlights a need for officials in the four counties which control Big Sandy to establish a response plan to deal with emergencies at the airport.

"Floyd County, Johnson County, Martin County and Magoffin County need to come up with some kind of emergency response," Cox said. "We could have just as easily had a fire with 10 people aboard."

Following the landing, Clements flew to Frankfort, where he works as a state pilot for the governor and other state officials. When he arrived, he received a standing ovation as a hero's welcome.

Clements, however, brushes aside talk of heroics.

"I'm not a hero, just a good Samaritan," Clements said. "A hero is somebody who risks their life for somebody else. I just happened to be there."

erage in cases of emergency.

Hornsby also reported that Home Quality Management plans to invest close to \$100,000 for renovations to the nursing home within the next three or four months. He says that the attention drawn to the center by the walk-out had nothing to do with the plans, that they actually have been in the making for some time now.

Among the improvements to be made are plans to install new call-lights in each room; the purchase of a van to be used by the residents for outings; and an employee incentive package that will include monetary rewards for a job well done.

Hornsby said he regrets the walk-out and subsequent loss of jobs to the former aides, but that according to very strict state laws pertaining to abuse of the elderly, Home Quality Management cannot afford to re-hire the aides. All but two of the positions have already been filled.

Hornsby said he desires that the community know that Home Quality Management strives to deliver the best quality care possible to all residents of each of their facilities. He cites numerous awards and recognitions of their facilities throughout the region and beyond as an assurance of this claim.

Hornsby states that by mid-March, tremendous improvements to the Prestonsburg structure will be seen.

Several persons were recognized for their contributions to local schools during the November 27 meeting of the Floyd County Board of Education.

Beverly Crisman, community relations coordinator, singled out Prestonsburg Elementary School's Family Reading Night and the persons who have been critical to its success.

The school's last event had an "outstanding response," with 105 parents and students attending, Crisman said. Several community businesses are also involved, she said, by sponsoring door prizes and coupons for students.

Persons credited with the success of the program include Marthann Damron, Terri Hall and Rebiel Reynolds.

Damron provides promotional materials on the events and works to encourage reading, through her library classes. "She assists with the Accelerated Reading testing that evening and circulates to see that things go smoothly," Crisman said.

The role of Hall, who is technology coordinator, is to inform parents and family members about the Accelerated Reader program and to help with planning the event, with testing and with getting prizes donated.

Reynolds, director of the Family Resource Center, also helps plan the event and notify

parents. She furnishes refreshments, assists with testing and helps in other ways.

Crisman also recognized Nadine Hicks, parent involvement coordinator for the school system. She provides a book for each student and information on how parents can work at home to help their children with reading.

Recognized for her involvement as a parent was Tammy Vance. Allen Elementary principal Linda Gearheart shared Vance's contributions with the board.

Vance, she said has served on the school's Site-Based Decision Making Council for four years and has been PTO president. She has also served on various committees at the school over the past seven years, according to Gearheart.

Crisman also recognized two groups that were unable to attend the meeting. The McDowell Family Resource Center, she said, has been named one of the top centers, out of the 705 centers across the state, because of its "outstanding job of meeting the needs of students, parents and community."

to receive sewer service. The ordinance further extends the agreement to future owners of the property also.

The counterclaim quotes relevant portions of the sewer service agreement which require that the property owners not "protest, oppose or petition against the city's annexation" of their property. To do so, under the agreement, gives the city "the right to discontinue sewer service."

The city claims that the residents were guilty of breach of contract and that therefore, the city stands to be entitled to "recovery of all damages, expenses and costs, whether incidental or consequential" incurred as a result of the provision of sewer service.

The city seeks to recover the cost of extending sewer lines into the homes — \$318,443. According to David Neeley, city attorney, the city will seek a court order forcing each of the five residents to put up a bond covering his or her proportionate share of the sewer line extensions. Later, if the city prevails in the suit, sewer services to these residents will be discontinued and they will forfeit the bond.

According to Stevens, two of the named residents had already been removed from the class action suit before the city filed its counterclaim. Those residents were Dr. Terry Wright and Roland Gray.

The remaining three, Kent Dings, Debbie Dings and Debbie Leslie, are not prepared, or willing, to carry the burden of the additional legal costs and ramifications that could be incurred should they choose to persist with their involvement in the suit against the city.

Also, according to Stevens, the city has informally declared that they will offer no objection to the desire of the residents to withdraw from the suit and will allow the court to dismiss their counterclaim.

Stevens also said that the pur-

pose of the original lawsuit against the city is to determine whether or not the annexation proposal should have been placed on the 2002 ballot for a public vote by residents of the Big Branch area.

That determination is still pending in circuit court.

The legislative process begins in earnest on Feb. 6 when lawmakers return to Frankfort to consider bills and pass legislation each weekday through March 9.

