



hauling utility poles, struck Eversole's cruiser on the driver side before the trooper could make it into the eastbound lane and then proceeded across the top of the vehicle before overturning and sliding 110 feet along the eastbound lane.

The truck flipped several times as it made it way down the eastbound lane and into traffic before striking another vehicle, a Chevrolet pickup truck driven by William P.

In a third development, resulting from the collision, the set of utility poles being transported by the Star Construction truck came loose upon impact with the second vehicle and struck a an eastbound Cadillac driven by Alice Sparkman

A host of state troopers as well as ambulance teams descended upon the scene to assist in bringing Eversole, who remained conscious and able to speak while still in his cruiser, according to eye witsses at Monday's scene, from the badly damaged unit.

Eversole was flown to Cabell Huntington Hospital where he was admitted and treated for injuries sustained in the accident. He is listed in stable condition, according to KSP reports, and should make a good recovery.

Former Wheelwright mayor dies at 85

The city of Wheelwright lost one of its most productive citizens Saturday as Elmer Hughes Ferguson died at the age of 85 at Our Lady of the Way Hospital in

Ferguson served as mayor of Wheelwright for an unprecedented 23 years during his lifetime, leaving his mark as a formidable politician and city organizer as well as a well loved city resident.

Those who remember him best, remember him to be a man who worked hard for what he believed in and remained kind to those around him in the process.

"He liked people," Audrey Yates, who worked under Ferguson as city clerk during a portion of his long

career as mayor. "He was involved with people and did humane things for people."

During his 23 year term as mayor, Ferguson accomplished a great deal for a city who watched their productive coal community fall helplessly into recession after the decline of the coal operations throughout Wheelwright.

According to Yates, who helped write many letters herself. Ferguson spearheaded an attempt to bring letters to the attention of the state, making them aware of the city's economic problems due to the fall of the coal company.

As a result, the amount of revenue sharing moneys being received by the city of Wheelwright nearly doubled, according to Yates.

This money was used to

improve city roads, build sidewalks and make additions and changes to city police services. all of which proved to be steps to preserving the troubled city's

economic standing. Ferguson will be remembered as a man who stood and helped those in need and a man who used his love of people to help others in whatever way he could, be that through politics or

in helping a neighbor. "He had a gruff exterior, but soft heart." Yates said. remembering the duel role Ferguson played during his life. "He was greatly appreciated and will be sadly missed."



klahoma City bomber Timothy McVeigh, whose execution garnered nationwide attention Monday, was silent in his last hours before being given the lethal injection that left him dead at just a quarter after 8 a.m. that morning.

Even after the execution, the media continued coverage, discussing McVeigh's silence when given the opportunity to speak and listening as family members of the 1995 bombing victims spoke openly about the federal sentence and what it meant in terms of closure.

However, time and again, it was mentioned that McVeigh's decision to remain silent left no room for

A poem, written by McVeigh and given to family members of the victims before he was put to death, did not serve as a sign of regret, but rather, an implied sense of righteousness on McVeigh's part as it spoke of how he remained strong in the face of all that had happened to him, never wavering, but holding his head high, "head unbowed".


If McVeigh's poem, and consequent last words, hoped to reveal to the world a higher reasoning on behalf of its author and some sense of satisfaction, it left much to be desired.

In the end, one can only see his refusal to speak to those he brought so much pain as another selfish act - an act that did not even offer them the satisfaction of a response.

McVeigh's execution left many people with strong opinions, but McVeigh himself left little room for argument. He was not sorry for what he had done, and, in fact, felt the bombing to be a needed strike against a government he hardly understood to begin with.

In any case, the death of Timothy McVeigh has came and gone. Perhaps our nation's self celebration should end as well, before we find ourselves striving unknowingly to prove our own point, be it right or wrong, through the death of another.

Department joined forces with Blackburn, along with Deputies Ricky Thornsberry and Terry Chaffins, visited Betsy Layne Elementary on Tuesday afternoon to congratulate students in 3 fifth grade classes who have completed the program. Each student received a T-shirt, a certificate, and a trophy.

"It's a great program," said Blackburn. who became involved with DARE three years ago. "It teaches them right and wrong, and shows them what kind of drugs are out there."

Thornsberry, who regularly visits schools throughout the county, said that the program begins as a "building block" basis.

Providing an entertaining atmosphere for the students, Thomsberry says, helps to make the program more successful.

