Ellen DeGeneres scores big with 12 Daytime Emmy bids

If nominations alone were the gauge, this year's Daytime Emmys could be seen as a coronation of Ellen DeGeneres.

The comedian has re-energized her career with her syndicated weekday program that has earned an impressive 12 nominations in the 31st Annual Daytime Emmy Awards, including outstanding talk show and host. NBC will televise the ceremony Friday, May 21, from Radio City Music Hall in New York.

The CBS serial "The Young and the Restless" is the most nominated program with 16 bids, and soaps "All My Children" (ABC) and "As the World Turns" (CBS) have 14

each, but the significance of DeGeneres' showing for her freshman season in daytime TV isn't lost on her.

"It feels extra good," she says. "I'm very, very happy. I was asleep when I got the phone call about the nominations; I had no idea they were being announced that morning, so it was just a surprise all around. I thought, 'That's a lot of nominations.' I didn't realize how big a deal it was, or that it was something that other shows hadn't had in their first year. I've been on other shows I've been nominated for, but what was great was to have everyone on this show recognized. That was really nice."

DeGeneres can be forgiven for not realizing when nomina

Conversation by Sally Stone

Dennis Franz

The 11th season of ABC's drama "NYPD Blue" ends this week. Dennis Franz, who plays Detective Andy Sipowicz on the series (and is the only member of the original cast), agrees with the observation that it had a rough start, and a lot of people thought it wouldn't last its first full season, let alone chalk up 11

years of high ratings. Now considered a television classic, watched every week by millions of people around the world, it's hard to believe that even before the show debuted there were pressure groups looking to keep it from airing because they perceived it as indecent — even immoral. And largely because of



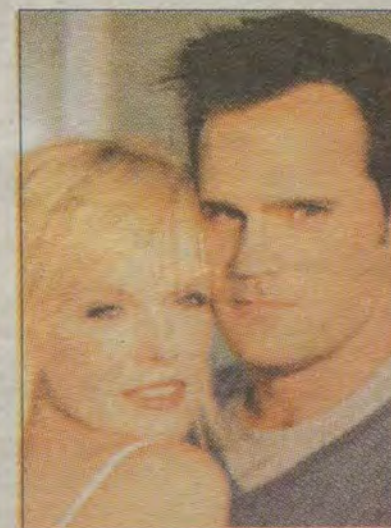

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tion announcement day was - March 4, for the record - since she was vacationing in Mexico at the time. "Jim Paratore of Telepictures (which syndicates 'The Ellen DeGeneres Show') called me and said, 'This is your Emmy wake-up call,' and I had no idea what that even meant. He said, 'You got nominated for every single thing we submitted you for. Except best theme song.' Of course, my first reaction was, 'What's wrong with the song?' 'I'm just celebrating the fact that I'm having fun,'" DeGeneres adds, "and that people are responding to it. I'm trying not to pay attention to numbers like ratings and Emmy nominations. I feel the reaction when I'm performing and when the audience is in the studio, the feeling that something very special is happening. I get that from

everything that comes back at me."

"The Ellen DeGeneres Show" has maintained the loose feel its host wanted from the beginning, from her unpredictable entrances to her complete spontaneity with guests, demonstrated in part by the recent on-air phone call she placed to the Australia-based mother of guest Poppy Montgomery ("Without a Trace"). DeGeneres remembers the debut show last September, with Jennifer Aniston in the guest seat, as being "something that was meant to be, honestly. It really felt like a very comfortable situation, because it marries everything I've done my whole career. It's stand-up, it's talking to the audience, it's getting to do little sketches ... it felt like I was free to go beyond playing a character on a sitcom. I was free to be myself."

And that's not just in front of the

cameras. "When I have an idea, all I have to do is say, 'Why don't we do this?' and we do it. From the beginning, I wanted to show the audience what the show was going to be, so every single thing I thought of, we just did. I wasn't nervous at all, and I haven't been since this started."

One reason may have been the return DeGeneres made to stand-up comedy before starting the program. She felt it was important to get back in direct contact with audiences since "the sensibility that was out there was not necessarily in line with my sensibility, because there's been so much negative and angry and mean-spirited comedy.

My stuff gets blatantly silly and obvious sometimes, but at other times, it's subtle. I think it was an adjustment for a lot of people to 'get' my rhythms."

DeGeneres sensed that during "The Ellen Show," the sitcom that had a brief run on CBS during the 2001-2002 season. Her previous series - ABC's "Ellen" - received considerable attention, especially when the title character revealed her homosexuality at the same time DeGeneres did in real life. The subject barely was addressed by "The Ellen Show," and it's virtually never brought up on her current vehicle, which was devised with all-embracing fun as its goal.

"My fans have always been on the same wavelength I was on," DeGeneres believes, "but a lot of people weren't, not because they don't have the same sensibility, but because that sensibility is just not something that has been out there. It's something I have missed on television. A lot of stuff is just mean, and I don't want to let that ever be a

part of this show."

Even youngsters are more attuned to DeGeneres now, thanks largely to her voice role as absent-minded fish Dory in the Oscar-winning, computer-animated 2003 Disney movie "Finding Nemo" (which has its premium-cable debut Saturday, May 22, on STARZ). DeGeneres got a big taste of her popularity with children when she attended, and ultimately was honored at, the recent Nickelodeon Kids' Choice Awards.

"I walked in to sit down and it was just wild how the kids reacted," she recalls. "That they are so aware of that movie, and that it has touched so many different people, makes me really proud. To hear parents say their kids have watched it 50 times and know all the lines just shocks me. I'm grateful the role was written with me in mind."

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its "blue" language.

"I guess we were pretty controversial for the time," Franz says. "But the fact is, while the language was a little rougher than most people were used to hearing on the air, once the audience understood that it was truer to the way real detectives speak - and we had a lot of real police officers and detectives confirm that for us - they accepted it."

Over the years we've seen Andy Sipowicz change from an angry alcoholic who never met a racial or sexist slur he wouldn't use when the mood moved him, to a man who still battles his demons, but finds the strength to do so within himself, not from a bottle.

"I think the change in Andy came when he stopped drinking," Franz says. "He saw things more clearly, especially about himself. And there were times when he might have slipped back, considering he's had some hard knocks to deal with. But he hung in there."

As far as any changes we should look for next year, both in Andy and in the show, Dennis Franz says, "I can't tell you that because I don't know. That's up to the writers. But for 11 years, the show has had some of the best writing you'll ever see on television, and I have no doubt that'll be the case next season as well."

* Dennis Franz and his wife

love to travel and spend every summer hiatus abroad, usually in Europe.

"We really enjoy ourselves wherever we are," he says. "There's a lot to see and a lot to learn. We love shopping and eating in local restaurants and meeting the people."

Many of whom, he notes, recognize him from the show. "They'll talk to me about Andy and the other characters, and sometimes they'll comment on something they especially liked or disliked. And they're always nice and friendly when they talk to you."

Asked how he handles any angry reactions from those who may single him out as a target of their anger over American foreign policy, Franz says, "That doesn't happen. Sure, we meet people who disagree with what America does or doesn't do in the world, but it's never a personal thing between us."

As for complaints by some people of rude or even hostile treatment, Franz says, "I've found that most people will treat you as you treat them. If you respect them and respect their country and their laws and customs, they'll show you the same consideration."

IN FOCUS: Mary Wilson, who helped found the legendary singing group The Supremes in the 1960s, is one of the many

musical stars featured on ABC's "Motown 45," airing on May 17. Along with hosts Lionel Richie and Cedric the Entertainer, the other performers include Wayne Brady, The Commodores, The Four Tops, Gladys Knight, India.Arie, Nick Lachey, Raven Symone and another original Supreme, Cindy Birdsong.

"I'm in the company of a lot of wonderfully talented people," Wilson says. "But I have to tell you, the show isn't about me, or them: It's about the music, the songs, the Motown sound that started in Detroit and went around the world."

Wilson says that making the special reunited her with many of her longtime friends. "It was great getting together again. But it also introduced me to a lot of younger talent who love the Motown songs and are carrying on the tradition.

"However," Wilson, who just finished touring in Canada in the musical, "Hairspray," adds "while tradition is important because it shows us our roots - where we came from - it's also important to keep moving, to keep growing, to try new things and not just rest on yesterday's accomplishments. I travel a lot on tour, and I always find inspiration for new songs and new ways of doing things, and that's how you grow both as a person and as an artist." (Note: The songs on "Motown 45" will be

presented in a constantly rotating pattern of live performances on multiple stages, creating a free flow of music that virtually never stops.)

