Even though the filing deadline isn't until August, two people have made application to run for school board in the November election.



Need for 911 tax crucial; board says

Equipment upgrades depleting funds, members say

Members of the E-911 advisory council met to discuss the problems and progress the county's E-911 system Wednesday night, and many said they fear the worst for the system if a surcharge is not re-established soon.

The cause for concern is the accumu-

lation of failing equipment such as pagers and radios, a triangular dead air spot in the Harold-Toler Creek-Betsy Layne area, and the lack of funds to replace the equipment by the volunteer fire departments.

As of March 31, the county's 911 account stood at \$114,493.53. Many of the communications problems are being addressed but the council is worried that the funds will be depleted either before the system can be fully installed or soon

Council members asked that the E-911 Executive Board consider the need for the surcharge as urgent and to address it immediately.

The 911 system is up and running, said Bill Dotson, Floyd County 911 coordinator, and it has been in use for

some time. Enhanced 911 allows a caller's address to be pulled up on a dispatcher's terminal, reducing the need for

Dotson said they have finished with the postal section of the mapping and addressing. He is currently working with the transfer of telephone records.

The enhanced system is expected to be fully online in the coming weeks for the entire county. Parts of the county are

A David man was released from Our Lady of the Way Hospital Thursday morning after a Monday evening confrontation with a family in his neighborhood.

After an apparent argument, Rick Estep, 41, allegedly fired multiple shots into the home of Julie Shepherd of Patches Drive in the Open Fork area of

The exchange of gunfire landed Estep in the hospital. Estep was transported to Our Lady of the Way after a juvenile in the home returned fire using a shot

Estep was arrested after his release from the hospital and charged with attempted murder after he allegedly pointed a gun into the chest of the juvenile and then pulled the trigger.

Teen charged in robbery of girl

Floyd County deputies Gary Tackett and Delmas Johnson arrested a Harold teen Wednesday after he allegedly attacked and robbed a 14-year-old girl.

Blake J. Robert, 18, allegedly entered the residence of Dorris Rowe at Harold around 10 p.m., slapped the girl, punched her in the stomach, and then left with a VCR, cell phone, and a video game.

The deputies caught up with Tackett about 90 minutes later at the home of Mike Riley, which was near Rowe's residence.

The juvenile identified Tackett as the alleged perpetrator after he was arrested.

Robert was arraigned Thursday, pleading not guilty to the charge. He was placed under a \$10,000 partially secured bond.

A preliminary hearing date of May 10 has been set for the case.

Politicians, bands v duke it out Saturday

Politics, hot dogs and live music are on the menu for the third "Battle of Bull Creek" to be held tomorrow at the Bull Creek Trade Center along U.S. 23 south of Prestonsburg.

The event, organized by Floyd and Edith Skeans, is a fairly recent concoction, a "not-so-fancy" Appalachian version of the Fancy Farm picnic held in western Kentucky each August.

One of the event's drawing cards is the open invitation to local politicians, particularly those seeking votes in the May primary, to stand up on stage and deliver and old-fashioned stump speech to the assembled crowd.

In addition, non-profit groups, political organizations and issue groups are invited to set up booths at the Trade Center, where they can take their causes to the public.

"We believe, being local, being a part of this community, we're going to do everything possible to bring democracy to Floyd County and open up the political process," said Skeans' son Tony, who assists in preparations.

In addition to the political battle, though, the Skeanses also invite local musicians to perform for the audience.

"The reason we let the bands come out and play is that, one, it makes it more of a festival atmosphere," said

> Many of the pagers have begun to develop problems, leaving the firefighters concerned. Unless they are in a station house, firefighters are alerted to a call via the pagers. A missed page could cost a life, members said.

> Dotson announced that as of May 1, President Clinton had signed a bill to "turn off the selective availability" in the Global Positioning Satellite. That move has increased the GPS pinpoint accuracy from within 100 meters to within 15 meters.

New Minnie housing for the elderly on horizon

The Floyd County Housing Authority convened Tuesday evening in an annual meeting to discuss plans for the construction of a senior citizens housing unit to be built in the Minnie area.

Members of the FCHA Board of Commissioners approved the declaration of excess land beside the Minnie housing project and approved a 50-year property lease for the proposed site.

