**Return campaign funds, Pence says**

FRANKFORT — Money raised on behalf of Gov. Ernie Fletcher's re-election campaign before his running mate left the campaign should be returned to political donors and the state GOP, Lt. Gov. Steve Pence said.

The money should first be returned to contributors, then to the state Republican Party, Pence said. State law dictates that Fletcher's campaign may not keep the money because the ticket has now split up.

"It's an opportunity to give them some funds to get their ideas out so they can be competitive in the 2006 election," Pence told The Associated Press in a telephone interview.

At last count, the campaign had more than \$130,000 on hand, according to records filed with the Kentucky Registry of Election Finance.

Pence announced last week he would not run with the governor in the 2007 governor's race. He also dismissed the governor's request that he step down as the state government's second-in-command.

Fletcher has named Robbie Rudolph, secretary of his executive cabinet, as his new running mate.

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## Police ask theft victims to make appointments

PRESTONSBURG — The Prestonsburg Police Department has been inundated with calls after collecting thousands of items in the eBay case.

In order to help area residents who are anxious to come down to the station to identify lost items, police are asking that interested parties begin calling

them to schedule appointments to view the evidence starting Monday, June 12.

Assistant Police Chief Bryan Hall said that visits to view evidence have to be scheduled carefully, as the department has over 1,800 pictures of items seized in the case and it will take an average of 90 minutes to review the pictures of evidence.

Anyone who thinks that the department might have recovered their items

can call them at (606) 886-1010 starting Monday and dispatchers will put callers through to the office that will schedule appointments.

"We want to make sure that everyone gets a chance to view what we have collected," Hall said, "but the sheer volume of material necessitates us taking this approach. We're very grateful for everyone's cooperation and will be willing to sit down with possi-

ble victims and let them see photos of everything we've recovered."

Police Chief Mike Omerod noted that the value of what was seized is incalculable and that many of the photos contain numerous items of evidence which include all manner of items from coin collections to flatware. He said that only a team of assorted appraisers would have a shot at calculating the dollar value of what authorities Mike have recovered.

## Governor pleads not guilty; judge sets November trial date

FRANKFORT — Gov. Ernie Fletcher pleaded not guilty Friday to charges of illegal hirings by his administration — a plea entered by his attorneys while the governor vacationed in Florida.

Judge David Melcher set Nov. 8 for the start of his trial.

A grand jury last month indicted Fletcher on charges of conspiracy, official misconduct and political discrimination over the alleged hiring of political allies for protected state jobs. It has issued 29 indictments in the case, but last summer Fletcher pardoned everyone in his administration but himself who might be charged.

Fletcher's personal attorney, R. Kent Westberry, entered the governor's pleas to the misdemeanor charges Friday. Fletcher was not required to appear, and court records indicated he had been in Palm Beach County, Fla.

Governor's spokeswoman Jodi Whitaker declined to say what Fletcher was doing at the time of his arraignment.

Stan Cave, Fletcher's chief of staff, said he was "not sure" when Fletcher would be returning to Kentucky. He expected the governor's return would be sometime this weekend.

After Westberry entered Fletcher's plea, the judge took the attorneys behind closed doors for a private meeting that lasted about a half hour. Afterward, Melcher said he had

discussed with them "the possibility of imposing a gag order." However, Melcher said he would instead allow lawyers to limit their comments to what's said or filed in court.

After the hearing, neither prosecutors nor Fletcher's attorneys were willing to say much.

"We heard and respect what the judge said, and it's our intention to try this case in the courtroom," Steve Pitt, one of Fletcher's personal lawyers, said.

Prosecutor Scott Crawford-Sutherland also declined comment on the matter.

"Governor Fletcher enjoys the same presumption of innocence that every other criminal

## Inmate escapes Big Sandy federal prison

INEZ — Police in Eastern Kentucky are searching for a convicted drug dealer who walked away from a minimum-security federal prison on Friday morning.

Daniel Middleton, 21, of Pennington Gap, Va., escaped from the U.S. Penitentiary Big Sandy around 10:24 a.m., the Lexington Herald Leader reported on its website.

Middleton was serving a two-year sentence for

possession and conspiracy to distribute the prescription painkiller Oxycodone.

Prison spokeswoman Crystal Norment said Middleton is the first inmate to escape since the prison opened in October 2003.

Officials did not know whether Middleton was armed. He was one of 148 minimum-security inmates in the minimum-security camp. The prison also houses 1,650 high-security inmates behind razor fences.

## Grave marker theft case back on track

PRESTONSBURG — A July 14 pretrial date was set for the Salyersville couple accused of stealing plaques from gravestones at a Salyersville cemetery and attempting to sell them as scrap metal in Prestonsburg.

The couple, Wayne and Thelma Davidson, were arrested in October but their court date was delayed when Thelma Davidson entered a drug rehabilitation program between the time the case was waived to the grand jury and indictments were issued.

At the pretrial conference, they will have to decide whether to take their case in front of a jury or enter pleas for the crimes, which accuse the pair of stealing grave markers from two Salyersville cemeteries which identified the interred as war veterans.

The pair were arrested following an investigation by the Floyd County Sheriff's Department that was led by Sheriff John K Blackburn and Sgt. Steve Little, at the time of the arrests, Sheriff Blackburn gave the lion's share of the credit to Mountain

PRESTONSBURG — A Bypro man who was indicted last month on charges of fleeing police had an indictment warrant issued against him in circuit court Friday when he failed to show up for his arraignment.

Timothy Bates was the subject of a preliminary hearing in district court in March, when Kentucky State Police Trooper B.J. Caudill testified about

arresting him on the charges that led to the indictment which was issued last month. Caudill said that he charged Bates with fleeing police, wanton endangerment, reckless driving, intimidating a witness and falsely reporting an incident after a car chase that occurred in the early morning hours of Feb. 19. He said that he had pursued Bates' vehicle until it wrecked in a ditch, at which point he

## Law protects babies, parents who safely surrender them

FRANKFORT — Pregnant women concerned about becoming parents have help from a law that allows them to safely surrender their newborns.

Since 2002, the Thomas J. Burch Safe Infants Act has allowed parents or someone acting on their behalf to anonymously place infants that they cannot care for at selected "safe havens." The law has resulted in 10 babies being placed in the care of the Cabinet for Health and Family Services (CHFS).

Parents may leave a baby up to 72 hours old at any hospital, with emergency medical services (EMS) personnel or with any firefighter or police officer. Parents remain anonymous and cannot be pursued or prosecuted unless an abandoned infant shows signs of abuse or neglect.

Supporters of the law intended it to eliminate incidents of newborns being left in unsafe locations outdoors or in trash cans, restrooms or other public places.

"The primary goal of the law is to keep babies from being tragically abandoned with no one even knowing about it," said Lisa Durbin, manager of the CHFS Child Safety Branch. "Women in crisis or who may have hidden a pregnancy can ensure their baby will be safe with this law."

Durbin said that since July, two babies have died after being unsafely abandoned by their mothers.

"If those parents had known about the law, those tragedies could have been avoided," she said.

