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State schedules killer to die Tuesday


For the third time since the state's death penalty was reinstated in 1976, a death row inmate is scheduled to die at the Eddyville prison in western

David Smith, 52, was convicted in 1983 of the murders of four people in Pike County. If last-ditch appeals are unsuccessful, he will be executed Tuesday.

A jury found Smith guilty of the 1980 killing of his girlfriend, Rebecca Church, 17, of South Point, Ohio; her 18-month-old daughter, Amanda Church; her mother, Mary Thompson, 48, also of South Point; and Rebecca's sister, Betty Maynard, 27, of Canada in Pike

Because Smith was convicted prior to the state's revocation of electrocution as a means of putting condemned felons to death, he was given the opportunity to choose between that method and lethal injection. According to prison officials, Smith has chosen the electric chair.

After the death penalty was reinstated in 1976, 21 years passed without an execution in Kentucky. In 1997, Harold McQueen Jr. became the first modern execution when he died in the electric chair. Eddie Lee Harper died by lethal injection a year ago.

Heart recipient meets family of organ donor

Even though the two families had never met face to face before in their lives, their "introduction to one another" was an emotional

Barbara Kelty, from Springfied in Washington County, paid a visit to the family of Danny Justice Jr., whose heart was donated to Kelty when Justice was killed in an automobile accident in 1995. Kelty, along with her brother, Donnie Carrico, and her daughter, Darlene, made the trip to the County Cafe on Mud Creek to meet the Justice family. Denise Justice, Danny's mother, works at

Kelty, who says she has had no health problems since she had her heart transplant, says it was important for her to meet the Justice take care of Danny.'

"The family is mine," Kelty said. "Part of this family is keeping me going. Kelty now works with the

Kentucky Organ Donor Affiliates (KODA) and her bubbling personality shows a strong need for such a program. Kelty said she knows there were two sides to organ donations

She said she was very happy when she learned that she was getting a heart, but knew somewhere a family who cared enough about life to donate organs was losing a loved one.

Kelty said a day did not go by that she didn't think of Danny.

"Every day I say a prayer to Danny (not for him) to him," Kelty said. "I also tell my husband (who died about a year a half ago) to

Kelty said people ask her if anything is different now that she has a different heart - did she like or dislike something that she did not in the past. She said there were no major changes, but she did relate how she cultivated a taste for watermelon. The Justices said Danny was a big watermelon eater.

Kelty said she lives by herself and wants it that way. She said she has an open invitation to stay with her children but prefers to live alone and take part in activities with the family. She said she went to the zoo, to Myrtle Beach and other outings.

"I do whatever I want to," she



What is meningitis?

Meningitis is an infection of the fluid of a person's spinal cord and the fluid that surrounds the brain. People sometimes refer to it as spinal meningitis. Meningitis is usually caused by a viral or bacterial infection. Knowing whether meningitis is caused by a virus or bacterium is important because the severity of illness and the treatment differ. Viral meningitis is generally less severe and resolves without specific treatment, while bacterial meningitis can be quite severe and may result in brain damage, hearing loss, or learning disability. For bacterial meningitis, it is also important to know which type of bacteria is causing the meningitis because antibiotics can prevent some types from spreading and infecting other people. Before the 1990s, Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib) was the leading cause of bacterial meningitis, but new vaccines being given to all children as part of their routine immunizations have reduced the occurrence of invasive disease due to H. influenzae. Today, Streptococcus pneumoniae and Neisseria meningitidis are the leading causes of bacterial meningi-

What are the signs and symptoms of meningitis?

High fever, headache, and stiff neck are common symptoms of meningitis in anyone over the age of 2 years. These symptoms can develop over several hours, or they may take 1 to 2 days. Other symptoms may include nausea, vomiting, discomfort looking into

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bright lights, confusion, and sleepiness. In newborns and small infants, the classic symptoms of fever, headache, and neck stiffness may be absent or difficult to detect, and the infant may only appear slow or inactive, or be irritable, have vomiting, or be feeding poorly. As the disease progresses, patients of any age may have seizures.

How is meningitis diagnosed?

Early diagnosis and treatment are very important. If symptoms occur, the patient should see a doctor immediately. The diagnosis is usually made by growing bacteria from a sample of spinal fluid. The spinal fluid is obtained by performing a spinal tap, in which a needle is inserted into an area in the lower back where fluid in the spinal canal is readily accessible. Identification of the type of bacteria responsible is important for selection of correct antibiotics

Can meningitis be treated?

Bacterial meningitis can be treated with a number of effective antibiotics. It is important, however, that treatment be started early in the course of the disease. Appropriate antibiotic treatment of most common types of bacterial meningitis should reduce the risk of dying from meningitis to below 15 percent, although the risk is higher among the elderly.

Is meningitis contagious?

