235 call vote fraud hotline

FRANKFORT — Attorney General Greg Stumbo announced today that his Election Fraud Hotline received 235 complaints from voters between 6 a.m. and 7 p.m. on Election Day. The most common complaint concerned electronic voting machine irregularities. Fifty-five voters across Kentucky expressed a variety of concerns about the new voting machines ranging from fears that votes had not been counted to allegations that votes were being switched to opposing candidates.

"Kentucky Bureau of Investigation agents worked closely with county clerks and voting machine technicians to maintain voter confidence in the new system," Attorney General Stumbo said. "The public has the right to demand assurances that their vote counts."

KBI agents carried out aggressive statewide election monitoring, with two agents in each of Kentucky's six congressional districts. Agents were available to provide an immediate response to any allegations of voting irregularities.

Attorney General Stumbo spent Election Day visiting precincts throughout Bowling Green in Warren County, observing the conduct of the general election. He accompanied by KBI Commissioner David James.

"I am particularly concerned by reports of lengthy delays at some

School under lockdown after alleged plot discovered

SALYERSVILLE — Magoffin County High School avoided a potential disaster when a student who had allegedly put together a student hit list was arrested Thursday evening.

The student, whose name and age has not been released, was taken into custody by the Magoffin County Sheriff's Department after rumors of the

hit list surfaced. School officials would not confirm at this time if a gun was recovered or not.

"At this time the student is in custody and we are currently working with law enforcement to investigate the incident," said Magoffin County Supt. Joe E. Henley. "We are taking all the precautionary measures to ensure that our students and faculty members are safe."

School was in full session Friday but a lockdown was

enforced all day, meaning officers from the Magoffin County Sheriff's department were on campus to ensure the students' and faculty's safety.

Principal Tony Skaggs said the lockdown was used to make students feel safe and that from the information school officials had there was no reason to believe anyone was in danger.

"We performed a locker

Task force makes a little go a long way

PRESTONSBURG — Nearly every county in the country has some kind of police presence that deals exclusively with drugs, but not many of them can boast the kind of results that the Floyd County Drug Task Force has achieved.

Floyd County Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson, the man task force members for the Prestonsburg Police Department call the brains behind the task force, said the thinking behind the 5-year-old group was really quite simple.

"I approached the county sheriff and the police department and said we're all trying to accomplish the same things, and if we combined resources, we could do even better."

All members of the task force seem to like to pass the accolades for the group's success on to

someone else, but the fact that since its inception the force has a 100 percent conviction rate speaks volumes of the type of work being done.

The task force began conducting investigations in early 2002 with one full-time member each from the Prestonsburg and Martin Police departments and also one from the Floyd County Sheriff's Department. The arrangement remained in place for a few months until the MPD member had to drop out because the officer was needed for other work. Funding has always been the main factor holding back the task force, but even when the task force was forced to cease operations in late 2004, the force itself never truly ceased to exist.

"We work when we've got enough people to work," said Prestonsburg Police Chief Mike

One killed, one hurt in crash on Route 114

MIDDLE CREEK — Route 114 was the scene of a fatal accident Friday when a man traveling westbound near Middle Creek crossed into the eastbound lane shortly before 10 a.m. and struck an oncoming vehicle.

Nineteen-year-old Anthony Osborne, of Prestonsburg, was pronounced dead at the scene by Floyd Deputy County Coroner Glen Frasure.

Surviving the crash was 20-year-old Brittany Tackett, of Virgie. She was airlifted by Medflight Air

Ambulance to St. Mary's Hospital in Huntington, W.Va. Tackett sustained two broken legs among other injuries in the wreck, and was wearing her seatbelt at the time of the accident.

The collision is under investigation by Trooper Eric Gibson of Kentucky State Police.

Members of KSP, Kentucky Vehicle Enforcement, Floyd County Sheriff's Department, Middle Creek Fire Department, Floyd County Rescue, Transtar Ambulance and Respond Ambulance all provided assistance at the scene of the accident.

Program helps younger workers find careers

Eva Conley joined the workforce at age 16, at a time when most of her friends were flirting with boys, trying the latest fashions, and worrying about the multitude of things that teenagers consider of paramount importance.

"My first job was at a fast food restaurant in Paintsville," recalled Eva. "I did a little bit of everything in that job, and I probably waited on just about everybody in Johnson County."

Conley confessed that while the extra money came in handy for a struggling high school student, she really did not care for

the work. "I worked with some really nice people, but I knew that I didn't want to do that kind of work for the rest of my life."

Despite finding the work uninspiring, Conley continued with the job, and even started a second one at Wal-Mart during her senior year at Johnson Central High School.

"I moved out of my parents' home right after graduation," said Conley. "I worked both jobs. During the day, I would work at Wal-Mart for eight hours, and then go to the restaurant. The way my schedule was set up, I never had a day off. I worked seven days a week."

Not one to give in to despair, Conley clung to the hope that

good things come to those who wait.

In January 2005, she learned from a friend about a service that helps young people prepare for professional careers. Administered locally by Big Sandy Area Community Action Program through funding from Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program, the Workforce Investment Act provides area youth with an opportunity for paid work experience, classroom training, job search, and other activities that help ensure that the participant is able to meet the economic and social challenges of adulthood.

Omerod. "It's hard for small forces to dedicate resources to it, but we haven't ever really stopped."

The task force was reactivated with funding from the Floyd County Fiscal Court at the end of 2005, and with or without funding, members pledge to work and keep their conviction rate intact. Prestonsburg Assistant Police Chief Brian Hall said the reason the force is so successful is because they make sure that every case is done the right

way before an arrest is made, meaning each undercover drug buy is performed legally with future prosecution in mind.

"We always do two buys, we want two buys on audio and videotape to make sure everything's done right," Hall said.

With limited funding, task force members have to be creative with their surveillance. Hall said they customize their surveillance equipment, including a Hardee's cup fitted with a microphone that was

used to prosecute their first case.

"The guy had the cup in his lap while he was driving and we followed behind him recording what he said using a VCR I had in my lap," Hall said.

Chief Omerod and Assistant Chief Hall both said they believe Floyd County has the best county and commonwealth's attorneys in the state because they demand that investigations are done properly.

"They have improved the criminal justice system in Floyd County. They demand more of the police," Omerod said.

Wayne Taylor, assistant commonwealth's attorney, passed the praise back to the officers who do the field work and said the reason the conviction rate is perfect is because of the people who have served on juries in Floyd County.

"I think significant jail sentences send a message, and it's a big reason why most of those

arrested plead guilty, because they are afraid of what a jury will do to them."

Chief Omerod said he believes the task force opened the eyes to people in the county that there is a drug problem just like there is anywhere else. He said the biggest problem is prescription pills, and although the task force has succeeded in convicting over 150 people, he understands that education and rehabilitation is what will slow the abuse and cut down on repeat offenders.

Thompson said the fiscal court helps put money into programs for education and rehabilitation, and the county's drug court helps to prevent repeat offenders.

All those involved said the task force will hopefully become a permanent fixture in Floyd County.

"I think it's been really successful," Thompson said. "The people involved have done a good job of it, made a lot of cases, and I'm glad we've done it."

precincts across the state, which points out the need for better voter education in the use of the new machines," Stumbo observed.

Attorney General Stumbo also noted that many types of election fraud appear to be in sharp decline, based upon complaints his Election Fraud Hotline received. "Allegations of multiple voting, improper voting assistance and absentee ballot fraud

were all in the single digits on Election Day. This is great news for Kentucky. Now we need to increase voters comfort with the new voting machines and ensure that vote tallies are quickly and accurately made public," Stumbo said.

