Stronger role for council advised in SFMS audit

Briefs Mountaintop to receive \$2 million

The city of Prestonsburg's mountaintop development project got another shot in the arm this week with a \$2 million announcement

The United States Department of Agriculture's Rural Development Service announceed the spending Thursday, which includes a \$1.1 million loan and a \$900,000 grant.

The money will be used to extend water and sewage lines to new customers in the mountaintop project.

"These funds will be used to install water lines and sewer collection lines to serve 150 new water and 181 new sewer customers in e the Prestonsburg Recreational and Economic Development Complex," said Thomas G. Fern, state director of USDA Rural Development.

Patton seeks action on garbage, taxes in speech

Getting a comprehensive tax reform passed before he leaves office is one of Gov. Paul Patton's goals, and he told legislators Wednesday night he sees a joint task force working on the issue as a way to mend the rifted relationships in Kentucky's government.

Patton briefly touched on issues like crime, education, worker's compensation and new job development in his State of the Commonwealth Address Wednesday night, but focused most of his 30-plus minute speech on a comprehensive tax reform and

As with Stumbo, the auditors found what they termed "limited evidence" among teachers, parents and students of high expectations of stu-

"Based on interviews with students, there is little articulation and understanding of academic expectations," the report states. Furthermore, "students are not encouraged to reflect on their work."

The audit team advised teachers and members of the Site-Based Decision-Making Council (SBDM) to do a better job of monitoring. evaluating and revising the curriculum, paying particular attention to

Paxton said she is not a stranger to Knott and Magoffin counties, noting that she filled in as assistant commonwealth's attorney there for a brief time.

In addition, the team said more attention needs to be paid to evaluating student work, to assessing the results and using the data to improve the curriculum and instruction.

Teachets were also advised to seek training in using open response questions for student testing and in using scoring guides to ensure effective and fair evaluations, as well as training in multiple learning styles and in teaching higher order thinking skills.

The report further recommended that teachers collaborate more in analyzing student work and that the school adopt a homework policy that monitors and ties out-of-class work with what is going on in the classroom.

LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

Around 40 percent of students surveyed by the audit team indicated they did not feel safe in the school. The team reported that members observed irregular enforcement of safety policies, but seemed to attribute the problems to the middle school's status as a "tenant" of the building, which also houses South Floyd High School.

Another disconcerting finding is that 58 percent of the middle school students surveyed "feel the school has no real interest in their future." The report also indicates that around half of the students believe school personnel do not do enough to recognize and praise their performance. Parents appeared to share that belief. In addition, fewer than one-fourth

The team recommended improved communication among teachers and parents and that the school "foster a culture that recognizes and celebrates the successes of all students."

The school was also criticized for the lack of professional development opportunities for teachers that would address relevant needs of students.

After Patton's statement about the task force, all the legislators -- except for Senate President David Williams who was sitting directly behind the Governor - stood and applauded.

"I don't really see what can be gained by putting a task force together," Williams said in a press conference after the speech.

Williams, R-Burkesville, said the Senate will not approve a tax reform bill that includes any tax increase at all. He said the Senate has "been there and done that" with tax reforms that seem to have no tax increase, but actually

said House Speaker Jody Richards, D-Bowling Green, said he thinks comprehensive tax reform is "too important an issue to let die." He said he thought a joint task force was a good idea, and that the only way reform would get passed in the House, was if it was something the Senate had also agreed to.

But Patton's other issue of importance, the environment, was received with a more positive reaction from the leaders

Patton said he wants the issues of solid waste, recycling, litter and residential and business physical growth addressed by the end of the 2002 session. But he said work on that process should begin now.

He said he would like to see a statewide garbage collection program implemented in all the counties this session. He said mandatory collection wouldn't cost the state anything because it will be paid for by the con-SUTTICTS

ernment's role in mandatory collection as making sure each county has a way to collect the fees.

