

**Widow sues Va. coal companies**

PIKEVILLE — The widow of a miner killed in an underground roof collapse at a southeastern Kentucky mine is seeking more than \$65 million in a lawsuit against the five Virginia companies that oversee the operation.

Claudia Cole of Cumberland filed a wrongful death lawsuit Thursday in federal court, accusing the defendants of negligence in connection with her husband's August 2005 death at the Stillhouse Mine No. 1 near Cumberland.

The suit says Black Mountain Resources, Harlan Resources, Stillhouse Mining, Cumberland Land Corp. and Cumberland Resources Corp. failed to ensure the mine complied with federal and state safety laws and train employees on placement of roof supports.

The miners on her husband's shift were also allowed to work in a mine area where there was a crack in the roof, according to the lawsuit.

The body of Russell L. Cole, 39, was recovered four days after the rock fall that trapped him under a rock inside the Harlan County mine. Cole was the mine foreman.

Claudia Cole and the couple's two children are seeking \$1.6 million in damages for loss of wages, \$50 million in punitive damages and \$15 million to

**Pipeline gets OK from feds**

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission issued an order Wednesday authorizing Equitrans to construct a gas pipeline that will carry gas from Langley to a Tennessee Gas Pipeline in Carter County and is

expected to reduce capacity constraints in Eastern Kentucky.

Currently, there is only one transmission pipeline in the Eastern Kentucky production basin operated by Columbia Gas. Equitrans contends that the proposed pipeline will provide a new source of transportation capacity that will reduce constraints throughout the region. They also say the project

will increase the reliability of the interstate pipeline grid by introducing a significant amount of gas into the interstate market.

The project, which is known as the Big Sandy Project, will include a 67.61-mile-long, 20-inch pipeline extending from the proposed compressor station near Langley, through Floyd, Johnson and Lawrence coun-

ties, to a connection with Tennessee Gas Pipeline Company's Broad Run pipeline in Carter County.

According to the order, the proposed pipeline will cross 476 parcels of land and 1,093 acres.

In September, Equitrans reported it had obtained easements for 338 parcels

**Sex offender faces new abuse charges**

PRESTONSBURG — A 61-year-old Prestonsburg man was arrested Wednesday on sexual abuse charges a little more than a month after he had been arrested for sex offender registry violations.

John Samuel Moore was arrested at his home Wednesday afternoon after a warrant was issued for his arrest stemming from an alleged incident

in September. Moore has been charged with first-degree sexual abuse against a 10-year-old girl and second-degree sexual abuse against a 12-year-old girl.

The citation lists one of the victims as Moore's neighbor, while the other one is listed as an acquaintance.

Moore had been staying with his brother since Oct. 25 when the first case was waived to a grand

**Pike jail sued over inmate's death**

PIKEVILLE — A Floyd County man has filed a wrongful death complaint with U.S. District Court, seeking damages after his daughter died while being held for drug possession in the Pike County Detention Center.

The defendants in the case are Pike County Judge-Executive William Deskins, Jailer Rodney Scott, Pike County Detention Center employee Dexter Coleman and three other unidentified employ-

ees of the jail. The complaint accuses the defendants of neglecting to provide Rachel Roberts with medical treatment after her arrest.

The complaint describes the alleged circumstances that led to Roberts' death while being incarcerated at the Pike County Detention Center. According to the facts presented in the complaint, Roberts, 22, was arrested Jan. 14 for drug possession. Upon her arrival at the jail, Roberts was obviously significantly impaired from the drugs which she had already ingested and subsequently was barely

able to write her name and had to have questions repeated to her numerous times during her booking. Her obvious impairment was allegedly reported to the shift supervisor Dexter Coleman and he was advised that she should be taken to the hospital. The complaint says that Coleman rejected the recommendation and said that Roberts "just needs to sleep it off." Roberts was taken to an isolation cell, where she laid down.

The complaint goes on to

**Couple gets six years for drug trafficking**

PRESTONSBURG — A Garrett couple was sentenced to matching prison terms Friday, after they both pleaded guilty last month to drug trafficking charges.

Barbara Hicks, 42, and Jasper Hicks, 47, were both caught trafficking numerous kinds of pills out of their home to officers working for Operation UNITE drug task force.

The Hickses pleaded guilty Oct. 4 to first- and second-degree trafficking in a controlled substance and first- and second-degree possession of a controlled substance and will each be given 12-year sentences, of which they will each

serve six. The remaining six years of their sentences will be spent on supervised probation.

Agents working with Operation UNITE drug task force conducted three undercover drug buys at the couple's home during a two-week period in January.

The first buy took place Jan. 4, when Jasper Hicks sold 17 methadone pills to an undercover agent, followed by another buy Jan. 9, this time by Barbara Hicks, who sold 11 pills. UNITE agents executed a search warrant of the couple's residence immediately after completing a third buy on Jan. 17.

The search turned up a wide variety

of land and expected to obtain easements for an additional 107 parcels. Furthermore, they reported that they expect to condemn 31 parcels comprising nearly 89 acres of land.

Equitrans did receive some opposition to the proposed project from North East Pipeline. North East is protesting that it owns and operates a natural gas gathering pipeline, known as the NEGC pipeline in Floyd, Johnson, Lawrence and Carter counties, and that the construction of Equitrans pipeline would encroach on the right-of-way of the NEGC pipeline at four locations, which raises operational and safety concerns.

North East also said that it has agreed to contribute portions of its pipeline right-of-way to the Straight Creek gathering system, and that the

construction of the Big Sandy pipeline would impede the construction and operation of the Straight Creek project.

North East requested that the commission deny Equitrans' application, but the commission later found that there were no safety or environmental risks and subsequently denied North East's request.

The commission has concluded that any potential adverse effects of the Big Sandy Project are outweighed by the substantial benefits of the project. They have found that the pipeline will help move gas out of the region and into the interstate pipeline network. Also, the commission says any adverse effects on landowners and neighboring communities will be minimal.

jury. He was released on a \$50,000 bond and was serving home incarceration for a period of either 60 days or until an indictment was returned.

A \$20,000 cash bond was set at Moore's arraignment Thursday morning, with a pre-

liminary hearing date set for Nov. 29. Moore has been ordered to stay at least 1,000 feet away from the alleged victims in the case if he posts his bond.

Moore was previously arrested Oct. 12 after the

Floyd County Sheriff's Department was alerted that he had failed to register his address in compliance with the sex offender registry, a felony. Moore was also charged with living within 1,000 feet of Mountain Comprehensive

Care Center in Prestonsburg. He also lived within 1,000 feet of children's playground at the time of his first arrest.

Moore was originally convicted of second-degree sexual assault in West Virginia

allege that there was no log entry in Roberts' file to indicate that Coleman, who was responsible for checking on her, made any attempt to assess her condition.

At approximately 5:30 p.m., dinner was served at the jail but officers were unable to wake Roberts. This was reported to Coleman, but the complaint says that he again did nothing. At around 8:30 p.m., another inmate, Jenna Bowling, was placed in the same cell with Roberts and was also unable to wake her. Bowling checked Roberts and discovered that she was not breathing and did not have a pulse. She immediately summoned jail officers who determined that Roberts was dead. The coroner placed her death at 9:24 p.m.

The document accuses the defendants of refusing to provide Roberts with the medical attention she needed. The

complaint goes on to say that Roberts was admitted to the jail despite its express, written policy prohibiting the admission of arrestees where there was evidence they have overdosed on drugs and that it was the custom and practice of the jail to refuse to admit persons arrested for drug possession only if they were completely unable to write their name. Roberts was able to write her name with extreme difficulty.

In lieu of damages, the plaintiff says that Roberts' estate is entitled to recover the income and earnings she would have enjoyed had she lived and her two minor children are entitled to recover for the loss of their mother, her companionship, comfort and support. The complaint also requests reimbursement for punitive damages from the defendants in order to deter such conduct in the future.

compensate the children for the loss of their father. They are also seeking a jury trial.

"From Claudia's perspective, she is seeking justice for her family. ... She wouldn't take any money if she could have her husband back," said Tony Oppgard, one of the attorneys representing Cole's family.

