## Attorney fights transfer of school gun case to adult court

**HAZARD** — The case against an eighth-grader indicted last month in Perry County Circuit Court for an alleged school gun incident may be remanded to district court.

Matthew McQuillen, 15, of Hazard, is charged with unlawful possession of a weapon on school properties, first-degree wanton endangerment and terroristic threatening.

The charges stem from a March 1 incident at Roy G. Eversole Middle School in Hazard. Derek Roberts, 14, alleged that McQuillen approached him between classes, placed a gun to his

neck, and threatened to kill him if he told anyone.

Attorney Bill Clemons, a public defender appointed as McQuillen's counsel, recently entered a motion to Circuit Judge Doug Combs to remand the case to district court. He argued that McQuillen did not meet the criteria for "automatic transfer," which allows cer-

tain juvenile justice cases to be transferred directly to circuit court, where defendants are tried as adults.

In order to be eligible for automatic transfer under KRS 635.020 (4), a defendant must be 14 years of age and charged with a felony crime in which a firearm was used.

The bulk of Clemons' argument lies

in the use of the term "firearm." The attorney quotes the definition of a firearm to be an instrument that expels projectiles by means of an explosion.

Roberts described a gun similar to a 9 mm firearm and told the court that McQuillen expelled a clip in order to

**JACKSON** — After five months of interviewing and discussions, the Breathitt County Board of Education has finally hired a new superintendent.

Woods has been active with the Garrard County Fair Board, Rotary Club, Lions Club, a local Baptist Church, Little League organizations, a former Jaycees 4-H Council member, Little League Coach, and Lake Cumberland's basketball official. He has also served as director of Vision 2000 for Garrard County.

Woods said that he and his wife, Sharon, and their two children are pleased to become a part of Breathitt County.

## Hazard man hopes to build air boats for river travel

**HAZARD** — "As far as I know, we're Hazard's first air boat manufacturer," Jake Toler said.

Most likely he is. Jake Toler launched his experimental air boat Thursday behind City Hall in Hazard, over 40 years from the date that Mayor Bill Gorman and his

friends launched the Mary Suzanne in a trip to Frankfort to promote Buckhorn Lake.

Gorman built his boat at home and his friends had to tear a basement wall down to get the boat out. Toler built his air boat in a storefront on Main Street, assisted by his friend, Roscoe Shackelford.

"I've always been interested in our small streams, but I've never been able to get down the

river," Toler said. "I got to thinking one day, maybe I could build an air boat to navigate the swift water and go over the rocks."

It worked. Toler said his boat goes through water 3 inches deep and never gets stuck.

Next spring, Toler wants to take four or five boatloads of people from Perry Central High

## Lee's College professor found dead

**JACKSON** — The body of Joyce Watts Hardyman, 54, of Jackson was found in her home the evening of June 7. Apparently she had been dead since June 1.

Edsel McCoun, the landlord, said that he began to notice an odor. He then decided to enter Hardyman's apartment to investigate, at which times he found her body lying on the couch. It was obvious that she was dead, he said.

McCoun then contacted the Jackson Police Department and the Breathitt County Coroner. Police Chief Clyde Caudill said that there was no foul play.

Hardyman was an associate

professor of English at the Lee's College Campus of Hazard Community College, where the flags have been lowered in her honor through Thursday.

Hardyman had worked at Lee's since 1987. While at Lee's, she served as the chairperson of the Humanities Division as well as acting dean of student affairs in 1993. She was named three times to Who's Who Among American teachers.

"Joyce Hardyman was a consummate professional, an exceptional teacher and above all, a wonderful friend to her students and colleagues," Dr. Hughes said. "She was a tire-

**STAFFORDSVILLE** — Tourism is the third-largest industry in the state of Kentucky, bringing in \$8.8 billion per year in state revenue. \$12.5 million is attributed to Johnson County tourism, bringing 274 jobs to the county.

That's why Tourism Secretary Ann Latta named Paintsville Lake State Park's new

campground facility a "great asset" at a ribbon cutting ceremony held on Friday morning.

"With a facility like this," said Latta, "those numbers will go up."

State and local officials dedicated the new \$2.2 million campground and park office building on Friday, with cheers from the a crowd of onlookers, which represented several businesses in the area, including neighboring park representatives Mark Mclemore,

resource manager at Jenny Wiley State Resort Park, and Mark Reader, from Yatesville Lake State Park.

The newly developed campground includes 32 developed sites, 10 primitive sites, recreational facilities, two picnic shelters and a bathhouse.

Uniquely, the campground also has individual sewer hookups available for its

**Parent Institute receives Kentucky Colonels grant**

LEXINGTON — The Prichard Committee for Academic Excellence received a \$25,000 grant from the Honorable Order of Kentucky Colonels. The grant will be used to purchase materials for parents who attend the committee's Commonwealth Institute for Parent Leadership this fall.

"Parents come away from training with binders and books full of information. Armed with that information, they have more confidence to go into local schools and make a difference," said Bev Raimondo, director of the institute. "Parents show that confidence when they meet with principals, teachers, and superintendents and carry out their projects aimed at improving student achievement. And the best part is that the focus is always on the children."

The Commonwealth Institute for Parent Leadership helps parents become advocates for improved achievement in their children's schools. Reaching parents who have difficulty being involved in their schools is a priority.

In 1997 the Prichard Committee launched the institute, which trains 200 more parents each year. After training, parents return to their local

schools and work on projects that engage other parents in student achievement activities. Since the program began, about 700 parents have been trained.

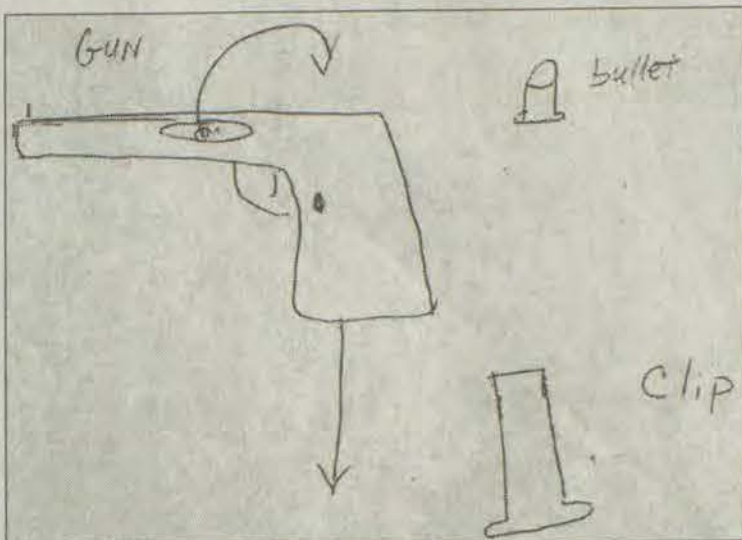

show him a bullet, but McQuillen and a classmate asserted that the gun was only a toy. No gun, real or toy, was recovered by the Hazard Police Department during their investigation into the incident.

"This term a 'firearm' was used in the commission of that felony has never been interpreted for purposes of its meaning within the juvenile code," Clemons argued in the motion. He further said that the juvenile court has an obligation to prove beyond a reasonable doubt that the gun was real before they subject McQuillen "to the full rigors, complexities and harshness of the adult criminal system ..."

Clemons entered a similar motion prior to McQuillen's indictment with District Judge Monte Gross, who also presides over Perry County's juvenile court. Prosecutor Leigh Anne Stephens refuted Clemons' argu-

ment by defining a weapon as any object that is used in a manner that convinces the victim of its deadly nature.

"In the case at hand, the victim saw a 9 mm firearm, not a toy cap gun, and the school principal found a 9 mm bullet, not a roll of caps," argued Stephens. "Others may have seen a cap gun, but there is always the possibility that two guns, one real, one toy, were brought to school. What the victim saw, he believed to be real."

Gross ruled that the question of whether the gun was real or toy was one that should be interpreted by a jury, not the court, and bound the case for the grand jury.

Circuit Judge Doug Combs has not ruled on Clemons' new motion. His decision will be made prior to McQuillen's arraignment in Perry County Circuit Court on June 21.

School to Frankfort, to prove how useful the air boats are. He plans to name his line of boats "Sky," which is his grandson's nickname.

Toler also has another motive: He wants people to get interested in the streams and clean them up.

"The more people we can get involved in the water, the more people will be interested in cleaning up the water," he said.

"We've been trying to clean up the river for 10 years," Roscoe Shackleford added.

Shackleford said some of the riverbanks are a lot cleaner. Shackleford, who loves the river, is a retired Hazard school superintendent who lives in a house on the riverbank and gardens there. He had heart surgery in February, so he could not do any of the heavy work on the boat building project.

The boat was really Jake Toler's project, Shackleford said.

"He did most of the work," he said "I helped him. I was one of those 'Hey! Wait a minute!' people. It was all his (Toler's)."

"We had to buy pulleys for the steering," Shackleford said. But Toler made everything else; he even welded the aluminum body of the boat.

"He even made his own rudders," Shackleford said.

"But they forgot to put a reverse on it," said Jack Gross, a Hazard physician who watched the launching.

"That's a lawn mower motor, that's what it is," Shackleford added.

The boat construction took place in secret, as far as the press and public were concerned. But Jake Toler told Mayor Gorman about his idea.

"The day I talked to him is the day he built this boat ramp for us," Jake Toler said.

That is true, according to Paul Feltner, the city manager. The city work crew, including Carlos Combs and a backhoe operator, Cecil Combs, dug out the ramp immediately. The ramp is close to the place where the Mayor and his friends launched boats back in the early 1950s. They had a crude footpath running behind City Hall down to the river.

Mayor Gorman was, of

course, present for the launching Monday, and even took a ride down the river from City Hall towards the bridge at Home Lumber Company.

"Being an old river rat — having traveled down the river three times, to Frankfort, and once to Louisville — this is right up my alley," Gorman said. "I did this 56 years ago. I had a boat 8 feet by 36 feet that went four miles per hour. I think this is great. I'm thrilled to death that Jake is doing this."

Mayor Gorman said that people used the river for transportation early in the century.

"The history of Hazard is the history of the river," he said. "The lifeblood of this county

was the river, until the railroad came in 1912. The railroad filled in the river — blocking transportation."

Toler said that the mayor and other city officials were a great help in getting the project off the ground.

"I can't say enough about Hazard Mayor Bill Gorman for showing an interest," he said.

B.J. Ewen, the city building inspector, helped them build the ramp, he said. Those who helped included Shackleford; Jim Strong, who provided insight for a steering mechanism for the boat; Feltner and the city work crew; and Dr. Gross, a co-pilot who helped with the test run.

