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Laid-off firemen ask to volunteer

In comparison to a few past meetings held within recent weeks, a fairly low-key meeting of the Prestonsburg personnel committee was held at noon on November 15.

Fire Chief Mike Wells was present to inform the committee that the fire department is adequately staffed on all shifts, but that they were lacking in volunteers. Wells estimated that he would be fortunate to have a turnout of six volunteers on a fire call.

Making application to be considered for placement on volunteer status, were former firefighters Michael Mays, Kenny Crisp and William Calliban. All three were laid off from paid positions in the department last



The cleanup of a train derailment which occurred last week continues. Nine cars jumped the tracks, but seven remained upright, allowing them to be taken away. The other two, shown above, overturned, dumping their cargo of soybean meal. The two cars have been hauled away from the accident scene and will be cut apart and taken away by a scrap metal company. CSX has spent the past week cleaning up the spill and representatives from the Environmental Protection Cabinet are monitoring the situation. The derailment occurred last Friday night across the river from Branham Village in Prestonsburg and was caused by a broken rail. Ironically, that section of track was slated to have its rails replaced on Tuesday, and the new rail was lying next to the tracks at the time the accident occurred.

Board hears four reports

Floyd County Board of Education members Terry Dotson, Johnnie Ross, Carol Stumbo and Jeff Stumbo heard reports from four schools at a special-called meeting Tuesday night at Adams Middle School.

Representatives of Allen and May Valley elementary schools, Prestonsburg High School and Adams Middle School presented overviews of their schools and talked about the progress being made on their consolidated plans. Each school was represented by members of the staff and the local Site-Based Decision Making Council (SBDM).

Allen representatives spoke enthusiastically about their school, including the strong support of parents. However, they did admit concern over the school's poor showing on standardized tests.

Principal Linda Gearheart said contributing factors may be that the school has more males and more discipline problems. She listed among strategies for improvement the reduction of class size and the hiring of an additional reading teacher.

"With serious drops in CTBS scores, this concerns me," said District 4 board member Carol Stumbo. "Do you think you have got to the cause?"

Gearheart added that the staff has put more stress on writing, with more teachers working on portfolios and requiring more on-demand writing. She said there have also been some staff assignment changes to align teachers with their strengths.

Asked what the board can do to help, Gearheart said the school is "pretty well set" with materials. "It will just take some good hard work from our teachers," she said.

"I have heard good things about your school," said

Recanvass results in minor change in Martin council race

Thursday to conduct a recanvass of balloting in the Martin City Council race.

While the recanvass caused one minor change in the final figures for the race, it did not affect the outcome.

The recanvass had been requested by Samuel Howell, who finished just out of the running by eight votes. Howell placed seventh in the six-office race, finishing behind Michael

Robinson, 171 votes to 163. Thursday's recanvass -

which, in contrast to a recount, Members of the Floyd compares machine counts to County Board of Elections met ensure against a mathematical or transcription error - did not change the order of finish for any of the candidates. However, one candidate did pick up a couple of votes.

Charles Edward Justice finished with 182 votes, two more than had been reported on election night. The error was made during a tally of paper absentee ballots. Justice remained in fifth place.

Thursday's recanvass was a light-hearted affair, with members of the board jokingly comparing it to the presidential recount in Florida.

Fifth-graders urged to prepare for new immunization law now

A new state law has gone into effect that now requires that all students entering the sixth grade in the 2001-2002 school year must complete a series of three hepatitis B vaccines prior to enroll-

In order to make the completion of this series of shots as convenient as possible for parents and students, the Floyd County Health Department is working closely with the Floyd County Board of Education and area schools.

Resource center directors have made arrangements to have health department nurses visit each county elementary school in order to administer the series of shots on site to each fifth-grade student that needs to complete the series. Letters informing parents and guardians of the

new law are sent home in advance of scheduling with each fifth-grade student. In addition, followup telephone calls are also being made. Appointments should be made in advance and

a parent or guardian must be present with the stu-

dent at the time the shot is administered.