DIAL TONES: The baseball-theme series that Tom Selleck had been hoping to lead off with next season before it was pulled from a production schedule may yet get off the bench at some point. Meanwhile, Selleck's having a busy month, what with "Reversible Error" airing on CBS on May 23, and "Ike" airing on A&E on May 31. ... ABC's "8 Simple Rules" three-part season finale arc ends in a double episode airing May 18. ... On May 17, The N Network airs "I Sit Where I Want," which examines race relations 50 years after Brown v. Board of Education outlawed segregation in public schools.

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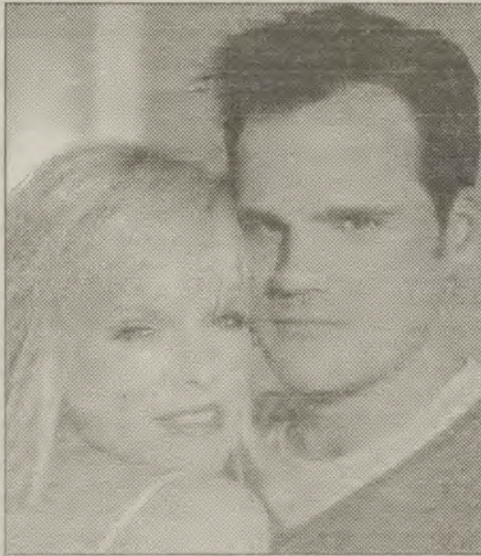

Critic Corner by DNA Smith

GRADE **A**

"Kill Bill (Vol. 2)"



Running time: 136 minutes
MPAA rating: R

I read an interview with "Kill Bill" director Quentin Tarantino where he said he plans to edit both volumes of "Kill Bill" into the single four-hour epic he originally planned and distribute it on the art-house circuit. When it comes to my town, I'll be first in line.

What's great about the "Kill Bill" flicks is that they are movies made for people who love great trashy movies. Tarantino's passion for the chop-socky

martial-arts films of the Shaw Brothers and Sergio Leone's spaghetti westerns is infectious. Tarantino seems bent on referencing every movie he's ever seen, and at times watching "Kill Bill" is like playing the B-movie version of Trivial Pursuit. And that's just fine and dandy with me.

Where "Vol. 2" differs from last year's installment is that where "Vol. 1" was mostly a splatterfest of gore and frenetic action — an homage to anime and Asian exploitation flicks — "Vol. 2" is a nod to America and Europe: Howard Hawks, Sam Peckinpah and Sergio Leone. The pace is slower, more deliberate and gives plenty of time to character development. It is also less bloody than the first film, but it is more emotionally gripping and intense.

We learn more about the relationship between The Bride (Uma Thurman) and Bill (David Carradine). The brutal beating The Bride receives at her wedding rehearsal is revisited —

from a different and more chilling perspective.

We see The Bride hunt down the remaining members of Bill's hit squad (Michael Madsen and Darryl Hannah); there is an extended flashback sequence where The Bride receives extensive martial-arts training that will ultimately save her bacon in more than one fight in the movie. We also learn her real name, what happened to her daughter and, of course, we see The Bride finally kill Bill.

In some ways, "Kill Bill (Vol. 2)" is a better movie than the first. This film could stand on its own as a complete film, whereas "Vol. 1" was one long prologue. But I still want to see the whole shebang in one sitting.

In short: If you saw the first movie, you'll love this one. If you haven't seen the first film, you can still enjoy this one without having seen the prologue. So far, "Kill Bill (Vol. 2)" is the best movie of the year.

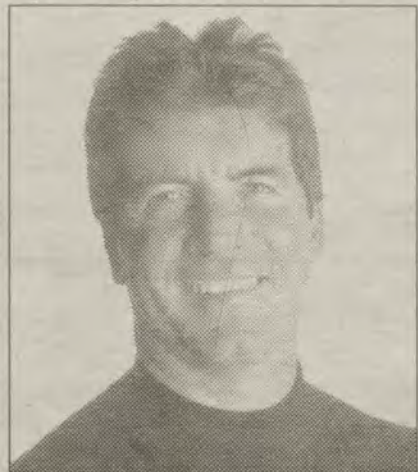

In April, Lutfee Abdul Waalee, 48, was sentenced to three years in prison for trying to pass a fake U.S. Treasury check for \$25 million at a credit union in Pittsburgh. According to the prosecutor, Waalee is a member of the "Moors" black separatist group that supposedly believes that each American is endowed with a secret government account worth around \$600,000, based on a theory that when the U.S. went off the gold standard in 1933, it began backing its currency not with a precious metal but with the prospective labor of its citizens. (Because the Moors are smarter than everyone else, only they know about these secret accounts and can thus buy and sell them.)

The District of Calamity (continued)

Recent news from the Washington, D.C., public school system, which by some measures is the poorest-performing in the country while simultaneously being the most expen-

sive: D.C. schools were found to spend \$234 per year per pupil on security (twice as much as Philadelphia, for instance, and five times as much as Baltimore, according to an April Washington Times report). Also, in one high school last year, 56 percent of students had streaks of at least 15 absences that were unexcused. And in an accounting-firm review of 944 student records in 16 high schools, in "hundreds" of cases the grade ultimately posted did not match the grade turned in, according to the report described in a December Washington Post story.

Government in Action

After a decade of tolerance, the Tokyo metropolitan government ruled in March that used lingerie could no longer be sold in the city's sex shops, where men had been paying the equivalent of \$15 to \$90 for a pair of panties in a plastic bag, sometimes including a photograph of the former owner. Increasingly, schoolgirls as young as 9 had been supplying the stores.

Unclear on the Concept

In March, a Shell/Site convenience store manager in North Naples, Fla., found employee Robert Lee King, 41, lying on the floor rubbing off one not-yet-purchased lottery ticket after another, looking for winners, stacking the used tickets neatly in two piles. The incredulous manager said he tried to explain to King that that isn't the way the lottery business works, whereupon King calmly took his stack of winners and walked out. The manager called in a sheriff's deputy, explained the problem, and showed the surveillance tape of King with the tickets, and while the deputy was writing his report, King happened to come back in to ask for his paycheck. He was charged with grand theft.

Residents of South Camden, N.J., who (according to a February Newark Star-Ledger report) have spent years complaining about government failure to rehabilitate their rundown neighborhood, have com-

menced another level of complaint recently. Now that the state and federal governments have finally sent cleanup and restoration money in, the Star-Ledger reports, residents are complaining that the community is starting to look too good (especially the Delaware River waterfront), which will raise property values (and taxes) and force many longtime residents to leave.

Latest Religious Messages

As usual in the hundred-year-old Easter festival on the Greek isle of Chios, townspeople from two churches in Vrodandos stockpiled small rockets (an estimated 25,000 in all) and fired them at each other's bell on Easter morning while parishioners were inside for services (although the windows had been boarded up in anticipation). As in previous years, misguided rockets started fires in nearby houses, but unlike in some years, there were no deaths.

Don Sneed, a theological researcher and gay activist in Dallas, released a video in April that he said provides mathematical and scientific proof that God exists (a theory that he proudly says no one has yet refuted). "The God Number" explains Sneed's "Definity - Uninity - Infinity," which he says "substantiates the identification of the specific number that represents God." This first video, he said, was for the layperson, and he is at work on a professional version for mathematicians and scientists.

Several parents walked out of a holiday program by the Glassport (Pa.) Assembly of God when the actors on stage began whipping the Easter bunny and breaking its eggs, which church officials said was an attempt to move past the benign symbols of the holiday and focus on the suffering of Christ. As children in the audience cried at the beatings, actors chanted, "There is no Easter bunny."

Least Competent Criminals

A man pulled a knife on a cashier at a Family Dollar store in Vineland, N.J., in December and demanded money from

the open cash register, but the cashier slammed it shut and said "No." After several more demands and several more refusals, the man walked out. And a potential robber of the Iowa Savings Bank in Des Moines on May 3 suffered a similar fate, except that not only did he finally walk out empty-handed, but he also left behind his own \$20 bill he had initially laid on the counter to get the teller's attention.

Update

St. Louis School Board member Rochell Moore was finally removed by a judge for misconduct in April, after incidents beyond the one reported last August in News of the Weird (in which she put a biblical curse on Mayor Francis Slay because she disagreed with his school reform proposals). At the board meeting that ultimately resulted in her dismissal, Moore dumped a pitcher of ice water on an assistant superintendent and later publicly threatened violence against anyone who suggests that she may be mentally ill (though she was involuntarily hospitalized for that in 2002).