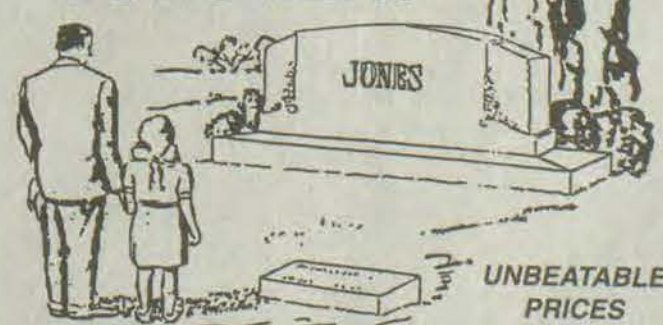

# More Kentucky women to be encouraged to take folic acid

LOUISVILLE — The goal of the current project of the Kentucky Folic Acid Partnership is that more Kentucky women will be encouraged by their healthcare providers to take folic acid every day to prevent serious birth defects.

As another effort in its statewide campaign to reduce the number of Kentucky babies born with severe birth defects of the brain and spine, the Partnership is distributing professional education kits on

folic acid use to healthcare providers across the commonwealth.

Gov. Paul Patton and the 2000 General Assembly recognized the importance of the Folic Acid Campaign and designated funding for folic acid education. This included \$10,000 for the purchase of professional education kits from the March of Dimes. These kits are being distributed to more than 3,000 physicians and nurse midwives throughout Kentucky.

Physicians and other healthcare providers can and do make a difference by influencing their patients to change behavior. Results of a March of Dimes survey support the importance of health education messages from physicians and certified nurse midwives. When women of childbearing age were asked about the importance of taking folic acid daily, they replied that they would be more likely to take it if their physicians told them to.

Studies show that women who take the recommended amount of the B vitamin folic acid daily prior to conception and during the first trimester of their pregnancy can significantly reduce their risk of having a baby with severe birth defects of the brain and spine, called neural tube defects.

The March of Dimes, the

Spina Bifida Association, the Kentucky Department for Public Health and the Barren River District Health Department are founding members of the Kentucky Folic Acid Partnership. This coalition of 50 agencies was formed in 1999 with the goal of reducing the number of babies born with neural tube defects by increasing the number of women who take folic acid every day. The Partnership includes a broad base of state agencies, not-for-profit organizations, hospitals and physician associations.

Prior to the launch of the statewide folic acid campaign, it was estimated that Kentucky had twice the national average of babies born with neural tube defects. This fall, the Partnership will announce results of a follow-up survey

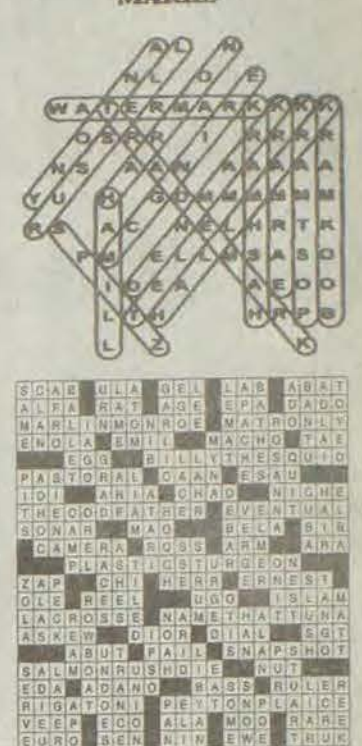
and hopes to show a measurable increase in the number of women across the state who are taking folic acid daily as a result of efforts by partner agencies to spread the word about the benefits of the B vitamin.

"The message to the professionals receiving the folic acid kits is the same message we want all women in Kentucky to receive. It is very important for women of childbearing age to take 400 micrograms of folic acid every day of every week, week after week, year after year, in order to reduce the risk of serious birth defects," said Dr. Steve Davis, a pediatrician and director of the Adult and Child Health Division in the Department for Public Health, who also serves as chairman of the Partnership.

"Research has shown that folic acid may also help reduce the risk of heart disease and stroke. Although research is ongoing, links to folic acid and a lowered risk for certain cancers like breast, colon and cervical, as well as a lowered risk

for Alzheimer's Disease are certainly suggestive enough to encourage all of us to take a simple little "B" vitamin, folic acid, daily to benefit everyone's good health," Davis said.

patrons, making it the first in the state park system with this availability.

According to state Rep. Hubert Collins, the addition of a campground at Paintsville Lake is a "dream come true" for many who have watched an idea grow into reality over the years.

Collins said the project was put into the state budget in 1998 from surplus funds. Those supporting the project, however,

became worried, said Collins, that the dream that might never come true, as the project sat on the list at 140, following many other projects to be completed.

But with the help of Gov. Paul Patton, Kenny Rapier, Ann Latta and others who supported the project, said Collins, it was "brought to the forefront," and became a reality.

"These things that have come about are the reward for us in the legislature," said Collins. "This is our thanks."

State Sen. Johnny Ray Turner agreed that the addition of a campground to Paintsville Lake State Park became a reality thanks to a "joint effort" from those who have shown support for the project throughout the years.

"It takes teamwork," said Turner, "and we've got a good team."

Turner pledged continued support for growth and development in the area.

During the ceremony, recognition was given to several Lexington firms attributed with construction of the campground, including D.W. Wilburn Inc., the project contractor; McIlwain & Associates, landscape architect; Myer-Jolly, architect for the campground buildings; and Kaiser-Taulbee, consulting engineers.

The Department of Parks joined forces with the Finance and Administration Cabinet to oversee the project.

There are currently 49 state parks in the Kentucky State Park System, in addition to the Breaks Interstate Park, which is shared with Virginia.

"The ideal spot for this initiative to get started is right here in Wheelwright," Thompson said during his speech Friday. "Here, if you live up in Weeksbury, you've got 40 miles to drive for services. Some are eligible for \$25 or \$30 in food stamps and for them it's a break even kind of proposition because after they pay someone \$25 to drive them to Prestonsburg, they don't buy them anything."

The services offered at the new Wheelwright facility, located in former Wheelwright High School's cafeteria and gymnasium as well as what used to be the art classroom of that building, are from the Floyd County Health Department. Those services will include immunizations, well-child care, WIC, Women Cancer Screenings and TB outreach services along with other health related screenings.

In addition to those services, the Department of Community-Based Services will help in getting those qualified food stamps, K-TAP and medical assistance operating at the Wheelwright facility from 8:30 a.m. until 4 p.m. five days a week.

The influx of convenient services does not stop there, however.

Mountain Comprehensive Care will be available to provide counseling and community education and will be joined by the Social Security Administration to assist clients in applying for

disability benefits and approach any concerns they may have as well as veterans services.

Four hospitals will offer their services at the facility including Our Lady of the Way, which will provide community education services; Highlands Regional Medical Center, which will offer OB/ GYN services; Big Sandy Health Care, which will be at the facility providing citizens with special clinics; and McDowell ARH, which will be on hand to provide various services.

"When we purchased this building from the school board, we had a vision," said Thompson. "With these offices and the shelter nearing completion, we can say the vision has been fulfilled."

"There is no place I'd rather be in the world this morning than Wheelwright, Ky.," Deputy Secretary Jackson said as he approached the group of citizens and facility workers who turned out for the grand opening. "I consider this as a momentous, historic day in the glorious history of the city of Wheelwright ... I really believe people will look back on June 15 and see it as an important day in the history of Wheelwright, because it was on that day the people of Wheelwright, of Floyd County, said, 'We're not going to tolerate inequality of access to services any longer. We're not going to have any of our people have to pay \$30 for cab ride to get services that they have a right to and that we can provide here in our own hometown.'"

## Thanks, but no thanks

To the outside observer, it would seem Blue Flame Energy cares little about its public image.

The company was the center of controversy in 1999, when an accident contaminated groundwater supplies in a Pike County hollow where families relied on wells as their water source.

Now the company is again making headlines, this time for its proposal to drill gas wells in the Breaks Interstate Park.

Even worse, during a meeting with the park's governing body Thursday, the company's lawyer said Blue Flame might give up its attempts to disturb the area's pristine wilderness for "a very large figure."

Quite simply, we would say the company's offer — which is really no offer at all — bears a striking resemblance to extortion.

Blue Flame, of course, should receive some money as compensation for dropping the proposal, particularly if it halts the controversy without placing the park in jeopardy.

Whether we like it or not, the company did legally lease the rights to natural gas underneath the park. And, regardless of the moral or ethical implications, it appears the company is supported by Kentucky law in its attempts to take full advantage of those rights.

To end the standoff, the park should be willing to reimburse Blue Flame for the amount it spent to purchase the rights, as well as costs it has expended in preparation for and defense of drilling. Maybe the company should even be entitled to a small profit on top of those costs.

But this "very large figure" the company is seeking gives us the impression Blue Flame wants considerably more, especially since the company's attorney hints at the potential value of the gas underground.

The park is right to reject Blue Flame's attempts to use public concern for the park to gather an obscene profit.

### The importance of fathers

Harry Chapin had it right. Fathers should be there.

"My child arrived just the other day. He came to the world in the usual way.

But there were planes to catch and bills to pay.

He learned to walk while I was away.

And he was talking 'fore I knew it, and as he grew,

He'd say, I'm gonna be like you, dad."

Harry Chapin's 1974 "Cats In The Cradle" poignantly depicts the troubled father-son relationship prevalent in many American families today. Chapin's tale of a father who had been absent and aloof during his son's childhood coming

to the painful realization that his son has, in fact, become just like him, is a storyline all too familiar in America today. Parents today spend roughly 40 percent, or 10-12 hours per week, less time with their children than did parents a generation ago.

In a survey on fatherhood, 60 percent of fathers surveyed responded that spending time with their children was the best thing they could do for them. However, among children ages 8-12, almost one-third say that they do not spend enough time with their fathers.

Too few children experience the simple joys of life such as playing ball in the front yard with dad or helping him fix the car, laughing as he pretends he really knows what he is doing. Fathers who are present make America's homes better.

Unfortunately today, many homes do not have a father. Consider these troubling statistics:

■ Tonight, at least 28 percent of American children will go to sleep in a fatherless home. Worse, at least 60 percent of black American children are living apart from their biological fathers.

■ The number of children living apart from their dads has climbed from 5.1 million in 1960 to 16.9 million in 1996.

■ Fifty percent of all white children and 75 percent of all black children born in the last two decades are likely to live for some portion of their childhood with only their mothers.

Social research has studied the impact of a father's absence in the lives of his children. Studies show:

■ Fatherless children are nearly twice as likely as those from intact families to drop out of high school.

■ Children living apart from their biological fathers are up to 75 percent more likely to have to repeat a grade of school and 70 percent more likely to be expelled from school than children living with both parents.

