School bus in fender bender

An early morning rain and wet blacktop were apparently to blame for the collision of a school bus and a pickup truck, yesterday on KY 979 on Big Mud Creek.

No one was reported seriously injured, according to Floyd County Schools Supt. Dr. Paul Fanning, but a bus aide and one student reportedly sought medical treatment on their own "for precautionary tests."

The pickup apparently skidded on the wet road and slid into the bus on what is known as Doghouse Curve, about three miles from the Harold intersection of the state route and US 23.

Karen Johnson, interim transportation director for the school system, said the small bus sustained "some body damage," although it was driven back to the bus garage. She said the accident occurred shortly after 7 a.m.

Ummm, 'dam' good

The phrase "busy as a beaver" now holds enhanced meaning for one Floyd County man. O.T. Hammonds, of Hammonds Branch Road at Water Gap, says that beavers in his area "have cleaned house with me."

Hammonds is referring to damage done on his property in connection with the felling of various fruit trees. According to Hammonds, the beavers have been "busy for about a month now," gnawing on five separate fruit trees that once thrived on land toward the back of Hammonds' property along the edge of a nearby creek.

Hammonds said that he had one pear tree, one cherry tree, and three apple trees that all "bore real well. They all were loaded (with fruit) every year, especially the apple trees. One bore big red delicious apples, they were real good."

Thanks to the beavers population that have taken up residence along the creek adjacent to Hammonds' property, there will be no fruit harvest this coming season.

The beaver have completely gnawed through four of the five trees and, from the looks of things, the fifth is about to follow suit.

Around the pointed stumps of each tree lie a multitude of shavings and large chips of gnawed

Commission discusses range of topics

Members of the Wheelwright City Commission covered everything from alleged slander to horses on city streets in Thursday's special meeting.

As usual, sparks were flying at the special called meeting of the Wheelwright City Commission, held yesterday morning at City Hall.

After a request from an audience member to open the meeting with a prayer, provided by local minister Roy Cosby, the meeting was underway.

Immediately several members of the audience requested to be given a forum for their comments. Mayor David Sammons asked them to wait until the commission had conducted some of the business noted on the agenda.

After the approval of the last meeting's minutes, the city financial report, the city bills, and an audit

Ethics panel considers statewide recommendation

The Floyd County Ethics Commission, at its Tuesday meeting, discussed the possibility of recommending to area legislators that they seek adoption of a statewide ethics policy.

Commission chairman John Rosenberg volunteered to investigate the feasibility of the local group's mounting an effort to push for ethics regulations that would apply in all governments across the commonwealth.

Currently, each government unit is responsible for interpreting and adopting its own code of ethics, including rules on nepotism, the practice of elected or appointed leaders hiring relatives for government jobs.

Codes relating to nepotism vary from county to county. Floyd County allows up to one relative to work with an elected or appointed official, while some other counties in the area allow officials to put several family members on the public payroll.

report done by Prestonsburg CPA William Bottoms, about which Mayor Sammons reported that "nothing unusual was found," the commission moved ahead on a discussion of the assignment of department heads. The commission moved to assign Don "Booty" Hall as commissioner of utilities. After a short silence, Hall said, "I'll take it."

Following, Tom Engle, former Wheelwright City Police Chief, asked, from his seat toward the back of the meeting hall, if it was legally "all right" to assign Hall to this seat in regard to "litigation" matters that concerned the Utilities Commission

and Hall's parents.

Hall's mother and stepfather, Ruby and Paul Preston, have filed a lawsuit against the City of Wheelwright and the Utilities Commission that is still pending in court. The suit alleges that the couple were each wrongfully denied employment with the city.

A comment was made that "Booty will just be a liaison between the (city) council and the (utilities) department."

Another resident attending the meeting spoke up and said, "Do it right, you all, just do it right."

This comment was acknowledged and the consensus of the commission was that there should not be a problem with Hall's assignment, so the motion to approve him for the seat stood.

The mayor then had the city clerk, Mary Ann Slone, open the bids that the city had received in answer to a posting of work that needed to be done to replace the roof of the city hall.

The first bid opened was from Hy-Tek Construction, a Prestonsburg company. Hy-Tek's bid for materials and labor amounted to \$36,939.82.

The second bid opened was from Meade Builders of Dema. Meade's bid for replacement of the roof was \$34,856.

All members of the council were in agreement that both bids were too high for the city's budget to accommodate.

Hall suggested that the city "buy materials and hire a local group to do the work."

Mayor Sammons' comments on the matter were, "We've read the bids and everyone agrees that this is too much money, I agree also. Besides, who's going to pay for this? I think we can just say that the bids were rejected, and move on. We can bring the matter up at a later date."

The matter of what to do about the controversy surrounding the old city hall building was next on the agenda, and if sparks existed earlier, now they were being fanned into full-fledged flames, as everyone in the meeting hall seemed to have a comment to make on the matter—and all at the same time.

According to Andy Akers and Mary Ann Slone, at one time the garage that sits beside the old city hall was sold by the city to Elva Wenk. For reasons not understood by Akers or Slone, Wenk was never given a deed to the property. She did, however, have in her possession a receipt from the city that showed the amount of money she paid and for what she paid.

Following this sale, David Hall had reportedly expressed a desire to purchase the old city hall building. An agreement to this purchase was made and Hall claims that he then traveled to Prestonsburg to meet with the city's attorney, Timothy Parker, to have a deed made to establish his ownership of the land.

According to Mayor Sammons, Hall gave incorrect information when delineating the property dimensions on the deed and this resulted in Hall obtaining a deed that said that he owned not only the old city hall building but also the garage that had earlier been purchased by Wenk.

As a result, everyone involved with the matter has had concerns about bringing the matter to resolution.

Yesterday, Mayor Sammons said that he did not "think we need to buy it back. Let it go before a judge." Sammons said that he thought that something had already been filed by Parker in connection with the matter.

An audience member declared that "nothing has been filed."

Various comments were made all about the room that the garage belonged to Wenk because she had paid for it.

Wenk declared that she had "about \$3,000 total" invested in the building.

Hall also declared that, according to his deed, he owned the property.

Sammons answered, "But you put down information that I didn't approve."

To which Hall responded, "I took down the deed you gave me."

Sammons again asserted that he believed the matter needed to be taken to court for a judge to rule upon.

Several commission members disagreed. Akers commented that "it would be best to settle this thing out of court and save the city a lot of money in legal fees and court costs."

As Wenk and Hall both approached the commission, audience comments became louder and more insistent.

At this point, Police Chief Charles Johnson stood up and addressed the audience saying, "People, people, be civil. Listen to

me, let one person at a time talk. Let's do this civilized."

Ultimately, the mayor acknowledged the motion to settle the matter out of court, and Hall seconded the motion.

Mayor Sammons, however, asked the clerk to note that he was in protest of settling out of court and that he voted "no" on the motion.

Akers then made a motion not only to settle the matter out of court, but also to have all litigation in regard to the matter dropped.

Hall seconded this motion.

