Child dies in Pike accident

ZEBULON — An 11-year-old boy was killed in an automobile accident Tuesday.

Mitchell Stone, the son of Donna Charles, of Zebulon Highway in Pike County, was pronounced dead at the scene of an accident on U.S. 119 by Pike County Deputy Coroner Zeb Hampton at approximately 4:39 p.m. Tuesday.

According to the police report, Charles was driving south on U.S. 119 when she lost control of the vehicle, crossed into the northbound lane and struck a 1994 Mazda pickup driven by Ira Thacker.

Charles and her son were both ejected from the vehicle. Charles was taken to Cabell-Huntington Hospital by Med Flight of East Kentucky. A third unnamed passenger in Charles' vehicle was treated and released from Pikeville Medical Center.

The Kentucky Vehicle Enforcement, Pike County Sheriff's office, and the Johns Creek Fire Department responded.

Kentucky State Police Trooper Jason Merlo continues the investigation.

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Suit against FCDA, former head dismissed

PRESTONSBURG — The 1997 lawsuit against the Floyd County Development Authority and then-acting chairman Burl Wells Spurlock was dismissed Monday, the same day it was scheduled for trial.

At the time the suit was filed, Spurlock

told The Times, "I hope they've researched their case. They've gone a long way to name me as part of a suit."

This year marks the end of the long legal argument, pending any future appeals. Circuit Judge John David Caudill issued the order canceling the trial last Tuesday. He also awarded Spurlock, who was accused of fraudulent misrepresentation and breach of contract,

\$4,845.64 in legal fees and reasonable costs.

Monday, Caudill issued a summary judgment in the case, dismissing all claims against Spurlock and the authority.

The suit was filed against the authority and Spurlock, both individually and officially, in March 1997, by Kea-Ham Contracting Inc. The company, which was working to develop the 35.75 acre

Davidson Industrial Site in Ivel where R&S Truck Body Inc. and Appalachian Wireless are now located, alleged that Spurlock fraudulently misrepresented the authority's ability to pay for the project in a 1995 letter to Kea-Ham's bonding insurance agent, River City Insurance Agency.

Business owners claim personal items sold in bankruptcy auction

PRESTONSBURG — Some items auctioned off at two government seized restaurants last week may be returned to the business owners.

Edward and Rebecca Kuss, who attended public auctions at their businesses, the Red Light Diner and Pizza Palace Fun Center, on June 16, argued for the return of personal property in a bankruptcy court hearing Thursday.

A day prior to the auctions at the BLK Enterprises and the Pizza Palace Fun Center, Judge William S. Howard ruled that no personal property would be sold at the public auctions.

The Kusses responded this week with motions for an emergency stay of all disbursements of personal property at the two businesses, as well as items at the Prestonsburg Pawn Shop, which are scheduled to be sold in a series of auctions next month. The Kusses included a list of various personally owned items that they now want returned, along with other vendor supplied or rented equipment that should not be sold.

During the content auction sale at the Red Light Diner Thursday, several items on a long list of equipment personally owned by the Kusses that was rented by BLK Enterprises, was sold. Kuss purchased a video game at the Red Light Diner auc-

tion Thursday.

The contents of the Pizza Palace Fun Center were sold to Kenny Pennington, the owner of the building. Video games, a pinball machine, a long pizza sub station and four carts for pizza boxes, claimed to be Kusses personal property, were sold during the auction.

U.S. Bankruptcy Trustee Phaedra Spradlin asked for documentation of personal property ownership and information regarding missing funds at both restaurants.

Spradlin said in her response that Kuss entered a purchase contract to buy the building, equipment, fixtures and recipes of the

Judge to reconsider motion to dismiss manager's complaint

PRESTONSBURG — A motion to quash a lawsuit filed against Luv Homes by an ex-employee who was fired after fatally shooting an alleged burglar has been put on hold pending a hearing.

Circuit Court Judge Danny P. Caudill issued an order Thursday to hold the matter in abeyance after receiving a motion from the Kirk Law Firm, which represents former Luv Homes manager Michael Kirk.

Kirk was fired from Luv Homes one week after shooting Ronnie Dillion, whom Kirk said had broken into a home on the company's lot in Ivel. In the suit filed against Luv Homes, the Kirk Law Firm wrote that Kirk's Ivel location has suffered a rash of break-ins at the site but could not get approval to pay

for proper monitoring systems to guard the area from intruders.

Judge Caudill noted in his decision that the Kirk firm has gone on record stating that they did not receive notice of last Friday's motion to quash the suit until after it was held.

The order issued by Judge Caudill has allowed for a hearing on the case that is scheduled for July 1 at 9 a.m. during the judge's regularly scheduled civil docket.

The motion that was heard last week to quash the case was based on a technicality that lawyers for Luv Homes contend should go grounds for dismissing the suit in that it was not properly served. The Kirk firm will argue that they merely need to serve the proper representatives of the company at their headquarters in Louisville to get their case back on track.

Theft suspect could face bail-jumping

PRESTONSBURG — An Ivel man who could face up to 20 years in prison for charges of theft, burglary and receiving stolen property failed to show up for his trial Wednesday and could now be charged with bail jumping as well.

A warrant was issued by Judge Danny P. Caudill when Bryan Kidd, 33, failed to show up in court on a charge of receiving stolen property that he incurred in January 2003.

The trial was going to be continued but Kidd failed to communicate with his court-appointed attorney and opted to stay away from the Justice Center. A sheriff's deputy in the courtroom noted that he had seen Kidd in the hallway but a search of the building could not turn him up.

Kidd is also looking at two other charges of burglary and theft by unlawful taking. Those charges were handed down by a grand jury in April, but Kidd has resisted all attempts to contact him by

Charges added in theft ring case

PRESTONSBURG — The investigation into an alleged theft ring which specialized in ATVs, trailers and mining equipment, has led to several arrests and even more charges being brought against one of the first men charged with receiving stolen property.

Kevin Hutchinson, of

Teaberry, has been charged with receiving stolen property four times since the case broke, with the latest two charges being waived to a grand jury after a preliminary hearing Wednesday.

Deputy Delmas Johnson testified at the hearing that Hutchinson was identified by a man at a mining operation in McDowell who observed him bringing in a mining buggy and selling it

to the company. That buggy turned out to have been stolen from Pike County.

Steve Owens, attorney for Hutchinson, asked Johnson if he knew who stole the buggy and Johnson replied that he didn't and that he only charged Hutchinson with receiving it.

Owens tried a different tack and asked Johnson if he

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Odds & Ends

■ **KALAMAZOO, Mich.** — Someone is stealing parking meters — poles and all — from the city's downtown.

Fifty-seven of Kalamazoo's approximately 1,000 meters were taken in 10 days. None could hold more than about \$10

in change.

Several stolen meters, some damaged beyond repair, have been recovered alongside roads and in local parks, said Sgt. Scott Merlo of the Kalamazoo Department of Public Safety.

The rash of brazen, public

thefts began June 10 when five meters were pulled from the ground near Kalamazoo Avenue and Church Street and on East South Street, Merlo said.

As recently as Monday, a stolen meter was recovered on Grant Street. The same person

or group of people appears to be responsible, he said.

"Somebody that is that brazen to do something in public, to take that big of a chance for that little of a gain is someone that is definitely desperate for money," Merlo said.

This is the city's second outbreak of parking meter thefts this year. In March, 20 downtown meters were broken into and damaged during two separate incidents, although no supporting poles were taken, Merlo said.

■ **LAS VEGAS** — A man accused of holding up a pizza parlor gave police a roadmap to his door when he accidentally left behind a job application with his real name and address, authorities said.

"I would chalk it up to either inexperience or plain stupidity," Clark County prosecutor Frank Coumou told the Las Vegas Review-Journal for a Wednesday report.

Alejandro Martinez, 23, of Las Vegas, was being held Wednesday at the Clark County jail pending a Monday appearance in Clark County District Court. He faces felony burglary and robbery with a weapon charges in the May 25 heist.

Authorities said Martinez ordered a pizza and started filling out the application before displaying a gun and demanding money. The clerk handed over \$200.

Outside, a witness also wrote down the license plate number of a getaway car.

Martinez' lawyer, Deputy Public Defender James Ruggieri, said authorities have the wrong man. He said the pizza shop clerk couldn't identify Martinez as the robber, and the job application was not presented as evidence at a preliminary hearing.

■ **ALEXANDRIA, La.** — Arco won't be a hot dog this summer.

Arco is one of four police dogs on the Alexandria police force who will be nice and cool after the department installs a special system in K-9 officers' patrol cars.

The temperature in a closed car in Louisiana can quickly rise to fatal levels for a dog.

Under the Hot-n-Pop system, when an officer gets out of the vehicle, he or she leaves it running so the dog can remain in the air conditioning. But the system automatically rolls down the windows and starts a fan if the car stalls or the air condi-

tioner fails.

The device also triggers the lights and siren and beeps the officer's pager.

The installation costs \$1,000 dollars per car, said Capt. Robert Wagner, patrol division commander. But officials say it's worth it to keep their canine cops safe in the heat.

■ **FAIRFIELD, Calif.** — Someone has lost a ton of pot.

Investigators uncovered a marijuana farm with more than 23,000 plants in Solano County, sheriff's officials said.

Deputies said the pot was growing in a steep canyon area northwest of Vacaville. The plants were watered through a sophisticated irrigation system, with some pipes up to four miles long.

Investigators estimated the value of the marijuana crop could have been as high \$117 million dollars. The illegal weed was destroyed.

Officials have not made any busts, but said they found some campsites apparently used by the pot growers.

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Top Fletcher aides called before special grand jury

FRANKFORT — Gov. Ernie Fletcher's current and former chiefs of staff appeared briefly before a special grand jury Thursday that is investigating administration personnel practices.

Current chief of staff Stan Cave, a former legislator, appeared before the grand jury for about five minutes before accompanying prosecutor Scott

Crawford-Sutherland to a private meeting with a Franklin County circuit court judge.

"I am concerned and troubled by the manner in which the AG has handled this investigation," Cave said.

That concern explains his brief appearance, Cave said declining to answer further questions. Cave was a Republican member of the Kentucky House of Representatives from 1993 to 2000.

Previous witnesses who followed such a procedure have acknowledged they invoked their constitutional right against self-incrimination.

Former chief of staff Daniel Groves also appeared briefly before the grand jury Thursday before going to see the judge.

The grand jury was impaneled on June 6 and is investigating personnel practices in the administration. It has been moving quickly, seeing nearly two dozen witnesses in five previous

meetings and indicting three Transportation Cabinet officials on misdemeanor charges they violated Merit System laws.

Acting Transportation Secretary Bill Nighbert, Deputy Secretary Jim Adams and Commissioner Dan Druen each face three charges they conspired to fire the cabinet's deputy inspector general, Mike Duncan, because of his political affiliation and support of Democrat Ben Chandler in the 2003 gubernatorial election.

The three are scheduled to be arraigned July 12 and their attorneys have indicated they intend to plead innocent. Gov. Ernie Fletcher has said they will continue in their posts and make personnel decisions while the case is pending.

The investigation began after a 30-year employee in the Transportation Cabinet delivered stacks of memos, copied e-mails and personnel records to Attorney General Greg Stumbo's office.

Both charges were passed on to a grand jury and add to the two others that were passed a few weeks ago.

Church offers service for emergency workers

WATERGAP — The Allen Baptist Church sent out letters this week to area law enforcement, emergency personnel and firehouses, inviting their staff members and families who serve the community to a special mass that will honor their contributions

to keeping Floyd County safe.

Pastor Arnold Turner has scheduled the service for July 3 at 11 a.m. and wrote in his letter that, "In light of what our country has been going through since 9-11-01, we felt the need to recognize and honor the service of law enforcement officers, military personnel, firefighters, emergency service personnel and veterans, living and deceased."

The celebration is also aimed at the families of people who serve, who, Turner noted, must make sacrifices as well.

The service is open to the public and Turner encourages all who serve the public to come in uniform if they would like. The service will include a video presentation as well as recognition for those who "make our freedom and safety possible."

Red Light Diner for \$225,000 in February 2001, but Kuss did not specifically list any items included in the contract.

"The Kusses have engaged in systematic abuse of the bankruptcy court in order to prevent their creditors and taxing entities from being paid," Spradlin argued. "Ms. Kuss failed to cooperate with the U.S. Trustee, as she had failed to cooperate with the Chapter 13 Trustee in 2004 and has failed to cooperate with me."

Bankruptcy Judge William S. Howard ruled that Spradlin could sell the equipment described in the schedules of the Red Light Diner, along with

items at the Pizza Palace, but he gave the Kusses 15 days to provide documentation of personal property ownership.

In her response, Spradlin alleges that bank deposits of the two restaurants do not match the state sales and usage tax returns for January, February and March. The Red Light Diner took in \$63,650.85, Spradlin argues, but the amount was not deposited into the business' account. Spradlin also alleges that \$15,624.69 received by Pizza Palace between January and March was not deposited.

Spradlin suggested that Kuss provide an accounting of the missing money before pursuing

any claim of ownership of personal property.

In court Thursday, the Kusses also argued for an emergency stay of the auction at the Prestonsburg Pawn Shop.