■ Compared to females who grow up with their fathers, females from fatherless homes are 111 percent more likely to have children as teenagers, 164 percent more likely to have a premarital birth, and 92 percent more likely to dis-

### A patient's perspective on pain

There has been a lot of news lately with the use and abuse of the drugs OxyContin and Vicodin. I have tried neither and have always chose to deal with pain without medications until recently. I have read articles in Newsweek and U.S. News and World Report that these drugs, when taken as prescribed, have given some pain patients back a higher quality of life while others seek these drugs out to abuse them.

Some five years ago I finally gave up trying to work due to chronic back pain and went on disability. I had a prescription of Tylenol 3 given to me and they still sit downstairs by my bedside today. I have tried them but they do nothing for the pain and only make one drowsy and drugged.

The reason I have avoided narcotics goes back to my training in the Army and civilian world as a drug and alcohol counselor. Opiate derivatives can lead to serious depression and dependence. I worked last as a drug coun-

selor in Inez. From my patients, I knew that in that county there was only two good family practitioners who avoided prescribing controlled substances and I chose the best one.

During the last couple of years I developed a new pain problem, neuropathy. To describe the feeling the best I can, it's like when you are out in the cold too long and your feet hurt and burn and go numb at the same time. I cannot wear shoes anymore and can't stand for even a blanket to touch my feet.

I went to an acupuncturist in Huntington, W.Va. He stated in three treatments he could relieve my problem at \$60 a session. He stated I would feel relief in the first session if it was going to work.

So I plopped down the money but with no success. I got on the internet and corresponded with an acupuncturist in Australia who wanted the doctor in Huntington to network with him. He stated he had other approaches he felt sure would work. The doctor in Huntington never contacted him nor answered any of my letters.

Next was a podiatrist who proclaimed I had arthritis. I

informed him I had tried several of the newer arthritis drugs but he was certain that Celebrex was the answer. Well, it didn't help any.

I went back to the first doctor and he tried Neurotin for two months and that cost me a couple of hundred dollars and the result was zero. He had earlier given me every prescription he could think of, but no luck.

Desperate for pain relief I decided to see a neurologist at Highlands Regional Medical Center. This doctor gave me a battery of tests over a three-month period trying to find the cause of my dilemma. He put me on Tegretal and then Efforex but no luck. He then informed me that 50 percent of the time they can never determine the cause of neuropathy and the only choice left was opiate drugs that he didn't prescribe. He referred me then to a pain clinic at King's Daughters' Hospital.

When I arrived there for my appointment I interviewed several of the clients there. One fellow told me I didn't want to see a particular doctor for he was rude and short-tempered. When I was called, I saw another doctor and the first question he asked was "Have you ever been tested

for diabetes?" I replied I'm sure I have. He then asked, "When?" I responded with "I guess some time over the last three months." He asked if I tried Neurotin? I said yes. He asked when and what was the dose? I couldn't remember the exact dose or how many pills I took a day but stated I took it for two months and it didn't do anything. He then got up angrily and stated he didn't need to put up with any of my deliberately vague answers. I got up angrily and told him it was obvious he was not sent any background information from the neurologist who referred me and that it was not only a waste of his time but of mine.

It seems there is a total lack of concern for the pain patient. If there were, the neurologist would have provided information to the next doctor so my treatment could be expedited and no duplicate testing or questioning occur. It also seems clear that the two doctors at King's Daughters' who work the pain clinic care nothing for the suffering the patients who see them.

At this point I'm at a dead

## Testing Sites

FRANKFORT — Public health officials in Kentucky are promoting a campaign during June for people who are at risk for HIV infection to be tested.

This campaign is associated with National HIV Testing Day on June 27. The theme for HIV Testing Day is "Take the Test, Take Control." Physicians and other health care professionals, as well as local health departments, may participate in this effort by encouraging HIV test-

ing to those patients at high risk and providing proper counseling during the testing process.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, approximately 800,000 to 900,000 people are infected with HIV in the United States and of these, approximately 200,000 do not know that they are infected.

Early detection of HIV is extremely important. Treatments are available to help those infected live longer and healthier lives.

These treatments are most effective when administered before HIV infection progresses to AIDS. Individuals who find out that they are infected can take precautions to prevent transmitting infection to others.

## Who should be tested?

■ A person who had sex with someone who has HIV,

who has any sexually transmitted disease, or who injects drugs. In addition, testing is recommended for persons who have had multiple sex partners or whose partner has sex with multiple partners.

As of Dec. 31, 1999, 59 percent of AIDS cases in Kentucky contracted HIV as a result of men having sex with men. Eleven percent of AIDS cases were a result of heterosexual contact.

■ A person who has shared needles or syringes.

Of AIDS cases, 13 percent contracted HIV from injecting drug use and 6 percent have both of the risk factors, men having sex with men and injection drug use.

■ A person who had a blood transfusion between 1978 and 1985.

■ A woman who is pregnant or desires to be pregnant.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention currently recommend that all pregnant women receive an HIV test. Early detection among pregnant women is so important because administering treatment to the mother during pregnancy and to the child through six weeks after birth, reduces the chance of transmitting HIV

throughout the state that offer HIV testing, such as a physician's office or a hospital. Also, there are currently 181 state-sponsored HIV counseling and testing sites in Kentucky. Most are operated by local health departments, but there are some at university student health centers.

Many of these sites offer anonymous counseling and testing at no charge.

# Laws passed in 2001 session take effect June 21

FRANKFORT — New laws approved during the General Assembly's 2001 legislative session are poised to enter the law books and officially join the statutes governing Kentucky.

Changes both big and small will occur when the new laws become effective Thursday, June 21. People who make bomb threats against schools will face stiffer penalties. So will people who fill their cars with gas then drive off without paying. The incoming batch of new laws will also establish the Appalachian dulcimer as the state's official musical instrument.

Out of 579 bills considered during the 29-day legislative session, 128 were passed into law.

Legislation approved by Kentucky lawmakers becomes law 90 days after a legislative session adjourns, unless an act specifies a different effective date or has an emergency clause that makes the law immediately effective. This year's legislative session adjourned March 22.

The 2001 legislative session was made possible last year when Kentucky voters approved a constitutional amendment requiring the General Assembly to meet each year. Previously, regular legislative sessions were held only in even-numbered years.

Here's a sampling of some of

the laws that take effect next week:

■ Senate Bill 2 will help promote the cleanup of abandoned, contaminated industrial sites known as brownfields. Many of these sites have remained unused for years because property owners feared cleaning up the land and putting it into use could prompt lawsuits if the state didn't think the site had been cleaned sufficiently. The measure encourages cleanup of the sites by ensuring property owners the state won't sue for additional cleanup once a brownfield site has been cleaned to the satisfaction of the Cabinet for Natural Resources.

■ House Bill 251 will ensure that foster parents have the authority to make decisions regarding the haircuts and hairstyles of foster children who are in their care for 30 days or more.

■ SB 76 will help make sure police don't engage in racial profiling, the practice of pulling over cars or questioning people based solely on their race. The legislation will require police departments that receive police salary supplements from the state to enact a policy prohibiting racial profiling.

■ HB 1 will stiffen penalties against anyone who makes a bomb threat to a school or public building. The legislation will

make the crime a felony rather than a misdemeanor.

■ SB 5 will designate the Appalachian dulcimer as the official musical instrument of Kentucky.

■ HB 100 will help determine if industrial hemp — which can be used to make products ranging from clothes to auto parts — is a viable product for Kentucky farmers. The legislation sets conditions under which a university could grow industrial hemp as part of a study to determine whether there's potential for a hemp market in Kentucky. So far, no college agriculture program has applied to grow hemp under the new law.

■ HB 101 will protect the jobs of volunteer firefighters by ensuring that an employer couldn't fire a volunteer firefighter for being late to work if the tardiness was caused by firefighting duties or some other emergency response.

■ HB 62 will help ensure foster children get the education they need by waiving tuition at Kentucky's public colleges and universities for foster children and wards of the state.

■ SB 155 will require commercial trucks to have lights and reflectors in operating condition and unobstructed by dirt and debris. Though the legislation stiffens fines for these violations,

truck drivers cited for having missing or inoperable lights or reflectors could have citations dismissed if the problem is fixed within 30 days.

■ HB 356 will specify that the state can only try to collect taxes on illegal drugs after a person has pleaded guilty or been convicted of dealing or possessing the drugs.

■ SB 47 will ensure Kentucky's secondary wood product industries, such as cabinet makers, are among the businesses that receive priority consideration under state economic development loan, grant, and incentive programs administered by the Kentucky Economic Development Finance Authority.

■ SB 71 will include students from Kentucky enrolled in Congressional Page School or in a foreign exchange school in the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship Program.

■ SB 123 will require that signs be placed at polling places on Election Day that inform voters of their right to report administrative or clerical errors at the polling place to the county board of elections within 10 days of an election.

■ HB 105 will allow for a driver's license suspension of anyone convicted of filling a car with gas at a station then driving off without paying.

"Ladies and gentleman," said starter Ron Read, "from Windermere, Fla., defending U.S. Open champion, Tiger Woods."

As the saying goes, the crowd went wild as playing partners Jeff Quinney and Thomas Bjorn, mouths agape, stared at the massive crowd.

Inside the gallery ropes, you meet all kinds. One East Coast scribe (no names) wondered aloud if Tiger would amble over to a western wear store, pick up a pair of cowboy boots

### Martin on the cart

The PGA Tour shot itself in the foot big time in forcing Casey Martin to seek legal redress for the right to use an electric cart in pursuit of his career as a professional golfer.

One has to believe the PGA Tour hierarchy consulted its attorneys before embarking on this road of no return. Surely, the legal beagles reminded Commissioner Tim Finchem, his staff and members of the Tournament Policy Board that legislation protecting the rights of persons with disabilities was already on the books and for a purpose.

Martin, who played his collegiate golf at Stanford University with the likes of Tiger Woods, turned pro with visions of making it in the mercenary fairway dodge based upon very real expectations. This despite the fact he suffered from a progressively debilitating circulatory disorder in his right leg.

He qualified to go onto the BYCOM Tour, kind of the farm system level for professional golf, and in this forum, frequently using a cart, finished in the top 15 money winners and therefore automatically was due a card for the PGA tour. He accepted the invite and promptly sought permission to use a mechanical conveyance for assistance in taking advantage of his playing privileges. The powers-that-be said no, and thereby hoisted themselves on their own petard.

What was Martin to do? Some foggy thinkers are part of the opinion he simply should have walked away from a life-long ambition (no pun intended), one for which he had gained admittance according to the PGA Tour's own rules and regulations, and said, "Hey, it's just my tough luck that I have a disability which doesn't allow me to pursue my career goals." Not bloody likely.

Interestingly enough, the United States Golf Association permitted Martin to use a golf cart while competing in the 1998 U.S. Open at the Olympic Country Club in San Francisco, Calif. The guys in the blue blazers displayed a whole lot more smarts than was the case with their PGA Tour brethren.

