Watchdog group chides judicial candidates

FRANKFORT — The Kentucky Judicial Campaign Conduct Committee recently issued a statement claiming that Judge David Barber's television ads misrepresent challenger Janet Stumbo, while Stumbo provided inaccurate information on her website regarding Barber's delinquent taxes.

The nonpartisan unofficial commit-

tee believes that Barber's ad "seriously and inappropriately misrepresents" two opinions Stumbo issued when she was justice on the Supreme Court. Barber's ad attacks a particular case that says when a mother was convicted of letting her lover abuse her baby, the Supreme Court said she had a duty to protect her child. According to the ad, Stumbo said no such duty existed. The committee says Stumbo's opinion was misinterpreted and Stumbo actually believed

the prosecutor in this case used the wrong statute which dealt with assault, rather than criminal abuse.

Barber's ad goes on to say, "In another case, Janet Stumbo's opinion was that there was no criminal liability for killing an unborn child." The committee says that Stumbo's opinion involving this case was that the state legislature intended cases of fetal homicide to be prosecuted under a law that it passed in 2004. They say this is

not the same as believing there is no criminal liability for killing a fetus.

In a statement provided to the candidates, the committee says, "The advertisement takes a case involving statutory interpretation and issues of which statutes could or should be used to prosecute a particular alleged criminal action and simplifies Justice Stumbo's opinion in a manner the com-

Man gets 6 years for drugs

PRESTONSBURG — A 68-year-old Martin man was sentenced to 10 years in prison in Floyd Circuit court Friday for several drug-trafficking charges.

Ronald Gene Stone was charged in May with six counts of trafficking in a controlled substance after he was recorded both on audio and videotape selling Oxycontin and hydrocodone to undercover agents working for the drug task force UNITE.

The first drug buy at Stone's residence occurred Oct. 25, 2005, when he sold both Oxycontin and hydrocodone to an undercover agent. Stone took part in another drug buy the very next day, selling only Oxycontin that time. A third Oxycontin buy took place on Nov. 1, this time with it being recorded on both audio and videotape.

After the third buy, a search warrant was issued and UNITE officers found a substantial amount of Oxycontin, hydrocodone and cash in his home. Officers were able to recover \$60 in cash that

Haywood cancer-free after 5 years

PRESTONSBURG — In 2001, Bill Haywood, of Prestonsburg, found himself having to search for a new physician, for the one he had seen for several years was retiring.

Being a veteran, Haywood decided he would make the trip to the VA Hospital in Huntington, W.Va., to seek a new physician there.

It was during this visit a physical examination took place. Haywood's PSA levels

were elevated and more tests would be required.

"I had no idea anything was wrong," said Haywood.

A second round of blood work was ordered and again the PSA levels were even higher than the first. This time a biopsy was ordered to check for prostate cancer.

"Actually they did six biopsies and three came back cancer," said Haywood.

His doctor wanted to do what is termed "radical surgery," removing the entire prostate right then, but Haywood wanted more in-

depth information and more options.

He came home, and began to search the American Cancer Institute's website to find any and all information on prostate cancer.

Prostate cancer is the second most common type of cancer among men in this country. Only skin cancer is more common. Out of every three men who are diagnosed with cancer each year, one is diagnosed with prostate cancer.

Coal company cited after black water spill

ALLEN — The black water spill that leaked into the Big Sandy river last Thursday has resulted in Frasure Creek Mining receiving a citation for an unauthorized discharge pipe.

According to the Kentucky Environmental Protection Cabinet, the day that the spill occurred, a citizen reported seeing discolored water entering the

Levisa Fork of the Big Sandy river and notified the Department of Mine Reclamation Enforcement regional office in Prestonsburg and the Kentucky Division of Water Emergency Response Team.

Upon inspections conducted by the Division of Water and DMRE, personnel determined that the water originated from an unauthorized discharge

Paintsville man indicted on child porn charges

PAINTSVILLE — The United States Department of Justice and the Project Safe Childhood initiative, in cooperation with federal, state and local law enforcement agencies, have started the process of cracking down on the sexual exploitation of children.

Operation Harvest Moon is an investigative approach which uses a variety of sources including under-

cover efforts by federal, state, and local law enforcement organizations, tips from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children and complaints from private citizens.

As a result of investigations conducted by Operation Harvest Moon, a federal grand jury returned 11 sealed indictments on Oct. 23, one of which charges a Johnson County man with violations related

Guest View Acknowledging differences

Good education can at times require flexibility that lends itself to meeting the various needs of individual students. The spotlight on single-sex classrooms illustrates the point. The Bush administration announced its final rules concerning enforcement of Title IX, which will result in greater freedom for school systems to implement single-sex classes or entire schools starting Nov. 24.

Thus more debate has been sparked on whether grouping girls and boys by gender creates an effective learning environment. "Research shows that some students may learn better in single-sex education environments," Education Secretary Margaret Spellings said in a press release. "The Department of Education is committed to giving communities more choices in how they go about offering varied learning environments to their students." Precisely. Some students learn better in a same-sex environment. Some do not. The emphasis should be placed on offering a choice.

The effect that gender plays in the learning process needs to be taken into account regardless of whether schools actually resort to the major step of creating single-sex classrooms. And parents and students often respond well when given greater leeway about educational decisions.

As World-Herald staff writer Veronica Stickney reported, some school districts, such as Westside Community Schools and Omaha Public Schools, are considering new options. There is nothing wrong with exploring the possibilities and getting input from staff, parents and students.

Certainly questions and concerns remain. Any school considering the adoption of gender-specific classes or schools needs to make sure there are no hints of sex discrimination or inequity in offerings. And real-world considerations should be kept in mind - social interaction between men and women is, of course, a fundamental part of adult life.