The hepatitis B vaccine is given in a series of three shots. The first shot is administered, and then a 30-day waiting period must pass before the administration of the second shot. The third, and final, shot is given five months later. In all, a period of six months is required to complete the

Because of the length of time required for the completion of the vaccination series, Jennifer Martin, health coordinator for the Floyd County Board of Education, urges parents to take advantage of the service being provided by the elementary school resource centers.

She estimates that it will take about 15 minutes to administer the shot at school as opposed to a much lengthier wait in a doctor's office. Also, the student is not counted absent if the shot is administered at school.

Students receiving the shot at school are charged no fee.

Students up to age 18 who receive the shot at the health department will be charged a nominal fee according to a sliding scale basis.

Carol Stumbo. "I'm not asking that you work harder, just that you examine what you need to do ... We've said that in some schools people are working very hard, but not with results.

May Valley representatives said they strive to get students motivated and to involve all students. They also stressed the teamwork among teachers. Principal Carole Combs said teachers meet together as a team to develop lesson plans.

Combs said a particular tool used for learning and communication is the "Friday Folder," which is sent home with students every Friday with a newsletter. Parents are asked to review the student's work, sign and return the folder.

Combs listed computers as among the school's "critical shortages." She said that of 24 computers in the computer lab, only 11 work. She also said the school needs an additional custodian and a program for talented and gifted students.

Board members teased Combs over her contagious enthusiasm and praised the atmosphere at the Martin school. District 1 board member Ross did, however, request that Combs make the school's mission statement "gender neutral," rather than using exclusively the masculine gender in referring to stu-

Principal Coy Sammons said that at 688. Prestonsburg High School has its smallest enrollment ever. The school, he indicated, has been dogged by problems going back several years before his tenure, but, he added, attendance and retention

rates do appear to be improving.

"Our past problems with attendance and discipline are being corrected," he said.

Teacher John Patton criticized the state system in which schools are funded based on average daily attendance. "In Kentucky, if we have attendance problems, they take away funding," he said, adding that the funds are needed to find ways to improve attendance.

"We have people who make laws who don't know anything about education," commented board chairman Terry Dotson.

Sammons emphasized that the school is determined to help teachers improve instruction. He said he sets aside professional development funds for teachers to get more "content-specific training.

Among the school's concerns, the principal said, are the improvement of test scores and attendance rates, as well as communication with parents and the community.

He added that the school needs furniture. Recent renovations, he said, left new, attractive rooms but no furniture. The need is particularly keen for teachers' desks, he said.

Dotson said that he might be able to help. "Let me remind that some companies can help," he said. 'Sometimes the board can't help, but someone in the area might."

Ross suggested that PHS explore Prestonsburg working with Community College on a program to provide dual credit, and Sammons said he and principals at the other county high schools are "in agreement" and plan to work with college administrators.

Sammons said his staff also recognizes the need to align the high school curriculum with the middle school. "Finding the time" is difficult, he said.

He added that the school needs to address the problems of transition of students from eighth to ninth grade. Dotson suggested that the high schools "may be able to use aides to ease the transition."

Jack Goodman, principal of Adams Middle School, made the final presentation of the evening. He reported on the progress of the consolidated plan, the implementation of reading across the curriculum, work on the equity plan and success of the school's

Homework Hot Line.

He said the staff is working on strategies to bring up test scores, which fell last spring. One strategy is the "advisor-advisee" program and new scheduling, which includes splitting the instruction of math and science, which had been taught in the same time block.

Another plan includes working more with feeder schools to align the curriculum.

Goodman drew expressions of concern when he said the school is abolishing the math and writing portfolios. "We were having students retained for not having polished portfolios," he said, adding that the students will still have a "working portfolio."

"I am concerned about the backward trend you seem to be on," said Carol Stumbo. "Have you had a chance to look at scores and revise your plan?"

Goodman responded that writing is not being de-emphasized. "Writing is going to be across the curriculum ... with more writing on

demand," he said. The principal added that the SBDM has overseen "a lot of posi-

tive changes. I don't see how we

can't see improvement in scores." As to needs, Goodman said he would like to have more teachers in specific areas, such as art and physical education. He also said he would like for teachers to have more paid days at the beginning of the school year, in which they can "meet together to plan" before classes start.

