Eighth case of E. coli reported

FRANKFORT — Another E. coli infection linked to a national outbreak has been reported in Kentucky, a state official said Friday.

A woman from Oldham County, just north of Louisville, became the eighth person in the state to suffer from the infection, said Gwenda Bond, spokeswoman for the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services.

The bacteria is known to have killed one person and sickened at least 158 others in 24 states since last month. Officials have traced the outbreak to contaminated spinach from at least one of nine farms and several processing plants in California.

The most recent victim in Kentucky was in her late 40s and received outpatient medical treatment, Bond said.

Another Oldham County woman was the only victim to remain hospitalized with the illness, Bond said.

In all, three cases of E. coli were reported in Oldham County, two in McCracken County and one each in Hopkins, Jefferson and Kenton counties.

The FDA has advised consumers not to eat fresh spinach or fresh spinach-containing products.

Magistrate wants water work repaired

PRESTONSBURG — Of the many items on the agenda at Friday's meeting of the Floyd County Fiscal Court, one had both positive and negative effects on many residents around the county.

Water line extensions throughout the county funded by coal severance taxes have had obvious positive effects

on residents. While this has proved to be a positive change, the construction work it has taken to get there is now revealing a cleanup problem that Magistrate Jackie Owens says is an aggravation to several residents who have also benefited from the extension.

Owens said he has been contacted by several residents complaining because their driveways and roadways leading to their homes have not been

repaired following water line construction. He also said it is the responsibility of the contractors on the job to repair the damage.

The argument Owens made to the court was that the contractors used a backhoe that was too large for the job and this was the reason most of the blacktop was removed.

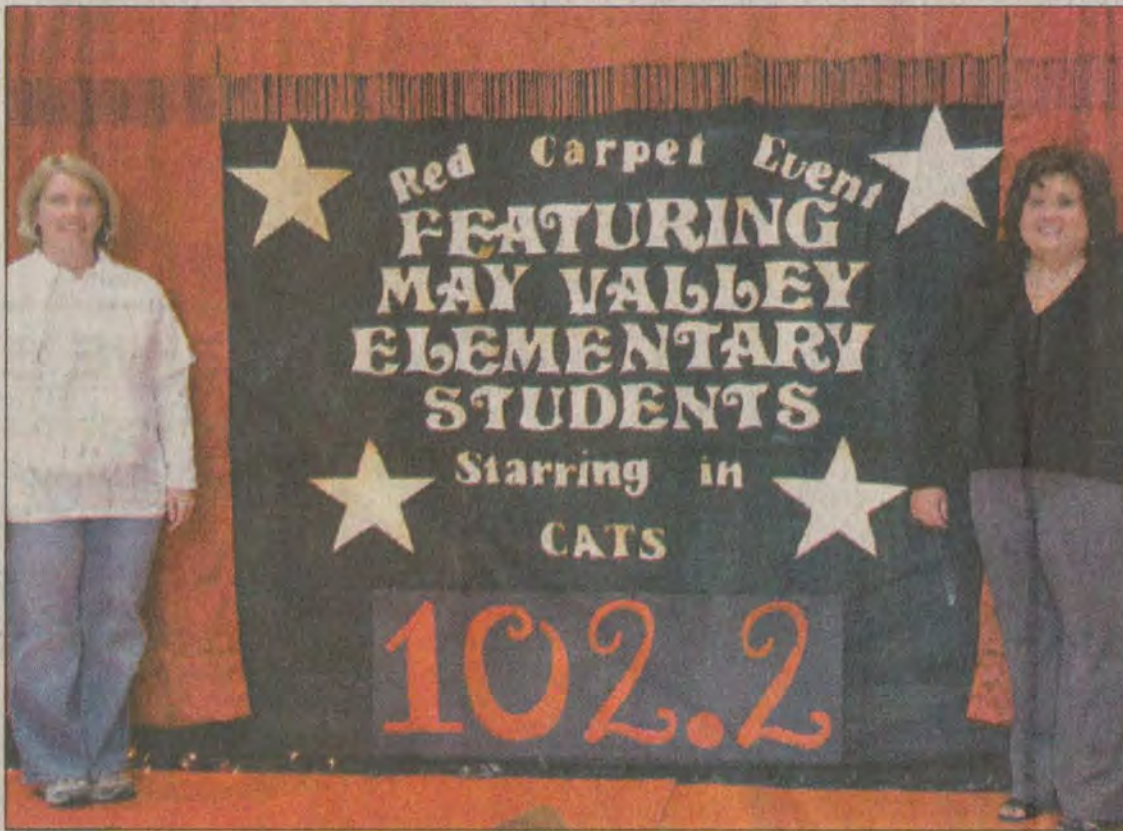
Employees of the contractor were in attendance to present their side of the story. They said they always use the

proper equipment for the jobs they complete and an inspector is on site every day to ensure things are done correctly.

Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson plans to visit some of the areas in question and proceed to work with the contractor to complete repairs.

"We will do what we can to work with the contractors to make repairs to these roads that have been damaged," said Owens.

May Valley, McDowell lead Floyd County schools on test

MARTIN — Several schools around the region are celebrating recent successes after the release of test results from state assessments for the year of 2006.

In particular, May Valley Elementary School is celebrating their success after discovering they had an academic index score of 102.2, making that school the first in Floyd County to score over 100 on the 140-point test.

May Valley principal Tonya Williams says school officials

very proud of both the students and teachers for working so hard to achieve this accomplishment.

May Valley also had four other scores of 100 or better, including 105.18 in practical living/vocational studies, 108.7 in math, 109.4 on the CTBS and 119.55 in social studies. According to academic index scores, May Valley Elementary is in the top 5 percent of all schools in the state.

