Two plead guilty to breaking into home

PRESTONSBURG — Two of three men who broke into a Muddy Branch home last April were sentenced in circuit court Friday to three-year prison terms.

Joshua Keith Hoover, 20, of Prestonsburg, and Todd Michael Gayheart, 19, of Wayland, will have to serve three years before beginning a

five-year probationary term, during which they will have to have no violations of law or risk going back to jail to serve out the remaining years of their sentences.

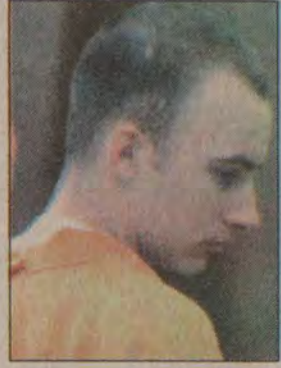
Terry Moore, 19, of Wayland, was the third man charged and is scheduled to enter a plea in the case on Nov. 18.

The three were arrested last April after Todd Hansford, who was cutting the lawn at his Muddy Branch home, spotted a all-terrain vehicle parked

behind his trailer. He realized that someone was inside his home and went to a nearby shed, where he kept a .22 rifle. He went back to his trailer and cautiously crept back to his home, surprising the three men as they exited.

At that time, Hoover tearfully admitted the crime to Hansford and apologized for breaking into his residence, where the trio had found some

Family's love reaches ACROSS BORDERS

ABBOTT CREEK — What defines the typical American family? Is it something to be framed on a wall, smiling, with blue eyes and fair skin? Does the picture include the faces of a father, a mother, a son, a daughter? With divorce rates increasing, the number of single-parent homes and immigration bringing new faces to this country, is the "typical" American family

definable at all?

When asked to define the word, "family," Cedar Trace residents John and Rachel Willoughby stumbled with their initial responses. How could they define something that encompasses so much in their home?

"A family doesn't have boundaries," Rachel said. "To me, it's not a look. It's not one picture."

"It's love," John said. "A family is all about love."

Adoption was always a "some-

day down the road" thing for this couple, who married eight years ago. They say they were "led" in their Christian faith to provide a home to an orphaned child.

Now that their dream has become a reality, their reality has shifted to include the misunderstandings of people inside and outside of their family — those who stop them at the checkout or a restaurant table, asking, "Where'd

Shooting case gets trial date

PRESTONSBURG — A trial date has been set for a McDowell man who stands accused of four counts of attempted murder for allegedly shooting into a car packed with four people last July.

Jeffrey Tackett, 42, appeared in court with his attorney, Ned Pillersdorf, of Prestonsburg, and was granted a March trial date for the July 10 incident.

Pillersdorf asked for a speedy trial and indicated

that he would like to try the case in December. But Commonwealth's Attorney Brent Turner said that in

light of Pillersdorf's recent revelation that a psychologist will testify that Tackett was acting in self-defense when he shot into the vehicle, the commonwealth will need more time

to evaluate the psychologist's report to decide if the commonwealth will need to have Tackett examined by its own doctor.

Tackett only had a histo-

Grave theft case sent to grand jury

PRESTONSBURG — A Salyersville couple who were arrested last week in connection with a series of grave marker thefts from Magoffin County cemeteries saw their charges waived to a grand jury after a preliminary hearing in district court on Wednesday.

Larry and Thelma Davidson, who are currently lodged at the Floyd County Detention Center under \$10,000 and \$5,000 bonds, respectively, will now have to wait and see if they will be indicted for the crimes which would then move their case up to cir-

cuit court.

Sgt. Steve Little, of the Floyd County Sheriff's Department, testified that the case came about when the owner of Mountain Metal, in West Prestonsburg, contacted the sheriff's office and said an employee of his bought some memorial plaques from a couple and did not realize that the company policy states that a letter from the family or cemetery acknowledging the sale had to be recorded. The worker realized the plaques were probably stolen after reading about an account of recent cemetery thefts in the

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Cruelty defendant faces revoked probation after horse killed

PRESTONSBURG — A Floyd County man who pleaded guilty in January to one count of second-degree animal cruelty is facing the revocation of his parole.

John Mark McKenzie, 33, of Ethel Drive, who was given a 90-day suspended sentence that was probated for two years in January, is

scheduled to appear in court on Nov. 14 to answer to a probation violation.

Assistant County Attorney Jimmy Ray "Blue" Marcum filed a motion to revoke McKenzie's probation on Sept. 14, alleging that he violated the terms of his probation July 29, when his 4-year-old mare, Candy, was struck by a car and killed on a roadway near his home.

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Odds and Ends

■ **CHICAGO** — Smells wafting from a chocolate factory might make mouths water, but federal regulators say they also could violate the Clean Air Act.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency cited the Blommer Chocolate Co. this week for alleged clean-air violations after someone complained about smells and emissions from the cocoa bean processing plant.

Inspectors saw excessive dust coming from machinery, the EPA said Wednesday in a statement.

"Inhaling high concentrations of particulates can affect children, the elderly and people with heart and lung diseases," the statement said.

The chocolate company, founded in 1939, has worked with EPA officials since last year to reduce emissions from its processing operations, said chief operating officer Peter Blommer.

Blommer has 30 days to discuss with the EPA how it will address the allegations. The EPA could fine the company or sue.

■ **SAN RAFAEL, Calif.** — Kevin Morgan is no dummy — but he got in trouble for driving with one.

Morgan, 28, got a \$351 citation for putting a kickboxing dummy in the passenger seat of his car, then driving in a lane reserved for vehicles carrying more than one person.

"I think he was pretty embarrassed because all the people driving by were laughing," Officer Will Thompson said. "About the only thing he said was, 'Well, that didn't help me very much today, did it?'"

Thompson often parks next to the car pool lane and stands on his car door rail to look down into passing vehicles. His point of view allowed him to see Morgan's dummy — which was wearing a Miami Dolphins jacket and a baseball cap, but had no

legs.

■ **FERNDALE, Mich.** — A man suspected of stealing discs from a video store was tripped up twice by his baggy pants before police captured him, authorities said.

James Green, 30, of Detroit, took about a half-dozen DVDs on Sunday night, and initially made his getaway on a bicycle, police said.

He abandoned the bike when officers spotted him in an alley, but his pants fell to his ankles and he tripped, Ferndale Detective Sgt. Patrick Jones said.

"Finally, he kicked off his pants and shoes" and jumped a fence into the backyard of a house where he was captured, Jones said.

Green pleaded guilty Monday to resisting arrest and retail fraud and was ordered jailed for 30 days.

■ **ANDERSON, S.C.** — Thelma Owens' passenger told her to step on it and she did, driving her 1988 Buick all the way through a business, police say.

"She went through four or five walls and out the back," police Cpl. Ron Colbert said. Police found her car sticking halfway out of the Blue Ridge Security office.

The 82-year-old driver was trying to turn out of a parking lot Thursday morning when her passenger told her to hit the gas because she was pulling in front of another car. Owens accelerated, but didn't turn her steering wheel, police said.

Investigators believe Owens was going at least 30 mph to make it through all the walls and the steel back door.

One person in the building was knocked unconscious, but he was expected to recover.

Owens has been charged with driving too fast for conditions.

■ **SAN CLEMENTE, Calif.** — A burglar apparently ran out

of time while trying to make a late-night snack at a pizza parlor, but police said he still got away with the dough.

A security camera showed the intruder breaking into Sonny's Pizza and Pasta early Monday, entering through a bathroom window, said Lt. Ted Boyne of the Orange County Sheriff's Department.

Once inside, the burglar put on an employee's shirt, then he made a pepperoni pizza and placed it in the oven, police said.

Employees arriving about 3 a.m. apparently scared him off before the pizza was ready. The burglar fled with about \$3,000.

"We found the pizza burned in the oven," Boyne said.

■ **BRATTLEBORO, Vt.** — Talk about being in a jam — a man convicted of selling stolen maple syrup could face a possible life sentence as a habitual offender.

A jury agreed with prosecutors that Stephen Bain, 52, sold more than 75 gallons of syrup to a New Hampshire wholesaler

just hours after it was discovered missing from the Dwight Miller Orchards in 2003.

Authorities said Bain had put his own stickers on the containers, in one case covering over a Miller sticker that was just partially removed.

Bain also was found guilty of felony possession of marijuana, in connection with pot authorities said was found at his home.

The charges normally could bring up to 13 years in prison. But someone can be declared a habitual offender after three prior felony convictions, and Bain had six.

"The jury decided he was a career criminal," Windham County Deputy State's Attorney Nat Seeley said after the trial. He said he would seek a "lengthy" prison sentence.

■ **BEVERLY HILLS, Calif.**

— The former director of the police department's shooting range was arrested for allegedly stealing guns, ammunition, badges and other property worth about \$30,000, authorities said.

Dan Pollara, 34, was arrested

Friday at his new job, police Sgt. Mike Foxen said.

Pollara, who was charged with stealing police property, was released on \$20,000 bail. He could not immediately be located for comment Tuesday.

Pollara, who worked for the Beverly Hills Police Department for more than seven years, recently resigned to take a position with a government agency in Ventura County, authorities said.

After his arrest his home and car were searched. Police recovered guns, ammunition, badges, gun parts, police memorabilia and Police Department records.

■ **PERRY TOWNSHIP, Mich.** — Things got out of hand for the second time in two years at a wedding reception in Shiawassee County. A guest lost part of a finger during a fight.

Philip L. Michalek, 26, was accused of biting off the tip of another man's thumb during a scuffle Saturday night outside the Perry Township Hall, police said.

Michalek, 26, was arraigned

Monday on an assault charge and jailed with bond set at \$10,000. If convicted, he could face 10 years in prison.

Police said Michalek was scuffling with Ryan Dickey, 23, when the incident occurred. Dickey was taken to a Lansing hospital, but doctors could not reattach the severed part of his thumb, authorities said. He has since been released from the hospital.

State police Detective Sgt. Mark Pendergraft said Michalek and Dickey had a dispute and went to the parking lot. "They got into a scuffle, and the victim's thumb ended up in the suspect's mouth," he told The Flint Journal.

In 2003, a wedding guest was arrested after biting off part of a man's finger, biting the thumb of the bridegroom and knocking down the bridegroom's mother during a fracas involving several people outside a wedding hall in Corunna.

In that case, the guest pleaded no contest to assault and battery and felonious assault charges.

you get them brown-skinned babies?" "How much did you pay for them?"

The Willoughbys have four children. This year, their 5-year-old twins, Madison and Makensie, opened their minds, then their hearts, then their arms to their new Guatemalan-born brothers, Maken, who is 11 months old, and Maxwell, who is 9 months old.

Makensie gets angry when people ask where her brothers are from.

"They're from Prestonsburg!" she recently told one woman in a department store.

John, 31, and Rachel, 30, examined all the possibilities when they researched international adoption: cultural differences, finances, possible medical problems, educational needs and racial prejudice, to name a few. What they didn't research is what they found when they brought their baby boys home — how to correctly answer those ill-thought questions or comments made by people who don't see beyond the typical.

Many Americans are against international adoption. John says the acceptance of international adoption will not be fully realized in this country without an "evolution in thought process."

"When television came out, there was, maybe, one person in the neighborhood who had one. It was a big thing," he said. "When TVs became more common, people didn't think about it anymore."

John's way of understanding has taken hold of the Willoughby household. They want cultural awareness to replace former understandings of what it means to be an Eastern Kentucky American.

Because they visited Guatemala three times during the process of the adoptions, John and Rachel were able to petition the Guatemalan government for IR3 Visas for their boys. The documents guaranteed American citizenship to Maken and Maxwell as soon as their planes touched down on American soil. One day, either one or both of them could be elected president.

"But people don't realize they're our own kids," Rachel said. "We didn't bring a puppy home... Maken and Max are my children. They were born my children. I believe that with all of my heart."