According to Thornsberry, the program teaches children about safety, the harmful effects of drugs, refusal consequences, respect, pressure with the media and peers, anti violence, self assurance, and conflict resolu-

Stephanie Stanford, fifth grade teacher at Betsy Layne, says that her students love the DARE program.

"The kids look forward to it every year," said Stanford. "They have learned a lot of strategies about how to deal with peer pressure when they are approached by drugs. It helps them learn how not to feel like an

According to Thomsberry, the DARE program keeps "evolving," and he expects it to expand even further in the upcoming year, after receiving word that more grant money is available from the National DARE Association.

Chaffins recently completed a two week training course at Cambellsville, and will be teaching children full time beginning in the fall.

Board

In regard to the scholastic audit of the school district's central office, conducted March 12 and 13, board member Carol Stumbo. district 4, said that she believed that the board should actively enlist the aid of Dr. Tom Peterson, Kentucky Department of Education, Division of School Improvement. Peterson had earlier issued a grade of "D" to the Floyd school district's central office, citing ineffective leadership as the main criteria for the mark.

Stumbo said that the school district's problem appeared to be a "systems problem" and that "other districts around us ...are using this man" to guide them to more productive pathways. "We need to ask Peterson, not to make a plan for us, but to provide us ble resources," Sumbo went on

Superintendent Paul Fanning informed the board that he had already attempted to make contact with Peterson and had left cussions, the board seemed messages with his office.

Additionally, Chairman Johnnie Ross also informed the board that he had sent several "communiqués" to Peterson by way of e-mail and telephone. He apologized to Stumbo for not making her aware of these contact attempts. "I took your suggestion (to utilize Peterson's services) seriously and acted upon them...I am sorry that you were not aware of my communiqués," Ross said.

A motion was thusly approved for Chairman Ross to make another communication to Peterson on behalf of the members of the board and to report back as to the outcome of this communication.

As Matt Wireman, finance director, appeared with further budget committee reports and recommendations, the board continued with the same pattern of questions and concerns that has been a mainstay in budget discussions this spring.

Stumbo raised concerns surrounding a lack of funds present in the budget for repairs/ renovations to certain of the county's school buildings, most specifically Prestonsburg Elementary and Betsy Layne Elementary. Both schools, according to Stumbo, are in dire need of having work done in the basement areas of their school buildings. "Unless you have been in the schools...unless you have stood in these basements" you can not be fully aware of the conditions present. "There are conditions out there that students should not be in, " she went on to say.

Stumbo maintained that the current budget plan did not

with information and other possi- reflect means to provide solutions to these problems. "These are inherent conditions that we need to be dealing with," Stumbo

Continuing with budget disdivided on the issue of proposed administrative salary increases. Once again, Stumbo firmly expressed her opinion that if scholastic audits were not showing favorable improvements, then administrative staff should not be "rewarded" with salary increases.

"After three years of state management, how many audits have we had? And yet it (problems) always come back to leadership at the district level," said Stumbo. "The board must focus on outcomes and results - if we reward" negative results then the pattern will continue.

Stumbo voiced opposition to approval of salary increases to principals and administrative

Chairman Ross said that he believed that it showed a "double standard" to "reward schools and not reward central office." This comment made in reference to the fact that the board had, just moments before, granted approval to the K-8 salary sched-

Stumbo replied, "I think that principles are going to have to have many hours of training. I do not consider it to be a double standard to reward those that are

The board approved a motion to appoint Glenna Slone, district 5, and Dr. Chandra Varia, district 2, as budget committee representatives in hopes of coming closer to a finalization of an approved

In other business, the board approved the abolishment of three district gifted and talented teacher positions. An improved Gifted and Talented Program is to be implemented July 1 with two new positions being established - District TAG Assistance Teacher and School TAG Coordinator.

The board also approved the hiring of four employees to work eight hour days for thirty days during the summer months at the district bus garage. These employees will assist in the cleaning and repair of district school buses.

Joe Jones, board architect. presented an athletic facility status report to board members. Jones asked for and received approval to accept a bid for \$16,039.92 to Fourever Green Lawn & Landscaping in regard to the Betsy Layne High School softball field.

Board approval was also given for the allocation of \$ 280,880.00 in funds to be used for the construction of a football field house for Allen Central High School. Included in these funds is a \$100,000 grant from the Kentucky legislature. The proposed facility will contain locker rooms, showers, toilets and concession areas and will be located adjacent to the existing grandstands.