The Tuesday night meeting was part of an ongoing effort by the board to hear reports from all the schools in the system. The next report meeting will be Monday, November 20, at 6 p.m., at Adams Middle School.

Forty-five fifth-grade students were scheduled to receive their first shot in the series at the Prestonsburg Elementary Family Resource Center on Wednesday and Thursday. The school has 92 fifth-grade students.

Hepatitis B is a serious disease that can cause acute illness leading to loss of appetite, tiredness, diarrhea and vomiting, jaundice, and pain in muscles, joints, and stomach. It can also cause chronic illness that leads to liver damage

(cirrhosis), liver cancer and death. Hepatitis B vaccine can prevent cer vaccine because it can prevent

a form of liver cancer. Martin stresses that "this is a preventable disease" and further stresses the importance of vaccina-

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

Time to exhale basketball has returned

There was a lack of the pageantry one would expect last week with the return of the second most popular religion in Kentucky. The first is whichever one guides your spirit each day; the second is college basketball.

More writers than probably should have strained the use of a thesaurus to write about the majesty and mystique of baseball. Greats like Grantland Rice are still known for their depictions of football games as epic crusades rivaling the Battle of Yorktown.

The thrill of college basketball tends not to lend itself easily to the written word. Perhaps it is because baseball and football seem more calculating, a bit slower to build the pressure. Basketball is action — sometimes thunderous, sometimes artistic, but always a source of conversation in the bluegrass state.

When the University of Kentucky lost its first two games Thursday and Friday, the sound of desperate souls crashing to the earth could be heard across the state. UK fans take that sort of thing personally.

It is pointless to make a fuss that a school's basketball team gets too much attention. The University of Louisville football team recently pulled off a major upset of Southern Mississippi, while its basketball team has fallen in recent years from its lofty status as perennial national champion contender. But when the basketball team begins play this week, excitement in the state's largest city will be high.

Kentucky Wesleyan College and Brescia University have several fine athletic teams, but basketball is different. If you do not understand why, it is difficult to explain.

Sports writer Dave Kindred once tabbed basketball the "dream game in Kentucky," one in which every boy — and now many girls — pictures himself or herself hitting the winning basket as time expires, then leaping into a hysterical crowd.

Perhaps it is because so many Kentucky colleges have been so good at basketball for so long. Kentucky and Kentucky Wesleyan are upper echelon in championships at their level, while Murray State and Western Kentucky universities continue to be forces in their conferences.

But the appeal of college basketball in the bluegrass is more than just cheering for a winner. There is something within a native Kentuckian that needs basketball like he needs oxygen.

Election has been unusually interesting

Editor: Boy, what a week it's been!

As a longtime devotee of history and political science, I find this week's election exciting. No, all my favorites did not win, but what transpired and is still going on is a first for America.

I can't recall a situation where no matter who wins the presidency, we have a House and Senate that are divided almost 50-50. It seems like when you look at the nation as a whole, no clear mandate was given by the American people. Sixty-five percent of the populace considers themselves as moderates or conservatives, while only 20 percent consider themselves liberal. However, Al Gore got 50 percent of the vote, meaning a number of folks more conservative than Al didn't feel secure in voting for George W. Bush.

The sheer turnout at the polls Tuesday by the people kept Bush from winning, Gore did a good job in mobilizing and energizing the "base," which in the end offset the normally more interested conservative bloc. No matter what happens in Florida, a lot of people now realize that their vote is important and that just a few people can make a difference.

I was raised in Palm Beach County, where the debate over miscast ballots threatens to taint the election.

The machines and methods used to vote are the same as I used 20 years ago. You get a sheet with choices on it. You slide it into the rack and punch holes in the card next to whom you wish to vote for. You put your finished ballot in an envelope and stuff it in the ballot box. As in any state, if you make a mistake, you can get a new card and start over. Florida's ballot this year had four cards and if you needed to change any one or all of them, you could very easily. The crying after the fact leads me to believe that something is rotten.