A number of prominent PGA Tour players, past and present, including Jack Nicklaus trumpeted the cause of maintaining tradition. Said the Golden Bear, "Walking has always been an integral part of golf. Something one must do to participate in the game."

Bilge! Literally millions of people throughout America play golf while enjoying the convenience of a cart. In fact, most private clubs and resort courses REQUIRE players to take a cart even if they prefer to walk. And the USGA places no strictures on players who use carts to initiate and maintain a legitimate handicap.

At one time walking (hiking) was the traditional means for traveling from one point to another. But when horses were introduced to enhance mobility the cause of maintaining tradition was not used to prevent this advantage. Still later automobiles became the preferred mode of transportation, replacing the horse as the traditional modus operandi for getting from one place to another. If tradition had been enforced as sufficient reason to disallow means of transportation other than walking just think where our country would have been prevented from being able to exercise and enhance their talents.

Does using a car give Martin an edge on his fellow competitors. Sure it does. On hot, humid days and hilly courses he bodes to be less fatigued than his walking buddies. However, when he does dismount to strike the ball he's doing so on one good leg as opposed to their two solid underpinnings. Ultimately, everything evens out.

In reaching its recent decision the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that golf has to do with actually executing a shot and not the method employed to arrive at the ball.

The PGA Tour was dumb. And dumb always has problems.

### Nice guys

According to Leo "The Lip" Durocher, "Nice guys do finish last." Needless to say, the man with a profile like a clinched fist didn't always call them right and his famous quote wasn't on the money either.

Perhaps there are no more bad boys to be found in any major sport other than professional tennis. In fact, during the past 20 years, these brats grown old have abounded with the likes of John McEnroe, Ili Nastase and Jimmy Connors setting the tone in the modern era. Now such as Australia's Lleyton Hewitt and Chile's Marcelo Rios, to name only a couple, are carrying this dubious torch into a new millennium.

Tactics such as racket smashing, profane and abuse of officials and animated fist-pumping in the face of vanquished opponents plays out as bad form in any arena. But only big-time tennis allows such bad behavior as a matter of course. If these antics were tried in other major sports suspensions, fines and a few busted chops would be the result.

Not everybody is taken with this thumb-sucking revolution. Among the most prominent detractors is former all-time court great Rodney Laver.

"I certainly don't agree with the conduct of the game now," he said, "but like it or not, the old court manners are definitely out. Personally, I would be embarrassed to engage in some of the things I see happening routinely today."

Contradictions to the rule of the day have been Pete Sampras and, as of late, Andre Agassi. Currently, Sampras holds the record for winning the most Grand Slam singles titles all time with 13, while Agassi, at 31, made a miraculous comeback at such an advanced age to be ranked No. 1 in the world in 1999 and 2000.

Said Sampras, "I don't think I have to act like a jerk to be recognized as a fine player. Before me Rod Laver and Ken Rosewall gentleman on and off the court and their attainments speak for themselves."

After undergoing a rebel phase in his early development Agassi matured and assumed the court reserve expected of a champion. In victory or defeat his decorum is always reserved, soft spoken and sans inflammatory statements.

In the wake of losing a Slam final to old rival Sampras, Agassi told reporter, "If you're going to beat Pete (Sampras) you have to weather the storm of shots he throws at you. Should you be able to do this then he's the most vulnerable. But I wasn't able to weather the storm today. He was simply too good for me."

Just a few weeks ago Sampras lost an early round match in a tune-up for the 2001 French Open and then faced his inquisitors from the press row.

"I don't have any complaints," he said quietly. "Actually I played good enough to win but just came up a little short. That's the way it goes sometimes. You just have to keep coming back, keep improving."

McEnroe, now a senior player and occasional television commentator, still conducts himself between the white lines like a baby with an open diaper pin stuck in his nump. Not surprisingly, he would like to see the headline players of today employing the same tantrum gimmickry that made him an item not so long ago.

"The men's game is so stale, there's no flavor to it," he remarked recently. "And unfortunately, the ATP hasn't done anything to help this situation. All they want is nameless, faceless players."

Suffice it to say the American sporting public at large doesn't cotton to players who engage in pampers histrionics.

Noted Agassi, "There's a high entertainment standard to live up to in the United States and men's tennis hasn't met it, so it's lost popularity."

Durocher was wrong. And men's pro tennis better believe it.

More often than not what is asked qualifies as banal, inflammatory, respectful and, not infrequently, downright stupid.

Thus it's hardly surprising that the response to the above often tend to be the like kind. However, some prove to be the exception and are nonsensical, delightful and wholly entertaining.

Here is a sampling of those which have stood the test of time for your amusement and amazement.

Lou Holtz, lately head coach at the University of South Carolina: "Yes, I do have a lifetime contract. That means I can't be fired during the third quarter if we're moving the ball."  
Vince Lombardi, Green Bay Packers great coach: "How did we do today? Yeah, I have an opinion on that matter. But I won't know for sure until my barber tells me on Monday."  
Bobby Knight, long-time Indiana University bas-

So, if they didn't think he would make a difference, why go to him at all, let him sit. Get on the phone and find whoever.

In Super Bowl XXXV, the Ravens ran all over the New York Giants by a 34-7 count. Dilfer did a masterful job of directing the club's attack and tossed a couple of key completions early on that put the Giants under the gun and made them abandon any pretense at running the football, something they had done rather respectably all season long. This, in turn, allowed the Ravens defense to disregard the threat of the run and just lay back their ears and go after the quarterback. Nice work if you can get it.

Lost somewhere in all this mismatch is the truth that you can't score without having possession of the football. Defense, at its best, is designed to get turnovers, or to obtain possession of the football, at the most

advantageous place on the field. Offense has a different mission.

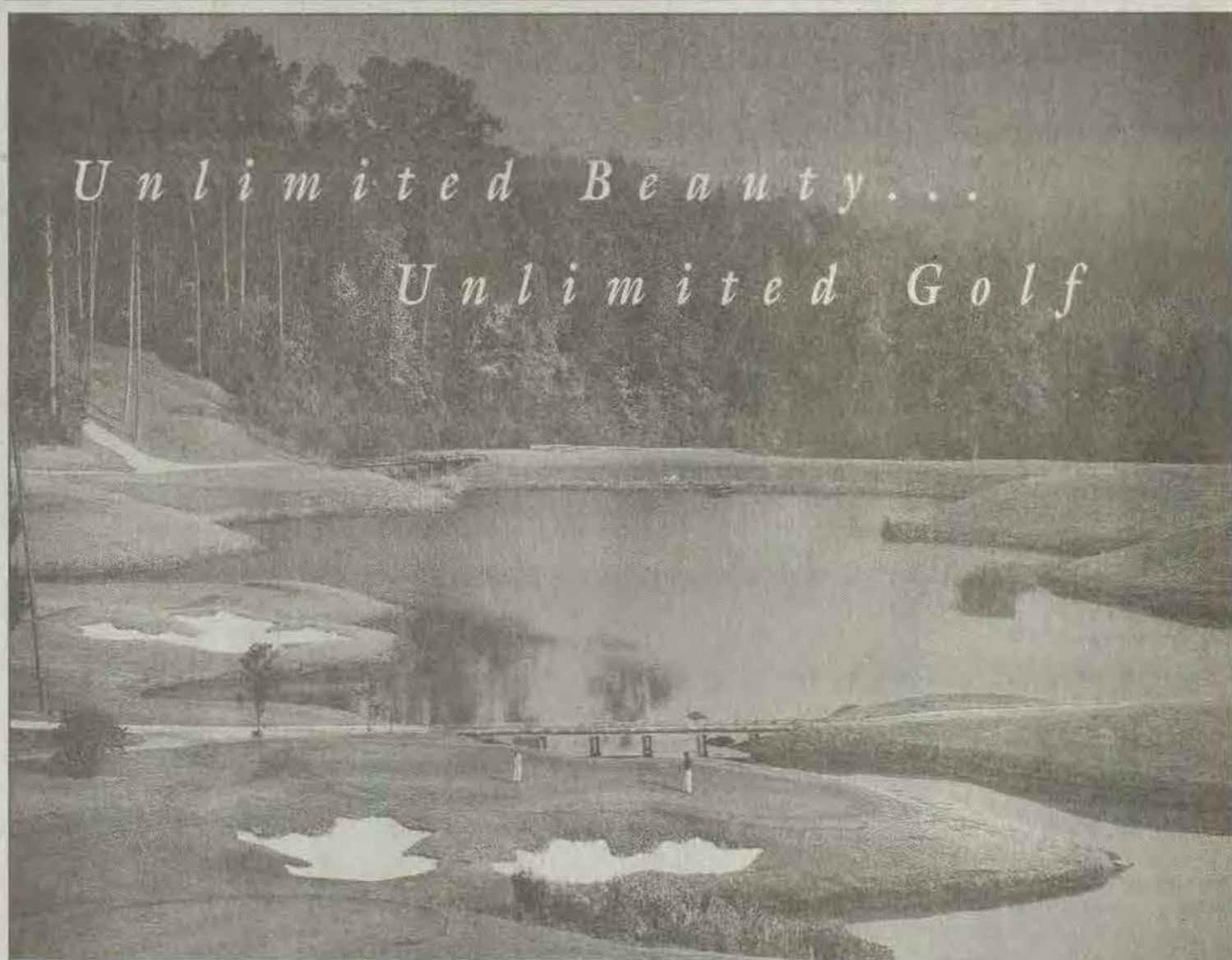
Old quarterback George Blanda said of late, "One thing will always be the same in football. You run the football to control the clock and you throw the football to score."

BROOKLYN, Mich. — Jeff Gordon's victory in Sunday's Kmart 400 could hardly be labeled undeserved. After all, he led 143 out of 200 laps for his second Michigan.

Gordon became the first driver to win from the pole this year. But he could have easily lost it, and it took a fair amount of, yes, luck for him to pull it off.

Of course, Gordon, be he ever so humble, always cites luck as a factor in his victories, which now number 55 since his trumpeted arrival in the Winston Cup Series in 1993.

This particular victory had some luck involved, but it was Gordon who grabbed the gold when opportunity presented itself. He dazzled the fans — perhaps "made them angry" — a better phrase — by giving the lead to long-suffering cky Rudd and then taking it ght back from him on the 1st lap.

"I only know one way and at's to go for it," said ordon, who gave car owner ick Hendrick his 100th ctory. "When I've got a car at's capable of winning, I

want to win. People always ask me what I like about racing and what keeps bringing me back. And I always say, 'Winning.' When I've got the car and the team and the pit stops to do it, I'm going to get everything out of it that I can."

A few missteps put Gordon in position to lose. When he pitted at lap 174, mistakes were made, and he had to come in again. Incredibly, the driver who proved to be his principal opposition, Ricky Rudd, pitted again as well, and not because he had lug nuts.

