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P'burg man arrested for abusing child

A Prestonsburg man was arrested Monday for the alleged sexual abuse of a child. Gary Risner, 43, of Prestonsburg was charged with first-degree sexual abuse after he allegedly subjected a 7-year-old girl to sexual contact. A not guilty plea was entered for Risner during his arraignment. He was placed in the Floyd County Detention Center under a \$10,000 cash bond and was ordered to stay 1,000 feet away from the child. Risner was served with a second warrant that alleged on May 15 he tried to hit Roy Blackburn with his car. A not guilty plea was also entered for Risner on that charge and a \$5,000 cash bond was set in the case. The preliminary hearings for both cases will be held May 31.

Tossed pups spark anger, compassion

Seven counts of first-degree cruelty to animals. That's what is waiting for an unknown person who threw seven newborn puppies into a ravine near Prestonsburg. Sharon Johnson of Prestonsburg called Prestonsburg City Police to inform them she heard kittens or puppies crying near the South Central Bell building at Water Gap Friday afternoon. Firefighter John Bryant went to the area and discovered the puppies. After he arrived on the scene, Bryant could hear the crying dogs and walked down an embankment to find them. Apparently someone had placed the part-rottweiler pups in a bag and then threw them into the ravine. In flight, the bag caught on a barbed-wire fence and sprayed them in different directions, said dispatcher Rhoda Franklin.

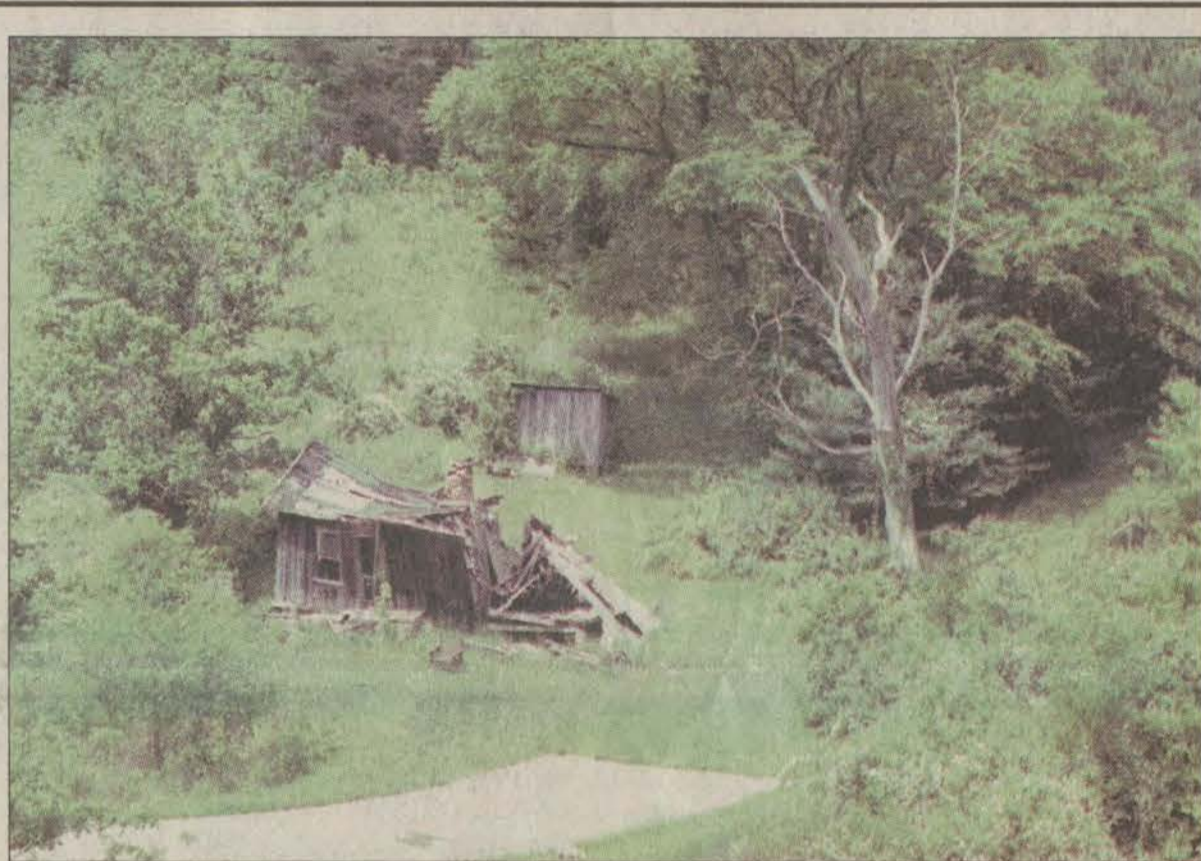
Bryant gathered the dogs and took them to Franklin. She and dispatcher Tammy Tackett, along with help from firefighters, bathed the pups, which had fly eggs on them, and sprayed them with a lice spray. The irate Franklin said the puppies were just days old. "You could tell their little cords had just fallen off," she said. Officer William Petrey traveled to dispatcher Heather Tackett's home for a bottle to nurse the puppies. The group mixed milk and a raw egg together to feed them. All the while Franklin grew more and more upset. "It is a disgrace to the city of Prestonsburg and to Floyd County that someone could treat animals this way," she said. "How would they like their babies to be thrown over an embankment?"

The discarded pups were both cold and

The tale of seven puppies which were tossed in a ravine caused outrage among some city workers who have been nursing them back to health. Three of the surviving puppies are still in need of a home.

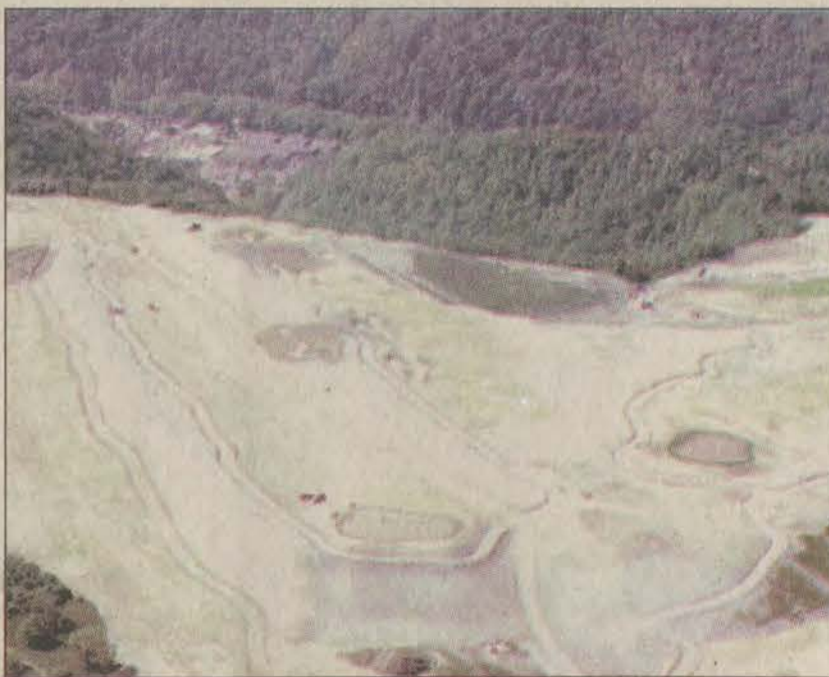


This dilapidated building and dead tree make a striking pose for a spring day on KY 321 near Dickey Town.

Golf course development moves forward with good weather

With good weather for most of the spring, progress has reportedly been made on Prestonsburg's mountaintop golf course project. Paving is set to begin on the access road to the course. The Department of Transportation has agreed to pave to the clubhouse area on the course. The DOT will lay four inches of stone base and nine inches of pavement. A change order was presented for an additional 300 feet of paving and 248 feet of additional conduit to be laid in the subdivision. The cost to the city will be \$9,312.55. A motion to accept the change was passed. The original retaining wall built on hole 17 has settled and begun to lean in the wrong direction. The subcontractor was reported to be taking responsibility for the cost of building a second wall. The 10th tee was also said to have cracks in the retaining wall. It will be sealed and monitored for further cracks. Mike Brown, a local contractor, is working on problems with the cart path. Minor problems with the path cracking have been reported. The contractor was instructed to halt further construction of the paths until the problems could be resolved. The contractor will absorb the cost

of fixing the cracks. In other developments: Ranger Construction reported that 12 holes of the 18-hole course have been seeded. Ranger will fill erosion areas and seed what needs to be seeded. The maintenance crew of the course will sod the ground. Holes 7, 8, 12, 13 and 14 were reported to need guardrails. Maintenance crews will do guardrail work this winter. Proposed bids for the clubhouse were open yesterday. The contract will be awarded the first of June. The clubhouse is expected to be open by Christmas.

