

'A state of total anarchy'

Spring break ends in trip to jail for some PHS students

Fifty Prestonsburg High School students anticipated spending their spring break basking in the sun at Daytona Beach, Fla., but some of those students found quite a different fate after an incident that occurred when their bus stopped, a little over two hours after departure, for a short break at a nearby shopping

On Saturday, a bus chartered by Alpha Trailways in Cincinnati, Ohio, pulled into a

Wendy's parking lot in Wise, Va., at 10:34 p.m., with a cargo of 50 students from PHS, two adult chaperones and an abundant amount of alcohol and


According to Tony Bates, Wise County chief of police, a call was received from a citizen, Dr. Theresa Dunton, of Big Stone Gap, who had become involved in a verbal altercation with some juveniles, who were allegedly intoxicated and smoking marijuana, after exiting a nearby theater with her children.

Upon arrival, Wise County police officials entered the bus

and noticed a very strong smell of alcoholic beverages. Approximately enforcement officials assisted the Wise County Sheriff's Office at the scene, including officers from the Norton Police Department, Pound Police Department, University of Virginia Campus Police and Virginia State Police.

Officers discovered "numerous" alcoholic beverages, including about 100 bottles of wine coolers, beer and harder liquors such as vodka. They also found a quarter-

Board discusses audit of Allen Central Middle School

Holding true to its new policy of shorter board meetings and agendas, the Floyd County Board of Education held a regufar meeting on Monday evening that adjourned one full hour before its regularly scheduled adjournment time.

The meeting, though brief, was not without some disagreement on certain issues, however.

After noting that there were no student achievements or public comments to be addressed, the meeting got underway with board member Carol Stumbo asking for permission to be recognized for comment.

After being granted recognition, Stumbo revisited an old issue concerning rules of order for public meetings. Stumbo said that according to the "New

Roberts Rules of Order," second edition, that the board had been

conducting meetings improperly. "According to the 'New Roberts Rules of Order,' only one board member must object (to an agenda item) to pull something from the board agenda," said Stumbo.

At various times in the past, Stumbo has been the lone oppo-

Patton appoints new mining board

Gov. Paul Patton introduced the eight members of the newly reorganized Mining Board April 10, and announced that Tony Oppegard will begin April 16 as the general counsel to the Department for Mines and Minerals.

During Patton's first year in

office, the state had its lowest number of mine-related fatalities ever, he said. Last year, it had one of the highest rates in the

'We want to be on the low end of that scale every year, and we think this board can do that," Patton said.

The former Mining Board was abolished earlier this year by House Bill 258. The bill, sponsored by Brent Yonts, D-Greenville, created the eightmember board and outlined its duties, which includes the investigation of mine safety violations and approving criteria for penalties levied against violators.

The legislation was prompted by a series of articles that ran in The Courier-Journal, Louisville,

Jury rules against Carter but doesn't order payment

A verdict was handed down in Floyd Circuit Court last Friday, finding State Manager Arnold "Woody" Carter liable for comments made in 1998 about the termination of W.D. Osborne Elementary principal Paul David Tackett, a 23-year school board employee.

The decision brought an end in a misuse of sick leave. to the speculation of the nature of a comment made by Carter during a meeting held after Tackett's termination as principal of Osborne Elementary.

In December of 1998, Tackett was terminated from the office of principal following a six-daylong investigation into a sick leave that Tackett had taken after being requested to do so by his doctor, Charles Hines. The dismissal came under section (b) of Kentucky Revised Statutes 161.790, which states that an employee may be terminated for "immoral character or conduct

, unbecoming a teacher."

The termination came based on the fact that Tackett, having signed an affidavit requesting and informing the board of education of his sick leave, then took leave to Hawaii. The board ruled his conduct improper because Tackett did not provide a request signed by a doctor prior to taking the leave, which resulted, from the school board's perspective.

In a deposition taken before the trial, Tackett explained that the doctor's written request was an option to a signed affidavit, which he did provide. He stated in his deposition that he felt there was no need to provide both. considering that it was an optional provision.

The meeting, during which Carter made the comment that the matter concerning Tackett was "illegal but not criminal" was held shortly after Tackett's dismissal

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ounce bag of marijuana, as well as another bag containing well over an ounce of marijuana.

