State had 19 cases of salmonella

FRANKFORT — Kentucky's recent brush with salmonella is a little worse than previously thought, as state health officials announced the discovery Friday of four new suspected cases.

The Department for Public Health said state laboratory officials identified the cases stemming from the recent national outbreak, bringing to 19 the number of salmonella cases striking the Bluegrass.

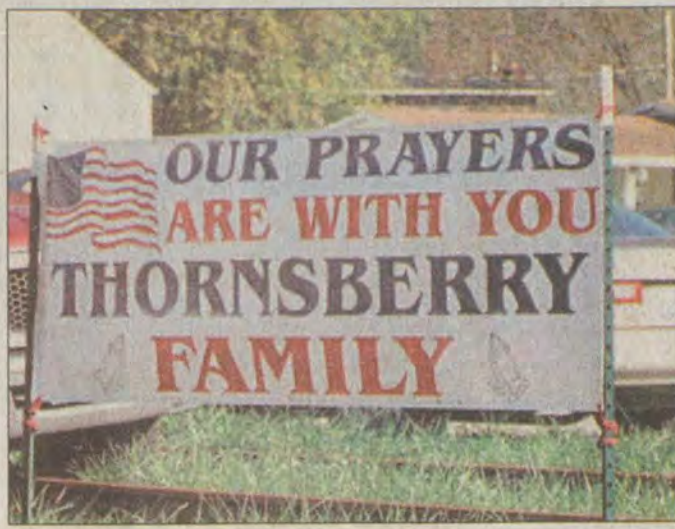
Previously, Kentucky health officials identified 15 cases that occurred in September. One of the new cases occurred in early October, according to the statement. Health officials are conducting additional tests to confirm the cases.

Health officials said Friday that contaminated fresh tomatoes served in restaurants were the cause of a recent salmonella outbreak that sickened dozens of people in 21 states.

The outbreak sickened at least 183 people, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. There were no reports of deaths, although 22 people were hospitalized. Interviews with victims led investigators to suspect restaurant tomatoes.

"We have identified tomatoes eaten in restaurants as the cause of this outbreak. We don't have any information that a name or a certain type of restaurant is involved. As far as we can tell, it's across the board," said Dr. Christopher Braden, a food-borne outbreak and surveillance expert with the CDC.

Community pays last respects to fallen Marine

McDOWELL — There were not enough seats for all of those who came to pay their respects to U.S. Marine Corps LCpl. Jonathan Brett Thornsberry at Little Rosa Old Regular Baptist Church on Friday.

Many people had to either stand or listen from the steps outside of the small church in

McDowell to hear the funeral service and get a final glimpse of Thornsberry, 22, who was killed Oct. 25 in Iraq when the Humvee he was riding in was hit by a roadside bomb just outside of Fallujah.

During Thornsberry's eulogy, given by his wife, Toni, she recounted how she had met him the first day of high school and how the two fell in love instantly and had been together ever

since. She said the last time she had spoken to him on the phone he said that he was not afraid and that the two said a prayer together.

"There is no more fear, no more suffering where he is," Toni Thornsberry said.

The service began with local members of Disabled American

Local police form 'net crimes task force

PRESTONSBURG — Local law enforcement agencies are teaming up to catch internet predators who are preying on children in the area.

Officials say they are doing their research and they plan to make this internet crimes unit effective at catching anyone who may attempt to lure in a child through the internet.

These days, the internet is something that has become a part of life.

More commonly, children often know more about the internet than their parents, which may put them in a vulnerable position. It's true that children are more willing than older generations to learn new technology, but sometimes a child's weaker maturity level may put them at risk for placing themselves in dangerous situations, all through the use of a home computer and an internet connection.

Floyd Co. Area Technology Center hosts regional meeting

GARTH — Floyd County Area Technology Center Principal Lenville Martin and his faculty and staff hosted over 100 people during the first of 10 Regional Cluster meetings held on Thursday, October 6.

Business and industry representatives, education administrators and instructors from Floyd, Breathitt, Knott, Letcher, and Pike counties came together to discuss technical education and skills training, and academic needs with education officials and program consultants from the Office of Career and Technical Education (OCTE). One of the major goals of the OCTE is to respond to the training needs of business and industry for the community. Continual technical and demographic changes necessitate the examination of programs to determine and identify ways that technical education programs

can be improved to deliver a more employable individual.

Breakout sessions in the areas of communication and information technology, construction technology, business technology, health and human services, manufacturing and transportation were held to address the types of skills employers want an entry-level employee to possess; how to improve employability skills; improving academic skills; improving technical skills attainment; work-based learning and industry certifications.

"From the comments we received, this meeting was a complete success. The ultimate value in this whole initiative is what will be developed to positively impact the students in all of our area technology centers on a statewide basis. Our mission is to develop a versatile individual by providing technical

education and skills training in a safe environment," said Martin. "Based on what the business and industry representatives relayed, we have a better perspective on what they expect from graduates of our programs. Not only are we looking at technical skills, we are looking for ways to improve the academic skills of the students who take our programs. We are in agreement that if these connections can be made, the final product will be a more employable individual."

The ten meetings taking place across the state are designed to identify regional issues. To address those regional issues, local representatives will be elected during each of the ten meetings to become members of an OCTE Statewide Advisory Committee. The committee will meet twice a year: once regionally and one time in

Frankfort to address the issues and concerns.

At the conclusion of the Floyd County meeting, three business people volunteered to serve on the statewide advisory committee to represent the region including: Mr. John Cobb, owner of J & K Contractors; Mr. Keith Akers, sales manager, Monumental Insurance of Allen; and Scott Hall, co-owner of OEM Retrofit of Prestonsburg.

"I think it is important for both the business and education systems to work together to produce the type of individual needed in today's workforce," said Cobb. "It's extremely important for the educational entities to get on the same page, to find out what the concerns are in business and indus-

Thornsberry was also honored Wednesday night in a ceremony where Toni Thornsberry was presented with a Purple Heart, which is awarded to members of the armed forces who are injured or killed in action.

Thornsberry was one of four Marines and one Navy sailor who were killed in the roadside bombing last week. There were more than 100 U.S. deaths in Iraq in October, making it the deadliest month of fighting in more than a year.

Thornsberry joined the Marine Corps in January 2004 and was deployed to Iraq Sept. 26, 2006. He was buried at Moore Cemetery at Doty Creek in McDowell.

Crime

Blackburn and the Floyd County Sheriff's Department are planning on playing a key role in the implementation of the new internet crimes unit along with the Prestonsburg Police Department, which has agreed to participate.

Lt. Shawn Roop, who works for the sheriff's department and who is also a professor of criminal justice at Big Sandy Community and Technical College, says they are inviting several other law enforcement agencies to participate, including Kentucky State Police and Kentucky Vehicle Enforcement. Roop said they have also been in contact with the Commonwealth's Attorney Brent Turner and County Attorney Keith Bartley to discuss the legalities of the operations that will be conducted.

Richard Roe, professor of information technology at BSCTC, is also going to be working closely with law enforcement officials with the investigations that will lead to these arrests. According to Roop, they are working to get a computer forensics option available at the college.

The goal of the internet crimes unit is to target predators who may be seeking children and teens. This unit will be run much like the one seen on NBC. Organizers say they are taking tips from Perverted Justice, the same organization used by NBC, and they've also been in contact with the Kentucky Bureau of Investigation, which will also be a part of the new internet crimes unit.

try and how to unite those issues and concerns with the opportunities that are available in the educational system. Based on that information, it makes sense to present viable solutions to government agencies so that changes can be made. Welfare rule is no reform

The ultimate antidote to poverty is education. It is true for the masses as well as a single individual. Where poverty breeds hopelessness, education fosters hope for a brighter future.