Wallen found not guilty of sodomy

Jury deliberates 3 1/2 hours before reaching conclusion

A Floyd County jury apparently agreed with a Prestonsburg man's assertion that police forced him to confess to engaging in sodomy with a child and found him not guilty at the end of his trial Thursday. The jury of three men and nine women deliberated for three-and-one-half hours before reaching its verdict. Proceedings began Wednesday in the sodomy trial of Jason Wallen, 23. The trial saw Sgt. Bobby Johnson of the Kentucky State Police read verbatim a statement Wallen had allegedly given him confessing to the incident. Wallen allegedly told Johnson the allegations against him were true in that statement. According to Johnson, Wallen allegedly confessed to engaging in oral sex with a 7-year-old boy in the basement of the child's home. Wallen allegedly told the officer that the child initiated the act. "It just sort of happened that day," Wallen said in his statement. "I realize it was stupid, too." "I don't want them to know about it," Wallen allegedly said of his parents in the statement. As Johnson continued his testimony, Wallen lost his composure, hiding his face and crying. Later, during testimony given by the child and his brother, the defendant swallowed hard while his family bowed their heads in the back. "Question. The boys told me the truth? Answer. Yes," Johnson read. Johnson told the jury that Wallen had been interrogated by another officer before giving his statement. The alleged victim testified next, going into the graphic detail of the alleged incident. The boy testified Wallen had come to get the boy and his brother and took them into the basement, where Wallen allegedly blocked the door with two tires. The child testified that Wallen first tried to pull his brother's pants down and then came to him. "He went to (the brother) to pull down his drawers and then he come after me," said the child. "He pulled my britches down. He touched my middle. Made me touch his." The child testified that Wallen had allegedly sodomized him and then forced him to do the same to Wallen. The boy said his brother saw what allegedly happened and pushed Wallen. "My brother threw a tire at him," said the child.

Agency announces partnerships with education community to inform young men of responsibilities, opportunities

Kentucky earns a "C" when it comes to the number of young people who register for the Selective Service. Only 79 percent of Kentucky males have registered by the age of 20. Only Texas, Louisiana and Hawaii have a smaller percentage.

The Selective Service System recently released its first-ever state-by-state analysis of registration compliance data, and announced a series of partnership efforts with the U.S. Department of Education and key education organizations to bolster on-time registration.

On average, the rankings show that nearly one out of five young men in the United States turning age 20 this year will fail to register, putting themselves at risk of losing out on important federal opportunities linked to registration.

New Hampshire ranked highest among the states with 95 percent of eligible men registered by the time they turn 20, while Hawaii was the lowest with 73 percent of young men born in 1980 registering before or during 1999.

Federal law requires that virtually all young men living in the U.S., register with Selective Service within 30 days of their 18th birthday. Late registrations are accepted through age 25, and many men register late.

The names are gathered by the civilian-controlled agency in the event of a national crisis that would require a military draft. A prime concern of the agency is ensuring that any such call-up would be "fair and equitable."

Over the past three decades, many reforms have been instituted to ensure fairness, and nationwide

some 11,000 volunteers in virtually every community in America have been trained in the procedures necessary to conduct a fair process. In addition, "equity" requires the highest compliance rate possible.

To reinforce the requirement, Congress has made Selective Service registration a requirement for obtaining a number of federal benefits, including student loans, job training, government jobs, and citizenship for male immigrants.

Under federal law, young men who do not register by the time they are 26 may never receive these benefits.

Additionally, although rarely prosecuted, failure to register is a felony punishable by up to five years in prison and a fine up to \$250,000. Many states and localities also link additional opportunities — such as student financial aid and state or municipal employment — to Selective Service registration.

"The American people, through their elected representatives, have made it clear that they believe Selective Service plays a vital role in ensuring that our country is prepared for a national emergency," said Selective Service Director Gil Coronado.

"Therefore, many benefits — benefits that are important to every man's future — have been linked to Selective Service registration. Our goal as an agency is to both ensure that we have registered every eligible man, and to ensure that we have done all we can to inform young men of the opportunities they are forgoing if they fail to register."

Coronado said that it is in this spirit the agency is reaching out to

the U.S. education community to help raise awareness of the registration requirement and to support the agency's new initiative, Selective Service Week, a series of school and community-based awareness activities to be launched in the fall.

"Our research has consistently shown that the biggest barrier to young men's compliance is a simple lack of awareness," Coronado said. "It is tragic to see young men potentially missing out on future opportunities, because they just do not know that they are required to register."

"But even more tragic is that our experience shows the young men most likely to miss the message are those from poor and underrepresented populations — the very men who stand the most to gain from these opportunities."

The agency is forbidden by federal law to purchase advertising, and so relies on a number of strategies to build awareness, including public service announcements, direct mail and direct outreach.

"On the whole, we're very proud of our record considering the enormous challenge we face of reaching the more than 5,000 young men in this country who turn 18 every day," Coronado said. "However, we are fully committed to doing more."

In announcing his agency's support for the outreach effort, U.S. Secretary of Education Richard W. Riley commented, "Throughout the history of our nation, our schoolhouses have been more than just places where children learn their 'Three Rs.' They are places where young people learn both their rights and their responsibilities as citizens of a free society."

as the two fled the basement. The boy said he immediately went upstairs.

"I went to the bathroom and puked. Then I went to watch TV and wait till mom came home."

The child said when his mother got home she took him and a sister back into the bedroom to talk about what allegedly happened.

The child told Pillersdorf that Wallen had pushed him up against a wall.

On cross-examination by defense attorney Ned Pillersdorf, the victim said he had been asked about the alleged incident several times. He said that his mother, father, uncles and aunts had asked him what had happened two or three times and that his mom and dad asked about it every day.

The boy's brother testified that he had seen the defendant one time before the day of the alleged incident. He told the jury that his brother had asked him to go to the basement because Wallen had something cool to show him.

"I just walked toward the back," the boy said.

He told the jury that Wallen placed tires in front of the door and spoke of the alleged act of sodomy against his brother, saying Jason made his brother do it.

As for the alleged acts against him, the boy said, "He tried to pull my pants down from my front belt loops."

He denied hitting Wallen but instead he said he moved the tires

and went up into the house.

Wallen's mother Dorothy told the jury she and Jason had been at the house that day but Jason stayed maybe 10 to 15 minutes. He stayed "long enough to get his car started."

The further testified that nothing unusual happened that day.

Dorothy Wallen said she had been in that basement maybe once and saw no tires there.

In his defense Wallen testified that he had dropped his mother off at the boys' Maytown home and that he did have what he believed to be battery trouble that day.

He told the jury that Bobby Johnson had met with him before and said that he would have to arrest him and go to the state police post to take a polygraph test. Wallen testified he had told the officer at that time that "I did not do it."

Wallen said that he had talked to a fellow named Charles Hines and that he originally told him he did not do it.

A tearful Wallen sat at the stand and said, "He started jumping toward me and raising his voice. He scared me."

"I was scared. I told them because I was scared. I have always been afraid of the police," he said.

When the prosecution asked Wallen about the incident he repeatedly said "I didn't do nothing."

He testified that he had been there about 10 minutes, did not go in the basement, and did not push the alleged victim.

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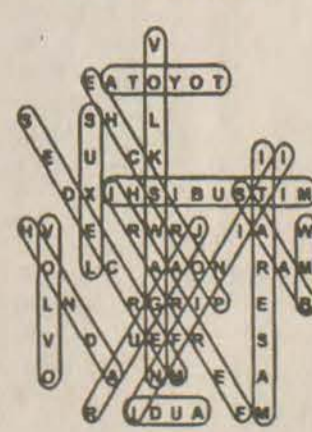

All KCTCS colleges authorized to award degrees

LEXINGTON — All institutions in the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS) now are authorized to award associate degrees in at least one program.

Community colleges in Kentucky have conferred associate degrees for years. But until the Kentucky Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997 created KCTCS, technical institutions lacked the authority to award degrees.

Action taken May 22 by the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education (CPE) on proposals from eight technical colleges means that all 15 of the commonwealth's technical colleges now have received approval to issue associate degrees in at least one program.

"While the technical colleges long have offered quality certificate and diploma programs, the ability to award degrees is a significant step forward in our efforts to ensure the

success of students," said Dr. Michael B. McCall, KCTCS president.

"Having a degree makes it easier for a student to find a good job, and increases opportunities to transfer to a university to receive a four-year degree," McCall said.

In its meeting at Central Kentucky Technical College in Lexington, the CPE approved the following degree programs for KCTCS technical colleges:

- Northern Kentucky Technical

College — business and office technology.

- Bowling Green Technical College — culinary arts.
- Hazard Technical College — industrial maintenance technology.
- Madisonville Technical College — machine tool technology.
- Owensboro Technical College — machine tool technology.
- Rowan Technical College — machine tool technology.
- Cumberland Valley Technical College — medical laboratory tech-

nology.

• Jefferson Technical College — welding technology.

Because each of KCTCS' technical colleges now has received CPE approval to grant the associate in applied technology (AAT) degree, the colleges must submit additional

AAT programs only to the KCTCS Board of Regents and won't need CPE approval.

"This degree-approval authority, granted to KCTCS by the CPE, will greatly assist our colleges in responding quickly to the needs of their communities," McCall said.