Jones reported that the Prestonsburg High School athletic facility project is slightly behind schedule due to the

spring's unusually wet weather. However, the poles for the field lighting are on site and electricians are adding the fixtures.

Final grading for the track area is complete as well as the footings for the grandstands. Installation of the grandstands will begin in the forthcoming

Jones reports that \$ 70,000 (approximate) in funds remain in the budget.

Additionally interim contract approval was given to R.L. Caudill Construction, Warco Land Improvement, Inc., Ray's Fence Company, Mountain Enterprises, Inc., the Dant Clayton Corporation and Patriot Construction in regard to the South Floyd High School athletic complex bid packages 1-11.

Also, bid packages 12, 13, and 14, in regard to track items, seating, and parking lot lighting for the South Floyd athletic field were also granted approval. Mountain Enterprises bid \$24,612 on track items which includes paving and track surfac-The Dant-Clayton Corporation bid \$83,484 on grandstand seating, and Kyova Electric Services placed the accepted bid for parking lot light-

Approval was also given for \$75,739.65 in funds to go toward the pavement of parking lot areas. Jones reports that the project is still operating below projected budget costs.

Several district students were recognized at the June 11 meeting for academic achievements. Additionally, three Betsy Layne Elementary School students were recognized and commended for artwork that was displayed at the Governor's Derby Breakfast in May. The students decorated a small wooden horse as a "horse of the future" in complete spaceman attire. The horse was dubbed "Oxygen." The work was noticed by members of the Kennedy Space Center team who purchased it for display at the Florida center. Chairman Ross said that certain members of the community are currently at work to raise funds to allow the students to travel to Florida to personally present their piece to space center officials. "Any help from the community toward providing these means would be greatly appreciated," said Ross.



Rogers: Key house panel provides \$4.2 million for **Daniel Boone Forest**

"Hal" Rogers (KY-5) says he has secured more than \$4.2 million for law enforcement efforts, recreation improvements and land acquisition efforts in Kentucky's Daniel Boone. National Forest Rogers says the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Interior has agreed to provide the funding in legislation that sets spending for U.S. Forest Service programs in the fiscal year that begins

panel to provide \$500,000 to contimue the fight against marijuana cultivation in the forest. It is the fourth year in a row Rogers has won the funding for the program, which has yielded hundreds of tons of the illegal crop and hundreds of arrests and prosecutions.

Pendleton reacts to McVeigh's execution

PENDLETON, N.Y. - Most were hoping to hear an apology. Some were looking for an explanation. Only a few expected

Whether shocked or disappointed, area residents had a lot to say about convicted Oklahoma City bomber and former resident Timothy McVeigh's decision to waive his final statement before he was executed Monday morning.

"I figured he had one more surprise for us up his sleeve," Town of Niagara resident Geoffrey Ulex said. "He has no remorse for the catastrophe he caused. Any apology he would have given would have been forced and that doesn't seem like

Neil Folkman of Niagara Falls said he watched the execution coverage before heading to work. For the most part, he said he was pleased with the way the media handled the event.

"I thought it was a nice touch that during the execution, a few of the channels ran the names of the victims from the bombing," Folkman said. "I really think the media went overboard on this whole issue, but at least the actual execution coverage was done tastefully. The media shouldn't shape what people feel about Timothy McVeigh or the death penalty. They should just report what happens, I think a lot of people forgot that."

Bob Heiman Jr. of Lockport didn't have a problem with McVeigh's execution.

"I think that 168 people believe that it was well-deserved;" he said. "I'm not against the death penalty. There are times where it is necessary to use it. He deserves

Some people, like Reid Passmore of Lockport, believe the government can't be trusted.

"It's hard to say about the death penalty," he said. "Governor (Mario) Cuomo would never go along with it because he knew how our government officials could frame people to put them in jail. Our government is getting way out of hand.'

"There are people who agree with his views, but don't agree with what he did. You can't do anything about the government because they are a legalized gang."

Passmore believes it would have been "more of a penalty to leave him in jail for life."

"Now, they'll never find out his views," he said. "I think he would have eventually come out with more about what he did."

There are some people who believe McVeigh changed during his time in the army.

