Contestants who think they can dance bust moves on Fox

Suddenly this summer, dancing is the "in" thing on television.

A couple of weeks after ABC's surprise hit "Dancing With the Stars" wrapped up its season, another fleet-of-foot series is stepping in. In conjunction with Dick Clark Productions, the producers of "American Idol" give amateurs the chance to show their stuff on the unscripted, Fox show "So You Think You Can Dance," which launches with a two-hour premiere Wednesday, July 20.

Los Angeles news anchor-reporter Lauren Sanchez hosts the 12-week competition, which follows the "American

Idol" formula of staging preliminary auditions in major cities (in this case, New York, Los Angeles and Chicago).

Executive producer Nigel Lythgoe believes the similarities between "So You Think You Can Dance" and "American Idol" end with each show being "a talent search. Singers and dancers are different animals, and dancers are a lot more resilient, I think. They're accustomed to going to auditions and getting the job or being turned down.

"They sort of shrug their shoulders and move on to the next audition. A lot of people walked in off the street to audition for 'American Idol,' but

A Conversation

with Pauly Shore

In 1972, Sammy and Mitzi Shore opened The Comedy Store on the Sunset Strip in Los Angeles. Over the years, the nightspot (which Mitzi has run since she and Sammy were divorced) became

famous both for showcasing established stars, as well as discovering many of the country's great comic talents. Among those who have come through its doors are Chris Rock, Dave Chappelle, Dave Attell, George Carlin, Sam Kinison, Jim Carrey and Robin Williams.

Pauly Shore, Sammy and

there's a bit more training to the people who came in for this."

That said, Lythgoe notes that some still showed up for impromptu tryouts: "Because they do a bit of break dancing, they think they're dancers. The whole premise of the program is, 'So you think you can dance? OK. Then do this.' That's what it comes down to, eventually."

"What's interesting is that some street dancers are now going to classes. It's almost easier to learn to dance if you can do eight pirouettes on your head and you have that rhythm built-in. I was a trained dancer, and there's no way I would dream of diving on my head and spinning around without using my hands."

"So You Think You Can Dance" will have its own versions

of Simon Cowell, Paula Abdul and Randy Jackson, with a panel of judges Lythgoe hopes will become as famous simply by showing their expertise. "I don't want to use celebrities," he says. "Simon was never a celebrity, and Randy was never a celebrity. They were just people we believed would make great judges. We want people who know what they're talking about."

"I started out as 'Nasty Nigel' on 'Popstars,' which was the show that preceded 'Pop Idol' (the forerunner to 'American Idol') in the United Kingdom, and I was a pretty tough judge. We found that sort of truthful toughness, or hard honesty, really focused people's attention. Of course, nobody does that better than Simon. He's gotten to the point where Americans will tell him, 'You say exactly

what I was thinking.' They used to boo him, and now he's turned that around."

Whereas a recording contract awaited Carrie Underwood and her "American Idol"-winning predecessors, the prize isn't quite as defined for the eventual "So You Think You Can Dance" victor.

"Let's be frank; this isn't 'Idol,'" Lythgoe says. "You can't turn on the radio and listen to somebody dancing, so unfortunately, this won't have the same kind of appeal. The humanity will be the appeal here. Let's not forget that 'Idol' comes in many layers, a bit like an onion. It isn't just about singing; it's about the people and their lives and about the chemistry between the judges. It comes at you from different angles."

"It's the same with this show. It might not produce someone at the

level of a Carrie Underwood or even a Bo Bice (last season's 'Idol' runner-up), but it will produce a celebrity, and it will hopefully get the public to understand the hard work that goes into that. If you get tired as a singer, you lose your voice. If you get tired as a dancer, you lose your temper, and you also start pulling muscles and injuring yourself."

Moreover, Lythgoe adds, "You're also forcing people together, and someone else will be holding the points that you earn in their hands. If they screw up, you're going to lose points, so there's a whole different feel to this from 'Idol.'"

Even though "Dancing With the Stars" outraced "So You Think You Can Dance" in getting on the air, Lythgoe doesn't mind. He believes the ABC show "skewed

to an older age group, and with this, I'd like to find the same demographic 'American Idol' has found in this country ... which is right across the board, from grandchildren to grandmas."

Lythgoe realizes the enormous success of "American Idol" raises the stakes for any other venture he attempts. "Expectations are always high," he observes. "It's something I'm used to in the U.K. as well. I had two huge successes there with 'Pop Idol' and 'Popstars'; in the middle of those, we anticipated another huge success with another show I did, but it didn't work."

"It's almost like the audition process itself," Lythgoe concludes. "Some you get, others you don't. That's part of making television programs. You just get used to it."

Mitzi's son, whose credits include his hit MTV show "Totally Pauly" and several feature films, including "Encino Man," "The Curse of Inferno" and "In the Army Now" and directing "Pauly Shore Is Dead," has now moved into reality television starting with the Sunday, July 17 debut on TBS of "Minding the Store," a half-hour reality series in which we see Pauly taking over the running of The Comedy Store, and finding that life at the top can be tough.

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"I've never had to deal with ordering (provisions) and all the other things that come with running a business like ours. I also have to put up with the renovations that are being made. Yes, I've seen how my mom has dealt with it all these years, but doing it myself is all new to me, and I have to learn as I go."

"Fortunately," he says, "I am not going to be alone. I've got some people I know will help me." Pause. Then, "At least I hope they will."

Shore's "helpers" include his right-hand man, Marlon; his sex therapist, Dr. Allen; his personal assistant, Sara; his comic friend, Marc; and Tommy, the talent booker.

"And, of course, Mom will be there as well. As a matter of fact, I may be running the place, but I

still have to clear all decisions with her."

The most difficult challenge so far?

"Hiding the profits from my brother, Peter."

Pauly Shore considers himself one of Hollywood's "lucky" people. While he occasionally laments that he doesn't get all the girls that other stars do, "still, how many people can say they grew up watching some of our most talented people on their way to greatness?"

Citing Robin Williams, Sam Kinison, Jim Carrey and others, he says they all had one thing in common besides getting their start at The Comedy Store: Mitzi Shore's faith in them.

"She has always had a sense of whose talent will take them to the top," Pauly Shore says. "And she's never wrong."

IN FOCUS: The new film "Bewitched," starring Nicole Kidman as Samantha the witch and Will Ferrell as her mortal husband, Darren, has renewed interest in the old TV series that starred the late Elizabeth Montgomery. This has reportedly prompted some Hollywood mavens to consider doing a movie on Montgomery's life. There is also talk about bringing the show back in an updated version. (There had been a sequel

several years ago that focused on Samantha's daughter, but fans didn't buy it.)

A personal note about Elizabeth Montgomery: She had been on a film location in Africa with her husband, Robert Foxworthy, and I asked her what she remembered most about her experience. She said, "Two things: The people, of course. They were warm and friendly. And the baby elephants: They're so darling, and so smooth. They looked like little Play-Doh creatures, and it was all I could do not to hug them, because I'd been told their very protective mothers, sisters and aunts wouldn't like that."

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DIAL TONES: Lauren Sanchez, the Emmy-winning entertainment reporter who hosts the Fox Network's new series "So You Think You Can Dance," premiering July 20, says, "The best way to describe the show is with one word: Fun. Even under the pressure of competition, the dancers are on stage doing what they love."

Simon Cowell, who became famous for his caustic comments as a judge on "American Idol," the elder sister of "So You Think You Can Dance," created "Il Divo," a quartet of classically trained singers who perform grand opera as well as pop songs. Their album, "Il Divo," which

was a big hit in Europe, is now, as they say, climbing the charts in the United States. The foursome will be appearing on American TV shows, including a guest stint on "The Young and The Restless" during the last week of August (possibly on the 26th, but the date may change). Will they do "American Idol?" No one is saying — yet.

Critic Corner by DNA Smith

'Batman Begins'

Running time: 137 minutes
MPAA rating: PG-13

At nearly 70 years old, Batman is the oldest and most popular anti-hero in American pop culture. Unfortunately, for most of those 70 years, Hollywood has struggled to portray the Dark Knight as a heroic figure, and gotten it wrong every time — until now.

Director Christopher Nolan gets it. He understands that the story of the Batman isn't some Cambellian Hero's Journey. The story of the Batman is a tale of madness and revenge. It's more "Kill Bill" than "Star Wars." Unlike the TV shows and previous film incarnations, Christopher Nolan's Batman kills, and feels justified in doing so.

Bruce Wayne is a tortured, emotionally stunted man on the brink of madness because he cannot get over the grief, fear,

rage and feeling of helplessness he felt as a little boy witnessing his parents' brutal murders. To keep from going completely insane, he takes on the persona of a frightening, savage avenger — the Batman.

The film stars Christian Bale, the first actor who not only can fill the cowl of the Batman, but also gives us the best Bruce Wayne we've ever seen. From a young man in his 20s in self-imposed exile in the Himalayas (where he trains in the martial arts) to his return to Gotham City in his 30s, Bale shows us the emotional and psychological journey Wayne needs to take in order to become The Caped Crusader.

Upon returning to Gotham, Wayne learns his company has been taken over by an unscrupulous partner (Rutger Hauer), the city is under the thumb of a ruthless mob boss (Tom Wilkinson),

virtually all the cops are on the take, except James Gordon (Gary Oldman), and a hooded, psychotic freak who calls himself The Scarecrow (Cillian Murphy) is about to release the entire criminally insane population of Arkham Asylum and then poison Gotham's water supply, killing every living soul. It's a tall order, but I think we all know who's gonna win.

"Batman Begins" is the best film of the summer and certainly the best Batman film yet made. There are only three things that could've been better: A musical theme (there is no memorable Batman theme in the score); a different leading lady (Katie Holmes doesn't have the acting chops to hold her own against the likes of Bale or Michael Caine); and most of all, a real Batmobile.

News of the Weird

The Jordan River, considered by believers to have been the gateway to the Garden of Eden (and by Christians to have been where Jesus was baptized), is now more than 50 percent raw sewage and agricultural runoff, according to a Middle East conservation group spokesman interviewed by Reuters in June. Together, Israel, Jordan and Syria have diverted away from the river (and then treated) about 90 percent of the water flow over the years for their own uses, though part of Jordan's diversion was to create a clean-water baptismal site for pilgrims (some of whom, nonetheless, still bathe in the greenish, polluted part).

Police Blotter

In an early-morning shootout on June 4 in the Homewood housing complex in Pittsburgh, two undercover officers and suspect Keith Carter, 19, exchanged a total of at least 103 gunshots and missed every single time. (On the other hand, in March,

Regina Jones-Peoples, 30, of Warren, Ohio, survived 18 gunshots, from her neck to her legs, allegedly by her estranged husband, Marcus Jones, 29, on whom police issued an arrest warrant.)

In the course of a traffic stop on Interstate 70 in Kingdom City, Mo., in June, Missouri Highway Patrol officers found a 3-foot-long rocket with an electric launcher, attached to an elaborate system of pulleys in the trunk of the car of two men, Michael Ray Sullivan, 41, and Joseph C. Seidl, 39. The rocket, which could probably be triggered from the driver's seat, was found stuffed with methamphetamine, with more (totaling about \$145,000 worth) in pipes alongside. The patrolmen who arrested the pair believe the contraption was for quick disposal of their inventory if they got cornered.

Government in Action

Ireland's justice ministry proposed

rules changes for its prison system in June, banning such "inhumane" treatments as restricted diets and corporal punishment. On the other hand, among the current practices that would soon be prohibited are inmates' bringing in their own furniture, hiring maids, and ordering food and alcoholic beverages, according to a dispatch from Dublin published in The Australian.

Officials in Montgomery County, Md., regard the feathery green plant called the mugwort as a weed, an "alien invasive plant," and periodically lament its presence in the county's parks, according to a June Washington Post report. However, local Koreans, who call the plant "souk," consider it a delicacy in seafood soup and rice cakes, and have eagerly been digging it out of the parks for free, except that it is illegal to remove anything, even weeds, from the parks. Consequently, according to the Post, county officials have simultaneously undertaken (a) a pilot program to see if goats

could be trained to root out unwanted flora and (b) a stepped-up program to convince the Koreans to obey the law against removing mugwort.

In May, Councilman Manfred Juraczka in Vienna, Austria, proposed, in order to alleviate the city's growing problem with pet droppings, to collect DNA samples from all registered dogs so that the soilers can be identified and their owners fined. According to an Associated Press report, a similar proposal was made in Dresden, Germany, in March, and News of the Weird reported another, in 1996, in the English village of Bruntingthorpe, which at the time had a population of 200 people and 30 dogs. (Vienna has about 50,000 registered dogs.)

arrested just as he was preparing to play a round at the Anchorage (Alaska) Golf Course on June 11. Police said he had just moments before caused a two-car collision that sent five people to the hospital (but not Puliddo-Castaneda, who walked away). Puliddo-Castaneda's passengers said he was speeding because he said he had to make his tee time. And, in June, describing the moments immediately after a serious auto collision the month before on Interstate 4 near Plant City, Fla., victim Tracy Palmer (ankle shattered, lip impaled on her teeth, according to a Tampa Tribune story) said she could hear tires rolling inches from her head as other motorists crept through the four-car wreck in order to be on their way. "People were actually driving between us (victims)," she said.