Co-sponsored by Floyd County Housing Inc., the four-acre site will house a single-story, 12-unit site designed as supportive housing for

In speaking of the site, members discussed the benefits of building in the Minnie area. The positive aspects of the project included tenants will be able to stay close to their families, live near their hometown, and have ground-floor acces-

The senior citizens highrise in Prestonsburg and the Dixie site at Lancer doesn't appeal to many of the elderly because of the multistory buildings and the distance from their families, members said.

The new housing is expected to be the beginning of making available homes for the county's elderly, said Patsy Ryan, executive director of the FCHA.

The board also passed a policy revision to the criminal background check on tenants occupying housing units owned by the FCHA. Added to the lease was the clause, "During the term of the lease, the [housing authority] has the discretion to retrieve through the courts any documents related to the arrest and conviction of drugs and alcohol."

In a quick election, the board voted for Morris Hylton as vice chairman of the Board of Commissioners.

Directly following the meeting, board members of the newlyformed Floyd County Housing Inc. met to adopt the bylaws of the

Upon approval of the bylaws, the board voted to adopt the section 202 program, which accepts the responsibility of sponsorship, long-term support and assisting the owner to develop, own, manage, and provide services at the site upon its comple-

Members then approved a conflict of interest agreement for the site. This would ensure that no profit would be made by any of the board members in the construction and management of the project.

The board moved to make the Big Sandy Area Development District a co-sponsor in the endeavor. The motion was made in order to ensure the grant for the building would be awarded.

Under 1994 laws, the board would be given zero credit for experience required to receive the grant. The board hopes that by making BSADD a co-sponsor they will have the needed experience to acquire the funds for the project.

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Product safety commission recall roundup underway

consecutive year, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) is conducting a recall round-up to get hazardous products out of people's homes.

Despite recall notices and public warnings, CPSC has found that many products with the potential to seriously injure or kill are still being used by consumers.

CPSC has enlisted the help of the Kentucky Department for Public Health to help publicize the safety campaign and distribute information on the hazardous prod-

"Kentucky is embarking on a renewed emphasis on child health," said Dr. Rice Leach, the commissioner for the Department for Public Health. "Removing these hazards will go a long way toward removing one of the most preventable causes of childhood death and injury.'

"People should do some spring cleaning and check their attics and other storage areas for old products that could be hazardous," said Mike Cavanah of the department's Public Health Protection and Safety Division. "The CPSC can get dangerous products off store shelves, but the real challenge is to get then out of families' homes.'

CPSC launched this year's Recall Round-Up on April 18 with a news conference and release of a "Recall Lists" of products. Some of the hazardous products that might be in consumers' homes are:

The recalled carriers are: Evenflo Model 207 and 492 made before July 27, 1997, by Evenflo Company: Cosco "Arriva" and 'Turnabout' models made before September 9, 1997, by Cosco Inc.; and Kolcraft "Infant Rider," "Secura," and other models made from January 1, 1993, through June 30, 1999, by Kolcraft Enterprises. People should call the company to get free repair.

· Pokemon Balls included with Burger King kids meals may pose a suffocation hazard to children under three years of age if either half of the ball gets stuck on the child's face, covering the nose and mouth. More than 25 million "Pokemon Balls" were distributed in November-December, 1999.

A 13-month-old girl and a fourmonth-old boy reportedly suffocated when one-half of a Pokemon ball covered their nose and mouth. In addition, CPSC is aware of several non-suffocation incidents. Take the "Pokemon Balls" (including the clip) away from children under the age of three years and discard the ball or return both halves to a Burger King restaurant for a free small order of french fries.

· Swimming Pool Dive Sticks can cause rectal or vaginal impalement if children jump into a shallow pool and fall or land on the dive stick. CPSC knows of nine impalement injuries and three non-impale-

. Television carts made by Sauder Woodworking Co. and by Bush Industries Inc. can tip over and injure children and adults when the cart and the TV fall. There have been 15 reports of these carts tipping over, resulting in three injuries including a three-year-old girl who suffered a skull fracture.

The carts were sold ready-toassemble and had a bottom cabinet with hinged double doors. People should remove their televisions and VCR's from the carts and contact the manufacturer to get a free repair kit to help prevent the cart from tip-

Tubular metal cribs made by Cosco Inc. before September 1997 can entrap or strangle a baby. These metal cribs can be misassembled with the mattress platform used as a side rail, creating a distance between the side rail slats that allows an infant to become entrapped.

