MIDDLE CREEK — Wearing a mud-splattered T-shirt, shorts and boots, Karen Crum used her bare hands to cull dried mud out of a window sill in what used to be her dining room. Her home is demolished, stripped now to the plywood floors and splattered with the excruciating reminder of the Memorial Day flooding. Flies flutter around a polished crystal chandelier in the living room, where a window overlooks a yard full of mud-beaten furniture. Her barn, her business, a mess.

She wants answers.

“I’ve worked all my life to get this stuff,” she says, pointing toward piles of Broyhill dressers, tables and chairs. “Now what are we going to do?”

Crum spent most of the afternoon Monday playing “phone tag” with various organizations associated with her husband’s mobile home moving business. Like many on Middle Creek, her family is still paying for damages caused during last year’s flooding. They claim that the floods in the area have gotten progressively worse over the years and they want to know why, a concern resonated by Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson

County receives \$270K for flood work

PRESTONSBURG — The Floyd County Fiscal Court met yesterday to pass on new developments in the county’s ongoing efforts to battle the damaging effects of last week’s flooding.

The best news is that a concerted

effort by U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers and the governor’s office has seen Floyd County receive checks for previous floods issued, which will go a long way toward helping current efforts.

Magistrate Jackie Edford Owens noted that Rogers “did some pushing and we are glad to see it.”

Judge Executive Paul Hunt Thompson was matter of fact in his

assessment of the aid, which comes to about \$270,000, when he said, “We’ve got a little breathing room now, not an oxygen tank, but some room.”

The court was able to pass a resolution to hire 12 temporary workers on an emergency basis. They will

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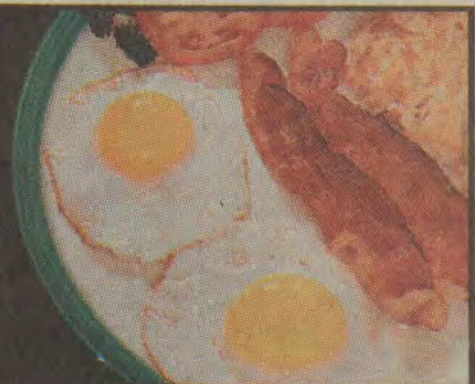

■ **PARKER CITY, Ind.** — A town marshal who was trying to quit smoking got some unexpected tough love from the Town Council — a one-day suspension for violating a no-smoking ordinance.

"Maybe getting a suspension is the best way to quit. It jogs your memory a lot better and gets you back to reality," Town Marshal Rex Amburn said Monday.

Amburn, 60, has been a smoker for 40 years. He's tried nicotine patches, pills, lozenges and assorted advice from friends around the east-central Indiana town of about 1,400.

He had cut back from three packs a day to about three cigarettes when a council member recently caught him smoking in his office in the town hall. That was a violation of a town

ordinance passed in 2000 that prohibited smoking in public buildings and vehicles.

Amburn lost about \$160 in pay. He did not object when the council approved the penalty and wore a nicotine patch to the meeting.

"I am not going to be smoking too much longer," said Amburn. "I have to stop."

"I am tickled if this gets him to quit," said council President Fred Ludington, who quit smoking 10 years ago. "If we hadn't enforced it, he would probably still be smoking in that office."

■ **DES MOINES, Iowa** — A man who claimed he didn't get the taco he paid for has been charged with assault for allegedly pelting a Taco Bell clerk in the face with a chalupa. Nancy Harrison told police

she was working the drive-through Thursday night when Christopher Lame, 24, ordered some food.

He later came into the store, complaining he didn't get the taco he had ordered, police records say. Harrison said that when she asked for a receipt, he went back to his car and brought back the bag.

Harrison said she told him the store was closing, and as she turned away, a chalupa hit her in the face near her right eye. She said she ran into the parking lot and took down the license number as the motorist was driving away.

Lame was identified through the license number.

He is scheduled to appear in court June 15.

■ **LOS ANGELES** — When it came time to tie the knot, Steven Murphy and Yvonne Rodriguez wanted the people who have become closest to them in attendance.

So they held their wedding at Los Angeles' Central Juvenile Hall.

For three years, they have worked with mentally troubled youths as part of the Los Angeles Archdiocese's Detention Ministry.

ment here."

Rodriguez, who moved to Los Angeles from her native Mexico at age 2, is a psychiatric social worker. Murphy, from Wisconsin, is a family practice physician.

"Yvonne and Steve could have gotten married in the cathedral but they chose here because you are important," Father Gregory J. Boyle, who performed the ceremony, told the assembled youngsters.

■ **LINCOLN, Neb.** — All he wanted was a Dale Earnhardt Jr. stock car replica, like the one he lost in the tornado.

But 9-year-old Nathan Stimple got more than he expected last week.

Nathan's family lost their home in the tornado that hit the village of Hallam on May 22. Nathan also lost the replica car, which he was supposed to get for his birthday.

He was pictured in Saturday's Lincoln Journal Star and more than a few NASCAR fans noticed.

One, Jeremy Allen, of Pleasantdale, invited the Stimples over to his house to give Nathan a care package Monday.

At first Nathan didn't know what to pick.

"I told him, 'You don't even have to worry about it. It's all yours,'" Allen said.

Nathan took home a whole duffel bag of Earnhardt Jr. memorabilia. It included three 1/24th scale cars, a blanket, a flashlight and a radio-controlled car, all with Earnhardt Jr.'s No. 8 on them.

"I had a really good day," he said.

Another sympathetic reader was Kay White, of Lincoln, who gave Nathan two Earnhardt Jr. cars.

"I was just overwhelmed," said Nathan's mom, Dawn Stimple.

during a fiscal court meeting last week when he suggested that the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers check out the potential problems of the area.

"The government needs to consider buying us out or raising us up," Crum said. "We can't afford this. We can't live like this."

Middle Creek residents speculate that the flooding problem can be attributed to strip mining, landfills on developing properties at the Prestonsburg Post Office and the forgotten practice of creek dredging, which they believe would increase the creek's carrying capacity enough to reduce flood damages.

"The last couple of years, it's gotten worse and worse. With strip mining going on, and logging, the washoff is filling the creeks up. There's nowhere for the water to go," said Billy Frasure, owner of a Middle Creek convenience store and trailer park that were hit hard in the flood.

Frasure spent Monday afternoon with a health department employee who was evaluating his deli in an effort to get it up and running again. He and his employees have scrubbed the store for the last seven days. Mud streaks still smudge the tile floor, a constant reminder of the \$50,000-to-\$75,000 worth of damage he's now facing.

With no viable solution in sight, Frasure, who's been running the business for four years, says he's more than willing to throw in the towel.

"I'd sell it right now," he said. "I can't stand it. I'd be tickled to death to sell it and let someone else have it."

The Kentucky Department of Housing, Buildings and Construction condemned every trailer on the lot behind the store. Residents who live there have been staying in shelters, hotels or with family members since floodwaters invaded their homes last Sunday.

"We drive up and down the road, looking over and hoping to spot one of them white trucks over here to tell us what to do," Jackie Wright said. "They put these salvage stickers on our homes and what does that mean? I don't know what that means. Can somebody come here and tell me these things? I don't know what to do."

Wright, the working mother of two children, said she spent the first two nights following the storm in her truck and was later awarded hotel room stays from two local charitable associations.

Monday was her checkout day, but she said she didn't know where she was going to

go. She still owes more than \$20,000 on her condemned trailer, which she purchased after her former home was destroyed in last year's flood. Floodwaters pushed it off its foundation during the storm and lodged it between two others. With both doors jammed, she has been unable to go in and survey the extent of the damages.

Wright says she remembers work being done on the creek behind the park about three years ago, but then, she says, they only removed garbage and debris that drifted along the creek bed.

Middle Creek residents says that certain sections of the creek are so filled with sediment, the water is flowing no more than 1 to 3 inches deep.

"People's gotten lazy and now we're suffering the consequences," said Janie McCoy Wright, of Bluebird Lane. "They used to grade up these streams, but they don't do that anymore. Now there's nowhere for the water to go, there's no outlet for it."

Wright, who was in the process of moving from her rental home when the flood came, lost all her her belongings.

Doug Lowe, who's lived in a neighborhood of eight homes straight off Route 114, says his home, built in 1975, has never been flooded. During the worst floods, he said, the two homes on each end of the lane were barely affected. This year, every home on the block was ravaged.

"I wanted to cry every time I think about it, but it does no good to cry," his sister, Janet, said.

When Route 114 was built, the state diverted the creek which flowed behind the homes — an approximate mile stretch to Cleo's Interior Designs — to the other side of the road. Now a "standing pond" remains behind them, created with waters that flow off the hillside into the culvert area, where it's diverted to the opposite side of the road.

Lowe said residents in the area, armed with a petition, tried to get the state to fill in the standing pond in the 1970s. They were unsuccessful.

In 2000, Lowe tried again, contacting U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers for assistance. Rogers and the state later disavowed any responsibility, he said.

They replied with a letter, authored in October 2002 by late Natural Resources Secretary James Bickford, who said that the Division of Water inspector completed the investigation of the "ox bow lake" left after the construction of Route 114. Bickford said a stream construction permit would be required to fill in the "old creek channel," and forwarded an application to Lowe, who said he couldn't afford to do so.

Even if it were filled in, Lowe says he isn't sure it would stop the problem.

"At this time, the flooding in

this area is getting so much worse, things are going to have to be done to alleviate the problem," he said. "I'm not an engineer but it seems to me that raising these houses up and building a dam on the other end, maybe a pumping station to pump the water out when it gets too bad — and I don't know how feasible, economically, that would be, but it might do the trick ... There's never been an engineer come in here and look at this, sit down and tell us, 'Hey, you need to do this or do that.' That has never been done and I think it needs to be."

Lowe isn't alone in wondering why, after all these years, flooding suddenly hits his home.

Dr. Rudolf Ousley, whose veterinary clinic has been located on Route 114 for nearly 24 years, says this is the first time water has ever gotten into his barn. Though he suffered only minimal damages, Dr. Ousley is well aware of others in the neighboring area who have never had problems during previous floods but were inundated this time.

Ousley said the amount of rainfall on the Memorial Day weekend was certainly a substantial factor in the flooding on Middle Creek, but he also noted that untidy creeks could have contributed to the mess.

"I'm sure there are a lot of factors. I'm sure we probably have gotten more rain in the Middle Creek and Abbott area than anywhere else, that's the major reason, and trees grow out in the middle of the creek and fill it in," he said.

Creeks behind his residence have never been dredged, he said.

Ousley's assistant, Barb Slone, said her 84-year-old mother is now battling the storm's aftermath at her home on Rough and Tough, a Middle Creek residential area.

The home, she said, has stood for 90 years and has never been flooded. The weekend storms brought in 4 feet of water and debris.

"I'd say a lot of it is where the creeks are filling in and there are trees growing up around it," she said, noting that several people in the area are alleging the same things.

But all these people are jumping to conclusions, officials say, pointing the blame, instead, to Mother Nature.

Ted Hamm, a hydraulic engineer with the Corps of Engineers, said dredging the creek would not be beneficial.

"Basically when you dredge the river it provides little to no flood reduction and it causes large environmental issues and necessitates maintenance that is costly and not really feasible economically," Hamm said.

Hamm and other Corps officials said that creek dredging upsets environmental habitats, threatens endangered species and disturbs the ecosystem. They would not comment on the effects of area landfills or devel-

opments, directing those questions to Lon May, Floyd County's floodplain coordinator.

May said yesterday that obtaining permits to build in a floodplain is an extremely consuming process, one the Division of Water doesn't take lightly.

"If it would have caused any adverse impact on the people in the area, the Division of Water would not have approved the application," May said, in regard to the construction site at the Prestonsburg Post Office.

In order to obtain a local permit to fill a floodplain area, the interested business or individual fills out an application with the Division of Water in Frankfort. A hydraulic analysis study is undertaken before the application is approved and a local permit is issued by May's office or that of Bobby Carpenter, the Prestonsburg floodplain administrator.

"You just can't go and build. You have to go through the process," May said.

When applications are considered, May said, one of the leading factors of consideration is whether the proposed construction site is part of the floodplain (the backwater area) or the floodway, the site of flow and velocity of the water.

The Division of Water rarely approves construction in the floodway, he said, noting that such construction is difficult and expensive in dealing with necessary regulations.

However, he said, it's possible that individuals or businesses have filled in on the floodway without his knowledge.

Regardless of that possibility, May stood with his assertion that the extent of the flood damages on Middle Creek can be attributed to the 6 inches of rain the area drank within a 24-hour period.

"This flood was not a backwater flood. It was a headwater flood," he said. "Typically, a fill like that only affects backwater."

In discussing the same issues, Carpenter, like May, said yesterday that the flood damage could be directly tied to the amount of

rainfall.