Schools are correct, nonetheless, to consider how gender differences can affect learning and what can be done, in light of that fact, to provide appropriate options so that educational performance is enhanced.

The bottom line is finding the best ways to educate each student according to his or her individual needs. The latest information from the Department of Education is helpful for better understanding the relationships between gender and learning.

Our last audit of fiscal year 2005-06 was just complete. This audit covers the period of July 1, 2005, to June 30, 2006. These audits are provided to business associates of the organization and oftentimes contain sensitive information. The hospital records discussed by Mr. Webb will be provided when the city agrees to a protective order governing the use of confidential material. Further, we believe that these records will not shed any light whatsoever on the proposed annexation by the city. Finally, we periodically release an extensive report to the public, which outlines the progress of the hospital and our contributions to the community.

I hope the above facts offer some clarity to the statements made by Mr. Webb at the last city council meeting.

Fletcher dedicates highway in honor of Patton

PIKEVILLE — Gov. Ernie Fletcher bypassed partisan politics on Monday to dedicate a stretch of Eastern Kentucky highway in honor of former Democratic Gov. Paul Patton.

The dedication of a new 20-mile section of U.S. 119 as the "Paul E. Patton Highway" was held in Patton's hometown of Pikeville, where he has enjoyed retirement since Fletcher succeeded him as governor in 2004.

The scene off a bridge along the highway, amid a backdrop of rolling hills covered in autumn leaves, had a touch of

irony. Just three years ago, Fletcher became Kentucky's first Republican governor in more than 30 years on a promise to "clean up the mess in Frankfort," following a sex scandal involving Patton.

Fletcher's own term has been marked by an investigation of his administration's hiring practices. He was charged in May with alleged conspiracy, official misconduct and political discrimination, but the charges were dropped in August as part of an agreement with prosecutors.

The two appeared at ease on Monday, sitting side-by-side and later stepping up to the microphone to exchange com-

pliments over their accomplishments in office.

"Paul Patton was elected by the people of Kentucky to serve as their governor for two successive terms and diligently worked to improve the quality of life for the people of Pikeville and Pike County," Fletcher said.

He credited Patton for sparking reforms in Kentucky's economy, higher education and, of course, making construction of the \$400 million highway a top priority.

Fletcher added that he had a greater appreciation for Patton once he began his own term as governor.

"Regardless of party affilia-

tion, there's a special kindredship between those who have served as governor," he said.

Patton, whose tearful confession of the affair had marked him as a political pariah among Democrats and Republicans, thanked Fletcher for the honor.

"What I really wanted was a bridge. ... This was the only thing that was left," he quipped with the crowd legislators, local officials and residents.

After the ceremony, Patton said he and Fletcher had a cordial relationship and no tension.

"Once people have held that job, you rise above the politics. You realize their struggles,"

Patton said.

While Fletcher wasn't obligated to attend the dedication ceremony, it was a smart move as governor and a candidate seeking re-election, said Kendra Stewart, a political scientist at Eastern Kentucky University.

To not show up "would be insulting to the people down there, and those are important constituents," she said. "You want to appear to rise above the fray of politics."

State Rep. Rocky Adkins, D-Sandy Hook, who attended the ceremony, said it was simply the right thing to do.

"It's a very bipartisan act to give credit where credit's due."

CDC probing salmonella outbreak in 18 states, including Kentucky

ATLANTA — A salmonella outbreak potentially linked to produce has sickened at least 172 people in 18 states, including Kentucky, health officials said Monday.

Health officials think the bacteria may have spread through some form of produce; the list of suspects includes lettuce and tomatoes. But the illnesses have not been tied to any specific product, chain, restaurants or supermarkets.

No one has died in the outbreak, which stems from a common form of salmonella bacteria. Eleven people have been hospitalized, health officials said.

"We're very early in the investigation," said Dave Daigle, a spokesman for the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

There have been 16 cases of the infection reported in Kentucky, but no one has been hospitalized, said Beth Crace, a spokeswoman for the state Cabinet for Health and Family Services.

Outbreaks of food-borne illness have repeatedly made headlines this year. Certain

brands of packaged spinach, lettuce, carrot juice, beef and unpasteurized milk recently were recalled after they were found to be tainted with illness-causing bacteria.

The most serious outbreak, first reported in September, involved spinach tainted with E. coli bacteria that killed three people and sickened more than 200.

The CDC detected the salmonella outbreak two weeks ago through a national computer lab system that looks for patterns and matches in reports of food-borne illness. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has joined the investigation and will try to help trace the outbreak to its origin.

Most of the cases are in adults, and more than 60 percent are women, said Dr. Chris Braden, a CDC epidemiologist investigating the outbreak.

The states involved also include: Arkansas, Connecticut, Georgia, Indiana, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, North Carolina, New Hampshire, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Virginia, Vermont and Wisconsin.

Fifty-one cases reported in Massachusetts in September are the same strain as that in

the national outbreak, said Donna Rheume, a spokeswoman for the Department of Public Health. It was not immediately clear whether those cases were in addition to the 172 reported nationwide.

Salmonella generally cause a nonfatal, diarrhea-causing illness. Other symptoms can include nausea, vomiting, abdominal cramps, fever and headache.

There are about 2,500 types of salmonella. The type in this outbreak — Salmonella typhimurium — is one of the most common, Braden said.

People can catch the infection from many different sources, including water, soil, insects, factory surfaces, kitchen surfaces, animal feces, and raw meats, poultry and seafoods.

Health officials estimate that more than 1.4 million cases of salmonellosis occur in the U.S. each year. About 1.3 million of those cases come from food, Braden said.

In California, where the E. coli outbreak was traced to, a trade group on Monday proposed mandatory state food safety guidelines for lettuce and spinach farmers and processors. The move by the Western Growers Association would include inspections by state regulators and sanctions for violators.

