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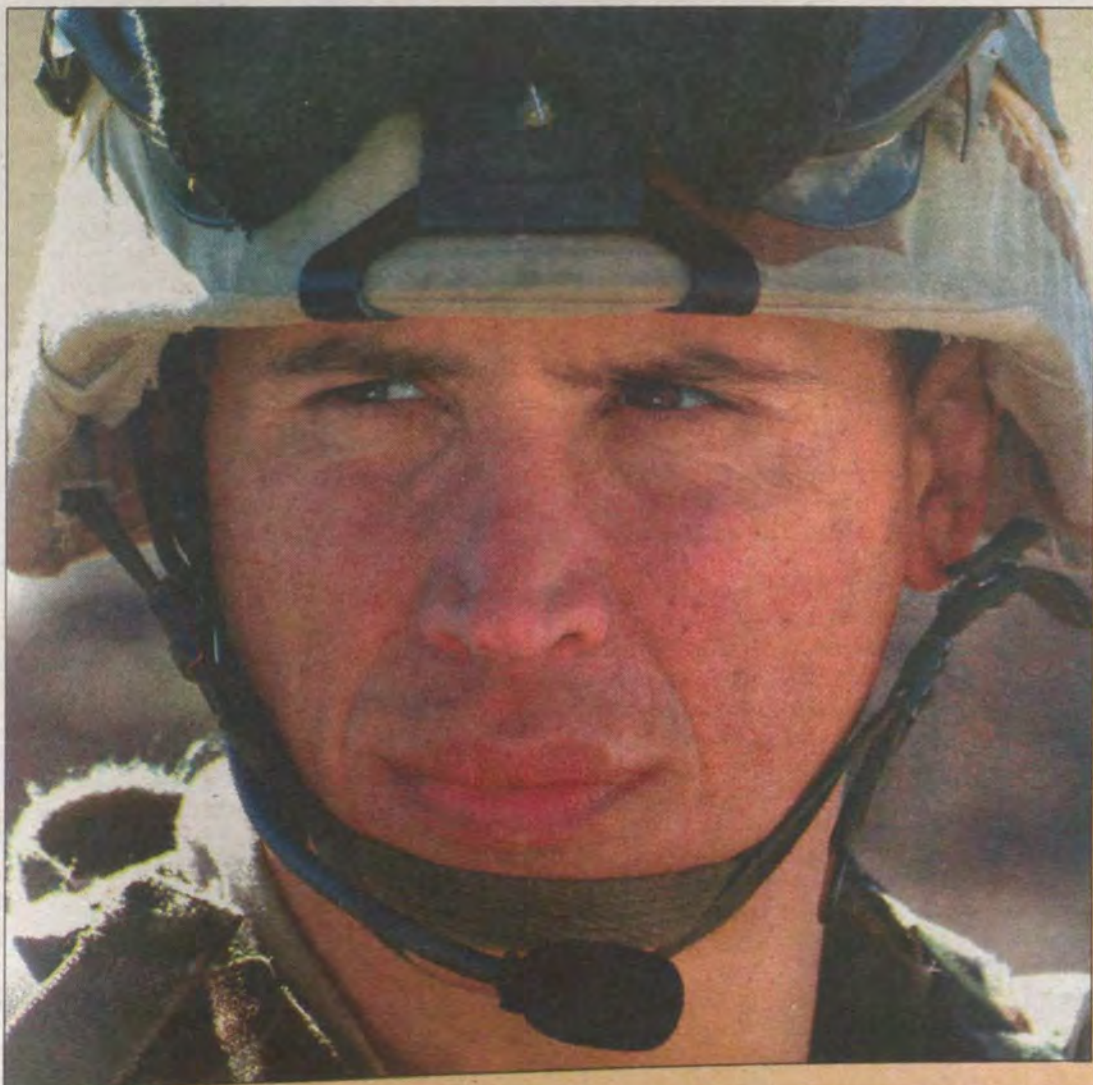

U.S. soldiers see action 'Over There' in new FX war drama

Typically, a war is over by the time a television series dramatizes it. Not anymore.

Award-winning producer Steven Bochco ("NYPD Blue," "L.A. Law") focuses on the current situation in Iraq with "Over There," which FX debuts Wednesday, July 27. The show follows the members of an Army unit on their first tour of duty overseas, and examines the impact of their absence and mission on relatives back home. Arguably the most familiar face in the ensemble cast is Erik Paladino ("ER") as the squad's sergeant.

Created by Chris Gerolmo, who also directed the pilot, the series uti-

lizes a number of filming styles, one highly reminiscent of the battle sequences in the 1998 movie "Saving Private Ryan." "Over There" also features Luke MacFarlane, Nicki Aycox, Josh Henderson, Keith Robinson, Brigid Brannagh, Jimmy "Jax" Pinchak, Lizette Carrion, Sprague Grayden and Kirk "Sticky" Jones.

"It is a first," Bochco says of the show's timing. "Some people have raised the question of whether it's an appropriate thing, or whether one can have the kind of distance from the subject that allows you to render it dimensionally. I guess those are fair questions, but our feeling is

"Back to You & Me"
Hallmark Channel
Premieres July 23

"Back to You & Me" premieres Saturday, July 23, on the Hallmark Channel. The film focuses on a successful doctor who has become disenchanted with her job and her life, and decides to return home to see if

she can find something meaningful by revisiting her past. She has no way of knowing if she's made the right decision or if she'll just be piling on to her already painful memories.

The film stars Lisa Hartman Black ("Knots Landing") as Dr. Sydney Ludwick, whose journey may take her to an emotional dead

that what makes this show relevant is this is the first war that civilians are experiencing in real time, by virtue of the kinds of communication we're all used to.

"There's a staggering level of involvement on a personal level between the young men and women in Iraq and Afghanistan, and their friends and loved ones," Bochco says. "I think that gives us a certain license to look at this war not just from the point of view of soldiers, but equally from the perspective of those here at home ... who, unlike in past wars, aren't just relegated to being bystanders waiting for letters or whatever that may well have been predigested or controlled in some way. Today, the communication is instant and pretty unfiltered."

One of the results, heightened

emotion, could affect "Over There" viewers more than they might anticipate. "I would certainly never take issue with anyone who has loved ones over there and chose not to watch this," Bochco says. "There is a certain intensity. On the other hand, regardless of one's feelings about the war philosophically or politically, no one can argue with the profound strength and courage of these brave young people who are in harm's way every waking moment. That certainly is worthy of attention dramatically."

Costar Palladino agrees, being the first among equals in the cast. He says, "This is the first acting job I've had where at the end of the day, your neck hurts and your back hurts and your shoulders hurt. It's the first time I have a blue-collar-job feeling, but it's wonderful in

the sense of getting an idea of what damage this (situation) does on the body. In real life, we'd probably be used to it by now ... especially my character, because he's been there for a while."

Palladino credits his 10 years of boxing for much of the stamina required by his "Over There" job. "When we started working with Staff Sergeant Sean Bunch U.S.M.C. (the show's technical adviser), we knew we were going to have to carry backpacks and run at the same time, so I went to a great canyon for running in Los Angeles. I was carrying 25-pound water bottles in my backpack while I was going up hills. By the time I got to 'boot camp,' I had to make sure I was at the top of my game physically."

While he has no friends stationed in Iraq, Palladino realizes

viewers' reactions to "Over There" may differ as U.S. troops continue the actual mission. "Some people may have some problems with it and others may not," he says. "Once they see the show, they'll really understand it's the story of the members of this particular squad and what they're going through. With where we're at right now, this obviously is a hot topic that involves many people very directly."

"Over There" upholds the edgy approach for which FX is known, via acclaimed series such as "The Shield," "Nip/Tuck" and "Rescue Me." Bochco felt the cable network would be an ideal outlet for the kind of show he wanted to do.

"I don't think, given the current state of standards and conservatism and anxiety in broadcast television, that you could put a

show like this on there," he says. "That's regardless of language or violence issues. Just the content alone, I think they might be very, very concerned about ... and even if you did get a broadcast network behind you, my guess is that they'd be breathing down your neck."

The "Over There" pilot is positioned to set another first: The episode will have an additional outlet by getting a DVD release on Aug. 2, the fastest a series premiere has made its way into the home-video market. Even though the show has Sgt. Bunch on board, Bochco says he purposely didn't seek other military ties.

"Quite candidly," he says, "we didn't want to have to deal with the sensitivities that would be inherent in a situation like that. We just wanted to be free to make the show we felt strongly about."

end, or open a new path toward a happier future. The film also stars Rue McClanahan ("Golden Girls") as Helen Ludwick, Sydney's mother, from whom she once fled and is now uncertain if she would be welcomed back after their long estrangement; Dale Midkiff ("Love Comes Softly") as Gus Martin, the lover she left behind and has mixed feelings about facing again; and Barbara Niven ("Pensacola: Wings of Gold" and the upcoming "Yours, Mine and Ours") as Connie Murray, Sydney's one-time rival who discovers that Sydney's return will teach them both a long-needed lesson in healing.

"What this film shows, perhaps more than anything else, is that we can't always believe that what seems to be unmovable truth is either unmovable or even true," says Barbara Niven, who stars in the Hallmark movie "Back to You & Me."

"For example, so many of us have heard the old saying that you can't go home again because home is never quite what we remember," says Niven. "Nor are the people the same as they were. But the fact is we can go back to where we came from and, if we're willing to make some changes and open up to the possibilities, we can find what we gave up, and make it part of us again."

In "Back to You & Me," Sydney Ludwick leaves her town, her mother and her lover because she feels she needs more than they can offer. And in the ensuing years, she finds success in her professional life, but her private life is desperately unrewarding.

"When she decides to come back for a class reunion," Niven says, "she knows it will be a challenge to see how much of the past she can reclaim, or if she wants to reclaim any of it."

Niven's character, Connie Murray, had never been Sydney's friend. "But as the two women start to put aside their differences and come to an understanding about each other," Barbara Niven says, "they realize they've both taken an important step in their lives. As the film makes clear, once we come to terms with the past, then we can look forward to the future."

IN FOCUS: Beau Bridges, who joined the Sci Fi Channel's "Star Gate SG-1" this season as intrepid space explorer and SG team member Hank Landry, says one of the best things about being an actor "is that you get to play a lot of different characters. Some you like more than others, and that's fine. But sometimes you get to play someone like Hank Landry, and that's really great."

Because?

"Because Landry gets to

explore all those galaxies — and I don't know how many times when I was growing up that I thought about how exciting it would be to go into space and see for myself what's really out there. And with Landry — plus a little bit of imagination on my part — I can finally go planet hopping."

Bridges, whose father was the legendary theater, film and television actor Lloyd Bridges, and whose brother, Jeff, is also an actor — as are many of the younger generation of Bridgeses — posted his first screen credit when he was barely out of kindergarten. He has often worked with his family, and noted that he, his dad and one of his sons, Jordan, starred together in the first episode of Showtime's "Outer Limits" in March of 1995.

Asked if he believes that one day we'll find a hidden Star Gate that will allow us to travel instantly through wormholes to other galaxies and universes, Bridges says, "Someone once said that if you can imagine it, someday you may be able to build it. So, my answer would be, why not?"

(NOTE: Bridges, who recently starred on the TNT miniseries "Into the West," will reprise his role of President Paul Hollister from the 2004 miniseries "10.5" in the upcoming sequel, "10.5: Apocalypse.")