Other calls to the Election Fraud Hotline included 104 calls with procedural or legal questions, 19 complaints regarding election officials, 23 complaints about

electioneering within 300 feet of the polls and 17 about vote buying or selling. KBI agents are reviewing each complaint and will investigate any that prove to be criminal in nature.

The Office of the Attorney General enforces Kentucky election laws in cooperation with the US Attorneys Offices, the Kentucky State Police and Secretary of State Trey Grayson's Office.

"I wasn't prepared for the real world," said Conley. "I had been focused on just graduating and working to just get by. When I heard what WIA could do for me, it was all I could think about. I wanted to be in the program so bad!"

After meeting with BSACAP staff to assess her needs, Conley was enrolled in a workshop that taught participants job readiness skills, how to prepare for the workforce, and identify careers that might

be best suited to the individual.

Upon completion of the workshop, Conley's WIA career advisor arranged for her to participate in paid work experience as a medical office assistant at Highlands Clinic in Floyd County. During the 12-week assignment, Conley was oriented to all aspects of working in a medical office environment. She became proficient at tasks such as record keeping, maintaining patient files and scheduling. Even

more important, Conley found that she had discovered a job that she truly enjoyed.

"I loved it," Conley said excitedly, with a beaming smile on her face. "I didn't know you could be so happy working."

Just as Conley's life seemed to be coming together, things got even better.

"While I was working at Highlands, the girls in the office told me about a job opening for a medical assistant

at Big Sandy Surgical Practice, a clinic just across the street," said Conley. "I applied, was interviewed, and hired the same day!"

Conley is now employed full-time at the clinic, and enjoys a good salary, along with a full range of benefits. But she hasn't slowed her pace any, and is now enrolled in the Medical Assistant program at Big Sandy Community and Technical College. She expects to complete her degree in 2008. She's also gotten engaged to a young man from Paintsville, and they hope to be married in a couple of years.

"I never thought I would be where I am today," said Conley. "I'm 21-years-old, and my life couldn't be any better. Participating in the WIA program has helped me more than anyone will ever know. I am so thankful."

Don't ignore success in effort to improve

The argument over whether, or how, to change the state's educational testing system is a civic iceberg. It's mostly submerged, and it's extremely dangerous.

Some folks would do whatever is necessary to sabotage the statewide improvement program created by the Kentucky Education Reform Act. They hate public schools and despise public school teachers' unions. They see disruption and discontent as useful preludes to the funding of private schools through taxpayer-financed vouchers.

Some want to subordinate KERA to President Bush's ill-conceived and poorly financed No Child Left Behind, the design of which virtually ensures that large numbers of public schools will be declared failures — the better to justify private alternatives. NCLB has been excoriated, and rightly so, from one end of the country to the other, including in conservative states.

Others who propose changes in Kentucky's current educational system are moved by legitimate motives. They offer modest and reasonable suggestions for altering the KERA-based approach.

The danger is that, as the struggle among all these competing interests continues, and as educational challenges remain unmet, Kentuckians will fail to focus on the many great things that are happening in classrooms from one end of the state to the other.

Just this week came the news that LaMesa Marks-Johns, a teacher at Shacklette Elementary in southwestern Louisville, has been given a \$25,000 Milken National Educator Award. Last year, Atherton High School's Diane MacKenzie won the recognition from a California-based educational foundation.

And, as Ms. Marks-Johns herself said, there's lots of award-worthy work in progress in classrooms across the commonwealth.

Theo-panic

In the 1650s, Oliver Cromwell governed England with a cadre of major generals, establishing a kind of low-church Protestant theocracy. Catholic priests were chased from the country, and Anglican clergy were suppressed. Censorship and blue laws were tightened.

What does Cromwell's rule have to do with contemporary American political life? If your answer is anything other than "nothing," you are probably in the grip of the "theo-panic" that is sweeping precincts of the American commentariat. They warn that America is beset by raging theocrats seeking to overturn our liberal democracy.

Otherwise respectable historians Kevin Phillips and Garry Wills have made this charge. It is a staple of The New York Times op-ed page. It has launched a slew of books with dire warnings: by James Rubin ("an effort to change America into a Christian theocracy") and by Damon Linker ("the end of secular politics").

The theocracy charge relies mainly on blowing Christian conservative positions out of proportion. Do Christian conservatives oppose public funding of embryo-destructive stem-cell research? Well, then, Calvin's Geneva can't be far behind. Never mind that in opposing such funding, they are usually supporting

the status quo.

National Review senior editor Ramesh Ponnuru has pointed out that you can take all Christian conservative positions — including far-fetched ones like banning sodomy and contraception — and if they happened overnight they "would merely turn the clock back to the late 1950s. That may be a very bad idea, but the America of the 1950s was not a theocracy."

Writing in First Things, Ross Douthat explains a problem with the theo-panic, which is that the influence of institutional religion is at a low ebb: "No prelate wields the kind of authority that Catholic bishops once enjoyed over urban voters, no denomination can claim the kind of influence that once belonged to the old WASP mainline, and the evangelical Protestantism that figures so prominently in anti-theocracy tracts is distinguished precisely by its lack of any centralized ecclesiastical government."

The truth about Christian conservatives is that they support public-policy goals infused with a certain view of morality. This isn't unusual. The greatest reform movement of the 20th

century — the civil-rights movement — was explicitly Christian. Today, the opposition to torture is based on a moral view that trumps all practical considerations (the inviolable dignity of the human person). A moral sense is often behind the liberal opposition to the Iraq War and to the death penalty.

Some of the anti-theocracy writers claim that what sets Christian conservatives apart is that their advocacy is explicitly religious. But most of the time it isn't. Take abortion. It doesn't take any particular religious faith to think that embryos in the womb are humans deserving protection — the key claim of abortion opponents. But their critics don't want to hear it.

For such self-professed advocates of reasoned discourse, they show an appalling tendency to want to shut down the other side with their swear word of "theocracy." They are emotional, self-righteous and close-minded. They are, in short, everything they accuse Christian conservatives of being.

A really terrible election campaign

As I write this we stand at the cusp of the off-year elections (although I suppose you could consider any year with a national election an off year).

You, on the other hand, have probably already experienced those elections and know who won. I can only presume that the Democrats did, handily.

How could I not? A week before the voting, the job approval of the Republican Congress was 16 percent and its disapproval rating was 75 percent (NBC/Wall Street Journal poll). A Newsweek survey said that voters preferred Democratic congressional candidates to Republicans, 55 to 37. And only 35 percent of the public thought President Bush was doing a good job, against 57 percent who thought he wasn't (again, the Newsweek poll).

The Republicans — drenched in scandal and reeling from their unquestioning support of a disastrous war — obviously, had no chance.

However, I am forever underestimating the ability of Democrats to snatch defeat out of the jaws of victory (see John Kerry's last-minute attempt to tell a stupid joke on President Bush that wound up denigrating American troops), so you'll have to wait until next week for my eagerly anticipated (I'm sure) election analysis. (I'd be more confident of a Democratic win if I could be certain that those new electronic voting machines weren't rigged in favor of Republicans.)

Let us instead talk about this cam-

paign.

It was terrible. Did I say terrible? I meant awful; awful, disgusting and shameful. If ideas were dynamite, this campaign couldn't have blown its nose.

Campaigns were filled with scurrilous personal attacks, misleading innuendo and outright lies. And that was just the Republicans. The Democrats weren't quite as slimy (they were ahead; they didn't have to be) but not much more informative.