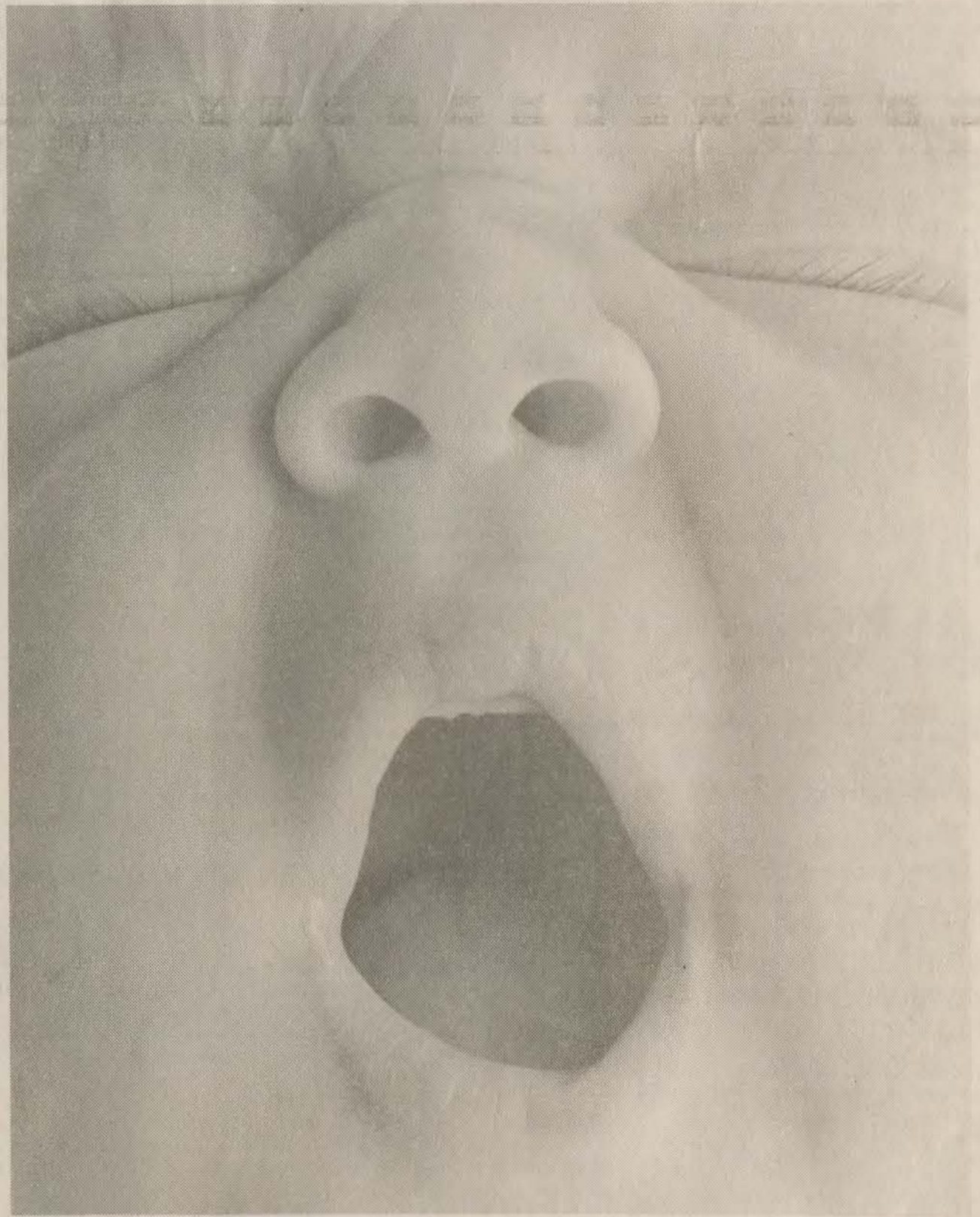

weak and were fed every two hours.

Franklin returned to work the following day after worrying about the pups all night, she said. She called Penelope's Pets in Lancer for help. Luckily, Jack Russell owned a dog which just had a litter of pups. The owner agreed to let the part-tweiler babes to nurse for five days from the new mom.

Unfortunately two of the pups died the first night with their surrogate mother.

"She laid on one of them," said Franklin. "The other was sickly."

Firefighter Kate Gulick took two of the pups, said Franklin, but the others will be given away when they are healthy enough.

Franklin and many of the firefighters are animal lovers and are appalled at such an act.

"I have cried my eyes out over it," she said. "It broke my heart. I would look at the puppies and just cry."

"If anyone has any information as to who did this, please call the city police," said the angry dispatcher.

Cruelty to animals is a crime that could be punishable by up to a year in jail.

County Attorney Keith Bartley said the perpetrator could be charged with seven counts of first-degree cruelty to animals and face a maximum jail sentence of seven years.

One thing which needs to be said

In all the reaction to Tuesday's outcome in the state Senate race, one thing has been noticeably left unsaid.

Thank you for your service, Benny Ray Bailey.

Bailey first entered the Senate in 1980 and he's been there ever since. During those two decades, he sharpened his skills and political prowess, gaining respect from his colleagues and praise for his intelligence and compassion.

On Tuesday, voters decided to give Johnny Ray Turner a chance at Bailey's job. It is not up to us to either praise or condemn that decision. It is the will of the people and it should be defended at all costs.

In some political races, it is a shame for either candidate to win. In this one, however, it is sad that either had to lose. Eastern Kentucky needs leadership from men of the caliber of both Bailey and Turner.

But while we are confident that Turner has the ability to serve his district admirably, it is with some remorse that we see Bailey leave the Senate. Certainly, it is hard to imagine a legislature without him in the mix.

It is even more difficult to think Bailey would not continue to serve his community, and we fully expect that once he has had time to reflect and recuperate, he will return to community service in some capacity, whether it is in the political arena or elsewhere. A man with the degree of concern Bailey has for Eastern Kentucky could not easily bribe those passions and be put out to pasture.

Bailey's experience in the legislature gave him the ability to funnel millions of dollars to this region. His expertise in matters of health care gave him sage-like status among his counterparts in the Senate.

The past year was hard on Bailey, however. After reaching the pinnacle of his power two years ago by masterminding an alliance with Republicans to overthrow former Senate President John "Eck" Rose, the ripple-effect of that decision came crashing down around him when Republicans took control of the Senate for the first time in the state's history.

It could be argued that Bailey became a modern-day Icarus, flying too close to the sun and getting burned. His defeat on Tuesday could very well be the inevitable consequence of that turn of events.

But it would be a shame for that to be the final chapter to Bailey's career. We expect and hope that it will not be.

—Guest Column— Inner America and the pursuit of private happiness

Routinely, the polls ask Americans' views on political issues like gun control, abortion and George W. Bush. Rarely do they probe our interior lives — our anxieties, satisfactions, intimacies, spiritual beliefs. But a recent New York Times Magazine gave it a try and came up with a compelling snapshot of "inner America" at century's turn.

What emerges from the data and accompanying essays is a portrait of an American people who no longer trust the institutions that once protected, sustained and inspired them. And why should they?

As essayist Alan Wolfe suggests, corporations now compete to lay off workers, unions are ineffectual, government increasingly is run by leaders who detest government, families seem more dysfunctional, media spread cynicism and religion has been reconfigured to match the mood of the day.

And what is that mood? A retreat from collective endeavor, a falling back on personal resources to help discover the conditions for a good and meaningful life. To be sure, this is an optimistic era, but one that's increasingly centered on preoccupation with personal rather than communal ambitions. People are pursuing life on their own terms.

As Wolfe puts it, Americans "still believe in God, uphold the family and love their country, (but) they increasingly decide which God best suits their temperament; which family structure works for them; and whether their country's government is worthy of their trust."

Take the idea of civic commitment. Most people said they do things like vote or serve in the community, not because they get satisfaction from it, but because they see it as an obligation.

On religion, about 70 percent say they're at least as observant as their parents, although their God is a theological departure from tradition. People are divided equally on whether the best religion would be one that borrowed from all the others. Just 22 percent still subscribe to the notion of original sin — that people are born into moral depravity that only God's grace can overcome. More than 80 percent believe in an afterlife, but only half as many believe in hell.

As Wolfe observes: "Americans want a capacious God."

Most say, for example, that lying is OK to protect someone's feelings, and that immoral thoughts are OK so long as they don't result in actions. Most men (52 percent) think it's acceptable to fantasize about sex with someone other than their partner (although only 40 percent of women agree).

Education has a big influence on people's outlook. The lower their level of attainment, the more likely they are to regret how their lives turned out. Two-thirds of those without college degrees, for example, say that true love is harder to find in today's society, while most of those with advanced degrees disagree.

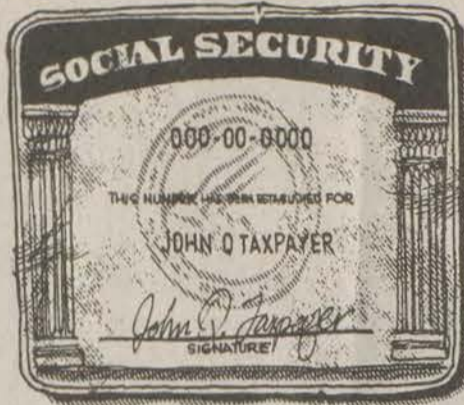
Other findings: 85 percent say it's possible to be pretty much who you want to be in America; 75 percent say they're happy with their sex lives; 62 percent say sex is overrated when compared with satisfying work or friendship; 61 percent say America was better when people didn't move around so much; 46 percent think they're overweight.

People are almost evenly divided over whether the growing gap between rich and poor is morally wrong — falling back, apparently, on their faith in individual effort and personal autonomy.

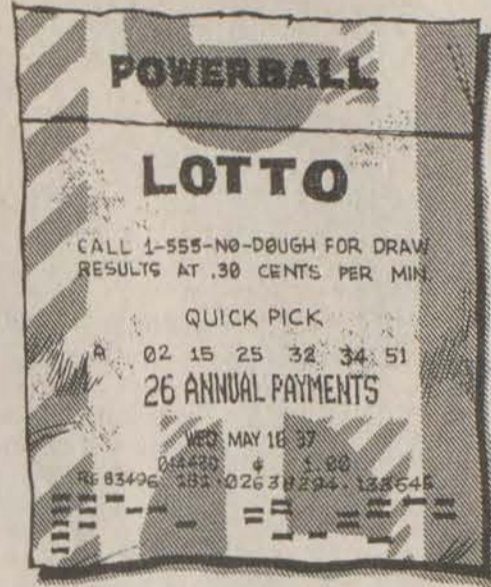
Indeed, Thomas Jefferson's melodic phrase "pursuit of happiness" seems ever more applied to private life, while the concepts of community and citizenship seem increasingly quaint.

