Shots fired at state troopers

PHYLIS — Two state troopers found themselves being shot at early Friday morning when they responded to a complaint of loud music from a residence in the Pike County community of Honey Fork, in Phyllis.

Troopers Gary Sykes and Tony Tackett responded to the call at 3:40 a.m. and were promptly fired upon, allegedly by resident John Paul May, 60.

The troopers quickly took cover as May reportedly barricaded himself inside the residence and refused to emerge. The troopers contacted May by phone and managed to talk him out of the building three hours later.

May was incarcerated at the Pike County Detention Center and was charged with two counts of wanton endangerment.

Trooper Tackett is investigating the incident.

Treasurer loses bid to lower payments

PRESTONSBURG — A Harold man who embezzled over \$200,000 when he was treasurer of the Betsy Layne Fire Protection District failed in a bid to have his restitution payments lowered Friday.

Glen Donovan Burgess appeared in circuit court with his attorney, Larry Webster, and argued that he has had a tough time finding work since he pleaded guilty to seven

felony counts of theft for using his treasurer's position to steal the money over a six-year period from April 1995 to August 2001.

Judge Danny P. Caudill denied the motion.

"He's the one (Burgess) who made the arrangements," Caudill said. The judge followed up by noting that partial payments were not in the spirit of the court orders requiring full repayment of all of the money that was taken.

Burgess became liable for the payments when he

entered a guilty plea in 2003 and was ordered to make restitution in the amount of \$15,000 a year. To date, he has paid back \$83,000, which is less than half of the funds he stole.

The Burgesses have had several court appearances since entering the plea. At one hearing, Judge John D. Caudill ordered a mortgage they got on their home "null and void." The mortgage had been obtained 21 days after the court had placed an injunction on their finances to secure payment of the restitution.

East Ky. Utilities customers to see bills drop

PRESTONSBURG — Although customers of East Kentucky Utilities had to weather high prices this winter, they can look forward to keeping warm for about half the cost next winter.

Before Friday's fiscal court meeting, County Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson announced that the county, which operates the utility, is close to finalizing a contract which will bring down the cost of natural gas dramatically.

Thompson noted that the fiscal court had been steadily

dropping gas rates over the past few months, last month's attempt to drop the rate to \$16.90 per MCF (1,000 cubic feet) met with resistance from the state Public Service Commission, which forced to county to inch the rate back to \$17.12.

That will change, however, when the new contract takes effect. The agreement will lock in a rate of under \$14 per MCF for a period of 12-to-14 months, "or maybe even longer," Thompson said.

Customers can expect to see the change on their bills

Election officers get boost in pay

PRESTONSBURG — Floyd County's election officers can look forward to a pay increase when they work the polls in May.

The fiscal court Friday unanimously agreed to raise the pay for the county's 172 election officers from \$75 to \$92. The \$17 increase will cost the county an additional \$2,924 for each election.

The increase was the idea of District 4 Magistrate Alan Williams, who first made the

proposal last month. During February's meeting, Williams noted that election officers in surrounding counties received were paid more than in Floyd County and he felt that the county should pay more for asking the officers to work a 12-hour day.

But no action was taken on the proposal in February, after County Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson said he was not comfortable moving forward until he had a chance to

Interactive game targets prescription abuse problem

LEXINGTON — It's a sort of choose-your-own-adventure book for middle school students, only higher tech and with much higher stakes.

Community activists in eastern Kentucky are fighting prescription drug abuse by enlisting the help of a company that creates

computerized dramas that let participants choose the path an actor takes with a click of the mouse.

WILL Interactive, based in Potomac, Md., is filming the project on prescription overdose in Kentucky with most cast members from Appalachia.

"In these kinds of behaviors it is not adequate to give someone information," WILL Interactive President Sharon Sloane said.

"You really have to engage people emotionally — simulate the stresses, the pressures, the pushes and pulls of the environment in which they interact."

With pain medication easier to get and far more socially acceptable than illicit narcotics, eastern Kentucky has battled a scourge of prescription drug abuse.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY WEEK IN REVIEW

Saying it was more important to get the issue before Kentuckians than wait for every detail to be worked out, a House committee approved a bill that would put the future of casinos in Kentucky on the November ballot.

Wednesday, Denver Butler, D-Louisville, chairman of the House Licensing and Occupations Committee, offered an amendment to House Bill 600 that would allow for casino gaming at nine sites across state.

Whether or not off-track betting facilities would be included as possible locations and how the state should spend any new revenue had become a sticking point on the legislation.

With all the publicity the issue is generating, Butler said the issue of locations should be postponed until the voters have spoken.

Under the committee substitute approved by the committee, casinos could be established in nine locations across the state.

By eliminating the site question, Butler said the fundamental issue of allowing expanded gaming could be answered by the voters if the measure is approved by the House and Senate.

"If it's immoral, they can vote against it," Butler said.

Committee member state Rep. Stan Lee, R-Lexington, said the committee's amendment fails to protect the horse industry and could only delay answering the site question.

"It's kinda like the dog that catches the car," Lee said.

State Rep. Paul Marcotte, R-Union, opposed the amendment and called the move "poor public policy" to leave such a vital question unanswered.

Vice Chairman of the committee Reginald Meeks, D-Louisville, favored the amendment and said getting the issue moving was a sign of progress.

"(The question of casino gaming) needs to be resolved," Meeks said. "The people deserve an opportunity to voice their opinion."

If voters approve the mea-

sure, Butler said it could be addressed by the next session of the General Assembly or possibly during a special called session.

With the adoption of the committee's recommendation, HB 600 moves on the full House for consideration.

□□□

The House has approved a bill that would legally protect a woman's right to breast feed in public.

The Senate has already approved the measure.

The bill would prevent local governments from establishing laws against public breast-feeding.

A proposed floor amendment that would relieve nursing mothers from jury duty was not heard because Speaker of the House Jody Richards ruled the issue not germane to the original intent of the bill.

SB 106 was approved on a vote of 89-1 and now moves on to Gov. Ernie Fletcher for consideration.

□□□

Doggie bags for bottles of wine may become a common sight at upscale restaurants in Kentucky with the passage of a bill Thursday.

SB 56 would allow the

"recorking" of unfinished bottles of wine purchased at restaurants to be transported in a vehicle as long as the container was inaccessible to the driver.

One of the bill's sponsors, Denver Butler, D-Louisville, said the bill could cut down on drunken driving because restaurant patrons wouldn't feel pressured to empty an expensive bottle of wine.

The bill, which was approved by the Senate on a 31-2 vote, now moves on to Gov. Ernie Fletcher for consideration for the House's 60-36 vote.

Rural electric cooperatives could expand operations under a bill passed Thursday by the House.

One of the bill's sponsors, Rob Wilkey, D-Simpson, said the cooperatives are "uniquely positioned" to provide high-speed Internet service to rural areas of Kentucky.

Wilkey said the bill provides several firewalls to separate the main goal of the cooperatives from any other business they may wish to enter.

Because of its status as a non-

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Military's push to turn coal into fuel picking up speed

DAYTON, Ohio — The Pentagon is trying to persuade investors and the energy industry to embrace an 80-year-old technology to turn coal into liquid fuel to power planes, tanks and other battlefield vehicles.

Officials have been crisscrossing the country, meeting with energy companies and state government officials to sell them on the idea. At the same time, military researchers have been testing fuel produced by the process to make sure it is suitable for military vehicles, especially older ones.

The military is worried that political pressure or terrorist acts could cut the flow of oil from the Middle East or hurricanes or terrorists could destroy U.S. refineries.

"We know what the technical challenges are, but we don't see any show-stoppers," said William Harrison, senior adviser for the Pentagon's Assured Fuels Initiative. "There is still a level of uncertainty, but it looks like the technology is mature enough."

There are roadblocks.

Building coal-to-fuel plants is expensive — possibly up to \$5 billion. Investors worry that their money could go up in smoke if the global price of oil drops, budding government subsidies dry up, or tougher environmental rules are put into place, said Kevin Book, a Virginia-based senior analyst for Friedman, Billings, Ramsey & Co. Inc.

But then there is coal — lots of it.

The Middle East has about 685 billion barrels of oil compared with 22 billion barrels in the United States. However, there is enough coal in the United States to produce 964 billion barrels of fuel, according to the Pentagon.

Montana, with enough coal to produce 240 billion barrels of fuel, leads the pack, followed by Illinois, Wyoming, West Virginia, Kentucky, Pennsylvania and Ohio.

"We have probably 250 years' worth of coal," said Mike Carey, president of the Ohio Coal Association. "It would have a tremendous impact on the coal industry."

The industry is already on the rise.

Demand for U.S. coal is expected to be a record 1.2 billion tons this year, up from 1.18 billion in 2005, according to the National Mining Association. Production is forecast to be 1.16 billion tons, a 3.2 percent increase over 2005.

Coal is used mainly to generate electricity and in steel-making. Although experts say the coal-to-fuel process works, it is being done in just a few small demonstration projects.

The Pentagon began looking at coal in 2001 when Congress earmarked \$13 million to investigate the Fischer-Tropsch process in which coal is gasified and then liquefied into fuel. The technology was developed by Germany in the 1920s and used by South Africa beginning in the 1950s.

The military accounts for about 4 percent of U.S. fuel consumption.

The process promises to produce a cleaner fuel that gives off more energy per pound and be less subject to freezing. It would reduce transportation costs and ease logistical headaches by enabling the military to use one fuel for all of its planes and vehicles instead of the more

than half dozen different fuels now used.

"See how beautifully clean that fuel is," Harrison said, pointing to a dancing flame inside a large glass tube at a Wright-Patterson Air Force Base lab. The flame turned from orange to blue as the soot was reduced when the fire began to burn fuel similar to what would be produced from coal.

Harrison, chief of the Air Force's fuels lab at the base, has been trying to light a fire in the private sector. He has spoken to state and industry officials in Ohio, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Montana and North Dakota.

Some energy companies are eager to have the military for a customer.

Houston-based DKRW Energy hopes to begin producing coal-based diesel fuel in 2010. The company needs to complete the permitting process and obtain financing for a \$1 billion plant that would produce 11,000 barrels of fuel a day in Medicine Bow, Wyo.

Syntroleum, based in Tulsa, Okla., converts natural gas into liquid fuels and is currently involved in several coal-to-fuel

projects.

President Jack Holmes said increasing demand for oil should keep the price high and coal-based fuel attractive.

"We think that now's the time," Holmes said. "If we can get these first few plants built and running and get the acceptability in the government and industry, there's a big market to do this."

Others point out that similar talk in previous years evaporated when Mideast producers cut the price of oil.

"You better be darn sure that the people in OPEC land aren't going to pull the rug out from underneath you," said Dick Bajura, director of the National Research Center for Coal and Energy at West Virginia University.