Bates said that the police drug dog made "several hits" on the bus, uncovering marijuana cigarettes and pills in bottles. One bottle contained 25 to 30 tablets, which, until further testing, remain unspecified.

According to Bates, one adult student admitted to having smoked marijuana, and one juvenile admitted to having snorted pills.

Alcohol tests were administered to adult students, leading to the arrest of six 18-year-olds and two 19-year-olds who were charged with possession of alcohol under the age of twenty-one.

Six juveniles, five 17-yearolds and one 15-year old, were detained until parents arrived to take them home, but those juveniles are expected to be charged this week.

Johnathan B. Holbrook, 19, Prestonsburg, was taken to a local hospital along with two juveniles because they were "dangerously drunk" and incoherent, Bates said. After refusing treatment, Holbrook was subsequently arrested.

of Martin. Of the juveniles detained were one 17-year-old from Blue River, one 17-year-old from Auxier, three 17-year-olds from Prestonsburg and one 15-year-

old from East Point.

"It was a sight to see," said Bates. "I guess it's disappointing to me as a law enforcement official because I do a lot of public speaking against alcohol and drug use. I guess we haven't come as far as we need to with these kids. I don't know, right now, the accurate count, but there were numerous and numerous bottles of alcohol on this bus. It was very disappointing.

The citizen and eye-witness, Dr. Theresa Dunton, who placed the 911 call to the Wise Police Department, expressed strong feelings about what happened the night of April 7.

"I think the parents of these kids should be absolutely grateful that the police intervened when they did," Dunton said during an interview with The Floyd County Times on Tuesday. "The situation was so out of control that if they hadn't intervened, we would be talking about a different tragedy altogether."

In a letter Dunton sent to The Floyd County Times, as well as other newspapers serving Wise, she described the scene as one of "a state of total anarchy."

"I could see them smoking marijuana in the parking lot," Dunton elaborated in an interview with The Times on Tuesday. "They were in a public parking lot doing something illegal like we were at Woodstock. I actually told the police there were no chaperones because I couldn't understand how there could be chaperones with this going on. I don't have a problem with the other kids going ahead on the trip. They

others' mistakes, but if it were my children, I wouldn't want them going with those chaper-

The chaperones in question are Donna Collins, a first-grade teacher at Allen Elementary, and Susan Hicks, who, together, arranged for the trip by gathering funds, acquiring a travel agency and chartering the bus.

Collins and Hicks, who are both parents of high school students, were not arrested during the incident. However, according to police reports, one of the two chaperones did have a child who was among those charged.

When asked if there had been drinking on the bus prior to the stopover in Wise, Collins' response was brief and to the

"Not that we knew of," Collins said from her hotel room in Daytona Beach, and then declined to comment further when asked to elaborate on their observations.

According to Bates "all the participants signed waivers, or the parents or guardians signed waivers for the juveniles, that the organizers would not be held responsible for what the group members did."

Collins' employment with the board of education and her role in this recent incident has brought some reaction despite the signed waivers and agree-

"If the superintendent thinks that this teacher's certification should be looked at then that would be handled by them," said Linda Gross, who handles public relations for the state Department of Education. "This just points out the need for parents to see that school trips should be sanctioned by the school."

don't deserve to be punished for to Collins, but, at this time, states that it cannot be said what did or did not occur during the

"We have to determine the facts," Fanning said. "If this thing happened, there would be a discussion between this office and the employee and we'd go from there. It was not a school function or we would be very focused with our involvement

When pressed, Fanning added that if the incident resulted in charges against Collins, it would "then be a matter for discussion at a later date."

According to Ron Hampton, principal of PHS, the trip was not affiliated with the school in

"Basically, it had nothing to do with the school," said Hampton. "A group of kids and parents got together for a field

According to students, the trip was funded by both parents and students.

Rev. Johnnie Ross, chairman of the Floyd County Board of Education, said that he was disappointed that there were adults present on the bus.

Apparently, the chaperones had signed releases to Alpha Trailways when they paid for the charter.

"This was not a school-sanctioned trip," said Ross. "I guess I would have to say that the chaperones are ultimately responsible."

Ross said that he had been a Scoutmaster for 15 years and a Girl Scout leader for five years, during which time he had seen that children make a lot of mistakes.