Williams said the school is utilizing several programs which are helping students learn. They often use team teaching, collaboration among teachers and they have imple-

mented a core knowledge program to assist in teaching science and social studies.

Williams said administrators are already analyzing scores in order to look for ways to improve even more next year. They are planning visits for teachers to other high performing schools in order to give teachers at May Valley the chance to borrow ideas and encourage them to think of new ones.

"We think our students and teachers deserve recognition for all of their dedication and hard

Sex offender gets six-year jail sentence

PRESTONSBURG — A Floyd County man pleaded guilty to three felony sex crimes Monday and was sentenced to six years in prison.

Johnny Spears, 52, pleaded guilty to two counts of first-degree unlawful transaction with a minor and one count of first-degree sexual abuse.

Spears entered the plea two weeks ago and was sentenced at that time but a hearing was held on

Friday after Spears' defense attorney disputed part of a pre-sentencing report.

Dr. Nancy Smith, a clinical psychologist who has worked for the Kentucky Department of Corrections for seven years, prepared a comprehensive sex offender evaluation of Spears and placed him in the high-risk category, meaning she believes there is a strong possibility he will commit a sexual abuse

Martin man pleads guilty to selling pills

PRESTONSBURG — A 68-year-old Martin man pleaded guilty Friday to six counts of trafficking hydrocodone and Oxycontin and is expected to spend six years in prison.

Ronald Gene Stone Sr. was indicted in May and arrested in June after agents from Operation UNITE recorded Stone on audio and videotape on three separate occasions selling the drugs out of his apartment in October and November 2005.

The first buy took place Oct. 25, 2005, when an undercover agent purchased Oxycontin and hydrocodone and recorded the transaction on audiotape at Stone's apartment. The agent again caught Stone on audiotape selling Oxycontin Oct. 26 and Nov. 1.

At that point, a search warrant was issued for Stone's apartment and upon execution of the warrant agents found large amounts of Oxycontin and hydrocodone in his home

Former coach arrested after cocaine found

PRESTONSBURG — A Prestonsburg man was arrested Sunday and charged with trafficking in cocaine.

Stephen Randy Gearheart, 46, was arrested on Route 80 at Watergap at 2:30 p.m. by Det. Tim Dials of Kentucky State Police. He was charged with first-degree cocaine trafficking, which is a felony.

Gearheart spent Sunday in the Floyd County Detention Center before being released after his arraignment Monday morning, where he posted a \$25,000 cash bond. He had a preliminary hearing on the matter set for Sept. 26 in Floyd District Court.

Gearheart was Prestonsburg Little League president four years ago and was previously a basketball coach at Adams Middle School, but has not been involved in coaching at any school for the last two years.

■ **MONTPELIER, Vt.** — Will it be ApricotAbra' or Wackie Chan? Italian Renaissance or Mojito?

How about Puttin' on a Ritz?

Ben & Jerry's has winnowed down more than 40,000 suggestions for a new flavor to five finalists, and will turn their customer-creators loose next month in the "Flavor Finals," to see which is tastiest.

The five finalists get expense-paid trips to the ice cream maker's Waterbury plant, where they will whip up their concoctions for the company's flavor gurus in the Oct. 4-5 finals.

The five finalists include Timothy Link, 36, of Troy, Idaho, whose suggestion was Mojito, a lime-based sherbet with mint, brown sugar and rum; and Tasha Callister, 26, of Jackson, Fla., whose Puttin' on a Ritz would consist of vanilla ice cream, caramel and Ritz crackers.

The others are: Robin Thorneycroft, 25, of Richmond, B.C., who suggested a flavor she calls Italian Renaissance, made of amaretto liqueur ice cream, cherry chunks and sliced almonds; Kerstin Karlhuber, 25, of Boston, whose Wackie Chan would be sweet cream and ginger-flavored ice cream, with chocolate-covered fortune cookie bits and fudge swirl; and Reina Chilton, 26, of Tempe, Ariz., who recom-

mended "ApricotAbra," a mix of apricot chunks, dark chocolate, vanilla ice cream and tart apricot preserves.

■ **BOILING SPRINGS, Pa.** — Ron Zaleski is trying to accomplish quite a feat: Hiking the entire Appalachian Trail in his bare feet.

His goal is to bring attention to the need for combat veterans to receive counseling. "In the beginning I thought, 'I gotta do this to show how tough I am. I want to be famous,'" he said at a recent pause to eat some pecan ice cream. "Now I just want to help these kids."

Zaleski, a retired health-club owner from Flanders, N.Y., said other hikers tend to stop complaining about the weight of their equipment or sore feet when they see him.

Zaleski said his aversion to wearing shoes began after he left the Marine Corps following a two-year stint in the early 1970s. Going barefoot started as a protest against the Vietnam War, although for 33 years he didn't make his explanation public, he said.

But recently when a little boy asked him why he was barefoot, he told him the reason.

"I'd almost forgotten why I was doing it," Zaleski said.

■ **CHEYENNE, Wyo.** — People were seeing double last week when three sets of twins were born in a single day at

United Medical Center.

The births, the most ever for the Cheyenne hospital, prompted extra staff members to come in Thursday and handle the workload.

"It was kind of chaotic," Mike Munari, whose wife, Tonya, gave birth to Jameson and Addison. They were the only parents of the three sets of twins to use fertility drugs.

Also born Thursday were Braxton and Daxton Thomas, sons of Mike and Glenda Thomas, and Trista and Trenton Hoover, a daughter and son born to Michelle Hoover.

Glenda Thomas gave birth to her boys on her birthday, which will make the date even easier to remember, Mike Thomas said.