Lawmakers will wrap up the session by returning to Frankfort on March 22 and 23 to consider whether or not to override any legislative vetoes from Gov. Paul Patton.

The 2001 session will mark Kentucky's first regular legislative session held during an odd-numbered year. Voters on Nov. 7 approved an amendment to the state constitution allowing annual legislative sessions.

New economy cannot leave Kentuckians behind

Kentucky is a state that is traditionally slow to change. In a business world that is now predicated on change happening more often than the phone rings, these dichotomies could prove fatal for the state.

Fortunately, there are many people in leadership positions who understand that Kentucky must change its ways if it is to take part in the new economy, one that relies more on brain power and innovation than brawn and the status quo.

The problem is, Kentucky has an abundance of residents who are inadequately prepared to take advantage of the high-skilled jobs required of the new economy.

This subject was one discussed earlier this month at the Kentucky Long-Term Policy Research Center annual conference. As Courier-Journal columnist Betty Baye succinctly said, "We're talking about a new economy when there are a lot of people who never took part in the old economy."

It is a difficult job to move the state forward without leaving anyone behind.

Michael Childress, head of the research center, was pleased to announce that for the first time, a majority of Kentuckians (55 percent) have a home computer and another 24 percent have access to the Internet elsewhere. That was tempered by Jane B. Stephenson, Appalachian director of the Steele-Reese Foundation, who said, "We talk about wanting computers in all the homes, when we have many people without telephones in their homes."

It is called the "digital divide," a widening chasm of access between the "haves" and the "have nots." In the year 2000, 89 percent of people with at least a bachelor's degree used the Internet. Another 78 percent of those with some post-secondary education used the Internet, but only 44 percent of those with a high school diploma or less did so.

Why is that important? People who use computers at work tend to earn 10 to 20 percent more than those who do not, Childress said.

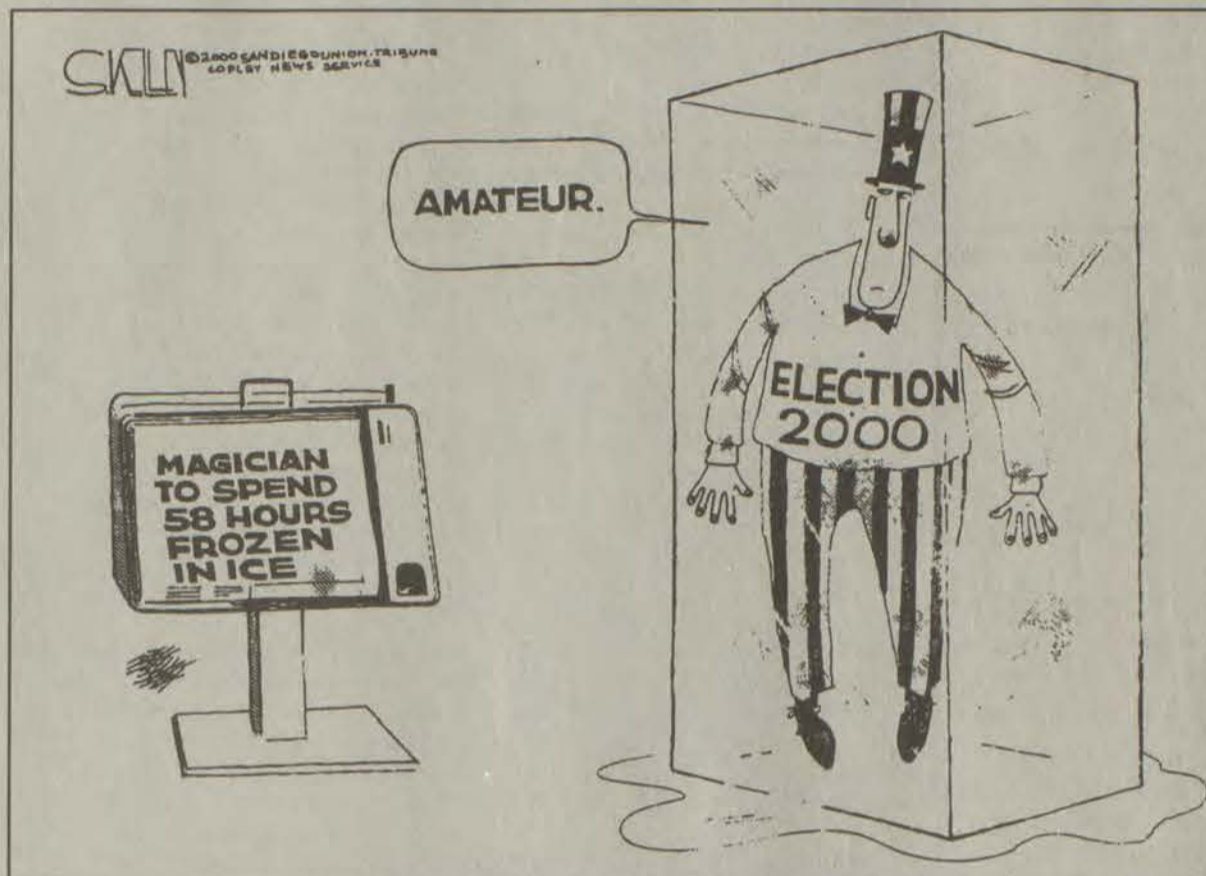
Forrester Research reports that 34 percent of U.S. businesses were online in 1999. Only 15 percent of Kentucky businesses were selling products online.