This is a mixed result. It's inspiring to see people confident in pursuing life on their terms. It's troubling to see them giving up on collective effort, expecting that a tax rebate, for example, is the greatest good that can come from government.

Deism is a lot of things, but it isn't Christianity. People have been making the mistake of thinking belief in a creator is the same thing as being a Christian, and it isn't the same thing at all. What kind of Christian doesn't believe Jesus was the Son of God, or that the Bible is divinely inspired? Of the Ten Commandments, how many are actually laws? Three or four out of ten? The statement that our country was founded on Christianity is not only historically inaccurate, but a deliberate falsehood perpetrated by hypocritical Christians who have forgotten the commandment not to bear false witness.

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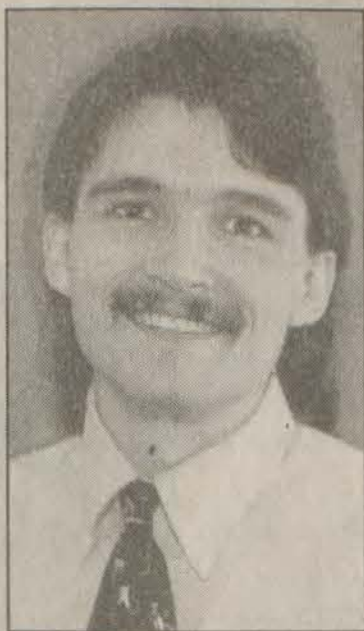
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A View from the Hill

Nearly 1,000 students learned more about science during the third annual Physics Petting Zoo last week. The zoo doesn't get its name from any animals but the event is so named because it allows young people to "touch" science experiments and demonstrations. The second floor of the Armington Learning Center was transformed into a mini-science museum with 60 hands-on physics and engineering exhibits for students to interact with in order to learn different scientific principles. The exhibits illustrated concepts relating to motion, pressure, sound, electricity, magnetism, light, and engineering.

Along with some of the popular displays from past zoos, additional exhibits were added this year, and existing ones were improved. Students played soccer with robots and discovered the shocking nature of electricity by using a Van de Graaff generator. They imprinted their own shadows on the "Shadow Wall" and tested various building designs with an earthquake simulator. One of the most popular exhibits was the laser maze that challenged students to manipulate a laser beam through a complex maze using mirrors.

Many school groups toured the zoo during the week, including groups from Pikeville Elementary, Lookout Elementary, Greasy Creek Elementary, Shelby Valley High School, Inez Elementary, Porter Elementary, Robinson Creek Elementary, Magoffin County Middle School, and students participating in the Pike County Chamber of Commerce Career Day also participated. For the first time, a group from the Kentucky Youth Academy visited the zoo, and their polite manners as well as their excitement about learning science impressed everyone.

The Physics Petting Zoo relies on the hard work and ded-

ication of many volunteers throughout the week. I would like to thank the following Pikeville College faculty, staff, and students for their help: Dr. Tom Hess, Dr. Bryan Hearn, Dr. John Nelson, Howard Francis, James Clay, Gayle Sunday, Teresa Mauk, Ron Damron, Gerri Kinder, Libby Shockley, Elaine Norman, Toni Casebolt, and Jeremy Parsons.

The zoo is one of many activities and events offered through the Pikeville College Math/Science Resource Center. This science outreach center is designed to promote scientific awareness in our community. The center schedules teacher and student workshops, hosts science shows and special speakers, holds science Olympics, and conducts a week-long science day camp in the summer among other math and science-related activities. This year's day camp will be held in July, and our 125 campers are already registered and ready for fun.

Finding college financial aid: Tips for tackling the assignment

Planning for college is tough enough without the additional challenges of completing the various applications available for federal financial aid.

The Kentucky Society of CPAs suggests several things to keep in mind when tackling this assignment: (1) prepare early; (2) investigate all options; and (3) don't assume that you are not qualified for aid, even if you think your family income is high.

The Financial Aid Process

Students shouldn't wait until they are accepted into college to start their aid search, or it may be too late. The deadlines for submitting financial aid forms tend to vary among colleges. For example, some forms may be due as early as December, although most are due in February or March. Even within one college, there may be different deadlines for different forms.

The first step in applying for aid is to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form. Students can obtain this form online at www.ed.gov or through their financial aid office. The FAFSA form should be filed after January 1 of the student's senior year in high school, but no later than June of that academic year.

About two-thirds of all student financial aid comes from federal programs administered by the U.S. Department of Education, which has made more than \$42.8 billion available in aid to students. The three most common federal financial aid loans are the Stafford Loans, the Pell Grant and the Perkins Loan. Except for one of the two Stafford Loans, these loans are awarded based on financial need.

The Stafford Loans

There are two types of Stafford Loans available. With the first, the funds are provided by private lenders, such as banks, and are administered by the Federal Family Education Loan Program (FFELP).

This loan allows you to borrow money from the bank at a relatively low interest rate that is capped at 8.25 percent. The second type of Stafford Loan is federally funded and administered by the Federal Direct Student Loan Program (FDSLPL), where the funds are provided to the school, which becomes a direct lender.

Stafford Loans are either subsidized, with the government temporarily paying the interest, or unsubsidized. The subsidized loan is based on financial need, whereas anyone can apply for the unsubsidized loan. With an unsubsidized loan, the student pays the interest, which begins to accrue when the loan is made and repayment can be deferred until graduation. Some students try to maximize their loan amount by combining subsidized and unsubsidized loans.

Pell Grants

Pell Grants are federally funded, available to undergraduate students and are based strictly on need. Unlike a loan, they do not need to be repaid.

Eligibility for Pell Grants is based primarily on a standardized formula that establishes an expected family contribution (EFC). When determining your need for financial aid, the administrator will first consider other aid you are expected to receive. He or she also will consider the cost of attendance, your status as a full- or part-time student, and whether or not you plan to attend school for a full academic year.

Perkins Loan

The Perkins Loan is awarded to undergraduate and graduate students and is based solely on exceptional financial need. Colleges and universities received a limited pool of funds from the federal government, which they award to students on an annual basis. For such campus-based programs, application deadlines vary. It's a good idea to check with the schools that students intend to apply to as soon as possible for specific deadline information.

Preparation

When completing applications, you are generally required to provide specific financial information, including tax information. To help streamline the process, you may want to prepare your tax return early or have an estimate ready to provide the required information on the form.

Finally, remember to follow all the instructions carefully. Try to avoid common mistakes such as forgetting to sign the application forms or leaving certain lines blank, which can delay the processing of your application.

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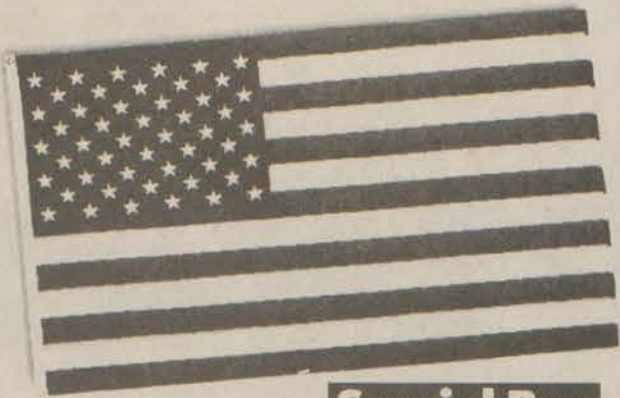
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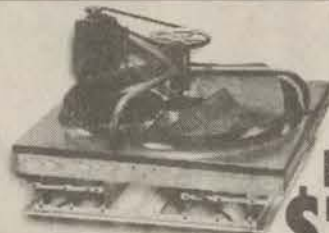
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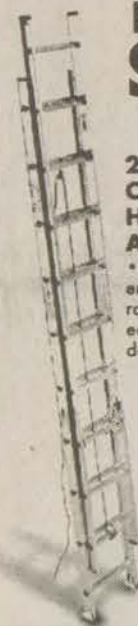

Local fire fighters go west to battle New Mexico blaze

Of the 40 fire fighters called from Kentucky, three are from Salyersville, which has about 23,000 fewer residents than does Los Alamos, the New Mexico city where a forest fire has destroyed homes, land and historical areas.

Sam Caudill, Magoffin County's ranger with the Department of Forestry, department crew leader Lonnie Puckett, and Dewey Marshall, who operates heavy equipment for the forestry department, are among the thousands of fire fighters called upon to assist in the New Mexico effort.

All three Magoffin County men departed last week for Los Alamos and are presently part of the fire fighting effort there.—*The Salyersville Independent*

Drug use prevention program holds first graduation in county

A total of 194 local students received certificates and other honors during a Drug Abuse Resistance Education

(D.A.R.E.) graduation held May 13.

The graduation ceremony was the first of its kind held here, and brought an official end to the first year of association between the D.A.R.E. program and the Magoffin County school system.

The D.A.R.E. program, a nationwide effort designed to bring together a community's schools, police officers and parents, teaches children how to resist drugs and violence.—*The Salyersville Independent*

Reo sues Hall, alleges 'slanderous' campaign

Two years ago, W. Keith Hall was suspended from the Pike County Board of Education by state officials who claimed he and two other board members voted repeatedly for alleged abuses by then-Superintendent Reo Johns.