Crude oil is selling for more than \$60 a barrel. In December, the U.S. Department of Energy scrapped its predictions that oil prices would drop to around \$30 a barrel by 2025, saying that costs will persist near or above \$50 a barrel for years.

As the military evaluates the

fuel made from coal, the Energy Department has funded efforts to refine the process. In January, the department awarded a \$100 million grant for the construction of what may end up being the nation's first commercial coal-to-fuel plant, in eastern Pennsylvania. Private financing is still being secured for the \$612 million plant, which could be up and running by 2009.

The risk to Mideast oil supplies was underscored in February when suicide bombers in explosives-packed cars attacked the world's largest oil processing facility. The attack was the first on an oil facility in Saudi Arabia and sent world oil prices soaring.

Syntroleum's Holmes said that even though a commercial plant would be expensive to build, it could operate for 30 years or more.

"We're not just trying to build a company, we're trying to build an industry," he said. "The acceptance of a new idea is always difficult. Everybody wants to be the first person to build the second plant."

Former meth lab now helps fund recovery center

PAINTSVILLE — The sign in front of a Paintsville business reads, "Thread of Hope is a non-profit thrift store. All proceeds go to Hope in the Mountains. For the rest of the story, come inside."

If you go inside the small building at the end of the TLC Day Care complex on Broadway, you will find an assortment of community-donated goods at thrift store prices. The 67-year-old attendant, Dessie Baldwin, who began working there last week, might tell you the building was once the site of a meth lab.

It was once an apartment rented by Bob Vanhoose in August 2004, when he and his wife, Karen Vanhoose, were charged with manufacturing methamphetamine. After police discovered the meth lab as a result of complaints concerning a smell of cat urine from TLC owner Thelma Crider, 300-plus

parents and family members of the 150 children enrolled in the center signed a petition started by parent Wendy Blair to get Bob Vanhoose the maximum sentence possible. The case is still in court.

A few months after the incident, Thelma and Ottway Crider joined a group of citizens from Johnson, Floyd and Pike counties working to establish an area drug-treatment facility for women called Hope in the Mountains. The couple offered to use the building as a thrift store to support the initiative, and the group named it "Threads of Hope." Community members cleaned it up and started collecting donations.

Although business hours have been limited to what time volunteers can open it, Baldwin now opens the store on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., and on Saturdays from 9 a.m. to noon.

"This is my kind of thing," said Baldwin, the mother of

seven, grandmother of 10 and great-grandmother of four. "I like to help people." Having volunteered for the Christian Appalachian Project and the Salvation Army, Baldwin said the work keeps her busy, and like most people in Eastern Kentucky, she has family members who would benefit from a place like Hope in the Mountains.

The 90-day women's treatment center was originally planned to open at a Johnson County location, but the group found a more affordable one in Floyd County, and has been trying to raise funds to open the facility by May 1. Through fundraisers like "Churches for Hope," sponsored by The Paintsville Herald, and an annual telethon — the second one is scheduled for April 23 on WYMT — and donations from other groups and business, the Hope board plans to have women in the facility by May.

Board member and 36-year drug counselor Jim

Recktenwald, of Dwale, goes to the Hope site — sometimes with founders Jimmy and Renee McCoy — at the intersection of U.S. 23 and Route 80, behind Trimble Chapel Church, on Mondays from 9 a.m. to noon, to offer resource information to anyone seeking help to recover from drug addiction. The Hope in the Mountains phone number is (606) 874-0240.

profit entity, cooperatives would have to separate their other businesses from its electrical operations under the bill. The new ventures would not enjoy tax-exempt status.

Under HB 568, any other business interest could not make up more than 15 percent of the cooperative's overall revenue.

The measure now moves on to the Senate for consideration.

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A controversial bill that would restrict public access to lawmakers' e-mail and phone records will not move forward this session.

State Rep. Rob Wilkey, D-Scottsville, sponsored the measure but has said he wouldn't pursue the issue.

The proposal had drawn criticism from media across the state and was opposed by the Kentucky Press Association.

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A measure that would delay full driving privileges to teens as part of a graduated licensing sys-

tem has passed the Senate.

With the 35-0 approval Wednesday, the bill goes back to the House for consideration of changes made in the Senate.

If the House agrees, the bill would go before Gov. Ernie Fletcher who has endorsed the measure in the past.

The measure would create an intermediate license for teens, between a permit and a full license. If the driver receives no moving violations in six months, they can apply for full driving privileges.

Under current law, teens can apply for a permit at age 16 and apply for a full drivers license in six months.

HB 90 bill would also restrict teens with an intermediate license from driving between the hours of midnight and 6 a.m. and only one unrelated passenger under the age of 20.

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The Senate Judiciary Committee has approved a bill amendment that would give law

enforcement and perhaps the public greater access to juvenile crime records.

The bill, which has already been approved by the House, is designed to help track sex offenders.

The measure would require county court clerks to create a record of juveniles charged in violent crime or a crime involving a weapon that could be open to law enforcement.

The new record would include the charges and any court proceedings and would be open to the public.

The details of the charges would only be open to law enforcement officers.

The main body of HB 3 would require sex offenders to register with the state every two years and a new photograph be taken of the offender. The measure would also prohibit convicted sex offenders from living near schools or child-care centers.

In other news, the court: Approved a \$2.15 million budget for the Floyd County Detention Center, which will require \$1.4 million from the county's general fund.

Approved by a 3-1 vote a Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan, developed by Big Sandy Area Development District. The 315-page plan, which was not provided to magistrates or the media, identifies actions that the county must take to mitigate damage from natural disasters. District 2 Magistrate Jackie Edford Owens cast the lone dissenting vote, saying he could not approve it without first having a chance to look at it.

Patriot Act protects us

With a decisive vote in favor of renewing the major provisions of the Patriot Act, Congress affirmed that the law has played a key role in protecting Americans from terrorist attacks.

President Bush signed the renewal of the Patriot Act March 9, one day before 16 sections of the old law were set to expire. At the signing ceremony, Bush said, "It's a piece of legislation that's vital to win the war on terror and protect the American people."

Despite a prolonged dispute over whether some sections of the law threatened the civil liberties of Americans, most members of Congress agreed with the president that the legislation is a powerful and constitutionally legitimate weapon in the war on terrorism. The Senate voted 89-10 in favor of renewal. The House passed the legislation 280-138.

Enacted in the aftermath of 9-11, the Patriot Act was intended to break down walls between law enforcement and national security agencies and give federal authorities new tools to combat the threat posed by foreign terrorists operating in the United States. The most important provisions of the law were designed to close holes in national security exploited by the 9-11 hijackers.

Clearly the Patriot Act has significantly strengthened the nation's defenses against terrorism. The most obvious evidence is that Islamic extremists have been unable to mount another attack on U.S. soil.

Osama bin Laden and his lieutenants in the al-Qaida network have repeatedly threatened to carry out more attacks against targets in the U.S., but no serious terrorist incidents have occurred since 9-11. ...

Some of the Patriot Act's critics have raised important questions about the law's expansion of law enforcement power. The president and Congress must be careful to balance the need to stop terrorists against the possibility that overzealous agents will use the law's provisions to infringe on the civil liberties of Americans. ...

When the Patriot Act was proposed in 2001, Republican leaders in the House attached the sunset provisions to the bill, thereby ensuring that Congress would review the law's impact after the initial anger and fear caused by the 9-11 attacks had subsided.

Both the House and the Senate thoroughly ventilated concerns about civil liberties, and changes were made to head off potential abuses of the laws search-and-seizure provisions.

The bipartisan compromise that resulted from the long-running debate assured that the bill would receive a strong endorsement from Congress.

It should be noted that no documented cases involving violations of civil liberties were discovered during congressional hearings.

Congress needed to examine — indeed, it had a duty to examine — whether the Patriot Act has caused an erosion of civil liberties.

Ultimately, responsible leaders in both parties concluded that the law has protected Americans without compromising their rights under the Constitution.

A question of honor

In September 1813, Andrew Jackson fought with Thomas and Jesse Benton in Nashville, Tenn., in a battle featuring a whip, pistols and knives. Supposed slights had roused the prickly sense of honor of these men. No one would remember the circumstances if the melee hadn't nearly cost the country the man who would become the hero of the Battle of New Orleans.

Those days are forever gone. But senseless violence over questions of honor is still with us. Except that the fighters are less formal than they were in Jackson's day, and they become mere mortuary statistics rather than fodder for historians.

A report in The New York Times identifies a rise in urban violent crime attributable to "petty disputes that hardly seem the stuff of fist-fights, much less gunfire or stabbings." In Milwaukee, murders rose from 88 in 2004 to 122 last year, with 45 of them prompted by argu-

ments, "by far the largest category of killings, as gang and drug murders declined." In Houston, homicides jumped by 24 percent in 2005, and "disputes were by far the largest category."

The Times reports that murder suspects explain their crimes as a response to being "disrespected" or subjected to "mean mugging" — literally being looked at the wrong way.

A case can be made that a direct line connects Andrew Jackson and today's urban youth. In his book "Black Rednecks and White Liberals," Thomas Sowell argues that a "redneck culture" — including "touchy pride" and "boastful self-dramatization" — was carried to the South by settlers from the British Isles, then into the cities with the migration of Southern blacks: "It largely died out among both white and black Southerners, while still surviving today in the poorest and worst of the urban black ghettos."

Two factors can suppress the worst effects of this cultural tendency. The first is fathers. Unsurprisingly, a researcher in Milwaukee found that young murderers are often sons of teenage mothers. Without a father, boys will tend to have

fragile egos and no impulse control. Throw in a blighted community and easy access to guns, and mayhem results.

The second is good government. Urban expert Fred Siegel says that many cities are "like a pressure cooker — if you don't manage it right, it will blow up."

The backdrop to all of this is the spectacular irrelevance of the civil rights movement. The coverage of Coretta Scott King's funeral focused on whether it was seemly for the Rev. Joseph Lowery, a civil-rights pioneer, to take shots at President Bush over his Iraq policy. The real story is the failure of the civil-rights movement to create a new generation of leaders willing to address today's threats to urban America.

Where are the uncompromising calls for the restoration of the black family and a new wave of vigorous, reformist urban government? Asked on "Fox News Sunday" what his solutions are to the problems of black America, the Rev. Lowery emphasized 30-year-old bromides. "Let's have more [government] programs," he suggested lamely.

The opposite of honor — a perverse version of which is driving the increase in murders — is shame. We should feel more of it when surveying our cities.

Howard Dean was right

Dr. Howard Dean, chairman of the Democratic Party, is something of a joke in sophisticated political circles — a wild-eyed radical, well out of the American "mainstream."

His signature moment, you'll remember, came when he ran poorly in the Iowa presidential caucuses of 2004 after having been the early favorite. "Eeyeah!" he said, or something like it, as he tried to rally his disheartened troops, looking a little demented as he did it.