Again, Mayor Sammons noted his objection and again voted "no."

As the matter stood, a decision had been made to buy the property back for \$2,500 from David Hall and then make a clear deed for Elva Wenk.

Next, members of the Ethics Committee were present to voice their objections to the behavior of Lowell Parker at a recent Utilities Commission meeting. Their objections stemmed from comments that were made about an ethics commission member, allegedly slandering him in public.

Hubert Farmer made the comment that it "is not ethical to put people down in public." He further complained that Parker "puts his employees and other people down in public. That's not right."

James Butler, also a member of the Ethics Commission, said that "comments were made against a member of the ethics commission, that he wrote bad checks and should not be serving on the commission. If those comments were made about me, then I would like to explain the situation."

Butler then went on to say that at one point, he signed the responsibility of the family checking account over to his wife and during the transition, some mistakes were made, creating an overdraft on the account. He said the mistakes were later corrected and all charges in connection with the matter were dismissed without prejudice.

Butler said as he presented papers to the commission, "Here are the papers. You explain to me how, if I am such a bad person, how is it that I am a sheriff's deputy and a licensed minister. If someone wants me to resign, I want it typed up by the clerk and sent to me."

Hazel Armour, a local resident, spoke up from the audience, saying, "I refuse to let him resign. He is a good neighbor, a wonderful neighbor. He is a good person who goes out of his way to do the right thing and to help others. He always helps people."

Another of Butler's neighbors echoed the same sentiment.

Mayor Sammons said that he didn't think anyone wanted Butler to resign. To which Butler commented, "Then let's do it right. Let's work together for the common good of Wheelwright, Kentucky. Let's move forward, there are no big I's or little you's, let's just move forward."

The mayor and commission agreed and the next topic brought up for discussion was that the fire department needed to have a tank repaired.

Akers said that he was "just reporting the problem."

A motion was made and approved that the city would pay for half of the cost of the repair of the tank. This motion was later amended by the mayor for the city to pay the entire cost of the repair of the tank.

Mayor Sammons said, "The fire department serves the entire city and community, I think we can pay for the tank repair."

This motion was also approved.

In other fire department business, Hubert Farmer reported to Akers that he knew of an area of woods that needed to be burned. Akers took note that he would check into the matter.

Moving to business of the police department, Johnson reported that he had recovered several stolen bicycles and returned them to their original owners, except for two, and he did not know whom they belonged to. He addressed the audience and commented that he needed help from the community on the matter.

Johnson also reported that the police car was having trouble maintaining a charged battery. He said he was told that the siren box was draining the charge.

A motion was made and approved to take the vehicle to a garage and have the problem checked and corrected.

Johnson then commented that he would soon be traveling to Richmond for police training and that he "needed a coat, a winter coat."

Mayor Sammons said that he had "no problem with buying a coat. We will check on the prices of coats,

and buy a coat."

Johnson then reported that he had begun to log mileage on the patrol car for each shift and that he would also begin "to do a log sheet on the areas I patrol and when."

Butler commented on the problem with four-wheelers in the area. He said that they were being ridden on the city streets and sidewalks at all hours of the night and that they were creating a disturbance for residents.

Johnson said that the laws had recently changed in connection with four-wheelers. He said that a four-wheeler can now be on the public roadway for two-tenths of a mile as long as they had an express purpose for being there.

Johnson further said that the new laws stated that the operator of a four-wheeler must be 16 years of age and have a valid Kentucky driver's license.

Johnson then said, "I will do my job. I will do what the law states. I will go by that blue book and support and uphold the KRS."

Public comments were then made about the legality of horses being ridden on the streets of town and about a mixture of sand and black top that had been spread on "79 Hill".

Butler said that the mixture was creating slick roads and that when you brake on it, "you slide."

Commission members agreed to look into both the issue of "79 Hill" and the horses.

Next, Laura Bowers had some comments to make in regard to the most recent utilities meeting. Bowers said that conduct at the meeting was "dreadful."

Commission member Bruce Johnson agreed that "he (in reference to Lowell Parker) was way out of line."

Bowers told Hall that he "should come to the meetings. You all put him on (the utilities board) and you should come to the meetings."

Hall agreed to try to attend the next meeting.

Commission members present at yesterday's meeting were Mayor David Sammons, Andy Akers, Don Hall, and Bruce Johnson. City Clerk Mary Ann Slone was also present.

Commission member Ruby Johnson had appeared earlier, but left because of illness.

City Attorney Timothy Parker had planned to attend the 6 p.m. meeting that had originally been scheduled, but had a conflict in scheduling that prevented him from attending the special called 11 a.m. meeting.

Peggy Bradford, secretary of the local ethics panel, said the commission is considering writing to State Rep. Greg Stumbo and other area legislators to encourage them "to push for a statewide ethics policy."

Bradford said the commission is also reviewing local county officials' financial disclosure statements, which, according to code, must be reported each year. She said the disclosures must be made not only by elected officials, but also by any county employee who has the authority to make purchases of more than \$500.

She complimented Jailer Roger Webb for his staff's prompt financial reporting. "He makes sure all (employees) have them in," she said.

Bradford said several elected officials have not turned in their reports yet, and she reminded that the code requires the financial disclosure forms to be turned in to the County Clerk's office within 10 days of their swearing in.

She is working with County Clerk Chris Waugh to make sure that everyone is in compliance by the January 30 deadline.

Rhonda Burchett was recognized as a new member of the commission. She replaces Bobby Akers, who resigned.

The next meeting of the ethics commission is scheduled for Tuesday, February 27.