"As of this point, in all honesty, I don't believe that fill had anything do with damage and construction at Middle Creek," he said. "I do feel that that the fill had somewhat of a bearing on Archer Park, because it increased velocity of water on the park."

Carpenter, who also works as Prestonsburg fire inspector, zoning inspector and building inspector, said that he's received calls of concerns from at least 50 individuals who are complaining that proposed construction of a new consolidated school on the Clark Elementary sight would increase problems with flooding.

"This was a phenomenal event. What they're telling us is that this was a 500-year storm, which means that there's a chance of 1-in-500 that the area will receive that amount of rainfall," he said. "I think that most of the damage in the Middle Creek and Abbott watershed is directly related to just a heavy amount of rain that hit one watershed in a short amount of time. If the entire area received the 6 inches of water that Abbott and Middle Creek did, the water would probably be on top of downtown Prestonsburg. I don't think the fill had anything to do with the particular storm, however, there's no doubt that anytime you fill, it has an impact on the floodplain."

Carpenter said the possibility remains that the fill may have had an impact on "as far as how long it takes Middle Creek to discharge from the backwater condition there."

"There may be some impact there, like it taking longer for water to get out, along those lines," Carpenter said. "I'm speaking of seasonal flooding, not the 'Storm of the Century' that we've had here," he said. "It would take a culvert and a creek able to handle the entire Big Sandy River in order to handle the impact of this last storm. That's a lot of water ... We're very fortunate that the entire region did not receive the amount of water these two areas did."

Carpenter said the construction near the post office is in the floodplain, not the floodway. The ditch near the site, which filters water from Middle Creek, was "changed drastically" since new U.S. 23 highway was constructed, he said.

The Corps of Engineers and the Division of Highways are exempt from regulations that demand they obtain local floodplain permits before they fill during construction, unlike other entities who wish to fill along the floodplain.

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start today and aid in helping to get trash and debris cleared from troubled areas like Middle Creek.

where a member of the fiscal court is also on hand.

"I fully expect individual assistance to be declared for the County," Thompson said. This is good news for those who lost private property.

If and when private assistance becomes available, flood victims seeking assistance will need to fill out a loan application with the Small Business Administration. This doesn't necessarily mean that victims will only be eligible for low-interest loans. The application is also used to establish guidelines for who is entitled to a grant or a combination of both.

The fiscal court will announce where to fill out an application should the approval be granted.

The court also announced that dumpsters are on the way to some key areas, with two going up at Abbott Creek, two at the Rough and Tough area and one going to Corn Fork.

Three church leaders were contacted to disburse a monetary award from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. They will be getting back to the court soon on what families need new clothes for their children.

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Health Extra

What Would Jesus Eat? Diets grapple with God's gastronomic will

SHELBY, N.C. — The Rev. George Malkmus often preaches about how he believes the world of proper eating began — or, in his opinion, began.

"The Lord gave us everything we need in the Garden of Eden: fruits, vegetables, nuts and seeds," the preacher-turned-diet adviser said in an interview at Hallelujah Acres, his North Carolina headquarters. "That's why we call the way we eat the 'Hallelujah Diet.' We celebrate its true creator."

Malkmus's diet is one of a batch of Bible-based eating plans flooding bookstores and health food stores. Last summer's "What Would Jesus Eat?" by Dr. Don Colbert, encourages eating non-animal-derived "living foods" and eschewing most "dead" or processed foods.

"The Weigh Down Diet" by Gwen Shamblin offers few food restrictions but encourages following "God's perfect boundaries of hunger and fullness."

Malkmus's diet — which draws, he says, from Genesis 1:29 — bans all animal products except for honey and promotes an 80 percent raw diet.

And there's the newest addition to the growing Christian health genre, Jordan S. Rubin's "The Maker's Diet." Drawn

from the book of Leviticus, Rubin's diet encourages eating certain meat and dairy products and warns against an all-raw, vegan regimen.

"The healthiest diet is to consume meats, poultry, dairy, fruits and vegetables and to consume them in a form the body was designed for," Rubin said. He advises eating foods in their most organic and least-processed forms. Dairy, for instance, should not be pasteurized and defatted and pumped with hormones but rather taken as a yogurt drink derived from raw, fermented milk.

Meat or vegan? Raw or cooked? The abundance of allegedly godly guidance is enough to make the would-be dieter pray for divine intervention.

Elisabetta Politi, nutrition manager at Duke University's Diet and Fitness Center in Durham, hopes people don't take the proposed diets too seriously.

"I am just thinking of the safety of having unprocessed dairy products. From a public health perspective, it's undoable," Politi said of Rubin's push for raw milk. "It's an extreme going back to an agriculture society that we are no longer."

There's nothing new about religious beliefs dictating what

people put in their mouths. Some Jews keep kosher, while observant Muslims adhere to dietary requirements called halal. Generations of Catholics grew up not eating meat on Fridays.

But the new God-based diets target two specific audiences not generally thought of as compatible — evangelical Christians and what Politi calls the "back to nature" health buffs who gravitate toward an organic way of eating.

Rubin, a Messianic Jew, says he is a member of both clans. He peddles supplements and lifestyle products to the health food industry through his Garden of Life company. At the same time, he describes himself as a "biblical health coach."

"My ministry is to help change the health of this world one life at a time," he said.

Similar claims by Malkmus, Shamblin and others rankle those who see spinning the \$40 billion diet industry to a Christian audience as just another way of using God as a gimmick.

"It's not just cashing in," said Stephen Barrett, a Columbia University-trained psychologist and founder of the Internet site "Quackwatch."

"I think that the people who promote these things, they're here to save the world and they

preach and they're the Messiah (of health). Their personalities and characters have all sorts of grandiosity" and little scientific basis, Barrett said.

Politi applauds the focus on healthy eating, but adds, "I don't think it has to be confused with God."

Mainstream nutritional or medical credentials are hard to come by in this crowd. Rubin says he holds degrees in naturopathic medicine and nutrition, but both involved unaccredited programs and his degrees couldn't be verified.

Malkmus, who said he is not currently affiliated with a specific church, has no formal scientific training. But he does employ a researcher who determined that the Hallelujah diet was deficient in vitamin B-12.

"This shocked me, that God's perfect eating plan could have a flaw," Malkmus said. "But we realized that fruits and vegetables back then were more nutritious because of the topsoil."

Barrett sees the 70-year-old Malkmus — who claims he healed his own colon cancer through diet but doesn't furnish medical records — as the best of a bad lot.

"Malkmus has a little more ethics than (others)," he said.

Malkmus's argument that people who ate a raw diet in biblical times lived an average of 912 years gets little more than a laugh from Barrett and Politi.

"It can't be scientifically tested or proven," Barrett said of the contention.

King's Daughters to undergo massive expansion

ASHLAND — Officials at King's Daughters Medical Center unveiled plans Thursday for a \$66.3 million expansion that will include a 120,000-square foot cardiac-care center.

The additions also include more on-campus physician offices and more parking and will also create 500 jobs.

Fred Jackson, the hospital's chief executive officer, said the expansion's four projects will meet area demand for health care. He said the hospital has seen double-digit growth in recent years.

"This is the future, not only for the medical center but for the region," Jackson said.

The centerpiece is the \$43.5 million Heart and Vascular Center. Expandable to 10 floors, the center's initial three will feature office space, a 20-bed chest pain unit of private rooms where patients who exhibit symptoms of heart attack can be closely monitored, seven state-of-the-art heart catheterization labs and

36 private patient rooms, and other dedicated labs.

The ground floor will feature a cardiac rehabilitation unit, as well as a therapy pool. KDMC's administrative offices also will be relocated to the ground floor.

Construction is due to begin on the heart center in September. It is expected to open in spring 2006.

"In our 105-year history, we've never built a project as big," Jackson said.






The expansion's three other projects include a five-story \$5.5 million "parking deck" to open next year with 526 parking spaces, and two currently under way — a four-floor \$15 million medical plaza slated to open next May, which will house 14 physician suites and the Surgical Weight Loss Program; and the \$2.3 million King's Daughters Hospitality House for families and patients who travel long distances.

One-third of the project's total price tag will be met by KDMC's operations budget. The facility will finance the other two-thirds on the tax-exempt bond market, Jackson said.

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Fletcher asks Bush to declare weather disaster

LOUISVILLE — Cleanup from storms that wreaked damage in the millions of dollars continued Monday as Gov. Ernie Fletcher asked President Bush to declare a major disaster in Kentucky.

Five days of storms produced

tornados, flooding and mud slides. Five deaths were blamed on the weather.

Statewide damage estimates reached \$17 million Monday, said Stacy Floden, information officer for Kentucky Emergency Management.

In a letter to the White House, Fletcher said storm damages "pose an immediate and

long-term threat to the safety, health and well-being of thousands of Kentuckians" and federal assistance will be needed.

In Martin County, cleanup crews were working Monday to finish clearing roads that had been covered with mud from torrential rains.

County Judge-Executive Kelly Callaham said the next task would be to haul away debris — including soaked carpet and rotting food — from flooded homes.

"This stuff is really starting to smell bad now," Callaham said in a telephone interview.

Floodwaters destroyed about 150 homes in the county, including some that were washed off their foundations and swept away. Callaham said about 350 more homes were damaged.

Damage to roads and bridges in the county was placed at \$1.6 million, he said. Some people were sleeping in their cars to

prevent looting to their damaged homes, Callaham said.

"It's just a slow process," he said. "Everybody needs to be patient and maybe we can get this mess cleaned up in the next week or two."

Also in Eastern Kentucky floodwaters damaged or destroyed several hundred homes in Floyd County, said Bill Dotson, the county's 911 director.

Several families were staying at a local hotel, with the Red Cross and other groups pitching in to pay the tabs, he said.

In Henry County in north-central Kentucky, the cleanup continued from a storm that spawned a tornado in Eminence on May 27.

"With the amount of damage, it's slow going at this time," Eminence Police Chief Mount Hadden said Monday. "But we are starting to make some headway."

Thirty-six of Kentucky's 120 counties reported damage, according to the Fletcher administration. Floods and tornados damaged or destroyed over 2,000 homes, and more than 1,000 people reportedly were still displaced in Henry, Floyd, Magoffin and Martin counties.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency estimated \$15 million in "infrastructure" damage, which included damage to roads, bridges and public buildings.

Fletcher requested individual disaster assistance in the 36 counties known to have damage plus neighboring counties in

which there might be future claims.

Floden, of Kentucky Emergency Management, said state officials hope to get a response from the White House this week. She said much of the repair work is on hold until property owners find out if federal assistance will be available.

If there is a federal disaster declaration, property owners could seek aid to repair or replace homes or for lodging expenses. Assistance could be in the form of grants or low-inter-

est loans.

Fletcher's disaster declaration request to President Bush covered 67 counties — the 36 counties known to have damage plus neighboring counties in which there might be future claims. The governor asked for individual assistance or public assistance or both.

Fletcher requested public assistance only for Boyd and Daviess counties.

He requested individual

his actions: "We physically cannot get into some of these areas in Eastern Kentucky," said Stacy Floden, a spokeswoman for the state Division of Emergency Management.

I would have you know that while eating dinner in a local restaurant on Tuesday night, I was greeted by state Attorney General Greg Stumbo. He certainly "got here" from Frankfort and so did other state employees sent in to assess the damage.

In a meeting of the Floyd County Fiscal Court, the Salvation Army had a representative that came to us from Oklahoma, the Southern Baptist Association brought volunteers in from nearly everywhere, and the Episcopal Church has volunteers coming from Kenilworth, Ill.

My daughter, a college student from Eastern Kentucky University, is volunteering with the American Red Cross and she has made it into the flood-damaged areas of Floyd County and so did Floyd County Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson and, I might add, without the aid of a helicopter or airplane. But we have to, because these people are our people and they need us.

This action by our lieutenant governor is inexcusable, unless of course he wasn't wearing the proper uniform, or didn't have his shirttail tucked in. Maybe he couldn't hide his tattoo from the general public, or had just pierced his ear? Perhaps there's a "new policy" that prohibits him from visiting the very lands from which he received the votes to do his work?

Appalachian charities struggle to meet needs of prison families

INEZ — When Eileen Mullins heard that a federal prison would be built on a remote eastern Kentucky mountaintop, she immediately started raising money to build a place for poor families to stay while visiting incarcerated relatives.

The retired teacher whose own son was imprisoned for manslaughter has seen the hardship faced by families from inner-city New York, Chicago and Washington, D.C., who must make long hauls through mountain roads for even short visits.

"I saw hurting people," said Mullins, whose Haven of Rest is set to open later this summer. "Some drive for hours in cars that would hardly run to get to the prison. Others had enough

money for gas but not enough for food. They had to sleep overnight in their cars because they couldn't afford hotels."

Churches and charities are stepping up to help the inmate families they see as unintended victims of a prison-building boom designed to bring jobs to remote stretches of Appalachia. Their hardship is multiplied in the federal system, because those eight prisons in the region can take inmates from anywhere in the country.