"I've got the best two presents I could ever have," Glenda added.

■ **MEDINA, Ohio** — When two gas stations were vandalized last year, police said the culprit wasn't an angry motorist. They said it was a rival station owner.

Steven Herold, 41, who owns a Shell station, pleaded not guilty to four counts of vandalism Monday in Medina County Common Pleas Court.

Detective Scott Thomas said Herold is suspected of vandalizing his two closest competitors, a Marathon station and a Clark Oil station, because both had lower prices.

He is accused of putting

glue in credit card readers, spraying foul-smelling deer repellent on pumps and throwing beer bottles through windows.

A trial date was set for Jan. 8.

Police said a break in the case was when surveillance tapes recorded the same silver GMC Envoy at about the time the rival station owners reported the vandalism. The tapes were used to identify a license plate and the owner.

■ **RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil** — Claudio Paulo Pinto is looking to break an eye-popping record. Literally.

Pinto can pop his eyeballs at least 7 millimeters (0.3 inches) out of their sockets, a national record for eye-popping, according to RankBrasil, an organization modeled after the Guinness Book of World Records that lists Brazilian records.

A former driver, Pinto got a job scaring visitors in a commercial haunted house in Belo Horizonte, 210 miles north of Rio de Janeiro. But he recently was laid off and now seeks international recognition for his ability.

"I was measured by an ophthalmologist on television in January. I could pop my eyes out 7 millimeters," Pinto said by telephone Saturday. "Since then, my capacities have improved over 50 percent."

That could put Pinto close to the world record. The title of "furthest eyeball popper" in

the Guinness Book of World Records belongs to Kim Goodman, of Chicago, who can pop her eyeballs 11 millimeters (0.43 inches) out of her sockets.

Pinto's ability is called "globe luxation." Doctors say it can strain blood vessels and nerves between the eyes and the head and feels unpleasant but usually doesn't cause lasting damage.

Pinto says he's been luxating his globes since he was 9 years old and "it doesn't hurt a bit."

■ **ASHLAND** — It was neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night that kept Charles Fred Miller from his appointed rounds.

Miller, a one-time mail carrier in the Eastern Kentucky city of Grayson, said it was

simply laziness.

The 32 year-old pleaded guilty Friday to a federal charge related to undelivered mail. He told U.S. District Judge David L. Bunning that he stuffed more than 500 items of undelivered mail into garbage bags in a storage shed behind his house.

"I just got lazy," Miller said.

A federal grand jury indicted Miller in July on felony counts of stealing mail, possessing stolen mail and obstructing correspondence, along with a misdemeanor charge of deserting the mail.

Three charges were dropped as part of a plea agreement, and Miller admitted to one count of obstructing correspondence. Sentencing was set for Dec. 4.

again without proper treatment. The designation would also place him on the sex offender registry for the rest of his life.

The defense called Smith to testify to see whether she had used hearsay evidence as a basis for her final conclusion in her risk assessment. She replied that she is simply required by her agency to include in her report all such occurrences that arise and leave it up to the courts to

decide what to do with what information.

Despite the hearing, no changes were made to Spears' sentence and he will spend six years in prison. His sentence has been credited with 227 days he has already served.

The most damaging piece of evidence found during the search was the money, because \$60 of it had matching serial numbers from cash used by officers during the initial drug buy from Stone, meaning they had him on tape selling the drugs and had the money they had used.

Stone made after he was arrested, he admitted he had been selling Oxycotin from his home and that he had just purchased and sold more in days prior to his arrest.

"UNITE should be complimented for their work in this case," said Wayne Taylor, chief assistant commonwealth's attorney. "It was three buys and then they followed it up with a search warrant and

Forsaking justice in the name of justice

Nine days after Osama bin Laden struck the United States, President Bush appeared in Congress and delivered the speech of his life. He quelled American fears and extolled American values.

"Whether we bring our enemies to justice or bring justice to our enemies, justice will be done," the president vowed. But, he added, "We're in a fight for our principles, and our first responsibility is to live by them."

Five 9-11s later, the Bush administration has moved 14 high-value suspects from secret CIA prisons to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. Among them is Khalid Sheikh Mohammed, the suspected architect of the 9-11 attacks. Now he wants Congress to approve the military tribunals in which he proposes to try Mohammed and other suspected terrorists.

Deep in every patriotic heart is the desire to bring the killers to justice. But our pursuit of justice must be scrupulously just. That is a central American value. The president's proposed tribunals mock it. Bush is asking Congress to give sanction to a judicial process that could include evidence obtained from hearsay and through coercion. Further, it would allow evidence that could be kept secret from the accused, thereby denying him any hope of rebutting it.

The president's new proposal is only marginally better than one the U.S. Supreme Court rejected this summer. It has, of course, drawn fire from civil libertarians. But it is also rejected by principled conservatives such as the military's top legal officers.

"I'm not aware of any situation in the world where there is a system of jurisprudence that is recognized by civilized people where an individual can be tried and convicted without seeing the evidence against him," Brig. Gen. James Walker, a U.S. Marine Corps staff judge advocate, said in testimony before Congress.

Further, he said, "I don't think the United States needs to become the first in that scenario." Hear, hear.

The general and other patriotic observers are correct, both for moral and pragmatic reasons. Embracing internationally revered standards of judicial fairness is inherently right. And it is eminently wise; who wants U.S. soldiers to be tried by foreign courts that allow coerced and secret evidence?

We Americans are, as the president said five years ago, in a fight for our principles. Our first obligation is, indeed, to live by them. In the next five years, let us pray that we do.

Bush's Vietnam?

