Friends, fans say goodbye 'to 'Big Dipper'

HAZARD - "Nobody knew Richard Blount, but you could ask them who the Big Dipper was, and everybody knew," said Jerry Wyrick, a friend of the sports broadcaster who died August 26 at age 56.

Blount was playing pool in Pikeville in preparation for a tournament when he suffered a heart attack and was taken to Pikeville Methodist Hospital.

Wyrick gave a eulogy for the "Dipper" at a funeral, which was held Thursday at Whitaker Athletic Center near Hazard. About 200 people attended, including coaches whose

7-year-old shot in hunting accident

The boy was taken to the Kentucky River Medical Center and was then flown to the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington.

comes to town with high recommendations and expectations from members of the community and the city commissioners



Bloody Breathitt comes alive

JACKSON - There's a part of history many folks in Breathitt County would rather forget, while others research and discover the underlying social and political currents that caused an estimated 700 killings between 1807 and 1972.

That history encompasses the long-standing "Bloody Breathitt" feuds. The feuds became so intense at times the military was called upon to camp outside the courthouse for weeks on end and keep the peace. Participants in the feuds would make the Hatfields and McCoys seem like peaceable folks in comparison.

One descendent of several feuders became fascinated by the feuding stories while growing up and started researching photos and documents as a senior in high school.

Jackson Times Editor Stephen Bowling, 29, later intensified his research to include court documents, census figures, personal interviews, newspaper accounts and any historical documentation available

His 18-year photo research and six-year writing passion culminated in Passion for Blood, a historical account that Bowling plans to complete by the end of the month.

"This book is the first real attempt to go beyond the hearsay of myth and legend and really look at the facts of what happened using a scientific approach to the history of the county," explained Bowling.

s of his research and writing interested inde-

nudged him and jokingly said, "It's a good day to die," while he walked down the courthouse steps. Right afterward, Curtis Jett came up behind J.B. Marcum with two .38-caliber revolvers and shot

him point blank in the head. The two hired guns were later found guilty and sentenced to prison. Bowling discussed the events that led up to the murder. He noted that J.B. Marcum was a lawyer on

the Republican Committee who filed a lawsuit claiming Judge Hargis rigged the last election. Unfortunately for Marcum, the multimillionaire Democratic county judge didn't take kindly to such

accusations in court. Hargis happened to own the largest mercantile store in Eastern Kentucky, which was situated right across the street from the courthouse.

The killing of Marcum brought major media attention from across the country and The Courier Journal dedicated three full pages to the sensational story, the most print they've ever written for a story, said Bowling.

Since 1847, The Lexington Herald, the Kansas City Times, the New York Times, the London Times, and the San Francisco Examiner had sent reporters or stringers to stay in Jackson and cover the violence resulting from the feuds.

Sometimes their accuracy was questionable, Bowling noted.

Quite honestly, there were a lot of mistakes in newspaper accounts with names and places reported inaccurately," said Bowling.

Bowling researched and found many of the 40 killings that followed Marcum's death in less than a year were ambush shootings probably fired from the empty circuit judge's office window in the courthouse

Sheriff Callahan's office was situated next door to the traveling circuit judge's office and he was conveniently away from the courthouse when the killings occurred, said Bowling.

Producer Matt Hader explained that they wanted to create a historical documentary to reveal the influences and look what was underneath the surface of the violence.

"We are not trying to slam the people of that time. We don't have a script written because everyone has their own version of what happened ..." said

pendent film makers, who began working on the feuding documentary using Bowling's book as the reference for their historical documentary, tentatively titled "Bloody Breathitt."

Filming began in April with a reenactment on Saturday, August 18, when downtown Jackson was taped off by police and history repeated itself.

Descendants of the Bloody Breathitt feuds reenacted segments of that history on Main Street, where many of the feuds took place in a violent struggle for political and economic power.

Bowling wore the period clothes and the badge of Sheriff Ned Callahan, supporter of the powerful Judge Hargis.

The time was May 1903 after the railroad came to town bringing new money and opportunity. With the new commerce came a tremendous political upheaval while citizens jostled for power and money. Bowling explained.

On the day of his death, J.B Marcum stood on the courthouse steps talking with B.J. Ewen, a businessman and owner of a hotel in town.

Marcum was interrupted by Thomas White who

Hader. "Everybody knows what happened at the OK Corral, yet this is more important historically. This is a story we think should be told ... These people were intelligent and cunning in their struggle for survival and power."

He explained that research on the documentary took two years with seven hours spent interviewing Bowling on tape. They still plan to come back and interview more local residents and shoot additional footage.

The producers have had initial phone discussions with the History Channel, which recently aired a documentary of the Hatfield-McCoy feud. They plan to finish the documentary and contact various television networks within the next six months.

Meanwhile, Bowling continues to finish the first chapter of Passion For Blood and plans to complete the book within the month. He reported that Viking Press has sent a letter of intent with an option to publish his writing.

This virus is similar to other kinds of equine encephalitis that have been in Kentucky on and off over the last 50 years. The virus can cause encephalitis in a small percentage of exposed animals and people.

Encephalitis is an inflammation of the brain and can be caused by a viral infection. West Nile Encephalitis (WNE) is a disease caused by the WNV that is transmitted by mosquitoes.

West Nile can only be contracted through the bite of an infected mosquito. Even in areas where mosquitoes carry the virus, very few mosquitoes much less than 1 percent - are infected. Severe illness results in less than 1 percent of people bitten by infected mosquitoes.