The California Department of Food and Agriculture, which would be responsible for enforcement, has agreed to work with Western Growers in developing a certification process that would give growers who meet the guidelines a clean bill of health, said Thomas Nassif, the trade group's president.

"It is not normal for a busi-

ness to say, 'Please regulate us and enforce it if we don't do the right things,'" Nassif said. "But that, we believe, is essential to restore public confidence."

Regional universities, KCTCS tackle rural bachelor degree attainment

Regional universities, the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS), local citizens and political leaders in southeastern Kentucky have created and supported the University Center of the Mountains to increase the number of those graduating with a bachelor's degree in an underserved region and pursue one of the mandates of Kentucky higher education reform.

The Council of Postsecondary Education (CPE) is to be commended for establishing the significant and laudable goal that Kentucky will match by 2020 the national average of bachelor's degrees awarded annually. CPE is challenging the state to nearly double the number of its workforce with a bachelor degree by 2020.

The stark reality in Kentucky educational attainment, however, is that the rural portions of the state have not been provided the resources to participate in bachelor degree attainment. If Kentucky is to reach its goal, the rate needs to be tripled in rural areas and not just doubled. The Kentucky River Area Development District (KRADD) has the lowest percentage of persons with a bachelor degree (8.6%) in any Kentucky area development district compared to the rest of the state (17.1%) and nation (24.4%) according to the 2000 U.S. Census. While the state is making progress increasing the percentage of citizens with bachelor degrees in the last decade, the gap has actually widened in KRADD and other rural areas, compared to the rest of the state.

There are various reasons for the gap in the rural and urban educational attainment; however, convenient access to bachelor degree programming is the root cause. The absence of a conveniently located university and the nearly two hour drive to the regional and state universities on mountainous roads have limited access to both bachelor and master degrees in the KRADD region.

The regional universities and the independent colleges serving KRADD are to be commended for the dedicated efforts they have made to serve the region. Unfortunately, the state universities have not been given sufficient public funds to duplicate student services and

programming in rural areas off their central campuses.

Rural Kentuckians deserve the same opportunity to obtain bachelor degrees as persons living in cities or on or near the interstate highways. Bachelor degree holders earn more money and will be a stimulus to build local economies. A higher educated workforce will attract and create new businesses and indus-

tries. More advanced degrees enhance the abilities of local businesses to adopt superior technologies and respond to changing economic conditions. Bringing more advanced degrees to rural Kentucky will be a catalyst to economic development.

In July 2003, four public partners (Eastern Kentucky University, Hazard Community and Technical

College, the Kentucky Community and Technical College System and Morehead State University) formed the University Center of the Mountains partnership. Lindsey Wilson College, the first independent institution, joined in July 2004. The UCM adds programs and partners based on education needs of the region.

Instead of spending millions of dollars on "bricks and mortar," the University Center of the Mountains creative collaboration is the most cost effective and innovative means to raise educational levels by utilizing HCTC campus facilities in four counties. The University Center of the Mountains is an engine for economic development and is a model to be replicated in other rural portions of the state which have been left behind in bachelor and master degrees.

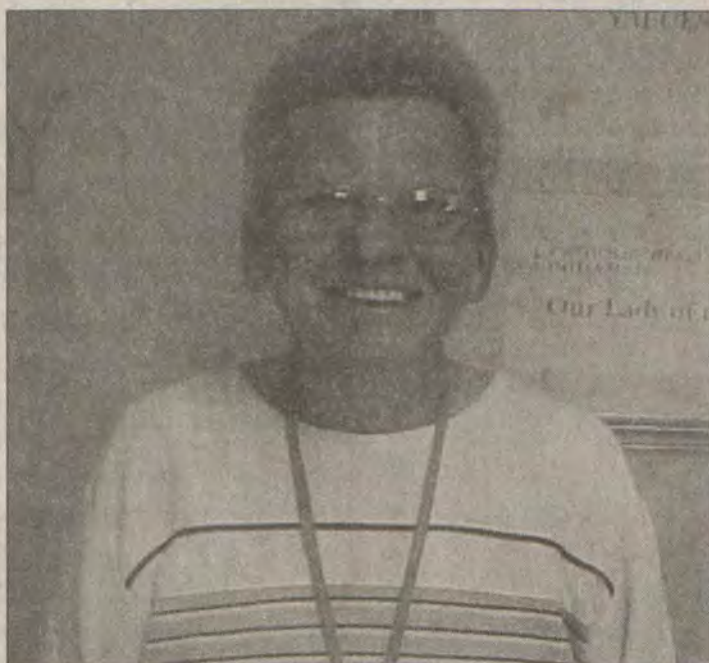
With limited resources, the UCM partners have expanded the number of bachelor degrees from five to eighteen and the number of master degrees from two to seven in

less than three years. The unduplicated enrollment in UCM partner degree programs has increased by 67%.

Local citizens, businesses, organizations and political leaders provided the seed money to begin the UCM. Local legislators worked with the Perry County Fiscal Court to utilize coal severance tax funding in 2004 for the UCM partnership, which has been recognized as a national model. The state, however, has the responsibility to provide rural Kentuckians equal opportunities in postsecondary education. The Kentucky General Assembly should pro-

vide additional funding to state universities for rural outreach and cost effective university center models in rural Kentucky to thus increase the bachelor degree attainment rates for all Kentuckians.

■ **BATESVILLE, Ark.** — Police instantly knew this Bill wasn't authentic.

A man has been arrested for trying to use a \$100 bill with no president's portrait and the name of former President Clinton.

The man, who has not been identified, was arrested Friday after trying to use the bill to buy cigarettes at a Batesville gas station.