"In light of this situation, we, as a society, have to examine our own behavior," Ross said. "I think sometimes kids are judged as though they have all the answers, when it's the parents who don't have the answers. Kids don't know where the line is, and without

someone drawing the line, the kids don't know how far they

can go." Ross went on to say that he certainly does not condone the behavior of the children on the bus, but that "there is a difference between misconduct and

malicious conduct." Ross went on to say that students are more prone to submit to peer pressure when they are away from home, especially when they aren't properly supervised.

In addition, Ross stated, with hopes of refreshing the need for a calculated response to the incident, that "there is a thing commonly called responsible parenting" and that parents "just don't put kids in these kinds of situations." He also added that this incident should make everyone better understand that "children need our guidance in all situations."

"Let us hope that we, as adults, can respond to this situation, rather that react and hurt their chances for their educational and social futures," said Ross. "We don't need to shoot the wounded.'

Ross explained that the students were "basically guilty of making a stupid, immature childhood mistake," and that those children needed our help, not our judgment.

"All of us have to talk about this openly," said Ross. "And we, as adults, have to admit that we have been involved in a similar situation at some point during our adolescence. If we reach out and help those children now, maybe it will help them make the right decision the next time they are faced with a situation such as this.'

The students not involved with the alleged activities on the bus were allowed to continue the trip with the aid of Collins and Hicks remaining in supervision. They are expected home from Daytona Beach on

Verdict

Elementary, where parents had gathered to protest Tackett's termination. Eighty-five parents came together and signed a petition to request that Tackett be allowed to return to his office and presented the petition at the meeting.

Tackett was reinstated as principal of Osborne Elementary in April 1999, but a civil suit continued.

In this most recent development, which also serves as an end to the longstanding suit, Carter was found civilly liable for the comments made in regard to Tackett. However, no damages were awarded as a result of the jury's 10-2 verdict,

"We sued him for defamation and the jury ruled 10-2 that Carter had defamed him (Tackett), then awarded zero damages," Ned Pillersdorf, Tackett's counsel during the trial, said on Tuesday. "Carter had said that he was vindicated, but I don't know that you're vindicated when you're found civilly liable for defaming a school board principal.'

The verdict affords mixed emotions as the statement will forever exist as an attachment, according the Tackett.

"They found him civilly liable for slander, and I was pleased with the verdict," Tackett said on Monday. "But I feel they should have put some value to it because it probably hurt me down the line in terms of any future plans. I felt like they didn't completely understand the damages that were caused by this. I've applied to several superintendent positions and was ranked in the top five in two of my classifications and ever since this came out, I'm not even in the top 20.

Chairman Johnnie Ross commented that he was sorry if the board had been conducting business improperly, and that he had asked the board attorney to advise him on the subject.

"I understand that you are sorry," said Stumbo, "and thatthe board attorney has been spoken with. But I wish I had gotten my right to review (certain) items last time. I have spoken with KSBA (Kentucky School Board Association) and they recommend no other way of doing it (in regard to conducting board meetings according to the Roberts rules)."

"Perhaps, then, we should adopt such a policy," said Ross. "I have no objection to it."

The board then went in to executive session to discuss litigation, property, personnel matters and expulsions.

Coming out of executive session, Ross announced that a tract of land, "which we shall refer to as parcel #5," involving three lanes of traffic on University Drive, had been approved for use as a right of entry by the commonwealth. The finances of this situation will be determined at a later date.

The scholastic audit status report of Allen Central Middle School was then presented by Liz Allen, principal.

After thanking the board for "inviting us here on the first day of spring break," Allen announced that the hiring of a new principal for the middle school would be complete by

Allen then proceeded to outline the middle school's mission statement and beliefs, along with detailing personnel and budget allocations.

Allen also outlined the school's academic performance and plans for increased proficiency and efficiency in the school through the use of ongoing initiatives, professional development programs, challenging lesson plans and follow-up trainings.

Allen also commented that the needs of increased space and certified teaching staff had been addressed and that these areas were in the process of being dealt with.

At the conclusion of Allen's presentation, Stumbo commented that she had "a problem" with one of the belief statements that Allen had reiterated, that of the belief that "middle schools will get better as the elementary schools get

better."

"The elementary schools have done better than the middle schools," said Stumbo. "Data shows that the decline in student learning begins when students enter middle school. The reports show that the students enter middle schools at a certain level and then their progress begins to decline after this point. Why is that?"