Unsafe baby abandonment is considered child abuse and neglect. Babies left at one of these safe places are examined and, if needed, treated at a hospital. CHFS then places them with foster parents who are

interested in adopting. Parents have 30 days to reconsider leaving their baby. After that time, CHFS asks the courts to terminate parental rights, freeing the baby for adoption.

"All but one abandonment occurred in hospitals just after delivery," Durbin said.

At the identified safe places to leave a baby, parents can receive an information packet that includes coded bracelets for parent and baby and voluntary medical disclosure forms that can be left with the baby or returned by mail. The information helps caregivers determine treatment for the baby and is kept confidential.

Durbin said the parents' medical history is important in determining the future needs of the child.

The packet also includes a brochure teaching mothers how to care for themselves after delivery.

In eight of the 10 cases of safe surrender since 2002, the children have been adopted. CHFS' protection and permanency office worked with one mother who came forward to be reunited with her child, Durbin said.

Durbin said her office is distributing Safe Infants Act information to advocates across the state through Community Collaboration for Children Regional Networks in each of CHFS' 16 regions.

Local health departments, Prevent Child Abuse Kentucky and the Kentucky Board of Emergency Medical Services/Children's EMS are also providing literature.

"We appreciate the support in order to raise awareness about the law — particularly to women who might have second thoughts about motherhood or teens who feel they have few options," Durbin said.

"Placing a child for adoption is a difficult choice," she

said, "and it takes a great deal of strength and courage to put

Interment will be in the Richmond Cemetery, in Prestonsburg.



# New law will require hundreds more mine rescue teams

CHARLESTON, W.Va. — Operators of the nation's coal mines will spend up to \$128 million to comply with the new federal mine safety legislation, with nearly half going to equip and train 260 new rescue teams, according to the Congressional Budget Office.

Meanwhile state regulators could be forced to hire experts to oversee training and certification of perhaps 2,000 or more miners who could be named to serve on the teams.

The law, which President Bush is expected to sign, requires rescue teams to be located within an hour's distance of the nation's underground coal mines, rather than the two hour's distance required now.

For coal producing states with large numbers of underground mines, such as West Virginia, the changes would be huge. Currently, the nation's second largest coal producer has 27 mine rescue squads, but the state's mine safety chief says the legislation might require as many as 65 more.

"That's a big deal," said Jim Dean, acting director of the Office of Miners' Health Safety & Training. Like other coal states, West Virginia pro-

vides training and certification for mine rescue teams, among other things.

Dean said the state would need more money to hire additional safety instructors and to buy new equipment to monitor the industry's teams and safety systems. The state already is contemplating spending another \$1.2 million a year to pay for two state-run mine rescue teams made up of the agency's employees.

Just what the legislation means for other Appalachian states, where the bulk of the nation's underground coal mines are located, is less certain.

Kentucky already tries to position its teams no more than an hour from any of the state's 239 underground mines, said Chuck Wolfe, a spokesman for the state's Office of Mine Safety and Licensing. All of Kentucky's teams are comprised of state mine inspectors.

Mine operators will spend anywhere between \$185,000 to \$250,000 to set up each of the 260 rescue teams the Budget Office says are needed to comply with the law, said Bruce Watzman, a lobbyist for the National Mining Association.

Maintenance, equipment, and installing communications

and tracking systems would add tens of millions more.

"It's going to be real money," he said. "The legislation is a big challenge, I think, in its entirety."

The coal industry has not complained publicly about the added cost because of sensitivity over the recent rise in deaths.

The mine legislation, along with similar laws passed by West Virginia, came in response to a series of deadly coal mining accidents in West Virginia, Kentucky and other states. So far this year, 33 U.S. miners have been killed, compared with 22 in all of last year, according to the U.S. Mine Safety and Health Administration. This year is on pace to be the deadliest year since 47 miners were killed in 1995.

Besides rescue teams, the budget office says coal companies will spend approximately \$21 million for 35,000 additional emergency air packs and unknown amounts for other new safety gear such as communications equipment.

United Mine Workers of America spokesman Phil Smith said mine operators should have been spending the money on hundreds more teams all along.

"That's a comment about

how far down this mine rescue system has gone," Smith said. "It used to be that there was a mine rescue team at every mine."

To Smith, complaints about the cost of creating more teams are immaterial. "The question shouldn't be how much is this going to cost, but how many lives is this going to save," he said.

Aside from the money, Watzman said coal companies may have problems recruiting miners to join the all-volunteer rescue teams, which require significant time commitments for training and mandatory contests. "That may be a challenge," he said.

But Smith said finding rescue team members won't be a problem.

"Certainly miners in every mine want to know that there will be people there ready to come in and rescue them," he said. "Interest in mine rescue is pretty strong right now."

observed Bates exit the car and flee on foot.

Later he learned from dispatch that Bates called to report the car as stolen but would not tell authorities where he could be reached.

Caudill testified that he eventually tracked Bates down to a residence, where he found Bates and his girlfriend. Bates said that he had meant to call KSP on Feb. 19 but thought that they were closed on Sundays.

Bartley also said that Bates is looking at a probation revocation if convicted, as he was serving a three-year probated sentence at the time of the incident for a previous case in which Bates pleaded guilty to one count of criminal mischief for stealing a relative's ATV and attempting to sell it to a third party.

Metals manager Gary McCoy, who contacted the department when he found out an employee had bought scrap metal from the pair that was later determined to have come from grave markers. "We never would have

opened this investigation or made an arrest without Mr. McCoy's efforts," Blackburn said.

The markers were valued at \$600 apiece, making the theft a felony, and were sold as

scrap metal for \$15 each.

The couple will be charged with seven counts of receiving stolen property in Floyd County, but will face the theft charges in Magoffin County, where the markers were taken.

defendant in any other case deserves and has, and that's the reason why the process is what it is," he said.

Crawford-Sutherland said he expected a trial to last from two to three weeks.

Melcher gave attorneys until July 7 to file additional papers in Fletcher's request to have Attorney General Greg Stumbo and his staff — which includes Crawford-Sutherland — removed from the case.

Westberry would not say whether he spoke with

Fletcher on Friday.

Fletcher is Kentucky's first Republican governor since 1971. Stumbo is a Democrat, and Fletcher has claimed the case is politically motivated. He is seeking to have Stumbo's office removed because he claims Stumbo is a potential gubernatorial rival in the 2007 election.

The case was initiated by a whistle-blower, a state employee who turned over documents and e-mails to the attorney general's office.

Last week, Lt. Gov. Steve Pence, a former federal prosecutor, announced he would not join Fletcher's re-election ticket and would step down as the head of Kentucky's Justice Cabinet. Pence later turned

down a request by Fletcher that he resign as lieutenant governor.

However, on Wednesday the administration expedited Pence's departure as secretary of Fletcher's Justice Cabinet, removing Pence and replacing him with Brig. Gen. Norman E. Arflack of the Kentucky National Guard.

The governor has been on vacation for two weeks, except for a brief return to Louisville last weekend where he publicly announced Robbie Rudolph as his new running mate. Rudolph had been state Finance secretary, and was serving as secretary of the governor's executive cabinet — a post he will now assume full time.

# The cost of success

The arrival of summer vacation brings joy to many children — and relief to others.

It isn't because those children haven't been doing well in school. It's because they have — and they don't have to suffer for it five days a week for three months.