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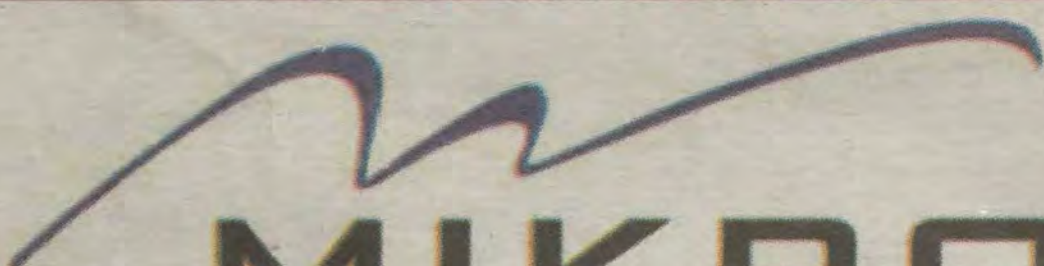

KCTCS raises tuition

MAYSVILLE — The board that oversees the state's community and technical colleges voted Friday to raise tuition by 16.5 percent for next year. The two-year institutions thus joined in a trend. All the state's four-year universities except Murray State had already raised tuition and fees for the 2004-05 year. In-state tuition at the two-year schools, including fees, would increase to \$92 per credit hour, up from \$79. Out-of-state students who live in counties contiguous to Kentucky would pay \$110 per credit hour, up from \$95. The rate for other nonresidents would be \$276 per credit hour, up from \$237. There is no credit-hour cap on tuition except at Lexington Community College, where tuition is capped at the 12-hour levels. However, its students also pay \$281 per semester in registration fees set by the University of Kentucky. The Kentucky Community and Technical College System has 62

Prestonsburg area flood control project that is expected to be complete in 2005-2006 and funding for the project, if approved, will be determined in 2008-2009. Both sites are in the city limits so the flood control project could have an impact on the decision of the committee. The committee was told that because of

Judge revokes probation for convicted dealer

PRESTONSBURG — A probation revocation hearing led to a two-year sentence for Morris Joe Hall, after Judge John David Caudill ruled that Hall had violated his probation by failing to report to his scheduled meeting with his parole officer and failing to appear at a scheduled court date in October. Hall, 47, was sentenced to probation after he pleaded guilty to trafficking a controlled substance within 1,000 yards of a school, possession of marijuana and

carrying a concealed weapon. Hall's attorney, Michael Studebaker, explained to Judge Caudill that Hall had been trying to work and most of the jobs he had gotten were out of state, making it difficult for him to show up for his probation meetings with his parole officer. After listening to Hall's reasons for his failure to appear, Judge Caudill sentenced Hall to two years for the trafficking charge, 12 months each for the possession and weapon charges.

Ohio couple pleads guilty to robbing Prestonsburg bank

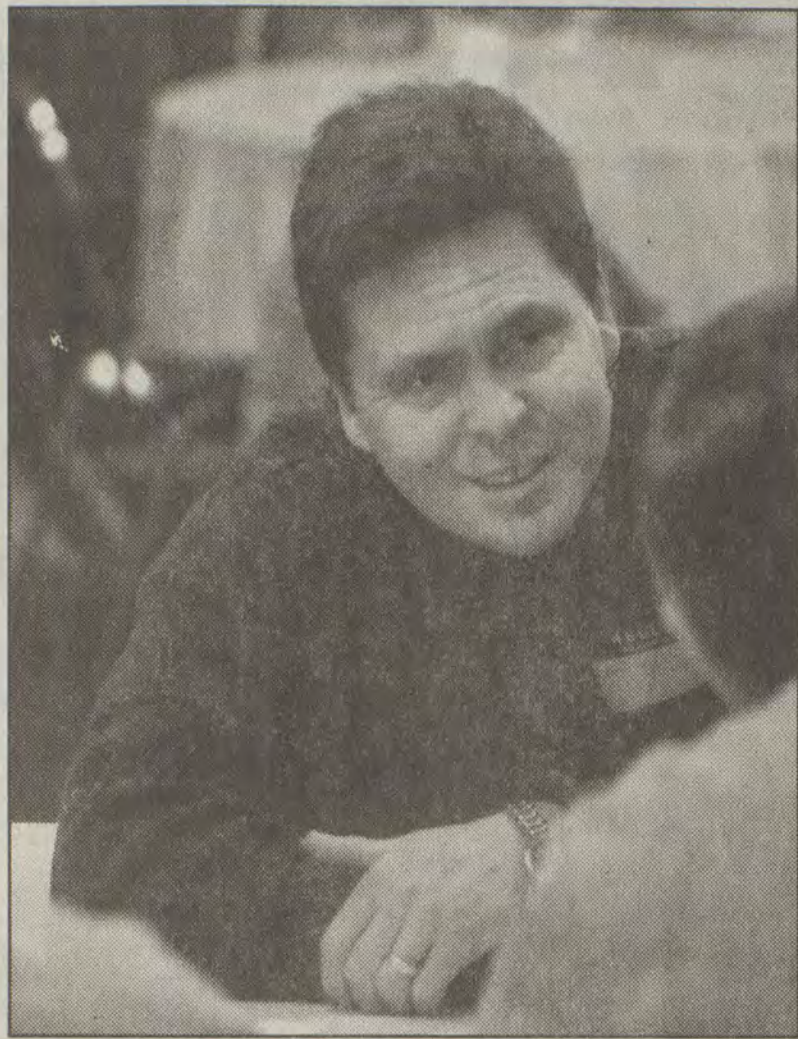

Launching a fiery speech in support of the bill, Shepherd said, "There comes a time in every society where we must draw a line

fundamental right to public expression."

House Criminal Justice Committee Chairman Danny Martiny, a Republican, said he agreed with the spirit of the measure but said the law would be impossible to enforce.

"I don't know that it's respectful to pay my respects at a funeral without my shirt on, but that's not illegal; that's just stupid," he said. "Government can't fix everything."

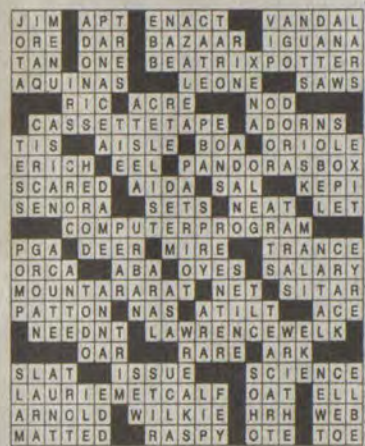

among hundreds of students at the school who qualified for the random drawing. Students with perfect attendance qualified on a weekly basis, and could have had up to 30 chances in the pot for the drawing.

Hampton said the giveaway helped raise attendance at the high school, specifically toward the end of the year, when there is usually a "lull" in attendance.

According to Christina Springer, director of pupil personnel with the Floyd County Board of Education, this year's attendance at Prestonsburg High School is comparatively similar to last year's attendance, which was estimated at 89.6. However, Springer said, numbers compiled for the current year only reflect attendance up to April 30, which means the last few weeks of school — including CATS testing weeks, which usually are the district's highest attendance days — were not included in that estimate.

Stumbo collects Medicare money

FRANKFORT — Attorney General Greg Stumbo got an assist in his ongoing efforts to recover money from Medicare fraud from the rest of the country on Friday.

A class action suit against Parke-Davis, the pharmaceutical company, will restore a little over \$1 million to the state's Medicare program. When this figure is added to what Stumbo has recovered already this year, it totals just short of \$4.5 million returned.

The suit began in 1995 when an ex-employee of Warner-Lambert, the corporate parent of Park-Davis, filed a suit in Boston which alleged that the company had engaged in "off-label" marketing. This is when companies market a

drug for its side effects to patients who not the primary target.

Part of the agreement is that the company will have to enter into a corporate integrity agreement. This means that the company will allow strict scrutiny of its marketing practices by officers of the Department of Health and Human Services.

The lawsuit netted \$439 million that will be divided among each state's Medicare funds, with some also going to the attorneys of each state to cover court costs.

A portion of the money has also been earmarked for state programs which offer insight on proper uses of prescription drugs, with \$1 million left over to evaluate those programs.

After a vote was called on the motion to submit both sites, it was dismissed with not enough votes for the motion to carry. The meeting ended with another meeting being set for next Thursday at Prestonsburg Elementary so the committee could get a feel for both sites and possibly make a decision between the two.

Studebaker pointed out that Sammons would benefit from treatment and wants to kick his drug habit.

Caudill moved to have Sammons brought back to the Floyd County Detention Center after his Pikeville stay is through, in two days, and will have him placed in a treatment program as soon as one is available. TV Tune-In

It has been said that, "Intelligent people, equally informed, seldom disagree." This thought is the underlying foundation for a wonderful community-wide program that is conducted each year in Waynesboro, Penn.