The National Trust for Historic Preservation surveyed 1,500 businesses in 16 downtown commercial districts nationally, and found that 14.3 percent of their total sales were from the Web. That was enough to keep many small businesses afloat, Childress said.

Last week, Gov. Paul Patton named William G. Brundage as the state's first commissioner of the new economy. He will have to deal with the need to find more trained workers to fill the jobs Kentucky wants to create, and that will only happen with a focused plan of elevating the skill levels across the state.

"If we try to move into the new economy with 40 percent of the people struggling with basic skills," said Gordon Davies, president of the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education, "it's like going sailing with your anchor down. You just go in circles."

U.S., OPEC blocking the way to cleaner air

For the past several weeks talks have gone on in the Hague by representatives of all the world's nations. The purpose is to set emission goals and put a plan in action to address the global warming crisis. The first talks took place in Kyoto, Japan, three years earlier.

The U.S. and the OPEC nations stand alone in throwing up road blocks. The U.S. produces 25 percent of the world's carbon emissions from the burning of coal and oil. OPEC nations are worried about the day coming when they will lose \$25 billion a year in oil sales.

In support of emission reduction is the rest of the world. In attendance there are 6,000 delegates from Island Nations whose very existence is threatened by the projections of rising sea levels. The 15 European Union nations, which are tired of ignoring the scientific evidence, agree that carbon emissions controls have to begin now.

What is proposed is that the U.S. reduce emissions to 7 percent below what emissions were in 1990. The E.U. will reduce to 8 percent below that benchmark and they will have five years to reach those goals.

We have all heard our politicians chide Kyoto as aimed at hurting the U.S. economy and not requiring many third world countries to reduce their emissions to the same levels. What we have here is another example of how our politicians have degenerated into paid spokesmen for vested interests. On one side of their mouth they spout about how the U.S. must be energy independent and on the other they have kept us dependent.

Is the 7 percent reduction in emission doable without hurting the economy? I think the answer is yes and in fact we could reduce emissions far more than the meager 7 percent goal. First we have to understand that the burning of fossil fuels is an old, outdated technology and not be afraid of change. Just as there was resistance to going from horses to the automobile we now have to realize we no longer have the luxury of continuing with the internal combustion engine.

In South Africa there is an automobile factory that is under construction to produce cars that run on compressed air. A simple design of feeding compressed air to the engine. They plan to open plants next in Mexico, Portugal and Australia. We now see hybrid cars from Toyota and Honda that get 70 miles to the gallon. There is hydrogen fuel cell technology on the way which one former OPEC minister commented on not long ago that he believed would put the OPEC nations out of business.

On another front, to reduce carbon emissions a reversal in thinking of electric power production is needed. We are used to thinking in terms of the power originating from the plant alone. With a government policy of tax writeoffs and incentives we need to put solar panels on every rooftop in America. Each home becomes a generating plant that feeds back power into the grid.

In Michigan we saw a shameful campaign scare ad by Lee Iacocca. He stated if Gore were elected it would be the end of auto manufacturing jobs in Michigan. This is a man who took our tax dollars in corporate welfare in the 1970s to open up parts plants in Portugal for Chrysler. We will still need automobiles but only different power plants. We will still have electricity but from a different source. Sure, coal miners won't be mining coal and that scares us here in Kentucky. In place of those coal jobs we will need workers in solar panel plants. We will need maintenance of those panels and installation. Whenever one technology takes over from another, old jobs vanish and new ones are created.

What holds up the progress to a cleaner, brighter future is a bought off government and is another example of why campaign finance reform is essential. It's another reason for all of us to abandon loyalty to the two major parties and vote Green.

Anyway, again, the duties of my job took me recently into the Betsy Layne area, this time to the high school to interview two students who had worked together to snuff out a small forest fire.

Well, the interview was finished, and I had quite enjoyed meeting the students, along with the mother of one of the two. After we had said our goodbyes and departed company, I was out of the building heading toward the parking lot, when I heard someone calling after me.

I turned to see the mother, Susan Reed, coming at a rather fast pace behind me, so I stopped, and as she caught up, she said to me, "I just wanted to let you know that I'm Carolyn Bishop's sister".