There have been 27 reports of babies becoming entrapped because of mis-assembly, resulting in one death. In addition, the mattress can compress and be pushed between the bars on the crib's platform, permitting a baby to slip between the bars on the crib's platform and become entrapped.

Cosco has received 12 complaints of entrapment because of the compressed mattress, resulting in one death. Call the company to

Old cribs and other products made before CPSC's safety standards can choke, strangle, or suffocate children. Old cribs with more than 2-3/8 inches between crib slats, corner posts, or cut-outs on the headboard or footboard present suffocation and strangulation

Bunk beds with spaces bigger than 3 inches can cause entrapment and strangulation. Old chest freezers can suffocate children.

Hairdryers without built-in shock-protection devices in the plug can cause electrocution. Drawstrings around the neck of jackets and sweatshirts can strangle a child. Destroy these old hazardous products. Do not sell them at garage sales or give them to thrift stores.

"CPSC sometimes learns of deaths or serious injuries caused by previously recalled products. We want to prevent these needless tragedies," said CPSC Chairman

More professional center will result in better trained deputies and small town police officers

The net result of the Rural Law Enforcement Training and Technology Center in Hazard will be better trained sheriffs, deputies and small town police officers throughout this region. That's great news for every resident of a small town or rural area in the eastern third of

Ground was broken last week for the center, a joint project of Eastern Kentucky University, the city of Hazard and other government agencies. Instructors from EKU's highly regarded College of Justice and Safety will provide much of the staffing for the center, which is expected to open in about a year.

The days when deputies were chosen more for their political and family connections than their abilities and when many small town police officers received little or no formal training are over. State law now requires all "road" deputies (those who do more than just collect taxes) and city police officers to complete basic training in law enforcement techniques, and most of that training is done at Eastern Kentucky.

When it opens a year from now, the Hazard center will make it easier for deputies and small town police officers to receive training that goes beyond the basics and that is aimed specifically at small departments serving rural areas.

A lack of manpower is a problem common to nearly every police and sheriff's department in this region. Because of it, officers often find themselves patrolling the highways alone. That presents a safety problem in times of trouble.

Another problem is a lack of equipment. While larger departments are blessed with computers, cell phones, voice mail and even video-cameras in their cruisers to record arrests and stops, the officer in a small department is likely to have only a radio - and it may not cover the entire county.

A lack of communications between law enforcement agencies is another problem, said Trooper Gary Kistner of the Kentucky State Police Ashland Post. With so many officers working alone, communications between departments is critical, Kistner said.

We agree, and the KSP could greatly improve that communication by using the services of a 911 emergency dispatching center. However, while all other public safety agencies have connected to 911 in some area counties, calling the KSP continues to require looking up the number and dialing seven digits.

These and other problems faced by small, understaffed and underfunded departments will be tackled by the new rural center. It holds the promise of making officers in small departments more skilled and professional.

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





Knott County Jail closed

After years of problems in complying with state regulations for the building, the Knott County Jail was finally closed permanently on Monday, May 1

Jailer Ricky Prater locked the doors for the last time, and 14 people incarcerated there were transferred to jails in neighboring Floyd and Letcher counties. Jobs were lost for nine jail employees.

According to Prater, the jail built in 1980, was constructed without a smoke evacuation system. In 1983, the state took over all county jails, Prater says, and such a system was one of their requirements. Cost of installment was considered excessive by county government.

Through the years, the state has issued waivers to different administrations of county government, allowing the jail to remain open. 

Good Samaritan or safe samaritan: It's really instinct

It's nearing midnight. You're traveling down the interstate alone and spot a car stopped on the side of the road. The hood is open and a woman with a small child in her arms is trying to wave down a passerby for help. What should you

"You'll be making a spur of the moment decision. There are some quick questions you'll have to ask yourself," says Radford University professor of physical and health decide," Turnauer stresses. education Martin Turnauer.

Turnauer, who lectures to students on automobile and travel safety, admits there are no set-instone rules for doing the right thing when it comes to being a good Samaritan on the highway. "I wish there were iron-clad facts I could give people, but I always say it's basically gut instinct."