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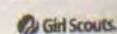

Holy Moly! The summer's only half over and there's still a bunch of rich, tasty cinematic goodness to be had. Take a gander at some of the films that'll be hitting your local multiplex in the very near future:

JULY

■ **Bad News Bears** — Remake of the '70s classic. Billy Bob Thornton plays the coach of a motley crew of Little Leaguers. Oooooo! I hope they win the Big Game! (July 22)

■ **The Island** — Ewan McGregor and Scarlett Johansson star as inhabitants of The Island, the last uncontaminated place on the planet. The pair discover that their idyllic world holds a terrible secret. Everyone on The Island is a clone to be used as "spare parts" for their original selves. (July 22)

■ **The Aristocrats** — Documentary about the filthiest joke

in the world. "The Aristocrats" is a joke that standup comics tell to each other. Although the joke stays pretty much the same, the trick is for a comic to make the joke his own, while one-upping the previous comic who told it. (July 29)

A subculture of hip-hop music has developed recently among computer science professionals, who taunt each other in verse much as mainstream rap artists do, according to a June report on Wired.com. "Geeksta" rappers like Ycracker and MC Plus+ spin verses such as the latter's "I'm encrypting s**t like every single day / sending it across a network in a safe way / protecting messages to make my pay / if you hack me you're guilty under DMCA" (referring to a federal copyright law). Explained another, "Monzy": "(Instead of boasting about our b*tches, blunts, Benzes or Benjamins, maybe we talk about our math skills or the efficiency of our code." A hip-hop journal editor doubted the genre would endure, though, because so far the major artists are males: "You're going to need some females."

cial five-year-minimum sentence under the law because he robbed a Sovereign Bank in Lowell, Mass., "while masked," argued to his sentencing judge in June that he wasn't actually in disguise but merely in his transvestite mode ("Andrea Guthrie"), including wig, false breasts, and a fake nose and facial moles. "This is what he does," said Guthrie's lawyer. "This is who he is."

Pieces of Work

In April, Florida Highway Patrol offi-

cers in Miami-Dade County had set up surveillance, including an airplane, to catch a notorious motorcyclist who at least twice before had sped past officers, at speeds up to 140 mph, and escaped. On April 24, he blew by again, going the wrong way in rush-hour traffic, but with the help of the plane, officers tracked him to his apartment and arrested him on six counts. The motorcyclist turned out to be David Carpenter, 24, who was at that time on track to become a Florida Highway Patrol officer, with his physical exam only a week away. Hanadi Zakaria al-Hindi (whose countrywomen are not permitted to drive cars), was granted a commercial pilot's license in June after flight training in Jordan and returned home to fly for Saudi Prince al-Walid bin Talal's company. (2) Ms. Laleh Seddigh, 28, won Iran's national championship car race in March after becoming the first woman allowed to compete against men in any sport since Iran's Islamic Revolution. (In the winner's circle, Ms. Seddigh put on a scarf and draped a cape over her tight-fitting uniform.)

The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration's lab in Vista, Calif., reported in April that it had received for testing 17 600-gram bricks of what it determined to be cocaine, but that on closer inspection, only the outsides of the bricks were of cocaine. Inside

each brick was 500 grams of heroin. Officials guessed that the ruse was to fool transporters, who typically charge more to ship heroin than cocaine.

Recurring Themes

Gary Moody, 45, was arrested after being pulled by police from a tank underneath a women's outhouse in a park near Albany, N.H., in June. A teenage girl had reported that when she went to use the facility, she saw Moody, standing in the muck below the hole, staring up at her. News of the Weird has reported on others discovered in similar circumstances (and who typically wear raincoats and waders and stand patiently, waiting for a user): in Horsetooth National Park in Colorado in 1998; near Peterborough, Ontario, in 1995; at a state park near Hamden, Conn., in 1990; and near

Durango, Colo., in 1990. According to Moody's arrest report, his explanation (which is a familiar one for these situations) was that he accidentally "dropped" a "ring" into the toilet and had to go looking for it.

Least Competent Criminals

According to police in Shreveport, La., in June, Jared Gipson, 24, had entered Blalock's Beauty College looking to rob the place but left (according to a Shreveport Times reporter) "crying, bleeding and under arrest" after the 20 students and teachers (almost all women) wrestled him down and attacked him with curling irons, chairs and a table leg, as well as their fists. Manager Dianne Mitchell had led the charge, tripping Gipson as he headed out the door, then yelling "Get that sucker!"

Leadership in America

According to an Associated Press report, Texas House Speaker Tom Craddick told a middle-school class he was visiting in April that the U.S. Congress is different from the Texas legislature, in that in Washington there are "454" members on the House side and "60" in the Senate. (The real numbers are 435 and 100.) And The Kansas City Star, reporting in May on a Missouri legislative debate on the Confederate flag, quoted Rep. Jim Avery as stating that the 1803 Louisiana Purchase involved a fight with France over the territory: "Well, we fought over it. We fought over it, right? You don't think there were any lives lost in that? It was a friendly thing?" (It appears well-settled in history that the Louisiana Purchase was just a land deal.)

Hyperactive Seniors

Lawrence Brown, 91, was arrested in June after an armed standoff with police, who said he was operating a drug market out of his home in order to, according to one officer, "supplement his Social Security income" (Chicago). Dorothy Densmore, 86, was arrested in May for having called 911 20 times in a 40-minute period to complain of poor pizza-service delivery and then biting the officer who came to question her (Charlotte, N.C.). Vera Tursi, 80, who uses an oxygen tank and a walker, was nonetheless arrested in June and charged with running a prostitution service out of her apartment in a low-income project (Lindenwold, N.J.).

Grethel man charged with sex abuse

PRESTONSBURG — A 62-year-old Grethel man was arraigned in circuit court Thursday on charges of sexual abuse of children which allegedly occurred between December and March.

Diamond Ray Akers was arrested earlier in the week and arraigned in district court Tuesday, but his charges came about just as a grand jury was meeting to hear the case. The jury heard from Det. Byron Hansford and chose to indict Akers whose preliminary hearing was scheduled for next week and is now moot.

Circuit Judge Danny P. Caudill chose to uphold the \$50,000 cash bond that was set for Akers during his district court arraignment.

Akers will face nine felony counts of first-degree sexual abuse. His case came to the attention of authorities after he allegedly confessed to some of the incidents to family members and later police. Akers will have a pretrial conference in the matter in September.

Six families homeless after trailers condemned

TEABERRY — Six families were ordered to vacate their homes at Darvene Hamilton's trailer court in Teaberry Friday.

"I don't believe this," three-year resident Bobby Adkins said, shaking his head, shortly after he was informed of the condemnation.

State Fire Marshall Albert S. Mitchell signed an emergency order Friday, condemning the park where two infants — 11 months old and 1 month old — were killed in a fire July 9. The fire leveled the mobile home and severely damaged two others, one of which was unoccupied at the time.

The mother, who was not identified, escaped with three other children. The cause of the fire has not been determined, officials say, however, Kentucky State Police, which is still investigating, said it may have been caused by wiring problems.

According to the order, directed toward owners Darvene and Keith Hamilton, the condemnation came about after Don Chapman, housing field inspector, and Tommy Younger, electric inspector, inspected the park on July 19 and 20.

Residents there Friday expressed anger because they were not informed that they may have to move when inspectors were on the scene this week.

Two-year resident Amanda Bentley asked American Electric Power workers who were preparing to shut off electricity, to turn on the electricity at a home she has in Tinker Fork. AEP workers, who would not give their names, told her that they could not do so until they had a printed order allowing the connection. Bentley, who had not paid a deposit to the company, later called the supervisor to resolve the situation. She said some residents of the park will live with her and her six children at her Tinker Fork home.

The order noted two specific violations. One cited a National Fire Protection Association regu-

lation stipulating that outside plastic piping must be installed underground only. A yellow gas line stretched from a neighboring store, Pappy's BP station, owned by trailer park owner Darvene Hamilton and his wife Ann (who works with family services division in the Floyd County School district's head start program) to the neighboring hillside. The line stretched above the graveled roadway, was connected to an electric pole, ran over a trailer, ran over a creek — through trees — and continued up the hill on the opposite side.

Blue River man killed after lightning strike

GRAYSON — A Blue River man died Thursday after apparently being hit by lightning in Carter County.

Bryon Little, 33, of Allen Branch, was working with two other men to anchor a trailer in Grayson when lightning apparently electrocuted him.

He was pronounced dead at King's Daughter Medical Center in Ashland Thursday afternoon.

Little, co-owner of Silver Eagle Mobile Home Service, was working with Magoffin County resident Mike Wheeler and Johnson County resident Jamie Burton when the incident occurred, said Walter Burton, who also co-owns the Paintsville-based business.

According to Gene Yinger, manager of Luv Homes in Ivel, the men were working to place a home for Luv Homes' service manager Johnny Jenkins, who has been on vacation this week.

Jenkins' son was going to purchase the home, Yinger said.

"They were putting anchors in the ground to anchor the mobile home," Yinger said. "The two guys underneath the house got [shocked] — I don't know how — and Johnny looked over to where they were at because they hollered or whatever, and when he turned back around to where Bryon was running the anchoring machine, he said he [Little] just fell back. The boys worked on him until the ambulance got there and the ambulance crew worked on him for 15 minutes and took him to the hospital. I don't think he even recovered at all."

Burton said the two men were running cables to secure the trailer and that Little operated an auger drill to place in ground disc screws to attach the cable.

Boyd County Coroner Keith Moore said that

Couple appear to answer meth charges

PRESTONSBURG — A Johnson County couple who were arrested in April by the Prestonsburg Police Department for allegedly operating a rolling methamphetamine lab were arraigned in circuit court Friday.

Stephen Salyers, 36, of Stambaugh, and Patricia Meade, 30, of Oil Springs, were given pretrial conference dates of Sept. 12 in the case which finds them accused of carrying all of the ingredients for manufacturing the drug in the trunk of their car.

Meade and Salyers were arrested April 25, when a Rite Aid employee called 911 after the couple stopped at the Highlands Plaza location and purchased a suspicious amount of the, then, over-the-counter drug Sudafed, which is also used in the

manufacture of meth. Now Sudafed tablets are targeted by a law which went into effect two months ago requiring customers to show identification before purchasing the drug which is supposed to be stocked behind the counter.

Sgt. Ralph Frasure responded to the call and arrived as the couple were leaving the plaza. Salyers allegedly failed to signal his turn onto University Drive, which gave Frasure cause to stop the vehicle. Inspection of the car revealed that the couple had all of the ingredients to make meth in their trunk. He charged the couple with manufacturing the drug and possession of the precursors needed to make more of the substance. He also charged the pair with drug possession and various vehicular charges which

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Police finding few leads in recent robberies

PIKEVILLE — Kentucky State Police is still searching for clues in two Floyd County robberies that occurred over a two-day time period several weeks ago.

No arrests have been made in either case.

An unidentified man walked into the Citizens National Bank in Allen on June 28 and walked away with an undisclosed

amount of money.

The white male, described as being between 5 feet, 10 inches and 6 feet tall, entered the bank early that morning with a canvas bag over his head. He left with an undisclosed amount of cash. Investigators at the scene said the man "hunkered" below the counter and "bobbed" his head above the counter during the robbery. He was captured on video only briefly, officials said. No weapon was seen during the robbery, but the man

threatened the teller with a firearm.

The next day, an armed robber entered Tackett's Grocery on Branham's Creek in Galveston. The unidentified man or woman hit the clerk, store owner Brenda Tackett, in the head with a hard object and knocked her unconscious before fleeing with an undetermined amount of cash. Tackett woke up on the floor behind the register and a female customer helped her get back up. She did not have insurance to cover the monetary loss.