"The bill was unmistakably fake due to the fact that the ink was running on the bill, the president's face was missing and for the president's name, it had the name Clinton on it," said Deputy Nathan Stephens.

The sheriff's office expects to file counterfeiting charges against the suspect, authorities said.

"Of all the cases I've worked with phony money, this is the sorriest bill I've ever seen," Lt. Brenda Bittle said.

■ **TOPEKA, Kan.** — The thing in the bag of black seedless grapes in Lori Warren's refrigerator was dark and shiny, all right, but it had something grapes don't: eight legs.

Making the whole experience worse, the critter had the red, hourglass-shaped mark on its abdomen that helped confirm its identity as a black widow spider.

Her 9-year-old daughter, Elysia Holland-Kyzer, discovered the spider Monday morning when she went looking in the refrigerator for butter for her toast. She yelled for her mother.

"I'm the spider catcher in the family, and I'm not really afraid of those things," Warren said.

But the closer examination that turned up the black widow's markings did give her a shiver, thinking of her children's close calls.

The grapes had been purchased at an area store by Warren's mother, who lives in Ottawa. The two women called two area stores where the grapes could have come from to tell them about their find.

The Warrens put their half-consumed bag of grapes into another plastic bag and then placed the whole thing in their garage. They weren't certain what they would do with it, but Warren was fairly sure the family will stay away from grapes for now.

"I don't think Elysia will eat any for a while," she said with a laugh.

■ **EUGENE, Ore.** — Steve Milton keeps springing back and springing back to rubber bands.

Through concentration and perseverance, he has created a 3,300-pound ball comprised of rubber bands. His creation measures almost 5 feet tall and takes up half his two-car garage.

Though it's not official, the 26-year-old Eugene man believes he has broken the record for the heaviest such ball, eclipsing John Bain's

mark of 3,120 pounds.

Milton has posted updates of his ball's growing girth on his MySpace page. He's also uploaded videos of the ball crushing things, such as when he used a forklift to drop the ball on an old van.

Milton started building the ball last November. He bought rubber bands at retail stores and then started purchasing in bulk from the Pennsylvania-based Dykema Rubber Band Company.

Milton, who wants to stretch the ball at least another 1,000 pounds, said the work isn't all that safe. He wears gloves to avoid burning his hands from friction and learned to move when a band breaks.

"If they snap they come off pretty fast," he said. "They've given me welts before."

■ **OKLAHOMA CITY** — The law legalizing tattooing in Oklahoma goes into effect Wednesday and some people are already eager to roll up their sleeves.

Tressa Madden, director of consumer protection at the state Department of Health, said her office has been swamped with inquiries about the licensing process. Oklahoma was the last state to legalize tattooing.

"Build the rules, and they will come," said Madden, whose department is in charge of licensing tattoo artists and tattoo establishments. "I try to return phone calls as fast as I can."

George Stratton, owner of Cutting Edge Tattoo in Arkansas City, Kan., said about 30 percent of his customers are Oklahomans who cross the state border for a legal tattoo.

He knows a portion of that business will slough off, but he predicted that many tattoo artists in Oklahoma won't have the experience or the money to meet state licensing requirements.

He said that if his business goes bad, "I'll move to Oklahoma and still have a jump ahead."

■ **BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** — Steve Volan drew guffaws and cackles when he walked into City Council meeting dressed in a yellow chicken costume.

The councilman's outfit led to a string of jokes before the serious business of debating whether chicken-keeping within city limits should be allowed got under way.

During Wednesday's discussion, 21 audience members spoke in favor of allowing residents to raise egg-laying chickens and four spoke against the ordinance. Volan joined the 5-1 council majority in voting to recommend the ordinance for final approval.

The word "chicken" was uttered more than 200 times and council member David Sabbagh jokingly asked whether three unrelated birds would be allowed to co-roost — a reference to a city ordinance restricting the number of unrelated adults allowed in single-family homes.

Opponents of chicken-keeping said they fear that neighbors with chickens would impact property values, and threaten the public health.

Supporters said that when people grow their own food and raise their own chickens, they actually contribute to public health since store-bought eggs can be unhealthy.

■ **FRESNO, Calif.** — Voters in the tiny American Union Elementary School District may think they're seeing double when they go to the polls next month.

When they get to the candidates running for school board on Nov. 7, they'll find Suzanne Dias and Suzanne Dias.

That's Suzanne Dias, 50, a school food service manager, and Suzanne Dias, 36, a housewife.

The two women are among six candidates running for three school board seats in the rural Fresno County district, which has one school with about 350 students.

Workers at the county elections office said they can't recall a time when two candidates with the same name ran for the same office.

"It's rare and clearly it would tend to confuse the voters," said County Clerk Victor Salazar.

Voters will see some differences between the two candidates.

The elder Dias will be listed on the ballot as Susanne Hodoian Dias. She added her maiden name after learning that the other Suzanne Dias was also running.

The two will also be distinguished by their occupations, which will be listed below their names on the ballot.

Another candidate, Brett Mosekian, calls the situation "kind of peculiar," but he doubts voters will have much trouble picking one candidate from the other because everyone in the district pretty much knows everyone else.

The district only has 893 registered voters.

Both teams will look to continue to grow and improve next season, as both expect large recruiting classes. Next year will mark the third season for the Pikeville College soccer program.