First, let's examine those who claim they were "disenfranchised." The retired and largely Jewish population in South Florida is extremely active and knowledgeable regarding issues and politicians. Usually, 90 percent or more vote in every election. Their condo associations, voter groups, PACs and other organizations have tremendous clout in South Florida politics

and they are extremely well informed.

The supervisor of elections sent out sample ballots to all voters before the election. These other political groups and associations also mailed out ballots and checked who they supported. My dad, who is 85, got one. There is no way that many, if any, of these folks did not know what the ballot looked like or what number to select before they got into the voting booth.

I don't buy the fact that after 25-plus years of astute political activism, they suddenly got "dumb" when it came to the 2000 race, and even the political novice knows one cannot vote twice for the same position. This group is very well acquainted with voting, with absentee ballots and how to request a vote be invalidated so it can be changed. The ballot was set up by a bipartisan group of elected officials, so the charges of purposeful confusion don't hold water, either.

While the world watches Florida and Palm Beach County, what about irregularities in other areas? What about offering cigarettes, meals, etc. to homeless people to vote for your man? What about the sale of votes offered on the internet? What about polls being kept open two hours longer in heavily Democratic St. Louis so more people could vote? Sure, everyone has a right to vote, but the law states you must be in line when the polls close to do so. Bussing in folks after hours is not quite kosher in my book.

Anyway, it's been interesting and fun. One thing for sure, the new leader will have to be just that — a leader. He must be able to forge cooperation and foster communication between parties. He must put the good of the people over party goals and build a spirit of teamwork. I don't know if either Gore or Bush can do that, but God bless them as they try.

Here's a few ideas to settle the stalemate:

 Do like Europe does and have a coalition government with both Bush and Gore sharing the nation.

Let Clinton stay in a few months and set up a whole new election nationwide with no TV or radio ads, just one TV debate (so no more money will be wasted).

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


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
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


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Ky unemployment increases slightly

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Kentucky's September 2000 Kentucky's September unemployment rate goes along with the normal trend for this time of year," said Carlos Cracraft, the department's chief labor market analyst. 'Kentucky's unemployment rate has either increased slightly or remained the same from August to offset by gains in fabricated metal September for last 17 years."

Four of the nine major job sectors had employment increases in September, while five reported employment losses, Cracraft said.

The government sector led with an increase of 9,100 jobs in August. Local education added 10,400 positions and state educa-September. Those gains were somewhat offset by a 2,900-job loss in federal jobs and a decrease of 1,700 jobs in local government.

"Returning or new teachers and hourly workers such as bus drivers, cafeteria personnel, custodians and maintenance workers returned or were added to school payrolls during the first full month of the school year. Also, college and university faculty and students started or returned to jobs in September," Cracraft said.

Increased farm work from harvesting led to a jump of 5,900 jobs in the agriculture sector in September. The transportation, communications and public utilities sector had 300 more jobs in September with a majority being in the transportation section.

The mining and quarrying sector had 100 more jobs in September. The manufacturing secjobs in September with 1,700.

'September's losses were widespread with employment down in

goods," said Cracraft.

Job losses of 500 occurred in transportation equipment, 400 in electronic equipment, 300 in stone, clay and glass products, 200 in lumber and furniture, among other categories. The losses were partly products and industry machinery.

"Manufacturing employment has declined in Kentucky over the past year, primarily because of job losses in the textiles and apparel, tobacco products, and electronic equipment industries," Cracraft

The trade sector recorded 1,300 tion jobs rose by 3,800 in fewer jobs in September mainly in retail trade categories such as food stores (-1,500), eating and drinking establishments (-300), and building materials and garden supply stores (-200). Gains in the trade sector occurred in miscellaneous retail stores (700), and department stores

> The construction sector had 1,100 fewer positions in September than in August. Contractors in special trade categories such as concrete, electrical work and roofing had 1,000 less jobs, while general building contractors had 200 fewer positions in September. Heavy construction contractors, such as those in commercial building had 100 more jobs in September.