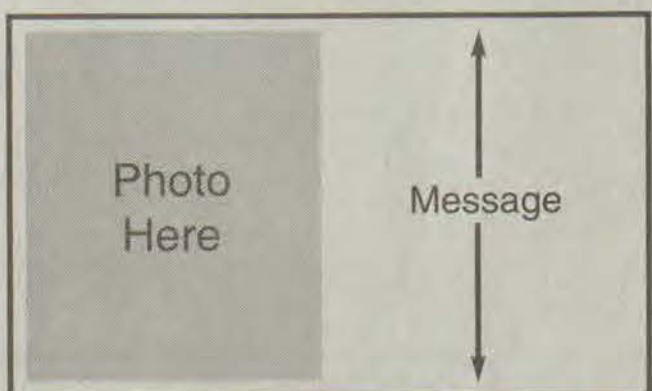

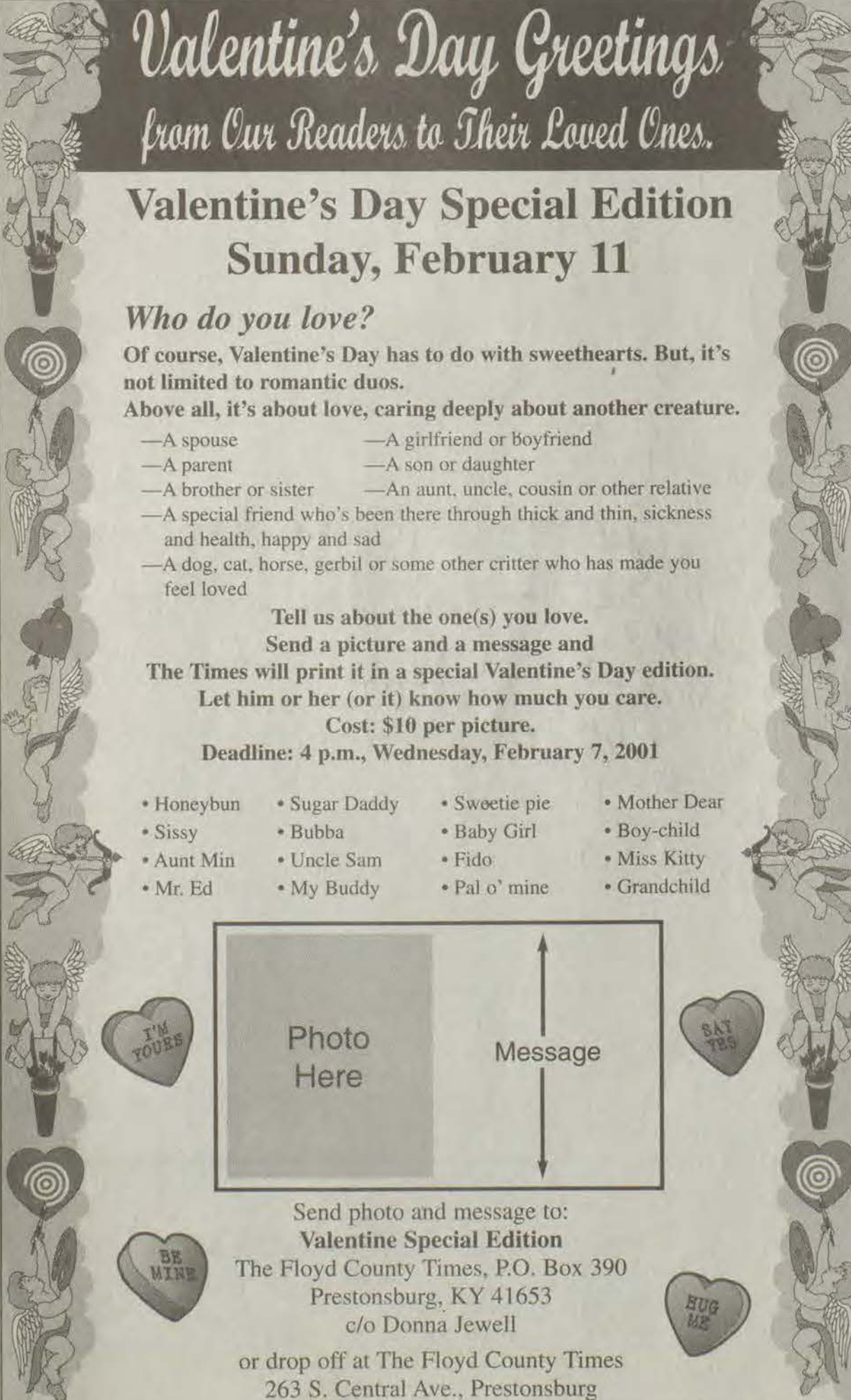

Use of kerosene as home heating oil is non-taxable

Section 4081 of the Internal Revenue Code imposes a tax on fuels such as gasoline and diesel fuel. Effective July 1, 1998, the Code was amended to include kerosene as a taxable fuel. However, the use of kerosene as home heating oil is non-taxable.

If federal excise tax is paid on clear kerosene used as home heating oil, the purchaser may file a claim for a credit or refund of the tax on Form 1040, U.S. Individual Income Tax Return, according to the IRS.

Dyed kerosene is available in most areas. Since there is no federal excise tax on dyed kerosene, no claims for credit or refund should be filed on dyed kerosene used as home heating oil. Purchases of clear kerosene for use as home heating oil may be made tax-free if purchased from a retailer who has a "blocked pump" approved by the IRS.

Individuals purchasing home delivery of heating oil generally qualify for the credit since these sales cannot be made tax free. If the federal excise tax is stated on your invoice, you should file for the credit.

Claims for credit or refund of federal excise tax on kerosene used as home heating oil are made on

your individual income tax return, Form 1040. You must complete Form 4136, Credit for Federal Tax Paid on Fuels, and attach it to your return.

If there is tax due on your return, the fuel credit will lower the amount of tax due. Any remaining balance of the fuel credit will be refunded to you. If there is no tax due, the entire

credit will be refunded to you. If you are not required to file a tax return, you will need to file one to receive a refund.

Any questions may be directed to the Louisville Excise Tax Group at 502/327-3080, ext. 139. Form 4136 may be downloaded from the IRS web site at www.irs.gov or ordered by calling 1-800-829-3676.

"I thought about trying to trap them or getting rid of them somehow," said Hammonds, "but I didn't know if I could by law and all."

According to Jayson Plaxico, district biologist for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, "Yes, you can kill beavers."

Plaxico adds, "But, as many people in the eastern Kentucky area have found, it's better to do long term prevention. An example is if you have an apple orchard and you put up a fence around it to prevent the beavers from entering it. Putting 'hardware cloth' around the tree as high up as you think the beaver can get to is another prevention alternative."

Many people in the local area seem to be unaware that beavers actually live in and thrive in local creeks and waterways.

Plaxico echoed this sentiment. "People are actually surprised that they have beavers on their property. Kentucky has seen an explosion in its beaver population over the past couple of years. The number one complaint we have concerning beavers is the damage they cause."

"Kentucky law reads that animals, except elk, caught doing damage can be killed. Exclusion, however, is by far the best method (of control)," Plaxico said.

Most of the damage caused by

beavers is a result of their efforts to build dams and bank burrows. Beavers build dams to create lodging for raising their young, sleeping, and food storage during severe winter weather.

So, even though their presence can be a nuisance and they are capable of destroying vegetation, including favored trees, on your property, the beaver, after all, is only attempting to do what we all do every day — protect and feed their families.

If beaver are a problem in your area, you may call the Department of Fish and Wildlife at 606/886-9608 for further information on how to control the population through the use of environmentally, as well as animal-friendly, alternative methods of control.

According to Plaxico, February is extended beaver trapping season. All other trapping seasons end in January, except the beaver trapping season.