Because Gordon had to pit, and Rudd's crew chief, Michael McSwain, chose to, Dodge driver Sterling Marlin could easily have won. He gradually gave up ground to the relentless charges of Gordon and Rudd.

### CRAFTSMAN TRUCK

FORT WORTH, Texas — Jack Sprague broke a 22-race drought in the NASCAR truck series and ended Dodge's winning streak Friday by taking the O'Reilly 400. Sprague drove his Chevrolet to a 4.66-second win over Brendan Gaughan.

## FEUD OF THE WEEK

### Rusty Wallace vs. Todd Bodine

Wallace's championship hopes took a hit with a 41st-place finish at Michigan. He blamed Bodine for the crash that crushed his hopes for a strong finish. "Right in the middle of the back straightaway, all of a sudden, I get drilled in the rear end by the (No.) 66 car (Bodine). That turned it sideways right into the wall, so I don't know what the boy was thinking. I don't know where his head was at on that one."

couldn't ask for it to be any better. We just couldn't seem to get the track position we needed to go good."

**Didn't you say recently that driving for Junie Donlavey reminded you of the days that you drove for Bobby Allison?** "Yeah, it really did. I'm having more fun right now than I've had since the '12 car' days. It just brings back memories of those days when we used to run good week in and week out. It feels like I'm back home again."

**How critical was track position?** "For me, it was everything because I couldn't go anywhere at the start of a run (after a pit stop). I was really good in long runs, but unfortunately, I lost so much track position

at the beginning that I just couldn't go. There at the end, I knew if I could protect the outside and they had to get around me on the inside, they were going to have a pretty tough row to hoe. It was a good day."

**Did you have a sixth-place car, or could you have contended with a few more laps?** "Well, I'm going to tell you, I don't think I could have beaten (winner Jeff) Gordon. He was awful good. He had everything. Our car, when I really leaned on it hard, was a little bit too loose (oversteering). We did some things on the last pit stop that really helped a lot, but it was something that was only going to help us for a short run. Everything really fell into our hands and really worked out."

Plus, when you head into the straightaway on the front stretch, you can easily make it four wide to pass."

"After running so well at Charlotte, we really thought about bringing that car to run the Cup in Michigan," crew chief Matt Bodand said. "Our original plan was to run Winston Cup at Michigan, and even though we made some changes in April, our schedule can change based on what we feel we need to do to get Ryan more experience. Our test here was good, and Ryan is really comfortable on the track. We just went back to our original plan."

- Driver will take responsibility for any and all crew members.
- Officials MUST BE NOTIFIED immediately of any driver change.
- Interpretation of rules and decisions of race operation officials will be final.
- Ignorance of rules will not be accepted as an excuse for their violation.
- Open drinking of intoxicants will not be tolerated. Immediate ejection from facility will be executed.
- Any crew member, driver or anyone else who uses loud and abusive language or profane signs towards any track official or any individual who is guilty of starting or engaging in a fight will be fined, lose all winning and points for that event. They are also subject to suspension from upcoming event(s).
- Any persons found with any weapon in his or her possession is subject to fine, loss of the weapon and arrest.
- Rain-outs: It is essential that pit passes and gate admission tickets be kept until completion of events in the case of a rain-out. This will be the only means by which you will be allowed admittance on the rescheduled date (once Late Model feature has been completed, the night's events will be considered official).

All race classes have separate rules.

**Minor league baseball attendance passes 12-million fans**

ST. PETERSBURG, FL— Attendance at Minor League Baseball games soared past 12.3-million fans in games played through the end of May. The 11 leagues, ranging from Class AAA to Class A, averaged 3,475 fans for each of the 3,545 games played during the first two months of the season, that's an increase of 2.9 percent over the same period last season,

based on the average crowd per playing date.

The South Atlantic League showed the largest increase, nearly 600 fans (30.8%) per playing date, thanks to new franchises in Lexington, KY, and Lakewood, NJ. The Lexington Legends, an expansion team, are playing before an

average crowd of 6,223, the second largest in all of Class A baseball. Lakewood is close behind with an average turnout of 5,968. The BlueClaws moved to New Jersey this season from Fayetteville, NC. Dayton of the Midwest League leads all Class A teams with an average of 8,158 fans.

The Legends reached their 100,000th attendance mark in

just their 17th home game, which is faster than any team in South Atlantic League history. The Previous record was 22 games set by the Delmarva Shorebirds in 1997; the same year Delmarva set the existing SAL regular season attendance record of 324,412. The

Thursday's opening round of the 101st Open at Southern Hills was washed out with 30 groups still on the course. Twenty-two groups had completed their opening rounds.

Three-time champion Hale Irwin, teeing off at 8 a.m., fired an opening round 67 to take the early lead.

Retief Goosen of South Africa was at 3-under before his round was halted after seven holes.

The first round will resume today at 7 a.m. Second-round play is slated to begin at 9 a.m.

Irwin owns U.S. Open victories in 1974, 1979 and 1990, and won last year's U.S. Senior Open for the second time. The 56-year old Irwin, the oldest player in the field and playing in his 32nd Open, proved that experience makes a difference.

He made bogey on the first two holes but followed with a pair of birdies. He added a birdie at the eighth and made the turn at 1-under.

Irwin added three birdies on the back side, including an impressive birdie-3 at the rugged 18th hole. He ripped a 2-iron from 198 yards to within two feet on the closing hole.

He saved par on the 16th by sinking a downhill, sidehill putt of 25 feet.

"My hope was to go out and be competitive," he said. "I think too many people are saying, 'Gosh, you're the oldest guy in the field. You're 56 years old.' But let's not forget that there are a few championships and three U.S. Opens to my title. So it's not like I've never been here before."

Irwin said that he feels confident he can still compete with his much younger opponents on tour.

"I don't think I'm in over my head," he said. "My purpose this week is not to be ceremonial, it's to be competitive."

Woods pushed his opening tee shot and never seemed to hit his stride on the front nine.

He struggled to save par on the first two holes before three-putting and making bogey at the third.

But it was at the ninth hole that his game went astray, pushing a short iron into a greenside bunker. Frustrated, Woods slammed a rake with his sand wedge, walked into the bunker and hurriedly blasted away. The ball sailed over the green. He needed three shots to get down from there for a double-bogey six.

Loren Roberts, a 45-year old who played with Irwin, shot a 1-under 69 in the opening round, along with Stewart Cink, who shot a 4-under 31 on the back.

"It helped me just because I like Hale and I felt comfortable out there," said Roberts.

Phil Mickelson, an 18-time winner on tour but still looking for his first major, finished at even-par 70.

"I'm not ecstatic, and I'm not disappointed," he said.

Also at even par were Sergio Garcia, Matt Gogel and Angel Cabrera.

Jim Furyk was one-under after 10 and David Duval was even par through 10.

## Medicare AND YOU

Most doctors and health care providers who work with Medicare are honest. There are a few who are not honest. Medicare fraud takes a lot of money every year from the program and Medicare is working very hard with other government agencies to protect Medicare funds.

**Q What is Medicare fraud?**

**A** Medicare fraud is purposefully billing Medicare for services you never received.

**Q What can I do to watch over spending in Medicare?**

**A** When your claim is processed at Medicare you will receive a Medicare Summary Notice (MSN). The notice shows what was charged for services or supplies and how much Medicare paid. You should check the notice to make sure that you got the services and supplies that are listed.

**Q What should I do if I see a charge on my Medicare Summary Notice that may be wrong?**

**A** Call the doctor, hospital, or other provider and ask about it. The bill may be correct and the person you speak to may help you to better understand the services you got. There could also be a billing error that can be corrected. If you are not satisfied after speaking to the provider, you should call or write the Medicare contractor that sent you the Medicare Summary Notice. The name, address, and phone number is printed on the front of the notice.

**Q Are there some other ways I can help stop fraud?**

**A** Yes. A few ways you can help are:  
 ■ Never give your Medicare or Medicaid number over the telephone or to people you do not know, except to your doctor or other Medicare provider  
 ■ Do not ask your doctor to make false entries on certificates, bills, or records in order to get Medicare to pay  
 ■ Be suspicious of providers that tell you the test is free, they only need your Medicare number for their records

**Q Besides my Medicare contractor, is there any other place I can call if I suspect Medicare fraud?**

**A** Yes. You may also call the Inspector General's hotline

## ARH receives funds for expansion in Eastern Kentucky

Appalachian Regional Healthcare (ARH) Board Chairman, William Engle, recently thanked Governor Paul Patton and the Kentucky Economic Development Finance Authority (KEDFA) for their approval of a \$4 million investment in the system's commitment to increase the number of quality jobs in eastern Kentucky. These funds from the Local Government Economic Development Fund, along with \$1.35 million from the Perry County Single County Fund, will be used to expand ARH's services in Central Appalachia.

The funds will be used to construct an 8,000 square foot central reference laboratory at the Hazard ARH Regional Medical Center, to develop the ARH System Center-Hazard and to relocate laboratory staff from the current central lab in Lexington. Other uses of the funds include development of the system's Chief Legal and Medical Offices, development of the ARH Division of Clinics, and a Community Based Planner at the System Center-Hazard. ARH will now begin an implementation plan for the balance of this significant expansion.

Over the next two to four years, ARH expects to have developed 81 administrative jobs that are new in eastern Kentucky. The laboratory in Hazard alone will employ about 19 people. After the first indication from the Governor's office that these funds might be available, ARH has developed or is developing about 20 new jobs at the System Center-Hazard alone. The total ARH Perry County's employment is now 1270 jobs.

ARH President and CEO, Stephen Hanson, says that ARH System offices in Lexington are remaining operational there.

ARH Legal Affairs and Medical Affairs offices are located in System Center-Hazard. Forrest Cook and Dr. William Grundler, respectively, serve as

vice presidents in those roles. The functions which support those offices, including coding, documentation specialists, part time assistant medical directors, will be located either in the System Center-Hazard or in ARH hospitals and clinics. ARH has already started to locate some Information Systems personnel in eastern Kentucky to be near the region's hardware and software.

ARH is also interested in continuing to build up the patient billing functions in Harlan where that team has historically performed well. Currently a number of

## Local complexes win HUD recognition

Kentucky Housing Corporation annually performs a management review of Highland Terrace and Highland Heights housing projects. The purpose of this review is to ensure the properties are managed and apartments are maintained in accordance with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) regulations.

After the management review, Kentucky Housing Corporation (KHC) rates overall management and maintenance practices. There are four possible ratings given by KHC to each property: Superior, Satisfactory, Below Satisfactory, and Unsatisfactory.

KHC performed management reviews of both Highland Heights and Highland Terrace Apartments in April, 2001 giving both properties a "Superior" rating, citing that the properties are well-maintained and management files in excellent condition.

Staff of these properties include Fran Howell, project administrator for Church Housing Association of Prestonsburg, Inc.; Sherry Akers, project manager Highland Heights; and Jody Collins, project manager Highland Terrace.