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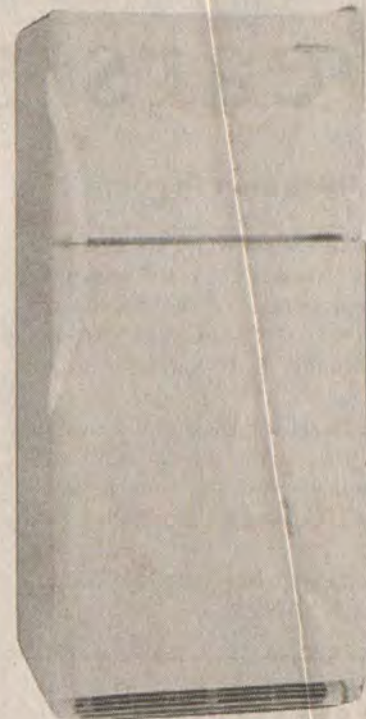
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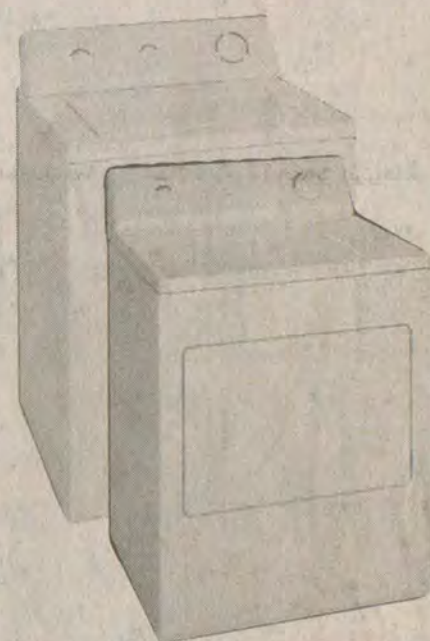

STARKVILLE, Miss. - Kentucky quarterback Andre Woodson threw for three touchdowns in Saturday's win against Mississippi State, but it was freshman running back Alfonso Smith whose performance impressed coach Rich Brooks.

Smith ran the ball 17 times for 92 yards and a touchdown in the 34-31 win. He added another 57 yards on two receptions.

"There was one play that excited me about Alfonso. I saw Alfonso cut back in towards the defender and lower his shoulder and he got about four or five more yards," Brooks said. "He was hitting holes with some pretty good speed."

Smith's performance also pleased teammate Keenan

Burton, who had two touchdown receptions in the game.

"He has some great runs. He has great moves and tremendous speed," Burton said. "He did a good job for our team today."

Smith, a 6-foot-1, 190-pound freshman, got his chance when Rafael Little was injured with a torn cartilage in his knee earlier this month.

Saturday's win was the first conference victory for the Wildcats (4-4, 3-3 Southeastern Conference) since last season at Vanderbilt.

Kentucky broke a 14-14 halftime tie by scoring on four of its first five possessions in the second half. However, the Wildcats, who led by 31-17 in the fourth quarter, needed a recovery by Jacob Tamme on an onside kick with 2:12 left to seal the win.

Mississippi State (2-7, 0-5)

got career-best performances from quarterback Michael Henig and wide receiver Tony Burks, but still lost its first five conference games for the second straight year. Henig finished 22-of-41 for 384 yards and three touchdowns, and Burks had seven catches for 192 yards and two touchdowns.

The Bulldogs' downfall, however, was due to a poor running game - they finished with just 35 yards rushing - and three costly turnovers.

"I'm going straight to the film for that because I'm very disappointed in our running game today," Mississippi State coach Sylvester Croom said. "I thought we were going to be able to run the ball well against them. It was something we worked hard at all week and did a very poor job of it."

Woodson was 19-of-28

passing, primarily to Burton and Dicky Lyons.

The Wildcats had opportunities to put the game away in the second quarter after taking a 14-0 lead, but turned the ball over twice and missed a field goal.

Mississippi State answered with consecutive scoring drives to tie the score.

Kentucky regained control in the second on Lones Seiber's 41-yard field goal, Smith's three-yard run and a 33-yard pass from Woodson to Burton for a 31-17 lead with 13:24 left.

Mississippi State rallied to get within 34-31 with 2:20 left on a 36-yard touchdown pass from Henig to Burks and a short run by Anthony Dixon.

Kentucky has won four of the last five meetings with the Bulldogs.

NFL: Falcons 29, Bengals 27

CINCINNATI — Michael Vick has found a balance. His passer rating is just as impressive as his 40-yard dash these days.

Vick threw three more touchdown passes on Sunday, leading the Atlanta Falcons to a 29-27 victory over a Cincinnati Bengals team that had never seen anything quite like the show he put on.

Few teams have. The mercurial quarterback has led the Falcons (5-2) to consecutive wins over the defending Super Bowl champion Steelers and the defending AFC North champion Bengals by throwing the ball. Vick has thrown seven touchdown passes in the last two games, proving his point.

"I feel I just need the opportunity to throw the ball," said Vick, whose passer rating of 140.6 was the second-highest of his career. "Just give me the chance to do it. I've felt like all along, this is what I could do."

No matter what they did, the Bengals (4-3) were helpless to run him down or shut him down.

Many of the Bengals' defenders had never faced Vick, who put on quite a show in his first career visit to Cincinnati. He went 20-of-28 for 291 yards and left would-be tacklers scattered all over the field while running

for another 55 yards.

Seen enough, Bengals? "He's a heck of a player," defensive end Bryan Robinson said. "When your goal is to keep him in the pocket and you do that and he still makes the play, that's frustrating."

In the last two games, Vick has gone 38-of-58 for 523 yards with those seven touchdowns and two interceptions, which translates into a passer rating of 119.5. Previously, Vick had never thrown more than four touchdowns in any two-game span of his career.

"He's leading like a champion," said tight end Alge Crumpler, who has caught four of those seven touchdowns. "He never points fingers at anybody in this locker room and is constantly encouraging everybody."

He was so good that Carson Palmer, last year's NFL leader in touchdown passes, and Pro Bowl receiver Chad Johnson were reduced to a sideshow.

Palmer made it close, throwing a 55-yard touchdown pass to Chris Henry that cut it to 29-27 with 3:41 to go. But Vick helped the Falcons run the clock down to 19 seconds before a punt pinned the Bengals at their 17-yard line.