Yes, some forms are bacterial meningitis are contagious. The bacteria are spread through the exchange of respiratory and throat secretions (i.e., coughing, kissing). Fortunately, none of the bacteria that cause meningitis are as

contagious as things like the common be reported to state or local health cold or the flu, and they are not spread by casual contact or by simply breathing the air where a person with menin-

However, sometimes the bacteria that cause meningitis have spread to other people who have had close or prolonged contact with a patient with meningitis caused by Neisseria meningitidis (also called meningococcal meningitis) or Hib. People in the same household or day-care center, or anyone with direct contact with a patient's oral secretions (such as a boyfriend or girlfriend) would be considered at increased risk of acquiring the infection. People who qualify as close contacts of a person with meningitis caused by N. meningitidis should receive antibiotics to prevent them from getting the disease. Antibiotics for contacts of a person with Hib meningitis disease are no longer recommended if all contacts 4 years of age or younger are fully vaccinated against Hib disease (see below).

Are there vaccines against meningitis?

Yes, there are vaccines against Hib and against some strains of N. meningitidis and many types of Streptococcus pneumoniae. The vaccines against Hib are very safe and highly effective.

There is also a vaccine that protects against four strains of N. meningitidis, but it is not routinely used in the United States and is not effective in children under 18 months of age. The vaccine against N. meningitidis is sometimes used to control outbreaks of some types of meningococcal meningitis in the United States. Meningitis cases should

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
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departments to assure follow-up of close contacts and recognize outbreaks. Although large epidemics of meningococcal meningitis do not occur in the United States, some countries experience large, periodic epidemics. Overseas travelers should check to see if meningococcal vaccine is recommended for their destination. Travelers should receive the vaccine at least 1 week before departure, if possible. Information on areas for which meningococcal vaccine is recommended can be obtained by calling the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention at (404)-332-4565.

A vaccine to prevent meningitis due to S. pneumoniae (also called pneumococcal meningitis) can also prevent other forms of infection due to S. pneumoniae. The pneumococcal vaccine is not effective in children under 2 years of age but is recommended for all persons over 65 years of age and younger persons with certain chronic medical problems.

A tiny step forward

A 1998 law regulating logging in Kentucky will take full effect on July 15.

However, it is naive to hope that the Kentucky Forest Conservation Act will have any more than a minimal impact on the harvesting of trees on private land in this state. By the time members of the 1998 General Assembly got through with the state's first attempt at logging regulations, they had gutted the bill of some of its most significant provisions and made effective enforcement of the remaining provisions almost impossible.

On the positive side, the law will require that after July 15 all logging operations - except when horses or mules are used exclusively - must have a certified master logger on site. The law also says "best management practices" must be used so that sediment from logging doesn't foul waterways.

So far so good. However, the law only restricts logging near streams, does not dictate the method of logging, and puts no limits on how much is cut.

Inspectors do have the authority to shut down a logging site where a master logger is not present or where severe environmental damage has occurred. That is if the inspectors can find the site.

Legislators stripped from the law a requirement that loggers file with the state a notice of intent to cut trees. Thus, the Division of Forestry - given the responsibility for enforcing the law - will not know a logging operation exists unless its employees come across it or it is reported by a citizen.

Not only was the notification requirement for all logging operations needed for effective enforcement of the law, it was needed to better protect absentee landowners from having trees harvested on their land without their knowledge. That's already a problem in this region, and it promises only to get worse as logging increases in the

As we said at the time of its passage in 1998, the Kentucky Forest Conservation Act is better than no regulations at all - but not much. If legislators are serious about promoting responsible timber harvesting in this state and assuring that logging becomes a sustainable industry, they need to take much more than this baby step

forward. - Ashland Daily Independent

Postmaster presents Postal Service view

Regarding the article titled "Back from the grave: annual, automatic postage hikes," in your May 31, 2000, issue, I offer the following information.

First, the group (Coalition to Make Our First Class Mail FIRST CLASS), which Mr. MacDonald quotes or refers to in the article, is nothing more than a front organization for United Parcel Service (UPS). It is almost entirely funded by UPS, according to

our National Postmasters of the United States (NAPUS) group. UPS has one interest in this and only one - their bottom line. If they can eliminate or reduce the competition that your Postal Service provides, then they have a wide open field to charge whatever they want for their services.

UPS does, in fact, raise their rates often, but with no alarm bells being rung by the media. They also can reduce service in areas with sparse populations, such as eastern Kentucky, and they can charge surcharges for service in such rural areas as ours. I suppose we should routinely accept those and "grin and

Secondly, it's not as though the Postal Service is exempt from inflation. The vast majority of our facil-

ities are leased. Landlords charge more as time passes, not less. Fuel to run our delivery fleet costs more each succeeding year, if you haven't noticed. Our workers' wages have to somewhat keep pace with these inflationary times just to provide for their families. Our last two rate increases (1995 and 1999) were less than inflation and that is a tribute to hard work and good management by postal employees and managers. These are verifiable facts, not propaganda such as the article you reprinted.

I'm certain you picked the article off some wire service or "news" provider without looking into the facts. A simple phone call to your local postmaster could easily have given a much better basis to make such a decision.