"Ninety percent of us do it nght," he said. "We make sure our garbage ends up in a safe, legal landfill. It's the other 10 percent that's giving all of us a bad name and making Kentucky less beautiful and less healthy than it can be

Richards said he couldn't comment on whether a bill about statewide garbage collection would pass because none has been introduced yet, but he said the House will work with the governor on the issue.

"In theory, the president of the Senate and I have always been in favor of garbage disposal, the devil's always in the details," he said.

Advance registered sophomores and juniors will pay tuition and fees in the Crager Room of the Adron Doran University Center from 9 a.m. until 5 pm. on the first business day. Seniors and graduate students will pay fees on Thursday: freshmen will complete the process on Friday. Admission to the payment arena is based on an alphabetical system, listed in the "Course Directory and Business Guide."

For new students, the process begins in the Office of Admissions, 301 Howell-McDowell Administration Building for undergraduates and in 701 Ginger Hall for graduate students. After being admitted, you may register in the department of your major.





Black lung rules must be tightened

President Clinton is running out of time to leave legacies. One of the most meaningful things he could do is save thousands of coal miners from an early, awful death from black lung.

The U.S. Mine Safety and Health Administration has proposed rules that would help prevent black lung in two ways. First, MSHA would take over the dustmonitoring program that is now administered by the coal companies themselves.

Mass evidence of cheating has been found, A 1998 series in the Louisville Courier-Journal found evidence that samples were often faked. Cheating and fraud were commonplace. Often the samples turned in by mine companies showed air in their mines was cleaner than the air at most street corners.

Secondly, the rules would tighten agency review of mine ventilation plans and increase the authority of inspectors to cite operators for dust violations

The rules are waiting for final White House approval. MSHA Director J. Davitt McAteer has been urging Clinton to approve them before he leaves office next month.


"Together, the changes we are proposing would act as the cornerstone of a restructured system to prevent black lung and silicosis." McAteer said.

About 1,500 miners a year die from black lung. Last month, the White House gave final approval to regulations that would make it easier for miners to qualify for black lung benefits, which is too often a lengthy and tortuous process.

But, as McAteer has said in the past, black lung is entirely preventable. If dust in mines is properly controlled, there will be no new cases of black lung.

In the introduction to its series on dust monitoring, the Courier-Journal said about the number of deaths: "It's as if the Titanic sank every year, and no ships came to the rescue. While that long-ago disaster continues to fascinate the nation, the miners slip into cold, early graves almost unnoticed."

McAteer is doing his best to change that. But only Clinton can make sure it happens.





get on, one year ago. This modest shortfall, if it materializes, can be handled without any significant disruption of service to our citizens. Our Budget Reserve Trust Fund stands at \$278 million, 4.1 percent of our annual General Fund Revenue. Our bond rating improved the last year and stands higher than it's ever been before.

Our personal income tax revenue continues to be strong. But we are concerned about the sales tax and the corporate income tax revenues. And, if the national economy slows down, state revenue could be affected. In summary, the current revenue situation appears stable.

And, with one exception, we're holding expenditures with-

in budgeted limits. That exception is Medicaid. Increased utilization and higher medical costs will cause a substantial increase in Medicaid obligations. We'll be discussing with you actions that will be necessary to bring costs within budgeted resources.

And we'll be asking you to consider other areas of concern between now and the end of March. I will ask you to enact the adjustments to the coal miner's black lung compensation program that I proposed in the 2000 regular session.

Some of our cabinets will be proposing adjustments to their programs which will be primarily operational issues without substantial change in policy.

I know that you'll be reviewing regulations, executive reorganizations and executive appointments.

These are all important subjects and this 30-day session will allow you to give them a more thorough review than would be possible in a regular session.

Our administration will be working with you in these and other areas but we'll also be going full bore implementing the aggressive agenda you've approved in three previous regular sessions and two special sessions since I've been governor.