The boys, both born as Mayan Indians, were chosen for adoption through Adoption Assistance Inc., out of Danville, a nonprofit agency that collaborated with a Florida-based international Christian adoption group called Celebrate Children. Rachel said the family chose to adopt from Guatemala because they believed they "could make that country a part of our [adopted] children's lives and part of our girls' lives."

And that's what they're doing, every day.

A Mayan Indian calendar, hand woven in brightly colored tapestry (with pictures and forms instead of numbers) hangs

framed near entrance of the Willoughby home, complementing many other Guatemalan additions recently added. Guatemalan meals are now family favorites. Mayan Indian holidays have been researched and discussed. Rachel says her immediate goal is finding someone fluent in Mayan Indian tradition who can interpret the meaning of a handmade "story quilt" that hangs upstairs. The story can be told to the children at bedtime, she said.

John and Rachel met Maken during their first trip to Guatemala, a missionary trip in which they worked in orphanages that were packed with abandoned children. They decided to adopt Maken, a child they had never seen, after viewing his medical history record. His young birth mother testified that she wanted better opportunities for her son.

On Valentine's Day, Rachel was interrupted during a work meeting by a telephone call from the adoption agency. She and John, who refinanced their home to pay fees, attorneys and other costs associated with the adoption, told their agency representative that they weren't sure they could financially care for another child. Rachel, still waiting for the final word on Maken's adoption, was told about a Christian-operated Crisis Pregnancy Center in Guatemala. The center, modeled after many in America, works with unwed pregnant mothers to prevent abortions. It was Maxwell's primary caretaker. His medical care was not as good as the care provided to Maken, who stayed with a foster mother until his adoption was finalized. Maxwell was 6 weeks old before the Willoughbys decided to adopt him. Rachel calls him her "reserved romantic." Maken, she says, is the "funny goofball that everyone will love."

When John and Rachel visited the poverty-stricken country, people came to them on the street bearing two messages. Some, fearing Americans, kept their distance. Others ran up and kissed them on the cheeks, saying things like, "Thank you for taking our babies to America." Rachel, remembering prejudicial stigmas attached to the Eastern Kentucky dialect, said their comments made her proud to live in a place that others wanted to be a part of, a place of hope and opportunity. It made her reexamine this country and her place in it.

At the dinner table, Rachel told her daughters about one married Guatemalan woman who lied about her husband in order to give her child to an American home.

Abortion is illegal, and extremely punishable, in Guatemala, a predominately Catholic country, and adoption is only available to orphaned children from single-parent homes. The typical Guatemalan city is built in communities of small shack-type residences. Rachel said those living there usually sleep outside of their

homes, leaving all of their possessions inside. Guatemalans searching for opportunities risk their lives as illegal immigrants. Some are shot trying to cross borders, while others die before they get there.

Rachel talked about a "city for children," a community of orphanages that was built on a refurbished American-made medical waste dump in Guatemala (the same kind of waste dump seen in many neighboring countries). Many babies are abandoned in these dumps, Rachel said, because mothers know that police won't search for people "dumping" children there.

In Guatemala, an orphaned child is "on the streets" if he or she isn't adopted by the age of 16.

The Willoughbys pray for Guatemala to be economically stronger so that Maken and Maxwell can be proud of their culture and their heritage. Today, when Madison and Mackensie surf the Internet, they go to precious.org, a photography-based adoption website, and pray for orphaned children in other countries.

They remember their names. "People, especially older people, say, 'Oh, Honey, that's so nice what you did for those kids,'" Rachel said. "We don't feel that we've done anything."

"People say, 'Those kids are blessed because of you,'" John said, "and we're the ones who are blessed. They have enriched our lives."

(Maken, nearly walking, spent most of the evening Wednesday throwing a ball on the living room floor and uncontrollably laughing at the thump of it. His laughter could be heard throughout the house, and it was followed by the smiles and giggles of his brother, his sisters and his parents, who say that his life, like his brother's, is as if he had been born of them.)

The couple say that even the chaotic times are worth it. Even though she now has more work to do than she ever imagined, Rachel says she can't wait to come home every day to be with her children and to "do it all over again."

When asked when the family would tell Maken and Maxwell about their adoption, Rachel seemed surprised.

"I don't have to tell them if it's something that's a part of their life," she said. "It won't be a pink elephant in a closet that has to come out. It's something they'll always know."

She talked about rocking Maken to sleep in his room, while telling him about the very first time she rocked him to sleep in Guatemala last December.

The couple know, without a doubt, that their boys will face prejudice or misunderstanding at some point in their lives. Sixteen years down the road, Rachel says, someone will see her son driving, and they will say, either aloud or to themselves, "Now, what's that Mexican doing with that car?"

John says they will "deal

with whatever comes" in the lives of their children, with whom the family instantaneously connected, whether they were born American, or born waiting for America.

"Baby poop sure is stinky," Rachel said, changing Maxwell's diaper. "It sure is. Yes, it is," she played.

"Yes, poop does stink," John said, walking into the kitchen. "It doesn't matter what country you come from."

FYI

■ November is National Adoption Awareness month.

The Adoption Assistance, Inc. group will host a Bluegrass Adoption Fair in Lexington on Nov. 13. Several adoption-affiliated agencies will participate. For more information call 1-800-432-9346.

■ More than 1.5 million U.S. families adopted children.

■ Kentucky does not assist in international adoptions. Kentucky adoption agencies connect families seeking international adoptions with agencies in other states.

■ The adoption option is available to nearly every American. Adoptive families can be single, married, have other children, rent or own their homes, have modest incomes, have disabilities, or parents older than 40. Regulations and fees vary by agency and country.

■ Adoption is not a second option for families who can't have biological children. It's a different option for many families, whether they are able to have biological children.

■ Numerous grants are available to families wanting to adopt.

■ The federal government give \$10,000 tax credit to adoptive families.

■ Julian Erwin, Executive Director of Adoption Assistance Inc., says that about half of all adoptive families have biological children in addition to their adopted children.

■ In 2002, white Russian children one of the most frequently internationally adopted children in the U.S. That same year, IR3 and IR4 Visas were given to 2,361 orphaned immigrants. More current statistics are not available at this time.

■ Adoptive families do not pay for their children. They pay medical expenses, legal fees, orphanage donations, home study fees, and other necessary services.

■ The U.S. recently opened a free trade agreement with Guatemala.

■ The popular television series "Survivor" filmed its latest series in Guatemala.

Today's Highlight in History: On Nov. 6, 1860, former Illinois congressman Abraham Lincoln defeated three other candidates for the presidency.

On this date:

■ In 1854, the "king" of American march music, John Philip Sousa, was born in Washington, D.C.

■ In 1861, Jefferson Davis was elected to a six-year term as president of the Confederacy.

■ In 1888, Benjamin Harrison won the presidential election, defeating incumbent Grover Cleveland with enough electoral votes, even though Cleveland led in the popular vote.

■ In 1893, composer Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky died in St. Petersburg, Russia, at age 53.

■ In 1900, President McKinley was re-elected, beating Democrat William Jennings Bryan.

■ In 1906, Republican Charles Evans Hughes was elected governor of New York, defeating newspaper publisher William Randolph Hearst.

■ In 1928, in a first, the results of Herbert Hoover's election victory over Alfred E. Smith were flashed onto an electric sign outside The New York Times building.

■ In 1956, President Eisenhower won re-election, defeating Democrat Adlai E. Stevenson.

■ In 1976, Benjamin L. Hooks was chosen to be the new executive director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, succeeding Roy Wilkins.

■ In 1977, 39 people were killed when an earthen dam burst, sending a wall of water through Toccoa Falls Bible College in Georgia.

Ten years ago: Funeral services were held in Jerusalem for assassinated Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin. President Clinton led the U.S.

delegation; Arab dignitaries also attended, including Jordan's King Hussein and Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak. Cleveland Browns owner Art Modell announced plans to move his team to Baltimore.

Five years ago: On Election Eve, George W. Bush and Al Gore campaigned through the final hours of their run for the White House, seeking last-minute momentum in a costly and exhausting race to become the nation's 43rd president. Surgeons in Manchester, England, separated conjoined twin girls, a procedure that involved allowing one of the girls to die, while giving the survivor a chance at life.

One year ago: An Ivory Coast airstrike killed nine French peacekeepers and an American aid worker, prompting France to wipe out the country's modest air force. The designers of SpaceShipOne, the first privately manned rocket to burst into space, were handed a \$10 million check and the Ansari X Prize trophy.

A graduate of Furman University, Crotts earned a Master of Divinity degree from Emory University. He also studied at the University of London and the L'Abri Fellowship of Switzerland. He has been a pas-

tor for more than 25 years, continues to work on college campuses in a variety of roles, and has written several books.

A student-led service is planned for Wednesday, Nov. 9, at 7 p.m. in Booth Auditorium. The service will include praise and worship, special singing, skits, testimonies and prayer.

Officials: Meth law having impact on meth trade

FRANKFORT — Officials have noticed changes in the illicit methamphetamine trade since a state law took effect that restricts the sale of cold and allergy drugs that contain a key ingredient for making meth.

In September, police busted 12 meth labs, compared to 41 during the same month a year ago, said Teresa Barton, executive director of the Kentucky Office of Drug Control Policy.

Since the late 1990s, the number of meth labs has dramatically risen every year, with Kentucky's 468 lab busts so far in 2005 ranking sixth among U.S. states.

Also, because of a log-signing rule for people buying certain cold and allergy drugs, state and local police have opened 160 criminal investigations, Barton said Thursday. Some of those investigations have led to indictments, but charges are pending in most cases, she said. Cold and allergy medicines

typically contain pseudoephedrine, a key ingredient for making meth. Since June, customers buying the drugs have had to show identification, sign a log and limit their purchases over 30 days to 9 grams, typically 300 pills.

Lt. Gov. Steve Pence said the new law has cut off the source of ingredients, which likely is going to push dealers and users to import pseudoephedrine or meth.

"The message we want to send to those who would try to bring the drug here is, 'Avoid Kentucky at all costs,'" said Pence, who is also secretary of the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet.

Figures were not available to show whether shipments of meth into the state have increased in recent months, he said.

But Calloway County Commonwealth's Attorney Gale Cook said she has noticed an

increase in the amount of crystal meth, a purer form of the drug usually made in other states or in Mexico.

Pseudoephedrine also is being brought into Kentucky from neighboring states that do not have the restrictions that Kentucky does, she said.

Gov. Ernie Fletcher's administration may ask legislators to consider changing the state's meth laws to allow computerization of pharmacy logs for better tracking and expansion of drug-treatment programs, which now are available in nine county jails, Barton said.

The law also made it a crime to operate a meth lab in the presence of children.

That remains a problem, even with the drop in meth labs, said Kentucky State Police Commissioner Mark Miller. So far this year, 71 children have been found at such locations, compared to 94 in all of 2004, he said.

Tougher sentences will protect children

Lt. Gov. Steve Pence recognizes that Kentucky needs to take measured steps to prevent the horrific crimes against children that have occurred recently in other states.

On a recent visit to western Kentucky, Pence touted the work of a task force that studied the state's sexual offender laws and made recommendations for strengthening those laws, especially those that apply to sexual violence against children.

The findings of the Kentucky Coalition Against Sexual Assault will form the basis of proposed legislation aimed at preventing brutal crimes such as the kidnapping and murder of 9-year-old Jessica Lunsford. Outrage over Jessica's case — and another involving the murder of 13-year-old Sarah Lunde — prompted the Florida Legislature to pass the nation's toughest law against sex offenders who prey on children.

The man charged with murder, kidnapping and sexual assault in connection with Jessica Lunsford's death had an extensive criminal record that included sex crimes. At the time Jessica disappeared, the man was living in a mobile home 150 yards from her home.