Palmer fumbled while being sacked, ending one of his better performances of the season on a downcast note. Palmer was 24-of-36 for 266

yards in his failed quest to keep up with Vick.

"He's like nobody else in our league — a Reggie Bush-type player," Palmer said. "He's exciting and fun to watch. He's one of the few guys you pay to go watch play."

The main event was supposed to be the matchup of Johnson and cornerback DeAngelo Hall, who had kept up a stream of trash talk since they met at the Pro Bowl last February. Eight months of dissing culminated in one last face-to-face exchange before the first play.

The Falcons took the bait. Hall threw Johnson to the ground emphatically on the first play, and safety Chris Crocker drew a late-hit penalty for knocking down Johnson again when he got up.

Johnson was under the Falcons' skin. Now, he had to get into the end zone.

He'd promised at least two touchdowns. He got one midway through the first quarter, taking a quick throw from Palmer and putting a move on Jason Webster to shake free for a 14-6 lead and his second touchdown of the season.

Johnson finished with six catches for a team-high 78 yards — numbers that failed to back up the prolonged brag.

"Their game plan was to just throw away from me," Hall said. "For the

most part, it was a relatively quiet day for him."

After the game, Johnson had nothing but good wishes and good words for Hall.

"It was a lot of fun," Johnson said. "I enjoyed it. It's not every day you get to play against one of the best in the NFL."

Vick let the Falcons get the final word.

In one say-it-all play, Vick eluded the rush, rolled left, pulled up and lobbed a 26-yard touchdown to Michael Jenkins in the third quarter. His 8-yard pass to fullback Justin Griffith put the Falcons ahead to stay at 26-20 — a bad snap scuttled the extra point — and showed that teams can't worry exclusively about his speed anymore.

"He's just getting comfortable," Hall said. "He's coming into his own."

Notes: Vick's best career passer rating was 141.7 in a 41-0 win at Carolina on Nov. 24, 2002. ... Vick threw only three touchdown passes in the first five games this season. ... Bengals S Kevin Kaesviharn left in the third quarter after landing hard on his left knee. He jogged off the field, but didn't return. ... Henry had five catches for 81 yards in his first game back since serving a two-game suspension from the NFL.

Stewart wins Atlanta; Johnson closes in on Chase leader

HAMPTON, Ga. — At this point, Tony Stewart is racing only for pride and wins. On Sunday at Atlanta Motor Speedway, he stole the spotlight from the title contenders with a win that clearly made him proud.

Stewart, who failed to qualify for the 10-race Chase for championship after winning his second Nextel Cup title last season, held off Chase driver Jimmie Johnson for his fourth victory of the season and second in the first seven races of the 2006 playoffs.

Afterward, he literally grabbed the checkered flag after a somewhat perilous climb up the flagstand in celebration.

"It's better than last year," said Stewart after jumping out of his No. 14 Joe Gibbs Racing Chevrolet. "We were in it last year and couldn't win any of these, so it's a lot of fun."

The runner-up finish was just fine with Johnson, though, as he moved within 26 points of series leader Matt Kenseth with three races remaining.

Johnson got off to a slow start in the Chase and was eighth, 156 points behind then-leader Jeff Burton just four weeks ago. But a second-place finish at Charlotte followed by the wins in Martinsville and second place here have put him right back into the mix for a shot at winning the one honor that has escaped him in his first four seasons in NASCAR's top stock car series.

"We got off to a rough start (in the Chase), but we had the speed in the car and now we're getting the results," Johnson said. "It was a fun race. You really had to challenge yourself and scare yourself on every lap."

Chase contenders Dale Earnhardt Jr. and Kenseth fought it out for third place, with Earnhardt winning the battle by inches.

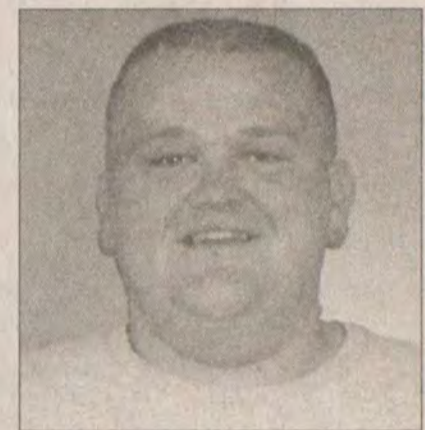

When contacted for comment, Barber said, "Everything in this ad is true," and goes on to say, "This committee is a group of private citizens with ties to certain people who do not want the public to know the religious beliefs of judges."

Stumbo responded, "I think it is despicable that David Barber would ignore the fact that he is completely misrepresenting my opinions in these ads. He is ignoring a committee that is trying to clean up a campaign."

Stumbo went on to say that a judge's job is to be fair and not worry so much about politics.

The same committee also says that Stumbo kept outdated information on her website that may have given voters the mistaken impression that Barber had not paid his delinquent taxes. The original

amount published on the web site was \$19,166.09 in July. On Oct. 20, the website was revised to say that Barber owed only \$154.54, much less than the original amount. Barber was informed of his remaining taxes by the committee and subsequently paid the full amount at the Floyd County Clerk's office.

When asked for her comment concerning the website, Stumbo said, "Just because he eventually paid these taxes doesn't mitigate that he let seven years go without paying when our school board was considering imposing a utility tax because they desperately needed the money." She also said the web site was corrected in a sufficient amount of time.

The indictment alleges that James Cottle, 41, of Paintsville, received and possessed various images of child pornography between January and May 2006. If convicted, Cottle could face up to 20 years of imprisonment, a fine of \$250,000 and supervised release for the receipt of child pornography. The maximum penalties for the possession

count is not more than 10 years imprisonment, a fine of no more than \$250,000 and supervised release.