"It's not unusual for people to have to travel 10, 12 hours to get here," said John Benish, who operates a hospitality house with his wife near the federal prison in Alderson, W.Va. "Christian ministries are left to help these hurting people. Part of the calling for churches is to visit prisoners and to be there for prisoners' families, because they're

hurting, too."

Robbie Pentecost, a nun who serves as executive director of the Catholic Committee on Appalachia, said accommodating the visits is important not just for humanitarian reasons, but also because studies have shown that inmates who receive visits are less likely to be repeat offenders.

Pentecost said church leaders are considering opening additional hospitality houses in other Appalachian communities where prisons have opened.

For Mullins, images of grim-faced mothers, fathers, wives and children waiting to see their loved one were as unforgettable as seeing her own son in orange prison garb and shackles for the first time. She said she longed to help those other families.

"No matter how brokenhearted she was, she could see the

needs of those around her," said June Rice, who serves on the ministry's advisory board. "In her gloom, she could see that she at least had a way to get to prison to visit her son and enough money to buy food and stay overnight at a hotel."

Traci Billingsley, a spokeswoman for the Federal Bureau of Prisons, said the government's goal is to house inmates within 500 miles of their homes. She acknowledged, however, that isn't always possible.

Filmmaker Nick Szuberla, who is working on a public television documentary on inmate families titled "From the Holler to the Hood," said the problems are unavoidable because new prisons just aren't being built near big cities.

"When you look at where prisons have been sited in the last 20 years, you see that rural

communities are predominate," he said. "Cities don't want them. Rural communities need the jobs they bring."

Towns like Manchester, Whitley City and Inez, which were hurting from a declining coal economy, welcomed the prisons for the jobs they created.

"Because Appalachia is a depressed area, people need jobs," Benish said. "When you go to work as a correctional officer at a federal prison, you start out at more than \$30,000. In the economy here, \$30,000 is darn good."

David Aker, mountain missions director for the Kentucky Baptist Convention, said the initiative by Mullins will be crucial

for many of the families of the 1,400 inmates in the nearby Big Sandy prison. After the lodge opens, it will provide free housing and food for inmate families.

Aker said he has been impressed that so many people have been willing to help Mullins with the project.

"They understand," he said, "that but for the grace of God, this could be me."

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State, FEMA crews survey road damage

"We have abandoned all routine maintenance since flooding began this past weekend," said Darold Slone, operations branch manager for Highway District 12. "Instead, our maintenance and traffic crews have worked on areas where state roads are washed out, trying to temporarily fix them so that they are passable. We have also been busy with slide removal, getting trees out of roads, removing rockfalls, and cleaning out culvert pipes and ditches."

Slone said that Lawrence County is probably the only one of District 12's seven counties that has been able to proceed with routine summer maintenance, which includes the district's ditching program, pothole patching and lane patching.

Preliminary estimates to clean up and repair damage to state roads and bridges from recent storms may reach more than \$6 million, according to Slone.

Of the district's seven counties, five sustained permanent damage and six require cleanup

work due specifically to problems caused by heavy rainfall over Memorial Day weekend and into the first of this week.

"Johnson, Martin, Floyd, Knott, Pike, and Letcher all had damage to one degree or another," Slone said, "with Martin, Johnson, Floyd and Pike suffering the most."

Slone said he and the district's maintenance engineers have already been in the field with FEMA representatives, working to determine how much repairs will cost.

"We are working with FEMA in Johnson, Martin, Floyd, Pike and Knott counties," he explained. "We have not been notified by the folks in Frankfort that FEMA will be looking at either Lawrence or Letcher counties."

Slone said that some repairs require equipment beyond what District 12 has at its disposal. "These will require authorization from FEMA so that federal funding can be obtained to contract the work," he said.

Slone seemed fairly confi-

dent that at least Johnson, Martin, Floyd, and Pike counties suffered sufficient damage to meet the guidelines for a Presidential disaster declaration.

"There may have been some small doubt about Pike County, as expressed by the county's DES director, Doug Tackett, but that was before we added our estimates in with the county's," Slone said. "Hopefully, our estimates will put the county 'over

the top,' so to speak."

Without a presidential decla-

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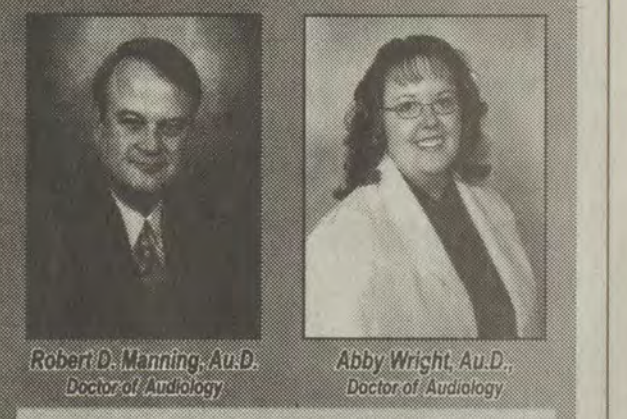
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Kentucky teachers near federal standard

LOUISVILLE — Kentucky public school teachers are close to achieving a new mark required by the federal government, with almost 95 percent of last year's classes taught by teachers considered

"highly qualified" under the standards.

The state's first official account showed 7,901 courses that didn't meet the standard.

The requirement is part of President Bush's No Child Left Behind school accountability law. By the end of the 2005-06 school year, all teachers who lead core academic classes — such as reading, science, math and social studies — must have a bachelor's degree, be fully state certified and prove mastery in the subject they teach through a col-

lege major, tests or by meeting state-set standards of expertise. The rule was designed keep students from being saddled with poor teachers.

The percentage missing the bar in Jefferson County was "much lower than we had thought," said district personnel director Bill Eckels, who attributed that to stricter hiring and state licensing rules. Jefferson County's count showed 98 percent of its classes were taught by teachers considered "highly qualified" under the standards.

Kentucky has an edge in meeting the federal standard, officials said, because most teachers need majors in their subjects. And Kentucky requires teachers to have a college degree, pass subject competency tests and serve a one-year internship, unlike some states.

"We already have a good system in place for ensuring high-quality teachers," said

Brent McKim, a physics teacher and president of the Jefferson County Teachers Association.

Of the classes that didn't meet the standard last year, many involved special-education educators teaching multiple subjects. Others were middle school teachers who were certified for kindergarten through grade eight but never took middle school subject competency exams. Still more were emergency-certified teachers and those who had been assigned a class outside their field of proven expertise, such as a physics teacher who took on a biology class.

Officials say that doesn't mean there are unqualified teachers heading classrooms.

"The reality is, you can be fully state certified but not highly qualified," said Phillip Rogers, an official with the Kentucky Education Professional Standards Board. "Teachers (with years of experience) are saying, 'Hey, wait a minute. Now you're telling me I'm not highly qualified?'"

Those failing to meet the federal requirement will need additional training or course work, or will have to take "Praxis" exams, tests that show whether teachers have sufficient knowledge of cer-

tain subjects for the students' grade level, officials said.

Officials say they don't foresee a problem meeting the 2005-06 deadline. Earlier this year the U.S. Department of Education gave teachers in isolated rural areas an extra year, or until 2007, to show they are qualified in all their classes.

There's no direct sanction for failing to meet the requirement on time. But the federal government has already put conditions on grant aid to several states for providing insufficient information on highly qualified teachers, according to the U.S. Department of Education. Similar action would be taken if districts ignore the law, department officials said.

Also, schools are required to report if they are not in compliance, and Title I schools, which have concentrations of low-income students, must send letters to parents when they fall out of compliance.

"That may add some public pressure," Rogers said, noting that schools are taking the requirement seriously.

Research shows teacher quality has a huge influence

on student learning and "can make or break a child's academic progress for years to come," according to a recent report by The Education Trust, a Washington D.C.-based education research group.

Susan Leib, executive director of the Kentucky teacher standards board, said the law already has helped reduce the state's emergency-certified teachers by 40 percent, to about 700, from a year earlier. Districts realize most such teachers won't qualify and are avoiding such hires, she said.

Emergency-certified teachers need only a college degree and as few as six hours of teacher training a year.

Teachers themselves get no added money or reward for meeting the requirement.

Kentucky has long ranked comparatively high in teacher quality. The 2003 "Quality Counts" report, compiled by the journal Education Week, ranked it second-best in the nation for teacher quality. It cited Kentucky for being the only state to prohibit out-of-field teaching, and praised its testing and teacher preparation programs.

and are helping Floyd, Johnson, Magoffin and Martin counties. The Red Cross is independently operating as a non-paid organization and relies solely on public donations to continue its services.

Currently the Red Cross is providing 400 meals twice a day to families in need, not to mention the moral support that these volunteers convey to bolster lagging spirits. They know the names of every person on their assigned routes, they get out of their trucks with open arms and smiles on their faces.

When asked why they choose to do this, John, one of the volunteers said, "People do this because of their heart." He has been doing national disaster services for several years and was called out during the Sept. 11 tragedy in New York.

"Nothing could compare to that disaster," he said as he looked down with a sigh.

Shirley Besing, a volunteer from Indiana, said, "I think floods are the worst disasters, because even though you may still have your home, you have to go in and try to clean up the mud and see everything you have destroyed."

As Besing and her husband Clinneth drove their route up Abbott Creek, and stopped sporadically to hand out food. One family had a dead battery in their vehicle, and Clinneth Besing didn't even hesitate to pull up to the car and help the man charge

his battery.

"We are here to help," Clinneth Besing said as he handed out meals.

The volunteers for the American Red Cross do not get paid for their services and are usually called out for three weeks at a time. When a disaster happens, the national chapter will start making calls to local chapters until they have enough volunteers to cover all the areas that need their services.

When they arrive in a disaster area, they begin going to businesses and restaurants asking for donations or help. The food for our area, for example is being supplied by a cooperative effort between Red Light Diner and Pizza Palace. The Red Cross pays for the food, but the restaurants are cooking and helping to load the trucks for the Red Cross.

The Red Cross is still looking for donations for water to give out to those who need it. According to Shirley Besing, "Water is the hardest thing to get donated."

Sheila Crockett, one of the people hit hard by the flood, said, "The Red Cross has been wonderful through all of this." She pointed at Clinneth and Shirley Besing and said, "Those two are great. I don't know what we would have done without them."

Couple sues doctors, hospital for malpractice

Highlands Regional Medical Center and two local doctors are the focus of a malpractice suit filed this week in circuit court.

John and Mary Speer, of Wheelwright, filed suit against Dr. Brendan M. McKenna, Dr. Jack Kendrick and the hospital for alleged negligence which occurred before and after the birth of their daughter, Kayla.

Kayla Speer, born in February 2002, suffers with brain damage, right side extremity loss and shows early signs of cerebral palsy, their lawyer, James Bryant, said.

Bryant claims in the suit that McKenna, an obstetrician with Archer Clinic in Prestonsburg, failed to properly monitor and control Mary Speer's gestational diabetes during her pregnancy, a mistake they say led to the extreme difficulties now afflicting their 2-year-old daughter.

Bryant also says that McKenna failed to offer Mary Speer a scheduled caesarian

section delivery and failed to notify her of his planned absence at the time of her expected delivery.

"Those failures led to certain metabolic conditions the baby had after delivery," Bryant said, noting that the extent of the child's brain damage can only be determined as she grows older.

The suit also accuses Kendrick, a pediatrician who cared for the child after to her discharge from Highlands, with negligence, alleging he failed to require timely CBC tests within the first 4 hours of her birth. They also claim Kendrick failed to perform a post-delivery dislustrial transfusion and properly monitor and assess lab tests on the child, "substantial factors," they say, in causing the child to have strokes and suffer permanent brain damage.

Kendrick cared for the child following her birth on

Feb. 22, 2002, until she was transferred to Cabell Huntington Hospital the following day.

The couple is suing the hospital for granting staff medical privileges to McKenna and Kendrick and for "failing to adequately investigate and reinvestigate" their applications for those privileges.

They are asking that all three entities be held liable for the problems now afflicting Kayla Speer and seek compensation for medical expenses, including psychological counseling, vocational education, physical therapy, and legal fees.

Calls to McKenna and Highlands were unreturned yesterday. Kendrick declined to comment.

Dr. Calliando, the doctor who delivered the child, was not named in the suit.

public intoxication were diverted in district court last month.

Allen said Hall's teaching certificate will remain effective and no action will be taken against her if she completes the diversionary period, which ends in May 2005.

"In this case, there has been no conviction," Allen said. "We're not able to take action because there's been no conviction against her for that conduct. It's not likely we can prove that she engaged in that conduct because her husband was the only other witness there."

Hall and her husband, Jarrad, allegedly led officers an ATV chase along Route 979 in the Teaberry area, where they then pulled off onto Dry Branch road, which leads to a

local strip mine.