A registered sex offender was charged with the murder of Sarah Lunde.

Pence noted that sex offenders often commit dozens of assaults before they are finally arrested and charged with a crime. "We want to act now before we have to react to a major offense ... like (the murders) in Florida and other states," he said.

... The Kentucky task force issued a list of recommendations for legislative action, including establishing a mandatory life sentence without parole for second-offense sexual assault against a child, classifying all felony sex offenses as violent crimes and requiring that felony sex offenders be listed for life on the state's sex offender registry.

... Kentucky legislators should join Pence in supporting enhanced criminal penalties for child molesters. ...

Society can't construct a perfect defense against sexual predators, but the justice system can do a better job of identifying these criminals and ensuring they are locked up for long periods.

The legislation Lt. Gov. Pence and the Justice Cabinet are working on emphasizes the role of tough sentencing in preventing attacks on children. If the main recommendations of the Fletcher administration's task force are adopted by the legislature, Kentucky should be a safer place for children.

Guilty of politics

Tom DeLay might be guilty of something. He might be a ruthless operator. He might be a right-wing zealot. But he almost certainly broke no laws in the case brought against him by Democratic District Attorney Ronnie Earle in Texas.

Liberals loathe Tom DeLay, but even a Christian pro-life former exterminator from Texas doesn't deserve the abuse to which DeLay is being subjected.

Democrats should recall their aversion to the politicized prosecutions from the Clinton years. A prosecutor has enormous power, and unless he wields it properly, he himself becomes an instrument of injustice.

In the Earle case, DeLay seems guilty only of committing politics. In 2002, he spearheaded a Republican takeover of the Texas House that meant Republicans could redraw the state's congressional districts and pick up five seats in 2004. Immediately after the GOP's victory, Earle started investigating.



He focused on a transaction between the DeLay-founded Texans for a Republican Majority PAC (TRMPAC) and the Republican National State Elections Committee (RNSEC). In Texas, it is illegal for corporations to give money to candidates. TRMPAC raised \$190,000 from corporations that it sent to RNSEC, which passed it to candidates in states where corporate dollars are legal. Then, RNSEC sent the same amount — or so Earle alleges — to Texas candidates from an account that had been raised from individuals. Earle says this is a crime, although he is hazy on why.

For a transaction to be money laundering, the money involved has to be tainted. But both ends of the TRMPAC transaction were legal. It also has to be the same money coming out both ends. But the TRMPAC money went into one account at RNSEC, and the money going to Texas came from another.

A formality? Perhaps. But according to campaign-finance expert James Bopp, both parties engaged in TRMPAC-like swaps thousands of times prior to passage of the McCain-Feingold campaign-finance reform after the 2002 election.

"It was extremely common," he says, "and everyone understood it was totally legal."

Which is why DeLay would have been advised that TRMPAC was doing nothing wrong. DeLay often walks up to the line, but we have laws so that everyone knows where the line is. If that line is vague or shifts after the fact, you don't have the rule of law, but a morass open to exploitation by prosecutors with partisan or personal motives. Earle has both.

He is the district attorney from liberal Travis County and has made his animus to Tom DeLay obvious. Most members of the original grand jury were Democrats, the kind of partisan advantage Earle will lose if the case ever makes it out of his home turf. Although no one can say for certain until all the facts are aired, DeLay will probably prevail, either by getting the charges thrown out or by winning at trial or eventually on appeal.

But the damage may already be done. When House Republicans re-instated a rule saying that members of their leadership had to step aside if indicted, they invited Earle to find a way to ruin DeLay's career. He did. DeLay's opponents can enjoy the spectacle and relish the result, but they shouldn't pretend that it is justice.

The wheels are coming off

The President's chief political adviser, Karl (Skipper) Rove, stands trembling on the brink of indictment in the same case.

- Bush ally Tom (Snapper) DeLay, has been indicted on charges of campaign law violations and has stepped down as House Majority Leader.

- The leader of the president's party in the Senate, Bill (Snoopy) Frist, is being investigated by the Security and

Exchange Commission for possible violation of the terms of his "blind trust," in other words, insider trading.

- The war in Iraq continues to be the war in Iraq: Two thousand American dead and counting. Things are so bad that the Pentagon has started to emphasize "body counts" of the people we kill, a sure sign a war is on the skids (see Vietnam).

- Gasoline prices continue to hover near the \$3-a-gallon mark, forcing the President to utter the dreaded word "conservation."

How appalling it must be for Mr. Bush. How disquieting. How delightful. Don't misunderstand me, I'm a patriotic American and I wish the president every success (with the possible exception of political). I even have sympathy for him. How much sympathy?

Just as much as the Vituperative Right had for Bill Clinton when they impeached him for lying about an egregious sexual indiscretion. That much.

I think it marvelously ironic that administration apologists are now complaining that Special Prosecutor Ernest Fitzgerald is being overzealous in his pursuit of Rove and Libby. They say he's trying to convict them of lying about something that was no big deal.

Really? Where were all those months when Special Prosecutor Ken Starr was playing Inspector Javert to Bill Clinton's Jean Valjean or when Martha Stewart got sent up for lying to an FBI agent about a stock deal that didn't amount to much? And how about Henry Cisneros the Clinton cabinet member

who's now in his tenth year of being investigated for a relatively trivial lie?

I argued against all those prosecutions but the Holy Right said the foundation of our legal system depends on the absolute truthfulness of witnesses.

Well, they convinced me. If Scooter or Skipper or even Sneaky lied or fibbed or misled federal officials about their roles in outing a CIA agent, I think they should go to the slammer. Ms. Miers, it turned out, was not done in by Democrats fighting for a less conservative nominee; she was torpedoed by the Hardcore Right because it was afraid she wouldn't be conservative enough.

This presents President Bush with a real dilemma. Does he nominate a saber-toothed conservative to placate his conservative base and risk a Democratic filibuster in the Senate that will leave blood all over the floor? Or does he try and find a compromise candidate mildly acceptable to both sides?

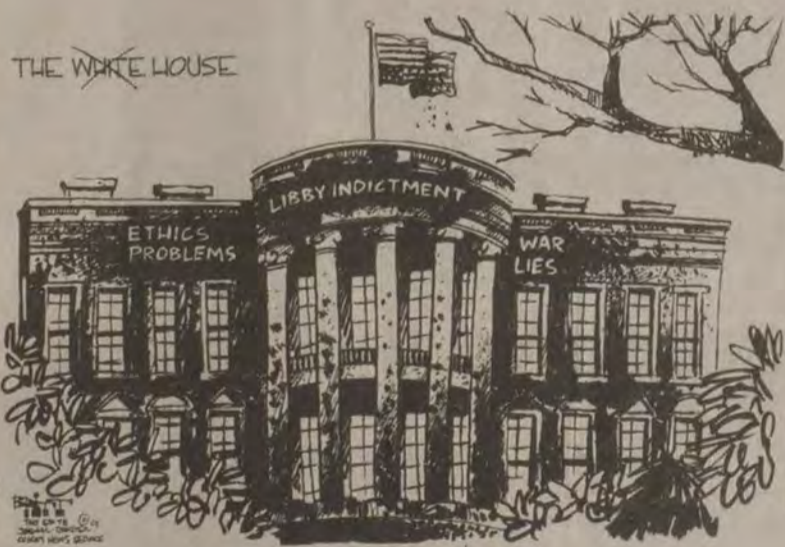
The Right has exhibited little talent for compromise and the Democratic leadership, what there is of it, has promised to bring Senate business to a halt if it is steamrolled on a nomination.

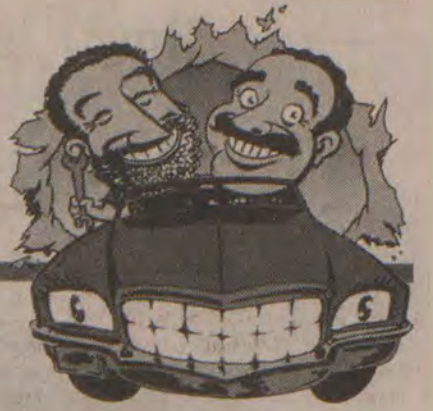

Roger Corman's ability to cash in on popular film trends led to the creation of this killer fish classic which appealed to audiences still waiting for the next "Jaws." Joe Dante ("The Howling") got his start editing film trailers for Corman and hits one out of the park with this film, which was the second he made for Corman before hitting the big time with films like "Gremlins."

The carnage begins when two backpacking teens break into a seemingly abandoned government testing facility. Finding a pool on the site gets them so excited that they opt to go skinny-dipping, even though there is obviously no lifeguard on duty. Turns out even David Hasselhoff couldn't rescue these two, as they are promptly set upon by a school of mutated piranha.

The teens turn out to have had rich parents and so an investigator turns up looking for them. She tracks their movements to the closed facility and spies their backpacks by the pool. She decides to empty the pool to see if they are at the bottom of it, which turns out to be a decision that ranks up there with giving film roles to Paris Hilton.

Draining the pool frees the piranha into an underground stream which leads them to the local river. Here they are free to menace plenty of folks as they wind their way downstream to attend the opening festivities of a lake side resort.

What makes this one swim is a tight script by John Sayles ("Eight Men Out"), which includes snappy dialogue, a message about messing with Mother Nature and plenty of opportunities for bikini clad cast members to run afoul of some hungry fish.

Dante directs it all with a sure hand and manages to put together enough talent to give the film some bite. The fish effects are constructed by Rob Bottin ("The Thing") and Chris Walas ("The Fly") and mostly look good.

The cast is game, too, with veterans like Kevin MacCarthy and Keenan Wynn showing up to collect a paycheck before becoming fish bait.

The special edition DVD, however, is the biggest treat. The bloopers alone are hilarious, with Wynn proving that he never met a line of dialogue he could remember, which prompts him to swear like a sailor every time he is called upon to say something. The disc also has a decent making-of short, as well as an insert which reproduces the ad campaign the studio sent to cinemas that booked the film. One idea they outline for theater owners is to scatter dead piranha at "various strategic locations along the banks of your local lakes and

The lasting value of building boys

Soon after I went into the motivation business, back in 1970, I learned a valuable truth or lesson that has served me well for the past 35-plus years. Independent. The staff at Mountain Metal was able to describe the couple and furthered the investigation by telling Sheriff John K. Blackburn that the couple were regulars who stopped by the scrap yard every day around 2:30 p.m.

Little said that he followed the couple onto Route 114 that same afternoon after their daily visit to the location. He approached the couple and asked if they knew a Thelma Cole. That name was the one the Davidsons used when signing receipts for the markers which they were selling as scrap metal for \$15 a piece. During the course of the conversation they admitted to using the alias, which was Thelma Davidson's maiden name.

Little also testified to interviewing the couple later in the day at the Floyd County Detention Center after five more grave markers were recovered at Mountain Metal that were sold

by them using the alias. At that time they told Little that they used the alias because Larry Davidson received Social Security benefits and didn't want to report the income.

During the course of the hearing it was revealed that Magoffin County is also charging the couple with the actual thefts while Floyd County pursues charges of receiving stolen property. The value of replacing the markers, Little reported, was \$600 per marker, which makes the crime a felony.

Magoffin County Sheriff Randall Jordan reported that plaques were severely damaged after being pried off the tombstones where they had been set in concrete. Each brass plaque stolen honored a war veteran buried at the cemeteries in Salyersville and denoted the veterans' years of military service as well as their names, ranks and the conflicts in which they served.

ry with one individual in the car and that was Shawn Sexton, who had been his tenant. At Tackett's preliminary hearing last summer, Trooper B.J. Caudill testified that troopers had been called to a Stop and Shop to break up an altercation between Sexton and Tackett prior to the shooting but that neither party was still on the premises when they arrived. For the hearing, Tackett was represented by Mike Endicott, who asked Caudill if he was aware of another incident in which Sexton threatened Tackett with a gun. Caudill responded that he knew of no such incident.