News That Sounds Like a Joke

(1) The support group for Chronic Fatigue Syndrome in Nelson, New Zealand, announced that it would support in principle the illness-publicizing International Awareness Day on May 12 even though its members would probably not participate in the commemorative activities because they are often too tired for such things. (2) The Rotary Club of Chatham, New Brunswick, announced in May that the grand prize in its raffle to help build a new environmental awareness center would be a Hummer. (3) Federal agents who were interviewing Gerald T. Williams, 34, about possible child pornography at his home in St. Louis, said that in the course of the interview, a screen saver featuring child-sex images happened to appear on Williams's computer. (Williams

pleaded guilty in June.)

Questionable Judgments

An 82-year-old man who had locked himself out of his still-running car in Glen Burnie, Md., in June, was hospitalized with first- and second-degree burns after attempting to siphon gasoline from the car using an electric vacuum cleaner (a spark from which ignited gasoline vapors). He told police that he wanted to force the engine to stop by removing the rest of the gasoline. In June, community leaders in a largely gay neighborhood in Toronto unveiled a 13-foot-high statue of Alexander Wood, one of their historical heroes, who according to legend had been pressured out of town in the early 1800s over a sex scandal. As the story goes, magistrate Wood, investigating a heterosexual rape

in which the victim claimed to have scratched her attacker's genitals, rounded up numerous suspects and zealously examined each for such a scratch. Hence, the statue features a 5-foot-tall image of Wood, seated, "inspecting" a standing man with his trousers down.

Names in the News

A Springfield, Ill., lawyer was unsuccessful in his petition to the judge to have his client tried for DUI-reckless homicide under a false name (in that the jury just could not be fair if it knew her real name, which is Doris Lush, and in fact, she was convicted) (May). Another woman who might have a similar problem: Denise Coke, 25, charged with possession of 33 pounds of cocaine (Roseville, Mich., May). Not so troubled: Mr. Emmanuel Innocent, charged with

attempted murder in a bar fight (Ottawa, Ontario, May).

Recurring Themes

"Fool for a client" Timothy Daniel, 25, who had fired his lawyer and defended himself on a murder charge in Columbus, Ohio, was found not guilty by a jury in May (though the judge sentenced him to five years in prison for being a felon in possession of a gun). (News of the Weird reported in 2003 that Jonathan Harris, representing himself, not only beat a murder rap in Philadelphia, but also prevailed as his own counsel in two felony trials, and then taunted the prosecutor for threatening to bring additional charges.)

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briefs Deadline for strike is today

PRESTONSBURG — Highlands Regional Medical Center met with union representatives Friday at the Ramada Inn in Paintsville for one last attempt to negotiate a labor contract prior to a strike deadline today.

The hospital has been negotiating with SEIU/District 1199 employees since May 16. SEIU employees, the hospital's service, technical and clerical workers, threatened to strike if negotiations aren't reached by noon today. Although agreement has been reached on more than 50 items in the hospital's proposed contract, on Tuesday, SEIU members voted down an offer made by the hospital.

The hospital placed its final offer on the table Friday and union employees held a secret ballot vote in Paintsville on Saturday. Results of the vote were not available by press time.

"I hope they do the right thing here," said Kathy McCormick, SEIU's Kentucky and West Virginia coordinator, Friday afternoon.

The union is asking for higher wages, better health benefits and job security for union employees.

Police continue search for escaped inmate

PRESTONSBURG — Two deputy jailers were injured Thursday night when a pair of inmates attempted an escape from the Floyd County Detention.

Police are still searching for one of two men, Roman Chaderic Johnson, who escaped after locking up two deputy jailers during a scuffle in cell 61 about 9:25 p.m.

The escape occurred as deputy jailers Mike Hall and Willard Kidd were dispensing nighttime medication to inmates in the cell, which held 10 prisoners.

Johnson, assisted by inmate Delmar Kendrick Jr., rushed out the door, assaulted the jailers, pushed them into the cell, closed the doors and ran down the hall to the control room, where the men encountered deputy jailer Lori Ousley. Kendrick reportedly put his

arm around the female jailer's neck and told her to get out before pushing several buttons on the control panel which failed to have any impact on the escape.

Floyd County Sheriff's Deputy Delmas Johnson, who was fingerprinting a prisoner at the time of the escape, saw the men run by the doorway and went after them. He caught up with Kendrick who tried to strike him but missed. The deputy took Kendrick down and cuffed him but couldn't prevent Johnson from escaping through the property intake box which is normally used to accept mail and belongings and only measures slightly less than 24 inches wide. Johnson, who is described as being 6 feet, 8 inches tall and weighing 250 pounds, somehow managed to squeeze his frame through the slot and escaped the facility before Deputy Johnson could get free to call the sheriff's department.

Escape prompts changes at jail

The escape from the Floyd County Detention Center Thursday evening was apparently well planned, according to jailer Roger Webb.

The investigation into the escape, which left two officers wounded, revealed that inmate Roman Johnson had been keeping a close eye on the comings and goings of staff at the facility. Webb's staff recovered a detailed grid from Johnson's cell which

noted the staffing of the jail at night and highlighted two evenings a week when the jail was operating a three staff shift. Johnson executed his escape during a shift that was down one staff

Annexation vote still being considered

PRESTONSBURG — The question of whether the proposed annexation of Highlands Regional Medical Center and Consolidated Health Systems properties will be placed on the ballot remains unanswered.

Lexington attorney Hanley A. Ingram, of Stoll Keenon & Park, addressed the city council by letter in May, alleging that the city did not properly send notice about the annexation to all potentially affected property owners. At that time, Ingram explained that owners of 6-to-7 acres of land targeted for annexation had not been identified.

Twenty-three property owners signed a petition opposing the annexation earlier this month. They asked that Mayor Jerry Fannin and Floyd County Clerk Chris Waugh take "all necessary actions required by KRS 81A.420 so that a public question on the annexation

proposed in Ordinance 5-2005 can be placed on the ballot at the next regular election."

Waugh spent a good majority of the day Friday driving along the boundary lines of the Route 321 properties that are targeted for annexation. He had already confirmed with the PVA's office that the petitioners were, in fact, property owners in that area. Waugh said he decided to drive the boundary lines to make sure that no residences were included in the area proposed for annexation.

"I went out and looked over the area and drove up to the cemetery on the hill. I saw a water tank up there," Waugh said. "I basically wanted to see exactly what the boundary lines really did cover. I was making sure that there wasn't any residential areas taken in, which there wasn't."

Waugh said his current "dilemma" is finding out

Boss gets 90 days for indecent exposure

PRESTONSBURG — District Judge James Allen sentenced an Endicott man to 90 days in jail and a \$250 fine Friday, which was the maximum penalty for a first offense indecent exposure charge.

Allen also noted that he would have given Benjamin Boss, 74, 12 months in jail had it been allowable.

Boss was arrested last week for a July 4 incident in which he exposed his genitals to a 3-year-old neighbor whose parents caught the incident on videotape.

Boss entered a guilty plea last week, but his sentencing had been postponed until Friday so the county attorney's office could investigate him further and see if more charges were pending.

County Attorney Keith Bartley noted for the court

that Boss has no criminal record but that a maximum sentence was recommended because of the nature of the crime. Boss was caught on videotape exposing himself to a 3-year-old child while clad in a g-string and dancing about provocatively and fondling a sexual apparatus. Bartley said that crimes of this nature escalate and compared the offense to drug users who later become dealers or support their habit, as well as small children who hurt animals and then grow up to be serial killers.

"Even his wife has said he's had similar incidents in the past," Bartley said.

Bartley went on to note that Boss's wife left him for a period due to his predilections. Bartley also affirmed that Boss needs counseling and said, "I think he's got major problems."

David founder leaving; board investigates

DAVID — The founder and executive director of the David School is stepping down from his position this week.

Daniel J. Greene and his wife, Anne, who is also leaving the school, are moving to Texas. The school hosted a retirement party for them and Emma Kriz Saturday.

Prestonsburg attorney Ned Pillersdorf,

who voluntarily serves as board attorney at David, confirmed Thursday that Greene will remain as director emeritus of the school. Greene will continue fundraising efforts from his new Texas home.

His step back from the David school, which he founded in 1972, comes alongside allegations that prompted an investigation by the school's board of directors.

Board chairman Andrew Dorton confirmed that allegations brought to the

board prompted an investigation, but he said Greene is not leaving because of those allegations or the subsequent investigation.

"We did receive some allegations," Dorton said. "In response, we conducted an investigation."

Dorton would not disclose the details or the outcome of the investigation.

"I guess I expected this call sooner or later, but I'm not prepared to talk about it now. It's not an uncomplex issue," Dorton

said. "We're looking for a replacement to run the school, but no final decision has been made."

The Times received several reports this week from school and David community affiliates who claim the investigation was sparked with allegations of discrepancies in the school's Adult Education Program. There has been no confirmation of those allegations.

■ **SANTA CRUZ, Calif.** — Talk about honest. A Santa Cruz man says he mistakenly received a copy of "Harry Potter and the Half-Blood Prince" four days before its official release.

And what did Thorin Brentmar do with the year's most anticipated book? Sell it on eBay? Lend it to friends? Read it one sitting? None of the above.

Brentmar called the publisher and sent it back.

"He called us," said Scholastic Press spokeswoman Kris Moran. "We said, 'Thank you very much.' We asked him to send the book back."

Brentmar said he's read all J.K. Rowling's Potter books and likes them. But he didn't pre-order "Half-Blood Prince," has no friends at bookstores who might have slipped him a copy and didn't know where it came from. He said it showed up hanging on his doorknob in a white plastic bag.

Scholastic, the book's American publisher, has printed 10.8 million copies. They remain sealed in cartons in bookstores, and won't go on sale until 12:01 a.m. Saturday.

Moran said Scholastic would reimburse whatever it cost Brentmar to return the book and send him a free copy and "other fun Harry Potter stuff" after the embargo ends.

■ **FORREST CITY, Ark.** — It took 25 rolls of duct tape and more than four weeks of work, but two high school students earned \$2,500 college scholarships after donning formal wear made from the adhesive to their prom.

Krystal Long and Casey Istringhouse, both 18, won the 2005 Stuck at Prom scholarship contest. The award goes to a couple who attends the prom dressed entirely in duct tape.

Long's dress, a two-piece design, was inspired by Pablo Picasso's "Girl Before a Mirror" painting. Istringhouse wore a tuxedo with similar patterns.

The couple said the outfits were extremely hot and heavy, but the crowd's reaction was worth the trouble.

"Everyone loved the outfits

and couldn't believe they were actually made of duct tape," Long said.

The pair from Forrest City was selected as best dressed from more than 260 couples from 44 states and Canada. The contest was run by Duck brand tape.

■ **BROCKTON, Mass.** — Animal control officers have captured a 4 1/2-foot alligator in a lake — and another's on the loose.

Michael Ralbovsky of the conservation group Rainforest Reptiles waded into Waldo Lake and netted one alligator Wednesday. "It was in awesome condition," he said.

Witnesses had reported seeing two alligators at D.W. Field Park. Officials speculated that the gators were pets that got too big. It's against the law to own an alligator in Massachusetts without a special permit.

"Somebody probably had these alligators and when they got too big they left them in the pond," said Paul Tighe of the Brockton Animal Control Department.

Three weeks ago, a four-foot alligator was found in a brook in Auburn. A two-foot gator was caught in Boston's Jamaica Pond in 2003.

■ **LAGUNA NIGUEL, Calif.** — The "Senior Citizen Bandit" has robbed three Southern California banks in the past week, brandishing a gun and ordering tellers to hand over the money, authorities said.

The robber, believed to be in his 60s or 70s, struck most recently on Thursday afternoon in Laguna Niguel. Police said he hit another bank in Seal Beach on Tuesday and a Washington Mutual branch in San Juan Capistrano last week.

"The method of operation is exactly the same," said Jim Amormino, a spokesman for the Orange County Sheriff's Department.

A man dubbed the "Old Timer Bandit" was killed in May 2004 after leading police on a pursuit. That man, who was in his 60s, was responsible for multiple bank robberies in Southern California's San

Gabriel Valley and had been suspected of robbing two banks before he was fatally wounded by a police officer.

■ **MASCOUTAH, Ill.** — It has been a hot, dry summer in this St. Louis suburb, but Rose Mary Cook knew there was no way she could have used \$74,000 worth of water.

The city's utility department claimed Cook used 10 million gallons of water last month, charging her \$29,787 for water, \$43,581 for sewer, plus \$893 for municipal tax.

"Luckily, when I opened the bill, I was sitting down," Cook said. "I could have filled every pool in southern Illinois and still not used that much water."

Cook presented the bill to a public works employee at City Hall. Officials quickly determined the whopping fee was the result of a broken meter and issued a corrected bill for \$32.66 — waiving Cook's monthly water and sewer charges for her troubles.

"My daughter asked me if I was hoarding water during the

drought," Cook said. "I told her I would, but I don't know where I would find 10 million gallon jugs."

■ **OAKLAND, Calif.** — Stephen Holloday has a familiar face — at least to tellers at one downtown Oakland bank.

Police say he robbed the same bank four times between March 9 and May 23, but on his fifth attempt this month, a teller recognized him and alerted another co-worker who had been robbed previously by Holloday.

The two confronted the man, who panicked and fled, Oakland police Sgt. George Phillips. He was arrested a short time later on a street not far from the Summit Bank, the evidence — a demand note — still in his pocket.

"He was a creature of habit," Phillips said. "He had a penchant for doing the same bank over and over."

Holloday also is a suspect in at least seven San Francisco bank robberies, including one branch he allegedly hit five

times, authorities said.