Soon after Hall's return from that suspension in July last year, audio taped evidence from Johns surfaced that helped state officials order Hall—who's gunning in Tuesday's primary for one of Pike County's seats in the House of Representatives—to resign or face prosecution for allegedly attempting to influence hiring in the district in violation of education laws.

Now, Johns, who turned in his resignation and retired in May 1998, and who Hall, 40, claims became his political nemesis after he failed to cast his support to Johns' favored successor, has filed suit against Hall and a Harold communications company that owns a cable access television station for allegedly slandering him in a political advertisement.—*Appalachian New-Express*

Close races expected in the primary

Unlike last November's gubernatorial race in which Gov. Paul Patton had his bid for re-election firmly in his back pocket for months prior to the election, several of Pike

County's hottest races in Tuesday's primary looked as if they would go right down to the wire and be won on election night.

Perhaps the most heated and expensive of local races in the final days prior to the election was the battle between former Pike County Judge-Executive Wayne T. Rutherford and W. Keith Hall, an entrepreneur and self-made millionaire, for Chris Ratliff's 93rd state House seat.

In another hotly-contested race, former 31st District state senator and attorney John Doug Hays faces former Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Rick Bartley for the Commonwealth's Attorney seat.

The results of the election saw Barley win by more than 1,600 votes and Hall over Rutherford by nearly 900 votes.—*Appalachian New-Express*

Regina woman dies in Mtn. Parkway crash

The mother-in-law of Pike County Judge-Executive Karen Gibson's oldest son was killed and her husband injured in a fiery single-vehicle car accident on Tuesday morning on the Mountain Parkway.

According to Kentucky State Police reports, Brenda Damron, 52, of Regina, was traveling on the Mountain Parkway about 8:30 a.m. Tuesday when her vehicle left the roadway and crashed into a tree about three miles east of Stanton.—*Appalachian New-Express*

Court scores two points in jailer case

Circuit Judge Stephen "Nick" Frazier ruled Monday that the county's fiscal court cannot reduce the salary of jailer B. Joe Hill during his term, but the court can eliminate his staff and reassign the jailer to duties as a bailiff to the court.

Frazier's decision upholds two of three sections of an ordinance adopted earlier this year by the fiscal court concerning Hill's duties as jailer. The circuit judge decided that the ordinance was valid in all respects except, its directive that Hill's \$36,000 salary be reduced to the minimum of \$12,000 allowed by law.

Frazier noted in his ruling that the state constitution explicitly prohibits changes to the salaries to elected officials during their terms of office, adding that the move to cut Hill's salary was a violation of the constitutional provisions.—*The Paintsville Herald*

The indictment charges Ramey with conspiring to possess and distribute marijuana; possessing and distributing marijuana; conspiring to commit unlawful monetary transactions; laundering of monetary instruments; and committing unlawful monetary transactions.—*The Paintsville Herald*

Bus driver suspended rest of year

After receiving a three-day suspension for abandoning a 9-year-old student, April 20, Janet Hall, a Martin County school bus driver has been suspended for the rest of the school year after reportedly fueling a bus with students on board, an unidentified source said Friday.

Martin County School Transportation Director Woodrow Nichols refused comment, Friday, saying all questions were to be directed to school's superintendent Bill Slone. Slone could not be reached or comment.

Hall was suspended three days for abandoning Joshua Stacy, a Grassy Elementary third grader, a half mile from his home while the bus was en route to school.—*Mountain Citizen*

12-year-old victim of 'drive by assault'

An Inez Middle School sixth grader was struck in the face with a full can of soda pop by a passing motorist, Monday evening near his home on Rockhouse.

Travis Smith, 12, was walking beside the highway on Rockhouse Fork when a young man, described as "between 16 and 20 years old," reportedly leaned out the passenger side window of a full-sized black pickup truck

and hurled a can of pop at the boy, striking the youngster in the face.

"It happened a little before 5 p.m., as he was walking home from Family Market in Tomahawk," said Pamela Smith, mother of the alleged victim. "His face was completely swollen with large welts around his eyes and nose after the assault. Now both eyes are black."—*Mountain Citizen*

False alarm at Warfield Shoprite

Imagine passing by a supermarket late at night and seeing a man walking around inside with a gun in hand.

This scene was the reason for a false alarm at Warfield Shoprite, Saturday night, as the Kentucky State Police and the Martin County Sheriff's Department rushed to the scene of what they believed was a robbery in progress. Instead it turned out to be a huge misunderstanding on behalf of both parties.

The police found an employee with a pellet gun who was trying to shoot flying birds which had been causing a problem for the store.—*Mountain Citizen*

Ethics board finds no wrongdoing in contract questions

The Lawrence County Ethics Commission has found no wrongdoing in the awarding of contracts to relatives of two county officials during the 1998 and 1999 fiscal years.

The board, acting on a request by State Auditor Ed Hatchett, ruled last Wednesday that the fiscal court followed proper procedure by allowing relatives of District Three Magistrate Roger Johnson and County Treasurer Sue Maynard to perform work for the county.

Last Wednesday's meeting was the ethics commission's first session since March 1999, and was called after Hatchett released two audits noting that Jordan's brother-in-law and Maynard's brother had been awarded contracts or performed services during the 1998 and 1999 fiscal years. While Hatchett didn't suggest any wrongdoing by the fiscal court, he recommended that the matter be referred to the ethics board for consideration.—*The Big Sandy News*

8 officials have filed disclosure forms

Eight elected Lawrence County officials have violated

a section of the county's ethics code by not filing an annual financial disclosure statement, the county's ethics commission decided last week.

But instead of levying a \$500 fine against the officials, which is required under the ethics code, the commission agreed to send a letter to the officials informing them of the violation and giving them time to correct the mistake.

Meeting last Wednesday for the first time, the ethics commission's new chairman, Tom Orlovsky, told members that "one of the things" they needed to address was the "fact that all elected officials, have not submitted" financial disclosure statements. The statements, mandated by the ethics code, include some of the income for the county and their business operations, or investments which exceed \$5,000 a year. Statements are to be filed by February 1 of each year. Official who have not complied with the disclosure provision, according to Orlovsky, are as follows: Sheriff Bobby Workman, District One Magistrate Steve Sparks, Coroner Mike Wilson, Surveyor Cliff West, and Constables Banner Castle, Randy Woods, Loman Keeton and Tom Mullins.

Upon receipt of the commission's letter, the officials will have 10 days to file their disclosure statements.—*The Big Sandy News*

An age-banded approach to saving for college

Regardless of your child's age, the best overall strategy for building a college fund is to invest a regular amount on a monthly basis, boosting your nest egg with the proceeds of bonuses, tax refunds, gifts, and inheritances along the way.

While your savings plan should stay intact, you will need to adjust your focus and investment strategy as your child approaches college age. The Kentucky Society of CPAs provides the following approaches for taking your child's portfolio from birth to high school graduation.

FROM NEWBORN TO FIVE YEARS OLD — TIME IS ON YOUR SIDE

With anywhere from 12 to 18 years before your child starts college, you have more than enough time to

accept a higher level of risk and invest aggressively, aiming for maximum returns. Invest most of your college savings dollars (or at least as much as your tolerance for risk allows) in stocks or stock mutual funds.

The stock market invariably has its ups and downs, but, over the long term, stocks consistently have outperformed other investments.

AGES 6 TO 9 — STAY THE COURSE

If your child is within the 6 to 9 age group and you're just starting to invest, you may not want to take the most aggressive approach. With a decade to go before your child reaches college age, you can still emphasize growth, but you may choose to moderate your risk somewhat by investing assets into less aggressive growth-and-income funds. If you've been saving regularly and already have a growing college fund, you can pretty much stay the course during this period.

AGES 10 TO 13 — GET READY, GET SET

Continue to fund the college nest egg, but start to steer your portfolio toward a more conservative profile. You can accomplish this by directing more of your new contributions to bond funds and tamer stocks or equity-income funds which, because they look for stocks that pay high dividends, tend to ride market dips better. Start researching safer, less volatile investments where you can begin shifting your money over the next few years.

WITH FEWER THAN FIVE YEARS TO GO — GO FOR SAFETY

You don't need to drastically alter your asset allocation on the day your child walks through the doors of high school, but you should start taking definitive steps to preserve the returns earned thus far. You'll still want some growth to help keep your

portfolio ahead of inflation but, overall, your emphasis should be on capital conservation and income.

By putting a plan in place for selling your stock holdings and buying less volatile investments, such as bonds, CDs, money market accounts, and Series EE Savings Bonds, you won't be faced with the need to sell in a down market to meet an impending college bill.

WITH TWO YEARS — THE MOMENT OF TRUTH

Now is the time to consider your eligibility for financial aid. The first step is to calculate your expected family contribution. To improve your financial aid picture, consider moving money around to lower the income used in financial aid calculations.

For example, when you sell stocks after January of your child's junior year in high school, the earnings are considered income on your financial aid form. When you sell those winners before the January cut-off date, the proceeds appear as assets and count for much less in the aid formula.

Look for other ways to lower your income, perhaps by contributing to employer-sponsored flexible spending account, since income that is funneled into such accounts isn't included in financial aid calculations.

If it looks as if you won't qualify for financial aid, consider federal and state loan programs that are not need-based. Also, many colleges offer tuition installment plans that spread out payments and may make it easier if you need to pay part of your child's tuition expenses out of current income.