Attempts to reach officials at the companies Thursday were unsuccessful.

Another miner, Brandon Wilder, 23, was killed in the collapse. Wilder's body was recovered about eight hours after the collapse, but two more rock falls hindered the search and injured two people.

The deaths prompted \$360,000 in federal fines against Stillhouse Mining.

They also focused attention on so-called retreat mining, a practice that has been blamed for the deaths of at least 17 coal miners in the past seven years. The process requires the removal of coal pillars, which hold up the roof.

In underground coal mining, crews first do what's called advance mining, dig-

ging into the mountain to remove coal. Coal pillars 25 to 100 feet across are left in place, resulting in a network of tunnels.

When companies have advanced as far as possible, they begin retreat mining, so named because the miners are working toward the outside of the mine. The process usually allows the companies to remove 20 percent or more of the remaining coal.

of pills, including nearly 500 methadone tablets and a combination of more than 100 hydrocodone and Valium pills. Agents recovered \$80 from Barbara Hicks' purse which was confirmed as money that had been used to purchase pills from the couple during one of the undercover buys. When conducting undercover drug buys most agencies make a record of the serial numbers of the buy money for prosecution purposes.


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

# Congress needs to do its job

The Republican-controlled Congress returned to Washington Monday with members having a much different perspective than they had when they left to hit the campaign trail just a few weeks ago. Thanks to what President Bush called a "thumping" for Republicans in last week's midterm elections, the GOP's 12 years of power on Capitol Hill will end in January.

As a result, an usually high number of "lame ducks" have returned to Washington, including Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist, who did not seek re-election and will leave Congress at the end of the year, and Speaker of the House Dennis Hastert, who was re-elected Tuesday but will relinquish the speaker's seat to Democrat Nancy Pelosi in January.

Nevertheless, this Congress still faces a ton of unfinished business, some of which should not be ignored until next year.

Congress should show its support for the president, who, after all, still is in charge of U.S. foreign policy for another two years, by approving a pending bill normalizing trade relations with Vietnam and a civil nuclear treaty with India.

A package of tax breaks — research and development credits, deductions for tuition and sales taxes — will expire at the end of the year unless Congress extends them. These tax breaks are not controversial and would have already been approved by Congress had they not been tied to more controversial measures to reduce or eliminate the estate tax and increase the minimum wage. This Congress should approve the extension of the other tax breaks and hold the debate on the minimum wage and estate tax until next year.

Although the new fiscal year for the government began Nov. 1, Congress has approved only two of the 13 spending bills necessary to run the government during the fiscal year. Bills that fund defense and homeland security have been approved, but the bills that fund the rest of government some \$460 billion altogether have yet to be approved.

Currently, much of the federal government is operating under a "continuing resolution," a stopgap measure that allows the government to continue spending at last year's levels until the funding bills are approved. The current "continuing resolution" expires at the end of December, and lame-duck Republicans could dump the whole mess into the lap of the Democrats by approving another "continuing resolution" extending into January.

While that would be a somewhat fitting end to this "do-nothing" Congress that is on a pace to meet the fewest number of days of any Congress in history and has approved no significant pieces of legislation this year, it would be an abdication of responsibility. Approving the spending bills to operate the federal government until Oct. 31, 2007, is the responsibility of this Congress, not the one elected last Tuesday. Before turning over their power to the Democrats, it is not too much to ask members of this Congress to do their job.

### War at Gitmo

**GUANTANAMO BAY NAVAL BASE, Cuba** — To enter one of the heavily barricaded camps for detainees here feels like walking into a low-grade war zone. Which is what it is. The extremists held here haven't given up their ideology, or their fight. The struggle to harm America in whatever way, no matter how minuscule, carries on.

The Asian-style toilets on the floors of the cells used to have footrests, until detainees wrenched them from the floor to use as bludgeoning weapons. The guards are splashed routinely with urine and feces. The detainees have even been known to try to kick their soccer balls out of their recreation area into barbed wire, to cost the infidels the price of one ball.

All the disturbances or suicides have taken place in the camps where security has been loosened. It was in Camp Four, where the best-behaved detainees are allowed to live communally, that a minor riot took place this past spring. A detainee faked a suicide attempt to lure the guards into the living area, where the floor had been smeared with urine, feces and soap. When they slipped, the detainees attacked them with light fixtures and other makeshift weapons. The man in charge here,

Adm. Harry Harris, says his conclusion was "there is no such thing as a medium-security terrorist."

While always mindful that they are dealing with dangerous men, the Americans treat them humanely, even sensitively. Seemingly every surface has a painted arrow pointing toward Mecca. Every detainee gets a Quran, and should it be necessary to search one, it is done by a Muslim translator, not a guard. Detainees are offered 4,200 calories a day. U.S. combat troops get 3,800. The average detainee has gained 18 pounds.

Interrogators rely on the soft sell. Detainees sit in a La-Z-Boy chair during interrogations, and beverages and movies are available to put them at ease. The most effective interrogator is said to be an older woman who adopts a nurturing attitude.

Roughly 300 detainees have been released or transferred for detention in another country. Of those, roughly 20 have been confirmed to have returned to fight, and probably others too. Nonetheless, roughly another 130 out of 460 are set to be transferred or released. The rest are con-

sidered too dangerous. One detainee has said that 85 percent of the Saudis would return to the fight if released.

The facility here has been used, of course, to smear the United States.

The press still uses photos from Camp X-Ray — the Spartan, temporary facility used for just four months in 2002 to house detainees — in its Gitmo stories, although it has been over-

grown with weeds for years and replaced by modern facilities. The detainees are aware of the power of the media, so they time their suicide attempts and disturbances for maximum attention. The principle among the guards is to respond to any provocation with minimal possible force to avoid giving critics any new propaganda.

Dealing with unappeasable murderous fanatics, while at the same time honoring our civilized norms, is never going to be easy. Gitmo is an attempt to find that balance, in the midst of what everyone here — the detainees and their minders — recognizes as an ongoing war.

### That was fun — now what?

I don't want to hear any more of that stuff about elections not mattering. The American people threw the rascals out on Tuesday and by Wednesday Donald Rumsfeld, the Prince of Faulty Intelligence (his), was ash-canned and the war headed in a new direction — maybe.

At least the president intimated as much when he introduced Rumsfeld's successor, a retreat from Bush the Elder's administration, by saying that the new man would provide new perspective. "New perspective" is pol-speak for direction-change, baby.

The problem is, there are only two directions in Iraq — in and out — and two speeds, fast and slow. I suspect that both Democrats and Republicans are hoping that the long-awaited Hamilton-Baker report on Iraq will present a recommendation that will allow us to moonwalk our way out of Iraq while looking as though we're forging ahead.

What about the "victory or death" approach that the president was peddling before the election, you ask? Forget that. The president's rhetoric of equating a Democratic win with "terrorists win and America loses" has been exchanged for soft murmurs of respect for the patriotism of Democratic leaders.

Tuesday's result doesn't need much analysis. It was a classic "We're mad as hell and we're not going to take it anymore" election.

The voters looked at the transpar-

ent lies masking the reality of a needless war gone bad, the industrial-strength political corruption, and they said: "No more. Enough."

The anti-Republican wave not only swept away the bad of the Republican Party, but some of its best and brightest too, voices of moderation like Jim Leach, Nancy Johnson and Lincoln Chaffee. It engulfed not merely representatives and senators, but Republican governors and state legislators as well. It was encyclopedic.

And it couldn't have happened to a nicer party.

The real question is, what now? One assumes that the electorate will want the Democrats to actually do something. End the war, mainly.

Not an easy trick. The dismissal of Rumsfeld is fine as a symbol, but has little substantive value. The president was and is the Decider.

And as Lyndon Johnson found out before him, there is no way to get out of a war gracefully except in victory (World War II), or at least in deadlock (Korea). The Democrats are going to find that out too.

Leaving Iraq now would surrender its people to an internecine warfare that would make the carnage we see now look like a rugby match.

If we stay the course, however, we get a slowly escalating civil war that gradually demoralizes our troops while generating a never-ending supply of recruits for terrorist groups.