The investigation which led to the indictment was conducted by the Kentucky State Police Electronic Crimes Section.

How to turn a love of animals into a career

Years into a successful career, many sometimes realize that they simply are no longer happy in their jobs. Animal lovers finding themselves in such a situation may want to consider switching careers to occupations involved in animal care. Animal-friendly careers are all around us, but where, and how, to begin your search? The first step, according to the Humane Society of the United States (HSUS), is to identify your job interests. From animal control officers to special events planners to animal protection lobbyists, there are literally hundreds of career paths to choose from.

"There is a common misconception that if you want to help animals, your only option is to become a veterinarian. And that's just not the case," says Betsy McFarland, director of communications for the HSUS Companion Animals program. "Just about any skill can be geared toward helping animals. For example,

there are lawyers who specialize in animal law. And, at the HSUS, we have a full-time art director who designs our publications. We have a full-time accountant, librarian, and many other positions that utilize a variety of skills. You don't have to earn a DVM to help critters," she said.

To learn more about the wide variety of positions available in the animal welfare field, check out the fields of specialization on Humane Society University's web site, search the U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Outlook Handbook, or look for books focusing on animal careers at your local library or bookstore. Reading advertised job openings is another great way to learn what types of jobs are available and get a more detailed description of specific opportunities.

After deciding on an area of interest, you'll want to investigate what kind of education is required for your chosen career. Depending on your goals, your length of study could vary greatly. Even if your dream job doesn't require

Floyd County voters decided overwhelmingly, Tuesday, that they prefer a change in county government, from the current magisterial form to the commission form, by a vote of 6,962 for the change, and 4,467 against. The change does not become effective until the countywide primary in 1998...Six incumbents and two other candidates who were running with them handily defeated four other candidates for Prestonsburg City Council, in the race, Tuesday. Receiving the most votes in the 12-man field was Robert R. Allen II, with 800...Janice Setser, a West Prestonsburg grandmother, was cited with three counts of endangering the welfare of a minor, after the Prestonsburg Police Department found two of her grandchildren wandering the streets, Tuesday morning. She is scheduled to appear in Floyd District Court on December 17, concerning the charges...Incumbent Eddie Patton will retain his seat on the Floyd County School Board. Patton will be joined by newcomers B.S. Newsome and Jody Mullins. Newsome and Mullins replace Phyllis Honshell and Dr. Brent Clark, who announced in August, they wouldn't be seeking re-election...Seventh graders from Adams Middle School stood beside Lake Drive, Tuesday, holding signs encouraging people to vote. Seventh-grade teachers Evonne Woods and Sheila Ortega had their students hold the signs as part of a course unit on democracy and citizen involvement...Democrat Senator Benny Ray Bailey of Hindman, benefitted from the 29th Senatorial District's heavily Democratic registration to outdistance GOP opponent John David Preston, of Paintsville, by an unofficial count of 18,768 to 11,917. Mitch McConnell won a third term in the U.S. Senate, joining the late John Sherman Cooper as the only Republican ever to win three statewide races in Kentucky...Voters may have decided to change Floyd County's form of government to the commissioner style of leadership, but the mag-

istrates may have the last word, despite the fact that voters in three of the four magisterial districts chose overwhelmingly to change the county's style of government. State government officials said the county judge-executive can do the re-districting or can recommend three people be appointed to a commission to redivide the county, with the fiscal court having final approval on that commission...A group of eight candidates for Prestonsburg City Council, all of whom were elected in Tuesday's vote, probably did not violate election finance laws, despite four complaints that were filed against them. lived to be 89, his mother 87. But his sister, who had died the previous year, had lived to be 100. He had a brother 98 and another 87. A third other brother had also died a year earlier, at age 92. His wife had died at age 90.

Of course, we are all aware of families here in the mountains who seem to have a tendency to out-live most folks. As a matter of fact, my great-grandmother on my daddy's

side is said to have died at 112. But we consider those people as exceptions. Among the farming communities of North Dakota's Great Plains, however, they seem to be the rule. The article stated that the year before, 51 people had died in that particular county. One woman was 100 and a man was 99. The average age of the women who died was 85; the men averaged 80.

So naturally, all this calls for

some sort of logical explanation. What would tend to cause ordinary people in this day and time to defy such odds? Based upon speculation of the people with whom he talked, the writer decided the following factors contributed highly: "Clean air; going slow; patience; a low-cost, low-stress economy; keeping an eye out for one another, (and) long, stable marriages."

If this list accurately reflects the

reasons for longevity, it's little wonder that the rest of the country is dropping like flies, including many of us here. Although we're lucky not to have the problems of the big cities, we still can't breathe clean air. Neither do we go slow. Furthermore, we hillbillies are also among the most impatient people in the world. And yes, we do fret over the economy. When it comes to our neighbors—at one time, our strong suit in

this little game—it's now a "do unto others, but do it first" philosophy. And finally, we've even seemingly adopted the idea of "starter marriages."

We don't know how much good it'd do to try to change our lifestyle at this point, and there's no way we could all move to North Dakota. Guess about all we can do is hope we'll end up being the exception.

Whatever your educational background, landing a great job can be a challenge. You'll need more than just a love of animals to beat out the competition, you'll also need experience. Volunteering a few hours a week at a humane organization can be just the ticket needed for a new career in animal welfare.

"While having a passion for animals is important, in most cases, ani-

mal welfare organizations want to see that you also have some good experience, not just passion," said McFarland, who got her start as a volunteer at a shelter in Texas. "Volunteering can be a great way to gain that experience while helping animals. Most wildlife rehabilitation organizations, local animal shelters, and spay/neuter clinics rely on volunteer assistance."