The shooting occurred at the Vance Kwik Mart, where witnesses reported that Tackett emptied a rifle into the car containing Sexton but that he only managed to injure the other three parties in the car. Tackett fled the scene and said he threw the rifle out of his car window. It

has yet to be recovered.

Later on in the evening of July 10, Tackett called the Floyd County Sheriff's Department and allegedly indicated he was the man who had been involved in the shooting. He reportedly cried during the course of the call and asked the dispatcher repeatedly if anyone had been hurt. The dispatcher was able to calm Tackett down and sent deputies to his location after determining that he no longer had a gun.

Authorities were able to arrest Tackett without incident at his girlfriend's home in Riley Branch.

Car recommendations for flood-prone areas

Dear Tom and Ray:
In the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, I'm rethinking my requirements for a new car. I live in the barrier islands off the coast of Georgia. Several times a year, when the tide rises exceptionally high, I can't get home (or leave) at high tide. We always evacuate in case of hurricanes, but when we evacuate, we can't always anticipate what we will encounter on the way. Is there anywhere I can find information about which cars are the safest and most reliable to transport me through water? Thanks.
— Celia

TOM: Well, water is very difficult for cars. Even a modest amount of water — anything over the axles — can cause big troubles. So, I would say the key things you should look for are high ground clearance, a high-mounted air intake and an engine-management computer that's not mounted low (like under the seat).

RAY: Right. The air intake is probably the most important. If water gets in through the engine's air intake and fills up one or more of the cylinders, the car will hydro-lock, and will immediately become as useful as a large fishing weight.

TOM: There are some vehicles that are designed to be able to forge moderate amounts of water — Land Cruisers, Land Rovers and Jeep Wranglers, for instance. But the problem is, if you buy one of those vehicles to get you through 2 feet of water once a year, you're stuck with it for the other 364 days, too.

RAY: The big SUVs, like the Land Cruiser, are expensive to buy, expensive to maintain and drink copious amounts of gasoline — which is of increasing concern to those of us not named Getty.

TOM: The Jeep Wrangler, on the other hand, is less expensive to buy and maintain. But it drives like a basketball. And the dental bills from having your teeth smash together at every pothole are going to add up, too.

RAY: So I'd say there are a couple of options you can pursue, Celia. One is to buy an old beater SUV or pickup truck that you use only for evacuation. Then you don't really have to care about the gas mileage or the ride comfort.

TOM: Any truck with good ground clearance and a high-mounted engine-management computer will work. Because if



you need to, you can have your mechanic install an air snorkel, which is just like the thing you use with flippers and a snorkeling mask. It attaches to the air intake, and extends it up above the hood.

RAY: But there are three downsides to that plan. One is that you have to have room to store an extra vehicle. Two, you have to keep it maintained to make sure it'll start when you really need it to. And three, what if you're not home when the flood comes? If the vehicle is stored in your garage or your yard, it's not going to help you GET home.

TOM: So in your case, I'd recommend a compromise vehicle, like the Jeep Liberty with the diesel engine. The Liberty has many of the off-road qualities of the Wrangler, including an air intake placed up near the hood. But its ride and handling aren't nearly as barbaric as the Wrangler's, and it gets gas mileage in the mid-20s. It's a car you could drive every day and not curse us for recommending.

RAY: The diesel engine is another plus if you're concerned about getting through water. Diesels don't need "spark" for combustion. So, you don't have to worry about washing out your ignition system and stalling mid-puddle.

TOM: But do be careful, and get some instruction before you actually have to drive through any serious amount of water. If the water is moving, your vehicle can literally be washed away. And remember, the only vehicle that's really designed to handle high water is the one we call "a boat."

Grand jury still has 'mountain of evidence'

FRANKFORT — Only half of the possible evidence collected by investigators in the personnel probe into Gov. Ernie Fletcher's administration has been presented to the Franklin County special grand jury, a prosecutor said Thursday.

There is still "a mountain of evidence" that remains sealed by the court and that grand jurors have not yet seen, Assistant Attorney General Scott Crawford-Sutherland told reporters.

So far, investigators and prosecutors have had access to 10 of the approximately 30 computers seized for evidence, Crawford-Sutherland said. The others, including Fletcher's e-mail server, remain under court seal and their contents remain unknown, he said.

"That's a huge amount of evidence," Crawford-Sutherland said.

Lawyers for the attorney

general's office and the Fletcher administration have disagreed for months over which people's e-mail accounts should be available. On Wednesday, Franklin County Circuit Judge William Graham told attorneys he wanted the matter resolved.

A hearing in the matter is scheduled for next Thursday.

Crawford-Sutherland said other "critical pieces of evidence" still under court seal include the computer server that housed the electronic documents for Local Initiatives for a New Kentucky (LINK) office. That office has at times been at the center of the investigation.

Also still under court seal are 28 CDs that contain e-mails dating back to the start of the investigation in May, Crawford-Sutherland said.

"It is absolutely essential that we get access to them," he said.

Crawford-Sutherland also said the investigation should continue until he was "satisfied and the grand jury is satisfied" that all of the relevant evidence

had been produced.

"It would be negligent, and I guess in an understated sort of way, to shut this grand jury investigation down without the grand jury having seen what was on the governor's e-mail server," he said. "And that's why we continue to fight efforts by the administration to halt the investigation before the grand jury has seen all the evidence."

On Wednesday, Graham said he wanted a resolution to what should happen with the thousands of sealed documents, which include e-mail accounts and other electronic documents. Graham said he wanted the question addressed because it has been "a major drag" on the grand jury's ability to conduct its investigation.

Fletcher's lawyer, Sheryl Snyder, said Wednesday that prosecutors were seeking access to all the e-mails contained on the various servers, some of which could include sensitive political information. That also included e-mail accounts for

some people, such as a summer intern, who were not relevant to the investigation, Snyder said.

Still, Crawford-Sutherland said he was "looking forward" to having the issue resolved and "getting this evidence before the grand jury soon."

Since the investigation started, the special grand jury has indicted 13 current or former administration officials stemming from the investigation. The governor has pardoned nine people, and fired others — including some who had been pardoned.

Meanwhile, the special grand jury met in Frankfort Thursday.

Former Medicaid Commissioner Mike Robinson appeared for about six minutes before the grand jury. His attorney, Guthrie True, told reporters Robinson did not answer the grand jury's questions on his advice.

Six other people appeared before the grand jury throughout the day but refused to identify themselves to reporters.

The horse had been running loose on the roadway, Marcum claimed.

The other horse, a 15-year-old stallion named Tarzan, drowned before officials arrived

at the scene.

Rescuers said that Candy was entangled and floating on a tree branch that normally stands between 6 to 7 feet above ground level.

McKenzie, who remained inside his home during much of the rescue, said he went back to bed earlier that morning after another rescue agency refused to attempt a swift water rescue.

He said he could not "stand

and watch it die."

The Floyd County Detention Center reported that McKenzie was arrested on Oct. 15 for failing to appear in court for a hearing on Sept. 23. He was released the following day, they said.

District Judge Eric Hall signed the order on Nov. 1, scheduling the revocation hearing. He also appointed a public advocate to represent McKenzie.

LOUISVILLE — Every year is a new beginning. Louisville women's basketball coach Tom Collen said Friday, but this year that beginning will be in a new conference.

The Cardinals — who migrated to the Big East from Conference USA along with Cincinnati, DePaul, Marquette and South Florida — will be competing in the largest and perhaps the toughest in the nation for women's college basketball.

Half of the league's 16 teams won 20-plus games last season. Connecticut, DePaul, Notre Dame, Rutgers and Louisville played in the NCAA tournament, and three more played in the WNIT.

"I think we're ready for a challenge, some competition," Louisville forward Jazz Covington said. "Conference USA, it's a good conference, but at some point, you have to step it up and challenge yourself and see where are you really meant to be. ... I'm positive we should be in the Big East. We should be with those top schools."

The Cardinals were 22-9 last season, losing in the C-USA tournament final, and ending their season with a first-round loss in the NCAA tournament.

Covington, a 6-foot-1 junior, led the Cardinals in scoring (17.8 per game) and rebounding (8.1) last season. Refreshing for Covington, she'll have more front-line players than she's used to playing with.

"My freshman year, we didn't really have any true post players that were strong, powerful, could really handle it," she said. "From my freshman year to my sophomore year, that's what I was — the post. ... As you look at it now, the players on our team, I'm the shortest of the post players."

The Cardinals also return their second-leading point (13.1) and rebound (6.9) producer from last season, 6-3 forward Missy

Motorists should exercise caution in November as deer movement increases

FRANKFORT — Motorists need to be aware that deer movement across roadways increases dramatically in November as the whitetail mating season (commonly called the rut) reaches its zenith.

"This is the time of the year deer breed," said David Yancy, deer biologist for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR). "Males are running around patrolling their territory and looking for females to breed. If females aren't in heat, they run away to avoid being harassed by the male until ready to allow breeding to take place. All of this activity causes deer to cross roads more often than usual."

The peak of this "rutting" activity is the middle two weeks of November, when the majority of deer breeding occurs, but it can extend a few weeks earlier and later. The shorter days and longer nights signal to deer that it is time to breed. Not all deer breed at exactly the same time, but rather when their internal biology says it's time.

"Deer have a 200 day gestation period," Yancy said. "In order to give birth in the late

spring to protect fawns from cold fronts, they've evolved to drop fawns in mid-May to mid-June." Some people mistakenly blame hunting for November deer movement, but this natural increase in activity level occurs with or without hunting. "They would be running out in the road much more frequently than we have now," Yancy said. "Hunting is by far the most effective method of controlling the deer population and keeping deer numbers manageable. The potential for colliding with a whitetail would be greater if we didn't."

Deer caught in the road by an approaching vehicle may not automatically move out of the way, even after honking the horn. Nothing in their natural world is as bright as the headlights of a vehicle, and these bright orbs transfix them. Motorists who encounter deer in the road should slow to a stop if possible and allow the deer to cross to the other side. When dark, it is a good idea to keep the headlights on so other approaching motorists see slowing or stopped vehicles. Turning off the headlights won't necessarily get the animal moving again. Patience and alertness are required to

best avoid a collision.

Deer routinely travel in groups, so if you see one, you'll likely see more. Watch areas where roads traverse through a wooded area. Deer can quickly dart out from the wooded area and into the road in front of an approaching vehicle.

If you are traveling at night over the next month or so, be vigilant. This time of year, deer can appear in unusual places. Be especially careful on foggy nights or when traveling small rural roads. After early December, deer start returning to their normal habits, avoiding noise and disturbance associated with traffic and highways. Regardless of how careful you are, the possibility still exists that you may collide with a deer. In urban areas, where whitetails can become accustomed to a lot of human activity and traffic, they learn that sounds and traveling vehicles generally pose no threat. Deer in these areas aren't as afraid as they otherwise would be.

Slow down, watch for deer crossing signs, and expect the unexpected when driving through areas where deer are likely to be, and chances are you'll be able to react in time to avoid an accident.

NBA's dress code not out of line

CHICAGO — When the NBA unveiled its new dress code, there was so much whining and opining you'd have thought David Stern wanted to bring back short shorts. Or make players wear plaid in an oh-so-attractive polyester blend.

Judging by what we've seen this first week, the new edict is about as restrictive as lint. Stern may have come off looking like the fun police, but he's not requiring anything different than what virtually every other employer does. Less, actually. Guys don't have to be buttoned down in a three-piece suit and tie. They can still wear jeans and be so hip it hurts.

And if a jacket and dress shoes can help win back fans turned off by some of the off-court shenanigans, what's so awful about that?