"Because of the fact, he was a totally different person than he was before he went to Desert Storm, I don't believe he was in total control of his faculties," said Judy Michaels of Lockport. "I'm against the death penalty. I think that God only has the right to take a life. I don't believe we do. I feel very badly for all of the families, including his."

"Life without parole, even in total solitary confinement, would have been more appropriate."

For his final statement, McVeigh hand-copied the poem, "Invictus," by William Ernest Henley, which was handed out to members of the media minutes after his execution. April D'Amarco of Niagara Falls said she wasn't surprised McVeigh chose to put his final thoughts in the hands of the media.

"It was with the media's help that he became the martyr many claimed he wanted to be," D'Amarco said. "He really took advantage of you people (members of the media). They played right into his hands by giving him all that attention."

McVeigh silent as he goes to his death

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. - In the end, the Oklahoma City bomber offered no remorse -only silence as he prepared to die.

Six years, one month and 23 days since he blew up a building and killed 168 people in the worst act of terrorism on American soil, Timothy McVeigh met his own death, a seemingly painless ending after a druginduced sleep.

through his body and ended his life within four minutes of the first injection shortly after 7 a.m. Monday, marking the first federal execution since 1963,

McVeigh wore a white T-shirt, khaki pants and slip-on sneakers into the death chamber on the west grounds of the U.S.. Penitentiary, Terre Haute. His hair appeared short and many who witnessed the death said he appeared thinner than at his trial. A sheet was pulled up tightly to his chest as he lay strapped on the gurney. He died with his eyes open.

In Oklahoma City, 232 survivors and victims' relatives watched a closed-circuit television broadcast of the execution, sent from Terre Haute in a feed encrypted to guard against interception.

Witnesses from the government, media and victims also watched from within the death chamber through viewing glass.

McVeigh did not respond when U.S. Penitentiary, Terre Haute, Warden Harley Lappin told him he could make a final statement.

Instead, McVeigh had earlier handed Lappin a poem he had printed legibly with words slightly slanted to the left. The four stanzas of the 19th

> cooperated entirely. Lappin said. After the execution, an unmarked vehicle moved McVeigh's body from the penitentlary to a funeral home. McVeigh's father has said his son's wish was to be cremated.

> Before his execution, McVeigh asked for last rites of the church one of the sacraments of the Catholic Church that asks for forgiveness from God in the event of death. Those rites were administered by the prison chaplain, said the Rev. Ron Ashmore, a Terre Haute priest who had visited McVeigh in past months, Ashmore did not visit McVeigh on Monday.

Kevin Mayes, Vigo County chief deputy coroner visited McVeigh about an hour before the execution for a pre-arranged examination.

Mayes asked him if he had been mistreated at prison, and McVeigh responded by saying no.

McVeigh disrobed and Mays inspected him and found no signs of abuse. Mayes asked McVeigh about his weight loss, and McVeigh replied that he had not been able to retain his former weight while in custody because of the prison food. Mayes did not remain in the chamber for the execution, instead returning to a trailer on the prison grounds.

'We were looking for anything out of the ordinary," Amos said, meaning anything that showed McVeigh may have been physically abused in prison. They found nothing.

"The LV. had gone in with the first stick, I didn't see any other pokes in him," she said. Amos noted that McVeigh appeared thin, but not extraordinarily so.

"He did not look emaciated," she

Amos signed McVeigh's death certificate after she returned to the trailer. Reaction to the killer's death reached worldwide, President Bush said the execution was an act of justice, not vengeance. "Final punishment of the guilty cannot alone bring peace to the innocent," he said. "It cannot recover the loss or balance the scales, and it is not meant to do so.

"Today every living person who was hurt by the evil done in Oklahoma City can rest in the knowledge that there has been a reckoning." The execution closed a sad chapter in America's history. Nineteen children were among those killed in the bombing of the Murrah federal building on April 19, 1995. Hundreds of others suffered permanent injury.

U.S. Rep. Brian Kerns, R-Terre Haute, issued a statement from Washington, D.C., commending the professionalism of prison officials and Terre Haute-area police in the days leading up to, and the day of, the execution. He also wrote of the effect of the execution on Terre

"We are glad to see this attention come to an end and life here return to a sense of normalcy," Kerns wrote.

While we will never forget the victims of McVeigh's senseless crime, may God grace our nation with the strength to heal and go forward," Kerns stated.