First among these is education. It will always be our primary focus. While we're fully involved with KERA and your recent emphasis on teacher preparation and dropout prevention, and we're working with the CPE and our colleges and universities to imple-

state this year, I've had dozens of practitioners in both fields compliment us and express their appreciation for these initiatives. As these programs are fully implemented, we'll also be viewed as national leaders in improving services in these very important areas.

Job creation is a vital part of our overall strategy as we continue to promote Kentucky as a great place to do business. The results are showing. 1999 was the best year in the history of the Commonwealth for new job development and while the slowing national economy affected our job growth in 2000, we still had a good year creating new and better jobs.

While I have and will continue to travel the nation and the world

promoting Kentucky, I'm embarking on a special effort to promote the two most economically disadvantaged areas of the Commonwealth, Eastern Kentucky and our inner cities. You've approved special incentives for both of these parts of the state, but I've found that it's still difficult to get businesses to forget stereotypes and take a fresh look at these areas, so I'll be using the influence of the Governor's Office to get the attention of the people who should be taking advantage of these special opportunities and just don't know about them yet.

While we have problems in these specific geographic areas, as we look at the bigger picture of the state of the Commonwealth, most of our people are ' doing well.

As our nation enjoys unprecedented prosperity, so does Kentucky. Though we lag the nation in many indices of social progress, we are improving the lives of our people, in some ways gaining on our fellow Americans over the past decade. The percent increase in our wages is 7 percent greater than the nation as a whole. The rate of job growth is 17 percent greater than the nation and our manufacturing jobs have increased 12 percent over the past 10 years, while the United States has been losing manufacturing jobs. And in November our unemployment rate was below

Now, "to deny" is very different from "to lie." When a person lies they generally do so with intent. Denial is a little more complicated, because oftentimes the person who is in denial distorts reality because it is just too painful for them to openly accept it for what it truly is.

To become aware of denial in your life, you have to exhibit some self-introspection and a lot of personal strength. Not all of us, apparently, are capable of this.

If there are any young women out there who may happen to be reading this column, I beg you to pay close attention to what I am about to say. It's a message that in this day and age, you have probably heard quite often, right alongside messages that relate to date rape, substance abuse and the importance of the use of condoms. We sometimes become over-conditioned to these types of "pub-

While we still must pursue manufacturing jobs, we know the only way we can reach our goal is to convert our economy to knowledge-based, hightech industries. We're making progress implementing the new economy initiative and we'll be prepared to propose more changes to you in the 2002 session.

The net effect of our efforts is that we've stopped the out migration of our people that was so pervasive in the 1980s. There are now 4 million Kentuckians, an increase of 9.7 percent over the past decade. More people are moving into Kentucky to find economic opportunity than are mov-Fing out. We are moving in the right direction. We still have a long way to go

I take some pride in our progress in the decade of the nineties because 1 was involved in many of the important decisions of that era.

This General Assembly as a body can take even more credit because it has made the final decisions that have laid the foundation for the successes we're experiencing. All of us in this chamber and our predecessors have made the past 30 years in Kentucky a period of enlightenment; a time of change; a time of challenge. We as a people have answered that challenge and our progeny will be the beneficia-

We've laid the foundation upon which we can build a better future. To a great extent, our job is to persevere in our commitments to the future, particularly in education. We have made the right decisions. We just need to implement them.

Changing education is a slow process. Changing an economy is also slow. The two go hand-in-hand. They're the two rails of that railroad that will take us to a better standard of living and quality of life.

In its broadest sense, that's the stated goal of our administration; a standard of living and quality of life reflective of the nation as a whole by the year 2020.

As we attempt to measure our standard of living and quality of life, we must take into account many factors, and even then we're dealing with a very subjective goal. Economic status - income - is a very important determiner of well being, but that must be weighed against the cost of living. Few would challenge the argument that a Kentuckian making \$30,000 a year is much better off than a New Yorker making the same wage.