For the past 30 years, left-right debate over America's wars has traveled a well-worn rut. The left says whatever war is in question is "another Vietnam," while the right denies it. After three decades of being serially wrong, in the Iraq War liberals might be making their first-ever correct diagnosis.

In Iraq, as in Vietnam, we face a vicious insurgency that has worn down the will of the American public. In Iraq, as in Vietnam, we have failed to cut off the enemy from re-supply. In Iraq, as in Vietnam, we have had ever-shifting military strategies. In Iraq, as in Vietnam, we have had trouble building effective, clean governmental institutions in the soil of an alien culture. Most importantly, in Iraq, as in Vietnam, we face the prospect of defeat.

The consequences of that defeat would be remarkably similar to those in the wake of Vietnam. The prestige of the U.S. government would sink around the world, emboldening our enemies and creating a period of American doubt and retreat. A humanitarian catastrophe would likely befall Iraq, just as it did Vietnam. The only significant difference is that in Iraq, radical Islamists harbor ambi-

tions to come to our shores and kill Americans, whereas the Viet Cong never wanted to follow us home.

The American domestic political scene already has the hallmarks of Vietnam redux. The Democrats are waging an intraparty civil war to marginalize supporters of the war, and they revile President Bush as much as they did President Nixon. Republicans, on the other hand, are hoping that the Democrats lurch too far in their dovishness and will, once again, discredit themselves on national security for a generation.

The two parties have clashing imperatives in the Iraq debate. The Democrats want to wage a fight over the war in retrospect while declining to make any positive prescriptions that might divide their party or expose unpopular positions (e.g., an immediate pullout). The Republicans have to fight in prospect, avoiding the losing debate over the past while convincing people they have a plausible strategy for success and the Democrats have none.

But what is that strategy? For too long, President Bush's administration has seemed content to do the bare

minimum in Iraq, hoping to hold things together just enough to allow troop drawdowns that justify its assurances of progress. Bush would be much better served by forthrightly acknowledging Iraq's distressing circumstances and backing an all-out push to secure Baghdad even if it

takes thousands of more American troops in the country.

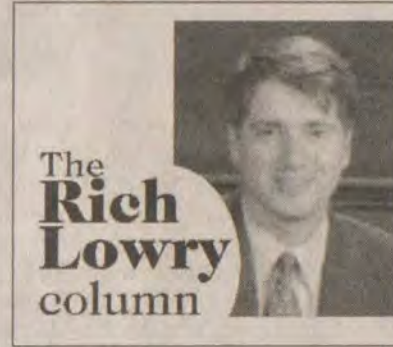
Because there is one other similarity with Vietnam that should be avoided — the aching sense that not everything was done to win the war. By the end of

Vietnam, we had essentially beaten the insurgency and could have helped the South Vietnamese hold off the conventional invasion of the North, if we hadn't given up.

In Iraq, too, we have scored some successes against the Sunni insurgency. It is not too late to tamp down the militia-directed violence, which hasn't yet taken on an uncontrollable life of its own. But the clock is ticking, toward the hour when we will indeed suffer another Vietnam.

Such real news can only be measured through its success in building an informed democracy, stimulating grassroots activism, and motivating resistance to top-down institutions. Democratic activism underlies the purpose, reason, and message of free speech.

Project Censored has just released an annual list of the most important real news stories not covered by the corporate media in the United States — a compilation of the best examples of journalism that the corporate media marginalized.

■ Future of Internet Debate Ignored by Media

Throughout 2005 and 2006, a large underground debate raged regarding the future of the Internet. Referred to as "network neutrality," the issue has become a tug of war with cable companies on the one hand and citizen consumers and Internet service providers on the other.

■ Halliburton Charged with Selling Nuclear Technologies to Iran

As recently as January 2005, and for a decade before, Halliburton sold key components for a nuclear reactor to an Iranian oil development company in violation of U.S. sanctions.

■ Oceans of the World in Extreme Danger

Sea temperature and chemistry changes, along with contamination and reckless fishing practices intertwine to imperil the world's largest communal life source.

■ Hunger and Homelessness Increasing in the U.S.

The number of hungry and homeless people in U.S. cities continued to grow in 2005.

■ High-Tech Genocide in Congo

The world's most neglected emergency is the ongoing tragedy of the Congo, where 6 million to 7 million people have died since 1996 as a consequence of invasions and wars sponsored by Western powers trying to gain control of the region's mineral wealth.

■ Federal Whistleblower Protection in Jeopardy

Special Counsel Scott Bloch, appointed by President Bush in 2004, is overseeing the virtual elimination of federal whistleblower rights in the U.S. government.

■ U.S. Operatives Torture Detainees to Death in Afghanistan and Iraq

The American Civil Liberties Union released documents of 44 autopsies held in Afghanistan and Iraq October 25, 2005. Twenty-one of those deaths were listed as homicides. These documents present irrefutable evidence that U.S. operatives tortured detainees to death during interrogation.

■ Pentagon Exempt from Freedom of Information Act

In December 2005, Congress passed the 2006 Defense Authorization Act which renders Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) "operational files" fully immune to FOIA requests, the main mechanism

by which watchdog groups, journalists and individuals can access federal documents.

■ The World Bank Funds Israel-Palestine Wall

Despite the 2004 International Court of Justice (ICJ) decision that called for tearing down the Israel-Palestinian Wall — construction of the Wall has accelerated using World Bank funds.

■ Expanded Air War in Iraq Kills More Civilians

A key element of Bush's draw-down plans in Iraq includes increased uses of airpower. Expanded air strikes will likely lead to increased civilian deaths.