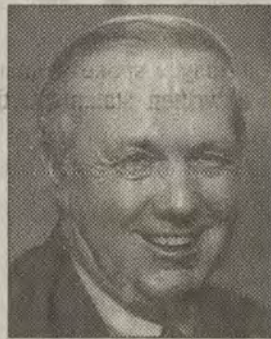
The name of the program is "TV Tune-In, USA" and was born in response to the content of the media, which has been proven to affect small children for the rest of their lives. Here is a little background on this program that may be of interest, especially if you are concerned about the quality to TV programming in our nation today.

In 1957, a program called "Project Postcard" was created by American Association of University Women to give advertisers and broadcasters an idea of how people felt about violent shows on television. In 1975, Ruth Pflager, president of the Radio-TV Council of Greater Cleveland, and Grace Noon, president of Ohio Church Women United encouraged and supported Project Postcard as a statewide activity that involved the viewer mailing individual critiques of TV shows to sponsors and broadcasters in an attempt to give direction to the media's financial supporters. Shows which were offensive and gave children the wrong messages, were noted, reported and encouraged to

be removed from the programming. The strength of positive critique was also promoted. In 1979, both CWU and AAUW in Ohio passed resolutions concerning broadcasting, and Project Postcard evolved into "TV Tune-In, USA."

Now, that's the background, but to bring you up to date on what has happened in more recent times, Ruth Pflager moved to Waynesboro, Penn., and about a dozen years ago she was instrumental in implementing this program in the community's school system. From what I can understand the backbone of this program is an Essay Contest that involves students from the third to the 12th grade.

To go back a moment to what I said in the beginning, "Intelligent people, equally informed, seldom disagree" is what happens when students focus on the merits, along with the evils, of television viewing and are better prepared to make wise choices. What's so exciting for me is that this annual essay contest is no small matter and this past year there were 1,159 different essays. The whole community gets involved and student winners are given cash prizes



for their work, so there is a little more incentive here. The highlight of this program is the "TV Tune-In, USA" Annual Student Essay Contest Awards Luncheon.

So you will have a little better feel for what I am saying, here is what is listed in the printed program. The Invocation, Moderator and Welcome, Why a School Essay Contest about TV, What is "TV Tune-In"? A Word from the Sponsor, Greetings from the Judges of the Contest, Recognition of Principal Funding Groups, Winners reading of 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place essays and Presentation of Awards and to close out the program, the Wrap up and Sign Off. On the program are many of the outstanding members of the community, so you can see it's a really big deal.

To minimize the risk of misunderstanding, please allow me to give you the purposes of TV Tune-In, USA, Waynesboro Unit: To affirm that television and the electronic media do more than entertain and advertise, THEY ALWAYS TEACH. To raise public awareness that values, morals and ideas, both wholesome and destructive are always being taught by the media. To educate viewers so that they understand

Colleges should teach, not coach

They're trying to reform college athletics again, poor things.

The National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) has approved a plan designed to achieve a revolutionary result: require college athletes actually to go to school and even — and this is the really controversial part — learn something. The plan will require "student-athletes" to make 20 percent progress toward a degree for every year they attend school. Schools whose athletes do not reach this benchmark will receive, first, a warning, then a reduction of scholarships and, finally, banishment from post-season play or, in extreme cases, loss of NCAA membership.

"This is the beginning of a sea change in college sports," said NCAA president Myles Brand. "It represents all the planning and effort of the university presidents and the NCAA to put in stronger academic standards that ensure that student-athletes get a genuine education and a legitimate opportunity to

graduate."

Naturally, the people who make their living off "student-athletes" — athletic directors, coaches, sports reporters, sports-yak radio jocks — are opposed to the new rules. "Instead of improving the opportunity for a kid to get an education, we are going to absolutely dumb down college athletics," said Georgia Tech basketball coach Paul Hewitt. With all due respect to Coach Hewitt and his concern for the educational opportunities open to his athletes, I suspect he and his colleagues are more worried about having their cash cow moved to a less lucrative venue.

As for myself, I am all for what the NCAA is attempting but I have no confidence in its success. Big-time collegiate athletics have become irredeemably corrupt. Trying to fix them with rule changes is like attempting to raise the moral level of a brothel by instituting a dress code. The truth is, We the People do not want a new dress code; we like collegiate athletics the way they are. In the recently completed national basketball tournament, only two of the Final Four teams ever graduated anybody. Did the public rise up and complain? Don't be silly. Instead they praised the surviving coaches for their recruiting ability.



The great educational reformer, Robert M. Hutchins, as he was taking over the presidency of the University of Chicago nearly 70 years ago, said that the first, most essential step in making that school a great learning institution was the elimination of intercollegiate football. The school dropped football and went on to become one of the world's most renowned universities. A coincidence? Hutchins didn't think so and neither do I.

We have fine schools, even great schools, that play intercollegiate football and basketball at a high level — Michigan, Stanford, Duke, Notre Dame and Wisconsin, to name a few. But they are forced to compete with schools that don't bother with academic standards, and the pressure to bend the rules becomes enormous.

Thus we have the spectacle of coaches from elite schools — schools that accept only the cream of the cream of America's high schools — going into the living rooms of barely literate teenagers and begging them to come play for them.

It's a hypocrisy that rots away at the very soul of a university. What's so good about college athletics anyway? They teach sportsmanship? Oh come

Minister's Moment: Trust in God

Two neighboring nations with a long history of hatred stare down gun barrels aimed at each other. Years of bitter violence have ended any hope of peace. Too many sons have died. Too many coffins have been carried through the streets. Too many vows of revenge have been uttered through clenched teeth of grief and anger. And now, after all these centuries of hatred, negotiators are trying to

bring leaders from the opposing nations together to begin the process of peace.

The first task is the most difficult of all — to find a way for the two warring nations to trust each other. How do you disarm in the face of your enemy? How do you trust an ancient enemy with so many memories of death and bloodshed? How do you trust? Yes, trust is difficult and risky, but peace is worth the risk.

Once again, trust is difficult and risky. But for those who are

willing to take the path of trust, then end is rewarding. At the end of the path called trust, two nations can find peace. One can even find God Himself.

In the Old Testament, in the Book of Genesis, we hear the story of one person on just such a path toward trust. His name is Abram. It is a story of a man who asked God tough questions, who lived difficult circumstances, and who found that God could be truly trusted.

At a moment in the life of Abram (Abraham), he was

drowning in uncertainty about the promise of God that he would have man descendants and father a great nation. That promise was easy to believe and joyous to anticipate when Abram was a young man. Then, all the world seemed alive with hope. Anything seemed possible.

But Abram became an old man. The old dreams had faded into fantasy. Abram was no longer sure that he heard God right in the first place or even if God remembered the promise.

Abram still hadn't fathered the first child, let alone a multitude.

So Abram asked God for some sign, some proof or at least an early advance on the promises. But God told Abram to trust Him, to have faith in Him.

God does not offer early pay-offs on faith investments to persuade us to keep the faith. God is not a divine slot machine, doling out occasional rewards to keep us at the table. No, God knows that trust is eroded by proofs and tests. God offers each of us a relationship with Himself, not a set of proofs. Such proofs and signs would diminish the role of faith and weaken the relationship God seeks to build with us. The effort to base any relationship on proofs instead of trust is doomed. God knows this, and so to Abram's request for proof, God simply offered a more profound statement of His promise, and then asked Abram again to bank his whole future on that trust.

"Trust in Me," says our God.

"Have faith in Me," said our God to Abram, and to each one of us. "Put your trust in Me," says our God. "Trust in my love for you, for I have sent my Son to you to bring you salvation. Listen to Jesus, and you will hear of My love and of My promise of eternal life," says our God. "Trust in Me, even when the world is shattering doom around you. Trust in my love," says our God, "when you seem lost and no one can be found and you are all alone. Trust in my promise of life when death is near and your last breath is drawn. Trust in me," says God.

There is only one path that leads to God (that path is Jesus Christ and our love of God and others), and we must walk that path with faith and trust, as Abram did. There is only one way to survive these moments when God seems to be distant. And that way is called trust — trust in God. It is all you and I can bring to God — our love, our faith, our trust.

Trust God, no matter what tomorrow may bring. Trust God.

Gay cruise plans prompt criticism of Baptist investment

DALLAS — The Southern Baptist Convention Annuity Board is drawing criticism from some within the denomination because it owns about \$14 million worth of stock in Carnival Cruise Lines, which is hosting a "Gay Days" cruise.

The annuity board administers the medical and retirement plans for the denomination's pastors. Its investment in Carnival already had brought disapproval from Baptists opposed to the casinos and alcohol sales offered on the company's "fun ships."

"The Baptists don't believe in gambling, liquor or pornography, or gays," said Don Allmon, a deacon at First Baptist Church of Dyer, Tenn. "When I say that, we love gays, but we don't like

their lifestyle."

Allmon said most Baptists were unfamiliar with the investment but would be upset when they learned about it.