I knew immediately who she was referring to, and I was amazed to find myself so close to a situation I had only reported on from a courtroom distance.

For those of you who may need a memory jog, Carolyn Bishop was the young woman who was brutally stabbed to death on a lonely strip mine road near Ligon last August.

Her husband has been charged with her murder.

I attended the preliminary hearing on this case — one of the first reporting assignments I was given. I'll never forget how it felt to listen to those cold and gruesome details.

Now, suddenly, I found myself face to face with Carolyn's sister. What could I possibly say?

As it turned out, Susan is a very warm and genuine person with a positive outlook and a survivor's will. Conversing with her is very easy.

She informed me during our encounter that Carolyn left behind two small children when she left this world. I was unaware of this, and it saddens me immensely to know that these children had their mother taken away from them at a time when they so desperately need her.

As a matter of fact, Carolyn's funeral had to be postponed for a day because the family did not want to bury her on her son's birthday.

Susan says that the children are coping well and that she and her family are committed to caring for them in every way. But, still, it's almost Christmas, and "Momma" won't be there this year.

My heart goes out to these children.



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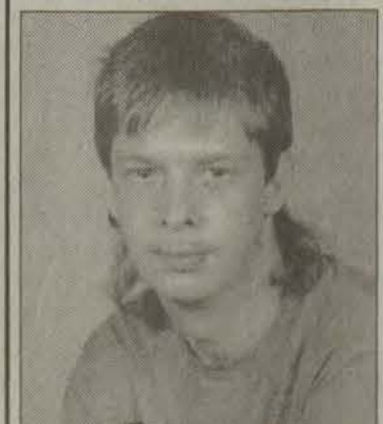

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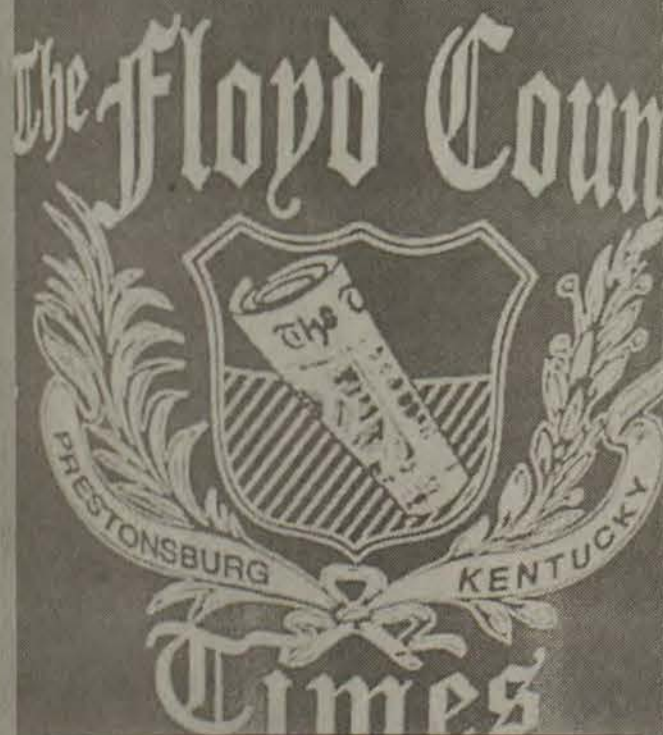

WARNING: Only a qualified professional should check your connector and replace it if needed. Don't try to do this yourself!

Moving the appliance, even slightly, whether to clean behind it or to inspect its gas connector, can cause the complete failure of one of these older weakened connectors, possibly resulting in a deadly fire or explosion. DO NOT MOVE YOUR APPLIANCE TO CHECK THE CONNECTOR!

HOW DO I KNOW IF A GAS HAZARD EXISTS???

YOU SHOULD TELL YOU (1) A GAS LEAK IS POTENTIALLY VERY DANGEROUS! Gas may leak from faulty appliances, broken pipes or broken mains. Make sure all members or your family know what to do if they smell gas.

(A) IF THE ODOR IS

STRONG:

- 1) Do not light matches.
- 2) Do not turn lights on or off.
- 3) Do not operate any electrical switches, appliance controls or pull any plugs from outlets.
- 4) Do not use the telephone.
- 5) Notify everyone in the building or house to leave immediately and leave the door open.
- 6) If possible, ventilate the building by opening doors and windows, starting where the odor is strongest. Do not re-enter the building for this purpose.
- 7) Call the gas company or fire department from a nearby building or house. Do not use the telephone in your house.
- 8) Do not re-enter your home until the gas company or fire department has told you it's safe to do so.
- 9) Never take chances! If your safety is threatened, get out quickly. Prestonsburg City's Utilities Commission Phone Number—886-6871 Day; After 5:00 p.m., Weekends or Holidays—886-2900.

