Man charged with stealing **Hiquor bottles** in pants

PRESTONSBURG - A Prestonsburg man was arrested at Rite-Aid Pharmacy in the Glyn View Plaza after a store clerk told police she witnessed the man stuffing bottles of liquor into his pants before leaving the store.

According to a written citation from Prestonsburg Police Officer Brian Kidd, Paul Setser, 27, of Prestonsburg, was seen by

a store employee "sticking liquor down his pants and leaving the store" Police charged Setser

with theft by unlawful taking and alcohol intoxication in a public place.

In a written statement to police, the pharmacy employee said Setser had stuffed a \$16 bottle of tequila and a \$17 bottle of Wild Turkey whiskey down his pants before leaving the store.

Setser is scheduled for arraignment on the charges Sept. 30.



EASTON, Pa. - Those who pay their tabs with bad checks get top billing on the marquee in front the Park Avenue Market.

It's Vic Ricci's way of getting back at customers who bounce checks.

The 52-year-old grocer said he started doing it in January when an infrequent shopper bounced a check for almost \$200. He said he tried phoning the man, but the number was no longer in service. Then he went to the man's home and the man said he desperately needed food for his family.

"I said, 'Give me a call every few weeks so I know you didn't forget about me,"' Ricci said. "He never did."

So Ricci cleared a spot on his marquee that normally displays specials and exposed the man publicly. A few days later, the man showed up at the store with about \$100, Ricci said. He said he wouldn't remove the name until he recovered all the money.

Ricci said he wouldn't publicly humiliate someone who makes an honest mistake, or who makes payment arrangements.

"Your name only goes up there if you ignore me," he said. Ricci said he's gotten only

positive response from his customers, with the only concern raised being legalities.

"People ask me if it's legal. I say I don't care," he said. "If you can't pay a \$25 check, how can you pay a lawyer? If someone wants to take me to court, [']] go."

LIMA, Ohio – A dentist is offering a \$100 reward for the return of a toothbrush.

The 14-foot red wooden toothbrush was stolen from Dr. Ruhl Warden's dental practice in this northwest Ohio city over the weekend. Warden has used

it as a yard sign for about 20 years. It weighs between 80 and 100 pounds.

Everybody sort of identified my office with it," said Warden. "Everybody's seen the big red toothbrush."

Warden, 74, said he filed a theft report Monday morning when he discovered the toothbrush was missing. He believes the rain Sunday allowed thieves to pull the toothbrush and its mount out of the ground.

The toothbrush was tilting two weeks earlier in a way that made Warden think someone tried then to grab it.

"Every once in a while, someone tried to pull it out," he said. "I could tell because it was sitting at an angle."

Warden, whose hobby is woodworking, crafted the base of the toothbrush out of yellow pine and the bristles from 10inch-long cedar poles.

Someone stole it the morning of New Year's Eve 1996. It eventually turned up, damaged and painted blue, about six miles from his office.

"It turned up once before," said Warden. "There's a chance it will turn up again."

FAIRMONT, W.Va. -Babs Steorts' wrestling opponents are dirty fighters: they bite, squirm and have angry dispositions.

They're also alligators and crocodiles.

Steorts is adjusting to the national attention she has received in the nearly three years she has been wrestling gators and crocs at Gatorland, an Orlando, Fla., tourist attraction.

She and four others routinely go snout-to-snout with the park's 700 alligators and 200 crocodiles during 11 daily shows.

"But the marketing department has a heyday with me, so I probably get a little more publicity than the rest of the wrestlers," Steorts said last week.

She's appeared on NBC's "Tonight Show with Jay Leno." Show contributor and actordirector Kevin Smith featured her in a segment on roadside attractions.

Steorts says she can't keep

PRIDE awards \$2,535 for environmental education in Floyd County

SOMERSET - Students at Prestonsburg Elementary School will participate in hands-on environmental education activities this year, thanks to the PRIDE Environmental Education Grant Program. PRIDE announced recipients of the 2003-2004 education grants last week at workshops in Somerset, Prestonsburg and Hazard.

