McDOWELL - A Martin woman was arrested Monday when she wouldn't leave her boyfriend's resi-


Kentucky State Police responded to the first call from a McDowell man who complained that his girlfriend was drunk and causing a scene at his home. KSP responded and escorta ed Laverne Sammons off the property.

Later she allegedly returned, prompting another call to authorities. This time Deputy Jeremy Shepherd, of the Floyd County Sheriff's Department, responded to the call.

Shepherd reported that he attempted to handcuff Sammons, but that she resisted and tried to assault the boyfriend. Shepherd said that he tried to restrain her but that she allegedly kept pulling away and even- tually ran into another room, where she allegedly curled up on the floor and tried to resist being cuffed.

Shepherd also had a time getting her into his cruiser, according to the uniform citation he filed. He wrote that he eventually got her into the car with the help of her boyfriend's brother and that she was intoxicated

Sammons pleaded not guilty to charges of alcohol intoxication, criminal trespass, resisting arrest and disorderly conduct at her arraignment on Tuesday morning. She said, "I was at my own house," when she entered the plea.

### First class to graduate drug court

Pikeville over the weekend.

PRESTONSBURG - The Floyd County Drug Court program will see its first set of graduates on May 1.

A ceremony for those completing the program will be held at the Justice Center and officiated by District Court Judge Eric Hall, who oversees the program that currently has 30 subjects. Five will be leaving the program with a

fresh start on Monday.

At a town meeting to announce the implementation of the program two years ago Judge Hall stated that he was sold on the strength of the program when he attended a Drug Court Graduation Ceremony.

Drug court programs received a boost last week when U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers presented a check from Operation UNITE to Supreme Court Justice Joe Lambert, on behalf of the

Administrative Office of the Courts, which will see the funds distributed throughout the program in southeastern Kentucky. The money will go toward drug treatment, drug testing and staff for the program, which is aimed at helping nonviolent offenders beat their addiction to drugs through an intense program which consists of two years of counseling, education, drug screenings and educa-

### W'wright may have violated court order

PRESTONSBURG -The city commissioners of Wheelwright will find themselves in front of a circuit judge again May 5 to face a charge that they violated a judicial order when they removed a member of the Wheelwright Utility Commission.

The motion, filed by Prestonsburg attorney Ned Pillersdorf, alleges that the commission removed Finney in violation of a court order issued by Perry County Judge Bill Engle on Nov. 30.

The order from Engle came with the appointment of a special receiver to handle negotiations with gas companies for the city after the citizens of Wheelwright filed a suit complaining that the commission ignored gas payments until the arrearage became so great that it was passed on to customers. The motion includes a quote from Judge Engle's order

which Wheelwright Commission is hereby ordered and restrained from interfering with the operations of the receiver and the Wheelwright City Utility Commission."

Pillersdorf goes on to note that the city violated that order and seeks to have the removal voided.

The motion also notes that the city removed utilities commissioner Blanche Finney because of her "outspoken criticism of the Wheelwright Commission."

The motion was accompanied by two sworn affidavits from utilities commission members, which include statements from Finney and utilities chairman Hubert Farmer. Finney attests that she has served since October, when the commission was reformed after a prolonged period where there was no one appointed to it. Finney says

### Man steps forward for friend, admits DUI

PRESTONSBURG - A Tennessee man was jailed on Monday after he testified that it was actually him who should have been charged in a drunk driving case.

Berchell Jay Henderson, 26, of Kingsport, testified at his friend's preliminary hearing on charges of DUI and fleeing police Monday and admitted under oath that he had been driving the vehicle and was subsequently charged with the DUI and a host of other charges which include driving with an open beer in the car, as well as resisting arrest, reckless driving and terroristic threatening.

Attorney Jimmy Marcum dismissed several of the charges on Tuesday, noting that Henderson had done the right thing by coming forward. He was offered a choice of seven days in jail or 14 days of home incarceration and was assessed a fine of \$873.00.

Though the confession spared a prison term for Henderson's friend, it came too late to avert a beating that he suffered at the hands of two other inmates which occurred one day after he arrested Henderson's charges.

received such incentives as free that they felt as though the past t-shirts and added physical activity time in return for regular daily attendance.

In regard to the consistency in achievement, board member Mickey McGuire commented that "your consistency year after year ... is phenomenal.'

"I would encourage you to Econtinue what you're doing," said board vice chair Carole Stumbo. "Because whatever it is, it's working."