Most people who are exposed to the virus will not show symptoms. Even people living in at-risk areas are unlikely to get sick from exposure to the virus.

may include slight fever and/or headache, possibly with skin rash and swollen lymph glands. A rapid onset of high fever with head and body aches, neck stiffness, disorientation, stupor and muscle weakness marks more severe infections of encephalitis,

Those who may be most at risk are persons over the age of 50 and those with weak immune systems.

To reduce the risk of becoming infected with the virus people can:

M Stay indoors at dawn, dusk and in the early evening when mosquitoes are most active.

Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants whenever you are outdoors.

Spray clothing with repellents containing permethrin or DEET since mosquitoes may bite through thin clothing.

Apply insect repellent sparingly to exposed skin. An effective repellent will contain 30 percent DEET (N,N-diethylmeta-touamide) for adults and 10 percent DEET for children.

Whenever you use an insecticide or insect repellent,

be sure to read and follow the manufacturer's Directions for Use printed on the product. NOTE: Vitamin B and "ultrasonic" devices are NOT effective in preventing mosquito bites.

Additionally, people can take the following steps to reduce mosquitoes around their home and neighborhoods by reducing the amount of standing water available for mosquito breeding:

Remove all discarded tires on your property. Used tires with standing water are one of the primary breeding areas for mosquitoes.

Dispose of tin cans, plastic containers, ceramic pots, or similar water-holding containers.

Drill holes in the bottom of recycling containers left outdoors. Make sure roof gutters drain properly, and clean

clogged gutters in the spring and fall. Roof gutters can produce millions of mosquitoes each season.

Turn over plastic wading pools and wheelbarrows when not in use.

Change water in birdbaths.

Clean vegetation and debris from edges of ponds. Clean and chlorinate

swimming pools, outdoor saunas and hot tubs. Aerate or add fish to ornamental ponds. Remember to drain water from pool covers and tarps.

Use landscaping to eliminate standing water that collects on your property.

Mosquitoes may breed in any puddle that lasts for more than four days.

Martin pleads not guilty to sex charge

PRESTONSBURG - The Floyd County District Court docket was a little longer than expected last week, after

sexual abuse and second-degree unlawful imprisonment. But an order issued by Judge James R. Allen on August 17 continued his arraignment date for another week, setting it for Friday, August 31.

On August 22, two days before his original arraignment date, the date was once again changed by a similar order issued by Allen to October 7.

When Martin came to court on the original date, Allen agreed to hold the arraignment, and he was penciled in at the end of the docket.

In an interview with the Times on Friday, Martin said he showed up for court for the August 24 arraignment because his office hadn't at that time received notice of the changes, which he said arrived in his office later that afternoon.

Efforts to find out who asked for the continuance were unsuccessful.

Martin, represented by Attorney Burl McCoy, pleaded not guilty to the charges and a pretrial conference is now scheduled for October 15.

Martin pleaded guilty to an amended charge of sexual abuse in January and received a 90day probated sentence. The court placed him on probation on January 30, stipulating that he continue good behavior, refrain from violating the law,

complete 100 hours of community service, and attend and successfully complete a counseling program at a residential facility.

After returning from a treatment facility in Texas, Martin turned himself over to Floyd County Constable Homer

Floyd County Circuit Court, Martin allegedly restrained a female by locking her in his office, while subjecting her to unsolicited sexual contact by rubbing his groin area against her body without her consent and touching her breasts without her consent.

Martin seemed undaunted.

"Business is good," said Martin. "I'm practicing law every day and I'm practicing strong

"The only comment I would have is that I pray every day that the Lord will give me strength to continue practicing law every day. I think that's answer enough."

Prankfort, to accept any credit for a continuing effort that he championed to stop the dumping of raw sewage into Kentucky's creeks and rivers.

It's a campaign that's gaining new momentum, thanks to \$24 million in federal grants that will help Eastern Kentucky homeowners replace their "straight pipes" and help small towns build new sewer lines.

When he was a Republican state senator from Richmond, Mr. Metcalf earned the ridicule of media types (who make their living writing stories and headlines) for wanting to see his name in stories and headlines.

His bill to prevent electricity hookups at new houses until proper sewage disposal was assured ran into trouble in the 1998 legislative session. The subsequent media analysis was that he had spent too much time issuing press releases and not enough counting votes. When his bill finally did pass, he got little credit.

And nobody mentioned that he had run a risk, embracing a good cause that was, nevertheless, unpopular with legions of rural voters — those who didn't live on sewer lines and didn't have the money to install expensive home treatment systems of their own.

Thanks to the efforts of U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers, the federal government is beginning to eliminate those two excuses for the continued existence of some 36,000 "straight pipes" in Eastern Kentucky. Never mind the irony that a stalwart of the conservative Republican House is promoting this big federal handout. It's an unadulterated good. People and communities that need help in protecting their water supplies will get it.

At the time he presided over the resurrection of Mr. Metcalf's bill, then-Sen. Kim Nelson, D-Madisonville, called raw sewage in streams "the No. 1 pollution problem in this state." Certainly, it is the most egregious. Straight pipes are a real, immediate threat to public health.

The fix is less a question of sophisticated technology than of adequate funding. So Rep. Rogers and the federal government intend to throw money at the problem. Good for them.