Do something like that once in a presidential campaign and the press never lets it go. From then on, he was the crazy one. I am indebted to the online virtual magazine "Crooks and Liars" for reminding me who he really was and what he stood for in that campaign.

In a speech Dean made at Drake University in Des Moines the year before, as the campaign began to heat up and we were getting ready to invade Iraq, he had this to say:

"I believe it is my patriotic duty to urge a different path to protecting America's security: To focus on al Qaeda, which is an imminent threat, and to use our resources to improve and strengthen the security and safety of our home front and our people while working with the nations of the world to contain Saddam Hussein...."

"Had I been a member of the Senate, I would have voted against the resolu-

tion that authorized the President to use unilateral force against Iraq...."

"That the President was given open-ended authority to go to war in Iraq resulted from a failure of too many in my party in Washington who were worried about political positioning for the presidential election.

"The stakes are so high, this is not a time for holding back or sheepishly going along with the herd."

How does that compare with John Kerry's "I actually did vote for [funding the war] before I voted against it"?

Yet Kerry got the nomination, while Dean got to wear the fool's cap.

Dean was not speaking from some peacenik sensibility that would have put him against the war no matter the circumstances. He thought this particular war was a bad idea at this time.

"If we go to war, I certainly hope the Administration's assumptions are realized, and the conflict is swift, successful and clean. I certainly hope our armed forces will be welcomed like heroes and liberators in the streets of Baghdad.

"It is possible, however, that events could go differently...."

"Iraq is a divided country, with Sunni, Shia and Kurdish factions that share both bitter rivalries and access to large quantities of arms.

"Anti-American feeling will surely be inflamed among the misguided who choose to see an assault on Iraq as an attack on Islam, or as a means of controlling Iraqi oil."

That, ladies and gentleman, is an absolutely spot-on assessment of the

way things were and how they would go, which was a lot more than the combined forces of the CIA, NSA, FBI, DOD and JCS were able to give us.

Howard Dean was one of two candidates, the other being Dennis Kucinich, who figured out what was going on. Both were treated as clowns.

The American press — "media" they call it these days — has become an embarrassment to the First Amendment. It habitually inflates the trivial and trivializes the significant.

Thus when Dick Cheney failed to report his shooting incident promptly, the press responded with loud outrage. I thought they were going to storm the lectern in the White House briefing room.

But when Cheney met in secret session with energy experts to craft a national energy policy, then refused to divulge the names of the people in the room with him, there was hardly more than a peep from our watchdog press.

Dean was also the guy, you'll remember, who said that the capture of Saddam Hussein — much heralded as a turning point in the war — wouldn't matter much. The press's response was to ridicule him.

How's the Saddam thing working out, by the way?

Challenger Center participates in NASA training in Houston

When the Stardust spacecraft arrived at Johnson Space Center in Houston, TX with its cargo of comet and interstellar particles from its seven-year, three-billion mile journey in space, Challenger Learning Center of Kentucky's Program Coordinator Scelinda Webb got a preview of its contents.

Tom Cravens, Challenger Center director, said, "The Challenger Learning Center of Kentucky is fortunate to have Scelinda Webb participate in this exciting experience. Our students will benefit from her involvement in the Stardust project. We expect that we will see programs at the Challenger Center based on the data that she has collected."

NASA surprised Scelinda Webb and 56 other educators when they were hand-selected to be one of the first to catch a glimpse of the cosmic dust. The educators were from existing Stardust partnership programs, which include the Solar System Educators Program, the Challenger Center for Space Science Education

and the JASON Project. Scelinda was one of six members selected from the Challenger Learning Center Network.

The participants were chosen for surpassing their commitment to their organization. Scelinda is a team member of a curriculum development and sharing project that is sponsored by NASA, the Challenger Network and the Boeing Corporation. This team will help develop a software program and mentor other Challenger Centers as they use this program to share their curriculum. Challenger Learning Centers now number 52 worldwide.

"It was very magical and humbling to stand only a few inches from material that once made up the stardust in our ancient solar system and to learn about the technology that was developed and used in this mission. I'm excited about bringing this special experience back to our curriculum here at the Challenger Learning Center of Kentucky in Hazard," said Mrs. Webb.

The Stardust educator experience included a visit to Johnson Space Center from Jan. 18 to 21 where the educators heard from scientists about their discoveries, interact with engineers and pilots who designed and maneuvered the spacecraft and received daily updates from Stardust's Principal Investigator Dr. Donald Brownlee and NASA Stardust scientist, Dr. Peter Tsou. Two days spent on training, gave the participants specific mission details.

Inside the capsule, a tennis racket-like sample tray holds the particles captured in a gel as the spacecraft flew within 149 miles of comet Wild 2 in January 2004. An opposite side of the tray holds interstellar dust particles caught streaming through the solar system by Stardust during its seven-year journey.

The particles will be sent to select investigators worldwide. Scientists believe these precious samples may unlock the mysteries of comets and the origins of the solar system.

'Black Christmas'

This is a yuletide psycho killer on the loose in a sorority house flick which features coeds being stalked by an unseen killer. This film gets high marks for its many original touches which have since become horror movie staples. This movie pioneered several concepts which were later stolen/saluted by other films and include: The killer making phone calls from inside the house (later appropriated for "When a Stranger Calls"); using the camera as the eyes of the killer (later used in "Halloween"); and the old reliable "Did we or didn't we kill the right guy?" ending.

Director Bob Clark ("Porky's") keeps the viewer off balance throughout by putting up more than a few red herrings, such as a disturbed music major who appears to be on the verge of a major breakdown, and by setting the story at the start of Christmas break, when disappearances could go unnoticed with everyone heading home for the holidays.

Saxon is cast here as the hard-bitten police chief who must contend with some less than stellar support from his staff, who appear to have studied law enforcement under Barney Fife. It all builds to a tense finale that will upset any viewer who thought it was gonna turn out all right in the end. This one is a keeper and thriller fans are urged to check it out before subjecting themselves to the remake which is due later this year from Glen Morgan, who wrote the "Final Destination" movies.

The film is further buttressed by a fine supporting cast. Olivia Hussey ("Romeo and Juliet") anchors the film as the good girl who can't seem to find the right moment to break up with her clinging, and possibly unhinged, boyfriend. Margot Kidder ("Superman") is also well cast as the sorority bad girl who comes to regret her partying ways when they leave her in an alcohol-induced stupor when the killer pays her a call. The movie also benefits from an early outing by comedienne Andrea Martin ("SCTV"

How can winter driver avoid ending up in a ditch?

Dear Tom and Ray:
We traded in a '97 Chevy Tahoe for a 2005 Cadillac Escalade. I told the salesman that we live on a ridge, and in the winter I sometimes had to put the Tahoe in 4-low, first gear and let it "walk" me down the steep, gravel driveway to the main road. He said I should have no problem! Now that winter is upon us, I put the Caddy into first gear and went down the hill. It quickly got up to 20 mph! If it snows or gets a little icy overnight, I will probably wind up over the edge in the gully. I even tried turning on the towing package, thinking it might gear down a little. I think it actually went faster! Can you help me? I called Cadillac, and they were not much help. — Rosemary

T O M : Sadly, your dealer was not entirely honest with you. (That's a nice way of saying he lied to you, Rosemary.) When he said you should have no problem, he didn't tell you that the Escalade has no "4-Wheel-Low" setting, which is also known as a "low range."

RAY: The 4-Wheel-Low, as you know, is your "crawling" gear. It lowers all of the gear ratios. It's for climbing up walls or over rocks, or for controlling your speed when you're going down steep, uneven grades.

TOM: The Escalade is designed more with the highway in mind than the backwoods. After all, it's a Cadillac. And even though it has all-wheel drive, the Escalade's system is designed to get you through snow, slush and bad weather, rather than down the Grand Canyon. It's more than adequate for most people. But it's not the same as having a true low range, which your old Tahoe had.

RAY: So, what do you do

now? Well, you don't have to end up in the ditch. You can ride the brakes down your driveway. We don't recommend riding the brakes on long, steep hills, because you can overheat your brakes and cause them to fail. But if you're talking about a driveway — even a long driveway — and you're traveling at a very low speed and your brakes are cold first thing in the morning, you shouldn't have any problem.

TOM: As long as you keep the speed down from the very outset and don't let the truck get away from you, there's no reason you shouldn't be able to keep the Escalade under control with the brakes.

RAY: But I would let the dealer know that you're disappointed he misled you in order to sell a car. And let him know that if you ever end up in the ditch, he's definitely going in next. Good luck, Rosemary.

Skidding in snow is no way to make a turn
Dear Tom and Ray:

My son told me that using the emergency brake to turn in the snow will not damage the car, and, of course, he believes that it is a better way to turn. He went into a long diatribe when I questioned the method (he is a lawyer and business consultant, taught to justify all his actions). My question: Was he damaging my car while using this method of turning on snow-covered streets? And should I drive like that? and "My Big Fat Greek Wedding"), who scores as the comic relief.

The film is also a testament to director Clark, who is pretty versatile himself, having started out by making three horror films before moving over to comedies. His best work is a toss up between this effort and his holiday favorite "A Christmas Story." Here's hoping that his planned remake of his first film, "Children Shouldn't Play with Dead Things," puts him back on the horror track.

'Cannibal Apocalypse'

This film, on the other hand, is a cinematic train wreck that benefits from Saxon's low-key turn as a Vietnam war veteran who slowly realizes that he is turning into a cannibal.

It all starts when an old friend named Charles Bukowski calls him out of the blue and stirs memories of when Saxon's character saved him from a pit trap in the jungles of Vietnam. Saxon has a flashback during the call and remembers that Bukowski and a buddy named Thompson were feasting on the remains of a corpse when he rescued them and that one of them had the temerity to bite him for his rescue efforts. Apparently he had suppressed the memory, go figure.

Saxon decides to stand his buddy up but soon finds that he is drawn to him, as well as his teenage neighbor's belly, which he goes after like it was coated in the Colonel's special sauce. The central idea here is that cannibalism can be transmitted like a virus, and though that is an intriguing concept they never go anywhere with it.

Instead this breaks down into a chase film, with Saxon freeing his buddies from a mental hospital, alongside a nurse they have infected, and then trying to

escape authorities while looking for snacks along the way. There is one unintentionally funny moment when cops chasing the group through the sewers hear a scream and one actually says, "Do you think that's them?"

There is never any apocalypse here and one gets the idea that the title was changed (from "Invasion of the Flesh Hunters") to cash in on the success of Francis Coppola's "Apocalypse Now."