In the future, we would appreciate more thoughtfulness before jumping to conclusions that such drivel (as 90 per cent of this article was) is actually factual and newsworthy.

The only thing which was truly accurate in the article concerned the two executives who were paid much too much for moving expenses. NAPUS dis-

UK trustees answer questions about closed session

Seven members of the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees met with media representatives Tuesday as part of a settlement to end the year-long legal dispute over a closed session of

Board Chairman Billy Joe Miles issued a statement that said he believed that the executive session "did not comply with the spirit, if not the letter, of the Open Meetings Act, and did not comply with the requirements of KRS 164.170."

In addition to the Open Meetings Law (KRS 61.870 to 61.884), there is a separate statute (164.170) that deals specifically with the UK Board of Trustees. and predates the open meeting law, that says all meetings of the board are to be open to the public.

The controversial executive session was held May 4, 1999, to discuss extending UK President Charles Wethington's contract. Following the closed door session, the board extended Wethington's contract for two years, putting him in the university's top spot until 2003. An uproar within the university's faculty, student body and media organizations followed the closed session.

The Lexington Herald-Leader, Louisville Courier-Journal and Kentucky Press Association sued the university. The lawsuit's alleged violations included: failure to include the contract extension on the agenda; failure to make a transcript of the session; and taking the vote in open session by voice vote only. The suit alleged the board's actions were deliberate to avoid public debate, scrutiny and comment by university facul-

Six weeks after the closed door session, the board rescinded its decision to extend Wethington's contract as president - and instead hired him as a fundraiser for the university after his retirement — but the lawsuit proceeded through Fayette Circuit Court.

Papers are expected to be filed this week dismissing the litigation. Tuesday's press conference was held for trustees to answer questions regarding the executive ses-

the parties came together to try and figure out a way to resolve the lawsuit," said KPA General Counsel Jon Fleischaker. "It appeared evident to everybody, that it was not worth pursuing the lawsuit in regards to time and expense, once the Wethington matter was resolved. I certainly hope and expect UK will do a better job in regard to following the open meetings laws. The lawsuit will have served its purpose if it reminds UK to abide with what the law requires on open meetings."

Former governor Edward T. 'Ned" Breathitt, then chairman of the board, said Tuesday he called the executive session to avoid posembarrassment Wethington, in the event there wasn't enough support to extend the contract. He said he also feared placing the item on the board's agenda would restrict trustees from having a "full and frank discussion" about the contract exten-

Breathitt said he was initially approached with the contract extension idea by Wilcoxson, chairman of the board's investment committee. He said Wilcoxson was concerned that a presidential search and change in leadership would hinder the university's very successful fundraising efforts and suggested Wethington's contract be extended by three years.

UK is in the middle of a fiveyear capital campaign and Wethington has been credited as being responsible for the fundraising success. That ability was cited as the prime reason the board wanted to extend his contract.

Breathitt said he received legal advice from the university's lawyer before calling the executive session.

"I asked the university's lawyers to advise me as chairman. so that I could advise the board, and Mr. Wilcoxson, what were the proper steps to legally have a closed session," he said. "I received that material from Paul VanBooven, the university's lawyer. He prepared a motion for Mr. Wilcoxson and on the strength of that legal opinion, he (Wilcoxson) made a motion to go into executive session. I felt that it was important that we have 'an "This press conference and executive session because we

Breathitt denied that any type of showing of hands or straw vote was taken during the closed session. He said only four members of the board of trustees had advance knowledge the contract extension would be discussed at the May 4 meeting: he, Wilcoxson, James F. Hardymon and Robert P. Meriwether.

In addition to Breathitt and Chairman Miles, five other trustees attended Tuesday's press conference: Paul Chellgren, Billy B. Wilcoxson, Frank Shoop, Steven S. Reed and Daniel R.

Reedy, a Spanish and Italian professor at UK and one of the two votes against the contract extension in the original meeting, said he raised the issue of exempting Wethington from the mandatory retirement age of 65 during the executive session and the possible fallout from such a decision.

'There was a general discussion of it, both pro and con," said

Chellgren said he and another trustee offered a compromise plan during the executive session to extend Wethington's contract by 18 months, instead of three years originally proposed by Wilcoxson.

Reedy said he was asked during the executive session if he could support a three-, two-, or one-year extension - to each of which he replied, "no."

In the uproar that surrounded the May 1999 meeting, there was much speculation regarding Gov. Paul Patton and his public clash with Wethington in 1997 over the community college system.

of the community college system, consideration that ask board to vehemently opposed Patton's plan that removed the colleges from the umbrella of UK.

A contract extension would have placed Wethington in the president's seat through most of Patton's second term. Another factor deemed suspect by some was the timing of the May 1999 meeting. It was the end of the school year, graduation, final exams and summer break were on the front burner for many UK faculty and its student body. Also, terms of office of two of Wethington's most loyal supporters on the board were set to expire

"In preparing the lawsuit and researching the issues, we heard speculation and comment about the possibility that Gov. Patton's role in in choosing the new president may have been discussed by members of the board as part of the closed meeting," said Fleischaker.

