## One dead, one in jail after Martin shooting

Officers with Kentucky State Police were investigating the scene of a shooting which took place just before midnight Wednesday in the Martin County community of Tomahawk.

Six hours later, Ed Maynard was in custody and charged with murder.

According to a police report, Maynard, 25, of Tomahawk allegedly was involved in an altercation with Flex Young, also of Tomahawk. The argument escalated until Maynard allegedly shot Young.

Young's friends transported him away from the scene of the shooting and stopped at a pay phone in an attempt to get help.

However, Young was pronounced dead shortly after emergency workers arrived on the scene.

Maynard was arrested around 6 a.m. Thursday and charged with murder. He is currently being held in the Big Sandy Regional Detention Center in Staffordsville.

KSP Det. Steve Bowman is leading the investigation into the incident.

## 'If I could just make a difference'

### School shootings inspire Tackett video

"If I could just make a difference somehow ..." said Marlow Tackett, speaking of the recent outburst of violence in our schools.

Tackett wrote a song two years ago called "Prayer in the Classroom," after watching a news broadcast about the Columbine High School slayings in Colorado.

The song, which speaks of replacing violence in our schools with prayer, love and understanding, has now become the first video to be released by Marlow Tackett and the Music Company band.

Filming for the video began in November with the aid of Teddi Collins Production Company in Pikeville. The script was written by Patsy Tackett.

The video was filmed at Dorton Elementary, where Tackett attended school as a child. It takes place in a building behind the school, in the same room where Ida Rose, his fifth grade teacher, taught him the Lord's Prayer.

"Ms. Rose made sure we said it the right way," said Tackett. "School has really changed since then."

Cast members of the video included the Tackett family, local citizens from Floyd and Pike counties, and students from Dorton Elementary, Robinson Creek Elementary, Virgie Middle School

and Betsy Layne Elementary.

"The talent here in the mountains is overwhelming," said Tackett.

Cast members rehearsed for a week before the final recording was completed.

Tackett, who has placed eight songs on the national billboard during his musical career, said the video will be sent to all major production companies throughout the U.S., starting with California, where a school shooting occurred earlier this week. He said he may even be willing to donate the video to organiza-

tions who could raise money to aid in the prevention of school violence.

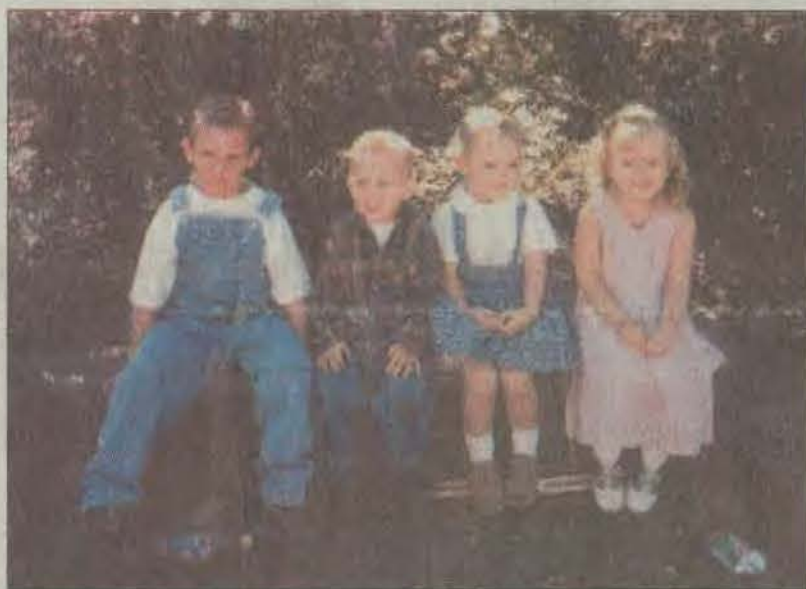
Tackett went on to say that he wishes to "reach out to students and parents across the nation." The song is dedicated to the family and friends who have lost loved ones because of school violence.

The video will be aired locally on WPRG.

## ARH workers vote down 'final offer'

### Current contract expires Mar. 31

An labor contract covering more than 2,700 hospital employees in nine eastern Kentucky communities, including those at the McDowell Appalachian Regional Hospital, was rejected by the United Steelworkers of America by just 21 votes Thursday in Lexington.

The margin of defeat can be seen as narrow, considering 2,300 steelworkers participated in Thursday's vote.

Steelworkers surprised Appalachian Regional Healthcare by rejecting a final contract offer for a new three-year collective bargaining agreement that seemed, according to ARH, to be nearly decided after coming to a mutual understanding during contract negotiations last Friday.

Friday, March 2, ARH and union bargaining representatives came to a tentative agreement on what was being offered to employees.

ARH claims that during the March 2 meeting they clearly stressed the three-year contract to be a "final offer."

The contract offer includes an early ratification bonus in the form of an early implementation of the initial pay increase.

The current contract does not run out until March 31, which gives union members until 11:59 p.m. March 11 to fall into agreement on the final offer and take advantage of the early ratification bonus. If the contract is accepted by that time, workers would still gain an early pay increase effective March 12.

The contract negotiations could easily result in unem-

## Turner picked to head probe into Pike judge

A Pike County case involving a county official faced with allegations of making executive decisions without the fiscal court's approval has state Attorney General Ben Chandler moving the legal handling of the case out of Pike County and appointing a special prosecutor from Floyd County.