Hall additionally commented that his school council and staff were committed to offering art and music instruction to Osborne students. "We think it's important," he said.

In other business, the board moved to adopt the 2006-07 school year calendar after having postponed that decision at an earlier date in order to gather community input in regard to preferences on the three calendar options proposed. In order to gather a community vote, an online survey was set up and public announcements were ""made in regard to the survey in order to help garner community participation.

Prior to the online survey, the ; board had leaned toward adopting calendar option number one, which provided for eight days of Christmas vacation (excluding weekends), five days of vacation for a fall break (excluding weekends) and three days of vacation for Thanksgiving break.

The primary point of discussion had centered around ensuryoling the provision of an adequate amount of instructional time prior to the spring testing session, along with discussion in regard to the length of the Christmas vacation period and whether or not a fall break period was a feasible or necessary addition to the calendar.

Kristina Springer, director of pupil personnel, had earlier informed the board that she had received numerous comments from parents and teachers saying

year's Christmas break period of a full two weeks had been unnecessarily long and that students failed to return to school ready to work.

Board member Mickey McGuire also reported that he had received similar comments.

Following the conducting of the online survey, Springer issued a report to the board that calendar option number three, which provided for a full two weeks of Christmas break, a two-day fall break and a threeday Thanksgiving break, was the option that had actually garnered the most votes from community members, including parents, teachers and students.

Following an extensive discussion of the matter, board members eventually voted to approve calendar option number one, with modifications that would include an additional day for Christmas break and an additional day to accommodate a day off during the spring festival period (Hillbilly Days Festival, in Pike County).

As currently scheduled, the 2006-07 school year will begin for students on August 9.

In regard to issues brought before the board by the Local Planning Committee (George Cawood, Kentucky School Board Association, and Bonita Compton, principal Opportunities Unlimited), such as future possible redistricting of students, as well as the issue of whether or not to impose a countywide utility tax, the board agreed to call special work sessions to gather and disseminate further information.

The work session dates will be announced at a later date.



### 'A great country and nation'

A group of liberal bloggers has launched a campaign to promote a foreign policy vision behind what they are calling the Euston Manifesto. The platform, which among other things endorses democracy-building abroad as the cornerstone of U.S. foreign policy, is debatable in some regards.

But one aspect of the manifesto deserves strong commendation: its unflinching refusal to engage in knee-jerk America-bashing.

The manifesto states: "We reject without qualification the anti-Americanism now infecting so much left-liberal (and some conservative) thinking. This is not a case of seeing the U.S. as a model society. We are aware of its problems and failings ... The United States of America is a great country and nation. It is the home of a strong democracy with a noble tradition behind it and lasting constitutional and social achievements to its name ...

"That U.S. foreign policy has often opposed progressive movements and governments and supported regressive and authoritarian ones does not justify generalized prejudice against either the country or its people."

Such language hearkens back to the late 1940s, when the Truman administration's Cold War policies won firm endorsement from an influential group of liberal intellectuals who were wide awake to the evils of communism.

Those left-leaning writers and academicians held true to their beliefs in social change — they supported an end to racial discrimination, for example — even as they were unbending in committing themselves to the fight against communism. It was a commendable vision that recognized this country's shortcomings but also its greatness.

If present-day liberalism ever severs unequivocally all connections to far-left kooks such as Cindy Sheehan (contributor to the new book "10 Excellent Reasons Not to Join the Military") and repudiates them, the American left might have a chance at a political comeback.

Liberal activists would do well to heed the words of the Euston Manifesto and its unhesitant praise for this "great country and nation."

### Study says Fletcher policy blocks ex-felons from voting rights

FRANKFORT - Kentucky's exfelons may want to vote but the state's policy on restoring their rights seems likely to prevent them from casting ballots, according to a recent report.

State lawmakers should consider sending voters a proposed constitutional amendment that would automatically reinstate ex-felons' rights when they finish their sentences, the report stated. Or, Gov. Ernie Fletcher should alter the state's reinstatement policy to make it easier for ex-felons to vote again, the report recommended.

'State legislators should examine the wisdom of the current policy and consider placing a constitutional amendment on the ballot to allow voters to support automatic restoration of rights upon completion of sentence," wrote Elizabeth Wahler, the report's author. "If that is not possible, then the governor should reconsider the current application process."