Mark Wiety, executive vice president of Citizens National Bank said he has been informed that officers have no leads in the investigation. A description of the getaway vehicle was not ascertained, he said.

"This guy, based on what the girls told me, I think he's pretty professional," Wiety said, pointing out that he's been through several robberies himself. He

■ **VEEDERSBURG, Ind.** — A pageant queen at a local fair has had her crown and title stripped from her amid claims the contest was rigged by her aunt.

The Fountain County 4-H Council removed the title from Sarah Rice, 18, who was named queen on Saturday. Grievances filed with the council say runner-up Jordan Snoddy, 18, had more points.

Irene Norman, who tabulated the judges' scores, said the results she submitted to pageant officials put Snoddy in first place. "It was blatantly rigged," she said.

Before the results reached the announcer, they passed through

several hands, including those of Nyanne Applegate, who is the pageant's director and Rice's aunt.

Applegate was unable to be reached for comment Thursday by the Journal Review of Crawfordsville. There was no phone number listed for her in the area.

She previously said she did not mishandle the results but that in queen pageants, the winner is determined at the judges' discretion.

Pat Beasley, Fountain County 4-H Inc. president, said the point system has been used at the fair for the last five years.

■ **LEWISTON, Idaho** —

When it comes to toilet paper, recreational vehicle enthusiasts can be demanding customers.

But Potlatch Corp. has come up with a new product that company officials believe will keep RVers, boaters and home septic tank users happy.

The new toilet paper, called SepticSure, is designed to dissolve quickly, preventing clogs, said Bruce Woodlief, the marketing director for Potlatch's consumer products division.

In laboratory testing, the product breaks down within just 30 seconds of being flushed, Woodlief said.

"Unlike a paper towel, where you're looking for absorbency strength, bathroom tissue is made to function a certain way," Woodlief said. "In a septic situation, the sooner it can dissolve, the better."

Woodlief claims SepticSure maintains the absorbency and feel of upper-end toilet paper.

■ **NEW SMYRNA BEACH, Fla.** — Police are on the lookout for the naked tickler.

Investigators said they believe one man could be responsible for a series of bizarre break-ins in which a naked man enters victims' rooms while they are sleeping and tries to tickle their feet.

The naked tickler struck again in New Smyrna Beach over the weekend.

Investigators have been working on five similar, unsolved cases since 2001. Most of the victims are women over age 60, said police Cmdr. Wade Kirby.

Kirby said no arrests have yet been made because they don't have a lot to go on.

New Smyrna Beach is 44

miles northeast of Orlando.

■ **FORT CARSON, Colo.** — Soldiers captured an intruder in a secure area of a Colorado military base, but the intruder was no criminal — just a loose moose.

Soldiers and state wildlife officers managed to corral the 500-pound female moose, which had wandered into the part of Fort Carson reserved for equipment returning from Iraq.

Steve Cooley, a wildlife manager for the state, said the location was less than ideal for a moose. The animal was tranquilized and loaded into a trailer packed with 600 pounds of ice to keep it cool during the record heat wave.

Officials said their military moose will be released into the wild in Western Colorado.

■ **CHICAGO** — A man who called a radio station to brag about his role in a bank robbery may be regretting picking up his phone.

Randy Washington, 24, pleaded guilty Monday to federal charges that will likely put him behind bars for more than four years. He admitted he and five others robbed the South Chicago Heights TCF Bank branch in April 2004.

The group escaped with \$81,000, which they split. There were no leads in the case until earlier this year, when someone called the popular confessions show on WKSC-FM to talk about the heist.

The caller described the exact amount of cash taken, noted an employee was in on it and bragged that the group had since been "buyin' Louis Vuitton this, Blass that, every-

thing, man."

Authorities quickly traced the call back to Washington's cell phone and arrested him.

■ **SAN RAMON, Calif.** — One Bay Area high school is adding an extracurricular requirement: car pooling.

California High School has more than 2,300 students, but just 150 available parking spaces. So beginning this fall, the school won't allow students to park on campus if they don't car pool.

There will also be a lottery for parking spots, which will cost \$50 a semester.

Lisa Robinson, 17, said the plan will be tough on some pupils who would be forced to drive long distances to pick up others.

"It's really hard for people who live far away from school," she said.

But school officials say they have few options and pending construction could cut even more spaces.

As many as 40 schools in the Bay Area have considered or implemented car pooling.

■ **MINNEAPOLIS** — R.I.P., Arnold the Crime-Fighting Pig.

A south Minneapolis neighborhood is mourning the loss of Arnold, a 450-pound porker who once foiled a burglary. The beast died last month from apparent heart failure. He was 6.

Arnold earned his name after sinking his teeth into one of two intruders who tried to rob his owner, Becky Moyer, at gunpoint in February 2001. She had just returned home when the two men confronted her in her garage. When they moved inside, Arnold was sitting

patiently by the refrigerator waiting for his dinner.

Moyer screamed, and Arnold sprang into action. When he clamped down on the burglar's leg, the intruders bolted and left behind a puddle of blood.

"I never dreamed, never dreamed that a pig could be a protector," Moyer said. "Never." Moyer received the part-Yorkshire, part-Vietnamese potbellied pig as a birthday present in 1999. Then, he weighed 10 pounds and was expected to top off at 60.

"I was like, I don't need this pig," Moyer said. "I just wanted a night out on the town or something."

■ **KOKOMO, Ind.** — A city fire captain has gotten in trouble for mixing work with his home life.

Capt. Kevin Shaffer must repay the department \$120 for using a fire truck to water his yard. He also was reprimanded and must pay 35 cents per gallon for the water he used, officials said.

Shaffer and other firefighters were training recently on the south end of town, after which Shaffer wanted to purge the truck's tank.

Instead of dumping the water down on the street or down a drain as is normal procedure, Shaffer put the water on his lawn in the city 50 miles north of Indianapolis, Deputy Chief Pat Donoghue said Tuesday.

"We consider that a misuse of fire department equipment," Donoghue said. "He said he didn't want to waste it. If he didn't want to waste it, he could have watered the department's lawn."

Shaffer said he did not plan to appeal the reprimand or fine.

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Stumbo denies offering to settle hiring investigation

FRANKFORT — Attorney General Greg Stumbo sought a civil settlement with the Fletcher administration earlier this month regarding the ongoing personnel investigation, Lt. Gov. Steve Pence said Friday during a taping of a Lexington news program.

Pence did not provide details of the alleged proposal. However, an attorney contacted Gov. Ernie Fletcher's administration in hopes of reaching a civil settlement after the special grand jury in Franklin County had issued at least one indictment in the investigation, Pence said during a taping of WKYT-TV's "Kentucky Newsmakers" program, scheduled to air at 11 a.m. Saturday.

"He had an attorney contact the governor and inform the governor that the attorney general had realized this was getting out of hand and he wanted to reach a settlement," Pence said on the program.

But Stumbo Spokeswoman Vicki Glass denied the claim, saying it was "inaccurate" and that, "there was never a deal

made." Glass, however, acknowledged Stumbo met with Jim Deckard, Fletcher's general counsel, as a "courtesy" during the 4th of July weekend.

"The attorney general has made no agreement with anyone from the administration to reach a civil settlement in this investigation," Glass said. "A criminal matter cannot be settled civilly. This is just another attempt to divert attention from the criminal acts being charged by the grand jury."

Stumbo's office has been investigating the Fletcher administration for alleged political tampering with the state's Merit System, which was created in 1960 to insulate state civil service employees from politics. State law says personnel decisions in the system are supposed to be based on qualifications, and not politics.

So far, a special grand jury in Franklin County has indicted eight current or former members of Fletcher's administration on misdemeanor charges stemming from the probe. All but one, who has not yet been arraigned in court, have plead not guilty.

Dan Druen, a former commissioner in the Transportation

Cabinet, has also been indicted on a felony charge for allegedly tampering with a witness. Druen's attorney has said his client denies the charge, and plans to plead not guilty.

On Friday, Pence criticized Stumbo's handling of the investigation, and said it should have been pursued as a civil matter from the start.

"The truth is, this is a civil matter and it should have been handled civilly," Pence said. "And the attorney general knows that."

Deckard released a statement supporting Pence's claim. According to Deckard's statement, a former state representative initiated contact with the Fletcher administration on Stumbo's behalf. The goal, according to Deckard's statement, was to bring "closure of the ongoing merit investigation."

"The final terms of a civil settlement of the ongoing investigation were reached directly with Attorney General Stumbo over the Independence Day weekend," Deckard stated. "Obviously, that agreement was breached. Given the nature of these proceedings, I reserve rev-

elation of further details at this time."

Glass called the claim "a desperate move by desperate people." Stumbo's meeting with Deckard was only as a courtesy and it would not effect the investigation, Glass said.

"I have heard statements

from the lieutenant governor, the governor's general counsel and the governor's press office that are inaccurate," Glass said. "They are a complete misrepresentation of fact, and I don't know why they're stating such misinformation."

Also Friday, prosecutors

filed court papers claiming the administration has impeded the investigation, Glass said. In the Friday motion, filed with the Franklin Circuit Court, prosecutors asked the court to compel the administration to produce various pieces of evidence, including copies of administration computer hard drives, certain logs and other "non-privileged documents."

Wheeler and Burton, who were not severely injured, were holding the cables with the lightning hit. Moore said the men were shocked. Others reported that one received a cut on one hand.

Moore said none of the men saw the lightning strike, but they told him that they saw a flash before they were shocked and Little collapsed.

Moore said it was obvious that Little had been electrocuted and there were no other power sources in the area that could have killed him. There were no nearby underground cables, he reported.

Little's body was sent for an autopsy to the state Medical Examiner's office in Frankfort.

"It's a bad deal, that's for sure. It's hard to understand," Yinger said. "I guess it goes with the grand scheme of things."

Yinger said Little was an intelligent, good natured man who married his high school sweetheart.

Little survived by his wife, Carol Ann, and his daughter Mahla, 9.

Funeral arrangements were not complete at press time.

Ann Hamilton said the gas line was not in use and that the trailers were all electric.

The other violation specified illegal electrical hookups at the trailer court. Officials at the scene Friday said the electrical line from at least one trailer was servicing another mobile home on the lot, which is a non-compliance with state codes.

Chapman, who went door to door informing families to get their perishables and belongings ready to leave, said Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson

arranged to have emergency shelter in place for three families Friday night. Super 8 motel donated three double rooms for the families, he said. The other families made other arrangements, he said.

Three-year resident Patricia Adkins, 31, was angry.

"If my kids ain't got a home, then Floyd County is [expletive deleted]," she said. "I'm not putting my kids in a shelter. My kids have never been in a shelter and I'm not putting them there."

The condemnation affects approximately 20 people, many of whom are children.

Residents were asking what to do to keep their food from ruining while they are in transition. No answers were immediately given to that question.

"He [Darvene Hamilton] should have come and told us," said Tiffany Hall, 18, mother of 3-month-old Laura Dawn Rose. "We have nowhere to go and, with the power off, all of our food is going to ruin."

Hall previously asked KSP Trooper Justin Cornett, who was called on a routine basis to protect officials carrying out the order, if she could drive her car without tags or insurance to another location. She could not contact anyone with a vehicle, she said. He told her not to drive

the car.

Ann Hamilton said the lot has been in operation for 12 or 13 years and that all of the trailers, including the septic system, were up to code when they were put in.

"If they would have let us know about the violations, we would have immediately rectified that," she said when questioned about straight pipes draining into the creek and in yards, electrical wiring problems and the uncovered gas line that hung above the road. "These families, they're panicking because they don't know what to do or where they're gonna go. You can ask the residents. If something needed repaired, we would repair it."