Chandler's office appointed Floyd Commonwealth's Attorney Brent Turner as special prosecutor Friday, March 2, in a case involving Pike County Judge/Executive Karen Gibson.

The action followed a written request from Pike County Attorney Howard Keith Hall and will eliminate Pike County prosecutors from being involved in the situation.

Assigned to the case, Turner will now be faced with presenting information for indictments against allegations connected to Gibson's tem-

porary suspension of a Pike County road foreman without first offering the action to other members of the fiscal court for a vote of approval.

In addition, should the indictments stand, Turner would be responsible to follow through with court proceedings against Gibson.

Gibson gave a written reply to questions Wednesday concerning Chandler's decision to have Turner present the case to the grand jury.

"I can't believe any of this," Gibson said in her statement. "I am told, however, by Rick Bartley, commonwealth's attorney, that a 1980 attorney general opinion says that you can't stop anyone from going before a grand jury. I guess this means something as insignificant as their charges must still be heard."

"It, however, is such a waste of taxpayer's money and time," Gibson continued, "I wish the fiscal court would just cooperate with me

**Pikeville College Allara Library to host exhibits on southeastern Indians and Daniel Boone**

Two exhibits spotlighting the history and culture of Kentucky will be on display at the Pikeville College Allara Library. "Of Father Sky and Mother Earth: Early Southeastern Indian Art and Culture" is currently on display through April 30 on the first floor of the Allara Library. The exhibit focuses on Native American life during the Mississippian Period, from 700-1500 A.D. When Hernando De Soto and other early Spanish explorers entered what is now the southern United States, they found an established civilization, complete with bustling villages and developed systems of economy and religion. The series of black and white photographs, developed by the University of Georgia, spotlights the everyday life of their civilization.

This fall a celebrated backwoodsman makes his return to the area when "The Legend of Daniel Boone: The First Frontier Hero" will be hosted by the library Sept. 4-28. Developed by Kentucky Historical Society's Kentucky History Museum with grant funds from the Kentucky Humanities Council, the exhibit will illustrate how the backwoodsman's life has been lauded in fact, and sometimes, in myth. Images of paintings, engravings, and artifacts compose a picture of the changing Daniel Boone as he has been viewed through the eyes of his biographers. "The Museums-To-Go Program is a great way for both the college and local community to learn more about rich history, life, and culture of Kentucky,"

said Pikeville College Archivist and event coordinator, Reagan Grimsley. Both events are traveling exhibits sponsored by the Kentucky Historical Society as part of the Museums-To-Go Program. The exhibits will be shown on the first floor of the Allara Library and are open to the public.

## Boyd steps down as medicaid commissioner; Hesen named interim commissione

Medicaid Commissioner Dennis Boyd announced Thursday he is resigning, effective March 15, after three years at the head of the \$3.2 billion program in the Cabinet for Health Services. Boyd will be returning to the University of Louisville, where he worked before becoming commissioner of Medicaid.

"When I was recruited to this position I knew I was facing the challenge of my life," said Boyd. "I have certainly enjoyed trying to meet that challenge, and I regret we have not been as successful as I would have wished."

Ellen Hesen, who has been general counsel for the Cabinet for Health Services since 1996, was named interim commissioner pending a search for a permanent commissioner. John Walker will serve as interim general counsel during this period.

Last week Jimmy D. Helton resigned as the secretary of the Cabinet for Health Services effective March 15. At that time, Gov. Paul Patton announced

that, because of the importance of the Medicaid program, he would appoint a special advisor to the governor on Medicaid, Kathy Kustra.

Kustra will head up an executive steering committee on Medicaid, which will have oversight of the program. Hesen has been appointed to that committee.

As general counsel, Hesen

has served as the chief legal advisor for the cabinet secretary and is responsible for legal services for all agencies within the cabinet, including the Department for Medicaid Services.

Hesen previously worked in private practice in Louisville and served with the Jefferson County Attorney's office.

## Be prepared when lightning strikes

Scientists say that lightning strikes somewhere about 100 times every second, so there are thousands of lightning strikes every day. Lightning kills more people than any other kind of storm, including hurricanes and tornadoes. Every year in the United States, lightning kills about 100 people. Worldwide, lightning kills more than 1,000 people in a year. Last year in Kentucky, five lives were lost to lightning. Still, lightning seriously injures more people than are killed by it.

There are countless myths that commonly circulate concerning lightning strikes. Ignore the myths, learn the truth and be prepared when lightning strikes.

Learn to recognize the danger signs of approaching severe weather, like threatening clouds or distant thunder. High winds, rainfall and cloud cover often come before actual cloud-to-ground strikes. Many lightning casualties occur in the beginning, as the storm approaches, because people ignore these signs.

Also, many lightning casualties occur after the perceived threat has passed. Generally, the lightning threat diminishes with time after the last sound of thunder but may persist for more than 30 minutes.

When thunderstorms are in the area but not overhead, the lightning threat can exist even when it is sunny, not raining, or when clear sky is visible.

When these situations exist, seek shelter in a sturdy building. If a building is not nearby, a vehicle is suitable, but keep the windows closed and avoid convertibles.

When you're inside a building, remember that telephone lines and metal pipes can conduct electricity. Avoid using the telephone or any electrical appliances and unplug all large appliances. Avoid taking a bath or shower, or running water for any other purpose. Turn off the air conditioner — power surges from lightning can overload the compressor. And don't forget to unplug the computer.