With these funds becoming available, state regulators promise stricter control of this kind of water pollution in the mountains. State Auditor Ed Hatchett says, after studying the Natural Resources Cabinet's record in this regard, that such a crackdown is long overdue. America's workers deserve a break

While Americans take time out to enjoy the fruits of their labor, countless hardworking Americans have little to celebrate this Labor Day. From the flashing lights of Broadway to the berry farms of California, runaway union power is steamrolling workers from all walks of life.

For union-abused workers, Big Labor's claim to being their "protector" is nothing more than hypocritical nonsense. Consider, for example, three lawsuits recently brought by National Right to Work Legal Defense Foundation attorneys.

Actors Equity Association union offi-

fine and launched a nationwide smear campaign after he signed on to a non-Equity production of "The Sound of Music."

Williams, who was never told of his right not to join the union, cannot legally be subject to exorbitant fines or any other forms of union "discipline." But ' those facts haven't fazed union officials, who seem hell-bent on making an example out of him.

In California, berry picker Francisco A/cazar and 150 of his fellow employees at Oxnard Coastal Berry were fired at the demand of United Farm Workers union kingpins. The union, which bills itself as a defender of "exploited farm workers," ordered the mass firing because the workers refused to join the union and pay full union dues.

Meanwhile, Machinists union offi-

Mother's Day for exercising her right not to join the union.

In each instance, union officials violated well-established U.S. Supreme Court precedents, including the landmark CWA vs. Beck decision won by Foundation attorneys, which states that workers cannot be forced to join a union or pay dues attributable to activities unrelated to collective bargaining, like politics.

However, to prevent workers from knowing about these rights, union officials have even gone as far as suing the Bush administration to stop the enforcement of a common sense executive order that merely requires federal contractors to inform employees of their rights. Union bosses ironically complained that the executive order imposes "substantial administrative burdens" on businesses. Even when workers find out about (See LABOR page five)




their rights, union officials often resort to harassment, intimidation and violence to keep them from exercising those rights. The National Institute for Labor Relations Research has documented nearly 10,000 mediareported incidents of union violence since 1975 and estimates that there have been an additional 80,000 incidents within that same time period.

For example, during a strike at a General Motors brake supplier, Shucheng Huang exercised her right to work in order to provide for her children. United Auto Workers union militants responded with a vicious campaign of terror in which they placed a freshly-severed bloody cow's head on the hood of her car, smashed her windows and followed up with death threats. UAW toughs terrorized other non-striking workers by slashing their tires, destroying workstations, hurling tools and auto parts at them and even pouring hazardous chemicals on them.

Fortunately, justice was won in this case, as Foundation attorneys forced the payment of an undisclosed monetary settlement. But many employees still live and work in fear when they confront union tyranny.

On this Labor Day, these recent stories of union abuse should lay to rest union officials' false claims to be defenders of working Americans. When, in their pursuit of power, union bosses systematically trample the civil rights of working men and women, not even their slick lawyers and spinmeisters can conceal the fundamental hypocrisy.



"The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics has increased the number of households surveyed across the United States. As a result, Kentucky's survey size went up 23 percent to 1,010 households. At this point, we don't know how much of an effect this has had on the rate." said Carlos Cracraft, the department's chief labor market analyst."

Cracraft said that typically in July the unemployment rate decreases because there are more Kentuckians with jobs and fewer unemployed people. This July, the opposite occurred.

We won't know if this is a trend or just a glitch until the next set of statistics comes out in September," he said. The 5.1 percent unemployment rate for July is the highest rate since February 1999 when it was 5.2 percent.

Agriculture led all other sectors in July with 2,300 new jobs.

The transportation, communications and utilities sector was second with 2,200 more positions in July. "Many of those jobs were the result of the end of a three-month strike in the transportation industry," he said.

Construction had the next highest number with 1,300 new jobs in July. About 800 of these jobs were in special trade categories such as concrete work and installing drywall and roofs. Another 300 positions were added in general building contractors and 200 were in heavy construction work.

The services sector added 100 jobs in July. Seasonal job losses totaling 600 occurred in areas such as membership organizations, educational services, and agricultural services, Cracraft said. However, hotels and other lodging places added 200 positions and business services reported a record gain of 800 jobs in July. Over the past

year, the services sector has recorded the most growth of any sector with 17,600 more jobs than in July 2000.

The finance, insurance and real estate sector added 100 jobs in July.

The mining and quarrying sector had the same number of jobs in June and July.

Of all the job sectors, government showed the largest decline with a loss of 16,100 in July. Local education had 16,000 fewer jobs as schools closed for the summer. Many of those jobs are hourly and will pick up again when school resumes.

The manufacturing sector had 4,500 fewer positions in July than June.

"The manufacturing sector has lost jobs in each of the first seven months of 2001. Typically, July is a month when manufacturing employment declines because many factories shut down for a week or two to retool and upgrade equipment or make yearly product changes, and for summer vacations. Such temporary work stoppages result in laying off some employees who have not been employed long enough to qualify for vacation pay," Cracraft said.

In July, durable goods manufacturing jobs declined by 4,600, while nondurable goods positions rose by 100.

The trade sector fell by 600 jobs in July. About 400 of those jobs were in retail establishments and about 200 were in wholesale trade. Within retail trade, food stores fell by 800 jobs, department stores declined by 400 jobs, miscellaneous retail stores decreased by 300 positions and building materials

and garden supply stores went down by 200 jobs.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics monthly estimate of the number of employed Kentuckians for July 2001 was 1,929,797. This figure is down 4,439 from the 1,934,236 employed in June 2001, and down 9,121 from the 1,938,918 Kentuckians employed in July 2000.