Answers come later

Bud Welch, who lost his daughter, Julie, in the Oklahoma City bombing, said people he has talked to who witnessed an execution did not get the closure they hoped for. "People are going to say, 'Well, he didn't suffer enough,' or 'I'm going to get on with my life." No one checks back in five or six years to see how they're doing." Welch is a staunch opponent of the death penalty. He did say, however, "If (the death penalty) was ever going to be right, (McVeigh) is the poster boy for the death penalty."

World is watching

A member of European media told bombing survivor and execution witness Anthony Scott that the whole world was watching news of McVeigh's execution. She wanted to know if he thought capital punishment was barbaric. "We can't bring back 168 people," he shot back at her, "I think this was definitely a deterrent to Timothy McVeigh."

Land yacht wanted

Anti-death penalty protester Harold Smith of Albany, N.Y., said if he had known he would be sleeping in his car before the McVeigh execution, he would have bought a bigger vehicle."It's a little sporty car. I sure could have used a Lincoln.'

Angels over Terre Haute

As dawn broke over the federal prison in Terre Haute, Ind., on Monday, several people looked toward the sky at the rays of light playing off the clouds. Billy Ray, a minister from Rescue Atlanta, a Georgia-based mission program, noticed something unusual about one large cloud which seemed to stretch across the entire western sky. So did Mark Hines, a minister from Frankfort, Ky.

Although the two were located in opposing camps of the McVeigh execution - Hines in the pro-death penalty camp and Ray in the circle of those opposing capital punishment both saw the same thing: the cloud looked like a classical representation of an angel, with a face which pointed south and the tips of its outstretched wings pointed north.

The two may have never met, but both agreed God was in Terre Haute just before and during the execution. The cloud dissipated shortly after 7

And the moon shone too

When convicted Oklahoma City bomber Timothy McVeigh was taken from his regular prison cell on the federal death row Sunday and moved to the holding cell near the execution chamber, he could look up toward the moon; a moon he hadn't seen in several years of confinement behind concrete and steel. McVeigh was moved in secrecy and in the dark, but as he lay strapped on the gurney in the execution chamber the moon continued to shine — a 3/4 moon stayed visible in the sky until 8 a.m., 46 minutes after McVeigh was pronounced dead.


Good for business, bad for town

Josh Chaney, the owner of Pizza City in Terre Haute, was prepared for the McVeigh execution to take place on its original date. The May 16 date, Chaney said, coincided nicely with the Indianapolis 500. It was the restaurant's busiest time of year. "Speaking from a purely business standpoint," Chaney said, "I was ready for that date. I already had extra help scheduled. When they changed the date, it kind of affected business. It's not as good now as it could have been. Personally, I wish we didn't have this happening here but I understand why we do. ... I just think Terre Haute should be known for other things beside death row."

Tired of it all

As the execution of Timothy McVeigh neared, people in Terre Haute may have differed on whether they support or object to death penalty. One thing many did agree on,

however: they just wanted the whole thing to be over. At Ballyhoo Pizza King in the 900 block of East Chestnut, several college-aged patrons said lethal injection was too easy a death for the Oklahoma City bomber. Several miles away, at Applebee's on South Third Street, patrons declined to talk about it at all. Customers of both places agreed on one thing, however: the whole thing was a media circus and it was time for the circus to pack up and leave town.

A handful of University of Indiana students who were among death penalty supporters also said they were there to show suport for victims' families. They showed it in different ways.

As the students chanted, cheered and performed fake countdowns for the television cameras, Jackson wiped her eyes and gritted her teeth.

A volunteer victim's advocate for the Oklahoma City Police Department, she shook her head as she watched the antics of the younger people. "They think they're being supportive," she said, "but they just don't understand."

Wrong place, wrong time

If there was one place in the world not to drive drunk Sunday night, it was along Indiana State Road 63 where it borders the federal prison. One allegedly inebriated driver found out the hard way. The road was heavily patrolled by state troopers, as well as city and county police in the hours leading up to Timothy McVeigh's execution. Any late night or early morning traffic on the road appeared to be suspect as police pulled over one vehicle after another.

But one driver didn't pay enough attention and swerved around a police vehicle shortly after 1 a.m. Monday. Six cruisers with flashing light immediately stopped the driver.

A moment to remember: Who won?