Democracy doesn't work when last-minute sound bites take the place of important public debate and comprise the bulk of information that could be available to the American electorate. A functioning democracy requires that issues be covered extensively before critical decisions are made in Congress and other decision-making bodies. We need time for review and analysis of crucial issues, not confusing, minute-long news blips.

We have a long way to go in building a media system in the United States that supports a healthy democratic process. Our efforts are but one piece of a larger dynamic of citizen-based democracy. Each piece is important as it works to build strategies that validate the core American values of freedom, equality and accountability. We need to turn off corporate news and act within our communities to find or establish independent sources of information that feed our democratic souls and build cooperative human societies.

I saw her last night for the first time in years. She was miserable. She had bleached her hair, trying to hide its true color, just as her rough front hid her deep unhappiness. She needed to talk, so we went for a walk. While I thought about my future, the college applications that had recently arrived, she thought about her past, the home she had recently left. Then she spoke. She told me about her love — and I

saw a dependent relationship with a dominating man. She told me about the drugs — and I saw that they were her escape. She told me about her goals — and I saw unrealistic material dreams. She told me she needed a friend — and I saw hope, because at least I could give her that.

We had met in the second grade. She was missing a tooth; I was missing my friends. I had just moved across the continent to find cold metal walls and cold smirking faces outside the foreboding doors of P.S. 174,

my new school. I asked her if I could see her Archie comic book, even though I didn't really like comics; she said yes, even though she didn't really like to share. Maybe we were both looking for a smile. And we found it. We found someone to giggle with late at night, someone to slurp hot chocolate with on the cold winter days when school was canceled and we would sit together by the bay window, watching the snow endlessly falling.

In the summer, at the pool, I got stung by a bee. She held my hand and

What would cause a muffler to explode? We just had work done on our '93 Saab 900S. It was running very sluggish up hills, and diagnostics showed several leaks in the exhaust pipes leading out of the catalytic converter. After having a new converter and pipes installed, the car was better, but still a little sluggish. Within a week, we were accelerating to get on a highway, and the muffler exploded. It literally burst open along the side. What kind of pressure would cause this, and should our mechanic have picked up on a muffler problem in the first place? — Angela

RAY: Well, here's the key question, Angela: After the muffler exploded, did the car run better?

TOM: If so, the muffler might have been the source of the sluggishness. Often what happens is that when a catalytic converter fails, its innards disintegrate and get pushed farther down the exhaust system, where they can lodge in the muffler baffles and plug it up.

RAY: That would cause exactly the symptoms you describe — the car would be sluggish when climbing hills or accelerating. If the tailpipe is blocked and the engine's exhaust can't get out, the fresh fuel and air have no room to come in, so the engine bogs

down.

TOM: So both your catalytic converter AND muffler might have been clogged. And when your mechanic replaced the converter, the acceleration improved a little bit, but the pressure on the muffler multiplied. At some point, the pressure got to be too much and the muffler burst at its weakest point — the seam.

RAY: While that makes you unwelcome in most bedroom communities after dark, it also allows the exhaust to escape. So the car should run better. And once you replace the muffler, you should be all set.

TOM: Mufflers sometimes explode due to backfires, caused by too much unburned fuel in the exhaust system. But given all the corroborating symptoms you have, I'm betting yours was just badly clogged. Next time, try Mufflermucil.

The cost of being efficient

Dear Tom and Ray:
Back in the '80s and '90s, there were some ultra-efficient cars like the Suzuki Swift, Honda CRX and Honda Civic. I owned a VW Rabbit diesel that got 45 miles per gallon with my lead foot. All sold for under \$15,000 and had real mileage ratings of 45 mpg or more. Even factoring in inflation, I'm curious why we have to pay an extra \$5,000-\$10,000 for hybrid technology to get the same mileage that a

good old-fashioned, gas-only car was able to achieve 20 years ago. Please tell me why this is so. — John

TOM: That's a good question, John. There are several answers.

RAY: One is that there's a lot of stuff on cars today that wasn't required or expected on cars 20 years ago. There are anti-lock braking systems, side-curtain air bags, reinforced beams in doors, electric windows, butt warmers, butt coolers and butt jigglers, just to name a few things. So economy cars now weigh a lot more than they did back then, because our expectations for even entry-level cars have increased. As a result, today's economy cars are a lot safer and more comfortable than the tin-can deathtraps you mention.

TOM: Second, cars today are bigger than they were 20 years ago, with more interior room. Look at today's Honda Civic. It's as big as the larger Honda Accord used to be in the '80s. Every time a model is redesigned, it seems, it gains a few inches in each direction (like its owners, I guess), so even our small cars are pretty big these days.

RAY: Finally, and probably most important, we've gone horsepower-crazy. Back in the early '80s, when we temporarily gave a whit about fuel economy, the average car had about 100 horsepower. A small

family car like the 1982 Honda Accord had 75 hp. By comparison, a 2007 four-cylinder Accord has 166 hp. A six-cylinder Accord has 244 hp! And that's considered a modest, midsize car today.

TOM: Upward of 200 horsepower is practically expected today. And there are cars with 300 hp, 400 hp and more. In my humble opinion, that's crazy. There's not a car on the road that truly needs more than 200 hp. Most cars would be fine with a lot less.

RAY: So in the past 25 years, instead of taking all of the technological advances we've made and making a 120-hp Accord that gets 60 mpg, we have a 244-hp Accord that gets 30 mpg.

TOM: Why is that? Because of some combination of (A) that's what we want and (B) the carmakers have made us think that's what we need. But we don't. Is it really more important for us to get from zero to 60 mph a few seconds faster than for America to be energy-independent and not have to fight oil wars in the Middle East and pay through the nose for gasoline? Not to me, it isn't.