■ **CICERO, Ill.** — Michelangelo is back home after three slow — but steady — weeks on the road.

The tortoise, affectionately known as Mikey, was reunited with Eastern Illinois University student Kim Heinemann on Monday after police found him moseying along the side of a road in this Chicago suburb more than 20 miles from where he went missing.

Heinemann, 23, and her family had mounted a public relations campaign to draw attention to the plight of her sluggish pet.

At one point during his journey, the tortoise was seen crossing a busy street where traffic had stopped to let him pass.

"He looks the same but is just hungry," Heinemann said Tuesday. "We stayed optimistic over the past few weeks, but we knew it was like a needle in a haystack that he would be found."

The 22-pound desert tortoise disappeared in June from the

backyard at Heinemann's parents' home where they were visiting for a few days. A resident eventually called police to report a tortoise walking down the road.

By Monday, Mikey was back at Heinemann's Charleston home where there's a turtle-proof fence around her yard.

■ **WEST BEND, Wis.** — It really pays to be honest — just ask Larry Hoffman.

The 70-year-old retiree returned \$2,000 he found in the pocket of a shirt he bought at a Goodwill store, and police say he will get the money back since the original owner can't be found.

Sgt. Gus Unertl on Tuesday said he told Hoffman that 24 people who had contacted police were not able to correctly describe the details of the shirt and money found on April 1. Claims came from as far away as Maine and Washington state, police said.

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State looks for answers to Medicaid crisis

LONDON — State officials, searching for ways to deal with a projected \$675 million shortfall in the Medicaid program, still have not found an alternative to taking coverage away from at least some recipients who now receive

it. "We hope it doesn't come to that," said Mark Birdwhistell, the state's undersecretary for health. "We have not come up with a silver bullet, a single solution to the problem."

The Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services held meetings this week in Bowling Green and London to

raise awareness about the problem and to solicit possible solutions.

"We're faced with some very difficult decisions," Birdwhistell said. "Quite honestly, all options are on the table. We're running out of easy solutions."

About 50 people attended a hearing Thursday and expressed some concerns

about some of the cost-cutting measures, including the copayments.

Cathy Allgood Murphy, a lobbyist for AARP of Kentucky, said patients can often have multiple prescriptions, and copayments could run more than \$20 a month.

"That may not be much for you or me, but that's a lot of money if you're

living on \$500 a month," she said.

Hoping to whittle down the shortfall, state officials raised copayments from \$1 to \$3 on prescription medications. Beginning in August, recipients will have to make copayments of \$2 for visits to doctor's offices, \$6 for emer-

Hall was transported to Highlands Regional Medical Center with head injuries. He was treated and released but was warned to be on the watch for signs of a slight concussion which could include dizziness and headaches. Kidd received only minor rib injuries and refused medical treatment. Ousley sustained a cut on her arm.

Floyd County Sheriff John K. Blackburn said authorities searched the Prestonsburg, Town Branch and West

Prestonsburg until the early morning hours Friday.

"We were looking under people's houses and under floors thinking he might have hid under someone's floor," Blackburn said, "but we were unable to locate him. We're still looking for him, but no information is coming in yet."

Jailer Roger Webb joined in the search himself and spent several hours cruising the area for Johnson. He noted that Johnson had been examined last week by the mental health staff

at Kentucky Correctional Psychiatric Center and was cleared to come back to the jail.

Johnson, who has been reportedly staying in Virgie, is facing charges of receiving stolen property over \$300, theft of identity without consent, unsworn falsification to authorities, falsely reporting an incident, second-degree forgery, driving on a suspended or revoked license and no insurance. Kentucky Vehicle Enforcement officer Keith Justice arrested him while May 13 he was

allegedly driving a stolen vehicle in Tram. He allegedly gave the officer the wrong name and date of birth and gave "verbal and written false information concerning his role in the possession of the stolen vehicle and false information on a drug deal," the citation says.

Johnson's \$50,000 cash bond in that case was amended to a \$50,000 surety bond by District Judge Eric Hall prior to his preliminary hearing on July 11. During that hearing Johnson behaved erratically and was cautioned by his court appointed lawyer, Lance Daniels, to be quiet after he made several statements to Daniels, loud enough for the courtroom to hear, about "wanting to do 20 years of federal time" and that he was upset about losing 20 pounds of cocaine.

Johnson was also arrested by Floyd County Sheriff's Deputy Michael Fitzpatrick on May 18 as a fugitive from Florida, where he faces charges of grand theft auto, carrying a concealed firearm, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon and grand theft of a firearm. He is scheduled for an extradition hearing on August 22.

Delmar Kendrick Jr., 26, of

Left Beaver Creek, was indicted on two counts of first-degree sexual abuse on June 9. Kentucky State Police Det. Marvin Watson alleges that Kendrick had sexual contact twice with a 5-year-old girl on March 1.

He pleaded not guilty to the charges and is scheduled for a pretrial conference on Sept. 12. He has been placed under a \$50,000 cash bond. Kendrick also has pending charges in district court, where he faces one count of fourth-degree assault, public intoxication and resisting arrest. He was out on bond for these charges when he was arrested on the sexual abuse charges. He was also charged Friday with three counts of assaulting a correctional officer

and one charge of attempted escape.

His father, Delmer Kendrick, 52, of Ivy Creek Road, was given a diverted two-year sentence on a third-degree sexual abuse and indecent exposure charge. Officials diverted the case because the complaining witness was afraid to continue with trial.

Johnson also took advantage of the medication routines at the jail, which required guards to enter cells so that they could be sure that inmates took their medication. That protocol was an effort to keep inmates from using their drugs as "money" to barter for other goods.

Johnson and Delmar Kendrick used the routine to overpower the guards who opened their cell and then locked them up inside it. It is a

key aspect of the escape and one routine that will be changed according to Webb.

"Now we're going to have to rely on the tray openings to pass meds and then the guards will have to look through the cell doors to try and observe the pills being taken," Webb said.

Webb noted that it was going to make it harder to check if inmates actually take their medications, but that concern is trumped by Webb's concern for the safety of his staff.

Webb also said that a bar will be inserted in the intake box that Johnson squeezed through and that it will run straight down the center of the box, making it impossible to squeeze through.

Webb observed that prosecuting Johnson will be aided by the jail's computer-operated camera system which observed several portions of the escape and recorded the images onto the central computer's hard drive. A specialist will be brought in to retrieve the images.

how many petition signers are registered voters in the Auxier precinct and whether the annexation proposal can still be put on the ballot if none of the petitioners live in the voting precinct.

Several of the 23 petitioners live in other states. Those that live in Floyd County are not registered for the Auxier precinct, he said. Other petitioners weren't registered to vote at all.

Waugh says the confusion lies in the wording of the 1996 statute that says that any annexation proposal can be placed on the ballot if 50 percent of the resident voters or owners of the property petition the mayor in opposition and forward the document, through the mayor, to the county clerk's office prior to the August deadline. Hospital attorneys claim they have signatures of more than 50 percent of those property owners.

The statute does not clarify if those voters have to reside in the respective precinct in order to

call a ballot vote on the annexation, only that those within the precinct are allowed to vote.

"They have fulfilled their obligation of turning in this petition," Waugh said. "It says when they fulfill that obligation, then an election will be held at the next regular election so long as the county clerk finds their petition to be sufficient."

The question now, Waugh says, is what "sufficient," as it is used in the statute, really means.

Waugh said he is discussed the problem with the state Board of Elections, but his contact there is on vacation next week and will not be available to answer his questions about the wording of the statute.

"I'm not going to get in any rush to do this," he said. "I think I have plenty enough time to make sure I do everything correctly for an issue as important as this."

The statute says that if only a part of any precinct is

"embraced" within the area targeted for annexation, then only the persons who reside within that area will be permitted to vote.

If put to a vote, the annexation will be valid if less than 55 percent of those voters oppose it, and it will not pass if 55 percent or more of the voters oppose it.

Greene mailed a letter May 8 to the Council on Post-Secondary Education, announcing his desire to "voluntarily relinquish" the school's \$327,323 Adult Education contract. The school was the state's designated program host until the contract ended June 30.

Greene and his wife, who heads the school's GED program, previously told The Times that they relinquished the contract because of complexities in a new state law that allows school districts to head GED programs. They said they wanted to increase their focus on students at the David School.

Reecie Stagnolia, with the Kentucky Adult Education program, said the state is not participating in any type of investigation against Greene or the school. The Prestonsburg Campus of Big Sandy Community and Technical College was notified Thursday, he said, that it will serve as the new adult education program host for Floyd County.

The state has just completed a comprehensive audit of the David School, Stagnolia said, and officials are currently reviewing the final audit report, which has not been released publicly. Stagnolia emphasized that the audit was a routine procedure and that the David School was one of 48 schools in the state that have been audited this year.

would reflect any discrepancies that may be found in the program.

Pillersdorf, who represented Greene in a criminal case that was dismissed in 1999, spoke on Greene's behalf Thursday.

"There are no deep, dark conspiracies, no deep, dark secrets," Pillersdorf said. "There's a rumor monger out there saying all this stuff that isn't true."

Reports to The Times indicate that teachers at the David School are worried about losing their jobs for reasons affiliated with the allegations and subsequent investigation.

The David School board, made up of several influential people across the county, removed at least one board member last month.

Pillersdorf sent a letter on June 14 to board member Johnny Ross, the Reverend Canon at St. James Episcopal Church in Prestonsburg. Ross was reprimanded a month earlier by the board, Pillersdorf said, and they voted in June to have him removed because he violated "certain internal policies."

Ross could not be reached for comment this week and Pillersdorf would not publicly disclose information about Ross' alleged violations.

Greene, who was recognized by President George Bush as one of America's "Points of Light" in the 1990s, came to Kentucky in 1972 to establish the David School, which has

long been recognized for helping decrease the high school dropout rate in Floyd County. The "no-fail" school offers a nontraditional environment to confront literacy problems, provide employable skills training and provide socialization skills training for the students.

"That school has meant a great deal to a lot of people, including our own daughter," said former David School board member John Rosenberg. "The community and the parents of the children who went to school there owe a real debt to Danny for having implemented the school. It's a great addition to the community."

Rosenberg's daughter was the David School's first graduate to obtain a master's degree.

The Times has made an open records request for a copy of the audit, David school board meeting minutes over the past six months and GED/Adult Education Program information over the past three years. Dorton said he would have to get permission from the board before answering those requests and before allowing The Times to cover the private school's board meetings.

Paintsville Lawyer Michael Schmitt is also volunteering legal services to the David School board, Dorton said.

Repeated calls to Daniel Greene were unreturned this week.

Hitting a new low

Gov. Ernie Fletcher's response to a grand jury probe of his administration's hiring practices has been consistently disappointing. But this week he hit a new low.

Initially, Fletcher — who campaigned in 2003 on a pledge to get rid of the waste, fraud and abuse in Frankfort — acknowledged possible "mistakes" in processing recommendations for new hires. But as the probe widened he accused Kentucky Attorney General Greg Stumbo of conducting a political witch hunt. And when members of his administration began to be indicted, Fletcher took to saying that his administration was only doing what Democrats had been doing for years.

All that was just a prelude to Monday's performance.

First, Fletcher called a press conference to announce the formation of a blue ribbon panel to study Kentucky's Merit System law. Fletcher complained the 45-year-old law, designed to limit patronage in state government, is so poorly written that trucks can be driven through its loopholes even as it can be used to catch a gnat.

Perhaps the law is flawed. But it smacks of political theater for the governor, at this point, to call for a study of the laws behind the indictment of eight current or former members of his administration.

Put it this way: Just hours after Fletcher's press conference, the blue-ribbon panel became the basis for one of the one-liners that his communications director used when word came that the chairman of the Kentucky Republican Party and two members of the governor's administration had been indicted.

"Today's actions are proof that the Attorney General is manipulating the Grand Jury process," said Monday's statement from Fletcher's communications director. "Clearly, this is in retaliation to the Governor's decisive action earlier today. Like the ones before them, these accusations are not supported by law."

That's mostly nonsense.