In the hours preceding McVeigh's execution and the hour following it, many people drove along the east side of the federal penitentiary to get a glimpse of the prison and the enormous number of reporters, photographers and support personnel who had descended on the town. Some took pictures as they drove past. Some stopped their cars and got out to take photos only to be driven away by U.S. marshals, Bureau of Prison personnel or state or city police.

One car which had been southbound on State Road 63 pulled onto Bureau Drive — the road leading into the prison — and stopped. Four elderly women were in the car. A passenger rolled down her window and asked nearby reporters "Can we go this way?" while waving at signs saying further traffic along the road was forbidden. When she received a negative reply, the woman asked "Are you with the media?" The reporters answered yes. "Oh," the woman said. "Who won?"

electronic filing increases nearly 20 percent

FRANKFORT, KY - The Kentucky Revenue Cabinet (KRC) reports that the use of electronic filing methods for 2000 individual income tax returns increased by nearly 20 percent over the 1999 filing season.

Electronic returns fall into one of three categories: TeleFile (telephone filing), Online (Internet filing), or Electronic (typically tax preparers).

This year to date, 495,090 returns have been filed electronically compared to 416,947 returns in 1999.

returns in 1999.

The number of electronically filed returns by preparers this year increased to 401,864 compared to 332,700 in 1999. In its third year of offering TeleFile, KRC accepted 47,528 returns filed by phone. The previous year,

more than 54,000 returns were filed by phone.

This 13 percent decrease is a result of TeleFile

taxpayers changing to other electronic methods of filing, such as electronic filing or online filing. The number of taxpayers filing online in 2000 increased to 45,698 compared to 29,534 filed in 1999.

According to KRC Secretary Mike Haydon, "Electronic filing is on the cutting edge of income tax processing. It is fast, convenient, and easy. Most returns received in the electronic format are processed in about two weeks, which is considerably quicker than mailing your return. We are gratified at the 20 percent increase over the 1999 filing season and urge taxpayers to continue using this modern filing method. Electronic filing is more efficient and drastically reduces the number of errors in processing. It is a win-win situation for the Cabinet and the taxpayers."

KRC will continue to accept 2000 individual income tax returns filed electronically and via the Internet through Oct. 15, 2001. Those wishing to use telephone filing, TeleFile, will have until Aug. 15, 2001, to filereturns.

Barriers to BellSouth long-distance costing Kentucky customers as much as \$235 million

Kentucky consumers could save as much as \$235 million annually when BellSouth is allowed to offer long-distance service, according to a new study released recently.

"The most significant aspect of BellSouth's request to offer long-distance service in Kentucky is the impact it could have on customers," said Amy Scarborough, Manager. "Every month BellSouth is delayed from entering this line of business could be worth as much as \$19.5 million in savings per month to Kentucky customers."

Customers in the Southeast "are losing as much as \$4.6 billion in potential benefits from competition because of long-distance regulatory barriers in the states served by BellSouth. Ending regulatory barriers to BellSouth's entry into the long-distance market could remedy this situation and lead to competitive pricing," concludes study author Stephen B. Pociask. Pociask is an economist and longtime analyst of the telecommunications and high-tech industries based in the Washington, D.C., area. He has authored numerous studies using applied economics to gauge the effects of telecommunications pricing and regulation on customers.

His new study, entitled "Competition and Consumer Quantitiative Benefits: Assessment In-region BellSouth, Long-Distance Market," uses analysis of long-distance pricing and the empirical results of competition in states such as New York and Texas where the long-distance market has been opened to full competition. Customers there are already enjoying reductions in their longdistance bills of as much as 32 percent, the study notes. The lack of full competition in the Southeast means that most customers in the nine states served by BellSouth are still paying "substantially

above costs," Pociask says.

He concludes that customers will win three ways if BellSouth is allowed to enter the long-distance business.

BellSouth's entry into the long-distance market will introduce true competition in a market currently dominated by three companies. Based on projections and results already seen elsewhere, Pociask estimates the new competition may lower long-distance prices between 20 and 32 percent.

■ BellSouth's entry will also stimulate local competition.

Lower local and long-distance prices will stimulate demand for both, and customers will enjoy additional savings as usage increases.

Conclusions reached by the study include:

■ The long-distance market in the Southeast is still heavily con-

Teachers recognized for standards-setting work

Last week, the Kentucky Board of Education accepted the proposals of more than 1,600 Kentucky public school teachers to complete the final component of the state's Commonwealth Accountability Testing System (CATS).