Prestonsburg Elementary School will serve 470 students with its \$2,535 grant to purchase supplies that will enhance their outdoor classroom and subscribe to several environmental education magazines.

'Through a variety of environmental activities our young people are learning to take pride in our beautiful land and waterways," said Congressman Hal Rogers (KY-5), who secured the federal funding that makes PRIDE grant programs possible. "All over this great region students are cleaning up, building outdoor classrooms, and over 20,000 of them are testing the water in the streams near

their schools and homes. The involvement of our young people gives a clear indication that once we clean up, they will make better decisions about caring for our natural resources than previous generations.

The PRIDE Environmental Education Grant Program awards up to \$5,000 to schools and nonprofit organizations to pursue projects that help young people understand the importance of a clean environment. The projects

promote personal responsibility and community pride.

PRIDE awarded 87 grants this year, totaling \$361,553. Since 1997. PRIDE has invested \$2,052,757 in environmental education, reaching more than 346,000 students across the region. PRIDE grants have started 24 school-wide recycling projects and built 222 outdoor classrooms, 50 greenhouses and 29 nature trails.

Within those records were lists of purchases, according to the company's complaint, and within those lists was Lewis' name.

The device Lewis allegedly purchased was delivered to her home address in Gilley, according to the complaint.

The satellite company, which delivers over 225 channels of television and other programming to more than 10 million homes and businesses across the country, asserts that Lewis used the device to receive unauthorized satellite transmissions for herself, as well as to assist others to do the same.

That the activity was illegal and that owning such a device were points which Lewis was

The company says such activity injures its rate of subscription and pay-per-view revenue, as well as compromises its security, accounting systems and infringes trade secrets, while interfering with future business opportunities.

The key to DirecTV's business is a method employed to encrypt, or electronically scramble, its satellite transmissions, a process they say provides security and for which they have invested more than \$1.25 billion to develop.

The company claims that Lewis violated both the Federal Communications Act of 1934 and the Electronic Communications Privacy Act, also known as the Federal Wiretap Laws.

Blue Grass Parkway to be renamed in honor of Collins

VERSAILLES - Martha Layne Collins' name will be added to the Blue Grass Parkway in a tribute to Kentucky's first woman governor.

The 71-mile-long road Versailles between and Elizabethtown will be renamed "The Martha Layne Collins Blue Grass Parkway" in a ceremony Thursday just west of the parkway entrance in Woodford County. Collins once taught middle school in the central Kentucky county.

Collins, 66, was governor from 1983 to 1987. Her administration is credited with providing the incentives that attracted Toyota to build an automobile plant near Georgetown.

State Rep. Joe Barrows, D-Versailles, said Monday he was unaware the renaming was in the works until he received an invitation last week.

"She needs to be honored in some fashion, and if this is the way they've chosen to do it, I'm



Patriot Act heightens assault on **civil liberties**

Protecting its people is Job One of any government - keeping them safe from an external enemy or lawless elements of its own society. But not by any means necessary.

The Founders of the American republic recognized the temptation of a government concerned with maintaining order to trend toward an allpowerful police state. That's why it wrote a set of rules - the Bill of Rights and Constitution - to keep everyone honest.

But the Bush administration is throwing the rule book on the trash heap in the name of fighting terrorism. It has already weakened nearly every procedural safeguard guaranteed by the Constitution at every stage of the legal process - detection, prosecution and punishment.

And now it is seeking to marginalize due process even further. Last week, President George W. Bush asked for additional powers to fight terrorism, including bypassing judicial oversight in obtaining warrants; the ability to hold terrorist suspects without bail; and the death penalty for terrorists regardless, presumably, of whether or not their actions actually killed or were intended to kill - a major affront to the principle of proportional punishment.