Weather warning devices such as a NOAA weather radio,

combined with a healthy dose of common sense can keep you from becoming a lightning victim.

## Justice for the poor

The orgy of recrimination against the needy and helpless called the Republican Revolution made a special target of the Legal Services Corporation, the program through which the federal government (supported at the outset by no less a Republican than Richard Nixon) offers legal help for poor people in civil cases.

This week, the U. S. Supreme Court tried to repair some of the worst damage.

Year after year, beginning with the rise of Newt Gingrich, the House Appropriations Committee has voted to slash funds for Legal Services, although Congress as a whole has regularly succeeded in restoring them to levels proposed by President Bill Clinton.

Year after year, Kentuckians have been especially complicit in the effort to deprive needy Americans of the access to courts that their well-heeled neighbors take for granted.

The subcommittee that did the dirty work has been headed by Rep. Hal Rogers, and he was joined on the full committee by Rep. Anne Northup. Ironically, these two represent Kentucky's great concentrations of the poor, rural and urban — the very people who would benefit from an adequately funded Legal Services program.

The GOP not only tried to deny Legal Services funds, but also to gag its attorneys by restricting the cases they could bring and the activities they could pursue outside the courtroom.

Congress barred the poor's lawyers from "litigation, lobbying or rule-making involving an effort to reform a federal or state welfare system" and from efforts to "amend or otherwise challenge existing law."

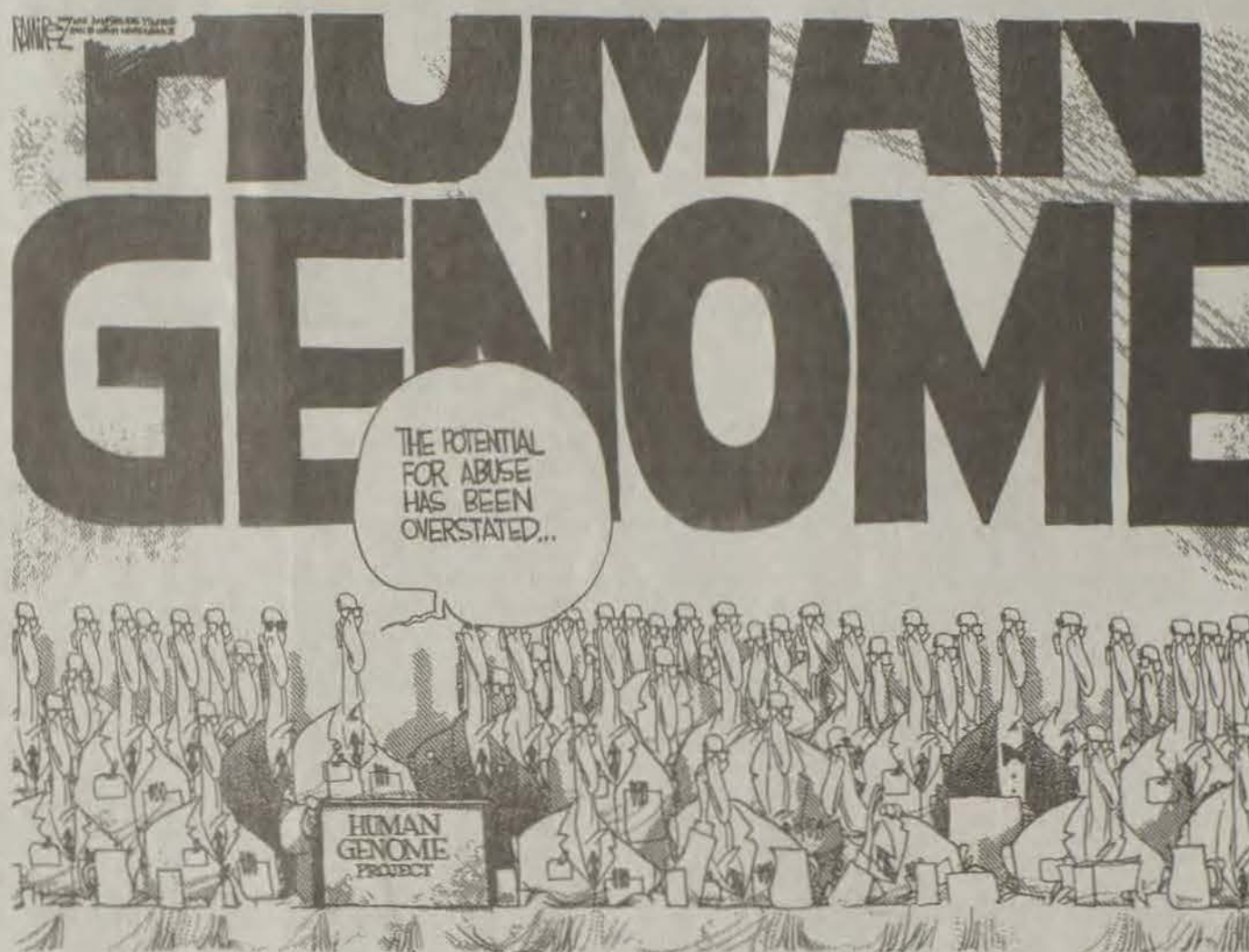
Last week, the Supreme Court removed some of those shackles. The justices ruled that Congress may not prevent Legal Services attorneys from raising challenges to welfare laws and regulations on behalf of the indigent. And the implications of this ruling extend to other areas in which government wrongly tries to regulate citizens' expression.