"If I knew that answer, I guess I'd be somewhere else,' said Allen, "I don't know. I realize that middle schools have to address this problem."

"I believe it would be wise to look internally," Stumbo said, "to take care of the problem on the middle school

Allen said that she agreed and that middle schools have to "find out where we are and where we can go."

When asked what she perceived as particular problems with the middle school concept in her school, Allen responded "the offering of exploratory

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

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




Divorce a worthwhile target

The Omaha religious leaders who pledged recently not to perform marriages for couples who haven't been properly prepared are attacking the problem of divorce from the right angle.

Making marriage more difficult and requiring sincere couples to think about the depth of their commitment and the strength of their bond before their wedding day is a superior way to lower the divorce rate.

By one account, divorce rates have fallen in 146 American cities where religious leaders have adopted similar policies.

That is an outcome much to be desired. Estimates of divorce rates are appalling - suggesting that up to half of new marriages will end in divorce, which is emotionally and financially hard on both partners. But it is particularly devastating for any children who may result from the marriage.

It is a fact that children of divorce are less well-off financially, physically and emotionally. Children who live in single-parent homes have more problems with studies, drugs and other challenges than children from two-parent households. Divorce hurts children.

Omaha's clergy have chosen the right path to strengthen marriages. Another battle plan might have led them to try to make divorce more difficult, as it once was. That wouldn't seem to be either desirable or possible.

Americans' attitudes and their lives have changed significantly in recent decades. Many things have influenced the number of divorces in this country. Among them, equal rights for women and the resulting rise in the number of women capable of self-support and no longer wholly dependent on husbands.


Additional factors: Increasing intolerance of domestic violence and the availability of help and shelter for abused women. The decline in social stigma and disapproval that once made divorce a shameful resort. A dwindling regard for religion and religious belief, once a strong part of the marriage bond for most people.

Taking divorce back to the days when one partner had to prove adultery or another serious offense doesn't seem rea-

Perhaps Omaha's pastoral leaders can change the course of marriage in their community. Perhaps they can use premarital counseling, using older couples as role models and other techniques to reinvigorate the concept, to make a couple realize the importance of the commitment before they make it, to reverse the "Oh, well, if it doesn't work out we can always get a divorce" attitude that is so corrosive to a long-term relationship.

Divorce is an appropriate target for the arrows of religion. Let us hope that the clergymen and -women of Omaha can hit the bullseye.

Are we so petty?

I may be outnumbered by my opinion in regards to the current standoff between U.S. and China, but, quite frankly, I think the entire situation is being dealt with in an immature manner by both parties involved.

On one side, you have a government demanding an apology for an accident that resulted in the loss of a well-loved husband, father and pilot.

On the other, you have a government which refuses to apologize, because they believe there is basically

nothing for which to apologize. Families of the 24 crew members of the U.S. EP-3 plane anxiously wait in the background for the moment they will be able to reunite with their loved ones, while anger kindles on the horizon toward the Chinese who are holding those men in captivity.

I suspect that the "diplomacy takes time" excuse is wearing thin for those of us who are worried about the possible

damage to our relations with Beijing.

If you ask me, it's simply a matter of political hogwash that needs to find some type of resolution as quickly and as painlessly as possible.

What type of example are we setting for our children?

Of course, I'm sure you'll agree that the events that took place on April 1. were merely the results of an acciden-

tal encounter, and that there is no possible way that either party involved can teleport through time to change the disastrous outcome, or take back words that have since been said concerning

there is no need for an apology, and I understand their point of view. China demands an apology, and I also understand their point of view.

So, how can one decipher the solution to such a problem?

Ask any first-grade student,

We are all taught as children, or at least, I hope we are taught, to respect our friends, neighbors and elders. When I was a little girl, I remember playing tag

one afternoon on the playground with my friends. Running back and forth across the yard, I didn't expect that my enjoyment would end in me hurting someone, physically, or otherwise. But as I rounded the yard near the swing set, I ran smack-dab into a little girl who just happened to be in the wrong place at the wrong time.

Of course, the child began crying frantically, and I couldn't blame her, because not only had I caused her to skin her knee, but I had also hurt her feelings, embarrassing her in front of her play-

Even though I knew it wasn't entirely my fault - she shouldn't have been standing there in the first place - I didn't think twice about whether or not she deserved an apology.