The monthly estimate of the number of unemployed Kentuckians for July 2001 was 103,661. This figure is up 8,053 from the 95,608 unemployed in June 2001, and up 21,304 from the 82,357 Kentuckians unemployed in July 2000.

The monthly estimate of the number of Kentuckians in the civilian labor force for July 2001 was 2,033,458. This figure is up 3,614 from the 2,029,844 recorded in June 2001, and up 12,183 from the 2,021,275 recorded for July 2000.

The civilian labor force includes non-military workers and unemployed Kentuckians who are actively seeking work. It does not include unemployed Kentuckians who have not looked for employment within the past four weeks. Employment and unemployment statistics are based on estimates. They are compiled to indicate employment trends rather than actually to count numbers of people who are or are not working.

Allow me to assure you that Richard Blount needed no help with his character. He was one, and he had a lot of it.



NAIA tourney returns to Kansas City's **Municipal** Auditorium

KANSAS CITY, Mo. In 2002, the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics will hold its Division I Men's Basketball National Cham-pionship in downtown Kansas City at Municipal Auditorium, the site that hosted the NAIA's first tournament and launched the organization itself in 1937. In conjunction with the Olathe (Kan.) Chamber of Commerce the NAIA announced a five-year agreement today making Mun-icipal the home of the NAIA tournament through 2006.

The 65th Annual NAIA Division I Men's Basketball National Championship will be held on March 13-19, +2002 with the succeeding tournaments planned for March 26-April 1, 2003 and March 24-30, 2004. Dates for 2005 are scheduled for March 23-29 and 2006 will be March 22-28.

In March of this year, the NAIA announced it would be relocating to Olathe, Kan., with the construction of a new facility that will include one structure for the NAIA National Office and another for the organization's Character in Sport Center. At the heart of the move was the NAIA's commitment to emphasize character and sportsmanship in athletics with one byproduct being the ability to bring national championships to the Kansas City metropolitan area.

"Our goal is to conduct at least one national championship in the Kansas City-Olathe area during each of



Marshall appealing student-athlete penalties

HUNTINGTON, W.Va. Fourteen Marshall University student-athletes have had their eligibility reinstated by the NCAA, with conditions.

The student-athletes, 12 football players and two men's basketball players, were originally declared ineligible by the University as a result of receiving extra work benefits prior to February of 2000.

The conditions of the reinstatement, pending appeal, are that the student-athletes must sit out a percentage of games during the coming seasons. Two football players will be required to miss 10 percent of the season, or one game. Ten football players will be required to miss 30 percent of the season, or three games.

The two men's basketball players will both be required to miss 30 percent of their season.

Pending appeal of these penalties, the student-athletes will begin serving their penalties immediately.

"This is unfortunate, but I prefer to reserve further comment on this situation until we know the result of our appeal," Marshall football coach Bob Pruett said.

Zelmo Beaty of Prairie View A&M University (Texas) pulled down 96 rebounds in five games (19.2 per game) to become the 1962 MVP. And the "Rockhurst Rule" was created in 1964 when hometown Rockhurst College created one of the biggest traffic jams in Kansas City history with a 7 p.m. tipoff for its first game of that tournament. Thereafter no team from the area could play in a game scheduled near rush hour. There are many lasting memories from the Kemper tournaments as well including the longest game in NAIA history, a five-overtime thriller won by Grand Canyon State University (Ariz.) over Central State University (Ohio), 88-82, in 1978. College basketball's top two scorers of all-time, John Pierce and Philip Hutcheson of Lipscomb University (Tenn.), played at Kemper as did Southeastern Oklahoma State University's Dennis Rodman, who scored 46 points and grabbed 32 rebounds in a 1986 tournament game. The six-day NAIA tournament follows a 32-team, singleelimination, Wednesday-to-Tuesday format with 31 games over six days leaving Sunday as the only open date. The NAIA has maintained a 32-team field since 1938 with the exception of the 16-team national tournament held in 1945. The 1944 tournament was canceled due to World War II. NAIA basketball was split into two divisions in 1992. The Division II Men's Basketball National Championship is currently held in Branson, Mo., on the campus of the College of the Ozarks.

The first 3,000 Bearcat fans attending the UC-Purdue game will receive a limited edition souvenir Bearcat Bobble head doll, courtesy of Pepsi One. The doll features the Bearcat mascot wearing the home black No. I football uniform and holding a football.

UC & ESPN:

The Purdue game will be the seventh Cincinnati game televised by either ESPN or espn2 over the last five years. The contest will be broadcast live

Hillshire Farms is available as on espn2. Cincinnati has posted a 2-4 record on the networks, defeating Boston College and Utah State (in the 1997 Humanitarian Bowl) on espn2 and losing at East Carolina on ESPN in 1997 and falling to East Carolina on ESPN and Syracuse on espn2 in 1998. The last appearance was a 25-14 loss to Marshall in the Motor City Bowl last year.

Purdue game a sellout:

The season-opener against Purdue reached sellout status on Aug. 22, nine days before kickoff. The sellout, the first since Nippert Stadium was expanded to its current 35,000 seat configuration in 1992, guarantees a new single game attendance record will be established. The current mark of 32,924 was set last season in Cincinnati's 45-15 win over Miami University. This will be only the third sellout since the stadium was expanded to 28,000 seats in 1954, and the first achieved before game day. It joins the crowd of 29,546 that saw UC face Miami (Fla.) on Oct. 18, 1986 and a 27,291 crowd for the Sept. 26, 1987 contest vs. Miami (OH). The listed capacity for both games was 26,592.