These are the boys and girls called smart, intelligent or, in modern education lingo, "gifted." Too many of them, however, would use other adjectives: lonely, shunned, ridiculed. And bullied.

In fact, two-thirds of the more than 400 gifted students in an 11-state study by Purdue University reported being bullied, according to a recent report in the journal *Gifted Child Quarterly*.

When that happens, they hurt emotionally, like any victim of bullying would. They also may lash back violently, as one-third of the students in the Purdue study said they were tempted to do.

Humans are skilled at isolating those who are different than they are. But consider the implications of this quote from Sylvia Rimm, a clinical professor of psychiatry and pediatrics at Case School of Medicine. She told *The Washington Post*: "Regular kids get bullied, too, but gifted kids are bullied based on their school performance, which makes the child's strength into a weakness" (emphasis added).

In other words, they suffer for doing exactly what their parents and teachers want them to do. (So do some minority children, whose reward for academic success is to be accused of "acting white.")

Parents and teachers (of any color, in our experience) naturally want children to develop a strong work ethic. America needs that ethic — long a national strength — more than ever in the 21st century.

But children who win in the classroom often lose in the hallways or on the playground, especially if they aren't pretty or handsome or good at playing ball. Some will work harder than ever. Others will succumb to the crushing peer pressure to embrace mediocrity, to just slide by and give less than their best so they can have the friends all people crave.

They need to hear that things change as they get older. They will move from one group of peers to another. In those groups, they'll find friends, even spouses, who see life as they do and take away the loneliness. It's a hard sell, however, because the teen years can seem the longest of all.

There are no easy answers to the Purdue study's sketch of what gifted children know from sad experience. But surely we adults can work harder to reshape the school subculture that punishes those who stick out — particularly for being the best they can be.

### How the boom began

If you find a turtle on top of a fence post, Bill Clinton used to say, it means someone put it there. It was his folksy way to explain why anything good that happened was no accident, and he should get credit.

George Bush has a fat turtle on top of a fence post in the form of our extraordinarily robust investment-driven economic boom. Not only has he been unable to convince people he put it there, he hasn't even been able to convince them that the turtle is on the post at all. Attitudes about the economy remain downbeat, even as all the statistical indices point in the right direction.

Perhaps the biggest reason they started pointing that way so determinedly was Bush's tax cuts of 2003, which cut taxes on capital gains and dividends and expanded expensing for business investment. It is the most obviously effective economic initia-

tive in years. That Bush hasn't managed to take credit for it is an extraordinary communications failing. It would be a little like FDR not selling the New Deal, or Bill Clinton not persuasively touting his (much overhyped) 1993 tax hike and deficit-reduction package.

The downturn Bush inherited early in his term was driven by an investment bust. Consumer spending wasn't the problem. Unlike in prior recessions, consumer spending didn't decline at all, according to a report of the Joint Economic Committee of Congress. In contrast, investment collapsed. The way to revive it was suggested by a simple principle — the more you tax something, the less you get of it, and vice versa. Reducing taxes on capital and investment therefore should increase both, and so it has.

Consider the big picture: The tax cuts were passed in May 2003, and that's roughly when investment — and everything else — began to take off. According to the Joint Economic

Committee, all inflation-adjusted fixed business investment dropped at a nearly 6 percent annual rate from the third quarter of 2000 to the first quarter of 2003, then jumped by 9.2 percent from the second quarter of 2003 to the first quarter of 2006. Investment in equipment and software followed the same trend during the same time period. Meanwhile, the stock market began growing at a faster pace, because taxes were less of a drag on its value.

Economics writer Donald Luskin notes that GDP growth, employment, corporate earnings, new manufacturers' orders and tax receipts all began booming after the spring of 2003. As he puts it, "Tell people they will get to keep more of the fruits of their labors and the fruits of their investments, and they will labor more and invest more."

One reason Bush hasn't been able to sell his 2003 tax cuts properly is that, until recently, the Republican Congress had failed to extend them. Now, the GOP is finally pushing their expiration date into the future, from 2008 to 2010. This is the occasion for celebration, and lots of explaining as to how the turtle got on that fence post.

### Praiseworthy prosecutors; crooked Congress

Who says there's never any good news in the paper? Why, just the other day a federal judge and jury found Enron executives Kenny Boy Lay and Jeffrey Skilling guilty of a dazzling number of corporate crimes—conspiracy, insider trading, wire fraud, bank fraud, securities fraud and just plain fraud.

The varlets will undoubtedly appeal but the chances their convictions will be overturned are about the same as the Kansas City Royals' shot at winning the World Series. Sentencing awaits them, so more good news is sure to follow.

I know, the glee I'm feeling is a classic case of schadenfreude, German for taking malicious pleasure in the discomfort of others. Is it possible I'm being petty, that I'm allowing class envy of the rich and powerful to dilute my natural, liberal sense of compassion?

Nah. Make no mistake about it, Lay and Skilling are guilty, not merely of the stated crimes but of a cruel betrayal of Enron investors and employees, people who gave them their trust and lost everything as a result.

Both men—Lay the chairman of the board, Skilling the CEO—argued that they didn't know what was going on. While this argument has had some success in other, similar prosecutions of corporate brigands, the Enron jury wasn't buying it.

Lay and Skilling were paid tens of

millions of dollars to run their company. If they didn't know what was going on, the jury reasoned, what was all the money for?

In truth, Lay and Skilling lied and cheated their way to the top, deliberately inflating Enron's worth with crooked book-keeping, then tried to cash out before the whole thing crashed. They didn't make it.

Special congratulations should go to the team of career government attorneys who prosecuted the case. They went against the best lawyers money could buy and won. They deserve our admiration and thanks.

Elsewhere on the legal front, official Washington was shocked last week when FBI agents, flashing a search warrant, stormed into the offices of Rep. William Jefferson, Democrat of Louisiana, and seized papers, records and computers.

Jefferson is the fellow the FBI caught in a sting operation recently and the raid presumably was related to that. (He was passed a \$100,000 cash bribe, \$90,000 of which was later found in his freezer. He says there are two sides to every story and I'm dying to hear his.)

You would think that Congress would be pretty pleased at this turn of events, wouldn't you? They certainly talk tough on crime during election campaigns.

But pleased they're not. Our solons erupted in outrage over the FBI's action and demanded that Jefferson's records be returned. Law officers, you see, aren't supposed to search congressional offices. It's unconstitutional.

"We need to protect the division

of powers in the Constitution of the United States," said Speaker Dennis Hastert, his eyes raised heavenward. (Or was that a television camera he was looking at?)



Don't you love it? This Congress has nodded off while the administration embraced torture as an interrogation tool, asserted the right of eavesdropping without warrant on citizens, arrested and jailed people without charging them and declared the right to attack another nation

pretty much any time it felt like it. But let the FBI search the office of a crooked congressman—with a warrant, yet-and the yahoos on the Hill suddenly discover that we've got a Constitution and they're sworn to uphold it.

Who's writing their script, Woody Allen?

It looked for a time like President Bush was going to cave in to Congress (and Dick Cheney) and order the FBI to send Jefferson's records back. But Attorney General Alberto Gonzales, of all people, as well as his deputy and the head of the FBI threatened to resign if he did it, so he temporized by ordering a 45-day hold on the material.