"We can wear jeans and collared shirts. That's just so basic and so easy, I can't believe anybody would even say anything about it," Chicago Bulls forward Eric Piatkowski said. "I was a little bit worried that they were going to tell us that to and from the airport, going to hotels and whatnot, that we were going to have to wear suits. They were awfully easy on us. It could have been much worse."

Besides, from the looks of some of the outfits this week, a dress code isn't putting a major cramp in anybody's style.

LeBron James was decked out in a white collared shirt and red, V-neck sweater under a black velour pinstriped dress jacket when he arrived for Cleveland's opener Wednesday night. Richard Hamilton traded in his customary Rip City jersey for a cornflower-blue suit and matching blue-and-white striped shirt — with his No. 32

stitched on the back of the collar. Tyson Chandler paired jeans with a long suede coat.

Even A.I. cleaned up, wearing a white dress shirt, and gray slacks and sport coat for Wednesday night's game in Detroit.

"I follow the rules just like I've always done," James said. "I don't have a problem with it."

There were plenty who did, however. When the NBA announced the dress code, it was accused of everything from micromanagement to racism. But let's not forget that the NBA is first and foremost a business, and its image was in need of a good scrubdown even before last year's ugly brawl in Detroit.

When Michael Jordan was around, he was so impeccably dressed he looked like he'd stepped out of GQ. But as the league got younger and that line between sport and entertainment faded, players started looking more shabby than chic. Instead of suits, you saw saggy, baggy jeans, and throwback jerseys. Workboots, not wingtips. Oversized chains and medallions that looked tacky no matter how many carats of diamonds they contained.

That hip-hop appeal may have worked with the kids, not so much with their parents and corporate America — the folks who pay the league's bills. The growing list of run-ins with the law didn't help, making the NBA seem too edgy for the mainstream.

"It's nice to have the luxury of wearing whatever you want, but they're trying to change the image of the NBA. Guys have gotten bad press over the years and they're trying to clean it up," said Bulls guard Kirk Hinrich, who had to upgrade his wardrobe with some new shoes and shirts.

And, really, the players are

getting off easy. No one's asking them to give up their SUVs or take a pay cut, just wear something decent when they're representing the league. Jay-Z might go for the hip-hop look when he's in the stands, but he was in a pretty sharp suit when he bought a piece of the Nets.

The players don't have to go corporate, either. While Kevin Burleson wore a beige suit with a silk tie on the Charlotte Bobcats bench the other night, Jake Voskuhl was in jeans, a lavender button-down — untucked, of course — and a chalk-striped gray jacket that looked like something out of "The Shawshank Redemption."

"We're professionals. If the league makes the rules, we abide by them," Piatkowski said. "It's a great lifestyle. I don't think we have a lot to complain about." For those that still do, get another job. But good luck finding one that pays even a fraction of what the NBA does, and doesn't come with a more-restrictive dress code.

AllState Corp.'s "business casual" code doesn't allow jeans, though individual departments can occasionally let loose for a "Jean Day." UPS tells its drivers and management how they can and can't wear their hair, and forget about growing a beard.

"We are certainly focused on post-Detroit as a low point in perception of our league," Stern said. "It sort of defined NBA players for a period of time. Our players are really good guys and deserved more respect than they were getting."

A dress code isn't the answer to all of the NBA's problems. But it's a reasonable place to start.

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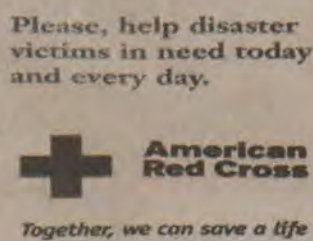
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O'Neal out two to four weeks with ankle sprain

MIAMI — Heat center Shaquille O'Neal will miss two to four weeks with a sprained right ankle, adding to the team's early-season injury woes.

O'Neal flew with his team to Milwaukee on Friday, shortly after learning results of an MRI exam performed earlier in the day. The team said earlier he was listed as day-to-day; a formal announcement of the updated diagnosis was expected after the team's arrival in Milwaukee.

The news, first reported by The Miami Herald on its Web site, probably wasn't surprising to teammates, who seemed resigned to playing without the 12-time All-Star after seeing him hobble and grimace after Thursday's 105-102 loss to Indiana.

"He's the most dominant player in the game," Heat forward Udonis Haslem said Thursday night. "If you don't have him it definitely hurts you. At the same time, the other guys

have the opportunity to step up."

O'Neal was getting in position for an offensive rebound when he stepped on Ron Artest's foot and rolled the ankle midway through the fourth quarter of the Heat's loss to the Pacers. X-rays did not reveal a fracture, but the 7-foot-1, 340-pound O'Neal left the arena on crutches.

Heat coach Stan Van Gundy said after the game that he expected O'Neal "to miss some time." O'Neal did not speak with reporters, and the team had no media availability before traveling on Friday.

"You never want one of your best players going down with an injury," Van Gundy said. "It's all also part of the game. We're already dealing with three veteran guys out, now a fourth veteran guy out, so some of these young guys are going to have to step up and play."

Projected starting small forward James Posey will probably miss a few more games because of an injured thumb, reserve forward Shandon Anderson has been

sidelined by back spasms and isn't traveling with the team and backup center Michael Doleac hasn't made his season debut yet because of an injured calf.

The Heat will now turn to Alonzo Mourning to start at center, with undrafted rookie Earl Barron the likely choice to be the first center off the bench.

O'Neal averaged 15 points and six rebounds in Miami's first two games. If he misses two weeks, that would mean Miami would be without him for six games and have him back for a home game Nov. 18 against Philadelphia. If he misses four weeks, that would keep him sidelined for 13 games and out until a Dec. 2 matchup in Sacramento.

He missed nine regular-season games and two playoff games last year because of various injuries; the Heat went 8-3 without their starting center.

"We've got enough firepower to win without him," Miami guard Dwyane Wade said. "If one person goes down, the other guys have to step up."

MOREHEAD — Shane Wood, who led the Piedmont College men's and women's tennis teams to seven Great South Athletic Conference championships and who built both programs from the ground up beginning in 1999, has been named head men's and women's tennis coach at Morehead State.

Wood will begin his new position at MSU on Nov. 14.

"When I first visited Morehead State it seemed like a place I could call home. I think there is an excellent athletic staff in place, and I am excited about joining the athletic family at Morehead. The tennis teams, both men and women, have a tremendous amount of talent and have enjoyed success over the last couple of years," said Wood. "My immediate goal will be to take that success to the next level, meaning Ohio Valley Conference championships, which I know is definitely within reach."

MSU Director of Athletics Brian Hutchinson is also confident in Wood's ability to lead a first-class program.

During his tenure, Wood was named GSAC men's Coach of the Year in 2001-2002, 2002-2003, 2003-2004 and 2004-2005. He was named GSAC women's Coach of the Year in 2003-2004.

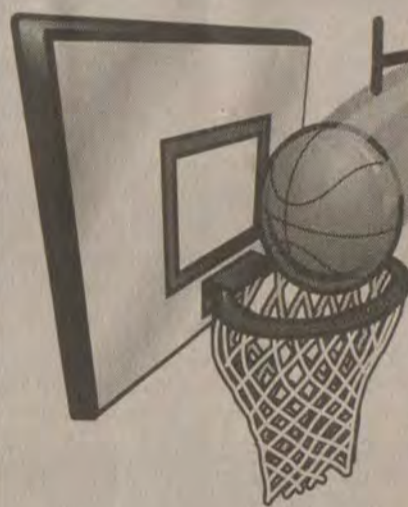

Wood and his wife Jennifer have two children, Payton (3)

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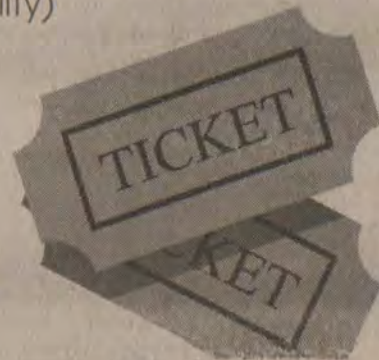
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Role reversal: Upstart Bengals face last-place Ravens

BALTIMORE — They have traveled divergent, unfamiliar paths this season. The Cincinnati Bengals are in first place and the Baltimore Ravens are in last, so Sunday's game between the AFC North rivals has a different story line than in recent years.

The Ravens have never finished below the Bengals since Brian Billick became Baltimore's head coach in 1999. This year, however, Cincinnati (6-2) is threatening to change all that.

Off to their best start since reaching the Super Bowl in 1988, the upstart Bengals are a slight favorite over the Ravens, even though Baltimore (2-5) has won 11 of the last 14 games between the longtime rivals.

"It does have a different

feel," Ravens running back Jamal Lewis acknowledged. "But they know as well as we do that it's going to be the same kind of game. We're going to hit each other in the mouth. We're going to play hard against each other."

Even though Baltimore is without injured linebacker Ray Lewis (hamstring) and safety Ed Reed (ankle), the Bengals know they're going up against a physical, unyielding defense. Pittsburgh ran for 221 yards against Cincinnati two weeks ago, but could muster only 101 yards rushing Monday night against the Ravens in a harrowing 20-19 victory.

That was enough to convince the Bengals that when it comes to playing Baltimore, you can throw out the records — if, in fact, you know what the records are.

"I don't know their record exactly, but they played

Pittsburgh close," Cincinnati receiver T.J. Houshmandzadeh said. "You know it's going to be a tough game. When they've had a lot better record than us, we've always played them well. So I wouldn't expect anything to be any different."

Last November, the Ravens were charging toward a playoff berth until the Bengals overcame a 20-3 deficit in the fourth quarter and handed Baltimore a 27-26 defeat at home. Cincinnati views that game as one of the turning points in getting the long moribund franchise off the ground, and quarterback Carson Palmer remembers it as the afternoon that helped launch his career.

"It was huge. That was the best half I played that year. I think it just gave me confidence," he said. "I just saw Ray Lewis and looked him in the eye. I saw Ed Reed, Chris

McAlister. I know what I can do. I still felt like I hadn't proven myself yet. I think it just gave me confidence and showed me what I could do."

The Ravens are 4-7 since, but beating Cincinnati isn't so much about revenge as it is staying in the playoff hunt.

"You can't go back in time, so why talk about it?" said Chad Williams, who has performed well in place of Reed. "They have a winning record right now and we're behind the gun. You have to give those guys credit for what they're doing this season. We're shooting for them, just like they were shooting for us the last couple of seasons."

The hunter has become the hunted.

"You can bet that it does feel different," Ravens tight end Daniel Wilcox said. "Those guys have been playing great all year. They got 20 interceptions

already."

Cincinnati, with an NFL-best plus-20 turnover differential, is on pace to surpass the club record of 34 interceptions in 1996. The Bengals have intercepted five passes in three different games this season, the first team to do that since Kansas City in 1970.

"They're as opportunistic as any team I've seen in a long while," Billick said.

Bengals coach Marvin Lewis, who served as Baltimore's defensive coordinator from 1996-2001, helping it win the 2000 NFL title, knows better than to think this game is about a 6-2 team against a struggling, last-place club.

"Really, they're not as (bad) as their record says," Lewis insisted. "I can't say why they are where they are at, but I'm very surprised. There are a lot of good players on that field; I

don't want them to get the ship righted this weekend."

Bengals add Vieira to practice squad

Vieira signed with the Bengals last April as an undrafted free agent from UCLA. He severely sprained his foot during rookie minicamp and was on the physically unable to perform list until Monday, when he was activated and put on waivers.

With Roethlisberger out, Batch steps in as Steelers' starting QB

PITTSBURGH — Charlie Batch always thought he could be an NFL starting quarterback again despite being pushed out by the Detroit Lions after four seasons.

What Batch didn't realize was that it would take four years for that next start.