When I reached out my hand to help her up, it began a bond that exists to this

As far as laying blame toward either of the parties involved, I don't believe that there is any possible alternative other than to say, both of us owe the other an apology.

If neither of us decided to tour the heavens on that particular day, then this problem, ultimately, would not even exist. We both were there, and because of that, the incident occurred.

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Commends Virginia police officers

I am writing this letter to commend several local law enforcement agencies that responded to a call I made on the night of April 7.

As my two small children and I exited the theater in Wise, we were confronted by a group of approximately 40 high school students. These students exited a bus which was parked in front of the theater. A number of these students were intoxicated (you could smell the alcohol as they walked by), a couple to the point of not being able to talk intelligibly or negotiate the stairs of the bus. Others were smoking marijuana in the parking lot.

Apparently, their judgment was so impaired they did not know this was not only wrong, but illegal. It appeared to be a situation of utter chaos, totally out of control, so I called 911.

Within minutes, officers arrived on the scene and took control. Later I learned that there were some arrests, a few were taken to the hospital as their blood-alcohol levels were dangerously high, and pills, marijuana and an inordinate amount of alcohol was confiscated. These children were only 16-to-18 years of

First, I want to express my sorrow at the state of our society. Where did these children get all this alcohol (150 bottles by one estimate), let alone the drugs? How could a situation get so out of control that my family and I were presented with a state of total anarchy as we left the theater? There were chaperones

on the bus! My 5- and 8-yearold daughters kept asking, "Why didn't those grownups tell them not to drink?" I

couldn't answer that question. Second, I want to express to any of the parents of the children involved that they should be eternally grateful to the officers who intervened that night. There was a lot of impaired judgment on that bus. It would have only taken seconds of distraction for the bus driver to lose her concentration and then perhaps we would be talking about a different tragedy altogether.

Last, I want to express my sincere gratitude to all of the law enforcement agencies involved for their quick response and ability to take control of a totally out-ofcontrol situation. I, for one, am sure that lives were saved Saturday night. I can only hope that this incident and its repercussions change the paths of some of those

involved.

It certainly made an impact on my two young daughters. Dr. Theresa A. Dunton Big Stone Gap, Va.

You never know where and when you might meet a friend and former resident of Morgan County. Thanks to Mr. Henry, arrangements were made for the Blair family to return to West Liberty.



The Pre-Admissions Testing (PAT) Department was created at the request of and in collaboration with Highlands surgeons, internists and family physicians to assure patient safety, eliminate

One of the greatest frustrations unnecessary surgery cancellations, and create an improved continuum of care between surgical patients, physicians, and the medical center.

> The PAT Department began operation on Monday, March 5. It provides one convenient step toward the preoperative process. According to Kim Preston, RN, who is coordinating the program, "The PAT Department was designed similar to those at the larger hospitals in Ashland and Lexington. Once the surgeon recommends surgery for the patient, two appointments are made, one with the surgery department for the actual operation and the other with the PAT Department. The PAT appointment can be from three to 10 days prior to surgery."

The Pre-Admissions Testing Department is located on the first floor of the medical center, close to the ER lobby.

During the PAT visit, all paperwork, labs, EKG and other diagnostic tests are performed in the department. This service allows the staff to take care of the patient's preoperative needs in one location. Only if an x-ray is needed does the patient have to leave the PAT Department.

The objective of the PAT Department is to process each surgical patient, making the entire process flow more smoothly for both the patient and their physician. After a patient completes the Pre-Admissions Testing process and the day of their surgery arrives, they need only stop by the ER admissions lobby, pick up their chart and go directly to Outpatient Services for their surgery.

Highlands has made many changes this year toward improvements in patient services, from opening a new Outpatient Registration Area and a new Cardio-Diagnostics Department to offering Radiation Seed Therapy for the treatment of Prostate Cancer and establishing the new Pre-Admissions Testing Department. All of these improvements in patient services are in keeping with Highlands vision to develop a healthier com-

Earnhardt autopsy case

Even though the Orlando Sentinel has settled its case with Teresa Earnhardt to permanently seal the photos after an independent medical expert viewed them, other challenges remain,

Last week. after the Florida State Legislature passed a new law forbidding the unauthorized use of autopsy photos, there are other newspapers challenging the law. The

University of Florida's official

school paper is one of them. Managing Editor Trey Csar says he hasn't decided what he would do with the photos if he obtained them.