Excellence and integrity in a Republican Justice Department? What is the world coming to? I don't know, maybe the Royals will win the Series.

According to museum information, the workshop, titled "Monotype: The Painterly Print," was part of the Walter Gropius Master Artist Series. The artist series

is funded through the generosity of the Estate of Roxanna Y. Booth, who wished to assist in the development of an art education program in accordance with the proposals of Walter Gropius, who designed the Museum's Gropius Addition. The information also notes that the museum is indebted to Roxanna Booth's son, Alex, for his participation in the concept development of the Gropius Master Artist Workshops. Alex E. Booth Jr., a native of West Virginia, has been a member of the Board of Trustees at Pikeville College for more than a decade. His vision and generosity enabled Pikeville College to establish the Booth programs which enhance learning and help students and teachers in Kentucky and Virginia meet the challenges of an increasingly technological society.



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## FCT Interview: Kentucky Football Offensive Coordinator Joker Phillips

*Editor's note: This is the first in a series of eight interviews with NCAA Division I football coaches.*

Floyd County Times Contributing Writer Jamie Howell (JH) recently had the chance to sit down and talk football with University of Kentucky Offensive Coordinator Joker Phillips (JP).

JH: Thank you for taking time to talk with me. What do

you think it will take to get the football program turned around at UK?

JP: Several people have asked me that question, I feel like consistency is the most important aspect to a good program. It took Frank Beamer seven or eight years at Virginia Tech to get that program turned around and Snyder needed eight or nine years at Kansas State to turn the corner. We understand that you don't get that much time

these days, but we feel like we have the program pointed in the right direction. It does make it tougher coming off probation and with the scholarship limitations, but we feel good about the future of the program here at Kentucky.

JH: With spring practice wrapped up, was there any player that really stood out to the coaching staff?

JP: Alfonso Smith is a guy that we knew had the chance to be a good football player

and after spring practice we feel like he gives us added depth at the tailback position. Alfonso is 6-1 and about 205 pounds. He is the fastest guy on our team and has such a drive and desire for the game. With Alfonso, Little and Dixon, we feel like we have the depth needed to compete in a conference like the SEC.

JH: With center Matt McCutchan being granted a sixth year of eligibility, the entire offensive line will

return for the 2006 season and that should be a big plus for the team.

JP: Getting Matt back was big for us and you are right we will have our line back, but what we also have is big time depth at the position. Aaron Miller is a guy from Eastern Kentucky (East Carter High School) that played for us and started 10 games two years ago. We will not only have him back this season, but also Micah Jones should

be back with us. We feel confident running the football behind this group.

JH: What are the expectations for the season?

JP: We need to get to a bowl game and we expect to get there. Six wins is what we need and once we get there we want to keep improving. Our goal is to get into the best bowl game possible.

JH: Another player that

## Jig may be tops for bottoming out on bigger, deep water bass

PADUCAH — When warming water sends post-spawn bass into the depths, a modern take on the oldest of lures may be the leading way to coax them back up to the anoding net.

"Jigs and soft plastics probably rank number one and number two in terms of catching bass on deeper structures," said professional angler Terry Bolton Jr. of Paducah. "What's good about the jig is that you can fish it with different retrieves, and it's always likely to get you some of your bigger bites."

Bolton fishes all over following the professional circuit, and he's scored top-10 finishes in more than 30 FLW Outdoors tournaments at different levels but he's been almost legendary, winning or finishing high in many tournaments on his home waters of Kentucky Lake.

He recently came within a whisker of winning a FLW Tournament on Kentucky Lake, settling for runner-up on a dead fish penalty, by practicing his forte of offshore structure fishing in which the bass jig is a primary weapon.

His chosen vehicle is usually a one-half- to three-quarter-ounce jig with fiber weedguard and silicone skirt topped off with a plastic trailer, a Zoom Chunk.

"When I first start fishing, I may mix up my retrieves for a while, try different things, to let the fish tell me what they want," he said.

"One way is to fish the jig like you would a plastic worm — let it go to bottom, then drag it across the ledge with short pulls," Bolton said. "Another way is to use a simple lift and drop, bringing the rod from the nine o'clock position to about 11 o'clock and allowing the jig to fall back to bottom on a semi-tight line.

"Another major option is to


"I would run a camp all summer if I could," Martin added. "I think a lot of coaches are like that and enjoy teaching fundamentals."

hop the jig, bringing it higher off the bottom with a quicker sweep of the rod and then letting it fall on a slack line," he said.

"Some days they like it dragged, some days they like it hopped," he said, indicating that with lift-and-drop retrieves, bass almost always prefer to strike as the jig falls.

The jig and trailer combination, with no built-in action, has its appeal purely in the angler's

manipulation.

"Depending on what you do with it, the jig can mimic a crawfish by hopping or crawling it, or you can even swim it and mimic a bluegill — or with some lighter-colored jigs, you can do a pretty good shad imitation," Bolton said.

For a typical presentation, Bolton stops his boat over deep water, perhaps 25 to 30 feet, and casts onto the shallower top of an adjacent underwater

ledge, often the inundated bank of a creek channel or the main river channel. He most often works his jig from the shallower top, sometimes 8 to 12 feet, down the quickly descending slope with whatever retrieve to which bass seem to respond best. "A lot of times you never feel a bite with the jig," Bolton said. "The line just gets heavy like you've picked up some weeds on it." Those who lift and drop their jigs also know to

be devoted line-watchers. On many occasions, a bass "bite" may go undetected by feel, but the semi-slack or slack line above the water may visibly twitch toward the depths, an indication a fish has inhaled the offering.

"Because of the way bass take a jig and because jig hooks sometimes are heavier wire and harder to pull into the fish, I recommend a stouter rod and a low stretch line for jig fishing,"

he said.

"I like a 6 1/2-foot rod, something anywhere from a medium-heavy to an extra-heavy action," Bolton said. "Sometimes you're just bringing the rod up and it gets mushy and you realize a bass has the jig but you don't have time to drop the tip and take up slack to set the hook. You've got to have enough backbone to keep coming back hard and just pull into the fish."

Deep-water jigging requires more work than some other options. So why take that route?

"Because of the bulk, it takes a little heavier jig to get it down and it takes a little longer," Bolton said. "And if you hop a jig all day, your wrists will definitely know it."

"But day in and day out, the bigger bass, those that are better than four pounds, are going to come on the jig."



# UK transfer Sims chooses Fresno State

FRESNO, Calif. — Kentucky transfer Rekalin Sims (Vallejo, Calif.) has decided to continue playing basketball for the Fresno State men's basketball team and head coach Steve Cleveland.

Described as having the size to play the front line and the range to shoot the three, Sims will sit out the 2006-07 season as a Division I transfer. The 6-8 200-pound power forward

played this past season for the Wildcats (22-13), who advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Playing in 29 games, Sims had six starts as he finished the year averaging 4.4 points and 2.9 rebounds in 13.2 minutes of playing time. He shot 44.6% from the floor while posting four double-figure scoring games in addition to having four 10-plus rebound performances. His best outing at UK was his start against Iowa

in which he scored 22 points and had seven rebounds in the third game of the year.