Batch, who has barely one quarter's worth of playing time since being the Lions' primary starter from 1998-2001, will replace the injured Ben Roethlisberger for the Steelers in Green Bay on Sunday. Batch will be playing in a city where he's started twice before, though nearly all of the Packers' starters have changed since he last played there in 2001.

Since then, Batch has been content to be his hometown Steelers' No. 2 or 3 quarterback, even as he watched what he considered to be less talented and less polished quarterbacks struggle throughout the NFL.

Steelers coach Bill Cowher acknowledged that keeping three experienced quarterbacks as he did this season in Roethlisberger, Batch and former starter Tommy Maddox was a luxury, but a move he was willing to make because the position is so critical.

So when Maddox flopped badly after Roethlisberger first hurt a knee last month, turning the ball over four times in a 23-17 overtime loss to Jacksonville, Cowher chose Batch after Roethlisberger hurt

his other knee Monday in a 20-19 victory over Baltimore.

With AFC North leader Cincinnati (6-2) playing Baltimore (2-5) on Sunday, the Steelers (5-2) may need to win to keep from falling 1 1/2 games back in the division race.

"Good football teams have quality depth and when players are asked to step in, there is not a dropoff," Cowher said Thursday after Roethlisberger had arthroscopic surgery to remove damaged cartilage in his right knee. "We will be tested with this set of circumstances and more along the way. That is going to be the defining moment of this football team."

Batch became the Lions' starter two games into his rookie season in 1998 and helped lead them to the playoffs a season later. The Lions barely missed the playoffs again after going 9-7 in 2000, but despite receiving a \$10 million signing bonus as part of a new contract, Batch wasn't brought back after the team went 2-14 amid a front office and coaching staff overhaul in 2001.

Batch has thrown passes in only two games since, in 2002, and missed last season with a knee injury. But he beat out Brian St. Pierre to be the No. 3 quarterback by leading a comeback victory at Carolina in the final exhibition game Sept. 1.

"It's not like we have a rookie or a second-year guy back there, then you have cause for concern," guard Kendall Simmons said. "But Tommy or Charlie, it doesn't matter who's

back there. We're not going to change anything or try to cut down on anything."

Linebacker Joey Porter said the defense will try to make Batch's job easier by keeping the Packers (1-6) from turning it into a high-scoring game. The Packers' Brett Favre was intercepted five times in a 21-14 loss Sunday in Cincinnati.

"You don't want to put Charlie in a situation where you have a shootout. We don't want to ask him to put up 28-35 points to win the game," Porter said. "We're going to try to rattle Brett Favre as much as we can and stop the run and if the offense puts up 17 or more, we feel we should win the game."

Going to Green Bay and winning would justify the Steelers' decision to keep Batch — he also might have to start Nov. 13 against Cleveland if Roethlisberger isn't ready — and his decision to stay in Pittsburgh and not seek a starting job.

"The opportunity hasn't presented itself for me, but, now that it has, I have to seize the moment," said Batch, a former Pittsburgh area high school star who turns 31 next month.

"It has been a while since I started, but I have played in this league. I've practiced every week and I've been around, throwing my routes every day in practice and proving I was capable of making the team."

"You don't want to wish injury upon anybody but, right now, we have to continue on. That's part of the game," he said.

Astros' youth movement gives former Legends hope

The Houston Astros made history this year when they advanced to the World Series for the first time in their forty-four year history. Although, the Astros came up short losing to the Chicago White Sox in four games, the franchise has to be pleased with the direction that the team is going.

While experienced post-season veterans like Andy Pettite and Roger Clemens led the way, many of the big moments were capped off by young players that were groomed in Houston farm system.

Perhaps no player raised his profile more than Louisville's Chris Burke. It was the former St. X star that hit one of the most memorable home runs for the Astros, when his solo shot ended the longest post-season game in Major League Baseball history. In fact many are calling the Astros 18-inning win over Atlanta as the "Chris Burke game."

Two former Legends played key roles for Houston's push for a World Series title. Mike Gallo gave quality outings from the bullpen. Wandy Rodriguez grabbed the spotlight early when he came in to relieve Roger Clemens in the third inning of game one of the fall classic.

Seeing Rodriguez and Gallo getting a chance will no doubt inspire other former Legends.

So who'll be next former Legend to make it to Houston? Here are five names you can expect to see at Minute Maid Park soon.

With Roger Clemens' future

being uncertain, don't be surprised if the Astros start thinking about integrating some more youth into the starting rotation. Fernando Nieve is emerging as a star in the Minor League ranks. The right-hander compiled a 4-3 record with a 2.63 ERA in 14 starts in Double-A Corpus Christi. Nieve was promoted to Triple-A Round Rock where

success was harder to come by. However, most



scouts agree that Nieve is close to developing into a front end of the rotation starter for Houston.

Phil Barzilla isn't the first name off the lips when talking about who will be next Legend in the Majors but he might be the next.

The former Rice Owl emerged in 2005 where he went 7-7 with a 3.03 ERA in 41 appearances for Corpus Christi. Being left-handed won't hurt either; everyone seems to be looking for a southpaw who can get batters out.

Brad Ausmus hit a big homer for Houston in the Astros 18-inning marathon against Atlanta but the offensive highlights have been few. Ausmus will also be 37 early next season, so Astros General Manager Tim Lincecum might be thinking about a change behind the plate. Hector

Gimenez might be the one to get the call. While no Ausmus behind the plate, Gimenez is a quality defensive catcher committing just eight errors in 2005. His offensive numbers will be a major upgrade if he can make the transition. Gimenez hit .273 with 12 homeruns and 58 RBI in 121 games. His ability to switch hit makes him even more appealing.

Second baseman and potential Hall of Famer Craig Biggio was given a new one-year deal and it will likely be his last season as a professional. The Astros will need to address their middle infield of the future soon. Chris Burke seems like the heir apparent but

don't be surprised if former Legend Brooks Conrad pushes him. Conrad's competitiveness will remind some of Biggio and Jeff Bagwell. Conrad also raised his stock with his improved offensive numbers. Brooks hit just .263 but clubbed 21 home runs and 22 doubles at Triple-A Round Rock.

While Willie Tavares emerged as a Rookie of the Year candidate for Houston, he isn't locked in at center field for the next decade. Kentucky's own Josh Anderson had a terrific year hitting .282 with nine triples and could challenge Tavares. Anderson's development has taken a big leap this fall with his performance in the Arizona Fall League. Anderson is ninth in the prospect heavy league with a .348 batting average.

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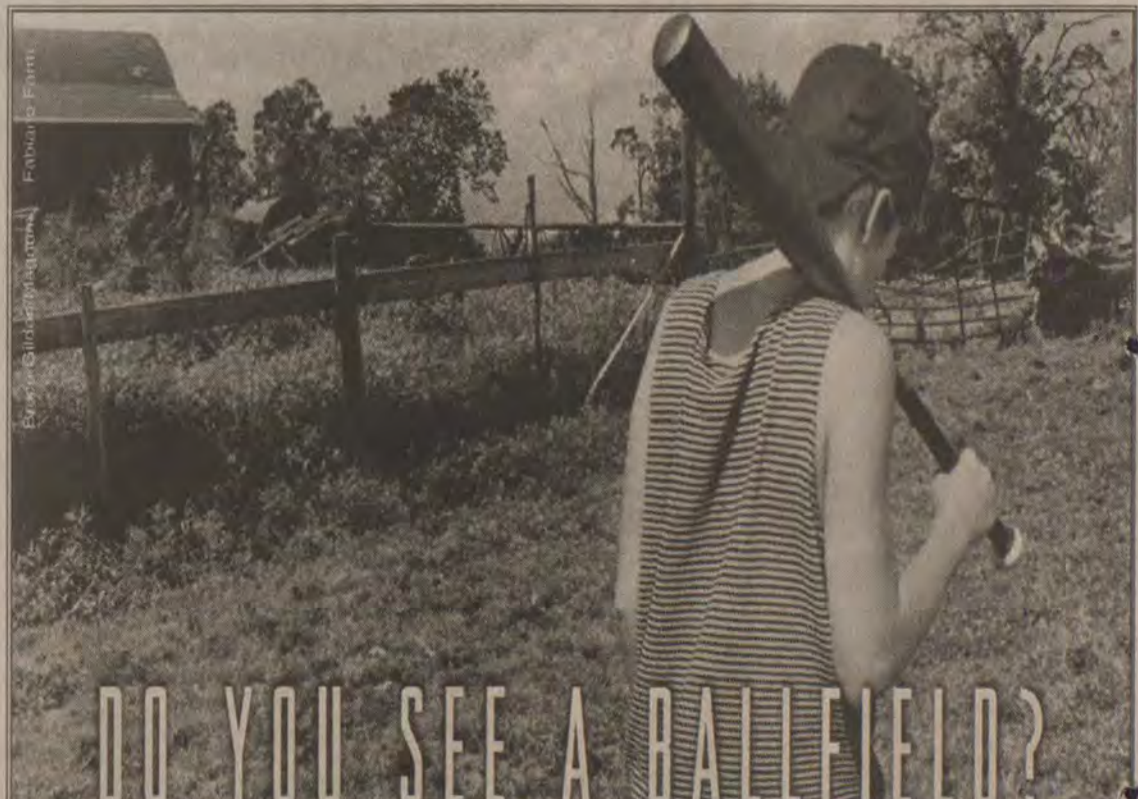

LOUISVILLE — It took one play for Louisville to get on the scoreboard. Not to be outdone, Pittsburgh tied the game on the next kickoff.

Two plays, two touchdowns — and almost too much for Cardinals coach Bobby Petrino to comprehend.

“Have you ever seen a start like that?” Petrino said. “That was unbelievable. That’s pretty wild.”

By game’s end, though, the result was routine: another lopsided Louisville win.

Michael Bush rushed for 115 yards and two touchdowns before leaving with a sprained foot and Art Carmody tied a school record with four field goals as No. 24 Louisville (6-2, 2-2 Big East) controlled the game in the second half en route to a 42-20 win over the Panthers on Thursday night.

Pitt’s Terrell Allen muffed the opening kickoff, which was recovered by Deon Palmer in the end zone for Louisville. But Allen proved he wasn’t rattled, returning Louisville’s ensuing kickoff 97 yards to tie it at 7 just 25 seconds in.

After a 5-yard touchdown run by Bush on Louisville’s next possession, the oddities continued when Pitt snapped the ball over punter Adam Graessle’s head and through the end zone for a safety, giving Louisville a 16-7 lead.

“At the beginning, it kind of felt like it was a little video game,” Bush said. “After that, we got ourselves together and we made a couple of nice plays and we were able to get the win. Things just settled down in the second half.”

Louisville has won two straight after losing its first two league games and temporarily falling out of the Top 25. The Cardinals, wearing black jerseys for the first time since the 1984 season, became bowl eligible with the win in front of a

record crowd of 42,692 at Papa John’s Cardinal Stadium.

Pitt (4-5, 3-2) had a three-game winning streak snapped. The Panthers must win their final two games, against Connecticut and No. 18 West Virginia, if they are to extend their streak of consecutive bowl appearances to six.

“In a game like this, everything gets magnified and you can’t afford to make any mistakes,” Pitt coach Dave Wannstedt said.

Louisville, known for its high-scoring offense, wore the Panthers down with long, clock-chewing drives after halftime. The Cardinals scored the final 23 points and held a commanding edge in time of possession — 37:10 to 22:50 for Pittsburgh — and never punted.

Bush’s second score, a 3-yard run in the third quarter, was his 20th rushing touchdown of the season, tying the school record set by Lenny Lyles in 1957 and matched by Eric Shelton last season.

Bush, the NCAA Division I-A scoring leader, left after that with a sprained left foot. X-rays were negative, and Louisville spokesman Rocco Gasparro said Bush would undergo an MRI exam Friday. Bush said he “felt fine” after the game.