The seeds of this due process assault were sown long before Bush launched the war on terrorism. They have their roots in the drug war. Most of the additional powers Bush is demanding are already in place to fight illegal narcotics - a parallel he pointedly drew when asking for more powers.

The drug war, however, is a terrible model for the war on terrorism.

Take, for instance, the Fourth Amendment's prohibition on warrantless searches - searches conducted without a proper showing of probable cause before a judge.

Such searches were anathema 25 years ago. But the war on drugs changed that.

Mandatory urine tests have become commonplace. Yet they are little more than a dragnet-type search in which everyone is tracked to snag the few who are guilty. No less a conservative voice than Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia has condemned the urine tests as "an invasion of ... privacy and an affront to ... dignity."

Also, drug authorities can search private homes based on anonymous tips - a dilution of the probable cause standard - and snoop around front yards and other "open fields" without a prior warrant.

The Patriot Act - the 300-plus-page piece of legislation that the Bush administration shoved through Congress within days of 9-11 - gives executive authorities expansive powers to conduct far broader searches with even less judicial oversight.

EXPANDING SECRET COURTS

The Patriot Act is an appalling assault on civil liberties almost from top to bottom. But a couple of examples highlight why it is particularly offensive to due process.

The act tinkers mightily with the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance

Gubernatorial candidates debate on health care issues

The Associated Press

HAZARD - In a debate that at times grew slightly heated, the Democratic and Republican nominees for governor on Monday each said the other was beholden to special interests on certain health care matters.

Republican U.S. Rep. Ernie Fletcher said his Democratic opponent, Attorney General Ben Chandler, would not endorse his plan for "medical malpractice reform" because he had accepted donations from trial attorneys.

Likewise, Chandler countered that Fletcher over the years has accepted too many contributions from prescription drug companies to remain objective on lowering health care premiums for patients.

The two men met on stage at the Hal Rogers Center in Hazard Monday night for a debate jointly sponsored by the city of Hazard, the Kentucky Hospital Association and Appalachian Regional Healthcare.

One of the main philosophical differences between Chandler and Fletcher has been their plans to lower the cost of doctors' medical malpractice insurance in the state. Escalating insurance premiums have caused some doctors to close their practices or stop perform-

ing certain procedures.

Like Chandler, Fletcher has proposed a "medical review panel" for malpractice claims. Fletcher has also endorsed capping the amount patients can recover for non-economic damages, also called pain and suffering.

Fletcher also would put to voters a constitutional amendment that, if ratified, would grant the General Assembly and the governor specific powers to deal with malpractice.

Chandler supports creating a self-insurance fund for doctors - a plan he says would lower malpractice coverage rates. Chandler also wants the state to join a "consortium" with other states to buy prescription drugs at bulk prices.



Suit alleges 5 drug makers inflated prices

FRANKFORT - The Kentucky attorney general's office Monday sued five pharmaceutical companies, alleging they inflated their drug prices to bilk Medicaid and Medicare.

"This case is about corporate greed," Attorney General Ben Chandler said in a news conference to announce two lawsuits in Franklin County Circuit Court. The alleged overcharging may have cost the state "well in excess of \$100 million."

Chandler said.

Nine other states also have sued drug makers for similar reasons since 2000, according to Chandler's staff. The list: California, Connecticut, Florida, Minnesota, Montana, Nevada, New York, Texas and West Virginia.

Defendants in the Kentucky suits are Abbott Laboratories Inc. of Abbott Park, Ill.; Dey Inc. of Napa, Calif., and three related companies based in Kenilworth, N.J. - Schering Corp., Schering-Plough Corp. and its subsidiary, Warrick

Pharmaceutical Corp.

They allegedly inflated the average wholesale prices of several drugs. Their reimbursement rates from government health plans are based on the wholesale averages, according to the suits.