Mary Obeng has demonstrated that she believes in the power of education to change her life. A 19-year-old single mother of a 6-year-old son, Obeng attends Berea College where she is majoring in accounting and carrying a 3.0 grade-point average.

But Obeng, the subject of a recent newspaper article, must be wondering if the government wants her to succeed as much as she does.

Like a lot of poor, single parents in college, Obeng worries that she won't be able to cope with a new federal rule already in effect that says she must work 20 to 30 hours a week in order to continue receiving a welfare payment every month.

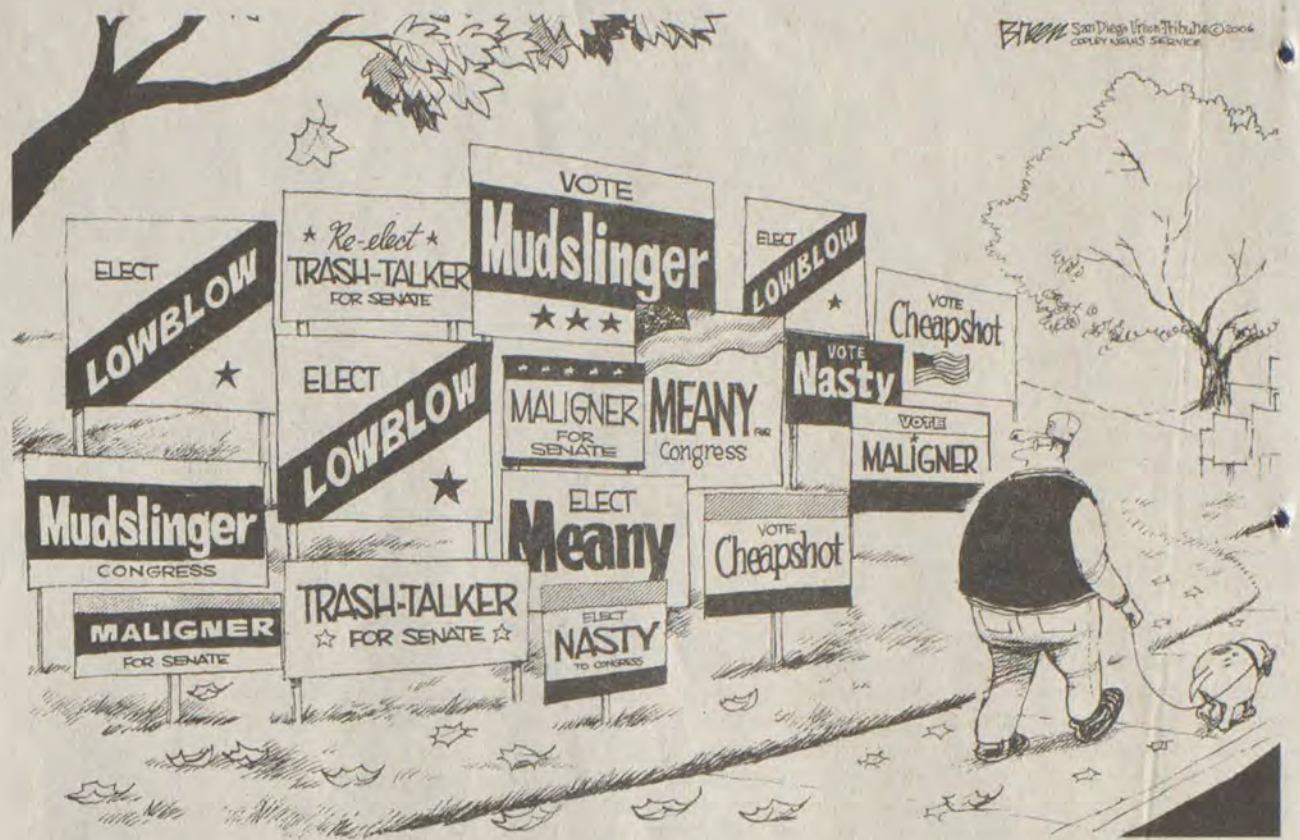
Obeng, who currently works about 10 hours a week in an on-campus job, receives a \$300 welfare check a month. Raising a child, attending classes, studying and working is about all Obeng can handle. Doubling or tripling her work requirement could force her to give up and drop out of school.

Welfare reform in this country has made great strides in cutting welfare roles and reducing welfare expenditures. But the new, stiff regulation that is about to deliver a blow to single-parent college students is counterproductive because it places a barrier in front of people who are seeking to remove themselves from welfare rolls permanently.

Obeng is facing a no-win situation. She needs the \$300 to get by. But if she has to spend a lot more time at a job, her education could suffer, threatening her and her son's long-term futures.

Sadly, an ill-advised rule has placed Obeng and others who share her plight in a no-win situation. A quick adjustment to the rule is in order. The federal government should be in the business of encouraging young single parents to further their education, not giving them a reason to fail.

Woodward's real revelation

Bob Woodward's latest blockbuster book, "State of Denial," is being sold on its bogus "revelation" that President Bush has been deceptive about poor security conditions in Iraq. The book's most important aspect isn't this "news," but the insight it gives into how the U.S. government has arrived at such a middling, uninspired campaign in Iraq — just enough not to win and just enough not to lose.

As State Department adviser Philip Zelikow thought after a visit to Iraq in 2005, in Woodward's words, "There was too much barely coping, just getting by and making incremental improvements."

We have been barely coping because we have never made a decision to go all-out, partly due to the restraining influence of Secretary of Defense Don Rumsfeld. Oddly, given the way he has become a hate-figure for Democrats, it is Rumsfeld who is perhaps closest to the Democrats' preferred Iraq strategy as any other major figure in the Bush administration.

He is not interested in trying to win the war outright, so much as handing the effort over to the Iraqis. According to Woodward, "Rumsfeld said strongly and repeatedly, the

Iraqis need to be given the chance to fail and fall on their faces, and only then would they pick themselves up, dust themselves off and come up with solutions."

This was a constant tension between Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice and Rumsfeld. She wanted to do more; he wanted to do less. They clashed over the creation of Provincial Reconstruction Teams in Iraqi provinces because Rice wanted the military to provide security and Rumsfeld wanted it handled by private contractors. They argued over security for Iraqi oil infrastructure, with Rice wanting more U.S. involvement and Rumsfeld less. Generally, the result has been a down-the-middle compromise, with the U.S. neither overwhelming our enemies nor letting the Iraqis sink or swim.

If Rumsfeld had had his way, we might have had one foot out the door already. In a meeting earlier this year in Baghdad, Rumsfeld raised the issue of reducing U.S. troop levels with Iraq Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki. Maliki was shocked. "It's way too early to be talking about that," he said. Rumsfeld's strategy

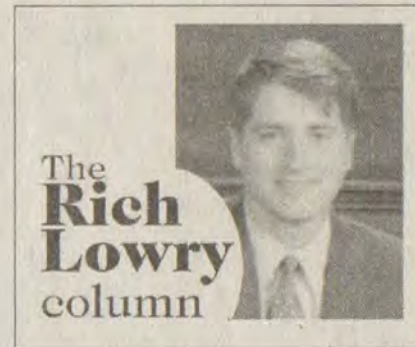
isn't outlandish in theory, but the fact is that the Iraqis haven't yet proven they are up to the burden he wants to place on them.