Bush, who had 16 carries, also caught four passes for 59 yards.

“I did OK,” Bush said. “Coach had a few plays down that we wanted to run and we all executed.”

Carmody kicked field goals of 46, 47, 32 and 36 yards, matching the school single-game record set by Nate Smith against Houston in 2000. The 46-yarder was a career-best, but Carmody booted a 47-yarder minutes later.

Entering the game, Carmody had attempted only eight field goals this season, making six.

“The deal was to try to force field goals and minimize the touchdowns and come up with a couple of turnovers,” Wannstedt said. “I felt like we had that going on defense. But in the second half, we’ve got to get a couple of scores.”

Louisville trailed in the final minute of the first half before Carmody’s 47-yarder, which put the Cardinals up 22-20 at the

break. “That was a big swing for us right there,” Petrino said.

Louisville scored on its first three second-half possessions, with Bush’s second touchdown and Carmody’s 32- and 36-yarders, and led 35-20 entering the fourth quarter.

Louisville wide receiver Joshua Tinch knew how dangerous his team could be when they’re on track.

“It just came down to executing our offense,” he said. “Guys making plays in the second half, guys making blocks. Everybody just stayed composed.”

Pitt reached the Louisville 22 early in the fourth quarter before penalties set the Panthers back and forced a punt. Louisville took over with 9:44 left and ran more than 9 minutes off the clock before Kolby Smith capped a 16-play, 80-yard drive with a 4-yard touchdown run.

Brian Brohm completed 21 of 31 passes for 247 yards for Louisville, which finished with 467 yards of offense. Pitt finished with 260 yards of offense, and Tyler Palko was 17-for-30 passing for 198 yards.

Cardinals defensive end Elvis Dumervil, who leads the nation in sacks, added another to push his total to 20 1/2 for the season. He also made three tackles and forced a fumble.

LEXINGTON — Four University of Kentucky players scored in double figures Thursday to lead the UK women’s basketball team to a resounding 90-34 exhibition victory over Dalhousie University of Halifax, Nova Scotia in Memorial Coliseum. Each of the squad’s 13 members saw action in the game with 12 Wildcats scoring at least two points.

Sophomore forward/center Eleia Roddy, who missed most of last season with a torn ACL, led the way for Kentucky with a double-double. She charted a game-high 15 points and 11 rebounds in only 18 minutes of action, while freshman point guard Carly Ormerod added 13 points, five assists and no turnovers in 25 minutes in her collegiate debut.

Sophomore center Sarah Elliott, who also returned from off-season knee surgery, added 10 points, five rebounds and two blocks in 14 minutes. Junior guard Jenny Pfeiffer, who did not play basketball last season after sitting out much of her sophomore season with mononucleosis, had 12 points in 16 minutes. She hit 3-of-6 from the field and 4-of-4 from the free throw line in her return to the Kentucky team.

“We got a lot of people minutes tonight and that is what exhibition games are all about,” UK Coach Mickie DeMoss said. “I think we were able to see some areas we have improved on. For the most part, I thought we kept our intensity and effort at a good level. I think, when the

game is one-sided, you have a tendency to let up a little bit. I was pleased that our board play and our overall intensity level were good.”

The Cats’ defense limited the Tigers to just 26 percent (13-of-50) shooting from the field and allowed them just 15 points in the opening period. UK committed just three turnovers in the first half, totaling nine for the game.

“I think it’s obvious that our depth is good, as is our athleticism,” DeMoss said. “We’re better, but I don’t know if we were challenged enough, particularly in the second half and midway through the first half. We had to focus on us, make sure we still took care of the ball and didn’t get sloppy.”

The UK inside game was dominant, outscoring the Tigers 50-12 in points in the paint and 17-0 in second-chance points. The Cats won the battle of the boards by an overwhelming 50-32 margin. The Wildcats’ bench also put forth a balanced effort, outscoring the Dalhousie bench 52-0.

Both teams had to brush off first-game jitters to start the contest, but the Wildcats settled in after a few minutes. With UK leading 10-9, sophomore guard Samantha Mahoney hit back-to-back baskets to spark an 11-0 run by the Wildcats to give them a 21-9 lead at the 11:50 mark of the opening period. UK used a 38-6 run to hold Dalhousie scoreless for over six minutes in the first half. The Cats led 48-15 at halftime.

“For us to come down here is a tremendous opportunity to play against Division I,” Tigers head coach Dr. Carolyn Savoy

said. “Certainly we wouldn’t run into any players near the caliber of Kentucky in our country. What we’re hoping is that this will make our team stronger and we will learn to take care of the ball, decreasing our turnovers and the little things. What tonight did for us is magnify the errors we’ve been making all along that nobody made us pay for, and tonight Kentucky made us pay for it.”

Kentucky continued to add to its lead in the second half and the Wildcats pulled ahead by 42 after a three-pointer by Ormerod at the 12:15 mark. A fast-break lay-up by freshman guard Oreonna Taylor gave the Cats a 48-point cushion (73-25) and two free-throws by Pfeiffer extended the Cats’ advantage to 54-points, 84-30. Pfeiffer poured in her second trey with 38 seconds left in the game, giving UK the 90-34 win.

The Cats shot 45.6 percent (36-of-79) from the field, including a 63.6 percent (14-of-22) from the free-throw line. Dalhousie hit just 18.5 percent (5-of-27) in the opening period and 26.0 percent (13-of-50) for the game. With the win, Kentucky improved to 5-0 under Coach Mickie DeMoss in exhibition games.

Kentucky concludes its 2005-06 exhibition slate Thursday, when it plays host to the Ohio Girls Basketball Magazine All-Stars at 7 p.m. ET in Memorial Coliseum. Admission is free. The game will be carried live on the Big Blue Sports Network with Neil Price. Live stats and audio also will be available at ukathletics.com.

No. 18 West Virginia 45, Connecticut 13

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. — West Virginia’s defense has gone largely unnoticed this season because of its occasional letdowns, and the Mountaineers’ thriving offense. But the defense was solid Wednesday night, pinning Connecticut deep in its own territory to set up several short scoring drives as No. 18 West Virginia cruised to a 45-13 win, giving the Mountaineers’ Pat White a successful first start at quarterback.

“Our defensive coaches thought we could get some pressure on them,” West Virginia coach Rich Rodriguez said. “When you make somebody one-dimensional, your chances of winning the game are pretty good.”

West Virginia had allowed more than 30 points in two of its previous three games. But the Mountaineers held an opponent to under 15 points for the fourth time this season and sacked UConn freshman Dennis Brown six times in his first road start.

West Virginia (7-1, 4-0 Big East) set up two touchdowns with turnovers and limited UConn to 12 rushing yards and 129 overall, the fewest allowed by the Mountaineers in three seasons.

“We knew since they had a young quarterback they would try to run the ball. We stopped that and after that we were able

Jay Henry said. White led the Mountaineers to touchdowns on five of their first eight drives.

He ran for two scores and threw for another in a three-minute span of the second quarter.

“The more you do it, the easier it gets,” said White, starting in place of the injured Adam Bednarik. “I liked playing the entire game, but I will go wherever they put me. I’ll play wherever.”

West Virginia (7-1, 4-0 Big East), playing for the first time in 18 days, built a 35-3 halftime lead. The nation’s ninth-best rushing attack used a rotation of backs to compile 228 yards against the Huskies (4-4, 1-3). UConn had one of Division I-A’s top defenses statistically, but four of its opponents have a combined record of 3-29.

“Our main focus was to stop the run, but obviously we didn’t do it,” UConn defensive end Shawn Mayne said. “The run killed us.”

White ran for 63 yards on 12 carries and at times frustrated UConn with his arm.

He hit Brandon Myles with a 20-yard TD pass early in the second quarter. On the first play of the ensuing drive, West Virginia’s Warren Young recovered a fumble at the UConn 20.

White then leveled two UConn players on a block that saved teammate Steve Slaton from a big loss.

“I enjoyed that hit a lot,” White said.

ed three defenders on a bootleg run to the right and scored from 14 yards out for a 28-3 lead.

“Pat’s got a different gear, and I think everybody saw that,” Rodriguez said.

Brown threw an interception that Anthony Mims returned 32 yards to the UConn 14 midway through the second quarter. That set up White’s second TD run, a 14-yard bootleg to the left.

Brown finished 10-of-19 for 97 yards.

“He gutted it out, but there are a lot of things he has to work on,” UConn coach Randy Edsall said. “He has to learn not to hold the ball so long in certain situations.”

White went 7-of-16 for 106 yards with an interception.

Slaton, a freshman who ran for 188 yards and set a school record with six TDs in a triple-overtime win over Louisville on Oct. 15, left with a sore hip late in the first half and did not return. He led West Virginia with 71 yards rushing.

The first-place Mountaineers, in pursuit of their first Bowl Championship Series bid, have road games left against Cincinnati on Nov. 9 and South Florida on Dec. 3 and a home contest against Pittsburgh on Thanksgiving night.

“I told our guys in the locker room after the game that especially this time of year, the more you win, the more is at stake,” Rodriguez said. “Our guys know that every game we play from here on out is for the Big East championship.”

Earnhardt heads '06 Motorsports Hall class

TALLADEGA, Ala. — The late Dale Earnhardt, a seven-time NASCAR champion, heads the latest class of inductees to the International Motorsports Hall of Fame.

Earnhardt is joined by team owner Jack Roush, NASCAR ace Harry Gant, female racing pioneer

Janet Guthrie and racing executive H.A. "Humpy" Wheeler in the class to be inducted April 27.

"This is one heck of a class for 2006," Jim Freeman, executive director of the Hall, said Wednesday.

Earnhardt became one of the most popular drivers in NASCAR history, posting 76 victories and 281 top-five finish-

es en route to winning more than \$40 million. He was a three-time Driver of the Year who also won 21 Busch races and four IROC Series championships.

He was killed in a crash at the 2001 Daytona 500.

Roush Racing team has claimed championships in the Nextel Cup, Busch and Craftsman Truck series. Roush's

five-car team has won the last two Cup titles.

Gant won more than 300 short-track races, including 21 in the NASCAR Sportsman series, now the Busch series. Gant left Winston Cup in 1994 with 18 wins and 17 poles. He also raced in a limited number of truck series races in 1996.

In 1977, Guthrie became the

first woman to compete in the Indianapolis 500 and in the Daytona 500. She finished ninth in the 1978 Indianapolis 500 with a team she formed, owned and managed. It was the best showing for a woman at Indy until Danica Patrick's fourth-place finish this season.

Guthrie's top Cup finish was sixth at Bristol in 1977, and she

qualified ninth at both Talladega and Bristol that year.

Wheeler has been the innovative president and general manager of Lowe's Motor Speedway in Concord, N.C., for nearly three decades. The track was the first to use an advanced lighting system to host night races and offer extensive VIP suits and condominiums.

'Texas Terry' couldn't turn down chance to drive for former Cowboys QBs

FORT WORTH, Texas — Being a Texas native and long-time Dallas Cowboys fan, Terry Labonte realized the uniqueness of the call while he was still on the phone.

Labonte was talking to Roger Staubach and Troy Aikman — the two quarterbacks who won the Cowboys' five Super Bowl championships. They are also the owners of a new racing team for which the two-time NASCAR champion will drive the first five races next season.

"To have the opportunity to help these guys kick off their team, being from Texas, it was just an opportunity I couldn't turn down," Labonte said Thursday. "It would certainly be hard to tell Roger and Troy no. It's exciting for me."

The 1984 and 1996 Nextel Cup champion known as "Texas Terry" was introduced as the first driver for the Hall of Fame Racing team. Labonte will run the 2006 season-opening Daytona 500 and the four races after that before journeyman driver Tony Raines takes over.