Additionally, Howell was the 2001 recipient of HUD's Audree Carter Award. The Audree Carter Award was named for a former HUD employee who died of cancer at the age of 36. This "Making a Difference" award is presented annually to a HUD employee who has been shown to make a positive difference in their community and in the lives of the people they come in contact with.

The award was presented at the annual conference of the Multifamily Division of the U.S. Department of

Housing and Urban Development held in May of this year at the Galt House in Louisville. Approximately 700 employees of multifamily properties from all over the state attended the conference.

Howell has been employed by the Church Housing Association for thirteen years and was promoted to Project Administrator in January, 1997. She oversees the management of Highland Heights and Cliffside Apartments, which are both multifamily apartment complexes for low-income persons and families, as well as Highland Terrace Apartments which is a four-story complex for the elderly and mobility impaired persons.

## Breaking up is hard to do

Divorce can be hard enough on your emotions without having to deal with money problems, too. Some people rush through a divorce as quickly as possible, overlooking the financial ramifications.

"You can divorce your spouse, but you can't divorce your creditors," said Steve Rhode, president and co-founder of Myvesta.org, a nonprofit financial crisis center. "We've seen people who have come out of a divorce thinking their debts are evenly divided. The surprise comes when collectors call because the other spouse has stopped making payments on their share of the debt as they promised."

When dividing up property some basic rules apply. It can be divided any way the couple chooses, but if they can't come to an agreement state laws determine who gets what.

According to Rhode, "Generally the property that each spouse brought into the marriage is awarded to him or her, and the property that was acquired during the marriage is

considered joint property. Some states divide joint property 50-50, others use a property division principle called equitable distribution. Equitable distribution tries to divide the property fairly between the two people."

Dividing debt is similar to dividing property and should be done just as carefully to avoid taking on an unfair debt load.

"In most states a spouse is only responsible for the debts he or she acquired during the marriage. The only time you might be responsible for your spouse's debt is if the account was a joint account or you co-signed a loan," Rhode explained.

"If your spouse does not pay debts that you originally signed for but he or she promised to pay in the divorce agreement, your creditors will not waste much time looking you up to collect," Rhode said. "To protect yourself is to pay off as many debts as possible before the divorce is final, even if you have to sell of some of your assets to do it."

## State School Board votes to grade state test on a curve, says watchdog group

"What this decision essentially means is that the statewide CATS tests will now be graded on a curve," said a spokesman for an educational watchdog group, "and everyone knows that when you grade on a curve it's easier to get a high score."

"This decision is the death knell for the idea that all children can learn at high levels," said Martin Cothran, spokesman for The Family Foundation of Kentucky, of the decision today by the State School Board to change the way it scores the state tests. "The State Board is essentially admitting that the scoring system it had in place before was too hard, and that children who cannot learn at high levels will be given a break."

The belief that all children can learn at high levels was a key tenet of Kentucky Education Reform Act of 1990. "The Board seems to finally be willing to recognize that this was an unworkable, utopian idea," said Cothran. "It's too bad taxpayers have had to foot the bill for state policymakers to learn this important lesson."

According to figures provided by the Kentucky Department of Education (KDE), scores on the statewide tests could increase dramatically under the new plan. The new plan will move many students out of the Apprentice category (the second lowest test grade) into the Proficient and Distinguished categories (the two highest grades).

According to KDE figures, some categories, such as Practical Living Skills, could see increases in the number of students scoring at or above Proficient of as much as 700 percent. The increases result from an apparent move away from what has been called "standards-based testing" back toward more traditional "norm-referenced" testing, where students are compared only against other students, rather than to a hard and fast standard.

"In many ways this means that the great testing experiment is over in Kentucky," said Cothran. "The irony is that this kind of grading scheme is what everyone wanted to get away from back in 1990."

## County unemployment rates continue to fall in April

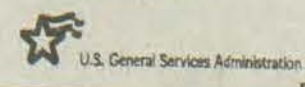
FRANKFORT - Unemployment rates dropped in 98 Kentucky counties between March and April, rose in 17 and stayed the same in five counties, according to the Department for Employment Services, a Cabinet for Workforce Development agency. The statewide unemployment rate declined from 4.3 percent in March to 4.1 percent in April. The state jobless rate has decreased the last three consecutive months. From April 2000 to April 2001, jobless rates were higher in 74 counties, lower in 44 counties and the same in Bath and Owen counties. In April 2001, six counties had unemployment rates at 10 percent or above. Six counties recorded double-digit rates in March 2001 and seven in April 2000.

Oldham County's 1.8 percent jobless rate was the lowest in the commonwealth. Other low rates were recorded in Fayette and Jessamine counties, 1.9 percent each; Franklin County, 2.1 percent; Bourbon County, 2.4 percent; Henry and Scott counties, 2.5 percent each; Bracken County, 2.6 percent; Shelby County, 2.8 percent; and Boone, Bullitt, Garrard, Mason and Owen counties, 2.9 percent each. Monroe County recorded the state's highest unemployment rate - 18.6 percent. It was followed by McCreary County, 14.7 percent; Wayne County, 12 percent; Carter and Crittenden counties, 11.1 percent each; Lewis County, 10.2 percent; Elliott and Magoffin counties, 9.3 percent; Morgan County, 8.2 percent and Breathitt County, 8.1 percent.

Unemployment statistics are based on estimates and are compiled to measure trends rather than actually to count people working. Civilian labor force statistics include non-military workers and unemployed Kentuckians who are actively seeking work. They do not include unemployed Kentuckians who have not looked for employment within the past four weeks.

There are many things you can do to increase your chances of receiving student financial aid to help pay for higher education expenses. Over the next several months we will provide some helpful tips from the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA) to get you started.

First, it is so important for students to make good grades in high school. By doing so they can earn money for college or technical training through the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship (KEES), which is administered by the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority. Students who make a 2.5 or higher grade point average and take the required courses can earn scholarships for college or technical college. The better students perform academically in high school the more money they will earn to pay their higher education expenses. And if they maintain their good grades in college they will continue to receive the KEES Scholarship for up to four years.

Students do not have to apply for this scholarship. If they attend a certified Kentucky high school, their school will automatically provide student eligibility information to the Kentucky Department of Education. The Department will forward the information to KHEAA who will then send each student an award notification at the end of each school year. ## Students learning CISCO networking classes at HTC

Students are learning beneficial skills through CISCO networking classes being taught at Hazard Technical College by Richard Roe.

The computer networking industry is lacking personnel with the training needed to set up and maintain computer networks. The first two levels (out of the four levels available) of CISCO classes will be offered this fall at Hazard Technical College. These classes are

needed to obtain network certification through the CISCO Networking Academy.

Students learn about the various components of a computer system and the role of computers and other equipment needed to operate and maintain a network.

The students also learn how to complete the physical installation of networks, as well as learning the concepts associated with computer networking.

Students will be required to take an on-line semester final at the end of each level of instruction and achieve a passing score in order to receive CISCO certification.

## Students take classes on campus and online

Busy students who want to schedule their college studies around job, family and other activities now have more options for earning a bachelor's degree through a unique alliance formed between Hazard Community and Technical Colleges and Franklin University.

The internet is the educational link that makes it all possible.

The community college has entered into an agreement with Columbus, Ohio-based Franklin University to offer students the opportunity to earn a bachelor's degree by combining on-campus courses at Hazard Community and Technical Colleges with online courses through Franklin University.

Bachelor's degree options include high-demand fields such as business administration, technical management, computer science, health care management, management information systems and public safety management.

Although many schools form agreements with a four-year college or university to provide students with a transition to a bachelor's degree, the Community College Alliance with Franklin is unique.

Students take core courses at Hazard Community College or Hazard Technical College, earning an associate's degree or equivalent. Then they take a selected number of "bridge" courses at HCC/HTC that are designed to prepare them for the upper level online courses taken from Franklin University.

From then on, students connect with professors and classmates via computer. Assignments are posted by e-mail, and there are scheduled chat sessions and bulletin board discussions in which the class reviews the study topics. When all classes are complete, the student is awarded a

bachelor's degree from Franklin University.

"The alliance allows students to build upon their positive community college experiences and attain a bachelor's degree without leaving the community," said Franklin University President Paul Otte. "I'm excited by the chance to work with Hazard Community and Technical Colleges."

"Obtaining a bachelor's degree from Franklin University is ideal for the person who is comfortable using a computer and the internet," noted G. Edward Hughes, HCC president. "Being self-disciplined is a must," he noted, adding that many succeed in collegiate work via the internet.

"The alliance is just another component of the University Center of the Mountains concept and this agreement with Franklin University falls in line with our goal to make a four-year college degree more accessible to the people of the Kentucky River Community and Technical College District," Dr. Hughes said.

The strength of this distinctive program is that students have the benefit of belonging to two schools at one time, college officials said. They can access Hazard Community and Technical

# Reynolds participates in Upward Bound at Morehead State University

Jessica Reynolds is the third sibling in her family to attend college after participating in Morehead State University's Upward Bound. The Elliott County freshman now takes part in Student Support Services on the campus.

After her two older sisters, Jennifer and Stephanie, participated in Upward Bound during their high school years, Jessica decided it was a good choice for her as well. "It's kind of like a family thing for us," she said.

A 1996 magna cum laude grad-

uate of MSU, Jennifer is a teacher at Rowan County Middle School. While a college student, she worked as a tutor-counselor during Upward Bound's summer camp where she now teaches classes. Stephanie is a senior at Eastern Kentucky University.

The siblings, the daughters of Ron and Rhonda Reynolds, have a younger sister, Robin, who is a freshman at Elliott County High School. She recently became active in Upward Bound.

Besides family tradition, the program was attractive to Jessica,

because she could earn six college credits and learn the layout of the campus and how to use the Camden-Carroll Library before entering Morehead State as a freshman.

"The program showed me what college was going to be like," Jessica said. "In the career planning class, I learned that there are not a lot of jobs that I would want to do without a college degree."

When she became a full-time college student, Jessica's decision to continue in the federally-funded Trio Programs was an easy one.

"It's good to have someone to help you sometimes, because you need it," she said.

Thousands of Kentuckians have attained educational goals through the Trio Programs, which were established by the Higher Education Act of 1965. On the MSU campus, the Commonwealth Educational Opportunity Center, Educational Talent Search, Student Support Services and Upward Bound offer assistance for disadvantaged students whose parents did not graduate from college.

Morehead State's Educational

Talent Search has worked with more than 25,000 middle and high school students since it began on the campus in 1968. Academic counseling and information about postsecondary education options are provided to its participants in 10 counties.

Counselors in Upward Bound, work with high school students to generate the academic skills and motivation necessary for success in postsecondary education. The program, which includes activities after school, on weekends and a summer camp, has served more

than 2,100 students since 1966.