Nonetheless, we need to continue to improve wages in Kentucky relative to the national average. We can only do that by improving education and changing our economy.

improvements in our juvenile justice system are so critical. In five years we've quadrupled our expenditure on juvenile treatment programs. And in those five years we've turned one of the nation's most inadequate programs into one of the nation's best and most effective.

In the entire area of social services, the basic safety net that any of us could have needed if fate had dealt us a different hand, we've made progress. More Kentuckians have better health care, our welfare reform has worked in a more humane way than many states, and women and children are safer from neglect and abuse because of the work of First Lady Judi Patton and the laws you've passed.

And we've invested in the public infrastructure of Kentucky. Our communities, our businesses, our modern way of life, is based on the infrastructure built and paid for by those who have come before us - and we have an absolute obligation to invest in the infrastructure that will be needed by our children. And we've done that. The three budgets we've enacted since I became governor have appropriated more money for schools, courthouses, college buildings, water and sewer systems, recreational and community facilities and roads than in any similar period in our history. We've invested in the physical as well as the intellectual capital of our people.

And we've acted to preserve our rural way of life, our family farms. From securing the Phase II settlement with the tobacco companies to dedicating half of the Phase I money to agriculture, we've been faithful to our farmers because they represent the very essence of Kentucky - hard work, independence, neighbors, community.

We've supported our working people, we've promoted tourism, we've invested in the downtowns of our cities - we've addressed just about every aspect of Kentucky life, but we haven't done all that we need to do.

Another very important aspect of quality of life is our physical environment. It's also important to our economy because in this age, when a lot of people can work anywhere they choose to live, a quality environment can attract the very kind of people we need to achieve our economic goals.

While we've experienced some unique environmental challenges, the vast majority of Kentuckians enjoy a good, safe, clean environment. I'm proud of the Cabinet for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection's even-handed regulation of industry to protect our environment and our jobs.

The cabinet's protection of our rural lifestyle through regulations con-

know and love today will not be the Kentucky we leave to our grandchildren

We need to study the growth issue during the interim but as to solid waste, recycling and litter control, we can begin to act now. A comprehensive solid waste control program must include a systematic and thorough education element, to raise our awareness of the extent of the problem, and to create in all our minds and especially in the minds of our children a determination to eliminate all unsightly solid waste from our Commonwealth.

This garbage, which gives us and our guests a less than flattering image of Kentucky, comes from two primary sources, thoughtless littering from automobiles and deliberate illegal dumping of household waste. Education is the ultimate cure for the first and stronger laws properly enforced can be the cure for the latter.

Until we can change attitudes through education, we must have an effective highway cleanup program that includes all public roads; state, county and city, not just the major state arteries. But we can also have stronger anti-litter laws and we can do a better job of enforcing them.

But the unconscionable blight on our countryside, and in some out-ofthe-way places in our cities, is illegal garbage dumps. They're unsightly, they're dangerous, they're unhealthy and they're numerous, over 3,300 as estimated by the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet. They have to be cleaned up!

But until we stop people from using them and creating them, it's a losing battle to clean them up. Every person, every household, every business in Kentucky generates waste as a by-product of modern life, about five pounds per day per person, about 7 billion pounds a year in Kentucky.

Ninety percent of us do it right. We make sure our garbage ends up in a safe, legal landfill. It's the other 10 percent that's giving all of us a bad name and making Kentucky less beautiful and less healthy than it could

Eighty percent of us can get rid of our garbage the cheapest, most convenient way possible - we have a garbage service that comes by our house and will take our garbage to a sanitary landfill. We hardly give it a second thought. Half of the 20 percent that don't have this service available wish they had it and would gladly pay for it. Let me assure you that it's cheaper in time and money to have your garbage picked up at the curb in front of your house than it is to load it into your car and go out of your way to a county transfer station that may not be open when you want to get rid of your garbage.

When we analyze a system of taxation, there are at least three major elements that need to be considered. One is adequacy and for the purpose of tonight's discussion, I'm taking that subject off the table. I will not propose or support any measure to increase general tax revenue, and will oppose any measure to cut taxes which does not cut the currently enacted budget a like amount!