HOW TO RECOGNIZE A GAS LEAK OUTSIDE HOUSE OR BUILDING

- 1) A gas odor.
- 2) A blowing or hissing sound.
- 3) Dirt being blown or thrown into the air.
- 4) Water bubbling or being blown into the air at a pond.

5) Fire coming from the ground or burning above the ground.

6) Brown patches in vegetation on or near gas pipeline.

If you detect any sight of a gas leak outside, call Prestonsburg City's Utilities Commission immediately.

(1) KEEP COMBUSTIBLES such as papers, fluids, paints, curtains and rags away from furnaces, water heaters and gas ranges and dryers.

(2) TEACH CHILDREN never to light or play with the controls of any gas appliances.

(3) KEEP PILOT LIGHTS of your gas range lit. If you put them out to save energy, a dangerous gas build-up can occur if someone accidentally turns on the range.

(4) KEEP GAS RANGE-CLEAN-make sure burner bowls are free of used matches, grease, paper, etc.

(5) AND NEVER USE YOUR GAS RANGE to heat your home or apartment. This practice creates a serious fire hazard and puts you and your family at risk from dangerous carbon monoxide fumes.

(6) MAKE SURE APPLIANCES ARE VENTED - Natural gas needs air, containing oxygen to burn safely and efficiently. Without enough air, dangerous carbon monoxide is produced. For this reason, always make sure that your gas furnace and water heater are vented to the outside of the building. If you're not sure your appliances are vented properly, have them checked by a qualified heating con-

tractor or plumber.

(7) KEEP FLUES AND CHIMNEYS CLEAR-Have your flue-pipe and chimney checked to make sure they're not blocked with debris such as nests, branches, or ivy. (Your heating contractor can inspect and clean flue-pipes for you.)

(8) SIGNS OF POOR FLUE VENTILATION - Indoor wetness (condensation); unusual smell in your home that doesn't go away; sick houseplants; yellow or wavering appliance flames; soot in your home; pilot light that keeps going out.

CERTAIN OLDER GAS CONNECTORS MAY BE DANGEROUS!

Gas connectors are corrugated metal tubes used to connect gas appliances in your home to fuel gas supply pipes. Some older brass connectors have come apart, causing fires and explosions resulting in deaths and injuries.

These older brass connectors have a serious flaw in how their tubing was joined to their end pieces. Over time, the end pieces can separate from the tubing, and cause a serious gas leak, explosion, or fire. To our knowledge, these dangerous uncoated brass connectors have not been made for more than 20 years, but many of them are still in use. The older these connectors get, the greater the possibility of failure.

Although not all uncoated connectors have this flaw, it is very difficult to tell which ones do. Therefore, any uncoated brass connec-

tor should be replaced immediately with either a new plastic-coated brass or a new stainless steel connector. Connectors can wear out from too much moving, bending, or corrosion. Connectors should always be replaced whenever the appliance is replaced or moved from its location.

NOTICE TO PRESTONSBURG CITY'S UTILITIES NATURAL GAS CUSTOMERS

NATURAL GAS FACTS

Natural gas is lighter than air, non-toxic and contains no poisonous ingredients. Breathing natural gas is not harmful as long as there is adequate air to breathe along with it. Natural gas will not burn by itself. Combustion can occur only when there is a mixture of gas and air containing between 5 percent and 15 percent natural gas and between 95 percent and 85 percent air. Because of its unique qualities of being lighter than air with a narrow band of combustion, natural gas is one of the most economical sources.

Understanding and following safety procedures will make natural gas an even safer choice.

THE POTENTIAL HAZARDS OF NATURAL GAS

GAS ACCIDENTS CAN BE AVOIDED IF YOU UNDERSTAND THE POTENTIAL HAZARDS.

(1) FIRE Natural gas can be a

fire hazard, if you let it. Don't let it. A very hot stove, open flame or pilot light can ignite any combustible materials that happen to be near. Keep paper, curtains, paints, solvents, etc., away from gas appliances.

(2) EXPLOSION Natural gas can be ignited by open flames or sparks. That's why unburned natural gas should never be allowed to escape into a room. A spark, flame, lit match or cigarette, even the flick of a light switch may be enough to cause an explosion.

(3) CARBON MONOXIDE POISONING

Even though natural gas itself isn't poisonous, gas burners that aren't adjusted properly can produce deadly carbon monoxide. You can't see or smell carbon monoxide, but it's a killer. To avoid its dangers, always make sure that all natural gas appliances in your home are properly adjusted and vented to the outside...so they'll burn safely and efficiently.

(4) SUFFOCATION

Natural gas can cause suffocation if it replaces air containing oxygen. (Only air that has oxygen can sustain life.) This is another reason why natural gas should never be allowed to leak from appliances or build up in an enclosed area or room.