Justice Anthony Kennedy declared for the majority that such restrictions would give America a two-tiered system of justice, one for the poor and another for those who can afford their own lawyers. They would, he said, call into question the "adequacy and fairness" of that system.

Asserting that this decision "redeems the promise of equal justice under the law," New York University professor Burt Neuborn described the Court as insisting "that lawyers for the poor are real lawyers with all the rights, responsibilities and opportunities to make arguments in court possessed by any other lawyers."

And, we would add, that the poor are real citizens with real rights, too.

## Free markets aren't conservative

One of the great myths of the Industrial Age is that businessmen generally like free markets. That myth has deep implications and consequences.

For example, someone who buys into it will tend to believe that proposals to deregulate markets are simply favors for special interests and inimical to the interests of most people. Advocates of deregulation are typically dismissed as flaks for corporate interests.

But that conclusion crumbles when we realize that businessmen historically have opposed laissez faire. The same is true today. Stephen Labaton, writing in the New York Times, vividly pointed this out in a discussion of regulatory policy in the Bush administration.

The Times noted, for

instance, that Microsoft, which did everything it could to defeat the antitrust suit brought by the Clinton administration, nevertheless favors restrictions on AOL in its merger with Time Warner. Microsoft — Microsoft! — has complained to the government that AOL is trying to monopolize instant messaging on the internet. Such positions make it hard to interpret as a matter of principle Microsoft's opposition to the antitrust suit.

As the Times article pointed out, "There are broad areas of the marketplace in which the government will remain active, not least because of demands from American business itself." Preston Padden, Disney's top lobbyist, was quoted saying, "Sometimes a highly regulated administration is helpful and sometimes it is not helpful. What I would really like is the Gore administration to be regulating my competitors and the Bush administration to be regulating me."

Padden is unusually blunt, but his position is par for the

course. Businessmen, going back at least to the era of mercantilism 400 years ago, have typically embraced government as an effective tool to protect themselves from competitors.

The word "protectionism" is usually restricted to business-supported barriers to cheap imports. But the term has far wider applications. Business interests have long favored all kinds of regulations and taxes to hamper existing and potential competition.

Taxes that make it difficult to accumulate capital to expand or set up businesses clearly favor established business leaders even if they have to pay the same taxes. The same is true for regulations. Older and bigger firms can more easily contend with such burdens than newer, smaller ones can. IBM and AT&T have bigger legal and accounting departments than some nascent garage operation. Many ideas for new businesses never get off the ground because of the regulatory and

tax barriers. What the critics of capitalism have never realized is that there is nothing conservative about capitalism. Even most conservatives don't realize this.

Capitalism — the self-regulating market economy — respects no established interests. Why is that so? Because the driving force of capitalism is the consumer.

For a business to do well, it must please consumers. Businessmen understand that. But there is a problem: we consumers are a fickle bunch. A business can be "riding high in April, shot down in May," as the old Frank Sinatra song said. Look what consumers did to Toys R Us, Boston Market, and an untold number of companies that were once hot properties and even dominant in their fields. We consumers don't care how good a business was yesterday. What's it done for us lately?

You often hear it said that Wal-Mart, the model low-cost

retailer, puts other stores out of business. Nonsense! Wal-Mart never put a single store out of business. It's consumers who put stores out of business. True, Wal-Mart makes it attractive to shop there. But I've yet to hear of Wal-Mart's forcing even one person into the store.

On the other hand, I've many times heard of businessmen asking government, in effect, to force other companies to stop serving customers as well as they would like to. Businessmen know their fate is in the consumers' hands. They know there is no safe harbor in the free market — which is why so many companies try to get government to adopt anti-market — that is, anti-consumer — regulations and taxes. It's the only way to prevent consumers from switching to a competitor they like better.

Once we understand that capitalism is not pro-business, but pro-consumer, we will understand that it is time to dump the regulatory state we have labored under for so long.