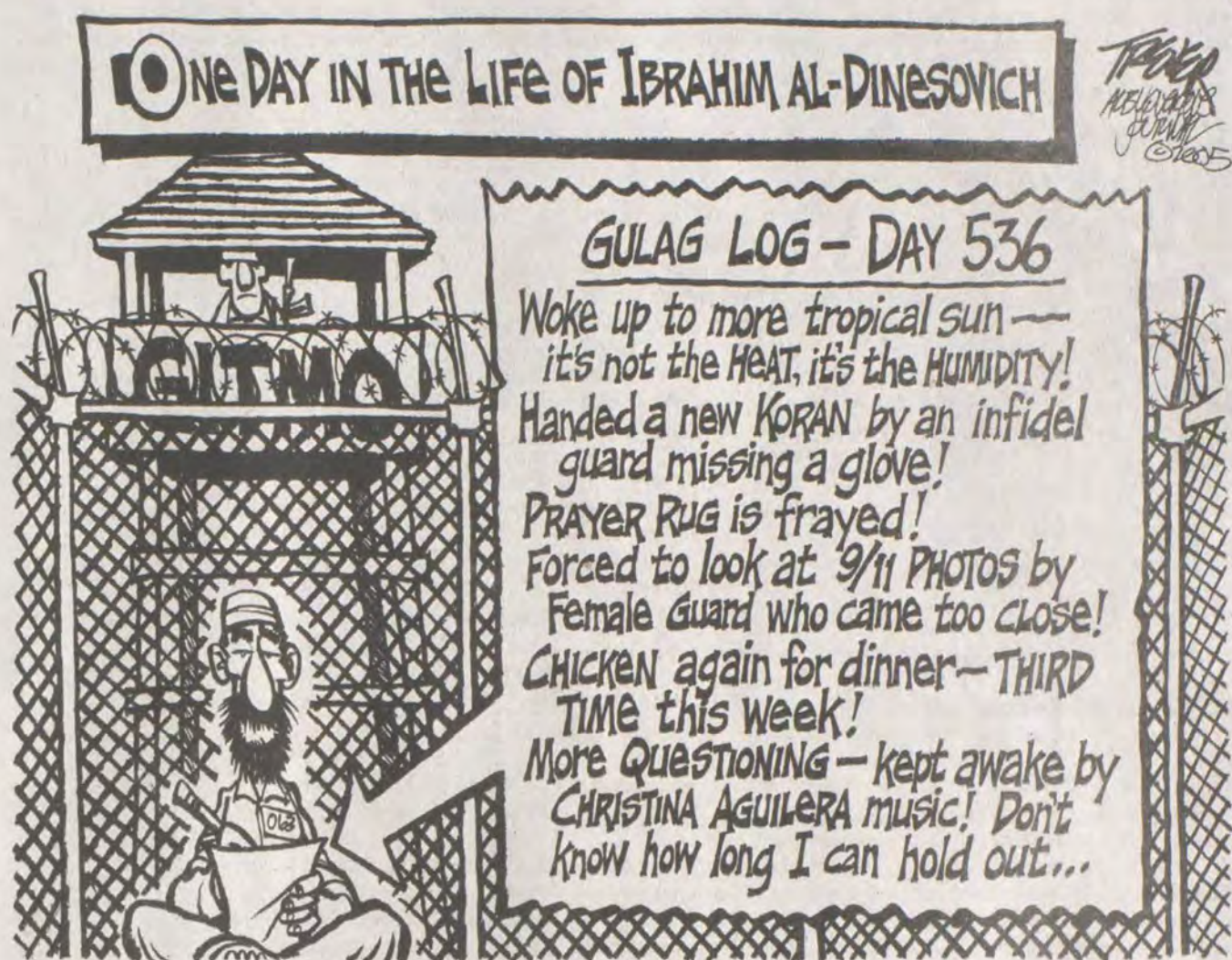
Monday's indictments don't prove anything — certainly not that Stumbo is manipulating the grand jury process. The indictments are merely allegations that the law was broken.

Moreover, it is not at all clear the indictments were in retaliation for anything. In fact, we're inclined to think that the 12 men and women who are taking time away from their jobs and families to serve on the grand jury had more important things to think about than Fletcher's blue ribbon panel — if, in fact, they even knew about it. And we'd hardly call naming a study panel "decisive action."

As for the last assertion — that the accusations are not supported by law — we're content to wait and see how the legal process plays out. Attorneys for those who've been indicted have promised vigorous defenses. We suspect that if there is indeed too much ambiguity in the Merit System law, the flaws will be revealed in the upcoming trials and related legal processes. If that happens, then it would be appropriate to convene a blue ribbon panel to look at ways of refining the law.

In the meantime, Fletcher ought to stop attacking Stumbo, the grand jury and the law and concentrate instead of getting rid of all that waste, fraud and abuse in Frankfort.

Abandoning Central America

Back during the Reagan years, few things so exercised self-styled idealists of the left as the fate of Central America. They bewailed its civil wars, and the way its governments allied with the U.S. were supposedly autocratic and abusive. When "Sandalistas" — the archetypical Birkenstock-wearing friends of Nicaragua's left-wing government — urged people to "think globally, act locally," they were mostly thinking of Central America.

Flash-forward two decades and a fragile democratic revolution in the region later. That old (misplaced) idealism has transformed into a genuflection to the protectionism of American labor: "Think globally, act however AFL-CIO head John Sweeney dictates." And so almost all of the House Democratic caucus has lined up in opposition to the U.S.-Central American-Dominican Republic Free Trade Agreement (CAFTA).

It is the most important Central America-related initiative Congress will take up for decades, and on its passage hinges the future of the region.

The agreement is a win-win. The University of Michigan estimates that it would boost U.S. income by \$17 billion and Central American income by \$5 billion. Forward-looking leaders in the region have made CAFTA a centerpiece of their development strategies, hoping to create a virtuous circle of economic growth feeding and building on political and economic reform.

So why not CAFTA? Bipartisan majorities support programs to give developing nations tariff-free access to the U.S. market. Democrats in particular support these programs on humanitarian grounds, including the Caribbean Basin Initiative, which has helped make 80 percent of exports from CAFTA countries already tariff-free. But when it comes to a free-trade agreement that will benefit U.S. exporters by giving them, in return, tariff-free access to foreign markets, then the Democrats find reasons to be oddly

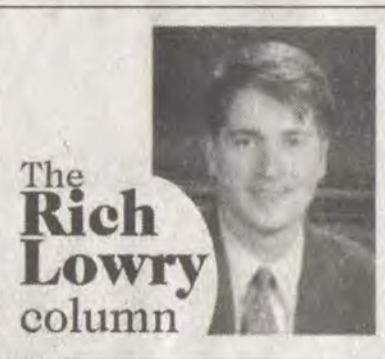
opposed.

They point to what they say are CAFTA's insufficient labor and environmental standards. But those standards are more far-reaching than those in the U.S. agreement with Jordan, negotiated by the Clinton administration and approved by Congress in 2001, and roughly equivalent to those in the agreement with Morocco, approved by a wide margin last year.

The fact is that unions simply don't like free-trade agreements. They opposed last year's free-trade agreement with Australia, even though the Aussies have roughly a \$9-an-hour minimum wage (U.S. dollars) and we run a \$9 billion trade surplus with them. The unions gave Democrats a pass on that agreement, so they felt liberated to vote for it. The unions won't be so forgiving on CAFTA, so nearly all House Democrats — even moderate "New Democrats" — are lining up to try to defeat it.

The agreement isn't perfect. It unfairly protects the U.S. sugar and textile industries. But it will foster growth here and in Central America, and help cement the region's progress. Its uncertain political prospects would be helped immeasurably if the left mustered on its behalf a spasm of its former Central American altruism.

Even liberals will miss conservative O'Connor

You know that liberalism in this country is at low ebb when liberals go around mourning the loss of Sandra Day O'Connor on the Supreme Court.

Not that Justice O'Connor was so awful. She was the deciding vote in cases that upheld a woman's right to abortion, ruled prayer at high school graduations unconstitutional, struck down Nebraska's ban on "partial birth abortions," upheld the use of race as a "plus factor" in college admissions and held that the display of the Ten Commandments on courthouse walls was unconstitutional. All of these are more or less the liberal position.

But let's get real. She was a conservative. During her nearly 24 years on the Court she voted with Chief Justice William Rehnquist about 70 percent of the time in cases that were not unanimously decided. In decisions that made conservatives hearts go pitty-pat she was the key vote in upholding the use of publicly financed vouchers for religious school tuition, rejecting a constitutional basis for gay rights, allowing the Boy Scouts of America to exclude homosexuals, striking down the Gun-Free

Schools Zones Act and refusing to rule that the death penalty was racially discriminatory.

And, most egregiously, she sided with the conservative (and Republican) majority on the Court in stopping the Florida recount in 2000, thereby handing the election to George W. Bush. It was one of the Court's worst decisions in recent decades, not quite up there with Dred Scott (the one that, in effect, made the Civil War inevitable) but close.

Moreover, it violated the principles that members of the conservative Court majority had espoused for years: a strict, narrow reading of the Constitution and a bias toward federal deference to state authority.

Instead of leaving the Florida recount to be fought out by the state Supreme Court and legislature, as the federalist principles they held in such high regard demanded, the Supremes moved in and gave the game to Mr. Bush.

How bad was the decision? So bad that no one in the majority had the nerve to sign it. It also contained the proviso that it should not be considered a precedent for any subsequent case. That bad.

Still and all, it can be said of Ms. O'Connor that she was truly a remarkable woman. She graduated third in her class at Stanford law school (not chopped liver) but was unable to get a high profile clerkship or a job with a prestigious law firm because, well, she was a woman.

So, she got married, raised a family, entered public life and became the majority leader of the Arizona Senate, the first woman in the nation to hold

such a post. She was appointed to the state appeals court by a Democrat, then to the Supreme Court by Ronald Reagan as our first woman Justice.

Her main strength, and one that argues for diversity on the court, was that she brought to the Court the unique perspective of someone who had been discriminated against because of her gender, yet one whose eventual rise owed a great deal to affirmative action. (No Justice before her, all men, had come to the court carrying such modest judicial credentials.) Both sides of that seemingly contradictory personal history are reflected in her decisions.

And now liberals are sorry to see her go because they know her successor will be much, much worse.

The name of Attorney General Alberto Gonzalez, the man who couldn't find anything wrong with our prison interrogation practices at Abu Graib, has been put forward as a candidate and already right wing groups are forming torchlight parades to protest his consideration because he isn't conservative enough.

Meanwhile, Democrats are forming ranks for a bloody battle but the best they can hope for is a nominee who is very conservative but not crazy. Federal Appeals Court Judge Harvey Wilkinson III would fill that bill, but don't hold your breath. The radical right likes crazy.

Fasten your seat belts, folks. It's going to be a bumpy ride.

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State expects increase in drilling for oil and gas this year

PIKEVILLE — Oil and natural gas exploration companies are on pace to drill more than 1,500 new wells in Kentucky this year, despite a shortage of drilling rigs, the head of the state regulatory agency that oversees drilling said Friday.

Rick Bender, director of the Kentucky Division of Oil and Gas Conservation, said increases in oil prices, coupled with high natural gas prices, have drillers scurrying for fresh domestic supplies.

The renewed interest in Kentucky's reserves isn't limited to the Appalachians. Petroleum companies are look-

ing to southern and western Kentucky as well. By July 1, the state had issued permits for 243 new oil wells, 327 gas wells and 214 combination oil and gas wells.

Those numbers, Bender said, will likely double by year's end.

"That's about all we're going to be able to do with the number

of rigs available in Kentucky," Bender said. "If there were more drilling rigs, we would be issuing more permits."

Only about 30 drilling rigs, most of them owned by independent contractors, are operating in Kentucky, according to industry estimates, and Bender said they're not able to keep up with demand.

Drilling activity in Kentucky is at its highest level in at least five years, based on state permits issued. Last year, the Division of Oil and Gas Conservation issued 1,266 permits for new wells in the state.

The state has about 48,000 producing oil and gas wells, according to the Kentucky Oil

and Gas Association. Crude from Kentucky is selling for about \$57 a barrel. Natural gas is selling for about \$8 per thousand cubic feet.

Mike Wallen, vice president of engineering for Daugherty Petroleum of Lexington, said higher prices for natural gas and crude make it financially feasible to drill wells in places that they wouldn't have considered a decade ago. Gas prices have more than doubled from about \$3 in 1990.

"Last year, our company drilled 157 wells," he said. "We're on pace to drill 160 to 170 wells this year."

Many of the new wells will be in remote locations that will

require the construction of roads and pipelines. The wells will be an average of 4,500 feet deep and cost from \$200,000 to \$300,000 to drill and put into production.

Wallen said Daugherty Petroleum has been fortunate to have a long-term contract with a Barbourville company to dig wells in southeastern Kentucky. As a result, his company hasn't yet been affected by the lack of drill rigs.

That's not to say it won't be affected in the future.

"It's a concern," he said. "There have been very few drilling rigs put in operation in this country in the past decade."

agency rooms and \$50 for hospital stays.

The copayments will not apply to pregnant women, people under age 19, some minorities and people in long-term care facilities.

About 691,000 people are enrolled in the state's Medicaid program, which helps with medical bills for poor or disabled people and long-term care for the elderly. Birdwhistell said he can't say for sure right now whether anyone would be cut from the program.

"That would be done only as a last resort," he said.

If cuts are necessary, Birdwhistell said "optional eligibility groups" would be looked at first.

Those groups include people who receive Medicaid assis-

tance despite having incomes above eligibility limits. That includes some caretakers of Medicaid recipients and people who place their assets in trusts so they meet eligibility requirements.

Medicaid officials have struggled with costs for years. While nearly balancing last year, growing costs and the number of participants prompted the projection for this year's deficit. Medicaid is funded through a combination of state and federal money, and Kentucky's share of the anticipated deficit is about \$215 million.

Copayments for prescription drugs and visits to doctors and hospitals could save about \$30 million from the Medicaid program's overall deficit, Medicaid

Commissioner Shannon Turner said. A separate move in which the state would reduce payments to nursing homes that reserve beds for patients who wind up in the hospital may save an additional \$9 million, Turner said.

Murphy said she is concerned that the copayments could prevent some older people on fixed incomes from getting prescriptions filled. Murphy said she supports state-proposed caps on medicines so that people required to take multiple prescriptions wouldn't have to make copayments on each one.

Kim Croley, a London pharmacist, said it is not unusual for patients to have to take seven or more medicines, especially diabetics who have heart and kidney disease.

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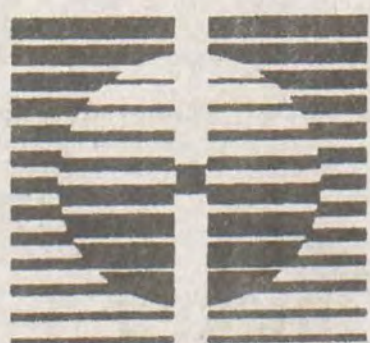

That's a perfectly good expression, as far as I am concerned; mainly, because I've used it myself.