Rumsfeld has a tactic in minimizing the U.S. commitment in Iraq in top U.S. military commanders. Gen. John Abizaid believes that, according to Woodward, "the U.S. military had done all it could" in Iraq. Asked by his friends his

strategy for winning, Abizaid responded, "That's not my job." When he visited Rep. John Murtha, the cut-and-run Democrat, Abizaid put his fingers close together and said, "We're that far apart."

So it is that Bush's stalwartness in the Iraq War never quite seems to be matched by the means he applies on the ground. His administration has been riven by debilitating divisions on Iraq for too long. Bush should appoint an Iraq czar, whose charge it is to do everything possible to win at this late hour, and who will have every resource of government at his disposal. Lest the next Woodward book cover how the U.S. handled its ignominious exit.

Third parties: No money, no win

Donald Kaul is recovering from two deaths in his family. He is expected to return next week.

Three-term Sen. Joe Lieberman finds himself as a third-party candidate in Connecticut this year. He has raised at least \$15 million. Todd Chretien is also an independent running for U.S. Senate, but in California. How much has Chretien raised?

He has raised all of \$58,000, and his war chest — if you can call it that — is far more typical for a third-party candidate than Lieberman's.

Classic independent and third-party candidates face a whole host of challenges, from raising money to getting their names on the ballot to participating in debates and marketing their platform.

"We're talking about some very high hurdles here that need to be climbed," said Micah Sifry, author of the book "Spoiling for a Fight: Third-Party Politics in America."

The nonpartisan Center for Responsive Politics has found that the 74 federal third-party candidates still in the running this election cycle have raised a total of just \$3.1 million, according to campaign finance data available Oct. 19. (This includes only those candidates who would be new to Congress and who have reported raising at least some money to the Federal Election Commission.) Together, Republican and Democratic candidates — including incumbents and challengers — have raised 337 times that amount.

"A third-party candidate is at a fundraising disadvantage because of this perception that he won't likely win a partisan race," University of California-Riverside political scientist Martin Johnson said. "Without a large base of support for door-to-door campaigning or telephone banks, and less money for broadcast messages, third-party candidates have more trouble getting their message out than candidates in the major parties."

Although the Reform, Libertarian, and Green parties are better known, others like the Peace and Freedom, Natural Law and Marijuana parties pop up periodically and can inject a single issue into the larger debate. The only two third-party candidates currently in Congress both come from Vermont — Sen. James Jeffords, who will be retiring at the end of this session, and Rep. Bernie Sanders, who is running to replace him. In fundraising, minor-party and independent candidates are seemingly stuck in a Catch-22. The candidates need money to educate the public about their views, but because they rarely have national-party support, they can only raise money if the public is already familiar with them.

"In order to win an election, not only do I have to convince voters I'm the best candidate, I have to let them know I'm a candidate at all," said Michael Badnarick, a Libertarian candidate for Texas's 10th Congressional District and, with more than \$393,000 in receipts, the second-largest third-party fundraiser remaining in the midterm elections. He comes in behind Bruce Guthrie, who is running for the Washington Senate seat, mostly with \$1.2 million of his own money.

Most third-party candidates receive the bulk of their contributions from individual donors, rather than from political action committees of

corporations, labor unions and other interests. So far this election cycle, those 74 remaining ones have received 39 percent of their contributions from individuals, compared to less than 1 percent from PACs and 58 percent from their own pockets. The Reform Party actually calls for the elimination of political action committees as part of its platform.

Third-party candidates receive so little from PACs because the committees are interested in investing in winners, Sifry said. "PACs are in the business of buying access and influence. They don't make idle bets. Their money flows to incumbents and people they expect to be incumbents," he said.

Because of the way third-party candidates are perceived, and because of the challenge of raising money, many of these outsiders must seek creative new ways to educate voters about their platforms and what their party offers that the major parties don't. Eric Eidsness, a Reform Party candidate in Colorado's 4th Congressional District, uses both an interactive blog on his website and newspaper editorials to share his opinions on such issues as immigration, energy dependence and the war in Iraq.

"The great benefit of [being a third-party candidate]," Eidsness said, "is I am utterly liberated to speak from my heart without any restraint whatsoever."

Speaking without restraint, but also without money, such candidates may find that it's hard to be heard.

Her investigation is significantly more successful than Norris' and she soon finds herself in trouble. She turns to Norris for help but he doesn't arrive in time to save her which adds more fuel to his righteous fury.

Norris, now tortured by dreams which include flashbacks of all the stuff that just happened in the first half hour, decides to form an unlikely partnership with Chan's news editor as well as her father, who taught him how to beat the snot out of goons. The unlikely trio prove effective and they eventually stumble upon tapes of Chan's work, which reveal that a Triad gang out of Hong Kong is responsible. Turns out anchor women are much better crime investigators than San Francisco's finest.

It all ends at the posh villa of the film's secret bad guy, who you will probably guess is the culprit from his first appearance, though it takes Chuck over an hour to catch up. TOM: Well, start by telling him to calm down. First of all, it's not nice to yell at your beloved wife for any reason. Second, it's only a car. In fact, it's only a '93 LeSabre. And most important, you've made the car last 14 years, Nancy. You're obviously driving it

gently and doing a lot of things right. So there's no need for any riot acts to be read to anybody.

RAY: That said, you've got the overdrive thing completely backward, Nancy. Overdrive is, essentially, the highest gear. So, if you have a three-speed automatic transmission with overdrive, "overdrive" is fourth gear. Setting the shifter to overdrive means that you're allowing the transmission to use any of those four gears, right up through overdrive.

TOM: When you put the shifter in "drive," you keep the transmission from shifting any higher than third gear. So you're preventing it from going into overdrive.

RAY: There's really no good reason to limit the transmission to third gear. The more time you spend in your highest gear (overdrive), the better your gas mileage. And the higher the gear, the fewer times the engine turns for the same amount of distance traveled, so the longer the engine lasts. So, basically, Nancy, you want to put the shifter in overdrive all the time.

TOM: You're fortunate in that you have an automatic transmission. That means it figures out what gear it needs to be in, how? Automatically! So just let it do its job.

RAY: There are a few rare situations — normally hilly roads — when you might want to be out of overdrive. One is when you're going 35-45 miles per hour — where the transmission will be right on the edge between third gear and overdrive. In that situation, the transmission might "hunt," going back and forth between those gears trying to find the right one. Some people find that annoying. So in a situation like that, it's fine to shift down into drive temporarily to stop it from hunting. But it's not necessary.

TOM: And when you're going down a long, steep grade, it's good to downshift to a lower gear — third, second or even first — so that engine braking keeps your speed under control, and you don't overheat your brakes.

RAY: But other than that, the best thing to do is just put it in overdrive the moment you leave your driveway, and then forget all about it.

Can do-it-yourselfer do this himself?

My wonderful boyfriend has recently discovered that he enjoys working on our vehicles, and it has become his new money-saving hobby. He has always changed the oil (though a lot of it always

ended up on the driveway), and he recently moved on to brakes. But now he's determined to up the ante and replace the timing belt on my 1990 Toyota Camry. He has the Chilton manual, so he feels confident. I am just a bit nervous myself. Should I be? What do you think are his chances for success, and how long should I plan to be taking the bus? — Charmaine

RAY: The time to get nervous would've been when he worked on your brakes, Charmaine. I mean, if he screws up the timing belt, the engine stops running. But if he screws up the brakes, then he's sending you an unmistakable message about the future of the relationship.