With Labonte driving, Hall of Fame Racing is assured of making the first five races. Even if the car doesn't qualify on speed, Labonte has a provisional as a past champion.

"We have, in my opinion, one of the finest race car drivers ever to kick off the season and give us some leadership all of us need," said former Trans-Am driver Bill Saunders, a co-owner with Staubach and Aikman who is the team's managing partner.

More than two years after forming the team, Hall of Fame finally introduced its drivers and crew chief Philippe Lopez at Texas Motor Speedway, where the Nextel Cup Dickies 500 will be run Sunday.

"I'm excited about being an owner, it's got my competitive juices going," Staubach said.

"It's a challenge we have before us. We recognize that," Aikman said. "We go in with eyes wide open and recognize there will be a lot of hard work involved. But we anticipate having success."

The team also rolled into Victory Lane its No. 96 car. That number was reached by multiplying the Nos. 8 and 12 jerseys Aikman and Staubach wore as quarterbacks since those car numbers are already used by two of NASCAR's most popular drivers: Dale Earnhardt Jr. and Ryan Newman.

The car sponsored by Texas Instruments is black and blue — a different shade from the blue worn by the Cowboys — with no silver stars or other markings indicative of the NFL team.

Aikman and Staubach were only casual NASCAR fans until they decided to join Saunders to form their own team. They initially planned to be racing in 2004, but stepped back and took their time.

"We were very diligent and very careful in how we put this

together," Aikman said.

This summer, Hall of Fame announced a three-year sponsorship deal with Texas Instruments. They also have a partnership with Joe Gibbs Racing to provide engines, equipment and technical help.

Besides the first five races, Labonte will drive two road-course races for Hall of Fame Racing. He also remains under contract to run 10 races of his choice next year for Hendrick Motorsports, including what is expected to be his final race at Texas next November.

"Rick thinks it will be great for our sport to have Roger and Troy involved," Labonte said. "And I get to run 17 races, instead of 10. I think it's great."

Raines won four times on the NASCAR Craftsman Truck Series in 1997 and '98, but doesn't have a victory in the Nextel Cup or Busch series.

In 54 Cup races the past four years, Raines has just one top-10 finish. He has 181 starts in the Busch Series, where he was the top rookie in 1999 and has 44 top 10s, nine of those this season.

"Without a doubt, this is the best opportunity of my career. I kept pinching myself to make sure it was real," Raines said.

When the quarterbacks were finished with their football careers, they had led Dallas to its only Super Bowl championships — Staubach two in the 1970s, and Aikman three in the 1990s.

Staubach is already in the Pro Football Hall of Fame, and Aikman is on the initial ballot for the next class, which will be voted on at the Super Bowl in February, just weeks before his first race as a NASCAR owner

Smaller teams find hope in NASCAR proposal to scale back super teams

HAMPTON, Ga. — Cal Wells III sat outside his hauler at Atlanta Motor Speedway, surrounded on all sides by larger, better-funded teams.

When he goes looking for sponsorship dollars, he must compete with behemoths such as Roush Racing.

When he tries to talk with a promising driver, he knows that a super team such as Hendrick Motorsports could be ready to swoop in.

No wonder Wells was happy to hear that NASCAR plans to limit the number of teams a car owner will be able to field in the Nextel Cup series.

"As it relates to me personally, I'm in favor of it. As it relates to making this a better sport, I'm in favor of it," said Wells, owner of PPI Motorsports. "I think it's going to be very good for the garage area, very good for the sponsors, very good for NASCAR."

Of course, teams such as Roush and Hendrick don't see it that way. They've used the formula that works for any successful business — hard work, ingenuity and persistent expansion.

Roush has grown into the sport's most dominating team, a five-man operation that gives the Chase for the championship the look of an office pool. Greg Biffle, Carl Edwards, Mark Martin, Kurt Busch and Matt Kenseth make up half of the 10-man field competing for the Nextel Cup title, one of them hoping to give the team its third straight championship.

Hendrick isn't far behind with his four-man team that includes finalist Jimmie Johnson (second in the points with three races remaining) and four-time series champion Jeff Gordon, the winningest driver outside the Chase with four victories.

Together, those teams have combined to win 22 of 33 races this year.

"Obviously, there's some owners who would disagree with me," Wells said. "I respect that. Roush has done a great job and deserves everything they get, as does Hendrick."

Three other teams have played prominent roles. Joe Gibbs Racing has points leader Tony Stewart, who also is tied with Biffle for the most wins (five). Evernham Motorsports is represented by Jeremy Mayfield in the 10-race shootout. Penske Racing South has the other two finalists, Ryan Newman and the retiring Rusty Wallace.

Dale Earnhardt Inc. (Dale Earnhardt Jr.), Richard Childress Racing (Kevin Harvick) and Robert Yates Racing (Dale Jarrett) have man-

aged one win apiece.

That's about it.

For teams such as PPI Motorsports and Bill Davis Racing, cracking the top 20 on any given weekend is considered a success. Even such legendary names as Woods Brothers Racing and Petty Enterprises have been pushed aside by the mammoth teams.

"The sponsors want to go to the bigger teams," Davis said. "Yeah, it's frustrating."

Now, with Roush, Hendrick and Chip Ganassi Racing poised for future expansion, NASCAR is ready to step in. Chairman Brian France announced last month that limits will be phased in over the next few seasons.

While vague on the details, France suggested that NASCAR would probably limit teams to four cars at first, then eventually scale back to either two or three cars.

France said he's concerned that smaller teams have little chance of contending and addressed two other issues that have could affect the long-term health of the sport: prospective owners being scared away by the multi-car operations, and young drivers being denied a chance to break into the series.

"Certainly, it would be a challenge to come into this sport today and do a startup team," Davis said. "I'm sure it's discouraged many people from trying to do that."

It's easy to see why expansion is the key to success.

More cars allow a team to do additional testing, share resources in the garage and trade notes on the track. Those sort of advantages usually lead to more wins, which makes it easier to attract the big-money sponsors and top drivers. The teams with the most money and best drivers essentially feed on themselves, growing even larger as everyone clamors for a piece of their success.

"What if Jack had all 43 cars?" Wells asked. "I know that's probably an extreme, but where does it stop? Five cars? Seven? Ten? Twelve?"

Bigger teams would mean fewer teams, which NASCAR fears will slow its impressive growth over the past decade. Wells pointed to the makeup of the other major sports while making his plea for greater diversity.

"When ownership is spread over a large group of people, like it is in any other sport, that breeds new ideas, provides better competition and makes the sponsor base more even," he said.

Sponsorship is the most crucial element to any team. Wells would like to add a second car next year — he figures it would cost only 70 percent of what he's paying for his first car because of shared resources —

but hasn't found anyone willing to step up with even that much money.

"It's a fantasy right now," Wells said, rolling his eyes.

Of course, just because a team has more than one car doesn't necessarily mean it will be successful.

Ganassi has three drivers and plans to add a fourth next year, but the team hasn't won a race since 2002. Petty, which usually runs at least two cars, is winding down its sixth straight season without a win.

Kyle Petty, who drives his family's No. 45 car, doesn't begrudge the success of teams such as Roush and Hendrick.

"Roush helped build this sport into what it is. Hendrick helped build the sport into what it is," Petty said. "No one cared about those guys when they weren't winning races. Now, everyone wants to penalize the guys who built up the sport. That's not fair either."

No one is quite sure how NASCAR would impose a limit on the size of teams. In a sport where rivals form alliances to cut down on costs and improve the chance of success, there are all sorts of potential loopholes and shortcuts that must be addressed.

Could two supposedly separate teams still share the same facilities? The same employees? The same engine-building technology?

What if Hendrick Motorsports split into two teams and gave Gordon, who already has a substantial ownership stake, control of the new organization but kept everything else the same? Would NASCAR step in and order a complete split?

"If you had a totally clean canvas, 44 cars and 22 owners would be the best thing," Wells said. "But the horse is already out of the barn on that one."

Rolex sports car series is on the rise

Scott Pruett relishes every time he hitches a ride in NASCAR, and he loves open-wheel racing.

These days, though, Pruett, one of the premier road racers in the country, is hooked on the Daytona Prototype he drives in the Grand American Rolex Sports Car Series.

"It's one of my favorite series," Pruett said. "When people come and see this, they love it. A lot of people haven't been aware of Grand Am, or didn't exactly know what it was. But then when they come to see it and watch it and experience it, they go, 'Wow! That's awesome.' And then they're hooked."

They sure seem to be south of the border. The series expects the largest crowd in its brief history for Saturday's season-ending race in Mexico City.

Even though co-drivers Max Angelelli and Wayne Taylor have a nearly insurmountable lead over Pruett and Luis Diaz of Mexico in the race for the drivers title in the top class, more than 100,000 fans are expected for the inaugural visit of the Rolex series. That would make it the largest crowd to witness a North American sports car race in more than 30 years.

Apparently, the Grand American Road Racing Association has struck a winning formula.

Based in Daytona Beach, Fla., at the same complex as NASCAR and the France family's International Speedway Corp., it was established in 1999 in an effort to stabilize the top echelons of sports car road racing in North America.

The series features two types of race cars — exotic looking Daytona Prototypes which, with their side-view mirrors sticking up like periscopes

above the headlights, look like something out of a Batman movie, and GT cars: high-performance, production-based race cars such as Porsches and BMWs similar in appearance to the latest models you see every day on the road.

The eye-catching, mid-engine prototypes are the dominant cars. Extremely low to the ground, they have carbon fiber side-impact panels, a multi-point roll cage with a center post at mid-windshield, and are capable of speeds in excess of 185 mph.

Introduced two years ago for the Rolex 24 hours at Daytona, fields steadily have grown. This season, nearly two dozen Daytona Prototypes regularly have competed in each race, and familiar faces such as NASCAR stars Tony Stewart, Jimmie Johnson, and Bobby and Terry Labonte have helped spur popularity.

"It's definitely on an upswing," said DP driver Alex Gurney, whose father, Dan, won the first Rolex 24 at Daytona in 1962. "I think they have the right formula, it's fan friendly. There's a lot of close racing and passing. It makes the races amazing to watch."

Five years ago, the future wasn't so rosy because of the skyrocketing costs of technology. Then, at the end of 2001, the Daytona Prototype category was announced with the aim of making all the technology available to everybody at a reasonable price and to eliminate the edge that money can buy.

Now, because the rules limit modifications, cars can be raced in their current configuration for several years and the manufacturers that supply the engines can submit any production-based motor for approval. They are tuned to produce about 500 horsepower, and each is capable of being mated to any of the approved Daytona Prototype chassis.

"It sent a message throughout the entire road-racing community that you would have a fair chance to win," Grand American president Roger Edmondson said. "If you won or lost a race, it was based on your ability, not on the fact that other people had technology you couldn't touch."

"When we announced Grand-Am, we said one of our charges was to eliminate the peaks and valleys that had plagued this type of racing. Now that we're on a peak, our new charge is to eliminate the valley, and I think we've got the plans for that."

The schism that has plagued open-wheel racing in America hasn't hurt. That the Indy Racing League and Champ Car World Series can't settle their differences has been a boon.

"We know many, many more teams are looking at what we're doing and looking at coming aboard," Edmondson said.

"Obviously, with open-wheel racing in an unsteady state right now, it creates an anxiety among some people who want to make a living in motorsports. They're looking here. Otherwise, they might not have been."

Still, it's been a slow climb. The low point was the 2002 season — the series announced the prototype program 60 days after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks and only two of the cars were ready. And the next season the series started with six Daytona Prototypes, and after the season-opening Daytona race only had four for the first half of the season.

Since mid-2003, there has been steady growth, and having races televised live on cable TV's Speed Channel has helped.

"We expected it to be successful," Edmondson said. "We didn't expect it to be this successful this quickly."