This one is nowhere near a classic, but there is plenty of mayhem on hand and the DVD release includes cannibal carnage scenes that were cut from the film before it was released on video in 1980. This plays like an Italian zombie film, only the undead are very much alive if not a little nuts. It is a tribute to Saxon that he delivers his stilted dialogue with conviction and soldiers on hoping only that his check will clear.

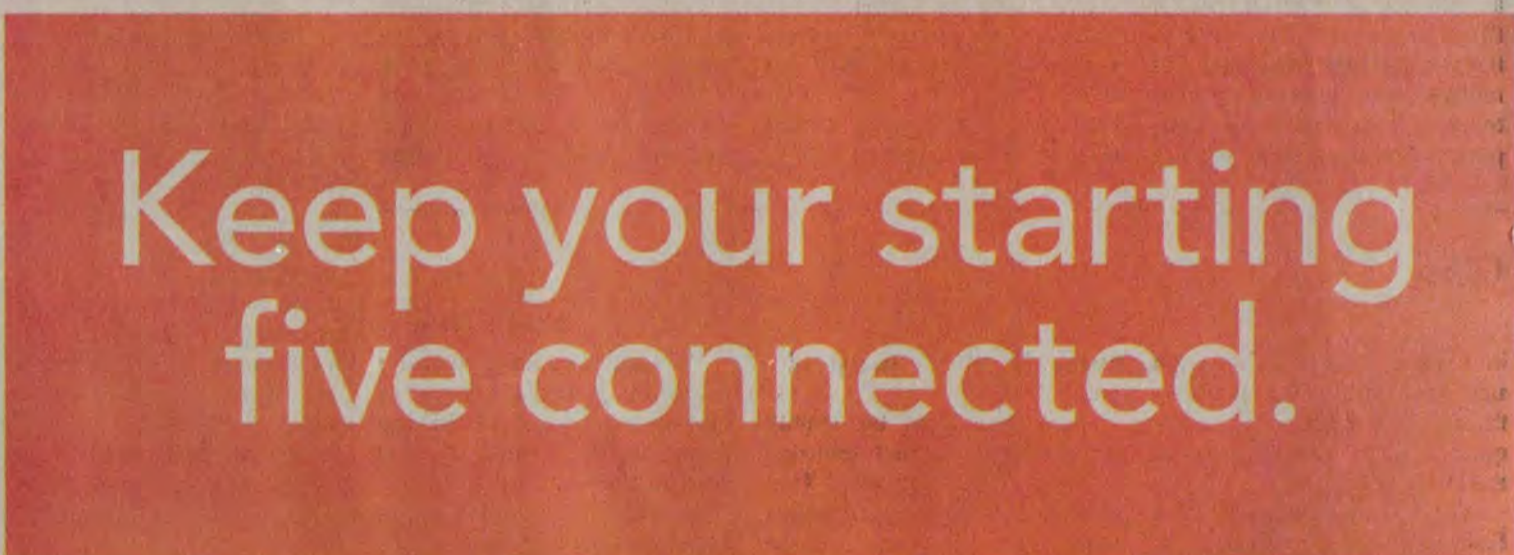

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NEWS OF THE WEIRD

"Reeking" As a Career Field: Homeless New Jersey man Richard Kreimer said in February that he had settled, on undisclosed terms, part of his most recent lawsuit, against a transit company and two drivers, for having denied him rides because of his foul odor. Kreimer's history includes a \$150,000 settlement in 1991 with the public library in Morris County, which had tried to keep him out because of the odor, and, by his count, \$80,000 in additional lawsuit-related income (though some went for legal expenses). Kreimer dropped another foul-odor lawsuit in February, against a transit company and a train station in Summit.

Cultural Diversity

(1) Health authorities in Thailand began warning teenage girls in January of the dental risks of do-it-yourself orthodontics (colorful metallic teeth braces worn for fashion to match girls' outfits, according to an Associated Press dispatch). (2) In Lunar New Year celebrations in January in China, 120 million rural peasants traveled to and from cities via jam-packed trains, despite meager

restroom facilities. As a result, according to a Reuters dispatch, there was a massive holiday run on adult diapers.

■ A 300-page indictment detailing more than 1,000 allegations of election fraud was returned in February by a grand jury investigating the coal-mining town of Appalachia, Va., following reports of absentee-ballot bribery by two town officials. Prosecutors accused candidates' operatives of offering the locals such goodies as beer, moonshine and cigarettes and, in one case, a supply of pork rinds.

Good News for College Kids

(1) In January, history professor David Weale of Canada's University of Prince Edward Island offered B-minus grades to any students in his overcrowded class if they would just go away, and 20 of the 95 accepted. (However, the administration found out, and Professor Weale, who had retired last year but returned to teach that one course, re-retired.) (2) Former Fairfield University student William Rom, 24, won \$111,000 from the school in a February verdict because he was improperly sus-

pended four years ago. At the time, Rom was accused of entering a women's restroom, fighting, ripping posters off walls, dumping water on students from a second floor, smashing a bathroom mirror, running naked on campus, and (underage) drinking (and subsequently vomiting in the dorm.)

School Daze

■ (1) The head of the Jo Richardson comprehensive school in Dagenham, England, prohibits students from raising their hands in class, according to a January Daily Telegraph report, to keep those not called on from feeling "victim(z)ed." (2) And rules drawn up in February by the Welsh Assembly called for schools in Wales to ban all kissing, even in school plays (but an assembly spokesman said Romeo could give Juliet "a peck on the cheek").

■ In February, Bolivia's foreign minister proposed to include coca leaves as part of school breakfast programs, noting that they contain many times more calcium than does milk (and unless processed as cocaine, are not mind-altering). And in November, the Coffee

Industry Association of Brazil proposed to help fund a breakfast program for a million schoolchildren as young as age 6, provided that the meal includes coffee.

Home, Sweet Home

Developer Ryan Pedram was finally ordered to stop work on his new three-story home in the Bronx in New York City after he had begun building it flush with a disputed property line, including constructing one cinder-block wall to encompass the trunk of an oak tree that ostensibly belongs to his neighbor. (He had figured on winning the property dispute and removing the tree; his plan, in case of loss, was not reported.) Also, in Brooklyn, a judge recently allowed industrialist Simon Taub to install Sheetrock walls in several rooms in his home as a temporary solution in a pending divorce, to allow both husband and wife to share the house (reminiscent of the 1989 movie "The War of the Roses").

People Different From Us

■ Unusual Obsessions: (1) orchids (When collector Sian Tiong Lim, 32, was recently jailed for four months in England for orchid-smuggling, orchid expert Eric Hansen told United Press International, "There is a lunatic fringe to the orchid world, and a fine line between the average grower and the horticulturally insane.") (2) rare bird eggs (Collector Gregory Wheal, 42, also was jailed recently for four months in England after a 30-year history of stealing from hundreds of nests. His lawyer told the judge that Wheal needs professional help.)

■ When Travis Frey, 33, was charged in Council Bluffs, Iowa, in February with kidnapping his wife, she gave police a "Contract of Wifely Expectations" that he had allegedly written for her (subsequently published on TheSmokingGun.com, which called it a contract "for the ages"). In painstaking detail, the

husband prescribed the micro-management of her life, including what she would wear in public and to bed and the exact times she would be available for specified sexual relations. Instructions on hygiene and body-shaving were given. Eight explicit, non-subversive wifely reactions were banned. She could earn "Good Behavior Days" with exemplary performance but would lose them on specified misbehaviors, including complaining about the contract.

Least Competent Criminals

Police in Milford, Texas (just south of Dallas), arrested a man in February who had fled a traffic stop, and in the ensuing chase, saw him tear open and toss out bag after bag of a substance (but some blew back in the car). When finally stopped, said police chief Carlos Phoenix, the man was "literally covered in marijuana" from the blowback. And in January, in Anchorage, Alaska, a man who had painted his face Smurf-like blue robbed the Super 8 Motel, and police put out a description. A short time later, a caller reported a man with blue smudges behind his ears, and police soon arrested Daniel Peter Clark, 19.

in coming months. Thompson said April bills will still reflect the \$17.12 per MCF, but subsequent billings should come at the lower rate.

The county began operating East Kentucky Utilities in November 2004, when the operator at that time could no longer afford to pay its supplier, Equitable Energy, and the utility's 1,100 customers faced losing their service. The fiscal court then stepped in, paying about \$160,000 to the supplier to keep the gas flowing and

assumed control of the gas company.

Since that time, the county has attempted to find someone to buy the company. That appeared to be in the works when Colorado-based Frontier Inc. stepped forward with a bid, but that fell through Jan. 31, when Frontier had still not produced payment.

For now, East Kentucky Utilities remains under control of the fiscal court and it doesn't appear that will change anytime soon.

"It's like something you can't get rid of..." Thompson said of the utility. "It's like having something tied around you that you can't get loose of."

However, the failed sale may have been a blessing in disguise, said Magistrate Jackie Edford Owens, in whose district about 700 East Kentucky Utilities customers reside. Owens said that Frontier probably would have passed on its rates to Floyd County customers after the sale, which at that time were over \$30 per MCF.

as well," McPeek said.

\$5,459. McPeek's goal is \$10,000 and that's exactly how much will go to God's Pantry if they succeed. Customers can donate as they check out and McPeek noted that no amount is too small. He said everyone who gives something will have their name posted on the blue-and-white labels trumpeting the contest which are currently threatening to cover every surface in the store.

Game

The problem hits hardest among people in their 20s and 30s, so community activists decided to target a younger age — sixth- through ninth-graders — hoping to save the next generation.

The project, which will be shown on school computer screens and could develop a national audience if other districts sign on, is more than just asking students to say no to drugs. It gives them subtle options — some of which lead to addiction, others to success.

One bad choice isn't fatal, but be careful: Pick too many ill-advised choices early and the most favorable routes might be unavailable later in the game.

Jim McDannel, an associate professor of psychology at Southeast Kentucky Community College, says even college-educated students are succumbing to prescription drugs. They're bored, and with injuries commonplace at coal mines and other blue-collar jobs, pain medication is prevalent and available for the right price.

"We've lost a whole generation is what it amounts to," McDannel said. "The last few years, I've seen some of my better students get hooked on drugs. It's a very frustrating process. You see just brilliant minds go to waste."

Kentucky River Community Care, a nonprofit health center serving eight southeastern Kentucky counties, determined it may be too late to help most adult abusers, but it's not too late to help their children. In hiring WILL Interactive, the organization set a modest but critical

goal — push back, even by a couple years, the average age students start experimenting with prescription drugs.

"Instead of the kids starting to experiment at 13, if we can delay it a few years, the research indicates the kids have a much greater likelihood of not becoming abusers," said David Matthews, health center's director of adult services.

Other programs are starting to make at least a small dent in the problem. In 2003, U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers got several million dollars for Operation UNITE, which increases drug investigations, treatment and education efforts in his eastern Kentucky district. Local churches have started a court-watch program to make sure drug dealers are more likely to be convicted.