A CPA can be an invaluable resource in planning and executing a college savings plan. He or she can also provide advice on making the most of education tax credits, such as the HOPE and Lifetime Learning credits, which you may qualify for once you start writing those tuition checks.

"Kyle really hasn't pitched that

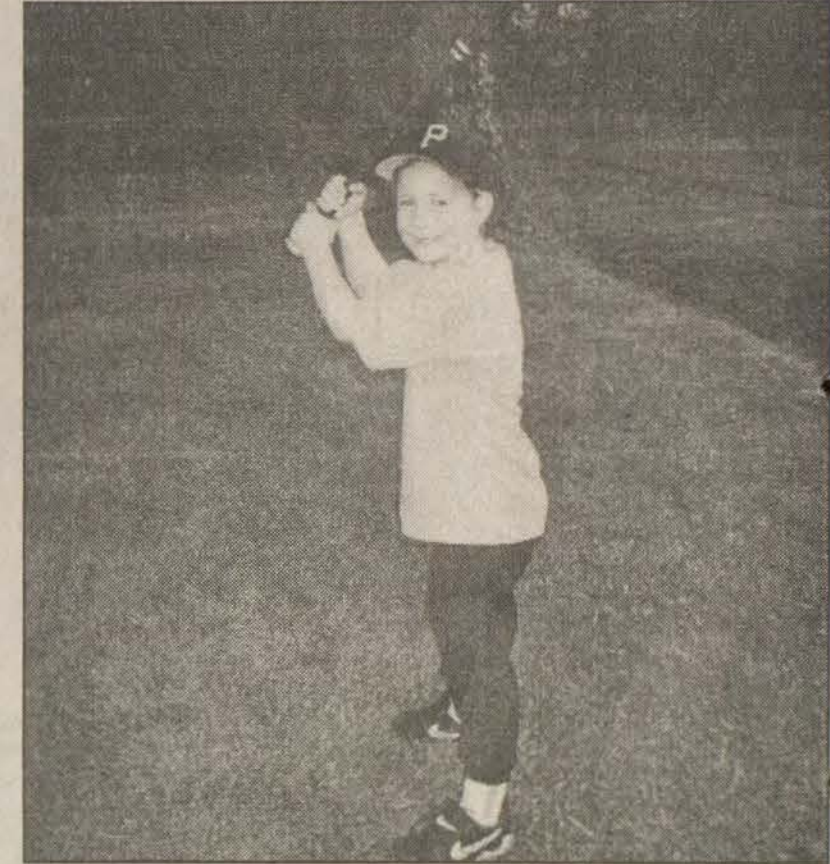
much for us," he said. "But he gave us a great effort."

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Sports In PERSPECTIVE

At no time in the history of professional baseball have so many home runs been recorded.

It used to be that a player who hit for the circuit 40 or more times in a season was considered to be a man of no mean talent. This past major league campaign there were several such performances, not to mention a few in the 50s and never mind Mark McGuire and Sammy Sosa.

So what's happening? Well, for one thing the balls are being wound tighter and have more jump to them than in years past. But an even more salient factor is the construction of the modern day bat. In his heyday Babe Ruth swung a 42-ounce piece of lumber, your

basic war club. It was his theory that weight combined with velocity would propel a ball farther than a bat of more conventional proportions. And too, a heavy bat has a larger hitting surface which enhances the chances of making more solid contact, a necessity when it comes to hitting the fence hopper.

But as time progressed, scientific research determined that the speed a bat moves through the arc of a swing is more important to generating distance than the matter of weight.

A heavy bat, despite its innate power, is more difficult to accelerate from a dead start and takes longer to get around to the ball.

Conversely, a lighter bat is more easy to "jump start" and can be swung much faster, which results in better carry on the ball.

Without really knowing why, baseball players have been swinging

weighted bats during hitting practice and in the on-deck circle so their real bats will feel lighter at the plate, the end objective being to get more zip into one's swing and hit the ball a greater distance.

If physicists are to be believed, lighter is better. Assuming this is true, one wonders how many round-trippers Ruth would have belted with a less cumbersome bat. More important, what is going on now? Bat manufacturers have been experimenting with increasing the flexibility of wood, giving it more snap, so to speak. This can be accomplished only to a modest extent given the basic properties of lumber. So here's where innovation on behalf of the players enters stage left.

One method of overcoming the limitations of processed ash is referred to as "corking." Simply bore a hole about an inch in diameter and a foot deep into the top of the bat all the while being careful not to split the bell. Then pack the opening with cork, sawdust, Styrofoam, or any other substance that is lighter than wood. Next, seal the hole with plastic that matches the color of the bat. Then sand the area smooth and apply a little pine

tar to give things a used appearance. Viola! A superbat. One that is lighter without any loss in size or hitting surface.

New York Yankees strong man Mickey Mantle once said, "If you swing for distance you almost have to have the bat in motion before the pitch is even released."

Science had also taught us that spin imparted to a ball at high velocity will further enhance its ability to fly longer and higher. Golf club makers learned this fact a long time ago.

Thus a lighter, grooved bat will produce better results than a standard model. Former Yankees shortstop Tony Kubek knew this (as did Mantle and Roger Maris) hence he used an ice pick to carve out the soft dark grain from his bats and then smeared pine tar into the openings. Finally, he sanded the bat lightly to harden the surface (better for greater force at impact) but not to the extent that the shallow grooves couldn't generate the desired spin on the ball.

Look out fences! Yet another dodge to increase the reaction of a ball when it contacts a bat is the liberal use of pine tar on the hitting area. This produces the same effect as grooves in imparting more spin and, subsequently, more distance. Essentially,

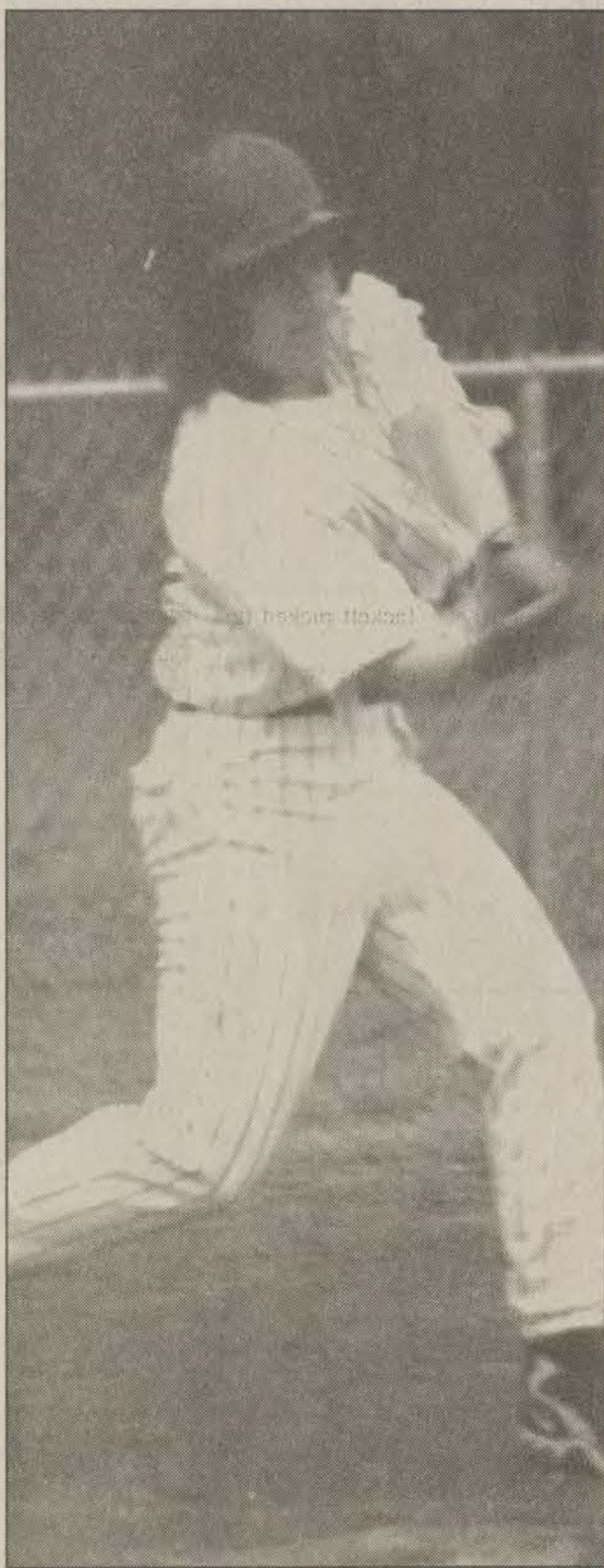

this is what the famous "Pine-Tar Episode" involving George Brett of the Kansas City Royals and his dubious home run against the Yankees was all about.

Hall of Fame catcher Johnny Bench not infrequently used a "cupped" bat (one with a hollowed out end) which is perfectly legal but has the same effect on the ball as a corked one.

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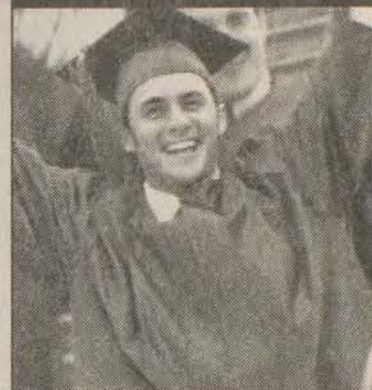

NEWS OF THE WEIRD

A March Reuters news service story featured the University of Tennessee's "body farm," a three-acre plot near Knoxville in which 20 corpses at a time are set up to rot under various circumstances so that homicide investigators (including, recently, Yugoslav war-crimes researchers) can study the stages of the decomposition process. The farm is best worked during winter; during hot, humid months, when maggots clean a body to the bone in two weeks, the stench is overpowering.