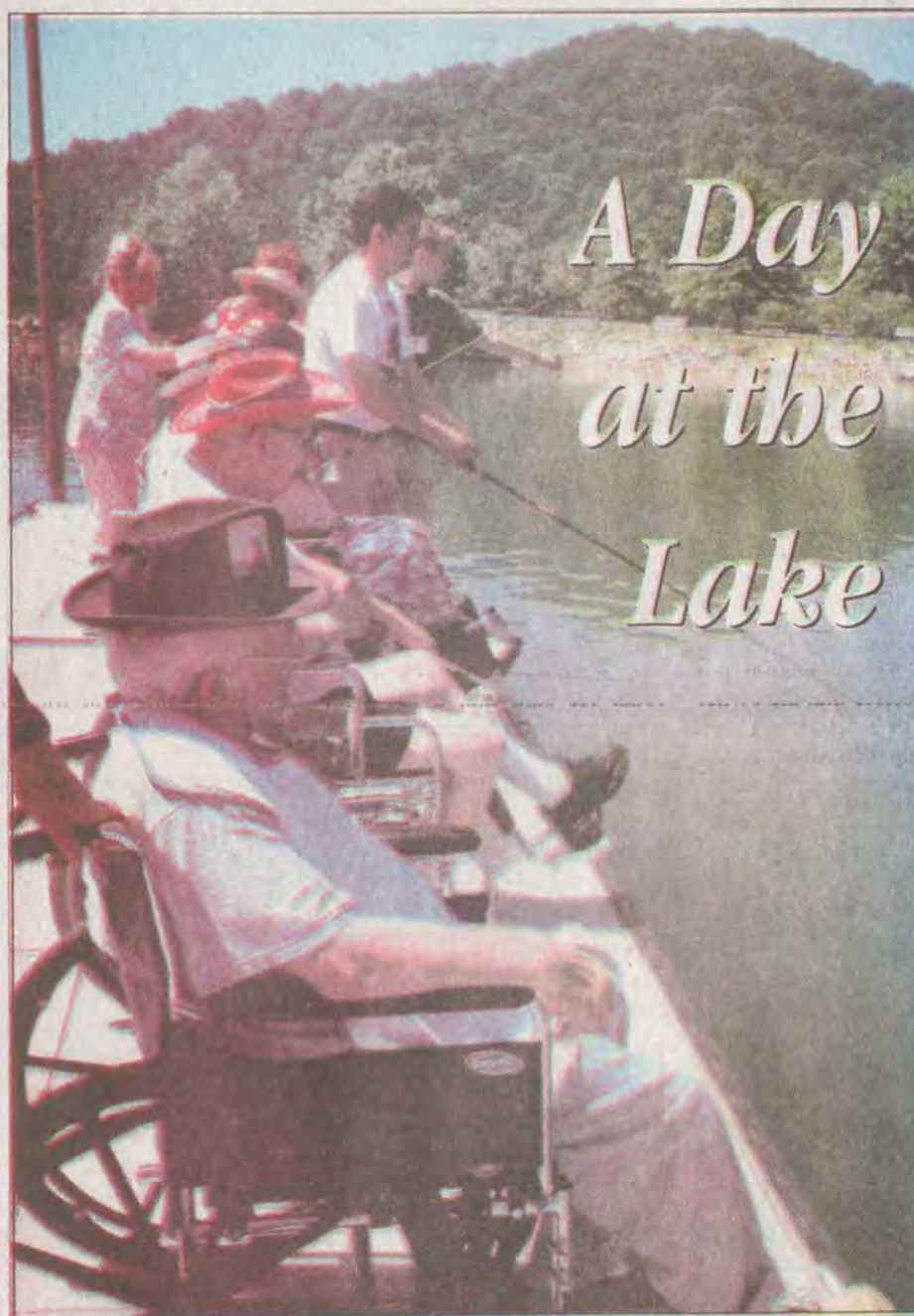

A valuable lesson learned in prison

Charlie Ward died when he was 73 years of age, but, oh, what a life he lived. When I read this true story of Charlie Ward in the excellent book "The 25 Most Common Problems in Business," by Jim Zaboloski, I knew it was a story I had to share with you.

The reason I wanted to share this story is because it represents thousands, perhaps millions, of people across America who started out on the wrong side of the tracks but became an exemplary model of what a human life is meant to be. If you suffer from low self-esteem because you were not born into the privileged class, do not possess looks or a body that causes others to stare, do not have an



Ivy League education or all the other advantages of those starting out with a "can't miss" label, this story is for you.

Let me say here in the beginning, the reason Charlie Ward became a tremendous success is because he discovered an age-old principle that will work for anyone who has the good sense to use it. I will be happy to tell you what it is, but first this story about the life of Charlie Ward.

Charlie came into the world on the worst side of town. As a young boy, he sold newspapers to help pay his family debts. Then he shined shoes and as a teen found himself serving oth-

ers as a cabin boy on a freighter. He tired of life in Seattle, Wash., and tired of serving others. He did what every young man day-dreams of — he hit the rails and traveled with bums on passing trains.

Charlie saw the States and made his living by stealing and petty thievery. His railroad journeys satisfied him for several years, until Mexico enticed him. He drank. He fought. He won, but more often he lost. He discovered gambling, which allowed him to win bigger and lose bigger.

Finally, U.S. authorities caught Charlie and tried him for trafficking in narcotics. Bitter and angry, Charlie claimed the authorities framed him, even as he passed through the gates of Leavenworth prison. Many inmates read my column, so here I hope you will really listen up. At age 34, Charlie Ward

hung on the end of his emotional rope. He had lived for himself for 16 years. He had given to no one and taken from all.

But his life turned around when he read the only material then available to prisoners: the Bible. By reading and rereading it, Charlie's life transformed into something he never thought possible. He burned into his mind to forgive those who had wronged him. He decided to become Leavenworth's model prisoner. He wanted to improve himself, and his opportunity came. He learned from a prison guard whom he had befriended that there would be an opening for a trustee in the prison electric plant in three months. Charlie knew the railroads, not electricity. He read every book on electricity in the prison library. He prayed and asked God to give him that job, and in return he would learn to give. He studied, and at the end of three months he not only passed the test, but due to his vibrant

personality, he won the hearts of the prison officials.

In a short time, Charlie became superintendent of the prison power plant with 150 men working for him. Charlie became everyone's friend, including the newest white-collar prisoner named Herbert Bigelow who entered because of tax evasion. Because Charlie gave of himself to help Herbert Bigelow adjust to his situation, his new friend responded in kind by telling Charlie that when he got out of prison to look him up in St. Paul. Bigelow's sentence ended, with Charlie's several months behind. When Charlie knocked on Bigelow's door, he received a handshake and a job offer as a laborer.

A bit disappointed, Charlie overcame his situation by giving again. His reward came in leaps — within the year Bigelow promoted him to superintendent. From there Charlie rose to the rank of gen-

eral manager and then vice president. His triumph came when Bigelow made Charlie Ward, ex-bum and ex-con, president of Brown and Bigelow Industries. Charlie remained as president, taking the \$3 million company to a \$50 million company, until his death at age 73.

In the beginning, I promised to tell you the principle that Charlie Ward discovered that completely turned life around. I might add, we don't have to be in prison to use this principle; it's there free for the taking for one and all. The Bible states it this way, "Give and it will be given to you, pressed down, shaken together, and running over." If you are having trouble on your job or in your life, change your attitude. Give first and the rewards will follow

Whose fault is damage caused by a speed bump?

Dear Tom and Ray:
Please respond ASAP! A late-'90s special edition Porsche was driven down a ramp. At the end of the ramp are two speed bumps, two feet apart. The first bump is made of concrete and the second one is hard rubber. Neither is more than 2.5 inches high at the center. The concrete bump is about 8 inches wide, and the rubber one is about 12 inches wide. After the bumps is the sidewalk, then the street. The owner of the car is claiming that the valet parkers drove his Porsche too fast over the speed bumps, causing \$10,000 in damage to his engine. He claims the bottom of the Porsche hit the bumps, causing the oil pan to separate or loosen from the engine, which led to an oil leak. Please tell me if this is possible, and if the cost

of repair is reasonable. — Hadi
TOM: Oh, you're in deep doo-doo, Hadi. Yes, it IS possible to drive a Porsche down a circular garage ramp at 60 mph and then scrape the oil pan on a couple of speed bumps. But I bet it was fun, wasn't it?

R A Y : Actually, it can happen at a lot less than 60 mph. The Porsche has such low ground clearance that the problem might have been the angle of descent, and the fact that there were two speed bumps.

TOM: Right. When it hit the first, it bounced up, and the springs compressed. But then it came down just as you were driving over the second bump, and that's when the oil pan took a hit.

RAY: The problem is, you weren't going fast enough, Hadi. Had you stepped on it a little more, you could have cleared the second bump completely!

TOM: Actually, if you drove it over the bumps at a reasonable speed — say, less than 5 mph — and damage was still done, then I'd say it's not your fault. Then it would be the fault of the manufacturer, who made a car that can't be driven in normal public facilities. Or it would be the fault of the guy who bought it, who should've warned you that it can't be driven over bumps.

RAY: And is it a reasonable price for the repairs? Well, let's see. An oil pan for a normal car costs about \$400. So ... \$10,000 for a Porsche sounds about right!

TOM: Actually, my guess is that the guy is claiming that he drove away with the oil leaking and then ran out of oil, croaking the whole engine.

RAY: Now, we should add that while it's possible that the engine was ruined by the method you describe, it's by no means the only explanation. It's certainly possible that the owner of the car is a sleazeball, and scraped up the bottom of the car himself in a drunken stupor, or by showing off to one of his ex-wives, only to try to blame it on you guys. Or that no one's at fault, and the pan failed over time, and he's just looking for

someone to blame.

TOM: But if you know that you, or one of your guys, drove it too fast, felt an impact and heard a thunk or a metallic scraping sound when you hit the speed bumps, then you guys probably toasted it.

RAY: So call your insurance company, Hadi. They're better equipped to investigate the alleged accident and determine if you guys are responsible or not. Tread carefully

Dear Tom and Ray:
My roommate and I have been arguing about tire traction. I said that a racing slick (or just a bald tire) has more traction in a dry environment, and is able to stop a vehicle faster on a dry road. He said that a tire with tread has more traction and is

able to stop a vehicle faster. We are on the verge of war: I've taken his dipstick hostage, and he's got my hubcaps. Please help end this war and bring peace (and my hubcaps) back to this house. — Matt

RAY: He needs to return your hubcaps with a humble apology, Matt. You're right.

TOM: On a dry road, a racing slick will give you more traction. Why? Because there's more rubber surface area actually in contact with the road. That's why drag racers, who need as much traction as they can get, as quickly as possible, use "slicks," or tires with no tread.

RAY: But remember, as soon as a half-ounce of rain comes out of the sky, you'll be in the ditch with your slicks. The problem with slicks is that when there's water on the road, the tire rolls up on top of it, and the water has nowhere to go. And when the tire's on top of the water, NONE of its rubber is

touching the ground! That's called hydroplaning, and it severely limits your ability to turn or stop.

TOM: The purpose of the grooves in treaded tires is to provide pathways for the water to escape. That way, while the rest of the rubber is maintaining full contact with the road, the grooves are channeling the water out back, behind the tire. And onto the windshield of the poor schnook driving behind you!

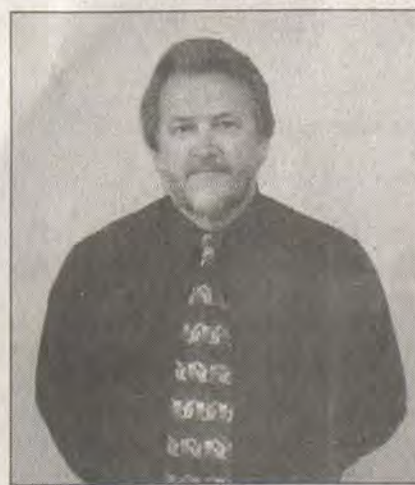

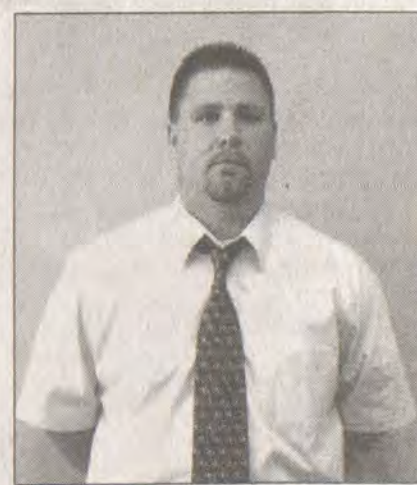

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Former UK players visit CAP camps

"I challenge you to do two things," begins Jeff Sheppard, who was a starting basketball player for the University of Kentucky and NCAA champion in 1998. "To show up. And to try."

Recently three former University of Kentucky Wildcats came to talk to campers at CAP's two full facility camps, Camp Andrew Jackson and Camp Shawnee.

Cameron Mills, Jeff Sheppard and Gavin Duerson all made their way to the remote hills of McKee and Endicott, to deliver a message of triumph in Christ. The three are also members of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, a ministry that uses the platform of sports to spread the good news of Jesus Christ.