"There have been many articles, documents and other personal articles reported to have been removed and/or lost from the building which is under the care, custody and control of the Trustee and her agent and to these possible losses becomes evident that more personal property may become missing from the premises and therefore to abide by this court's orders of the rightful owner of personal property shall have it back and it

shall not be sold or discarded," Kuss wrote in her motion.

In her response, Spradlin said she was unaware of any items removed by her or her agents other than documents pertaining to the contents of the business. Spradlin asked her agent, auctioneer Jim Gambill, to remove a filing cabinet containing firearm record sales for "future review."

"The pawn shop is locked and cannot be accessed by anyone not authorized to enter it," Spradlin wrote. "Trustee states that some pawned items have been redeemed by their owners. A record of these redemptions will be provided to the court." Spradlin requested a list of personal items in the pawn shop and promised to attempt to locate them and return them to the Kusses.

Howard ruled that all guns in the Pawn Shop will be sold, and that Spradlin would hold all "strictly personal articles."

Dismissed

Officials affiliated with the project said that R&S Truck Body was considering leaving Floyd County at that time because they had outgrown their business space. In a purchase agreement with the Authority, R&S agreed to buy a portion of the site, construct a 200,000 square foot manufacturing facility and relocate its operations there.

According to the summary judgment, the authority obtained more than \$2 million in funds through the Floyd County Fiscal Court and grant money from the Kentucky Economic Development Finance Authority and the Kentucky Department of Local Government, that would be disbursed to the Authority to pay for the project. The authority hired Summit Engineering as an independent contractor to survey and develop plans for the project. Kea-Ham was awarded the lowest bid (\$1,183,975) during an October 1995 authority meeting.

Officials with the authority and Summit Engineering were "seriously concerned about Kea-Ham's lack of experience and ability to complete the project," Caudill wrote in judgment, because the bid was 24 percent below Summit's estimates and 43 percent below the median bid received. Kea-Ham reassessed its bid and "felt comfortable that it could complete the project for the amount of its bid," Caudill wrote.

Kea-Ham was awarded the approximate \$1.2 million contract for the job in October 1995. The company began work in November 1995, but ceased work the following spring, when the authority delayed paying its second and third invoices. They "walked off the job" in January 1997, according to the file, without completing their contract work.

That decision, Caudill ruled, came after former Floyd County Judge-Executive Ben Hale told William Stevens, shareholder and vice president of Kea-Ham, that he "had not signed the contract with Kea-Ham" and that he "decided not to go forward with the R&S project, even though the Floyd County Fiscal Court had already applied for and received several grants."

"Hale told Stevens that 'the Development Authority couldn't do it without his blessing,'" Caudill wrote. "Hale also told Stevens and Kea-Ham that the Floyd County Fiscal Court did

not intend to pay the invoices."

The subsequent suit alleged seven counts against the authority (breach of contract, negligent misrepresentation, estoppel, breach of warranty, and fraud) and two counts against Spurlock (fraud and negligent misrepresentation). The 1995 letter should have provided a more detailed description of the authority's financing arrangement, they argued, and the omission of that information was fraudulent.

Kea-Ham claimed that because of the inaccuracies, they had to do more work than was contemplated during the bidding process. Judge Caudill ruled this month that they were obligated by the contract before the letter was written.

After the authority obtained grant funding, it made arrangements to submit progress payments to Kea-Ham as work was completed.

River City Insurance contacted Spurlock shortly after Kea-Ham received the contract award, requesting information regarding frequency of progress payments the authority would make to Kea-Ham. Spurlock replied in the Nov. 5, 1995, letter, stating that the company would be paid through invoices presented on a monthly basis.

"The authority has interim financing approved in the amount of \$1.5 million from the Bank Josephine ... which will be supplemented by LGEDF (coal severance tax) of \$1,460,000 and CDBG of \$595,555," he wrote.

Even though Kea-Ham alleged misrepresentation, that letter, the "basis" of the complaint, was consistent with the authority's meeting minutes and the loan commitment with the Bank Josephine, Caudill ruled.

Caudill entered a summary judgment in the case on April 12, deciding that Kea-Ham could not prove its allegations against Spurlock. All claims were dismissed against him. Kea-Ham followed with a motion to vacate that judgment. It was denied by an April 15 order in which Caudill also dismisses the claims against the authority with prejudice, but the judgment was vacated in favor of Spurlock and the Authority.

The matter was in court again

on June 10, but Kea-Ham failed to respond to Spurlock's affidavit or another motion for summary judgment submitted by the authority.

The contract agreement stipulated that any cessation of work for reasons beyond the authority's control would not entitle Kea-Ham to assert a claim for damages.

Kea-Ham's claims, Caudill wrote, fail as a matter of law. One of the most interesting aspects of the case revolves around a 2000 Supreme Court decision that reversed the circuit court decision in a previous summary judgment.

The first summary judgment was entered in the case in August 1997 in Floyd County Circuit Court, where all counts were dismissed against Spurlock because of sovereign immunity regulations. The charges against the authority, however, were not dismissed because the organization had insurance that could pay for damages.

After appeal, Supreme Court Justice Joseph Lambert entered an order saying that neither Spurlock nor the authority were protected by sovereign immunity. Lambert declared the authority as an "independent municipal corporation with several means of funding," and not a governmental board that would be immune from civil suit claims. In his ruling, Caudill described the authority as "a public nonprofit governmental entity created by the Floyd Fiscal Court" that "operates as an agency of the Floyd Fiscal Court."

Spurlock said Tuesday that he disagreed with the Supreme Court decision.

"I urged our county judge to go to the County Judge's Association and get the legislature to define sovereign immunity — who's got it, who doesn't — and not to leave it to the courts to decide," he said.

Spurlock said people will now not want to serve on similar boards if they know they aren't protected by sovereign immunity.

Kea-Ham filed its last annual report with the secretary of state on July 22, 1996. A certificate of administrative dissolution was filed.

his lawyer.

Kidd was represented by Jim Adkins, who has since left the state and been replaced by Julio Collado of the public advocate's office. Collado has yet to meet his client and has not heard from him since taking over for Adkins last month.

When Kidd chose not to attend his arraignment on the new charges in April, a warrant was issued and his information was fed into a national database but he has not been found.

A bailiff mentioned that he often saw Kidd at horse shows and would have collared him if he had known about the warrant. "We will now be seeking to

add a charge of bail jumping for Mr. Kidd," said Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Wayne Taylor.

Kidd was free on a \$5,000 cash bond when he stopped coming to court and will now have to forfeit that money. Taylor observed that should Kidd be found, then bond will be a paramount issue now that Kidd has shown that he is considered a certain flight risk.

Though President Bush was sworn in for his second term less than six months ago, the 2008 race for the White House has been stirring up since, well, Election Night 2004. Makes a body want to cover ears and eyes and scream.

The latest Democrat to confirm that he's serious about seeking the presidency is Delaware Sen. Joseph Biden, who was a candidate in 1988. He joins a list of wannabes or possibilities such as Sens. John Kerry of Massachusetts, George Allen of Virginia and New York's Hillary Clinton.

Never mind that most of the senators face re-election bids next year. But since when did an expensive and stressful campaign for re-election interfere with long-range ambitions?

There. That's the problem. Politicians are almost always looking ahead to the next election. While they obviously don't dislike having their names bandied about, and the speculation guarantees paychecks for political pundits, the year-round "who is in and who is not" has become exasperating.

So what if Arnold Schwarzenegger is prohibited from running for president because he is foreign born? Speculation is near feverish that the former Hollywood action character is getting his ducks in a row. Remember, Schwarzenegger was elected California governor less than two years ago. Talk about the fast track.

Earmuffs and blinders anyone? Or just go ahead and scream.

The Dallas Morning News, on how do you say "good ol' boy network" in Arabic?:

At the FBI, too few ranking managers know the answer, according to the latest broadside against the bureau's post-Sept. 11 efforts toward reform.

The scathing critique focuses on the lack of expertise in counterterrorism among high-level managers responsible for just that. It's tempting to dismiss the charge as bellyaching, since it comes from a lawyer representing an agent an Arabic-speaking, Egyptian-born American citizen who was passed over for promotion and is now suing the bureau.

But consider that the criticism comes after the following in recent weeks alone:

A blistering report from a bipartisan presidential commission that faulted the FBI for "ambitions (that) have led it into unnecessary new turf battles with the CIA."

A Justice Department report identifying FBI weaknesses that led to the Sept. 11 attacks. Citing "rapid turnover" among counterterrorism managers at FBI headquarters, the report said they often lack "time, ability or incentive to acquire the expert knowledge related to their functions."

An update from the Sept. 11 commission expressing disappointment in the FBI's failure to develop a new \$170 million computerized case-management system. "We have been taken aback," said commissioner Jamie Gorelik, former deputy attorney general.

To be fair, the Justice report cites significant changes by the bureau to bulk up intelligence gathering and analysis. The FBI has received good marks for better information sharing with other agencies. And, bowing to the presidential commission, it will allow the White House's national intelligence director to help fill the FBI's No. 3 position of intelligence chief.

But it concerns us that the FBI's official rebuttal nitpicks the Justice finding of harmful turnover among counterterrorism supervisors. "It is not 'rapid turnover' from an FBI perspective," the bureau said.

Hold on there. The FBI perspective is just what needs changing, according to critique after critique. Failure to bend in the strong winds of change hobbles the bureau's efforts to become just what the country needs: an agency that anticipates malevolent acts not just cleans up after them.

High schools out of date, failing to prepare students

Most of Kentucky's high schools — reflecting national conditions — haven't kept up with the times. "If Rip Van Winkle woke up today, one place he would be most comfortable is in the high school," says Willard Daggett, head of the International Center for Leadership in Education.

A recent report from the Prichard Committee concludes that high schools are not preparing enough students with the skills and knowledge they need to succeed after graduation, whether that means more education or going to work. And convincing people that all high school students need to develop the same skills makes the challenge even more daunting. Many Kentuckians think our high schools are doing just fine as they are.

There is no question that some of our high schools have improved. Kentucky's college-going rate, for instance, has jumped dramatically since 1998. But the progress is falling short of what we need, and the obsolete design of high schools is making it almost impossible to pick up the pace of improvement.

The fact is that high schools today look pretty much the same as they did when they were invented in the 1880s, a time when unskilled, routine, physical labor was the norm. High schools were

designed to sort students — those who were expected to run things in society received the best education. No one even thought about all students reaching a respectable level of proficiency.

Today some level of postsecondary education is the ticket to middle class jobs, or better, for everyone. Today a college graduate will earn on average \$16,000 more per year than a high school grad, and \$21,000 per year more than a dropout. Even a high school graduate will earn \$6,000 more than the non-grad. Do the math — that's income of hundreds of thousands for a life's work — and we're only talking about the average, not the top earners.

But as postsecondary knowledge and skills become more critical, the shame is that far too many young people are not prepared to acquire them. The pipeline looks like this: of every 100 ninth graders who enter high school, 68 will graduate; of the 68 who graduate, 39 will go on to college; of the 39 who enroll in college, only 15 will have graduated six years later.

Clearly, we've got quite a way to go before we'll be doing just fine. The recommendations in the Prichard Committee's "High Achieving High Schools" report reflect the following key points.

We believe that there is general agreement among those who are studying these problems about how to fix them. Having the will and capability to make needed changes is another matter. It's no accident that high schools have been the way they are for a century or more. High schools need strong encouragement and incentives to embrace change.

We believe we should increase academic expectations for all students — and we mean all — and tell students, teachers and parents that a successful future requires a tougher curriculum now. It

doesn't matter whether a student has plans for postsecondary education; knowledge and skills for those going into the workforce are often higher than those required for college. Experts tell us the reading levels required for many entry level construction or factory jobs are about the same for a standard college-level business school textbook or War and Peace.

This means that every student must successfully complete what is now known as a college preparatory curriculum, whether they plan on postsecondary education or not. Research also shows that students, particularly those who are struggling now, want to be challenged, not bored.

What else?

- Create uniform course content across all schools, since all courses with the same name aren't the same, and hold students accountable with end-of-course or competency exams.

- Remove obstacles, like current state scholarship rules that reward good grades in undemanding courses.

- Make sure all teachers have the preparation and training they need to teach all students at high levels in challenging courses, and reform the teacher pay system to attract and retain the most skilled teachers.

- Encourage high school students to take postsecondary courses through dual credit arrangements.

- Make the senior year worthwhile — not a vacation.

- Find, train and reward superb high school principals.

- Make sure every student has at least one adult who cares about him or her personally.

- Concentrate on the 9th grade, the transition year that sets the pattern for

ABC drama 'Empire' brings ancient Rome to summer TV

LOS ANGELES — ABC is gambling that summer viewers might enjoy a Roman holiday, circa 40 B.C.

Movie theaters are dominated by various kinds of blockbusters at this time of year, "Empire" executive producer Tony Jonas figures, so maybe the same approach will work on the small screen.

"While the rest of television is doing reality shows, you're going to have this gigantic, sumptuous epic that, hopefully, comes into the American consciousness as feature films have been doing for so long," Jonas said.

ABC's ratings success also affected scheduling for "Empire." Enjoying a resurgence with newly minted hits including "Desperate Housewives" and "Lost," the network kept its regular-season lineup intact.