Ignatius Piazza, 40, has completed \$3 million worth of infrastructure toward his planned gated community 50 miles from Las Vegas in which every resident will be trained in firearms use, creating what he calls "the safest town in America." According to an April USA Today story, the town of Front Sight will have (by fall 2002) 12 shooting ranges, a private school

and a convenience store to service buyers of its 177 lots, which cost \$275,000 each (but come with various perquisites, including an Uzi).

Latest Astonishing Research

Short schoolboys are twice as likely as tall schoolboys to get bullied (British Medical Journal, March); female inmates in solitary confinement are lonely (University of Alberta researcher, January); many women who work outside the home feel stressed (AFL-CIO poll, March); and drivers need to keep their minds (and not just their eyes) on the road (Journal of Experimental Psychology: Applied, March).

The Litigious Society

The lawsuit by the family of the late cold-blooded bank robber Emil

Matasareanu is set for a September retrial after a hung jury in March on whether the city of North Hollywood, California, should pay because police officers might not have taken the mortally wounded Matasareanu to the hospital soon enough. The body-armor-wearing gunman and his partner provoked a televised, 44-minute, daytime firefight with police in 1997 in the bank's parking lot, firing more than 1,200 rounds from their automatic weapons, wounding 17; Matasareanu was hit 29 times and bled to death.

People Who Are Just So Upset: Ms. Cleanthi Peters, 57, filed a \$15,000-plus lawsuit in Orlando, Florida, against Universal Studios for last year's Halloween Horror Nights exhibit; she said she expected it to be frightening but that it was too frightening. And Charles Settles filed a \$2,000 lawsuit in Brunswick, Ohio, in January against his son's high school baseball coach, arguing that, because the

team was so bad (winless on the season), it lost out on an all-expense-paid trip to a Florida tournament.

A 19-year-old woman, who was conceived by rape, filed a lawsuit in December seeking damages from school officials in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, claiming that since her biological father was a teacher there (and a notorious pedophile who is now in prison), school officials should have done more to prevent him from raping her mother, who was then a student. The woman complains that, since everyone in the community knew of the rape, she has so far led a very lonely and harassed life.

Bizarre Workplaces

National Labor Relations Board lawyers argued at a March hearing that Tenneco Packaging plant (now named

Boone Day 2000 is June 3

On June 3, for the 103rd time, the Kentucky Historical Society will celebrate the date of June 7, 1769, when Daniel Boone "from the top of an eminence, saw with pleasure the beautiful level of Kentucky."

The program, titled "Fresh Voices From Appalachia," will begin at 10:30 a.m., in the Brown-Forman Kentucky Room of the Center. The Richard H. Collins Award will be presented to the author of the best article appearing in The Register of the Kentucky Historical Society during 1999.

Also, the Hambleton Tapp Award will be presented to a Kentucky teacher who has completed an exemplary project using local heritage resources in the classroom.

The awards will be followed by a lecture from Linda Scott DeRosier, author of the widely acclaimed "Creeker: A Woman's Journey."

DeRosier, psychology professor at Rocky Mountain College in Billings, Montana, will tell of her experiences as a woman growing up in rural Appalachia and moving away. Based on her memoir, this lecture will address issues of Appalachian culture, economics, gender roles, and sociological and psychological factors.

A special chorus of Kentucky Historical Society employees will provide patriotic music and lead the audience in the Boone Day tradition of singing "My Old Kentucky Home."

Following a luncheon, there will be poetry readings by Frank X. Walker, director of the Governor's School for the Arts and author on "Affrilachia;" Richard Taylor, Kentucky's current poet laureate, and Garry Barker, author of "Bitter Creek Breakdown" and director of the

Kentucky Folk Art Center in Morehead.

Winners from National History Day competitions and/or winners at the Kentucky Junior Historical Society Convention (both determined in April) will provide short historical skits.

There will also be displays of Kentucky Junior Historical Society Convention winning projects and National History Day winners.

A group of students from Stanton Elementary School will

perform in a country music presentation. Dr. James Gifford, director of the Jesse Stuart Foundation, will preside at the afternoon session.

Tickets must be purchased from the Kentucky Historical Society for the event. Cost is \$16 for Society members and \$20 for non-members. Call 502/564-1792, ext. 4414 for more information or to reserve your ticket.

The Kentucky Historical Society is an agency of the Education, Arts and Humanities

Cabinet. The Kentucky History Center is the headquarters for the Society and is located in historic downtown Frankfort.

Last year's celebration, the first to be held in the new Kentucky History Center, drew an audience of 150 to 175. Statewide interest in the History Center has remained high, attracting 200,000 visitors in the first 11 months of operation. Expectations are that the second Boone Day celebration in the Center will draw another large crowd.

KET program examines Beat Generation

When Allen Ginsburg, Jack Kerouac and William S. Burroughs met in New York City in the 1940s, they had no intention of starting a social revolution.

In the wake of World War II and the atomic bomb, these young writers were clearly marching to a different beat. By the 1950s, their beat became a movement embraced by a generation.

American Masters profiles the leading figures of that irrepressible movement and examines their continuing impact on modern society in Oscar-winning filmmaker Chuck Workman's "The Source: The Story of the Beats and the Beat Generation." The 90-minute documentary airs on KET

Never before have all the major figures of the era been gathered together in one film. Highlights include some of the last interviews conducted with Ginsburg, Burroughs and Timothy Leary before their deaths.

The list of other interviews, conducted especially for "The Source" or culled from the archives, is a veritable Who's Who of the Beat Generation: Lawrence Ferlinghetti, Michael McClure, Ken Kesey, Gregory Corso, Ed Sanders, George Stade, Gary Snyder, Robert Creeley, Amiri Baraka, Jerry Garcia, David Amram, Shirley Clarke, Tom Hayden and Norman Mailer.

The film also features dramatic readings by John Turturro as Ginsburg, Johnny Depp as Kerouac and Dennis Hopper as Burroughs, invoking all the power and raw energy of Ginsburg's "Howl," Kerouac's "On the Road" and Burroughs "Naked Lunch."

"The Source: The Story of the Beats and the Beat Generation, an American Masters Special," produced by Beat Productions, is closed-captioned for the deaf and hard-of-hearing.

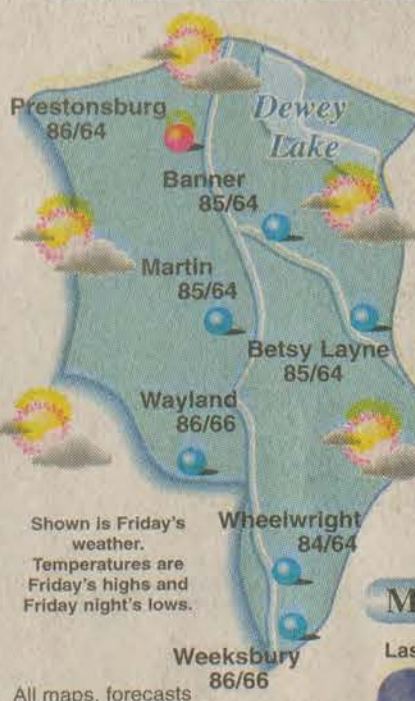

CRITTERS CORNER

Last week we discussed problems cat owners encounter due to their cats' scratching activities. The majority of cats can be taught to use acceptable objects of play. Notice, I did not say this is always easy, just that it's often possible. There are always a few determined felines, however, who will continue to shred draperies and furniture, and/or will persist in attacking people.

Keeping cats' nails trimmed is one way to reduce the amount of damage done, and it will help with loosening old claw sheaths, which is one of the reasons cats scratch objects to begin with.

Nail trimming is relatively simple in cats, because the claws are always translucent white, making it easy to see the blood supply and the nerve, which runs in the same area at the base of each claw. Your vet can show you how to do this, including restraint techniques and the proper equipment.

Rewarding the cat with a small bite of a tasty treat, such as tuna, after each paw or even after each nail may change his attitude toward the whole procedure.



cats tolerate them surprisingly well, especially after the initial period of adjustment.

They usually stay in place for several weeks, and fall off as the nail grows out. They are made of an inert material and are harmless if swallowed by the cat.

Call your vet to see if he or she uses these, or can order them. It's probably a good idea to bring the cat in to the clinic for the initial application, so you can see how it is done. Depending on how cooperative the cat is, you may return to the office for replacements or ask your vet to dispense glue and extra caps for "touch-ups" at home when needed.

These are a good alternative for use in a young cat that will probably soon grow out of the "crazy

Another option is use of a product called Soft Paws®, available through many veterinarians. These are flexible plastic nail caps that are adhered to the cat's claws with a medical-grade super glue. Many

teenage" stage, and they are also useful in cases where a playful cat is causing injury to the fragile skin of an elderly person in the household. Soft Paws® are available in a clear version, which are hardly noticeable and in several colors for the fashion conscious. They are also available for dogs.

Obviously, declawing surgery is another possibility, and one that I consider as a last resort. For the most part, I am very much opposed to this procedure, but I am enough of a realist to accept that it may be the only practical solution in some cases.