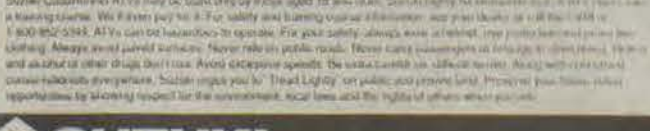

"I'm obviously very pleased with the win

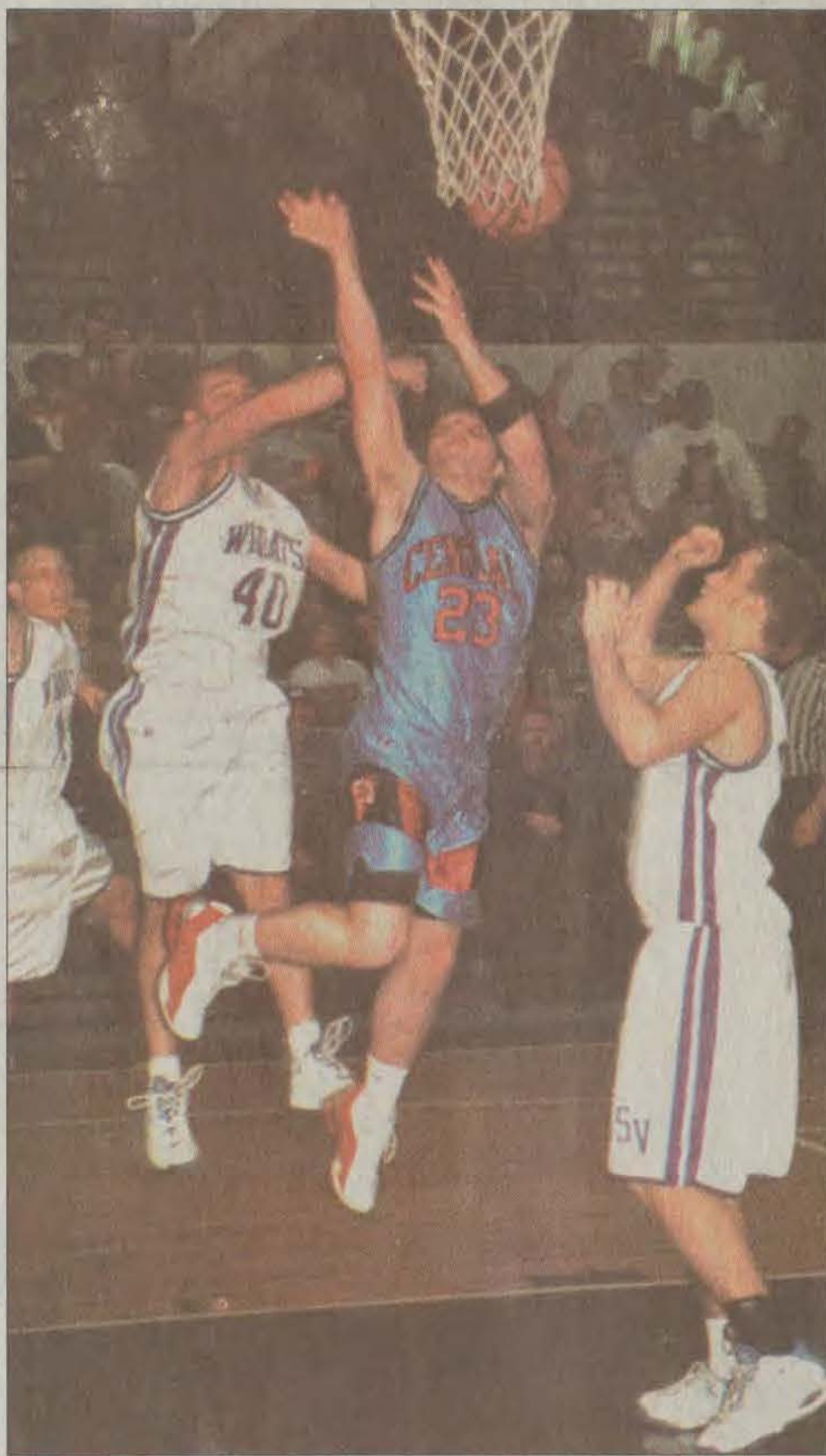

### Mullins paces Allen Central in 57-52 win over Wildcats

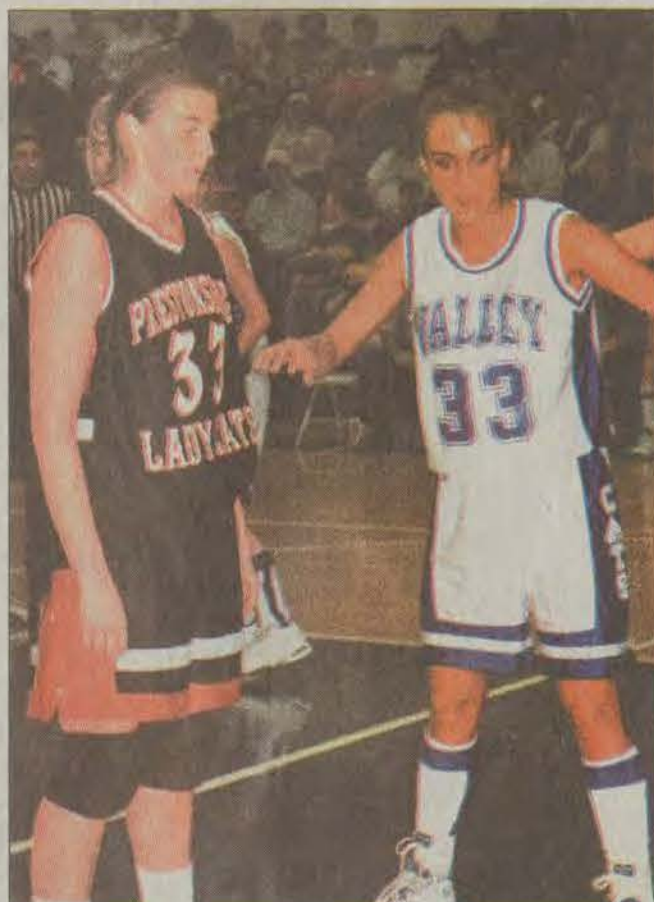

a very elite group who have gone on to become very successful in the series. The 42 Rookie of the Year winners have accounted for 21 Winston Cup Championships. That number is sure to increase with former award winners Jeff Gordon, Jeff Burton, Tony Stewart, Matt Kenseth, Rusty Wallace and Ricky Rudd either just approaching their prime, or in their prime.