Victory seems out of the question. Iraq isn't a country; it's a conglomeration of warring clans, sects and regions. We have to decide which awful outcome we favor and

whichever one we choose, it's going to be ugly.

A final word on the election: For me the defining moment took place late, when President Bush went to Pensacola, Fla., for some last minute campaigning. But, oddly, the Republican candidate for governor couldn't show up to appear on the platform with Mr. Bush. It seems that a previous engagement had come up suddenly.

Never fear. Katherine Harris, the ditzy Republican heroine who delivered the presidency to Mr. Bush in 2000 but who's become something of an embarrassment to the party, was running for the Senate in Florida and she showed up. Her, they wouldn't let on stage with the president. He didn't want to be seen with her.

The Republicans this year weren't a political party; they were a leper colony.

It remains to be seen whether the Democrats can resist the impulse to take revenge for the indignities Republicans heaped upon them during the past dozen years, or whether they'll really try to get something useful done.

If they go the revenge route, they'll probably get kicked back into the street in 2008 and they'll deserve it.

A political party is never more vulnerable than after a great victory.

## 'Night of a Thousand Cats'

A millionaire/psychopath stalks the sunlit beaches of Acapulco for beachcombers to seduce, kill and feed to his pet felines in this take on the Bluebeard legend from the team of Director Rene Cardona Jr. and actor/producer Hugo Stiglitz.

Stiglitz stars here as Hugo (hmm ... could this be a vanity project?), a millionaire who cruises the sun-drenched shores of Acapulco in his helicopter, which he uses to impress the ladies and harass high-rise dwellers. As the film opens, he is seen frolicking with a comely blonde, who he takes back to his rather decrepit castle for a weekend rendezvous. He wines her, dines her and introduces her to his mute butler, Dorgo, before their last stop on his tour, which includes the customary viewing of his trophy room. The lady appears impressed with his family's collection of hunting trophies but she freaks out when Hugo shows off his Mason jar shelf in which each container sports a human head.

Turns out this is what Hugo does when he isn't harassing people from his helicopter. Hugo also makes time for whipping his butler at chess and feeding the remains of his victims to a pit full of cats, but he is apparently a romantic and feels as if he is missing out on something. Along comes a comely housewife who is also bored and soon Hugo is falling for her, which he shows by hovering over her home every chance he can get and tossing dolls overboard for her daughter to collect.

In between several bouts of stalking new victims, Hugo makes time for a few dates with his new obsession and seems poised to go straight. Unfortunately, he is just a sadist at heart and can't mend his ways. Hugo begins to break down (as if he had far to go) and his fragile ego can't accept a drubbing from Dorgo at the chess table. Hugo, perhaps, overreacts to losing his first game by adding Dorgo's head to his collection and feeding the rest of his manservant to the cats.

We all know where this one is heading and sure enough the cats get hungry and bust out of their pen and go searching for that delicacy that Hugo has introduced them to — humans. It's a feline-frenzied finale and these cats are far from finicky as they strip our main character of every last shred of dignity, and clothes, while providing them with a repast before striking out on their own to see what else is on the menu in Acapulco.

This one pulls no punches and delivers on the gore front. The version available on DVD cuts out some 20 minutes, but one can assume that all they snipped was plot and character development. Unfortunately, the editors who chopped this one left in about 20 minutes of padding which amounts to endless shots of Hugo piloting his helicopter around the downtown area and making a nuisance of himself to any woman with an apartment above the 10th floor.

This film marked one of several collaborations between Stiglitz and Cardona which include:

■ "Survive" — Based on a true story about a soccer team that was forced to commit acts of cannibalism after their plan crashed in the Andes.

■ "Tintorerra" — In which the pair sought to reproduce the box office success of "Jaws" by adding sex and nudity to the mix.

■ "Cyclone" — Which finds Hugo cast as one of a band of survivors of a storm that are lost at sea and fight over who gets to eat the rich lady's poodle.

Though none of these films threatened to overshadow the Martin Scorsese/Robert DeNiro collaborations, they at least pumped some blood into the American drive-in market.

Stiglitz went back to acting but

I have a question that has been causing a bit of a disagreement between my fiancé and myself. I have a 2000 Toyota, and when he drives it and makes a turn, he turns the steering wheel all the way to the end until it hits the stop. Chris thinks it is OK to do this, but my dad always told me not to turn it until the wheel stops. Who is right here? By the way, the wedding is in two weeks! — Anna

TOM: Is it too late to cancel the caterer?

RAY: It depends on how often he's doing this, Anna. If Chris is only doing it when he's parallel parking and trying to get the car into a tight spot, that's not a big deal. Your father is right that turning the steering wheel "all the way to lock" puts extra stress on the power-steering pump and all the rest of the steering gear. But it's not a big deal if it's done occasionally, and only when necessary.

TOM: On the other hand, if he's doing this frequently, or when it's not absolutely necessary, or just because it bothers you, Anna, it could be a sign that he's an animal. And it could carry over into other aspects of life. Soon he might insist, for instance, on

wire-brushing the barbecue grill on the living-room carpet.

RAY: So when you get a chance, you might want to discreetly check the quantity and density of the hair that's growing on his back. And measure the distance between his knuckles and the floor when he walks. If it's less than 24 inches, you might be marrying the missing link, Anna. Our best wishes to you.

### Hydrolock a possible price of sleek design

Dear Tom and Ray:  
You have undoubtedly noticed that some parts of the country got a lot of rain this past summer. Often, the result is large (sometimes deep) puddles, or flooding of entire sections of highway. Being the owner of a 2004 Passat, I was somewhat concerned when my wife informed me that a co-worker said that the engine of his Passat was ruined when he drove it through a standard puddle; it wasn't all that deep, just the sort of water puddle that anyone who has ever driven a car has driven through countless times (unless, of course, they live in Death Valley or something). Anyway, his car stalled and wouldn't restart. It turns out that the air intake is on the bottom of the engine and allowed water into the

engine, which was damaged beyond repair. My wife and I did a quick check on the Internet, and indeed, a number of Passat and Jetta owners reported similar stories. How often have you encountered this issue, and what can we poor, unsuspecting Passat owners do to avoid the problem, aside from moving to Death Valley? Yours dryly — Peter

RAY: It's not just Passats and Jettas, Peter. It's lots of cars — especially sporty cars.

TOM: The problem is that if you want to keep the hood line low and sleek, like it is now on most cars, there's no room for the air intake on the top of the engine. So they run a duct to the air filter, which is often located behind a headlight or near a wheel well.

RAY: So, you end up with the air scoop a foot and a half off the ground, which is kind of dumb. But it's very widespread. And if water does get sucked up through the air intake, your engine will hydrolock and instantly be ruined.

TOM: And, while most people are smart enough to not drive through puddles that are a foot and a half deep, most people DON'T account for the wake created by their car or other cars.

RAY: Right. Even if you're the

only one driving through a puddle, you create a wake, which radiates out to the edge of the puddle, and then ... radiates back in. So even if the puddle is only a foot deep, if you go too fast you could create a swell high enough to reach your air intake. And if other cars are going through the puddle, too, all bets are off.

TOM: So, what do you do? First, it's a good idea to know where your car's air intake is. If you can't identify it yourself, ask your mechanic to point it out to you. That way you'll know how high off the ground yours is. That's the first piece of information you should have.

RAY: If yours is near one of the wheel wells, you have to be extremely careful when going through serious puddles. The first step is to watch someone else go through it, to see how deep it actually is at its deepest point (I always let my brother go first).

TOM: If it's not too deep, proceed through very slowly, trying to not



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make a wake.  
RAY: And if it IS too deep, or you don't know how deep it gets, you have two choices: One is not to go — stop, back out and take another route.

TOM: The second choice is to cross your fingers and hope that if you don't make it, you can convince your insurance company that the puddle was an unavoidable road hazard, like a huge pothole or a log in the road that you couldn't avoid. Otherwise, you'll be taking out a home equity loan and buying a new engine.

## Odds & Ends

■ **DES MOINES, Iowa** — Panbanisha the bonobo is up to her tricks again.

For the second time in as many months, the ape triggered a fire alarm at the Great Ape Trust of Iowa research center.