Jarred Hall, facing 20 separate charges, including five counts of first degree wanton endangerment, and counts of first-, second- and third-degree drug possession, pleaded not guilty during his arraignment. He is scheduled for a preliminary hearing later this month.

Officers confiscated OxyContin, Lortab, Xanax, alprazolam and other unidentified white pills from Jarrad Hall, along with a black straw with a powder residue on it. He later said he had a prescription for every pill in his possession.

Supt. Dr. Paul Fanning declined to comment Monday, saying only that the Board of Education hopes to see the diversionary process work.

make an arrest in this case due to an anonymous tip.

"That's how we make all of our cases," the officer said.

Though many poachers are clever and can have some success, they can expect to get no mercy from the courts if they are caught.

"I'm a sportsman and have been for 20 or so years," Hall said. "I take a hard line on poaching."

ving his niece home, said Kretzer "darted out" in front of him before he realized what was happening.

"She wasn't looking in my direction," Turner said. "She darted out in front of me. I was in the middle lane heading that way and she was almost on the yellow line. I swerved into the oncoming traffic lane and I thought I missed her, but then I heard something hit on the back tire area. I pulled in here (the Taco Bell parking lot) and she was sitting there."

Investigating officer Trent Combs confirmed through witness statements that Turner, who was driving north in the center lane, swerved to miss Kretzer.

"The tail end of the vehicle caught her," Combs said.


Several people in the restaurant ran out in the road to help the woman, as others were holding back traffic. She was taken to the Taco Bell parking lot before ambulances arrived at the scene and was later transported by Respond Ambulance Service to Highlands Regional Medical Center.

The extent of her injuries were not released yesterday.

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Housingers still feel tainted by dropped internet scheme charges

AUXIER — Nick and Linda Housinger, along with Frank Richter, were arrested in May of last year for allegedly helping a man from Nigeria, Peter Deanx, receive goods that were bought with phony and, in one case, stolen credit cards.

Last month, a Floyd County grand jury declined to indict them, but the three still believe that many believe them to be guilty. Linda Housinger says she is fed up with it.

"We have never been in trouble with the law," Linda Housinger said.

A fair amount of attention was paid to the case in terms of the Federal Bureau of Investigation getting involved and formal charges being sorted out but none of this has happened. The Housingers say they should feel vindicated but have instead felt that they were treated as if they were guilty until proven innocent.

Some details of the case were never clear in the reports that were published about it. The packages were ordered by Deanx, who paid for everything with questionable cards, but the Housingers were only involved in shipping them to Nigeria and never placed orders themselves. They say essentially were a drop shipment operation.

The three say they have learned from the experience and have corresponded with others across the country warning them about deals which involve shipping to Africa.

"We just don't want to see anyone get used like we were," said Nick Housinger.

Linda Housinger was most distressed about how the charges disrupted her charity efforts for Loveline Outreach, which she founded in 1983. She says the charges have continued to affect the charity, which doles out food, toys and clothing to families in need.

Housinger founded the

Loveline Outreach after being diagnosed with agoraphobia, which is a fear of the outdoors.

"I saw the need in this area," Linda Housinger said. "Due to my illness, I am available all of the time and wanted to put a positive use to that."

Nick Housinger was an trucker who lost his job because of the arrest and he remains upset about how the case was handled.

"They left our house wide open," Nick Housinger said. "They were supposed to make arrangements for my dog and it spent 14 hours locked in my truck till they got around to it."

Things went better for the Housingers when the courts got involved.

"Judge Eric Hall did right by us and was very fair," Nick Housinger said. "It would be nice, though, to get attention for the case being dropped rather than no attention because everyone is left with the impression that we did something."

Linda Housinger mentioned that the three have tried to help authorities get to the bottom of the case.

"I helped Deputy Shepherd contact Deanx over the internet," Linda Housinger said. "We had nothing to hide. They searched here for 10 hours. Frank even contacted the con-

sulate in Nigeria but they told us to leave it to the local authorities so we contacted the FBI ourselves and offered them whatever they needed."

Despite the experience they harbor no grudges.

"The police were all pretty decent to us for the most part," Nick Housinger said.

Linda Housinger's concern is to keep Loveline Outreach going. The charity received a few news reports in its lifetime and depends on donations, that have never included money, to continue.

"When I am doing work for Loveline, then I am feeling alive," she said.

Loveline Outreach continues to accept donations of food, clothing and toys and is aiming for a big Christmas giveaway for indigent children. This year's "Miracle Christmas for Children" campaign hopes to see a toy for every child in the region.

Hazard beat Johnson Central 14-8 in a regular-season meeting.

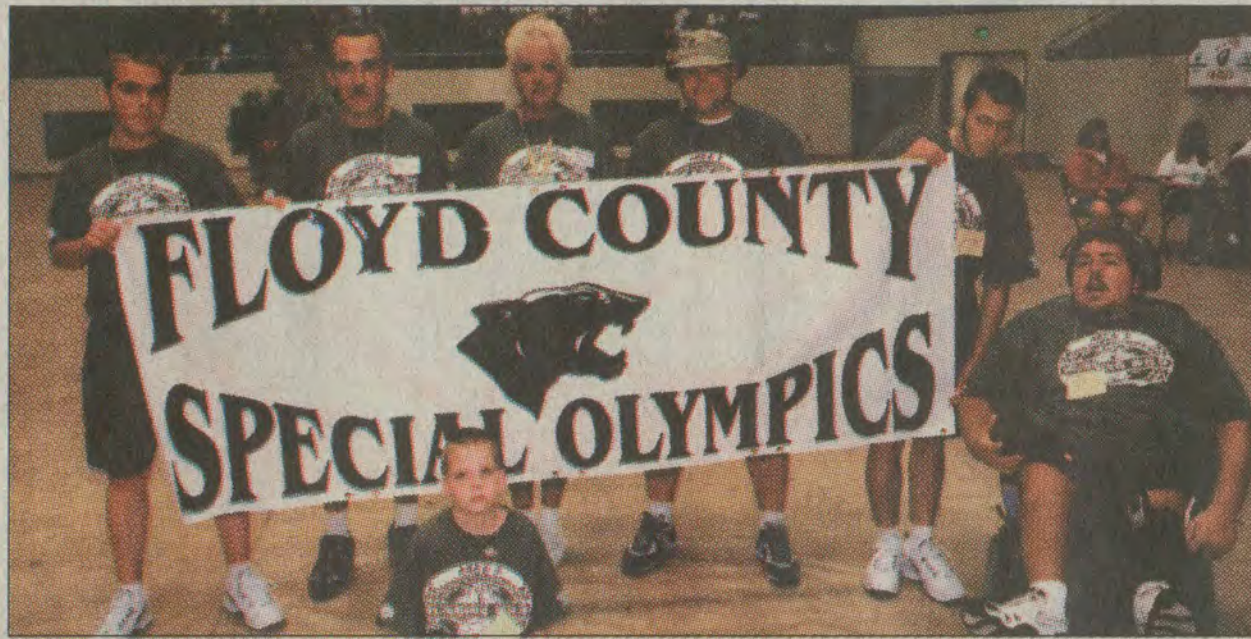
Ashland won the 16th Region and will play for a chance to appear in the state tournament.

Griffey closes in on 500 homers

OAKLAND, Calif. — As Ken Griffey Jr. closes in on another major milestone, it's clear 500 home runs means a lot more to his family than it does to the slugger.

While his wife, kids and father made the long journey to Oakland to see if Griffey can hit the two homers he needs to become the 20th player in that exclusive club, Griffey tried to deflect any questions about the

meaning of the milestone. "I haven't hit it yet, so I can't tell you how it will feel," Griffey said before Monday's 13-2 loss to the Athletics. "We'll see when the time comes. Right now, I can't worry about how I'll feel three weeks from now, a month from now or whenever. I'm just worried about today."

Griffey's entourage will have to wait at least one more night. He went 1-for-3 with a single before leaving the game in the sixth inning trailing 11-2.

"I just threw him a lot of sinkers," A's starter Mark Mulder said. "If he was going to hit a home run, I wanted it to be off my best pitch."

Even though the 34-year-old Griffey is poised to reach 500 faster than all but five players, getting there has taken longer than people thought.

Griffey finished the 2000 season — his first with Cincinnati — with 438 homers, trailing Barry Bonds by only 56, and seemed ready to reach 500 in early 2002.

But three injury-plagued seasons have delayed the milestone by two years. Now, instead of Griffey being the player mentioned as most likely to break Hank Aaron's career record of 755 home runs, it's Bonds who has that label with 674 homers.

"If he had stayed healthy, he would have done some awesome things," said Expos man-

ager Frank Robinson, one of the members of the 500 club. "It just wasn't to be. But he's still a young man as far as this game is concerned."

After a slow start this season it seemed as if Griffey would never regain the form that made him an All-Century player ahead of Bonds. Pitchers challenged him with impunity and even intentionally walked Sean Casey to face him — quite an insult for a player of Griffey's caliber.

But over the past couple weeks, Griffey once again is hitting the way he did when he was younger. He has nine homers in his last 15 games, including two Sunday against Montreal. "They started missing the label and hitting the barrel," he said. "For a while the balls were hitting the label. A few minor adjustments had to be made, and that's it."

While Griffey's father, who hit 172 homers in his big league career, came to watch his son this week, the two haven't talked about what the milestone would mean.

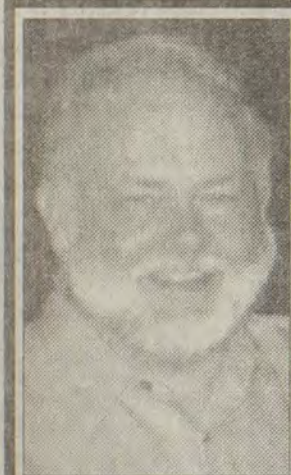
"We don't talk about things like that," Griffey said. "As a father and son we don't talk about accomplishments. He comes in and asks where the kids are. Even when I played Little League or basketball, he

Football program placed on probation, school fined

LOUISVILLE — Louisville Holy Cross' football program has been placed on probation and the school fined and ordered to pay the cost of an investigation after the Kentucky High School Athletic Association found the program recruited athletes.

The future of the school's coach, Ray Riedinger, was uncertain. Sister Maryann Tarquinio, the principal, said she understood that Riedinger intended to resign. But Riedinger said he doesn't intend to.

"I have not officially given a letter of resignation," he told The Courier-Journal Friday night. "If anything, at this point, the principal is not going to renew my contract."

The program was given two years' probation and the school fined \$1,000 by the KHSAA. In addition to the \$1,000 fine, the KHSAA required the school to pay \$1,812.28 for the cost of the investigation.

The school did not appeal the KHSAA's verdict, but Riedinger said he is looking into appealing as an individual.

According to the school, the

KHSAA cited several offenses, including:

—Arranging for discounted tuition for players; such discounts were not generally available to other students. (Tuition this past school year was about \$5,000.)

—Providing prospects with special recognition at sports events and giving them transportation to at least one game.

—Providing prospective athletes with souvenirs bearing the football insignia.

—Engaging in inappropriate communication with prospects.

The investigation apparently began about 18 months ago, when North Bullitt coach Brett Newton complained to the KHSAA about Holy Cross' contacts with youth-league players in his district. Newton said Friday that he knows of at least seven such players — none of whom went to Holy Cross.

"We had had at least one kid that said he got personal phone calls from coach Riedinger," Newton said. "Even in the vagueness of how you could interpret all the rulings, how you could think that calling a kid at home would be OK is beyond me."

Newton welcomed the sanc-

tions but said of Riedinger: "I didn't want him to lose his job." However, he said, the penalties may send a message. "If people see that they (the KHSAA) are taking (recruiting) seriously, and if you do try these things, there could be penalties. ... It's not worth losing your job over."

Newton said his complaint involved players who stayed home, not those who went to Holy Cross.

"They had a great season last year, and three of the starters lived in our district," he said. "And we didn't complain about those because ... they weren't going to say bad things (about Holy Cross)."

Holy Cross won 12 straight games last season before falling to Danville in the Class A quarterfinals. Riedinger's five-year record at the school, his alma mater, is 42-17.

"We apologize to all our students, parents and alumni for these problems," Tarquinio said in a statement released by the school. "Holy Cross is committed to running an ethical athletic program."