Residents wanted their rent money back. Darvene Hamilton could not be reached for comment on the matter.

Chapman said the families may be able to take out criminal charges on their landlord.

The Hamiltons can request a hearing to appeal the decision within 10 days and the park could be reopened if the violations are fixed, the order said.

The Hamiltons also own several other trailers across the road, which were not included in the order for condemnation. Chapman said he would inspect those mobile homes as well.

Alert: Pop is fattening

Now really. Do some people in this country really believe cutting the consumption of soda pop requires a warning label? Actually, they do. The food police are at it again. If the Center for Science in the Public Interest has its way, that 2-liter bottle of Coke or 12-ounce can of Pepsi will bear a federal scarlet letter just as alcohol and cigarettes do.

The group, citing new statistics, contends that pop consumption in America is still too high and pop-drinking among teens is worse than ever. It has petitioned the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to slap rotating labels like these on soft drinks:

- "The U.S. government recommends that you drink less (non-diet) soda to help prevent weight gain, tooth decay and other health problems."

- "To help protect your waistline and your teeth, consider drinking diet sodas or water."

- "Drinking soft drinks instead of milk or calcium-fortified beverages may increase your risk of brittle bones (osteoporosis)."

And the center contends that all caffeinated drinks should bear this label: "This drink contains (fill in the number) grams of caffeine, which is a mildly addictive stimulant drug. Not appropriate for children."

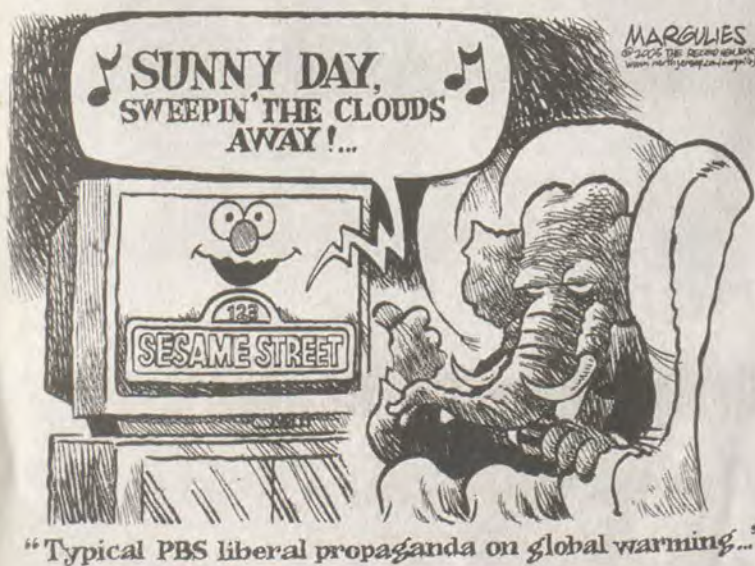
While we're at it, why not make the bottles and cans say "Coke - It's the Real Bad Thing"? Or "The Pepsi Generation Is Over"? Don't misunderstand. The points of the messages are legitimate. So is the idea of curbing the sale of pop in schools, one of the center's targets. This newspaper has welcomed efforts in some other states to pull pop and some snacks out of school cafeterias, school stores and vending machines.

Funny thing, though. Doesn't drinking milk promote obesity, too? Haven't the food police distrusted diet sodas for years? Why not labels for them? Or coffee? Tea? Juice? Even water (which can kill if one drinks too much at one time)?

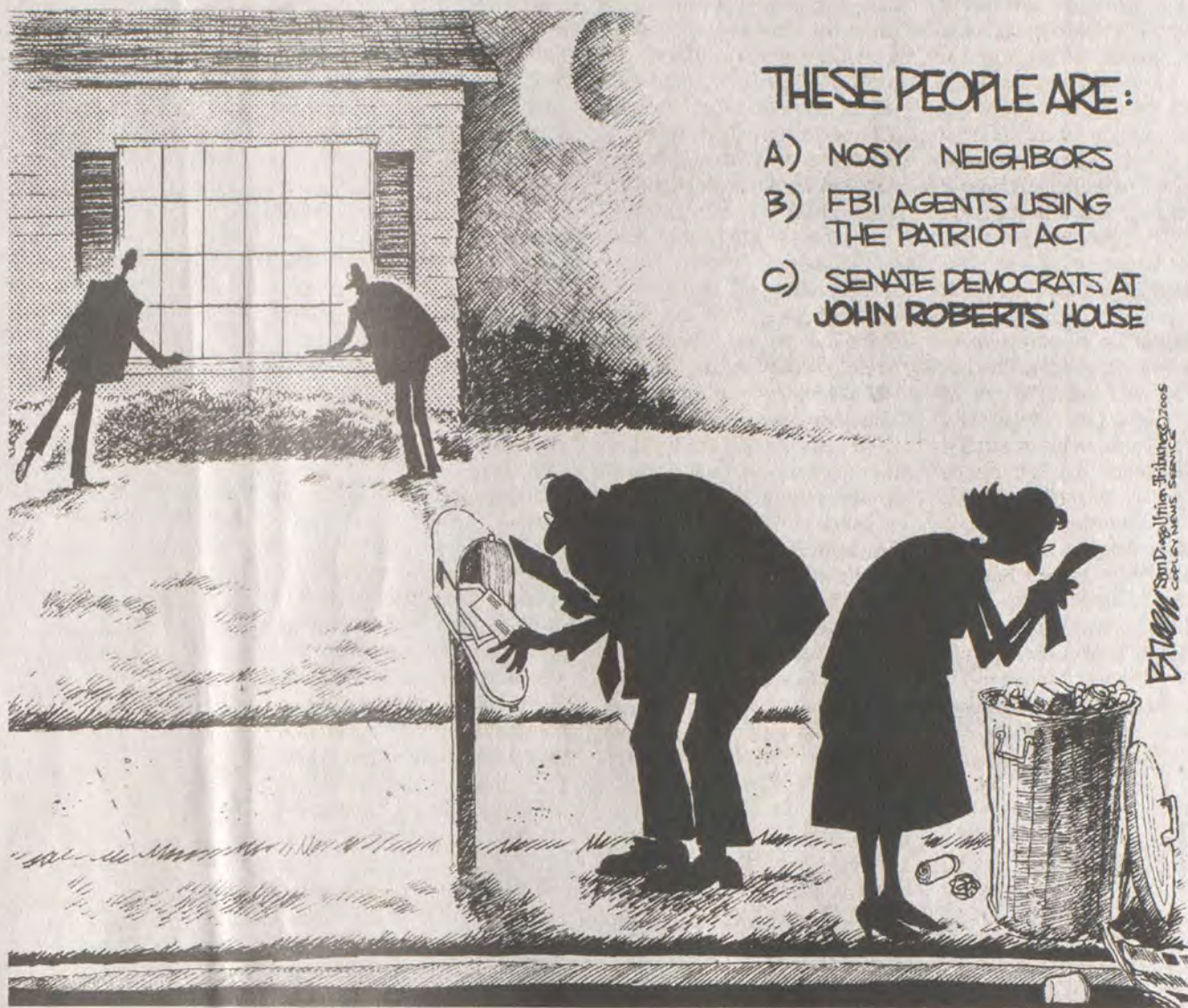

It's winnable

A new pall of gloom has settled over the Iraq War. There is no doubt that the insurgency has increased its lethality in recent months, and that can't be spun away. But neither is it cause for existential despair. We can still beat the insurgency, with the very same methods that have already proven successful in Iraq.

Last year, the U.S. military was faced with a radical Shia revolt led by Muqtada al-Sadr in the south, presenting a ticklish problem. If the U.S. were too heavy-handed in response, it could have lost the tolerance of the crucial majority Shia for its presence. If we are to prevail against the Sunni insurgency, success will look like our victory over Sadr — a messy, imperfect amalgam of military pressure and negotiations, ending with some of the bad guys getting positions in Iraq's government.

In April 2004, it fell to Maj. Gen. Martin Dempsey's 1st Armored Division to handle Sadr's revolt in five southern

cities. Dempsey realized that his most important task was to isolate Sadr politically, denying him the support of his fellow Shia. So Dempsey's information campaign with the Iraqi public came first, and the military operation was supplementary to it. "We reversed the paradigm that we had lived with during my first 30 years in the Army," says Dempsey.

Dempsey publicly said that he was going to systematically take back the cities, leaving Karbala and Najaf — the cities with especially important mosques — for last. "We were giving the Iraqi people a sense that we were giving [Sadr] a chance to stand down," Dempsey says.

Eventually, Dempsey went after Sadr's forces militarily. But he beat them back into the mosques at Karbala and Najaf, and stopped there. There was a negotiated solution, with the U.S. giving up on its demand to arrest Sadr, who was wanted on a murder charge. Importantly, Sadr lost political support during the confrontation, rather than

gaining it. With his forces still holed up in the mosques, Sadr lived to fight another day. In August 2004, Maj. Gen. Peter Chiarelli's 1st Cavalry Division had to confront him again. Again a deal was cut. Sadr's forces were ousted from the mosques and stopped fighting. Sadr eventually decided to take part in the political process, and when the new elected Iraqi government was formed in May, his movement got two important ministries. Is this a perfect result? No, but if he is no longer shooting at Americans and his followers are venting their grievances through politics, that is all to the good.

We should be aiming to do the same with the Sunni insurgents (the foreign jihadists are truly irredeemable). If the balance of Sunni opinion embraces the new Iraq, this could isolate the insurgents within their own community, the same way Sadr was isolated within his. While applying military pressure, we will have to talk to the insurgency's more reasonable fringes.

Would that we could simply kill all our enemies in Iraq in a neat black-and-white battle. Alas, we can't. Which is why the fight against Sadr has to be our model.

The Plame game

Judith Miller is an odd choice for the role of Joan of Arc in the farce that I like to call the Valerie Plame caper.

Ms. Miller is "The New York Times" reporter who has been sent to jail for refusing to reveal her sources for stories that exposed Ms. Plame as a CIA undercover operative.

The irony of that is that Ms. Miller didn't write the stories. Columnist Bob Novak did; so did Matthew Cooper of "Time" magazine. Yet neither of them is in jail. Ms. Miller is.

Mr. Cooper escaped jail when, at the last moment, his source gave him express permission to use his name. The apparent immunity enjoyed by Mr. Novak, who resides in the netherworld of cable television, is more mysterious. We don't know if he's ratted out his sources or if he's even been asked to. He ain't talking and neither is the prosecutor.

What it amounts to, in simplistic terms, is that Ms. Miller is in jail for something that Bob Novak wrote.

Here's the background to this bizarre case.

Some months before the Iraqi war Joseph Wilson, a retired diplomat and Ms. Plame's husband, was asked by the CIA to investigate whether Saddam

Hussein was trying to buy weapons-grade uranium from Niger.

Wilson found no evidence of it and told the Bush administration that. When the president later offered that imagined purchase as one of the reasons for going to war, Wilson wrote an op-ed piece for "The New York Times" charging that the administration had misrepresented the facts.

Soon after, Novak wrote a column, based on confidential sources, revealing that Mr. Wilson's wife was a CIA operative and had recommended Wilson for the investigation of the alleged sale. The implication was that it was some sort of boondoggle concocted by a husband and wife hostile to the administration.

Since it is a crime to blow the cover of a spook, a special prosecutor was appointed to find the source of the story. As part of that investigation, he asked Ms. Miller to tell him whether anyone in government had told her about Mr. Wilson's wife and her job. She refused; thus jail.