They promised things like expanded health care and aid to education without saying how they'd pay for it and they tried to make voters believe that they'd always been against the war, even when they hadn't.

Here are a few things that were seldom if ever mentioned:

- The national debt. It's now at \$1.5 trillion and will increase this year by \$260 billion.

- A continuing trade deficit that will eventually swallow the dollar (and our economy along with it) whole.

- Unfunded pension plans and a Medicare program that will be pitifully inadequate to withstand the requirements of an aging Baby Boom population.

- Global warming. This is probably the single most important issue facing the world, let alone our nation, and we keep acting as though it simply isn't there. That is beyond dumb; it is criminal.

The big issue of the campaign was the war, which is certainly a real issue, but hardly anyone talked about

it in realistic terms.

President Bush went around the country all but promising that a Democratic victory would ensure that we'd all be murdered in our sleep by "Islamofascists." He called our fight in Iraq "a clash of civilizations."

I have a question for him. If it's a clash of civilizations, how come we're depending on the Iraqi army to fight it for us?

I am old enough to remember World War II. We had gas rationing back then and food rationing and an "excess profit tax" and "dollar-a-year men." We had paper drives. We had the draft. That was a clash of civilizations. And we geared up for it.

This war is an opportunity for people who make a lot of money to make more.

When they come to write a history of this sorry conflict, the thing that will stand out is the lack of national commitment. Except for the kids we hire to fight it for us, and their families, nobody has been asked to sacrifice anything. We didn't even pay for it; we borrowed the money from the Chinese and Japanese to finance it.

And yet, no one really called the president on that.

If ever the time was ripe to throw the rascals out, this was it. I hope you did it.

Frugal motorist can save a few more bucks and forgo oil change this time

Dear Tom and Ray:

Before being deployed to Iraq for a year, I put my 2003 Subaru Outback wagon in storage. I put it on jack stands with a plastic ground sheet beneath it, plugged the exhaust and intake, changed the oil and filter, and locked it up. I'll be home in another two months, and I'm wondering if I should change the oil again when I get home. I tend to be ... um ... frugal. OK, I'm cheap, but I don't want to do any damage to my beloved Subaru over \$10 worth of oil. Is it advisable to change the now-year-old oil, or can I drive my car without worrying about it? I change my oil and filter religiously: every Sunday ... OK, every 3,000 miles, but I've never changed it based on time alone, even though the oil companies would love for me to do that. Do I need to change the oil when I get back? —

Aaron, Al Qa'im, Iraq

RAY: What 10 bucks? You're in Iraq. Can't you just fill up your canteen and bring a couple of quarts back with you?

TOM: Actually, you don't need to do anything, Aaron. The fact that you plugged up the intake and exhaust means that no possible contamination could have gotten into your engine while you were gone. So the oil is as clean as it was the day you left. In fact, it's as if you had left it in the bottle!

RAY: That's assuming your no-good brother-in-law Eugene hasn't been using the car to deliver pizzas the whole time you've been away.

TOM: Before you start it, we do have a couple of suggestions, though. You might want to remove the spark-plug wires so the engine won't start. And then crank the engine for 15 or 20 seconds to get the oil circulating.

RAY: The top of your engine hasn't seen oil in many months, and it would be good to give the oil pump a little

head start, and let it coat everything before making the engine run at 1,000 rpm or more.

TOM: Don't forget to unplug the air intake and exhaust before you do that. Otherwise, whatever you plugged the intake with will get sucked right into the engine. And you won't like the results of that if you're frugal, Aaron. Best of luck to you.

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Odds & Ends

■ CHARLESTON, S.C. — A pocket protector would be pointless for this diamond-encrusted, \$170,000 fountain pen that will never be used.

"You do not put ink in that pen. It's like owning a Ferrari that you don't want to drive," said owner Al Parish, a Charleston Southern University professor.

The pen, one of only three in the world, went on display Wednesday at the Montblanc store along with others from Parish's \$1.2 million collection. They arrived in an armored car accompanied by security guards.

The pen is the "Montblanc Solitaire Mountain Massif Skeleton" and was created in honor of the 100th anniversary of the Swiss company. Its 1,400 white and blue diamonds are arranged to depict the Mont Blanc mountains and the pen is topped with a 43-facet star-cut diamond.

The buyers of the three handcrafted pens were chosen from among 60 collectors worldwide in a lottery, said Jan-Patrick Schmitz, chief executive and president of Montblanc North America.

He said the company sought pen aficionados like Parish who collect rather than sell them for a quick profit.

The pen will join Parish's collection of about 150 other Montblancs, which he plans to pass along to his children.

"You don't really own it," he said. "You're just keeping it for one generation."

■ WAUKESHA, Wis. — An unidentified man has been bugging women by using an insect story to try to persuade them to disrobe.

Police said the man, who remained at large Thursday, told female workers in at least seven businesses they have a tick on their clothes and should remove clothing to find it.

"We don't know what his potential gain is, if it's sexual gratification or he's trying to be funny, but it's a serious crime," Police Sgt. John Konkol said.

Hali Frankowski was working recently at Sunset Tan when the man came in and asked her to show him the tanning beds.

At one point he told her she had a tick on her shirt, she said.

"He was like 'It's right there.' That's when he took my pants, pulled them down, pulled them over, and that's when I jumped and started walking toward the bathroom," she said.

The man left, leaving her stunned.

"You know some guy is violating your space. Just the most random story in the world," Frankowski said.

Police said the man has tried the trick in the Milwaukee-area cities of Waukesha, Muskego and Franklin. They said he seems to target younger women working alone in stores.

■ MASON, Ohio — A homeowner who was forced to pull the plug on his computerized Christmas light show last year has a bigger display planned for this holiday season.

Carson Williams will be decorating a park in this Cincinnati suburb.

Williams, a 41-year-old computer engineer, spent near-

ly two months last year hooking up 25,000 lights at his home in Deerfield Township and programming them to flash to Christmas music. The music was broadcast through a low FM transmitter, so people driving by could pick it up on their car radios without the music being played through the neighborhood.

Williams' display went dark last Dec. 6 because of safety concerns and increased traffic from sightseers. But the attention led to appearances on national television, and the house was featured in a Miller Lite beer commercial.

This year's display, opening Dec. 2 at Heritage Oak Park, will include 35,000 Christmas lights synchronized to music. Visitors will view it from their cars like a drive-in movie.

It will cost \$15 per car for a 15-minute show. Williams will get some of the proceeds, with most going to Festivals of Mason, a local nonprofit group that organizes family events.

■ FARMINGTON, Utah — Senior citizens here could soon be feasting on cuisine prepared by jail inmates.

Davis County officials are considering awarding a food service contract to Canteen Correctional Services, which makes food for the jail and seniors who participate in its meal-assistance programs, said health department director Lewis Garrett.

The food would be prepared by inmates at the jail's 12,000-square-foot kitchen and would be of a higher quality than what inmates or officers get, he said. Dietitians would create the menus.

Garrett said supervisors, an on-duty guard and security camera will ensure that food tampering would not occur.

Members of the county's Senior Services Advisory Board toured the jail's kitchen earlier this week to get a glimpse of the meals.

"I feel very good about it," board member Fawn Jensen said. "They (the meals) are really an improvement from what they've been able to serve so far."

■ CHARLESTON, S.C. — With the election season over, campaign signs are now worth their weight in spinach dip.

So says the Southeast restaurant chain Sticky Fingers, which is offering a free appetizer to anyone who cleans up the campaign clutter and brings in a sign.