Before the beginning of the season, the 2001 rookie class on paper looked like the making of great competition as each first-year driver was driving for one of the top owners in the sport. Leading the list was Casey Atwood who would be driving a Dodge for Ray Evernham. Jason Leffler would be behind the wheel of a Chip Ganassi Dodge. Jack Rousch had Kurt Busch driving one of his Fords and A.J. Foyt hired Ron Hornaday to drive his Pontiac. Cal Wells also went with a rookie to drive his Ford in Andy Houston.

The five drivers just mentioned promised to make up a very competitive class, but after the first race the competitive level of the Rookie of the Year competition was about to get kicked up to another level. Dale Earnhardt's death at Daytona forced Richard Childress to turn over the driving duties of his Goodwrench Chevrolet to his Busch Series driver Kevin Harvick.

Harvick was all set to make a serious run for the Busch Series championship this season while running in seven Winston Cup events. All of these plans had to be shelved after that dark day in Daytona. Childress had said on more than one occasion that Harvick was the future of Richard Childress Racing, but nobody ever dreamed that the future would come so quickly.

I don't think anyone could ever imagine the pressure that Kevin had to be feeling the first time he had to crawl into Childress' Cup car. It is tough enough just making a start in the series as a rook-

ie, but for Harvick he was being asked to not only run a race but to also help heal the deep wounds caused by Earnhardt's death.

The rule book states that to be eligible for Rookie of the Year that a driver must officially start in at least eight of the first 20 events. Harvick will be eligible for the award and in fact now finds himself in third place trailing only Ron Hornaday and Casey Atwood after the first three races.

The Goodwrench driver showed this past weekend at Las Vegas that he was not only going to be a contender for "ROY," but he also was going to contend for a win. His eighth place finish showed not only the series but the fans that Richard Childress Racing would be able to move on.

Childress knew that the series couldn't withstand the sight of the black No. 3 Monte Carlo on the track, so to help ease some of the pain he repainted the car white and changed the number to 29. That had to make it a little easier on Harvick as he got into the car. He doesn't want to be known as the driver that took Dale's place, instead he would just like for the fans to know that he is doing what he felt like Earnhardt would want him to do.

It doesn't seem fair for Kevin to be put in such a situation, but then it wasn't fair that on the last turn of the Daytona 500 that Dale Earnhardt would lose his life. The sport of racing isn't always fair, but then life also at times doesn't seem to be fair!

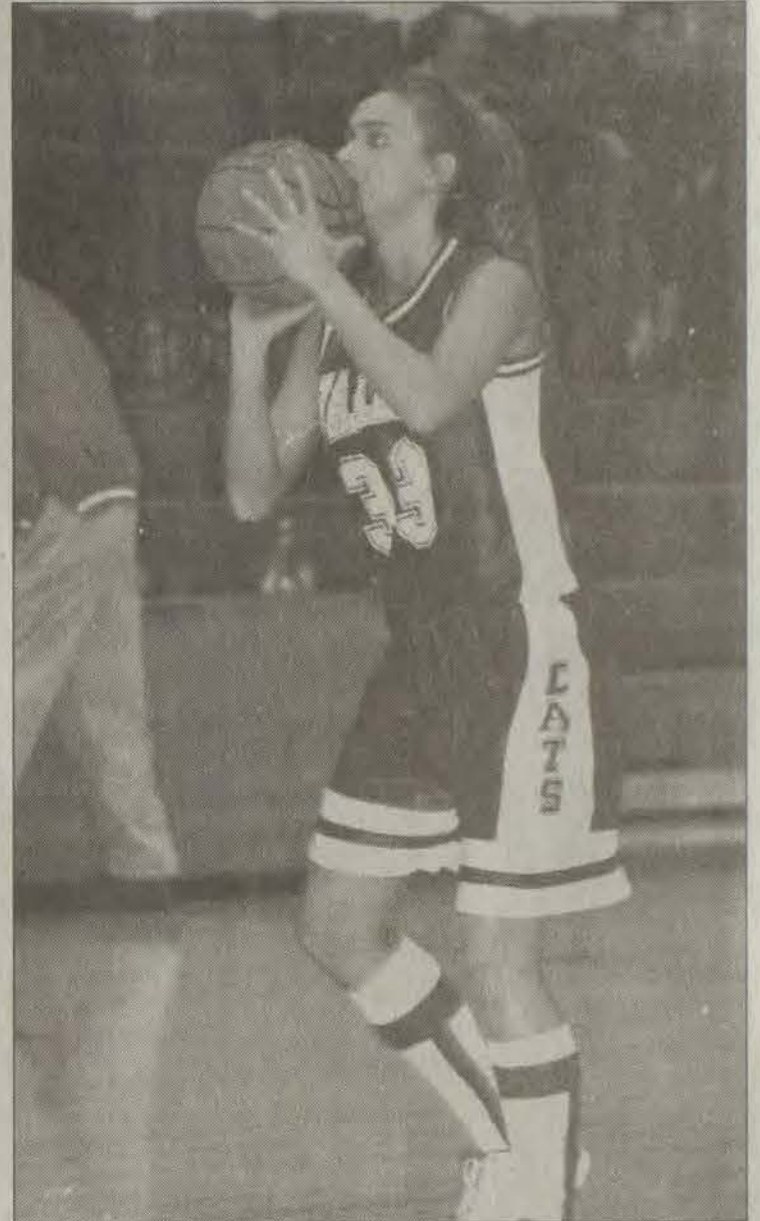

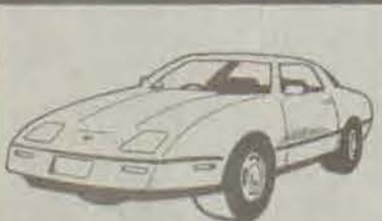

# Floyd County teams eliminate host Shelby Valley squads

Will Shelby Valley reconsider hosting a 15th Region Tournament when the opportunity to do so comes their way again? If they do, one couldn't really blame them,

after the luck they had in the postseason tourney this season.