A summer airing offered two advantages, according to Quinn Taylor, the network's senior vice president for TV movies. The National Basketball Association finals on ABC create a strong promotional base for the series, he said.

And as one of the few pieces of original drama on

broadcast TV this summer, "Empire" is counterprogramming both to reality shows and to cable's flood of fiction that includes HBO's "Six Feet Under."

Billed as a six-hour limited series, "Empire" begins with the assassination of Julius Caesar and follows a dramatized version of the ascension of his nephew and heir, the teenage Octavius.

The series debuts with a two-hour episode at 9 p.m. Tuesday followed by hourlong episodes on four successive Tuesdays at 10 p.m.

(Cautionary note to students: Don't attempt to base a term paper on "Empire," which occasionally swaps historical accuracy for dramatic effect in time-honored Hollywood fashion.)

Despite early media buzz that had its fate in jeopardy, "Empire" is a richly cinematic and impressive production. A solid ensemble of mostly British actors is at ease in togas and carrying the weight of epic storytelling.

Among the cast: Colm Feore as Caesar; Santiago Cabrera as Octavius; Vincent Regan as Marc Antony and Emily Blunt as Camane. Jonathan Cake plays the pivotal and fictional character of Tyrannus, a gladiator who becomes Octavius' protector

and mentor.

The avoidance of American actors (one exception is Dennis Haysbert of "24") was a deliberate bid to keep well-known faces out of the drama, Jonas said. He also figures British accents help suggest an ancient and removed era.

"The idea was what can we do to ease our audience into what's kind of a difficult buy, which is to traverse 2,000 years," Jonas said.

Cake, who stars this fall in NBC's new drama "Inconceivable," drew closer to Tyrannus — a principled man and ex-slave who's ferocious in battle — by doing his own stunt work. The athletic actor, a rugby fan, worked out with a trainer for months prior to filming in Rome last year.

"Getting a lump or bruise or cut on the hand makes you feel a little bit less like the cosseted, very spoiled actor that you are if you're doing a production where everybody's treating you nicely and asking if you want a cup of coffee," he said.

There was some risk given that real swords were used in close-ups to provide authenticity. In a scene in which Tyrannus fights to free his son from kidnappers in an ancient and musty underground temple, a cut quickly became infected and required a hospital

visit for Cake.

(His five months in Italy, however, ended on a high note: He and actress Julianne Nicholson were married there after filming wrapped.)

Besides positioning itself as a TV-sized blockbuster, "Empire" seems to be aping the movies by beating a competitor to the screen. HBO is bringing the 12-part drama series "Rome," set in 52 B.C., on in the fall.



"We were filming at exactly the same time," recalled Cake. "We'd meet up in Roman restaurants to have a 'hands across the Tiber (river)' evening to compare notes on our productions."

The joking suggestion was made that he and a "Rome" actor whose character was also handy with a sword should "just go at it to settle the whole thing."

A tale of two soldiers who become involved in the sweep of events, "Rome" is being positioned by HBO as a potential continuing series. Jonas would like to see the same for "Empire" and is ready if viewers give it an arena-style thumbs-up.

"There's closure in Episode 6, but there are story lines that could launch right out in more quests for power," he said. "It's not being tied up in a nice little ribbon."

Hollywood rolled out the big guns this week with a slew of new releases that feature more than a few duds.

"Coach Carter" — Samuel L. Jackson tries hard here as a real-life coach who locked athletes out of practice until they improved their grades. Jackson tries hard but the cliché-ridden script tends to ignore character development and offers one too many game sequences which are meant to be suspenseful but wind up being repetitive.

"Cursed" — Wes Craven returns with his latest horror opus which, unfortunately, suffers from a fair amount of production tampering. The film was nearly completed when Miramax studios decided to make some changes in the script

which necessitated halting production and firing some of the cast. The stall also cost the film when Academy Award-winning makeup whiz Rick Baker ("An American Werewolf in London") moved on to other projects. The end result focuses on a brother/sister pair who are turned into werewolves, but the whole thing lacks bite. The studio is offering the film in an unrated edition that restores some of the gore effects but can do little to mend the fractured narrative.

"Hostage" — Critics savaged this action/suspense outing but it's worth a look. Bruce Willis stars as a hostage negotiator trapped between a rock and a hard place when hoods take a family hostage. Turns out the family patriarch is also a mob accountant. The mob responds by taking Willis' fami-

ly hostage in order to control the situation, which quickly becomes unbearable for Willis. An intriguing premise based on a novel by Robert Crais.

"Miss Congeniality 2" — Sandra Bullock returns in this so-so sequel which finds her FBI character drafted to do public relations work for the agency. William Shatner also returns and is taken hostage, which forces Bullock to go back into action. Not very good and Bullock has been better.

"Dark Water" — This one is probably the best bet this week. Hideo Nakata ("The Ring") directed this Japanese effort which focuses on a woman who relocates to a cheaper apartment with her young daughter while in the midst of an ugly divorce. Things get worse when their apartment turns out to be haunted by the spirit of an abused

child. Nakata manages to wring suspense out of common household noises here and the film builds steadily towards its grim and shocking finale.

Next-week look for Vin Diesel trying a change of pace as he plays baby-sitter to an unruly bunch of children in "The Pacifier."

 It is also critical that we explain to parents and the public why higher expectations will help their families and communities. Parents, employers and community voices need to talk to young people about responsibility, initiative, perseverance and respect for others. The message that it is important to work hard now, as

teenagers, for future gain must come from the home as well as the school. Parents, in short, must be more productively engaged.
 None of this will happen if we don't keep doing — and doing better — the initiatives Kentucky began in 1990 to improve its schools. We will never have high achieving high schools unless we have high achieving elementary and middle schools.
 Fortunately, Kentucky has a lot going for it. Some high schools are already moving in the

direction we suggest. State officials are hard at work on reform plans, and Gov. Ernie Fletcher is focused on the challenge. Other organizations like the Partnership for Kentucky Schools are pushing for needed changes.
 The good news, then, is that there is a buzz across the state and that momentum is building. But we must move now from buzz to action if we are going to reach our goal of providing a high-quality education for every Kentuckian.

Hearing for former aide expected today

PRESTONSBURG — Circuit Judge John David Caudill will preside over a hearing Friday in a Floyd County Board of Education case filed by a certified special education teacher who is suing because the board will not hire him.
 Hueysville resident John Hicks, who was employed as a special education teacher by the Floyd County Board of Education for 12 years, was fired from his position at South Floyd Middle School on Oct. 4, 1999, by Supt. Paul Fanning.
 The termination came after investigations were conducted by the Department of Education's Division of Management and the school district.
 According to an affidavit submitted by Fanning in October 1999, Hicks "unprofessionally" provided students with answers to open response questions, wrote entries for student portfolios (a violation of the Code of Ethics) and provided accommodations not specified in the students' IEPs during special education testing.
 "I had and have in my possession an abundance of documented evidence demonstrating that Mr. Hicks is unsuitable for appointment and that he has sanctions applied to his teaching certificate in violation of board policy 03.11 (2)," Fanning wrote.
 The CATS investigative report, filed by Director Jim Jackson in August 1999, alleges that Hicks provided accommodations not consistent with four students' IEPs and that

five other students had expired IEPs. The report also says that Hicks provided his seventh- and eighth-grade students with answers during the 1999 CATS test and that he "may have" written some portfolio answers.
 The file included statements from those students. Many told investigators that Hicks helped them write or bubble in the answers on their tests.
 Hicks, who routinely denied the allegations, told officials that he had not received appropriate training prior to administering the test at South Floyd Middle School. Principal Zenith Hall, however, supplied documentation, signed by Hicks, that showed he attended training sessions at the school.
 Hicks said in his deposition, filed last November, that he had pending lawsuits against the boards of education in Floyd, Magoffin and Knott counties.
 His argument, purported by his attorney Timothy Parker, is that school boards cannot certify the need to hire teachers on emergency certificates unless it is impossible to find qualified teachers to fill those positions.
 Hicks testified that he applied for positions at several school districts in surrounding counties — 110 separate applications in Pike County alone — and has not been hired, even though he holds special education certification.
 Judge Caudill will decide Friday whether to grant Parker's motion for summary judgment or another motion by board attorney Michael J. Schmitt to assign a date for trial.

Parker argues, on behalf of Hicks, that summary judgment should be awarded because Hicks was not hired for positions he applied for that were subsequently filled by teachers who weren't certified in special education, a violation, he alleges, of KRS 161.100.
 "The defendant has acknowledged that the plaintiff was not hired for positions that were filled by teachers not certified in special education," Parker wrote.
 Hicks accepted an admonishment by the board and settled with them under the condition that he would be reinstated to his employment and would resign at the end of the 1999-2000 school year. Parker argues that the admonishment received by Hicks is not sufficient to relieve the board from the regulations of the emergency certification statute.
 "The plaintiff was advised by the superintendent of the Floyd County Board of Education that he would not be offered any position of employment with the Floyd County Board of Education," Parker wrote.
 Hicks is entitled to \$161,603.02 in back pay, Parker argues.
 In his motion, Schmitt requests a trial because "this case has been subject of several summary judgment motions filed by both the plaintiff and the defendant, all of which have been heretofore overruled."
 Schmitt says both sides have requested a trial and that numerous depositions have been taken and the case "has been sufficiently developed" for the assignment of a trial date.

McGuire presides over Bar Foundation's annual meeting

LOUISVILLE — On June 9, the Kentucky Bar Foundation held its annual meeting at the Hyatt Regency in Louisville.

Prestonsburg attorney Mickey McGuire, president of the Kentucky Bar Foundation, assisted by Chief Justice of the Kentucky Supreme Court, Joe Lambert, on behalf of the Foundation handed out charitable contributions of over \$70,000.

Receiving a \$4,000 grant was Appalachian Citizens Law Center of Prestonsburg contributing funding to Mine Safety Institute.

Also receiving a grant was the Fred M. Vinson Memorial Foundation of Louisa, of \$4,000. The Museum in Louisa is dedicated to Fred M. Vinson, the son of a jailer, who became Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court in June 1946 and served until he died in 1953. Vinson served in all three branches of government — legislative, judicial and executive branches. In his first term in Congress, he gave a speech defending Kentucky. His remarks contained in the Congressional records state "when the radiant sun rears its majestic head above the waters of the Big Sandy and the mighty Ohio on its Eastern shore, throughout the day it retains a most happy status in its journey across Kentucky; and when its golden glow, in the even time, sinks into the turbulent waters of the Mississippi it leaves

Kentucky with a feeling of gloom and sadness exhibited in its very face."

The Bar Foundation reported contributions and pledges in excess of \$300,000 for the year and the endowment fund has now grown in excess of \$1.4 million. The Foundation contributes to charities on an annual basis with the purpose of providing access to justice.

McGuire will be replaced next year by incoming President Bill Arvin from Nicholasville. New officers include Warren Keller, president-elect, from London; Gary Sargent, vice president, of Northern Kentucky; and Stan Keys, secretary/treasurer, from Paducah.

Over 200 attorneys and guests attended the 2005 Foundation Luncheon and Grant Awards.

In his remarks, McGuire said he believed our background and circumstances have a great influence on who we

are, but we are responsible for who we become. McGuire said he was blessed by having three great passions in life. First, the practice of law, an honorable profession; second, ballroom dancing, where he has competed from California to Western Europe, in a World Championship event; and third, the opportunity to serve as president of the Kentucky Bar Foundation. "It has truly been a rewarding experience to have served with so many distinguished colleagues," McGuire said.

McGuire thanked the audience for their contributions and the service each has made to the Foundation. McGuire then introduced the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, Joseph Lambert, who addressed the luncheon and echoed his appreciation for the contributions all had made to the Foundation.

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Running afoul?

My friend Chuck Damron used to say he thought there should be no fouling out in basketball.

I thought about this on Tuesday as I watched the fourth quarter of Game Six in the NBA Finals. Detroit, a seven-player team who surprisingly has overcome this drastic limitation, spent part of the final period with its only five available players – at least in the opinion of Larry Brown – on the court.

Why? Tayshaun Prince had "tweaked" an ankle – Stu Scott's words, not mine – while Rasheed Wallace had five fouls.

So with the season hanging in the balance,

one of Detroit's best defenders was sidelined with foul difficulty while the other was having a wheel realigned.

So as I sat here watching the possible long-overdue end to basketball's 2004-05 season, I thought about my friend Chuck Damron.

I used to listen to Chuck and Gene Davis often during basketball season when they were the voices of the Pikeville Panthers and I was the sports editor of the local paper. Anytime I left a gymnasium I immediately dialed in to see what was happening in another, and often wound up listening to Chuck.

I remember two things vividly from his time on the radio: The phrase "walk-no-call" has been burned into my memory, and his theory about fouling out.

I also remember being at basketball games played in the "new" T.W. Oliver Memorial Gymnasium during his tenure. The announcers, of course, sit courtside at Pikeville, right at the scorers table, which meant they were always in the sites of officials who were signaling fouls to the table.

I always laughed and shook my head at Damron, who often took umbrage with the guys in stripes, and always took pride in showing his displeasure: Holding a big sheet of paper to emphasize his jesture, Damron would wave off the official so that all could see, and no doubt was repeating the same word to those listening on WPKE:

"Awful. Just awful."