When asked about any discussion during the closed session involving the governor. Shoop said he stated there wasn't a conflict between Patton and Wethington.

Herald-Leader editor Pam Luecke said she was glad the litigation was over.

"I'm glad it's behind us. A year after the fact isn't the same as having an open meeting, but it's better than nothing," said Luecke.

FRANKFORT - Several new toll-free hotline to report illegal photographs of illegal dumpers can now be viewed on the Web site of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet. The cabinet's investigators hope the public can help identify the featured dumpers.

The images came from hidden cameras the cabinet places at illegal dumpsites across the state. Web site visitors who have information about the people or vehicles in the photos are asked to call 1-888-NO-DUMPS, the cabinet's

dumpers and dumpsites.

Normally, cabinet investigators are able to question people in the community near a dumpsite and determine the identities of those caught on tape. But sometimes, despite numerous efforts, the identities of dumpers cannot be deter-

That's where the cabinet Web site comes in. Investigators hope it will help them solve the cases that have been stopped by dead ends.

gal dumpers investigators need help to identify, go to the "What's New" category of the cabinet's Web site www.kyenvironment.org. The exact address for the page is http://www.kyenvironment.org/nre

pc/dumpphotos.asp. The Web site and hidden cameras are part of the cabinet's Illegal Dumping Initiative. Since February 1997, the cabinet has issued 2,468 notices of violation to illegal dumpers and required them to pick up more than 2,189 tons of trash.

The Kentucky Department for the Blind has received a national award for sustained outstanding performance in the Social Security Administration's vocational rehabilitation program.

Security Social The Administration (SSA) reimburses the Department for the Blind for the costs of services provided to beneficiaries with disabilities if the services result in a job at a specified earnings level.

Once employed, the individuals no longer have to rely on federal disability payments. The department is reimbursed approximately \$400,000 annually.

Workforce Cabinet for Development Secretary Allen D. Rose said the citation is an indication of the agency's commitment to customer service.

"A citation such as this one means that our employees are helping Kentuckians with disabilities enter the workforce and improve their lifestyle while saving taxpayers' money," said Rose. "It's hard to imagine a better achievement for government.

In awarding the citation, Ken McGill, associate commissioner for employment support programs in the SSA, pointed out that the department achieved a 100 percent approval rate for reimbursement claims submitted for two recent years - 1997 and 1999.

Department for the Blind Commissioner Denise Placido said all of the department's

employees can share in the honor but that one employee in particular is responsible for the 100 percent accuracy rating.

"In two years, our staff has worked to achieve the successful employment of 48 social security disability income recipients," she said. "You cannot put a dollar amount on what jobs mean to their lives. While all of our employees have contributed to that success, the credit for the 100 percent approval rate goes to Debbie Bohannon.'

Bohannon, the department's social security coordinator, is responsible for submitting reimbursement claims. She tracks consumers for about 12 months after employment, reviews counselors' casework, reviews federal regulations governing the program and researches records of employment, earnings and administrative time counselors spent with con-

Governor, First Lady provide funds to open advocacy center

a commitment when we began our term that we would address child abuse and what this terrible crime does to Kentucky children. Today we are here to continue that commitment with a \$228,000 check to establish a new children's advocacy center in the Gateway Region," Gov. Paul Patton said recently as he presented a check to Bonnie Eaglin, president of the board of the newly established center.

The Gateway Children's Advocacy Center will be located in the Louise Caudill Medical Building in Morehead, which will be purchased and renovated with the funds provided by the Governor and First Lady.

First Lady Judi Patton, who in April of 1999 established Kentucky's first statewide associa-

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Morehead - "Judi and I made tion of Children's Advocacy Centers, joined the governor in giving the cheek to the Gateway CAC representatives.

"While Paul and I are providing funds to create a children's advocacy center in each region of the state, we are working toward the day when child abuse ends and no region needs a center of this kind,"

The \$228,000 is comprised of \$118,000 in capital construction funds to assist in purchasing the new facility and \$65,000 in state general funds, which will used to operate the new center.

These funds were included in Gov. Patton's budget request to the 2000 General Assembly. In addition, \$45,000 in capital construction funding was added to the governor's budget during the legislative session by State Sen. Robert Stivers to assist the Gateway Center in completing purchase of their new facility.

Following the check presentation, Mrs. Patton was joined by officials from the Governor's Office of Child Abuse and Domestic Violence Services, Kentucky Association of Sexual Assault Programs, and Kentucky Domestic Violence Association in presenting a legislative champion award to Sen. Stivers.

Stivers sponsored a key piece of legislation proposed by the Pattons which toughened the criminal justice system's response to crimes of sexual assault and domestic violence. The legislative champion award for Stivers is one of 10 such awards the First Lady will distribute over the next few months.

The Pattons are championing the cause of children's advocacy centers as a way to ensure that the investigation and prosecution of child sexual abuse cases are well coordinated in local communities.

