Jackson pleads guilty to burglary

A Garrett man opted to plead guilty rather than stand trial on burglary charges Monday morning in Floyd Circuit Court. Ollie Michael Jackson, 23, faced charges of two counts of third-degree burglary and one count of theft by unlawful taking. The incidents leading to the charges occurred on a property located on Turkey Creek near Route 680. Contained on the property were one storage building and some unoccupied homes. Jackson was accused of taking several tools, including welding equipment, from the buildings. Commonwealth's Attorney Brent Turner said that he was completely prepared for trial when Jackson entered an open plea of guilty to the charges against him. "Basically," said Turner, "he chose to"

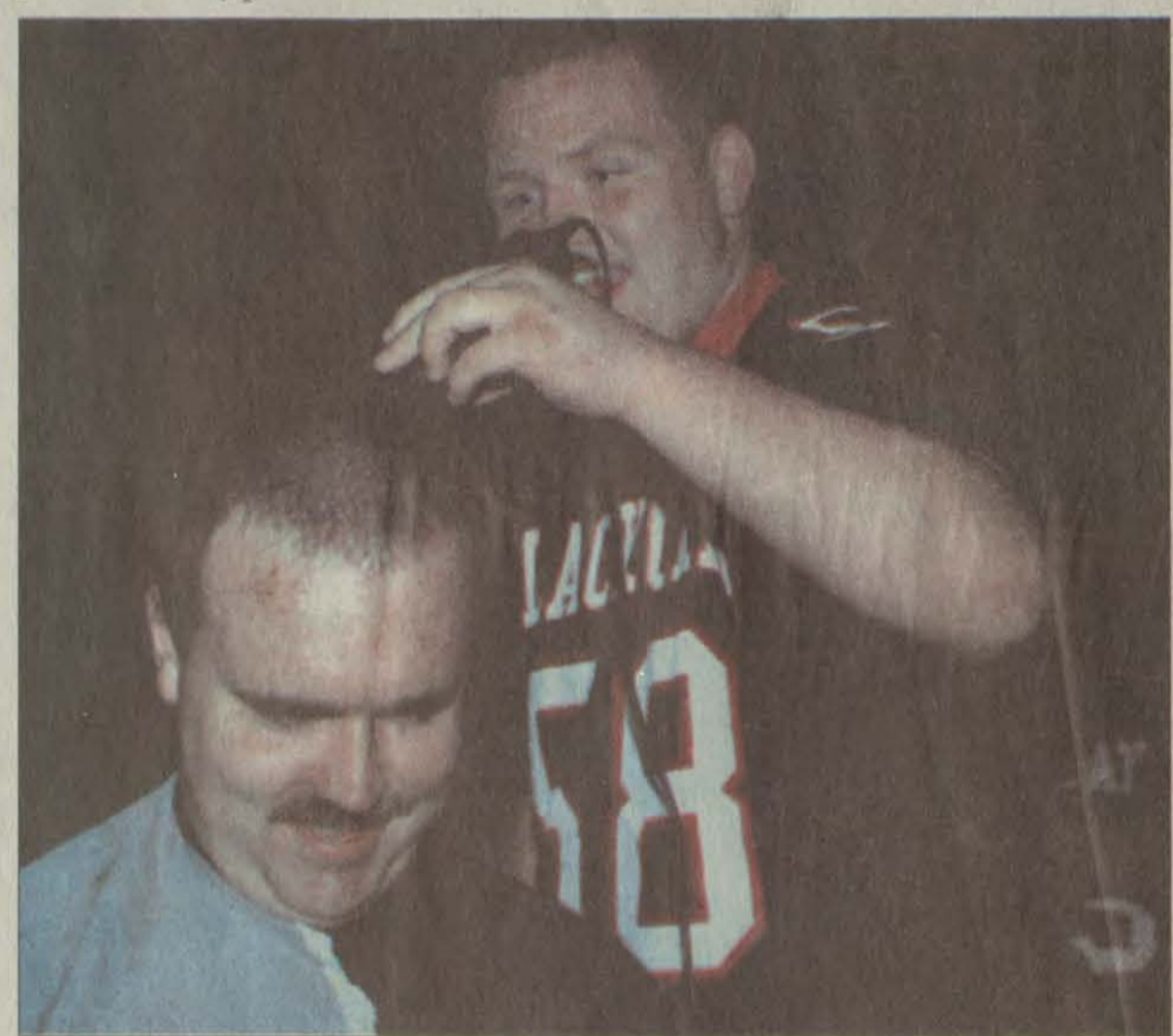

Fiscal court moves forward with project to build community center

A countywide community center to be built in the city of Martin is one step closer to reality as the Floyd County Fiscal Court took steps Wednesday to get the project underway. Commissioners unanimously approved two resolutions authorizing County Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson to sign agreements which will allow \$1.4 million state funding to be released to start the project. Phase I of the project involves the purchase and renovation of the old RND Building along Route 80 in Martin. The total to be spent on the project's first phase is \$929,500. Plans call for \$496,500 to be spent on the project's second phase, which includes money for one year's salaries and general expenses. The project will be funded entirely by the state. During the meeting, Thompson described the proposed center as "sort of a miniature YMCA" with an emphasis on giving young people something to do in an attempt to keep them away from drugs. The center will include offices, a gymnasium, pool tables and a computer room. The agreements must now receive approval from a legislative subcommittee before work can begin. Thompson said he hopes to have that approval in December, allowing work to begin in January. He speculated the center would be ready to open by mid-2001. In other news, the court: ■ Gave initial approval to an \$88,244 budget amendment to take into account unanticipated funding for road materials. ■ Agreed to pay \$28,250 to Hamilton Construction and \$15,000 to C.O.E.X. for work on a completed project at Calf Creek. All members were present for Wednesday's special meeting.