The trouble started Wednesday morning, when Panbanisha wanted to go outside but the staff was too busy to let her out, trust officials said. Panbanisha then apparently lost her temper and pulled the alarm, officials said.

It's a trick Panbanisha initially learned in October when she saw a welder start the alarm. It took her less than a day to learn how to duplicate the excitement.

When the alarm sounded the next morning, "I went to check on Pan, and she was sitting there next to it with a smile on her face," lead scientist Sue Savage-Rumbaugh said last month.

Savage-Rumbaugh said she explained the danger of such mischief and Panbanisha promised not to do it again.

Panbanisha is one of seven bonobos at the Great Ape Trust. Bonobos are one of the most human-like of the great apes and have sophisticated language skills.

Trust officials said they will

cover the alarms to prevent a third prank from Panbanisha.

■ **BISMARCK, N.D.** — Selecting the nation's best Thomas Jefferson impersonator came down to a coin toss — a Jefferson head nickel, of course.

Clay Jenkinson, a Dickinson State University scholar and host of a weekly radio show about Jefferson, was declared the winner Wednesday on "The Colbert Report," a satirical news show on the Comedy Central channel.

Jenkinson appeared with two other Jefferson impersonators, Bill Barker and Steven Edenbo.

Steve Colbert, the show's host, asked the trio about slavery, and asked if Jefferson was under the influence of drugs when he designed the rotunda at the University of Virginia. One of his statements implied Jefferson had sex with his slaves, to which Jenkinson replied: "If it were true, (it) would be none of your business."

At the end, Colbert, after two coin flips, determined Jenkinson was "King of the Jeffersons." Jenkinson, who was playing a man who was a fervent anti-royalist, had a

crown placed on his head, a robe on his shoulders and a scepter in his hand.

■ **NEW CUMBERLAND, W.Va.** — A man facing robbery charges will receive a new trial after a juror was overheard saying the defendant should be convicted quickly so the jury could go home.

The statement was allegedly made when the 12 jurors were taking a lunch break in Glenn A. Stewart's trial in Hancock County Circuit Court.

Circuit Judge Martin J. Gaughan declared a mistrial Tuesday after questioning two jurors. One denied making the remark and the other couldn't verify that the remark was made.

"Someone came in off the street, someone known to the court system, and said he heard one of the jurors say, 'We have to find this guy guilty in a hurry so that we can get home,'" Gaughan told the Weirton Daily Times. "The obligation to give the guy a fair trial is so strong that this is the best way to handle it."

Stewart, 21, was being held in jail pending his new trial, which is scheduled for Nov. 30, said a spokeswoman for the county prosecutor's office.

■ **HOLLYWOOD, Fla.** — A sticky situation at a school has come unglued.

Police on Wednesday arrested two teenagers who they believe broke into their school last week and put glue in all the door locks.

The teens, whose names are being withheld because of their age, were charged with burglary and criminal mischief, police spokesman Capt. Tony Rode said.

The damage cost McArthur High School nearly \$30,000, Rode said.

Police and school officials were able to break into most of the classrooms before students arrived, but witnesses said some students were still stranded outside classrooms, according to The Miami Herald.

Investigators used surveillance video to help catch the pair.

■ **MINNEAPOLIS** — Jessica Gaulke is trading in her sash as a Minnesota beauty queen for Army fatigues — and Iraq.

Gaulke, who was chosen Minneapolis Aquatennial Queen of the Lakes in July, is giving up her title because her National Guard unit has been activated for duty. The 22-year-old Augsburg College sociology student will be going to the Mideast as a diesel generator mechanic.

"It really wasn't a decision that was mine to be made," said Gaulke. "My unit's going. I've accepted it. It's part of the whole scope of why I joined;

I'll be there for all of us over here."

Gaulke said being Queen of the Lakes, Minnesota's best-known festival royalty, is "a huge honor," but she said she is simply honoring the agreement she made when she committed to the Guard before her senior year in high school.

Her last day as queen will be Jan. 2, when she'll represent the Aquatennial in the Rose Bowl parade. Aquatennial officials will announce the new queen in January. She'll serve until July and, like Gaulke, will receive a \$4,000 college scholarship.

"We're distressed to lose a good queen, but we'll have a worthy successor. And we're proud of her for making this choice and what she'll do for the country," Aquatennial President Jim Erickson said.

■ **MANILA, Philippines** — A Filipino man who flew home from Cambodia said he was carrying live fish in his carryon luggage, until a check at Manila airport revealed three 1.5-foot-long crocodiles, officials said.

The head of the Manila International Airport Authority said Wednesday it wasn't clear how Enrique Yu Castillo, 50, was able to carry the Siamese crocodiles from Phnom Penh to Singapore to Manila on Monday night.

The crocodiles are on an endangered species list and their importation is prohibited, airport manager Alfonso Cusi said in a statement.

He said charges were being readied against Castillo, while

the reptiles were turned over to the Department of Environment and Natural Resources.

Castillo had earlier sought a permit to import the exotic animals but his application was denied, said Teddy Aguir, from the environment department's Wildlife Traffic Monitoring unit at the airport.

■ **CHARLOTTE, N.C.** — A student's call for help to his mom may have gotten him more parental involvement than he bargained for.

Police said Inez Horne, 45, was arrested Wednesday after she, two daughters and a family friend stormed a classroom to defend her 15-year-old son, who had called home to say he was afraid another student was planning to attack him.

"The mom decided to show up at school and take matters into her own hands," said Police Officer Robert Fey.

Police Sgt. Randy Haigler said the incident unfolded Wednesday morning after Horne's son called to tell her he was being threatened.

"They arrived on campus, they didn't check into the office, they went directly to the classroom and started to assault a 16-year-old student," Haigler said.

Horne was charged with misdemeanor trespassing. Daughters Keisha Horne, 19, and Marquitta McNair, 18, were charged with misdemeanor trespassing, simple assault and carrying concealed weapons — Horne a knife, McNair a box cutter — according to arrest records. A

boyfriend to one of the daughters was also charged with misdemeanor trespassing.

"From our perspective, it just makes a tough job even tougher when parents aren't part of the solution," school spokeswoman Nora Carr said.

■ **BEDFORD, Ind.** — Real estate can be a tough business. But sometimes it's a real beast, Erika McKinney has learned.

McKinney won a trip to the hospital when a horse bit her and knocked her into a tree during a property showing Friday.

McKinney and her client were standing by a fence at the property in rural Bedford, about 65 miles south of Indianapolis, when the horse leaned over and bit McKinney's hand, then head-butted her into a tree.

McKinney, who suffered bruises to her hand and chest, was treated and released from a local hospital.

"We were just kind of standing there and the horse just kind of pulled its head back and reared her in the chest," said Diana Ritter, McKinney's client. "We were both worried that it would come over that fence. I love horses, but that one, I don't know about. It had some sort of problem."

The county animal control officer is investigating the attack.

McKinney, who owns three horses and a pony, wasn't deterred by either attack.

"She kept going after all of it," Ritter said.

## Silent but deadly: Obrzut hoping to make noise for Wildcats

LEXINGTON — Lukasz Obrzut's English has improved along with his shot in the past year, so this week the 7-footer from Poland coined a new catch phrase for himself.

Silent but deadly.

Wherever Obrzut got that, it's pretty clear it wasn't from teammate Randolph Morris, who laughed at the tag.

"I don't know about silent," Morris said. "Silent in terms of you don't understand him."

Silent or not, Obrzut's impact on Kentucky during his senior year could

be substantial. His value was heightened with news that Jared Carter, the team's only other 7-footer, would be sidelined for about a month with a dislocated shoulder.

That leaves Morris and Obrzut as the only two centers with collegiate experience on the team for the Wildcats (1-0), who play their second game Friday against Mississippi Valley State.

Although coach Tubby Smith said he had been tempted to start them both, with Morris at power forward, the risk of one of them fouling out caused him to change plans. Freshman forward Perry Stevenson started the season opener Wednesday against

Miami (Ohio) and got seven blocks. Obrzut, who is nursing a knee injury, had no points and one rebound in limited action.