It all started in the first game of the tournament when the Prestonsburg Lady Cats, a team as inconsistent as any squad in the 15th Region, took to the floor against Summer Jones and the SVHS Lady Kats. Some folks didn't give Prestonsburg a chance after they bowed out to the upstart South Floyd Lady Raiders in the 58th District finals. Prestonsburg, without the services of junior point guard Megan Hyden, since mid-December, have played up and down for most of the 2000-01 season.

Prestonsburg senior Amelia Conley could be the most complete girls' player in the 15th Region. She played like a complete player in Prestonsburg's first round win over Valley. Conley, and teammate junior Ramanda Music, each had 17 points as Prestonsburg shocked Valley in the first game of the 15th Region girls' basketball tournament.

Shelby Valley senior Ashley Damron, a Pikeville College signee, was playing with a weak ankle. But Shelby Valley Coach Bobby Spears won't use that as an excuse. The host Lady Kats had their chances to claim a win before falling 57-54, in what many basketball gurus around the state are calling one of the biggest upsets in the 2001 high school basketball postseason.

"I can think of 100 ways we could have won this ball game," said Shelby Valley's Coach Spears, after his team's three-point season-ending setback to Prestonsburg.

Jones put up a valiant effort for Shelby Valley. Her 24-point, 10-rebound game is one of the best individual performances of the tournament thus far.

Things got worse for Shelby Valley faithful Tuesday night. The SVHS Wildcats, winners of 27 games, and losers of just 2, coming into the game against Allen Central, were the clear consensus favorite to claim a 15th Region title. The fact that the 15th Region Tournament was held at Robinson Creek, Ky., home of Shelby Valley High, didn't hurt the Wildcats chances either. The Akers broth-

ers (Jeremy, Shannon), along with teammates Terry Wright and Mike Riddle, have lived and died by the three-point shot all season long. Shelby Valley was perfect against 15th Region competition in the regular season. The Wildcats were undefeated against 15th Region foes coming into the regional tournament game with Allen Central. The Wildcats dropped their first and only 15th Region game of the season when they fell 57-52 to the Runnin' Rebels Monday night. The win ended Shelby Valley's season. The Wildcats ended the season with a 27-3 mark. An impressive mark, to say the least.

Is hosting a regional tournament a bad thing? No, I certainly wouldn't think so. They call this time of year March Madness. I think everyone associated with Shelby Valley would agree with that.

# Critter Corner

Since last week's column was devoted to vaccination, I thought it might be a good idea to drop back and discuss vaccines themselves.

Let's follow an imaginary dog, (we'll call him "Rex") who comes into contact with the Canine Distemper virus. Rex is three months old, and has had no vaccinations. He probably encountered the virus from the stray dogs who pass by his yard. The virus entered Rex's body through his nose and mouth and set up housekeeping in his respiratory system.

Rex's body realizes that it has been invaded by foreign organisms that don't belong there, so it tries to get rid of them by organizing an immune response. Rex is beginning to feel bad, both from the virus itself and his body's attempts to get rid of it. Hopefully his owner will realize he is ill before he develops the full-blown signs of Canine Distemper: a high fever, a thick discharge from the eyes and nose, pneumonia, loss of appetite, and dehydration. A trip to the vet will result in Rex being treated for

the side effects of the disease, since there are few drugs that work against viruses. He will probably be given fluids, maybe some antihistamines, and something to stimulate his appetite. He will be given antibiotics only to fight off the bacterial infections that often develop secondary to the virus and make the condition worse.

His owner will be instructed on how to keep him clean and dry and how to make sure he gets fluids and nutrition. If all goes well, Rex will slowly recover from his illness. The virus may, however, enter his nervous system and cause him to develop tremors or even seizures. Dogs sometimes recover even from this degree of illness, but they often have lasting damage to the nervous system. Despite the best of treatment, Rex may very well die.

Now let's check in on "Susie", Rex's fictional littermate. She was adopted at the same time as Rex by the next-door neighbor. Susie and Rex live in adjacent yards. Both were exposed to the virus, but Susie isn't sick. How come?

The answer is that Susie's owner had her vaccinated as soon as he brought her home, and she has been receiving booster shots when they are due. When the virus entered Susie's respiratory system, her body was ready for it. The vaccine contained a form of the virus that would not cause disease, but that her body recognized as a potential threat. She was able to manufacture specific

weapons, called antibodies, against the Canine Distemper virus. When her body was confronted with the real virus, it was ready for it. She was immediately able to manufacture all the antibodies she needed to destroy the virus before it ever became established.

These fictional animals illustrate the way the body reacts to invading diseases in the vaccinated and unvaccinated animal. Vaccines give the body access to the enemy's secret weapons plan and allow it to develop its defense strategy ahead of time.