Travelers have several issues they must think about when they're put out on the road alone, and many issues are the same whether it be daylight or dark, Turnauer

dren you can see? How is the person dressed? Is the car a newer or older model? Does the person appear to be pointing at something on the car? Is the person holding

These questions are not meant to stereotype, Turnauer emphasizes, but to allow the motorist a quick assessment of the situation. If a woman is standing beside an older model car with a baby in her arms and it's late at night, the gut instinct would be stop and assist.

"You're the one who has to

Motorists always have the choice of bypassing a stranded traveler but stopping at the next exit to make a courtesy call. That would be helpful and safe, Turnauer says, adding since many travelers carry cell phones, they could immediately call for help.

What do you do when it's late at night and you see someone pointing to his car, perhaps indicating he may have a flat? "If it's dark, how do you know if it's really flat or how can you tell if he may have a gun in his hand?" Turnauer asks.

The best option would proba-Turnaur suggests some basic bly be to go on to the next exit and things to look for when you have to make a call for him. I am not sure

Besides helping stranded travelers, motorists must also be prepared to make quick decisions when it comes to what is best for their own safety and peace of mind when traveling.

Two of the biggest issues motorists must contend with are where to stop for rest breaks and what to do if they believe they're if the vehicle is an unmarked police

Turnauer states, "Someone traveling can't really say it's safer to stop at a rest area for a break any more. Think about some of the murders you hear about in the news that happen at rest areas."

He quickly adds, "But also you must ask is it safer to stop at a mini mart where someone could rush in and hold the place up?"

Given the two scenarios, Turnauer believes the lesser of the two evils would be to stop at a mar-

"Pull right up to the front door in good light. That would be somewhat safer and there probably will be some other people close by." He emphasizes again that the decision is going to be a judgment call, and depends on the area being traveled.

right then, but don't immediately step on the gas either.

Tap your brakes and let them know you see them back there and you're not going anywhere. Proceed at the same rate of speed, don't panie, and go to the next exit. Then you can pull over."

Someone who is out to harm a being followed and can't determine motorist will be less likely to make an attack in a well lit area, Turnauer says.

Turnauer also offers these safety traveling tips:

 Don't ever carry more than \$2 or \$3 cash at any time when traveling. "Credit cards and check debit cards are accepted just about everywhere. There would be no reason to carry huge amounts of cash." Carrying cash is just asking for trouble.

Should you make that judgment call to stop and assist another traveler, the blanket could be useful in extreme weather conditions. Also remember umbrellas, shovels, gloves and extra outer wear.

> . No matter what time of year, always carry a flashlight. Flashlights don't work without good batteries, so keep those on

> . If you own a cell phone, keep it with you. "People can get a cell phone and use it for 911 calls only. There's not a lot of money involved if you just use it for those type calls. It would be worth it."

> . Keep something to snack on in the car. "A bag of chips or a candy bar can hold you over until help arrives." Also, snacks or sandwich

ber of times the traveler has to get off the highway and stop at a market. The more prepared, the better.

· Major highways are usually safer to travel than rural roads and short-cut routes. "Sometimes there are not many people out on the side roads. If you do happen to need help, you'd be more likely to get it on a major highway.'

· Keep the car doors locked, daylight or dark. It's easy for someone to jump into the passenger seat when you're at a stop sign or red light and the door is unlocked.

· Travel as much as possible during daylight. "If my students are going away, say for instance on spring break, I urge them to do as much traveling as they can during daylight. It's just safer. You're going to have a better view of what's going on."

Elementary reading grants awarded

FRANKFORT - Eighty-five funded Kentucky Early Reading Kentucky elementary schools will receive special grant funds to improve their elementary reading programs, the Department of Education has announced.

from two grant programs: the state-

Incentive Grant (ERIG) Program and the federally-funded Reading Excellence Act.

Funding is effective beginning

The state ERIG Program was established in 1998 by the Kentucky General Assembly. Currently, 83 elementary schools across the state are participating in the program, with continuation funding in 2000-01.

The new funding - \$1.8 million - will add projects in 29 additional elementary schools.

The program provides funds to support teachers of primary-age (K-3) children who are struggling with reading. Funds provide professional development and other supports for strategies that research has shown to be effective with struggling readers.

