Early release denied

PRESTONSBURG — A call for mercy from one Floyd County inmate was denied in Circuit Court during motion hour Friday.

Patricia Shepherd, 30, serving two concurrent three-year sentences, submitted a pro se motion for shock probation during court proceedings, requesting another chance "to do the right thing."

"I just want to change and do the right thing for me and my kids," she tearfully told Circuit Judge John David Caudill.

Caudill, however, pointed out that her request came too late. After being formally sentenced on June 24 of last year, Shepherd only had 180 days in which to file for shock probation, he said.

"I have no choice in the matter," he told her before she returned to the holding cell.

Shepherd is serving time for fourth offense driving under the influence, operating on a suspended license and possession of drug paraphernalia. She was also charged in this case for being a second-degree persistent felony offender, a charge tacked onto previous felony offenses.

County approves nuisance ordinance

PRESTONSBURG — The Floyd County Fiscal Court meeting was well attended Friday with over 100 people showing up to weigh in on a proposed "nuisance ordinance."

Despite many objections by the public, the ordinance was passed, with only Jackie Owens voting against it.

Owens has been far from shy about the issue and shared some observations about the ordinance before the floor was opened to public comment. He pointed out

that the law would give too much power to county government and would impose harsh fees and hard-to-meet deadlines on anyone who is deemed to have an unsafe structure on his or her property. He also pointed out that the ordinance would force people to put up fences around ponds, pools and wells.

"This is a bad ordinance," Owens concluded.

Members of the public weighed in with their opinions and seemed divided on the issue. Some feared for the safety of local children who have been injured or killed by falling into open wells or dilapi-

dated structures, while others argued that the ordinance would punish those who couldn't afford, for any reason, to get the work done in a timely fashion.

Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson supports the ordinance and tried to convince those in attendance that the county had the best of intentions with it. He was very specific about protecting children from the dangers of abandoned and upkept properties and noted the responsibility of land owners.

"You should be liable for keep-

Vernotzy gets treatment instead of jail

PRESTONSBURG — Dale Vernotzy, 49, of Prestonsburg, was sentenced in circuit court Friday following his plea of guilty to four counts of first-degree sexual abuse.

Most of the details in his case were sealed, as the case involved a

minor who Vernotzy molested in May 2003.

Vernotzy, represented by Bernard Pafunda, was first thought to be incompetent to stand trial, but a hearing on the matter was held in February wherein Vernotzy was declared competent to stand trial by Circuit Judge John D. Caudill.

The sentencing saw Vernotzy

again in front of Judge Caudill, who followed the prosecution's recommendation of five years. However, that sentence will be diverted, with Vernotzy assigned to a treatment facility for the entire term.

Vernotzy will also have to complete a sex offender's program while staying at the facility, which is scheduled to be the Venture Home.

Cook admits violating probation

PRESTONSBURG — A Floyd County woman who participated in the robberies of the Allen Kwik Mart and Martin Prescription Pharmacy stipulated to violating her parole Friday.

April Leigh Cook, 24, of Mousie, could face up to five

years in prison for a complicity to commit robbery charge. She was given a five-year probated sentence on that charge in 2002.

Circuit Judge John David Caudill, referring to a report from the Probation and Parole office, said she violated the conditions of her parole when she failed to report in May to their office. Drug screening revealed the use of

methadone and marijuana in April, Caudill said, and Cook also violated her curfew in May.

She was arrested last month by the sheriff's department, when she allegedly assisted Scott Bradley, 23, of Martin, in robberies at the Allen Kwik Mart and Martin Prescription Center.

Life sentence recommended for murderer

PRESTONSBURG — A Floyd County jury that found Marcus Phillips guilty of murdering his wife, Patty Phillips, recommended Thursday night that he spend the rest of his life behind bars.

Phillips gave no reaction as the sentence was heard and quietly shuffled from the courtroom without looking at the audience, which contained Patty Phillips' family as well as Det. Jeff Crumbley, who has stayed involved in the case for the entire four years it has taken to come to trial.

Preceding the recommendation the jury got to hear from each attorney. Defense counsel Harolyn Howard asked for leniency for Phillips while Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Wayne Taylor asked for the life sentence.

"How much leniency do you think he showed Patty as he held her down?" Taylor asked jurors.

Friday morning saw Patty's family stop by the Commonwealth's Attorney's Office before making the drive back to Ohio.

"We are so thankful to the people at this office," said Patty Phillips' mother, Donna

Newton. "They have been so kind to us. The people in this area were so nice and supportive to us."

Patty's brother Bill echoed those sentiments saying, "They got justice for Patty."

"You know how it is when you have to go far from home," Bill Newton said.

"You assume that they will back because he's home, but there was none of that. They did right by Patty."

The family also had praise for Det. Crumbley, who stayed with the case for four years and often worked on it during his own time when the case was in flux.

"He had no quit," Bill Newton said. "He was like a dog with a bone."

Taylor was very pleased with the outcome. He said he had heard from many circles that the case was unwinnable, but he said noted that he had a lot of help.

"It's a rare occasion when you have law enforcement and witnesses from four different states come together and work for the same result," Taylor said.

Taylor also said he was inspired by Crumbley's dedication and noted, "He would still be here if the case hadn't finished and he will be back when the formal sentencing is done on October first."

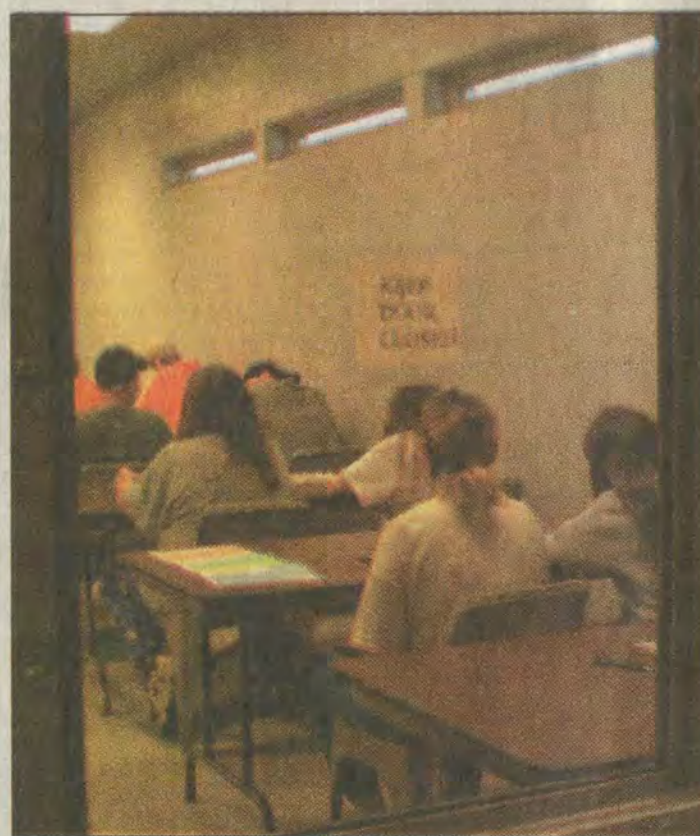

■ **WAVERLY, Neb.** — It was a ruff ride for the hitchhiker who traveled 85 miles on the back of a semitrailer truck in pouring rain, state troopers said.

Before being rescued, he was shaggy, sopping wet and wearing only a flea collar.

A motorist on Interstate 80 reported seeing a dog on the truck, troopers said.

"The truck driver didn't know anything about the dog," said trooper George Owen Jr. "He was just as shocked as anybody when he saw him."

Owen said the dog was as bit startled too.

"We took him in back and dried him off and made sure he wasn't hurt," Owen said. "He was pretty happy after that."

The driver said the mixed-breed shepherd must have hitched a ride when he stopped in Sutton, 130 miles from the driver's final destination, Omaha.

Troopers called around to local police and sheriff's offices, but so far they haven't found anyone missing a dog.

For now, the dog has found temporary lodging.

"A friend of mine has a farm and loves animals, so the dog is out there now," Owen said.

"He'll have a good home if nobody comes looking for him — or he doesn't go looking for another ride."

■ **BELOIT, Wis.** — They likely did their college searching mostly online and knew from childhood that computers suffer from viruses.

For incoming college freshmen this fall, one-hour photo processing has always been a reality, Cleveland's Rock 'n Roll Hall of Fame has always existed and there's always been a cable comedy channel.

Those are some of the findings in Beloit College's latest Mindset List designed to help faculty and staff relate to the latest crop of students — most of whom are about 17 years old and were born in 1986.

Classics Professor Art Robson, who regularly teaches in a First-Year Initiatives program for entering students, edited the list.

He noted that most of the new students were born in the year that the Chernobyl nuclear power plant melted down and the Challenger space shuttle exploded after takeoff.

It was also the time when Clint Eastwood was elected mayor of Carmel, Calif., the Soviets were bogged down for a seventh year of frustration trying to control Afghanistan and the United States was preoccupied with the Iran-Contra scandal.

■ **ELYRIA, Ohio** — James Pengov thought selling his vote would help get him out of debt. Instead it landed him in trouble with the law.

It took authorities 12 hours to hear about and stop Pengov's eBay offer of a "Presidential Vote for Sale," with a starting bid of \$50.

The 36-year-old said he was hoping to land enough money from selling his vote to pay medical bills.

"Up for auction is MY VOTE!" said Pengov's Aug. 19 posting on the online marketplace.

"Simply tell me who to vote for, after paying the auction, and it will be so. If you care, buy my vote and you will have twice the power in the upcoming election!!!!"

Pengov said he didn't know that selling a vote was illegal.

The fraud unit of the California secretary of state's office, which has been alerted to votes for sale on eBay in previous elections, came across the posting and notified Ohio authorities.

Pengov told buyers he generally votes Republican, but expressed dissatisfaction with both parties.

Hani Durzy, eBay spokesman, said the online auction service screens the 29 million listings for violations of its policies, but because 3.5 million are added daily, it relies on outside help to catch inappropriate listings.

■ **WEST PALM BEACH, Fla.** — Krispy Kreme is offering

to reward students with a doughnut for every A on their report card, but the plan seems a little flaky to some officials trying to fight childhood obesity.

Under one promotion, Krispy Kreme stores will give Palm Beach County students in kindergarten through sixth grade a free doughnut for good grades. Another program has students decorate posters of doughnuts with "success sprinkles" when children meet goals. The posters can be turned in for doughnuts.

"Krispy Kreme doughnuts are very good, especially when the 'hot' lights are on, but I can't say that there's anything healthy about them," school board member Debra Robinson said Tuesday. "Can't we find something else? I mean, a doughnut?"

Krispy Kreme doesn't track how many schools are participating. Principals decide whether to allow the doughnut posters or any other business partnership, a school district spokeswoman said.

Jackie Zepeda, Krispy Kreme spokeswoman, said she was unaware of any concern about the doughnut giveaway in light of child obesity, which has been declared an epidemic by the National Institutes of Health.

The promotion comes as 50 Palm Beach County schools start a \$1.4 million program to promote healthier lifestyles with nutrition and exercise programs. The district is also offering healthier school lunch menus.

■ **CEDARVILLE, N.J.** — In this case, police say a dead snake was more dangerous than a live one.

Michael File received several small lacerations on his back Sunday as the result of being whipped with a dead six-foot-long black snake, state police said. File, 26, wasn't wearing a shirt during the assault by Kenneth Davis, 42, authorities said.

Davis later was assaulted by File with a baseball bat, authorities said.

Police said they learned that Davis had been attempting to let the snake, which was alive when the incident began, crawl into File's residence. File's father, whose name was not available,

saw the snake approaching, stepped on it and beat it to death with a piece of wood.

Police said Davis, who had been drinking, then became angry and pushed the elder File. Michael File told Davis to leave the property, whereupon Davis picked up the snake, twirled it over his head and assaulted Michael File with it, police said.

File then grabbed a baseball bat and took aim at Davis' head, police said. Davis was treated for head lacerations.

Davis was charged with simple assault. Police Sgt. Sean Day said charges against File are likely.

■ **TUCSON, Ariz.** — Lt. Col. Martha McSally, the first female head of an Air Force fighter squadron, may have her head in the clouds — but it's her hat that has gotten her in trouble.

McSally, 38, wore a men's flight cap during her installation ceremony as head of Davis-Monthan Air Force Base's 354th Fighter Squadron in July. Wearing the men's cap, which runs straight across the forehead rather than angling down toward the eyebrows, is forbidden for women under U.S. Air Force rules.

McSally has tangled with military commanders over gender dress differences before. She previously sued the Pentagon for forcing female troops to wear Muslim garb overseas.

She won the case accusing the Defense Department of discrimination for forcing her to wear the long, black cloak worn by Muslim women when traveling off-base in Saudi Arabia. The policy was reversed.

Senior Master Sgt. Jacqueline Dean, chief of the

board which oversees the dress code, said the regulations updated in early July specifically ban women from wearing the men's flight cap.

But dress code violations are rarely punished unless they are chronic, officials said.

On Tuesday, when asked for a response from McSally, Davis-Monthan spokesman Capt. DeJon Redd said McSally was focused on leading her squadron and didn't want to address peripheral issues like the cap.

■ **BOZEMAN, Mont.** — Rancher Skip Houglund figured it was an offer he couldn't refuse: Bring in a cow, get a free frozen blended coffee beverage.

So he took Bonnie Prince Charles Edward Stuart, a Scottish Highland steer who generally goes by "Charlie," to a local Dairy Queen on Tuesday and got a free "Moolatte" as part of a corporate promotion.

Houglund brought Charlie to town from his Willow Creek ranch after reading that people who brought a living cow to any participating business would be rewarded with a free coffee-flavored Dairy Queen version of a latte.

Charlie, who is 10, was the only animal that made an appearance at any of the area outlets of the Minneapolis-based chain.