Judge demands explanation from DUI defendant, attorney no-shows

While it's not too common, the failure of a defendant to show up for his trial happens often enough to be routine. What is less common and far from routine is for the defendant and his attorney to both not show up for trial. But that's exactly what happened Tuesday in a drunk driving case in Floyd District Court. John Friend of Pikeville was scheduled to go to trial Tuesday morning on a charge of second-offense DUI. The charge resulted from Friend's arrest in Harold, after he registered a blood-alcohol level of 0.234. However, both Friend and his lawyer, Robert Wright of Pikeville, were no-shows. That lapse proved costly for Friend, and perhaps for Wright as well. District Judge James Allen went ahead with the trial, despite the absence of the defendant. Friend was found

TOPS helps ease move from welfare to work

Another session of the "TOPS" program got underway locally on November 13 under the instruction of Alan Steidlitz, career counselor. "TOPS" is a program that is conducted under the auspices of Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program Inc., which is operated in conjunction with the Big Sandy Area Community Action Program. The primary focus of the program is to reduce dependency on welfare subsidies and create and maintain self-sufficiency in persons that have previously received public assistance. Each participant receives a workbook of materials and Steidlitz conducts classroom lectures throughout the eight weeks of the program. He also invites guest lecturers to the workshop who speak

Documentary examines Hitler's fascination with myths

History meets Indiana Jones in "Hitler's Search for the Holy Grail," airing Monday, November 27, at 10 p.m. on KET. Fictionalized as the basis of Steven Spielberg's first film in the Indiana Jones trilogy, there was, in fact, a Nazi archaeological unit that sent teams across the world in an effort to find the Grail during World War II.

Hosted by Michael Wood, the program explores how history was

used as a Nazi political tool and how the racist theories used by the Schutzstaffel (SS) to justify genocide were selectively drawn from archaeology, myth and legend.

Nazi ideas about the Aryan "master race," for example, were adapted from legends about the Holy Grail and the lost city of Atlantis—a purported origin of the Aryan race—which were deemed proof of the supposed mythical greatness of the German people.

"Hitler's Search for the Holy Grail," contains rare and previously unseen footage, including color film of the Nazi archaeological expedition to Antarctica, documentary evidence of expeditions to Peru, Iceland and Iran and footage of SS chief Heinrich Himmler at archaeological sites.

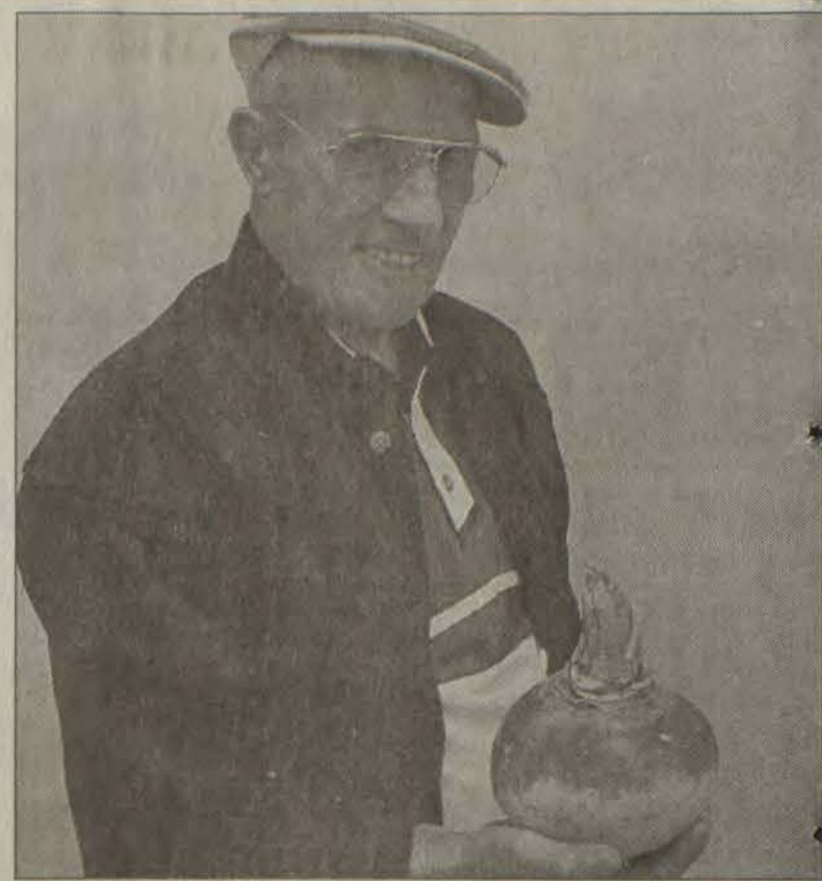
The documentary also includes interviews with associates of the SS and a recording of the Nuremberg Trial of Wolfram

Sievers, head of the Ahnenerbe ("Ancestral Heritage Society"), the SS archaeological and historical unit.

The Ahnenerbe ended with the suicides of Hitler and Himmler and the execution of Sievers by a war crimes tribunal. However, many of the unit's top archaeologists returned, unpunished, to university life—only to re-emerge as leading academics in postwar Germany.

New students must have eyes checked

A new law has been passed by the 2000 Kentucky General Assembly that requires children entering the public school system for the first time during the 2000-2001 school year to have a complete eye examination, not just a screening, by January 1.

The eye examination must be conducted by a licensed optometrist or ophthalmologist.