"Just think of those leftover campaign signs as oversized, roadside gift certificates," said Sticky Fingers co-owner Jeff Goldstein. "It's an easy way to help take care of our neighborhoods."

The Charleston-based ribs restaurant will offer coupons for a free appetizer through next Wednesday.

The chain operates 17 restaurants in the Carolinas, Tennessee, Georgia and Florida.

■ RENO, Nev. — Backers of a move to legalize small amounts of marijuana in Nevada said they're not bummed out by its defeat at the polls.

If anything, they were encouraged by the support they received from voters and pledged Wednesday to try again.

"The reality is, in the histo-

ry of this country, no pot initiative has gotten the vote total we're going to end up getting," said Neal Levine, campaign manager for the Committee to Control and Regulate Marijuana.

Nevadans can expect the issue to appear again in 2008 or 2010, he said.

"It's 100 percent certainty that we will be back on the ballot," Levine said. "We've been working this state for five years, and we're not going anywhere."

Voters rejected Question 7, 56 percent to 44 percent. It passed only in tiny Storey County, by a mere 95 votes of 1,851 cast.

■ KEY WEST, Fla. — Call it an opportunity for some below-sea-level recognition.

An online auction began Wednesday for naming rights to an artificial reef project organizers hope to establish off the Florida Keys.

The reef is to be created by sinking the retired 524-foot U.S. Air Force missile-tracking ship General Hoyt S. Vandenberg, which monitored NASA space launches from 1963 to 1983.

Since 1984, the ship has been among other decommissioned vessels at the James River Naval Reserve Fleet in Virginia's James River. The so-called Ghost Fleet is being thinned because of environmental concerns.

Bidding on the online auction site eBay Inc. begins at \$900,000, with a reserve price of \$1.3 million, said Joe Weatherby, a project organizer with Artificial Reefs of the Keys.

It's the last piece of a funding puzzle required for the \$5.7 million project. ARK has already gathered \$3 million, but needs to come up with remaining funds to avoid losing the ship to scrapyards.

"This is for someone who is looking for a legacy," Weatherby said. "It's something for an individual or a company that is permanent and positive for the environment."

■ BUFFALO, Mo. — Prisoners returning to a southwest Missouri county jail damaged in a failed breakout will find a new color scheme — pink with blue teddy bear accents.

The Dallas County Detention Center is being repainted a soft shade of pink in an effort to better manage sometimes volatile detainees. Sheriff Mike Rackley said he decided to update the look as part of extensive repairs neces-

sary after inmates set a fire and vandalized the interior in an escape attempt.

"Basically, if they are going to act like children and commit a childish act, then we'll make a childish atmosphere," he said. "And it's a calming thing: Teddy bears are sooth-

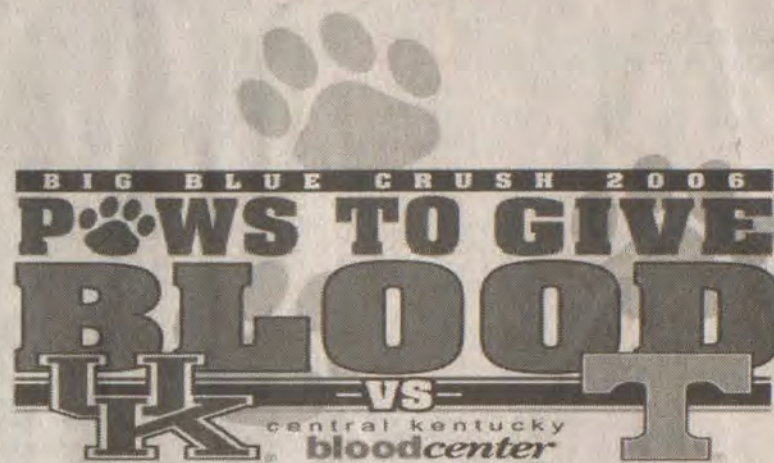
ing. So we made it like a day care, and that's kind of like what it is, a day care for adults who can't control their behavior in public."

A month after the Oct. 8 incident, the county's 30-plus prisoners are in neighboring jails while repairs continue.

The new paint job includes stenciled blue teddy bear accents.

"How do you feel tough in a pink atmosphere?" Rackley said of the new color scheme, which was inspired by similar redecorating efforts at jails in Texas and Arizona.

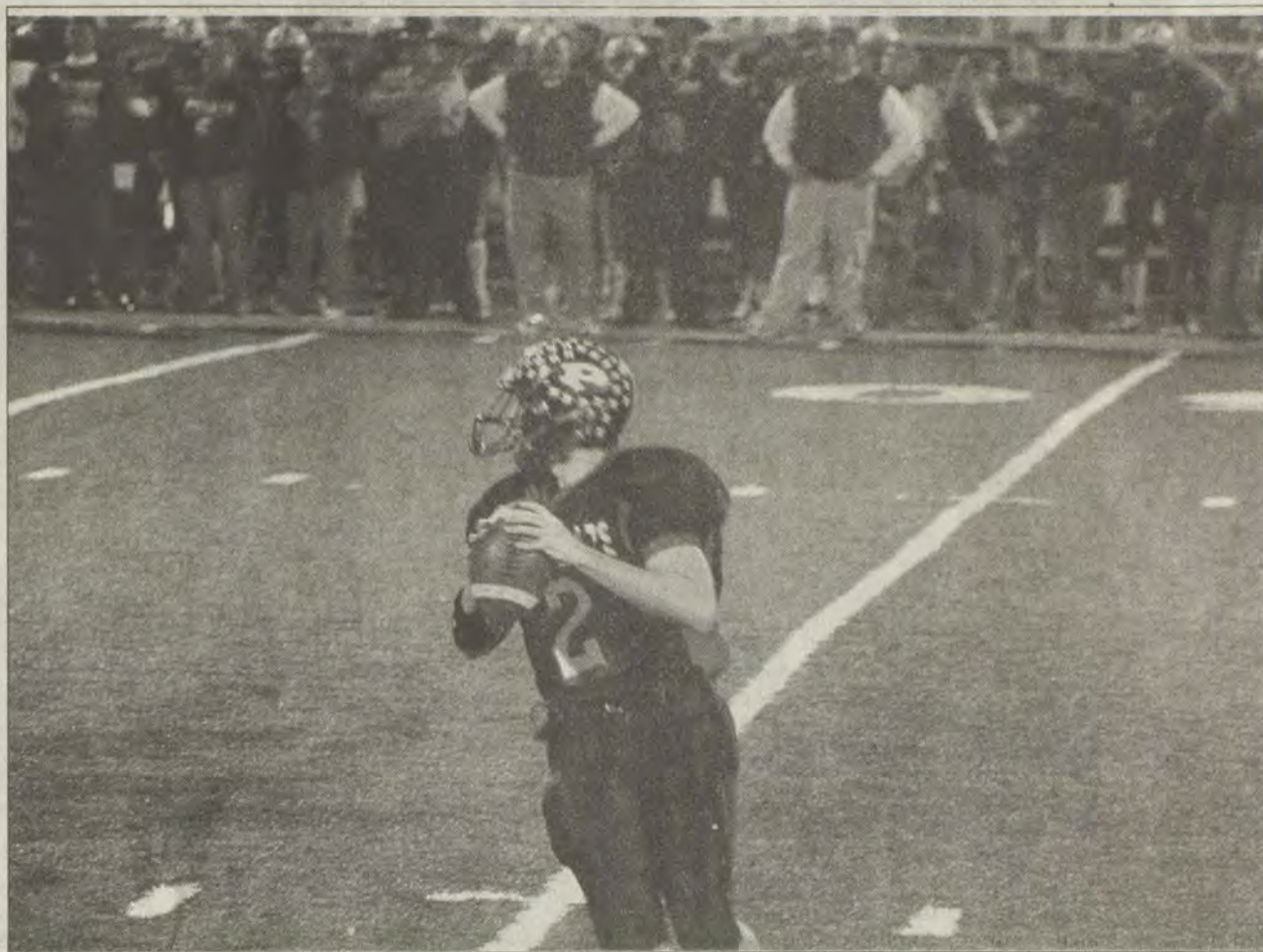

Marshall trip delayed by engine smoke

CEREDO, W.Va. — A charter plane carrying the Marshall University football team to a game against East Carolina was delayed more than two hours Friday after smoke was reported in an engine, airport officials said. No injuries were reported among

the 150 people aboard, but the timing was eerie.