Although all elementary schools were eligible to apply, low-performing schools were targeted for this year's grant selection.

Funding is distributed regionally across the state. With the addition of \$2.4 million to the state budget for the program during the 2000 General Assembly session, more grant awards will be announced in early fall.

The Federal Reading Excellence grants are designed for eligible school districts to help schools in Title I School Improvement status.

Although all districts with a school in Title I School Improvement status were eligible to apply, at least half the funds were set aside for districts with high poverty, defined as those having a district free and reduced lunch rate of 60 percent or more or having the highest or second-highest numbers of children in poverty.

The \$6.8 million in federal grants will fund 28 projects in 29 school districts, serving 55 elementary schools. Kentucky was one of 17 states to receive these federal

With current state Early Reading funds and the new state and federal funds, a total of 168 schools across the state will have these researchbased projects in fall 2000.

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

know I had a perfect game going. I knew I was pitching good and just wanted to keep it up. I just felt good that day.

"I told her after the game, 'Do you know that you pitched a nohitter and one batter from a perfect game?" said Damron. "She said, 'You're kidding.'

While Tackett was outstanding from the mound, second baseman Brandi Allen was near perfect from the plate collecting three hits in four at-bats. Allen had two RBIs for the Lady Raiders. Megan Ousley and Jessica Paige collected two hits in the win.

CRITTERS CORNER

Gunner, our Doberman Pinscher, is a canine nervous wreck.

We were his fourth home by the time he was around eight months old, and he is convinced that if he loses sight of us, we will be gone for good.

Dobermans have always been Pat's breed; when we met, he owned a large male named Prince, who I believe was the first police patrol dog in Floyd County.

When Gunner needed a home, I made the decision to take him without consulting Pat. I did not want to
bring up the subject of Prince's
advancing age, and I had heard him
comment that it was the one breed

This is all to help explain why I am joined at the hip to a 75-pound dog who believes himself to be a minature poodle. He trails me as I do laundry, sleeps in my office while I work on the computer, and wants to snuggle in bed.

Many Dobermans have a snuggly personality, but none of them have a snuggly body. Pat is convinced he will be arrested for wife beating one of these days when Gunner has once more stepped on my face, leaving suspicious-looking bruises and scratches.

Actually, he nearly suffocated me the other night. He has recently added thunderstorm phobia to his list of quirks. All the behavior books say that you should not make a big fuss over a dog who is acting fearful, because it convinces them something bad really is going on.

(And now you know why I have gone into behavior medicine—all my animals are crazy).

Anyhow, I try to remain near Gunner for reassurance when the weather is stormy, but otherwise I just give him a mild sedative, and try to pretend that I am ignoring the thunder and lightening. He is not convinced. It may be my lack of acting ability. Having grown up with a mother who was also thunderstorm phobic, I've been conditioned over the years to jump out of my skin every time it thunders.

Anyhow, during a mild storm a few nights ago, I gave him his medication and took the dogs into the bedroom with me, intending to do some reading.

A loud clap of thunder was followed by an airborne

Doberman, who apparently managed to jump flat-footed from his huddled position beside the bed, and of

the bed, and of course, land on my face, I lay there, pinned to the pillow with his

trembling stomach completely covering my nose and mouth.

My voice was too muffled to make Pat hear me in the next room, where he was still glued to the History channel, and I was in too awkward a position to push the dog off. I could see the headline in the paper: LOCAL WOMAN KILLED

Of course, it would go on to explain what really happened, and everyone who knows me would have had one final good laugh at my expense. Obviously, I finally managed to squirm my way out from underneath him, since I lived to tell the tale.

Since it is easier on both of us than leaving Gunner "home alone," I generally have him along as I drive, perched over my shoulder like Snoopy playing "Joe Vulture."

We're easy to spot—it's the Blazer with the spay-neuter bumper stickers, an assortment of leashes and collars draped hither and yon, and a stack of mail on the dashboard, most of it bearing the return address of the AKC. News Of The Weird

Seven Brigham Young University students recently organized a Fight Club, inspired by the Brad Pitt movie and periodically drawing as many as 300 screaming spectators to watch college-age men pound each other into submission. Unlike in the movie, boxing gloves are used, and hunk-admiring women constitute almost half the audience, according to an April Salt Lake Tribune report. (Fighting is not against the BYU Honor Code, although watching the R-rated "Fight Club" movie is, and the fights are held late enough at night so as not to violate the Mormon "family home evening" concept.)