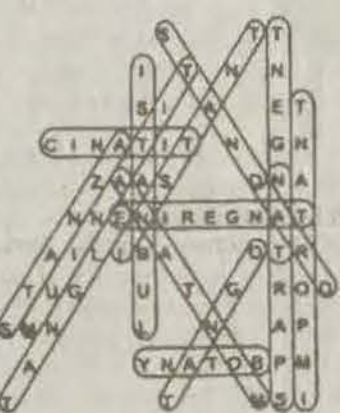

It's time for some 21st century predictions

- 1955: Disneyland opens in California; 1956: The interstate highway system is created by President Eisenhower; 1957: The first Japanese car, a Toyota, is sold in the U.S.; 1958: The first credit card is launched by Bank of America;

- 1962: The first Wal-Mart opens; 1963: Equal pay for equal work is required; 1964: The Civil Rights Act becomes law; 1964: The Surgeon General reports that smoking causes lung cancer; 1965: Medicare is signed into law by President Johnson;

- 1971: The single-chip microprocessor is invented by Intel; 1971: MCI begins to compete with AT&T; 1973: Federal Express begins operations; 1973-74: The OPEC oil embargo occurs; 1979: The Three Mile Island nuclear accident changes Americans' views on

nuclear power generation;

- 1980: Reagan is elected president; 1981: Microsoft is chosen to provide the IBM operating system; 1982: The current bull market begins; 1988: The savings-and-loan crisis peaks; 1989: The Berlin Wall falls, a triumph of capitalism and Reagan policies; 1995: Netscape goes public.

Those were pretty significant events in their time. Now, let's look ahead to what may occur in the 21st century.

- 2004: NIBCO celebrates its 100th anniversary (Sorry, I couldn't resist); 2010: PCs, TVs, cell phones and pagers have merged into a single, voice-activated micro-unit installed in fashionable eyeglasses; however, sneezes and burps can cause inadvertent on-line stock trades; 2020: Microsoft bounces back from its breakup by opening a popular chain of "wired" retirement homes for Silicon Valley retirees; 2030: The internal-combustion engine is outlawed; the battery-powered "Energizer Special" NASCAR wins at Daytona with an average speed of 37 mph before a crowd estimated at 23 people and one stray dog.

Refuge policy development in the home stretch, U.S. Fish and Wildlife service says

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has released several draft policies for public comment, providing guidance on public recreation and educational activities and conserving wilderness on the 93-million-acre National Wildlife Refuge System.

With this announcement, the Service has largely completed development of an extensive body of policy necessary to implement the National Wildlife Refuge System Improvement Act, the system's first organic legislation which President Clinton signed into law in late 1997.

"A lot has changed since the first refuge manager patrolled for poachers in a sailboat almost a century ago," said U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Director Jamie Rappaport Clark. "Once these policies are final, they will form a solid foundation to guide the most important aspects of modern refuge management."

Policies released January 16 are:

► The proposed General Recreation Policy, which provides general guidelines for managing recreational and educational uses on units of the refuge system.

► Six draft policies, Hunting, Fishing, Wildlife Watching, Wildlife Photography, Environmental Education, and Interpretation, which update and replace the Service's existing policy on recreation providing specific guidance on the "priority public uses" given preference over all other uses in the Improvement Act

► The draft Appropriate Refuge Uses Policy, which spells out a process for evaluating uses other than those six priority uses on refuge

lands.

► The draft Wilderness Stewardship Policy updates existing wilderness management guidance and reaffirms the Service's commitment to managing wilderness to accomplish the purposes of the refuge. This draft policy spells out how wilderness will be handled during the preparation of Comprehensive Conservation Plans, and the proper management of the priority public uses in wilderness areas, among other items.

► The draft Mission, Goals, and Purposes policy clarifies the interaction between the mission of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the goals of the refuge system, and the purposes for which each refuge was established.

President Clinton signed the National Wildlife Refuge System Improvement Act into law in October 1997, establishing wildlife conservation as the single mission of the system for the first time and creating new decision-making processes to strengthen refuges' relationship with the public. In keeping with the spirit of the Act's call for expanded public involvement in refuge management, the Service has released all draft refuge policies for public comment since the law was signed. Taken together, the policies will help ensure that individual refuges are managed consistently across the country as a true National Wildlife Refuge System.

In a related move, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service also published its final Biological Integrity, Diversity, and Environmental Health policy today. The final policy has been substantially revised in

response to congressional, state and public comments received following the release of the draft policy. Ecological Integrity, released on October 17, 2000. The final policy provides guidance and basic principles for wildlife and habitat management practices.

The full text of all these policies can be found at <http://www.fws.gov/r9pdmi/home/newfrnotice.html>. The Service will accept written comments on the proposed policies for 60 days.

"Preparing these policies over the past three years has been a tremendous effort, and we are looking forward to shifting gears and working to ensure that these are carried out consistently at refuges across the country," Clark said. "I want to thank the Service staff and our partners at state agencies and conservation organizations who have devoted so much of their time and energy to strengthening the refuge system for the benefit of future generations of Americans."

Since Theodore Roosevelt founded the first refuge in 1903, the National Wildlife Refuge System has grown into a 93-million-acre network of lands and waters that provide "stepping stones" of habitat for many species of migratory birds and other wildlife, sanctuary for hundreds of the nation's endangered species, and secure spawning areas for the nation's last healthy wild salmon fisheries.

More than 35 million people annually visit refuges to enjoy activities such as hunting, fishing, wildlife observation and photography, and environmental education and interpretation.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is the principal federal agency responsible for conserving and enhancing fish, wildlife and plants and their habitats for the continuing benefit of the American people. The Service manages the 93-million-acre National Wildlife Refuge System which encompasses more than 530 nation-

ally significant fisheries, conserves and restores wildlife habitat such as wetlands, and helps foreign governments with their conservation efforts. It also oversees the federal aid program that distributes hundreds of millions of dollars in excise taxes on fishing and hunting equipment to state fish and wildlife agencies.

The agency enforces Federal wildlife laws, administers the Endangered Species Act, manages migratory bird populations, restores

al wildlife refuges, thousands of small wetlands and other special management areas. It also operates 66 national fish hatcheries, 64 fishery resource offices, and 78 ecological services field stations.