Store manager Minde Erickson said she was surprised Houglund showed up with Charlie. "It seems like a lot of work," she said.

After numerous children finished marveling at Charlie, who has short legs, shaggy red hair and long horns, Houglund put the steer back in the trailer and collected his reward.

Today's Highlight in History: On Aug. 29, 1944, 15,000 American troops marched down the Champs Elysees in Paris as the French capital continued to celebrate its liberation from the Nazis.

On this date:

■ In 1533, the last Incan King of Peru, Atahualpa, was murdered on orders of Spanish conqueror Francisco Pizarro.

■ In 1632, philosopher John Locke was born in Somerset, England.

ing your property clean," Thompson said.

The ordinance passed Friday is an amended version which softens some of the language. The rate of interest on liens placed against owners who let the county fix their structures will be lowered from 12 percent to 8 percent. The time span to have work done on eyesores will be changed to read "a reasonable amount of time" instead of five

days.

The law will not be final until it is published in The Times next week, when it should appear in the legal section on Wednesday. Though it becomes official that day, it can still be added to the ballot in November so that Floyd Countians can vote on it. This can be done by filing a petition with the County Clerk's Office asking to put the issue on the ballot in November.

Thompson also used the meeting to read a prepared statement which announced that a proposal for a construction and demolition debris landfill in the county are off the table throughout his tenure as judge-executive. Thompson cited the emotional upheaval about the project and the time it has taken from his schedule as the chief reasons for dropping the dump project.

The meeting also saw the fruits of a recent homeland security grant doled out to area fire departments and police. Voice activated pagers and radios were distributed, which will improve the communication system of those branches.

The county has also received approval for a second grant that will include upgrades for local emergency and rescue services and total \$80,000.

Fletcher: 'Rekindle the fire for education'

FRANKFORT — Gov. Ernie Fletcher floated a wide-ranging but lightly detailed education initiative Friday night to an influential audience from all corners of academe.

He said he was trying to convey a vision, not a plan. "It was a beginning to really rekindle the fire for education," Fletcher told reporters afterward.

Nearly 200 people packed the Executive Mansion for an invitation-only presentation.

The audience included university presidents, members of the Council on Postsecondary Education and state school board, leaders of the Kentucky Education Association, school administrators and education advocates.

Fletcher said it was "a good, broad spectrum of people who've been involved in education a long time."

What they heard included a call for "a second generation of systemic refinement" as a follow-up to the Kentucky Education Reform Act of 1990, lest Kentucky fail to reach its long-term education goals.

Fletcher said major themes of the evening were about increas-

ing teacher quality and teacher pay; an emphasis on early learning, including statewide, all-day kindergarten; and a role for the universities in economic development.

Fletcher also said he wanted to "eliminate the silos" of education — the separate realms of elementary and secondary schools, colleges and technical and adult education.

Left unanswered: the cost. "The big question mark," said Roger Marcum, superintendent of Marion County schools and vice president of the Kentucky Association of School Administrators.

University of Kentucky President Lee Todd said "money wasn't part of the discussion. It's going to have to be part of the discussion."

Fletcher did supply one cost estimate — the tab for raising teacher pay to the average of Kentucky's seven neighboring states — at a news conference afterward. "A hefty figure," he said, "probably to the tune of \$100 million."

Todd said Fletcher wants universities to be more deeply invested in economic development, doing more research with commercial application — a goal Todd shares. Past adminis-

Highlights of "educational vision" presented by Gov. Ernie Fletcher on Friday:

- Kentucky led nation in passing Kentucky Education Reform Act of 1990 but still lags in adults with college degrees, students who complete college. Needs "second generation of systemic refinement" to meet long-range education goals.
- Focus on performance in classroom — expanded preschool, all-day kindergarten, early diagnosis of learning disabilities.
- Improve teacher quality. Raise salaries to average of seven surrounding states, but link pay to performance.
- "Longitudinal" testing to track progress of students year to year.
- Expanded university research labs. Greater commercialization of research. Get universities more deeply involved in economic development.
- Require universities to improve teacher training, provide help for local schools.

trations have talked about it, but Fletcher's commerce secretary, Jim Host, presses the universities for action on the idea, Todd said.

Todd and University of Louisville President James Ramsey said Fletcher also wants the institutions to offer better teacher education and to do more to assist public schools in their service regions.

Outside the Executive

Mansion, Democratic Rep. Kathy Stein criticized Fletcher's presentation.

"We have no budget, but here we are at the Governor's Mansion talking about enhancing education," said Stein, of Lexington. The General Assembly adjourned in April without passing a budget. Fletcher is running state government on a "pending plan" that is being challenged in court.

Stein said she was relieved that Fletcher had not proposed school vouchers or tuition credits. In his news conference, Fletcher said he avoided the "school choice" issue because he wanted to confine himself to what was politically feasible.

Natural gas supplier says rates will increase this winter

PADUCAH, — Western Kentucky's largest supplier of natural gas said utility bills for the average residential customer will increase by about 10 percent this winter.

Atmos Energy Corp. officials said bills will amount to about \$97 a month, well below the U.S. Department of Energy's projected \$175 for gas distributors nationwide.

Atmos said bills will average a total of \$584 from October through March, up from \$531 last winter, which was warmer than usual. The \$97 figure is a per-month figure for the six-

month period.

Atmos based the estimate on current market indicators for wholesale natural gas supplies.

Changes in wholesale prices or normal winter temperatures will affect gas heating bills, the company said.

Dallas-based Atmos has about 180,000 gas customers in western and central Kentucky.

Atmos Kentucky Division President John Paris said the weather will likely be the leading factor in how much customers pay this winter.

"The tight balance between natural gas supply and demand has put upward pressure on gas prices, but we are doing every-

thing we can to deliver reliable gas supplies at stable prices," Paris said.

With market volatility and increased gas use for summer cooling, summer gas prices are much higher than in recent years, Atmos spokesman Tom Higdon said.

The Kentucky Public Service Commission says prices this summer have ranged from about \$4 to \$6 per thousand cubic feet, which is roughly the winter floor price.

Atmos is Kentucky's second-largest natural gas supplier behind Louisville Gas & Electric.

Shepherd pleaded guilty in 2002 to two counts of theft and promoting prostitution — allegedly selling a female to a Prestonsburg resident for sexual favors. She was sentenced to two years on each theft charge and 12 months for the promoting prostitution charge, but the concurrent sentences were probated for three years.

She was one of several Floyd County Detention Center inmates who were baptized at the jail last month.

Judge orders hearing for abuse suspect

PRESTONSBURG — A Floyd County man facing sexual assault charges after allegedly abusing his two minor children will participate in a competency hearing.

Circuit Judge John David Caudill granted a motion for the hearing, submitted in court Friday by public advocate Tracy Hancock on behalf of Joshua Glenn Jarvis, 23, of Prestonsburg.

Jarvis was arrested in June by the Kentucky State Police after he

allegedly made a child, his 7-year-old fourth cousin, take her clothes off and lie on a bed while he "engaged in an act of sexual gratification."

He was later charged with a second count of first-degree sexual assault after allegedly make a 6-year-old child "participate" during another act of sexual gratification.

Jarvis was staying with his cousin — the mother of four children — at the time of the alleged crimes. The father of one of the children claims that Jarvis admitted to abusing four children in the

home.

Jarvis allegedly attacked the father with a butcher knife prior to his arrest on the first sexual assault charge against him — an allegation lending him an additional charge of second-degree assault.

When Jarvis entered court Friday through the holding cell door, he wandered aimlessly past the bench and jury box and stood, staring blankly near the witness stand.

Caudill found that reason enough to grant the motion for a competency hearing.

Smoke gets in their eyes

When it comes to tobacco and smoking, state officials are just lost in a swirl of cigarette smoke.

We know of no other way to explain the sheer lunacy that guides Kentucky's policies.

For example, it's well documented that high cigarette taxes keep kids from smoking, yet state legislators are content to keep what soon becomes the nation's lowest state excise tax, a 3-cent-a-pack tax that hasn't been changed since 1970.

And despite statistic after statistic that shows how smoking-related problems kill Kentuckians and drain the medical system (\$1.17 billion in direct health care costs in Kentucky every year, according to one study), Kentucky officials have decided to do less, not more, to help smokers quit.

This year, Kentucky health officials have set aside \$3.5 million to help smokers quit and nonsmokers from taking up the habit, a whopping 26 percent reduction from last year. The decrease is occurring because the state has \$1 million less from the tobacco settlement lawsuit than it did last year and because of a \$200,000 reduction in a federal grant.

As a result, 23 local health departments in Kentucky have seen reductions in state funding this fiscal year. One of those, in Louisville, just eliminated a support group for pregnant smokers — even though nearly a quarter of pregnant women in the state smoked in 2001, running the risk of everything from stillbirths to low birth weights.

... Northern Kentucky health officials had previously indicated they were hoping for more, not less, money to help curb smoking. The agency sponsors 13-week cessation classes at four locations at a time, but those classes are routinely full.

The Northern Kentucky Independent District Health Department would not only like to set up more classes, it also wants to strengthen its prevention programs, to toughen its media campaign and to more fully examine and address the disparities in smoking rates among various population groups.

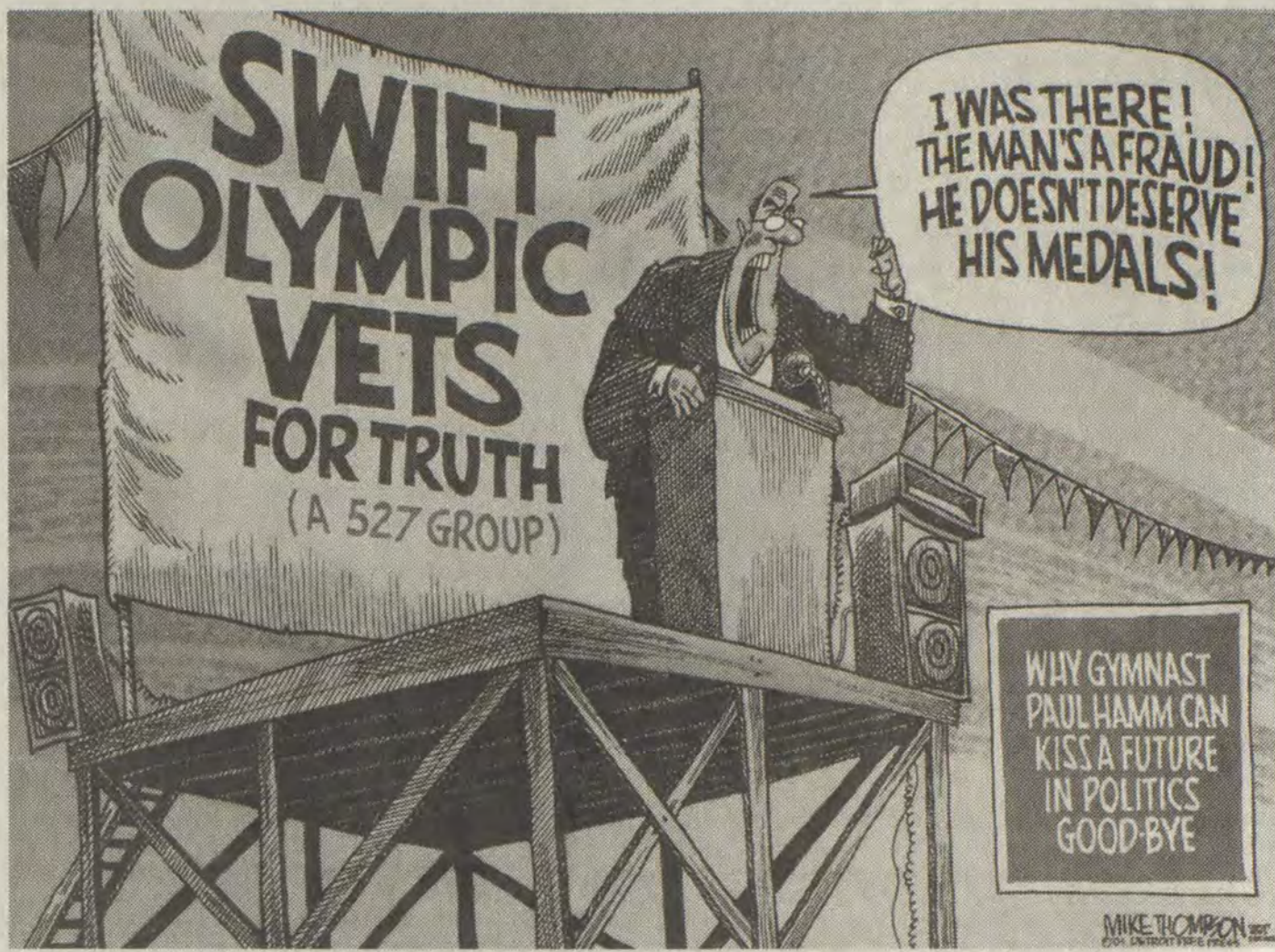
It's obvious such programs are needed.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said 32.6 percent of adults in Kentucky smoked in 2002, the highest rate in the nation. That's despite the fact that 45.6 percent of those adult smokers tried to quit.

They obviously need help.

Kentucky should raise its cigarette tax significantly, it should change Medicaid guidelines to cover smoking cessation and it should increase — not decrease — help for local health departments trying to do something about our state's smoking habit.

The Democrats 'un-American' charge

Before telling a reporter to "shove it" late last month, Teresa Heinz Kerry complained that there were "creeping, un-Pennsylvanian and sometimes un-American traits" to the presidential campaign. Few people outside of Wilkes-Barre care much about the epithet "un-Pennsylvanian," but in dropping the "un-American" bomb she highlighted an important truth about today's politics: It is the Democrats who routinely question the GOP's patriotism, not the other way around.