If you think sports is all about winning a game, think again. That was the message Cameron Mills told close to 80 female campers this past Wednesday.

ROSSBURG, Ohio — For the first time in recent history, Eldora Speedway's time-honored World 100 for Late Models is receiving a face-lift; a restructuring of the traditional format that will allow not only more starters in the 100-lap finale on September 10, but offer more opportunity to teams to make

the starting grid as well.

Several Eastern Kentucky Dirt Late Model drivers take to the road and head north to Eldora Speedway for the World 100 each year.

Started back in 1971 by Earl Baltes, former Eldora owner, the World 100 was the first major event of its kind for dirt Late Models and the reverence has increased annually. For each

of the past several years, over 200 teams from all points of the Nation have trekked to southwestern Ohio in an attempt to first make the starting line-up and then, walk off with the coveted 'globed trophy' that signifies a World 100 victory.

A grueling process of elimination has, in the past, narrowed the hopefuls down to 24 starters, but this year that number will be

increased to 28.

The initial steps in that elimination process will not be altered.

Two rounds of single-lap time runs on Friday night (September 9) will narrow the aspiring teams down to 120 and guarantee placement into one of the six 20-car heat races on Saturday (September 10), which will again be lined up in accordance to the long established format.

And, as in the past, the top three finishers from each heat will advance to the admired World 100.

From there, the complexion takes on some re-tooling.

Instead of only the next four cars having a second chance at earning a coveted World 100 starting berth through a single B-Main, the next eight cars will be lined up into one of two B-

Mains; from which four cars will transfer out of each.

Eldora officials are confident the re-design will enhance the event and not tamper with tradition.

This year's edition of the World 100 will offer \$38,000 to win and \$1,600 to start. Tickets for the event are available by contacting the Eldora Speedway office at 937.338.3815 during normal business hours.

Ford unveils
Fusion race car
for 2006 season

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — The 2006 Ford Fusion race car, based on the production model that will hit showrooms this fall, was officially named Ford Racing's new race car for NASCAR competition in a ceremony featuring Ford's NASCAR stars in the Booth Playhouse in Charlotte, N.C.

The 2006 NASCAR Ford Fusion will make its competition debut at the 2006 Daytona 500 in February, and Ford teams will use it in next year's Nextel Cup Series Chase for the Championship, as well as Busch Series competition.

"We're thrilled to be unveiling the new Fusion," said Dan Davis, director, Ford Racing Technology. "The Fusion production car represents a fresh, new attitude for Ford in the mid-size sedan lineup. This Fusion race car has the same bold look, and it represents an all-new era in our Ford NASCAR racing program."

The 2006 Fusion will become Ford's first all-new nameplate car for NASCAR racing in 38 years, since the 1968 Ford Torino made its debut in both the showroom and on the race track.

"The Fusion represents the new face of Ford cars," said Marty Collins, General Marketing Manager, Ford Division. "And racing it in NASCAR competition allows us to get that new face in front of the millions of race fans who follow NASCAR racing in person and on television."

"Racing involvement will play a key role in the launch and the marketing of the Fusion throughout the rest of this year and into 2006. The great interest in NASCAR racing will help us tie the Fusion name to the Ford brand, and it's only right that we race Ford's newest car in America's flagship racing series."

The first of nine Ford Racing Innovation Drives for consumers nationwide kicks off Saturday at Kentucky Speedway, with the production Fusion headlining the Ford lineup of vehicles available to drive, and the NASCAR Fusion making its public debut for race fans.

The NASCAR Fusion will replace the Ford Taurus race car, which has captured four NASCAR championships (three Nextel Cup, one Busch), and 100 Nextel Cup victories since it made its competition debut in 1998.

"We'd like to send Taurus out with one more championship," said Davis, noting six Ford drivers are currently in contention to qualify for the final, 10-race Nextel Chase for the Championship. "But the time is right to move on to Fusion."

Ford submitted the Fusion to NASCAR officials several weeks ago, and is awaiting a final, on-track test before the car is officially certified for competition.

"We've worked hand-in-hand with NASCAR on the development of this car, and we can't thank them enough for helping us bring the Fusion forward," said Davis.

Dirt racetracks
upgrading to draw fansby JAMES HANNAH

ROSSBURG, Ohio — An electronic scoreboard and splashy billboards have sprouted at Eldora Speedway, a dirt racetrack in rural western Ohio that has operated for more than 50 years with few bells and whistles.

A track in Missouri is sporting spacious, state-of-the-art bathrooms, fans at an Indiana raceway can watch the action behind glass as they wait in line for food, and a track in New Jersey is selling roast chicken and spaghetti dinners at a new pavilion.

Traditionally known for their hard wooden benches, spartan restrooms and take-it-or-leave-it surroundings, auto dirt racing tracks have tried to become more fan friendly in the past few years. Increasing competition for the entertainment dollar — from minor league baseball to cineplexes — is forcing the change.

"This industry has just taken for granted people will show up on Friday and Saturday nights," said Guy Webb, president of the All-Star Circuit of Champions, a Champaign, Ill.-based group that organizes sprint-car races in 18 states.

"If we don't upgrade, we're obsolete."

Dirt tracks began popping up in the 1920s but really took off after World War II when veterans returned from overseas. Some races were held on horse tracks at county fairgrounds. Others were run in more primitive rural surroundings.

"You basically plowed up some dirt and invited the neighbors," said Larry Boos, director of operations for Eldora Speedway.

Earsplitting engine noise and flying dirt were part of the deal.

Ford took a different approach with the development of this race car than it had done with previous models in the past. This time, Ford engineers, led by Ford NASCAR field manager Ben Leslie and Ford aerodynamicist Bernie Marcus, did the early development with a scale model testing program that in previous new model efforts had been done by race teams.

Leslie and Marcus consulted

with Ford race teams and took input on the new Fusion race car, but the duo did most of the development work over the past eight months while Ford teams competed week-in and week-out in NASCAR competition.

"Our guys did a terrific job of getting the NASCAR Fusion to where it needed to be, and we actually were ahead of schedule in getting it to NASCAR," said Davis. "The goal of any new car is to take

the lessons learned from the previous model and, working within the NASCAR guidelines, bring forth a slightly better product.

"I think we accomplished that, and with the Fusion's dynamic new look, I think we have a car that NASCAR fans will easily recognize out on the track, in Victory Lane, and in their own driveway.

"We're excited, and I know our teams are as well."

"Old-timers say you've never really been to a dirt race until you've got mud in your beer," said Bill Holder, who has traveled to numerous tracks and written books and magazine articles on the sport.

Yet people in search of entertainment have become accustomed to clean, modern, comfortable facilities.

"You don't want to go into a john that has moss growing in it," Holder said.

Eldora was carved out of a farm. A low-slung green wooden building hides the bowl-shaped track from the main highway. The parking lot is gravel. In the grandstand, worn wooden benches are marked with hand-drawn seat numbers.

In the unfolding makeover, a \$75,000 electronic scoreboard was installed in April. Track officials are thinking of replacing the wooden grandstand seats with aluminum ones with back supports and adding hospitality suites, a move that would cost \$1.2 million.

"We've got to keep up with the Joneses," Boos said.

According to a forecast by PricewaterhouseCoopers, Americans will spend \$43 billion on sports this year. That

compares to \$51 billion on casino gaming, \$37 billion on films, and \$11 billion on theme and amusement parks.

Track operators say attendance has increased at the upgraded facilities.

"Would you rather go shopping at a flea market or would you rather go to Macy's?" asked Jim Nier, who added a luxury box with theater-style seating, a playground, and a souped-up menu at K-C Raceway near Waverly in southern Ohio.

"These people are used to going to NASCAR facilities, where everything's clean, neat and in place. And that's what I'm going after."

Bridgeport Speedway in New Jersey said attendance has increased 30 percent since it spent \$1.5 million on 14 sky boxes and other upgrades. At the Bluegrass Speedway in Bardonia, Ky., fans are renting VIP booths — built four years ago atop the bleachers — for \$2,000 a season.

"We've got people standing in line for them now," said promoter David Ferrell.

Billy Daniels, owner of Union County Speedway in Liberty, Ind., said the higher

attendance enables him to keep the ticket price at \$10. The track is replacing its wooden bleachers with aluminum and recently built the new concession stand, keeping fans in mind.

"The whole front of it is glass so they don't miss anything while they're walking through the line," Daniels said.

Shavonne Hale, 46, of Charleston, W.Va., who has been to more than 30 tracks, likes the installation of luxury boxes at some tracks and would also like to see such things as handrails on bleachers and more cover from the sun.

Other fans prefer the gritty, no-frills atmosphere that has been part of the sport since it began.

Luxury boxes? "That takes away from dirt racing," said Tony Blanton, 32, of Rarden, Ohio.

At Lake Ozark Speedway in Eldon, Mo., top-shelf liquor and margaritas are sold at the concession stand. Yet it's the bathrooms — with upscale fixtures, red stalls and black-and-white-checked tile floors — that get the most attention.

"We get more comments on our bathrooms," said owner Howard Schrock.

Stewart looking to get back on track

Tony Stewart figures he has the rest of the Nextel Cup races right where he wants them now.

After an inconsistent and sometimes frustrating start to the season, Stewart suddenly finds himself the hottest driver in the series going into Sunday's New England 300 at New Hampshire International Speedway.

His last four starts have produced finishes of second, first, first and fifth — four of his seven top-five finishes and both of his victories in 2005.

The last of those top fives was particularly impressive, with Stewart crashing in practice, starting a backup car from the rear of the field and charging into contention before the halfway point of the race last Sunday at Chicagoland Speedway.

Worse yet for the rest of the Cup competitors, Stewart's resume shows he is a "second-half driver," with the majority of his 21 career victories coming on the back end of the schedule.

He will drive onto the 1.058-mile New Hampshire oval third

in points — the best position for the 2002 Cup champion with 18 races to go in his seven-year career. Stewart trails series leader Jimmie Johnson by 151 points and Greg Biffle by 43.

"We're at that point of the season where the tracks are getting hot and slippery, and that's what we like," Stewart said. "When guys can't hold it wide open and they can't sit there on high-grip tracks and they actually have to drive these things, that's when we start getting fast."

New Hampshire has been a good track for Stewart in the past, with one win, six top-fives and seven top-10s in 12 starts. He also won an Indy Racing League event there in 1998.

There will be an added bit of drama this weekend, with the New Hampshire track one of several on the Cup schedule this year at which the cars practice Friday, qualify Saturday and then are impounded by NASCAR until just before the start of the race.

With only limited adjustments allowed when the teams get the cars back — an effort to keep them from spending

money on special qualifying parts and pieces — a compromise between the qualifying and race setup is a must.

"If anything, I've always thought this year when we had the impound races that it was a better deal," Stewart said. "The old format, we always used to spend two hours in practice to run two laps (of qualifying), and then we switched the cars over and we got an hour and 45 minutes of practice to prepare ourselves to run 300 laps."

New Hampshire is a difficult racetrack, so the impound rule might have some drivers spooked before they race.

"It certainly doesn't help if someone has a bad attitude going in there," Stewart said. "It kind of puts a strike against you, but I'm not going to say that you're already beat. There are tracks that I've been to that weren't my favorite tracks, but I still found a way to win there. You've just got to stay focused and work hard to find what it takes to be good."

Right now, it doesn't seem to take much for Stewart to be good on any track.

Jockey insurance issue a complex problem

LEXINGTON — The issue of workers' compensation insurance for jockeys and backside workers at racetracks is a "powder keg" that will require much research and careful thought, an insurance broker told a panel studying the topic.

A resolution can be reached, but first "an unbelievably difficult financial problem" must be solved, John Unick of San Francisco said during an open forum Thursday at the Kentucky Horse Park.

The problem is determining who will pay for a workers' compensation program, said Tom Ludt, a member of the Kentucky Horse Racing Authority and the chairman of the panel named by Gov. Ernie Fletcher to research the issue. Fletcher has given the panel a Sept. 1 deadline to develop a proposal to solve the problem.

"Everyone wants to see it addressed, but no one will come forward with a public funding proposal," Ludt said after the meeting. "No one wants to take it on."

Jockeys want owners and racetracks to foot the bill for expanded workers' compensation coverage, while others in the industry favor jockeys contributing a portion of the cost.

The issue of insurance — particularly for jockeys — has been contentious in recent months.

In November, a dispute over jockeys' insurance resulted in 14 riders being banned from Churchill Downs in Louisville and a one-night rider boycott at Churchill-owned Hoosier Park near Indianapolis.

In February, Kentucky's thoroughbred tracks agreed to obtain insurance policies offering up to \$1 million in coverage for injured jockeys as a temporary measure until a long-term proposal could be presented to state legislators next year. Previously, the tracks offered a \$100,000 policy for jockeys, who could purchase additional coverage themselves.

The panel heard Thursday from four active or retired jockeys, including Hall of Fame rider Chris McCarron and Tony D'Amico, who broke a collarbone and ribs and punctured a lung Nov. 3 as a result of a fall at Churchill Downs.

Also speaking were executives from industry organizations including the Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders Association, the Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association, the Kentucky Quarter Horse Racing Association and the Kentucky Harness Horsemen's Association.

Unick, who put together a workers' compensation plan for jockeys at California tracks, called the issue "unbelievably complex" and said the "entire industry almost collapsed" in that state because of the situation.

"If Kentucky truly bands together and works on this issue and understands compromise, this thing will work itself out," Unick said. "California was 10 times worse."