Advocacy centers are locations where forensic interviewing by law enforcement and staff of the Department of Community Based Services are conducted, forensic medical examinations are completed, and where therapy and other support services are provided to children and their families.

The governor's biennium budget in total included more than \$1,650,000 for centers statewide, which will result in one CAC being funded in each Area Development District. At present, centers in Paducah, Henderson, Bowling Green, Louisville, Northern Kentucky, Ashland, London and Lexington are opera-

Funding has also been provided to open centers in Elizabethtown, Pikeville and Hazard. The Pattons also proposed legislation to the 2000 General Assembly which was sponsored by Speaker Jody Richards to make Kentucky one of only a handful of states to create children's advocacy centers in state law.

Students in the academies can work toward an associate's degree in network information systems, and can continue their education at four-year universities.

The academies in Kentucky currently teach about 250 students, and the number is expected to grow rapidly as academies open and become better-known, McCall said.

'The sky is the limit," McCall said. "Our partnership with Cisco matches our goals of delivering education and training that changes the lives of our students and serving communities across Kentucky.

KCTCS, which was formed by the Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997, includes 15 technical colleges and 13 community colleges. 

A. Brosnan and Keely Shaye Smith, the mother of his youngest son, delayed their wedding after Brosnan's 16-yearold son, Sean, was seriously injured in an automobile accident in April. The wedding had been scheduled to take place in Ballintubber Abbey in Ireland but was put off until Sean's condition improved.

Sean, incidentally, is one of two children Brosnan adopted when he was married to their mother, Cassandra (Cassie) Harris who died of ovarian cancer in 1991.

Q. I know Sharon Stone is active in a lot of charities, but did she really give away a million-dollar painting to help fight AIDS? Please answer this question. Ryan M.

A. Actually, what Stone did is act as a "presenter" of the painting - called Suprematist Composition by the Russian artist Kazimir Malevich - to the buyers. The bidding was described as "lively." When the gavel fell, the winning bid turned out to be more than \$17 million. Phillips, the auction house, gave Stone a percentage of the proceeds as a donation for AmFAR, an organization involved in the fight against AIDS.

Q. The suspense is killing me. Will there be another season of "The X-Files," and will David Duchovny and Gillian Anderson stay with it if it's renewed? Deborah K.

A. "The X-Files" has been renewed and both Anderson and Duchovny will be with the show for another year. Meanwhile, executive producer Chris Carter got a "consideration" of his own from FOX in return for keeping the show on the air: The network has agreed to put "The X-Files" spinoff, "The Lone Gunman," into its 2000-2001 midseason lineup.

Now that all the votes are counted, the primary election is finally history.

But before you can say "I LIKE IKE," the general election will be gearing up again and the remaining candidates will be back on the campaign trail. "Bill Clinton's foreign policy experience stems mainly from having breakfast at the International House of Pancakes." -Patrick Buchanan.

"I enjoyed talking to you. My mind needed a rest." — Henry Youngman.

Phase III: By late summer, the gloves will start coming off. Here are some possible one-liners from a comedian named Butch Fisco on his website www.insults.com:

"Nice suit! Somewhere there's a Pinto without upholstery."

"Hey, Vice President Gore: Nice hair! What is that, Rayon?"
"Hey, Gov. Bush, nice suit! There's a family in Tijuana right

Phase IV: During debate season, regional insults will abound. And since the two contenders are from the South, Jeff Foxworthy's "Redneck Classic" would go like this; You might be a redneck if...

now saying, 'What happened to our kitchen curtains'

"Your good deed of the month was hiding your brother for a ew days."

"You can entertain yourself for more than an hour with a fly swatter."

Docu-drama explores life of German clergyman and resistance fighter

What is a moral person to do in a time of great immorality? That question was central to Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a German clergyman of great distinction who actively opposed Hitler and the Nazis. His convictions eventually cost him his life.

"Bonhoeffer: Agent of Grace," airing on KET Wednesday, June 14, at 9:30 p.m., and KET2 Tuesday, June 20, at 9 p.m., dramatizes Bonhoeffer's final years, his participation in the German resistance and his moral struggle.

The 90-minute film won the top honor at the Monte Carlo TV Festival this past February.

Shot in the Czech Republic, Berlin and Canada, the dramatization depicts the heroic rebellion of Bonhoeffer, a highly regarded Lutheran minister who could have kept his peace and saved his life on several occasions, but instead paid the price for his beliefs.

The film is a vital portrait of the man, the teacher, the resistance fighter, the moralist, the prisoner and, eventually, the martyr. The program also sheds light on the efforts of the German resistance.

In April, doctors at Washington, D.C.'s St. Elizabeth's Hospital said Tomar Cooper Locker, 25, was no longer mentally ill and should be unconditionally released. Just two months earlier, Locker had been found not guilty by reason of insanity (post-traumatic stress) in the murder of boxer Reuben Bell, whom Locker had fatally shot because he thought Bell had killed Locker's girlfriend. Though Locker thus escaped penalty for murder and the wounding of five bystanders, he was sentenced to 20 to 60 months for gun-possession (but since he was jailed pre-trial for 26 months, a judge at press time was considering whether to release Locker immediately).