This makes for a fascinating stew of cognitive dissonance, transference and probably odd psychological maladies yet to be identified and labeled. It's not easy to question the patriotism of people you are denouncing for questioning people's patriotism — but Democrats manage it.

Wes Clark personifies the art form. He gets so angry at Republicans allegedly questioning his patriotism, his head nearly explodes. "This flag is ours! And nobody will take it away from us," he

shouted at the Democratic Convention. What is it Nietzsche once said? "No one is such a liar as the indignant man." Or such a hypocrite.

Clark based most of his primary campaign on questioning President Bush's patriotism. He said of Bush's landing on an aircraft carrier, "I don't think it's patriotic." He said that Bush had failed to do his duty to protect the country, and "if you're patriotic, you do your duty." He said of Iraq, "I don't think it was a patriotic war."

Clark has plenty of company. At a Democratic event, Michael Moore belittled of Republicans: "They are not patriots. They are hate-triots." Ted Kennedy denounced "false patriots," and Howard Dean criticized those who fly "under a banner of false patriotism." The implicit message from both was clear: Republicans aren't true patriots.

This fits a pattern. Back in May, Teresa Heinz Kerry called Dick Cheney "unpatriotic." New York Rep. Nita Lowey has called Republicans "unpatriotic" for cutting taxes. Howard Dean, again, has said that Attorney General John Ashcroft "is not a patriot."

Given the nature of their incendiary charges against Bush, Democrats are almost forced into questioning his patriotism. If Bush really lied the country into a war of choice to boost his own political fortunes, he is a treasonous scoundrel. If the Bush administration creates terror alerts to provide itself political cover, as Dean thinks, it is an unpatriotic monstrosity. If Bush is a "fascist" — as Dean and prominent environmental activist Robert Kennedy Jr. recently suggested — he is un-American.

Indeed, it makes sense for Democrats to pretend that the debate is all about whether they are patriotic. To that challenge they can simply answer, "Yes, we are — next question." This was the flag-waving, reporting-for-duty approach of Sen. Kerry at the Democratic National Convention. But that's not the issue. It is whether the Democrats have a tough and serious national-security policy, a much more difficult question for them to answer.

If Democrats want to question Republicans' patriotism, that's their business. They just shouldn't pretend that they are the victims of the kind of assault they themselves are launching.

'Star Wars' and 'No Child' both phony

There are few things more powerful than a bad idea whose time has come. Take the president's missile defense system. Please.

Last week, President Bush brought up the subject to a friendly Pennsylvania crowd:

"I think those who oppose this ballistic missile system really don't understand the threats of the 21st century," he said. "They're living in the past. We're living in the future. We're going to do what's necessary to protect this country."

It's amazing the way he can make his failures sound like successes.

The missile defense system has been a boondoggle from the outset. It has never passed a realistic test; the General Accounting Office recently criticized its tests as "repetitive and scripted." Moreover, it has been hideously expensive, with \$130 billion already spent and \$53 billion planned for the next five years (with cost overruns sure to follow).

Yet the president is determined to start deploying this "defense system" in a few months, in time for the November election. Even as we speak, the Pentagon is preparing to start lowering interceptor missiles into silos in Alaska and California and declare the system operational.

A group of 49 retired generals and admirals have issued a statement urging the president to put a hold on his startup

plans. They instead suggest that he spend the money (\$3.7 billion) to defend our vulnerable borders, ports and nuclear facilities, for which we have done little to protect from terrorist attack.

The criticism has fallen on deaf ears. Maybe he should stop living in the future and try the present for a while.

Another of the president's bogus success stories is his "No Child Left Behind" program. He brags about it all the time.

The program was launched with bi-partisan support and much hoopla a few years ago, the idea being that the federal government was going to enforce stringent minimum standards of performance on America's schools. Students would be tested and schools that didn't produce enough successful students would be warned and eventually punished, perhaps closed.

It was a lousy idea from the get-go. It's based on the concept that bad schools occur because their staffs are lazy or incompetent. You can find examples of that but it has been my experience that bad schools are the product of a variety of malign social forces that the schools are powerless to affect — poverty, drugs, mindless violence, social chaos and parental abandonment among them. The result is the flight of good, experienced teachers and administrators to a more welcoming atmosphere and a legacy of despair for the people left behind.

I don't have a magic bullet that will solve the problems of our nation's failing schools, but I'm pretty sure punishment ain't it. That will only increase the demoralization of teachers who are doing

their best in the face of brutal odds.

One aspect of the campaign that Mr. Bush clearly seems to be winning, however, is food-pandering. A few weeks ago, while in Iowa, the president bit into an ear of uncooked Iowa corn and said: "This corn is so good you can eat it raw." (This is the rough equivalent of visiting a bean farm and saying: "These beans are so good you can shove them up your nose.")

He followed that, in Philadelphia, by ordered a "cheese steak" sandwich and, saying: "A lot of people are wondering why I'm coming so much; it ought to be obvious to you. I like my cheese steak Whiz with," a reference to South Philadelphians' disgusting habit of slathering steak sandwiches with Cheez Whiz. (A year ago John Kerry had made the mistake of ordering Swiss cheese on his cheese steak, reminding people of the time Sargent Shriver, the Democratic vice-presidential candidate, strode into a working class bar on the campaign trail and said: "Drinks are on me, and I'll have a Courvoisier, bartender.")

The American voter will forgive a candidate a lot of things, but a sophisticated palate isn't one of them.

Non-religious Americans are increasingly important for the Democrats' coalition

After years of talk about the centrality of conservative Protestants and Catholics in the Republican Party coalition, an opposite factor is gaining wider notice: the Democrats' reliance upon non-religious voters.

"Seculars have become an increasing portion of the Democratic electoral coalition and especially of the party's activist base," says Geoffrey Layman of the University of Maryland, author of "The Great Divide: Religious and Cultural Conflict in American Party Politics." The trend originated in 1972 and had become obvious to political scientists by 1992, he says.

A religiously linked values clash is redefining U.S. politics, according to Louis Bolce and Gerald De Maio of City University of New York. And if Republicans

are labeled the party of religious traditionalists, they assert, "the Democrats with equal validity, can be called the secularist party."

A University of Akron poll of 4,000 adults this spring showed that those with no religious affiliation are 17 percent of self-identified Democrats, rivaling the party's traditional blocs of white Catholics (18 percent) and black Protestants (16 percent). The secularists favored John Kerry over George W. Bush by 57.4 percent to 27.2 percent (with the rest backing others or undecided).

The Akron polling since 1992 is particularly useful because samples are large and interviewers press for specifics on affiliation rather than vague religious identifications. (The 2004 margin of error was plus or minus 2 percentage points.)

A Pew Research Center poll of 1,512 adults, reported Tuesday, showed more Americans see the Republican Party as "generally friendly to religion" (52 percent

than the Democratic Party (40 percent). Among blacks, only 28 percent saw the Republicans as faith-friendly and among Republicans, only 27 percent saw the Democrats as friendly.

Political scientists say polls that correlate religious behavior or belief with party alignment indicate the "God gap" is more significant than most factors, including the much-touted gender gap.

Similarly, scholars' surveys of delegates to the parties' 2000 conventions found contrasts on weekly worship attendance (59 percent for Republican delegates, 35 percent for Democrats), expressing "a great deal" of reliance upon religion (41 percent for Republicans, 23 percent for Democrats) and conservative beliefs about the Bible (54 percent for Republicans, 26 percent for Democrats).

Appeals court sets broader standard in grandparent visitation cases

LOUISVILLE — The Kentucky Court of Appeals on Friday set a new standard for deciding when grandparents may have visitation rights with their grandchildren over objections of the parents.

The old standard, requiring "clear and convincing evidence" that the child would be harmed by a loss of a grandparent's visitation, is "unnecessarily strict and unworkable," the court said.

Among other things, "it does not adequately take into account a situation where visitation is withheld by the parents out of vindictiveness," the court said in an opinion by Judge Julia Tackett of Lexington.

Henceforth, a grandparent must prove — although still by

clear and convincing evidence — that visitation would be in the child's best interest, Tackett's opinion said.

Judges should consider a "broad array of factors" when deciding whether the child's best interest is being served, the opinion said.

The court took the unusual step of having all 13 sitting judges decide the case. Cases are usually decided by three-judge panels.

The case stems from a dispute involving a Metcalfe County family.

Bobby Vibbert Jr., and his wife, Laura, refused to let their son see his grandfather, Bobby Vibbert Sr., and his step-grandmother, Dorothy.

The elder Vibbert won visitation rights from a domestic relations commissioner, who said

"common sense dictates" the

child would be harmed by lack of contact with his grandfather after they spent so much time together.

That ruling was upheld in Metcalfe County Circuit Court. On appeal, the parents said the grandfather had not met the requirement for "clear and convincing" proof.

The appeals court vacated the decision and returned the case to circuit court.

"We believe that a modified 'best interest' standard can be used in cases where grandparent visitation is sought," Tackett said.

Factors to be determined include:

- The nature and stability of the relationship between child and grandparent and the amount of time spent together.

- Potential detriments and benefits to the child and effect

on the child's relationship with its parents if visitation is granted.

- Stability of the child's living arrangements.

- Wishes of the child.

- Emotional health of the parents and grandparents.

Tackett wrote that "fit parents" still held a "superior right" to make decisions for their children, including who may visit them.

"A fit parent's decision must be given deference by the courts, and courts considering the issue must presume that a fit parent's decision is in the child's best interest," Tackett said.

In other cases, the court:

- Upheld dismissal of a lawsuit by three Winchester residents against the city, its utility commission and Kroger Co. The taxpayer suit challenged a con-

tract under which Kroger, using public revenue bonds, built a wastewater lagoon, with the city footing the bill for its operation.

Clark County Circuit Court ruled that the agreement might have been a "bad bargain" for the city but was lawful. Without proof of fraud, the appeals court said it agreed.

- Upheld dismissal of a wrongful-death suit against Perry County in the suicide of a jail inmate, Herman Holbrook, in 1994. A lower court ruled the county was protected by the constitutional doctrine of sovereign immunity.

- Affirmed a robbery conviction for a Fayette County man who claimed he should have had a competency hearing after his trial judge was warned that he was "excessively religious."

Fayette Milton Vanderford

used a crowbar to rob a service station. After his arrest, his attorney complained that Vanderford was not helping him prepare for trial. "Every time he broached the subject, Vanderford would tell him that God would 'deliver' him," the appellate ruling said.

Vanderford rejected a plea offer of five years in prison because "he believed God would not permit him to be sentenced to more than one year." He was sentenced to 18 years.

Non-religious

Moreover, Bolce observes, some Americans aren't just non-religious but anti-religious. Surveys have shown hostility toward evangelical and fundamentalist Protestants among a segment of Democrats, including more than half the party's 1992 convention delegates. He likens this to anti-Catholic bias from the 1850s through the 1920s, except that this time "it's more a prejudice of the educated classes."

Since America's secular ranks are growing, the trend might seem to help the Democrats. In National Opinion Research Center surveys during 2002, 13.8 percent answered "none" when asked their current religion, compared with 6.3 percent in 1991.

But overt appeals to secularists could backfire, Layman

says, because blacks are more devout than other Americans and the Democrats also need some support from churchgoing Catholics and white Protestants.

Last year Amy Sullivan, a former aide to Sen. Tom Daschle, complained in a Washington Monthly article that Democratic leaders worried so much about "their core base of secularists and religious minorities" that they shunned religious appeals, thus undercutting "any chance of building a sustainable electoral coalition."

Sullivan thinks in 2004 the Democrats are finding "ways to acknowledge the importance of religion," luring religious moderates without alienating non-religious supporters.

One sign of the new emphasis came the Friday before the party's Boston convention when

chairman Terry McAuliffe named Brenda Bartella Peterson, a Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) minister, as the Democratic National Committee's first religious outreach staffer within memory. McAuliffe said this reflected Democrats' "commitment to reaching all people of faith."

But Peterson resigned less than two weeks later, after the conservative Catholic League pointed out that Peterson had joined a legal brief asking the Supreme Court to remove "under God" from the Pledge of Allegiance. Peterson is now organizing religious opposition to the proposed ban on gay marriages and civil unions in Kentucky.

She says Akron-type polling overstates secularism's impact because many Americans are

personally religious but "far more dedicated to acting out their faith" through politics than by church involvement.

In practical terms that's precisely the problem for Democrats, says John C. Green, an expert on religious factors in politics who runs the Akron surveys. Unlike Republicans networking at weekly worship or with other groups or listening to religious broadcasts, the unchurched voters "are much harder to find and organize," he says. Worse yet, they're less likely to vote.

To Bolce, the Democrats' new religious rhetoric doesn't

alter the fact that the two parties have become markedly different on disputes that divide secularists and religious traditionalists. He and De Maio rated U.S. senators' records the past decade from 0 to 10 in voting on matters like abortion, homosexuality and aid for religious schools.

Republicans had an average of 0.95 and Democrats 8.9 on their secularism scale. John Kerry scored a perfect 10, as did John Edwards once he joined the Senate. Zell Miller, the Democratic turncoat that Republicans named as their convention keynoter last week, scored zero.