The best thing about Damron is that he often did this when calls were made against the opposition, not just when they went against his Panthers.

But I digress.

It was Damron's theory that no player should be forced out of a game due to fouls. He liked the foul limit, but believed penalties should only be a stiffer punishment, not being banished to the sideline. If Jody Thompson, for example, picked up his sixth foul, Jody's opponent would be allowed two shots and the ball, but he would still be allowed to play.

That would deter a player from just hacking away, but still keep said player in the game down the stretch.

I mention my friend Mr. Thompson because of a well-publicized night his senior year during the 15th Region tournament at Johnson Central. I sat on one end of the press table on the stage and another fellow named Rick – Mr. Pitino, if I recall – sat at the other.

Da Coach was there for one reason and one only – to see Jody play – but instead got to see one of the 13th Region's quote-unquote "finest" send him to the bench a couple of minutes into the game with fouls.

Pitino had to be thinking what every single other person in the packed arena thought: We didn't come here to watch this jerk call. Yet while he stayed on

the court, Jody had the best seat not located directly beside one of the two Ricks for the remainder of the half.

Which, by the way, is where the infamous Mr. Wallace sat on Tuesday night while his Pistons tried to hold it together down the stretch.

And I wondered if my friend Chuck Damron – who, by the way, all these years later is the father-in-law of one Jody Thompson – might modify his rule-change slightly.

Says here if that rule is ever considered, I hope they add one stipulation: If one of your fouls was a technical, you leave when you reach the limit.

Players may deserve a break like the one Chuck suggests, but they don't deserve one when it comes to crunch time. If you can't hold your composure, you need to sit.

In the end, it didn't matter. Wallace returned to the court along with Prince and led their team to a 95-86 win, forcing last night's deciding game, the first Game Seven in NBA history in 11 years.

But I wonder if my friend Mr. Damron would mind my minor adjustment of his rule recommendation for those who have issues with their composure.

I've never totally ruled out Damron's idea. I hope he wouldn't mind mine.

Wheeless' ninth-inning homer sends Longhorns back to CWS championship series

OMAHA, Neb. — Chance Wheeless' right shoulder hurt so much in the sixth inning that he couldn't even run out a grounder.

Three innings later, the Texas first baseman was able to just jog around the bases.

Wheeless shook off a sore shoulder and homered in the bottom of the ninth to lead the Longhorns to a 4-3 victory over Baylor on Wednesday and into the championship round at the College World Series.

"Every swing I took that I put the bat on the ball, it was just excruciating pain," Wheeless said.

The win sent Texas (54-16) into the best-of-three championship series for the second straight year. The Longhorns, national runners-up to Cal State Fullerton in 2004, will play either Arizona State (42-24) or Florida (47-21).

Arizona State, led by Erik Averill's five-hitter on two days' rest, beat the Gators 6-1 earlier Wednesday. That forced a game Thursday night to determine which team was to move on to the championship round that starts Saturday.

Wheeless' homer atoned for his error in the seventh inning, which led to the tying and go-ahead runs for Baylor (46-24).

Wheeless lost Kenn Kasperek's throw in the sun after the pitcher fielded Seth Fortenberry's bunt. One run came home on the play and Fortenberry ended

up on third before scoring on Kevin Seivigny's hit.

The Longhorns tied it at 3 in the eighth when Nick Peoples scored on a play at the plate. Peoples ran into catcher Josh Ford, who was blocking the plate without the ball.

Umpire Mike Conlin ruled obstruction and called Peoples safe. Baylor coach Steve Smith argued unsuccessfully that Peoples intentionally collided with Ford and should have been ejected.

That set the stage for Wheeless in the ninth.

Texas coach Augie Garrido told Wheeless that he was thinking of having Clay Van Hook pinch hit for him because of his shoulder injury.

"That first swing when it popped out, I didn't know what was going to happen the rest of the day," Wheeless said.

After talking Garrido into letting him hit, Wheeless sent Ryan LaMotta's 1-1 pitch over the right-field fence for his fifth homer of the season.

Wheeless, 1-for-4 Wednesday and 3-of-12 in the CWS, initially injured his shoulder in Monday's game against Tulane. On a check swing during his last at-bat, he said, the shoulder popped out and back in quickly.

He said he was sore Tuesday, but took batting practice with no problem Wednesday afternoon.

It was apparent the shoulder was hurting during the game. Still, he refused to let Garrido sit him.

"I had a feeling," Wheeless said. "I thought maybe I would get a base hit or something like that. Getting the game-winning hit is just huge."

Garrido said he was glad he gave in to Wheeless' wish.

"All year long, whether it's our coaching staff or other coaching staffs: 'Why doesn't somebody step up and do something? Come on, show a little courage,'" Garrido said. "Now the guy wants to do this, and I go back to the dugout and a couple people in there go, 'Why are you letting him hit? He's got a bad shoulder. He doesn't have a chance.'"

"I said, 'The guy wants to be a hero.'"

Baylor, making its first CWS appearance since 1978, reached Wednesday's game with a thrilling comeback win over Tulane on Tuesday night, rallying from a 7-0 deficit for an 8-7 victory.

J. Brent Cox (8-3) was the winner in relief. LaMotta (5-2) took the loss.

Arizona State 6, Florida 1
Averill (11-4) threw his five-hitter in 92-degree heat, retiring the last eight batters for his fifth complete game this season.

"He told me before the game, 'I'm going nine.' I listened to him," ASU coach Pat Murphy said.

The Sun Devils, who came into the CWS with the fewest wins of any team in the field, have won three straight after losing in the first round, and are

5-0 in NCAA tournament elimination games.

Averill's outing was a help to a relief corps that had worked 16 1-3 of ASU's 26 previous innings. The relievers were allowed to stay back at the team hotel until a half-hour before the game.

"My mind-set going in was to get as many innings as I could because our bullpen has been a little tired," Averill said. "I just tried to put the ball in play and let our defense take care of it."

Averill had thrown 76 pitches in 5 2-3 innings of the Sun Devils' 4-2 win over Tennessee on Sunday. He threw 113 against the Gators, striking out seven and not allowing a walk.

"I was a little tired the first five innings, but then I got a second wind," Averill said. "You never really know how much your body will give you until you ask it."

The game followed Arizona State's dramatic 11-inning win over Nebraska, highlighted by Jeff Larish's CWS record-tying three home runs.

Unlike that game, the Sun Devils led early against the Gators.

Travis Buck homered deep into the right-field seats off Bryan Ball in the first inning for his sixth home run.

Ball (7-5), who hadn't pitched since June 4 in the regional opener against Stetson, went six innings and allowed four hits and four runs.

Littering of Kentucky's waterways reflects poorly on everyone

FRANKFORT — One of the ugly side effects as the summer boating season kicks into full gear is the amount of unsightly trash that washes up on the shores of our lakes. Boaters throw much of this trash overboard, but trash also accumulates around boat ramps, public access areas, popular bank areas for fishing and around boat-in camping areas.

"Littering reflects poorly on all who use our water resources," said Benjy Kinman, director of fisheries for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources

(KDFWR). "Trash in our waterways is not only unsightly, but it is potentially harmful to fish and wildlife."

Fishing line is a harmful substance to leave in and around waterways. Ducks, geese, turtles and fish can become ensnared in discarded fishing line. The fishing line will still be in the water and harmful to wildlife when the litter bug's children reach adulthood.

"Discarded fishing line is common around any popular fishing spot," said David McChesney, wildlife program coordinator for the KDFWR. "Any bird can be affected and I've seen turtles and waterfowl entangled in discarded fishing line. This can lead to death or the loss of appendages and can affect their ability to feed or defend themselves from predators. Fishing line entanglements may have a tourniquet effect that restricts or completely cuts-

off blood flow and can lead to severe, deadly infections."

Another painful aspect of littering is the image it creates in the minds of visitors and those who rarely use public waterways. "Trash is not only an eyesore, but it's a bad reflection on boaters, anglers and those who use public waterways," said Jim Axon, assistant director of fisheries for the KDFWR. "Boaters and anglers can play an important role in reducing this problem by leaving these areas more attractive for other users that before you arrived."

Pack out what you bring in to a public fishing or camping area. Discarded monofilament line may be wound into a tight ball and stored in a pocket until it can be disposed of properly. Bring a trash bag on your boat and place all trash in it until you arrive back at the marina or boat ramp. Trash cans are readily available in these areas. If

you are bank fishing or using a stream access area, put a plastic grocery store bag in your back pocket to store trash until you get back home or to a trash can.

"If everyone did these things, we can greatly reduce the amount of trash in and around our waterways," Kinman said. "Pick up other's trash when you use our waterways. People don't want to go on vacation and see soda cans, broken styrofoam coolers, bait containers, potato chip bags or plastic sandwich bags lining the shores of our lakes and rivers. They want to see clean areas free of trash."

The littering problem also helps prevent access to fishing areas. "Many stream public access areas get closed down to public access because private landowners grow tired of picking up the trash that accumulates around these areas," Kinman said. "Litter bugs hurt everybody."

Keep farm ponds in check

FRANKFORT — The long days of sunshine and heat promote the growth of plants, as anyone who goes on vacation for a week and returns to a jungle of a yard knows. Farm ponds grow a green ring around the banks during summer that in most cases is a nuisance for fishing and swimming, but provides cover for fish and is generally not a problem.

Sometimes, the green ring grows over the entire pond and makes it useless for fishing, swimming or even sitting in a lawn chair and admiring on a summer evening. A pond covered in a green mat of vegetation looks repugnant to the eye: unclean and stagnant. In addition to the aesthetic impact, excessive vegetation also can promote the overpopulation of bluegill because bass can't get at them and oxygen depletion as the plants decay.

If your farm pond is covered in a thick mat of green goo or choked with bright green oatmeal like flowers, you must first figure out what vegetation is overtaking your pond in order to control it.

"The biggest deal is to identify what vegetation you are trying to get rid of so you select the correct control," said Kerry Prather, central fishery district biologist for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources and an expert at farm pond management.

Some landowners shy away from using chemicals on their ponds and try a biological control by using triploid grass carp while some other landowners want quick results by using a chemical control. The best con-

trol may be a combination of both chemicals and grass carp. "One chemical won't kill everything," Prather explained, "and grass carp may not eat everything in your pond that is causing problems. Some landowners use chemicals at first to get a quick control and use triploid grass carp to maintain the control."

The ugly, green cotton like floating mats of filamentous algae is one of the main culprits in taking over farm ponds. Treat filamentous algae with Cutrine-Plus, K-TEA, Hydrothal 191 or copper sulfate. Triploid grass carp will eat this plant for the first year or two after stocking. Filamentous algae is what most people call "moss."

Triploid grass carp are good controllers of submerged vegetation such as curly-leaf pondweed whose leaves look like green crinkle cut French fries. Another common submerged vegetation in ponds is coontail. Coontail vegetation looks like it sounds; the ends of the plant form a bushy "tail." Other submerged vegetation found in farm ponds are milfoil, common naiad and muskgrass. Shading the plants with black plastic for two to four weeks kills submerged aquatic vegetation, but only shade small portions of the pond at a time. Chemicals such as Reward, Avast!, 4-D, Komeen, Weedtrine and Aquacide controls submerged vegetation as well.

Emerged vegetation such as cattails, water lilies, creeping water primrose and floating leaf pondweed can be controlled by the application of chemicals such as Rodeo, Reward, Aquacide and 4-D. Triploid grass carp are not a good con-

trol for these types of plants.

Floating aquatic vegetation are the hardest weeds to control in a pond. Triploid grass carp will not control these types of aquatic plants. The tiny bright green to whitish plants that look like tiny pieces of oatmeal are called watermeal while a similar plant that is larger with fine tentacles hanging from their bottom side is known as duckweed. Avast! and Sonar are both good chemicals to use to control these plants.

Chemical applications must be done carefully in order to protect your farm pond. Follow all instructions from the chemical manufacturer and some chemicals may prohibit the use of the pond for irrigation, livestock watering, swimming and even fishing and fish consumption for a period of time after application. Treat only sections of the pond at a time. Being too aggressive with chemical application may kill off so much plant life that it ties up oxygen in the water that can lead to fish kills. Most chemicals should be applied in water above 55 degrees.

Another easy to do control is to manually remove problem aquatic plants in early spring before they reproduce. A garden rake, dragging a heavy cable or chain across the bottom of the pond, pulling by hand or mowing with a scythe all help control aquatic plants. Aquatic plants contain good amounts of nitrogen and phosphorus so they may be tilled into your garden or applied to a compost pile.

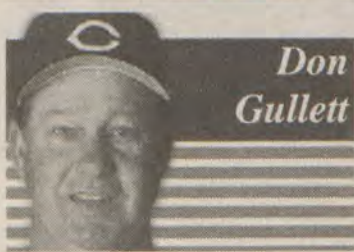
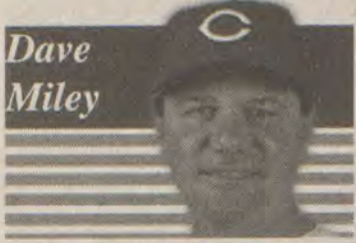

REDS FIRE MILEY, GULLETT

Narron named interim manager, wins debut game

CINCINNATI — The Cincinnati Reds are in the hands of a self-described “baseball guy” for at least the rest of the season.