This is a strange case in that most whistleblower cases involve a reporter protecting a source who leaks information of government wrongdoing. In this case, the government leaked classified information in order to punish a whistleblower and the press — Novak, mainly — is helping it.

Another irony here is that Ms. Miller, rightly or wrongly, has been considered by some as a shill for the Bush administration in the run-up to the war. She

wrote a series of stories relaying the intelligence community's belief that Iraq did indeed have weapons of mass destruction. She has since admitted that her sources were wrong.

So one could say she's gone to jail for protecting those same benighted administration sources. Good riddance.

That misses the point entirely. (As did the judge who sent her to jail saying that she had placed herself above the law.)

Miller did not write a story. The prosecutor has produced no evidence that she even had sources. So what the judge is saying, effectively, is that a prosecutor can single out a reporter and force him or her to tell him anything and everything he or she knows, without ever publicly giving a reason. That is an invitation to abuse of power.

What a reporter does for a living is go around and talk to people. If the people feel that everything they say will be made available on demand to a prosecutor or to the IRS or anybody with a badge, the only meaningful conversations he or she will have is with their dogs.

The public interest lies in reporters finding out things that government officials don't want them to know. They need to be able to protect confidential sources to do that. The Supreme Court, which refused to hear Miller's case, should have figured that out by now.

Harris avoids prison time

PIKEVILLE — A wealthy Pikeville businessman who doctors have said has only months to live will not be sent to prison for his involvement in an election fraud conspiracy that involved buying votes from impoverished eastern Kentuckians.

Ross Harris stood motionless beside his defense attorney as U.S. District Judge Karen Caldwell announced a sentence of 18 months in home confinement, three years of probation and a \$100,000 fine. He begins the home confinement immediately.

A business associate who prosecutors said assisted Harris in funneling illegal contributions to local politicians didn't fare so well. Caldwell sentenced Glenn Turner of Pikeville to four years in prison, and ordered him to report to a yet-to-be-determined prison on Nov. 18. He must also serve three years probation and pay a fine of \$10,000.

Harris was convicted in September on one count of conspiring to commit mail fraud and to buy votes, three counts of mail fraud, and one count of structuring withdrawals from a bank account to avoid federal reporting requirements.

Turner was convicted of conspiring to commit mail fraud and two counts of mail fraud.

The mail fraud counts involve the sending of bogus campaign finance reports to the state.

Prosecutors claimed Harris illegally contributed some \$40,000 to former state Sen. John Doug Hays' unsuccessful judicial race in 2002, and that Harris and Turner gave an additional \$20,000 to the re-election campaign of Knott County Judge-Executive Donnie Newsome, who served 16 months in federal prison after being convicted of election fraud in 2003.

The money, prosecutors said, was used in a scheme disguised as a "get out the vote" effort.

On Tuesday, former state Sen. John Doug Hays and his wife were sentenced to prison on mail fraud charges for submitting false campaign reports in the same eastern Kentucky election fraud case.

Hays, now a seminary student studying to become a minister, will have to spend six months in prison and his wife, Brenda Hays, three months in prison. Both also were sentenced to six months of home confinement and three years probation.

However, both will remain free pending the outcome of their appeal.

Prosecutors claimed in the trial that the Hayses conspired with others in Pike County, including Harris, to buy votes to help Hays win the district judge race. They claimed that Harris was the leader of the conspiracy to buy votes from impoverished eastern Kentuckians.

In testimony on Tuesday afternoon, a string of character witnesses described Turner and Harris as generous men. Turner, they said, gave of his time to help underprivileged children and as a volunteer coach, while Harris used his wealth to help the less fortunate, to assist local churches and to provide scholarships for law students at the University of Kentucky. A UK dean testified that Harris anonymously contributed \$1 million to the law school for the scholarship program.

Dr. Dale Adkins, a Pikeville physician, testified that Harris has cancer and that he has less than a year to live.

Defense attorney Jesse Barrett asked for Harris to be sentenced to either probation or home confinement based on his illness and his philanthropy.

"It's undisputed that Mr. Harris suffers from inoperable, incurable, terminal bile-duct cancer," Barrett said.

Caldwell said she would have been inclined to give Harris a much stiffer sentence if he wasn't sick.

"It's the harm to the democratic process that defies logic in this case," the judge said.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Kenneth Taylor had argued that Harris shouldn't be granted a lesser sentence because of his illness or because of his philanthropy.

"It's the John Gotti defense: 'I'm a philanthropist regardless of whatever else I've done,'" Taylor said, referring to the late mob boss who was sentenced to prison for murder in 1992.

"There are two sides to this man," Taylor said of Harris. "There's the dark side, and the good side."

Harris' daughter, Tanya Harris of Pikeville, said in testimony Tuesday that her greatest fear is that her father will die in prison.

"I just wish he could spend this time with his family," she said. "We need him, and he needs us."

'Shaun of the Dead'

Zombies are en vogue again with remakes, sequels and original films shuffling towards theaters and DVD. Here's one that helped the current boom get started.

This one scores points by taking the genre in a new direction that blends elements of comedy, action and even drama to give us the story of how a zombie invasion of merry olde England actually improves the life of a complacent 29-year-old who is stuck in a major rut.

The story centers on Shaun, who is 29, on the outs with his girlfriend, stuck in a dead end job and doomed to spending the rest of his days with his flat mates, who include a career-driven salary man named Pete and a hopeless slacker named Ed (who sits around playing video games all day and neglects to take down phone messages which he would probably get wrong anyway since he is stoned most of his waking hours).

Shaun's professional life offers little escape and finds him supervising younger adults who now see him as "the man." Everything is about to change, however, as an epidemic spreads in just days and begins transforming Londoners into the undead. Unfortunately Shaun is so dead to his surroundings that he doesn't figure out what's going on until his neighborhood has become "zombie central."

Miraculously this is when the worm turns for Shaun and he suddenly has a purpose — fighting zombies. It is something that he's actually good at, though any opportunity for career advancement seems unlikely.

Soon his slacker buddies, elderly parents and ex-girlfriend are all depending on him to get them all to safety and find a safe haven for them. Shaun becomes a man of action. He even finds time to settle differences with his stepfather, whom he has resented since his mother married him 16 years before.

This one works because it doesn't settle for the obvious gags involved with the undead, which were already done to perfection in George Romero's "Dawn of the Dead," which featured scenes of bikers teeing off on zombies with everything from golf clubs to cream pies.

Here, laughs are generated by the British culture, which is sent up for being stuffy and too well mannered to properly express itself in the ensuing crisis. Shaun's mom is a great example. When Shaun discovers that his mother is missing a bit of flesh from an attack, she can only muster, "They were a bit bitey," before joining their

She looked up toward the overhead bin where I had put her bag and the bowl.

"Yes," she continued, "that bowl might be well-worn from all of the loving hands that have polished it over the years, but it's part of our family, and it has to be given in person."

As we were talking, I discovered that I actually knew her great-grandson. He was a vendor at the small store I was working in at the time.

Walking off the plane, I thanked her for the most enjoyable conversation.

With a twinkle in her eye, she agreed. "Yes,

dear, the time seemed to fly right by."

I carried her bag for her, and she held on to my arm as we approached the arrival area. She was met by her great-grandson and her new great-great-granddaughter, who was honored with the same name as her great-great-grandmother, Marion.

The luster and shine of the silver sugar bowl seemed to return as the family embraced. Tears streamed down the old woman's cheeks when she saw little Marion's smiling face reflected in the small vessel.

I wished them a wonderful visit, and I didn't see her great-grandson until two or three weeks later. He told me how much his great-grandmother had enjoyed our "lit-

Depression is a treatable illness

The other day I got a letter from Dorothy Duren, who reads my column in the Valdosta Daily Times down in south Georgia. What she had to say was so important that I wrote her back, asked for permission to use her name and to share the contents of her letter with you.

Her subject was depression, a mental state that negatively affects millions of people in our nation each year. It's normal for any person to be depressed when they have suffered a major defeat, a divorce, the loss of a loved one, being fired from a job, missing the cut, turned down by a favorite college and the list is endless.

While all of these things hurt, in a reasonable length of time a normal person will bounce back and be ready to face the next

challenge. I get depressed when it rains for several days in a row, but up to this point, have always managed to bounce back.

However, what happens to a person who does not bounce back in a reasonable length of



time and stays depressed? This is what has come to be known as severe mental depression and, if not dealt with, the end result in far too many cases is suicide. This is

why I said that Dorothy's letter was so important.

She told me a true story about a man by the name of Stuart Perry, who has made a commitment to do something about this mental illness that is treatable. If you or some member of your family suffers from deep mental

depression, I hope you will read very carefully what I am going to say and you might also pass this along to someone you know outside of your family who also suffers from this condition.

Here is the rest of the story. Dorothy said, "Just last week I attended a meeting of the Southwest Georgia Hospital Volunteers in Americus, Ga., where I heard Stuart Perry, guest speaker. Stuart told us of his experience with depression. His father committed suicide when he, Stuart, was 21 years of age and in college. Stuart dropped out and came home and ran the family's service station for eight years before he began showing signs of depression.

The family immediately got him help (and that's the key) and when he recovered, he felt God was calling him to help publicize the importance of getting help for depressed people.

With the help of Mr. Rudy Hayes, they organized a "walk"

and Stuart walked from Americus, Ga., to Chicago, Ill. His object was to obtain petitions requesting doctors to screen all their patients for depression and do what they could to help. He obtained many petitions, which he delivered to the headquarters of the American Medical Association in Chicago.

Along the way there were rallies and he spoke at many meetings. At each of these meetings, including the one Dorothy Duren attended, he passed out a small card encouraging people with symptoms of depression to get help. She concluded her letter by saying, "I was very impressed with his endeavor because I and my family have battled with depression for many years. Hopefully, with this kind of publicity we can overcome the stigma of depression and mental illness."

Before I conclude this column, I want to give you the information that is on this card, including a couple of phone numbers where people who suf-

fer from severe mental depression can get help. First, I would like to offer a word of caution. In these days with skyrocketing medical costs and insurance premiums that are annually outpacing the rate of inflation by a hefty margin, we don't want to further strain our system by being deceptive or misusing it. Our system was designed for people who are really sick and need help and as this relates to mental depression, there are some signs that will serve as a red light, that indicate that it's time to take action.

Here are 10 symptoms of depression.

1. Persistent sad, anxious, or "empty" mood.
2. Sleeping too little or too much.
3. Changes in weight or appetite.
4. Loss of pleasure or interest in activities.
5. Feeling restless or irritable.
6. Persistent physical symptoms that don't respond to treatment.

7. Difficulty concentrating, remembering or making decisions.
8. Fatigue or loss of energy.
9. Feeling guilty, hopeless or worthless.
10. Thoughts of suicide or death.

This is a program of the National Mental Health Association and they recommend that you see your doctor or other mental health professional if you experience five or more of these 10 symptoms for more than two weeks.

The likelihood of depression increases if you have an illness such as heart disease, stroke, diabetes, cancer, Alzheimer's or Parkinson's. What to do when you've got a short fuse

Dear Tom and Ray: I have run into a problem with my 1993 Jeep Cherokee Sport. Something is causing the fuse that serves the power door locks, radio, cigar lighter and dome light to blow. You put in a new fuse, and it blows before you can even test things out. Just before this started, the power locks were acting up — sometimes they would work, and sometimes not. Could the power-lock switch or actuators cause this? Is it going to be a matter of replacing the locks, or can this be fixed without buying an all-new set? I would really appreciate any help you can throw my way. — Matt

TOM: This is going to be a pain in the butt, Matt. Fortunately, at least you've got a good type of short to deal with.