Madeline Flanner-Kincer, chairwoman of UNITE's Letcher County Community Coalition, says she knows many families in the area with a loved one addicted to prescription drugs. One of her own relatives faced 17 years in prison for trafficking but is now in drug court, a type of diversion program.

"People get frustrated or into a mindset of hopelessness," she said. "The irony is now there are lots of jobs, lots of employers in the region who can't find employees who can pass drug tests."

Paul Cooney, a family practice physician in Barbourville, Ky., said he has stopped prescribing pain medication for chronic problems because he would see numerous potential drug abusers each day.

"As a physician, you get pre-

ty adept at who really has pain and who just wants pain medicine," Cooney said.

Although producers of the interactive drama are quiet about most of the script, would-be actors tried out for a part earlier this month by reading lines in which a student tries to persuade a doctor to give him drugs.

By the time someone reaches the scrounging point, addiction has set in and it's likely too late, says director Jeff Hall. The more appealing routes, as the 60-minute video teaches, come earlier, like choosing where to hang out on the weekends, and more importantly, with whom.

"Sometimes the choices change the character," Hall said. "You might be a little more sensation-seeking, or you might be a little more responsible."

New fishing regulations in place for 2006

FRANKFORT – Before heading out for that first fishing trip of the year, anglers in Kentucky should familiarize themselves with new regulations that took effect March 1. All new regulations are listed in the front section of the 2006 Kentucky Sport Fishing and Boating Guide, available at most places where fishing licenses are sold.

The new regulations include a 20-fish daily creel limit and a 40-fish possession limit statewide on redear sunfish. The department established the limit on redear sunfish in response to requests by anglers to impose harvest restrictions. The redear sunfish, commonly referred to as a shellcracker, became a sport fish in Kentucky last year. This prevented its harvest by gigging, bow fishing, spear fishing or com-

mercial fishing.

New regulations concerning white bass, yellow bass and hybrid striped bass are now in effect. White bass and hybrid striped bass – a cross between a white bass and a striped bass – possess similar coloration, markings and body shape. To help eliminate confusion over identification of these fish, the department has set an aggregate statewide limit of 15 on each species or any combination of white bass, yellow bass and hybrid striped bass. No more than five fish of the combined 15-fish daily limit may be longer than 15 inches.

The exception is on the Ohio River, where the 30-fish aggregate daily creel limit remains on white bass, yellow bass, striped bass and their hybrids. No more than four fish in the daily creel

Turkeys plentiful, setting up

PADUCAH – Wild turkey gobblers are showing up in their old Kentucky homes.

"Right now, the big winter flocks are breaking up, and a lot of the older gobblers are starting to stake out their breeding territories," said biologist Steve Dobe, coordinator of wild turkey management for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

"It's a good time for turkey hunters to get their feet on the ground and scout out their hunting areas," Dobe said. "They can start finding where gobblers are roosting, where they're feeding,

where they've been scratching – it's not too early to start."

Wintering turkeys tend to collect in fewer locations, with large flocks forming into separate social groups of hens and last year's young birds and mature gobblers. The birds disperse into smaller groups with the onset of springlike conditions, and recent warm days apparently have accelerated the move to home territories and triggered more behavior commensurate with the approaching breeding period.

Kentucky's regular spring gobbler hunting season doesn't begin until April 15 statewide, but tom

limit may be longer than 15 inches. The statewide 15" minimum, five-fish creel and possession limit on striped bass remains the same.

Anglers may now keep only one muskellunge a day statewide. Gigging and snagging are now banned on Cave Run Lake and its tributaries, from the main lake upstream to the first riffle.

A statewide, six-fish aggregate daily creel limit for walleye and sauger is now in place. Anglers may keep six walleye, six sauger or a combination of six fish of both species. This new regulation does not apply to the Ohio River.

There are new regulations concerning paddlefish, sometimes called spoonbills. A statewide daily creel limit of two paddlefish for either bow fishing or snagging is now in effect, except in the Tennessee River below Kentucky Dam and in the Cumberland River below Barkley Dam, where snagging rules changed significantly this year.

The area from Kentucky

Dam downstream to the new U.S. 62 bridge will be open to snagging 24 hours per day from January 1 through May 31. From June 1 through December 31, this area is only open to snagging from sunset to sunrise (closed during daylight hours). The Tennessee River from the new U.S. 62 bridge to the I-24 bridge is closed to snagging year round, but the river from the I-24 bridge downstream to the Ohio River is open to snagging year round.

There is now a daily creel limit of eight fish in aggregate for snagging on the Tennessee River, and this limit shall not exceed the daily creel limit for any sport fish in which the daily creel limit is under eight fish a day. All fish snagged, except shad or herring, must be kept and counted toward the daily creel limit. Snagging must cease after attaining the daily creel limit for any sport fish species. On the Cumberland River below Lake Barkley, snagging is only permitted downstream of the U.S. 62 bridge, with an eight fish

daily creel limit on paddlefish.

Bow anglers may now fish up to 200 yards below Kentucky Dam and Barkley Dam.

New regulations concerning jug lines, limb lines and set lines also took effect March 1. Jug lines are now limited to 50 per boat along with a limit of 25 limb or set lines per angler. Limb lines, set lines and jug lines are prohibited on any state-owned or managed lake less than 500 acres in size and on Bullock Pen, Elmer Davis, Kincaid, Greenbo and Carter Caves lakes. The only exceptions are the waterbodies on Ballard, Swan and Peal Wildlife Management Areas.

turkeys already are establishing themselves where they will be doing business on opening day, Dobeys said. "I've already seen gobblers strutting," he said.

The state's turkey flock could promise hunters a generous year, Dobeys said.

"The population is something around 200,000," Dobeys said. "It's pretty stable, having filled most of the prime habitat. Geographically, turkeys are pretty much everywhere, but they should continue to expand to fill habitats toward carrying capacity and to occupy some more habitats that are less than ideal."

The spring population may be a little stronger than typical because of a relatively mild winter combined with last fall's massive acorn crop.

"It was a pretty warm winter and there wasn't much ice, so winter mortality should have been lower than usual," Dobeys said. "And there was such a huge crop of acorns on the ground from last fall that

they've had lots of food.

"With all the food and the mild conditions, I'd expect that most of the turkeys coming into this spring will be in better physical condition - a little heavier than average," Dobeys said.

Some scattered reports of fewer turkeys being seen over the past few months - and the related concerns of some hunters that the population has declined - probably are more related to the food supply than the actual population trend, Dobeys said.

"Going back to the fall before last, the acorn crop was very poor that year and turkeys seemed like they were everywhere," Dobeys said. "What was happening was that there were very few acorns in the woods, so turkeys were feeding out in the fields, looking for insects, any kind of food."

"Then last fall, there were so many acorns that food was all over the ground, and turkeys

spent a lot more time in the woods," Dobeys said. "As a result, people weren't seeing them as much, and some got worried that the population had dropped."

The wild turkey population can be expected to fluctuate a fair amount from year to year based primarily on spring weather, Dobeys said. Severe weather in the form of precipitation and cold temperatures during the nesting period can be expected to produce poor classes of young turkeys that will show up within the next one to three years as modest downturns in the flock, he said.

Past conditions considered, however, Kentucky hunters can expect to take to the woods and fields with a strong population of turkeys out there this spring, Dobeys said.

Whether the gobblers will sound off and whether they'll come when called, that's something to be revealed only when the season opens.

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Kurt Busch tests at Kentucky Speedway

SPARTA — The ongoing evaluation of the Dodge Intrepid versus Charger NEXTEL Cup Series race platforms continued at Kentucky Speedway Tuesday with Penske Racing South driver Kurt Busch the No. 2 Miller Lite car.

Busch visited the 1.5-mile tri-oval to work with spring packages and further explore techniques for enhancing the performance of the 2006 Charger template.

"We come here to test because this is the closest track that we can run that gives us information for other racetracks. This place is definitely the caliber of a Cup facility. Northern Kentucky, the Cincinnati area, everybody wants a Cup race here.

"We're studying the way the rear and front springs come

down to the racetrack. You don't want the car to hit the racetrack, you just want to make sure you get the car as low as you can. This place is flat and smooth. We're trying to get things right for our next race. We had it right at Daytona, but we've struggled in the last two races so we're just coming back and touching up on things," Busch said.

The 2004 series champion who competed in Roush Racing Fords for the past six seasons, described his Kentucky test as an asset at the early juncture in his Penske and Dodge transition.

"It's been weird just transitioning teams and getting that communication right. We drafted with Ryan Newman at Daytona and that's a big piece of the puzzle - getting the teams working together. I think that's gone real smooth so far."

While continuing to establish a solid communication baseline with Newman and new Crew Chief Roy McAuley, Busch also faces the challenge of managing his test tire allotment due to the series' new tire leasing policy.

"Right now, we have as many tires as we can find in our batch. Once we run out, we're out and we just have to do the NASCAR tests. It sets us on a little bit of a budget. Instead of just full throttle, wear out as many tires as you want, you really have to use the tires the right way because you want your car to handle well on new tires and old tires.

"We stashed, let's just say 100 tires, because we can only test 10 times this year due to the schedule. We look at it and we just bring 10 tires per test. So, for example, if it's 10 tests and 100 tires, we just divide it the numbers because at the end of the year, there's no more stockpiling tires. They're all gone. NASCAR is going to take them away and actually serial number the tires. It makes sense for the environment, our racecars and the budget."

Despite his numerous immediate challenges, the 27-year-old Las Vegas, Nev., driver said he is learning from the Penske approach to NEXTEL Cup racing.

"The biggest difference for me has to be just the platform between cars. Driving the Ford the last few years and understanding it, now it's the Dodge. We've been running the '04 car and the '05 car, so we're here, again, trying to sort out the differences. We're just trying to make sure we do the right things with our stock cars. We have to really understand, and our group does, from the ground up on what we have to do to get these big beasts around the track," Busch said.

Busch added that one advantage to being a part of the Penske organization is his opportunity to tap the racing knowledge of the team's successful open-wheel engineers.

"We've exchanged lots of computer-based ideas such as writing different programs to understand how the front geometry works. We're looking at it from the new way of doing things instead of the old school.

"Those open-wheel cars are real light and nimble and they turn real easy. You just throw downforce at them and go. It's just a different world with the stock car stuff and Roger (Penske) is definitely in tune with everything we're doing," Busch said.

He hopes the engineering exchange will uncover the key elements he will need to improve his Charger templates and help him advance from the 22nd position in the series standings.

"We raced the Charger at Daytona and had a great car. Then we raced the '04 at California and Vegas and saw some things with it. I think we can be better all around once we

get everything put together and we'll end up with the Charger. That's what we need to do. When Dodge puts so much money into advertising a program, that's the car we need to race.