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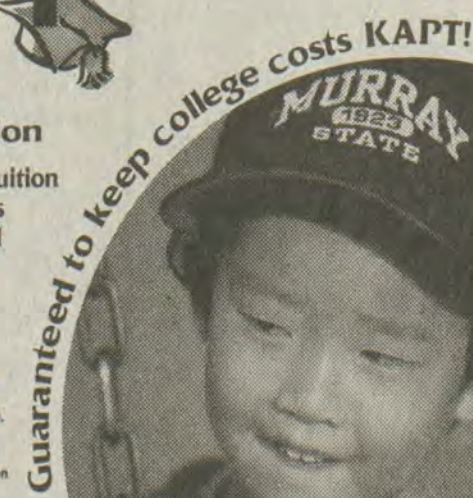

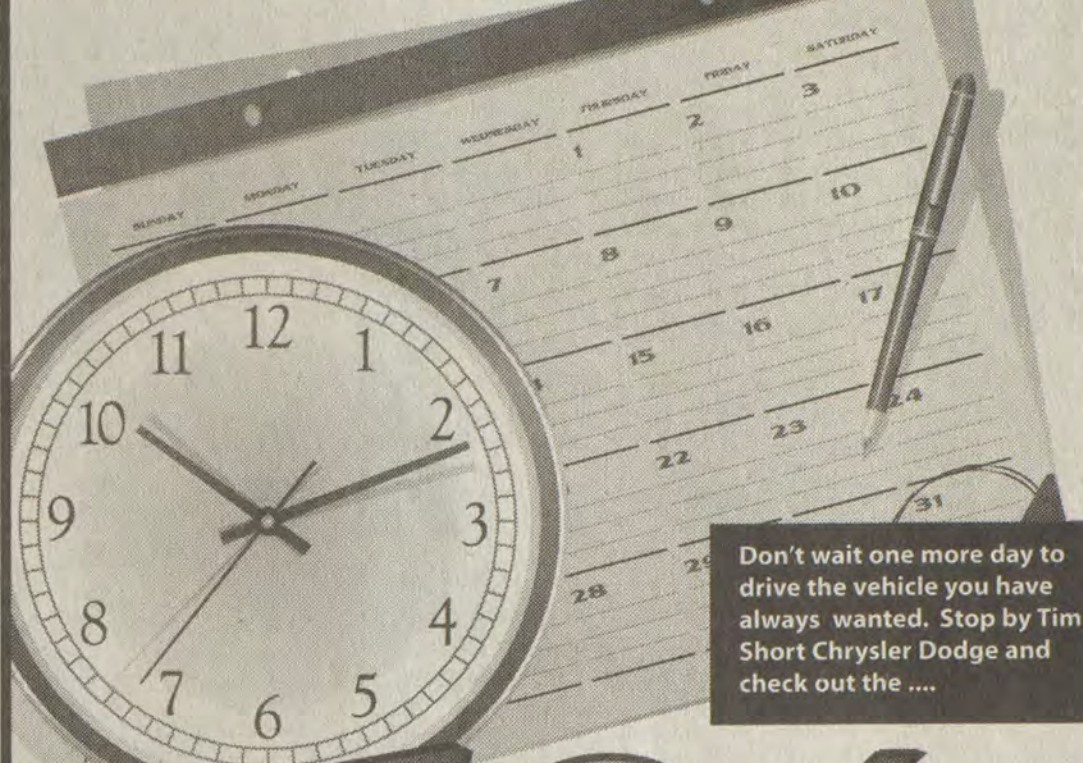

Family learns accused killer lives in nearby nursing home

ELKHORN CITY — Fifteen-year-old Danielle Perry was alarmed when she learned last week that a man accused of killing her father two years ago is now living less than a mile from some of her family members in Pike County.

Ernest Childers, 68, of Marrowbone, moved into a nursing home at Elkhorn City after a judge found him incompetent to stand trial and dismissed the murder charge against him in May.

Danielle Perry was among eight witnesses who said they saw Childers shoot her father, Clifford Perry, in front of a Marrowbone church in 2002. Danielle Perry still lives in the nearby home of her immediate family.

"I think it's wrong," Perry said of the ruling that freed Childers.

Childers is living in Elkhorn City at the Mountain View Nursing Home, less than one mile from the home of Clifford Perry's sister, Carolyn Cantrell.

"It's just a regular nursing home — they have no security up there," Cantrell said. "It's putting our family at risk."

Pike County Commonwealth's Attorney Rick Bartley said the murder charge had to be dropped after the ruling on Childers' competency.

"There became, at that time,

some question as to his competency to stand trial," Bartley said. "It had to do with his behavior."

Court documents said Childers was "very delusional and paranoid, stating that he was Jesus Christ." Doctors said Childers was incompetent and that he wasn't likely to become competent in the foreseeable future.

Childers was sent to the Kentucky Correctional Psychiatric Center in La Grange, where he was treated for several months on two separate occasions. In between those visits, Bartley had worked out a plea agreement with Childers.

Childers had agreed to plead guilty to killing Perry in exchange for a 10-year prison sentence. But Perry's family thought Childers should spend more time in prison and opposed the agreement.

Bartley said he did not pursue it out of respect for their wishes. "They said, 'We'll take that chance,' and I said 'OK,'" Bartley said.

Childers, who returned to Pike County in May, declined to comment on the matter through an employee at the nursing home.

Under Kentucky state law, people who are found incompetent to stand trial must have all charges dismissed. Those people are then referred to an involuntary hospitalization hearing.

But the requirements are very strict to hospitalize someone against his or her will, and if

they aren't met, that person is set free.

Childers is not the first mur-

der suspect to be freed after being found incompetent for trial.

"We have one of these cases about every two years," Bartley said.

State plans charges against Harlan County coal operator

FRANKFORT — The state plans to charge the owner of a Harlan County coal company that ordered employees to work in an area that was closed when inspectors found what they said was an unsafe roof.

The coal operator would be the first in Kentucky to face charges since the state's system of prosecuting mine-safety violators was overhauled in 2001, said Tony Opegard, lawyer for the Office of Mine Safety and Licensing. Opegard would not identify the owner.

Officials with the coal company, Highlands Mining and Processing Co., did not return calls seeking comment.

State mining regulators temporarily shut down Highlands Mining's underground mine in Cumberland on Aug. 4 for failing to comply with an order to fix unsafe roof conditions. The order came after a routine mine inspection revealed the need for additional bolts to support the roof.

State inspectors later found that company officials had ordered employees to work in an area of the mine that was closed because of the safety concerns and that the roof had not been reinforced as ordered.

Opegard told the Kentucky Mining Board Thursday that the owner admitted to investigators that he ordered three miners into

the closed area. The owner could face fines of up to \$10,000 for each violation.

Fifty-five cases, many with multiple defendants, have been brought by the Mine Safety and Licensing office before the state Mine Safety Review Commission in the past three years. The commission acts as a court in deciding cases before it.

Opegard also said he would file a case against the mine company, a charge that carries a possible penalty equal to the revenue a company generates in a 10-day period.

LOUISVILLE – Another fall tennis season will likely bring with it a busy slate for University of Louisville student-athlete Jeremy Clark. Quite possibly the greatest high school tennis player to ever come out of Floyd County, Clark, a graduate of Prestonsburg High School, made a splash on the University of Louisville men's tennis team in the fall of 2002, going 5-4 in singles play with wins over players from Austin Peay, Evansville, Eastern Kentucky, Wright State and West Virginia. During that first season, Clark teamed with Josh Surowski for a 2-2 doubles record.

In the fall of 2003, Clark posted an 8-5 record and advanced to the Flight 'A' finals

of the Louisville Fall Invitational. He went 6-2 in doubles and was named to the Dean's List and Athletic Director's honor roll.

Clark and his doubles partner were ranked in the top-25 in doubles for much of the spring.

In high school, Clark had an unbelievable run, posting a 121-4 record in his high school career. He was ranked as the No. 1 U16 player in Kentucky. The four-time regional champion was a two-time all-stater and ranked in the top 200 in the United States U16.

He was the Boys 16 Southern Open Champion and competed in the USTA Super National Hard Court Championships in Kalamazoo, Mich. He was a Kentucky Governor's Scholar and continues to keep

up in the classroom.

Louisville men's tennis coach Rex Ecarma has signed a new contract, ensuring his presence with the Cardinals until June of 2009.

"We're very excited about everything that's happening in men's tennis," said U of L Associate Athletic Director, Julie Hermann. "Coach Ecarma is an outstanding leader of our program and continues to take us to the next level. It was very important to us to show our commitment to him as he has been so dedicated to the University and the program."

Clark has already picked up much knowledge from the U of L coach.

The Cardinals finished the 2004 season with a 19-9 record, an at-large bid to the NCAA regionals and is currently in the

midst of a 28-match home winning streak. Ecarma has led the Cardinals to three NCAA appearances since 1998 and under his guidance, the team was ranked as high as No. 30 in the Intercollegiate Tennis Association national rankings. Several singles players and doubles teams have also been ranked among the top in the nation in Ecarma's 14-year career. The 2000 Conference USA Coach of the Year led Louisville to a league championship in 2000 and runner-up finish in 1998.

After playing for the Cardinals from 1983-87, Ecarma was named head coach in 1990. With 200 wins, he is the winningest men's tennis coach in program history. Ecarma is among elite company, being one

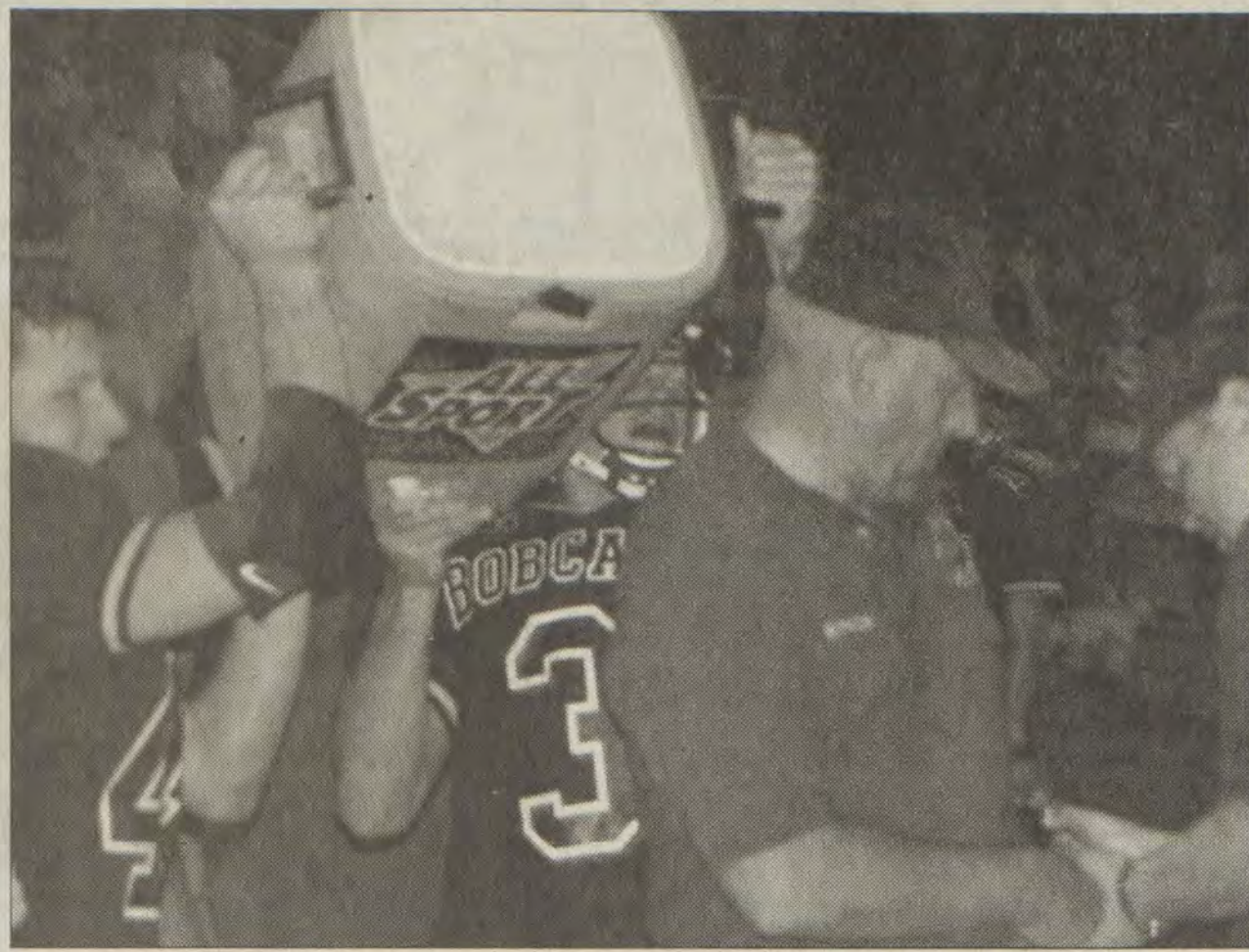

Ken Griffey Sr., Bob Howsam, Will White selected for Reds Hall of Fame

CINCINNATI — All-Star outfielder Ken Griffey Sr., 19th-century pitcher Will White and front office executive Bob Howsam will be inducted into the Cincinnati Reds Hall of Fame during ceremonies prior to Sunday's 1:15 p.m. game against the Arizona Diamondbacks.

The trio was chosen by the Cincinnati chapter of the Baseball Writers' Association of America. Their inductions will bring to 64 the number of former managers, players and front office executives enshrined in the club's Hall of Fame.

Griffey, 54, was a 19-year Major League veteran and three-time All-Star right fielder for the Big Red Machine who helped produce World Series championships in Cincinnati in 1975 and 1976 by hitting .305 and .336 (2nd in the NL), respectively. Originally selected by the Reds in the 29th round of the June 1969 free-agent draft, he became a full-time player for the Reds during the 1975 season and over the next seven years appeared with the Reds in 3 National League Championship Series and two World Series.

Griffey finished his Major League career with a .296 batting average, 152

homers and 200 stolen bases in 2,097 games. He hit .303 in 1,224 games for Cincinnati, hit at least one homer against every club except Cleveland, 6 times hit at least .300 and 3 times recorded at least 20 stolen bases in a season. In 1980, Griffey was voted the Reds' Most Valuable Player after hitting .294 with 23 steals in 146 games. He spent 5 seasons on the Reds' Major League coaching staff, most recently in 2001, and since then has worked for the club as a special assistant to the general manager.