Another important element of tax policy is our competitive position relative to other states. There are many ways in which we're out of line with other states, especially our closest neighbors. We need to analyze our tax structure, compared to our neighbors and competitors and make appropriate adjustments. We can't move into a knowledge-based economy with a tax code designed for an industrial age.

The third essential element of a system of taxation is fairness --- who pays relative to how much they own and how much they earn. I believe that those of us who've prospered the most relative to the general society should pay relatively more to support the government of that society. Most people would support that theory but the disagreement will be about the degree of relative obligation. Here again, a good guide would be our sister states, particularly our close neighbors. By most accounts, we tax our working poor more heavily than most other states. Our state tax on motor vehicles is onerous. We tax drugs differently, depending on how they are dispensed, we still need to modernize the way we tax the telecommunication industry, and we have other examples of unfair taxes, high and low. The time has come to address these inequities. It's the second major item of unfinished legislative action on my agenda.

I've seen where leaders of both houses of the legislature have called for comprehensive tax reform. I'm ready. It's been studied, restudied, and the restudy has been restudied, to paraphrase words used in a recent national controversy. The time has come for action. Here again, I call for support; from both houses and from both parties.

I know there will be critics. Nothing we can do that's meaningful or important can ever be done without criticism. If meaningful progress were easy and obvious, it would have already been done. Leaders look for the solutions that require study and

Good health is a matter of prevention more than treatment. That's why our support for our public health departments was so important in the last session. And our early childhood initiative, our anti-smoking and drug prevention programs and our women's health initiative will make us healthier, as will our extraordinary KCHIP program for children's health insurance. Programs which promote physical exercise like our school sports, the Blue Grass State Games and the Senior Olympics are also very important. A healthy lifestyle is not something government can mandate but it is something that government can encourage.

Freedom from fear, especially fear of being the victim of crime, is also an essential element of a high quality of life. We have a relatively low crime rate in Kentucky but it's still too high. That's why we revised our criminal code and are building more prison beds and strengthening training and compensation programs for police officers and modernizing our courts of justice with buildings and technology - but here again, prevention is cheaptrolling the worst excesses of large animal feeding operations is vital to preserving the Kentucky we love. Its work on cleaning up illegal and unhealthy garbage dumps has been innovative and effective. But cleaning up after someone has polluted isn't the answer. And planning after a city is built isn't the answer either. Herein lies one of the two unfinished major initiatives I'd like to complete before my tenure in this office is finished.

I ask the General Assembly to address the issues of solid waste, recycling, litter, and residential and business physical growth by the end of the 2002 session and begin that process in this session!

I realize that some of these issues, especially growth, are complex and the proper foundation hasn't been laid, but we can begin now by establishing a task force that can start work soon and prepare a proposal for consideration in the 2002 session.

We must explore how we can give our communities the tools they need to ensure that they're growing in ways that preserve their quality of life without slowing their economic potential. Kentucky is developing its farmland at a rate that's ranked third in the nation. Many of our communities are seeing the high cost of unplanned growth. This is an issue that we must begin to address or the Kentucky we

And for rural residents, where collecting garbage is more expensive, it's a lot cheaper when everyone on a road takes the service, not just a few.

We need to ensure that curbside garbage service is available to every Kentucky residence and business and that every generator of garbage uses that service!

Yes, I know that solid waste control is a local government responsibility and I also know that 24 counties in Kentucky have taken that responsibility seriously by enacting universal garbage pickup service ordinances. The time has come for all counties to do the same thing. And it's our responsibility to see that they do. I know that rural solid waste collection is somewhat different from urban collection programs, primarily because counties normally don't have the means to collect the fees that cities do. That's something we can and must correct.

Counties should have as much authority and flexibility as they need to ensure that those who generate solid waste pay their fair share of the cost of disposing of it in a safe, healthy, and aesthetically pleasing way.