RAY: Right. You've got a dead short, which means it's not intermittent — it blows the fuse immediately, each and every time you replace it. That makes it easier to find than, say, a fuse that only blows once every three weeks when the moon is in the southern sky, and Maura Tierney cracks a smile on "ER."

TOM: The way to find a dead short is, first, buy a buttload of replacement fuses. Then start disconnecting one suspected electrical component at a time. After you've disconnected a component, replace the fuse. If

it DOESN'T blow, you've hit pay dirt.

RAY: Approach it logically. You know it's either the locks, the radio, the lighter or the dome light. I'd start by eliminating the radio. Radios almost never blow fuses, in my experience. So now you're down to three possibilities. That was easy, right?

TOM: I'd disconnect the lighter next. You can remove the wire from the back. That's easy to do, and lighters frequently cause problems.

RAY: When that's not it, Matt, go for the dome light next. That pulls down from the headliner. Once it's pulled down, the wires should be exposed. That's easy, too.

TOM: And when you've eliminated everything else, you then have to tackle the door locks. That's not so easy.

RAY: Well, it depends. Start by opening the door and looking at the area where the hinges are. You'll see a sheaf of wires that exit the A-Pillar (the front of the door frame) and enter the door itself. Since those wires get bent every time the driver's door opens and closes, that's where you're most likely to get a fraying or broken wire that's touching metal or touching another broken wire. So, look there first and see if you can find any evidence of exposed wiring. If you do, fix it, and then test it.

TOM: If you don't find a problem there, then you're going to have to remove the inside door panel. It's held on by about 1,400 little clips. Try not to lose more than 1,300 of them, or it'll be hard to get the door panel back on.

RAY: You can then try disconnecting the door-lock switch. If the fuse still blows, try the actuator itself. Once you get that fuse to not blow, you're in business, Matt. Good luck.

One time, my father-in-law was waiting in the car with them. It was nighttime, so not only did I leave the car running, but I left the headlights

on. When I came out, I got a speech from him about how leaving the lights on when the car is only idling will greatly shorten the life of the battery. I didn't believe him, but not wanting to start a fight, I went along with him and pretended it was a good idea. Is he right? — Eric

TOM: Well, let me say first, Eric, that you are a man of great perspicacity. You did exactly the right thing.

RAY: Right: You pretended your knucklehead father-in-law was right, and went along with his harmless suggestion in order to keep the peace. If only there were more international leaders with your wisdom.

TOM: To answer your technical question, your father-in-law is completely nuts. Virtually all modern charging systems are equipped to run the headlights without using any electricity from the battery. The engine will use a tiny bit more gas

because the alternator is working a little harder. But it's practically immeasurable.

RAY: And besides, shining the headlights into the window of the convenience store helps you see the labels on the beer bottles in the store refrigerator so you don't accidentally take home a six-pack of Panther Pee Light.

TOM: So, when the old man is around, do him the kindness of turning off the

headlights when you're parking in idle. It'll make him feel useful and respected. That's important. Remember, he can still change his will!

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Former state employee files federal lawsuit against state, GOP

FRANKFORT — A former state employee has filed a federal lawsuit against the state and the Republican Party of Kentucky, claiming she was fired because she was a Democrat.

Leslie Campbell filed the complaint in U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of

Kentucky at Pikeville this week, alleging her civil rights were violated when state officials targeted her for termination because she was not a longtime Republican loyalist.

The lawsuit also names, among others, the state Transportation Cabinet, acting Transportation Secretary Bill Nighbert and Gov. Ernie Fletcher's deputy chief of staff Dick Murgatroyd as defendants.

"It was the defendants' pattern and practice to unconstitutionally promote people based on their political performance and to cause an unlawful and unconstitutional purge of those defendants perceived not to be politically loyal," according to the lawsuit filed Monday.

The suit comes as Attorney General Greg Stumbo's office conducts an investigation of the role politics has played in hiring

within Fletcher's administration. A special grand jury in Franklin County has indicted eight people on misdemeanors stemming from the investigation.

One of the eight, Dan Druen, was indicted on a felony charge for alleged witness tampering. His attorney Rob Eggert said Druen would plead not guilty to the charges.

Campbell worked as a time

keeper with the state Transportation Cabinet between Feb. 5 and June 29, according to her suit.

She was allegedly told, by two other defendants, that switching her party registration from Democrat to Republican would "increase her chances" of getting a job in the Transportation Cabinet, according to the lawsuit. Campbell "reluctantly" changed her regis-

tration on June 28, 2004, according to the complaint.

Campbell was eventually replaced by a longtime Republican supporter with better political connections, the lawsuit claims.

"In their unbridled appetite for political patronage, my client lost," her attorney Ned Pillersdorf said.

Campbell has also filed challenged her dismissal in an appeal filed with the Kentucky Personnel Board.

Transportation Cabinet spokesman Doug Hogan did not have an immediate response.

"I don't have any comment, just because I haven't seen it," Hogan said.

State GOP spokeswoman Jessica Ditto said the lawsuit was "preposterous."

"The Republican Party of Kentucky has no hiring authority," Ditto said.

Campbell is seeking reinstatement, unspecified compensatory damages and \$1 million in punitive damages from each of the defendants.

Appeals court: Convicted judge-executive may stay in office

FRANKFORT — A conviction and 16 months in federal prison for vote fraud and evidence of violation of campaign finance laws are not enough to force Knott County Judge-Executive Donnie Newsome out of office — at least not yet.

The Kentucky Court of Appeals on Friday said Newsome's opponent in the 2002 Democratic primary waited to challenge the outcome.

Mike Hall, who lost to Newsome defeated in the bitter 2002 Democratic primary by 520 votes, filed suit to have Newsome removed under a normal election challenge suit. But a unanimous three-judge appel-

late panel said the lawsuit was filed too late.

The ruling, written by Judge Rick Johnson, included some frustration by the judges at the inability to make Newsome pay for his improper election with the forfeiture of his office. Newsome refused to give up the office, even during his time in prison.

Johnson noted that after Newsome was incarcerated, he began cooperating with federal authorities and testified that he received \$8,000 in campaign contributions that were not properly reported. "These acts would appear to be clear violations (of state law)," Johnson said.

Nevertheless, Hall only filed his election contest suit in 2004, after learning of

Newsome's federal court testimony. And state law makes it clear that such challenges to the outcome of a state election must be filed within 10 days of the balloting.

"There is no provision allowing the court to apply any other time limitation no matter what the ground of the contest," Johnson said.

A special circuit court judge appointed to hear Hall's case

had refused to dismiss it, as requested by Newsome's lawyer.

Complicating matters is a provision of Kentucky law that dictates that convicted felons can remain in office until a "final judicial determination of guilt."

That phrase has always been a little vague. And Newsome is still appealing his conviction through the federal courts.

Steven Reed, a former U.S. attorney who is representing Newsome in the appeals process, said he doesn't know how long it will take for the 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to make a decision.

Hall can ask the Kentucky Supreme Court to review Friday's appeals court decision.

Judges Michael Henry and John Minton agreed with the decision.

BSCTC webmaster attends conference

Faculty and staff from three colleges in the KCTCS met via ITV on July 20 to discuss web site effectiveness strategies. Primarily at issue was the use of the Macromedia Contribute content management software, which allows users to make updates to web pages without disturbing the consistency of the site and without any knowledge of web technologies like HTML and CSS.

The conference was initiated by Madisonville webmaster Craig Dixon and Hazard IT Director Donna Roark. Also participating were Big Sandy CTC webmaster Jason Kretzer, Hazard CTC webmaster Bart Massey, Madisonville CTC Interim IT Director Chet Cunningham, Madisonville CTC PR Director Liz Hames, and Madisonville CTC Disability Resources Coordinator Valerie Wolfe. The members from Madisonville are part of a Web Site Redesign Committee formed in March of this year. Dixon and Cunningham co-chair the committee.

Creating and maintaining a navigable, up-to-date web site with a consistent look-and-feel has been a problem for many throughout the system, and has become a more critical need recently given the increased functionality many students expect to find on web sites today. KCTCS is starting to take notice, recently delivering an online registration mechanism and promising an online application for admission coming soon.

These changes have prompted some new hiring. Kretzer started at Big Sandy July 11, and Dixon was hired at Madisonville in January as part of that college's Title III Institutional Strengthening grant. Said Dixon, "We knew Hazard was already using the software, so it was a great

opportunity for us to see what they've already been doing - what they've tried, what works, what doesn't. There's no need for all of us to make the same mistakes."

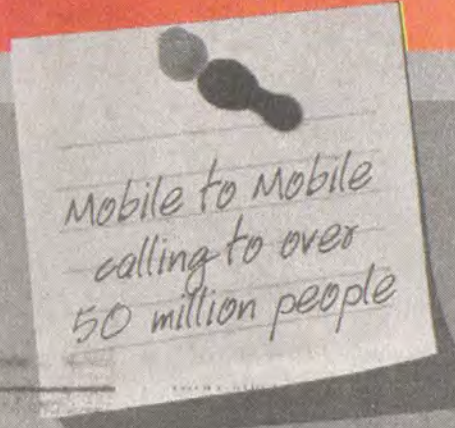

Carolina rig opens door to deep, summer bass

PADUCAH — The quick ticket to deep water bass is the Carolina rig, a quirky means of fishing soft plastic lures.

Bass in our popular reservoirs occupy deep water haunts throughout

the year, but especially during the heat of summer, the fish spend much more time far from the shorelines and in the darker comforts of the depths.

What's considered deep varies from lake to lake, but summer bass almost always are concentrated in double digit depths and more. Creek and river channel drop-offs, long

points, underwater "humps" and other prominent depth changes where the shallow edge is perhaps 12 to 18 or 25 feet deep hold much more promise than visible shoreline features.

Many shallow-oriented anglers are frustrated by the demands of deep

Fusion will make its competition debut at the 2006 Daytona 500 in February, and Ford teams will use it in next year's NASCAR Nextel Cup Chase for the Championship, as well as Busch Series competition.

"We're thrilled to be unveiling the new Fusion," said Burt Diamond, global marketing manager, Ford Racing Technology. "The Fusion production car represents a fresh, new attitude for Ford in the mid-size sedan lineup. This Fusion race car has the same bold look, and it represents an all-new era in our Ford NASCAR racing program." Diamond and Ben Poore, Ford car marketing manager, will be available for media interviews at the Speedway on Saturday from 6 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The 2006 Fusion will become Ford's first all-new nameplate car for NASCAR racing in 38 years, since the 1968 Ford Torino made its debut in both the showroom and on the race track.

"The Fusion represents the new face of Ford cars," added Poore. "And racing it in NASCAR competition allows us to get that new face in front of the millions of race fans who follow NASCAR racing in per-

son and on television.

"Racing involvement will play a key role in the launch and the marketing of the Fusion throughout the rest of this year and into 2006. The great interest in NASCAR racing will help us tie the Fusion name to the Ford brand, and it's only right that we race Ford's newest car in America's flagship racing series."

The NASCAR Fusion will replace the Ford Taurus racecar, which has captured four NASCAR championships (three Nextel Cup, one Busch), and 100 Nextel Cup victories since it made its competition debut in 1998.

"We'd like to send Taurus out with one more championship," said Diamond, noting six Ford drivers are currently in contention to qualify for the final, 10-race Nextel Chase for the Championship. "But the time is right to move on to Fusion."

Ford submitted the Fusion to NASCAR officials several weeks ago, and is awaiting a final, on-track test before the car is officially certified for competition.