The law focuses on those children entering public Heads Start programs and public pre-school (kindergarten), for the first time this year. It targets the 3-, 4- and 5-year-old age groups. However, any student coming from private schools and entering public schools for the first time this year, regardless of age, will also be required to have the eye exam and complete the necessary form.

An official form, the Kentucky Eye Examination for School Entry, must be completed and turned in to the child's school by January 1.

The law was enacted as part of the Governor's Early Childhood Initiative.

In studying early childhood development, the Kentucky General Assembly identified problems with vision as an important factor limiting children's abilities to learn and succeed. It was found that up to 13 percent of children birth to 5 years of age, have some type of vision condition. This increases to 25 percent of children above age 5.

The law is an effort to ensure that Kentucky's children have their eyes examined in their early years in order to detect and correct any vision problems that may be exhibited.

Any complete eye exam done at any time prior to the child's entry into school will meet the requirement. However, the exam needs to be reported on the Kentucky Eye Examination Form for School Entry. If the exam was done prior to 3 years of age, it is recommended, but not required, that another eye exam be given at 5 years of age in order to determine whether the child's vision has changed.

Financial assistance is available to help pay for the eye examinations. Medicaid and Kentucky's Child Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) will cover these services, if the family meets eligibility requirements. Also, funds have been set aside to assist children who are neither Medicaid or KCHIP eligible, and whose families do not

have the resources to pay for the cost of the eye exam.