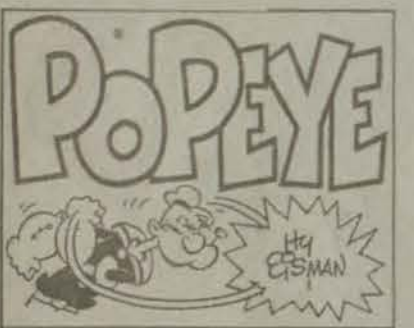

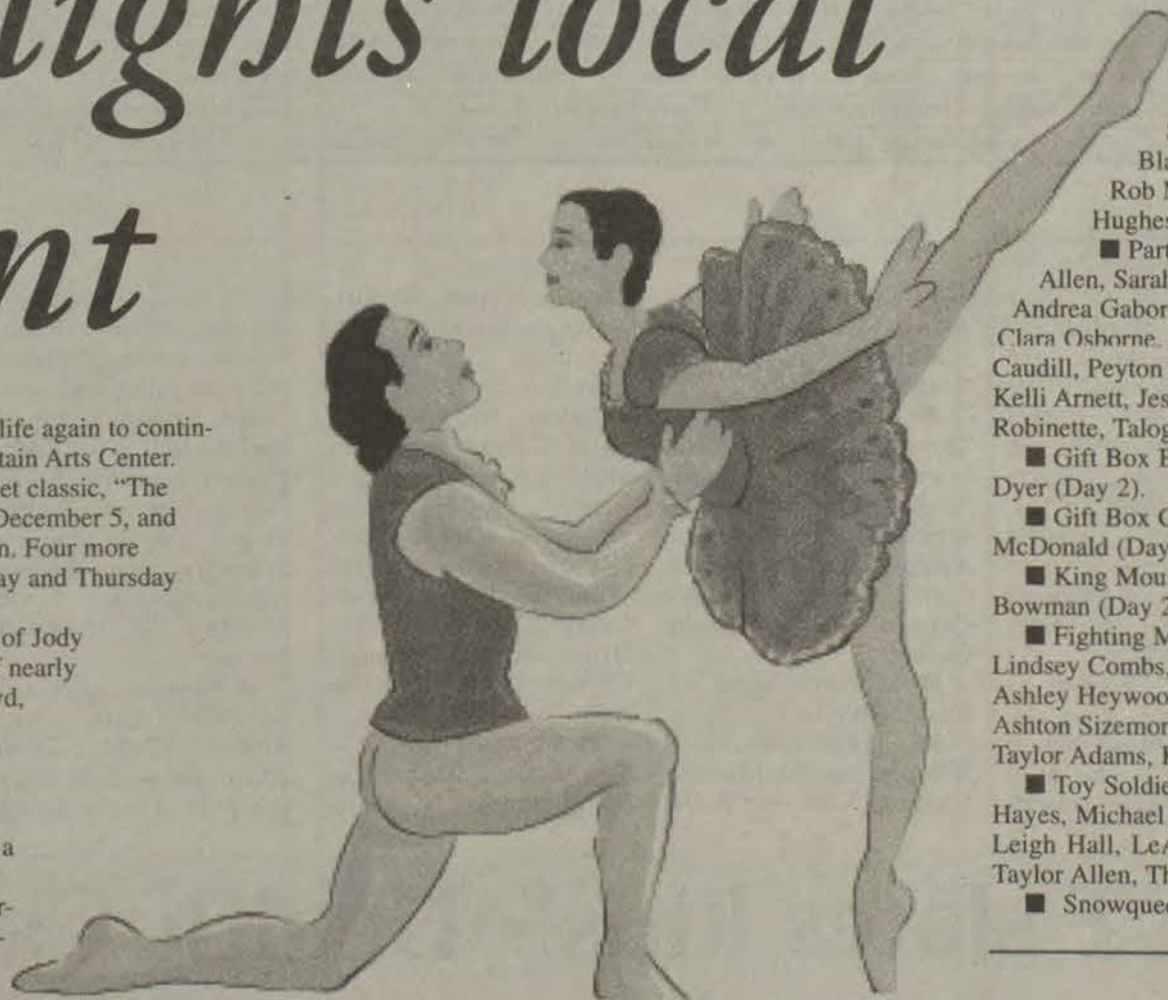
Seasonal ballet spotlights local talent

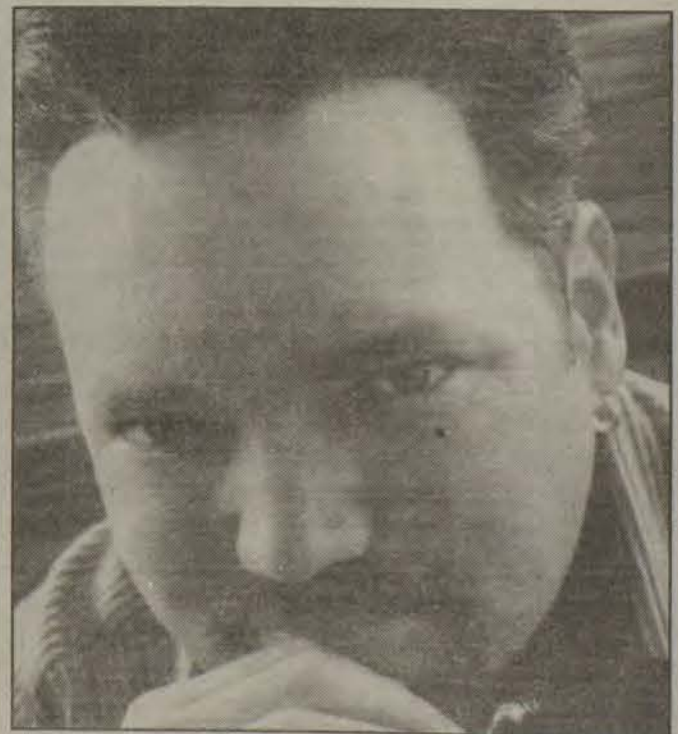
inside looked like.

NEWS OF THE WEIRD

A court in Council Bluffs, Iowa, will rule in early December on whether to admit "brain fingerprinting" evidence that might free Terry Harrington, who has been in prison for 22 years for a murder he says he did not commit. Iowa psychiatrist Lawrence Farwell developed the technique, which he says measures brain activity (or inactivity) following attempts to trigger memories; tests on Harrington showed him with no memory of the murder or the crime scene but with memories of attending a rock concert with friends on the same night.

High school student Brandi Blackbear filed a federal lawsuit against the school district in Broken Arrow, Oklahoma, in October for suspending her twice during the previous school year, once for her Stephen King-type writing journals and once after the assistant principal implied that Blackbear's Wiccan "curse" actually caused a teacher to become ill. "I, for one," said the Oklahoma director of the American Civil Liberties Union, "would like to see the (evidence) that a 15-year-old girl made a grown man sick by casting a magic spell."

Some of the More Obscure Election Weirdness

An Atlanta Journal-Constitution database match proved that 5,412 dead Georgians had voted since 1980, with 15,000 more potentials this year. Tom Wesson, an Anglo running for constable in Dallas, lost even though he had given himself an edge by renaming himself "Tomás Eduardo Wesson." Kari Brandenburg, the

Albuquerque district attorney, won re-election easily over a man who had sent her a syrupy, flirtatious e-mail message in October but later claimed it was really meant for his wife. To comply with residency requirements, a school board candidate in Miami tried to claim he lived in a 9-by-11-foot storage shed on his father's property, but a judge dropped him from the ballot. And "psychic" Jacqueline Stallone, interviewed before Election Day, said her dogs had told her telepathically that Bush would win the presidency by "200" votes.

Leading Economic Indicators