Kentucky's services sector reported a decline of 900 jobs in September. Even though there were increases in education services (900), health services (500), and business services (400) positions, tor recorded the largest decrease in amusement and recreation services (1,300), agricultural services (-500), jobs in hotels and other lodging places (-500), and jobs in memboth durable and nondurable bership organizations (-500) fell.

"The services sector still had the most job growth of any of Kentucky's job sectors over the past year," said Cracraft. "It had 17,400 more jobs in September 2000 than in September 1999."

Finance, insurance and real estate had 300 fewer jobs in September.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics monthly estimate of the number of employed Kentuckians for September 2000 was 1,916,229. This figure is down 17,825 from the 1,934,054 employed in August 2000, but up 26,150 from the 1,890,079 Kentuckians employed in September 1999.

The monthly estimate of the number unemployed of Kentuckians for September was 72,427. This figure is up 2,009 from the 70,418 unemployed in August 2000 and down 9,407 from the 81,834 Kentuckians unemployed in September 1999.

The monthly estimate of the number of Kentuckians in the civilian labor force for September was 1,988,656. This figure is down 15,816 from the 2,004,472 recorded in August 2000, but up 16,743 from the 1,971,913 recorded for September 1999

The civilian labor force includes non-military workers and unemployed Kentuckians who are actively seeking work. It does not include unemployed Kentuckians who have not looked for employment within the past four weeks.

Employment and unemployment statistics are based on estimates. They are compiled to indicate employment trends rather than actually to count numbers of people who are or are not working.







Prestonsburg Regional **IV Champions!**

Blackcats drive past Russell 21-0 behind Garza and Hyden

(This Friday night the Prestonsburg Blackcats will host the Breathitt County Bobcats in the championship game of Region IV, a game they have not played in since the 1993 season).

I remember the game so well. It was to be a match up between the state's top defensive ballclub of the year 1993 and one of the high profile teams of the same era.

Prestonsburg would host the Russell Red Devils in the championship game of Region IV. Coach Bill Letton's ballclub was the states leading defensive team and Russell was known for their running game behind a player known as Robert Brown. Brown came into the game as one of the state's top rusher with over 1,400 yard to his credit. Russell coach Ivan McGlone told me following the game that he expected better things against Prestonsburg.


"I thought we could play against Prestonsburg defensively," said the veteran Russell coach. "But we could not get anything and Jody Cornette was outstandgoing against them offensively."

'Front page fifties' exhibit opens at KHC

"Front Page Fifties," the Kentucky Historical Society's new temporary exhibit, will open December 9 at the Kentucky History Center in historic downtown Frankfort.

The exhibit will be a look at the sights, sounds and experiences that made the 1950s so memorable, from the birth of the Baby Boom generation to the Cold War to the decade's zany designs. "Front Page Fifties" will bring the era to life and help today's Kentuckians understand it through the front pages and headlines of the state's newspapers.

Artifacts, photographs, audio and video will bring this nostalgic era to life, a time when Kentuckians not only marched off to Korea, but participated in the birth of rock 'n' roll music, the suburban explosion and the growing civil rights movement.

Often recalled as a quiet period, 1950s Kentucky was a time and place of conflicting images, trends and realities. The post-war boom brought the growing middle class to the suburbs, while thousands of rural Kentuckians migrated to northern cities to find employment.

Rock 'n' roll displaced big band music as the choice of the young, while pioneers of bluegrass music such as Bill Monroe and the Osborne Brothers preserved the state's old-time acoustic traditions

Spectator sports reached a popularity and success rarely seen since. The fabulous Derby winner Citation became the first thoroughbred to win \$1 million.

The University of Kentucky was in the midst of unprecedented success in football and basketball, a time checkered by the resignation of football coach Paul "Bear" Bryant and the basketball team's point-shaving scandal. The basketball programs of the University of Louisville and Western Kentucky University were gaining prominence.