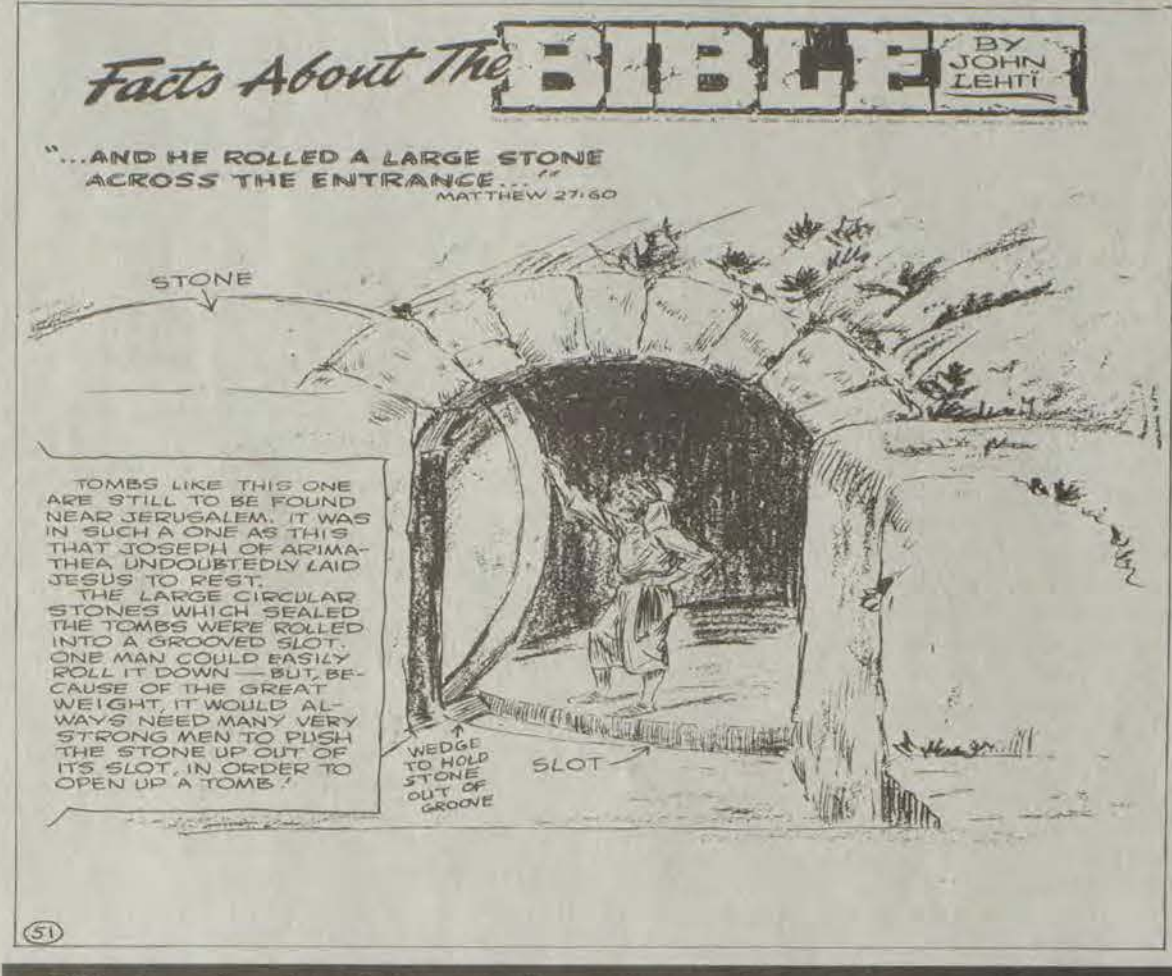

The major league baseball winter meetings ended of late with the big news being the amount of money Texas Rangers owner Tom Hicks spent in the hopes of propelling his

team into the World Series come next October.

Hicks seriously challenged his financial fortunes, given the costly acquisitions of Alex Rodriguez, Andres Galaragga and Ken Caminiti, a trio of big bats capable of daunting any pitching staff no matter how potent. They will join the likes of other heavy-handed lumber merchants such as Rafael Palmeiro, Rusty Greer, Ivan "Pudge" Rodriguez and Gabe Kapler.

But even before the most recent shoring up process, the Rangers were able to hit along with the very best clubs in the American League, including the New York Yankees. It's obvious that Hicks now intends for his team to simply outscore the opposition, relying on raw power rather than any pretense of finesse.

Yet there is a considerable downside to all this muscle building. To date the Rangers possess the weakest pitching staff in the AL, their collective ERA for the 2000 campaign being a doleful 5.52.

Many a scribe has asked Hicks, et

al, why some of the mountain of greenbacks expended for on-field talent didn't go toward the purchase of some first-class arms.

Replied Texas manager Johnny Oates, "We made a legitimate effort to upgrade our pitching. It just didn't work out. There's not a whole lot of pitching out there. In getting a return for the money, I'll take a guy who can play 162 games a year over a guy who can pitch 32."

Oates also pointed to the improvements the club has made in its defensive status. Alex Rodriguez, in addition to his \$252 million bat, is a four-time All-Star as a shortstop. He sports not only a sure glove, but also a strong throwing arm. Catcher Pudge Rodriguez is also an All-Star. And third base, a trouble spot of no small dimension last season, will be manned by Caminiti, a three-time Gold Glove recipient.

Completing the infield is second baseman Randy Velarde, a superior defensive performer brought over from the Oakland Athletics, and the first base duo of Palmeiro and

Galaragga, both capable fielders and endowed with that little extra reach.

Given these very definite pluses, Oates opined, "A much improved defense and run-production capacity can't help but improve our pitching."

Let us pray, right?

How important is pitching? Can great hitting and standout glove work offset a weak mound staff?

Speaking to this subject, much revered manager Whitey Herzog observed, "You need one thing to be a winner — a good bullpen. If you don't have outstanding relief pitching, you might as well p— on the fire and call in the dogs."

Both Don Drysdale and pitching buddy Sandy Koufax knew where the game was played. During their days with the Los Angeles Dodgers, they often had to hurl shutouts to prevail.

Quoth Drysdale, "Hitters always think they know more than they really know. But all that's necessary is keeping the ball away from the fat part of the bat. And to do that, you simply move the hitter off the plate. In essence, the pitcher has to find out if the hitter is timid. If the hitter is timid, then the pitcher has to remind the hitter he's timid. But if the hitter is not timid, the pitcher must make him timid."

Added Koufax, "Pitching is the art of instilling fear. Show me a guy who can't pitch inside and I'll show you a loser."

The great Satchel Paige said, "Hitters don't own nothing. Just keep the ball off the sweet spot (of the bat). And you do that throwing low and away. That's how they can't hurt you. Not even Ted Williams."

Remember the old songsong "Warren" Spahn and (Johnny) Sain and pray for rain."

Nobody wins without good pitching. Nobody.