Potential Caretakers of Democracy

Among this year's political candidates: For governor of West Virginia: Joseph Oliverio, who admitted in February that he's had 60 speeding tickets and been arrested 150 times. For Anderson County, Tennessee, property assessor: Bobby E. Jones, who served time for 37 counts of making false statements to the federal government. For a seat in the Missouri General Assembly: Richard Tolbert, who recently filed for Chapter 13 bankruptcy for the seventh time in three years. For Scottsdale, Arizona, City Council: Gary Tredway, on the lam for 30 years after a conviction for throwing a firecracker at firefighters during a student antiwar demonstration.

Frontiers of Science

Recent Language/Brain Scramblings: Wendy Hasnip, 47, told BBC Television in December that a minor stroke had given her the rare Foreign Accent Syndrome (in her case, a French accent, though she knows no words in French). Also in December, the Moscow (Russia) Times featured Willi Melnikov, 37, brain-injured by a landmine in the Soviet-Afghanistan war, who emerged from the hospital with an activated (previously dormant) facility for languages and has since become fluent in dozens and conversant in 93.

China's Xinhua News Agency reported in March that the 13-pound cyst removed from a 28-year-old farmer in the northern province of Shaanxi actually contained the ossified fetus of his identical twin brother. Physicians at Hanzhong Medical School and Xi'an University of Medical Science said the fetus had grown for a while after the farmer's birth, then stopped, with the result that it had hair, skin, and teeth similar to an adult's but other features that resembled a fetus'.

New York City unloaded all of the 60 paintings created by artists that happen also to be elephants, including Sao (a former log-hauler in Thailand's timber industry), whose work was likened by Yale art historian Mia Fineman to work of Paul Gauguin for its "broad, gentle, curvy brush strokes" and "a depth and maturity." Fineman said she is writing a book on the three distinct regional styles of Thai elephant art.

Garbage artist Tom Deininger's oneperson show opened at the Newport (Rhode Island) Art Museum in January, consisting of his sculptures made of discarded trash, including packaging, toys, clothes and computer parts. Deininger says fans feed him tips on particularly cool Dumpsters to raid and told the Providence Journal that he was working on a self-portrait made of cardboard boxes, with cheeks

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Distiller named national historic landmark

Interior Bruce Babbitt has announced the designation of the Labrot & Graham Distillery in Woodford County as a National Historic Landmark.

Labrot & Graham is one of 15 properties in 10 states recommended to the Secretary for this designation by the National Park System Advisory Board for their national significance in American history and culture:

"We are very pleased and honored that the U.S. Department of the Interior has recognized the importance of Labrot & Graham, home of Woodford Reserve, to the development of bourbon whiskey by naming it a National Historic Landmark," said L&G General Manager Bill Creason.

In recommending Labrot & Graham as a National Historic Landmark, the advisory board said:

"As the birthplace of bourbon in the 1830s, this site illustrates, like no other property, the history of bourbon distillation in Kentucky. With its intact rural setting, Labrot & Graham presents the evo-

U.S. Secretary of the lution of the craft from the traditional pot still distilling of farmers during the 19th century to the mature and highly specialized industry of the post-Repeal

> Of all Kentucky distilleries, Labrot & Graham is closely associated with the development of bourbon as a- distinctive Kentucky alcoholic beverage and the one that became the leading export of the United States.

> Speaking of Labrot & Graham and other newly National designated Landmarks, Historic National Park Service Director Robert Stanton stated, "These landmarks serve as a guide in comprehending important trends and patterns in American history, allowing us to better understand the conditions which helped shape our country. Their continued preservation will ensure that future generations will learn from and enjoy these treasured sites for years to come."

A site recognized as a National Historic Landmark receives such a designation because of its historical importance to the entire nation and is

already listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

While the National Register contains more than 71,000 historic sites, only 2,310, or roughly 3 percent, have been selected for landmark designation.

National Historic Landmarks are identified by theme and special studies prepared or overseen

by National Park Service historians and archaeolo-Service often conducts National Historic Landmark studies in partnership with federal, state, tribal or local preservation officials; the academic community; independent scholars; and others knowledgeable about a particular subject.

Owners of National Historic Landmarks are gists. The National Parks free to manage their property as they choose, provided no federal license, permit or funding is involved. - The owner agrees to observe simple preservation precepts with respect to the property and receives technical advice and assistance from preservation experts if needed.

The Historic Sites Act of 1935 authorized the Secretary of the Interior to recognize historic places judged to have exceptional value to the nation. The Historic National Landmark program was established to identify and protect places possessing exceptional value in illustrating the nation's her-

Prestigious prize awarded to UK art museum

The American Association of Museums has announced the winners of its national Publications Design Competition for 2000.