Bench coach Jerry Narron was promoted to interim manager after the Reds fired Dave Miley on Tuesday. Cincinnati won Narron's debut Tuesday

night, 11-4 over St. Louis.

“God, family and baseball. Those are my three passions,” Narron said. “I'm a baseball guy.”

After a 27-43 start, including a listless 6-1 loss Monday night to St. Louis, the Reds made the long-expected move of replacing Miley.

“We were not doing the things you've got to do every day,” general manager Dan O'Brien said. “We saw that things were not going to change.”

Pitching coach Don Gullett also was fired. Vern Ruhle, the Reds' minor league pitching coordinator, will handle the job for the remainder of the season.

Narron, like a thousand managers before him, said he would stress fundamentals, basic things at which the Reds had become lax.

“I'm intense,” he said. “I have a passion for it, a love for it.”

Narron said he had been dissecting the team's problems the past couple of months, but still regretted that Miley and Gullett

were fired.

“We had huge expectations coming into the season, and we did not live up to them,” Narron said.

Cincinnati has had four straight below-.500 years — its longest such streak since 1945-55 — and has not reached the playoffs since 1995.

Miley and Gullett were told of their dismissals Tuesday morning and were not available for comment. O'Brien called it a “sensitive and emotional” meeting with Miley — too sensitive to bring up whether Miley would be offered another job in the Reds' system.

Miley had spent 26 seasons in the Reds' organization as a player, coach and manager.

“He gave his heart to this team, but we're excited about Jerry Narron,” said first baseman Sean Casey. “We have a whole lot of respect for him. He's the kind of guy who can stabilize the ship.”

Reds players were careful

not to blame Miley and Gullett for their woeful record. But some acknowledged a somewhat different atmosphere.

“Any time change comes, it brings a different feeling,” Casey said. “That's only human.”

Backup catcher Javier Valentin, the hitting star Tuesday night, said the Reds seemed more resolute.

“We can feel the difference,” Valentin said. “We want to do better. We know we can do better.”

Miley became the Reds' manager on July 28, 2003, when he replaced Bob Boone. Cincinnati was 125-164 during parts of his three seasons.

Narron, who managed Texas in 2001-02, was Boston's bench coach in 2003 and managed for four years in Baltimore's minor league system. He was in his second season as Miley's bench coach.

Gullett, a former ace for the Reds, had been the team's pitching coach since May 24, 1993. Paul Wilson, the Reds' opening day starter, called him the best

pitching coach he's had.

“You'd like to think that if you did better or stayed healthy, you might have helped him keep his job,” said Wilson, who had season-ending shoulder surgery after compiling a 1-5 record with a 7.77 ERA in nine games.

The Cincinnati pitching staff gave up a club-record 236 home runs last season and a major league-high 106 already this season.

O'Brien said pitching was not entirely to blame for the Reds' ineptness.

“Every night, some component of the game breaks down on us,” he said.

But it all came together for Narron's debut. Valentin drove in four runs with a three-run homer and a bases-loaded walk to help the Reds defeat the first-place Cardinals.

“We had a lot of things that didn't go well for us,” the soft-spoken Narron said afterward. “These guys are due for a good stretch.”

Joe Randa hit a solo homer

and Felipe Lopez doubled with the bases loaded to back Brandon Claussen (4-4), who allowed seven hits and three earned runs in six innings.

St. Louis starter Jason Marquis (8-5) gave up seven hits and 10 runs — a career high, but only six were earned — in 2 1/3 innings.

“He was trying to get the ball down, and he got it up,” St. Louis manager Tony La Russa said. “And he was getting too much of the plate.”

Cincinnati had 12 hits after being held to four in Miley's last game.

Maybe things have changed.

Notes: Valentin's four RBIs tied a career high. ... St. Louis OF Jim Edmonds was out of the lineup for the eighth game since suffering a hairline fracture of his left middle rib, but was available to pinch hit. He could return to the lineup Wednesday. ... Reds leadoff batter Ryan Freel missed his third straight game with a sore toe. ... Reds OF Kenny Kelly left the game in the eighth with a sprained left knee.

Reds 7, Cardinals 6

CINCINNATI — Even when he struggled, St. Louis left-hander Mark Mulder could count on getting left-handed batters out. Now, even that is not a sure thing.

The slumping Mulder gave up two home runs to left-hander Adam Dunn and a two-run double to Ken Griffey Jr., another left-hander, as Cincinnati scored seven runs in the first three innings and held on for a 7-6 win on Wednesday.

“My location's been terrible,” said Mulder (8-5), who is 1-4 in his last five starts. “On and off, it's been like that all year. It's getting to be frustrating. I'm not finishing pitches.”

Left-hander Sean Casey also had two hits against Mulder, who went into the game allowing left-handers to bat just .125 against him. Dunn's home runs were the first Mulder allowed to left-handers all season.

“He was having location problems, and they capitalized,” manager Tony La Russa said.

Mulder, who was acquired from Oakland in an offseason trade, allowed season highs of 12 hits and seven runs in four innings. His previous season highs were 11 hits, by the Reds in his 6-5 loss on April 13, and six runs by Cincinnati and two other teams.

Dunn led off the second and third innings with home runs and moved into a tie for the NL lead with his 19th and 20th home runs. The Reds jumped out to a 7-0 lead while improving to 2-0 under interim manager Jerry Narron, who was promoted from bench coach on Tuesday to replace the fired

Dave Miley.

“I told (Dunn) if he hits three, he's leading off Friday,” Narron said.

Dunn struck out leading off the fifth inning.

Reds starter Ramon Ortiz (3-5) didn't allow a hit in his first career appearance against St. Louis until Mark Grudzielanek led off the fifth with his seventh home run of the season. Ortiz gave up five hits and three runs in seven innings for his second win in his last three starts.

“I feel good,” Ortiz said. “I had a good breaking pitch, a good changeup, a good slider, and a good fastball, inside and outside. When your team scores seven runs, that's very good. When they score runs for you, you have to go get it. You have to throw strikes and make your pitch.”

The Cardinals scored three runs in the eighth inning to cut the lead to 7-6 before David Weathers pitched out of trouble. He went 1 2/3 innings before Kent Mercker struck out Jim Edmonds with a slider for the final out in the ninth and his first save in three tries.

“Our bullpen stopped the bleeding, and we kept plugging,” La Russa said. “We had a good-looking rally, but they made pitches when they had to. Weathers got the outs they needed and Mercker made his pitches.”

The save was Mercker's first since Aug. 27, 2003, for Atlanta against the New York Mets.

“The infamous backdoor slider,” Mercker said. “If you can learn how to throw that pitch, you can make a lot of money. He's a guy you want to stay away from, but you'd better make sure it's down.”

“I like Mercker and Weathers at the end,” Narron said. “They give you everything they've got, they battle, and they don't beat themselves.”

Joe Randa gave the Reds a 1-0 lead by driving in Rich Aurilia from second base with a two-out single in the first. Mulder gave up three hits in the inning, which matched the total he gave up over seven shutout innings in the Cardinals' 7-3 win over the Reds on May 4.

Dunn sparked Cincinnati's four-run second by leading off with his 19th homer. Aurilia added an RBI single and Griffey hit a two-run double to the base of the center-field fence.

Dunn led off the third inning with his second homer, giving him four multihomer games this season and 13 in his career. Jason LaRue followed with a single, moved to third on Ortiz's double and scored on Aurilia's one-out single to center.

The Cardinals added two runs after Grudzielanek's homer in the fifth.

Notes: Dunn's homers gave him six this season off left-handers, including his last three. The left-handed hitter went into the game hitting .162 against left-handers. ... Randa extended his hitting streak to eight games (10-for-29, .345). ... Ortiz's double was his second career hit and first for extra bases in 42 at-bats. ... Edmonds started for the first time on the nine-game road trip and extended his hitting streak to five games (7-for-19, .368). He missed the previous eight games with a hairline fracture of his left middle rib. ... The Cardinals had won six consecutive series before dropping two of three on this road trip.

Transition more difficult for Latin American players

LEXINGTON — Every year, many Latin American players take a chance and move to the United States to play baseball, one of the most important parts of their childhood.

Lexington Legends outfielder Francisco Caraballo, from Anaco, Venezuela, and hitting coach Rodney Linares, from the Dominican Republic, were happy to make the transition.

After beginning his career with the Detroit Tigers in 1997 and playing for a couple of years, Linares finished his playing career for the Houston Astros, but stayed in the system to coach. He just couldn't leave baseball.

“Back in the Dominican, either you play baseball, or you don't do anything,” Linares said. “It's like a religion.”

Linares says that the first thing a kid gets is a glove, if they can afford it. If not, many Dominican children will play with milk carton gloves or use rags rolled up as balls and hit them with sticks. These children will do anything to be able to play baseball.

Caraballo played two years in the Venezuelan Summer

League before coming to the United States. He agrees that the intensity of baseball is different in the United States than in his home country.

“The fans are more active,” Caraballo said. “Over here, people are a little calmer. Over there, they go crazy. It doesn't matter if they are losing or not.”

The language barrier was not a big issue for Caraballo or Linares. They both learned English quickly and were committed to improving it.

“Everywhere I went, I tried to watch American television,” Linares said. “My roommates were always American players, and they played a big part in it. I would tell them not to speak to me in Spanish.”

Caraballo learned English differently. His mother used to live in the United States and speaks English fluently, which helped in his studying. He also took five years of grammatical English at the high school level.

“With just those five years, it became pretty easy,” Caraballo said. “I couldn't understand everything, but I wasn't afraid to speak it and make mistakes.”

Caraballo and Linares both agree that the climate was by

far the hardest part of the transition.

“I've been in cold weather, but playing in cold weather and working in cold weather is something different,” Linares said.

After a few years of being thousands of miles away from their families, neither of them find it that difficult anymore.

“We are pretty much used to how far away I am from them,” Caraballo said. “The first year, my mom was pretty sad every time I was leaving, but now she tells me to go.”

Linares hardly sees his family at all, except for his dad, who is also in the Astros system.

“I work during the winter, so I don't see them much,” Linares said. “I call them and I'm on the internet all the time, but it's gotten old.”

Although making the move to another continent is a huge step, Caraballo and Linares, along with other Latin American players across the country, are happy to be in the United States playing baseball.

“It's a dream to make it to the big leagues,” Linares said. “You come here and see the beautiful fields we have all through the system, and it's nice.”

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Thirty-five years after demolition, Crosley Field is resurrected

CINCINNATI — On Thursday, the Cincinnati Reds Hall of Fame and Museum celebrated the 35th anniversary of the last game played at Crosley Field with the unveiling of a Crosley Field replica by Yellow Springs resident, Mike Weaver. The four-foot by seven-foot model was unveiled in a ceremony and program at the Cincinnati Reds Hall of Fame and Museum.

“This model will definitely bring back many memories of Crosley Field,” said Reds Hall of Fame and Museum Director, Greg Rhodes. “The level of detail, the bright colors of the orange and green seats, the scoreboard and advertisements; Mike has done a tremendous job both researching the ballpark, and in building the model.”

Weaver, age 53, first attempted a model of Crosley Field when he was 18 years old after his mother brought home a batch of cupcakes adorned with miniature baseball players. Weaver, who played dice baseball with the miniature men, decided he needed a field to play on. What better field than Crosley Field?

Thirty-four years later, with the model he made when he was 18 still on display in his house, Weaver decided it was time to build a better model. Using microfilms and a high-powered magnifying glass, Weaver spent six months studying photographs and blueprints of Crosley field in order to recreate the stadium as it was at the last out of the last game, June 24 1970.

A grand total of 18 months, 2200 hours, and \$2,750 later, Weaver finished his model

With the scoreboard clock set at 10:44 pm, the exact time that Wayne Granger delivered the final pitch; the details in Weaver's model are impeccable. The twelve National League flags fly high above the stadium, and Weaver has flawlessly recreated the advertising that covered the stadium, down to the “Partridge Whoppers, Cincy's Favorite Frankfurter” sign on the left-field wall. Icons Paul Sommerkamp, the Crosley PA announcer, and “Peanut Jim”, the legendary peanut vendor, are the only two people currently represented in the model, though Weaver plans to add his family into the stands when the model is off display.

The model is on loan to the Cincinnati Reds Museum and Hall of Fame for the remainder of the 2005 season.

Morris remains in NBA draft as deadline passes

LEXINGTON — Randolph Morris, Kentucky's starting center last season as a freshman, will remain in the NBA draft and not return to play basketball for the Wildcats.

"After many talks with my family, I truly feel this is the best decision for me right now," Morris said in a statement released Tuesday night by the agent that will represent him.

Morris declared himself eligible for the draft six weeks ago, notifying Kentucky coach Tubby Smith by fax of his intentions. Morris did not hire an agent, which would have allowed him to return to Kentucky if he chose to withdraw from the June 28 draft.

But the deadline for underclassmen to withdraw from the draft passed at 5 p.m. EDT Tuesday, and Kentucky received no notification from Morris that he planned to return, Athletics Department spokeswoman Mandy Polley said.

The university issued a statement from Smith Tuesday night.