Prior to signing with Kentucky, Sims attended Salt Lake Community College where he was a two-time JUCO All-American. Also a two-time Scenic West Athletic Conference/Region 18 Player of the Year, he led the conference in scoring both seasons while leading the league in rebounding as a sophomore.

In 2004-05, Sims averaged 19.4

points and 9.6 rebounds, earning First Team All-America honors and helping the program set a school record in wins (27-6). As a sophomore, he also set the Bruins single-season rebounding mark en route to establishing a new career rebound record. In 2003-04, Sims captured Second Team All-America accolades after averaging 18 points and eight rebounds per game.

As a prepster, Sims attended De La Salle High School (Concord, Calif.). He was a two-year letterwin-

ner and helped the program compile a 64-8 record in his two seasons. As a junior, Sims was named the East Bay Player of the Year after averaging 20 points and nine rebounds.

"Rekalin is an outstanding player who has the versatility to play multiple positions," said Cleveland, who is in his second year with the Bulldogs. "He will be a great fit for our system. He is long and extremely athletic with very good perimeter and post skills."

## Student paper rejects ad aimed at Kentucky basketball coach

LEXINGTON — An anti-Tubby Smith ad won't run in the University of Kentucky student newspaper.

The Kentucky Kernel rejected the full-page ad sought by University of Kentucky adjunct professor Richard Cheeks calling for Smith's dismissal as the Wildcats basketball coach.

Cheeks, a Jessamine County engineer and lawyer with two degrees from the University of Kentucky, said a group of between 500 and 1,000 fans have come to believe Smith is bad for the basketball program.

"We see the program in decline. ... We don't want it to

decline the way the Louisville program did in the latter years when Denny Crum was there," Cheeks said. "So we decided that we were going to begin to get our message out."

Cheeks and a group called Concerned Fans For UK Basketball sought to buy a \$1,700 ad in the Kentucky Kernel. The paper rejected the ad, prompting Cheeks to call other media outlets.


Smith could not be reached for comment. Scott Stricklin, a spokesman for Kentucky's basketball program, said Smith wants the program to be successful and he knows that passionate fans will sometimes react badly to a subpar season.

"Being that he's one of the

nation's winningest coaches, he pretty much knows what it takes to win championships because he's done it here," Stricklin said.

The college newspaper's adviser and general manager, Chris Poore, said the advertising staff made the decision to reject the ad without influence from the university administration. The newspaper is independent and the newsroom is independent of advertising, Poore said.

"Newspapers and television stations make those decisions everyday, about which ads to accept or not accept, especially when an ad is going after somebody or something," Poore said.

## Indiana All-Stars begin preparing for Kentucky stars

Indiana's game plan is simple: Get the basketball inside to Greg Oden. Or, if he's covered, which may take two or three Kentucky players to do effectively, get the ball back out to Mike Conley.

It's a combination that carried Lawrence North to three straight Class 4A championships and one the Indiana All-Stars will try to exploit in their annual series this month against the top high school players from neighboring Kentucky.

No one has figured out a way to stop them yet.

"Obviously, it's going to go through them," Indiana All-Star coach Chris Benedict of Columbia City said. "Mike's got the ball in his hands, and Greg goes inside, so it's just a good 1-2 punch to go with."

The 7-foot Oden, the national high school player of the year and Indiana's Mr. Basketball, shot an incredible 74 percent from the field and averaged 22 points and 10.5 rebounds a game last season, when Lawrence North finished unbeaten with a record-tying 45th straight victory. The 6-1 Conley, who will remain Oden's teammate next season as freshmen at Ohio State, averaged 16.3 points and 4.1 assists a game.

"It's a dream to every kid that ever thought of playing basketball to be an Indiana All-Star," said Vaughn Duggins of Pendleton Heights. "It's a dream come true to play with that kind of talent. Greg and Mike are going to make us all look good."

The first boys and girls All-Star games will be in Bowling Green, Ky., on June 17; the rematches will be in Conesco Fieldhouse in Indianapolis on June 24.

Benedict, whose Columbia City team lost to coach Jack Keefer's Lawrence North team in the 4A championship game in 2004, said despite the talent of Oden and Conley, their first concern is to make their team successful.

"I just have the utmost respect the way they went about this run they've had. They go about it the right way, play the game the right way, play within the framework of what coach Keefer wanted them to do."

The Indiana team also includes Notre Dame recruit Luke Harangody of Andean, Purdue recruit Chris Kramer of Huntington North, Virginia-bound Jamil Tucker of Gary West and Indiana State recruit Cole Holmstrom of Bloomington South. Curtis White, whose No. 2-ranked Indianapolis Pike lost to Lawrence North three times last season, also is on the Indiana squad.

The others are Andrew Warren of Indianapolis Brebeuf, Grant Leiendecker of Homestead, DeJovann Sawyer-Davis of Anderson, Antonio Ballard of Jeffersonville and Brandon Hopf of 2A champion Forest Park.

The Indiana girls All-Stars are led by Miss Basketball Amber Harris of Indianapolis North Central and Dee Dee Jernigan of East Chicago, both of whom signed with Purdue but changed their minds after the departure of former

Boilermakers coach Kristy Curry to Texas Tech. Harris instead will enroll at Xavier and Jernigan will attend Rutgers.

FahKara Malone of 3A runner-up Evansville Memorial, who still plans to play at Purdue for new coach Sharon Versyp, and future Notre Dame teammates Melissa Lechlitner of South Bend St. Joseph's and Ashley Barlow of Pike also are on the girls team.

The others are Amanda Stull of Rushville, Courtney Reed of Northfield, Melanie Thornton of Carmel, Audrey McDonald of Kokomo, Susan Lester of Pendleton Heights, Maria Olsthoorn of 4A champion Castle and Chanell Ridley of Fort Wayne Concordia.

"We're pretty good in each position," said Indiana girls coach Julie Shelton of Mount Vernon (Hancock), a 1989 All-Star. "As long as we gel and find a group that can work together, we're going to have a good experience."

The boys and girls All-Stars open camp at DePauw University on Sunday. They'll also play exhibition games against Indiana's junior All-Stars on June 14, June 20 and June 22.

# REDS NOTEBOOK: Coffey settling into closer's role

CINCINNATI — For the first two months of the season, Todd Coffey would sprint out of the bullpen and get the Cincinnati Reds out of another eighth-inning threat. Coffey did so well in his setup role that manager Jerry Narron resisted the temptation to move him into the closer's spot. He was willing to wait for the right time to come. It's time. Coffey has started closing games for the Reds, moving into the role that was going to

belong to him at some point. The 25-year-old reliever got his first promotion to the majors last season, got his first save and showed why he was the organization's best closer in the minors. He was the main setup man for closer David Weathers at the start of this season. When Weathers blew four consecutive save opportunities, Narron decided it was time to make the switch. Heading into a series opener against the Cubs on Thursday night, Coffey had picked up four of the Reds' last five saves. He was 4-of-5

overall in save chances this season, led the staff with 29 appearances and led National League relievers with a 1.85 ERA. His biggest adjustment to the closer's role has been dealing with the self-imposed expectations — something all closers experience. "That's what you've always wanted to do," Coffey said Thursday. "When you're a kid throwing a ball against a brick wall, you're like, 'I want to be there in Game 7 of the World Series with a one-run lead.' You're not thinking, 'I want to be out there with a

seven-run lead.' You want to be there in the tough situations." He learned last Sunday how tough it can be when he got into a game in the 10th inning in Houston and gave up a run that prolonged it. The Reds won it in the 11th, 6-4, and Coffey talked to a few teammates afterward about his approach to that game. They told him to treat the last inning like it was no different from any other. That's what he's done in his appearances since then. "I'm trying to keep it the same now," he said.