He said coverage of exercise riders, not just jockeys, should be included in any plan.

Some Kentucky racetracks, including Keeneland in Lexington and Churchill Downs, require trainers who apply for stalls to show proof

that they carry workers' compensation insurance for any employees. But many jockeys and exercise riders aren't employed by a specific trainer — they are independent contractors and thus aren't covered.

Because they are independent contractors, jockeys should be required to help pay for any workers' compensation insurance plan, TOBA President Dan Metzger said. Any insurance plan "must be part of a broader review of the jockey compensation model," he said.

A panel formed by the National Thoroughbred Racing Association also recommended the cost of additional health insurance for jockeys be split between the riders and racetracks, said NTRA senior vice president for marketing and industry relations Keith Chamblin, who led the panel.

The Jockeys' Guild criticized that recommendation.

Rodney Prescott, a jockey who has ridden in more than 1,100 races this year — the most of any rider in the nation — said that most simply can't afford to pay for extra insurance.

Of the \$156,453 he said he received last year in take-home pay, Prescott said he only actually got to keep \$88,413, after paying agents and valets, buying supplies and gas and purchasing insurance.

He said he's in the top 100 in the nation for jockey earnings, but that there are about 1,300 jockeys across the nation.

"What about those jockeys not in the top 100? I just don't see how they can pay for it," he said. "They're not even making minimum wage."

DEI, Waltrip parting ways at conclusion of season

MOORESVILLE, N.C. — Dale Earnhardt Incorporated and Michael Waltrip announced Friday they will no longer be together beginning in 2006.

The DEI No. 15 NAPA Chevrolet has been driven by Michael Waltrip, a fan-favorite, in the Nextel Cup Series for the past five seasons where he earned four victories, including two Daytona 500 wins in 2001 and 2003.

"All of us at DEI want to thank Michael for all his contri-

butions to our organization and wish him well as he moves on in his career," said Richie Gilmore, DEI's Vice President of Motorsports.

"Dale and Teresa gave me an opportunity with a winning organization that I have been proud to be an integral part of for the last five years," Waltrip said.

"My professional relationship with DEI is ending, but my personal relationships have ties that are deep-rooted. Therefore, my decision to leave DEI is a difficult one.

"Our individual visions for

the future are taking different courses, but our goals are the same — to be successful in the premier division of NASCAR."

"DEI's Nextel Cup focus for 2006," continued Gilmore, "will be to sharpen every entity of our race teams by preparing the No. 1 Bass Pro Shops Chevrolet, driven by Martin Truex Jr., and the No. 8 Budweiser Chevrolet driven by Dale Earnhardt Jr., for the championship.

"Additionally, we are working diligently with our current partner, NAPA, on returning to the No. 15 car."

Joint Statement from NCAA and University of Kentucky regarding Randolph Morris

The NCAA and the University of Kentucky are working cooperatively to examine the eligibility of basketball student-athlete Randolph Morris.

While the NCAA will not comment further on a pending case, the national office and the University of Kentucky together felt it necessary to explain the student-athlete reinstatement process.

Upon completion of the cooperative investigation, should the university determine a student is ineligible for competition, the institution may choose to seek reinstatement of the student-athlete from the NCAA national office.

During the reinstatement process, the NCAA reinstatement staff considers a number of factors: guidelines established by the Committee on Student-Athlete Reinstatement; any relevant case precedent; the student-athlete's responsibility for the violation; and any mitigating factors presented by the institution.

There are three possible results: reinstatement, non-reinstatement or reinstatement with conditions.

In examining cases where

there is involvement of amateurism issues, the first question the reinstatement staff must determine is did the student-athlete cross the threshold and professionalize him or herself to the point where reinstatement is not warranted.

If it is determined that reinstatement is warranted, the reinstatement staff considers the specifics of a particular violation to determine if conditions are warranted.

For example, in cases involving the receipt of monetary benefits, the general condition would require repayment and additionally assess the responsibility of the student-athlete for the violation. The Division I Committee on Student-Athlete Reinstatement has established general guidelines for withholding from competition based on the dollar amount of the benefit received. For violations where the benefit is less than \$100 the condition would generally just require repayment. For violations over \$100, repayment would be required and the student-athlete would be withheld from competition based on the following:

■ \$101-\$299 = 10 percent withholding

■ \$300 - \$500 = 20 percent withholding
 ■ \$501 and over = 30 percent withholding.

These withholdings would exclude exhibition contests.

It is important to note that these are base guidelines and other factors may increase or decrease a withholding condition. Specifically, if a student-athlete should have asked questions before engaging in the activity, should have known the activity was not permissible or knowingly committed a violation of NCAA rules, the penalty will likely be more significant or reinstatement may even be denied. In addition, a large dollar amount could result in a more significant withholding condition. Finally, benefits provided from an agent generally result in the withholding percentage being increased.

Therefore, it is premature to speculate on which of these guidelines would apply in a case not yet considered by the reinstatement staff.

The NCAA and the University of Kentucky are working in cooperation to ensure this case receives a thorough review and a fair and timely outcome.

Prosecutor taking more time to review rape allegation

LEXINGTON — A prosecutor reviewing a woman's allegation that she was raped by a University of Kentucky basketball player may take several more days before deciding whether to prosecute.

Fayette County Attorney Margaret Kannensohn said police are still conducting an investigation. She will review transcripts, tapes and documents received from the accuser and through court orders.

The accuser made a complaint last week. The county attorney's office typically would have sent a recommendation to a district judge within 24 hours.

But Kannensohn was sending a letter Friday to lawyers for both sides in the case, saying she needed more time to review the woman's allegations that she was drugged and raped April 20 at Wildcat Lodge, a residence hall for UK basketball players.

She said she wanted her review to be thorough because of what she called "the unusual circumstances" of the case.

"I don't care who the parties are," Kannensohn said. "The case is unusual because it came to me in the middle of a contin-

uing investigation."

Kannensohn also said she will not consider statements made by the suspect and said that is standard procedure.

In deciding probable cause in other cases, she said she reviews only interviews and documents from the accusers and their corroborating witnesses.

"My job is to determine probable cause. In ordinary circumstances, I would not review the defendant's statements. I am not the police, the judge or the jury," Kannensohn said.

In May, just days into the investigation, police cleared the case by exception, saying the alleged victim had stopped cooperating and that tests had shown she did not have the date-rape drug Rohypnol in her system as she had suggested.

But on July 5, the 29-year-old woman told Lexington police that she wanted to file criminal charges. Police declined to make a probable-cause arrest, and sent her to the Fayette County attorney's office to file a complaint.

That's how the case ended up in Kannensohn's hands.

She said her office will send a recommendation to a Fayette district judge to issue a warrant or a summons, or to take no

action. However, the district judge is not bound by the county attorney's recommendation, Kannensohn said.

The accused player told police last week that he and the woman had consensual sex, Lexington Assistant Police Chief Ken Hall has said.

In interviews with the Herald-Leader, the woman said she had been incapacitated and unable to consent to sex. The newspaper does not typically identify alleged rape victims and did not give the woman's name.

Police have not publicly named a suspect in the case, but an agent for former UK star Chuck Hayes has said he was notified of the investigation. Hayes' attorney, James Lowry, has declined to comment on the case.

"It's standard procedure for them to only review the complaining witness' statement," said the woman's attorney, Traci Boyd. "And I don't have any problems with them taking more time in making a decision. It shows that they are taking it seriously and doing the right thing."

Ex-football players hit race car pits

OWENSBORO — A year ago, David Colognesi and Erick Wettstain were lifting weights for the Apollo High School football team.

Now, they're lifting tires at Brewco Motorsports Inc. based in Central City, recruits in a battle of pit crews heating up in the NASCAR Busch Series. The pair, along with Donnie Eaves, a 2004 graduate of South Spencer (Ind.) High School, were scheduled to make their debut in the Automobile Racing Club of America race July 8 at Kentucky Speedway near Sparta, but will have to wait after their driver had a non-injury crash in practice that morning.

It's an experiment at BMI, hiring personnel to primarily do pit stops. Up to now, the two-car operation owned by Clarence Brewer Jr. has pitted its cars the way NASCAR teams have since the sport started in the 1940s; using crews whose members are mechanics in the shop during the week, but who grab an impact wrench to change tires on the weekends.

But much has changed in NASCAR the last few years. Teams are hiring men who do nothing but pit stops. The extra time they have to practice, plus hiring people who fit an athletic profile, are huge advantages for big-money Nextel Cup teams.

Those crews are also used at the Busch Series level with Chip Ganassi Racing, Rick Hendrick Motorsports, Richard Childress Racing and others using the division as a driver development program.

"That's what we've run into,

and that's what pushed us to do this," BMI president Todd Wilkerson said. "Ganassi, Hendrick and RCR are bringing their Cup guys down. Ganassi especially, and just killing everybody. We'd do very good stops based on what we did last year and lose four or five spots."

"That's the biggest advantage the Cup guys have over us. They have their Cup crews competing against us. We have mechanics doing pit stops on the side."

BMI officials kicked the idea of hiring pit crew specialists for a few years, Wilkerson said. He chose to go with high school graduates instead of college grads because they'd get an earlier start and be available longer in a sport where retirement age for crew members is around 35, he said.

Wettstain heard BMI was looking to hire pit crew trainees while still a senior at Apollo. He thought about playing college football, but said he never got serious about it and figured he hung up the pads for good last fall.

The three interviewed for the job about a month ago. Wettstain's father, James, was a longtime dirt late model driver in the area, but Wilkerson said racing experience wasn't a prerequisite for the job.

"I stayed in fairly good shape," Erick Wettstain said. "Kentucky Wesleyan College had contacted me a couple of times about playing football. There wasn't real serious talk. I was interested in it, but racing is my first love."

"This is right up my alley. As soon as I had an opportunity, I jumped on it."

Eaves spent a semester at the University of Southern Indiana last year and as a partner in his

father's roofing business. Colognesi also considered going to college.

Neither has been on a race team before but are familiar with the growth of NASCAR's popularity.

"There are probably millions of people that would love to have a job like this," Colognesi said.

The three practice pit stops every day. At first, Wilkerson thought it would take until February before they would be ready to pit BMI's primary cars, the No. 27 Kleenex Ford driver by David Green and the No. 66 Duraflame Ford driven by Greg Biffle.

But after watching their progress, Wilkerson estimated they'd be ready in 30 to 60 days. Their debut, though, was scheduled for much sooner.

Colognesi, Eaves and Wettstain were to pit for an ARCA car for fellow Owensboro racer John Hayden July 8.

There were also plans for the trio to head to Joliet, Ill., for a Busch Series race at Chicagoland Speedway, but travel arrangements couldn't be worked out, Wilkerson said.

The three fit the same athletic profile, around 5-foot-10, 165 pounds. Trying to find the right combination of speed and power is the key, Wilkerson said.

"These tires weigh 50 or 60 pounds apiece with it mounted to the wheel," Wilkerson said. "It takes a lot of strength to pick up a tire and put it where you want it."

Wilkerson said BMI's plan is to keep the three recruits together since pit crews do best trained as a unit. The trio will also pit the car driven by Aaron Fike, who drives a part-time schedule for BMI.

Northern Kentucky regents postpone attempt to jump to Division I

HIGHLAND HEIGHTS — Northern Kentucky University will remain in NCAA Division II and postpone an attempt to move into Division I-AAA, the school's regents have decided.

Talk of a move to Division I status had increased after the university received state funding for a \$60 million sports center. Three studies presented to regents also said NKU was ready to move into Division I if certain conditions,

including changes in infrastructure, financing and facilities and securing a conference membership, could be met.

But regents decided instead to develop a multiyear investment plan. University President James Votruba said NKU should save its resources for the future and examine a move to Division I later.

"What we've learned is that we are indeed well-positioned in many respects to move to Division I," Votruba said. "...But it's also

clear that it would require a financial commitment that could compromise our ability to invest in core academic priorities."

The university has said its facilities aren't ideal for Division II and that \$20 million to \$25 million in additions and upgrades are necessary, no matter which division the school is in. About \$4.4 million would be added to the athletic budget if the school moved to Division I. That would result in a major tuition increase, Votruba said.

Hooter's Pro Cup drivers looking forward to August return

BRISTOL, Tenn. — Bristol Motor Speedway returned to action this week as Danny O'Quinn, Clay Rogers, Jeff Agnew, Wayne Willard, and Kirk Leone took part in a Hooter's ProCup testing session.

On Wednesday, each of the drivers were trying to acquire valuable information regarding how to get around the World's Fastest Half-Mile particularly looking for that perfect setup for the Food City 150 event which takes place Wednesday, Aug. 24.

Unfamiliarity was a serious issue that each of the drivers were trying to address during the testing session. Agnew, the 1998 Hooter's Pro Cup champion, whole heartedly agrees that Bristol is an entirely different animal.

"It really doesn't compare to other tracks that we race at," he said. "You feel so much speed here because there's such a big difference. I guess Winchester (Ind.) and Salem (Ind.) up north can compare a little bit, but you go off into these holes down in the corners and it feels like

you're going forever."

Rogers, the defending series champion, believes that racing at Bristol is a totally unique experience.

"I've run at Michigan and run over 200 miles per hour, but no where do you get the sensation of speed like you do right in the middle of the corners at Bristol."

Rogers believes that you must be able to stay focused to be successful at Bristol Motor Speedway. "You've just got to come in here with the mindset to get over that. If you're going into turn one and there's a wreck coming off four, you're lucky to get stopped," he said.