For openers:

The Bearcats have historically played well in season openers, compiling a 67-36-10 mark in the previous 113 openers. UC opened the 2000 season with a come-from-behind 23-17 win over Army.

A rare freshman start:

Since Rick Minter took over as head coach of the Bearcats in 1994, only two true-freshman have started the first game

of the season. A third is expected to accomplish this against Purdue as Doug Monaghan has taken over the starting strong safety slot. Monaghan, who was a first team all-state choice as a senior at Colerain High in Cincinnati last year, will join teammate Josh Gardner and current NFL Bearcat Derrick Ransom (1994) as freshman starters.


UC faces the Big Ten champs. . . again:

The Purdue game will mark the third straight year that Cincinnati will face the defending Big Ten Conference champions and the second time that the game will be played in Nippert Stadium. UC played Wisconsin the last two years, winning at home in 1999 and falling in overtime in Madison last year. Ohio State is the only Big Ten team on the schedule for 2002.

Home field turf advantage:

The Purdue game will mark the beginning of the second season that the Bearcats have played on the FieldTurf surface in Nippert Stadium. The surface, which combines the properties of natural grass with the durability of a synthetic surface, was installed as part of a \$2.3 million upgrade to Nippert Stadium and Meyers Field during the summer of 2000. The Bearcats took little time in adjusting to the new playing surface, winning all six home games last year. The six straight victories is tied for the eighth longest home win streak in Nippert Stadium history and the longest since an eight game streak from 1981-82. The record for the longest home

tion, event staffing, marketing and promotions.

The NAIA began as the Association of National Intercollegiate Basketball (NAIB) through the initial tournament and instituted the name change with the addition of new sports in 1952. Municipal Auditorium remained the home of the men's basketball tournament through 1974 when it moved to Kemper Arena for a 19-year run from 1975-93. Tulsa, Okla., hosted the last eight championships at three different sites, the Mabee Center (1994-98), the Donald W. Reynolds Center (1999) and the Tulsa Convention Center (2000-01).

Much of the Division I men's tournament's storied history lies in Kansas City. The first tournament was the brainchild of basketball's creator Dr. James Naismith, Baker University (Kan.) Athletics Director Emil S. Liston and Frank Cramer of Cramer Chemical Company, who first conceptualized the idea over a kitchen table. With the support of many Kansas City businessmen, eight teams appeared in the first tournament.

Municipal Auditorium officially opened one year prior to the birth of the NAIA in 1936, and it has since hosted nearly every type of event from U.S. Presidential Campaigns to the NAIA Indoor Track and Field National Championships, With barrier-free access to the main floor, it has comfortable seating for 10,700 people, including 7,300 permanent upholstered seats

Perhaps the biggest milestone in NAIA history came in 1948 when, behind the vision of future NAIA executive director Al Duer and Naismith Memorial Hall of Fame basketball coach John McLendon, the NAIA became the first organization to offer postseason opportunities to black student-athletes. Clarence Walker, a reserve guard on John Wooden's Indiana State University team became the first black player to appear in the postseason. In 1953, historically

I've listened to Dipper hundreds of times, and been fortunate enough to be a guest on dozens of shows. He was always kind, always told his listeners I was a little better writer than I really am, and usually gave me a little too much credit as an authority figure on mountain sports.

But that was the Dipper. He wanted us to feel welcome, to feel appreciated, and that we did. Whether it was in the radio station at WIFX or WSGS, or in his home, or in any one of a number of restaurants where he held his radio show these last many years, Dipper was always large, always in charge.

And he was always a friend. I looked forward to state tournaments, because the Dipper was always there. Dipper held court in many a hospitality room, always with a story, always leaving them laughing. Get there early enough before a session, and you were

likely to find him holding court out on the court. It didn't matter to Dipper. Anyplace was good enough for him.

Heck, I must confess that Julian Tackett and I once were guests in a Dipper bull session held in a men's room under the stands at Richmond's McBrayer Arena. We were a captive audience, you might say.

He was always there for a pat on the back, always called me his "old buddy," always wanting you to know you were valued. He always succeeded in that.

players and asking whom he should support. "They need two votes to get honorable mention," he'd say. "If you vote for them and I do, they'll at least get that.'

Most people who saw the Dipper noticed he was a big man. But I'm convinced a man like the Dipper couldn't have survived in a small body. He had too much heart for that. His passion and love of life needed room that isn't available in a lean physique.

Dipper had his own way of honoring these student-athletes. Each January and May, he held a banquet to announce his All-Mountain Team. Seniors from across the region were honored that day.

"This may be the only time these kids are recognized," he once said. "We need to do that, to make them feel important."

I was fortunate enough to be honored at one such banquet. Two years earlier I had presented the first John Bastolla Gridiron Award to John's wife, Ella.

It was shortly after he had passed. On this afternoon, he gave it to me.

That plaque is hanging at the top of a collection in my office, and I'm probably more proud of that than any of the others.

It's ironic 1 mention John today. It was the Dipper who called a few New Year's Days ago to tell me our friend had passed away. Those are two of the best friends I've made in this business, and now they're gone. If they play high school sports in Heaven, I know who's in the press box.