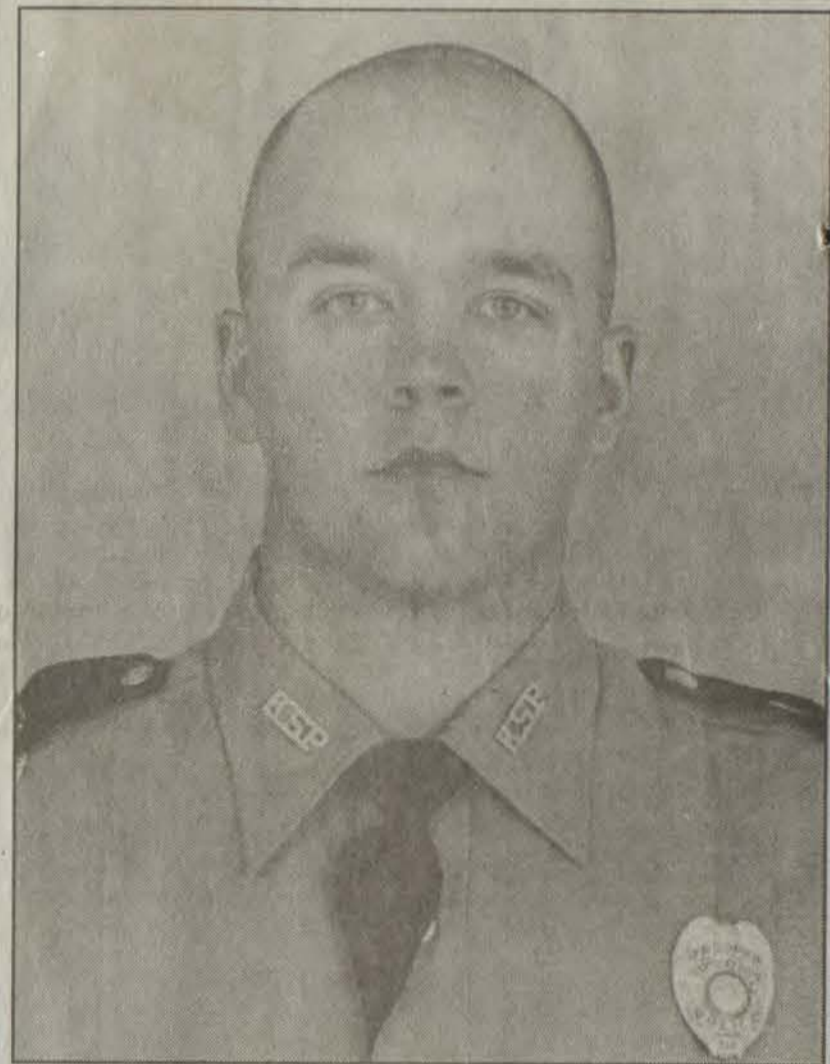

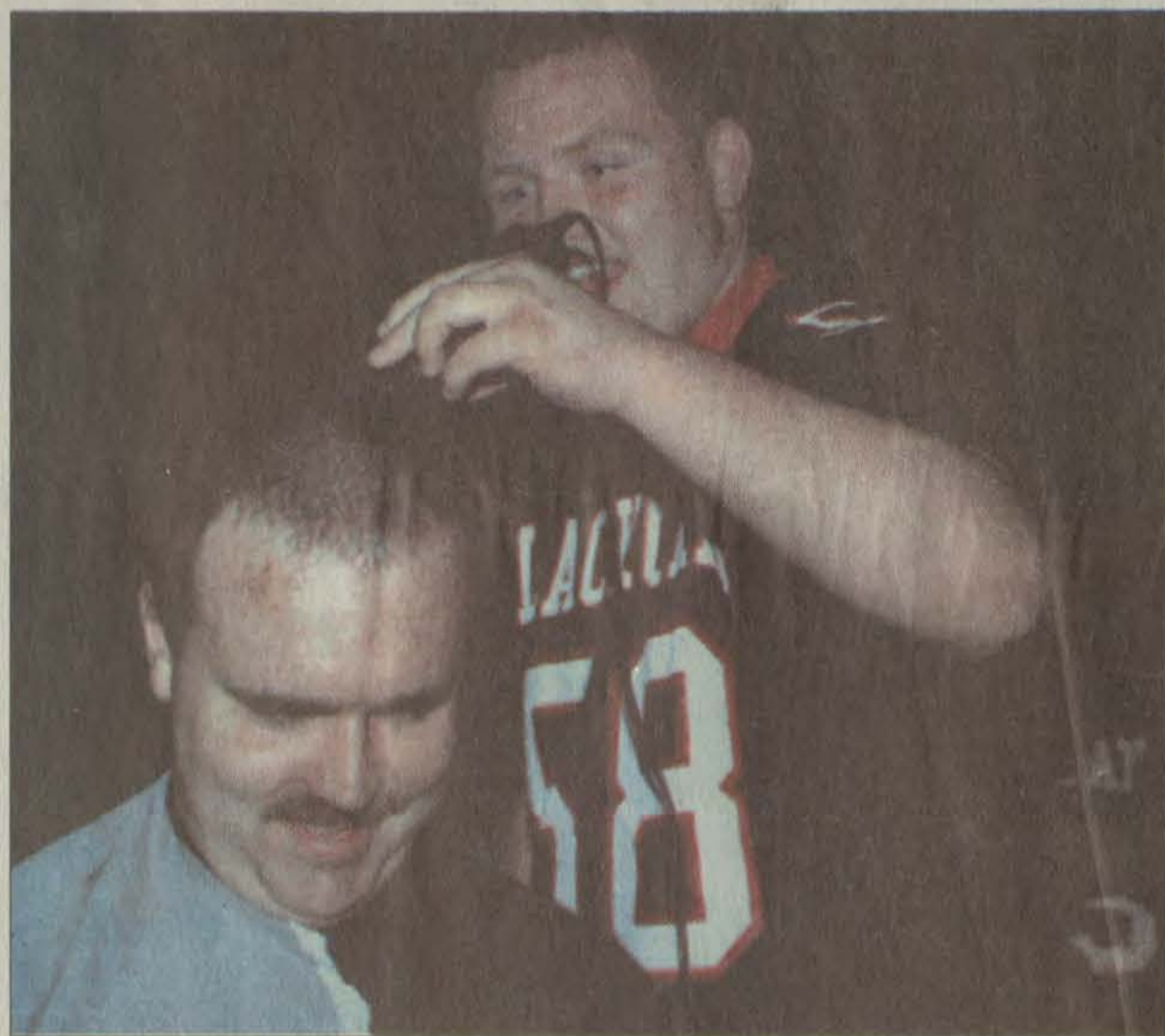

The primary focus of the program is to reduce dependency on welfare subsidies and create and maintain self-sufficiency in persons that have previously received public assistance.

Each participant receives a workbook of materials and Steidlitz conducts classroom lectures throughout the eight weeks of the program. He also invites guest lecturers to the workshop who speak

on a wide range of subjects.

Initially, participants are engaged in an orientation program, leading into classroom lectures and discussions on various job attainment skills and interview techniques.

Among the topics covered are self-assessment, first impressions, networking, communication skills, listening skills, interpersonal skills, assertiveness vs. aggression, self-esteem, transferable skills, goal setting, job applications, resumes, interview skills, job preparedness, attainment of goals and tips on remaining self-sufficient.

Those participating in the current session say that they all get along well together and enjoy the materials presented to them. Several made comments concerning how much better they feel after just one week of participation in the program.

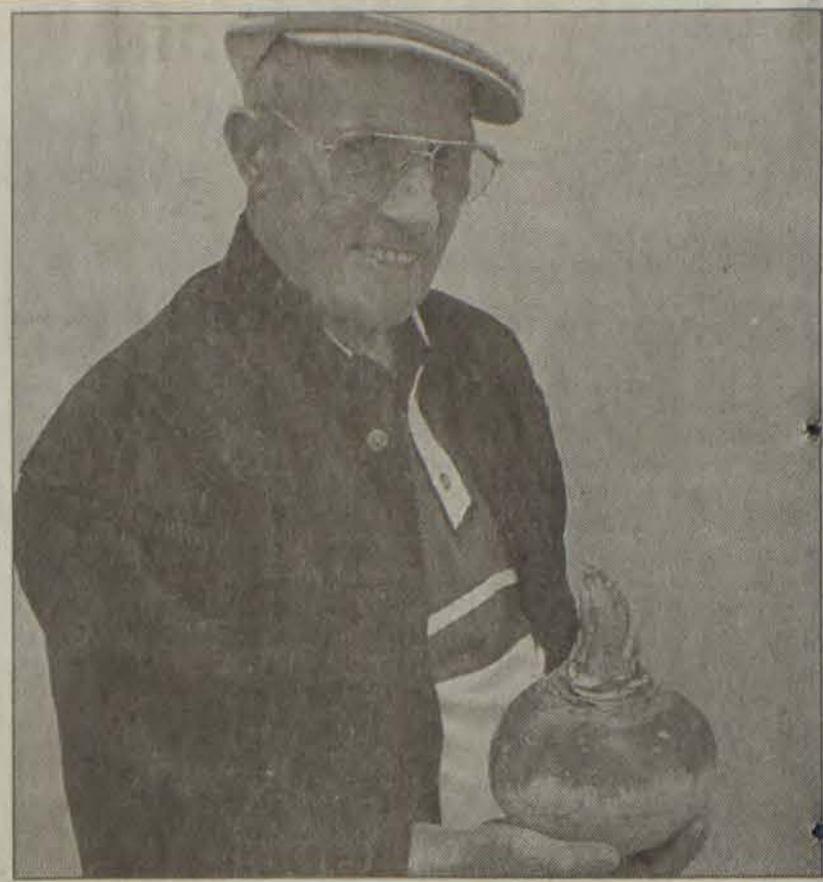

Any complete eye exam done at any time prior to the child's entry into school will meet the requirement. However, the exam needs to be reported on the Kentucky Eye Examination Form for School Entry. If the exam was done prior to 3 years of age, it is recommended, but not required, that another eye exam be given at 5 years of age in order to determine whether the child's vision has changed.