More than 500 accidental electrocutions were reported in Russia last year from people stealing power line electrical cables for resale as scrap metal. According to an April New York Times dispatch, more than 15,000 miles of power lines have been pulled down

in recent years, rendering millions of households dark for weeks at a time. One recent victim, interviewed in intensive care, said he was confident when he saw a single line left on a pole, believing that thieves had taken the other lines safely; he is now without his left arm, right leg and colon.

The Americanization of China

According to a January Associated Press report, China has a government-sanctioned UFO research organization with 50,000 members, processing 500 alleged sightings a year, which is to be expected, said the director, because extraterrestrials, too, are interested in the country's rapidly developing markets. And Professor Liu Dalin opened a sex museum last year in Shanghai, with 1,000 exhibits, including a historical, imperial-palace stamp used to mark the derrieres of virgin girls. And according to an April Wall Street Journal story, there has been a

recent "explosion" of successful litigation in China by elderly parents suing their children for failing to care for them in old age.

Ooops!

The British supermarket chain Tesco announced in January that its film-processing department had collected a total of 24,000 photographs over the years in which customers had accidentally snapped shots with a finger on the lens (the right middle finger being the most popular).

Hussen Farah Mohammed, 46, was released from jail in Bloomington, Minnesota, in January after 16 months' incarceration for entering the U.S. illegally from Canada; he said he had accidentally wandered across the unmarked border while in the woods birdwatching, but after he was captured, Canada refused to take him back. And Houston car mechanic Edgar Garfield Gibbons, 41, returned to the U.S. in March

after nine months in jail in Georgetown, Guyana, to which country he had been mistakenly deported when he was confused with a New Jersey man of the same name.

In December, former Gastonia, North Carolina, prison guard Timothy Ramey filed a legal challenge to his dismissal, saying the precipitating incident was merely a minor mistake. Ramey was arguing with his superintendent about something and became so frustrated that, in an effort to "ignore" what his boss was saying, Ramey reached into his briefcase, "pulled the first thing out" that he found, and pretended to concentrate on that. It was a copy of Playboy magazine, which infuriated the superintendent.

In December, a joint committee of the Colorado Legislature approved an emergency grant of \$75,000 to Morgan Community College in Fort Morgan, after it dawned on administrators that, because of

Nova takes look at ancient Vikings

On June 8, 793 A.D., a boat full of Scandinavian raiders landed at the undefended island monastery of Lindisfarne in northeast England. They savagely attacked the monks and pillaged one of Christendom's holiest shrines, sending shockwaves through Europe.

Many believed God had sent the "Northmen" as an act of divine judgment.

For the next century, Europe's kingdoms were locked in a life-and-death struggle against massive onslaughts by Viking fleets and armies.

From these bitter fights for survival were born the first stirrings of national identity in England, France and Russia.

But who exactly were these aggressors? In a dramatic two-hour special, Nova "The Vikings" tells the story of a people who were much more than ax-wielding pirates. The program airs on KET Tuesday, May 9 at 8 p.m. on KET.

Historians and archaeologists present an image of the Vikings that goes far deeper than their savage stereotype. The latest research shows that they were canny merchants, expert shipbuilders, superb artisans and bold colonizers of lands that lay beyond the edge of the known world.

Latest Unsuccessful DUI Excuses: John B. Byrnes, Windsor County, Vermont (January), claimed he was in the passenger seat, and that it was his setter ("Becky") that was driving. Ronald McDonald Jr., 40, Norristown, Pennsylvania (November), claimed he drove a short distance only so his girlfriend could clean her hands after changing a diaper so she wouldn't dirty the steering wheel. A 76-year-old man, Milwaukee (February), claimed he was under a doctor's orders, driving or not, to have two drinks a day.

In 1996, a federal court in Miami ordered Cuba to pay \$187 million to the families of three Cuban-American men on protest flights shot down by Cuban military jets in open waters. In November 1999 (three weeks before Elian Gonzalez was rescued off the Florida coast), in perhaps a retaliatory court proceeding at Havana's Provincial Popular Tribunal, the United States was found to have harmed Cuba through 40 years of "aggressi(on)" and was ordered to pay the Castro government \$181 billion.