During the peak of Dipper's popularity, my friends Jason Blanton, Ed Taylor and I decided to have our own banquet to honor players in the 15th Region.

It was a one-time shot, but we wanted to do it up as nice as we could. After dinner that night, it was my task to introduce the speaker. He'd driven over from Hazard to talk to these athletes, to congratulate them, and he'd done it for nothing. It's how he was. When we told him we couldn't pay him, he scoffed. "I don't want paid," he said. "It's an honor to be asked." When I stood that night, I asked how many people knew his name. Not one person raised their hand - not a player, a coach or even a media member. But they all knew the kind, friendly gentleman who stood before them that night. They all knew the voice. They all knew the passion. They all knew the Dipper. And they all loved him. It was an honor to know the Big Dipper. Good day, sports fan.





AAA says plague of unstable gas prices returns to midwest on refinery outage

ORLANDO, Fla. - A major gasoline refinery shutdown in the Midwest has boosted retail gasoline prices by more than 20 cents per gallon in many markets throughout the central United States in the last week, AAA reported today.

"The projected six-month shutdown of a Citgo refinery due to structural problems caused by a fire on August 14, has created the exact market conditions AAA and others have been warning about for more than two years," said Susan Pikrallidas, AAA vice president of Public Affairs.

"The U.S. gasoline refining industry is stretched too thin to meet the needs of America's motorists at a consistent price, and - as illustrated by this month's refinery fire in Lemont, Ill. - the nation continues to be only one major supply disruption away from sky-rocketing gasoline prices and possible shortages," she said.

With retail gas prices again over \$1.70 per gallon in many midwestern cities, AAA again called on the federal government to look for ways to streamline its overly complex system of regional gasoline standards, and carefully review the effects industry consolidation is having on consumer prices and supply.

As the nation's largest motoring and leisure travel organization, AAA provides its more than 44 million members with travel, insurance, financial and automotive-related services. Since its founding in 1902, the not-for-profit, fully tax paying AAA has been a leader and advocate for safety and security of all travelers.







Parents who want their children to be educated as well as entertained by television will do best to stick with existing shows this season, save one exceptional new program. Sagwa, the Chinese Siamese Cat, premiering Monday, Sept. 3, on PBS, is lushly drawn cartoon based on the book by Amy Tan (The Joy Luck Club). The bestselling author wrote the book for her cat who had been diagnosed with a terminal illness. Given only a monthto live, the cat survived four more years after being read the story, Tan says. Set in a Chinese palace around 1900, the show tells stories from the

a bat named Fu-Fu. Each half-hour episode offers two 11 1/2-minute segments and a related educational interstitial. In one story about the Chinese New Year, a rat convinces Sagwa to pretend to keep catching it so she looks good and the rat can stay in the palace. But soon her conscience kicks in and triumphs. Sagwa strives to help 5- to 8year-olds make sense of the world. 'The first goal is to provide them insights into the kinds of socio-emotional issues they will be confronting," says educational consultant Eve Hall. "It's broken into subgoals of getting along with others, dealing with honesty, figuring what it means to be open-minded and tolerant, and defining oneself."

'The cultural diversity of the show is very unique and special," says executive producer George Daugherty, "It shows children another view of another time and place, another culture. ... At the same time, it has a universality that hopefully kids will come away with the realization that they have a lot in common with other cultures." Or, as in the case of a 7-year-old girl who watched a review tape, they may simply say, "I just love Sagwa. She's so cute." And cute abounds in Oswald,a new Nickelodeon show about a blue octopus that premiered last month and features the voice of Fred Savage (The Wonder Years). Its whimsy may drive older children from the room, but a 3-year-old

intently followed Oswald's search for an ice cream truck and rejoiced when it finally was found. Nickelodeon's other new series is The Nick Cannon Show, premiering Saturday, Sept. 29.

Cannon, 20, stars in and produces this children's comedy show that takes on daily life and features guest stars including Eddie Murphy. The WB Network airs more Japanese anime this season, beginning on Sept. 15. Based of a comic book series, Yu-Gi-Oh! follow a teen-ager named Yugi who is picked on by bullies. Pokemon: Johto League Champions is yet another spinoff of th original series that continues to air weekdays. WB's other two new Saturday morning shows are The Mummy, a cartoon featuring an 11-yea old who travels the world with his parents as they search for powerful scrolls and The Nightmare Room, a live-actio anthology series based on R. 

I listened as Devon laughed hysterically at me while she leisurely ate her pizza. "Ooooooooo," she howled. "The devil's gonna get you, Sara."


"Does this mean you aren't going?" Cinder asked.

surgery door, gasped, and said, "What happened to that poor dog?" He thought I had a live dog in a body cast!

Anyway, the kennel club tried to help out Jenny Wiley Theatre by putting on a "Canine Good Citizen" demonstration to help draw people and their dogs out to the tryouts for the role of Sandy. Except for kennel club members and theatre representatives, about three people and no dogs showed up for the event. The theatre people needed two dogs for the two casts of orphans that would rotate the shows throughout the season. John Faulkner and I had brought our dogs for the CGC demonstration-his Golden Retriever, Keeper, and my Golden Retriever-Chow mix, Casey. "How about those two dogs?" the lady from the theatre asked. John and I gave each other deer-in-the-headlights looks and mumbled out something about having no experience with this sort of thing.

The dogless theatre lady was undaunted. "They're trained, aren't they?"