"Randolph was an important part of our team last year and

will certainly be missed," Smith said. "We wish him the very best as he pursues a professional basketball career, just as we have with every player who has pursued those opportunities in the past."

Morris spoke of Kentucky in the past tense after a private workout for NBA teams in Chicago earlier this month and also in the statement Tuesday. Morris has worked out for the Memphis Grizzlies, Sacramento Kings and Los Angeles Lakers.

"Words cannot describe how much I enjoyed playing for the Wildcats and attending school in Lexington," Morris said.

Morris said in Chicago that he had had no contact with his Kentucky teammates or coaches since entering the draft.

The 6-foot-10, 266-pound Morris chose Kentucky over Georgia Tech after considering a jump straight from high school to the NBA. Morris started 33 of Kentucky's 34 games this past season, averaging 8.8 points and 4.2 rebounds in 19.8 minutes per game as the Wildcats finished 28-6.

Morris struggled much of the season with foul trouble — he led

the team with 102 fouls — but played his best basketball in the NCAA tournament. He had his first career double-double against Cincinnati, finishing with 11 points and 12 rebounds in a 69-60 second-round win. In a 94-88 double-overtime loss to Michigan State in a regional final, he scored 20 points.

The McDonald's All-America selection, who attended Landmark Christian School in Atlanta, was part of a ballyhooed Kentucky recruiting class that included two other McDonald's All-Americans, guards Rajon Rondo and Joe Crawford, as well as guard Ramel Bradley.

Morris' primary backups last season were a pair of sophomores, 7-foot Lukasz Obrzut and 7-foot-3 Shagari Alleyne, who combined to average four points and 2.5 rebounds per game. Kentucky also has signed another center, 7-foot-2 Jared Carter of Georgetown.

Morris is one of two Kentucky underclassmen this year to enter the draft. Junior swingman Kelenna Azubuike announced his plans in April and signed with an agent, Joel Bell, thus ending his college eli-

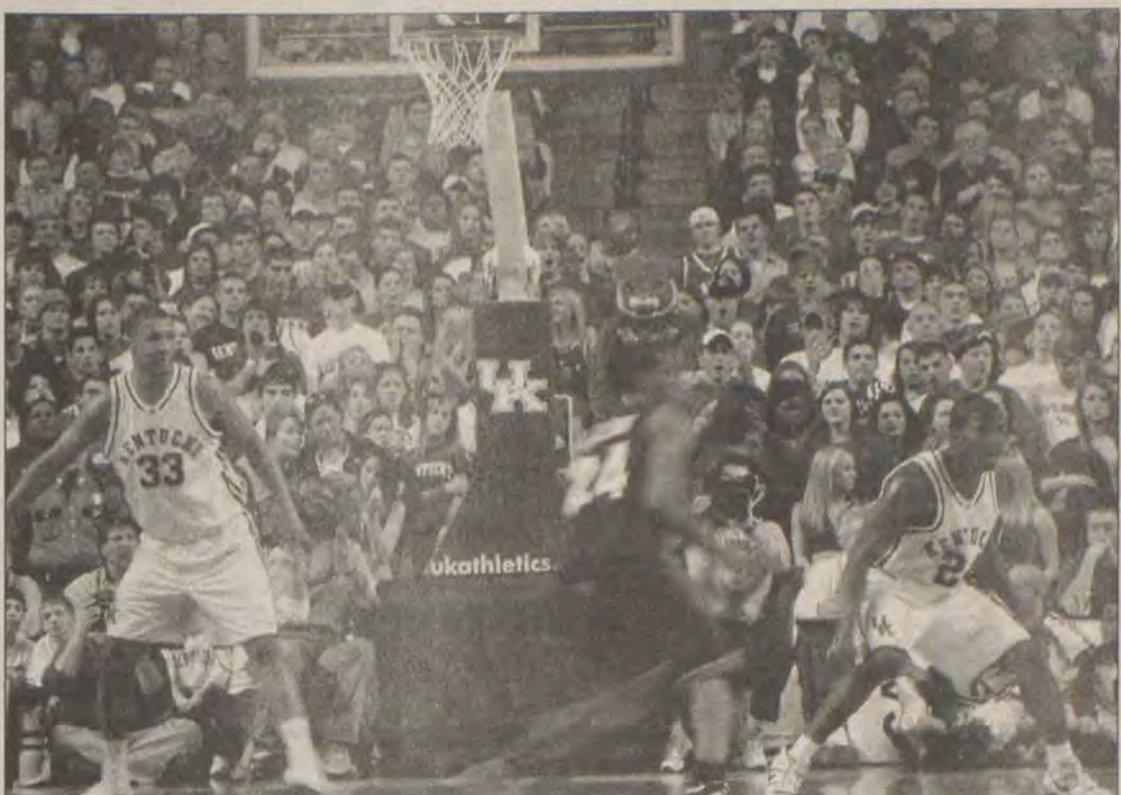

gibility.

Before Azubuike's departure, Kentucky figured to have four starters return for next season. Now, with Morris also leaving,

the Wildcats will have only two: Rondo and guard Patrick Sparks.

"I feel good about the players we have coming back next sea-

son and the newcomers we've added to the roster," Smith said in the statement. "I look forward to getting started with this group in the fall."

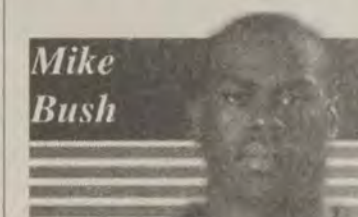

Jack Roush finally has a NASCAR powerhouse

For his first 15 years in NASCAR's top stock car series, Jack Roush spent tons of money, hired the best people he could find and tried in vain to win a Cup championship.

Mark Martin, the driver who came with Roush to what was then called Winston Cup in 1988, never quite made it to the top, finishing second four times, the last in 2002.

Roush, a mathematician, innovator and owner of a company that supplies parts to the automotive and transportation industry, sometimes waged verbal war with NASCAR's rule-makers and became bitter about several decisions that went against him over the years.

"I honestly never thought NASCAR was going to allow me to win a championship, no matter what I did," Roush said after Matt Kenseth finally gave him a Cup title in 2003.

Now, with Kurt Busch having given Roush his second straight title last year and his powerful team off to a tremendous start in 2005, with eight wins in the first 15 races, some of his competitors are wondering if there's any way to stop the five-car Roush juggernaut.

Last Sunday at Michigan International Speedway, Greg Biffle, who has emerged as the sport's newest star, won for the fifth time this season and the sixth time in 16 races, including the 2004 season finale.

Carl Edwards, in his first full season in Cup, won his second

race of the year the previous week in Pocono, and the personable youngster quickly is finding a following in the sport.

Martin, Kenseth and Edwards finished third through fifth at Michigan, and Busch, who had run in the top 10 throughout the race, faded to 12th at the end.

Heading into Sunday's Dodge/Save Mart 350 at Infineon Raceway in Sonoma, Calif., Biffle is second in the season points, trailing Hendrick Motorsports driver Jimmie Johnson by just 49 points, with Edwards fourth, Martin fifth, Busch, who also won a race earlier this season, ninth and Kenseth, who has struggled most of the season, 21st.

Martin, flashing some of his old-time talent and enthusiasm

during his final full season in the Cup series, has an explanation for why the Roush team is running so well these days.

"It's because we've got great engines right now and we've got great handling packages," Martin said.

And there's more.

"It's only my opinion," Martin added, "but I believe that Roush Racing has the hottest lineup of drivers in NASCAR, depth wise. We don't have an off team right now, period. We've got great engines and great drivers and great crew chiefs."

It would be hard for anybody to dispute that right now.

Rusty Wallace, a contemporary of Martin and also in his final Cup season, said, "Those Roush guys have got it figured

out. That's pretty obvious."

If the 10-race Chase for the Nextel Cup championship started right now, Roush would have four of the 11 cars eligible to race for the title. Last year, for the inaugural Chase, he had three — Busch, Martin and Kenseth.

Roush, 62, who won numerous championships in sports car racing before finding success in NASCAR, is relishing the roll his Cup teams are on.

"You never know how long it's going to last and I'm going to make sure I feel good about it for as long as I can," he said, grinning.

He credits the recent success to "really, really smart people" who are able to adapt to rule changes and new equipment faster than peers on other teams.

"They historically have done that," Roush said. "Carl is the latest indication of that. He's had very little experience with these cars and has moved right in and taken right over — much like Greg did and like Kurt Busch did before."

"I guess Mark Martin was the daddy of it, but we've got a culture of being pragmatic and looking at what's in front of us and thinking about the things that we need to do — and that's just the way we live, and the guys do very well."

Biffle summed up the prevailing feeling among the Roush drivers.

"Man, I just feel so lucky to be able to be where I'm at driving these race cars and being able to win these races," he said. "I just feel pretty special about it."

Future of U.S. Grand Prix in doubt after F1 fiasco

When 14 Formula One drivers walked out the back gate at Indianapolis Motor Speedway, they quite possibly took the United States Grand Prix with them.

For a series that claims it wants a larger piece of the American market, the fiasco at Indy was a tremendous setback. Only six cars competed Sunday, creating a sham of a race that has jeopardized F1's future in the U.S.

"Formula One is damaged, very damaged," team boss Frank Williams said as he left the track. "Maybe irrevocably so in North America."

Although F1 is the most popular racing series in Europe, Asia and South America — its TV ratings trail only World Cup soccer and the Olympics — the series has yet to catch on in America. In the weeks leading up to the U.S. Grand Prix, drivers, teams and even F1 boss Bernie Ecclestone talked of their desire to change that.

Ideas were discussed and Ecclestone was persuaded to award the U.S. television rights to four races to a startup company that bought air time on CBS for the broadcasts.

He also leaked information that Renault boss Flavio Briatore was hosting a Las Vegas businessman during the Canadian Grand Prix two weeks ago. It led to widespread speculation that casino magnate Steve Wynn was working with the series to stage a race along the Vegas strip.

But all those talks, efforts and ideas were sabotaged when concerns over tire safety for the seven teams that use Michelin caused them to pull out of the U.S. Grand Prix. The teams begged to reach a compromise with the FIA, the world motorsports governing body, that would allow them to race safely at Indy.

When no resolution could be

reached, 14 cars pulled off the race track following the warmup lap and went home for the day. The fans at Indy were disgusted. Across the world, even the most ardent F1 supporters were mortified.

"It was, frankly, a sick joke and although I am long retired and was 4,000 miles away, I felt humiliated and embarrassed by what went on," said former world champion Nigel Mansell of Britain.

"It was like watching someone commit suicide in public. My heart goes out to all those thousands of F1 fans who traveled from across America — not to mention those who came from overseas. They will not want anything more to do with F1."

Before worrying about recapturing fans, Formula One first must figure out if anyone in the U.S. still wants to host a Grand Prix.

The contract with Indianapolis runs through next season. Indy track boss Tony George, who could be seen pacing and chatting on his cell phone during a frantic race-morning meeting, has yet to make himself available for comment.

He did, however, refuse to wave the checkered flag when Michael Schumacher crossed the finish line for his first win of the season, and George also boycotted the post-race podium celebration.

Track officials have said only that they are evaluating their options for future events, although they began accepting ticket renewals on Monday morning for next year's race.

If the race does return to Indy, some doubt the fans will.

"Even if we do come back, half the crowd in the stands won't be back, that's for sure," driver David Coulthard said. "Having this mistake take place, it will be a question of what actions will be taken to do damage limitation."

Sports marketer Marc Ganis of Chicago's Sportscorp Ltd. questions F1's sincerity in its efforts to

build an American fan base.

"They can talk all they want about it, but they certainly don't act like they want to do it," Ganis said. "They talk and talk and talk, then to go ahead and shoot themselves in the foot by basically destroying the event in Indianapolis ... that leaves me to question whether it is a desire or commitment to grow in the U.S."

Ganis believes F1 must increase its marketing efforts, take its drivers on an American promotional blitz and stage more than one race a year in the U.S. He points to seven-time world champion Schumacher, who rivals soccer star David Beckham in worldwide popularity, as an example.

"His reach here is extremely limited, he can walk down Fifth Avenue in New York and no one would know who he is," Ganis said. "It's the same way it was with Beckham. They had to work to build him here. Now he comes into New York and L.A. and he is treated like a rock star."

"That's the price of entry into the U.S. sports market. If they aren't prepared to do that, they shouldn't be here."

Drivers agree that the series needs more than one event in America. Of the 19 races now, Indy and Montreal are the only two in North America. Most of the rest are in Europe and Asia, and the time difference forces Speed Channel, which holds the U.S. broadcast rights, to air them live early on Sunday mornings.

"F1 needs a couple of American drivers, an American car and five races in the States, which won't happen," Canadian driver Jacques Villeneuve said. "So Las Vegas would be a good place for us because it is international, people go there for a good time, for a party, for gambling, so anything will work in Vegas."

Now it's just a question of whether Vegas — or any other U.S. city — wants Formula One.

Gustin has fond memories of Thunder Valley as promoter and driver

BRISTOL, Tenn. — Roger Gustin's name is synonymous with Bristol Dragway as the veteran promoter of the Super Chevy Show but many don't know about his other ventures at Thunder Valley.