Almost 36 years ago, on Nov. 14, 1970, a plane carrying the Marshall football team home from a game against East Carolina crashed, killing 75 people, including most of the team. A movie about the rebuilding of Marshall's football program after that

crash is scheduled to open nationwide on Dec. 22.

Marshall's sports information director at the time, Gene Morehouse, died in that crash.

On Friday, his son Keith Morehouse was aboard the Boeing 727 headed for the game in Greenville, N.C. The jet, originally

scheduled to leave Tri-State Airport at 11 a.m., took off at 1:25 p.m.

"I don't think it's as big a deal as some people are trying to make," Morehouse said before reboarding the plane for takeoff. He is now sports director of WSAZ-TV in Huntington.

Alpa Shah, director of operations

for the Tri-State Airport Authority, said excess fuel burning off one of the engines caused the smoke.

"These things happen," said Cabell County Sheriff Kim Wolfe, who was providing security for the team. "It's just ironic, the timing of this one."

Hansbrough leads AP's preseason All-America team

Tyler Hansbrough of North Carolina led a preseason All-America team of underclassmen.

The 6-foot-9 sophomore forward was the top vote-getter Tuesday on the team chosen by the same panel that selects The Associated Press' weekly college basketball poll.

Joining Hansbrough were juniors Joakim Noah of Florida, Ronald Steele of Alabama and Glen Davis of LSU and sophomore Brandon Rush of Kansas.

The 2006-07 team was decidedly different from the season before when four seniors and a junior were picked for the preseason honors.

Hansbrough was named on 65 of the 72 ballots, one more than Noah. Steele received 55 votes, while Davis had 51 and Rush 26.

Hansbrough was the key to North

Carolina's surprising season that saw the Tar Heels go from unranked to 10th in the final poll. He averaged 18.9 points and 7.9 rebounds and made Carolina fans and coach Roy Williams very happy when he decided to return for a second season in Chapel Hill.

"There's a lot of things I want to accomplish as a team," Hansbrough said. "I had a good year, but I talked to coach and we both agreed there's a lot of things I could get better at individually. I'd like to go a little farther in the tournament and have a better ending."

"I've never really known a player to spend another year with coach Williams and get worse."

The 6-11 Noah was the star of Florida's run to its first national championship last season, averaging 14.2 points and 7.1 rebounds. His flowing hair and engaging smile has made him a fan favorite and his ever-

improving talent has made the son of former tennis star Yannick Noah one of the country's top players.

"Don't expect to see Michael Jordan out there right now. There was so much hype around him at the end of the year. He's not Michael Jordan," Florida coach Billy Donovan said. "I had an opportunity to show him the tape of every basket he scored last year. I think it was amazing for him to get a chance to see that he scored a lot of baskets just by hustling and working hard. He's not a great 3-point shooter. He's not a guy that's going to score a variety of different ways. He scored on being a great hustler, a great runner and a highly competitive kid. I've talked to him about not losing that. Sometimes you've got a kid like Joakim Noah coming back to college basketball and people expect to see Magic Johnson, Larry Bird or Michael Jordan. He is nothing remotely close to that. He's a very,

very good player who's eager to get better."

Davis was hard to miss as LSU made its run to the Final Four. Known as "Big Baby," the 6-9 Davis played at 310 pounds last season, a number some thought may have been generous, and he was named Southeastern Conference player of the year, averaging 18.6 points and 9.7 rebounds.

It will be a much-different looking Davis this season as he has slimmed down considerably, losing about 50 pounds.

"I'm just eating healthier, but it's tough especially for a college student," he said this summer. "It's not like I eat crazy, it's just really, really difficult when you stay up late and do all that college stuff."

"I want to go into the NBA with experience, basically grown up," he said. "I don't want to sit for a couple of years. For now, I just want to

establish myself in college basketball and win a national championship. It's all about winning."

The 6-3 Steele is the only true guard on the team. He averaged 14.3 points, 3.7 rebounds and 4.3 assists for the Crimson Tide last season, while averaging just over 40 minutes per game.

Rush, a 6-6 swingman, averaged 13.5 points and 5.9 rebounds last season for the Jayhawks.

UCLA junior guard Arron Afflalo was the next-leading voter-getter with 20.

Last year's preseason All-America team was seniors J.J. Redick and Shelden Williams of Duke, Dee Brown of Illinois and Craig Smith of Boston College along with junior Adam Morrison of Gonzaga.

Redick, Williams and Morrison were first-team selections after the season, while Brown was on the second team and Smith the third.

Athletes continue to graduate at better rate than other students

INDIANAPOLIS — NCAA president Myles Brand commended college athletes for their academic improvement Thursday, then criticized poor fact-checking by the media and government for failing to report the true story.

Brand said figures released by the NCAA Thursday prove athletes often outperform their peers in the classroom and called any other notion a "myth."

The latest federal graduation rates show athletes are more likely than the general student body to earn a diploma, and that female athletes continue to post higher numbers than their male counterparts.

"One of my most significant frustrations to read time and again is the mistaken myth that student-athletes are not good students," Brand said. "The federal government confirmed something we've known for a long time — that student-athletes are good students. There really is no excuse for getting this information wrong."

The latest measurements

showed incoming athletes from the freshman class of 1999-2000 held a 2-point advantage, 63 percent to 61 percent, over those students who did not play sports. Athletes also had a 1-point overall increase over last year's figures.

Federal graduation rates are calculated over a six-year period for each incoming freshman class.

Brand blamed the misperception on erroneous reports and called on editorial writers and the House Ways and Means Committee, which is investigating the NCAA's tax-exempt status, to get the numbers right.

"Their claim that student-athletes don't perform well in the classroom is way off, and I think those wrong stories need to get their facts right," he said. Academic reform has been Brand's top priority since taking over as president in 2003.

He presided over a movement that made eligibility standards for student-athletes more rigorous and created more stringent standards for freshmen to play. Brand also pushed for a new, more effective calculation to measure academic

success among student-athletes.

Under the NCAA formula, called the Graduation Success Rate, 77 percent of student-athletes graduated. The NCAA's numbers were consistently higher than the federal rates.

The difference between the two calculations is that the federal rate does not include transfer students.

By all measures, Brand likes the progress.

"I'd say the academic achievement of our student-athletes over the last several years is one of our greatest success stories," he said.

Among the more notable findings over a four-year period were that female athletes earned diplomas at a significantly higher rate, 71 percent, than their male counterparts, 56 percent; and that blacks (53 percent) and Hispanics (58 percent) continued to lag behind other ethnicities when earning diplomas.

Whites had the highest federal score at 67 percent.

Brand also cited a 3-point increase under the federal guidelines, from 43 to 46 per-

cent, for men's basketball players and a 4-point jump, from 38 to 42 percent, among black players.