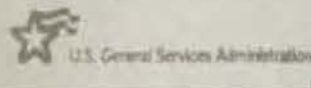

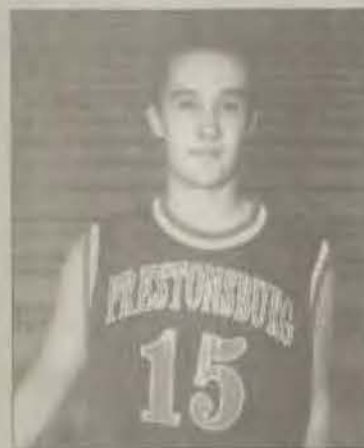

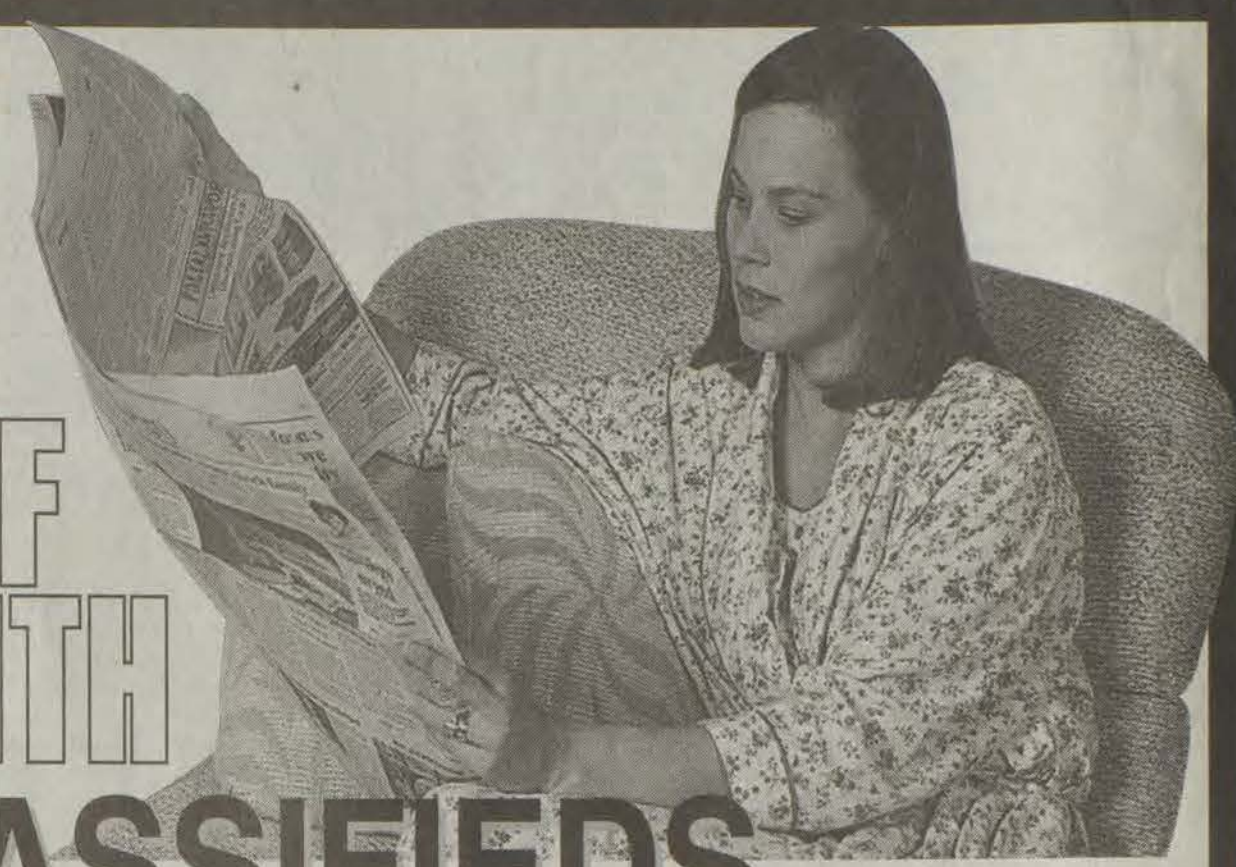

Great Performances celebrates Copland's best-loved series in "Copland's America," airing Sunday, January 21, at 10 p.m., on KET.

Highlighting the evening are "The Boatmen's Dance" from Copland's Old American songs; "Song of the Guerrillas" from the film "The North Star"; excerpts from Appalachian Spring, El Salon Mexico and other, more rare Copland selections, including a piece written for the 1939 World's Fair.

The telecast opens with Fanfare for the Common Man, "a kind of phantom National Anthem," says composer/conductor Jonathan

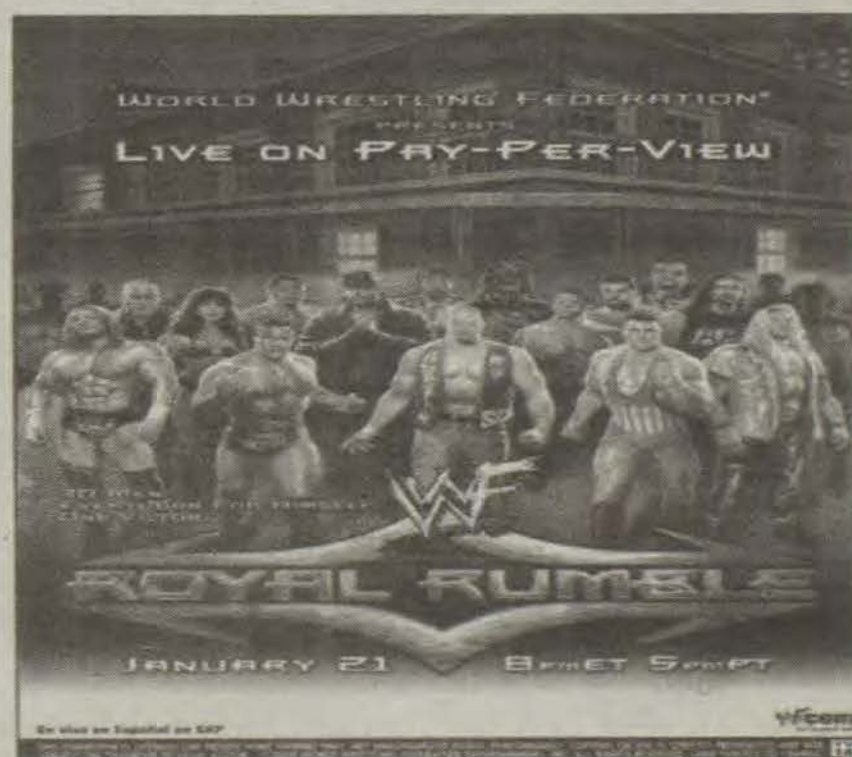
Sheffer, who leads the Eos Orchestra in this Copland tribute.

"When I think of 'American,' in the best sense of the word," says composer John Corigliano, "I think of plain talk. Say it. Articulate it. Don't mystify it; don't cover it with whipped cream. Say it. And I think Aaron [Copland] said it."

Critter Corner

So much is happening in the fields of animal behavior and training that it can be mind-boggling at times, but it is providing us with a wealth of new information and teaching tools.

Having dyslexia (undiagnosed until a college roommate majoring in special education picked up on it), I am very aware that different animals learn in different ways. When an animal is just not getting the message about a particular behavior with traditional methods, my opinion is that we humans are not conveying information effectively. It's time to switch gears.

I've been very interested for quite some time in "clicker training." You've probably seen some of this on Animal Planet, the Discovery Channel, or TLC. It's the same method used to train performing marine mammals, such as dolphins and whales, although the clicker is usually replaced with a whistle.

The proper name for this training method is operant conditioning. You've heard this term if you studied a man named B.F. Skinner in college psychology. Basically, operant conditioning involves influencing behavior (animals or people) by reinforcing certain actions. This is another one of those concepts that's much easier to understand when you are given an example.

We see a type of operant conditioning in action when the family cat appears out of thin air whenever he hears the can opener. The cat doesn't actually think, "Wow, I'll bet that's a can of cat food being opened!" (although it can sure seem that way).

Actually, the sound of the can opener has become associated with the positive reinforcement of often being fed shortly thereafter. That's a simplified version, but you get the idea.