Initiated in 1971, Student Support Services offers tutoring, academic advising, and personal career and financial aid counseling to 221 undergraduates each year. Its participants enjoy a variety of events throughout the semester, such as white water rafting or to a hockey game.

Designed for non-traditional students, the Commonwealth Educational Opportunity Center serves approximately 2,000 adults annually. The CEOC, which has served more than 15,000 adults in 10 years, works to increase the educational level and college attendance rate in a 27-county area.

Kentucky students joined hundreds of others for National Trio Day on Saturday, February 24. Students competed in a Scholars Bowl contest and attended a theatrical performance by Hasan Davis at Berea College, which is hosting the statewide celebration.

Postsecondary Education, the program offers a schedule that simulates college life where participants explore the opportunities available in the teacher education field, along with communication skills and educational workshops.

To increase the number of minority students entering the teaching profession, the MTEP program provides assistance and encouragement. "I tell my students that if you want to go to college, we can help," Winfield said. "But you have to put forth the effort."

MSU has been working with junior high students through the Jefferson County Partnership Act for several years. "We encourage the youngsters to start thinking about taking college track courses before they enter high school," she said. The \$1 million the University received from the

GEAR-UP grant last year will provide funds for academic programs for middle school students in east Kentucky, she added.

Statewide, the number of African American students enrolling in college after high school has increased in recent years, according to statistics from the Council on Postsecondary Education, but Winfield would like to see the numbers go higher. In 1998, 51.5 percent of the students enrolled, compared to 34.3 percent in 1982.

Students cited several reasons for not choosing to teach, according to Sherron Jackson, senior associate with the CPE. Among them are: a lack of minority role models, low teacher salaries, lack of financial aid and support, and issues related to certification after completing the teacher education program.

While success does not always come easy, Winfield believes lots of problems—in school and in life—may be avoided if one is prepared. Drawing on personal experiences, she credits hard work for allowing her to become a teacher.

Growing up in Jeffersonville, Indiana, Winfield was a single mom in her thirties when she chose to return to the classroom. A former employee of Louisville Welding Company, she attended Jefferson State Vocational School for two years before continuing her studies at MSU.

An honors graduate, Winfield earned associate and bachelor's degrees in industrial technology, as well as a master's degree in vocational education from MSU. She taught welding at the La Grange Vocational Education Center, part of the Kentucky State

Reformatory, before accepting a fulltime post at MSU to oversee the welding program.

During the next year, Winfield held a joint appointment with the University's College of Education and Behavioral Sciences and the Department of Industrial Education and Technology, after being named coordinator of the MTEP program in 1992.

Although she no longer teach-

es welding, Winfield remains busy teaching other courses, including MSU 101. A large portion of her time is spent on administrative duties, completing paperwork, and locating resources that would fund scholarships for her students.

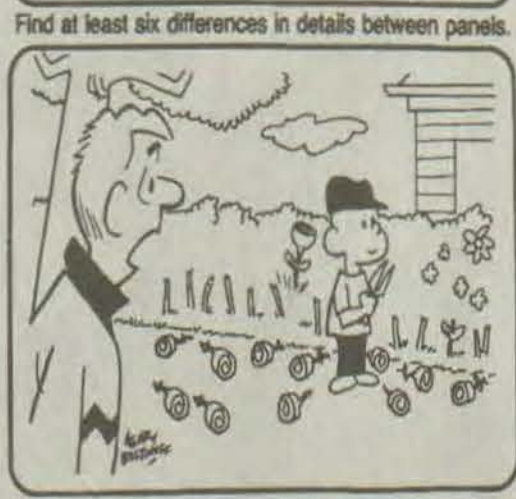

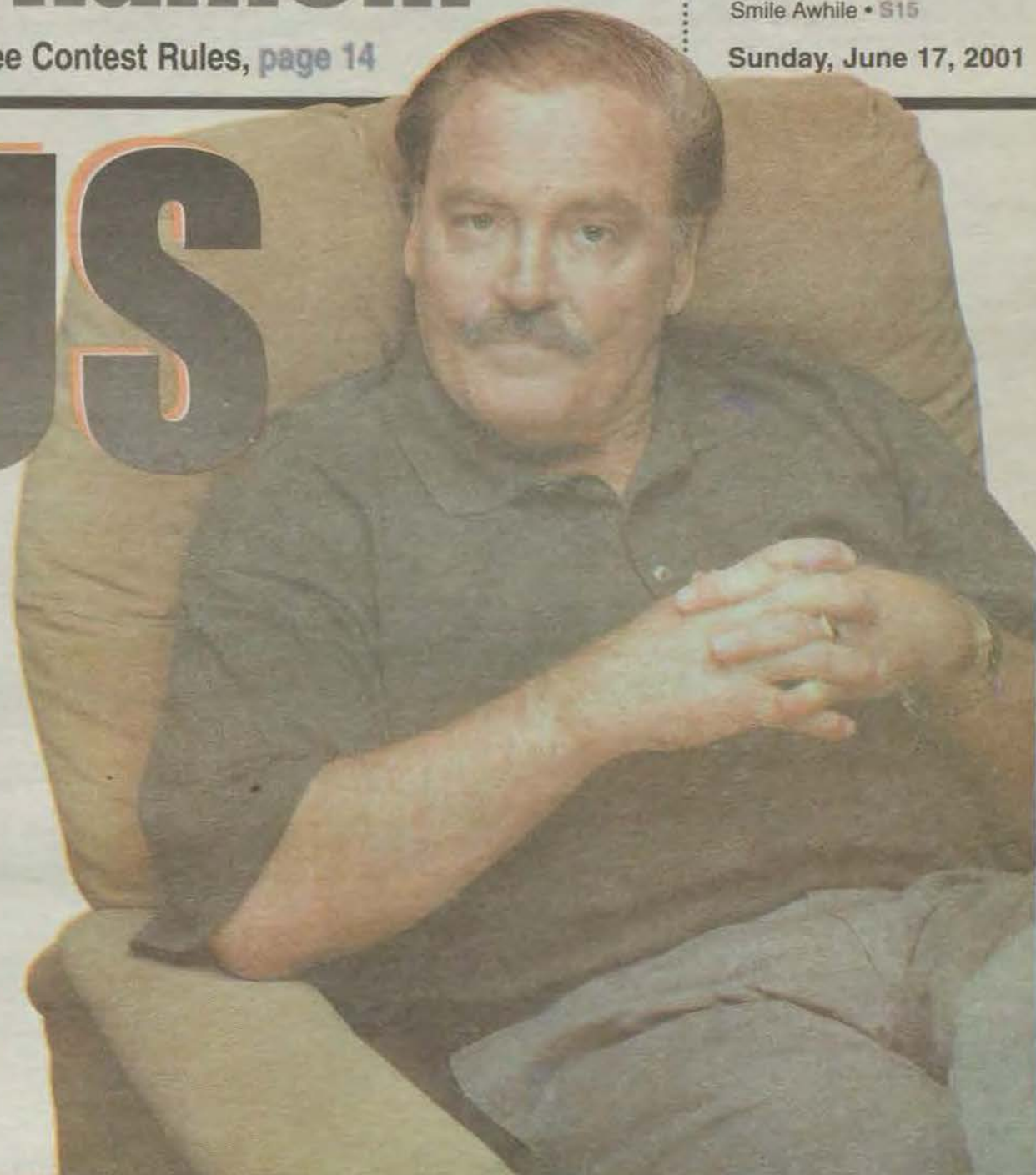
Real dads today do better job than their TV counterparts

Being a father has never been a day at the beach. In many homes, Dad is the principal breadwinner, taken for granted as a provider and able to spend only limited quality time with his family. And in TV seasons past, fathers had to deal with yet another indignity: watching dads such as Heathcliff Huxtable (Bill Cosby), Jim Anderson (Robert Young) and Ward Cleaver (Hugh Beaumont) regularly displaying an uncanny knack for solving any problem, no matter how severe, with a few perfectly chosen words in less than 30 minutes. Against these titans of paternity, many a real-life dad must have felt hopeless and inept.

The truth is, however, that these days many real-life dads are doing a bang-up job, particularly when you compare them to some of their counterparts around the TV dial. And sometimes you can find those bad dads in the damndest places. By most standards, President Josiah "Jed" Bartlet (Martin Sheen) on *The West Wing* is a superior human being of strong moral fiber and matchless integrity - except where his own children are concerned. Bartlet

spent much of last season worried that the interracial romance between his youngest daughter, Zoey (Elisabeth Moss), and presidential aide Charlie Young (Dule Hill) would attract the attention of hate groups. He was right, but his concern manifested itself in inflexible behavior that rarely took Zoey's feelings into account.

This past season, the show's writers devoted much of an entire February episode to Bartlet's uneasy relationship with his middle daughter, Ellie (Nina Siemaszko), a troubled young woman who believed (accurately) that her father never really had time for her.

These actions and attitudes on Bartlet's part may have seemed a little out of character until this season's finale, in which a flashback introduced us to the president's own father, a cold and officious autocrat who didn't hesitate to give his idealistic young son a fast sock to the chops anytime Jed disagreed with him. The apple didn't fall far from this particular tree.

Of course, President Bartlet is a SNAP (sensitive New-Age pop) compared to Ken Titus (Stacy Keach), the monstrous patriarch of the Fox sitcom Titus. This diabolical dad - who, incredibly enough, is based on series creator and star Christopher Titus' real-life father - is so single-mindedly selfish that he thinks nothing of making cruel jokes about the mental instability of his ex-wife, Christopher's mom, or habitually attacking his son's self-esteem.

In one memorable flashback, young Christopher came running up excitedly after his mother had told him he could be anything he wanted to be when he grew up.

Ken's response? He handed Christopher a

shovel and told him to go out and practice digging holes, as that was where his future most likely lay.

Fox, in fact, may be the official home of the dysfunctional dad, as the network has given us such fatherly flops as Al Bundy (Ed O'Neill), who made sure his family shared his crushing sense of failure; Red Forman (Kurtwood Smith), the bitter and chronically unemployed dad of That '70s Show, who rags his sensitive son, Eric (Topher Grace), every chance he gets; and Sean Finnerty (Donal Logue) of Grounded for Life, who struggles weekly to be a good father to his demanding children despite a nonstop chorus of disapproval from his own spare-the-rod pop, Walt (Richard Riehle). Not that Fox has a patent on disastrous dads. On some level, Frank Barone (Peter Boyle) of CBS' Everybody Loves Raymond may love his sons, Raymond and Robert (Ray Romano, Brad Garrett), but he'd be loath to admit it. Certainly both his sons carry the scars of the sadistic little head games Frank used to play with them as kids, pranks that left both brothers with a bodacious case of night terrors.