White spent 8 of his 10 Major League seasons playing in Cincinnati, from 1878-80 and again from 1882-86. In his career White went 229-166 with a 2.28 ERA, 394 complete games and 36 shutouts in 401 starts and two relief appearances. He made all but five of those appearances for the Reds, except for three starts for Boston in 1877 and two starts for Detroit in 1881. In records that include all players since 1876, White is the Reds' all-time leader in victories (227), losses (163), complete games (389), shutouts (35), ERA (2.25), games started (396) and innings pitched (3,497.2). His career ERA of 2.28 ranks 10th all-time in baseball history.

White, the first Major Leaguer to wear eye glasses, won at least 30 games five times and led the American

Association in victories with 40 in 1882 and 43 in 1883. During his career White also led the league in winning percentage (40-12, .769, 1882), appearances (76, 1879), complete games twice (75 in 1879, 52 in 1882), shutouts 3 times (eight in 1882, six in 1883, seven in 1884), innings pitched twice (680 in 1879, 480 in 1882) and ERA (2.09 in 1883). Because he pitched in an era of underhand pitching, similar to today's fastpitch softball motion, White rarely had a sore arm. In 1879, he completed all 75 of his starts. White's best season was in 1882, when he went 40-12 with a 1.54 ERA, 52 complete games and eight shutouts in 54 starts and 480 innings. That season he led the American Association in wins, winning percentage, complete games, shutouts and innings pitched.

Howsam, 86, universally is recognized as the architect of the Big Red Machine. He was the club's general manager from 1967-78 and again from 1983-84, but he also served as president and chief operating officer from 1973-78 and 1983-85. Under Howsam's direction, the Reds were baseball's dominant team in the 1970s, a decade during which they won 6 Western Division titles, four National League pennants and World Series championships in 1975 and 1976. That team's starting lineup of Johnny Bench, Tony Perez, Joe Morgan, Dave Concepcion, Pete Rose, George Foster, Cesar Geronimo and Griffey earned 63 All-Star selections, six Most Valuable Player awards and 26 Gold Gloves.

While he was known as one of baseball's most shrewd traders, Howsam also was credited with making the Reds' minor league system one of the strongest in the game. In 1973, he was named Major League Executive of the Year by The Sporting News.

While presiding over the team's move from Crosley Field to Riverfront

Three convicted of illegally baiting field to lure doves

LOUISVILLE — The owners of a Henderson County hunting club have been convicted of baiting a field with seeds to attract doves.
Jack Strassweg, 63, of Corydon, Ky., and Rick Krohn, 44, of Newburgh, Ind., were convicted in U.S. District Court in Owensboro of hunting doves over a baited field in 2002. Clifford Romain, 60, also of Corydon in Henderson County, was convicted of aiding and abetting them.
The men each face a \$500 fine, according to the U.S. Attorney's office in Louisville.

The convictions were returned last week but weren't announced until Tuesday by the U.S. Attorney's office.
The defendants are owners of the High Ground Hunting Club, which covers 1,950 acres in Henderson County.
The convictions come a week before dove season reopens in Kentucky.
Mark Marraccini, spokesman for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, said he was not familiar with the Henderson County case, but

said the baiting tactics allegedly used sounded typical.
"There should be no reason to ever bait doves," Marraccini said in a phone

interview. "There are plenty of legal ways to prepare an area that will not only be attractive to doves — and give you a place to hunt — but to all kinds of wildlife."
Calls seeking comment from the defendants' attorneys, W. Mitchell Deep of Henderson and Richard Horne of Mobile, Ala., were not immediately returned.
According to testimony at the trial, large amounts of wheat seeds were put in a field at the hunting club — two days before the opening of dove hunting season in

2002, the U.S. Attorney's office said. The seeds were disced under on the first day of hunting, according to testimony.
Strassweg testified that the heavy concentrations of seed were due to a broken seed spreader, the U.S. Attorney's office said.
The judge found that the concentration of seeds constituted a "baited" field, and that it was unlawful to hunt over the field until the seeds were cleaned up and 10 days had passed.
Krohn had shot eight doves and Strassweg two doves when they were apprehended, prosecutors said.
State and federal fish and wildlife officials investigated the case.

Dove hunting season in Kentucky reopens Sept. 1 and continues through Oct. 24, Marraccini said. An abbreviated hunt will run Nov. 25-30.
He said it's fine to hunt in sown fields — "as long as you don't put your seeds out there in big piles and as long as you don't overseed it."
"There are a whole lot more hunters out there who hunt and take doves legally than who use bait to do it," he said. "But do people bait doves? Yes, they do. It occurs every dove season."

LaRue is Reds' most-hit player

CINCINNATI — Jason LaRue doesn't have the most hits among Cincinnati Reds players, but he is the most-hit by far.

LaRue has been hit by a pitch 19 times this year. Ryan Freel, with 10, is the only other Reds player in double-digits.

Last season, LaRue was hit 20 times, tying the club record set by Frank Robinson in 1956.

"I have no idea why I get hit so much," LaRue said Thursday. "I stand in the same place an ordinary guy does. I'm not closer to the plate than other people."

As a catcher, LaRue encounters more contact than most players. But he denies that he gets hit more often because he's more willing to take the hit.

"It's not fun at any point in time getting hit by a 90-plus mile an hour fastball," LaRue said. "The majority of the time, where they throw the ball, it's basically impossible to get out of the way."

"It seems every time I've gotten hit, they're usually throwing me up and in, around my shoulders or where my hands are, and sometimes that's one of the hardest spots to get out of the way of. I know for me it is."

Still, LaRue — an avid hunter whose favorite attire includes camouflage shirts and caps — bolsters his

tough-guy image with his willingness to take the hit or block the plate at all costs.

"That's the way the game's supposed to be played," he said. "That's the way I was taught to play the game, and that's how I always play the game."

"You're going to take your bumps and bruises, you're going to get hit by pitches. I'm going to get run over at the plate."

The very attitude it takes to be a catcher, some would say.

Harang gets three-hit shutout over Cards

CINCINNATI — A computer glitch left Aaron Harang slightly disoriented. He had the St. Louis Cardinals baffled, too.

Harang threw a three-hitter for his first career complete game and Sean Casey homered to lead the Cincinnati Reds over St. Louis 1-0 Thursday night.

A computer virus prevented scoreboard displays of rosters, linescores and individual statistics at Great American Ball Park.

"Without the scoreboard on, I didn't even realize what inning we were in," Harang said. "Maybe I'll have them turn it off next time."

Chris Carpenter (13-5) also pitched a three-hitter and struck out 11 for the Cardinals, but he wound up with a tough loss. Casey hit the first pitch from Carpenter into the right-field bullpen with two outs in the sixth inning for his 21st homer.

"He pitched just as good a game as Harang," Cardinals manager Tony La Russa said. "He'd like to have that one pitch back."

Cincinnati took two of three from the Cardinals, who had won eight straight series since dropping two of three games July 23-25 at home against San Francisco. It was only the second series they've lost since June.

Harang (8-6) had lost three straight starts, including a 10-5 defeat at St. Louis on Aug. 16. He struck out six and walked one.

Carpenter, who walked only one, had won his past four deci-

sions. St. Louis lost for only the fifth time in his last 21 starts since April 23. He entered with the lowest run support among Cardinals starters at 4.1 runs per game.

"Carpenter was nasty, and so was Harang," Casey said.

"We just had the feeling that nobody was going to hit Harang tonight. To tell you the truth, we kind of had that feeling with Carpenter, too."

Carpenter's first double-digit strikeout game of the season also was his first complete game since July 29, 2002, with Toronto at Kansas City. He lost that game as well.

The right-hander finished one shy of his career high for strikeouts set Sept. 4, 2001, against the New York Yankees.

Harang was backed by excellent defense in the eighth inning, when Austin Kearns denied Edgar Renteria at least a double on a diving catch in right field.

"That was the lone pitch I left up," Harang said. "I saw Kearns going after it and thought, 'Please make this play.'"

Kearns said he momentarily lost the ball in the lights, but recovered and was fully extended to make the catch.

On the next play, third baseman Felipe Lopez made a diving catch of a grounder to throw out Reggie Sanders.

"They played a strong defensive game behind Harang," La Russa said. "Give them credit. We

made contact a few times. We didn't hit too many pitches hard."

With one out to go, after Larry Walker singled, Cincinnati manager Dave Miley was booed when he went to the mound to talk to Harang.

"I was hoping he was going to tell me to go get 'em," Harang said. "He just asked me how I was feeling."

Miley was cheered as he left the mound, and Harang got the final out by getting Albert Pujols on a grounder to shortstop.

Cincinnati went 5-14 against the Cardinals this season.

"They beat us up so bad this year, to get a series from them is huge," Casey said.

Notes: Casey is 18-for-53 (.340) with five homers in his last 14 games. ... The Cardinals canceled batting practice. La Russa said he sometimes does that when the team has a late-night flight. ... St. Louis 2B Tony Womack returned to the starting lineup after being held out Wednesday with a slight groin problem. He had a pinch-hit single Wednesday and a leadoff single Thursday night to extend his hitting streak to a season-high 12 games. He had two of the three hits off Harang. ... Reds SS Barry Larkin started for only the fifth time since leaving a game July 27 at Pittsburgh with a strained left oblique muscle. ... Cardinals slugger Jim Edmonds failed to reach base safely, ending a 47-game streak that dated to June 29.

Marshall's Hill selected as one of 22 for Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award

LOUISVILLE — Marshall University's Stan Hill is one of twenty-two outstanding senior quarterbacks that have been selected as candidates for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, presented annually to the nation's top senior collegiate quarterback by the Frank Camp Chapter of the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Educational Foundation.

Hill, a senior from Oxford, Miss., passed for 1,767 yards and 15 touchdowns last season, despite missing more than six games with a knee injury. His quarterback rating of 165.9 was the second highest in the nation last year and his completion percentage of 69.6% ranked 4th-nationally.

Included among the elite list of candidates for the award are: Derek Anderson (Oregon State), Brock Berlin (Miami, Fla.), Jason Campbell (Auburn), Timmy Chang (Hawaii), Darian Durant (North Carolina), Charlie Frye (Akron), David Greene (Georgia), Gino Guidugli (Cincinnati), Stan Hill (Marshall), Matt Jones (Arkansas), James Kilian (Tulsa), Stefan Lefors (Louisville), Rasheed Marshall (West Virginia), Zack Mills (Penn State), Craig Ochs (Montana), Dan Orlovsky (Connecticut), Kyle Orton (Purdue), Bryan Randall (Virginia Tech), Chris Rix (Florida State), Andrew Walter (Arizona State), Jason White (Oklahoma), and Danny Wimpine (Memphis). Additional candidates could be added at a later date if their performance dictates inclusion.

The nation's top senior quarterback is selected for the award from a list compiled by a select committee of football experts from across the United States. The

committee will choose five finalists plus any ties and announce the list on Oct. 20.

The 2004 recipient will be announced Dec. 1, with the award presentation to be made in Louisville on December 10 at the Clarion Conference Center.

The prestigious award bears the name of who many refer to as the finest quarterback to ever play the game of football. Established in 1987, the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award has previously honored 14 outstanding young men.

USC quarterback Carson Palmer won the award last year. Other past recipients include Don McPherson (Syracuse, 1987), Rodney Peete (USC, 1988), Tony Rice (Notre Dame, 1989), Craig Erickson (Miami, Fla., 1990), Casey Weldon (Florida St., 1991), Gino Torretta (Miami, Fla., 1992), Charlie Ward (Florida St., 1993), Jay Barker (Alabama, 1994), Tommie Frazier (Nebraska, 1995), Danny Wuerffel (Florida, 1996), Payton Manning (Tennessee, 1997), Cade McNown (UCLA, 1998), Chris Redman (Louisville, 1999), Chris Weinke (Florida State, 2000), David Carr (Fresno State, 2001), and Carson Palmer (USC, 2002).

In addition to honoring a player with the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, the Frank Camp Chapter of the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Educational Foundation has awarded more than \$500,000 in scholarships to deserving scholar athletes from area high schools. The organization was formerly associated with the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame. The Transamerica Insurance and Investment Group, a leading provider of innovative business and personal finan-

cial services, is a major corporate sponsor for the award and organization as well as Southwest Airlines, the official airline for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Educational Foundation. The namesake of the award has a storied history which has earned him the recognition of being the greatest quarterback to ever play in the NFL.

An 18-year veteran of the NFL, Unitas played his collegiate career at the University of Louisville (1951-54), passing for 3,007 yards and 27 touchdowns. Unitas, who wore number 19 as a professional, had his No. 16 collegiate uniform retired at Louisville, the lone number retired by the Cardinals.

He began his 18-year pro career with the Baltimore Colts in 1956 and played there until joining the San Diego Chargers for his final season. His career passing figures are mind boggling. He completed 2,830 of 5,186 passes for 40,239 yards and 290 touchdowns during his 18-year NFL career. Among his many records is one that may stand forever, throwing a touchdown pass in 47 consecutive games.

Unitas was selected as the top quarterback of all-time by the Pro Football Hall of Fame 36-member selection committee. In commemorating the NFL's 25th, 50th and 75th anniversaries, he was also honored as the greatest quarterback of all time. A Pro Bowl participant 10 times and a three-time Most Valuable Player honoree, Unitas was inducted into the Professional Football Hall of Fame in 1979. In turn of the century listings, Unitas was featured among Sports Illustrated's top ten athletes, Time's ten most influential athletes and in ESPN's series on the 50 greatest athletes of the century.