Trainers have taken advantage of animals' ability to make an association between some type of sound and the occurrence of something desirable. "Clickers" have become the noisemaker of choice for dog training. These are small plastic-and-metal boxes that make a loud "click-click" sound when pressed. Start with a bag of wieners or cheese cut into small pieces. If you spend a few minutes giving the dog a treat each time you click, you soon see him take on an expectant look each time he hears the sound.

What happens if you begin to click only when he is in a sitting position? It may take a few more minutes, but before long, you can almost see the little light bulb go on over his head! "This is a game, and I think I just discovered a rule! If I put my body in this position, I can make this person click, and a click means a treat! Cool!"

The weird thing is, you just taught "sit" and you didn't say a word. This drove me crazy at first. I was so used to saying "sit," then luring or placing the dog into that position. Now, I knew that the word meant nothing to the dog originally, but I still felt the "command" should come first. When clicker training, however, you get the behavior first, then you add the word. It helped me to think of this as "naming" the behavior for the dog, rather than "commanding" it. Once the dog begins performing, or "offering" the behavior fairly pre-

dictably, it is time to start adding the word that goes with the particular action. Say "sit" just as the dog's bottom hits the ground — soon an association will form in the dog's mind between the sound of the word and the sitting position. Click and treat as before.

In a little while, try saying "sit" before the dog offers the behavior. If he drops into position (even if it appears accidental), click and reward him with a "jackpot" of several treats. If he doesn't offer the behavior, do nothing. He didn't do anything wrong; you just raised the criteria that he has to meet to earn the click. Try again in a few seconds. Unbelievably, your dog may be sitting on command, off leash, within five minutes or so.

Of course, you will need to practice this to keep the command fresh in his mind. Over time, you will reduce the frequency of treats — two clicks to earn a treat, then three, and so on — and substitute verbal praise and petting.

Eventually, the clicker will not be necessary at all, but even then it will still be a very powerful tool — an occasional, random click and treat that takes the dog by surprise cements the behavior and makes it much less likely that the dog will ever forget it.

In the meantime, you are showing him all sorts of new things he can do to make you click — "down," "shake hands," "say your prayers" — your imagination, patience, and the dog's physical abilities are the only limits.

Another fun approach is to take something unique that the dog does, give it a name, and "put it on cue." For example, our

Dalmatian has a habit of sitting up on her haunches. I gave this a name, "sit pretty," and she now does it on command. I've read that some of the best animal tricks in television and movies started with a trainer using something the animal did spontaneously.

Believe it or not, this technique works with cats, too. The sessions usually have to be shorter, because cats get bored quickly with repetition, and the treats must be very desirable, such as bits of shrimp or tuna. You have to convince a cat that this is worth his while.

I'd love to get a group together to explore more about this method. I'm new at it myself, but I got hooked when I attended a seminar by Karen Pryor (the mother of clicker training) a couple of years ago. Let me know if you're interested. NEWS OF THE WEIRD

The technology sector of the economy is in such a precarious state, according to a January story in U.S. News & World Report, that "Imara," a 44-year-old "business intuitive" with an MBA, has attracted a large following among entrepreneurs and venture capitalists (including 30 paying clients) who seek her investment and business-development advice that she says she acquires by extrasensory perception. "In these troubled times," said an Imara associate, "people are looking for a different insight that gives them a competitive advantage." Said Imara: "(C)ompanies don't have time to do market research studies, which can take months. I can give them feedback in an hour."

Scheduled for unveiling in May at Britain's National Memorial Arboretum in Alrewas, Staffordshire, is a World War I commemorative statue to honor England's 306 combat deserters. According to the Arboretum's director, "(T)here has been a sea change in attitude,

towards more understanding" of the plight of cowards and others who abandoned their comrades, especially for about 100 teen-agers whose principal sin was to run away after fearing they would be punished for lying about their ages in order to enlist. The director said some veterans' organizations support the memorial.

Still More from Election 2000

William R. Macera was re-elected mayor of Johnston, Rhode Island, despite being found in October in a car that police said heavily reeked of marijuana smoke; he narrowly edged out write-in candidate Louis L. Vinagro Jr., who had been arrested hours before the election for threatening a state official inspecting his waste-hauling business. And Bobby Banks, 20, was elected to the New Bern, North Carolina, soil conservation board but was then arrested for having illegally registered to vote as a convicted felon. And in races that ended in ties in Delhi, Minnesota (mayor), Fife Lake,

Michigan (township supervisor), Louisville, Nebraska (city council), and Hickman, Kentucky (school board), things were settled by, respectively, a draw of cards, a draw from a hat, a draw of cards and a coin toss.

Unclear on the Concept

Three Mexican migrant workers told reporters in November that the owner of Poncho's Cantina in Auburn, Maine, forbade them from speaking Spanish at their table while they were dining on Tex-Mex food and said they were considering a complaint to the state Human Rights Commission.

Sean Dix has been angry at CNN since 1996, when a reporter was critical of his dental-floss-holder invention (a product review that probably caused Dix's then-sprouting sales to fall off). In the ensuing four years, Dix has reportedly sent 6,000 faxes to Ted Turner and CNN protesting the televised report. In an April 2000 fax (according to a December report in the Village Voice), Dix intimated that he would

kill Turner, which he prefaced this way: "It is at this point that I have come to the end of my attempts to deal with you in a rational manner (after 6,000 faxes)."

In December, Angela L. Pearn, 30, of Akron, Ohio, won her lawsuit that had charged DaimlerChrysler and Rolling Acres Dodge with fraud for concealing that the car they sold her had a history of trouble and was officially a "lemon" under state law. An elated Pearn told reporters afterward, curiously: "Now people will know that not all car dealers are honest."

Bright Ideas/Schemes

Jennifer Garves, 22, and her mother, Karen Krause, 43, were charged in Waupun, Wisconsin, with child neglect and concealing a corpse for what police say was a scheme last June to deflect attention from the death by blunt trauma to Garves' 2-day-old boy. According to police, the women took the baby's body to a

restaurant, dined while pretending the boy was still alive, then expressed alarm that he had suddenly stopped breathing. Hospital and restaurant employees later expressed their suspicions to police, and after an investigation, the women were arrested in December.

To help the Netherlands' meat-exporting business (already No. 3 in the world), but recognizing the country's small land area (half the size of South Carolina), Agriculture Minister Laurens-Jan Brinkhorst recently endorsed a think tank's proposal to build a six-story "agropark" of pig pens, chicken coops and salmon pools. An Animal Protection Society spokesperson likened the building to a concentration camp for animals, but proponents said the facility would be less animal-dense than some farms are now. Said one developer, "If people can live in apartment buildings, so can pigs."

Three (possibly four) of the 88 victims of Alaska Airlines Flight 261 in January 2000 led secret (separate) sex lives in Mexico or Guatemala, according to federal lawsuits filed in San Francisco by reputable U.S. attorneys who seek compensation for the men's alleged offspring. However,

according to a San Francisco Chronicle investigation in November, foreign mourners (typically a "great-aunt") often run scams, producing "evidence" that a dead man had a clandestine lover and had fathered a child, that the lover had also died tragically, and that the "great-aunt" thus deserves a major payout (in this case, from Alaska Airlines and Boeing). (In one claim, the alleged mother was a flamboyant Mexican Zapatista rebel, killed in combat in 1994.)