"Four points in one year is a very serious move upward and it's 5 percent higher than African-American students in the general student body."

Four schools — Boston College, Bucknell, Duke and Northwestern — graduated at least 90 percent of their athletes over the one-year period. Duke, at 91 percent, had the highest rating. The other three each had 90 percent rates, but Bucknell was the only school of the top four to exceed its overall student body grad rate (88 percent).

The three lowest scores belonged to Florida A&M (19 percent), Texas-Pan American (21 percent) and Lamar (30 percent) although Lamar's total was only 1 point lower than its overall total.

The three military academies — Army, Navy and Air Force — received no one-year scores for their athletes. The report includes only student-athletes receiving scholarships, which the military academies don't have.

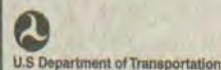

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Wildcats looking to rebound from disappointing 2005-06 season

LEXINGTON — Most college basketball towns would be more than content with a 22-13 record, a trip to the conference semifinals and a four-point loss at the hands of a national powerhouse in the second round of the NCAA tournament.

But this isn't most college basketball towns. This is the home of the winningest program in history, and for Kentucky fans, last season just wasn't good enough.

It's a sentiment shared by coach Tubby Smith, entering the 10th year of his tenure in Lexington, which began with a national championship but hasn't produced another Final Four participant since — the longest drought ever for the program.

"I'll just say it was bad," Smith said of the season, which resulted in a 9-7 Southeastern Conference record — the Wildcats' worst in 16 years, and an 87-83 NCAA tournament exit against top-seeded Connecticut.

Gone to the NBA's Boston Celtics is Rajon Rondo, the lightning quick guard who last season led the Wildcats in points, rebounds, assists and steals. Gone also is another key member of the backcourt, senior Patrick Sparks, who had a down year but at times still showed a lethal touch from long-range.

So with last season's sag and the backcourt departures, Kentucky enters the year no longer the titans of the SEC but perhaps lacking the element of surprise enjoyed by a typical underdog. During the conference's media days last month, opposing coaches cautioned that teams should take Kentucky lightly at their own risk.

"We are definitely improved," said Lukasz Obrzut, a 7-1 senior center from Poland. "A new word for me, cohesiveness. We are coming together as a team and working on our communication skills."

No Wildcat player was elected to the SEC's preseason first team, and only center Randolph Morris made the second team. Rather than rely on one star to carry the load, the Wildcats will seek chemistry through a variety of spare parts, each of which showed flashes of stardom a year ago.

Morris, a junior center, was suspended for the first half of last season after he tried unsuccessfully to get drafted by an NBA team. It took him a while to get his bearings and re-emerge as an inside force down the stretch, but he still led the Wildcats by averaging 13 points and 6 rebounds a game.

"Last year I didn't really know my situation or know where I was going to be," Morris said. "But, this year I'm in a very good position where I know where I stand and I know what I need

to do. That makes it easier."

Obrzut and Jared Carter, a sophomore who considered transferring but ultimately decided to stay, provide depth at center. Should Smith opt for a larger lineup, Morris can also play power forward.

Rondo was the headliner of a trio of guards that came to Kentucky before the 2004-05 season, but the other two remain and are ready for their close-ups.

When Ramel Bradley is hitting his shots, few players look better from 3-point range. When he's not, few players look worse. He'll take over the point guard duties and has already emerged as the team's most vocal leader.

"I've matured a lot this year," Bradley said. "I've just got to key on what coach wants me to do, not push the ball but find the open teammates."

Injuries and Morris' suspension forced fellow junior Joe Crawford into a forward role for much of the season, but this year he should settle into his more natural position as a shooting guard. Although he had an undisclosed offseason surgery that he feared might threaten his ability to play, Crawford says he has never felt better and is ready to lead.

"There were games when I was up, games when I was down," Crawford said. "This year, I'm going to make it a point to be consistent."

Bobby Perry gave the Wildcats a little of everything — even the occasional 3-pointer — and was particularly good during the two NCAA tournament games, averaging better than 22 points. He is capable of playing power forward or small forward, when Smith goes with a bigger lineup featuring both Morris and Obrzut.

Two other forwards, Rekalim Sims and Sheray Thomas, were in and out of Smith's doghouse last year. Sims decided to transfer but Thomas could play a key role either as a starter or one of the first off the bench. Freshman Perry Stevenson also should see some action.

Smith acknowledges last year was tough. He yanked key players from the starting lineup down the stretch — including Rondo — and replaced them with a smaller, less-flashy five that got higher grades in practice drills.

The bad news this season is he might not have the depth to do something like that again. The good news is that the starting roles appear more set now than they were at any point last season.

"Any time you don't have to deal with uncertainty it is a good thing," Smith said.

But for Kentucky fans, the uncertainty isn't about who will start. It's about whether Kentucky will start playing like it used to.

Colonels hope to rebuild with six new players

RICHMOND — The biggest thing Eastern Kentucky coach Jeff Neubauer learned in his first year with the Colonels last winter was just how hard life can be in the Ohio Valley Conference.

"The one thing I'd take from that first year is this league has a lot of talent," Neubauer said. "Last year there were a ton of seniors in

this conference and it was really a good league, very balanced. A lot of teams that just beat up on each other is what happened."

If knowing is truly half the battle, that will be the easy half for Neubauer. The difficult part will be filling the holes that his own departed seniors left on the Colonels' team.

The Colonels went 14-16 overall and 11-9 in the OVC last year with three experienced seniors in Matt Witt, Jason McLeish and Alonzo Hird, the last remaining starters from the 2005 team that went to the NCAA Tournament.

Their graduation means Neubauer will need to find a way to replace the 44 points a night they provided. Witt led the Colonels in scoring and assists per game last

season with 18.5 and 4.4 respectively, while McLeish scored 17.8 per game and Alonzo Hird averaged 7.9.

"They had been through a lot of wars," Neubauer said. "Whenever you lose that it's really hard to replace."

Junior forward Darnell Dials is the team's lead returning scorer, with 7.1 points per game. Neubauer hopes Dials can keep improving like he did in the summer between his freshman and sophomore seasons.

Dials shot 44 percent from the field as a freshman even though "basically all he shot was lay-ups and post moves," Neubauer said. Last season, Dials started 26 games and shot 58 percent from the floor. Neubauer also expects Dials

to help the team in intangible areas.

"He's certainly one of the guys that everyone else looks to for leadership," Neubauer said.

Junior forward Jamaal Douglas could play a big part instantly, too. "I haven't figured out exactly what role that is but he should be a contributor for us," the coach said.

The 6-foot-7 Douglas sat out last season after transferring from Lafayette, where he led the Patriot League in rebounds with 7.0 per game and Lafayette in blocks (28) as a sophomore in 2004-05.

"He's a big, strong, 250-pound player," Neubauer said. "Hopefully he does help us around the basket, just rebounding and being physical in the post."

The Colonels will also depend on four freshmen — forwards Josh

Daniel and Josh Taylor, and guards Adam Leonard and Robin Mestdagh — to make an immediate impact. Freshman Ryan Dillman had knee surgery recently and has not practiced with the team yet.

"We're still trying to figure out who's who and who's going to play how much and we haven't come to those conclusions," Neubauer said. "But those four guys are going to be a part of our success here in the future."

Neubauer knows he has some rebuilding to do. So he keeps his goals simple.

"I know (we're getting) better," Neubauer said. "There's no question in my mind. That's the only thing we're talking about. ... We're just talking about improving every day."