O'Quinn, who splits time in the in Arca Series driving for Jack Roush, understands how easy it is to get caught up in the atmosphere here.

"It's an awesome experience. 170,000 fans watching you is unbelievable. But when the green flag drops it's just racing and everyone is back to business," he said.

Rogers has seen a dramatic improvement in the quality of drivers entering the Hooter's Series.

"The level of competition in the series has come up so much with owners like Michael Waltrip and Dale (Earnhardt) Jr. having teams coming in. Tony Stewart also has some involvement with a team in the series," Rogers said. "A lot of people are taking a good, hard look at this series right now. It's just going to get tougher and tougher."

O'Quinn believes the similarity of the cars being used in this series compared to the other racing series' allows car owners to see what the drivers are capable of.

"The Hooter's Pro Cup Series is used to find people. The cars are very similar to a Busch Car spec wise."

The drivers understand the importance of this race as many feel like it's an audition to move up into a NASCAR series.

"Everybody has goals and aspirations of running Nextel Cup, but the sad thing is there is not but a few positions that are open. That's why the Hooter's Series is great because it presents us a platform to come out here in front of the NASCAR World and showcase our talent," Rogers said.

Piazza comes up big for Mets

Mike Piazza couldn't help flashing a big smile after hitting a tiebreaking home run in the eighth inning against the rival Atlanta Braves. Moments like this have come less and less often for the future Hall of Famer.

Piazza celebrated his three-run homer that lifted the New York Mets over the Braves 6-3 Thursday night with a curtain call. "It felt good," Piazza said. "It really did."

The homer was Piazza's 388th, one behind Johnny Bench for 46th on the career list, and gave him 1,200 career RBIs.

The .315 career hitter has seen his production decrease appreciably the past few seasons because of injuries and a failed attempt to move to first base. Piazza is hitting just .260 with 10 homers and 39 RBIs this year.

But he came through this time, sending an 0-2 pitch from reliever Blaine Boyer over the right-field wall.

"It's weird," Piazza said. "I feel like I've been swinging the bat pretty well. I'm not hitting .350 or anything, but I guess I was lucky the first part of my career. I guess it's catching up to me a little bit."

In other NL games, it was: Milwaukee 4, Washington 2; Chicago 5, Pittsburgh 1; Philadelphia 13, Florida 7; Arizona 6, San Diego 0; San Francisco 4, Los Angeles 3.

David Wright hit two home runs, Carlos Beltran matched a career high with four hits and the Mets beat the visiting Braves for just the third time in 10 meetings. It was the opener of a four-game series between the NL East rivals.

In the eighth inning with the score tied 3-all, Beltran hit a

one-out double off reliever Jim Brower (3-2). John Foster followed by walking Cliff Floyd on four pitches, and Braves manager Bobby Cox brought in Boyer to face Piazza.

"You don't want to get beat 0-2 when you've got the hitter in the hole," Cox said. "It was a bad pitch, but it's a pitch that Mike's so strong, he can hit it out."

Roberto Hernandez (5-2) earned the win in relief of starter Kris Benson with one scoreless inning. Braden Looper pitched a perfect ninth for his 21st save.

Adam LaRoche homered for the Braves, who have lost three straight after winning a season-high six in a row.

Brewers 4, Nationals 2: At Milwaukee, Damian Miller's two-run double off Gary Majewski (2-1) in the eighth gave the Brewers a victory.

Miller, who had been caught

trying to score from third on a comebacker to the mound an inning earlier, sent a full-count pitch to the gap in left-center to break a 2-all tie. Matt Wise (3-2) picked up the win with one hitless inning of relief and Derrick Turnbow pitched a perfect ninth for his 18th save.

Preston Wilson homered in his debut with the Nationals.

Cubs 5, Pirates 1: At Chicago, Mark Prior allowed two hits in eight strong innings and helped himself with two singles as the Cubs won their fourth straight.

Prior (6-3) walked three and struck out 10. Todd Walker homered for the Cubs and Henry Blanco had two doubles off Mark Redman (4-9).

Phillies 13, Marlins 7: At Philadelphia, Mike Lieberthal and Pat Burrell each hit two homers to lead the Phillies.

Brett Myers (7-5) was bailed out by the long ball after staking Florida to a 3-0 lead. Ryan Howard homered off A.J. Burnett (5-6).

Earlier Thursday, the Marlins designated Al Leiter for assignment, perhaps signaling the end of a 19-year career for the left-hander who helped Florida and Toronto Blue Jays win World Series titles.

Diamondbacks 6, Padres 0: At San Diego, Javier Vazquez pitched eight sharp innings while getting two hits and scoring a run for Arizona.

Shawn Green had three hits for the Diamondbacks, who pulled within 4 1/2 games of the NL West-leading Padres in baseball's weakest division.

Vazquez came within three outs of his fourth complete game this season, shutting down the Padres on four singles and

one walk. Vazquez (8-8) allowed only one baserunner to reach third base, struck out four and snapped his four-game losing streak.

Brian Lawrence (5-9) lost his third straight start.

Giants 4, Dodgers 3: At Los Angeles, Light-hitting Omar Vizquel's three-run homer in the seventh inning drove in the go-ahead runs, and San Francisco took advantage of the early ejection of Los Angeles starter Brad Penny.

Penny was thrown out in the third inning by plate umpire Rob Drake after tossing his helmet in protest of a call at first base. Jason Schmidt (7-5) pitched six solid innings to snap a two-game losing streak. Tyler Walker worked the ninth for his 14th save.

Vizquel hit an 0-2 pitch from D.J. Houlton (4-3) off the screen attached to the right field pole for his second homer of the season.

Palmeiro gets within one hit of 3,000; Harden five outs from perfection

So close. Rafael Palmeiro pulled within one hit of 3,000, and Rich Harden was five outs from perfection on a night of near history in the American League.

The New York Yankees are getting close, too — just 1 1/2 games out of first place after Alex Rodriguez's clutch homer off new Red Sox reliever Curt Schilling.

With flashbulbs popping all over Safeco Field, Palmeiro went 1-for-3 with a walk in Baltimore's 5-3 victory Thursday over the Mariners, leaving him with 2,999 hits. He'll try for the milestone again Friday night against Seattle starter Joel Pineiro.

"It's going to happen eventually," Palmeiro said. "If not tonight, then tomorrow or the next night."

Harden retired his first 22 batters and finished with a masterful two-hitter in Oakland's 6-0 win over visiting Texas. He was five outs from the 18th perfect game in major league history when Alfonso Soriano hit a clean, broken-bat single to center in the eighth.

"I was a little disappointed, but I still had a game to pitch," Harden said. "That's how baseball works. It was pretty cool the way the fans were into it. It got me pumped up a few times."

It was the closest a big league pitcher has come to a no-hitter this season. Harden (6-4) was the first to make it through seven innings, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.

At Fenway Park, there was no blood on Schilling's sock when he faced the Yankees this time. No bite on his splitter, either.

With the sore-ankled hero of Boston's 2004 World Series run debuting in his new role as a reliever, Gary Sheffield lined a double and Rodriguez hit a two-run shot to break a ninth-inning tie in New York's 8-6 victory.

"I made two big mistakes back-to-back," Schilling said. "It's frustrating, disappointing."

The third-place Yankees won for the eighth time in nine tries to pull within 1 1/2 games of first-place Boston in the AL East, the closest they've been to

the division lead since April 13.

"I believe this game, we don't win it the first two or three months of the year," Rodriguez said after his first homer at Fenway for the Yankees. "It shows you how far we've come."

In other AL games, it was: Chicago 1, Cleveland 0; Los Angeles 3, Minnesota 2; Kansas City 12, Detroit 9; and Tampa Bay 3, Toronto 0.

After Rodriguez's mammoth drive to left-center, Schilling (1-3), who had been on the disabled list since April 23, retired the next three batters to complete his first relief appearance since a late-season tuneup for Arizona in 2002.

"It was set up to be a situation that was great, if I did what I was supposed to do," he said.

Tom Gordon (3-3) pitched a hitless inning, and Mariano Rivera struck out all three batters in the ninth for his 21st save in 23 tries.

Jason Giambi, Bernie Williams and Sheffield also homered for the Yankees, who put rookie pitcher Chien-Ming Wang (shoulder) on the disabled list, where he joins fellow starters Carl Pavano, Kevin Brown and Jaret Wright.

At Oakland, Calif., the crowd gave Harden a standing ovation after Soriano's hit, and he quickly recovered. He allowed a two-out single to David Dellucci in the ninth before finishing his first career shutout and second complete game. Harden threw 61 of his 81 pitches for strikes in a game that lasted just 2 hours, 11 minutes.

It was the fewest pitches by an Oakland starter in a complete game since 1988, when the team began counting.

"Yeah, I'd say that was probably the best I've felt," Harden said. "Complete games are pretty rare for me. I don't think I threw one slider — all changeups and splits."

At Seattle, Palmeiro got hit No. 2,999 with a single to right in the fourth off starter Aaron Sele (6-9).

"At that point, I thought I might get it done tonight," Palmeiro said. "I had two or three at-bats left. I felt good,

and these guys don't pitch around me."

With 566 home runs, Palmeiro is poised to join Hank Aaron, Willie Mays and Eddie Murray as the only players in history with 3,000 hits and 500 homers.

Daniel Cabrera (8-7) allowed two hits through eight innings, Jay Gibbons hit a two-run homer and Baltimore moved within one game of AL East-leading Boston.

Seattle fans cheered all night for Palmeiro, who grounded out twice and walked in the eighth. He was on deck when Miguel Tejada was retired to end the top of the ninth, drawing boos from a home crowd known for its devotion to the Mariners.

"I'm sure once I get it over with, they won't do it any more," said Palmeiro, who admitted being warmed by the response. "The fans just wanted to see it happen."

White Sox 1, Indians 0: At Cleveland, Jose Contreras (5-5) pitched three-hit ball for seven innings to stop Chicago's season-high three-game skid. Frank Thomas hit an RBI double off Kevin Millwood (3-8) in the first, sending the Indians to their sixth loss in seven games. Dustin Hermanson got his 22nd save.

Angels 3, Twins 2: At Minneapolis, Jarrod Washburn (6-4) ended Los Angeles' season-high four-game skid, and Francisco Rodriguez earned his 18th save.

Royals 12, Tigers 9: At Detroit, Matt Stairs hit two homers, including a grand slam, and drove in six runs. Zack Greinke (2-11) beat Jeremy Bonderman (11-6) to win for the first time since May 31.

The Tigers put closer Troy Percival on the 15-day disabled list with a torn right forearm muscle.

Devil Rays 3, Blue Jays 0: At Toronto, Casey Fossum (4-7) and Danys Baez combined on a six-hitter for Tampa Bay's first shutout since Aug. 23 against Seattle. Damon Hollins homered and Jorge Cantu had two RBIs for the Devil Rays, who have won just two of 13.

Baez finished for his 14th save in 20 chances. Ted Lilly (7-9) allowed two runs in seven innings.

Brown says he's confident Pistons will bring him back

Larry Brown wants to return to the Detroit Pistons if owner Bill Davidson will have him back. If not, he wants to move on.

"My thing has never changed. I want to coach Detroit, and I expressed that to them," Brown said in his meeting Wednesday in suburban Detroit with Davidson, team president Joe Dumars and Brown's agent, Joe Glass. "Now Mr. D and Joe just have to talk to Mr. Glass and decide what they want to do."

"I want them to be comfortable. I don't want to retire, but I want to move forward," Brown said.

In a telephone interview Thursday night with The Associated Press, Brown again described the meeting as positive and said he was relieved to have an opportunity to address numerous issues with Davidson. Among the topics were Brown's health, and how the team might respond if Brown is again forced to miss time as he did last season when Gar Heard guided the team for 17 games while Brown underwent surgery.

Brown developed a bladder

problem after having hip surgery, and he said during the NBA playoffs that he would not want to coach again with his current medical condition.

He sought treatment in late June at the Mayo Clinic, and Brown still does not know if his bladder disorder can be corrected. But in his interview with the AP, Brown sounded much more open to the idea of learning to live with the discomfort while continuing to coach.

Dumars has said Detroit would welcome Brown back if he's willing to return, but Davidson is believed to have been bothered by Brown's flirtations with the Cleveland Cavaliers and his comments over the winter to a New York tabloid that coaching the Knicks would be a dream job.

The Knicks have been awaiting a resolution of Brown's status with the Pistons, and they presumably would make a strong pitch to bring him aboard if Detroit decides not to bring him back.

Knicks president Isiah Thomas had a falling out with Davidson years ago, and the Pistons' owner would clearly not relish the prospect of Brown joining Thomas in New York.

The Pistons signed Brown to a five-year contract worth about \$25 million, plus incentive bonuses, two years ago.

"I'm confident I'll be back, but you never know," Brown said. "Whatever happens will be for the best of the franchise, and that's the important thing."

Brown, who said he has not had any conversations with anyone representing the Knicks, expects to know his status with the Pistons "by Monday at the latest."

"I hope I can continue to coach, but if not I'll hang out with my kids," Brown said.

Pistons spokesman Matt Dobek said talks between Dumars and Glass were continuing, and there was no other news to report.

Brown held discussions with the Cavaliers in the spring about the possibility of becoming team president, though he steadfastly maintained he was only looking for a fallback plan of his own in the event his medical condition precluded him from coaching. The Cavs hired Danny Ferry as their general manager last month, and owner Dan Gilbert assured Ferry he would have complete control.