Financial assistance is available to help pay for the eye examinations. Medicaid and Kentucky's Child Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) will cover these services, if the family meets eligibility requirements. Also, funds have been set aside to assist children who are neither Medicaid or KCHIP eligible, and whose families do not

have the resources to pay for the cost of the eye exam.

The Kentucky Vision Project also offers free eye exams and glasses to low-income families.

Kentucky's new day

The recruitment of William Brundage to head the Patton administration's "new economy initiative" signals a new day in Kentucky, in more ways than one way.

As governor, Paul Patton has insisted on looking at programs strategically and selling them as part of a coordinated effort to make life better in the commonwealth over the next couple of decades.

Just as the General Assembly asked Kentuckians to accept drastic change, and commit real money, to the KERA elementary and secondary school reform that offered a payoff over decades instead of over the weekend, Gov. Patton urged forbearance on expecting a payoff from his historic overhaul of higher education.

Kentucky has a long history of judging politicians by how much blacktop they laid last week, when the weather was good. But Gov. Patton has promoted investments in education and technology that he knew wouldn't pay off fast enough to make good brags in re-election commercials.

Now he has brought in Mr. Brundage, who has outstanding credentials for overseeing the new Kentucky Innovations Commission and who also has the right kind of patient approach. The Kansas City academic promises to make some things pop quickly, but he warns, wisely, that "the real payoff is going to take you a decade or two."

Other states already have been working hard to help universities, tech schools, med schools, hospitals, research institutions and area industries conspire and cooperate. They must, if the new information-based, high-tech economy is going to flourish.

And it's not too late for Kentucky to have that kind of success, as it did not in the last century. Mr. Brundage knows what such progress looks like, because he has helped move Kansas City toward some of it in the life sciences.

The challenge is broader and deeper in this state, with its enduring rural culture that's based on tobacco and coal, both of which are in trouble . . . and with its bad attitude toward things intellectual and academic.

But it's a new day in the coalfields and the tobacco patch. The economic facts on the ground, and under the ground, have changed. Maybe attitudes will, too.

Gov. Patton has even changed the metaphor. In explaining the direction of the "new economy initiative," he said Kentucky must "skate where the puck's going to be." You know it's a new day around here when the Governor invokes hockey instead of hoops.

Kentucky 4-H: Education and more

More than 240,000 youth take part in educational programs and activities offered by Kentucky 4-H/Youth Development.

4-H is primarily for youth ages 9 through 19 years old. However, nutrition education programs are available for children beginning at age 5 and continuing through age 19.

The 4-H mission is to create opportunities and supportive environments enabling culturally diverse youth and adults to become capable, competent and caring citizens.

4-H programs are developed by county extension agents and state extension specialists of the Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service. Each county has at least one local agent. Most state specialists have headquarters on the University of Kentucky campus. As extension personnel, we work in cooperation with volunteer leaders, community organizations and local and federal governments.

We develop educational programs and activities geared to the interests and needs of all youth in our county. Input from the county 4-H council helps us develop educational opportunities based on our particular local situation and citizens' interests.

The multifaceted 4-H programs help youth become more productive citizens.

These programs serve as a stimulus for positive changes to help citizens adapt to a diverse and changing society. The emphasis is on building skills and developing effective outcomes through various lessons promoting lifelong learning, positive values and social responsibility. To accomplish these missions, 4-H offers many subject areas including natural resources, food and nutrition, animal and plant sciences, health and safety, citizenship and communications.

In addition to programs for youth, 4-H/Youth Development encourages adults and teenagers to become volunteer leaders. Last year, more than 25,000 adult and teen volunteers provided leadership to the 4-H program in Kentucky. Working with extension professionals across the commonwealth, these volunteers filled diverse roles ranging from coordinating activities and events to serving as leaders of community-based clubs.

Lawmakers take closer look at tobacco contracting

Kentucky Tobacco Sales auction warehouse in Horse Cave opened its doors to farmers, buyers and state legislators yesterday as the opening day of tobacco sales kicked off in Kentucky.

Growers received a market average of \$1.95 per pound for burley on opening day, compared to the \$2.02 per pound average that growers have received from Philip Morris's pilot contracting program since early November.

The legislative Tobacco Task Force met in Cave City after visiting the auction warehouse to discuss the pros and cons of contracting with farmers and industry leaders.

Tobacco groups like Kentucky Farm Bureau and the Council on Burley Tobacco told lawmakers

they would like to see federal legislation passed that would make tobacco contracts more user-friendly. The proposed legislation, supported by 16 states' attorneys general, would require that the contracts be written in plain language, not legalese, and disclose financial risk. Another provision, said Council on Burley Tobacco President William Fritz, would make it an unfair practice for companies to retaliate against producers for their marketing choice.

Some legislators were surprised to hear Kentucky Farm Bureau Public Affairs director Patrick Jennings say that KFB supports contracting legislation for all Kentucky's agriculture commodities.

"A framework protects the pro-

ducer and the company as well," said Jennings. "We want a unified message for all agricultural products."

Task Force Chairman Sen. Vernie McGaha, R-Russell Springs, said testimony from the meeting would be used to complete the task force's report on contracting due by Dec. 15. The report, not a recommendation, is required by 2000 Senate Bill 49 which directs the task force to study tobacco contracting and purchasing. SB 49 also requires the task force to study the effect of contracting on the federal Tobacco Price Support Program and small farmers.