TOM: Actually, it's a big step from brakes to a timing belt. The main obstacle can be the crankshaft pulley. That pulley needs to be removed in order to change the belt. And sometimes, removing it ain't easy.

RAY: We have a special puller we use for the job.

TOM: Yeah, his name's Bruno. He weighs 350 pounds.

RAY: No, a puller is a tool that maximizes the pulling force. But even that doesn't work sometimes, and we have to use the oxyacetylene torch to heat up the pulley and

expand it until we can pull it off.

TOM: And the older the car is, the more likely the crankshaft pulley is frozen on there.

RAY: So he can try it, Charmaine. If he gets the pulley off, the rest of the job on a four-cylinder Camry is quite manageable.

TOM: And if he can't get the pulley off, then he can just have the car towed to his local garage, fess up and let them finish the job.

RAY: Of course, it might take him a week or so to admit defeat, screw up the courage to confess, and have the car towed. So if I were you, Charmaine, I'd pick up at least a one-month bus pass.

with great scenery, San Francisco, and a cast of talented thespians who prop up Norris' acting chops, which need considerably more help than his judo chops.

Acting-wise, this is a real who's who. Terry Kiser shows that he was the perfect choice to play a corpse in "Weekend at Bernie's" as Chuck's ill-rated partner. He's only on screen for a few minutes before he is promptly incinerated, but he returns in Norris' dreams and we are treated to his death scene again and again. Rosalind Chow ("Deep Space Nine") is also effective as Kiser's equally unlucky girlfriend.

What this film really needs is colorful villains to offset the bland heroics of Norris, and Carver provides them with two ideal choices. Veteran British actor Christopher Lee turns up as the criminal mastermind behind the heroin ring and relishes his scenes wherein he examines his victims like cells under a microscope before calmly telling his henchman to terminate them.

His terminator is also a surprise as played by hulking ex-wrestling star Professor Toru Tanaka. He is an 1980s

Oddjob who lets his muscles do the talking. One great bit has him getting frustrated that a victim had escaped, which sees him takes out his anger on a helpless Volkswagen. The expression on the car's driver is priceless.

There are a few problems, though. The film has an uneven tone which finds people tortured one minute and then gives you scenes of Chuck talking to his dog Morty as if they were auditioning for one of those cutesey flicks where a cop teams up with a talking pooch. Though the final fight sequence is good, most of the others aren't well executed or a showcase for Norris' style. A fight set on a steam ship is so dimly lit that you can't tell if Norris is thumping thugs or cocktail waitresses.

All in all it's an enjoyable time waster but you'll be wishing the producers had went all out and let Norris team with Shaft to take down Dracula. Now that's a Norris, Roundtree and Lee film I'd like to see.