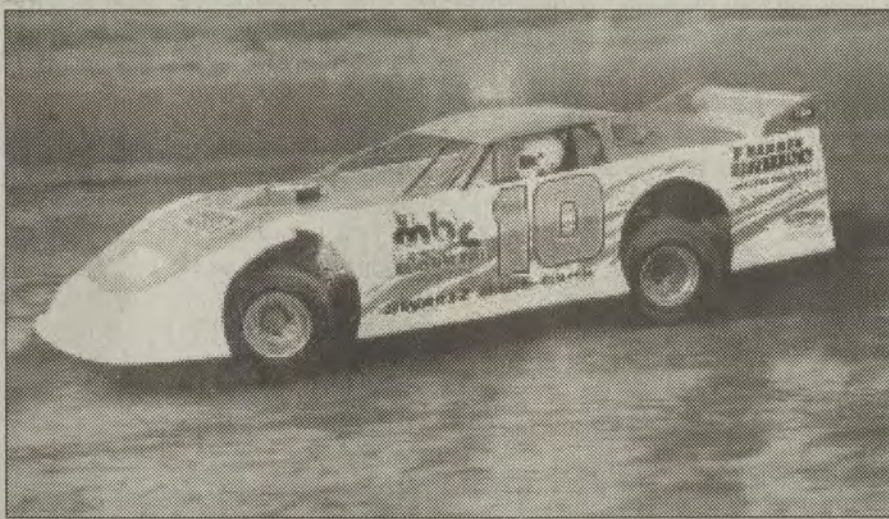

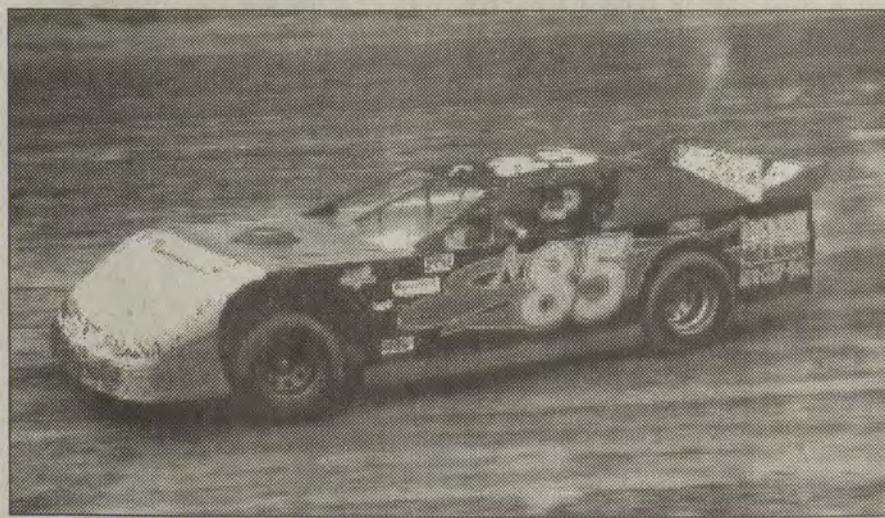

Reds make Texas right-hander top pick

CINCINNATI — David "Homer" Bailey, who had a minuscule 0.49 earned run average while winning all 14 games he started this year as a high school senior in Texas, was taken by the Cincinnati Reds in the first round of Monday's baseball draft.

"I'm as excited as I could be," said Bailey, the seventh pick overall in the draft taken from La Grange High School.

Bailey, 18, also had two saves and struck out 187 in 85 2/3 innings this season. He walked 15 batters and hit 17. Opponents batted just .106 (30-for-238).

"You always want a pitcher like this," said Terry Reynolds, conducting his first draft as Cincinnati's director of amateur scouting.

Reynolds said Bailey's fastball averages 92 to 96 mph and he has a sharp breaking pitch.

General manager Dan O'Brien said he saw Bailey pitch in a tournament game about three weeks ago.

"It was a man playing with

boys," O'Brien said.

It is the second year in a row that the Reds took a Texas pitcher with their first pick.

Last year, the Reds picked University of Houston closer Ryan Wagner in the first round. Wagner made just nine minor-league appearances before making his major league debut last July 19.

As a Yoakum High School senior in 2001, Wagner was beaten by then-freshman Bailey in a Class 3-A regional final. La Grange went on to win the Class 3-A championship that year.

"La Grange and Yoakum aren't very far apart," said Bailey, whose nickname "Homer" is the name of his great-grandfather. "We always play them once or twice a year."

"As a freshman, he wasn't afraid to compete against older guys," Reynolds said.

Bailey has a scholarship to the University of Texas, but the Reds are confident that he'll sign.

"He told us right from the beginning that he wanted to be a major-league pitcher," Reynolds said. "He said if he was selected in the first round, he wanted to go play."

"The Reds understand me and know that all I'm looking for is fairness as far as money," Bailey said. "My goal is to play professional baseball."

The 6-foot-4, 185-pound right-hander was considered by most experts to be the No. 1 high school pitcher in the draft. Baseball America rated his fastball, breaking pitches and command the best among this year's high school pitchers.

Baseball America ranked Bailey No. 6 overall on its Top 100 Prospects list.

always asked how the team did first, and then at the end he'd ask how I did."

Griffey's heralded return home to Cincinnati has not been the fairy tale people thought it would be. Acquired in a trade with Seattle before the 2000 season, Griffey signed a below-market \$116.5 million, nine-year contract just to be able to stay at home.

But the assortment of injuries and losses turned the once happy-go-lucky, backwards-cap wearing kid into a frustrated veteran. The Reds even tried to trade him only to have Phil Nevin block a deal to San Diego after the 2002 season and an injury halt talk of a trade to the New York Yankees last summer.

Now the Reds are in first place and Griffey is happy to be

coming to the ballpark. Most importantly, he is healthy.

"There are good days and bad days. I just deal with it like every other player in the league," he said. "If I run into a wall, I run into a wall. If I have to dive I'll dive. If I get hurt doing that then I'll go home. It's as simple as that."

Griffey's resurgence has caught the attention of his opponents. While the A's would prefer to watch Griffey reach the milestone on TV instead of in person, they respect what he's gone through recently.

"You don't ever want to see anybody of that caliber get hurt so many times," A's first baseman Scott Hatteberg said. "I've always considered him to be one of the greatest players I've seen. To see him get back where he was is great."

Disease could affect next year's road to Triple Crown

LOUISVILLE — Doug Bredar was shocked this spring when he saw the effects of a disease that took the lives of many Kentucky foals and mares in 2001.

The racing director at Churchill Downs watched on Kentucky Derby day as the Three Chimneys Juvenile — a prominent race for 2-year-olds — went off with only five horses.

In 2002, that race drew 15

horses. In 2003, a healthy field of nine horses ran. Bredar expected the weak turnout for 2004, but what he saw still surprised him.

"Lots of things in life you know are coming and you don't really look forward to them," Bredar said. "This was one of those things."

As the racing world waits to see if Smarty Jones can complete a Triple Crown, Bredar and other horsemen are bracing for what might come in 2005 because of an outbreak of Mare Reproductive Loss Syndrome in 2001.

In late April that year, some pregnant mares in Kentucky began delivering very weak foals, which needed days of medical treatment to survive, if they lived at all. During the following weeks, hundreds of foals died and thousands of mares lost early term pregnancies.

Many of the foals were lost early in the pregnancies — foals that would have been born in 2002 and would be 2-year-olds now. The gestation period for a foal is about a year.

According to The Jockey Club, the disease reduced the number of foals born in Kentucky in 2001 by more than 500. The following year, about 1,700 foals were lost in Kentucky.

The disease baffled veterinarians. Several possible causes, including the hay eaten by mares, were considered and rejected.

David Powell, a researcher at the University of Kentucky's Maxwell H. Gluck Equine Research Center, said the exact cause is still unknown, but that

researchers are confident it had something to do with the eastern tent caterpillar. The 2001 outbreak coincided with a large infestation of the caterpillars.

Eastern tent caterpillars eat the cyanide-laced leaves of cherry trees and secrete on grass, which is then eaten by mares.

Industry and equine experts say the 2001 deaths haven't drastically affected the racing quality of this year's 3-year-old crop of thoroughbreds. But Kentucky racing officials already have seen negative effects as a result of the loss of foals that now would be racing as 2-year-olds.

Geoffrey Russell, director of sales at Keeneland Race Course in Lexington, said that track's races for 2-year-olds in its recently completed spring meet featured solid fields, "but they weren't overflowing fields, which we usually have."

Bredar said the same thing is happening at Churchill Downs during its current meet.

"Races that used to fill up with

no problem, now we're scrambling to fill them," he said.

Outside Kentucky, other tracks aren't experiencing the same problems — yet.

Mike Lakow, the racing secretary at Belmont Park in New York, said there haven't been major differences in that track's 2-year-old racing fields between last year and this year.

His counterpart at Hollywood Park in California, Martin Panza, said 2-year-old field sizes for that track's current meet are "off just a fraction, but it's not a crisis. Maybe last year I would have had 12 in a race; this year I have 10."

Panza said the disease "hasn't had much of an effect" in California. That could change next year, he said, simply because of numbers.

"If you have 2,000 fewer foals, this crop will always be a light crop," he said. "After you go through the 2-year-old seasons and you weed out a bunch of those horses, there will be less 3-year-olds. It obviously will have

some effect. A lot of it will be regional. I would imagine Kentucky will feel it more than California or New York."

Despite the foals lost in 2001, Smarty Jones and next year's top contenders are facing more competition on the road to the Triple Crown than any of the 11 horses who have earned that honor.

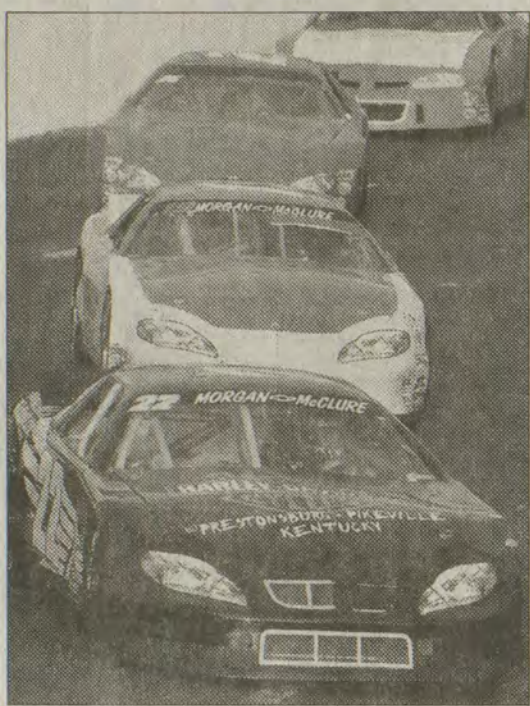
In 2001, 34,539 foals were registered in the United States, according to The Jockey Club. That was down slightly from the previous year. In 2002, the number dipped to 32,235. By 2003, it was back up to 34,025.

Affirmed, meanwhile, was one of 28,271 foals registered in 1975. Seattle Slew, foaled in 1974, was one of 27,586 thoroughbreds registered that year.

Secretariat, foaled in 1970, was one of 24,361 registered foals that year. The number of registered foals in any year didn't exceed 10,000 until 1956, 11 years after Citation — the last Triple Crown winner before Secretariat — was foaled.

'Go, Smarty!' chants turn into 'No, Smarty!'

The chants of "Go, Smarty!" quickly turned into cries of "No, Smarty" at Philly Park.

Thousands of fans jammed Smarty Jones' home track in suburban Philadelphia to cheer on the small red chestnut, only to leave disappointed by his failed Triple Crown bid.

"The Philly jinx rides again," fan Jeff Rosenthal said. "We should be getting used to this by now."

With Smarty Jones leading the charge down the stretch Saturday at Belmont, the crowd inside the Philly Park bar had started celebrating early. Then Birdstone passed the hometown hero.

The din that had begun at 9:30 a.m. when the doors opened was lost amid a deafening silence. Smarty Jones lost by a length.

Just before post time, Rosenthal had said: "This horse has no idea what he has riding on his back: the hopes and dreams of this city."

After capturing the Kentucky Derby and Preakness Stakes, many fans hoped Smarty Jones would bring an end to Philadelphia's 21-year championship drought.

"I still love him," Theresa Jones said as she shuffled past a pile of discarded betting slips. "He's still No. 1 in my book."

BAD ACTOR: It took a blindfold to get Rock Hard Ten into the starting gate at Belmont Park.

When the horse balked on his first approach, the starters walked him in a circle and tried again. He backed up and jockey Alex Solis patted his neck reassuringly.

Rock Hard Ten wasn't buying it. He kicked his hind legs, jumped and turned sideways. Solis jumped off and the starters tied a green blindfold over the colt's eyes.

This time, he went in. Trainer Jason Orman wasn't discouraged by Rock Hard Ten's fifth-place finish after the colt pressed the pace for more than a mile in the 1 1/2-mile race. The

colt was the 6-1 second choice behind Smarty Jones.

"I think we might have been too worried about Smarty Jones and not worried enough about everybody else," he said. "He's had three tough races in five weeks. He's danced every dance. He's a good horse and you'll hear more from him later on."

NERVOUS PURGE: Trainer Todd Pletcher said Purge was beaten before he set foot on the track. The colt finished last in the nine-horse field after setting the early pace in the 1 1/2-mile race.

"He got pretty wound up on us in the paddock, and he got excited in the post parade," Pletcher said. "He kind of unraveled with the crowd. He got a little too fired up."