RAY: Now, \$3-a-gallon gasoline might change our opinions of what we need. In fact, it's already changing them. Huge, heavy SUVs with overpowered engines are getting a lot harder to sell.

TOM: An increasing num-



er Ford Focus (130 hp, 37 mpg highway), the Chevy Cobalt (145 hp, 34 mpg highway) or the fun-to-drive BMW Mini Cooper (115 hp, 36 mpg highway).

TOM: But the bottom line is that carmakers listen to only one thing, and it's not annoying automotive columnists like us. They look at their sales numbers. If people are buying 300-hp Hemis, they design and make more cars like that.

RAY: So if we want more choices in high-mileage cars, we have to buy high-mileage cars and let the gas guzzlers sit on the lots longer. So, it's not up to you and me, John; it's up to the people who are putting their money down now and signing on the dotted line. They'll determine the range of options the rest of us have a few years from now.

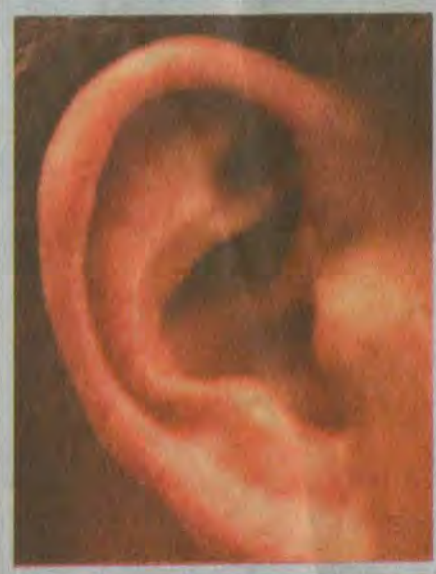

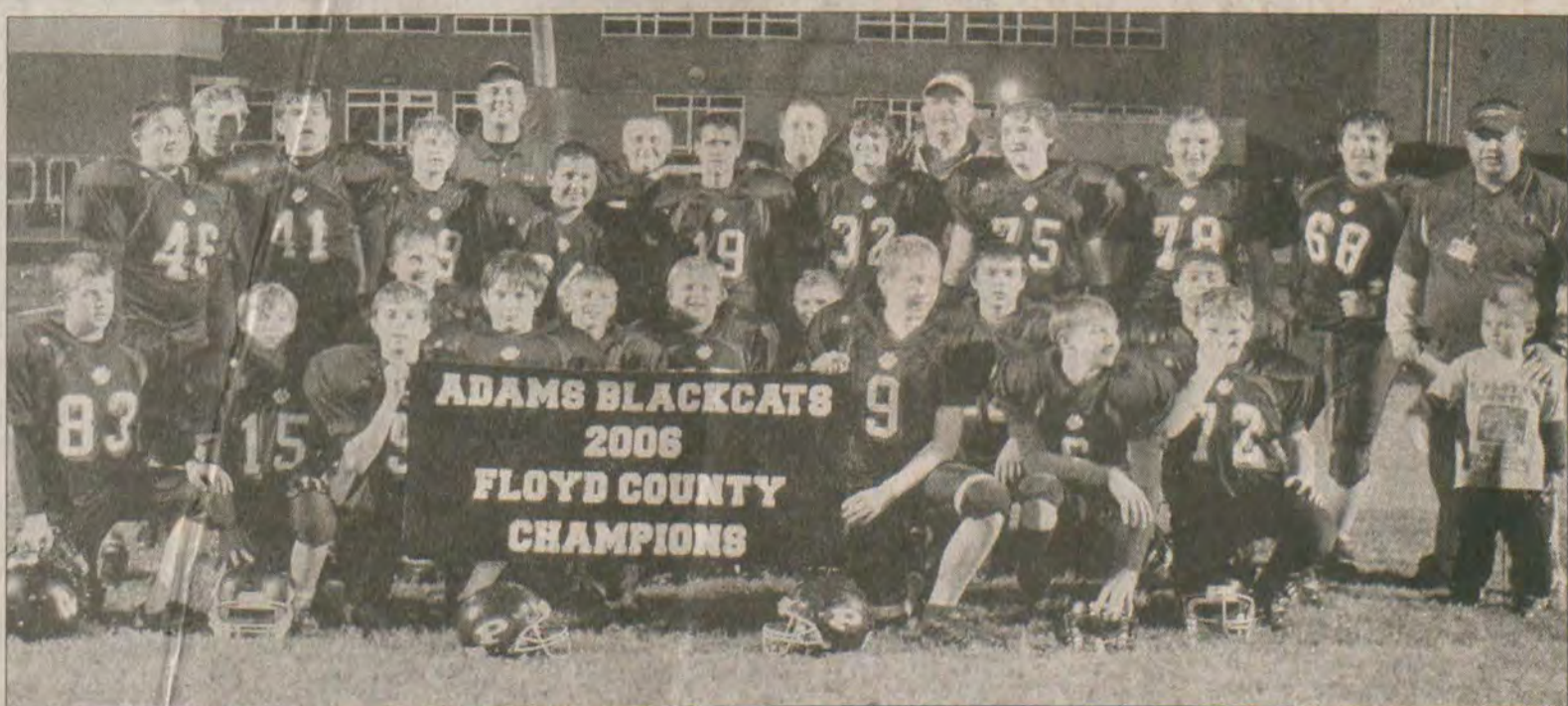

In 1990 Curry replaced former AFCA President Jerry Claiborne as the head coach at the University of Kentucky, a position Curry held through 1996. Curry's 1993 Wildcat squad posted a 6-6 record and earned a berth in the Peach Bowl. That season Kentucky recorded its first three-game SEC winning streak in 16 seasons and won two SEC road games for the first time in nine seasons.