France's communist party, once serious opponents of capitalism and religion but lately in severe organizational decline, hosted a glamorous fund-raising party in Paris in October with the fashion house Prada (featuring supermodels and other trendy guests), and then a week later staged an art show featuring 30 works portraying a heroic Jesus Christ.

The Birch K9 Health & Fitness Centre opened earlier this year in Heywood, England, providing hydrotherapy, whirlpool, treadmill and magnetotherapy to dogs under the direction of trainer Dave Burdon, according to an August report in The Washington Post. Despite the club's success in rehabilitating dogs' natural muscles that have weakened through dog owners' indolence, one British newspaper quipped that Birch K9 is the kind of thing that could only happen in America.

So important is the vodka industry to the Russian economy that in August, police in Moscow forcibly entered the Krystall

(Stolichnaya Vodka) factory, ostensibly to seek tax documents but actually to install an insurgent board of directors to commandeer tax revenues and profits. And so important is the tequila industry to the Mexican economy that earlier this year, federal police moved into the western states that grow agave (the cactus-like plant that is the main ingredient in tequila) to guard the crops; recent agave thefts have sent the tequila price out of range for many Mexicans, from about \$11 a bottle to about \$33.

Prostitutes in Romania's dismal economy have been forced to spruce up their services, according to a June Reuters dispatch from Bucharest, by agreeing to cook and clean up after making house calls. And an exclusive

Tokyo club has gone even further: For about \$1,000, the customer can visit a brothel decorated as a traditional Japanese man's "home" fantasy, of a beautiful young "wife" who waits on him hand and foot, watches the TV shows he wants to watch, listens to him brag about his day, refrains from mentioning her own problems, cooks him a meal and has sex with him.

rebar that shot through the windshield and penetrated his skull, protruding from the back; he requires extensive rehabilitation. And an 18-year-old University of Southern California student fell out of a second-story apartment window in September and skewered her buttocks on two wrought-iron security bars; four USC football players rushed to help, pushing her body upward to relieve the pressure until paramedics arrived.