The "First Annual Gay Days Cruise" is set to begin May 30 with a five-day Bahamas cruise on Carnival's Fantasy ship.

Southern Baptists have spoken out against homosexuality for years, including boycotting the Walt Disney Co., partly because gay groups hold their "Gay Day" festivities at Disney's amusement parks. Gay rights groups picket the Southern Baptist meeting each year, accusing them of spreading hatred.

The Rev. O.S. Hawkins, president and CEO of the Dallas-based annuity board, was not available for comment Friday, a spokeswoman said. In a written statement, the board

stressed that "the gay cruise in question with Carnival cruise line is being promoted on a gay-oriented Web site and not on the Carnival Web site."

In a separate statement, Vance Gulliksen, spokesman for Miami-based Carnival, said the company caters to a "very broad" demographic and does not discriminate based on race, age, sex, marital status, religion, national origin, physical or mental ability, or sexual orientation.

"This particular group, like most groups sailing on Carnival, is being sold and marketed through an independent travel agent," Gulliksen said.

Gay Days Inc. touts the cruise on its Web site as "a great way to meet some new friends for Gay Days 2004," which is expected to draw tens of thousands to Orlando, Fla., from June 1-7.

The cruise is not an all-gay event, but organizers "hope within a few years this event will grow to a buy-out," according to the Web promotion. Gay Days spokesman Chris Alexander-Manley was not immediately available for comment Friday.

Karen Weldin, director of operations for Soulforce, a gay rights group that takes issue with the Baptist treatment of homosexuals, said she finds it amusing that the annuity board owns stock in Carnival while boycotting Disney.

"The whole thing just makes me smile a bit about the hypocrisy within the Southern Baptists," Weldin said.

The Baptist board owns about 26,200 shares of Carnival in its Equity Index Fund and

State projects surplus after years of shortfalls

FRANKFORT — Tax revenues are up, and Kentucky could have at least \$70 million more this fiscal year than had been expected, experts say.

Some lawmakers say the money could be saved for future budget problems or could help the House and Senate overcome differences to pass a budget. Gov. Ernie Fletcher said he wants to add \$10 million to education spending for the next two fiscal years.

Budget shortfalls have forced spending cuts in the past three years. But strong retail sales have boosted sales tax income above expectations.

"Clearly the recovery has been stronger than we previously estimated," said Merl Hackbart, a University of Kentucky finance professor and a member of a state economic forecasting panel.

Another panel member agreed. "It looks like we have turned the corner. We've been waiting for this for a long time," said Larry Lynch, a professor emeritus of economics at Transylvania University.

Fletcher administration Budget Director Brad Cowgill said he fears inflation and soaring oil prices could stall the recovery.

"But overall it will be only a slight uptick in the \$7 billion General Fund. Given the uncertain future revenue outlook and various other problems in any budget that might be passed, we need to be cautious," Cowgill said.

Some retailers say sales have increased.

"We did very well in February, March and April," said A.F. Dawahare, chairman of the Lexington-based Dawahare's clothing store chain. "... Part of it is due to changes we've made, part of it is the economy. And the weather's been great."

Bruce Pieratt, president and chief executive officer of a family-owned business that operates five furniture and major appliance stores, said he hasn't seen such an increase.

"We've had some growth, but nothing like 10 percent over last spring. We've found sales this spring to be sort of flat — up in some locations, down in the others," Pieratt said.

Legislators and revenue experts expressed caution about planning to spend any surplus.

The House and Senate adjourned without agreeing on a budget for the two-year period that begins July 1 because the House rejected the Senate's insistence that the budget include Gov. Ernie Fletcher's

tax reform plan. Unless that deadlock is resolved, Fletcher may impose his own spending plan.

Rep. Harry Moberly, the Richmond Democrat who is chairman of the House budget committee, and Senate Republican Leader Dan Kelly of Springfield both said they want a revised official forecast of revenue to help budget any surplus produced this year and any over the next two fiscal years.

"We do have to be cautious," Moberly said. "But I think Brad Cowgill is being a little more pessimistic than reality. I think we're seeing signs of a sustained recovery and there's some disappointment within the administration that this is occurring before they passed their tax modernization plan."

Still, Moberly said the expected surplus would not be enough to fund major increases in spending.

"If a new forecast would give us more money, about the most we could do is be able to fund

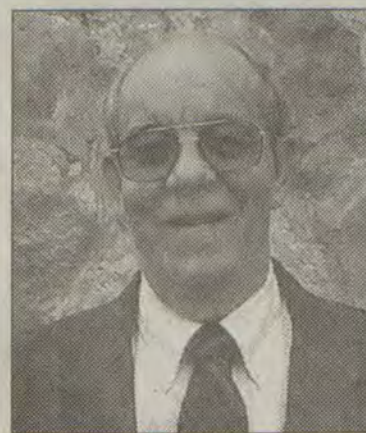

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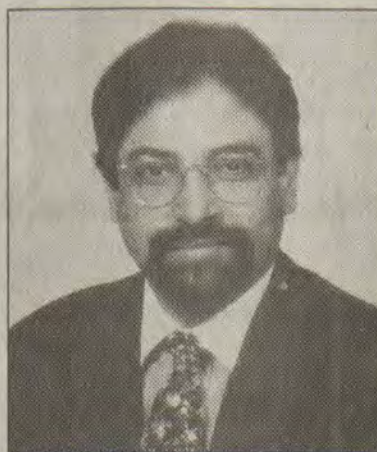

According to the board's statement, its guidelines prohibit investments in any company publicly recognized "as being in the liquor, tobacco, gambling, pornography or abortion industries." Between 300 and 400 companies are on the board's restricted list, the statement said.

"However, we could go through every stock in the Fortune 500 and probably find some reason why we shouldn't invest in any of them," the statement said. "If the Southern Baptist Convention should choose to boycott Carnival as it did Disney, we would take appropriate action as we did with Disney."

Hemphill scores first career ARCA win at Kentucky Speedway

SPARTA — Ryan Hemphill just knew it would happen again.

As the laps and the fuel level in his Dodge dwindled on Saturday night, May 9, during the ARCA Re/Max Series Channel 5-205, Hemphill remembered his last race, where dominated most of the way only to suffer late misfortune.

This time, Hemphill's luck lasted and allowed him to score his first career ARCA win. The 22-year-old from Apollo, Pa., making his third career ARCA start, led most of the way and held off Billy Venturini by 0.706 of a second at Kentucky Speedway.

Hemphill said his crew figured before the race that a full tank of gas would last about 60 laps. They took a risk by running the final 77 laps of the 137-lap race without a pit stop.

Eight caution flags, covering 58 laps, aided his cause by allowing Hemphill to conserve fuel. His official speed was 98.299 mph, and his winning time was 2:05.26.

"If it wasn't for all the cautions, we definitely would have had to pit again and top (the gas) off," Hemphill said. "I'm glad that we didn't. I don't know if we would have had the car to come back and get the lead."

"I didn't think we were going to make it. I was doing my best

and everything I could to save fuel."

The final caution began on lap 131 — when A.J. Fike spun out in Turn 3 and hit the wall — and ended with two laps remaining. Hemphill had a solid restart, and neither Venturini nor third-place Mark Gibson threatened to pass him.

"I hated to see the caution there," Venturini said.

Ken Weaver and Christi Passmore rounded out the top five. Only 10 cars finished on the lead lap.

The victory eased the disappointment of Hemphill's last ARCA start. He started on the pole in the ARCA 150 on April 9 at Nashville Superspeedway and led with eight laps left before hitting another car and finishing 15th.

"We are happy to be back after the disappointment of Nashville," Hemphill said.

Hemphill, who made seven starts on the NASCAR Craftsman Truck Series circuit during 2002 and 2003, started on the outside of the front row on Saturday. He moved into first when pole sitter Frank Kimmel crashed on lap 23.

Kimmel, the ARCA Re/Max series points leader, had won three previous races at Kentucky Speedway. He lost control in Turn 3 on the 23rd lap and crashed into the wall.

Kimmel quickly returned to the track despite heavy damage to his car's rear end, but he soon

was black-flagged by ARCA officials and left the race because his car was dragging parts. After the problem was fixed, he returned to the track again but was not a factor, finishing 20th.

"Misfortune for Frank Kimmel, good fortune for us," Hemphill said. "His car was awfully strong."

Kimmel maintained his series points lead. He leads Venturini by 45 points.

1992 race earns No. 1 All-Star ranking

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — As the NASCAR Nextel All-Star Challenge prepares for the celebration of its 20th anniversary, the previous 19 editions have evoked everlasting memories of many of the sport's greatest stars providing the fans with brilliant racing, stunning finishes and occasionally a touch of controversy.