It is the General Assembly's intent, according to SB 49, to support the price support program and small tobacco farmers.

Allen County farmer Al Pedigo told the task force that he would like both the federal program and contracting to continue. Farmers will receive \$10 to \$12 more per hundred pounds "on the bottom line" this year because of contracting, said Pedigo.

"When the farmers looked at this opportunity, the first thing they looked at was price," Pedigo said. "Contracting is a big change in the way we market our tobacco. The most important thing we can do is let that change work."

Patton orders heating assistance

In anticipation of higher prices for natural gas and heating oil in the winter season, Gov. Paul Patton has called on public utilities and the public to work together to provide some safeguards against undue utility cutoffs.

"As gas prices have risen, public concerns have been voiced nationwide about how long these higher prices will last, if there is enough gas supply to meet the demand, and the impact these increases will have on winter heating bills," the governor said.

"With the cooperation I'm calling for today, no Kentuckian should have to make the choice between food or heat, medication or heat, suffering disconnection because the bill was too high. With everyone's cooperation, no Kentucky home should be cold this winter."

Several months ago, Patton asked the Public Service Commission, the Cabinet for Families and Children, and the Natural Resources Cabinet to hold

hearings and identify the needs and the programs available in Kentucky to help families with the expected increase in their winter heating bills.

Patton said, "Out of these hearings, we found a willingness among all of our natural gas utilities to work with customers who are having trouble paying their bills. These utilities understand that with prices as high as they are, many customers will be having trouble this season paying the higher bills."

But, the governor emphasized, "no utility can help you if you do not contact them. If you're having trouble with your bill, contact your utility and set up a payment plan that will keep your gas service on, while allowing you to pay installments on the bill that work within your budget."

The governor also issued an Executive Order giving utilities more responsibility in ensuring low-income households qualifying for assistance

receive that help this winter. Under the order, utilities are to work with state agencies to develop a procedure to ascertain whether a customer near cutoff for nonpayment qualifies for any low-income winter assistance.

Additionally, the governor said he wrote President Clinton in September requesting early release of Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) funds to allow the Cabinet for Families and Children to increase the benefit to each household.

As a result of that request, Kentucky did receive about \$4.7-million of early released funds that will allow CFC to increase the benefit by 25 percent to low-income households that use natural gas, propane, fuel oil and kerosene for heating.

Gov. Patton also outlined a number of steps that people can take to avoid a utility cutoff and prepare for the winter heating bills ahead.

- Turn down your thermostat.
- Seal air leaks in windows or doors with caulk or plastic.
- Wrap your water heater with insulation.
- Lower the temperature setting on your water heater.
- Add insulation, especially in the attic.
- Fix leaky water pipes.
- Heat only occupied spaces.
- If you have a manufactured home, use skirting around the base.
- Check to make sure ductwork is sealed and does not leak.
- Make sure you gas heating systems are adjusted correctly, call a service technician if there is a concern.

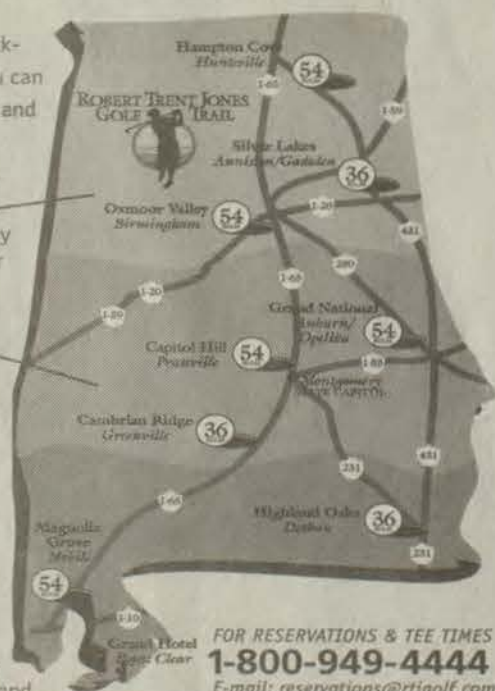

And the winner is...

In the history of elections — Presidential or otherwise — this has had to be the weirdest race ever run. Nearly two weeks after the final vote was entered, we still don't know who the official President of the United States is going to be. Amid voter fraud concerning absentee ballots and hand-counted ones, and concession's speeches by Gore and semi-acceptance speeches by Bush, Americans have once again been bombarded by the media with more information than they ever wanted to know.

Being the daughter of a former politician, the controversy over recounts and absentee ballots doesn't surprise me. The first time my father was elected county court clerk he won by two votes; a recount made him a winner by three. During the counting of absentee ballots after his second election, Chick Carroll threatened to do harm to the next person who didn't count Daddy's votes correctly.

As perplexing as all this election sense and nonsense is, I was so mesmerized by the political process which took place in Missouri it left me speechless (and for those of you who know me, that's almost a medical impossibility). What I'm referring to is the campaign victory of a dead man!

Born and reared as an eastern Kentuckian, I am used to hearing stories that dead people had cast votes and that even farm animals like mules and horses have enjoyed the privilege of casting a ballot on occasion. But for a dead person to win an election — I was genuinely shocked! Let's give this some thought.