This is something we can do in this session. And let me assure you that it's good politics. I know. I've been there, done that, bought a t-shirt. Oh, I know, the opponents will make the most noise. But I put my faith in the people who want a clean Kentucky, a healthy Kentucky, a beautiful Kentucky and want to pay their fair share of the cost of making it that way.

I'm where I stand today because I put my faith in those kinds of people in Pike County 18 years ago when we enacted a universal garbage collection program. I'm for it in every county and I'm asking legislators from both houses and both parties to stand with me and enact this law in this session!

And then let's look for other ways to clean up Kentucky with recycling and litter control and dump cleanup programs and programs to encourage smart growth in Kentucky!

Another essential element of a good quality of life is a fair government, especially a government which is supported financially in an equitable manner. Now I realize that fairness is, in many ways, in the eyes of the beholder, but I think we could reach general agreement on a fair way to support Kentucky state government.

Billie Holiday

'JAZZ' and 'Mixed Media Jazz' harmonize

"Jazz music objectifies America," trumpeter Wynton Marsalis says at the outset of Ken Burns' much-anticipated,-10-part documentary, JAZZ, airing Mondays and Wednesdays, January 8 through 31 and Tuesdays, January 9 and 23 at 9 p.m. on KET.

January 6 thru January 12, 2001

Acclaimed documentary filmmaker Burns feels his newest series tells, in a very palpable way, the story of America. "The story of jazz is not just a story of this amazing music over the last century," Burns explains.

"It is a story of that century. It is about race, it is about two world wars, it is about a Great Depression, it is about sex, it is about drugs and the terrible cost of addiction. It is about creativity, and heroes and villains and fools. It is about the growth of cities. It is about civil rights."

Amidst this backdrop of American history, the series traces the growth and development of jazz—from the gritty streets of New Orleans to the Lincoln Gardens on Chicago's Southside, where Louis Armstrong first won fame; from Prohibition-era speakeasies to the wideopen clubs of Kansas City; from the Roseland Ballroom in Times Square, where only whites were allowed to

dance, to the Savoy Ballroom in Harlem, where people of all colors mingled.

Burns' jazz study uncovers some of America's most creative, original and—sometimes—most tragic personalities. From Jelly Roll Morton, Duke Ellington and Louis Armstrong to Billie Holiday and Miles Davis, JAZZ examines the creative geniuses whose sounds shaped the 20th century.

Ever-present in this historical journey is, of course, the music. Featuring more than 500 jazz pieces; 75 interviews with jazz enthusiasts, including musicians, writers, historians, chib owners and fans; and more than 2,000 archival film clips—many rare and never before seen—the series is an

extraordinary tribute to one of America's most unique musical forms.

The JAZZ Web site (www.pbs.org/jazz), launched on December 18, offers in-depth profiles of American jazz artists, information about the series and interactive programs which allow users to listen to differences among the varieties of jazz and create their own "jazz mix."

In harmony with Ken Burns' epic look at jazz in America. KET's Mixed Media offers a special tribute to jazz in Kentucky. While the Commonwealth may be the birthplace of bluegrass music, it has vivid jazz roots as well.

Airing Sunday, January 14 at 10 p.m. on KET, the hour-long Mixed Media Jazz Special spotlights the history of jazz in the Bluegrass.

The program includes live performances by Kentucky jazz artists. The Ovation Orchestra, a 14piece ensemble led by drummer John Roy and featuring vocalist June Kelly-Roy, performs big band music of the 1920s and '30s, while the Jamey Aebersold Quartet — led by the Louisville alto-saxophonist who has personified that city's

More than 900 years ago in western Kentucky, late prehistoric peoples constructed mounds on which they built their towns. At Wickliffe Mounds in Ballard County, the remains of this civilization can be viewed today. In this segment, Shuffett travels to Ballard County for a firsthand look at how some of the earliest "Kentuckians" lived

their lives.