The OVC awards the Medal of Honor to the student-athlete who earns the highest year-long grade point average in 16 of the league's 18 sports, with indoor and outdoor track and field combined to one category for both men and women. Each of the 84 Medal of Honor winners posted a perfect 4.0 GPA for the 2003-04 year.

Among the Morehead State student-athletes honored with the award included baseball's junior outfielder Jesse Howell (Las Cruces, N.M./Trinidad State JC), women's basketball's freshman guard Megan "Penny" Gearhart (Olive Hill/West Carter HS) and guard/forward Jessie Plante (Windsor, Ontario, Canada/F.J. Brennan HS), women's track and field and cross country sophomore distance runner Alicia Brown (Lucasville, Ohio/Valley HS), men's golf's sophomore

Chad Carroll (Salyersville/Johnson Central HS), women's rifle freshmen team members Lindy Collins (South Range, Wis./Superior HS) and Jena Evans (Berry/Harrison County HS), women's soccer's freshman defender Trista Stark (Cincinnati, Ohio/Roger Bacon HS), softball's freshman shortstop Becky King (Parkersburg, W.Va./Parkersburg South HS), men's tennis junior Tomi Simola (Valkeakoski, Finland/Valkeakosken Lukio) and women's tennis' junior Ariana Gracia-Medrano (Mexico City, Mexico/Centro Universitario Mexico). Brown earned the honor twice, once for cross country and once for track and field.

BOWLING GREEN — Breathitt County High School product Justin Haddix and Blake Ladson each threw for two touchdowns Thursday as the Western Kentucky University football team's offense posted more than 500 yards in the team's annual Red-White Game at L.T. Smith Stadium/Jimmy Feix Field.

Haddix completed nine-of-13 passes for 171 yards while Ladson was 7-of-14 for 134. Brian Porter complemented their performance by leading all running backs with 103 yards on 13 carries.

"We saw some good things out here, especially from Justin," said head coach David Elson. "It was really reminiscent of a year ago when he completed all eight passes in this game. He looked good throwing the ball early. And, we saw some receivers step up and make big catches."

"Our first defense looked good, although there are some issues in the secondary that we have to get situated. But, for the most part, they ran to the ball well."

It didn't take long for the first-team offense to put points on the board as Haddix led a seven-play, 80-yard drive that he capped with a 40-yard touchdown pass to Maurice Perkins on a third-and-18 play.

Ladson responded by taking the second unit on back-to-back scoring drives

in the second quarter. A 46-yard strike to Rannen Roberson came with the offense facing 3rd-and-16 resulted in its first points, while Ladson completed three straight passes to generate the second score — his final toss covered 39 yards to Montaze Trumbo.

Aaron Scott led all receivers with three catches, although Roberson posted a game-high 58 yards. Those two, along with Earl Clayton and Trumbo, were the only individuals to record more than one reception.

Haddix answered Ladson's drive by taking the offense on an 80-yard march late in the second quarter. Porter picked up 21 yards on the first two plays of the drive, and also had a 29-yard reception one play after Haddix was sacked by Brad Cloud that allowed the offense to cross midfield. Haddix found Trumbo for 18 yards to set up a 1st-and-goal as he capped the nine-play possession with a 4-yard pass to Chris Brunemann on third down.

"Brian Porter had a good night running the ball, continuing to prove that he is a very able backup," Elson said. "He can compete for the job with Lerron (Moore). The one thing we have found out about Brian in preseason camp is that he is an explosive runner. He looks like a small guy out there, but he has really good speed and at the same time is strong and powerful."

"We've been very impressed with him and are excited about what he can do

for us this year."

Chris James hit field goals from 36 and 39 yards as time expired in the first half.

The only scoring in the second half came when Jamar Harris found the end zone from 4 yards out with just over four minutes remaining in the scrimmage. A Ladson 12-yard carry put the offense in the red zone, although Harris covered the final 13 yards on two plays to end the nine-play possession.

Andre Lewis led all players with nine tackles, as Cloud and Jon Hedges each chipped in with seven stops. Dan Cline and Brandon Mason added six tackles apiece.

Brandon Smith led the first-team defense with five stops, three of which came behind the line of scrimmage. Three of Daniel Williams' four tackles on the night were for a loss as well, as each player recorded a pair of sacks.

The only turnover of the scrimmage came when Charles Thompson intercepted a Ladson pass in the first quarter. "We just have to keep working," Elson said. "This is not the end of anything. We just have to come back to work tomorrow and get things corrected."

The Hilltoppers — who enter the year ranked 13th by The Sports Network and 14th in the ESPN/USA Today coaches' poll — begin the regular season with a 6:10 p.m. (CST) kickoff at I-A Kansas State on Sept. 4.

Suspended WKU player reinstated for practice

Holts started five games, recorded 52 tackles and had four sacks last season. He was also named to the Southeastern Conference All-Freshman team as a defensive lineman in 2002.

BULLS GAP, Tenn. — Indiana's Greg Johnson appeared to be well on his way to the biggest payday of his racing career Thursday night at Volunteer Speedway, leading the O'Reilly Southern All Star Racing Series "Scorchers 100" from lap 19 until lap 98. But lap 98 doesn't pay the big money. Randle Chupp of Troutman, N.C., worked Johnson over for 18 circuits, dropping down on the bottom and rim-riding up top around the high banks attempting to grab the lead each time around the track.

Using a strong run on the bottom racing off the fourth turn, Chupp pulled alongside Johnson as they received the two-to-go signal from the flagman. finally win in an exciting finish like tonight is something else. I feel this victory was way overdue, because I've always ran well here. I'd gotten up on the outside of him racing off the corners on several occasions, but he'd slam the door on me and I'd have to get out of the gas.

"With a car as good as what my crew chief (Danny Myers) had put under me, I had to do whatever it took to get the lead there with only a couple of laps remaining. If not, I would have been letting my guys down. We just got that good run off the fourth turn, and I knew I had to drive it (car) on deep into turn one on the bottom. I hated me and Greg got together, but that's just racing. I'm sure if he'd been in my position he would've done the same thing. We didn't really make much contact, and I've only got a little tire mark on the right-side door panel."

Chris Madden of Gray Court, S.C., set fast-time at 12.754-seconds (112.910 mph) during qualifying to earn the right to start the first of four heat races from the pole position in preliminaries Wednesday night for the \$15,000-to-win Scorchers 100. The top four finishers in the

respective heat races earned transfer spots into the Thursday night 100-lap feature.

Madden jumped into the lead at the drop of the green in the 12-lap heat, and held off a hard-charging Scott Sexton, Ray Cook and Billy Ogle Jr. at the checkers. The second 12-lap heat saw Dan Schlieper of Sullivan, Wis., roll to the victory over Jimmy Owens, Freddy Smith and Mark Vineyard. The third 12-lapper saw Randle Chupp of Troutman, N.C., record the win over John Blankenship, Scott Bloomquist and Brandon Kinzer. Greg Johnson of Lawrenceburg, Ind., captured the victory in the fourth heat over Brad Hall, Skip Arp and Ronnie Johnson.

Herman Goddard won the first of three last chance consolation races, with Rick Rogers finishing second to Goddard to advance to the Scorchers 100. Vic "The Thrill" Hill won the second race over Jeff Maupin, with Scott James leading Kerry Jones to the checkers in the third race. NASCAR Nextel Cup Series driver Ken Schrader and Rick Norris were awarded track provisional starting berths to complete the stellar 24-car field.

Madden's victory in the first heat secured him the pole position for the \$15,000-to-win Scorchers 100, and Schlieper's win in the second heat earned the "Wisconsin Wildman" the outside front row starting berth. The top five in the running order completing the opening lap had Madden on the point, followed by Schlieper, Chupp, Johnson and Scott Sexton.

Up front the top four of Madden, Schlieper, Chupp and Johnson pulled out to an eight car-length advantage over Sexton by the tenth lap. With Blankenship holding down the sixth spot, the action from seventh back to tenth between Owens, Hall, Smith and Cook was heating up.

Johnson began his move to the front on lap 14, as he passed Chupp to take over third between turns three and four. Three circuits later, Johnson drove under Schlieper racing into the first turn to move into the runner-up position. Setting his sights on the race leader Madden, on lap 19 racing off turn two Johnson grabbed the lead. One lap later, the caution waved when the third-running Schlieper slowed with a flat tire.

The top five on the restart were Johnson, Madden, Chupp, Sexton and Blankenship. Sexton immediately began to challenge

Chupp for the fourth spot, and on lap 23 after the duo had made contact while battling for position, Sexton slowed to a stop high in the banking in turn four with front suspension damage to bring out the caution.

Going back green, Johnson remained on the point followed by Madden, Chupp, Blankenship and Hall. Racing hard for position back in the field, on lap 26 Hill and R. Johnson got together between turns three and four and spun, also collecting Norris. Johnson parked his ride for the night, while Hill and Norris headed to the tail of the field for the restart.

Johnson quickly jumped back out to an eight car-length advantage over Madden and Chupp, with Blankenship also in the hunt. Just behind them, Hall, Owens and Bloomquist had their own battle raging for fifth through seventh in the running order. Owens was all over Hall trying to grab the fifth spot, while also doing his best to fend off the advances from Bloomquist, who had moved up from his 12th starting position.

Getting under Madden racing into the first turn on lap 34, Chupp used the low-line racing off turn two to move into the runner-up spot. And just three circuits later, Owens rode the cushion around Hall between turns three and four to take over fifth.

Halfway into the Scorchers 100, Johnson was beginning to see Chupp slice into his lead, with Madden, Blankenship and Owens running third through fifth, respectively. Holding down sixth through tenth in the running order were Hall, Bloomquist, Smith, Cook and

Kinzer.

Chupp's opportunity to close to Johnson's rear bumper occurred when the event's final caution waved on lap 75, when "The Southern Gentleman" Smith slowed with a flat tire. With the field tightened up for a run to the checkers, Chupp was poised and ready to strike. He began working Johnson for the lead on lap 80, and lap-after-lap he would stick the nose of his Biscotti's Restaurant/Bonanza Produce/Modern Engineering/Corporate Image/AFCO Racing Products/Hoosier Tires/Pro Power Race Engines/Rocket/No. 114 Grand Prix alongside Johnson to let the leader know he had company.

With five laps remaining, Chupp drove deep into the third turn up high in the banking to get his left-front to the passenger-side door panel on Johnson's mount. But Johnson slammed the door the shut on Chupp racing off the fourth turn. Chupp was not going to give up, though.

With Johnson and Chupp engaged in a heated duel up front, on lap 97 racing down the backstretch into the third turn, Chupp drove in on the high-side. When Johnson drifted up the banking, Chupp dove to the inside racing off the fourth turn. Knowing it was now-or-never, Chupp and Johnson raced door-to-door into turn one, with Chupp on the bottom.

Neither driver was going to give any ground ... and they say "rubbin' is racing." Chupp and Johnson made contact, and racing off turn two Chupp grabbed the lead. Chupp held Johnson off for the \$15,000 victory, with Madden, Blankenship and Owens rounding out the top-five.

Completing the top-10 finishers were Hall, Bloomquist, Cook, Kinzer and Rogers. NASCAR Nextel Cup driver Schrader, after starting in the last row, had a good run to finish in 14th-place.

"I hope the fans enjoyed this race, because I know from where I was sitting it was a good one," said Chupp. "We had a really good car. I could drive it anywhere I needed. To be able to win this race with such a strong field of cars present, this is something I'm very proud of. I'd like to give a word of thanks to track owner Joe Loven for having the track in such good shape. You could race up high or down low. Considering just how hot the weather was for the two days we were here, the track was in excellent shape."

"I'd like to dedicate this win tonight to my young 20-month-old son, Zander, because this is the first big race I've won since he was born. I also need to say thanks to my wife, Tina, for putting up with my racing. A racing wife has to put up with a lot, and she's behind my racing all the way. This win tonight is also very special because all the guys I work with at Team Rensi Motorsports (No. 25 U.S. Marines Ford Taurus) are down here watching, being the Busch Series race is in Bristol tomorrow night. I don't get to race in front of these guys very often, but after winning tonight I think they're all going to have to start coming to see me race more often. I know our driver for this weekend at Bristol, Mike McLaughlin, after qualifying in 10th for the Food City 250 earlier in the day, he had a blast down here tonight watching this dirt race."

Said set to make oval debut at California Speedway

CENTENNIAL, Colo. — Boris Said thought his last chance to run a Nextel Cup race in 2004 ended when a wet track forced cancellation of Bud Pole qualifying at Watkins Glen.

However, Said will race in the No. 36 Centrix Financial Chevrolet of MB2 Motorsports in the Sept. 5 Pop Secret 500 at California Speedway, it was announced Wednesday.

Centrix, Said and MB2 first came together at Infineon Raceway in June and produced a strong sixth-place result at the Sonoma, Calif. road course.

"We are very proud to be taking this next step in our relationship with MB2 and Boris," said Robert E. Sutton, chairman and chief executive officer of Centrix. "We knew we would be putting Boris back behind

the wheel of our car, we just needed to figure out the best track to do it on. California Speedway gives us a chance to build our brand in one of our most important markets while allowing Boris to show-off the skills he developed in the Craftsman Truck Series and at Daytona in the Budweiser Shootout."

Racing on ovals is not new for Said, who is known worldwide as one of the most exciting and accomplished road racers, having just recently become the first American to ever win the German 4-hour GT Endurance race at the famed Nurburgring Nordschleife circuit.

Said, of Carlsbad, Calif., competed in the NASCAR Craftsman Truck Series in 1997, 1998 and part of 1999.

Ricky on the line: He's still out of service

DAVIE, Fla. — Ricky Williams phoned the Miami Dolphins this week, but said his next destination will be India, not a return to the NFL.

The retired running back contacted coach Dave Wannstedt several days ago, sources close to the coach said Thursday. But Williams told The Miami Herald he has no plans to come back anytime soon.