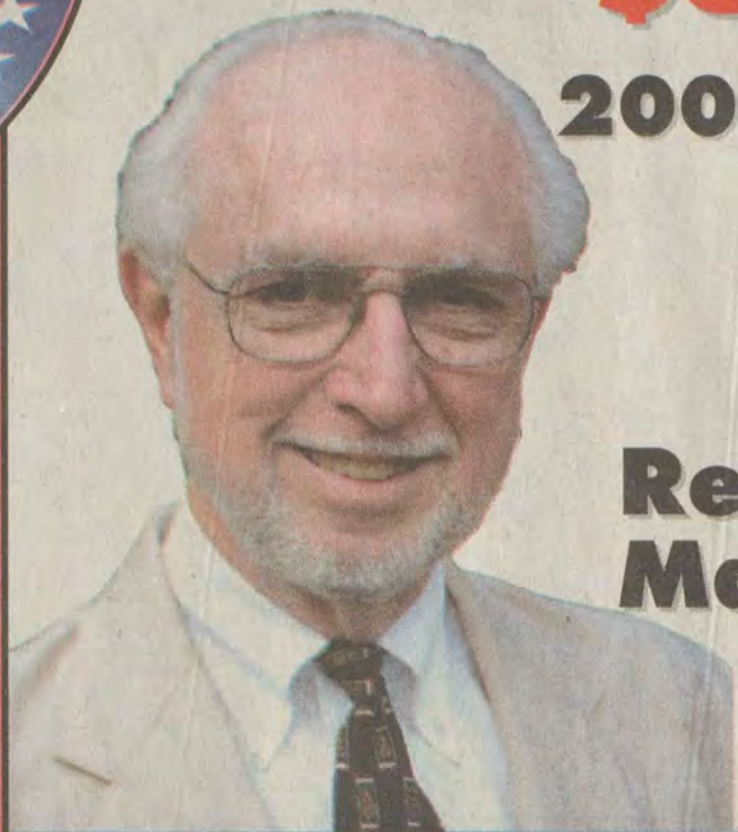

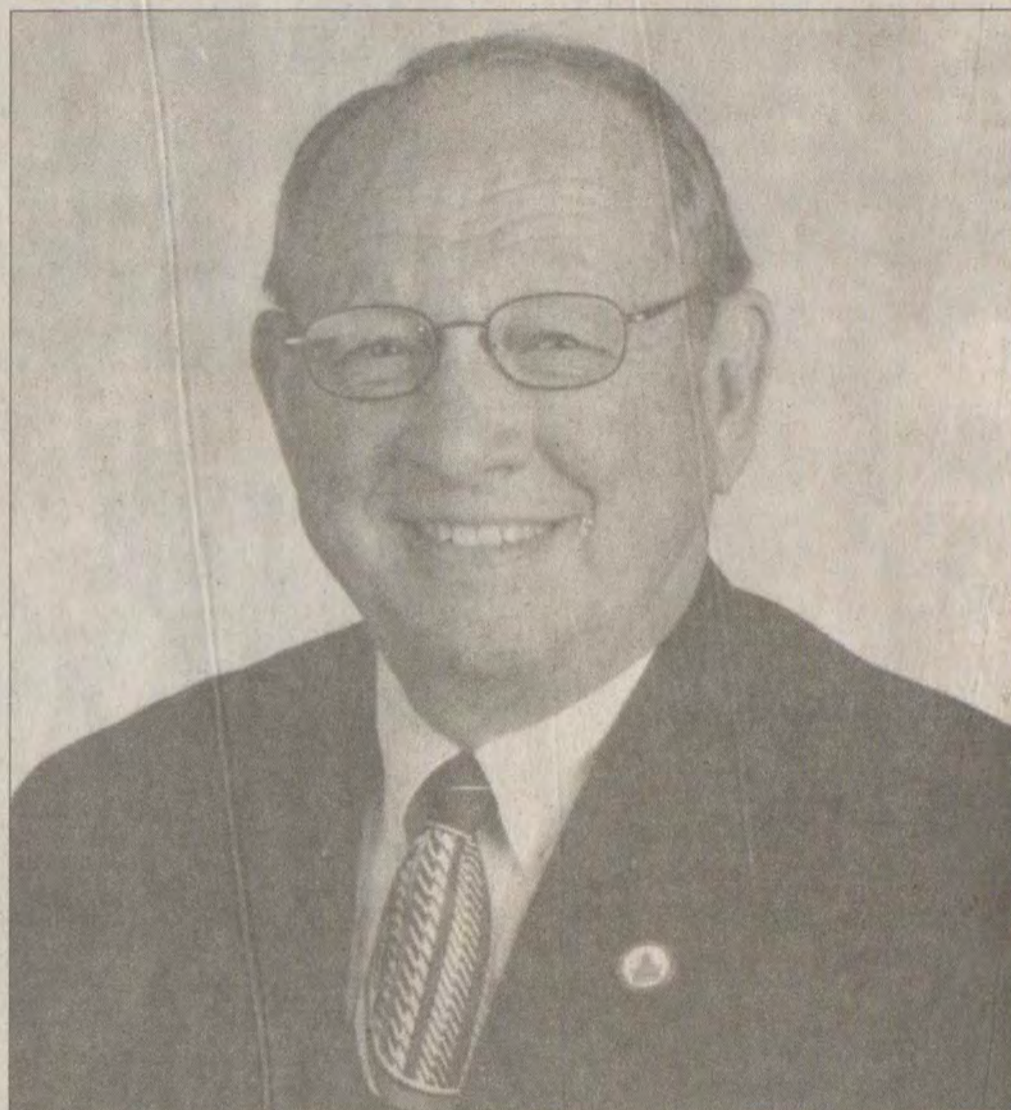

Bengals, Ravens vie for AFC North lead

BALTIMORE — The Baltimore Ravens have apparently found the solution to their offensive woes.

The Cincinnati Bengals are still searching.

Convinced that Baltimore's sluggish attack was in need of a radical change, coach Brian Billick fired offensive coordinator Jim Fassel and assumed the play-calling responsibilities. The move immediately produced the desired results: an uplifting 35-22 victory over the New Orleans Saints last Sunday.

Jamal Lewis ran 31 times for 109 yards, both season highs, and Steve McNair went 17-for-23 with two touchdowns and no interceptions. Baltimore led 28-7 at halftime and finished with a 13-minute advantage in time of possession.

If the Ravens (5-2) can build on that effort and beat the Bengals (4-3) on Sunday, they will open a two-game lead on the defending AFC North champions.

"We set the bar. We know what we can do offensively," McNair said. "Now we've got to keep it going. To go up two games at this point in the season, it's going to be hard for people to catch up."

The Bengals opened with three straight victories, but have since lost three of four. The fault lies primarily on an offense that has not come close to matching its productivity of a year ago.

Touchdowns have been

scarce, opinions plentiful. Running back Rudi Johnson questioned the play-calling after receiving only 12 carries in a loss to Atlanta last week; right tackle Willie Anderson believes the team needs to get tougher; and quarterback Carson Palmer pointed the finger of blame directly at himself.

"When you lose, you've got to question everything," Bengals coach Marvin Lewis said. "The Ravens experienced that a couple of weeks ago."

Lewis learned much from Billick while serving as a defensive coordinator in Baltimore, but he has no intention of following the lead of his former boss by firing embattled offensive coordinator Bob Bratkowski. Rather, Lewis hopes the Bengals will right themselves with another feel-good performance against the Ravens.

Cincinnati beat Baltimore twice last year, 21-9 and 42-29. In the latter game, Palmer threw three touchdown passes in an eight-minute span to help Cincinnati take a 34-0 lead.

T.J. Houshmandzadeh had nine catches for 147 yards and a touchdown, and Chad Johnson finished with five receptions for 88 yards and a score.

The key to their success? Maybe it's because the Bengals relish the challenge of facing Baltimore, a team built around devastating defense that annually ranks among the best in the league.

"I think offensively we kind of play up to the level of our competition sometimes,"

Palmer said. "You've got to bring your best game, and it's happened that we've played very well against them."

Houshmandzadeh and Chad Johnson usually receive man-to-man coverage from the Ravens, and this time they will be facing a unit that has permitted 11 completions of 30 yards or more, including five last week in New Orleans.

"As a defensive unit, you never want to give up yards," Ravens cornerback Chris McAlister said. "But this is the NFL. Those guys get paid like we do to make plays."

Guys like Johnson, who already has a touchdown celebration in mind for the Ravens.

"I have some special, special stuff for the city of Baltimore," he said. "You know, 85 is coming to town. Hopefully, I can get in the end zone so I can show them what I've got in store."

Not if McAlister can help it.

"As a defense, we just have to stay true to our technique, go out and execute as we have in the past," said McAlister, who has three interceptions. "Bottom line, we have to stop the ball from going over our head. We do that, it's going to be hard for anyone to score points against us."

If the Bengals can't score enough to outdo Baltimore's overhauled offense, they will fall to .500 for the first time since 2004. But a victory will put Cincinnati in excellent position heading into the second half of the season.

"That's what it's about. You

No. 5 Louisville 44, No. 3 West Virginia 34

LOUISVILLE — Welcome to the national championship hunt, Louisville.

Brian Brohm threw for 354 yards and a touchdown, and the fifth-ranked Cardinals took advantage of key mistakes by No. 3 West Virginia for an impressive 44-34 victory Thursday night that could give them an inside track to the Bowl Championship Series title game.

The win will likely lift Louisville (8-0, 3-0 Big East) to at least fourth

in next week's BCS poll — it was fifth this week — and could be the spring board the Cardinals need to propel them into the national championship game if they manage to run the table.

But first, they must get past another undefeated conference foe. Louisville plays at No. 15 Rutgers (8-0, 3-0) next Thursday night.

"Now the biggest game in Louisville history is this Rutgers game coming up," Brohm said.

The Cardinals avenged last year's triple-overtime loss to the Mountaineers (7-1, 2-1) by returning a fumble and a punt for touchdowns

during a pivotal three-minute stretch in the third quarter. Then, they delivered on their offseason motto to "finish."

West Virginia quarterback Pat White ran for 125 yards and four touchdowns and added 222 yards through the air. But he couldn't overcome three turnovers and a relentless Louisville offense that racked up 473 total yards and kept the Mountaineers on their heels all night.

Heisman Trophy hopeful Steve Slaton ran for 156 yards and a touchdown for the Mountaineers, but fumbled on consecutive snaps in the

third quarter — apparently bothered by weakness in his left arm. Louisville's Malik Jackson returned the second one 13 yards for a score that gave the Cardinals a 23-14 lead, and Trent Guy added a 40-yard punt return four plays later, pushing Louisville's advantage to 30-16 with 9:23 left in the third quarter.

And unlike last season — when the Mountaineers rallied from 17-point fourth-quarter deficit to stun the Cardinals 46-44 — there would be no miracle comeback this year.

Though White led the Mountaineers on a pair of touch-

down drives to get them back in it, the Cardinals responded each time with a score of their own. Brohm connected with Mario Urrutia on a 6-yard TD and Anthony Allen added a 5-yard touchdown run to keep the Cardinals safely in front.

Forced to abandon its high-powered running game to catch up, the Mountaineers simply couldn't keep pace as their school-record 14-game winning streak ended while a packed Papa John's Stadium crowd — clad mostly in black T-shirts that read "Beat WVU" — stormed the field.

Tyndall returns home to resurrect Morehead State

MOREHEAD — Donnie Tyndall spent the spring and summer stumping for the Morehead State men's basketball program, shaking hands, kissing babies and calling every season ticket holder to thank them for their support and promising better days.

Like any good politician, Tyndall didn't promise when those better days will come. Maybe this year, maybe next year. With a young team featuring eight new faces at a program that went just 4-23 last season, Tyndall knows it's not wise to get caught up in the details.