A spokesman for the Schering companies said the average wholesale price -AWP - used by Kentucky Medicaid is a "reference price for reimbursement," not a literal cost

"It has been well known and the AWP system."

widely reported since the 1960s that AWP as a reference price does not reflect actual prices," the spokesman, Bill O'Donnell, said in a telephone interview.

"If there is fault here, it is the continued use of an undefined reference price to calculate reimbursement rather than government using some more realistic price," O'Donnell said. "Contrary to what we believe the suit is alleging, the company did not seek to take advantage of

A spokesman for Abbott Laboratories, Jonathon Hamilton, said the company would vigorously defend itself against the suit, which he said was similar to others filed against the industry.

"Abbott has consistently complied with all pricing laws and regulations," Hamilton said in a statement. "Abbott has properly and lawfully provided information to the government and to the independent drug reporting services on which the government relies in setting reimbursement."

A call to Dey was not returned.

In the lawsuits, the attorney general agreed that "reported AWP bears no relation to any price, much less an average wholesale price." The difference between reported AWP and actual cost is known in the industry as the "spread," and the companies marketed the spread to induce doctors and other Medicaid providers to purchase and prescribe their drugs over those of competitors, the lawsuits said.

All the companies "knowingly, willfully and intentionally provided false and inflated AWP and other pricing information" for their drugs, the suits said.

Chandler said his prosecutors believe pharmaceutical companies have been setting the price "just wherever they want to set it." He said consumers feel the effect through the loss of tax dollars and, in the case of Medicare recipients, through excessive prescription co-pay-

Congress, acknowledging that law enforcement authorities needed special leeway in foreign intelligence investigations, carved out a small exception to the Fourth Amendment's probable cause standard. Under this standard, police have to show evidence of a crime before getting the go-ahead from a court to conduct physical searches or subpoena business records.

The surveillance act relaxed that standard, so no evidence of a crime is necessary. Instead, intelligence authorities can go to a secret court and obtain a search warrant simply by demonstrating that the primary purpose of their investigation is to gather foreign intelligence and the person in question is a proven agent of a foreign power.

Few people would likely find that egregious. But once the door is cracked for a due process exception, kicking it wide open becomes much simpler.

And that's exactly what the Patriot Act does. Its Section 218 expands on the surveillance act standard to allow the same secret courts to grant warrants if federal law enforcement agents can certify - not prove by hard evidence - that the person to be searched is a suspected terrorist

Certainly, the Justice Department has to meet the higher probable cause standard to conduct the searches. Still, authorities do not have to notify homeowners of the searches as long as the Justice Department can show that notification would in any way jeopardize the investigation.

Since notification would in almost every case undermine an investigation, this could effectively spell the end of the "knock and announce" requirement on police executing searches, a major abrogation of privacy rights.

The Fourth Amendment was added to the Constitution because of the Founders' deepseated revulsion against the practices of their former English masters, who had wide-ranging powers to ransack homes in search of any evidence of tax evasion or other crimes.

The search powers were used to enforce the Stamp Act, the pivotal event leading to the Declaration of Independence.

And yet here Americans are again, supposedly in the name of preserving liberty, returning to the onerous abridgements of freedom the nation was founded to reject.



August tax receipts down nearly 5 percent

FRANKFORT - Receipts for the state's General Fund in August were down 4.7 percent from a year ago, the office of the state budget director reported Monday.

The state budget assumes growth of 4.5 percent for the fiscal year.

August's drop-off were not surprising, acting State Budget Director Mary Lassiter said in a written statement. Last month, budget forecasters predicted the state would end the year about \$274.4 million short of its mark for fiscal 2004. Lassiter said in a written statement.

"We benefited greatly last August from some one-time sales tax payments, and August of last year also marked the beginning of the tax amnesty program that netted additional said in a statement.

In August, the state took in \$484.6 million, down from \$508.7 million in August 2002.

While the state's individual income tax revenues grew by 10 percent, sales and use taxes / dropped 14.7 percent, the report said. Sales and use taxes are down 6.3 percent so far this fiscal year.