No. 15 Rutgers 28, No. 3 Louisville 25

PISCATAWAY, N.J. — Somewhere in the sea of red-clad bodies that spilled out onto the field at Rutgers Stadium was the most unlikely national title contender college football has seen — maybe ever.

Ray Rice, Brian Leonard and the Scarlet Knights had just pulled off the greatest victory in Rutgers history, and it looked as if all 44,111 fans had left the stands to join them on the field.

Yes, Rutgers has arrived. Just ask Louisville, which got kicked right of the title scramble by the Scarlet Knights.

The program that once set the standard for futility jumped into that title picture Thursday night by rallying from a big deficit for a 28-25 victory over the third-ranked Cardinals.

On his second chance, Jeremy Ito kicked a tiebreaking 28-yard field goal with 13 seconds left and the second consecutive primetime showdown between Big East unbeatens went to No. 15 Rutgers (9-0, 4-0).

"This is the new Rutgers," said

Leonard, the senior fullback who was a redshirt-freshman on a J-IT team. "This is a dream of mine."

Just a week ago, it was Louisville (8-1, 3-1) celebrating the biggest win in school history, a 44-34 victory over West Virginia that vaulted the Cardinals into the thick of the championship race.

This time, it was Rutgers' turn to party.

The Scarlet Knights shut out the high-scoring Cardinals in the second half, erased an 18-point deficit and got the ball with 5:28 left in the fourth quarter at their own 9.

"You don't come back like we did tonight unless you have believers," coach Greg Schiano said.

Leonard went 26 yards with a pass in the flats to get Rutgers into Louisville territory and Rice broke a 20-yard run to get into field-goal range. Ito missed a 33-yarder with 18 seconds left, but Louisville was off-side and Ito got another shot — and it was perfect.

"It was just a bad kick," Ito said of his first try. "It was a funny game. You have to give credit to our defense."

The final play, appropriately, was a sack of Brian Brohm by a Rutgers' defense that proved worthy of the No. 2 ranking in the country.

"We were totally out of sync in the

second half, and that can't happen," Louisville coach Bobby Petrino said. "Some of our goals are still out there, that we can reach. We're going to need some help."

After the game, Rutgers fans flooded the field and swarmed the players. The 185-pound Ito got lifted right off the ground.

"It was a little scary at the end with the mob scene," Schiano said. "But it was fun. This is the way college football is supposed to be."

And the way it's never been at Rutgers. There are now four undefeated teams in the country — No. 1 Ohio State, No. 2 Michigan, No. 14 Boise State and — it's probably hard for many to believe — Rutgers.

Rice, the Heisman Trophy candidate, yes the Scarlet Knights even have one of those, ran 22 times for 131 yards and two touchdowns.

Brohm, who looked like the Heisman contender last week, went 13-for-27 for 163 yards with a TD and an interception. He also was sacked five times, twice each by Jamel Meekins and Devraun Thompson.

When Schiano took over at Rutgers in 2001 the program was as bad as it got in college football, and it didn't get much better in the former Miami assistant's first few seasons.

The Scarlet Knights won three games in Schiano's first two years and

12 his first four, before finally turning it around last year with seven victories and a bowl bid.

This season, off to their best start 1976, the next step for the Scarlet Knights was to show if they could compete with the nation's best.

The answer: Absolutely. Louisville jumped out to a 25-7 lead in the first half behind Brohm and a 100-yard kickoff return by Jajuan Spillman and it looked as if the Cardinals were on their way to a BCS boosting romp.

But laughingstocks no more, the Scarlet Knights came charging back to tie it in the fourth quarter behind speedy tailback Rice and a relentless pass rush. Rutgers gave the 2,000 fans packed into the temporary stands behind the south end zone something to go crazy about when Kenny Britt reached high for a pass over the middle and broke free for a 67-yard reception right in their direction. Louisville's William Gay caught Britt from behind and stripped the ball, but it bounced right back to the Rutgers' receiver, who covered it at the 4.

And if that wasn't enough to swing momentum Rutgers' way, Rice's 4-yard TD sweep on the next play surely was. The 2-point conversion cut it to 25-22 with 4:42 left in the third quarter.

After struggling early to slow down Brohm and the No. 2 offense in the country, Meekins and the hard-rushing Scarlet Knights held the Cardinals without a first down for the first 26 minutes of the second half.

When Ito nailed a 46-yard field goal with 10:17 left in the fourth quarter, the game was tied at 25, the cannon behind the south end zone boomed and the record crowd was in a white-towel waving frenzy.

"They were an undefeated team so we knew it was going to be tough," Louisville running back Kolby Smith said, "and it was a home game for them and we heard it was going to be their biggest crowd ever. We just wanted to come in and execute. But tonight we didn't."

Students started lining up outside the stadium more than four hours before kickoff for the most important college football game in New Jersey since, well, maybe the first one was played between Rutgers and Princeton in 1869. Never before had Rutgers played in a game matching ranked teams.

Now the Scarlet Knights have won one and can start wondering where they will be ranked when the next Bowl Championship Series standings come out Sunday.

"Hopefully we go up," Rice said. "I'm just glad we won this game."

Chargers handling issues better than Bengals

CINCINNATI – Arrests on land and water. Benchings for misbehavior. Suspensions for substance abuse.

In the past year, the San Diego Chargers and the Cincinnati Bengals have turned into the NFL's two top examples of why character counts. Their rap sheets are nearly as extensive as their play lists.

So far, there's one big difference between them. As they prepare to meet Sunday in Cincinnati, the Chargers are dealing with their trouble a whole lot better.

The Chargers (6-2) are tied with Denver for the AFC West lead, having won four of their last five games. They've overcome their off-field problems by getting the most out of their stars and more than expected out of their backups.

"You've got to find ways to stick your finger in the dike, as it were, and have somebody else step forward and do the job," coach Marty Schottenheimer said. "We've done a little bit of that."

They won last Sunday without linebacker Shawne Merriman, the NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year last season. Merriman sat out a 32-25 victory in Cleveland, starting a four-

game suspension for a positive drug test. He claims he took a tainted supplement.

It was the latest setback to a defense that already had a lot of woe. Linebacker Steve Foley is out for the season, recovering from bullet wounds while facing drunken driving charges. Safety Terrence Kiel has pleaded not guilty to felony drug charges. Cornerback Markus Curry was released by the team following his arrest on suspicion of committing domestic violence.

All the off-field turmoil has led to on-field shuffling. When Foley got shot, Shaun Phillips took his place. Phillips has missed the last two games with a calf injury, giving Marques Harris a chance to play.

"Everybody's really good friends and everybody's close, and that makes it easier," Harris said. "When you go through tough times, you stick together. That's how we've been."

The Bengals (4-4) are glad somebody else is having to go through that stick-together routine.

"Merriman – he's a beast back there," quarterback Carson Palmer said. "His suspension couldn't have come at a better time for us. I was excited to see that."

No one has dealt with more self-

inflicted problems than the Bengals, who have had six players arrested and two suspended – linebacker Odell Thurman and receiver Chris Henry – in the past year.

It looked like they, too, could overcome their character issues after they beat Pittsburgh to open the season 3-0. A few hours after that win, Thurman was arrested for drunken driving, and Henry was in the vehicle with him.

Thurman was suspended for the rest of the season. Henry was benched for one game by coach Marvin Lewis, then suspended by the league for two more. Without one of their top receivers, the Bengals started a 1-4 slide that has brought a sense of desperation.

The defending AFC North champs already trail Baltimore by two games. They haven't had a losing record since 2004. Falling to 4-5 would put them on track to be an also-ran in the playoff chase.