"Bristol and I have a long history," said Gustin. "I raced in the inaugural NHRA Spring Nationals in 1965 (now the O'Reilly NHRA Thunder Valley Nationals) in an experimental-class Mercury Comet and have made a lot of laps down that track since."

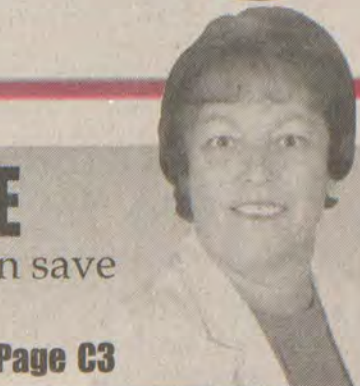

Summer service project continues

"It's been a true blessing," said Linda Wright, of Prestonsburg, a homeowner who, along with husband, Gary Michael, have been the happy recipients of some home repair work courtesy of a group of service workers now in the area observing what their home churches refer to as "Appalachian Work Week."

Linda and Gary Michael, both well known longtime residents of Prestonsburg, have both suffered some major physical setbacks in the last few years. Gary has been in and out of hospitals recovering

from both heart and lung surgeries, along with surgeries done on both knees. And to further complicate matters, Linda, too, suffered some problems with one of her shoulders, leading to surgery for her, also.

"We've just had a rough time lately," Linda said. "Because of our physical limitations, the house managed to get in need of repairs, and because of the cost of traveling so much to hospitals and doctor appointments and all, we just really haven't had any extra money around." Linda, who is a hair stylist, has been unable to cut hair due to the problems with her shoulder. Gary Michael, because

of his health problems, has been unable to work also.

"But, you know, we never considered the possibility of asking for help...when you're used to doing for yourself, you just never really even think of asking for help," she said.

Linda says that it was her association with co-director of the Auxier Lifetime Learning Center, Sue Schaffer, that led her to realizing that she and Gary Michael could receive assistance. "Sue kept calling and calling, wanting me to cut her hair for her," she said. "Finally, I got the time and felt good enough to do it, but I had to ask Sue to come to my home to

have it done."

Once there, Schaffer noticed some of the things that were in need of repair at the couple's home and informed Linda that she and Gary might be eligible for assistance. "I just knew that we had work crews coming and I felt like these two might be eligible for help," Schaffer said. "They really didn't want to apply, but I took the papers over and told them, 'You need this,'" Schaffer said.

Now, of course, the couple are pleased as punch that the service workers are repairing their roof and extremely happy and thankful

THINGS TO PONDER

Helping children to care

Citizens' concerns about school violence have lead to the "no tolerance" policy now found in most school systems. In an effort to prevent violent outbursts, major questions become, "What makes kids care about each other? How can gentleness to each other in a violent world be taught?"

During hour-to-hour activities, people working with children and teenagers have observed the various ways in which young people are inappropriate to each other. At times, it seems that students are frequently

most cruel to each other when there is a lack of acceptance of differences among them. There comes to mind the 10-year-old student that was resistant to disclose how her classmates were treating her. However, her mother quickly went to tell how her daughter's classmates were different this year. "There's a half mix," was her mother's way of describing the portion of students in the class, based on their parents' financial standing. While at a school function, the mother said that one of her daughter's classmates said to her, "Bet you buy all of her clothes at (an expensive store out of town)." The girl's mother concluded that her daughter's classmates had been making remarks about her daughter's clothing and were socially isolating her from the group.

After a child has been the "victim" of inappropriate behaviors/actions of class-

mates, she is likely to show a change in behaviors. While the fourth grader described above had been an "A" student with many friends before that particular class, she began consistently expressing an extreme dislike for school, having physical complaints on school day mornings, having a decline in grades, and showing a change in behaviors. It is not unusual for a source of violence and cruelty in adolescence to occur in emotional, verbal, and physical abuse among dating teens. Also, the experience has been that boys are likely to abuse girls more often than vice versa. Parents are prone to be unaware of these circumstances until typically the girl stops dating the boy and spills the beans. Not unexpected, these couples show characteristics similar to spouse-abuse, when all of the details are told. Needless to say,

parents and society are very concerned about what can be done to prevent such circumstances and be aware of what is happening while it is occurring.

As we all know, parents cannot completely control all of the things that affect their children's lives. After all, children have to spend much of their time away home and in the "real world," a place that can often be harsh and uncaring. The numbers are told over and over again in the media: extreme incidences of violence, almost three million crimes, occur on or near school campuses every year, to equal about 16,000 per school year or one every six seconds. In regards to date abuse, national data has revealed that many high school boys thought it was OK for a boy to

When drugs fail, surgery can save life of Hepatitis C patients

Question: A friend of mine recently had a liver transplant for hepatitis C. What exactly is that? I have never heard of this before. Can you tell me more about this type of hepatitis?

Answer: We currently have five different classifications for the different types of hepatitis — hepatitis A, B, C, D, and E. All of these illnesses are viral diseases of the liver, but each has unique characteristics. These distinctive attributes include the way they are spread, how serious they are, and the kinds of treatments, if any, that are available. Since you asked specifically about hepatitis

C, I'll focus my remarks on this disease in today's column.

Hepatitis C — caused by the hepatitis C virus (HCV) — is usually diagnosed by accident when the doctor finds an elevated liver enzyme, or ALT, level on routine blood work. While there can be symptoms of an HCV infection, such as jaundice (turning yellow), fatigue, abdominal pain, nausea and loss of appetite, more than 80 percent of people with HCV have no symptoms at all. The viral infection becomes chronic in up to 85 percent of the people with this infection. A chronic disease is one that's either always present or comes back again and again.

Fortunately, the number of people

newly diagnosed with HCV infections has declined in recent years. This is due, primarily, to increased awareness and a safer American blood supply. The most common transmission route for HCV is sharing needles while injecting drugs. Tattoos and body piercing have also been identified as risks factors. HCV can also be spread from an infected mother to her child during childbirth. Others have contracted HCV infections from blood transfusions or organ transplants prior to 1992, hemodialysis, and getting clotting factors prior to 1987.

While there is no vaccine to prevent an HCV infection, there is effective treatment that can cure up to 80 percent of people with chronic hepatitis C. A single drug treatment with interferon alone or in combination with an antiviral drug — ribavirin is a good example — yields very good results in selected patients. The treatment regimen can be required for six months to

two years to get a complete cure.

Still, despite the advances we've made in treatment, about 5 percent of people with hepatitis C die from the resulting chronic liver disease. Currently, liver disease from HCV infection is the leading indication for a liver transplant. So, your friend probably had a liver transplant because he wasn't responsive to treatment and his liver was on the verge of failing due to his HCV infection. This probably saved his life.

People who have hepatitis C should make sure that every doctor who treats them knows that they have this disease. This is important so that he or she can avoid using medications that could harm the liver. Also, if you have hepatitis C, you should not drink alcohol or use over-the-counter medications that are taxing to the liver.

Prevention is the best method for dealing with hepatitis C. Here are a few tips to help you avoid an HCV infection: Do not use IV drugs and

avoid sharing needles. Do not share personal care items, like razors and toothbrushes, as they may have blood residue on them. Unless you're in a

long-term mutually monogamous relationship, always practice safe sex, using latex condoms.

strike his girlfriend if she angered him. Was this the basic attitude of nearly 17,000 people being killed by their domestic partners, during the early 1980's?

Although children had previously been thought not to develop a sense of real caring about others until they reached adulthood, researchers (Waxler, Yarrow, and King) found that even very young children developed a fairly good sense of empathy, an ability to understand another's feelings. When a parent had a headache or was crying due to receiving bad news, 2-year-old toddlers were observed to react with concern. They showed a desire to "fix" the problem and offered comfort and compassion to distressed parent. Other studies and news reports have told about older children organizing ways to respond quickly and with concern to a classmate, friend, family neighbor, or to a stranger, needing assistance. In addition, children have a natural affinity for animals and a desire to help them, such as a young teen beginning a shelter for unwanted dogs. Another study (Magen and Aharoni) supported that teenagers, helping others, felt very positive about their lives and had high hopes for their own futures.

Parents can try to encourage their children to become caring, just, and responsible, to counteract the children's exposure to violence, or television and on the streets. Similar to other behaviors that need shaping by parents, a basic issue is for the parents to be frank, honest, and upfront with the behaviors you like or don't like. Let children know how much it means to you by your behaving with kindness and responsibility: speak up in a firm and honest fashion, as soon as you see them doing something inappropriate; and keep your focus on the behavior and not on the child personally,

such as "What you did is not very nice" versus "YOU are not very nice!" It is so important to let your children know how highly you regard their kind behaviors toward others. "I saw how you helped the boy who fell and how thoughtful you were. I felt so proud of you!"

This is definitely an area where the parents' actions speak louder than words. Since children observe their parents and other adults' behaviors and attitudes, it is more likely that your children will be caring and compassionate, if you are consistently. Again, as in other circumstances, "Do as I say, not as I do" just does not work, especially when it comes to teaching about caring. Although there is not always time to do everything that you want, whenever and however you can, try to do small acts of caring that can be part of your family's life. Examples would be doing a favor for a neighbor, helping with a church project, and speaking up when someone is being treated cruelly. Another great idea is to have other caring people around your children so that they have several role models. Also, find some way, organization, church, or hospital, where your children can volunteer. In addition, one study found that children who see kindness on television tend to copy the same behaviors.

How would you rate the children in your family with regard to their level of caring for others? Remember that experts have pointed out that when children feel a more secure base at home, they're more likely to venture out and pay attention to others. It's when they feel deprived of love and nurturing from parents that they focus on themselves and their own needs. Furthermore, the parents having nurturing behaviors toward their children is a way for them to show positive role modeling for children.

Gladiator shields Rome's next ruler in ABC's lavish 'Empire'

by John Crook

The ultimate fate of the Roman republic sits on the broad shoulders of a resourceful gladiator in "Empire," a lavish six-hour limited series bowing with a two-hour premiere on ABC Tuesday, June 28.

The epic adventure, which continues on the next four successive Tuesdays and bucks the "all reality" slate of original network programming airing elsewhere, stars an international cast headed by Jonathan Cake ("The American Embassy") and newcomer Santiago Cabrera.

Cake, who plays Tyrannus, the fictional gladiator at the heart of the story, admits that he was wary about committing to a "toga project" that could easily go terribly wrong.

"I felt like the reason no one did a 'sword and sandal' movie for so long before Ridley Scott did 'Gladiator' was because it's an incredibly tough genre to do," the 36-year-old English actor explains. "The capering ghosts of Monty Python hang around it, and for good reason: It's a genre that's easy to mess up, easy to parody."

"Then I read the script, and I thought that the person who wrote it, Thomas Wheeler, had an incredibly strong grasp of Shakespeare, actually, and how Shakespeare wrote historical dramas, which was to worry less about the politics of it and to focus on these extraordinary characters."

"I think Thomas is very accurate about the politics, actually, but in the finished thing he

ABC's six-hour miniseries "Empire" debuts on Tuesday, June 28. The production, which was filmed entirely in Rome and south-

ern Italy, opens in 44 B.C. and focuses on Octavius — who was forced to leave Rome after the murder of his great uncle, Julius Caesar — and his bodyguard, a one-time gladiator named Tyrannus. Octavius would go on to become Rome's first emperor, Augustus Caesar. Under him, Rome's arts would flourish and its political

manages to give you a sense of these world-changing events that are happening because of the whims ... of these extraordinary people. He really captures something about ancient Rome, a mixture of the history and texture along with, of course, this absolutely helter-skelter adventure."

The story opens in 44 B.C., as Julius Caesar (Colm Feore) returns from Spain to find his Roman republic neglected by a corrupt Senate drunk on its own power. Admiring the arena skills of Tyrannus, Caesar offers the celebrated gladiator his freedom in return for his service and friendship.

Tyrannus is unable, however, to prevent the fatal attack on Caesar by Brutus (James Frain), Cas-

sius (Michael Maloney) and their co-conspirators, arriving only in time for the dying Caesar to make him swear to protect his successor, Octavius (Cabrera), Caesar's 18-year-old nephew.

The two men are forced into exile, where Tyrannus has his hands full trying to protect the handsome but headstrong Octavius from the multitude of enemies that surround them on every side.

"I think his uncle saw a high intelligence in Octavius more than anything else," Cabrera, 27, says of his often brash and naive character. "At the end of the day he was the ultimate politician, I think. Caesar saw in Octavius a mix of intelligence and sensitivity he thought the people would recognize.

"I could easily see them sitting at a table at Octavius' house, at lunchtime, and Caesar giving his very intimate thoughts about what is going on in Rome and this

boy just taking it all in from a very young age. It is his destiny, so when the time comes his hidden strengths and talents come out. He still has to grow, however, from being a brattish innocent into a passionate and nearly ruthless leader and strategist."

"Empire" was filmed on location in south central Italy, a spare-no-expense decision both actors say they found invaluable.

"The locations manager was keen to impress on us that many of the places we shot had never been seen on film before," Cake says. "It just makes everyone's jobs easier when you are standing there actually touching ancient stones instead of a set that wobbles. That goes very deeply into what a scene is about, because you feel the weight of history. It's like putting on the perfect costume or finding just the right sword. If you have the right backdrop, if it's real, it dignifies everything you do."