"I think we're hungry for a winner," said Tyndall, who replaced Kyle Macy as head coach in April.

It's a hunger Tyndall grew familiar with while playing at Morehead State for three seasons before graduating in 1993.

"I wasn't a guy that was fortunate enough to play at Duke, Kansas or North Carolina," he said. "I had to scrape by, and hopefully my team will adopt that attitude."

Tyndall spent the last dozen years making his way up the coaching food chain, including assistant and associate coaching stops at LSU, Idaho and Middle Tennessee.

Now he finds himself back at his alma mater hoping to get the program pointed back in the right direction.

His first — and probably most important — task will be trying to convince his players that "winning" and "Morehead State" aren't mutually exclusive terms.

"Anytime you struggle through a four-win season, kids aren't feeling great about what they accomplished," he said. "People in the community felt like the program wasn't on solid ground."

Tyndall started laying the foundation soon after taking over, urging established players like Shaun Williams to get in the weight room. Williams, who led the team in scoring (16.4 ppg) and rebounding (6.4 rpg) last season, dropped 15 pounds off his 6-foot-7 frame and cut his body fat to eight percent.

Tyndall thinks Williams' slimmer look should allow him to post even better numbers this season, though Williams — whom Tyndall thinks was asked to do too much last season — should also benefit from some much-needed help. Tyndall brought in guard Nikola Stojakovic to run the offense in hopes of bringing some order on both ends of the court. Stojakovic won't put up spectacular numbers, but became a proven winner at Highlands Community College, which went 34-2 last season.

"He's like a coach on the floor," Tyndall said. "He doesn't turn the ball over. He makes great decisions, which is what you want from your point guard."

Swingman Jamyron Stewart and forward Ryan Allen should give the Eagles a more athletic frontcourt, hopefully allowing them to compete better in the lane. The Eagles were rebounded by nearly four boards a game last season. Tyndall envisions a hard-working, defense-oriented team that will hopefully get some momen-

tum by the time Ohio Valley Conference play begins.

"I'm not saying there aren't challenges, but when I went to LSU there were challenges, at Idaho and Middle there were challenges," he said. "It's about selling the positives you have. It's about working hard. The climate has slowly started to change."

Freshmen to play major role for Cardinals

LOUISVILLE — Edgar Sosa stole the ball, darted to the lane and dunked it. As the ball slammed through the net, the Louisville freshman guard ran back up the court, raising his arms above his head in celebration.

It was the kind of youthful exuberance that was hard to come by in Louisville last season, as the Cardinals limped to a 21-13 record in a year bogged down by injuries, inconsistency and exaggerated expectations.

But Sosa and fellow freshmen Earl Clark, Jerry Smith and Derrick Character are hoping to put the spring back in Louisville's step by providing the Cardinals with the kind of high-energy play that was lacking at times last season.

"It's a very talented group of freshmen, it really is," said coach Rick Pitino. "I venture to say before it's through, if they stay together this will be the best recruiting class I've ever had."

Strong words from a coach who has guided the careers of future NBA

stars Jamal Mashburn and Antoine Walker while coaching at Kentucky. But if the Cardinals want to return to the NCAA Tournament, they'll have to rely heavily on the class that Pitino thinks is ready to compete in the Big East right away.

"Even though we're young, with this group, they're so willing to learn, they're so spirited, I don't think it will take a lot of time (to gel)," Pitino said.

The key, Pitino said, is Character. The 6-foot-8 forward could provide the Cardinals with a physical presence they desperately needed last season. He's lost over 40 pounds since arriving on campus this summer, and has "Charles Barkley-like" ability, according to his coach.

"It all depends on Derrick," Pitino said. "Derrick's got a lot of growing up to do."

Yet Character has shown Pitino that he's willing to work through his weight problems, and the early returns have been dramatic. He sparkled during a preseason scrimmage just hours after finally getting down to the 275-pound barrier Pitino said Character needed to crack in order to get on the floor.

"I'm just trying to bring more energy and size," Character said. "I'm just trying to help out (center) David Padgett. He didn't get a lot of help last year. I think I'll be able to contribute a lot this year."

Character and Clark will provide help in the frontcourt, with Sosa and

Smith splitting duties in the backcourt. Sosa has come so far he's already battling sophomore Andre McGee for the starting point guard spot, while Smith should see significant time at shooting guard while senior Brandon Jenkins recovers from a broken leg.

"I'm way ahead of where I thought I'd be," Sosa said. "I thought this was a learning year for me and watch Andre play. But coach told me I could contribute so I'm going to get in the gym every night and try my best."

Pitino compares the excitable Sosa to former Louisville star Francisco Garcia, who helped the Cardinals to the Final Four in 2005.

"He's the type of guy you know, when he scores a bucket, he thinks he just won the Super Bowl," Pitino said. "So we've just got to calm that element up so he can get in the press. But we don't want to channel that emotion down. Everybody has great respect for his fire and passion for the game."

It's a passion that comes out when the lights come up, Sosa said.

"I usually play better in games," Sosa said. "I work hard in practice, but I just play better in games."

That gamesmanship will be necessary as the Cardinals look to replace departed guard Taquan Dean, who seemed to take every big shot last season. While Sosa will hardly be first in line to put it up, his willingness is part of what has Pitino so

excited.

"We've got to push our learning curve," Pitino said. "If we can just withstand that big, big rush the first month of the season, we'll be fine."

The freshmen also have the luxury of playing with a group of sophomores that learned from last year's mistakes. Pitino heralded last year's incoming class — including guards Terrence Williams and Andre McGee — as one of his best. Yet saddled with a Top 10 preseason ranking and

major injuries that forced them to take on responsibilities they might not have been ready for, last year's freshmen struggled.

"We can teach them," Williams said. "Our heads were on cloud nine last year, especially on media day. We got to talk to all these people, we got all these questions and then we ended up in the NIT. We can show them the dos and don'ts, the right track and the wrong track."

Louisville 94, Georgetown, Ky., 92

LOUISVILLE — Louisville freshman forward Derrick Character scored 25 points and grabbed 11 rebounds to lead the Cardinals to a 94-92 win over Georgetown (Ky.) in exhibition play on Wednesday night at Freedom Hall.

Edgar Sosa added 15 points and Juan Palacios scored 14 for Louisville, which struggled against the Tigers, an NAIA school located about an hour east of Louisville.

Justin Taylor and Jason Petrimoulx led Georgetown with 18 points apiece, and the Tigers had their chances in the final minutes, briefly taking the lead with 5:25 to go and keeping it interesting until the very end.

Character, the marquee player in Louisville's recruiting class, looked ready to play after an offseason conditioning program that shaved 45 pounds off his 6-foot-8 frame. He played 25 minutes, shooting 9-of-16 from the floor and having his way in the lane at times.

Yet the Cardinals' inability to hold onto the ball (23 turnovers) and poor free-throw shooting (30-of-51 from the line) allowed the Tigers to keep it close.

Georgetown hung around after the Cardinals sprinted to a 15-point first-half lead as Louisville looked very much like a team playing after just two weeks of practice.

The Cardinals open the season on Nov. 18 against Northwestern State.

WKU football will make move to I-A

OWENSBORO — Western Kentucky University will move to compete in Division I-A football next year.

The school's board of regents voted 7-2 Thursday in favor of the switch, with one regent abstaining.

Western will submit paperwork to the NCAA office before June 1 and will be considered a reclassifying school for the 2007 and '08 seasons. The first year the Hilltoppers will be eligible to participate for a Sun Belt Conference championship and a berth in a bowl game is 2009.