When Purge gave up the lead to Smarty Jones on the backside, Pletcher turned his attention to Smarty.

John Velazquez and Purge were so far back, the jockey watched the infield video board to see what was happening in the stretch.

"I would have liked to have seen a Triple Crown, but that's how it goes," he said.

SMARTY'S EARNINGS: Smarty Jones earned \$200,000 for finishing second, and increased his career total to \$7,613,155.

He remained fourth on the all-time list of North American horses, behind Cigar, Skip Away and Fantastic Light.

Had he won, Smarty Jones would have collected a \$5 million bonus for sweeping the Triple Crown and \$600,000 from the Belmont purse, catapulting him to the top of the list.

SMARTY SOUVENIRS: Among the most popular souvenirs were \$2 win tickets on Smarty Jones.

Fans purchased them with the intention of not cashing them had the colt won the Triple Crown, hoping the tickets would increase in value in years to come.

At least two people took souvenir hunting to the extreme. One person arranged to purchase 10,000 tickets — at a cost of \$20,000 — and another bought

6,000 tickets.

"We had never before had much of a market for souvenir tickets," said Bill Nader, senior vice president of the New York Racing Association. "But we've seen a huge appetite for \$2 Smarty Jones tickets."

Hollywood Park in California gave away \$2 win tickets to the first 10,000 fans through the gates Saturday, which cost the track \$20,000.

RECORD CROWD, HANDLE: A record crowd of 120,139 watched Smarty Jones' Triple Crown bid.

The old mark was 103,222

for the 2002 Belmont, when 70-1 long shot Sarava derailed War Emblem's Triple try.

The crowd bet a record \$14,461,402 on the 13-race card, bettering the old mark of \$13,165,397 for the 2001 Breeders' Cup at Belmont Park.

Total handle, which includes wagering from all North American outlets, was \$110,994,890, bettering the old mark of \$98,835,163 for the 2001 Breeders' Cup.

In Memory of Jerry Herrman Dove House Ministries, Inc. (01-05-34 to 06-05-04)

non-refrigerated fruits and vegetables. People picking Kentucky strawberries also may notice sap beetles in the bottom of picking containers when sorting berries.

The beetles are small brown and black colored with short wings that do not cover the abdomen. Fruit flies resemble small flies or gnats. Adults are about one-eighth

inch long and usually have red eyes. The front part of their bodies is tan, and the rear is black.

The best way to avoid problems with these pests is to eliminate the sources of attraction. Ripened produce should be eaten, discarded or refrigerated. Eliminate breeding sites by cutting out and discarding cracked or damaged parts of fruits and veg-

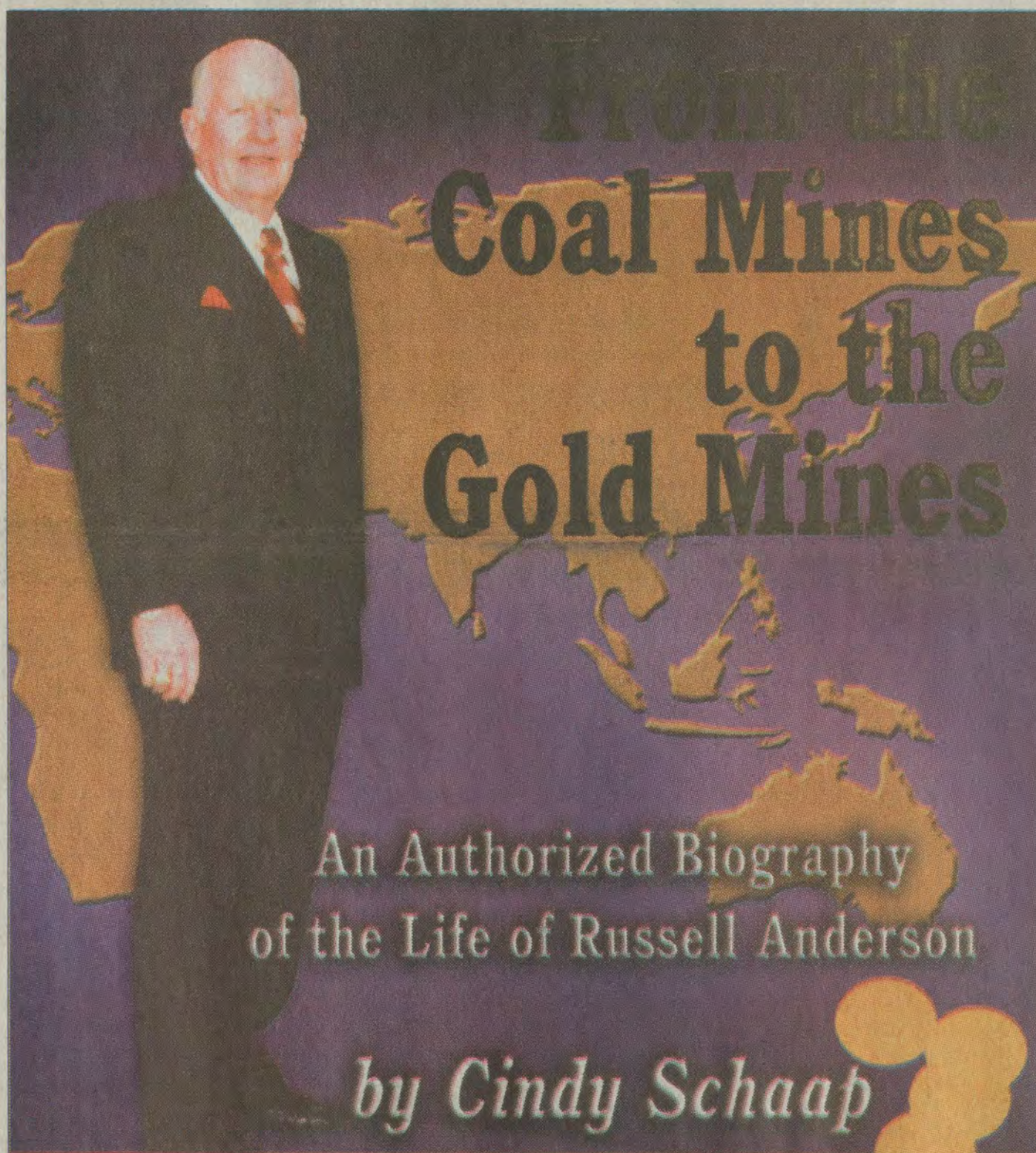
etables in case eggs or larvae are in the wounded areas.

Be sure windows and doors have tight-fitting screens to help keep adult pests from entering your home from outside.

Fruit flies also will breed in

There is a quote that I love—so much so that I have a copy of it hanging in my office and it serves as the cover page for every set of notes that I hand out in dog training classes. I read it frequently, although I know it almost by heart, because it helps me keep my perspective. The language is a little flowery, and it may require reading a few times to get the full effect of its message, but I think it is one of the most eloquent descriptions of our relationship with animals I have ever come across. "They are not brethren; they are not underlings; they are other nations, caught with ourselves in the net of life and time, fellow prisoners of the splendour and travail of the earth." Henry Beston, The Outermost House.

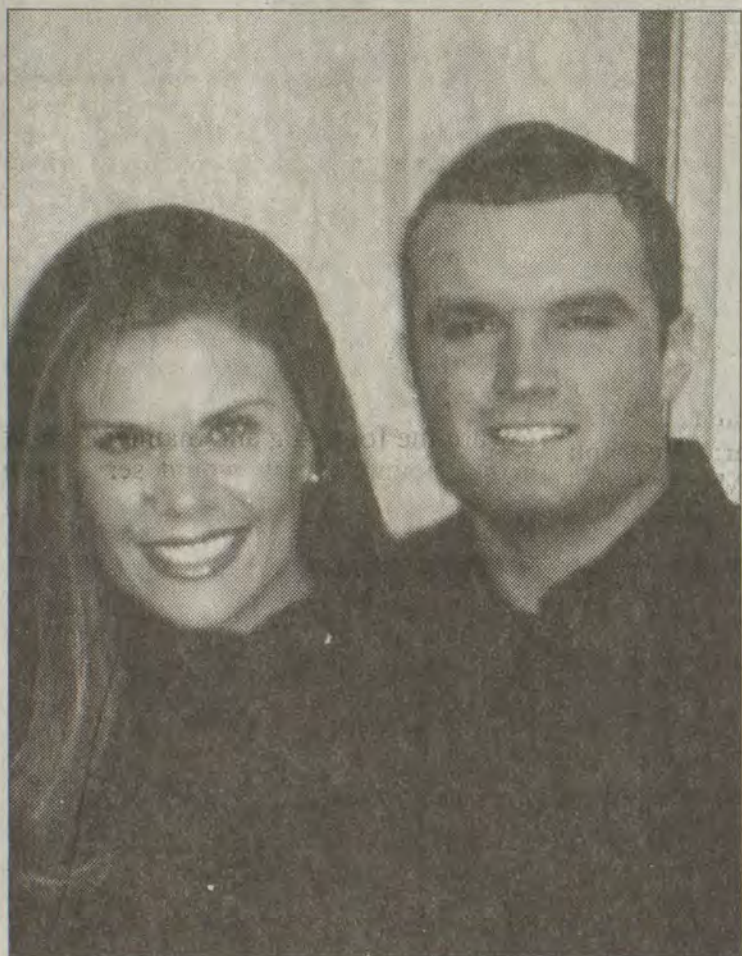

drains, garbage disposals, empty bottles and cans, trash containers, mops and cleaning rags. A moist film of fermenting material is all these pests need to develop.

It is essential to locate and eliminate all sources of attraction and potential breeding areas once your home is infested. Then use a pyrethrum-based aerosol insecticide to kill any remaining insects. If you don't find and eradicate these areas before applying an insecticide, the problem will persist

no matter how frequently you apply the treatment to control adults.

ens more than a few childhood memories relating to the unwelcome arrival of high water.

I suppose the following excerpt from my book, "Muddy Branch: Memories of an Eastern Kentucky Coal Camp," expresses it best.

"Maybe it says something about by ignorance, or maybe it speaks of my innocence, but I honestly never thought of floods as anything other than something to be enjoyed.

"As a matter of fact, as the little sticks I'd stuck in the ground to measure the rapidity of the rising water would appear to grow taller and taller, as the water receded again, I'd experience a kind of low myself, perhaps a sense that another exciting time in my life was about to end.

"I never gave a thought, either, to the pollution factor involved with flooding. Why, if the flood occurred, when it was really warm, some of the older boys would wade in it. Of course, I never did.

"I can remember Mrs. Adams telling us at school, that we'd all get typhoid fever and die if we played in the backwater, and that the health nurses were coming to vaccinate us as a preventative measure, whether we had played in the water or not. A boy named Gene told her that he wasn't taking any old shot, because he hadn't drunk enough of it to hurt him, anyway. I can't remember if he took the shot or not, but drinking it apparently did him no harm. I saw him a while back and he looked fine, except all his hair that hadn't turned white, had fallen out.

Of course, with age comes wisdom, and now we know better. When I was a kid, though, flooding was something I viewed with the same excitement as when Mom and Dad would let me go to a pie supper."

sents The Holy Spirit in the home built on the foundation that Jesus Christ is Lord," he continued.

On May 4th 1978, a certificate of incorporation was awarded to Dove House from the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

"Dove House opened a Christian gift shop on North Lake Drive, in Prestonsburg, and purchased a Christian cassette tape library. Gifts and things were added to the library so that they could pay the rent and take care of car repairs, and to purchase Bibles and Christian videotapes for the jail ministry," he told.

After a while, Jerry told how customers wanted them to handle books and Bibles, so they did. The bookstore was named Dove House Bookstore.

In the early days of Dove House, taping of the Full Gospel Business Men's Fellowship, in Pikeville, took place every month.

"The bookstore wasn't just a "bookstore - it was a ministry," Jerry quoted.

A ministry, where people came for prayer and encouragement.

Not a church, so many felt comfortable praying with one another. Herrman told they had the opportunity to guide people into good books they needed for their "spiritual growth."

He shared, "If someone lost a friend we were able to minister to them. We were blessed, and so were they because of God's great Love."

Herrman began ministering to the Juvenile Dentition Center each week after it was built, as well as the Job Corps Center.

In 1993 when the prison was built at Wheelwright, ministering began there every other week.

In 1990, an offer to purchase the bookstore came. Jerry told how he took it to the Lord in prayer, because the ministry belonged to God, not to him, and he felt the Lord was saying, "Launch out into the deep" and that's exactly what they did!

The bookstore was sold, and the jail and prison ministry became full-time.

With no money now coming into the ministry, Jerry Herrman began writing the Dove House newsletters. The newsletters were sent four times a year, March, June, September, and December.

The newsletter, titled "Dove House Update," was to keep people informed on what was going on.

The newsletters also helped in the raising of funds.