"We've worked hand-in-hand with NASCAR on the development of this car, and we can't thank them enough for helping us bring the Fusion forward," said Diamond.

Ford took a different approach with the development of this racecar than it had done with previous models in the past. This time, Ford engineers did the early development with a scale model testing program that in previous new model efforts had been done by race teams.

The engineers consulted with Ford race teams and took input on the new Fusion race car, but the duo did most of the development work over the past eight months while Ford teams competed week-in and week-out in NASCAR competition.

"Our guys did a terrific job of getting the NASCAR Fusion to where it needed to be, and we actually were ahead of schedule in getting it to NASCAR," said Diamond. "The goal of any new car is to take the lessons learned from the previous model and, working within the NASCAR guidelines, bring forth a slightly better product."

"I think we accomplished that, and with the Fusion's dynamic new look, I think we have a car that NASCAR fans will easily recognize out on the track, in victory lane, and in their own driveway. We're excited and I know our teams are as well."

rainbow trout in the tail waters below Wolf Creek Dam. Jazz likes fishing for stripers but she loves fishing for the huge rainbow trout in the tail waters. She is so good at catching trout that she could probably teach her Papaw a few new tricks.

If you ask Jazz where and how she catches her fish her answer is almost always the same. "I won't tell you but I will show you." If you really want to know you will just have to take her fishing. She only keeps the fish she plans to eat and doesn't mind that she has to

release the big fish in the slot (on Cumberland River rainbow trout 15 to 20 inches must be released in the best possible condition). She doesn't mind releasing the 16-inch rainbow in the picture. She said, "I'll be back to get you next year."

Just this one time, Jazz wants to tell everyone how she has been fishing in late June. For stripers she recommends trolling with live shiners on planer boards at 20 feet over a 120 feet of water at the mouth of the creeks. Fishing is a little slow at this time.

For the nice rainbow trout she likes to drift in her Papaw's boat with two or more generators running. The dam has six power generators and with no generations the river is good for wading and three is great for drifting while six is a little much with the water level up in the trees. She will drag power bait, salmon eggs, or night crawlers on the bottom. Even if you don't catch any fish (that is a joke) the scenery is worth the drift.

water fishing - waiting for their lures to reach bottom, struggling to maintain "feel" with their offerings, etc. The Carolina rig relieves most of those encumbrances.

The rig is created like this: Run the main line of a medium heavy casting or spinning outfit through a 3/4- to 1-ounce sliding egg or bullet-type sinker. Next, thread the line through a plastic or glass bead (to cushion the forthcoming knot and to serve as noisemaker).

Tie the end of the line to a sturdy barrel swivel. Tie a section of leader (as little as 18 inches, maybe as much as 4 feet) to the other end of the swivel.

Finish the rig by tying an offset "worm" hook on the tag end of the leader, then adorn it with the soft plastic lure of your choice. A plastic worm will do, but many vary it with lizards, multi-legged "creature" baits, fake crawfish, tube lures or ultra-simple "French fry" stick lures.

Most of the time, when there is underwater wood in the form of stumps or brush piles on which to snag, the soft plastic is hooked self-snagless "Texas-style" with point buried in the lure. When fishing open, rocky bottoms with few obstacles, lures might be rigged with

exposed hooks, which make for an easier time setting the hook.

The Carolina rig, best cast by a sidearm lob with a long rod, hurriedly carries the lure to the bottom with the heavy weight. Once there, it provides good bottom contact that can be felt through the rod.

However, with the lure wafting free of the sinker on the trailing leader, a bass doesn't feel the weight of the hefty sinker when it sucks in the life-like plastic offering. The Carolina rig thus combines a swift sledgehammer delivery while maintaining a subtle feather duster presentation.

To fish a Carolina-rigged plastic, make a long cast to get the rig past the expected strike zone and to keep the lure in a possible fishy area as long as possible. Allow the weight to thump down on bottom on a likely offshore structure, take up slack, then slowly to moderately drag the rig along with rod motion. The lure will trail along in a lively manner behind the sinker, which may attract bass from the silt trail it disturbs or the clicking of the bead against the sinker.

A "bite" on the rigged lure may not be felt through the loosey-goosey connection of the

leader. Many pick-ups are sensed just as "wet rag" weight or a gradual tightening of the line.

To set the hook and to compensate for the fish possibly moving to the side, putting it at an angle with the main line - point the rod at the perceived fish, take up slack with the reel, then sweep the rod in a long arc to the side.

An advantage of separating the lure from the weight of the sinker is that bass tend to not quickly spit out the lure. The unburdened plastic lure apparently feels so natural that the angler must be alert to pick-ups so bass don't have too long to hold onto and even swallow the plastic/hook combo.

The fisherman can avoid deep hook-ups that can injure the fish (and void any efforts to release them) by promptly setting the hook when bass come calling.

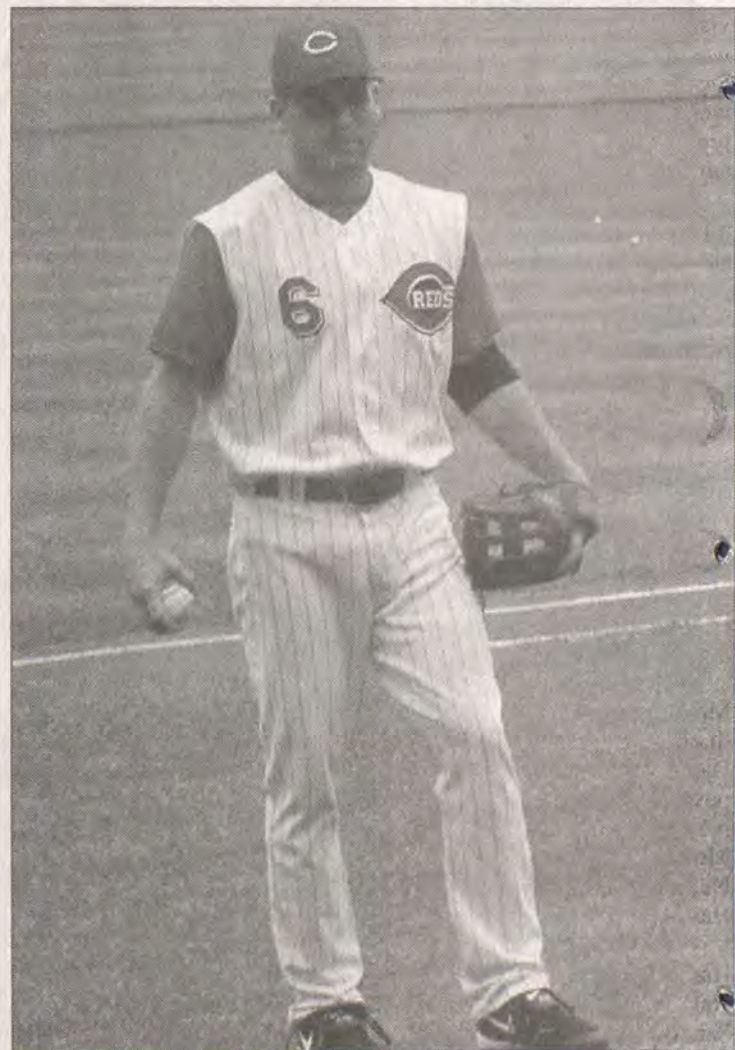

United States, Panama advance to Gold Cup final

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Cutting things close is becoming an art for the U.S. soccer team.

Outplayed for most of the first half and playing the final 30 minutes without their coach, the Americans scored twice in the final seven minutes to beat Honduras 2-1 on Thursday night in the CONCACAF Gold Cup semifinals.

Goals by John O'Brien and Oguchi Onyewu lifted the host Americans into the tournament final for the championship of soccer's North and Central American region on Sunday against Panama, which outlasted Colombia 3-2.

Seven of the Americans' 11 goals in the Gold Cup have come after the 80th minute.

"That's been the theme for this tournament," goalkeeper Kasey Keller said. "We've been leaving things a little late."

You think? The Americans

appeared lost until Onyewu's long feed into the penalty area hit Landon Donovan and then was cleared by Honduran defender Erick Vallecillo — directly to O'Brien. He buried it in the 86th minute.

The United States had been applying pressure throughout the second half, especially after coach Bruce Arena was ejected in the 59th for protesting a foul too vehemently. With the score tied, Arena, watching on television in the locker room, told those around him there was still time for another goal.

He was right. Donovan's 30-yard free kick was headed in by Onyewu, a 6-foot-2 defender who beat goalkeeper Junior Morales from 4 yards for his first goal in eight games with the national team.

"We've been getting opportunities on free kicks and corner kicks all game, and I missed one barely in the first half, but we kept on knocking on the door," Onyewu said. "I think we were bound to get a good opportunity. I

don't think anyone expected it to be in the last minute of the game, but thankfully it happened."

Donovan felt it was inevitable because the team never gives up, not even when nearly all of the 41,721 fans at Giants Stadium are rooting for Honduras. Although the United States appeared headed to its first home loss against a regional rival since Honduras won a World Cup qualifier 3-2 at Washington in September 2001, he never lost faith.

"A lot of teams don't keep fighting there," said Donovan, whose free kick created the game-winner. "A lot of teams kind of throw the towel in and say that's it."

The U.S. team, ranked sixth in the world, also has used late goals in recent World Cup qualifiers with Jamaica and Panama to grab points.

"A couple of important goals — scored at important times," O'Brien said.

Arena departed when Jamaican referee Peter

Prendergast gave him a red card, although Arena said after the game he thought the fourth official, Carlos Batres of Guatemala, ordered the ejection.

"I firmly believe when reasonable people get together, they're going to realize that was a mistake," Arena said. "I don't think there was anything wrong with what I did."

Arena is suspended for Sunday's final. He and Prendergast got into a screaming match following a World Cup qualifier at Costa Rica on July 23, 2000, causing FIFA to suspend Arena for three games, a penalty later reduced to two games.

Honduras, ranked 39th but already out of the running for next year's World Cup, went ahead in the 30th minute when Mario Ivan Guerrero beat goalkeeper Kasey Keller from 20 yards off a cross from Milton Nunez after U.S. defender Frankie Hejduk made a bad pass.

The Central Americans got too conservative in the second

half, though, and it cost them.

"You have to keep attacking against the United States, take advantage of your opportunities," Honduras coach Jose De La Paz said. "Their persistence enables them to come back and win games in the last minutes."

The United States beat Panama 3-0 on the road in World Cup qualifying last month. Sunday's match will be the fourth in 10 1/2 months between the teams. Panama is ranked 83rd.

"Playing the United States can only help Panama's football," coach Jose Hernandez said. "It is a pleasure to play against them and learn against them. We faced them in World Cup qualifiers and lost twice, but we will hope for the best on Sunday."

Panama's first goal, in the 12th minute, came off a free kick by Julio Medina that was backheaded home by Ricardo Phillips. Fourteen minutes later, Luis Moreno made a brilliant run through two defenders on

the right side and fed Jorge Luis Valdes for a left-footed volley.

Although Colombia broke through in the 63rd on Jairo Patino's right-footed shot off an excellent setup by Tressor Moreno, Panama went up 3-2 10 minutes later with Phillips' second goal. Phillips finished off a half-field break with Luis Tejada by sending a precise shot inside the far goalpost.

Patino scored in the 89th minute and Colombia also hit the post in a final push to tie it.

Notes: U.S. defender Eddie Pope sprained his left ankle in the seventh minute when tackled by a Honduran and was replaced in the 15th by Hejduk, with Onyewu shifting to central defense. ... Victor Coello, Honduras' starting goalkeeper, was hurt just before halftime and replaced by Morales. ... Both teams had trouble and frequently flopped onto a field filled with brown spots, one that resembled a poorly kept municipal golf course. "It was slippery. It was soft," Donovan said.