They won a Division I-AA championship in 2002.

"I think that the greatest benefit is going to be the prestige and the per-

ception, the value of the WKU brand," athletics director Wood Selig said.

WKU President Gary Ransdell said he is confident the football program will improve.

"I literally and figuratively handed a Sun Belt Conference football to our athletic director and made it known that I'm now turning my attention to building an honors program," WKU President Gary Ransdell said. "In essence moving on to more important matters."

Selig is sure the university has lost students and student-athletes because of the football team's classification.

The Hilltoppers have faced I-A competition, with poor results in recent years against Wisconsin, Auburn and Georgia. The Hilltoppers will play a schedule of 11 I-A teams and one I-AA team, Selig said.

"We don't anticipate playing Georgia and Auburn 12 times a year," he said.

The Hilltoppers are working on scheduling series with Navy, Vanderbilt and Indiana, Selig said.

One obstacle Western will face will be the attendance requirement. The NCAA says Division I-A teams must average 15,000 paid attendance for home football games. The Hilltoppers are averaging around 9,500 this season. There are plans to expand their Smith Stadium from 17,500 seats to 22,000.

Selig said the university has an aggressive strategy to boost that category. The school plans to rearrange student seating, get help from corporate partners and market tickets aggressively within a 70-mile radius.

The idea to make the move came under university President Gary Ransdell's "Challenging the Spirit" program, designed to encourage the university to think on a national level rather than a regional one. Ransdell has said the competition change is vital to the university's academic and financial future.

Chase shaping up to be a 2-man race between Kenseth and Johnson

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — What looked to be a wide-open Chase for the championship last week might actually only be a two-man race to the title.

It would be fitting if it indeed comes down to a race between Matt Kenseth and Jimmie Johnson, because they were the best of the field during the regular season. The two combined to hold down the top spot in the standings for the entire 26 weeks before the Chase for the championship started.

Now they head into the final three races of the year with just 26 points separating Kenseth from second-place Johnson. Although Denny Hamlin, Jeff Burton and Dale Earnhardt Jr. are all within striking distance, the Nextel Cup is more than likely Kenseth's or Johnson's to lose.

And, for the first time, Johnson likes his chances.

"I had a great dream about being a champion. That's the first time for me in my championship battles ... I had the sensation of being a champion," he said. "I didn't have the full visual of standing on the stage or anything, (but) every thought I have about it fills me up with excitement and happiness, where in the past, I almost had nightmares."

"When I would think of the championship laying there before I'd go to sleep at night ... everything was kind of fear-based. This year, everything as I doze off and go to sleep, I'm smiling and I'm like, 'Man, I can't wait to get to Texas and Phoenix and Homestead and race for this thing.'"

Kenseth, who won the 2003 championship under NASCAR's old system, isn't as wild about his chances as Johnson.

After putting together a late-summer surge that cemented him as the driver to beat, Kenseth has been frustrated with his team's performance through the first part of the Chase. The dominance they'd shown earlier was gone, and tiny mistakes have been sabotaging their efforts. After a particularly lackluster run in Charlotte, he flatly said his team was "kidding ourselves thinking we can win a championship operating like (that)."

So he refused to celebrate when he moved into the points lead two weeks ago, accepting that his top spot in the standings was the result of the failure of others. But a fourth-place run last week in Atlanta buoyed his spirits, and Kenseth isn't as pessimistic about his chances as just a few weeks ago.

"We finally showed that we can run with the leaders again, and that was encouraging," Kenseth said. "There's three more to go, and if we can con-

tinue to work like we did in Atlanta, then we'll have a shot. But we've got to be on our game because (Johnson) is very good and that team is capable of clicking off wins and running well."

Of course, no one is dismissing the rest of the competition. But last week's race in Atlanta gave Kenseth and Johnson significant separation, leaving Hamlin, Burton and Earnhardt with the best — albeit slim — hope of catching them.

Heading into Texas Motor Speedway this weekend, Hamlin is 65 points out in third place, while Burton and Earnhardt are tied for fourth, 84 points back.

Burton, who looked invincible two weeks ago, isn't giving up.

"We're one race away or one poor finish away from one of the top two guys from being right back in it," he said. "We feel good about the position we're in, (but) we also understand that

we are probably going to have to have a little help.

"In today's environment, a little bit of help is not out of the realm of possibilities."

And Earnhardt plans on using Texas this weekend as the place he closes the gap. His confidence is always soaring at that track, where he scored his first career victories in both the Busch and Nextel Cup series.

"Texas was the place where I realized I could make a career out of racing," he said. "Before our Busch Series win there in '98, I wasn't sure I was going to make it as a race car driver. I was living in a doublewide and trying to get my career going. I hadn't had much success in racing up to that point, but we won that race at Texas, and it set the foundation for our championship that year."

Now he hopes Sunday's race will do the same thing for him.

2-time champ Terry Labonte ready to retire

First, he was Texas Terry, the smooth, young driver from Corpus Christi with all the potential in the world.

Then he became the Ice Man, known for his cool demeanor and unflappable personality.

A little further down the NASCAR road, Labonte became the Iron Man, setting a record with 655 consecutive NASCAR starts, a mark later broken by Ricky Rudd.

In the end, though, the two-time series champion wants to be remembered simply as Terry Labonte, a guy who got to live his dream for nearly three decades.

"None of those names meant much to me," said Labonte, who will make the 848th and final start of his 29-year Cup career Sunday at Texas Motor

Speedway. "I was just doing my job and enjoying myself."

Labonte will be feted this week in Texas with a dinner, gifts, a special paint job on his car and a pre-race ride around the 1.5-mile TMS oval, allowing the 200,000 fans expected Sunday to show their love and appreciation for his contributions to the sport.

All of it likely will be more embarrassing than thrilling to the quiet man. But it is only appropriate that Labonte, a member of the Texas Hall of Fame since 2001, will end his distinguished career in the Lone Star State.

And Labonte, who cut back to a limited schedule in 2005 to spend more time with his family and to enjoy the fruits of his long, successful career, said there are no second thoughts or regrets about calling it quits nine days before his 50th birthday.

"I still feel the same way about my decision," he said in an interview last week. "I think my wife asks me about that every other week. But I still feel good about it and I'm still looking forward to going to Texas and running that race."

"Hopefully, we're going to have a good run. That's my biggest concern.

But, as far as how I'll feel after the race is over, I don't really think I'll feel any differently."

Barring an upset win in Sunday's Dickies 500, Labonte will finish his illustrious career with 22 victories, the last in 2003 in the Southern 500 at Darlington Raceway, the same track at which he made his Cup debut with a fourth-place finish in 1978.

Gary Dehart, a crew member on the Billy Hagan car that Labonte drove to his 1984 championship and crew chief when Labonte won his second title in 1996 with Hendrick Motorsports, said the driver always has had something special.

"I don't think there's anyone out there that drives a car like Terry," Dehart said. "He's very consistent and very smooth. If you were to ever go to a test and watch Terry make lap after lap after lap, you'd see how consistent and precise he is. I think that's his biggest attribute."

Team owner Rick Hendrick said his on-track ability is obvious, but notes it's who Labonte is off the track that makes him special.

"He'll always do what's best for the team, even if it puts him in an awkward spot," said Hendrick, who took a chance on Labonte in 1994,

after the driver had struggled for several years. "I looked at his statistics early in his career and I couldn't believe how well he'd run with the equipment he was in. He's always been a team player and a great friend."