One thing hasn't changed: His out-of-the-bullpen bolt. Coffey sprints to the mound, a practice he started in the minors and has maintained along the way. "It's kind of for focus, and I get my legs loose at the same time," he said. NO SURPRISE: The Reds appeared to be embarking on their annual midseason fade when they lost five in a row in mid-May, knocking them out of first place in the NL Central for the first time in two weeks. They opened June five games behind St. Louis,

quickly becoming an afterthought. A seven-game winning streak catapulted them right back into a first-place tie with the Cardinals heading into the series against Chicago. Manager Jerry Narron said all along that it was too early to write off the Reds, who have emerged from a deep hitting slump. "Teams in the big leagues are so close in talent that the teams that are going to win are the teams that do the little things consistently the best," Narron said. "And it seems like everybody's got holes."

## Picture this: McNair joins Ravens

OWINGS MILLS, Md. — After going up against the hated Ravens for the last 10 years of his NFL career, Steve McNair must have felt a little strange standing between Baltimore coach Brian Billick and general manager Ozzie Newsome. There was McNair, posing for pictures in front of a purple jersey with his name on it. "Well, back in the day, you would have never dreamed I would be here," McNair said. "But I'm here. The NFL is a crazy business." McNair signed with the Ravens on Thursday and was

introduced as their starting quarterback. The transaction ended a lengthy odyssey for McNair, who had negotiated a five-year deal with Baltimore on April 30 but had to wait five weeks to be traded from the only team he ever played for, the Tennessee Titans. The Ravens — and McNair — knew the Titans couldn't keep the three-time Pro Bowler unless he restructured his contract for less than Baltimore was offering. Plus, Tennessee drafted quarterback Vince Young of Texas with the third overall pick in the April draft. Titans general manager Floyd Reese realized a trade was the only option after talking to McNair's agent, Bus Cook, on Wednesday morning. So he called Newsome and struck a deal: McNair for Baltimore's fourth-round pick in the 2007 NFL draft. "It's good to be here. Finally, the drama is over," McNair said. "I'm here at a

place I feel very wanted. This has been an experience over the last month-and-a-half to get here, but I'm here and I'm satisfied." McNair believes joining the Ravens will enable him to wrap up his NFL career with a pretty little bow. "I think this is a place we can win Super Bowls. That is the missing piece out of my career," he said. The Ravens, similarly, consider McNair to be the missing piece in their quest to rebound from a horrid 6-10 season and add another championship trophy to the one they collected in 2001. "He is one of the elite quarterbacks in this game. His record speaks for itself," Billick said of the league's co-MVP in 2003. "Clearly, as our starter going in, Steve is going to add a dimension to this football team that we have not had." The 33-year-old McNair gives the Ravens a quarterback

with enough talent to win a game on his own. Since Billick arrived in 1999, Baltimore has relied on its defense while hoping that a long line of mediocre quarterbacks could do enough to prevent the offense from being a liability. That included last year's starter, Kyle Boller, who immediately dropped to No. 2 on the depth chart after McNair passed his physical Thursday morning. "I think it transforms us. To add Steve, with the kind of player he is, it adds that much more," said receiver Derrick Mason, who caught 29 touchdown passes from McNair when they were teammates at Tennessee for eight seasons. Ravens linebacker Ray Lewis bumped helmets against Tennessee twice a season when the teams were paired in the old AFC Central. The most memorable clash came in 2001, when Baltimore beat the Titans to end Tennessee's bid

to return to the Super Bowl. "OK, No. 9, here we go," Lewis said. "He's a warrior." The trade reunites McNair with former Tennessee teammates Mason and Samari Rolle, both of whom signed as free agents with Baltimore last year. "I never thought I would see this. I'm waiting for Eddie George to walk in the locker room," said Ravens guard Edwin Mulitalo, referring to the former Titans running back. The Ravens don't need another running back. But they've been looking for a quarterback with McNair's credentials ever since they moved to Baltimore from Cleveland in 1996. "They never had a guy that brought this credibility to them in 11 years," Rolle said. "They have to be excited they got Steve McNair." To say the least, Offensive coordinator Jim Fassel can't wait for McNair to get on the

field. "We've got leader guys, but sometimes a new guy walking in the door — especially at the quarterback position — is very helpful," Fassel said. "He's going to have the respect because of what he's done." McNair has played through dozens of injuries, but there have been times when the pain was too much to bear. He missed two games in 2005 after missing eight in 2004, and there's no guarantee his body can take a pounding for 16 games in 2006. But the Ravens were delighted to take a chance, hopeful the quarterback can take them to Miami for the 2007 Super Bowl. "At the outset of this off-season, we talked about upgrading our football team," Newsome said. "Bringing Steve in, does that guarantee us being in Miami? No, it doesn't. But I think today we are a better football team than we were yesterday."

## Jockeys fighting another attempt to restrict ads

LEXINGTON — Race car drivers, camouflaged in advertisements, are often walking endorsements for their corporate sponsors. Kentucky's horse racing officials are trying to make sure their sport

doesn't follow suit. "I'd rather see just plain white britches," said Dell Hancock, a Kentucky Horse Racing Authority member who is part-owner of Claiborne Farm. "I'm a purist and that's the way I like it. I'm for the good of the game, not just the good of one person." But jockeys insist they need sponsorships to supplement their income. The Jockeys' Guild, armed with a 2004 court ruling at least partly supportive of their cause, has resisted previous efforts to curb the use of ads and faces another one now. The Kentucky Horse Racing Authority voted Monday to tighten its own

rules on what commercial logos jockeys can wear after some riders were spotted at this year's Kentucky Oaks and Kentucky Derby with a corporate Web address on their pant legs. The issue stems back to a 2004 lawsuit in which jockeys won the right to be able to wear ads or guild patches. The authority stepped in to make sure owners, who pay the bills, had influence in what types of logos were worn. Last year, the authority passed a regulation letting jockeys wear "a recognized logo of an entity representing the jockeys." Anything else must go through a three-step approval process.

First it goes to the horse's owner, who could reject it for any reason, then the track, who could reject it if it conflicts with an official race sponsorship, and finally racing stewards, who would primarily check on mandated size limits. But on Oaks Day, Mark Guidry was spotted with the words jockeymedia.com on his pant leg, and others wore a similar ad the next day at the Derby without going through the full approval process. JockeyMedia is an organization that sets up corporate sponsors for jockeys. It is affiliated with the Jockeys' Guild, which is why the riders argued they didn't need to get it cleared.