A constitutional amendment proposed during the 2006 General Assembly would have put to voters the question of whether felons should automatically have their right to vote restored when their sentences are completed. The proposal did not come up for a vote and was unsuccessful.

The report was released last week by The Sentencing Project, an advocacy group in Washington, D.C. It was based on interviews with 40 parolees who had

lost their voting rights in Kentucky.

According to the study, those who were interviewed responded to flyers posted on public bulletin boards and they were each paid \$15 for their time. Interviews with the respondents lasted about 30 minutes, according to the

Kentucky is one of three states in the nation - Florida and Virginia are the others — that permanently revokes the voting rights of people convicted of felony offenses, according to the report. Voting rights are restored on an individual basis in those states. Ex-felons in Kentucky must apply to the governor to have their right to vote restored.

Currently, Gov. Ernie Fletcher requires felons who have completed their sentences and are seeking a restoration of their voting rights to submit a letter explaining why they should be allowed to vote. They must also include three ref-

Fletcher's general counsel, Jim Deckard, said he does not believe the requirements are too burdensome.

Since 2004, 646 people have had their voting rights restored out of 791 completed applications, according to numbers provided by Fletcher's office. Another 48 applications are under review by local commonwealth attorneys. There are 1,062 applications on which the administration is waiting for a reply from the applicants, according to Fletcher's

"In many circumstances the request,

the written request, is one or two sentences explaining why the person wishes to have this important right restored," Deckard said. "I do not think it too onerous for someone seeking such gubernatorial action to make such a simple written request."

Yet, 90 percent of those interviewed did not know the procedure for regaining their voting rights, the report found. And, four of those interviewed thought there was no opportunity for them to ever regain their right to vote, the report found

A "large majority" of the 40 people interviewed would likely vote again if they could, Wahler said. More than half had voted before and over two-thirds had a "strong desire" to vote now, she said.

Most of the respondents understood that losing their rights to vote "was a natural consequence" but felt like suffrage should be reinstated after they "had paid their debt to society, Wahler said in a telephone interview.

The "majority of the respondents" who were interviewed did not say they were feeling deterred by the steps of the application process. And, "very few" considered the difficulty of the process as they reason they would not apply to vote, the report found.

"In fact, it was surprising how many people who reported that they did not intend to complete the application process stated that they would not because they

Police say Michael Urbano, 23, locked himself out of the house early Saturday morning and decided to get in using a cable TV wire through the chimney.

But the wire broke and Urbano fell, getting stuck about three-quarters of the way down. He was freed when a firefighter pushed him to safety.

"We get him up, and he's naked as a jaybird," said Hayward police Lt. Gary Branson, "He tells us he took his clothes off because there would be less friction going down the chute. We did find his clothes. So that part checked out."

Authorities were called in early Saturday. A neighbor heard "faint, distressing" calls since about 2:30 a.m. and decided to call police.

Police say it probably wasn't a comfortable few hours for Urbano. "He's not fat," Branson said, "but he used to play football. He's not that little.'

But Hannah doesn't wear shoes - she eats them. Still, that didn't stop this 2-year-old English bulldog from beating out 49 others to claim top prize in the 27th annual "Beautiful Bulldog" contest Monday.

The contest marks the beginning of the Drake Relays, one of the nation's oldest and most prestigious track and field meets.

Hannah, who is white with patches of brown scattered across her squat figure, took the stage wearing a Drake cheerleaders' outfit and shocked the crowd by taking "top dog" honors over Porterhouse, a brown male from St. Paul, Minn., who dressed like a construction worker — complete with tool belt and hard hat.

The panel of judges poured over a random assortment of drooling, grunting canines with a much different purpose than their Westminster Kennel Club counterparts. Bowed legs, deep wrinkles, bloodshot eyes, protruding teeth and clever costumes were considered strong attributes.

'We're looking for the ugliest bulldog you can get your hands on," said Dolph Pulliam, the executive director of the Beautiful Bulldog contest.

■ BELLINGHAM, Wash. — Instead of enduring a day of inattention and spring fever, Bellingham Christian School declared a "sun day" and gave everyone the day off.

School administrators had told the students there would be no school on the first sunny day that hit at least 63 degrees. After Monday's forecast called for a high of 65, school was closed. The mercury actually hit 68, the National Weather Service reported.

Students were told to return on Tuesday when the forecast called for rain.