LEXINGTON - For the first time in school history, the Kentucky women's basketball team has earned top-25 preseason rankings by Athlon Sports magazine and Lindy's Basketball Annual which were released recently. The Wildcats, who had a record-breaking regular season in 2006 that included the most wins (22) in 16 years, a school-record nine SEC victories, the highest conference finish (fourth) in 23 years, and UK's first appearance in the NCAA

Tournament in seven years, are ranked No. 14 by Athlon Sports and No. 18 by Lindy's.

"It's exciting for our program to be ranked in these preseason polls," UK Coach Mickie DeMoss said. "With that excitement there are also a lot of expectations but I think I am much more accustomed to dealing with high expectations than no expectations. (Memphis, Tenn.) also is back after receiving a medical hardship for missing all but six games of her sophomore year with an illness. Humphrey led UK and ranked fourth in the SEC last season in rebounding (8.5 rpg). Carly Ormerod (Louisville), an All-SEC Freshman team member last season, returns as the floor general after starting in all 31 games during her rookie campaign and averaging a team-high 31.1 minutes per game. MATEWAN, W.Va. - Matewan High School officials have forfeited the football team's first three wins after a player was ruled ineligible.

But Matewan Principal Marcella Charles said she plans to appeal the ruling.

Senior Garrett Epling's eligibility

came into question after transferring from the Belfry High School.

Charles said the decision to forfeit the games was made by her and officials from the Secondary School Activities Commission. She notified high school principals of Shelby Valley in Kentucky, Madonna and Williamson of the decision this week.

Matewan (4-0), was ranked No. 5 on Tuesday in the SSAC's Class A computer ratings. After forfeiting, Matewan's record would change to 1-3 and its position in the ratings would drop drastically, throwing its playoff prospects in jeopardy. The top 16 teams make the playoffs.

On Thursday, the rankings had not changed; Matewan was still No. 5

while Madonna was tied at No. 15 and Williamson was 26.

Matewan coach Yogi Kinder said earlier this week he was told to hold Epling out of the Tigers' game Saturday against Man. Epling was a linebacker and a backup running back in the first three games for the Tigers.

Mike Hayden, the SSAC's executive director, declined comment Thursday, saying it was up to the school to release any information.

Charles declined to discuss the matter further.

"I have to protect the rights of the student," she said Thursday. "We will be doing the right thing at Matewan High School."

Yearling sale sets world mark in sales

LEXINGTON - Keeneland's 10-day sales figures for its September Yearling Sale set a world record for a thoroughbred auction Thursday, reaching \$385,707,000.

The mark broke the record set at

last year's 14-day September sale, \$384,349,900.

The sale's average price is 5.4 percent more than last year, \$148,292, compared with \$140,639 for 2005. The median price of \$70,000 is up 16.7 percent from last year's \$60,000. In the first 10 days, 2,601 horses have sold, compared with 2,640 last year.

Keeneland sold 285 horses Thursday for \$8,523,300, up 5.6 percent from 2005 when 287 horses

brought \$8,067,800. The average is 6.4 percent more than last year, \$29,906, compared with \$28,111 in 2005. The median price of \$20,000 was the same.

The day's top price of \$330,000 was paid for a filly by Pulpit out of the Meadowlake mare Audrey Paulina. Southern Equine Stables purchased the yearling, consigned by Claiborne Farm as agent.

The sale continues through Monday.

Palmer, Cowher turning Bengals vs. Steelers into real rivalry

PITTSBURGH — There's something different now about the Bengals-Steelers division rivalry, one that has rarely raised itself above the lukewarm level for 36 years. It's actually a real rivalry.

From Carson Palmer's "I hate the Steelers" mantra to Bill Cowher's appropriation of the "Who Dey" chant to the read-between-the-lines undertones regarding the Steelers' injuring of Palmer in the playoffs, it's obvious this is now a circle-the-calendar game.

To the Bengals (2-0), Sunday's game — the teams' first matchup since Palmer badly injured his left knee during Pittsburgh's 31-17 playoff victory in January — is a chance to validate their belief they are the AFC North's best team. That they could have won the Super Bowl, not the Steelers, if Palmer hadn't been hurt.

To the Steelers (1-1), it's a chance to get their own play back to a championship level, which it hasn't been so far, and to quiet the talk that the balance of power in the division and maybe the AFC has shifted to Cincinnati.

"I won't say they're our biggest rival, but they've definitely made it a good rivalry now," Steelers linebacker

Joey Porter. "It's about time they got it to the point where you can recognize it as a rivalry."

Especially since it's mostly been a tepid dislike until now, one that would only occasionally rear up with a good game here or a spicy comment there. But it's a clearly distinguishable one now after decades of domination by one or the other — the Steelers in the 1970s (14-5) — and 1990s (13-7), the Bengals in the 1980s (13-6).

That all changed when former Steelers defensive end Kimo von Oelhoffen badly injured Palmer's knee by rolling across it following a 66-yard completion on Cincinnati's first pass completion in the playoffs. Many Bengals felt the injury altered the outcome of the game, and there still seems to be some hesitation to accept von Oelhoffen's explanation there was no intent to injure — even if Palmer has absolved him.

"I was having personal battles with their coaching staff," Porter said that day. "They made it seem as if that play was intentional."

Von Oelhoffen wasn't penalized but, two months later, the NFL competition committee pushed through a rule banning onrushing defensive players from hitting quarterbacks below the knee.

If losing their star QB and their

season wasn't bad enough, the Bengals also had to hear Cowher twice recite their signature "Who Dey" chant — once in the locker room after the game, and again during the Super Bowl victory celebration.