Obrzut says he is trying to cut down on "stupid fouls." Smith joked about one such foul he committed in an exhibition game.

"The kid kind of put his nose right on his elbow," Smith said. "I just couldn't believe the official called that."

Obrzut says it took him some time to get a feel for what kind of fouls the officials would and wouldn't call.

"My job is to play aggressive," Obrzut said. "Their job is to make sure I'm playing clean."

But the biggest transition for Obrzut going from European to American basketball is learning to play with his back to the basket and post up. He has shown marked improvement in that area since last year.

Morris says his teammate has developed a lethal hook shot that is almost impossible for an opponent to defend when Obrzut is hitting it.

Obrzut explains European basketball just didn't have the need for low-post players, because rules allow teams only 24 seconds to get off a shot. Thus, virtually every shot is taken while facing the basket — there just isn't time for anything else.

Growing up, he thought he would just be about 6-foot-7, making him a forward. He didn't become a center until arriving in the United States.

"Whenever I first touched the ball and had my first coach, he taught me how to shoot," Obrzut said. "He didn't teach me how to post up. As a young guy, I didn't know how much I was going to grow."

Morris, who says he always knew center would be his position, has been impressed by his teammate's progression.

"For him not knowing that's his position, he's adapted to it very well," Morris said.

# Cincinnati Bengals offense finally rolling

CINCINNATI – Halfway through the season, the Cincinnati Bengals' offense is starting to play the way everyone expected.

Maybe it's a function of the defensive coverage. Maybe it's the result of a slight change in philosophy. Maybe it was just overdue.

Whatever the reason, the Bengals looked like one of the NFL's top offenses again Sunday during a 49-41 loss to San Diego, an offensive breakthrough overshadowed by a defensive collapse.

"We had the loss, but we made some strides on offense," receiver Chad Johnson said Wednesday. "That's what we were looking for, to get back into that rhythm we had last year."

It looked like old times in the first half Sunday. Carson Palmer moved

fluidly on his surgically rebuilt left knee, Johnson repeatedly got open for big plays, and the Bengals played nearly perfect football while surging ahead 28-7.

Although the Chargers scored 42 points in the second half to make headlines, the play of Cincinnati's offense suggested it had finally found its way.

Palmer threw for a career-high 440 yards and three touchdowns. In the first quarter, he was 8-for-8 on three touchdown drives for 163 yards and a perfect passer rating of 158.3.

Johnson set a club record with 260 yards on a season-high 11 catches, including touchdowns of 51 and 74 yards.

The offense had season highs in yards (545), completions (31), and first downs (29) against a defense ranked among the league's top 10.

"From this point on, I would hope that we would continue that same pace

and be able to score 40 regardless of who we're playing," Johnson said. "Whatever defensive adjustments they make to stop us, hopefully we make the same offensive adjustments to continue to have the same type of game we had last week."

There was one notable adjustment. Offensive coordinator Bob Bratkowski called more of the plays against San Diego, rather than leaving it up to Palmer to choose from a few options at the line of scrimmage.

"We changed things up a little bit and put things back in Bob Bratkowski's hands a little bit more," coach Marvin Lewis said. "We took it out of the quarterback's hands, so the things the coaches spend a lot of time on – game-planning and so forth – we were able to get through and attack a little bit more."

The most notable difference was that the Bengals got out of their no-huddle approach, taking more time to

choose the next play.

"When we get to the stuff that Brat can call off the play sheet, we have a lot more options, a lot more play combinations, different formations, different motions, different routes," Palmer said. "It just gives us a little bit more offensively."

Until Sunday, the offense had been performing well below its level from 2005, when the Bengals won the AFC North and Palmer led the NFL with 32 touchdown passes. Johnson led the AFC in catches (97) and yards (1,432) while making his third consecutive Pro Bowl.

Everything has been different this year. Palmer has been working back into form from his reconstructive knee surgery, and Johnson has been covered by two or three defenders as opponents take away the long pass.

The Chargers gave Johnson more man-to-man coverage than most teams, and paid for it. The New

Orleans Saints (6-3) aren't likely to make the same mistake. They're likely to do what the rest have done – change their defenses to account for Johnson.

"Week in and week out, we see stuff unfamiliar to most teams because most people try to stop Chad," Palmer said. "We're definitely expecting and preparing for certain coverages that Chad typically gets."

The Bengals will find out Sunday whether the big game against San Diego was an aberration. They'll also get a better idea of whether it even matters.

At 4-5, the Bengals can't afford another loss if they want to make the playoffs.

"They say defense wins championships, but I'd like to be the first person to say the offense is going to carry us," Johnson said.

# Bengals desperate to save season against Saints

NEW ORLEANS – They say defense wins championships – they being everyone except loquacious Bengals receiver Chad Johnson.

"I'd like to be the first person to say that the offense is going to carry us," Johnson said.

The proclamation came as Cincinnati prepared to play New Orleans in a game the Bengals (4-5) desperately need after a crushing 49-41 loss to San Diego last week.

"I feel that offensively after our performance last week, you want to move forward from that," Johnson said. "Scoring 41 points is a good thing, and hopefully we can continue that success these last seven games and give ourselves a chance to get down to Miami."

By Johnson's logic, the Saints (6-3) also would be a strong contender to get to the Super Bowl in Miami.

Both teams have quarterbacks who have performed well coming off of major offseason surgery: a reconstructed knee ligament for

Cincinnati's Carson Palmer and a throwing-shoulder operation to repair a damaged labrum and torn rotator cuff for the Saints' Drew Brees.

Each quarterback threw for career highs in yardage last weekend, Palmer for 440 and Brees 398.

And each offense boasts a Heisman Trophy winner from USC, Palmer for the Bengals and rookie Reggie Bush, who scored a spectacular touchdown on a double reverse last weekend, for the Saints.

The problem for both teams is they each put up eye-popping numbers on offense last week and still lost. Plagued by three lost fumbles, New Orleans fell 38-31 at Pittsburgh despite racking up 517 yards against a well-respected defense. The Bengals' setback was perhaps more demoralizing as they gave up a franchise-record 42 points in the second half in front of their own fans.

Think the Louisiana Superdome scoreboard operator will be busy Sunday? The oddsmakers do, placing the over-under in the low 50s.

Saints coach Sean Payton is not sure he agrees.

"It's hard to predict how the game might unfold and I know better," Payton said. "Sometimes games take on a certain rhythm or tempo to them and it may be different than you want it."

In two of their three losses this season, the Saints have given up big passing and running plays. Willie Parker broke off runs of 72 and 76 yards against New Orleans last week, while Ben Roethlisberger's 264 yards passing included 37- and 38-yard touchdown passes.

With Palmer throwing the ball and Rudi Johnson running it for Cincinnati, that could spell trouble for New Orleans.

But the Saints' defense also has looked anywhere from competent to very good in victories on the road at Cleveland, Green Bay and Tampa Bay and at home against Atlanta and Philadelphia.

"We had a couple breakdowns last week, but all in all we were pretty strong this season," Saints linebacker Scott Fujita said. "There were just a few breakdowns that were definitely correctable."

## A funny way to teach discipline at 'Knight School'

Cut through the clutter and the debate about Bob Knight comes down to this: Either you believe a coach with a few priors – but a stellar resume otherwise – is allowed to pop a kid in the chin to get his attention, or he isn't.

Not that Knight cares what you think.

"If that's an issue," he said, "then I'm living in the wrong country."

Not necessarily, though the country he's living in is as divided about sports as it is about politics, and Knight just might be the most polarizing figure in it.

At the risk of oversimplification, his side subscribes to the amateur

model, which holds that playing is a privilege, the front of the jersey is sacred and the coach always knows best. Always. The other side favors the pro model, in which sports is a business, loyalty is overrated and the players call the shots. It's hardly coincidence, then, that Knight never took his act to the NBA, where more than a few guys there wouldn't think twice about popping him back, or worse.

Though they might be factors, age and race don't explain the divide. Because barely 24 hours after Knight cuffed Texas Tech reserve Michael Prince to ensure they made eye contact, he walked into the United Spirit Arena to hear Prince's fellow students chanting, "Bobby! Bobby!" in unison. And Knight has never lacked for players, black or white, or parents willing to commit to the cause.