Kentucky was an interesting place in the 1950s. "Front Page Fifties" will bring to life the following themes of the decade: "How Hot Can a Cold War Get? Kentucky, Korea and the Red Menace," "The Move to Suburbia," "All Shook Up: Youth Culture Ascending," and "Cracks in the Wall: The Beginning of the End for Legal Segregation," and "King Cagers and Gridiron Giants: The Sports Section."

The exhibit runs from December 9, 2000-September 1, 2001.


Light show at the Breaks

News Of The Weird

Officials at the Paralympic Games, held in Sydney two weeks after the Olympics, said performance-enhancing drugs were a concern, certainly, but that some athletes with spinal-cord injuries presented yet another problem in their quest to get an edge. Some jabbed pins into their legs, or sat on tacks, or blocked their catheters to overfill their bladders, which research shows improves athletic performance (by raising blood pressure) by an average 10 percent. Even though such abuse is pain-free, it is dangerous, a Canadian team doctor told the Globe and Mail newspaper. "(B)ut," he said, "like every other athlete, (these abusers) feel invincible.'

The New England Journal of Medicine reported in October on apparently the first-ever transfer of a food-poisoning virus during a football game. Florida State beat Duke, 62-13, in the 1998 game, but 43 nauseous Duke players and assistants got some measure of revenge by inadvertently making 11 FSU players violently ill during and after the game by passing the virus via their unwashed hands and the fresh vomit on their own uniforms. The cause was contaminated turkey sandwiches.

Re-release of the 1973 movie "The Exorcist" in September is but one event fueling a recent flurry of Satan-dispatch-

ing attempts. The Catholic Archdiocese of Chicago revealed in September 2000 that it had, for the first time, appointed a full-time exorcist. And the Vatican revealed in September that Pope John Paul II had failed in his own exorcism of a 19-year-old woman after the church's chief exorcist had also failed. And in a July investigative piece, the New York Post reported that the \$1 billion annual donations worldwide to the Universal Church of the Kingdom of God (Brazilbased, but with 15,000 members in the United States) are made largely under the church-created fear that such giving is the only way to obtain exorcisms. ...

CREME DE LA WEIRD

Bismarck, North Dakota, police reported in October that a man recently telephoned two fast food restaurants posing as a police officer and instructed the manager to strip-search employees for contraband. The caller's persuasiveness caused an adult male to strip for a female manager and an adult female to strip for a male manager.

An unidentified man was finally caught by police in August, in Stafford County, Virginia, after two years of sightings in which he would lie on mountain-bike trails camouflaged with dirt and leaves in hopes (sometimes successful) of getting run over by an all-terrain vehicle. (Last October, according to one sighting, he staggered away from such an incident, bloodied.) The man, who lives in Burke, Virginia, was not arrested but was ordered to stay off bike trails.

GOVERNMENT IN ACTION

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is now formally considering (following a public comment period that ended in September) new regulations that would reduce the minimum size of Swiss cheese holes in Grade A cheese from 11/16ths of an inch in diameter to 3/8th of an inch. The dairy industry said it could provide the cheese more efficiently if the holes were smaller.

Heavy-Handed Regulatory Reform: A sausage factory owner grew tired of repeated visits by federal food-safety inspectors and, according to police, shot three of them dead (San Leandro, California, June). A man angry at his treatment at a Social Security office opened fire, killing a guard (Sacramento, California, September). Two city officials were shot dead by a homeowner when they tried to cross his property to attend to a sewer problem (Bunker, Missouri, September). Five Miami-area homeowners, fearful they will lose their trees, have been charged in 2000 with brandishing guns at state inspectors looking for an infectious citrus disease.



After last week I've probably got everyone wondering how it could be bad for a
breed of dog to be labeled positively.
"Popular," "smart," "friendly," "elegant,"
"good with children"—these are all labels
placed on certain breeds that have resulted
not only in negative consequences for individual dogs, but have sometimes nearly
destroyed entire breeds.

One of the best examples of this occurred within the past few years with Dalmatians. Of course, those pups were so cute and so smart in the movie; everyone wanted one. Well, Dalmatians are cute, and they are smart; they are also active to the point of being hyper, extremely strong, eas-

ily distracted, can be a little difficult to train, and some are aggressive. Several health problems plague the breed, most notably deafness and kidney trouble.