"It was a commercial enterprise, but they sort of skirted the regulation," said Lisa Underwood, general counsel for the Racing Authority. Under an amendment approved Monday, KHRA clarified that only the Guild's boot emblem and a wheelchair logo representing disabled jockeys will be allowed without going through the approval process. State officials still must sign off on the amendment. "It's just a standpoint of good taste," said John Veitch, chief state steward for Kentucky races. "We don't want to turn this into a NASCAR-type thing where the ad is so large it detracts

from the tradition of the sport." But the Jockeys' Guild, which opposed the current regulation, contends the new one is also unnecessary. Darrell Haire, interim national manager, says some jockeys make as little as \$35 for a minor race and need to have more power to boost their income. "The jockeys don't want to go out there looking like poster boys," Haire said. "They want it all in good taste. I just think it's unfair. Most of these riders don't have medical insurance or retirement. There's money to be made on advertisements, and I just think the riders should have the opportunity."

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BUSY ON THE DIRT: For now, veteran Late Model driver Brandon Kinzer will remain busy with his dirt track racing program. Kinzer, however, plans to test a racecar on asphalt later this year.

# How to tell when it's time to junk a car

Dear Tom and Ray:

Please define "driving a car into the ground." I realize I'm on the downside of my '93 Toyota 4Runner's lifetime. I crossed 200,000 miles a month ago but would like to keep it for at least a year more (I'm saving to buy my next vehicle in full). But in the meantime, little things are starting to go wrong. My air conditioning hasn't worked in five years, and now the heat doesn't work unless it's on high. I had the rust taken out, but it's reappeared stronger than ever. The car is far from being dead, but I wonder if it's in my best interest to get these repairs done, or just sock that potential cash away for the new vehicle. The AC estimate alone was something like \$1,300, and (at least before my rear door panel was bashed by some idiot) the vehicle's blue-book value was around \$2,500. AC and heat are optional in my book, but at some point, something is going to give. At what point do I just leave it by the road and walk to the nearest Toyota dealer and buy another truck? — Linley

RAY: Well, Linley, I'm going to let my brother define "driving a car into the ground," since he's the

world's foremost authority.

TOM: It's simple. A car has been driven into the ground when the amount of money it requires to be roadworthy exceeds the amount you're willing to spend. So either the car WON'T go, or it's not SAFE for it to go anymore, and you don't want to pay the minimum necessary to keep it on the road. Then you reluctantly take the plates off it, pay somebody to tow it away, and consider the car "driven into the ground."

RAY: And while you certainly sound like you're coming in for a landing, Linley, you're not on the ground yet.

TOM: It's easy to be confused near the end of a car's life, when multiple things start to go wrong. But you have to separate "safety" issues from "convenience" issues. And everything you mention is a convenience issue.

RAY: Right. If you don't mind driving without AC, who cares? That's your business. It hasn't worked for five years. So what? My brother hasn't worked for 10.

TOM: The heat only works on the high setting. Well, if you don't mind switching between wearing a parka and driving in your underwear, why should anyone else care?

RAY: And the rear door panel? Who cares? Use the other door. Or climb out the window.

TOM: None of these issues makes the car unsafe to drive. So you're under no obligation to fix them. If you'd rather save the money than have air conditioning, that's fine.

RAY: Now, if you had a bad wheel bearing, a hole in the floor that allowed leaking exhaust to enter the cabin or a leaky brake line, that would be a safety issue, and you'd have to fix it — or junk the car.

TOM: So, I'd have your favorite mechanic give the car a good once-over. Have him check stuff like the front end, the tires and the brakes. If he finds any safety-related problems, you can see what they'll cost to fix and then make your decision.

RAY: But as long as the car is safe to drive, you can just keep driving it and save your money. Then when the time comes, and you just don't want to put any more money into it, call my brother. He'll make you an offer.

## Car likes cold air — but why?

Dear Tom and Ray:

On cold days, the cold, crisp air getting to the 3.8-liter engine of my 2001 Buick Regal makes it run better. I can tell it has more power — like a

horse on a cold morning, it's raring to go. Believe me, this is not my imagination. Is there something I can do or add on to give cold air to the engine year-round? Also, please explain this phenomenon.

Thanks. — Harry

TOM: Well, you can move to Antarctica.

RAY: I think there's a simpler solution, Harry. Rather than adding a cold-air-delivery device, you need to find out why your car is running poorly once it's warmed up.

TOM: The first thing I'd be suspicious of is your air-flow sensor. The air-flow sensor measures the density of the air, which changes with the temperature. Once it knows the density of the air, the computer then adjusts the gas/air mixture accordingly. If the sensor is giving the computer bad information, the computer will set the mixture incorrectly, and your engine will run poorly.

RAY: Have your mechanic test the air-flow sensor over a range of speeds, and see if the signals coming out of it match what the manufacturer says should be coming out. If not, you need an air-flow sensor, my friend.

TOM: Or a trailer hitch, so you can tow around one of those freezers outside convenience stores that sell 5-pound bags of ice.

## Odds & Ends

■ EASTPOINTE, Mich. — A state judicial agency says a dog's place is in the home and has ordered a suburban Detroit judge to stop bringing her terriers Lurch and Lizzard to court.

The State Court Administrative Office, an agency of the Michigan Supreme Court, contacted Eastpointe District Judge Norene Redmond about the dogs this week, said agency spokeswoman Marcia McBrien.

"Courtrooms are serious places, and respect for the court needs to be maintained," McBrien said.

Redmond said last week she saw no problems with bringing dogs to court, something she has done occasionally since 2004. She said the dogs brought calm to the tense courtroom.

The state agency said there had been several complaints about the dogs.

McBrien said she has been told the judge would comply with the order.

■ PLEASANT HILL, Ore. — Graduating seniors at Pleasant Hill High School were in no rush to get to school for their final day.

About a dozen of them drove to school Wednesday on riding mowers, forcing traffic on Highway 58 to slow to about 10 mph.

"We wanted to make people wait," said Kodi Long, 18. "We were trying to teach them a lesson — not to hurry."

Ty Holloway, 17, was puttering along on a John Deere when he was stopped by a policeman. The officer laughed and sent him on his way when told of the circumstances, Holloway said.

But police Sgt. Mike Wisdom said it was technically illegal. A riding lawn mower meets the legal definition of a motor vehicle and the statutes that apply to vehicles apply to riding lawn mowers, too.

"Riding lawn mowers are not supposed to be on the highway," he said. "There's just a multitude of violations."

Among the infractions: equipment violations (lack of brake lights, turn signals and horn) and lack of registration, licensing and insurance, Wisdom said.

■ SYDNEY, Australia — Wrinkled, lumpy, balding or just plain funny looking, Australian researchers have launched a search for the country's ugliest sheep to try to identify genes that produce high quality wool.

These so-called ugly merinos — ones born with rough, uneven or extra curly wool, bald patches, or even very wrinkled skin — are often culled shortly after birth because of their inability to produce good wool.

Instead, researchers are asking farmers to donate their unusual sheep or wool clippings to the study.

"When something goes really wrong with the genes, it is the most powerful indicator about where to look to identify the genes that can — paradoxically — make things go really right," said Paul Hynd, a researcher from the University of Adelaide, which launched the study with the South Australian Research and Development Institute this week.

Australia's merino wool industry is worth about \$2.1 billion each year, and scientists hope to use the study to produce higher quality wool to

compete with increasingly popular synthetic fibers.