All those who worked at Dove House Ministries were volunteers. All donations that come in to the ministry went toward the purchase of Bibles, Christian videos, office supplies, rent, car repairs, etc.

The vision to share "Try Jesus First" came to Herman in 1995 & 1996. It was then Dove House Ministries Inc., placed 24 Billboards along the highways, with the big bold letters reading "Try Jesus First!"

Herrman shared that his visions were to spend time sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ - to mentor, teach, and encourage inmates in an attempt to help them find Christ and change their attitudes and outlooks on life.

Jerry Herrman's goal was to work toward being instrumental in breaking the vicious cycle of

prisoners returning to prison.

In his many years of service providing guidance, he was blessed to have witnessed lives turned around, families reconciled, and attitudes changed, and numerous people commenting on the billboards that were placed along the way. Jerry would smile from ear to ear as he shared his memories and experiences.

And reflecting upon my memories of Jerry brings a smile upon this face.

I pray there is someone out there who shares the love, and encouragement within their soul to continue what Jerry Herrman began.

I don't know anything about Henry Beston, although I gather that he lived along the Atlantic coast in the early part of the 1900's. I'm not sure if The Outermost House is a novel, an essay, or what, but I'd like to find a copy of it. I am curious to know if the rest of his writing has the depth and insight of this particular passage.

He seems to have found a middle road between two extreme and unrealistic views that people sometimes have of animals—the completely utilitarian and the overly sentimental. I'm not sure which of these two views is the most destructive in terms of our relationship with the natural world. Those who value animals only for how they can benefit humans—as food, beasts of burden, alarm systems or even status symbols—can't really be said to have a relationship with them at all. At the other end of the spectrum are the people who, intentionally or not, try to turn animals into humans. Neither view is fair.

While it is obvious that animals have the ability to think and feel, we can't automatically assume that they think and feel like humans. We see may see behavioral signs of anxiety and totally misinterpret them as anger, retaliation, or willful misconduct. We project our values and morals on animals. ("He KNEW better than to chew my good shoe"; "How could that cat kill an innocent bird?") These attitudes are never more obvious than in a novice dog training class. If the dog never becomes an obedi-

ence whiz, but his owner finishes the class appreciating the challenge of learning to communicate with another species, I have accomplished something significant. I want them to leave seeing dogs in a whole new light. The problem is not so much as whether a dog can learn, but whether we can teach effectively. Good teaching depends on good communication and effective communication depends on mutual understanding and respect between two beings. This cannot be achieved by either idealizing or looking down on other creatures, but by appreciating them for what they are.

The Bible presents a similar idea in Romans 8:19-23 (NIV): "The creation waits in eager expectation...in hope that the creation itself will be liberated from its bondage to decay and brought into the glorious freedom of the children of God. We know that the whole creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth right up to the present time. Not only so, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait..."

Creation suffers with us, and humankind can never be separated from the natural world. We are all part of the Plan; our fates are intertwined. These are ideas that evoke images both of the Native American people and of St. Francis of Assisi. They understood the concept of very different yet very much the same. We're all in this together, and it behooves us to understand and appreciate those who share the journey of life with us.

Anderson

Born the son of a hard-working coal superintendent, Anderson learned early in life the value of a long day's work. While attending school at McDowell Grade School, Russell learned to gather kindling and coal for the family's fire, help with the farm animals, as well as the gardening, and even how to trap mink and muskrat. Russell sold the hides of the animals to Sears and Montgomery Ward; he was paid \$2.50 to \$4 for a muskrat hide and as much as \$30 for the hide of a mink. He opened his first bank account when he was in the eighth grade.

Anderson, known affectionately by fellow classmates as "Cotton" because of his full head of white hair, graduated from McDowell High School, a member of the class of 1950. While attending McDowell High, Anderson gained a great respect for his school principal, George L. Moore. Years later, he would visit Floyd County to dedicate South Floyd High School's "George L. Moore Library," as a special guest who had donated \$7,000 toward making the library one of the best in its area.

Anderson left Floyd County shortly after graduation, to find work in the construction business in Michigan. Finding the area in great need of housing construction, Anderson soon became successful in the industry, building and renting apartments. Before long, Anderson found that he had gone from

"three rooms and a path," in rural Kentucky, to living in a brand-new house with three bedrooms and indoor plumbing, on McCarthy Street, in Ypsilanti, Michigan.

He met and married Maxine Ramsey, a Christian girl, though Anderson himself, at the time of his marriage, was "unsaved." In her book, Schapp relates how Anderson, initially, begged his new wife to forego Sunday church services to stay home and cook for him. Maxine, however, refused, and, seeing his new wife's devotion to her religion, Anderson himself turned his own life over to God less than a year after taking Maxine as his wife.

From this point on, Anderson's story becomes one of intense devotion to God, a fiery passion for "soul-winning," and learning how to trade "dollars for dimes," with God. Anderson testifies that through a commitment to regular tithing, as well as being generous in his giving toward the "Lord's work," he became a millionaire in a little over seven years.

An excerpt reads: "As I already mentioned, in 1960, I was broke. A little over seven years later, I was a millionaire! You know how I did it? I took God at His promise. I cannot afford not to tithe and claim God's promises because in Luke 6:38 it tells us exactly how we are to give. Listen, we believe and claim John 3:16. The same Bible says, 'Give, and it shall be given unto you'...In other

words, God says, 'You can't outgive Me. The more you give to Me, the more I'll give back to you.'"

Anderson, who never attended college, received an honorary doctoral degree from Midwestern Baptist Bible College on May 28, 1972. He has, through the years, given away millions of dollars "wherever God showed me a need." His generous donations have helped found four Bible colleges in the United States, among them, Commonwealth Baptist College, in Lexington; six Bible colleges in foreign countries; and 39 churches across the United States. In addition, he has contributed to numerous building programs, at home, and abroad.

Dr. Russell Anderson, though

now retired, remains active, touring and traveling nationwide, as well as overseas, in his zealous work of preaching and "soul-winning." He pays his own travel expenses, never accepts a "love offering," and frequently hosts "millionaire's dinners," which consist of meat, vegetables, beans, cornbread, and banana pudding. "I was raised on it, and I haven't found anything better," he quipped.