Responsible breeders know all these things, and they work hard to produce healthy and even-tempered dogs. This takes lots of work, years of study, and a thorough knowledge of their chosen breed. Unfortunately, there were unscrupulous dog breeders and inexperienced people who saw dollar signs in the public's clamor for Dalmatians. Instead of taking time to educate would-be owners, these people basically bred

and sold anything with spots.

The incidence of health problems increased, because the breeders were not removing affected and carrier dogs from their breeding programs; temperaments also deteriorated. This, coupled with the fact that many of the new owners were not being prepared for some of the special needs of this breed, led to mass disappointment with these dogs.

Dalmatians started showing up in shelters in droves; every newspaper carried "free to good homes" ads for adult Dalmatians. Ethical Dalmatian breeders grilled prospective owners with the fervor of the Spanish Inquisition. The entire breed is still reeling from the episode.

This is why St. Bernard breeders were less than enchanted with Beethoven, and why Chichauhua people shuddered every

time they heard "!Yo quiero Taco Bell." I suspect Border Collie, Golden Retriever and Shetland Sheepdog people have mixed emotions about how well their breeds are doing in the televised

are doing in the televised Agility Trials on Animal Planet.

Once again, I am not breed-bashing. All of these dogs can be wonderful companions in the right setting, and if their owner knows ahead of time what they are getting

The best advice I know to give people

when they are interested in a certain breed is to find out all they can about it. The first question you need to ask is "what was this dog originally bred to do?" The characteristics that helped the dog perform that task are the ones that would have been emphasized in the breeding.

For instance, most people are totally unaware that Dalmatians were originally bred as bird dogs. For bird hunting, a dog needs to be strong, energetic, very prey-oriented, able to focus quickly on anything that moves, and somewhat independent, so he can make decisions in the field. Dals got away from these roots as they became companions to horse-drawn carriages and fire trucks; eventually they became best known as firehouse mascots.

Knowing the background, however, better prepares you for a puppy who is going to need lots of exercise, training and patience.

I often get calls about "behavior problems" in dogs that are nothing more than an owner who was not aware of what their pet was bred for. People who want their Labrador Retrievers to stop carrying off and chewing on their possessions, and those who are upset because her Terrier is digging holes, have to first be helped to understand that those behaviors are genetically "hardwired" in those breeds. Chances are, they can't be eliminated, just channeled into was the distraught lady who had bought a Border Collie, because she wanted a lap dog.

Dog shows are another good place to find out about different breeds. Exhibitors are often happy to discuss their breed if you are considerate and find out when they might have time to ask. Just looking at the dogs will help, too.

Which group (Sporting, Non-sporting, Hound, Terrier, Working, Herding or Toy) is your chosen breed shown in? That will give you a clue about the breed's basic personality. Remember, though, that every dog is an individual, and there's going to be some variation.

Check out also how much maintenance is going to be required for your breed. My friend Anita had fallen in love with Bearded Collies—until she saw one "in the fur." She knew they had a lot of hair, but not that much!

This works even if you have a mixed breed dog or are considering one at the shelter. By identifying the predominant breed or breeds present, you can make an educated guess about the dog's temperament.

In summary, don't impulsively choose a breed, because it's cute or the most popular, or shy away from one because you've heard something negative about it. Do your homework, know what you're getting into, and honestly ask yourself, like Anita did, whether you are prepared to deal with the challenges of that breed. Both you and your dog will be happier if you do this.







Combine 1 1/2 cups hot water and 1/3 cup melted butter in medium bowl. Carefully pour over top of batter (do not mix). Bake for 40 to 55 minutes or until gingerbread is cracked on top and toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Serve warm with ice cream, if desired.

Pumpkin ice cream is wonderful served with this cake. It is easily made by stirring 1/3 cup brown sugar, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg and I cup cooked pumpkin into 1 quart softened vanilla ice cream. Free until firm.