That's why Prince himself termed the episode "nothing," and his parents, both of whom played college basketball at Western Kentucky, couldn't understand what the fuss and the nonstop replays on TV were about.

That's also why Jarrus Jackson, a kid Knight recently suspended for two

weeks to get his grades in order, said after the Red Raiders clobbered Arkansas-Little Rock. "To be honest, I didn't know it happened until I got home last night and saw it on TV. I don't think he did anything wrong, you know. It's just being coach, really."

"And I think," Jackson added, "any other coach in America can do that, too."

The simple fact is that no other coach in America would, but Knight has been doing that for most of his career and even though it finally cost him his job at Indiana, he isn't about to stop now. That's one of the reasons he came out of exile and settled in Lubbock, Texas; the other reasons being Gerald Myers, an old pal and athletic director who's as tame as they come, and a chance to collect enough "W's" to climb past Dean Smith and become the all-time winningest coach in Division I.

That doesn't mean Knight isn't loyal, just the opposite. The plague of college sports at the moment is a lack of accountability and that's never been his problem. Knight doesn't cut corners, he graduates his players and

stays in touch. Three years ago, he returned his \$250,000 base salary even before the Red Raiders learned they wouldn't be invited to the NCAA tournament, saying, "For some reason, this team is not as well taught as it should be."

That ethic is why Jackson's father arrived on campus right after Knight suspended his son, stayed there while Jarrus picked up his grades, and wound up sitting in the stands Tuesday night not far from where more than a dozen members of Knight's 1966 Army team was holding their annual reunion.

Not everybody feels that way, of course, and even Knight's staunchest supporters worry that he still might pull a stunt severe enough to grease the skids at Texas Tech, Ohio State coaching legend Woody Hayes, one of Knight's heroes, got away with manhandling his own players for years, but was shown the exit after he used the same tactics on an opponent.

Unlikely to happen to Knight anytime soon. Counting the win over Arkansas-Little Rock, Knight was just seven shy of catching Smith. And

the inspired performance the Red Raiders put on, partly in response to the controversy swirling around Knight, suggests he won't have to wait long for those.

In the past few days, we've seen the Cavs' LeBron James walk off the court a few seconds early and Patriots coach Bill Belichick offer the lamest of handshakes to a former assistant whose team had just beat his, and heard Raiders receiver Randy Moss' alibi for all those dropped passes by saying his heart wasn't in it.

Yet for all the airtime those incidents filled, none of them stirred near as much heat or light. Showing a lack of discipline yourself might be a funny way to teach discipline to others, especially since Knight could have yelled to get the kid's attention, or lifted Prince's gaze with something more genteel than a pop.

But apparently it's the kind of lesson that a lot of people in sports are hungry for at the moment.

NEW YORK — Back in the minor leagues, Brandon Webb had so much trouble controlling his sinker that he was hitting batters with it all the time and growing increasingly frustrated on the mound.

A few years later, that sensational pitch made him a Cy Young Award winner.

The Arizona Diamondbacks' ace won a wide-open race for the NL's top pitching honor, beating out San Diego closer Trevor Hoffman on Tuesday.

"It's really unbelievable, looking back to where I started from," Webb said. "It just happened for me this year."

One of six starters who tied for the league lead with a pedestrian total of 16 wins, Webb received 15 of 32 first-place votes and 103 points in balloting by the Baseball Writers' Association of America. Hoffman, who broke the career saves record this season, got 12 first-place votes and 77 points.

St. Louis Cardinals ace Chris Carpenter, last year's winner, finished third with two first-place votes and 63 points.

"All three of us probably were deserving of it and probably a couple

more guys, too," Webb said. "I knew that I had a pretty good chance."

Houston's Roy Oswalt, who led the NL with a 2.98 ERA, got the other three first-place tallies and came in fourth.

Webb, who went 16-8 with a 3.10 ERA and made his first All-Star team, was listed second on seven ballots and third on seven others. No pitcher was included on every Cy Young Award entry.

"It was pretty big emotions. We were very excited for it," Webb, an Ashland native, said. "It's with you forever. To have that title go along with you means a lot."

Webb's victory total was the lowest for a starting pitcher who won the Cy Young Award in a full season. The previous low was 17 wins, by Pedro Martinez of the Montreal Expos in 1997 and Randy Johnson for Arizona in '99.

Fernando Valenzuela of the Los Angeles Dodgers was honored with a 13-7 record in 1981 and Atlanta's Greg Maddux went 16-6 in '94 — but those seasons were cut short by players' strikes.

"A lot of the wins pitchers can't control," Webb said. "You can give up one hit and still lose the ballgame."

Webb also is the first NL winner to have an ERA above 3.00 since

Philadelphia's Steve Carlton had a 3.10 mark in 1982. Rick Sutcliffe split the 1984 season between Cleveland and the Chicago Cubs, finishing with a 3.64 ERA overall but a 2.69 mark in the NL.

Webb's success came only two years after he really struggled.

After a strong rookie season in 2003, Webb walked a major league-high 119 batters the following year for a terrible Arizona team that went 51-111. The right-hander also led the NL with 16 losses and 17 wild pitches that year.

But he cut his walks in half in 2005 and issued a career-low 50 free passes this year. And he got more help from Arizona's much-improved infield defense.

"Basically, I just tried to do what I've done the last three years, which is throw a lot of sinkers," Webb said.

Before Webb, Johnson was the only Diamondbacks pitcher to take home the award, winning four straight times from 1999-02.

The AL Cy Young Award winner will be announced Thursday — and Minnesota's Johan Santana is a heavy favorite. The NL and AL Manager of the Year will be revealed Wednesday.

Webb threw a career-best 235 innings, which ranked second in the NL. The 27-year-old sinkerballer also tied Carpenter for the league lead

with three shutouts and both had five complete games, good for second in the NL.

"I was pretty surprised that Carpenter didn't get as many first-place votes," Webb said. "I thought it would be between me and Carpenter."

Voters select their top three choices and points are tabulated on a 5-3-1 basis.

Webb's worst start of the year came against San Diego in the regular-season finale, when he gave up seven runs in four innings of a 7-6 loss that allowed the Padres to clinch the NL West title. The outing increased his ERA from a league-leading 2.88 to 3.10 — but voters weren't dissuaded.

"I think it's an honor well deserved. There was some concern that his last start would have an effect on the voting," Diamondbacks pitching coach Bryan Price said. "One start doesn't make or break a season."

One of the biggest keys in Webb's development has been his ability to control his deceptive sinker, which helps him induce one harmless groundball after another when he's on top of his game. He also helped himself in his mental approach.

"Early in my career, even in the minor leagues, if I had a bad inning or something went wrong I'd show

emotion out there and let that get to me. Every year, I've tried to improve on that."

Webb agreed to a \$19.5 million, four-year contract with Arizona in January. For winning the Cy Young Award, the buyout of his \$8.5 million option in 2010 doubles from \$500,000 to \$1 million.

"When you look at No. 1s in baseball, and every team has one, a legitimate No. 1 will look like Brandon Webb," Price said. "He replaces the strikeout with the double play. That defines a No. 1 pitcher in the big leagues to me."

The 39-year-old Hoffman finished with a league-leading 46 saves in 51 chances for the Padres. He has 482 career saves, breaking Lee Smith's previous mark of 478.

Hoffman went 0-2 with a 2.14 ERA in 63 innings spanning 65 appearances. He was listed second on three ballots and third on eight.

Hoffman also was a Cy Young Award runner-up in 1998 to Tom Glavine of the Atlanta Braves.

Carpenter and Hoffman each receive a \$50,000 bonus for finishing high in the voting.

## Brooks says he has discussed contract extension

LEXINGTON — Kentucky football coach Rich Brooks said Thursday that he has discussed a contract extension with Athletic Director Mitch Barnhart and is "all for it."

Brooks, now in his fourth year at Kentucky, is enjoying by far his best season at the helm, leading the team

to six wins — four in the Southeastern Conference — and an almost certain first bowl appearance since 1999.

There had been speculation heading into the year that Barnhart might fire Brooks if he wasn't able to improve the team's fortunes, but the Wildcats have responded.