Second prize was awarded to the University of Kentucky Art Museum in the Supplementary Materials category for its brochure titled, "Modern Fiction and Art: Prints by Contemporary Authors."

Designed by Robin Jones, with an introduction by UK Art Museum curator Rachael Sadinsky, the brochure includes essays by Kurt Vonnegut and Ralph Steadman.

Reproductions of Vonnegut's Tralfamadore No. 1, Steadman's Lizard Lounge, and Hunter S. Thompson's The Sheriff, illustrate the 12-page, full-color booklet.

The Art Museum's brochure was one of 1,237 entries submitted to the competition. It received the only second prize awarded for supplementary materials in the museum's budget cat-

The Modern Fiction and Art exhibition was featured at the museum from July 1999 through February 2000. Developed in conjunction with the UK English Department, the exhibition was comprised of silkscreens designed by Vonnegut, Steadman, Thompson, William and Burroughs.

The Vonnegut prints illustrated characters and ideas for several of his novels, while the Steadman works

were images from the Thompson novel Fear and Loathing in Las Vegas.

The Modern Fiction and Art: Prints by Contemporary Authors brochure was on display at the AAM Annual Meeting in Baltimore, May 14-18. All the winning publications will be featured in a special section of the July/August issue of Museum News, the AAM journal.

Small Time Crooks

The trailer for "Small Time Crooks" is mildly deceptive.

You get the idea that the film is going to be one of those caper movies, a la "Take The Money And Run," Woody's gut-busting gangster movie from three decades ago. But the caper alluded to in the previews — the bank heist — plays only a brief part in this movie.

Probably one of the best movies Woody Allen has made in a decade, "Small Time Crooks" is a story about petty thieves and how they exist in all walks of life, regardless of the trappings of class and taste. Allen plays Ray Winkler, an ex-con who's served time for a bungled bank job. While in the stir, he was sarcastically labelled "The Brain," but Allen takes the jibe as a compliment. He actually believes he is a criminal mastermind. And so, he concocts a scheme. He's going to rob a bank by tunneling under it.

With that in mind, he rents a storefront down the street from the bank to use as a cover for his tunneling operation. To make the cover even more, well, covery, he enlists the aid of his wife. Frenchy, played by the Meryl Streep of comedy, Tracey Ullman.

Frenchy, a retired stripper-cum-mani-

eurist, can only cook two things — spaghetti with turkey meatballs and cookies. So, she sets up a cookie shop in the building while the guys begin their tunneling.

Along the way, Frenchy becomes obsessed with becoming classy, and acquiring good taste. Meanwhile, Winkler just wants to drink beer, move to Florida and eat crab.

In her quest to become classy, Frenchy hooks up with a dashing young art dealer (Hugh Grant) who, in his own way, is a petty criminal.

Throughout the movie, Allen portrays the elite of New York — Hugh Grant's people — as a coven of zombies, All of them are old, sagging, soulless creatures who appear to be made of wax and standing too close to the flame. All these people have are material things and eti-

quette. It's all they discuss. It's all they care about. These people have no sense of life.

And speaking of life, the one performance that truly adds life and soul to this little movie is Elaine May who plays Prenchy's cousin, May, May is dumber than a skid mark, but has a heart of gold and speaks nothing but the truth. The overwhelming majority of belly laughs from the audience were inspired by May. In a movie about crooks, Elaine May steals the show.

If you're a fan of Woody Allen's, this movie will be a welcome treat. And even if you're not a fan, check it out at a matinee. I really think you'll be pleasantly surprised.

Kentucky Life tours boarding school, visits with Mingo Spirit singers

The premier program of Dave Shuffett's first season as host of Kentucky Life encores Saturday, June 17, at 8:30 p.m., on KET.

The episode opens with a tour of the Oneida Baptist Institute, a Clay County boarding school celebrating its centennial. This school, founded as an antidote to the famous eastern Kentucky feuds, today provides a Christian education for hundreds of children from the region, the nation, and even the world.

Through interviews with former students, teachers, school leaders and historians, a picture of a unique institution emerges.

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WOMEN AT WORK

A study by the University of California at Los Angeles says that women tend to deal with stress differently than men. This, in itself, is not exactly "stop-the-presses" news. But, what is newsworthy is the evidence that supports this long-held observation.

Men tend to use the "flight or fight" reflex in response to stressful situations. They'll either take the challenge head on, or flee if the odds against them seem too high.

On the other hand, women use the "tend-and-befriend" reaction. Under stress, they'll care for their children or talk out the problem with their women friends.

The UCLA researchers suggest this "tend-and-befriend" pattern not only keeps women calmer in stressful situations — this, despite the stereotype of the "hysterical" female going to pieces in the face of danger — but may also explain why women appear to be less vulnerable than men to drug and alcohol abuse and other stress-related disorders such as hypertension. The researchers say this may also explain why women will ask for directions — turn to a "friend," as it were, for help — and men don't.

The "tend-and-befriend" pattern is shown in another study involving male and female police officers. When facing a threatening situation, women will try to talk rather than shoot their way out of it.