I used Canine Distemper as my example for a couple of reasons. First, it is a vaccine success story. What was once a widespread disease has become so uncommon that most dog owners (and a few vets) have never even seen a case. It's still out there, though, and it crops up occasionally; mostly in puppies with no history of vaccinations. No vaccine is 100% effective. Many factors influence how well an individual animal will respond to a particular vaccine, including the animal's general health (those weakened by heavy worm burdens may not respond well), the breed (Rottweilers have notoriously poor responses), and the age of the animal.

We generally do not start a vaccination series until a puppy is around 6 weeks old. Before then he has been protected by a passive immunity that his mother provided around the time of birth. "Passive" indicates that the pup's body did not work to develop it. Unfortunately, this also interferes with his ability to respond to the vaccine virus. Think in terms of his body saying, "Hey, I've already got plenty of that; why should I make more?" As the puppy gets older, and loses more and more of his passive maternal immunity he is better able to manufacture his own active immunity. How long the maternal interference lasts is variable. There may be a "window" of time when the puppy is unprotected even after his shots have been started. It also explains the need for a series of booster shots in young animals. We have to be sure that the pup or kitten has an opportunity to respond to the vaccine without maternal interference.

This brings me to the second reason for using Canine Distemper as my sample disease. Although many of the newer vaccines use sophisticated technology to help them work in spite of the mother's immunity, we use an old trick to help protect young pups against Distemper. It turns out that human Measles virus has a structure very similar to the dog Distemper virus. (I have no idea how they figured that out!) If we add inactivated Measles virus to the Distemper vac-

cine given to young puppies, we may actually trick their body into making antibodies that will work against the other disease! This is just another of those bits of trivia that I find so interesting.

By the way, I hate unhappy endings. Since this is one case that I have full control over, I am happy to report that Rex made a complete recovery, and thanks to the advice of Susie's owner, is now catching up on his vaccine series!

—In December, a judge in Albuquerque approved the settlement of a class-action lawsuit against Primerica Life Insurance in which the class's lawyers get about \$7.5 million in costs and fees while only two people out of the 6 million-customer "class" get any money at all (\$30,000 each). Also imminent until mid-February was the settlement of a similar lawsuit against Massachusetts Mutual Life Insurance in which the class's lawyers would receive \$5 million plus other benefits while only two members of that 3 million-customer "class" would get any money at all (a total of \$350,000). (Because of heavy criticism in the latter case, the settlement collapsed in mid-February.) Both lawsuits came about when lawyers felt the insurance companies had not disclosed the precise charges for customers who pay premiums monthly instead of annually.

—"Vote for Me, and I'll Fight for You": In January, a 55-year-old member of the Turkish parliament died shortly after being punched in the head about five times by legislators from the far-right Nationalist Action Party who disagreed with

him on whether the chamber's rules of debate should be changed. Although it was the parliament's first death, fights are known to break out there, unlike the extraordinary two-judge fistfight in January at the courthouse in New Orleans; according to WDSU-TV, the combatants were judges Steven Plotkin and Charles Jones, and the results were not announced.

— In January, News of the Weird reported that a North Dakota man had qualified under that state's law for a concealed-weapon permit even though legally blind, but that man had at least satisfied the state's reasonable shooting test by hitting a human-sized target 10 times out of 10 from a distance of 21 feet (after practice shots to get his bearings). However, in February, according to a report in the Louisville Courier-Journal, Kentucky's weapons law has also permitted at least two legally blind people to obtain licenses, and in that state, the shooter must hit the human-sized target, also from 21 feet, only 11 times out of 20.

## Latest Protests

—According to Reuters news service, a January campaign attrib-

uted to Venezuelan military dissidents has seen more than 100 pairs of women's panties mailed to current military brass to make the symbolic point that the generals have been pushed around by President Hugo Chavez. And police in Davos, Switzerland, trying to contain protesters at the World Economic Forum in January, loaded their high-pressure water cannons with manure bought from local farmers.

## Least Competent People

Barry Darrell Freeman, 29, was convicted in January of an attempted rape last year near Philadelphia. According to testimony, things started to go bad for Freeman when the victim asked him to take off his own clothes and then chided him until he did. With his clothes off, the woman saw that he was not carrying a gun, and ran away, eventually to outrun Freeman to safety. However, during the chase, according to the woman, Freeman kept muttering something about not being able to trust a woman.

Lodging and dining facilities at Shaker Village of Pleasant Hill have been rated as among the 800 best in the United States. The tourist attraction near Harrodsburg received a higher rating than any other Kentucky facility in the Zagat Survey for 2001.

The survey is based on voting by nearly 20,000 people staying at hotels upward of 30 nights per year. Shaker Village received "very good to excellent" ratings in all categories: rooms, service, dining and public spaces/facilities.

"Run to Shakertown, but take it easy when you get there," advises the Zagat Survey, which calls the spot "a don't miss experience."

Shaker Village has 81 lodging rooms in 14 of

the village's original 33 buildings. All rooms are appointed with Shaker reproduction furnishings and hand-woven bedspreads and curtains.

The dining room in the Trustees' Office features traditional Kentucky fare, along with Shaker specialties.

The restored Shaker community, established in 1805, offers self-guided village tours. Artisans demonstrate 19th century trades of broom making, woodworking, coopering, spinning and weaving. Musical performances are given several times a day. Two craft stores fea-

ture hand-crafted items, and from April through October, riverboat cruises on the Kentucky River are offered aboard the Dixie Bell. Hiking, horseback riding, nature programs, workshops, fairs and a range of special events add to the adventure.