It is these types of memories that have built the NASCAR Nextel All-Star Challenge, formerly known as The Winston, into the most thrilling and unpredictable all-star event found in any sport. And what better time than the eve of the event's 20th anniversary than to have members of an expert panel vote for their favorite moments in the history of the race.

The panel consisted of NASCAR Nextel Cup Series drivers Bill Elliott and Terry Labonte, who have participated in 18 of the 19 all-star races; drivers Rusty Wallace and Ricky Rudd, who have competed in 17 of the events; Lowe's Motor Speedway President H.A. "Humpty" Wheeler, who has hosted and promoted 18 of the races; NASCAR President Mike Helton, who hosted and promoted the only all-star race not held at Charlotte (Atlanta, 1986); and former Charlotte Observer motorsports writer Tom Higgins, who has witnessed every one either in person or on television.

By virtue of the panel's order of preference of the top moments on their respective

choices, the following earned the highest voting totals. The top-three moments in descending order are:

No. 3 — "The Tide Slide" (1989): Darrell Waltrip, driving his Tide-sponsored Chevrolet, was leading the race as he was approaching the white-flag lap when hard-charging Rusty Wallace nudged Waltrip, sent him spinning and created the "Tide Slide." Wallace went on to capture the victory while a displeased Waltrip wound up seventh.

"It was an ugly, ugly win," Waltrip said at the time. "I hope he chokes on the \$200,000, that's all I can tell him. He knocked the hell out of me... A lot of guys let greed overcome speed, and that's what happened today. I got spun out. A guy

drove down underneath me and drove up into me and spun me out."

"It was blatant. I had him pretty well covered. I just didn't want to make a mistake but I guess I made one, letting him get up there."

En route to Victory Lane, Wallace's car was hit by Waltrip's and it ignited a scuffle between the two teams.

"I'll never forget the aftermath of that race, with Darrell telling me to choke on the 200 grand, Todd Parrott and some of my team punching it out with Darrell's team on pit road and getting suspended and all hell just about breaking out," Wallace said. "It was something they talked about for years to

has done this," said H.A. "Humpty" Wheeler, president and general manager of Lowe's Motor Speedway. "We've worked very hard to establish the NASCAR Nextel All-Star Challenge as one of the most popular events in sports."

"The race's unique format has proven itself over the years and produced more memorable moments than any event in racing. It's like The Masters at Augusta or the Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs—NASCAR's all-star race belongs at Lowe's Motor Speedway and we hope to continue this tradition for years to come."

SMI 'very pleased' to have second Texas date

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Speedway Motorsports, Inc. officials announced Friday that Texas Motor Speedway will host a second NASCAR Nextel Series Cup race beginning in 2005.

The additional Texas date, which was released today as part of the 2005 NASCAR Nextel Cup Series schedule, is the result of a settlement in a shareholder lawsuit in Texas and part of NASCAR's on-going schedule realignment.

The new race is set for Nov. 6, 2005. Texas Motor Speedway's traditional spring race, the Samsung/RadioShack 500, is scheduled for April 17, 2005.

In addition to the second Nextel Cup race, NASCAR has added a second Busch Series race at the 1.5-mile superspeedway on Nov. 5, 2005. A

settlement is subject to court approval.

NASCAR officials announced Thursday that Rockingham would not be included on the 2005 NASCAR Nextel Cup Series schedule. For 2004, as part of its schedule realignment, NASCAR and ISC officials moved a previous Rockingham date to California Speedway. SMI officials said plans for the Rockingham track were incomplete, but noted they are studying options, including racing and other events.

"We are very pleased to have reached the settlement agreement and to have obtained a second NASCAR Nextel Cup Series date for Texas Motor Speedway," said O. Bruton Smith, founder and chairman of Speedway Motorsports, which owns and operates Texas Motor Speedway. "The second Texas date falls in line with NASCAR's overlying strategy of expanding into underserved markets and will help strengthen the sport's national appeal."

"My desire, as it has always been, is to continue to help NASCAR build the sport of stock car racing. Working together will help build a better sport for the fans, participants and corporate partners," Smith concluded.

Speedway Motorsports officials also disclosed the company will purchase North Carolina Speedway, located in Rockingham, from International Speedway Corporation for \$100 million. Speedway Motorsports will also pay approximately \$12 million in related expenses as part of the settlement. The purchase of North Carolina Speedway is subject to the Hart-Scott-Rodino Clearance and the

It's spawning time for little big fish

PADUCAH — These are the some of the biting-est days for the fighting-est fish.

Kentucky anglers have options for whoppers, but some relative miniature fish make a good case for themselves, especially at this time of the spring.

Sunfish, primarily bluegill and redear sunfish, offer quality fishing in quantity at many waters across the state.

Saucer-shaped sunfish are the smallest of the commonly sought species. Bluegill over 6 inches are quality, while 8-inchers are jumbos. Redear sunfish are normally fewer where they do exist, but they are heavy-

weights of the sunfish set. A good percentage of adult redears top 8 inches, and big ones may surpass 10 inches and a pound in weight.

Bluegill are the bread-and-butter sunfish in most Kentucky waters. They are a cornerstone of pond and small lake populations, serving as an angler's target as well as a forage species

for predatory bass.

Hand-sized sunfish are aggressive and quick to hit a bait or tiny lure in most circumstances. When they do strike, they put up a scrap out of proportion with their modest size.

"Bluegill tend to be more numerous than other species, and they're easier to catch than most other fish and they're good to eat, too," said Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources fisheries biologist Jim Axon.

Being widely available, quick to bite, scrappy and table-worthy wins admirers among anglers. Axon said bluegill and other sunfish routinely rank third, roughly tied with channel catfish, trailing only black bass and crappie in angler popularity polls.

Now, however, sunfish action can be better than usual because fish are clustered together in spawning colonies. Bluegill and redears gather in the shallows with their own kind and fan out

bowl-shaped "beds" in which eggs will be laid and fertilized, and baby "fry" will hatch to repopulate the waters.

Spawning bed fishing is popular with late spring anglers because it congregates some of the biggest fish of the species where they may be caught in good numbers.

Hub cap-sized depressions that are sunfish nests are often seen in shallow areas of sandy-gravelly bottoms in as little as perhaps 1 foot of water, although some may be as much as five feet deep. In each bed, more than one female fish may lay eggs — up to a few thousand per female — that are fertilized by male fish.

Fishermen often locate sunfish bedding areas by test fishing until they find repeated action in a small area, indicating a concentration of fish. In clear areas, some nesting colonies will be visible to the naked eye. Familiarity helps, too. Some sites attract bedding bluegill and/or redears every year as water temperatures run from the high 60s into the 70s.

Axon said a key to good action at a bluegill nesting

come and [radio personalities] John Boy and Billy even made a song about that day."

Recalled Wheeler: "We had to hide Rusty to get him to and from the press box."

In Waltrip's eyes it may have been an "ugly win," but in Wallace's it was a defining moment in his career.

"It was the turning point of my career — and Darrell's, too. I don't think there has ever been in the history of our sport a situation where in a split second the roles are reversed like that — totally reversed," Wallace said. "Darrell became the hero there in that race and I became the villain. D.W. didn't have the greatest fan appeal back then — he was a driver who the fans either loved or hated — it was just that simple. Well, that day he became the good guy and that image lasted with him all the way until he hung the helmet up."

"Man, it really did fireworks for my career. I was still a young guy on the way up. I'd finished second to (Bill) Elliott in the points in '88 and hadn't really stirred up any big buzz until that day. It definitely put my name and face on the map and I got booed for years to come after that one. I'm just so grateful that I was finally able to get back in the good graces with all the fans and have them all know that I really am a good guy."

Wallace also built off the momentum of the win and went on to his only series championship.

"That whole season was so special for me and that team," Wallace said. "We won the big all-star race at Charlotte and went on to win the championship that same year. Like I said, that day and that race was a very big part of the sport's history I think. I know how huge it was as far as the big picture goes for me; that's for sure."

No. 2 — "Pass In The Grass" (1987): Many dubbed this all-star moment the catchy "Pass in

the Grass," but Helton called this "the defining moment for Earnhardt."

Whatever you want to call it, it was classic Earnhardt.

As the final 10-lap sprint got underway, Earnhardt exhibited his aggressive nature that earned him the nickname "The Intimidator" as he made contact with his fellow leaders at that time, Geoffrey Bodine and Bill Elliott. Elliott retaliated by making contact with Earnhardt and sent him through the grass on the frontstretch. However, Earnhardt continued to mash the gas, regained control of the car and somehow miraculously maintained the lead and captured the dramatic win. Both Bodine and Elliott bumped Earnhardt's car following the checkered flag and tempers flared.