It's one thing to put your confidence in a living, breathing candidate whom you trust will do the right thing once he or she is elected; but to place all your bets on a dead man calls for an awful lot of hope. I'll be the first to admit that it's hard enough to tell if some politicians are really alive when they're in office. (I heard this was the case with Calvin Coolidge.) Some legislators leave for Washington and their constituents never hear from them again until they receive an envelope in the mail asking for a campaign contribution. That's when the elected officials acknowledge that there are warm bodies out there somewhere waiting to vote. But actually electing a dead person to

represent you seems slightly out of the ordinary. OK, let's try and be realistic. The man's widow is going to be representing him in Congress. That's been done many times before like in the situation where Sonny Bono's wife, Mary, completed his term after he was killed in a skiing accident. Episode One, Ancient Fires at Cliff Palace Pond, examines landmark research on Kentucky's first forest managers. Episode Two, The Adena

People: Moundbuilders of Kentucky, explores the legacies of the Adena people whose ancient culture is renowned for massive burial mounds. Episode Three, Saving a Kentucky Time Capsule, documents efforts to preserve dozens of ancient American Indian mud glyphs (drawings) discovered deep inside a Kentucky cave.

Support for the production of these programs was received from the USDA Forest Service, Kentucky Heritage Council, Kentucky Archaeological Survey, Kentucky Arts Council, Kentucky Humanities Council, and Voyageur Media Group Inc.

NEWS OF THE WEIRD

The attorney for alleged San Francisco dog-abuser Steven Maul said in November that Maul only bit the dog in the neck as part of an unorthodox but loving discipline method and that in fact Maul "is very oral" and "has French-kissed his dog." According to a report in the San Francisco Chronicle, Boo, an 80-pound Lab, had darted out into traffic in November (again), and Maul, intending to teach against that, clamped down on Boo's neck in a way he said dogs signal dominance to each other, but did not break the skin. (Researchers have written about bite-training, but the method is currently far out of favor.)

In October, Rev. Derek McAleer revealed to his 350 small-town St. Marys (Georgia) United Methodist parishioners that their church had become the recipient of what is believed to be the largest one-time church donation in history: \$50 million from the estate of the recently deceased man who founded the local telephone company. Actually, the donor, Warren Bailey, was a long-time church supporter but was also known in town for not having attended services in more than 20 years.

In an Ordinary Year, This Would Be Weird Election News

In the September 19 primary in New Ashford, Massachusetts, none of the town's 202 registered voters cast ballots, including the disgusted town clerk, who manned the polls for 14 hours. And a Green Party candidate for the Maine legislature failed to vote for himself in the June primary, leaving him

with zero votes and forcing him to return his public financing. And Texas Lt. Gov. Rick Perry sent a fund-raising letter in July that not only shook down lobbyists but asked lobbyists to rank their clients as to how much they could be expected to be shaken down for (from \$1,000 to \$25,000). And the money flowed so freely at the GOP convention in August that Philadelphia Inquirer reporters discovered an accidentally discarded \$5,000 lobbyist's check to a congressman stuck to the bottom of a utility cart outside the hall.

Great Art!

News of the Weird has reported on scientists who borrow the jellyfish's "green protein" for medically productive genetic modifications, but Chicago artist Eduardo Kac created controversy in September by proposing to create embryos with the jellyfish's green-light-producing gene just to make visually appealing organisms, such as a glowing rabbit. (Kac's major work so far is "Genesis," a sentence from the Old Testament, translated into Morse Code, transposed onto DNA, inserted into fluorescent bacteria, and lit up when anyone accesses the piece on Kac's Web site.)

In a summer contract with the city of Montreal, artist Devora Neumark performed "The Art of Conversation," which consisted of her standing at the entrance to a subway station from noon to 4 p.m. every Tuesday and "conducting spontaneous interchange with interested parties on a variety of topics."

Frontiers of Science

A U.S. Forest Service researcher announced in August that her team had discovered the largest living thing ever found, a 24-centuries-old fungus, covering 2,200 acres in the Blue Mountains of eastern Oregon; DNA testing confirmed that the underground, stringlike structure was all the same organism. And three weeks later near Lake Okeechobee, a University of Florida biologist discovered what he called an "evolutionary relic," a previously unknown, carnivorous, flowering plant that grows entirely underground but by photosynthesis.

An August British Broadcasting Corp. documentary, "Brain Story," featured a man whose cranial lobes were surgically severed in order to treat epilepsy and who now is able to do what he calls the "party trick" of drawing different designs, with each hand, at the same time.

Akron, Ohio, in August on nine counts of roughing up two of his high-achieving, home-schooled daughters when they performed worse in their endeavors than he expected. According to the indictment, when one daughter came in second in the National Spelling Bee, botching "cappelletti," Lavery threatened to kill her and had to be physically restrained. The girl told the Akron Beacon Journal that Lavery would punch them in the head for their failures and that screaming and profanity were common. Lavery complained to the Associated Press that he was "easier on (his kids) than my father was (on me)."

Update

News of the Weird reported in 1999 on the lawsuit by 5,400 descendants of the 18th-century Welsh pirate Robert Edwards, claiming ownership of 77 acres of lower Manhattan (including the World Trade Center and the New York Stock Exchange). In August 2000, four descendants claimed to have found a copy of a 1778 lease for the land, which had been given to Edwards shortly before by a grateful King George, stating that Edwards' heirs would get the land back in 1877. The value of the land now is conservatively estimated at \$750 billion, or \$140 million per descendant. Courts in South Wales, New York City and Pittsburgh have opened proceedings.

Least Competent Criminals

Customs Agent Adventures: Cocaine "mule" Jose Antonio Campos-Cloute was arrested at the Melbourne, Australia, airport, in September after a momentary lapse; as he was filling out the Customs form, he absent-

minently checked the "yes" box on whether he was carrying illicit substances, and that led to a search. And Briton Alison McKinnon was sentenced in August to five years in prison in Turkey for attempting to smuggle six pounds of heroin out, strapped to her chest; she was ready to board a plane home from Istanbul but was designated for searching only because one of her body-piercings set off a metal detector.

Also, in the Last Month ...