No one answered the phone at the school on Monday, the case is expected to be schedalthough the recorded message said school had been canceled due to the nice weather. Messages left at the school and on the administrator's home phone were not returned.

■ HUNTINGTON, N.Y. — A 71-year-old man who went outside in the rain to pick up the Sunday newspaper plunged into a cesspool in his front yard, and his son and neighbor were sucked in when they tried to help.

The victims escaped, two with the help of firefighters, covered in raw sewage but not badly hurt.

Andrew Palladino said the soggy ground, soaked by two days of rain, gave way outside his Long Island home: walked across the lawn, and all of a sudden I disappeared."

He yelled to his wife for help, and she threw a rope and called their son, Dan, who lives with them. The son said the scene 'was like a horror picture."

A neighbor who heard the commotion ran over to help but the ground gave way again, swallowing him and the son. The neighbor crawled out and passers-by tried to hold onto the others until the Huntington Fire Department arrived.

Firefighters secured the ground, lassoed Palladino and his son and dragged them out.

It's not the first time a cesspool — a pit that collects waste from toilets and sinks has swallowed someone in Huntington.

In 2001, a man practicing archery in the backyard with his two children died when his cesspool caved in and consumed him. And in 1998, a Huntington Station man was rescued after he fell 65 feet into one.

■ MADISON, Wis. — A family that nursed Bambi, an orphaned fawn, to health three years ago can fight to prevent a state agency from euthanizing the animal, state courts decided.

Michael and Ilene Smith of rural Columbus filed a lawsuit Wisconsin against the Department of Natural Resources to halt the execution of the deer.

A judge declined a DNR request to throw out the lawsuit in February, and last week the state Court of Appeals refused to hear the state's appeal. Now uled for an evidentiary hearing in Circuit Court.

The Smiths say the whitetailed deer is like a family pet and kept in a fenced, wooded area on their farm. They say

they followed state instructions on fencing and veterinarian checks, only to have the agency order the deer's destruction.

The dispute has been complicated by chronic wasting disease, the fatal brain ailment that turned up the state's wild deer herd in 2002. State officials say restrictions to control the disease prevent the Smiths from keeping Bambi.

The Smiths were summoned to a friend's home in the summer of 2003 after the friend found two injured fawns whose mother had apparently been killed by a car, according to court records.

■ NEW YORK — Police Commissioner Raymond Kelly has returned a remarkable piece of stolen loot: an antiquity depicting the Greek god of

"On behalf of the New York Police Department, I bring you the head of Dionysus," Kelly told Consul General Antonio Bandini in a ceremony at the Italian Consulate on Park Avenue.

The antiquity was returned last week after police determined it had been stolen from a museum in Italy more than two decades ago.

Authorities said Christie's had planned to put the bust of Dionysus - known in Roman mythology as Bacchus - up for sale for \$25,000 in 2002 after acquiring it from a defunct Japanese museum. But the auction house, amid suspicions it had been stolen, turned it over to police.

The NYPD's Major Case Squad traced the sculpture to a small museum in Italy that had been looted in 1983. It was sold to the Japanese museum sometime before 1990, but there was no record of the seller, police

February, Metropolitan Museum of Art agreed to return 21 looted artifacts to Italy in exchange for loans of other treasures in a deal that the Italians called a model for other museums with stolen goods in their collections.

■ PLACERVILLE, Calif. — Relentless rain and deep snow in Northern California has left many wild animals hungry and disoriented, including a host of boney bats.

The cold spring has left bats exhausted and emaciated, possibly because colder temperatures have suppressed insects the creatures eat. Bats can devour food equal to one-third to onehalf of their body weight each night - but scientists say there is little to be found.

You can see their ribs, their backbones, and (the area) where the intestine and the stomach are is completely sunk through to the back," said Dharma Webber, founder of the California Native Conservancy. Webber is nursing 30 bats in her home in Placerville.

Five bat rehabilitators are caring for about 50 bats total in the region. She said emerging mosquitoes aren't enough to feed the creatures.

"It would be like us eating a little piece of popcorn here or there," she said.

Naturalists are also warning visitors to the Lake Tahoe region to secure food in homes, garages and cars because bears emerging from hibernation aren't having much luck finding grub.

"I had hoped some would see (the deep snow) and go back to bed for a while," said Ann Bryant, executive director of the BEAR League. "But it's normal for them to be up this time of year, and if they find even a few bites of food, they're up for the duration."