His conversation with Wannstedt was their first since Williams called the week before training camp with the stunning news he was retiring.

Prompting the latest call was a letter the Dolphins sent Williams last week seeking to recoup \$8.6 million in bonuses paid to him.

"I didn't call them to see if I could come back. I was just causing a conversation to happen," Williams told the Herald from Australia. "They sent me the letter and (my agent) told me it's in my best interests to call them."

Even if the 27-year-old Williams wanted to return, he faces a suspension for the entire 2004 season for violating the NFL drug policy. He has acknowledged testing positive for marijuana three times.

Williams may have been seeking a way to avoid repaying any money, but an NFL source insisting on anonymity said the Dolphins are taking a hard line with Williams. Players and team officials gave no indication they're eager for the 2002 NFL rushing champion to return, even though Miami totaled five

first downs and no points in its most recent exhibition game.

His latest reasons for retiring, including a workload he considered excessive, annoyed ex-teammates.

"He's acting like a bitter girlfriend," defensive tackle Larry Chester said. "He's just lashing out. I don't think anyone should pay attention to him."

"He owes a lot of people an apology — not just the fans, but the players in this locker room. A lot of guys were with him all offseason. We figured he was going to war for us. To back out without any explanation is messed up."

Williams said he plans to travel to India soon for a "couple of months."

"It's not in my best interests to play football right now," he said.

Williams' agent, Leigh Steinberg, didn't return calls seeking comment. Wannstedt and Dolphins general manager Rick Spielman declined to discuss the latest development in the Williams saga.

"I'm only going to comment on guys who are here practicing," Wannstedt said.

Williams admitted he was unhappy with his contract and new offensive coordinator Chris Foerster. And he said the Dolphins relied on him too heavily the past two seasons, when he carried 775 times.

"I don't really know what to think about that," offensive lineman Seth McKinney said. "Speaking as offensive linemen, we go out there and block. If we run the ball 100 times, we're out there blocking 100 times.

Maybe we're overused. That's the way it goes. That's the game of football. I don't know what he's talking about, really."

McKinney and other players said

they still expect to be without Williams this season, despite his phone call to Wannstedt.

"I don't think many people are paying attention to it," fullback Rob

Konrad said. "I think it's more of a positioning thing by him. He's in — where is it, Australia or Austria? I would doubt he's going to be back here anytime soon."

Steelers win battle of Pennsylvania

PHILADELPHIA — Duce Staley ran into the end zone, went straight to the stands and handed the football to young boy wearing a Donovan McNabb jersey.

Just one problem: Staley plays for the Pittsburgh Steelers now.

Staley ran for 37 yards and one touchdown in limited action against his former team, leading the Steelers to a 27-21 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles in a preseason game Thursday night.

Reserve Willie Parker ran for 106 yards and one TD and Dante Brown also had a TD run for the Steelers.

Reno Mahe ran for a score and L.J. Smith and Greg Lewis had TD catches for the Eagles, who lost two more starters — linebacker Nate Wayne and left guard Jermaine Mayberry — to injuries.

A three-time 1,000-yard rusher in seven seasons in Philadelphia, Staley showed the Eagles what they're missing. He ran six times for 33 yards on the opening drive, capping it with a nifty

14-yard TD run.

Philadelphia didn't make a strong push to retain Staley, a fan favorite who again heard the familiar chants of "Duuuuce!" each time he touched the ball. But the Eagles could use him now after losing Correll Buckhalter to a season-ending knee injury last week.

After Jeff Blake connected with Lewis on a 14-yard TD pass to give the Eagles a 21-17 lead, the Steelers went ahead on Parker's 3-yard TD run early in the fourth quarter.

An undrafted rookie from North Carolina, Parker perhaps earned himself a roster spot with his performance. Ben Roethlisberger, the No. 11 pick in this year's NFL draft, was sacked on his first play and finished 7-of-11 for 74 yards and one interception. Starter Tommy Maddox was 4-of-6 for 53 yards.

Terrell Owens, the Eagles' biggest offseason acquisition, didn't have a catch. His 41-yard TD reception in the first quarter was negated by a holding penalty on Tra Thomas. He later dropped a pass that hit him in the chest.

McNabb was 8-of-19 for 105 yards and one TD. Blake was 6-of-7 for 63

yards and one TD.

Wayne and Mayberry left with hamstring injuries in the first quarter. It wasn't immediately known how long they'd be out. The Eagles already are without Buckhalter and defensive end N.D. Kalu for the season, and have several other key players on the sidelines.

The Steelers took a 17-7 lead in the second quarter on Brown's 1-yard TD run. McNabb connected with Smith on an 11-yard TD pass to cut the deficit to 17-14.

Mahe, getting an extended look, ran in from the 2 to tie it at 7. Mahe finished with 49 yards, including a 33-yard run, on 10 carries.

Notes: FS Brian Dawkins, DT Corey Simon and LB Dhani Jones were among 13 players who sat out for the Eagles. RB Brian Westbrook and recently signed RB Dorsey Levens also didn't play. ... Steelers WR Plaxico Burress caught two passes for 45 yards. RB Jerome Bettis had six carries for 18 yards. ... Jeff Reed had field goals of 48 and 43 yards for Pittsburgh. ... DE Jevon Kearse, Philadelphia's other big-name offseason acquisition, had one sack.

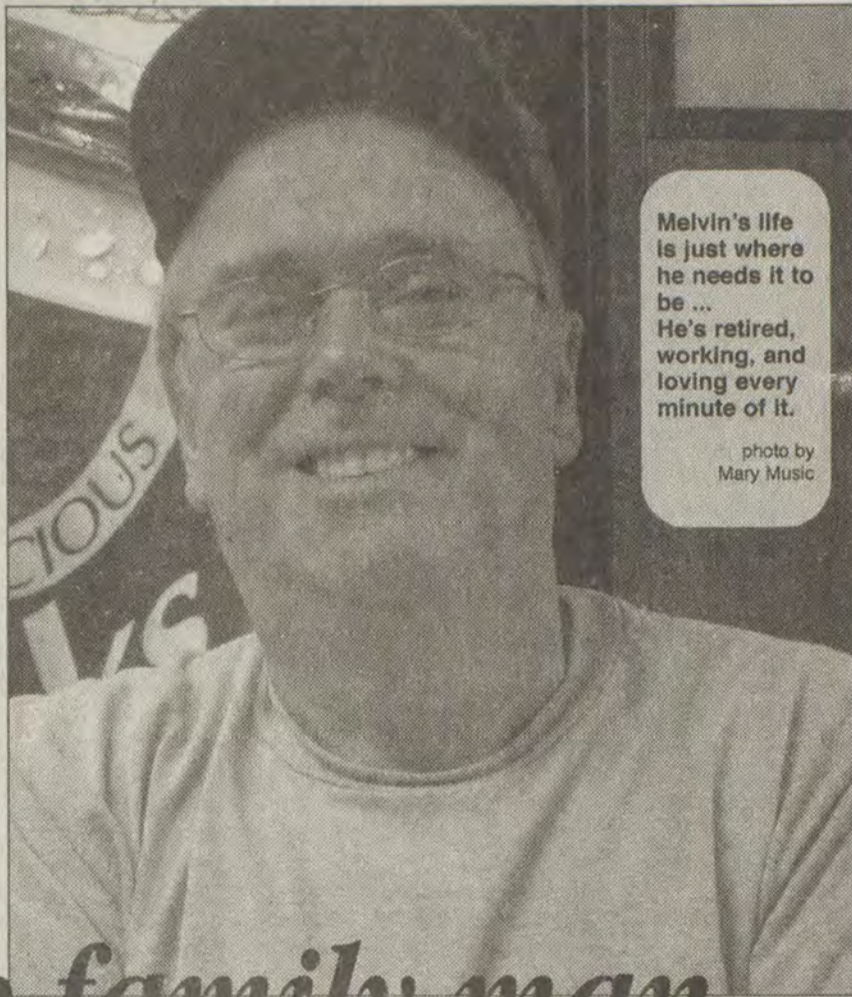

About 'Meet Appalachia'

I met Melvin when I worked as a clerk at Foodland. He is the type of person who pitches in where ever he can—without complaints — to make the workday go smoother.

A smile. A handshake. Or, just a simple: "Hey, how ya doing today?" He's a real people person, one with a kind heart and genuine personality — a true gem.

The child sits in the shade with dusty jeans and hands. He holds the stick in his left hand, drawing circles in the soil. It's three hours past suppertime and his dad, a coal miner, hasn't come home from work.

The boy came outside twenty minutes ago. He sits there now gazing down the driveway, hoping to see his father's hat round the corner.

Time passes. He can hear his brothers and sisters in the living room. He doesn't know what they're saying, but he knows—by the silence now—that it isn't good. His mother is worried. He's getting there.

"Daddy!" a child's voice drums off the porch.

A dusty man walks slowly up the driveway, his form is shadowed by the evening sun. He carries his hat in his hand. A patch covers his eye and he smiles when he sees the children. They run to him, embracing his dusty pant legs. The family goes inside.

Meet Melvin Ray Hall, a retired coal mining supervisor and part time carry-out at Foodland in Prestonsburg. Melvin, 65, grew up in McDowell, the son of Milly and Elisha Hall. He and his six siblings knew the hardships that came with farming. The boys were in charge of feeding the livestock and mending the fences.

"I thought I didn't like it. I look back and I thought it was a hard time, but I look back again and see they were the good times of my life," Melvin said. "I had my family. My mother and dad were good parents. We bonded as a family. We had our scraps and squabbles, but we all banded as one."

The strength in family ties comes

from a deep love, one known only between mothers and fathers and sons and daughters. Melvin lives that life. His says family is one of the most important things in his life.

"I've been a good husband. I've been a good father," he said. "But every day I just can't help but ask how can I be a better father to my son or how can I be a better husband to my wife and a better grandfather to my grandson. I'm not much of a person if I didn't do the best I could do toward my family."

Melvin's family devotion is genetic. It is the same type of love seen during his childhood — a strong devotion shared to him through his parents, siblings, and grandmother.

Melvin said he lived "in the shadow" of his grandmother, Darkus Gearheart, who lived about 100 ft. away from him. He and his brothers and sisters visited her everyday because they "enjoyed being around her" — especially when she baked homemade apple and pumpkin pies.

She was a good woman, Melvin says. "She loved everyone."

Melvin describes his father — the man walking home from work with a patch on his eye — as a good and giving person.

"He was a very, very giving person," he said. "He was a good husband to my mom. Whatever she needed or wanted, he always tried to provide it for her."

Melvin does the same now for his family.

Melvin met his wife, Mable Doris (Martin) Hall, in a theatre when he was a freshman in high school. She was his first girlfriend. They dated for three years before they married — three years after he left his school days and began working.

They rented, at first. They then pur-

'Donnie Darko'

Donnie is a teenager with a fair amount of emotional baggage. For one thing it's 1988 and voters are hard pressed to decide between Mike Dukakis and George Bush (the dad). Another problem is his rebellious behavior which has necessitated bringing in a therapist. He is also fighting with his siblings and has to avoid a bully at school who has targeted him.

All of these problems pale in comparison to his darkest dilemma. He has been told that the world will end in 28 days. Donnie is convinced that this last part is true and has proof that he can't

share because his friend Frank wishes to remain anonymous. Frank isn't shy, but he is a 6 foot tall talking rabbit and that could get in the way of his credibility.

The crazy part, though, is that Frank may not be the creation of an overactive psyche. He may be the real deal and has simply chosen an unreliable vessel for his message. Let's face it, folks ... no one in these movies believes a teenager and that goes back to "The Blob." Donnie never questions the existence of Frank but he does find ample time to question authority.

This shapes up as a James Dean movie for the new millennium. A talking rabbit is nothing compared to the reality of adolescence since the 1980s, when even the promise of romance carries the sword of Damocles-like threat of death and disease. Donnie has to contend with obnoxious bullies, closed-minded faculty and a new age motivational speaker who has charmed all of the adults in his orbit.

While tackling these issues he continues to fall under the spell of Frank and begins to do his bidding to avert the impending catastrophe. The chores range from minor vandalism to arson but Donnie is soon steered, by Frank, towards the gun in the back of his father's closet.

If you think you can work out where this going next, then think again. This is really about character and whether someone is ready to make the ultimate sacrifice, even though society doesn't seem to merit it. What starts out as a warped fantasy actually turns into a testament to the human spirit.

The film manages to tell this story without ever losing its dark edge or

When I was 5, my biological father committed suicide. It left me feeling as though I'd done something wrong; that if I had been better somehow, maybe he'd have stayed around.

My mother remarried shortly thereafter, and this man was my dad until I was 19. I called him Dad and used his name all through school. But when he and my mother divorced, he just walked away. Once again, I wondered what was wrong with me that I couldn't keep a father.



Mother remarried again, and Bob was a wonderful, kind man. I was 20 and no longer living at home, but I felt great love and attachment for him.

A few years later my mother was diagnosed with cancer and was not given long to live. Shortly before she died, Bob came over to my house alone one day. We talked about a lot of things, and then he told me that he wanted me to know that he'd always be there for me, even after Mother was gone. Then he

asked if he could adopt me.

I could hardly believe my ears. Tears streamed down my face. He wanted me — me! This man had no obligation to me, but he was reaching out from his heart, and I accepted.

During the adoption proceedings, the judge commented on all of the undesirable duties of his profession, and then with a tear in his eye, thanked us for brightening his day as he pronounced us father and daughter. I was 25, but I was his little girl.

Three short years later, Bob, too, was diagnosed with cancer and was gone within the year. At first I was hurt and angry at God for taking this father away too. But eventually the love and

acceptance that I felt from Dad came through again, and I became, once more, grateful for the years we had.