Bread dough should rise in warm, draft free place. To ensure that your dough has doubled in size, press 2 fingers lightly and quickly into dough. The indentions should remain.

Gravy

A new way with old-fashioned gravy

by Dana Jacobi from the American Institute for Cancer Research

For beginning cooks, gravy making is one of the more challenging parts of preparing a traditional holiday meal. Even experienced cooks find the last-minute steps stressful trying to drain off and separate the fat and pan juices, and make enough of a lump-free gravy—all the while juggling to get the dinner to the table.

Today, along with these concerns, we face the nutritional nightmare of the fat content of a classic gravy made with pan drippings and flour. Using pan juices alone, without added fat and flour, is always a possibility, but I would hardly call it

To keep all three traditional ingredients—because nothing beats the flavor and silken texture they create here is a recipe for a healthier version, in abundant amount. You can make it one or two days ahead, or assign its preparation to someone else and reduce your stress level.

There are two keys to this simple, good gravy. The first is using a really rich stock. The second is thickening it by pureeing some of the vegetables used to make the stock.

If you are roasting a very big bird, you can use the parts normally reserved for gravy—the neck, giblets and wing tips—plus extra wings. But this means cooking the broth while the bird is in the oven—essentially, at the last minute. Instead, I prefer buying about four extra wings and using them to make the stock a day or more ahead.

Another reason I like this gravy is that you end up with extra stock. This comes in handy for making more gravy, if necessary, for the leftovers. It also gives you the base for a lovely turkey and rice soup.

Rich Turkey Gravy Turkey Broth

2 pounds turkey parts, including neck, wings, thighs and giblets 1 medium carrot, peeled

and sliced 1 celery stalk, halved

crosswise

1 medium leek, chopped

1 large onion, quartered 1 small parsnip, peeled and sliced

3-4 sprigs flat-leaf parsley sprigs 2 large garlic cloves Gravy

2 cups turkey broth 1 Tbsp. turkey fat

2 Tbsp. all-purpose flour salt and freshly ground pepper

For the broth, combine turkey parts, carrot, celery, leek, onion, parsnip, parsley and garlic in a large pot. Add 12 cups water. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer gently for 2 hours. During the first 30 minutes, skim off any foam that rises to the surface.

Strain broth into a bowl. Reserve carrot, onion, parsnip and garlic. Discard other vegetables and turkey. Cool broth to room temperature. Refrigerate, overnight if necessary, until fat congeals. Lift off fat, using a spoon, and reserve it in a small bowl.

Puree reserved carrot, onion and parsnip in blender or food processor, along with 1/2 cup of turkey broth. Blend in remaining broth.

Heat the tablespoon of turkey fat in a saucepan. Using a wooden spoon, mix in flour, which will gather into a soft ball with the fat. Cook, stirring constantly, over medium heat until mixture is fluffy and looks moist, about 2 minutes. Slowly whisk in 1/4 cup broth/puree until mixture is smooth. Add remaining puree. Bring gravy to a boil, then immediately remove from heat. Season gravy with salt and pepper to taste. Pour gravy into a gravy boat.

Makes a total of 2 3/4 cups, or 11 individuals servings, each containing 43 calories and 1 gram of fat.

2 cups hot scalded milk 2 Tbsp. melted shortening


1/4 cup molasses 1 pkg. active dry yeast 3/4 cup raisins


1 tsp. cinnamon 1-1/2 tsp. salt 6 cups flour

In a large mixing bowl, combine milk, shortening and molasses; allow to cool until lukewarm. Add yeast and let stand 5 minutes. Stir in raisins,

cinnamon and salt. Add flour, a small amount at a time, mixing well after each addition until a stiff dough forms. Knead on a lightly floured board until smooth and elastic. Cover with a warm, damp cloth and let rise in a warm place until doubled in bulk. Punch down; let rise again until doubled in bulk. Form dough into three loaves and place in well-greased loaf pans. Cover and let rise again until doubled in bulk. Bake at 400 degrees for 45 minutes or until golden brown.









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


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
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