Things You Thought Didn't Happen Anymore

Nathaniel Bar-Jonah, 43, was arrested in Great Falls,

Montana, in December and charged with killing a 10-year-old boy in 1996, and because of notes he made and a psychiatric evaluation, police believe he may have used parts of the body in meat casseroles. And in December, in the Netherlands town of Best, two men were sentenced to 12 months in jail for conducting a duel with pistols, over a woman. And in November, accountant Gnanasuravi Raveendran, 51, told a UK Regional Press reporter in Bexley, England, that his brother had just suffered an attack of epilepsy shortly after trying to prune Raveendran's allegedly "cursed" hedge, following fatal attempts to prune

it by his sister in 1997 and his brother-in-law in 2000.

Least Competent Criminals

Seven soldiers from Fort Carson, Colorado, were arrested in December, quickly caught after allegedly robbing a McDonald's, cleaning out the cash registers of \$400; reportedly, they told police they had spent hours meticulously plotting the crime (but had netted less than \$60 a man). Another crime seemingly less remunerative than honest work took place in Springfield Township, Ohio, in December, as three men were charged with stealing 2,000 items from a Marc's store, items which police said

the men were trying to resell from the basement of a home. However, the goods were mostly small-ticket items (retailing for as little as 39 cents each, with an average price of \$4.12), which must still be discounted to move quickly, and reselling that much merchandise would require dozens of man-hours.

Also, in the Last Month ...

Files stolen from a police internal affairs investigation turned up in a Dumpster in back of a Dunkin' Donuts shop (Baltimore). A 17-year-old girl, who suffered disfigurement and mental impairment six years ago when she was injured while pushing her

then-7-year-old friend from the path of a speeding 18-wheeler, sued the friend for nearly \$4 million (U.S.) (Hamilton, Ontario). A 27-year-old blind man was issued a permit to carry a gun, which he says he needs because blind people are vulnerable to robberies (Fargo, North Dakota). Show business people gave out awards to themselves in 564 ceremonies last year (4,025 "bests"), up 65 percent from 1999.

Bybee Pottery. Bybee has been in continuous operation by the Cornelison family since the state's pioneer days. Sales records date back to 1845, but the company may have been established as

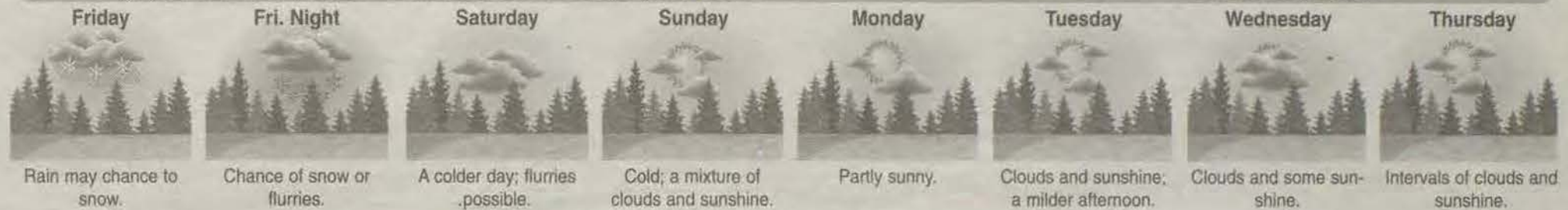

Hasan Davis, a lawyer, educator, actor and poet from Berea, will portray Burleigh in the first fireside chat, scheduled for Saturday, February 3.

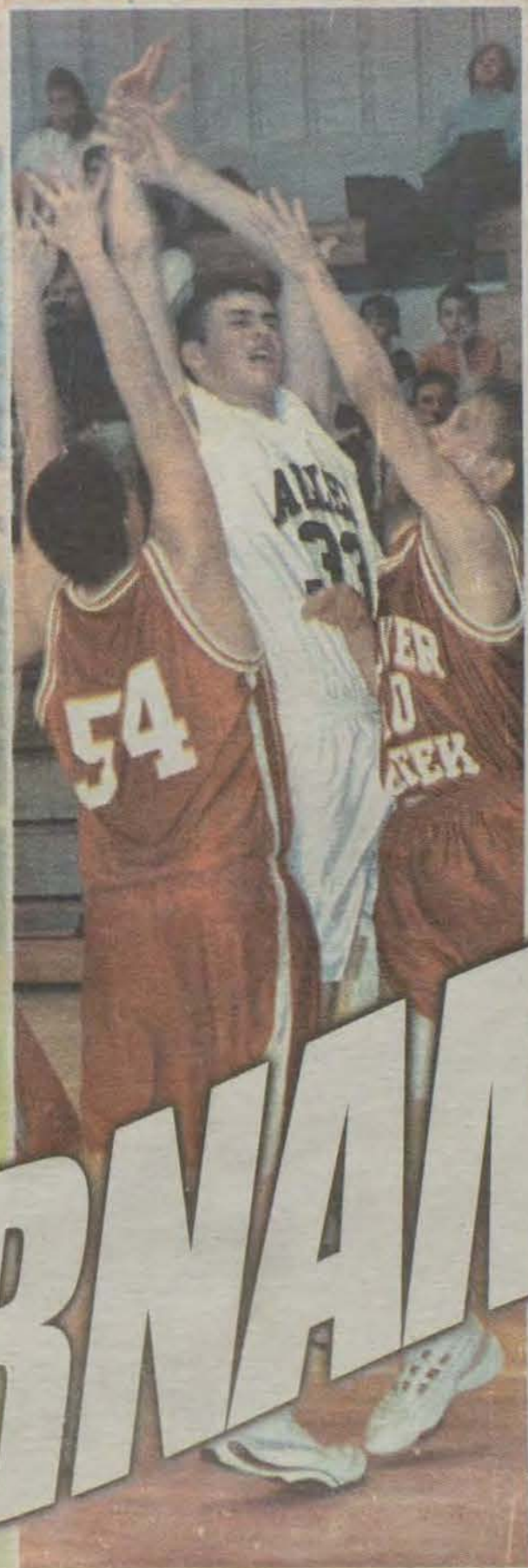
The event will be held around the massive stone fireplace in the fort's block-

Have a great tournament!

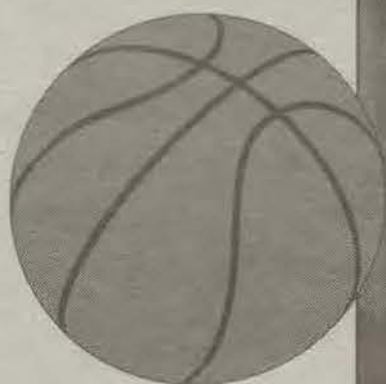