"A lot of things were going on when the green flag dropped," Elliott said of a restart with a few laps remaining at the time. "He hit me several times. If a man has to run over you to beat you, it's time for this stuff to stop. What he did wasn't right. When a man pulls over and lets you by and then tries to run you into the wall, I'd say that was done deliberately. I've been beat on at Watkins Glen, Talladega and here by one car, Earnhardt's. If somebody doesn't do something about this, we're coming back next week and we'll see what happens."

"This whole deal is between me and Bill and it has nothing to do with our teams," Earnhardt retaliated. "We knocked each other around, but it's all over now as far as I am concerned. But if Bill still wants to do something about it, then I'll stand flat-footed with him any day."

Rumor had it that when Elliott returned home he threw out any jeans he had by Wrangler, which was Earnhardt's sponsor at the time, and vowed never to wear a pair

again. Elliott was livid about Earnhardt's antics, but it sure made for a great show.

"That's about the nearest you could get to good old grassroots racing," Wallace said. "The only thing better would have been if it were at night. Earnhardt was like a man possessed and he drove like an absolute madman. He was always aggressive, even in the points-paying races, but the fact that Humpy promoted this thing as a 'no-holds-barred, winner-take-all' shootout I think only worked to make Dale stand even more on the gas."

Added Wheeler: "It's still one of the most talked about moments in racing history."

No. 1 — "One Hot Night" (1992): Little did Wheeler know at the time of conceiving a promotional tagline for the 1992 event — "One Hot Night" — that it would deliver more than anyone could imagine on its billing. Before the cars even turned a wheel, this event already had a special place in not only all-star annals but motorsports history overall as Lowe's Motor Speedway became the first superspeedway to run at night under the lights. "We shocked the world by lighting a superspeedway," Wheeler said.

The night racing and the ambiance it created was a spectacle in itself, but then the main event put this one over the top as the No. 1 moment in all-star history.

"This was such a unique event because it was under the lights for the first time," Helton said. "Plus, it was great racing all through the field all night long and culminated with an exciting finish. It possessed all the elements for a great all-star moment."

Three of the sport's stars — Dale Earnhardt, Davey Allison and Kyle Petty — were involved in the frenzied last-lap finish that crystallized this moment. On the final lap, Petty tangled with race leader Earnhardt, spun him out of the way and appeared on his way to a victory. However, Allison charged up to Petty for a checkered-finish duel that was decided by mere inches at the line. To add to the dramatic finish, Allison and Petty made contact and Allison crashed after the checkered fell and did not get an opportunity to celebrate the win in Victory Lane as he was transported to the hospital with a concussion.

"The wreck at the end was just as much my fault as it was his," Petty said afterward. "We were leaning on each other. I tried to chop him off, but if I had cut across in front of him, I would have ended up in the infield. At the end, he cut on me as I would have on him. We clipped when we came across the line."

Although Wallace was not part of the mix, he still enjoyed the theater the moment provided.

"That was one where the finish should be on the highlight reels forever," he said. "Crashing sideways into the wall there at the checkers — we were all glad that Davey wasn't hurt and it was a special memory personally about him. He's one of the guys that I'd jokingly told about the way I'd like to be remembered in winning them — flipping upside down and skidding on the roof sideways across the finish line with sparks flying and the thing ablazin' with the crowd going ape crap. Well, he pretty damned near did just that there on that night."

Otter, bobcat harvest must be reported by phone next season

FRANKFORT - Hunters or trappers who take a bobcat or river otter in Kentucky will be required to report the harvest of those animals using the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' (KDFWR) Telecheck Reporting System.

At a special-called, May 7 meeting in Frankfort, the KDFWR Commission approved the new requirement to take effect this fall, when the statewide bobcat and limited-area otter seasons open. Most sportsmen and women are familiar with the telecheck system, presently used to report the harvest of deer and wild turkey.

The process is simple. Hunters make a toll-free phone call to 1-(800) 245-4263 (CHK-GAME), and then respond to a few survey questions using the keypad of their phone. At the end of the survey, the automated system provides a confirmation number for the hunter to record on the back of his/her hunting license as proof of complying with the

check-in requirement. It's that easy.

Those who harvest a bobcat or otter will have until midnight on the day the animal is recovered to make the call. For

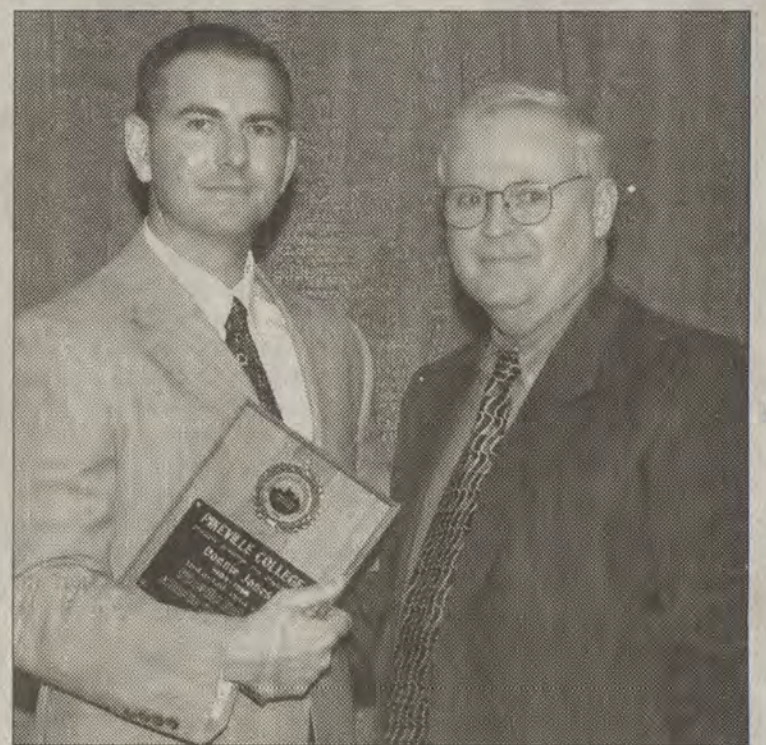

Jones honored at Alumni Banquet

PIKEVILLE — In a lifetime of coaching, Donnie Jones is used to sitting in the background. But at the Pikeville College Alumni/Senior Banquet, the spotlight shined brightly on the Pikeville College graduate.

Jones, a member of the Class of 1988, was honored twice at the college's annual celebration of graduates present and past. He was one of two people presented the school's Outstanding Alumni Award and was also enshrined into the Athletics Hall of Fame.

"This is a tremendous night for me," said Jones, who began his coaching career immediately upon his graduation with a two-year stint at his alma mater. "Pikeville College means so much to me, and it's quite an honor to be brought back here tonight."

The Outstanding Alumni Award is presented annually to someone whose contributions have enriched the lives of others, bringing honor and distinction to Pikeville College. Jones was honored alongside Reed Anderson, a member of the Pikeville Junior College Class of 1954 and longtime attorney, judge and assistant county attorney.

In addition, Jones became the 69th member of the Pikeville College Athletics Hall of Fame. The Hall ceremony is annually held in January, but due to his coaching obligations, Jones is unable to attend. Therefore, the Hall of Fame Committee elected to hold a special ceremony at the banquet.

Jones spent six years as an assistant coach at Marshall University and was the only

member of the staff retained when Billy Donovan took over the program. When the former Providence College standout and University of Kentucky assistant was hired at the University of Florida, he asked Jones to join him there.

In their eight years together in Gainesville, the Gators have played in six NCAA tournaments, one more than the school had reached in its history before their arrival. And in April 2000, they led the Gators to the national championship game for the first time ever.

The current staff has led the Gators to a record of 169-84.

But it is for his playing days that Jones is remembered on "The Hill". He came to Pikeville College from Point Pleasant High School in West. By the time he graduated in 1988 with a Bachelor of Science, he held records for most assists in a game with 21, in a season with 276 and in a career with 513.

During the ceremony, Jones thanked his teammates. "It's a cliché, but without them none of this would be possible," he said. "The highlights of my time here in Pikeville were the memories made on campus and the basketball court."

Daniel and Grace Curry, Forgiven

Ridicule. Judgment. Anger. Resentment.

These words, when used by society, carry a negative connotation. Intermix those same words with religion, and you have sin.

Meet Daniel P. and Grace Curry, founders of the Rising Son Ministries Church, in Allen. They know all too well the meaning of these words. They've experienced the sting of their definitions for many years now.

Daniel and Grace met years ago, while attending a church in Prestonsburg. Both were married. Both had children in those marriages. Both are living today as husband and wife, as they have been for the past 10 years.

But it doesn't matter to some people how long they've been married. Nor do their accomplishments or their happiness matter to some who continue to judge them.