Christines: A 1982 Chevrolet Citation (faulty wiring) in Winter Haven, Florida, and a 1991 Eagle Talon (ignition came on when the trunk was slammed) in Milton, Ontario, reportedly started up on their own in incidents in August and October, respectively. Firefighters were hosing down the Citation when it mysteriously lurched away from them; the Talon suddenly ran down a bystander (hospitalizing him in serious condition) during a car auction.

Recurring Themes

News of the Weird has reported

cases of severe motherhood envy in 1992 (Texas), 1996 (Alabama) and 1998 (Illinois), when pregnant women were killed and their abdomens slashed open so that the fetuses could be stolen. In September 2000, according to police in Ravenna, Ohio, Michelle Bica killed a pregnant woman and stole her baby, but because police suspected her, Bica shot herself to death several days later. In all four cases, the babies survived.

In Their Own Words

Retiree Neal Terry, 78, profiled in an October Dallas Morning News story about his "hobby": "I've dedicated my life to irritating people. It's a special gift that I have." "I tell my grandsons, 'You're not going to like everybody you run across, so go ahead and irritate them.'" (Terry insisted that no one has ever gotten really angry at him, even the times he sang the Partridge Family song, "I Think I Love You," over and over at work.)

Law of the Jungle

Troy Carlisle, 28, was sentenced to 20 years in prison in October after being convicted in Brandon, Mississippi, of forcibly taking the life jacket of a 7-year-old girl and leaving her to drown in a Arkabutla Lake. Carlisle told police, "I was thinking I was gonna die or she was gonna die." And in July, Alvin Latham was charged with second-degree murder after he survived the sinking of a shrimp boat in a storm off of the Louisiana coast; police said Latham stabbed the captain to get the ship's only life vest.

Also, in the Last Month ...

The president of the Caesars Atlantic City casino resigned, seeking treatment for compulsive gambling. A married couple, both with doctorate degrees, shot each other to death in a gunfight while their young daughters were watching TV in another room (Sacramento). Home-invading robbers tied up a family on Halloween night and loaded up their valuables, diligently pausing several times to pass out candy to trick-or-treaters (Westminster, California). Jailers confiscated Derrick Echols' artificial leg after he used it to beat a cellmate with and said they probably wouldn't give it back to him until he is released (Peoria, Illinois).

CRITTERS CORNER

We're overdue for a funny column, and I have a stash of stuff people send me that they find on the Internet. I don't have the slightest idea who wrote any of these, but thanks, whoever you are, for sharing your sense of humor.

I've had this first one for quite some time, and frankly, I've been a little hesitant to use it. I was afraid someone would think it was a serious how-to-article. So take this with a grain of salt, and get your vet to show you some more effective techniques.

HOW TO GIVE A CAT A PILL

1. Pick cat up and cradle it in the crook of your left arm as if holding a baby. Position right forefinger and thumb on either side of cat's mouth and gently apply pressure to cheeks while holding pill in right hand. As cat opens mouth pop pill into mouth. Allow cat to close mouth and swallow.

2. Retrieve pill from floor and cat from behind

sofa. Cradle cat in left arm and repeat process.

new ruler and repair curtains. Carefully sweep shattered porcelain figurines from hearth and set aside for gluing later.

8. Wrap cat in large towel and get spouse to lie on cat with head just visible from below armpit. Put pill in end of drinking straw, force mouth open with pencil eraser and blow down drinking straw.

9. Check label to make sure pill is not harmful to humans and drink large glass of water to take taste away. Apply Band-Aid to spouse's forearm and remove blood from carpet with cold water and soap.

10. Retrieve cat from neighbor's shed. Get another pill. Place cat in cupboard and close door on neck to leave head showing. Force mouth open with dessert spoon. Flick pill down throat with

elastic band.

11. Fetch screwdriver from garage and put door back on hinges. Apply cold compress to cheek and check records for date of last tetanus shot. Throw away T-shirt and fetch new one from bedroom.

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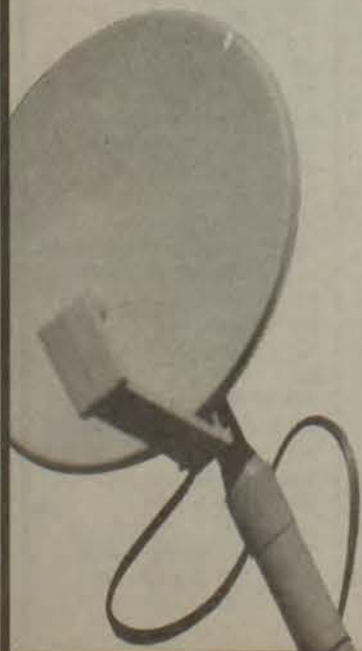
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