In February in Largo, Florida, James Brian Kuenn, 40, was convicted of killing a teen-age girl, despite his claim that she had accidentally fallen and hit her head; Kuenn said he was so embarrassed at the accident that he made it look like murder to throw police off. And Thomas Storey, 27, was sentenced to 26 years in prison in Santa Ana, California, in December for murdering his wife, despite his claim that she had actually killed herself; he said he stabbed her dead body 25 times only to simulate murder to spare their son the shame of his mother's suicide.

At a village near Jericho in the Israeli-occupied West Bank, police said a Muslim woman beat her 10-day-old son to death in January because he preferred to be breastfed by his father's other wife. And in Tokyo in March, Mitsuko Yamada, 36, pled guilty to killing a 2-year-old girl, apparently solely so that Yamada would no longer have to face the girl's mother, who had allegedly ignored Yamada during the neighborhood playground's social hour when mothers gather while their kids play.

Legendary McCoy family troubadour Jimmy Wolford will close out the night with a special musical retelling of the feud. The families will also offer a memorial tribute to the victims of the feud as the names of those fallen will be read, followed by a moment of silence.

Near the courthouse stage will be a children's play area, made up of children's rides, DJ music, prizes, and activities. The "L'il Feuder's Village" will be the perfect spot for all the "L'l Feuders" to stop by and enjoy. Rides include: The Parachute Drop, The Titanic Slide, Balloon Typhoon, Air Walk, Laser Tag and Sea Dragon.

Two family tents will be the official sites for the Hatfield-McCoy genealogy registration. Sponsored by Pikeville's Papa John's restaurants, the family tents will be the place for registering as many Hatfield-McCoy descendants as possible in an attempt to break a Guinness World record for the most family members ever gathered.

As further tribute to the legacy

of the feud, McCoys: 2000 is reprinting the McCoy family classic, "The McCoys: Their Story." Written by Truda Williams McCoy, the book is based on actual interviews from the 1920s conducted with feud participants.

Out of print since its initial run in 1976, the book is a much sought-after collector's item. It is the only book ever written recounting feud events from the McCoy point-of-view. It also has the most comprehensive McCoy family genealogy ever assembled.

The reprinting is being made available courtesy of Paul McCoy, Nancy Forsythe and the Pikeville Preservation Council, Pike County and the generosity of McCoy family descendants.

The Hatfields and McCoys will square off against each other in a number of fun events, including the noteworthy softball game. At 6 p.m., the families will square off on the Pikeville College athletic fields in a softball game being sponsored by Pikeville Community Trust Bank.

The reunion will conclude on Sunday, June 11, with a reconciliation/memorial service at the Buskirk-Matewan Bridge. Pastors Bo McCoy and Jerry Hatfield will officiate. Below the bridge lies the Tug River area where much of the feud fighting took place.

Both families will meet here in a symbolic gesture of peace. The McCoys will then accept a gracious invitation by the Hatfields to attend a picnic and other festivities in Matewan, West Virginia.

The Hatfield-McCoy Festival is free and open to the public.

Events at Booth auditorium will be limited to the seating capacity of 650. The family banquet dinners on Friday night at the Landmark Inn and the Sycamore Inn are ticketed.

Dale Hollow Lake doubles capacity with lodge addition

The Mary Ray Oaken Lodge at Dale Hollow Lake State Resort Park in southcentral Kentucky now offers twice as many reasons for guests to enjoy the facilities of one of the park system's newest resorts. A 30-room lodge addition opens this weekend, doubling the total number of guest rooms to 60.

I feel less inhibited and more confident in trying different methods, experimenting with ground preparations and finishes.

"Intimacy is important to me, and I think this value is becoming more common as America wears itself out with consumerism and political correctness.

"Some American standards, the importance of individuality and freedom of expression, seem to be contradicted both by the rehashing of everything cliché in popular media, and by what sometimes appears to be a lack of involvement in current art events on the part of the general public.

"Not everyone can connect with the messages of all art, but for me, that is not the point. Art is to be addressed on the subjective, individual level. I am encouraged and inspired by persons who enjoy the personal."

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
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