The U.S. Supreme Court declined to overturn a Californian's drug-possession conviction even though one juror admitted he decided guilt by flipping a coin (which the juror defended by noting that he did two out of three). An Atlantic City casino introduced a row of stationary bicycles rigged with 25-cent slot machines. In separate incidents four days apart in Chicago, two cab drivers accidentally drove off with customers' toddlers sleeping in the back seat and required police help in reuniting the families. Doctors revealed that transplanting part of a woman's ovaries into her arm was successful in growing new eggs, for in vitro fertilization (San Diego).


Keeneland sets art fair

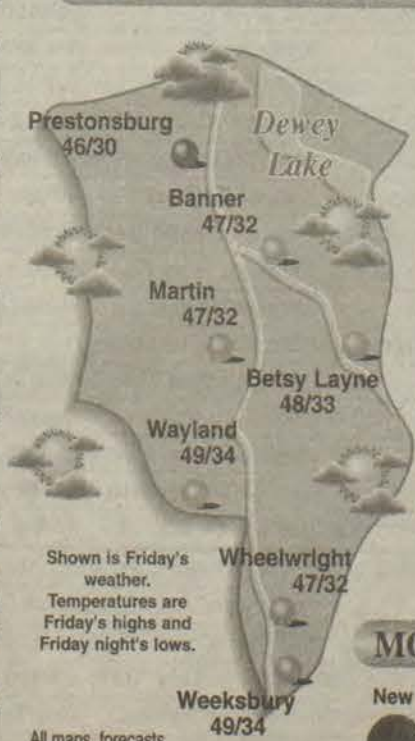

CRITTERS CORNER

The holiday season is once again upon us. Although the media love to use images of cute puppies and kittens peering out of Christmas stockings and popping out of packages, animals and the holiday festivities don't always mix as well as they'd like us to believe.

A pet that may be part of your family for the next 10-15 years certainly should never be bought on impulse. Likewise, animals should never be given as gifts, except in cases where it is known for a fact that the recipient wants this particular animal and has been forewarned, or when a child's family has decided that the time is right to add a pet to the household. Even in those cases, the animal should not be brought into the household in the midst of all the holiday chaos.

A better idea would be to wrap up the pet supplies the new owner will need—beds, bowls, brushes—and present this at gift-giving time. A picture of the new pet could be included, or a "certificate" that allows the person to go to the shelter to pick out his or her new friend.

Introducing a new pet to the household is stressful enough for all concerned under normal circumstances. Factor in the noise, confusion, frayed nerves and the presence of potentially harmful

decorations, plants, and so on, and you have one gigantic recipe for disaster.

The commercials don't show the trip to the vet the day after Christmas due to an upset stomach from the turkey slipped under the table, a laceration from stepping on a broken ornament, or a swallowed length of tinsel which will have to be surgically removed.

Responsible breeders often will not sell puppies or kittens near the holidays for fear of impulse buying, and many even avoid breeding an animal that will produce a litter near this time of year. "Puppy mills" are another story—their motivation is profit, and they have no qualms about capitalizing on the season and the "cute factor" to sell as many animals as possible. This is the reason prospective pet owners are encouraged to look to responsible breeders or shelters for their new pets.

While I'm on a roll here, there's another threat looming on the horizon. Be on your guard against "Dalmatian Fever" again this year. Disney plans to release its movie, "102 Dalmatians" at Thanksgiving. Following the release of the original film several years ago, Dalmatians started showing up in shelters in record numbers, as the result of impulse purchases by people who had not researched the breed. Please don't be swayed by a child who has fallen

head-over-heels in love with these dogs.

Go ahead and buy all the stuffed toys and other spotted accessories you want, but skip the real thing as a Christmas present. If you still think your child is serious about a Dal, do some research on the breed. (AKC's web site is <http://akc.org>—there is a wealth of information there), talk to owners and longtime breeders, and arrange to meet some dogs.

In the right setting, Dalmatians can be great dogs, but their owners have to be informed and prepared for an athletic, energetic and strong-willed animal.

What about pets already in the household? There are several pet safety concerns to keep in mind this time of year. Here's a nutshell "Holiday Survival Guide" for your pets:

Many plants that are used for decoration, such as mistletoe and holly, are toxic. There is controversy over just how poisonous poinsettias really are, but err on the side of caution and keep all of these out of your pet's reach. Some evergreens, yews, for example, are also toxic; if you catch your pet nibbling at the Christmas tree, prevent access to it when you are not around to supervise.

Consider providing the animal with an alternate safe source of roughage such as "kitty grass" or good-quality hay, which



can be purchased in pet-supply sections of major stores. (The hay will be located near the hamster supplies). Also do not allow pets to drink the water in the tree base.

Other potentially harmful decorations include tinsel and garland, which can cause intestinal obstruction if swallowed. Cats are especially prone to this, since they can't seem to resist playing with shiny things that move so easily. Ribbons can be dangerous for the same reason. Strings of lights obviously pose the risk of electric shock, and the small bulbs are also easy to dislodge, break and/or swallow. Ditto for larger, fragile ornaments.

Many holiday foods present potential problems. And although you probably already know not to feed your pet turkey bones or chocolate, be alert for guests who may be less careful. Even "OK" foods can cause problems in certain situations. While it's probably fine to feed your dog or cat a small amount of chopped turkey breast for Christmas dinner, the fat in poultry skin or in ham can cause a severe upset stomach or even life-threatening pancreatitis in sensitive animals. Onions in large quantities (and "large" is relative to the size of the animal) can result in a severe form of anemia.

The keys to being safe at the holidays are caution, common sense, and modernization. When you think about it, this is good advice for us humans, too.