■ GREELEY, Colo. — Republican U.S. Rep. Marilyn Musgrave's re-election campaign was already heated, and it just got smelly as well: Her staff accused a Democratic activist of leaving an envelope full of dog feces at her office here.

Someone stuffed the envelope through the mail slot in the door on May 31 and then sped away in a car, Musgrave spokesman Shaun Kenney said. He said most of the preprinted return address was blacked out, but staffers used the nine-digit ZIP code to trace it to Kathleen Ensz, a Democratic volunteer.

Ensz told The Associated Press she left the envelope at Musgrave's office but said it "wasn't in the office doors, it was in the foyer." Asked what she meant by the act, she declined comment.

Kenney demanded an apology from Musgrave's likely Democratic opponent, state Rep. Angela Paccione of Fort Collins.

Paccione spokesman James Thompson said Ensz has no formal ties to the Paccione campaign.

Greeley Police Sgt. Joe Tymkovich said Ensz had been cited for criminal use of a noxious substance. She is due in court Aug. 10.

■ MANCHESTER, N.H. — Jim Hourihan of Liverpool, England, had never heard of Manchester, N.H., until this week. But thanks to a mix-up, he found himself there while trying to fly to another Manchester — the one on the other side of the Atlantic.

Hourihan boarded a Continental Airlines flight in Los Angeles on Monday, but it wasn't until he got on a connecting flight in Cleveland — a 50-seat regional jet — that he realized he was headed to New England instead of jolly old England.

"When I first saw the plane I thought, 'That's not going to Manchester, England,'" Hourihan told WMUR-TV. "And it was then that it dawned on me. There must be two Manchesters."

Tuesday evening, after a stay in Manchester, Continental booked Hourihan on a flight to Newark, N.J., to connect with a flight home at no extra charge, said Brian O'Neill, assistant director at Manchester Boston Regional Airport.

Hourihan said he liked Manchester, but felt it could use a few more pubs.

He is not the first passenger to have landed in the wrong Manchester, O'Neill said.

The airport recently added "Boston Regional" to its name, making it appear more frequently when travelers and agents search for flights, O'Neill said. Previously, he said, Manchester might not show up until page 11 or 12 of a computer flight search, but now it sometimes appears on the first or second page.

■ ASHLAND, Wis. — Traffic signals that went haywire at the city's busiest intersection over Memorial Day weekend left technicians stymied for five days until state experts discovered the cause: a wayward paper clip.

The malfunction reverted the signals at Ellis Avenue and Lakeshore Drive to a default mode, flashing

yellow and red. Typically, the signals only go out after accidents when a vehicle hits one of the pole, but there had been no such crash.

When city crews finally called in the state Department of Transportation for help, a DOT official spotted the culprit—a paper clip had fallen behind the signal's control panel and shorted out the system.

Ironically, the paper clip had been used to hold a card with names and phone numbers of technicians who maintain the signals, said Pat Colgrove, city operation manager.

"I was shocked," he said. "I said, 'You got to be kidding me.'"

■ EUCLID, Ohio — Don't try to hang a blanket in a window in this Ohio town.

The City Council has banned the use of blankets, garbage bags, newspaper or other unsightly items in place of curtains.

Shades, miniblinds and other conventional window coverings in houses and apartments must work and be hung properly, according to the law approved 8-1 Monday. Sheets sewn to look like drapes also will be acceptable.

Violators will receive warnings and could face up to six months in jail and a \$1,000 fine. Residents who just moved in will be given some wiggle room and landlords will be responsible for getting renters to comply, said Ron Petkovic, the city's housing manager.

The measure was meant to give Euclid a nicer image, and was prompted by complaints, Councilman John Conway said.

"There was no intent to turn our inspectors, through this ordinance, into the fashion police," Conway said.

Cleveland State University Law Professor Alan Weinstein said Euclid might have a hard time making the law stick.

"It would be nice if we could legislate good taste," Weinstein said. "But the problem is: Who decides what's good taste?"

■ MORGANTOWN, W.Va. — Calling all cheapskates: Bring your dates here!

A new study by economists at West Virginia University finds a couple can enjoy a low-key night on the town for just \$23.73 in Morgantown, cheaper than most other West Virginia cities and below the national "cheap date" level.

Expect to pay an average of \$7.37 for a first-run movie ticket in Morgantown and \$8.99 for a medium cheese pie at Pizza Hut, the school's Bureau of Business and Economic Research said in a report released Wednesday.

That compares with ticket prices of \$7.51 in Charleston and \$7.71 nationally, and pizza prices of \$10.11 in Charleston and \$10.25 nationally.

But true penny pinchers might not want to live here.

Overall, Morgantown ranked 96th among the 297 cities that took part in a national cost of living survey by the nonprofit group ACCRA: The Council for Community and Economic Research.

Housing costs in Morgantown were 1 percent above the average, but 14 percent higher than Charleston and 14.6 percent higher than Pittsburgh. Utility and transportation costs were also higher, as were the prices of dental and medical care and prescription drugs.

mercy kill of a bellhop who is channeling Jerry Lewis.

Jackie takes forever to figure out that Helen is the snake woman and doesn't even develop a clue when their car is turned into a snake factory while on the freeway. It is a great sequence that employs real snakes for the interior shots and rubber ones for the car's exterior, which at least shows that no snakes were harmed in the making of this celluloid jewel.

Meanwhile, Richard fends off another attack every 15 minutes (by a new assassin in the same blue jumper). He eventually seeks out "The Fortune Teller," who breaks down the problem in seconds explaining that the killers want his ring which is the only device that can kill the Vampire Queen who is also the Queen of the Scorpions. The soothsayer then whips out a magic mirror and a golden sword and says to break the ring on the mirror with the sword to kill the Queen. Should have seen that one coming. Though this moment has nothing to do with the rest of the film it at least offers an explanation for the disco/frog queen sequences which appear to have been shot for yet a third movie.

Meanwhile the cops corner the snake man (or is that snake woman?) and pump enough lead into it to sink a battle cruiser. The end?

I don't know where to start here, but trust me that this is entertaining even if it stubbornly refuses to let the audience in on what's going on. The scenes with Richard were obviously filmed separately and edited into the rest of the action, with no regard for coherence. That said, this delivers on every exploitation front, with plenty of rubber-suited monster footage, kung-fu battles, dancing demon queens and trussed-up spouse billiards. In the end it never really makes any sense, but it's a fun ride that will either leave you scratching your head or fitting a noose around it.

All that and it comes on a double DVD called "Tales of Voodoo 5," which also includes "Vengeance." Jason Miller (Father Karras in "The Exorcist") should have billed himself as Buck Naked for this 1970s thriller, which casts him as an escapee from a South American prison who is without clothes as he is relentlessly pursued by a guard dog after he kills its master. If it sounds familiar that's because it was remade last year as "Rottweiler," where they kept the basic structure but changed the dog into a cyborg. These are fun, if not coherent, flicks, and they won't break your bank account, though they may induce headaches so take this one alongside a hefty dose of tylenol.

Best line: "He's a blind night watchman who has overcome gout and arthritis. He also plays the flute." 1988, rated R.