More than a year ago, the teachers began developing new student performance standards for the testing system. Last Tuesday, the board agreed to accept their recommendations and praised the teachers for their work.

"Three years ago, I wasn't sure we could build this new assessment and accountability system," said Kentucky Board of Education Chair Helen Mountjoy, "but every time we've asked teachers and administrators for their assistance, they have responded. These new standards, developed by teachers, are a mechanism to move Kentucky schools to proficiency and beyond."

The teachers used a six-step process designed by a panel of national testing experts that advises the state board on assessment and accountability issues. According to state and national curriculum and assessment experts, it was the most comprehensive standards-setting process ever undertaken by any state.

James Carterall, chair of a panel of national

testing experts that advises the state board on assessment and accountability issues, called the standards "more extensive, more thoughtthrough, more multidimensional than standards developed by any other state."

More than 3,000 people—2.891 identifying themselves as educators—responded to a Kentucky Department of Education online survey about the standards-setting process between May 10 and 28. Most respondents said the performance descriptions were appropriate in each subject and grade level. A small number rated the recommended standards as too high. A smaller number said the standards were too low.

centrated among the top three long-distance companies.

■ Barriers to BellSouth's entry into the long-distance market reduce competition and "permit long-distance service providers to price significantly above cost."





"The only thing in racing they can relate to is Mommy and Dale Jr.," she said. "So they're happy, but they want me to keep up with Dale." She started 32nd and finished 34th Sunday after spinning out on lap 194. She did not wreck but wound up three laps down to the leaders.



Point Given never left California from mid-November until mid-April and in his two prep races as a threeyear old, all he had to do was gallop along and spurt away from overmatched rivals whenever jockey Gary Stevens chose to push the button.

Staying in California has worked for many Derby winners in recent years, but the prep races there are usually demanding enough to get a horse ready to 150,000 fans and a mile-anda- quarter race against 15 or so other horses in May. Had Millennium Wind stayed in California for the Kentucky Derby trail, I think we'd be celebrating Point Given as a Triple Crown winner today. They found their beginnings in a small school, learning all about the importance of reading, writing, and arithmetic. They found their best friends in the class-room or on the baseball field while sliding into first base. They used to meet about the same time nearly every day of the week.

In pigtails or wearing baseball caps, they studied together, they played together. Together, they learned the importance of friendship.

As the years passed, however, they said goodbye to many of their classroom memories and friends and began lives all their own. Many moved away, found a job, a family, and have spent years watching their own children grow up.

Throughout the years, they have found themselves reminiscing on memory lane. From time to time, their thoughts were focused on the memories of the time they spent together as children. From time to time, they have wondered where and how their childhood friends are doing in life.

Four decades of Betsy Layne High School students turned out on Friday at Jenny Wiley State Park for the chance to rekindle a few of their childhood memories. Dressed with smiles of excitement, they milled through the convention center to reunite with long lost friends and neighbors.

Joe Hinchman, graduate of the class of 1947, and his wife, Mary, began plans in January to put together a class reunion for Betsy Layne graduates of the 1947 and 1948 classes, but when other graduates told them that they would love to come to the reunion, they couldn't turn them away.

The Hinchman's were given an overwhelming response. The result was a gathering of four decades of students-making the largest class reunion in Betsy Layne history. The crowd came from coast to coast-from California to New Hampshire-for the chance to say hello to their childhood friends.

Over 400 shining faces that once graced the steps of Betsy Layne High School came back home for the opportunity to visit with the friends they knew so well in the 1930's, 40's, and 50's.

It was an evening of laughter and fun for those who attended, one not soon to be forgotten by many.

"I think it's wonderful!" said Lillian M. Steele Taylor, 1947 graduate. "Some of these people I haven't seen for 50 years!"

The evening began early with registration and photographs at 5 p.m., and pleasantly progressed with dinner provided by the culinary magic of Chef Barry Oldson and the staff at Jenny Wiley State Park, followed by recognition of special teachers, various musical selections, and down-home hillbilly entertainment from none other than

Southern pine beetle outlook-2001

Spring has arrived but not everything is 'greening up" as usual. In fact, many of our pines are doing just the opposite. Several Floyd County residents have called me wondering what is causing entire groups of our local pines to turn brown and die. In many cases, I have found that Southern Pine Beetles are to blame when entire groups of pines began to die all at once. In the following article I have included more information on the current state of the Southern Pine Beetle in Kentucky.