"Right now, we're just trying to get the templates right so we're good when we compete

with other cars. We're not looking for help from NASCAR, but trying to do it ourselves. We really just want to hammer down on what we can do internally before we go, 'Hey, can you help us out a little bit?'" he said.

Newman also participated in the test.

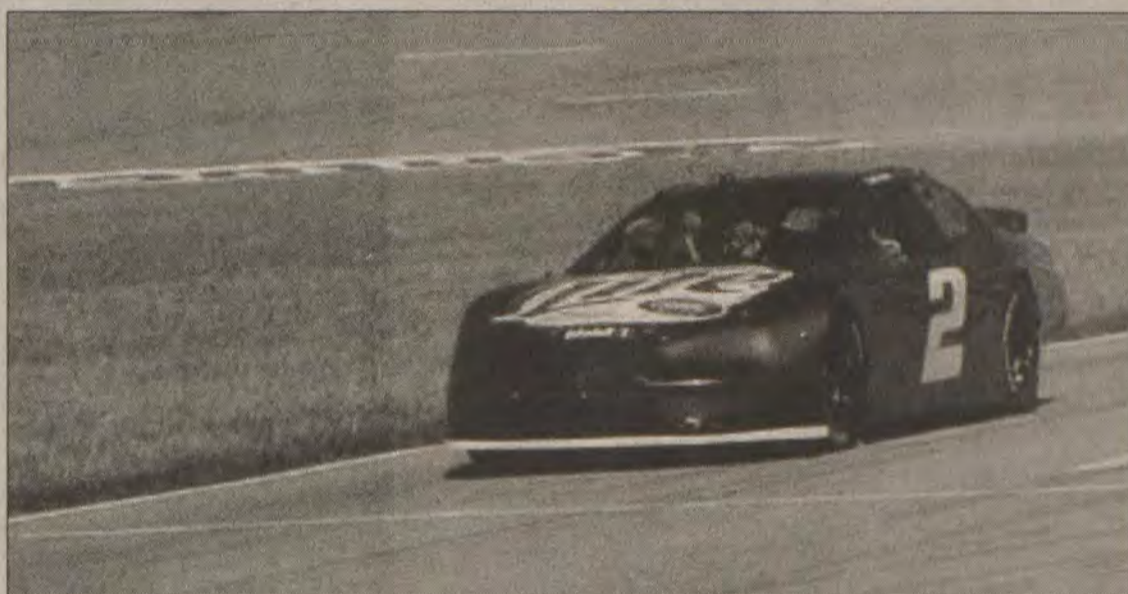

WORLD BASEBALL CLASSIC: Mexico 2, United States 1

ANAHEIM, Calif. — Roger Clemens was looking for a much better finish to his brilliant career.

Clemens pitched well Thursday night, but a lineup loaded with All-Stars couldn't get the job done for the United States.

Oliver Perez and seven relievers combined to pitch a three-hitter to lead Mexico past the Rocket and Team USA 2-1 on Thursday night, eliminating the Americans from the inaugural World Baseball Classic and putting Japan in the semifinals.

When it was over, Clemens implied that he had thrown his final pitch.

"For me, right now, it's goodbye," he said in a brief statement issued through Team USA. "I felt great tonight and my body responded well. I'm very thankful for the opportunity to participate in this event. It made all the work I did in the last six weeks worthwhile."

Clemens, who has won 341 games and struck out 4,502 bat-

ters in 22 big-league seasons, wasn't at his best. The 43-year-old right-hander allowed six hits and two runs in 4 1-3 innings with no walks and four strikeouts. He threw 73 pitches — seven below the maximum for the second round.

The outcome was a stunner, especially considering the offensive firepower on the Americans' roster even without Derrek Lee and Johnny Damon, sidelined with sore left shoulders.

Team USA scored only eight runs in three second-round games.

"It's a tough bite to chew," catcher Michael Barrett said. "The expectations on us to win and getting upset is a credit to their style of play and their pitching. We put everything we had into this in such a short time, and didn't get it done."

South Korea had a 3-0 second-round record in Group One, with Team USA, Japan and Mexico all going 1-2. Japan earned the second semifinal berth from the group by allowing the fewest runs in games between the tied teams.

Japan, which has already lost twice to South Korea in the Classic, faces its archrival in Saturday's second semifinal game in San Diego, with the Dominican Republic meeting Cuba in the daytime opener. The winners play Monday for the championship.

"You're never prepared for defeat. We always prepare to win," Team USA manager Buck Martinez said. "It's a disappointing loss, for sure. We never really exploded with the bats."

"The quality of the pitching we saw in this tournament was certainly much better than I expected on a consistent basis."

Martinez said Clemens didn't object to being removed from the game.

"Rocket looked at me and looked fatigued," Martinez said. "He says, 'What do you got out there?' That was a sign that he felt like I did. We probably had a better shot with a fresh arm out there."

Scot Shields entered with runners at first and third and one out, and Jorge Cantu's grounder drove in what proved to be the winning run.

"My perfect scenario would have been that I come in for Roger and clean up his mess," Shields said. "I got the chance and I didn't do it, and that hurts. That run that scored was the winning run and it eliminated us. It's pretty hard to take."

Perez allowed only one hit in three scoreless innings, and the Mexican bullpen retired 12 straight batters until Chipper Jones drew a one-out walk off Jorge De La Rosa in the ninth. Luis Ayala then walked Alex Rodriguez, but David Cortes needed only one pitch to get Vernon Wells to ground into a game-ending double play.

"We came here to win, and that is how we performed this evening," Mexico manager Paquin Estrada said through a translator.

Regarding Clemens, Estrada said: "He's a person that I respect, and I've kept the lineup as a souvenir to this occasion."

Mexico took a 1-0 lead off Clemens in the third on a lead-off double by Mario Valenzuela and a two-out single by Jorge Cantu.

But it wasn't that simple.

A television replay showed Valenzuela's fly ball hit the right field foul pole at least 10 feet off the ground and bounced back onto the field. However, first base umpire Bob Davidson didn't see it that way, and Valenzuela wound up at second.

It was Davidson, umpiring behind the plate, who ruled that Japan's Tsuyoshi Nishioka left third base early in the eighth inning Sunday to negate a sacrifice fly that would have snapped a 3-3 tie in a game Team USA won.

The Americans tied it in the fourth off Francisco Campos when Jones doubled, took third on a fly ball and scored on Wells' sacrifice fly, barely beating right fielder Valenzuela's throw to the plate.

Valenzuela opened the fifth with a single, took second on a sacrifice and third on a single by Alfredo Amezaga before Shields relieved and Cantu drove in the winning run.

"This was for Mexico, so everyone can know in our country — everyone can know what we're doing here so we can leave here with our heads held

high," Cantu said, adding it was an honor to face Clemens.

The "Americans" blew an opportunity against Edgar Gonzalez in the top of the fifth, when Jeff Francoeur opened with a double and Barrett was hit by a pitch. Francoeur strayed off second when Michael Young squared to bunt, and was caught in a rundown. Gonzalez then retired Young and Derek Jeter on ground balls to end the inning.

Thanks to exceptional work by relievers Ricardo Rincon and Oscar Villareal, Team USA wouldn't have another baserunner until the ninth.

The game was played before an announced crowd of 38,284 at Angel Stadium. Among those attending was commissioner Bud Selig, a proponent of the Classic.

"The intensity has been just remarkable," Selig said. "In the end, the beneficiary of all this will be baseball all over the world. I mean, who knows, long after I'm gone, this event will be big. But more importantly than this event will be big is what it's going to do for baseball, including American baseball."

Reds 7, Pirates 2

Claussen allowed an unearned run in the third. His throwing error on a pick-off attempt allowed Rajai Davis to go to second base. Davis then went to third on a single by Jack Wilson and scored on a ground out by Sean Casey.

Vogelsong gave up four runs over three innings. Claussen

lowered his ERA to 2.45.

Cincinnati relievers Ryan Wagner, David Weathers, Kent Mercker, Rick White and Chris Hammond each threw scoreless innings. Mercker and Hammond have not allowed a run this spring.

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Louisville arena debate boils down to locations only blocks apart

LOUISVILLE — It's shaping up as a cliffhanger at the height of March Madness, with big names on both sides and plenty of suspense.

But there's more than bragging rights on the line in this high-stakes game. The outcome could well determine where to build a proposed multipurpose arena in the state's signature city that would become home to University of Louisville basketball.

There's broad agreement the arena would help re-energize downtown and make the city more competitive. The disagreement boils down to location. One potential site is near the rejuvenated riverfront; the other is a few blocks to the south, close to the city's core.

The debate, and division, has spread to Kentucky's Capitol as legislators ponder whether to chip in \$75 million in state-issued bonds and whether to weigh in on the location dispute. The matter might not be

resolved until very late in the 60-day legislative session, which is entering its closing days.

A gubernatorial task force recommended the riverfront site that now features a utility transmission station as an unsightly stepladder to the city's skyline.

Supporters say a waterfront arena would be an eye-catching attraction for people crossing the Ohio River into Kentucky. It would make for a nice panoramic shot seen by national audiences when the arena plays host to televised events, they say.

"It will be a wow factor," said Mayor Jerry Abramson, who has teamed with Gov. Ernie Fletcher and UofL President James Ramsey in supporting the riverfront site.

A 22,000-seat waterfront arena would carry a projected \$381 million price tag, which would include building a flood-wall and parking garage.

Backing for the other downtown location picked up momentum in recent weeks when two prominent businessmen paid for another study. It

concluded that the same-size arena at their preferred site would cost \$114 million less.

Humana Inc. co-founder David Jones and Papa John's International founder John Schnatter are pushing for the site, now a parking lot near the Fourth Street Live entertainment district and across the street from a new hotel.

"They need to stand down for a moment and say, 'Let's consider all the information that's out there,'" Jones said of policymakers.

The General Assembly appears split on the issue.

The House endorsed the \$75 million in bonding as part of its budget plan, but stipulated that the arena be built at the parking lot site, away from the riverfront. The Senate appears poised to remove the site-specific language in its budget deliberations.

That would leave it to House-Senate conferees to try to resolve the matter.

Louisville lawmakers were apologetic when the arena spat, which divided their own ranks,

spilled onto the House floor during the budget debate.

"I'm sorry we've got this Jefferson County fight here," said Rep. Larry Clark of Louisville, the second-ranking House Democrat who supported the budget language linking the arena to the city-core location.

The arena proposal has won solid backing from rural legislators, who say that a prosperous Louisville will generate more tax dollars for statewide use.

"My constituents understand the importance of the cities," said Senate President David Williams, a Republican from Burkesville near the Tennessee border. "I hear no anti-Louisville sentiment in my district."