What the Earnhardt family and fans fear are if the photos would wind up on the Internet. And their beliefs are fully justified. Last week, pictures of Rodney Orr and Neil Bonnett, who died at the Daytona International Speedway in 1994, were displayed on one Internet

The new law passed by the Florida Legislature requires permission of a judge or the family of a dead person to gain access to autopsy photos, but the site acquired photos of Orr and Bonnett when anyone could request them under the state's open-records law.

Earnhardt's photos are sealed, at the request of his widow, but The First Amendment Foundation and the Florida Society of Newspaper Editors will ask a judge to let them contest his sealing of Earnhardt's autopsy photos. They also want the new restrictions on autopsy photos declared unconstitutional.

No more free photos

The Dale Earnhardt photo giveaway is over. The response was overwhelming. We had several hundred Earnhardt photos on hand, but those were gone after the first day's mail arrived. We mailed at least one photo to everyone who requested it.

It was very difficult selecting the best statements made about Earnhardt, because all were from the heart and sincere. These are the four we chose.

"Dale meant racing excitement and for a few hours you could forget your life and live with him. He made you feel like you were there. Dale loved his fans and his family,"...Mrs. P. N., Lake Waccamaw, N.C.

"I liked Dale Earnhardt because he is the best to ever drive in NASCAR. He inspired me to never give up on something that I want to do. After losing so many times at the Daytona 500 he never

This past weekend I was part of the standing room only crowd to watch the Virginia 500 from Martineville Speedway, It was also what I like to call my first trip to a 'third world track'. That's the term I like to use when referring to any track not owned by Bill France's International Speedway Corporation or Bruton Smith's Speedway

While France and Smith have been known to dig deep into their wallets to make sure that every aspect of their tracks stay current. Martinsville has moved at a much slower pace. Sunday's race was the first that every fan had an aluminum chair-back type seat. At last fall's race some of the original concrete bleachers were still being

Track president W. Clay Campbell knew that the speedway's pit. and garage situation was more in line with the 60s and 70s than the way tracks are now set up. Two years ago the Speedway's pit area was reconfigured to eliminate the backstretch pits and create one (very long) pit road. The move look away the advantage teams pilting on the frontstretch had, but created some very close quarters during yellow flag pit stops. This problem was addressed over the winter as pit road was widened 10 feet which made entering and exiting safer for both drivers and pit crews. The extra space created by the removing of the backstretch pits allowed the speedway to build a modern garage area on the backstretch which made the weekend easier on all of the teams, especially with the temperatures in the high 80s all weekend.

Those are some of the changes that the speedway has under-

gone, what I liked most was the traditions that the track still carried on. Forget all the food choices that you can find at most other tracks, Martinsville's track food of choice is the legendary, 'Jesse Jones Hot Dog. Who needs the smoked sausages and turkey lege that you see at other tracks, at \$2 a dog it may be the best culinary value you will find at any track concession stand. You haven't really gotten the full Martinsville Speedway experience until you are sitting there holding a 'Jesse Jones' and watching a Norfolk and Southern train rumble by close enough to the backstretch that the engineer can be

seen watching the race. Even the victory lane celebration has its own unique twist that sets it apart from other tracks. Since 1964, the winners of major events at the speedway have received a grandfather clock as their trophy. This idea came about when the original owner of the speedway, H. Clay Earles was looking for a novel trophy that wouldn't end up stored away in some driver's basement

Before you ever get inside the track, you realize that there is something refreshing about this track. It's definitely not one of those 'Charlotte clones' that seems to be the only type of track being built. Instead of those huge paved lots surrounding it. Martinsville calls a neighborhood its own front yard. The residents will pul you within 50 yards of the front gate for \$10 and of course that comes with portapotty privileges. I had a media parking permit and its location couldn't come close to the convenience of a front yard spot.

Martinsville also differs from many of today's tracks as it caters more to the average fan than corporate America. You didn't see the large fields of hospitality tents that companies use at other tracks to show their customers a good time. Instead, you saw grills at the back of every pickup where race fans were severing the moment of a bog race with each other. When my traveling party got back to the van, the topic of con-

versation centered around just how different their race day experience had been. It was if we had actually got to watch a race and relax at the same time. Martinsville is definitely a different experience, but one that I plan on experiencing gain. The speedway and local people go about making a race fan feel appreciated, something that not to many tracks can say at this time!