The current southern pine beetle (SPB) outbreak has devastated pines in various parts of Floyd County as well as many other areas of eastern and southeastern Kentucky during 2000, and samples of damage have been received from many parts of the Commonwealth, as well.

The stage for this outbreak was set by a number of factors, primary among them were:

relatively mild winters during the past few

ice storms of 1998

a serious drought during 1999, that severely stressed trees, especially in normally dry sites

and a pine population that was at very sus-

ceptible age (at least 15 years old) for insect attack.

This insect will attack all species of pine, but prefers loblolly, shortleaf, Virginia, and pitch pine. In outbreak situations, tree species that are normally not preferred as hosts can be attacked, as well. Consequently, white pine have been hit hard, and on occasion, Colorado blue spruce has been

What are the prospects for 2001?

This winter (December 2000-February 2001) (average temperature 33°F) has been colder than the previous four (38.4, 39.9, 40.1, and 38.3°F, respectively). However, temperatures need to be at or below 0°F, for several days to kill a significant number of developing beetles. The winter temperatures have not been low enough to have a major impact.

Simple competition among developing southern pine beetles in trees probably will have a larger effect. Beetles surviving in heavily infested trees frequently are smaller and producer fewer offspring. This can result in a decline in numbers in ensuing years. However the biggest factor simply may be a lack of suitable pines (in the proper age category) due to heavy tree mortality. Frequently, a lack of suitable hosts also contributes to bark beetle crash after an outbreak in fringe areas like Kentucky, they simply have eaten up their food. Finally, natural elements also will begin to kill a larger proportion of SPBs than they did earlier in the cycle.

This points to a probable downturn in the SPB populations, but the damage has already been done. The population is crashing under its own staggering weight. In spite of this, there is likely to be a significant beetle flight this spring. Severely infested trees can produce as many as 150 beetles per square foot of trunk surface. That can be 15,000 beetles from a 12" diameter-50' tall tree. Even at 99 percent mortality from all that can go wrong, there will be a lot of beetles flying in search of suitable hosts.

What stages of SPB are present in infested trees now?

Eggs, larvae, pupae, and adults can be found in trees during the winter. There are several generations each year so there is no real synchrony to the life cycle. The winter here has stopped flight but adults will emerge and fly once temperatures climb above 55°F. Spring attack begins about the time dogwoods flower. Newly emerged beetles can move to nearby trees or they may fly some distance before attempting to colonize a tree.

What management alternatives are available?

In some instances, heavily attacked trees have been felled and removed or destroyed. This eliminates them as a source of beetles to attack nearby pines; however, infested trees remaining in the area will produce beetles that will fly this spring.

If trees have been felled but not removed, a coarse, low pressure trunk spray of lindane, Dursban (chlorpyrifos), or Asto (permethrin) to wet the bark of the entire trunk should kill many of the beetls ready to emerge. The trunk will need to be turned so that the entire surface can be treated. This treatment should be applied by mid-April.

SPB attacks in home landscapes, on golf courses, and other non-forest settings have killed many valuable trees. Trunk sprays, as described above, can provide some protection from infestation/re-infestation of surviving trees. Complete coverage (crown, stem, base) is essential for protection. While SPB adults will be flying over much of the spring and summer, the spring flight is the most synchronized and is the best target for a trunk spray.

Could this outbreak have been prevented?

Climatic factors, drought and mild winter, play a major role in SPB survival and set the stage for outbreak. There was no way to manipulate this. However, forest management practices to thin pine stands for optimum growth and removal of stressed trees that are prone to SPB attack could have greatly reduced the numbers of trees at risk in some areas.

said Martin Cothran, spokesman for The Family Foundation of Kentucky, of the decision today by the State School Board to change the way it scores the state tests. "The State Board is essentially admitting that the scoring system it had in place before was too hard, and that children who cannot learn at high levels will be given a break.

The belief that all children can learn at high levels was a key genet of Kentucky Education Reform Act of 1990. The Board seems to finally be willing to recognize that this was an unworkable, utopian idea," said Cothran, "It's too bad taxpayers have had to foot the bill for state policymakers to learn this important lesson."

According to figures provided by the Kentucky Department of Education (KDE), scores on the statewide tests could increase dramatically under the new plan. The new plan will move many students out of the