We tried feebly to explain that training for formal obedience competition doesn't exactly qualify a dog to be a stand-in for Lassie. As a mixed-breed, Casey couldn't even compete in real shows. We had only done a few fun matches. I tried not to think about the time he got tired, walked out of the ring, and watched me do a whole "Heel Free" exercise alone. I didn't know he was AWOL until the judge was nearly in tears with laughter. Dog people expect that sort of thing. Audiences probably wouldn't.

To make a long story short, we suddenly found ourselves the handlers of two canine actors, and were plunged into the world of live theater. Since each cast rehearsed separately, we wouldn't even have the support of the other lost soul, but we each dutifully showed up for our respective first rehearsals.

What I had not counted on was the professionalism of the children cast in the roles of "Annie" and the other orphans! They immediately fell in love with Casey, and he adored them. I soon learned to ask the kids if I had a question about something. Kristen Everage was "Annie" for our cast. She and Casey clicked right away, and the bond was obvious even to the audience.

Kristen may have been only

twelve years old, but I told her early on that I would need her help. and she quickly became my mentor. She showed me where to stand to be out of the way, what cues to listen for, which way was "stage right" and "stage left", and how to maneuver around the scenery without causing an accident. I taught her how to use Casey's training to make things easier - keeping him on her left side, using very subtle commands for "heel", "sit", and "stay", and doing things consistently. In the audience one night, my husband overheard someone remark, "I think that child is giving that dog HAND SIGNALS!" He was right.

At the end of the first act, "Sandy" has to make a stage crossing alone, a lost dog looking for "Annie". This scene follows a large musical production number with lots of activity. It took both of us to come up with a way to pull this off. Casey knew the hand signal for "come" and he was fairly reliable, but I had to get his attention across that huge expanse of stage! As soon as the musical scene started, I left Kristen holding Casey and sprinted for the other side. At Jenny Wiley, this is more difficult than it sounds, because "backstage" is crammed full of backdrops and props for the other shows of the season, so you have to go downstairs, through a "tunnel" UNDER the backstage, upstairs and around to the opposite end of the stage. It took a lot of practice (and a lot of running) to get Casey used to the idea that I was going to pop up on the other side, but eventually he learned to look for me. Now I had to help him focus on where I was among all the movement in the darkened area behind the curtain. I decided to try an ultrasonic dog-training device similar to a "silent dog whistle". It was perfect! He could actually hear this over all the music and commotion - his ears tipped forward, and he looked straight at me the first time we tried it during a full rehearsal! He never flubbed that scene.

Actually, he only messed up twice that I remember. He wandered offstage once instead of coming to Kristen, but she never missed a beat - she recovered the dog, ad-libbed a line, and went on as if nothing had happened. I was mortified, but one of the other actors laughed and said, "Now you see what live theater is all about. The unpredictability is what makes it so much better than a movie." Maybe. I don't see why all stage actors aren't committed to a mental institution after one season. Anyhow, Kristen fixed the problem next time by rubbing hotdogs on her hands before this scene. My chowhound stuck to her like glue from then on.


Casey's other act of "unpredictability" during one performance was to emerge from a large Christmas box during the finale butt first. He essentially mooned the audience. Kristen called it a "sense of comedy"; I couldn't disagree, remembering the look on his face when I found myself alone in the ring at the dog show. I could swear he was grimning.

By the end of the season, both of us were having a ball. Casey had learned the cues and would sometimes start to move offstage before Kristen could get her last line out. We found out that he could keep time to music with his tail. The kids were all ready to help hold a leash, exchange the ratty "orphan dog" rope collar for the glittery bow that Sandy wears to Daddy Warbuck's Christmas party, or just give him a good pat or a last-minute brushing. At the end of each performance, he stood in line with the other actors to meet the audience and give autographs (I helped out with a paw-print stamp). John was reporting that Keeper was enjoying similar popularity. We were all tired, but we hated to see it end.

I had always hoped to let Casey do this production again, but it came around too late for both him and Keeper, who both passed away long before we were ready to let them go. I can't hear "Tomorrow" without imagining a tail thumping in perfect time. I hope this season's Sandy is having as much fun as we did.

News of the Weird...

Curt Storey, 62, who lives near Pittsburgh, Pa., filed a wrongful-discharge lawsuit in August against Burns International Security Services, claiming he was fired from his job because he refused supervisors' demands that he cleanse his lunchbox and pickup truck of Confederate flag decals, orders that he calls illegal national-origin discrimination. Storey claims he is a "Confederate Southern American," even though he is a lifelong Pennsylvanian and even though courts have not recognized CSA as a protected class under anti-discrimination law.

Paul Morgan of Biloxi, Miss., has been busy the last few weeks lining up Web site viewers, at \$20 each, to watch him slice off both his feet on Oct. 31 with a homemade guillotine. Morgan's feet are nonfunctional because of an automobile accident, and he wants hydraulically operated prostheses to make him more mobile, but this is the only way he knows to raise the \$200,000 to buy them. Although traffic on CutOffMyFeet.com is heavy, as of mid-August, Morgan had signed up only 10 viewers.

In August, Naples (Fla.) City Councilman Fred Tarrant demanded that local artist Ted Lay's "Famous Tongue Mona Al Monica" (side-by-side painting impressions of Mona Lisa, Albert Einstein, and Monica Lewinsky sticking their tongues out) be removed from its place at a Naples municipal art center because he thinks Lewinsky's "tongue" too much resembles a penis (which Lay denies). According to a Naples Daily News report, Tarrant is in fact blind but said various advisers have assured him that the tongue is a penis.