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

was probably about 50which, as my dad would have said, was "a right smart bit ago"-when I first started paying attention to the obit pages in the paper. Perhaps there is really something to the old joke that if you don't find your name, you shower and shave and go on with your

But seriously, one of the things I've found curious, is that many people I knew as a kid who have long since moved away, are coming back home...to be buried.

For some reason, after having lived in various parts of the country (the industrial north in particular), for nearly half a century, families of the deceased, likely the result of requests made when the decedent was still alive, return their loved ones to familiar surroundings. It makes you think that although, physically at least, they found themselves elsewhere, their hearts and souls were still residing in these mountains.

Former Governor Happy Chandler, speaking of these transplants, was once quoted as saying, "I never met a Kentuckian who wasn't going home.

There's little doubt that had not the jobs played out, had not the coal companies decided they'd taken enough of our natural resources that many of these families would never have left in the first place. Had there been ample employment available, enabling them to put food on the table and clothes on the backs of their children, many of these families would still populate our hills and hollows.

So, who is better off, those who went or those who stayed? Might as well ask which came first, the chicken or the egg. But if one gave serious thought to that question, there would probably be ample proof for positive results on both sides.

And ironically, we suspect that oftentimes those who staved wished they'd gone, and those who went, wished they'd stayed.

When a Memorial Day morning finds a shiny new vehicle bearing foreign tags parked in the head of a hollow on a gravel driveway, it's easy to understand how those who have taken root here might wish their life different. On the other hand, when the owner of that vehicle is having a morning cup of coffee on the front porch of the old homeplace, watching as spears of sunlight burn off the mist that has wrapped itself around the hilltops like an old woman would wrap her shoulders in a shawl; when the song of a cardinal replaces the desperate wail of a siren; when the only odor comes from the wild honeysuckle vines that line the fence just beyond where Mom has planted marigolds

tend to crust over and prevent penetration. Mulch established beds in mid- to late-spring or early fall when warm soil temperatures promote good root growth.

Water doesn't move easily through heavy clay soils, so surplus moisture saturates soil and keeps oxygen from reaching the roots. Using too much mulch compounds this problem, especially for shallow-rooted plants that can suffocate from lack of oxygen. Diseases can increase, because many organisms thrive under conditions of excessive moisture and low oxygen.

Excessive mulch around tree trunks can cause bark to decay and attract rodents that cause feeding damage. Some trees are susceptible to crown rots and cankers, when even a shallow layer of mulch is applied against the trunk.

Gardeners can choose from es organic or inorganic mulches.

Organic materials include pine, cypress or hardwood bark, compost, leaves, lawn clippings, manure, sawdust, and wood shavings. Inorganic materials include black plastic, landscape fabric, gravel and crushed rock. An advantage of organic mulches is they slowly break down, adding beneficial organic matter to the soil.

Landscape fabrics or black plastic are not recommended for permanent beds containing trees, shrubs or perennial plants. A layer of organic mulch usually is applied atop the fabric or plastic for aesthetic reasons. Research shows this organic mulch on top of landscape fabrics encourages roots to grow up into the layer of mulch above the normal rooting zone. This makes plants more susceptible to cold and drought stress-

When black plastic is improp-

erly applied without sufficient consider when selecting a materiplanting holes, it interferes with the normal supply of oxygen and water to plant roots.

Some inorganic mulches like crushed limestone rock should not be used around plants that require acidic soil. Other materials, like gravel, might not be compatible with certain landscape designs. Gravel or rock can become a mitsance if it enters the lawn areas and causes problems with mow-

Soil acidity is one factor to the-way site and periodically stir-

al. Most organic mulches might slightly lower the soil pH, making the soil more acidic. However, this rarely has a negative impact on plant growth.

Don't use mulch with a strong "vinegar odor," as this indicates the mulch is too "green" or "sour." This can burn plants, and actually tie up needed nutrients such as

Allow "green" or "sour" mulch to mature by piling it in an out-ofring it. Once this odor has dissipated, apply the mulch to plants.

Other factors to consider in choosing mulch are longevity and expense of the material, moisture retention and benefits such as decoration, erosion, moisture and weed control and soil conditioning properties.





According to floral experts, daisies should last approximately five to seven days if properly cared for. Keep cut flowers in a cool location, away from cool drafts and heat sources.