"Just the fact that this was the weather, the smells, the atmosphere, and then being in the actual places gave such a reality to the thing," Cabrera says. "You'd put these costumes on, this armor, and I would just feel like going for a run. You feel so athletic, as opposed to them restricting you. Quite the contrary. I'd get on a horse wearing that armor and feel as if I had been riding a horse all my life. It was very empowering."

Before departing for the five-month filming period in Italy, Cake spent three demanding months in Los Angeles with a physical trainer as well as a pair of "sword geeks" who drilled him for his complex and virtuosic arena battles.

"I wanted that to look as natural as possible, not like some guy who had worked at a gym and was picking up a sword for the first time," he explains. "Tyrannus must look as if his sword is

an extension of his arm."

And while he sadly was forced to forgo most of Italy's culinary treasures to stay in peak condition, Cake says the effort was worth it for a story he thinks will startle viewers with its sense of immediacy.

"The very best Shakespeare productions I've ever seen may have had the cast in doublet and hose, but it felt as if it was all happening now," he says. "Any show about history tells you more about the period when the show was made than about the actual historical period where it's set. 'Star Trek,' for example, tells you far more about the '60s and '70s than it does about 2050, or wherever it's set.

"You can't avoid that, nor should you. It's still a setting for drama. And if you want to write a show about the American influence abroad, the American 'empire,' then the Roman empire is a good place to start."

might would expand.

"Empire" uses historical figures in telling the story. The one exception is Tyrannus, who didn't actually exist, but represents the type of men who survived the arenas and used their skills as bodyguards. Stars of "Empire" include Colm Feore ("Chicago") as Julius Caesar, Santiago Cabrera ("Haven") as Octavius, and Jonathan Cake ("First Knight," Hallmark's "Noah's Ark" and the upcoming NBC series "Inconceivable") as Tyrannus.

There appears to be a resurgence of interest in the history of ancient Greece and Rome, as shown by such recent films as "Alexander" and "Gladiator." And now we have ABC's miniseries "Empire," which unscrolls on-screen June 28. Even the popular "Star Wars III: The Revenge of the Sith" seems to be a retelling of Rome's past glories, with its reminder that people often cede their power to the power hungry who promise to keep them safe from outside threats (as the Roman Senate did with Julius Caesar).

Jonathan Cake, who stars as Tyrannus, says, "There's always much to learn from the past, and Roman and Greek history —

which we like to think of as, perhaps, the first history of Western civilization — is filled with examples of how people use and misuse political power. In many ways, what happened back then has happened many times since, and is happening right now."

Cake says he wasn't disappointed to learn that Tyrannus was the only major character in "Empire" who wasn't real.

"At least, not in the physical sense," he says. "But I think what he represents is far more powerful and interesting than if he were a flesh-and-blood man. You see in him all the men who were sent to the arena to kill or be killed. And the fact that although he survived often enough to be given his freedom, he was still risking his life in becoming Octavius' protector."

Much like our own Secret Service sworn to "take a bullet" for the president?

"People who will put their own lives on the line to protect their leaders are part of an old tradition found probably everywhere in the world," Cake says.

Tyrannus was able to survive the arena partly because of his skill with a sword, which he uses to great effect to protect Octavius. Did Cake's martial-arts training help him with his swordplay?

"Sorry," he laughed. "Wrong actor. I don't know where that story comes from, but I am not a martial artist. No doubt, it would have helped if I were. I had very little sword training, so I didn't take to it easily at first. I had to work hard to get the moves right."

Besides being a wonderfully photographed spectacle, what else might audiences find in "Empire"?

"A great story, for one," Cake says. "No matter how many times you think you know all about Antony and Cleopatra, for example, and Caesar's murder, I expect you'll find something new (in 'Empire') that you didn't know before."

If he could meet with Tyrannus — not in the arena, but for a glass of wine just poured from an amphora taken off a Greek merchant ship — what would he talk to him about?

"So many things," Cake says. "I'd want him to tell me what it was like to know that you had to kill someone if you wanted to live? Did he ever think about the family he might have somewhere? Did he ever think he might be free one day, and if so, what he would do with his freedom? And what he experienced as the protector of Julius Caesar's heir, and what

might happen to him if Octavius was killed by his enemies? I'd also ask him about people like Marc Antony and Julius Caesar and others (who shaped our historical legacy)."

"The Longest Yard"



Running time: 109 minutes
MPAA rating: PG-13



Didn't Adam Sandler already make a football movie? Yes. It was "The Waterboy," and it was a much better football movie than "The Longest Yard," Sandler's latest attempt at trying to shed his emotionally retarded man-child persona.

The problem is, Adam Sandler is no Burt Reynolds (who starred in the original version back in the '70s), and putting Burt in your movie only reminds us of Sandler's (and the remake's) shortcomings.

Sandler plays Paul Crewe, a former NFL quarterback who was once accused of shaving points in a game. Crewe is arrested and sent to prison for reckless, drunk driving after spending nine years on a drunken bender.

The warden (James Cromwell) is a football nut, and all the guards are former college players who didn't

make the NFL cut. They play in some kind of prison league, and the warden forces Crewe to set up a pre-season warm-up game between the prisoners and the guards. The game is going to be televised on ESPN, because the warden, who has aspirations of being governor of Texas, wants the TV exposure.

Of course, the prisoners aren't supposed to win, so the warden frames Crewe for a murder he didn't commit in order to get Crewe to throw the game.

The plot is pretty much the same as the original, but the execution is way different. In the original, the guards and the warden were far more sadistic and cruel, which justified the

violence on the field. In Sandler's version, the guards come off as little more than schoolyard bullies — and not very bright ones, since the security is so lax that one of the prisoners always seems to have a freshly made McDonald's cheeseburger on hand. Another prisoner's justification for wanting to get back at the guards is because one big, bad guard wouldn't let him finish watching "The View."

Now you see the problem with "The Longest Yard." It's a comedy that wants so badly to be dramatic. The original was a gritty drama with moments of low comedy. The reason the original was a great movie was because of the confident swagger and screen presence of Burt Reynolds.

The reason Sandler's version fails is because Sandler doesn't have the machismo to pull it off. In locker-room terms, Sandler can't fill Reynolds' jock. Period.

Q I often watch the shopping channels, and I wonder how many of the celebrities actually work with the products they sell. For example, do they design the clothes or decide how a perfume should smell? — Karleen J.



Barbara Walters

A Although I wouldn't swear that Elizabeth Taylor heats a test tube over a Bunsen burner flame when her perfumes are being concocted, or that Susan Lucci actually sits down at a sewing machine to come up with a design prototype, the fact is the celebrities are very much involved in the products.

For one thing, while they may not design an outfit from the inside out (seaming, etc.) as professional designers do, they may sketch an outfit and work with the designers and give their approval for the final creation. They do the same with scents: Chemists create the fragrances (floral, musky, fruity, etc.) with the advice and consent of the celebrities. Ditto cosmetics, shoes, etc.

Q On "The View," I believe I heard Barbara Walters say once that she spent her teen years working in a New

York City nightclub. My neighbor, (with whom) I carpool, says that's not true. I can almost swear it is. — Maureen F.

A Barbara Walters' father was legendary showman Lou Walters, who for years ran the fabulous New York night spot "The Latin Quarter." Barbara says that after school, she would sometimes come down to the club to watch rehearsals for the spectacular shows, especially when a famous entertainer headlined. However, she never worked there.

Q Is it true that "Monster-in-Law" is the only "comeback" movie Jane Fonda decided to make? I recently heard that she wanted to do it so that it would help her sell her autobiography, and then she would retire from movies for good. — Genna L.

A Au contraire. Jane Fonda is said to be planning to reunite with former "Nine to Five" co-stars Lily Tomlin and Dolly Parton in a sequel to the hit movie

News of the Weird

Gerardo Flores, 19, was convicted of murder in June in Lufkin, Texas, in the death of the 5-month-old fetus of his girlfriend, Erica Basoria. Flores admitted that he had stood on Basoria's stomach several times at her request to induce a miscarriage, but Basoria had told authorities that she had also punched herself in the stomach several times. Under Texas law, killing a fetus is a capital offense, and so Flores automatically received a life sentence, but Basoria could not be charged because of her constitutional right to abortion.

The Entrepreneurial Spirit

— (1) British entrepreneur Colin Dowse recently introduced Sprayon-mud (about US\$14 a quart), dirty water chemically treated for greater stickiness, mainly for urban SUV owners to

pass themselves off as all-terrain adventurers. (2) The maker of Doggles (which for several years has sold sunglasses for dogs at about \$25) now offers corrective-lens Doggles starting at \$75, which veterinary ophthalmologists can prescribe as alternatives to \$2,000 lens-replacement surgery, according to a March report by KMGH-TV in Denver.

— In the last few years, Taiwan entrepreneurs have opened restaurants with motifs such as prisons, zombies and Mao Zedong, but the latest is Eric Wang's "Marton," in Kaohsiung, whose theme is the toilet. All seats are what you would think, with food served on a glass tabletop resting on a bathtub, and some of the delicacies are presented in miniature toilet bowls (among them, curry hot pot, and disturbingly, chocolate ice cream).

Science on the Cutting Edge

— Recent scholarly findings (reduced to their essence in a May Wall Street Journal column): It's much easier to identify someone if he is physically near you than if he is up to 450 feet away (Psychonomic Bulletin & Review, February). People who choose their careers carefully, rather than on a whim, experience greater job satisfaction (Journal of Economic Psychology, vol. 26, no.3). College students tend to drink more alcoholic beverages than they realize (Alcoholism: Clinical & Experimental Research, April). If patients voluntarily tell a doctor about a bad side effect of a medicine, they are more likely to be switched to a safer one than if they don't (Archives of Internal Medicine, January).

— According to a study by Professor Martin Gibala and others, pub-

lished in the June Journal of Applied Physiology, people can get the health benefits associated with two hours' cycling in just two minutes. Gibala said that over a two-week period, two hours daily of moderate-speed riding made cyclists no healthier than four all-out, to-the-max 30-second bursts daily (with four minutes' rest in between). (However, all subjects were already at least moderate exercisers.)

Leading Economic Indicators

— (1) New York state Assemblyman Adriano Espaillat, from Manhattan, introduced a bill in June to require a minimum wage for comedians (at least \$125 per 20-minute show at comedy clubs on weekends and \$28 on weekdays). (2) North Carolina correctional officials began rethinking inmate man-

ufacturing programs recently when they discovered that, even though they pay prisoners only \$3 a day in their T-shirt-making concession, suppliers in Bangladesh can make the shirts for 38 percent less.

— London's Housing Market: Agence France Presse reported in May that an agency had just rented out a 54-square-foot apartment in Notting Hill (loft bed over a kitchenette, closet and shower) for the equivalent of US\$1,065 a month. And in the Haringey Park neighborhood, developer Andrew Markey proposed to convert the kitchen and hallway of a house he owns into its own two-story townhouse (producing a living room 21 feet by 8 feet). Agents said such a house might go for the equivalent of US\$325,000, but

in June, the local council rejected his initial plans.

Man's Best Friend

In March, Mark Allen Shook, 43, attempting to flee (with his dog) Mountain Ranch, Calif., police officers who had come to arrest him on a domestic violence charge, was captured after a chaotic fight during which the dog bit off part of Shook's ear. And in Eltham, England, in May, a family's dog, chasing a ball, bumped the ladder on which a man was standing to trim some bushes with a chainsaw, causing him to fall and fatally slice the neck of his wife, who was holding the ladder.

More Things to Worry About

(1) Five Buddhist monks in Bangkok were defrocked in May after a street fight culmi-

nating years of hostility between two temples, according to a Reuters dispatch. Said one (who used brass knuckles), "When an ordinary person is given a middle-finger sign, he will be mad. So will I." (2) In May, a 1,500-pound camel named Poon, roaming around his home at the Mayle Farm in Shinnston, W.Va., decided to sit down on top of a woman who was painting a fence. No one could hear her muffled screams, but she managed to call 911 on her cell phone, and help arrived just as Poon had begun to bite her.

Least Competent Criminals

Easy Identifications: (1) Awiey "Chucky" Hernandez, 20, was arrested when he went to the 90th Precinct station house in Brooklyn, N.Y., to check on the status of a pal

and inadvertently stood directly in front of his own "wanted" poster (on robbery and drug charges). The in-custodial Hernandez had come to inquire about was Huquan "Guns" Gavin, 18, who appears with him on the poster. (2) Charles Cross Jr., was arrested on the street minutes after allegedly robbing a Fifth Third Bank in Louisville, Ky., in May, because he displayed the effects of having been looking directly into his stash bag at the moment the red-dye device exploded.

Update

Even though AIDS continues to spread through sub-Saharan Africa, the pernicious custom of the village "cleanser" persists in Zambia, Kenya, Malawi and other


countries (mentioned in News of the Weird in 2003). When a husband dies, the widow traditionally must break the marital bond by soon having sex again, lest the entire village be spiritually condemned. The preferred partner is a relative of the husband, but if none is available, the village leader calls on a professional "cleanser" who performs the task in exchange for a chicken or other remuneration. According to a May New York Times dispatch from Malawi, cleansers believe that wearing a condom will provoke other bad spirits.