A drop in highway tolls and investment income were "principally responsible" for August's slump, the report said.

CRITTER CORNER That 'comforting' commotion

By Dr. Carol Combs-Morris, DVM

"What makes cats purr? And believe it or not, I think my Pug purrs-he does this funny little rumbling thing when he's feeling really content and someone is petting him. Even my brother asked during a visit, 'Is this dog purring?' So, Dr. Carol, what is this 'purring' thing and where does it come from?"

This question comes form Kathy Prater, my editor at the Floyd County Times. I've honestly never heard a Pug purr, but I can probably explain that easier than I can tell you why a cat purrs. I even called Shawn at vet school to see if they had any new theories, and he has promised to let me know as soon as he finds out. I will update you with any additional information.

In the meantime, I surfed around the 'net for facts, theories and trivia, although there's not a whole lot of information out there. (Funding for

studies on cat purrs is probably pretty far down the priority list.)

Most people think that the cat's purr originates in its throat, and to me that's the most reasonable ideathe vibrations seem most intense there. But where in the throat? There are supposedly membranes called "false vocal cords" that lie above the true vocal cords. (I don't remember being told anything about these in anatomy class.) One theory holds that air passing over these cords as

the cat breathes makes them vibrate and produces the purr. Another speculation is that the cords vibrate in response to blood flow in certain vessels in the neck.

The possibility exists that the vibration is not in the vocal cords at all, but in the hyoid apparatus, a small set of bones in the throat that help support the tongue.

New timeframes set for Qualified Income Trusts

FRANKFORT The Department for Medicaid Services has announced new timeframes for people who are considering establishing Qualifying Income Trusts so they may keep their Medicaid coverage.

These timeframes affect approximately 1,200 people who reside in nursing homes or who receive community services that are alternatives to nursing facility care who have gross income over \$1.656 a month. The trust is for the excess income and allows these people to keep Medicaid

coverage

The department had initially asked individuals who elected to establish the trusts to have them completed by Sept. 19.

Under the new timeframes, people who are unable to have the trust document completed by Sept. 19 may file a letter of intent with their local Community Based Services office explaining the reason they couldn't meet the initial deadline by Sept. 19. If a letter of intent is submitted by Sept

19, the trust will need to filed with the local Community Based Services office by Oct. 22

By sending in the trust by Sept. 19, or a letter of intent by Sept. 19 and the trust by Oct. 22, the individual's Medicaid coverage will continue.

The trust requirement does not apply to everyone on Medicaid in nursing homes or who receive community services - just those whose income is over \$1,656 a month. The department sent notices in August to those who are affect-

Most of this racket is due to the fact that all the standard equipment that belongs in a dog's head is squashed into a space much smaller than normal.

Kentucky took only 47 snaps and was unable to get into an offensive rhythm, Brooks said. The Wildcats continued to have difficulty establishing the run, managing only 26 rushing yards against the Crimson Tide. Kentucky is averaging just 79 yards rushing per game.

"Our offense has to do a better job of keeping our defense off the field," Brooks said. "We've started all three games very slowly on offense. We need to get some ballpossession drives, move the chains, get some first downs and get a little ball control time-wise on the clock on the offensive side. That will help us when we get to the fourth quarter on the defensive game when we've been on the field."

Quarterback Jared Lorenzen said he's at a loss to explain the Wildcats' ground woes.

"Your guess is as good as mine," he said. "I'd put our running backs against anybody in the Southeastern Conference. I absolutely love our running backs and I love my offensive line. I think it's just something that we're missing right now and something that we've got to keep constantly working on."

Lorenzen sprained the medial collateral ligament in his right knee against Alabama but finished the game. He is expected to play against Indiana.

Indiana and Kentucky have played the past 17 seasons. Indiana holds the overall series lead at 17, 15-1, but Kentucky has won seven of the past eight games, including a 27-17 decision last year.