And certainly no gallery of pathetic patriarchs would be complete without another Frank - Costanza (Jerry Stiller) - from Seinfeld, still airing widely in syndication. This character's sole qualification as head of the household lay in his ability to outscreech his harpy of a spouse (Estelle Harris). Growing up in this environment, it's no surprise that their son, George (Jason

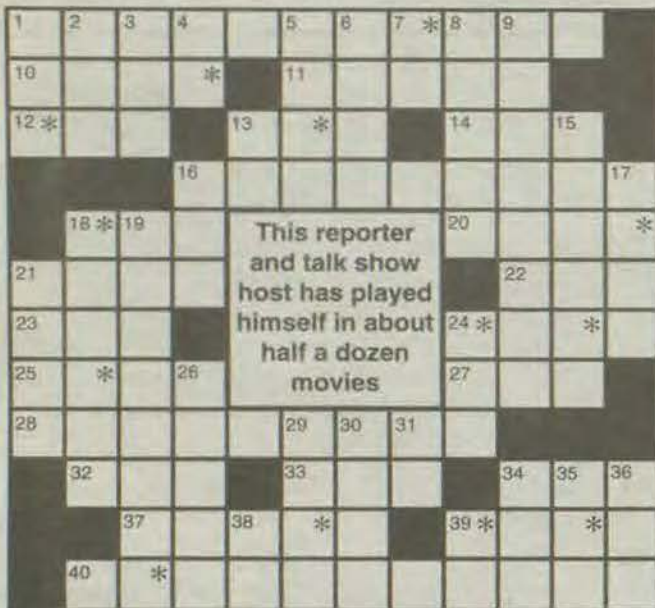

# WMMT Radio Series Pays Tribute to The Carter Family

A newly released Appalshop radio series - "Anchored In Love: The Carter Family Story" - features the Original Carter Family and the Carter Fold in Scott County, VA. The four-part documentary will air on Appalshop's community radio station WMMT, Whitesburg, KY, beginning on Saturday, June 16 at 1 PM, and will continue to air on three consecutive Saturdays.

The series, which was recently distributed on the National Public Radio satellite, is now being featured on many Public Radio Stations across the country, including stations in New York, Massachusetts, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Tennessee, Oklahoma, California, Washington, and Alaska.

"I live just over the Clinch Mountain from The Carter Fold," says Scott County resident and WMMT radio producer, Maxine Kenny. "I've heard Janette and Joe [Carter] sing the songs and tell the stories for over 25 years. I just decided it was time for the rest of the country to hear the story of how three musicians from Poor Valley in Scott County

- A.P. Carter, his wife Sara, and her cousin Maybelle, the Original Carter Family - walked into a makeshift recording studio in Bristol in 1927 and changed the face of country music in America forever."

"Anchored In Love" is filled with Carter Family music and the story is told by Janette Carter, daughter of A. P. and Sara Carter, and noted country music historian, Dr. Charles K. Wolfe. Wolfe is author of the recently published book, *The Carter Family*.

Janette Carter has vivid memories of the day her family got in their Model-T Ford and headed to Bristol. She recalls:

"I was just a child. I can remember standing at the gate and screaming and crying up at Grandma Carter's for Daddy to take me, but that's one time Daddy didn't take me. I was just four years old and I didn't go with them. Gladys went, my sister, and she took Joe. Joe was nursing and he had to go with his mother."

The radio programs follow the Carters from Bristol, to recording studios in New York, and then on

to Texas where they performed on the powerful border radio stations across the border in Mexico. Between the historic Bristol recording sessions in 1927 and the breakup of the group in 1941, the Original Carter Family recorded over 250 songs. Most of these songs were collected by A. P. from his neighbors, the "folk's" living in the mountains of southwest Virginia and east Tennessee. In the programs, Dr. Charles K. Wolfe explains the appeal of the Carter Family songs:

"If you were to take country music and strip away all of the different styles and all of the different tricks and formulas and get it right back down to its basics, you've got Carter Family music. Carter Family songs are songs that anyone can sing - and many, of course, we continue to sing. They are imminently sing-able. People don't just listen to them, they sing them."

In 1974, Janette Carter and her brother Joe, and her children Dale and Rita, began to welcome visitors to oldtime music-making and dancing every Saturday night at the Carter Family homeplace in Poor Valley, at the foot of Clinch Mountain, near Hiltons,

VA. At first, upwards of 100 people would cram into A.P.'s small country store for the show, but within a few years friends and neighbors helped construct the rustic, 800-seat theater known as The Carter

Fold. Next door, the one-room store is now a museum housing the memorabilia of the Carter Family.

Every year, during the first weekend of August, thousands of visitors come to The Carter Fold - including Nashville stars - to pay tribute to the legendary first family of country music at the annual Carter Family Memorial Festival. The final installment of "Anchored In Love," is recorded "live" at the 25th Anniversary of the Festival. It includes tributes to the Carter Family by local folks as well as by country music icon Johnny Cash. It is no accident, according to Dr. Wolfe, that country music greats are attracted to The Carter Fold. He says:

"Many of the stars in Nashville want to go to that wonderful little valley up in Virginia, to the Carter Fold, to rejuvenate their roots - to go back and kind of get a taste of where it all started. They talk about Bristol being the birthplace of country music,

but the birthplace of the birthplace of country music is out there in Poor Valley."

The theme music for "Anchored In Love - The Carter Family Story" is arranged and played on autoharp and guitar by John McCutcheon, another musician familiar to southwest Virginia and eastern Kentucky audiences.

The series was produced by Maxine Kenny at WMMT, the public radio station of Appalshop in Whitesburg, KY, and mixed at GDS Studios, Wise, VA. Major funding for the series was provided by the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities, with additional funding from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, The National Endowment for the Arts, and the Kentucky Arts Council.

The WMMT broadcast of "Anchored In Love" can be heard at 88.7 FM, or in Kentucky on translators 89.1 FM Paintsville and Pikeville; 89.3 FM Prestonsburg; 90.5 FM Harlan; and in Virginia at 88.1 FM Coeburn and Big Stone Gap; 88.3 FM Norton; and 91.1 FM in Abingdon, VA. The programs will also be broadcast simultaneously on the web at [www.appalshop.org/wmmt](http://www.appalshop.org/wmmt).

# News of the weird...

■ The Swedish navy announced in May that because of slashes in the military budget, it would cut back from around-the-clock operations to 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. The army and air force said they have not yet decided whether to remain open on weekends, but that they, also, were hard hit by the legislature's ban on overtime work.

■ Ben Lambert told reporters in Winnipeg, Manitoba, in May that he was forecasting to sell 40,000 pairs this year of his new E2U men's underwear, featuring a "three-hammock arrangement with non-crushing support" that would allow the scrotum to relax, whether the man is standing or sitting. Lambert said his shorts, priced at about \$16 to \$22 (US), would fit in much the same way that a bra fits a woman and would remove the need for men periodically to adjust their shorts for comfort.

■ Among the holdover Democratic projects recently canceled by the Bush administration was an \$860,000 program to teach public housing tenants to reduce stress and improve their self-esteem by the use of colors, meditation, aromatherapy and "applied kinesiology" (in which a practitioner feels a person's glands to determine, for therapy purposes, which of 14 personality types that person is). The career Housing and Urban Development official who had approved the program is a priest of the International Metaphysical Ministry, and the program's chief trainer said she was "shocked" that something so successful was being terminated.

**Laughter in the News**  
Witnesses to the bar shooting by

Luther V. Casteel, 42, in Elgin, Ill., in April, in which two people were killed and 18 wounded by the gun-obsessed ex-con, say they were most disturbed by the fact that Casteel laughed all the way through the ordeal; said one, "How can you laugh when you're killing people?" And according to a police report in the Vail (Colo.) Daily on Feb. 22, a man was arrested for vandalizing a Colorado Mountain College building with a fire extinguisher, motivated, the man later said, because he was being chased by seven men and a baby and that the baby was laughing at him. And according to a Naples (Fla.) Daily News report in March, laughter "clubs" are starting up all over the world, with "certified" laughter "leaders" teaching members the techniques (and psychological and physiological benefits) of the "lion laugh," the "roller coaster laugh," and the "tickle laugh," among others.

## The Continuing Crisis

■ When sheriff's deputies decided to break routine on April 17 and search not only visitors entering the Daley Center court building in Chicago but also the people who work there and who thus usually enter without inspection, they confiscated several dozen items of contraband from badged employees, including brass knuckles, tear gas and a dagger, and their booty does not even count what some lawyers and judges might have had on them except that they saw what was going on and simply declined to enter until the inspection ended.

— At the International Beauty Show in New York City in April, Fort Myers, Fla., hairdresser Valentino LoSauro showed off his "Edward-Scissorhands"-type finger scissors, "Clawz," which he has

been using in his salon and now hopes to bring to market. By attaching the devices to one or both hands, he can run his fingers through hair, with independent cutting action from each finger, greatly reducing the time for a haircut.

■ In the five years since he moved to Wilkie, Saskatchewan (population 1,300), Louis Harewood, 56, who operates assisted-living homes and who is a former Baptist preacher, has been accused by husbands of seducing local married women, using his charisma to allegedly send the women into voodoo-like hazes in which they reject old friends and otherwise act strange. Harewood denies any sexual contact and blames certain for-

mer employees for spreading rumors. Still, petitions recently circulated urging him to go away. Said one woman, "Our biggest worry is that if he can control 40-year-old women, what about our 16-year-old daughters?"

■ A February report in the Rochester (N.Y.) Democrat and Chronicle described a local patient's remarkable recovery from botulism paralysis at Park Ridge Hospital. The woman recently recalled that, after the toxin struck her in June 2000, she lay in her hospital bed, able to hear everything around her but unable to communicate in any way with anyone, and that someone had erroneously said she was a big fan of singer Celine Dion. After that,

the hospital staff, in an effort to aid the woman's recovery, played the singer's music in her room around the clock for weeks. When the paralysis left the woman, one of the first joys she experienced, she said, was stopping the music because she actually never cared for Dion.

■ In March, Alice Hoppe, 80, of Cheboygan, Mich., settled her lawsuit with her physician for his failure, over 18 months of treatment, to detect that the reason for her difficulty in swallowing was because her lower denture had caught in her throat during knee surgery in 1995. According to the doctor's attorney, the denture was hidden behind some folds of skin and "was very difficult to find."

## Latest Brassiere Technology

Beverly Hills, Calif., security consultant Paxton Quigley introduced SuperBra recently, a \$30 garment that doubles as a holster for a gun the size of a snub-nosed .38 revolver; said Quigley: "If a woman is attacked, the purse is the first thing taken from her (so) a good place to conceal a weapon is in the chest area." And in March, the British firm Gossard introduced the \$40 Ultrabra Airotic that inflates (via accompanying pump) up to two cup sizes for the woman who, according to a spokesperson, doesn't want "huge breasts through the day but (does) want to have them in the evening."