On Father's Day I always reflect on what I've learned about fatherhood. I've learned that it is not dependent on biology or even on raising a child. Fatherhood is a matter of the heart. Bob's gift from the heart will warm my soul for eternity.

"You will be raised believing in God. This will not be forced on you, but since I was raised as

a Christian, you will be exposed to Christian doctrine and how Jesus, the Son of God, was born to teach us that love is the guiding force in our lives.

"As you grow and mature, you will observe things, situations and behavior that are not consistent with the teachings of our religion. You will become aware that there are many other religions that are different from ours. Some groups have a teacher like Jesus, but are called by different names. In the East it is Buddha, in China and Japan it is Confucius and Mohammad in the Arabian countries. These are only a few of the religions of the world.

"The followers of these various religions believe that their prophet or teacher, like Jesus, is the only true one. I want to encourage you to learn about these other religions. They believe theirs is the only true religion. For them it is just as

you believe in your faith and religion, there is only one God, but God has many sons. You must respect and honor their right to worship in their own way without condemnation and prejudice. Freedom of thought and expression should always be respected, accepted and honored.

"God gave us a will and it is part of our soul's birthright to make choices. Try always to make these choices for positive outcomes.

"You will also see, as you grow and mature, that there are other races of people. The color of their skins is different than ours. You will hear and be told that the white race is superior. You must know that all people and races are equal in the eyes of God.

"You will also see that those who are different than us are many times treated badly and persecuted for these differences. This is not right or good and should not be a part of your expression of love to those that are different.

"Soon you will be in school and studying the history of our country and the world. When you read this letter I hope that we are all still here. In the years 2000-2002 a major war was about to start in the Middle East. The possible extinction of the human race was in jeopardy and much of the world was moving away from the spiritual side of our lives and away from God. You must know and realize that God is an integral part of our lives and without Him at our side we are like a 'ship at sea during a storm without power.'

"During my lifetime I have seen or experienced four wars. I've seen prejudice, discrimination, hatred and evil destroy many countries and lives of innocent people all over the world. You personally will not be able to correct all of these injustices, but you will during every conscious moment of your life have the choice to reach out to those lives you touch who are in need and help them along life's path.

"There is good and evil in

this world. Edgar Cayce said, "The greatest evil in the hearts and minds of individuals is contention, fault finding, lovers of self, and lovers of praise because these forces separate us from God. Bill Newsome, a student at Pikeville College, has been recognized as an outstanding member of the Pikeville community through his dedicated work with the Pikeville High School academic team. The PHS academic team has excelled in both state and national competitions due to being comprised of intelligent, hard-working team members, and through the efforts of dedicated coaches, of which Newsome is one. Newsome has worked with the team for the past three years.

"Bill has been a great asset to our students," said Coach Johnny Belcher. "We could not have advanced to this degree without his assistance."

Newsome, a 2001 Betsy Layne High School graduate, was a member of the BLHS academic team who placed in state competition in language arts his sophomore year. chased a piece of property, paying payments for three years, and saved money to build their first home — the one they still live in.

Melvin dropped out of school in the 1950's during his sophomore year, three years before he married Mable.

"I quit because I thought at that time that was so much other stuff to do other than school," he said.

At 17, Melvin — seeking his independence — trekked into the Beaver-Elkorn Coal Mine in McDowell, where he worked for 4 years before deciding to return to school.

Then, he worked all day and went to school 5 or 6 hours three days a week. He completed the training in six months and became a mining supervisor, the title he kept until his retirement more than 30 years later.

"The work was hard, but I

think it's a place where you bond with your fella workers, co-workers," he said. "They looked out for danger for you and you looked out for danger for them. In the coal mines, you looked out for your buddies."

Melvin started as a laborer in the mines, working out hourly wages on his knees for 8 to 9 hours a day. When he received his supervising training, his hours increased along with his wages.

As supervisor, he was in charge of crews of 12 to 50 men. He supervised the work and looked after their safety.

Melvin preferred not to talk about the accidents he witnessed while working in the mines. He said he's seen a lot of them.

"Sometimes I didn't know if I could cope with it," he said. "But I kept telling myself, 'Yes, you can do it.'"

And that's what he did.

Eventually, he signed up for Emergency Medical training, a skill he renews every two years by taking additional training.

"I seen men underground get hurt and everybody would stand back, not knowing what to do," he said. "If you have a little knowledge, then you know better what to do to stop bleeding, or make a splint. I would like to think that I helped some people."

As supervisor, Melvin fired only two men — one with a drinking problem and another who smoked pot on the job.

He didn't like having to fire them and said that he gave the men every opportunity to straighten up their life.

Today, he still keeps in touch with the friends he made while working in the mines. But, with time, they're getting fewer in number, he says.

"The friends I've worked

with throughout the years are deceased, dead, or dying," he said. "A lot of my friends have gone on. It hurts me to know that somebody I worked with is gone. It takes a part away from me. You really get close to the people you work with, especially in the coal mines."

His father died of a lung disease after working in the mines for 38 years.

Melvin worked at Beaver-Elkorn for 5 years. He then worked at the National Mines in Knott county for 21 years and retired in 1999 from Massey Coal in Pike county, where he was employed for 6 years.

In the passing of these years, he witnessed the passing of mining traditions — manual labor went to continuous miners and loaders; buggies used to carry coal changed to scoops and rails.

The experience taught him to love his job. He is a self-pro-

manic unpredictability. Great stuff and, it appears, that video has rescued this film and done the unimaginable. It will come back to theaters, where it played briefly, in a new director's cut. It's a smart movie and a top rental among teens who have made it such a rental hit that the theatrical rerelease was inevitable.

Why does it work so well? Its chief appeal is that it works on so many levels. The best interpretation, though, is that it is a dark fable which spins awkward adolescence and apocalyptic visions into a fierce account of the importance of challenging rules that hem us in more than free us to choose.

First-time director Richard Kelly has assembled a fine cast to tell this tall and exceedingly grim tale. Jake Gyllenhall ("October Sky") is properly subdued as Donnie. Drew Barrymore and Noah Wylie are earnest as young and not-yet-jaded teachers. Patrick Swayze is all teeth and charm as the new age guru who hides an awful secret and James Duvall is parts menacing and charming as the big rodent.

Only "Heathers" (1989) comes close to this film in its accurate portrayal of modern adolescence.

needs and you start counting your blessings."

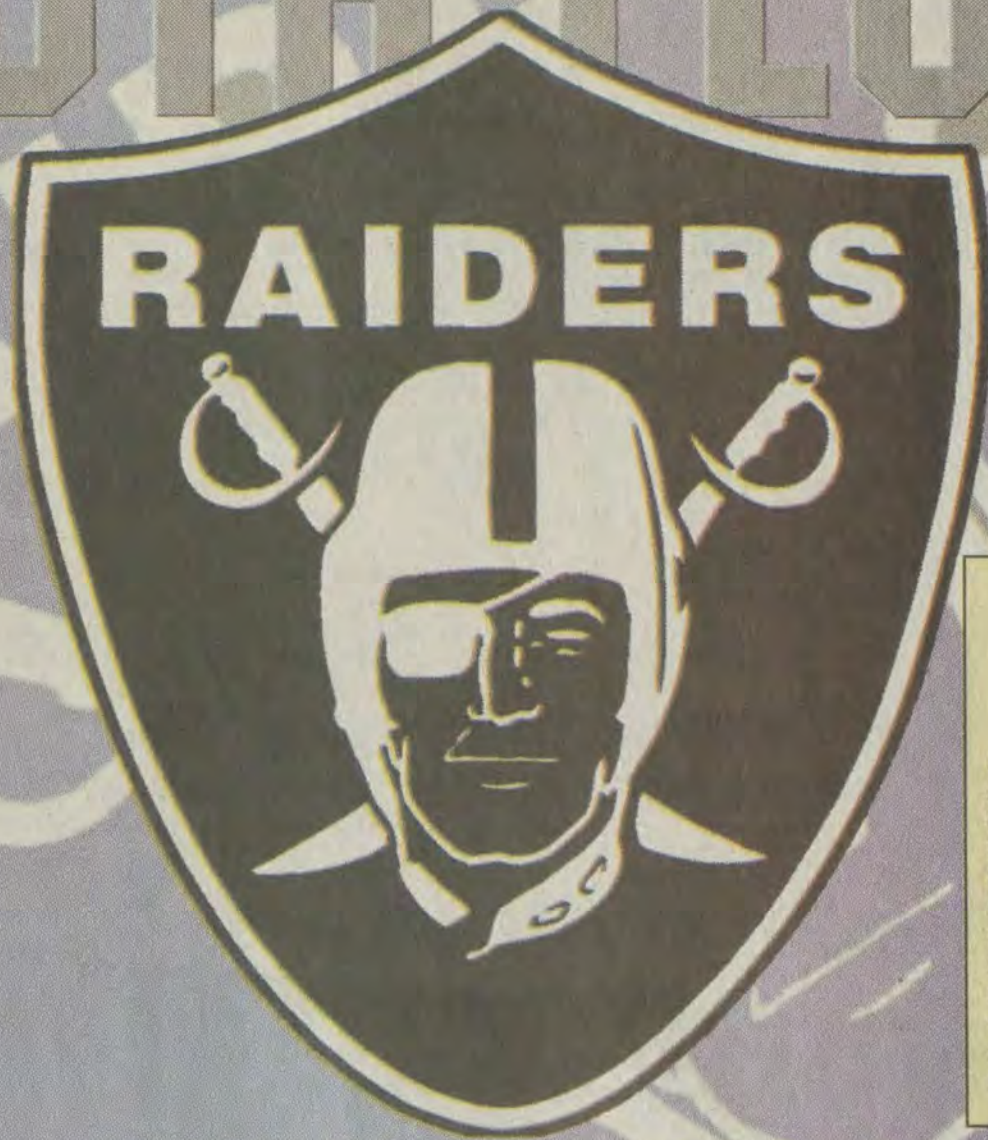
Melvin says he counts his blessings every night.

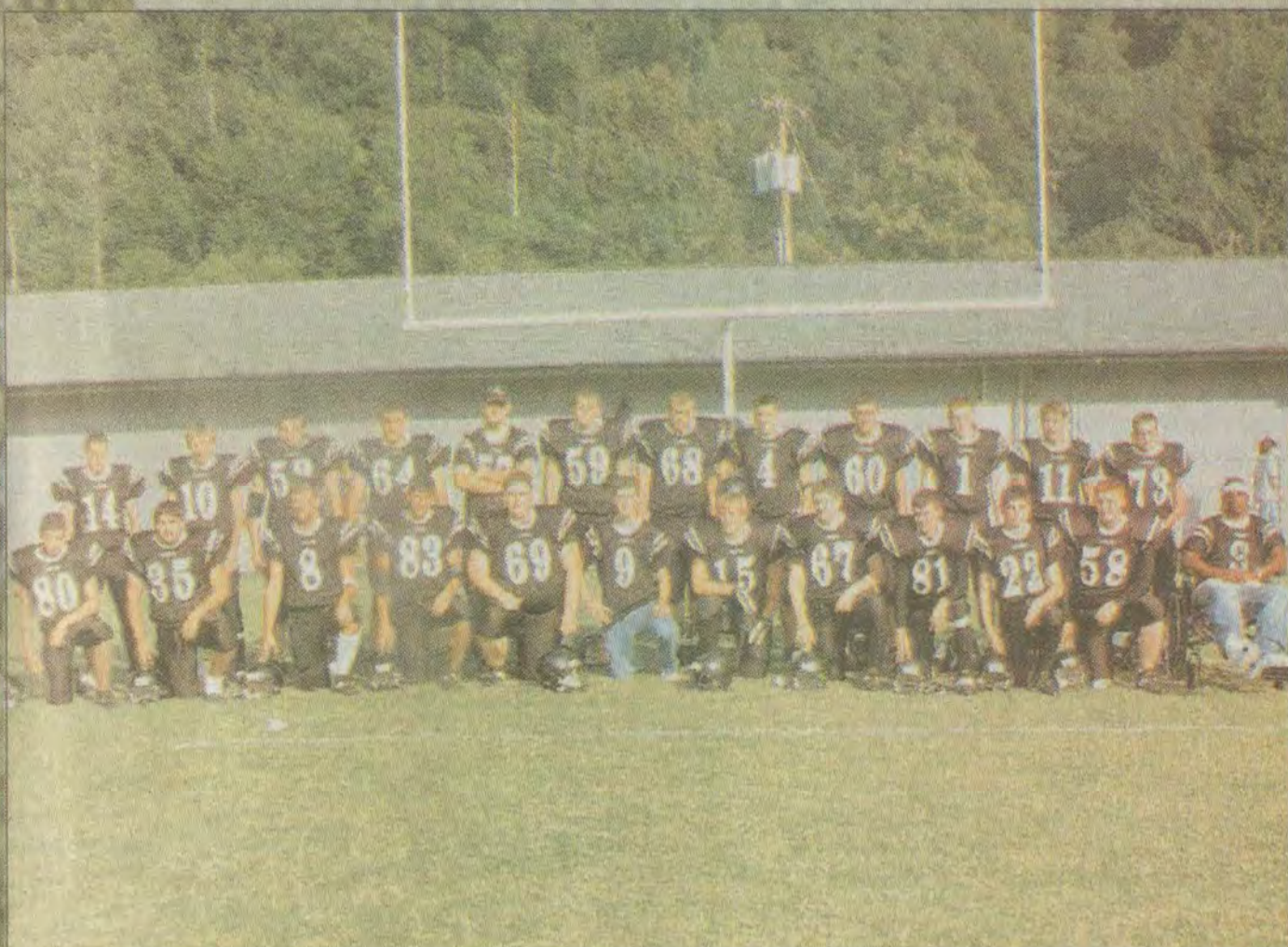