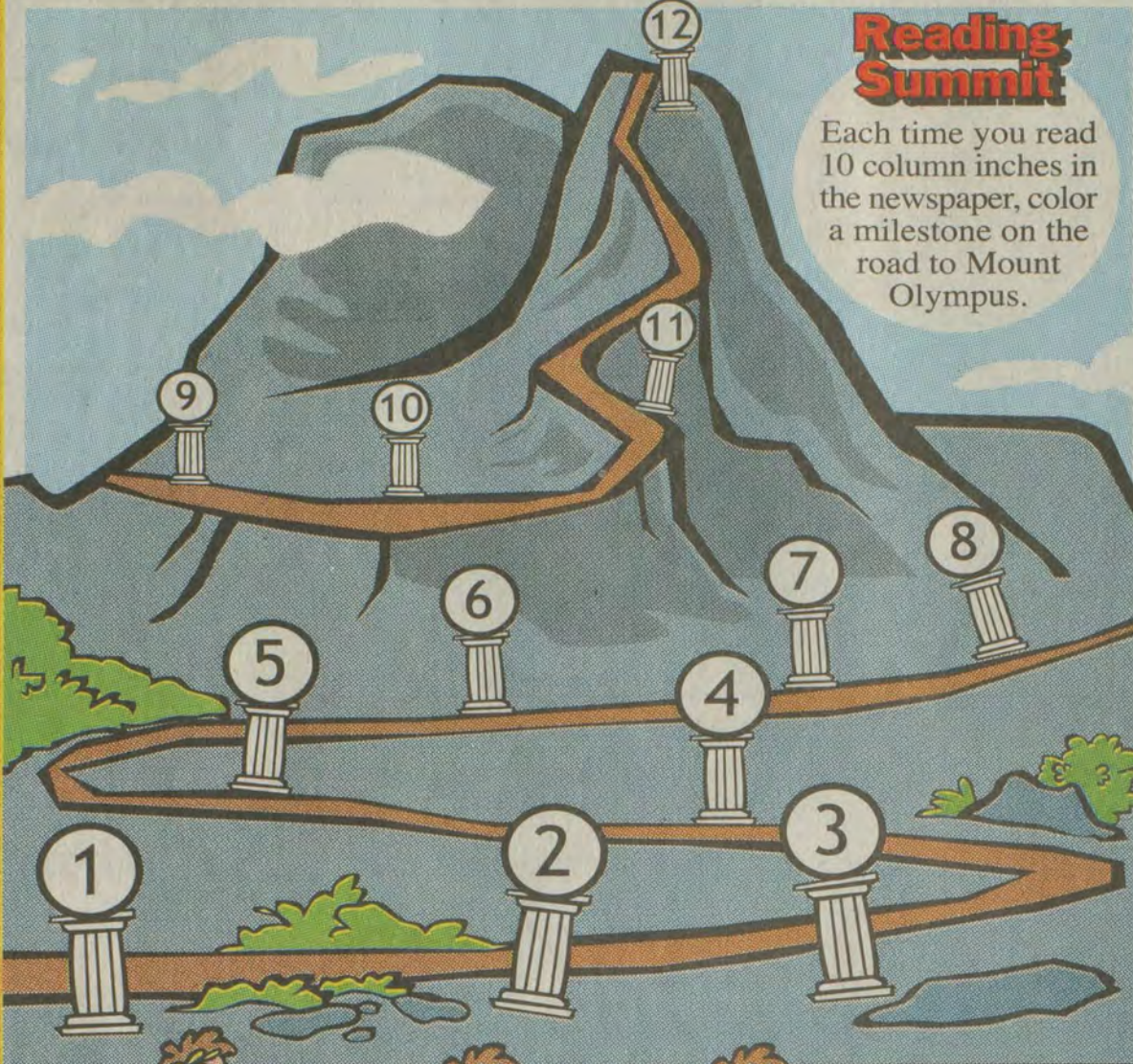

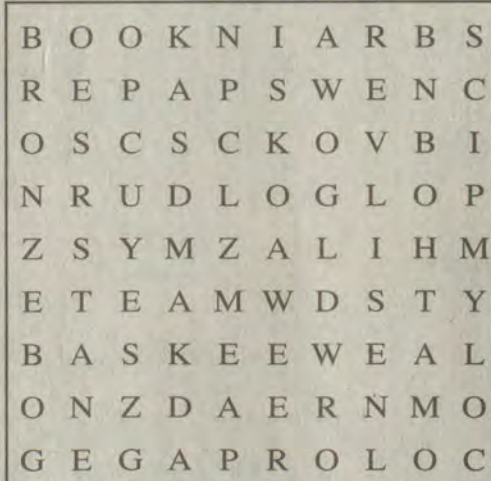

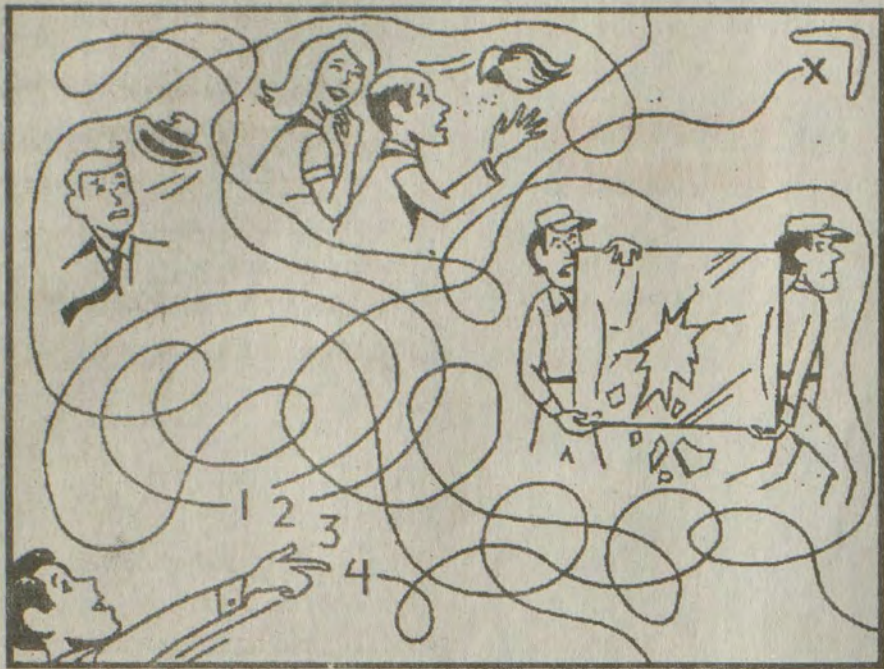

OUT ON A LIMB BALANCING ACT

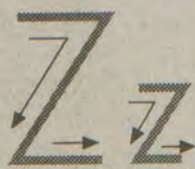

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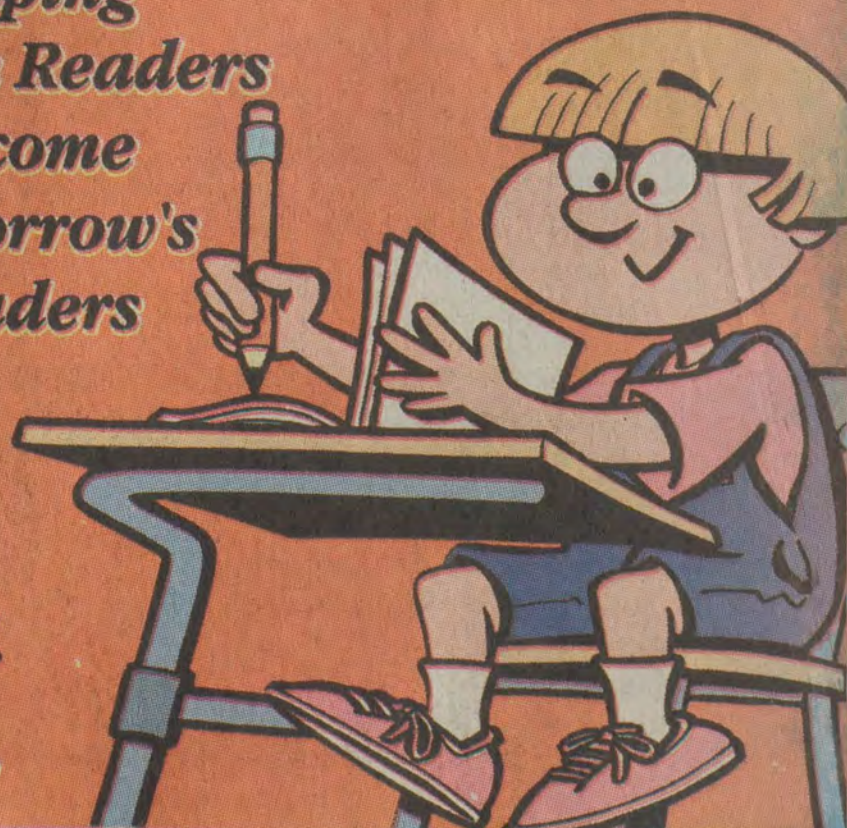
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What's the Kalahari?

The name "Kalahari" is derived from the Tswana word *Kgalagadi*, or "the great thirst."

The Kalahari desert is a large, arid (dry) plateau (mostly flat land) in Southern Africa that is nearly the size of France. Erosion of large, soft stone formations has created masses of red and brown sand. The Kalahari desert and the neighboring Skeleton Coast of Namibia form the world's largest body of sand. (Although the Sahara Desert is technically larger, it has only isolated pockets of sand dunes — mounds or ridges of loose sand deposited by wind.)

The Kalahari desert covers an area of about 100,000 square miles (260,000 sq km). It is part of a large sand basin that stretches from the Orange River up to Angola and Zambia, in the west to Namibia and in the east to Zimbabwe. This basin has a total surface area of about 360,000 square miles (930,000 sq km).

Dunes there vary in height from about 20 to 200 feet (6 to 60 meters). They can be up to 50 miles long (80 km). Scientists sometimes refer to the area as a dry savannah. Unlike the dunes of the Namib Desert, those of the Kalahari are stable and do not wander (due to vegetation, which over the course of thousands of years has managed to anchor the sand in place).

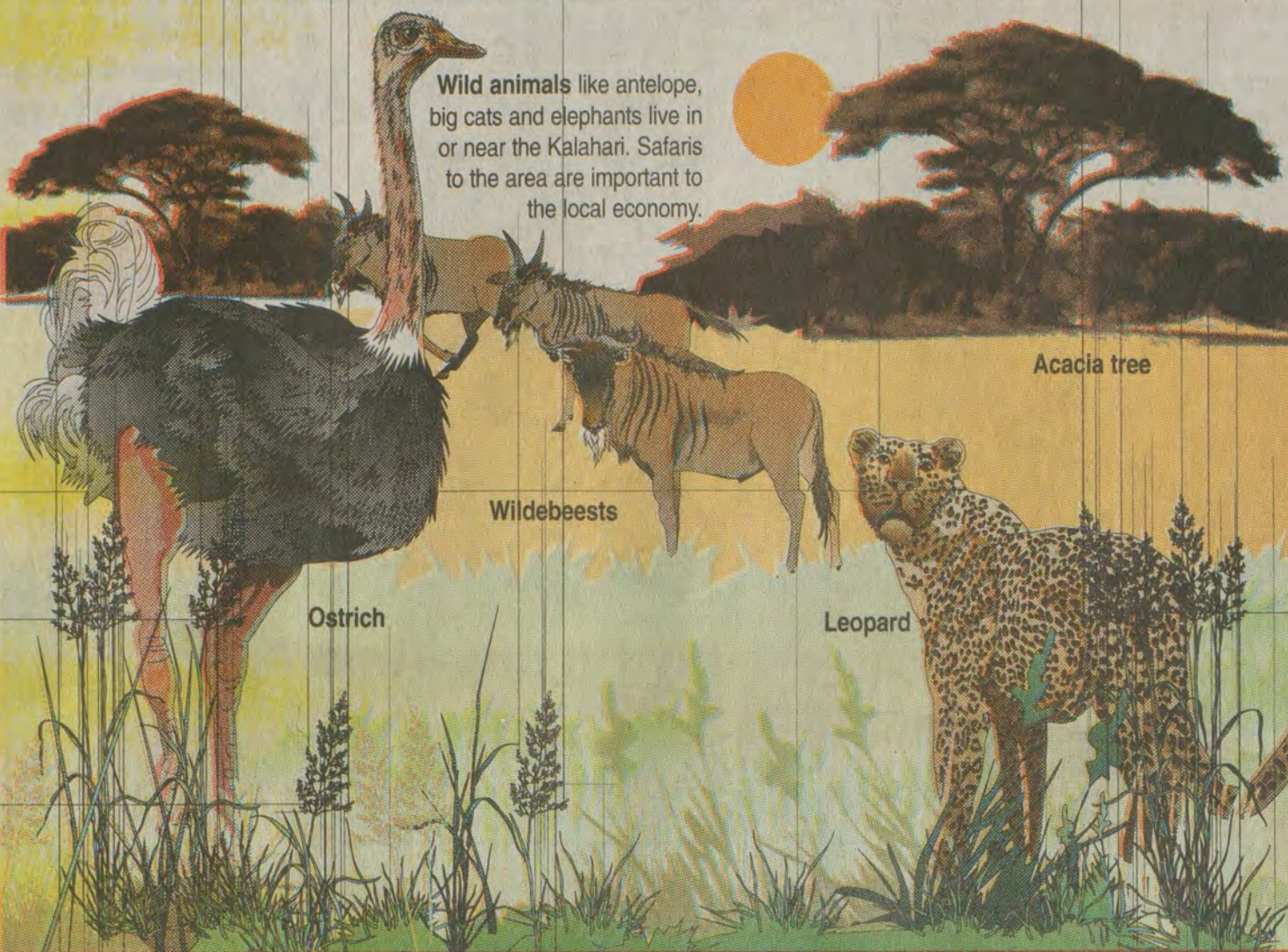
Land and climate

Most rain falls in late summer, and occasionally a cold front may bring rain to the Kalahari in winter. The rainfall pattern can fluctuate considerably from year to year. In general, up to 25 inches (64 cm) per year of rain falls in the North. Because of this, some scientists do not consider the Kalahari a true desert — according to some definitions, a true desert receives less than 10 inches (25 cm) of rainfall annually. About 17 inches (43 cm) falls in the East, but less than 7 falls in the Southwest.

Dryness causes a vast temperature range, especially in the South, where the temperature reaches 117 degrees Fahrenheit (47 degrees Celsius) in summer, but hard frosts can occur in winter.

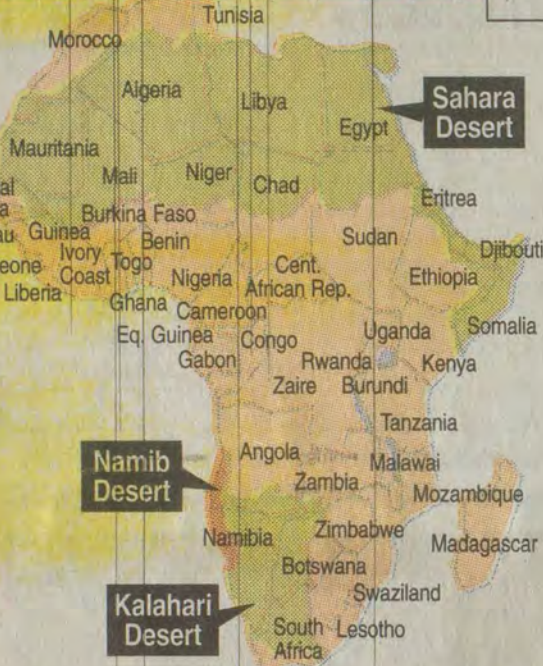
The soil soaks up all available rain in the wetter North and East, making surface water rare. The only permanent surface water in or around the Kalahari is the Boteti River. In the North, the Okavango River drains from the Angolan highlands but forms the inland Okavango Delta, where most of the water evaporates. In wet summers, some Delta water fills the Boteti River. It then discharges east into Lake Xau and the Makgadikgadi Pan, a region of salt pans located about 500 miles from the sea.

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KALAHARI DESERT

The Great Thirst of Africa



More than 1/3 of the African continent is covered by desert. The Sahara, Kalahari and Namib are the names for these vast, dry regions that cover more than 1 percent of the Earth's total landmass.

Acacia trees are umbrella-shaped trees of the Kalahari. Many species of these trees contain chemicals toxic to insects, which would devour them for moisture otherwise.



Plant life

The Kalahari plateau is covered with vegetation. Low scrub, deciduous trees and grasses have adapted to erratic rainfall. Grasses, thorny shrubs and acacia trees can survive long drought periods, but the number of plant species vary according to the annual rainfall. In the driest regions, very few plants exist.

Animal life

Wildlife in the Kalahari has adapted to survival without permanent water supplies. The largest protected areas in the Kalahari are the Central Kalahari Game Reserve in Botswana and the Kgalagadi Transfrontier Park, shared by Botswana and South Africa.

Meerkats are a type of mongoose and common to the Kalahari. Their name comes from Afrikaans (the Dutch-derived language of South Africa) and means "marsh cat," although they are not cats. Meerkats grow to a length of 10 to 14 inches (25–35 cm), with a tail of about 8 inches (20 cm) long that they use as a tripod to balance themselves in an upright position. They live in family groups called "mobs" or "gangs" and communicate by scent, sound and body language. They make several different alarm calls that indicate various predators. Meerkats feed on scorpions (they're immune to the venom), beetles, spiders and small mammals.

People and history

The sparsely populated Kalahari is inhabited by the Khoisan-speaking (characterized by clicking sounds) San people, the Bantu-speaking Tswana, Kgalagad and Herero, and a small number of European settlers.

The San (bushmen)

The San have inhabited Southern Africa for at least 30,000 years. Traditionally, they were hunter-gatherers. On average, 25 to 50 people linked by kinship, marriage and friendship formed a group. In good conditions, groups could swell to more than 100 people, but during drought, groups might dwindle to family units of less than 10. The bushmen followed water, game and edible plants and were always mobile. They did not farm, keep animals or live in a permanent location. Everything they possessed was carried as they moved, with women gathering edible plants and water and men hunting.

Today, much of the San's land has been taken over by other Africans, including many whites of European descent. Most San now live in reserves and villages in and around the Central Kalahari Game Reserve, in Northeastern Namibia, or in Northern South Africa. They are increasingly involved in cattle farming, often as laborers. Less than 5% of the San people still practice their traditional hunter-gatherer economy and lifestyle.

Bantu-speaking peoples

It is thought that when the first Bantu tribes arrived, the San coexisted peacefully with them, but as the Bantu numbers grew, pressure was placed on the peaceful San. Many San ended up as slaves, and others abandoned their traditional hunting areas to move into drier areas of Namibia, Botswana and South Africa.

In the late 19th and early 20th centuries, Herero peoples migrated into the Kalahari from the West. Today, many raise livestock for a living, and are concentrated in the Eastern Namibian and Botswanan portions of the desert.

European settlers

Europeans first came to the Kalahari as missionaries, hunters and traders in the early 19th century, but few settled there. In 1849, the Scottish explorer and missionary Dr. David Livingstone crossed the desert, finding Lake Ngami (in what is now Botswana). By the second half of the 20th century, settlement in the Kalahari began to increase as mining and tourist operations grew.

Today, a large threat to the Kalahari is the rising livestock population and destruction of the desert's native plants.

Dr. David Livingstone (1813 to 1873), a Scottish explorer, revealed Africa to 19th-century Europe. He was also an early missionary of modern Christianity in Africa.