More than a dozen bears have broken into garages, 10 houses and three cars, Bryant

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
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### Mine industry: Rules stemming from W.Va. fatalities are too rigid

LAKEWOOD, Colo. Mine industry officials told federa regulators Monday that emergency rules imposed after two deadly accidents in West Virginia are too rigid and could actually put miners in more

After January accidents at the Sago Mine killed 12 and the Aracoma Alma No. 1 Mine killed two, the government adopted temporary emergency safety regulations for only the third time since 1977. The new regulations require notification of an accident within 15 minutes and impose new training stan-

During a public hearing before a panel from the federal Mine Safety and Health Administration, industry representatives said the 15-minute reporting deadline could be impractical or dangerous, possibly forcing mine workers to make a choice between trying to rescue an injured comrade or calling MSHA to report an accident and avoid a fine.

"We recommend allowing flexibility for an operator to handle injuries that require undivided attention in the early stages," said Dale Byram, general manager of safety and training for Jim Walter Resources Inc. of Brookwood, Ala.

He also said it can be difficult for mine officials to find the appropriate person at MSHA to

manager for the Twentymile deaths in all of 2005. Coal Co. in Routt County said the new regulations fail to consider unique features of individ-

'Miners have a lot of ingenuity, but MSHA tries to have more black-and-white type standards," he said during a break in the meeting.

The emergency standards went into effect immediately after they were adopted March 9, but the agency is accepting public comments through May 30 to determine whether revisions are necessary before the regulations become permanent in December.

The meeting was the first of four. Others are planned in Kentucky, Virginia and West Virginia. Colorado has scores of mines and similar operations, including 12 coal mines, according to state and federal data.

Patricia Silvey, acting director of MSHA's Office of Standards, Regulations and Variances, said after the meeting that the agency will be flexible where necessary, but regulations must be specific enough that mine companies know what is expected.

"We want to get their comments to help us achieve our purpose: providing the most appropriate and effective protection for miners," she said.

According to MSHA's Web site, 32 miners — 26 in coal mines and six in other types of mines — have died so this year. At this time last year, 13 mining fatalities had been reported, while there were 57 mining

During the meeting, some industry officials criticized other provisions of the new regulations, including a training standard that would require miners to walk the entire length of an escape route four times per year. Industry officials told the panel that could be physically dangerous for some miners who might be working miles from the surface in an industry with an aging work force.

"It would only measure the endurance of miners rather than increase their knowledge," Derick said.

He said at his mine, miners use the air intakes as escape routes, and air can move through those shafts at 30 mph, causing wind chills up to 100 degrees below zero in the win-

"We risk knees and backs to walk a miner five miles out of our coal mine," Byram said. "But in an emergency situation, knees and backs aren't a con-

He suggested allowing miners to use mechanized transportation to travel the escape routes during training, but require them to walk along areas of particular concern, such as stretches with dangerous terrain or areas where safety and rescue equipment is stored.

Byram said it also could be difficult to comply with a requirement that mines maintain separate caches of portable emergency oxygen-generating units because they are in short



### **DRAFT 2006: Bengals** have no big holes to plug

CINCINNATI - No gaping

It's been a long time since the Cincinnati Bengals could say that about their roster. During their 14-year run without a winning record, they epitomized what happens to a team without a plan. As soon as one area was fixed through the draft, another fell apart.

A lot has changed entering their fourth draft under coach Marvin Lewis, who broke that mind-boggling streak of futility by leading the Bengals into the playoffs last season for the first time since 1990.

Except for Carson Palmer's left knee, these guys are in good shape.

'I'm happy with where we are," Lewis said last month. "We're in a situation where we don't have a void anywhere in

In the last five weeks, the Bengals have filled their three most glaring needs through free agency, signing safety Dexter Jackson, defensive tackle Sam Adams and backup quarterback Anthony Wright.

That gives them a lot of options in the first round, where they'll be near the end of the list for the first time in a long time.

The Bengals are slotted for the 24th overall pick, their lowest position since 1989, when they were coming off their Super Bowl loss to San Francisco. They had the 27th pick in that draft and traded it to Atlanta for extra picks in later rounds.

They were slotted at No. 17 team's No. 3 receiver. in 2004, but wound up trading down to the 26th pick and took only reliable receiver at tight running back Chris Perry.