The rest of Kentucky sits back and watches as the location debate plays out in Louisville. Each side has aggressively pushed its preferred site.

The riverfront location, advocates say, would generate more revenue from naming rights and signs because of its proximity to interstate high-

ways.

The site would stir development of a hotel, restaurants, stores and condominiums, while getting rid of an eyesore that would linger without the arena, Abramson said. Meanwhile, the other site already has drawn interest from developers, he said.

Schnatter worries about who would pay for any cost-overruns to clean up the riverfront site before construction. He also notes that the basketball court on that site would be well below the 100-year flood plain. "Anybody with private money ... won't touch that site with a 10-foot pole," he said.

He also said that any panoramic view would be impeded by a bridge.

Schnatter and Jones mainly focus on the cost difference. The riverfront project would carry an extra \$8 million in debt service yearly, or \$240 million over the 30-year life of the bonds, they said. The riverfront project costs would include \$63 million to move the electric transmission station across the street,

they said.

Meanwhile, the proposed arena even leads to split opinions within families.

Johnny Jackson would gladly give up his parking space for the arena. Jackson, a civil engineer, said he considers the parking lot location ideal because of its proximity to the entertainment district and the new hotel.

"This is a more prominent location here," said Jackson, a UofL graduate who held an umbrella in his alma mater's colors while on his way to work on a recent morning.

His wife, Yolanda, worries the arena would be empty many nights. She wouldn't mourn its demise if the project falls through. "In that instance, perhaps we can earmark some more money for education, so that wouldn't be a bad thing," she said.

A. Thomas Johnson, a lawyer who parks in the same lot, also would make way for the arena, but said the dispute points out deeper problems.

"Bickering is a problem for Louisville right now," he said.

Tennessee 63, Winthrop 61

GREENSBORO, N.C. — Chris Lofton's remarkable shot allowed Tennessee to avoid a major upset and sent the Volunteers into the NCAA tournament's second round for the first time in six years.

The sophomore guard took an inbound pass with 2.9 seconds left and rattled home a fallaway jumper from just inside the 3-point line to help the second-seeded Volunteers beat Winthrop 63-61 Thursday in the first round of the Washington Regional.

Craig Bradshaw missed a

shot right before the buzzer that would have tied it for the Eagles (23-8), who remained winless in six trips to the tournament. They were trying to become the fifth 15th seed to record an upset in the first round, and the first since 2001. Instead the Volunteers advance to face seventh-seeded Wichita State.

The frantic finish capped a heart-pounding game that featured nine ties and eight lead changes, the final one coming on Lofton's shot. His were the only points in the final 2:42 as both teams squandered chances to advance to the second round.

The Volunteers (22-7) had a

couple of opportunities in the final seconds. C.J. Watson missed a 3, but they retained possession when Dane Bradshaw chased down a long rebound on the other end of the court. Coach Bruce Pearl — who led underdog Wisconsin-Milwaukee to two victories in last season's tournament — called a timeout to set up the play for Watson, and Bradshaw fed him the pass.

After the shot went in with four-tenths of a second on the clock, the Tennessee players mobbed Watson. Winthrop coach Gregg Marshall used his final timeout, and James

Shuler's long pass bounced off the backboard to Bradshaw. Replays also showed that the ball had hit off a Tennessee player, which should have started the clock, before it got to Bradshaw.

It was a moot point since Bradshaw's hurried shot changed off the rim, allowing the Volunteers to hang on.

Major Wingate led Tennessee with 15 points, and Torrell Martin finished with 14 points and a career-high 13 rebounds for the Eagles.

Perhaps all those who questioned Tennessee's No. 2 seed were right — after all, the Volunteers limped into the tour-

namment with four losses in its previous six games. Pearl pointed to a fabulous regular season that ended with a Southeastern Conference East Division title, as well as a sweep of the season series with Florida.

It's unlikely winning in this fashion will quiet any of those critics.

Of course, none of that really matters to Marshall and Winthrop. They won the Big South Conference tournament for the sixth time in eight seasons and have little to show for it. Last year, a 10-point loss to Gonzaga ended their season, and now this.

Shuler swished a 3-pointer

with about 3 1/2 minutes remaining to give the Eagles their final lead at 61-60, and Bradshaw tied it with a free throw on the other end. Winthrop had turnovers on two straight possessions and Lofton missed an ill-advised jumper from way beyond the line for the Vols.

Finally, Bradshaw got a look to put the Eagles back in front, but his 3-pointer was off, setting up the final sequence.

Andre Patterson had 12 points and 11 rebounds for Tennessee, and Bradshaw scored 12 on 5-of-17 shooting for Winthrop.

Gators gig South Alabama in opening round.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — No. 14-seed South Alabama put up a valiant fight in the first round of the NCAA Tournament on Thursday, but fell to 3rd seed Florida, 76-50. The Jaguars finish with one of the best records in school history at 24-7, while Florida improves to 28-6. It was the Jaguars' first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1998.

Both teams came out of the gates very cold as neither team

scored through the first 3:24 of the game. Florida's Lee Humphrey scored the first bucket of the game at the 16:36 mark. USA came right back with a bucket by senior Chey Christie seconds later. Florida extended the lead to 17-10 through the first 11:04, but an 8-2 run by the Jaguars cut the deficit to one with 5:49 left.

John Pelphrey-coached USA used back-to-back treys by junior Leandro Buboltz and a jumper by sophomore Demetric

Bennett to close the deficit.

Right as the momentum was about to change to South Alabama, the Gators had the answer and went on a 10-0 run to build a 29-18 lead with 2:58 left. USA kept its poise and didn't panic as it battled back cutting the deficit to six to end the half, scoring the last five points.

The halftime statistics were pretty even as the Jaguars finished 9-of-27 from the floor and 5-of-13 from beyond the arc and 2-of-4 from the line. The six

point difference in the half was Florida had three more made field goals, going 12-of-30. The Gators were 5-of-15 from beyond the arc and were 2-of-4 from the line.

Buboltz led all-scorers with 11 points at intermission. USA held a 20-19 edge in rebounds.

The Jaguars struggled out of the gates in the second half, too. The teams exchanged 3's right as the half began, but USA went scoreless for the next 3:23 until senior Mario Jinter hit a trey to

cut the Florida lead back to seven with 15:39 left. Florida scored the next 14 of 20 points to go up 48-34 with 11:44 to play.

The Jaguars got as close as 12 points on a jumper by senior Michael Phillips with 9:11 to play, but the Gators proceeded to outscore the Jags 24-10 the rest of the way for a 76-50 win.

The Jaguars were 19-of-55 from the field for the game for 34.5 percent and were 9-of-20 from beyond the arc and were a season-low 3-of-6 from the line.

Florida was 29-of-59 from the field and 10-of-25 from beyond the arc. The Gators were 8-of-10 from the line.

Buboltz had a team-high 14 points on 5-of-7 from the field, including 4-of-5 from the 3-point stripe. Jinter had 10 points in his final game as a Jaguar. Florida had four players in double-figures with a game-high 20 from Lee Humphrey who had a career-high six made 3-pointers and was 7-of-8 from the floor.

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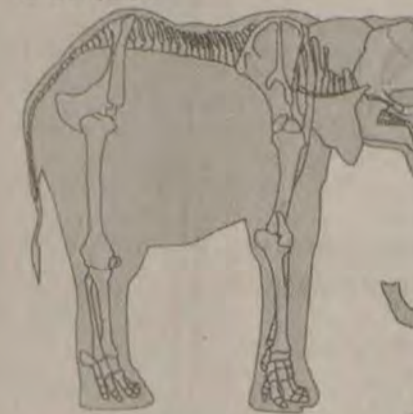
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ELEPHANTS

The largest and heaviest land mammal in the world, the elephant is very smart and very strong. And with a life span of about 70 years, they live longer than any other land mammals (with the exception of humans).

African elephant

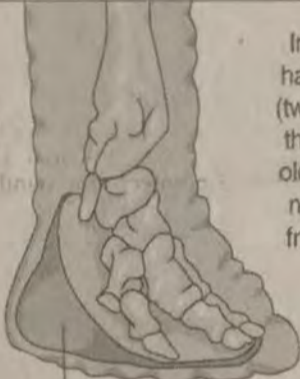
The African elephant (*Loxodonta Africana*) is the largest animal living on land. The largest is the bush elephant, which lives south of the Sahara. Forest elephants are found in Central and Western Africa. Males are larger than females, and a bush elephant can be 11 feet tall (3.4 m) and weigh up to 14,000 lbs. (6,300 kg) These animals have four or five toes on their front feet and three toes on their back feet. Both males and females have tusks. Wild populations are estimated at 400,000 to 600,000.

The toe bones of an elephant sit on a soft pad of fat that acts as a shock absorber and allows the animal to move very quietly, despite its size. The sole of the foot has thick skin with deep cracks and grooves for traction.

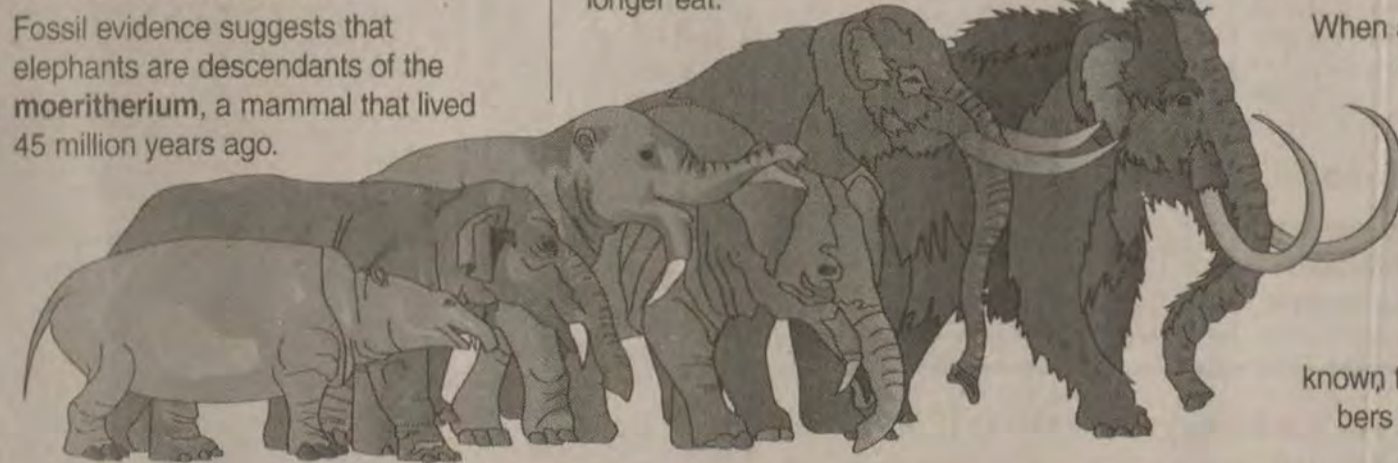
Elephants walk at about 3 to 6 miles (5 to 10 k) an hour but can double that speed when on the march and reach up to 25 miles (40 k) when frightened.*

Musth

For several weeks in a year, adult males experience musth (pronounced muhst). High levels of the hormone testosterone cause unpredictable and aggressive behavior. During musth, the elephant oozes a thick, smelly, black fluid from a gland on the side of its head (between the eye and the ear).