The "tend-and-befriend" pattern may be linked to oxytocin, a hormone which is released during stress. It's been shown to make both rats and humans calmer, less fearful and more social. While both sexes secrete oxytocin, its effect may be diminished by male hormones. On the other hand, the female hormone, estrogen, appears to amplify it.

As I noted in the first paragraph, the "tend-and-befriend" pattern comes as no big surprise to most women who

know how valuable friends and family are in times of stress. So, why hasn't it been reported in scientific literature before?

The answer is that before the Administration called for a change in government grants policies in 1995, women were simply ignored or underrepresented in studies on stress.







"Simple" Home Networking!

Having more than one home computer is becoming increasingly common, and linking computers — making a network — has tremendous advantages.

You can, for example, access files stored on the living room machine from the den or use the bedroom computer's cable modem to surf the Web from the living room. Combine that with printer sharing, a "firewall" for hacker security and access to basic programs from wherever you sit in the household, and the advantages become obvious

Before now, wiring and installing a home

network have been well beyond the technical expertise of all but the most advanced "geeks" or professionals. However, WatchGuard Technologies (www.watchguard.com; (800) 734-9905) of Seattle has introduced a line of home networking devices that promises to change the onerous task forever ... but, it's still only for the brave.

WatchGuard's home network product has been dubbed SOHO (an acronym for small office/home office) and accommodates up to 10 computers (expandable to 50). The box, which measures in at 14 inches by 3 inches and sells for \$449, promises easy "plug and play" installation, but that tends to be an oversimplification. For example, you will need to purchase network cards for each computer (\$20 each) plus cabling (one short one is supplied). That's it as far as hardware goes. After that, everything just plugs in. On the other hand, when it comes to the software — something Watchguard doesn't control — the process becomes a bit more convoluted.

The problem: One needs to make so many detailed changes to their operating system and browser — and possibly lose complete access to the Net while doing so
— that only the bravest computer operators
who can afford the luxury of keeping at least
most of their system "off-line" for as long as
it takes, should attempt it.

Watchguard has an excellent Technical Support Department, and they promise to help you wade through the installation's quirks. You will, however, need a strong constitution and of computer operators who can afford the luxury of time before attempting such basic configuration system changes.

So, considering the possible advantages, is Watchguard worth the hassle? Absolutely. But, be cognizant of the risks.

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The 1900 house on KET 'transports' modern family to life 100 years ago

The sci-fi drama of time travel meets true-life drama as "The 1900 House," a four-part "docu-soap," transplants a modern family from 1999 back to 1900.

The series, airing Mondays, at 9 p.m. BACK on KET, beginning June 12, clearly evinces the radical changes in domestic life wrought by the scientific and technological innovations of the last 100 years.

The Bowler family—parents Joyce and Paul, 17-year-old Kathryn, 11-year-old twins Hilary and Ruth, and nine-year-old Joe—are taken back in time to the spring of 1900 in Greenwich, a suburb of London, England.

For three months, they live in a charming late-Victorian terraced house, dressing in period clothing and living as a family in 1990 would have lived. But the experiment proves far from fun and games for the Bowlers.

As "The 1900 House" shows, the harsh reality of turn-of-the-century life is something the Bowlers are not prepared for.

The cameras capture the misery of wash day (an all-day laundry affair), the frustrations prompted by a coal-burning range that stubbornly refuses to provide enough hot water, the indignity of being routinely "dirty, greasy and smelly" (as daughter Kathryn complains) and the sobering fact that life, especially for women, is highly restrictive and achingly dull.

Throughout this living experiment, the Bowlers help take modern viewers behind "ye olde" veneer that time has shellacked upon the past. The series strives to prompt thought, elicit laughter and create a visceral understanding of how much change has occurred becuase of a dynamite meeting of science and society.

"The 1900 House" is produced by Wall To Wall Television for Channel 4, in association with WNET/New York.

Rough River opens new miniature course

Rough River Dam State Resort Park at Falls of Rough in Grayson County has opened a new miniature golf course that shares features seen in some of the most elaborate courses in the country.

The 18-hole course, situated on a grassy hill overlooking the lake, boasts natural features such as "waterscaping," in which water flows down the course to a holding pond. Barriers that employ native rock also come into play,

The end result is a course that aesthetically blends into the environment, said Lisa Gorby, in the state Department of Parks planning and design division.

The department purchased plans from a nationally recognized firm, Adventure Golf Services, to serve as the models for the holes. The company designs and builds courses for many major amusement parks. The department then adapted the plans for the site's unique characteristics.

Golfers will find the winding holes to be both fun and challenging, she said. A missed shot just might put a golfer's ball into the creek. On another hole, the golfer has to putt the ball through a rock tunnel to sink the shot.

Nine of the course's 18 holes comply with the standards of the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Design work on the \$120,000 project began in the fall of 1998. The department's construction staff started building the course last summer. The course replaces an outdated facility elsewhere on the park grounds.

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
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