Now the question appears to be not whether Brooks will return but for how long. He says that hasn't been worked out.

"We talked earlier this week about having some discussions, when we got time, about extending it and I'm all for it," Brooks said. "That's what I came here to do is get this thing going. I know it hasn't been as quick as most people would like to see it, but I think it's pretty understandable that we have a pretty good group of young players coming back."

During a radio interview prior to Kentucky's basketball game against

Miami of Ohio Wednesday night, Barnhart said he wants Brooks to stay.

"I fully anticipate us going forward with coach next year," he said on the Big Blue Sports Network. "We're gonna get going with Rich and give him a chance to continue to build off the foundation that he's laid for this program. I'm really proud of what they've done."

Prior to this season, Brooks had

only a 9-25 record at a Kentucky program he inherited that had been scarred by NCAA probation. During a preseason banquet he pledged this would be "the light at the end of the tunnel."

The former NFL coach is best known for leading Oregon from 1977-94 — including the Ducks' first back-to-back winning seasons in 16 years and first bowl berth in 26 years.

## Five standouts sign with Louisville women's team

"As far as recruiting class rankings, this is the best class ever signed at Louisville," said head coach Tom

Collen. "It's not the highest class that I have ever signed but it's the one with the most potential. As we all know, recruiting class rankings are more for the fans than the coaches. Before this season is over, I think the Louisville fans will see that the class we signed two years ago that included Helen Johnson, Angel McCoughtry, and Chauntise Wright should have been ranked a Top 10 class. "We're all excited about the addition of Laura," said Collen. "Laura is a 6-1 forward with tremendous three-point range. She's a 4.0 student who thinks the game as well as she plays it. ## Florida dominates instate foe for win

The defending national champions extended their winning streak to 14 games and won their 23rd consecutive game against non-conference opponents.

Florida (3-0) built a 31-point lead late in the first half, going ahead 45-14 on Taurean Green's 3-pointer, and cruised the rest of the way. The Gators made 23 of their first 27 shots, and hit 59 percent for the game.

Even with the reserves playing much of the second half, the Gators overwhelmed Jacksonville (1-2). They did the same to Samford and

North Florida to open the season.

Corey Claitt led Jacksonville with 16 points on 7-of-12 shooting. Jesse Kimbrough and Tyrone Curnell added 10 points apiece.

No. 11 Duke 75, UNC-Greensboro 48: At Durham, N.C., Brian Zoubek scored 17 points off the bench to lead Duke in the rout of North Carolina-Greensboro.

Gerald Henderson had 12 points, and David McClure and DeMarcus Nelson added 11 apiece for the Blue Devils (3-0), who never trailed. Duke shot 53 percent from the field while holding the Spartans to 32 percent shooting.

Kyle Hines scored 17 points, reaching double figures for the 24th straight game. Ricky Hickman added 12 points for UNC-Greensboro (0-3), which fell to 0-18 against ranked teams since moving to Division I in 1991-92.

No. 13 Memphis 111, Jackson State 69: At Memphis, Chris Douglas-Roberts scored 21 points to lead six Memphis players in double figures to overcome Trey Jackson's 32 points for Jackson State.

Memphis (1-0) never trailed in the game, led by as many as 23 in the first half and continued to build the advantage after the break. Jeremy Hunt scored 16, while Doneal Mack added 14, and Robert Dozier had 13 points before fouling out.

Julius Young added 11 and Grant Maxey had 10 for Jackson State (0-4).

Michigan St. 63, No. 19 Texas 61 At New York, Drew Neitzel scored on a drive with 2.4 seconds left to lift Michigan State over Texas in the semifinals of the Coaches vs. Cancer Classic.

Michigan State (4-0) will play Maryland for the championship Friday night at Madison Square Garden. The Terrapins (4-0) beat St. John's 92-60 in the other semifinal.

In a game of two young teams, freshmen were key for both.

Raymar Morgan had 18 points for Michigan State, while Kevin Durant had 21 for the Longhorns (2-1), one less than Abrams, a sophomore.

No. 23 Georgia Tech 103, Georgia State 74: At Atlanta, Lewis

Clinch scored 20 points and Georgia Tech overwhelmed Georgia State with its depth, pressure defense and outside shooting to easily win the first game between the Atlanta schools in 13 years.

Freshmen Thaddeus Young added 19 points and Javaris Crittenton had 18 for Georgia Tech (3-0).

Crittenton scored all of his points

in the first half, going 7-for-7 from the field. He hit three 3-pointers as the Yellow Jackets were 8-for-13 from behind the arc while building a 58-30 halftime lead.

Lance Perique was 10-for-10 from the free-throw line to lead Georgia State (0-2) with 22 points. Rashad Chase added 18.

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# Happy Harvick satisfied with 5-win season

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Kevin Harvick opened the Chase for the championship as the popular pick to win the Nextel Cup title. He made a serious run at it, too.

But it will take a small miracle Sunday at Homestead-Miami Speedway for Harvick to actually pull it off. No matter to Harvick, who with five wins in this resurgent season is indeed Happy again.

"We've had a great year, though it's been up and down," Harvick said. "But for the most part we're just having fun, and racing as hard as we can."

It's been some time since Harvick could say those words. The guy who earned the nickname "Happy Harvick" during his dominant early years fell on hard times and became downright grumpy.

He wasn't winning and his Richard

Childress Racing team was a mess, making Harvick the hottest free agent on the Nextel Cup market. He could have picked almost any ride in the garage, and took his sweet time deciding what would be best for him.

Just three months into the season, though, he decided the slow progress he had seen at RCR was worth a leap of faith and he chose to stay right where he was.

And that's when he really started having some fun again.

RCR made a huge leap shortly after Harvick's decision, and he and teammate Jeff Burton both landed in NASCAR's playoff-deciding format. The team was so hot, Childress absolutely was convinced one of his cars would win the title this year.

So did everyone else, for that matter. Even though Jimmie Johnson and Matt Kenseth were the strongest two drivers of the regular season, Harvick was so hot when the Chase began that

he overwhelmingly was picked to win it.

Those predictions looked pretty good when Harvick opened the Chase with an aggressive win in Round 1 at New Hampshire. But he slipped a little after that, and fell as low as sixth in the Chase standings following a 31st-place run at Texas two weeks ago.

But his No. 29 team bounced back last week at Phoenix, overcoming a faulty alternator to score its fifth win of the year. It was a season sweep at Phoenix, and it moved him back up to third in the standings. He trails Johnson by 90 points heading into Sunday's race.

"There's really not a lot of pressure, to tell you the truth," Harvick said. "It's just go out and go as fast as you can and everybody knows that everybody's going to do everything they can do."

"It falls how it falls, and that's just kind of how we've looked at it since

the season started."

Should they fall short of the title, Harvick and crew chief Todd Berrier are confident this wasn't a one-year aberration. RCR as a company finally seems to be back on track. And the company has been out front on development of NASCAR's Car of Tomorrow, which will be phased in beginning next season.

But the 29 team is also clicking, and Berrier said the chemistry has never been better.

"When they go through a year like last year, and then a year like this year, it's just attitude," Berrier said. "All the guys are jacked up and on a roll. It's all about momentum and attitude, and that's the biggest thing we've got going."

Harvick said that comes from consistency, and notes that the core of his crew has been together for four seasons building its current cohesiveness. "It's the same bunch that we've

had, and we all know each other really well and get along," he said. "When somebody says something that they shouldn't say, everybody doesn't carry it on their shoulders, they just brush it off and it's done with."

"So I think our team is good, and it's just a matter of having it all put together. I think absolutely, we can get better, but just having the experience that we've had this year is going to help us continue to succeed."

Alas, he'll likely fall short of the title. Although he dominated Sunday on Phoenix, earning the win and the five-point bonus for leading the most laps, Harvick gained only 15 points on Johnson.

Still, they aren't writing themselves off just yet.

"It can happen," Berrier said. "But if it were to happen, we'd have to be on top of our game to make sure we capitalize on it."