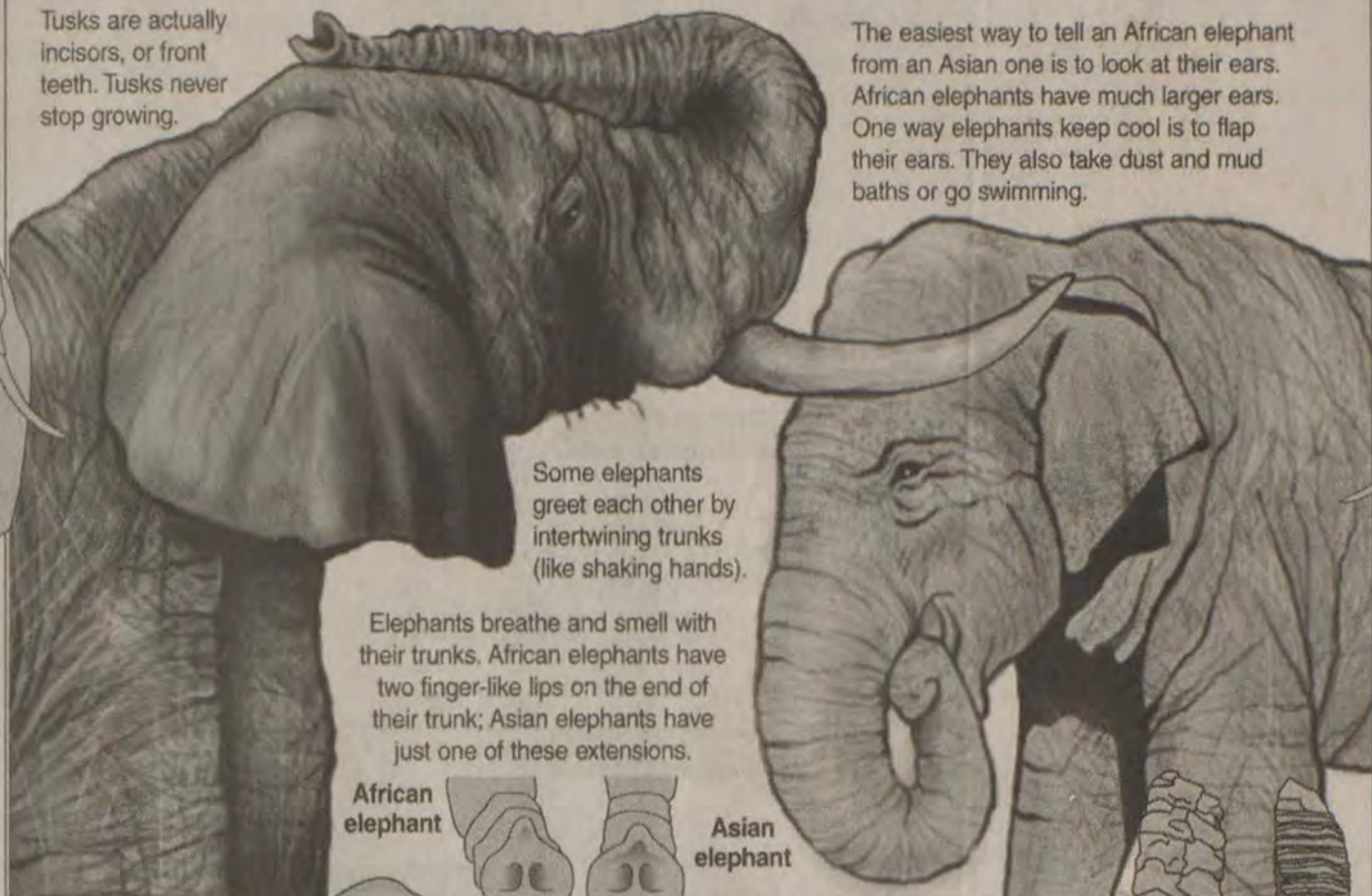
Ancient ancestors

Fossil evidence suggests that elephants are descendants of the moeritherium, a mammal that lived 45 million years ago.



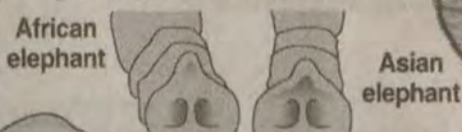

Tusks are actually incisors, or front teeth. Tusks never stop growing.

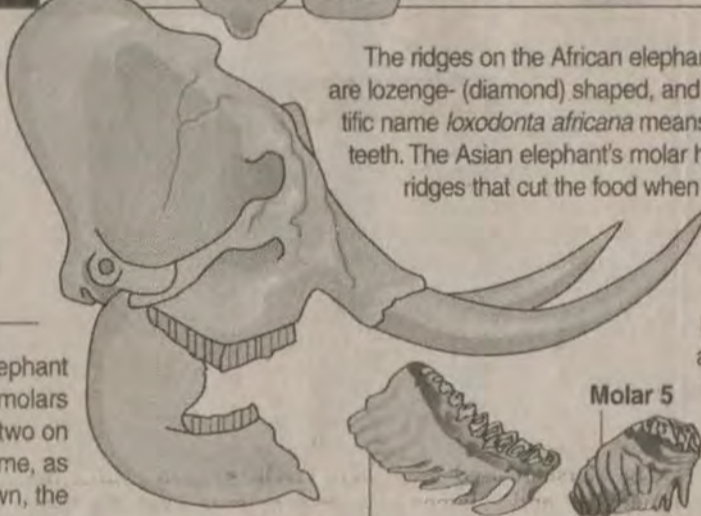


Some elephants greet each other by intertwining trunks (like shaking hands).

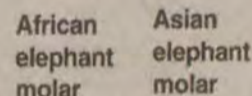
Elephants breathe and smell with their trunks. African elephants have two finger-like lips on the end of their trunk; Asian elephants have just one of these extensions.



An elephant skull would be very heavy if it did not have small holes or pockets of air. Elephants chew by moving the jaw from side to side in a grinding motion.



The ridges on the African elephant's molar are lozenge- (diamond) shaped, and its scientific name *Loxodonta africana* means lozenge teeth. The Asian elephant's molar has sharp ridges that cut the food when chewing.

In its lifetime, an elephant has six sets of four molars (two on the top and two on the bottom). Over time, as old molars wear down, the new (larger) molars move from the back to the front.

Molar 6 is the last and largest molar; it appears when the elephant is about 40 years old.

Food for thought

Elephants are **herbivores** and survive on many kinds of grass, leaves, fruits, roots and tree branches. Adult elephants spend 16 to 18 hours of every day eating. They can consume up to 330 lbs. (150 kg) of vegetation and drink up to 40 gallons (160 l) of water a day.

Elephants can travel more than 50 miles a day foraging for food and water. Migration routes are never too far from water, because an elephant can live for only about three days without it.

Wild elephants can live to 60 or 70 years of age. If it avoids being hunted and does not die from disease, it will die of old age in the form of starvation. Its final set of molars wears down to nothing, and the animal can no longer eat.

Family life

Elephants form tight-knit family groups, or **herds**. A herd generally consists of 10 to 12 related females and their offspring. The herd is led by a **matriarch** (the oldest and usually the largest female). This dominant female decides when to eat, rest or migrate.

Young males are forced to leave the herd when they reach maturity (age 10-16). Adult males often lead solitary lives or gather in small groups with other males. A lone male elephant is called a **rogue**.

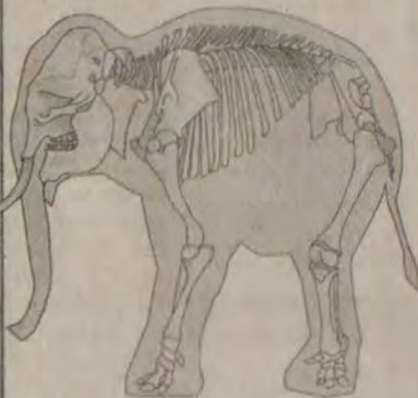
Sensitive souls

Elephants can cry, play and even laugh. They also grieve when a calf is stillborn or a family member dies.

When a **calf** (baby elephant) cries, the entire family responds with caresses and soft, reassuring sounds. Elephants will lift or support an injured or ill herd member. And they have been known to rescue family members from natural disasters and man-made traps.

Asian elephant

The Asian or Indian elephant (*elephas maximus*) is smaller than its African cousin. A bull stands 9 to 10 feet (2.7 to 3.2 m) tall and weighs up to 11,000 lbs. (5,000 kg). The female is smaller than the male and has very small tusks or none at all. An Asian elephant has five toes on its front feet, and four toes on its back feet. This animal is listed as endangered, with wild populations estimated at 35,000 to 50,000. The Asian elephant has been domesticated by man and to this day is captured and trained to carry heavy loads. At one time it was even used in warfare.

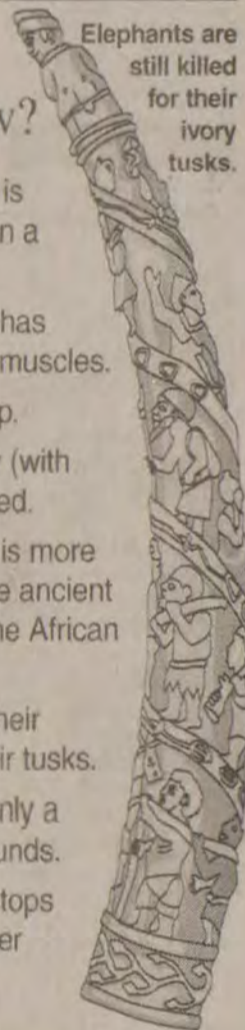

Did you know?

- An elephant's heart is five times larger than a human heart.
- An elephant's trunk has more than 100,000 muscles.
- Elephants can't jump.
- Some elephants cry (with tears) when frustrated.
- The Asian elephant is more closely related to the ancient mammoth than to the African elephant.
- Elephants will rest their heavy trunks on their tusks.
- Humans can hear only a third of elephant sounds.
- An elephant never stops growing, so the larger an elephant is, the older it is.



The skin of an elephant can be up to 1 1/2 inches (3 cm) thick in some places on its head and back, but is paper thin around the mouth. Elephants use touch as a form of communication, and their skin is not tough and leathery, but soft and sensitive.