Next, Kentucky Life looks at a "herd" of 79 thoroughbreds that thundered into Lexington last summer in a public art project called Horse Mania.

The exhibit, organized by the local arts and cultural council, featured fancifully decorated horses completed by regional artists. In this segment, we see many of the equines that dotted the city for more than four months.

Then, Kentucky Life cameras tour the Jefferson County Memorial Forest, which stands within sight of Louisville. Its more than 5,000 acres of hiking trails and pristine forest are designated as a National Audubon Wildlife Refuge.

Though most Kentucky Life viewers have come to expect treks to Kentucky's splendid outdoor retreats, it's unusual to find one just 15 miles from the towering buildings, noise and people of downtown Louisville,

Corned beef and cabbage

Mother always told us that whatever you did on New Year's Day is what you would be doing the rest of the year. Since I believed her, I always tried to avoid doing things I didn't like, lest I be forced to repeat them throughout the year (i.e., cleaning the kitchen and bathrooms, etc).

Daddy told us later that he supposed Granny Wheeler left the "dime" tradition out since they never had enough money to put in the pot.

Despite the fact that I love cabbage, I never could understand how something that smelled so horrible while cooking could be a harbinger of good luck, particularly luck that could last an entire year.

Some people think that substituting slaw for cabbage is a suitable replacement for the cruciferous leaf, but it isn't. If you don't like cabbage then you're doomed to have bad luck until you learn how to make it more palatable. At any time during the year, if something bad happens to you, you can always blame it on not having cabbage for New Year's.

It used to worry me about the people who didn't eat cabbage on New Year's Day. What happened to them during the year? I rationalized that the people who didn't eat cabbage were the ones who suffered all types of atrocities as well as committing them. I can just imagine a policeman asking a man why he hit his best friend and hearing him reply, "I don't know, officer. If only I'd had my cooked cabbage on New Year's this wouldn't have happened!"

If our family traditions/superstitions run true to form, next year at this time Ronnie and I will be sharing corned beef and cabbage with Mother, my sister Melinda and her husband Ed. After our repast, we will be traveling to Stanton in a pouring, driving snow storm to pick up my son. This will be followed by a long nap and more cabbage.

Hopefully, the year in between will be filled with lovely memories, good luck, health and happiness, and that our families will continue to be blessed with the gift of friendship.

Cabbage or not, the last four years have been difficult for my family. We have lost loved ones, weathered terrible illnesses, and have been forced to alter our lifestyles. Yet, through it all, we have been blessed with the love of kindness and understanding of family and friends. However, we are not alone. There are many others who face more crises on a daily basis than I will ever know, such as people who endure war on their home lands, children who go to bed hungry. I am blessed.

News Of The Weird

The debut CD from the Thai-Elephant Orchestra (Lampang, Thailand) was scheduled for December release, featuring six pachyderm prodigies playing crude versions of traditional instruments (drum, gong, bass, xylophone) and recorded intact, without overdubbing, to create music that (in the words of a New York Times writer) "strike(s) some Western listeners as haunting, others as monotonous." The CD's American producers, pointing to much academic research on elephants' natural musical abilities, said they plan a second album ("easy-listening," engineered, they said, to make it more accessible to a wider audience).

In November, federal drug officials busted what one agent called "the world's largest LSD lab," run from an abandoned missile site near Warnego, Kansas. Indicted were two educated establishmentarians as the alleged principals: William L. Pickard Jr., 55, deputy

director of a University of California Drug Policy Analysis program (and an expert on the illegal drug trade in Russia and a vegetarian, nonsmoking, marathon runner with a master's degree in public policy from Harvard), and Clyde Apperson, 45, a Silicon Valley computer consultant. Pickard obtained personal bail recommendations from the San Francisco district attorney and from a British lord.