Good Ol' Boys Out of Control

■ In May in Stroudsburg, Pa., Noah Berryman, 19, was convicted of involuntary

manslaughter; hours after earning his driver's license, Berryman was trying to get his car airborne on a hill (he launched 63 feet on the fourth attempt) when he hit a tree. killing the two friends riding with him. And in February, a 52-year-old man shot a 21year-old man to death on I-75 in Tennessee as the men hauled 30 fighting roosters to a cockfight in Kentucky; the older man was angry that the younger man kept kicking the back of his seat. And in June, as Knox County (Tenn.) sheriff's deputies surrounded an auto parts store looking for suspect Charles "Cracker" Dunn, his brother, Melvin "Squirt" Dunn Jr., jumped on cars, waved his arms and defiantly challenged them, before they stormed the store and arrested him (but not Cracker, who wasn't there).

Unclear on the Concept

In July, according to police, an unidentified man stole an ax from a Home Depot in Oklahoma City and used it menacingly to rob a clerk and shortly thereafter did the same at two other stores, including a Wal-Mart. On interviewing witnesses, police learned that a Wal-Mart door greeter had seen the man enter carrying the ax, but his only impulse was to make sure that he did his job and placed a sticker on the ax so that when the man later tried to exit the store, he wouldn't be charged for it.

■ In May, a court in Edmonton, Alberta, sentenced William Piggott, 55, to 18 months' house arrest for three 1999 offenses in which prostitutes had turned him in for talking too dirty. According to court records, Piggott had merely asked the women if they would have sex with dogs.

The Litigious Society

■ In May, several months after the Escondido, Calif., library's resident cat attacked Richard R. Espinosa's 50-pound Labrador-mix assistance dog, Espinosa filed a \$1.5 million claim against the city, alleging that he was in bad shape because of the dog's injuries. According to the legal papers, Espinosa suffers "significant lasting, extreme and severe mental anguish and emotional distress including, but not limited to, terror, humiliation, shame, embarrassment, mortification, chagrin, depression, panic, anxiety, flashbacks, nightmares, loss of sleep (and) loss of full enjoyment of life as well as other physical and mental afflictions of pain (and) suffering."

■ In June, Mary Lee Sowder filed a lawsuit in Roanoke, Va., against the local PetsMart store for \$100,000 for injuries to her knee that she suffered when she slipped and fell on "dog slobber," which was allegedly drooled upon the floor by the manager's own huge dog (of unspecified breed).

Kevin Mackle died at age 21 in 1998 when a Coke machine he was rocking in a dorm at Bishop's University in Lennoxville, Quebec, fell on him. In July 2001, Mr. Mackle's family filed a lawsuit for about \$660,000 (U.S.) for wrongful death against the machine's manufacturer and distributor, and Coca-Cola, and the university. The lawsuit claims that each defendant was negligent in not posting signs on the machine that college students should resist the temptation to rock it. According to the coroner's report, the late Mr. Mackle was well-known by his friends for securing free sodas by rocking the machine and was once again engaged in his craft when the fatal accident occurred.

People Different From Us

According to police reports in the Daily Independent (Ashland, Ky.) in June, Clark Schneeberger, 44, heard that his father-inlaw, Richard J. Kouns, was angry that his daughter and Schneeberger had fought several days before and was on his way over to defend his daughter's honor. Schneeberger prepared for the interfamily visit by strapping on body armor and equipping himself with a bayonet and brass knuckles. Kouns arrived swinging, and the two battled until Schneeberger subdued Kouns by biting off part of his nose (an attack that earned Schneeberger a grand jury indictment several days later).

Undignified Deaths

A 26-year-old SWAT police officer in Dallas was accidentally shot to death by a colleague in June as the two men showed trainees how to react to a gunman in a public place. And a 14-year-old girl died when the all-terrain vehicle in which she was riding smashed into a tractortrailer; she was in the vehicle because she was visiting her father's workplace as part of Take Our Kids to Work Day (Welland, Ontario, November 2000, and for which a lawsuit was filed in May 2001). And the Alcoholics Anonymous chapter in Milwaukee still does not know who the man was who collapsed and died during a meeting on May 23 (because those attending meetings usually do so

anonymously).

In July, the University of South Florida agreed to pay \$25,000 to a former art student to settle her 1999 lawsuit claiming that she felt sexually harassed by a class-discussion photograph of a naked white woman clinching a naked black man. despite the fact that that day's topic was controversial art and that all 250 students in the class had been warned of the nature of the class and advised they would not be penalized for missing it. (Shortly after the class, the woman's father complained, and the graduate assistant who supplied the photograph was transferred, which ignited a public protest by all the rest of the students in the class.)

Also, in the Last Month...

Benjamin Sharpe, 47, charged with stabbing a friend, insisted he had to do it because his buddy had vowed to drive home, though inebriated (Aiken County, Ga.).

A conference paper by British scientists concluded that female cockroaches lower their standards for a mate as their biological clock runs down (Manchester, England).

Accused sex-assaulter Kevin Erwin was cleared by a jury, which found his torturing of his girlfriend consensual, that she for some reason had failed to use the "safe" words to get him to stop ("tomato" and "pepper") (Canton, Ohio).

The Japanese firm Takara said it will soon market a