Grace was on the receiving end of an abusive marriage for 13 years before

she decided to divorce the man she married at 16. She was going through that divorce when a 10 year relationship she had with her pastor changed.

He had married when he was 18, and had spent years living through the "ups and downs" of a marriage to a woman he didn't understand. The marriage was "rocky," he says. His wife was pregnant when he was drafted as a combat engineer to Vietnam. His youthful adjustments to that torment returned as nightmares when he came back from overseas. His baby didn't know him. His wife didn't know him. He barely knew himself, but he tried "to make the best of it."

Trying didn't work. Daniel left his wife, resigned from the church, and eventually married Grace, who has stood lovingly beside him since.

The judgment and ridicule suffered by both from this incident has marred the life of Daniel and Grace like a "plague."

For 3 years, they traveled from

The story picks up with Brigitte on the run after delivering her sister Ginger from the curse of being a werewolf by putting her down (no more walkies). Whereas the first film show-

cased the communication gap with teachers and parents this time the focus is on institutions. Seems Brigitte is slowly becoming a lycanthrope and must inject a cocktail of wolf's bane and her sisters' blood to stave off the lunar pangs. Unfortunately she gets arrested and is thrown in a state rehab hospital and asylum under the mistaken impression that she has a drug problem. Brigitte knows that no one will believe the truth and must search for an escape route while playing up to the staff at the facility. Its not an easy task as the head counselor is convinced she's suicidal, the top orderly wants to exploit her for his own sadistic pleasures and the therapist on-call has written her off as a closet lesbian.

Things get kicked up a notch when a male werewolf picks up her scent and comes a courting. Now Brigitte must trust a precocious preteen named Ghost who has a lurid imagination, tells a fair amount of lies and just so happens to know a way out. The escape goes well but Brigitte is starting to change and must get some antidote quickly. This sets up a finale that includes a werewolf attack and the stunning realization that Ghost may be more dangerous to everyone involved -including the werewolves.

Once again this series manages to tell a good dramatic story without sacrificing the horror elements. The werewolf is kept to the shadows for most of the film but does get to make an extended appearance during the final half-hour. Emily Perkins reprises her role as Brigitte and once again gives an all systems go performance that should net her a long career in front of the cameras. The real surprise here, though, is Tatiana Maslary as Ghost. This girl starts out as that precocious character you've

A twenty-four-karat friendship



Jesse Owens seemed sure to win the long jump at the 1936 games. The year before he had jumped 26 feet, 8 1/4 inches -- a record that would stand for 25 years. As he walked to the long-jump pit, however, Owens saw a tall, pit-eyed, blond German taking practice jumps in the 26-foot range. Owens felt nervous. He was acutely aware of the Nazis' desire to prove "Aryan superiority," especially over blacks.

On his first jump, Owens inadvertently leaped from several inches beyond the takeoff board. Rattled, he fouled on his second attempt, too. He was one foul away from being eliminated.

At this point, the tall German introduced himself as Luz Long. "You should be able to qualify with your eyes closed!" he said to Owens, referring to his two jumps.

For the next few moments the black son of a sharecropper and the

white model of Nazi manhood chatted. Then Long made a suggestion. Since the qualifying distance was only 23 feet, 5 1/2 inches, why not make a mark several inches before the takeoff board and jump from there, just to play it safe?

Owens did and qualified easily. In the finals, Owens set an Olympic record and earned the second of four golds. The first person to congratulate him was Luz Long -- in full view of Adolf Hitler.

Owens never again saw Long, who was killed in World War II. "You could melt down all the medals and cups I have," Owens later wrote, "and they wouldn't be a plating on the 24-karat friendship I felt for Luz Long."

church to church, searching for someone, any congregation to accept them. No one did. No one would allow Daniel to preach or speak to the congregation. To this day, his own family in West Virginia refuses to allow him to speak at their Baptist church because he's been divorced.

It's a "tradition of man" that stands strongly in this area, the couple say. Many churches believe that divorce is not acceptable in the eyes of God, and there are several who believe that divorced individuals shouldn't purport religious beliefs onto others.

When all this happened, the couple became the topic of a local newsletter. For months, the scandal was plastered on pages for whole neighborhoods to read. They got looks, sneers, and to this day, it still haunts them.

"I don't know if people condemn me as much in a personal way as they do in religious ways," Daniel said. "I could have killed my first wife and they would have forgiven the murder easier than they would have forgiven my divorce.... People need to know that we're just like other people who've had problems and tried to rectify them. People think you should never have a problem if you're a Christian, or that you should leave the church. I think the church should be able to minister to each other."

Grace remembers being at a funeral years ago, when one woman walked up to her and repeatedly "Repent! Repent! Repent!" That's all she would say.

"How many times do I have to repent?" Grace asked when describing this incident.

For some in this community, she could never repent enough. But that's not how she sees it. And that's not how Daniel sees it either. They have been forgiven in the eyes of God, and they know where

He's been pastoring for 31 years now.

When he returned from the war, Daniel recalls sitting in a jet in a Seattle airport as people were "booing" the soldiers' homecoming.

"That was a time period in this country where people didn't fully understand what was going on," he said. "We were there a year and we didn't understand."

The nightmares are not as bad as they used to be, Daniel says. In one recurring nightmare, Daniel is drafted to return to Vietnam. He tells them he's already been, and they explain that his experience in the war is why they want him to go back. Though this experience was a trying time in his life, Daniel believes that every person should serve at least one year in the military. It's a way to build character, structure, and strength, he says.

He now avoids movies about Vietnam but says he supports the current war in Iraq.

Grace, who now sings in the church's praise group, was born in the old Prestonsburg Hospital. She was raised in an old time Pentecostal Church, where the strictness of their religious beliefs forced constraints on the way members dressed and wore their hair.

"I don't think anybody has the right to put their beliefs on anybody else," she said. "The Bible says we work out our own salvation. Really, the way you look on the outside is not who you are on the inside.... It's what's in your heart that matters—how you treat people, how you live your daily life."

"What could you add if Christ saves you?" Daniel asked. "He cleanses you by his blood. What can you add to that?"

The couple say that in all the years they have been married, they've only had one disagreement and that they "do everything together."

they stand with themselves, their marriage, and lives with respect to their religion.

Fortunately, Daniel says, "God always has a way of bringing things around."

Though they still face ridicule and judgment by some, there are others who share more compassionate feelings. About 90 percent of their church congregation now were members of the Rock of Revelation Church in Prestonsburg, where Daniel resigned those years ago. Grace says one woman who repeatedly battered and judged them during all that went through a tough time herself before turning her opinion at their door, where she came, crying, asking for forgiveness.

"I told her there was nothing to forgive," she said. The woman and her husband are now faithful members of the Rising Son Ministries church, where they gather in a family like atmosphere to worship each week.

Daniel and Grace started the church about 3 years ago in Allen when they were "called" to do so by God. Now, they focus their teachings on the "Rock of Restoration," a calling to people in need of inner healing, restoration, or people who have been "wounded by religion."

Grace says the experience they went through during all this made them both stronger, individually and as a couple. It's also made them more compassionate to others in need or who are hurting. In fact, that's one of the reasons they built the church in Allen.

"Our message is not one of condemnation," Daniel said. "Christ didn't come here to condemn the world, but to help restore it. ... God is like a radio station. He's always broadcasting love, but our lives get so busy we get out of hearing distance. People need to slow down and give God more time in their lives."

The church is non-denomina-

tional, but Daniel says it's considered to be a Pentecostal Church because they believe in the "gifts of the spirit." The congregation of this "Full Gospel" church believe in speaking in tongues and healing, but they do not adhere to strict Pentecostal teachings that women should wear only dresses, refuse make-up, and never cut their hair.

The church, whose members are extremely health conscious, carries a contemporary tone, with modern Christian music, theological studies, and routine discussions regarding books by contemporary Christian authors and movies that they watch the first Wednesday of every month.

Sometimes, they take their studies outdoors, meeting at the Dewey Dam spillway for services.

Born in a family of ministers, Daniel, who moved here in 1978 from West Virginia, said he rebelled as a youth because he was "jealous" of the attention his parents gave to the church they pastored.

"As soon as my parents didn't make me go to church, I didn't go," he said.

But his feelings toward religion changed when he was drafted to Vietnam at age 18. When he was 19, as was the rule in those days, he was placed in a full-fledged combat zone. He served there while his brother served in the air force.

"The reality of that war really made me think," he said, remembering the bombardment of sniper fire, mortar attacks, and one midnight helicopter assault on his camp that changed his life.

They were firing inside their camp and the terrifying event "was enough to make anyone pray."

"You're 19, and you're really at a time in your life when you think nothing could kill you," he said. "I prayed and asked God to help me get home and I'd serve him. I have kept that promise."