# Follow-up to banner season falls short for Roush Racing

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Roush Racing was at the top of NASCAR a year ago, so dominant with 15 wins and all five cars in the Chase for the championship that it prompted a rule change to cap the number of cars each team could own.

This season has been nothing short of disappointment.

Only two Roush cars made the Chase this year, and only Matt Kenseth had a realistic chance to win the Nextel Cup. But his team fell apart the moment the postseason began, and he's practically conceded the title to Jimmie Johnson as the series heads into Miami for the season finale.

And after a flurry of company-wide personnel changes, Kenseth pronounced the powerful Roush organization "somewhat of a mess."

So what went wrong so quickly for the team that did everything right last year? Too many things to count.

When it's all added up, though, Roush Racing became a victim of its own success.

"The trick bag that you get into in this business that will teach you very

quickly is, if it's not broken, don't fix it," Roush said. "We were clearly disadvantaged last year from having such a great year ... and we really didn't change much over the winter."

That initial complacency led Roush to make the first of many changes just seven races into the season, when newcomer Jamie McMurray couldn't get up to speed with the rest of the program. So Roush ousted veteran crew chief Jimmy Fennig, who had won a championship just two years earlier.

Then he replaced him with Bob Osborne, who had engineered a dream season the year before by leading Carl Edwards to a third-place finish in their inaugural Cup campaign.

Only that didn't help, either. Not only did McMurray not improve, but Edwards' team suffered and he failed to race his way back into the Chase.

"I didn't think it could get worse, and it did," McMurray said.

Much worse, in fact.

Greg Biffle, last season's runner-up in the Chase standings, also failed to make the Chase. Edwards and Mark Martin haven't won a race all year, and no Roush team has been to

Victory Lane since Kenseth's last trip at Bristol in August.

"I don't know what the heck is going on at Roush Racing," Kenseth said. "Right now, it seems in somewhat of a mess. We'll see what happens. As a group, Roush Racing hasn't been nearly as strong as it was last year."

So Roush is again trying new things, assigning Biffle a new crew chief and reuniting Edwards with Osborne (it apparently clicked, they finished fifth Sunday in their first race back together).

Roush also started a tryout process to find someone to lead McMurray's team, and he's bringing Fennig back to the Cup garage to work with 20-year-old David Ragan next season.

So will it help? Roush certainly hopes so, and figures the shake-up can only improve team unity after communication seemingly broke down this year.

"A year ago all five of our teams were carrying any idea that they had, everything they had seen on somebody else's car, every curiosity they had, they carried it into a forum where it could be analyzed by the entire group and they were absolute-

ly unselfish to that," Roush said. "This year, as things went bad, things were a little chilly in meetings."

"We hope to get through this with keeping everybody on staff, just shuffling around to try to find chemistry interactions that will be effective and timely for what we need."

Chances are Roush will figure it out because recent NASCAR history has shown that more than ever, the sport is cyclical.

Teams that seem to be on top suddenly can't do anything right (see Ryan Newman), and teams that appear to be in disarray quickly turn it all around (see all of Richard Childress Racing).

Roush is far from the rock-bottom place that Childress was two years ago and Robert Yates Racing is now. But to avoid falling all the way down, he'll need to figure things out with McMurray's team — and quickly.

It's easy to point to the No. 26 team as a major source of the problems, because what was a winning operation the past two years with Kurt Busch behind the wheel isn't even competitive with McMurray in the driver's seat.

When that team began to struggle, it had a domino effect on the entire

organization.

Yes, Roush had his issues with Busch during their time together. But the guy still won races — and the 2004 championship — and the information his team brought to the table helped everyone in the organization.

But when Busch begged out of his deal, it turned everything upside down. McMurray suddenly had to replace him instead of Martin, and Martin couldn't retire as planned because Roush was still short one driver.

So McMurray went to a team he wasn't expected to join, with a crew that wasn't meant for him. And when it didn't work, a disappointing season was set in motion.

"Kurt Busch was the catalyst to all that," said Martin, who is leaving at the end of the season. "If you scoot way back, the whole world could have been different by one decision — the whole Roush world could have been different by one decision."

"Our tools maybe haven't been quite as sharp as they were last year. The effort has been the same, and I think Roush Racing hopes that next year they'll be back with the tools as sharp as they were. But last year was a very special year for us."

# Longtime racer John Andretti approaching a strange honor

John Andretti looked down at the toes of his shoes, a little embarrassed.

The driver, whose professional career began more than 20 years ago and who has won races in open-wheel, sports cars, drag racing and NASCAR's top stock car series, is on the verge of becoming rookie of the year in the Busch Series.

"Man, I wish people would just stop talking about that," said the 43-year-old Andretti, wincing a bit at the question about his battle with 21-year-old Danny O'Quinn for rookie honors this season.

It's hard to ignore, though. The two go into Saturday's Busch season finale at Homestead-Miami Speedway tied for the top spot in the rookie chase.

Throughout the season, Andretti has had to get up an hour early on the first day of practice each race week to attend rookie meetings presided over by former Busch champion David Green, a 48-year-old Andretti contemporary.

"I gave the rookie meetings for two years in Cup and I've even held them over here before," Andretti said, laughing. "David is great. And when I came to the sport, Mark Martin and Jeff Burton and people like that all helped. You really appreciate that."

O'Quinn is enjoying having Andretti at the meetings.

"I've learned a lot having John and David Green talking to us before the races at places we've never been," he said. "John's got so much experience and he doesn't hold anything back."

Andretti shrugged off the compliment.

"If I can give them something back, that's great," he said. "They're a great bunch of kids."

But Andretti said he really hasn't focused on the rookie race at all.

"Otherwise, we probably would have come to the track with very different setups and stuff," he said.

Far more important to the veteran driver is the development of the ppc Racing team, a championship outfit with Jeff Green, David's brother, just six years ago. But the team is struggling, with Andretti and teammate Kenny Wallace trying hard to stay competitive in a series now dominated by Nextel Cup drivers and teams that do double duty on race weekends.

Andretti goes to Homestead 13th in the season standings, one point behind Jason Leffler and one of only five drivers in the top 13 that compete only in the Busch Series.

His first full season in Busch has been made particularly tough by the presence of the so-called "Buschwackers," led by runaway

series champion Kevin Harvick.

"It hurts in a lot of ways," Andretti said of the Cup drivers and teams competing in Busch. "They have the wind tunnel time, they have the engineers, things they learn over there that they bring over here — not only before the weekend, but during the weekend."

"And they're testing at places like Kentucky and Memphis. We can't test at those places because we race at virtually every mile and a half that exists. They need to take one off our schedule so we can go there and test. It becomes very difficult for us to catch up. My teammate's in the same boat I'm in, so we can't help each other that much."

Team owner Greg Pollex is frustrated, too, but he's happy to have a driver with Andretti's background.

"Any time you have anybody that has the experience of John, and having won Cup races, I think it gives you more depth," Pollex said.

"It would be nice if we had at least a partial (Cup) program and we could bring back that information," he added. "John gets you halfway there. But there's a lot that we miss because we don't have that Cup affiliation. It's the haves and have nots, because we don't have that Cup technology."

But it's not all frustration for the nephew of longtime racing star Mario Andretti. After years of being gone from his family just about every week-

end, the father of three is thoroughly enjoying racing on Saturday and being home on Sunday.

"I love it," he said. "It's great to see Jarrett and Olivia do their sports and have Emilia tag along. Nothing beats family time and the kids aren't in school on Sunday. We can spend it together."

"I think as much as NASCAR's a family sport, it's becoming a grind. It's almost like family is a hindrance in pursuit of what they expect you to do — meaning the teams, sponsors, everything. The Busch Series is certainly less of that. You get that extra day, and that's a big deal."

Andretti, who drove in 340 Cup races from 1993 through last season and won twice, is signed with ppc through next season and happy with the continuity. Still, he won't close the door entirely to another Cup ride.

"I would look at it seriously and give it a lot of thought," Andretti said. "I guess I'm old by some standards, but I'm not old by all standards. I think that when I was there, I didn't always make the best decisions for me."

"I'd like to go back over there and prove something. That's why you've got to be with somebody that's ready to do the same. I enjoy the people in this organization and I look forward to helping them move forward."