"Terry could've accomplished even more in his career had he been a little more selfish," Hendrick added. "But there's not a selfish bone in his body. He's a great talent, but he's just a great human being."

Bobby Labonte, the 2000 Cup champion, always has admired his older brother and will be the one who misses him most at the race track.

"One of the things I'm going to miss is not having him parked next to me in the motorcoach lot," Bobby said. "We always park next to each other and I've enjoyed that. It was a little different not having him around much the past two seasons, but now he won't be there (at all)."

"One of my first jobs in racing was working on my brother's car at Hagan Enterprises. I learned a lot about the sport by watching him and I know that has helped me with my career. He always helped me when I needed it. It didn't matter what it was."

The elder Labonte said he has no doubts he still could be driving a full-

time schedule, if that's what he wanted to do.

"Oh, I could, yeah," he said. "I think if you're going to do it, you need to either get in or out. This limited deal, I really like it a lot, but it was a little harder than I thought it was going to be."

"I think we'd be a lot better if we ran every weekend just because I can't really tell the guys on my team how to fix my car. I can tell them what it's doing but, with these setups that we run today, I don't have enough experience with them. I can't come in and say do this and do that, where I used to do that. It's just difficult that way."

Asked if he might change his mind and drive at least a few Cup races in 2007, Terry Labonte shrugged and said, "I had someone come knock on my door in Charlotte (three weeks ago) wanting to know if I wanted to go to Atlanta (last weekend), and I said, 'Nope.' The guy says, 'So I don't need to talk money?' I said, 'Nope.'"

"I just don't really have no desire to do it. Maybe after I sit out for a while I might change my mind or start missing it or something but, as of right now, I sure am looking forward to life after the Texas race."

Hopes high as modern gun season opens Friday

State wildlife officials say the conditions are right for hunters to take a record number of white-tailed deer this season.

"Because of the mild winter and wet spring, we had a large number of healthy fawns this year," said Tina Brunjes, big game coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Fish and

Wildlife Resources. "The potential is there to exceed the (record) 2004 harvest, if the weather cooperates."

Kentucky's deer herd has an estimated 900,000 animals, an all-time high. Modern gun season, the time when hunters take the most deer, opens statewide Friday (Nov. 11).

Hunters took a record 124,000 deer in 2004, but the harvest dropped to 112,000 last season. Trees were so

loaded with acorns and other nuts in 2005 that deer did not have to move far to find food, which limited their exposure to hunters. However, this year's mast crop appears more normal, which along with clear, cold weather could increase deer movement and help hunter success in the woods.

Hunters must wear hunter orange clothing on their head, back and chest

whenever a firearms season for deer is open.

Modern gun deer season ends Nov. 20 in Zones 3 and 4 and Nov. 26 in Zones 1 and 2. Check the 2006-07 Kentucky Hunting and Trapping Guide for a map of deer season zones and for bag limits, equipment restrictions and other regulations for deer hunting.

Late crossbow season set to get underway

Area hunters can still crossbow hunt during 2006. Due to a typographical error in Kentucky 2006-07 Hunting and Trapping Guide, one page

incorrectly listed the start of late crossbow season for deer and turkey. The late crossbow season begins Friday (Nov. 11), coinciding with the start of the statewide modern gun season for deer. The late crossbow season extends until Dec. 31. The season-opening date is correct elsewhere in the guide, including the summary page of the state's hunting seasons.

Early crossbow season for

deer and turkey went from Oct. 1-22.

Archery season for deer and turkey opened Sept. 2 and continues through Jan. 15, 2007.

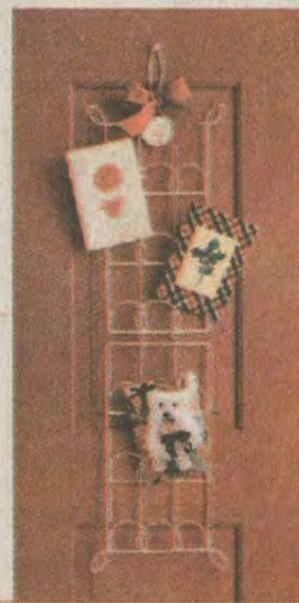

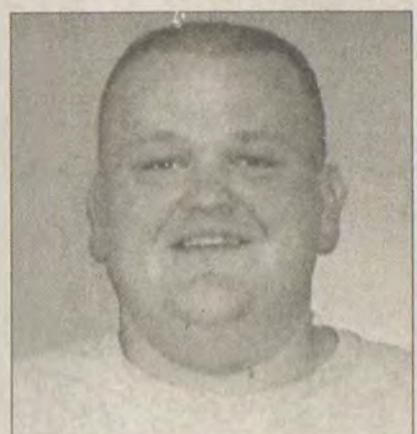

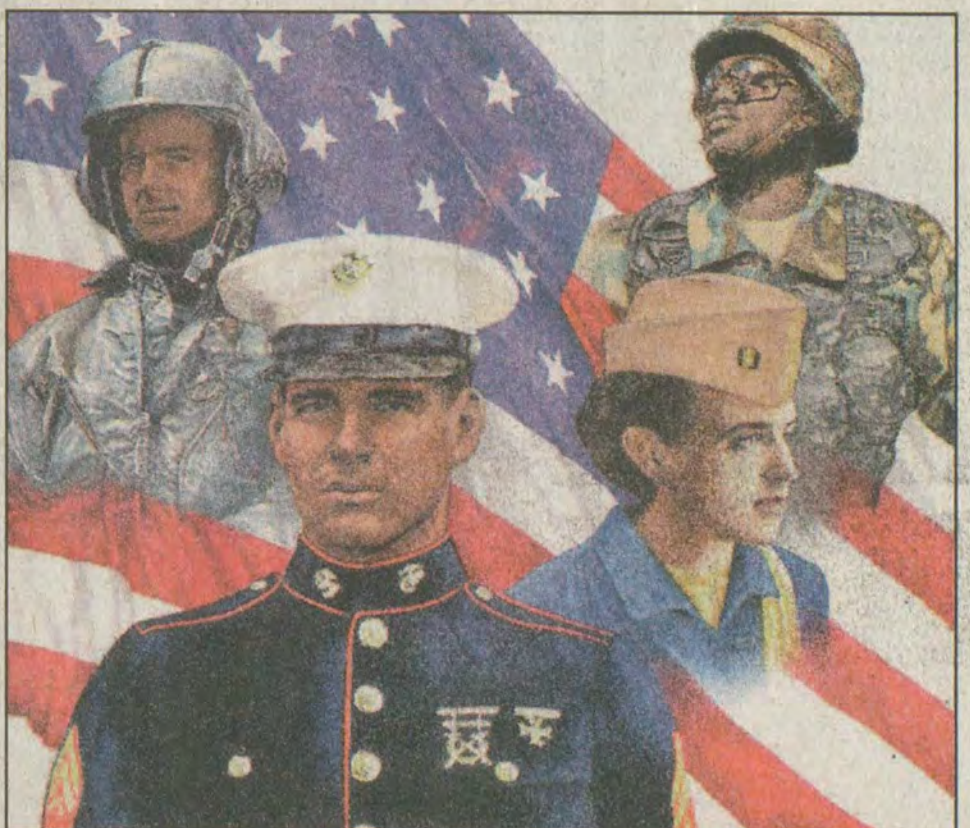