Armed with knowledge and experience, you will still need to convince a humane organization that you're the best candidate. Before you hit the

pavement, remember that preparation and patience are key.

Depending on your willingness to relocate, salary expectations, and other factors, finding a position that fits your skill and experience level could take several months. "Landing your dream job isn't going to happen overnight but it's worth the wait," McFarland said.

While working on behalf of animals is not typically glamorous or high-paying, people who have pursued a humane career argue that they gain something more valuable than

fame and fortune. "No two days are the same, and at the end of the day, I know I've made a difference even if it's only for one animal," said Alice Calabrese, who left a career in retail banking for one in the animal welfare field. Calabrese, like many others who are devoting their careers to helping animals, feels that looking into the faces of befriended animals is worth more than any amount of money.

Boating and cold water safety

The combination of a warm fall day, the love for the outdoors, and often a boat, lures many people each year to our nation's lakes, rivers and streams for many desired types of late season outdoor recreation.

These outdoor enthusiasts come to fish and hunt on our public fishing and hunting areas. They come to canoe on our white water streams and some come just for the beauty of the outdoors. No matter what the reason, all these people have one thing in common, the dangers of cold water exposure.

The Corps of Engineers at Paintsville Lake promotes and encourages cold water safety whether at home on your farm pond, canoeing a stream, or visiting Paintsville Lake.

The Corps urges all cold weather enthusiasts to practice the following safety tips when participating in cold water sports.

- 1) Make a float plan. Tell someone where you are going, how long you will be gone and when you expect to return.
- 2) Utilize the buddy system. Take someone with you.
- 3) Dress properly - use multiple layers of appropriate thin clothing for trapping body heat.
- 4) Always wear a life jacket when around water. It won't work if you don't wear it.
- 5) Don't horseplay when on board a boat.
- 6) Make sure your boat is equipped with an engine kill switch and use it whenever you're underway.
- 7) Remember, water chills 25 times faster than air.
- 8) Remember, by November, the water temperature of a typical Corps lake may be as low as 55 degrees.
- 9) Hypothermia is a condition in which your body loses heat faster than it can produce it and it can occur in water that is 70 degrees Fahrenheit or below. If left untreated, death can occur. So, learn how to recognize it, how to prevent it and how to treat it.
- 10) Keep a first-aid kit with you and if you have one, a cellular telephone.

The list is endless, but one thing is for sure, water safety is no accident, so be careful out there!!

IF VOTER NEEDS ASSISTANCE IN VOTING

VOTER MAY HAVE ASSISTANCE IF:

1. Voter is blind
2. Voter is unable to read English
3. Voter has a physical disability which prevents the voter from voting without physical assistance

WHO MAY ASSIST THE VOTER:

1. Both Election Judges; or
2. Person of voter's choice except:—not voter's employer or agent of that employer—not officer or agent of voter's union—not a candidate to be voted upon.

WHAT IS THE PROPER PROCEDURE?

1. Voter completes the "Voter Assistance Form" (SBE-31) completely, including the reason assistance is needed, and signs name.
2. If any person other than the election judges assists the voter, that person must complete the portion of the form which is an OATH that the assistor will operate the machine as directed by the voter AND this OATH must be attested by the Clerk signing.
3. If the election judges assist the voter, the Democratic and Republican Judges must sign the OATH at the bottom, BOTH JUDGES will enter the machine with the voter, where in the presence of each other, the machine is operated in accordance with the directions of the voter.
4. Election officers should list the name of each assisted voter on the 'Record of Assisted Voters' (SBE-31A) form which should be returned with the election material as instructed.

VOTER MAY MAKE APPLICATION FOR PERMANENT ASSISTANCE TO VOTE

There is a portion of this form where the voter may request the Board of Elections to certify the voter as needing permanent assistance due to blindness or other physical disability. If the Board approves the voter's

request, voter will have permanent certification, relieving the VOTER ONLY from the responsibility of completing the oath. Even if a voter is certified for permanent assistance, the assistor(s) must still complete and sign their portion of the Oath.

Violations of the laws regarding Assistance to Vote should be reported to the Board of Elections immediately, and noted on the "Precinct Election Sheriff's Post Election Report" (SBE-53)

ELECTIONEERING

Electioneering is PROHIBITED WITHIN 300 FEET* of any entrance to a building in which a voting machine is located, if that entrance is unlocked and used by voters on election day.

Electioneering is defined by law as:

1. Display of signs
2. Distribution of campaign literature, cards or handbills
3. Solicitations of votes for or against any candidate or question on the ballot in any manner
4. Solicitation of signatures to any petition

The PRECINCT SHERIFF has the responsibility of ENFORCING the ELECTIONEERING LAWS within 50 FEET OF THE ENTRANCES. VIOLATIONS OF ELECTIONEERING WITHIN 300 FEET should be reported to the Board of Elections IMMEDIATELY.

The precinct Sheriff may request the assistance of any law enforcement officer to maintain law and order at the polls, but it is strongly suggested that Precinct Sheriff make that request through the Board of Elections. (County Board of Elections phone number 886-3816 or 1-800-481-2009)

Any violations of the electioneering laws should be entered on the "Precinct Sheriff's Post Election Report" (SBE-53)

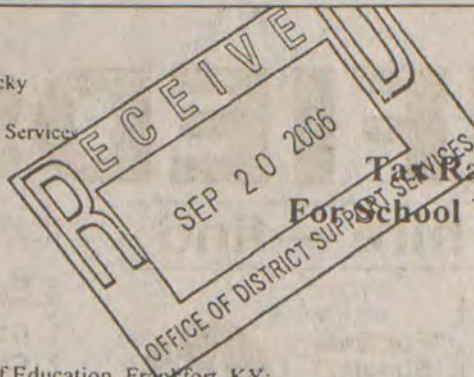