Tom Van De Rostyne, an assistant commonwealth's attorney in Jefferson County, said prosecutors there would decide what to do once they have reviewed the information from Indiana.

Major League Baseball: Reds 9, Cubs 6

CINCINNATI — Once an overheated Greg Maddux started seeing little white dots, his chance to reach the 3,000-strikeout mark was gone.

That wasn't the end of his woozy afternoon. A bullpen meltdown a few innings later cost Maddux that elusive first win at Great American Ball Park as well.

Roberto Novoa (2-3) balked home the tying run in the eighth, and Austin Kearns followed with a two-run single Thursday afternoon, rallying the Cincinnati Reds to a 9-6 victory

over the Chicago Cubs. Javier Valentin homered twice and Rich Aurilia had a solo shot, helping the Reds gain a split of the four-game series.

Maddux lasted only five innings on a steamy afternoon, turning a 5-3 lead over to the bullpen. He has yet to win in four starts at Great American Ball Park, where he has an 8.14 ERA.

He ran the bases twice — on an RBI single and while vainly trying to beat out his double-play grounder. By the end of the fifth, he was spent.

"I don't know what did it," Maddux said. "I just didn't feel right. I started seeing those little white things. It kind of spooked me a little bit."

Maddux struck out four, leaving him two shy of becoming the 13th pitcher to reach the 3,000 mark. He will try again next week at Wrigley Field.

Novoa pitched out of a bases-loaded, none-out threat in

the seventh to preserve a 5-4 lead, with center fielder Jerry Hairston making a diving catch on Aurilia's sinking liner to end the inning.

The Reds rallied in the eighth on a hit, a walk and Novoa's balk, then loaded the bases again with two outs. Kearns, who spent the last six weeks with Triple-A Louisville losing weight and fine-tuning his swing, singled off Ryan Dempster for the go-ahead runs.

Kearns returned to Cincinnati on Wednesday night, too late to get into the game. He batted cleanup Thursday and went 3-for-5 with the most important hit.

"I'm not out for personal issues or to prove people wrong," said Kearns, who wasn't happy with the demotion. "In the past I've tried to do that, and it made it that much harder; I tried to do too much. I learned to relax in Louisville and was reminded that it's a game. It's

nice to get off to a good start."

Aurilia completed the eighth-inning rally with another two-run single off Dempster, the fifth Cubs pitcher. Brian Shacketford (1-0) pitched the eighth for his first major league win.

Running the bases on a humid, 85-degree afternoon sapped Maddux, who went eight innings in each of his last two starts. He gave up Aurilia's solo homer and Valentin's two-run shot.

"You've got to try to keep it in the park here, and I didn't do it very well," Maddux said. "But at least I left some guys on base."

Todd Walker's three-run homer off left-hander Eric Milton put the Cubs up 5-1 in the fourth, but they couldn't hold on against the majors' best comeback team. It was the 14th time the Reds have won by overcoming a deficit of at least three runs, best in the majors.

The NL's top power teams spent the series taking advantage of the majors' most homer-friendly park. More have been hit at Great American than anywhere else.

Aramis Ramirez hit his 25th homer in the ninth for Chicago, which hit 11 in the series to Cincinnati's seven. The Reds have 128 overall this season, two more than the Cubs.

Chicago's problem all series long was stranding runners. The Cubs left nine on base Thursday, four of them in scoring position.

"It is frustrating," manager Dusty Baker said. "They took that game from us. We were hoping that Greg could have gone longer, but he was out of gas after running the bases a couple of times. We had to go to the bullpen a little bit earlier than we wanted to, so our bullpen was really spent today."

The focus was on Maddux, who got his first big league win in Cincinnati in 1986 against the

team he rooted for as a boy. He got a quick start toward the strikeout mark, fanning leadoff batter Ryan Freel on three pitches. He got two more strikeouts in the second, leaving him halfway there.

After that, the four-time Cy Young winner had a more important thing on his mind — keeping cool. Once the dots appeared, he was done.

Notes: Maddux is 19-15 against the Reds. ... C Michael Barrett extended his hitting streak to eight games. ... The Reds sent reliever Ben Weber to Class-A Dayton to start a medical rehabilitation assignment. The right-hander has been on the DL since May 9 with a bulging disc in his neck. ... Milton has given up 30 homers, most in the majors. ... Ramirez's ninth homer at Great American tied him with four others for most by an opponent there. He had four homers in the four-game series.

Nationals lose again, fall into tie for NL East lead

Sole possession of first place is gone, and a matchup with Roger Clemens is looming for the Washington Nationals.

No wonder baseball's feel-good story from the first half of the season isn't feeling so good about its current situation.

"Things are going bad," first baseman Brad Wilkerson said. "They keep swamping on us right now."

Roy Oswalt threw eight shutout innings and delivered his first RBI of the season, part of an 11-hit effort that helped the Houston Astros beat Washington 3-2 on Thursday night.

Washington was perhaps baseball's biggest surprise during most of its first season since moving from Montreal, and led the NL East by 5 1/2 games on July 3. But the Nationals have lost six of eight since the All-Star break and 11 of their last 15, falling into a tie with the Atlanta Braves for first place in the NL East.

In other NL games, it was: the New York Mets 12, San Diego 0; the Los Angeles Dodgers 1, Philadelphia 0; Milwaukee 12, St. Louis 7; Cincinnati 9, the Chicago Cubs 6; and Pittsburgh 8, Colorado 1. While Washington strug-

gles, Houston has turned things around after a dismal start. The Astros have won 12 of 16, and Thursday's victory moved them within 4 1/2 games of the Braves and Nationals for the wild-card lead.

"We have made up a lot of ground since the All-Star break," said Oswalt, who has won seven of his past eight starts. "You have to win ... on the road. That is the biggest thing."

Oswalt (13-8) gave up six hits, struck out six and walked none. Brad Lidge allowed Preston Wilson's two-run homer in the ninth before finishing for his 22nd save.

Nationals starter Esteban Loaiza (6-6) went seven innings, allowing three runs two earned.

Washington also is dealing with a couple of key injuries. Outfielder Jose Guillen, leading the team with 19 homers and 54 RBIs, said he might get a cortisone shot on his injured left side, which would force him to miss time.

The only good news for the Nationals on Thursday was ace Livan Hernandez saying he would continue to pitch despite knee pain. After a loss Wednesday night, the All-Star said he might opt for surgery and not pitch again this season.

"I feel good today. Not 100 percent, but I feel much better, and I'm not going to miss a start," Hernandez said.

Mets 12, Padres 0: At New York, David Wright singled and doubled during a seven-run sixth inning, and the Mets roughed up All-Star Jake Peavy (8-4) to

complete a three-game sweep.

Wright became the first Met this season to have two hits in an inning, and Kazuhisa Ishii (3-8) won at home for the first time since the Mets acquired him from Los Angeles during spring training.

Jose Reyes hit three singles, scored twice, drove in two runs and stole his 31st base. Doug Mientkiewicz homered and drove in two runs, and Ramon Castro hit a two-run homer for New York.

Dodgers 1, Phillies 0: At Philadelphia, Odalis Perez took a no-hitter into the sixth, and Jeff Kent drove in the run.

Left-hander Perez (5-5) allowed just three hits in seven innings, walked none and matched his season high with seven strikeouts.

Jon Lieber (9-9) gave up just five hits, struck out seven and walked one in eight innings, but lost only the second 1-0 game in Citizens Bank Park's two-year history.

Brewers 12, Cardinals 7: At St. Louis, Geoff Jenkins had three hits and three RBIs to extend his batting streak to a career-best 14 games, and Milwaukee capitalized on shoddy defense.

The Brewers' 14-hit effort featured RBI singles from starter Chris Capuano (11-6) and reliever Matt Wise.

Albert Pujols had three hits and an RBI for the Cardinals, although his run of homering in three straight games ended. Jason Marquis (9-7) gave up seven runs and nine hits in four-plus innings.

Ramirez homers on second chance; With Big Unit out, Guerrero hits grand slam

Bad things happen when Manny Ramirez is given a second chance to swing the bat and when the New York Yankees have to turn to their bullpen earlier than expected.

Ramirez homered in the ninth inning, one pitch after third baseman Joe Crede dropped his foul pop and lifted the visiting Boston Red Sox to a 6-5 victory over the Chicago White Sox on Thursday.

"You just knew once Crede dropped that ball that Manny was going to do something special," Boston's Johnny Damon said.

On the next pitch from Luis Vizcaino (4-4), Ramirez hit his 26th homer to left-center and gave the Red Sox the lead after Curt Schilling blew a save in the eighth by giving up a two-out double to Crede.

"It's a humbling feeling. You've got to keep your head up," Crede said.

With Yankees ace Randy Johnson out after six innings because he "tweaked" his back, the Los Angeles Angels rallied behind Vladimir Guerrero's grand slam off reliever Tom Gordon and went on to beat New York 6-5.

"Once I hit it, I thought it was going to go out," said Guerrero, who hesitated as he watched the flight of the ball. "Then I saw Bernie Williams go back and camp out, and I thought I'd better start really running."

Yankees manager Joe Torre pulled Johnson after the sixth because the pitcher seemed to be favoring his back and Torre didn't want to take any chances with his ace.

"Hopefully, he should be ready for his next start," Torre said.

Johnson sounded as if he will. "I kind of dragged my foot and I think my momentum just kind of put a lot more of my body weight on my right side and I felt my back tweak a little bit," he said. "But I've done it before, so I'll be fine. I can touch my toes now and I'll touch my toes tomorrow."

Reliever Scott Proctor walked the one batter he faced and Buddy Groom gave up two hits to load the bases for Guerrero.

Gordon (3-4), who usually pitches the eighth as Mariano Rivera's setup man, said he threw his cut fastball essentially where he wanted it.

"The ball was down, but he was able to get the ball in the air and drive it. There aren't too many guys who can hit that pitch out of the ballpark," Gordon said.

In other AL games, it was: Cleveland 10, Kansas City 1; Toronto 6, Seattle 3; Minnesota 10, Detroit 5; and Oakland 6, Texas 4.

In Chicago, the White Sox tied it in the eighth when Aaron Rowand doubled with one out, went to third on an infield out and scored on Crede's two-out double off Curt Schilling (2-3).

"I'm incredibly disappointed. I forgot the feeling of letting down your starter and your team," Schilling said. "That's probably why I'm so upset about it. It's an adjustment."

Schilling pitched the final two innings in his fifth relief appearance and got his first win since April 18, a game he started. It was his first victory as a reliever since 1992.

In Los Angeles, Jason Giambi homered twice off Bartolo Colon, the second game in a row the Yankees' first baseman hit a pair. Giambi has hit 15 home runs this season, 10 this month.

Alex Rodriguez hit a solo homer, his AL-leading 27th, and Hideki Matsui also hit a solo shot, his 16th for the Yankees. All the home runs came off Colon (12-6).

Colon was one of the most excited Angels in the dugout when Guerrero homered.

"I actually jumped up in the dugout when he hit it," Colon said through a translator. "I said, 'Thank you, Vlad. Now I'll give it to the bullpen.'"

Indians 10, Royals 1: At Cleveland, Johnny Peralta and Victor Martinez hit three-run homers to lead Jake Westbrook (7-12) and the fading Indians to a victory.

The Indians, who were 10 games over .500 on July 4, improved to just 3-11 since by salvaging a split of the four-game series against one of the AL's worst teams.