Declawing a cat involves the amputation of the last joint of each toe, usually on the front feet only; the equivalent of removing the tips of our fingers at the joint just below the nail. Although

the surgery is performed under general anaesthesia, there is obviously going to be significant post-surgical pain, especially since the cat has to walk on these wounds.

With the advent of new pain control methods which are safer to use



in cats, the surgery may be the lesser of two evils if the only alternative is the cat losing his home or his life.

When I had clients who had to make the decision to declaw their cat, I referred them to another veterinarian who I felt was more skilled in the procedure and the needed post-surgical care. Honestly, these cats seemed to do well and appeared to suffer very few long-term negative effects.

If you have thought the matter over carefully, and concluded that this is the only way to peacefully coexist with a terrorist cat, don't feel like some sort of monster. It is a decision made in your cat's best interest. Of course, a declawed cat should be kept strictly indoors.

Although many declawed cats can still climb trees using their hind nails for traction, they have lost their primary means of defense.

Another surgical alternative is tenotomy, which involves cutting the tendons that allow the cat to unsheathe its claws. I have never performed this surgery myself, nor have I ever seen a cat on which the procedure has been done, so I can't render much of an opinion. It would make sense that this would be a less

traumatic operation than declawing, but again, I just don't know firsthand.

Regular nail trimming would still have to be done on a cat who has had a tenotomy, possibly even more often, since he can no longer extend the claws to perform any routine maintenance on them himself.

There is no one easy "quick fix" for a cat who is causing damage and/or injury with his claws. The good news is that we have many more options available to us now to deal with the problem.

My general advice is to first try to redirect these natural activities into acceptable outlets, such as scratching posts and appropriate toys, and give this solution time to work.

Routine nail trimming should also be done. Nail caps would be the next step, and these may be needed only temporarily.

The last resort would be surgery, keeping in mind that this is irreversible; you must be committed to keeping this cat safe in return for removing his natural defense.

Talk to your veterinarian about the alternatives available, and then make an informed decision that is best for you, your family, and your cat.

Pactiv), in order to disrupt union organizing in July 1999 at a plant in Beech Island, South Carolina, had activist-employee Gary McClain arrested and, with the help of friendly local law-enforcement, committed to a mental institution for two weeks under the pretense that it feared workplace violence. Tenneco officials said it was just a coincidence that the Aiken County sheriff chased McClain down on the road and arrested him the day after a big organizing meeting.

Ontario's Social Services Ministry, seeking to find savings in worker efficiency, announced in March that some employees would be fitted with electronic monitoring devices that would track their whereabouts nearly every minute of the workday for 16 weeks. A union official called

the plan a gross invasion of privacy, especially since the obvious result of the project will be layoffs.

Recurring Themes

One of the widely reported stories of 1993 was the Vinton, Louisiana, crash of a car containing 20 naked Pentecostals from Floydada, Texas, who had received word from God that they should discard all their worldly possessions to make it more difficult for Satan to catch up to them. In April 2000, in the Houston suburb of Sugar Land, a state trooper stopped a car containing three women and a 3-year-old girl, all of whom were naked and who told the officer that God had told them to burn their clothes, drive to Wal-Mart, and buy new

clothes. Said the trooper, "It's always something. No two days are the same in this job."

More Easy Identifications: Johnny Lee Miller, 32, was arrested for bank robbery in January in West Valley City, Utah; he had left behind a large envelope (in which he had concealed his gun) that contained a personalized certificate from a prison-sponsored course in anger-management, which he had completed during his last lockup. And a four-year credit-card-theft spree ended in March with the arrest of Elnetta Denise Brown, 28, in Tampa, Florida; she had finally lost her anonymity by sitting for a Christmas portrait and

From missed flights to hotel mix-ups: Inexperienced travelers tell about their bumps in road

(NAPSA)-A woman locked away her sandwich in a hotel room safe, mistaking it for a microwave. Finding their hotel beds turned down, three youngsters called their parents in hysterics, fearing an intruder had robbed them. A flight attendant had trouble hiding her amusement when a man began yelling for her into the air vent, thinking it was an intercom system.

These are just a few of the trials and tribulations faced by inexperienced travelers who told Enterprise Rent-A-Car and travel expert Arthur Frommer their most embarrassing, funny and out-

with a white-knuckled, emergency landing on a snow-packed runway. Being a roller-coaster lover, she actually enjoyed the ride, but was disappointed to learn all landings would not be so thrilling.

• An infrequent traveler was pleasantly surprised to see her name in lights and a car waiting for her at an airport rental car lot. Unfortunately, the car was being held for another person with the same name who was a member of the company's gold card club. Her misunderstanding resulted in mild embarrassment when she turned the vehicle over to the gold club card holder and trudged back to the

counter to wait in line with the other non-gold card renters.

As funny or frustrating as many of the stories sound, Frommer says such mix-ups are common for rookie travelers. He suggests that infrequent travelers be aware that most well known travel providers—whether they are airlines or rental car companies—target only seasoned business travelers with preferential treatment. Taylorville campground to feature park system's first horse camping

As Taylorville Lake State Park's new campground gears up for its first full season of operation, park officials already are looking forward to a "first" for the state park system. This fall, the park will offer the first campsites to accommodate campers with horses.

The park will have 10 developed campsites that will handle horse trailers. The park maintains 16 miles of trails for horseback riding. The horse camping sites are scheduled for completion in September.

Meanwhile, campers are starting to discover the 45-site campground that opened only a year ago. The campground includes a restroom/shower building, a playground, and support facilities.

Each site includes a parking space, living area that includes a picnic table and barbecue grill, and water and electrical service.

The restroom/shower building complies with the standards of the Americans with Disabilities Act, as do two campsites. Nightly camping rates in the summer are \$16.

Lynn noted that the park is located minutes southeast of Louisville in adjacent Spencer County. Accessibility to the state's largest city is one of the park's strong points, he said.

Kentucky Life visits High Bridge, talks with Tom Owen

At one time, Kentucky was home to the highest bridge in North America and the highest railroad bridge in the world.

Remembering Garrett A. Morgan of Bourbon County

The Kentucky Historical Society's marker No. 1493, dedicated to Paris, Kentucky, inventor Garrett A. Morgan, has been refurbished and was rededicated on May 17.

The rededication ceremony took place at the St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Paris. The unveiling of the marker at Tenth and Vine Streets immediately followed the ceremony.

The text of the marker reads: Sites of birthplace of Garrett A. Morgan, and Branch school, which he attended are 1/4 mile south. He invented the tri-color traffic signal, forerunner of the present type, and a gas mask worn in rescue work in Cleveland, Ohio. His mask was the basis of the one used in World War I. In his honor the Claysville area is renamed 'Garrett Morgan Place.'

The son of former slaves, Garrett Morgan was born in Paris, on March 4, 1877. He left Kentucky as a teen-ager and eventually settled in Cleveland. In 1907, Morgan opened his own sewing equipment shop, launching a career as a successful businessman and inventor.

After witnessing a collision between a horse drawn carriage and an automobile, Morgan turned his creative talents to the issue of traffic safety. In 1923, he patented the three-way traffic signal, a device that provided the foundation for managing traffic flow in the 20th century.

It became his most renowned invention.

Morgan also received national notice for inventing, a gas mask used to rescue several

men trapped during an explosion in an underground tunnel beneath Lake Erie in 1916.

In recognition of the important contributions of this African American inventor, the U.S. Department of Transportation established the Garrett A. Morgan Technology and Transportation Futures Program, an educational initiative to prepare students for tomorrow's high-tech transportation careers.

"The Kentucky Historical Society has administered the Historical Markers Program for 40 years, and today there are more than 1,700 markers throughout the state. This is an important outreach activity for KHS," said J. Kevin Graffagnino, KHS executive director, "which collaborates with local governments, historical organizations and individuals in creating new markers as capsule lessons on important events, sites and movements in Kentucky history."

"In partnership with the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet, the Historical Society looks forward to maintaining and enhancing the Historical Markers Program as a popular and effective means of informing Kentuckians and visitors alike about the Commonwealth's distinctive heritage."

The Kentucky Historical Society is an agency of the Education, Arts and Humanities Cabinet. The Kentucky History Center is the headquarters of the Society and is located in historic downtown Frankfort.

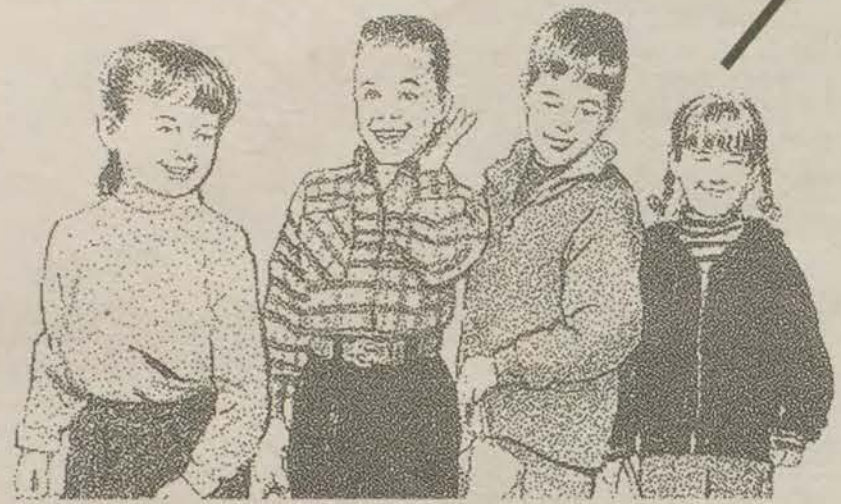