"As far as I'm concerned: Sure, it's a must-win," defensive end Bryan Robinson said. "We're going to need this one. We got ourselves in the hole."

They don't want to get buried by a team that's doing a lot of things right. With Philip Rivers running the

offense for the first time, the Chargers lead the league with 31 points per game. They've done amazingly well inside the opponents' 20-yard line, scoring 18 touchdowns and 12 field goals in 31 chances. The only time they didn't score was when they decided to run out the clock at the end of a game.

While Rivers has been steady, LaDainian Tomlinson has been terrific. He leads the league with 14 touchdowns and 1,151 total yards, and is coming off a 172-yard game against Cleveland in which he repeatedly slipped out of the tacklers' grasp.

"It's like trying to catch a fish, after the fish comes out of the water and he's slippery and tough to hold onto," Chargers fullback Lorenzo Neal said. "He knows the game and he's a smart guy, a student of the game who's always watching film. He wants to be great."

San Diego's depleted defense also is on a roll, leading the league in sacks. The defense has scored touchdowns in consecutive games for the first time in franchise history.

"Great teams find a way to get it done," Neal said.

Nothing about the Bengals is great these days. Giddiness over that 3-0 start has given way to second-guess-

ing and outbursts by players. The Bengals have the feel of a team that's on the verge of a meltdown.

In the past, a break-even mark at the season's midpoint would have Cincinnati fans in an upbeat mood. Times have changed.

"It's not upbeat right now," receiver Chad Johnson said. "It's not upbeat at all."

Palmer says he's still a work in progress

CINCINNATI – Carson Palmer is still a work in progress.

On the 10-month anniversary of his devastating injury, the Cincinnati Bengals quarterback said Wednesday that his left knee is doing so well that he never gives it a thought. The problem is that a lot of other things aren't quite right yet.

It shows in his throws. Palmer's touchdowns are down, his interceptions are up, and his passer rating is nowhere near what it was at the halfway point of last season. Some of it has to do with what's going on around him – a beat-up offensive line hasn't protected him nearly as well.

And, some of it goes back to that low hit by Pittsburgh's Kimo von Oelhoffen during the Steelers' play-

off victory on Jan. 8.

"When you go back and have to start all over, which is essentially what I had to do, you rebuild your mechanics from the ground up, and that's something I did," Palmer said. "That's something I'm continuing to do."

"Last year, I felt when I was on the field that I was just playing football and reacting. It's something I've started over on and continued to build."

Palmer listed all of the things he's trying to refine as the Bengals (4-4) try to find their own offensive comfort zone: holding onto the ball, moving around in the pocket, keeping his balance, dropping back properly.

"There's not one or two things I'm working on," Palmer said. "It's the whole position of playing quarterback."

He didn't put it on the list of things

to fix, but Palmer's psyche also might be going through a reconstruction.

After a 26-20 loss to Baltimore on Sunday, Palmer acknowledged for the first time that he's aware of when tacklers come in around his legs. He said Wednesday that it's not something he thinks about until after the play is finished.

"I think I might recognize it more because of what's happened," Palmer said. "Looking back at before the knee injury, I wasn't recognizing it at all. I'm sure it happened a lot. I haven't gone back and looked at last year's film and compared it game-to-game, but I have recognized and realized it's been going on this year."

It usually takes an athlete more than a year to fully recover – mentally and physically – from a devastating injury. Palmer shredded two ligaments, dislocated his kneecap and damaged cartilage only 10 months

ago.

Whatever the reason, Palmer's numbers are down.

At the midpoint of last season, he had completed 69.7 percent of his throws for 2,031 yards with 16 touchdowns, five interceptions and seven passer ratings over 100. This season, he has completed 61.2 percent of his throws for 1,879 yards with 12 touchdowns, six interceptions and only one triple-digit passer rating.

The numbers are magnified by the team's struggles. The defending AFC North champions have lost four of their last five games, dropping them two games behind first-place Baltimore.

"I don't think it has to do with Carson as much as it has to do with everyone," receiver T.J. Houshmandzadeh said Wednesday. "Again, y'all give the quarterback way too much credit when things go

good. When things go bad, everybody wants to look at the quarterback."

One telling statistic: Palmer was sacked only 12 times in the first eight games last season. He has been sacked 23 times this season – four more than all of last year – and often gets hit as soon as he gets the pass away.

The pressure isn't good for any quarterback, let alone one who is still trying to get back into form after a knee operation.

"He's getting hit more this year than last year," Houshmandzadeh said. "Rudi (Johnson) isn't running the ball as well. Chad (Johnson) doesn't have as many catches. Everything is not the same as it was last year. The circumstances are different."

So are the outcomes.

Deer don't see lifesaving hunter orange as do we

PADUCAH – Clothing in stylish fluorescent orange makes an urgent fashion statement: Don't shoot.

The bright orange color – sometimes called hunter orange or safety orange – proliferates in Kentucky especially during the state's modern firearms deer season. The state's gun season, Nov. 11-26 in some counties and Nov. 11-20 in others, brings with it a requirement for all hunters afield to wear the solid orange color on head, chest and back.

The orange clothing requirement also is in effect during muzzleloader seasons and youth firearms deer seasons. The color display isn't required for small game hunting, but it is recommended. Fluorescent

orange is highly visible to hunters, standing out vividly in natural surroundings.

Nationwide, safety officials have seen a major reduction in "mistaken for game" accidents since the common adoption of regulations in various forms requiring hunter orange clothing, especially for deer hunting. Simply, hunter orange clothing is especially bold to the eyes of other humans. It is virtually unmistakable to the eyes of other people, showing up starkly against the otherwise confusing colors in nature.

In a New York study, researchers concluded that hunters who wore fluorescent orange were seven times less likely to be shot by another than hunters who left off the orange garments. Seven times safer.

When one sees movement through the thicket, the glow of

hunter orange in even low light makes it clear that the stirrings there are that of another hunter and not a potential target animal.

There has been some resistance to the wearing of fluorescent orange by some hunters because of apprehension that deer would more readily see them. That worry, however, is based on human vision and not that of whitetails.

Scientists point to the marked differences between the eyes of deer and humans. Deer have eyes that are more advantaged in low light conditions, in night vision abilities. Humans have only a fraction of those abilities in minimal light, but in a trade-off, people can have some edge in seeing in brighter light, notably on the color spectrum.

Physiology has shown that the eyes of deer have more rod cells that

improve their night vision. The makeup of their eyes apparently gives them better ability to see short wave length colors – blues and even shades into the ultraviolet range. It's thought that deer can see ultraviolet range colors better than humans.

However, fewer cone cell sensors in deer eyes are said to leave them essentially red-green colorblind. Science has surmised that deer see little to no differences between greens, reds and oranges.

Based on those factors, the best way to stand out in the wild to deer would be to wear clothing of bright blue. Conversely, donning orange makes the wearer stand out to orange-sensitive, cone-plentiful human eyes but deer see the same color as darker and practically indistinguishable from green.

Hunter safety is the responsibility

of every hunter on the active end. That is, every hunter has the burden of making absolutely certain of his or her target before a decision to take the game, to shoot.

In an imperfect world with fallible decisions possible, however, the wearing of fluorescent orange compensates for what could be an occasional mistake with potential horrific consequences. When light and cover and overactive imagination might make it possible for one human to see another as what might be a deer, the gaudy, orange attire of the perceived hunter screams otherwise.

On the possible receiving end, the deer hunter should be wrapping himself in fluorescent orange vest or jacket and cap as if they were a lifesaving armor.