Running back and kicker are the only areas they wouldn't consider in this draft, which is more about adding depth and planning for the future than about fixing problems right now. With a core in place - 25 players with three or less years of experience last season - the Bengals figure they're just getting started

"Our guys are grown up now," Lewis said. "It's time to work and act like a team. They've had individual success. They've had a moderate degree of success as a football team. So it's time now to go beyond that."

A few additions in the right spots would help. The defense remains a trou-

ble area. The Bengals gave up an average of 30 points over the last eight games last season, something that has to be fixed if they hope to make it back to the playoffs. Safety Madieu Williams is expected back from a shoulder injury, and the signings of Adams and Jackson should make a difference.

The Bengals could still use a defensive lineman, another safety and a cornerback or linebacker for future development. and are likely to focus on defense in the first round.

The offense returns intact, though with some leftover concerns. Receiver Chris Henry is scheduled to go on trial May 30 in Orlando, Fla., on a charge of carrying a concealed firearm. raising questions about the

Matt Schobel, the Bengals' end, went to Philadelphia as a free agent last month. The Bengals would like to add a pass-receiving tight end, but probably not in the first round they've already got a lot of money tied up in players who

catch the ball. Although the offensive line is set, two of its anchors - center Rich Braham and right tack le Willie Anderson - are nearing the ends of their careers. Replacements are on board, but the Bengals could add another lineman.

Their overriding concern for 2006 can't be fixed in the draft. Palmer's left knee had to be rebuilt after he tore it up during a first-round playoff loss to Pittsburgh. It's possible he'll be ready for the opener Sept. 10 at Kansas City, but the odds are that he'll miss at least part of the season.

Wright left the Ravens to sign a one-year deal to be the Palmer's backup and, if he not ready, his fill-in at the start of the season.

One of the things that Lewis has learned since his rookie season as head coach is that the draft and free agency can't change a team overnight.

"One player doesn't make a difference," Lewis said. "The tendency you get - the public furor that one person or one thing will make a big difference. I think that's been proven (false) over time.'

The one exception would be Carson Palmer.







### Thunderstorm Phobia

The spring storm season is here, and if the last few weeks are any indication, it's going to be a doozy. Storms make me nervous, but I could probably sleep through most of them if not for two large dogs trying to seek shelter, generated.

ally stepping on my face in the process.

Fear of storms is common in animals and people, and it is grounded in the reasonable instinct to seek shelter and avoid injury. Fears turn into phobias when they get so bad that they are out of proportion to the actual danger. Most dogs that show signs of anxiety during storms fall in the category of fearful. They may hide, shake, pace or

drool. The really phobic dogs are a different story. These animals tend to be truly frantic, and often hurt themselves or do damage to their surroundings in their attempts to get away from the storm. They often urinate or defecate, and they may dig or chew holes in walls, tearing out toenails in the process. Dogs have been known to hurl themselves through windows, sometimes several stories above the ground. For some reason, cats are not often affected as badly as dogs, maybe because they are better at hiding, and therefore isolating themselves from the perceived danger.

We tend to think of storms as causing a type of noise phobia, a reaction to the thunder, but there are many other factors Hivolved. The lightening is obvious, as is the sound of wind and rain. Animals most likely are also very sensitive to the changes in air pressure, the smell of ozone and the presence of static electricity in the air.

I had really not given much thought to static electricity until I was reading some material for this article. Several sources mentioned dogs who headed straight for the bathroom during storms, to take refuge next to, or inside the tub, or to wedge in pext to the plumbing for the toilet. This was very familiar; if Gunner is not behind the bed, he can always be found in the bathroom next to the tub during a) thunderstorm. I had always assumed it was part of the instinct to hide in a small space, since our bathroom is tiny. The \*Urrent feeling is that dogs may actually be trying to discharge

static buildup through the natural conduction of the pipes.

No one knows why some dogs develop a fear or a phobia of storms while others seem to hardly notice them. Why do two dogs in my house become so nervous while six others take little or no notice of a storm? Gunner is anxious about everything in general; Desi is not. There is probably a genetic component, as the literature mentions the condition is more common in certain breeds, but there is probably also a great deal of learning involved. A tree falling on the house during a storm, or an actual electrical shock, such as through a telephone jack that a dog was sleeping near when lightening struck nearby, could trigger a very justifiable fear of something horrific happening again. Dogs may also learn their fear through their owners' behavior during a storm. In most cases, we never know what causes the problem.