Names in the News

Two University of Nebraska dentistry professors profiled in an October Lincoln Journal Star report: Drs. Jeffrey Payne and Randy Toothaker. Arrested in September for threatening an insufficiently pious judge in Kenner, Louisiana: Mr. Allah M. God Allah. The participants in a police chase in Jay. Oklahoma, in July: Officer Tracy Sixkiller, arresting Russell Hogshooter and Belinda Chewey.

The Entrepreneurial Spirit

Federal investigators in November charged Lake Forest, Illinois, physician Krishnaswami Sriram with Medicare fraud, based on records indicating that at least twice Sriram worked 70-hour days and once saw 187 patients in a single day, 131 of them in house calls. Records also showed, according to prosecutors, that he saw 32 patients subsequent to their dates of death and 49 patients one day in January 1999 while the city was virtually closed by a blizzard.

Engineer Masaaki Fukumoto, 36, of the Japanese firm NTT DoCoMo, announced in October that he had developed a prototype of a wireless telephone worn as a wristband and functioning via a device that converts audio signals into vibrations. Incoming calls cause the wrist to vibrate, and the wearer engages the phone by touching the thumb to the index finger. Speaking requires holding the wristband close to the mouth, and listening involves transferring the audio signal to the

eardrum, which is done by the user's sticking his finger in his ear.

USA Today reported in September on New Zealander Geoff Marsland's new CD consisting of 64 minutes of lawn mower noise, designed for those wishing to retaliate against annoying neighbors. Previously, Marsland released 64 minutes' worth of a crying baby, for couples trying to talk themselves out of becoming parents

Brazil's Catholic Church issued \$650,000 worth of "shares" on the Rio de Janeiro stock exchange in September, aimed at institutional investors who want to contribute to the church's social programs and who receive, instead of dividends, detailed reports on how their money is being used. offering of shares in an ancillary real estate venture, which will start by developing land adjacent to the church.

Chutzpah!

Massachusetts inmate Frederick Ford, serving eight years for paying a hit man \$11,000 in 1999 to kill two former associates (and convicted after the "hit man" turned out to be an undercover federal agent), petitioned a court in Boston in September to have the money returned to him, since the killings were never carried out.

In October, Ohio inmate Donald Harmon filed a \$500,000 lawsuit against his former attorney Martin Emrich, whom Harmon says was supposed to bribe a judge with \$10,000 of Harmon's money to get a favorable sentence; Harmon, however, wound up with a sentence almost double what he expected and now complains that he didn't get his money's worth from the bribe.

It's Not Over 'Til It's Over In December, a man in Kazakhstan turned up alive at

his own funeral after surviv-

ing a makeshift burial by friends in a shallow grave after he appeared to be electrocuted on power lines. And in October, Ben Holmes, 48, missing and declared dead in 1988, was shot by his exwife in Youngstown, Ohio, when he dropped in on her after a 20-year absence to claim half of her furniture.

Recurring Themes

News of the Weird has kept track over the years of the peril faced by insufficiently dowried wives in India and Bangladesh, noting burgeoning murder rates in

1994 and 2000, and noting in 1999 the preference for sulfuric acid attacks as the way Bangladesh husbands (and their mothers) deal with such wives. A December 2000 New York Times dispatch from Bangalore, India, reported that the new weapon of choice in mother-in-law attacks on wives is kerosene and that hospital burn wards are filled with "thousands" of grotesquely disfigured wives whose primary sin was either to bring too paltry a net worth to the marriage or to underperform household chores.

Least Competent Criminals

In October, Dee Blyth reported a burglary of her home in Chadwell Heath, Essex, England, in which thieves had helped themselves to what they thought was her stash of cocaine ("charlie" in local slang), leaving behind the distinctive residue of cocaine "lines" on a table after lifting several electronic appliances and jewelry worth about \$3,500. However, as Blyth told police and reporters, gleefully, the container of powder on her mantle (labeled "Newfoundland Charlie")

was not a coke stash but was an urn containing the ashes of her late dog, whose name the label bore.

Parisian widow whose beauty and enigmatic background ignite obsessive desire in the American.