Cowher was seizing on the fact the Steelers overcame tough road obstacles and hostile, intense fans, but realized later he may have riled up the Bengals, who are 8-20 against Cowher-coached teams.

"When I say 'Who Dey,' you say 'We Dey,'" Cowher yelled to his players in Cincinnati.

The Bengals have a chance to respond Sunday.

"Everybody's talking, 'It's Steeler week, it's Steeler week,'" Palmer said. "I'm not sure if in Pittsburgh they're saying, 'It's Bengal week,' but around here it means a lot to us."

Of course, Palmer's own avowed hatred of the Steelers turned up the intensity of the rivalry a notch, too, even if Porter isn't ready to say he feels the same way about Cincinnati.

"The rivalries we play with Baltimore, some face masks get ripped off and some people get stepped on," said Porter, who said the Bengals don't yet compare to the Ravens. "There are a lot of dirty things that go on in that game. That's a true dislike."

Palmer's remarkably fast return from his serious knee injuries obviously has meant a lot to the Bengals, who can start 3-0 in successive seasons for the first time in franchise history. He has thrown for 479 yards and two touchdowns, and now goes against a Steelers pass defense that has given up an uncharacteristically high 492 yards, the fifth most in the NFL.

However, the Bengals are banged up at receiver. Team mouthpiece Chad Johnson is getting over a concussion, Tab Perry — he of the 94-yard kickoff return against the Steelers in December — is out with a hip injury, and T.J. Houshmanzadeh has a sore heel. Houshmanzadeh has yet to play, and the Bengals practiced most of the week with only four healthy receivers.

The Steelers have worries of their own, with Ben Roethlisberger looking rusty in a 9-0 loss to the Jaguars on Monday, only their fourth shutout loss since Cowher took over in 1992.

Roethlisberger, playing in a real game for the first time since his motorcycle accident and his appendectomy, was limited to 141 yards passing. Even worse for the Steelers, it came on a night they ran for a Cowher-era low 26 yards. Willie Parker had only 20 yards after gaining 115 against Miami in the opener.

The Steelers also had a short week of preparation for a potentially pivotal game in defining which team has the edge in the division.

"It's not time to hit the panic button yet, but at the same time it's a must win," Porter said.

Rookie Hamlin ignores Chase pressure

Dennis Hamlin recalls his son's first go-kart race with a chuckle.

"He was 7 years old," Hamlin said. "He finished the race and we couldn't get him to stop. We were chasing after him telling him it was time to get out, and he wasn't listening."

Denny Hamlin, now 25, is a lot better at listening to his parents these days, but he's also just as determined to race.

Heading into Sunday's NASCAR Nextel Cup Dover 400, Hamlin is well on his way to being the Raybestos Rookie of the Year. He is also the first true rookie to compete in the 10-race Chase for the championship.

But being among the top 10 drivers and having a shot at winning a title in his first full season doesn't seem to faze the youngster from Chesterfield, Va.

After finishing fourth in the Chase opener last Sunday at New Hampshire, Hamlin is second in the standings, 35 points behind leader Kevin Harvick. That's quite a spot for a youngster who only two years ago was racing late-model stock cars and wondering if he was going to get a real shot at the big time.

"To me, the pressure's off," Hamlin said. "The season's almost over. You might as well not even count points for me any more."

Hamlin acknowledges the battle to secure a place in the Chase was "nerve-racking," but that's over now.

"I just went out there (Sunday) and I didn't even think we were in the top 10 in points," he said. "I haven't even thought about it. I feel like I have less pressure on me than anybody else does. Nobody really expects a rookie to win it."

If he did, it would be quite an ending to his story. To get him to this point, the entire Hamlin family has gone through the wringer.

Dennis Hamlin says the family went through about \$750,000 trying to keep Denny racing. That included selling two classic cars and taking out two second mortgages on their home.

"I wanted to be able to sit in my rocking chair and say I did everything I could to get him there," Dennis said. "I wanted him to have every possible

chance to make it."

But even with his parents' sacrifices, Hamlin was out of money late in the 2002 season and getting ready to sell his car and work full time in his dad's trailer and hitch business.

A chance meeting with team owner Jim Dean at South Boston Speedway got the youngster a ride for the next season. The kid won 25 of 36 races and took the championship at Southern National Speedway in Kenly, N.C.

Dean's team also provided cars for Joe Gibbs Racing's diversity program, and team president J.D. Gibbs quickly saw Hamlin's potential, signing him before he even determined where Hamlin would race.

After running a handful of NASCAR truck races and one Busch event in 2004, Hamlin ran the full Busch Series in 2005, finishing fifth in the points. He also ran seven Cup races in preparation for moving up to the big series.

He won a pole and had three top-10 finishes in that brief Cup audition, raising expectations.

No problem. Hamlin has lived up to the hype.

He's drawn praise from many of the top drivers in the series, including teammate and two-time Cup champion Tony Stewart, who says he's "amazed" by the kid's maturity and

focus.

"Tony always seems to talk to me at the best times, and that's right before I get in the race car," Hamlin said. "The last thing I hear is his voice telling me whatever he tells me."

Four-time champion Jeff Gordon also has had praise for Hamlin, saying, "He is very talented and very determined. He's got a great future."

Hamlin is grateful for the kind words, but said he's still just trying to do the best he can.

"Running against those guys every single week, I feel like I've kind of grown up in the racing part of it," Hamlin said. "A lot of Raybestos rookies, you get to run in the top 10 maybe a few times and you don't understand how these guys up front drive."

"Well, I've been lucky enough and run well enough where I race against these guys every single race, and it's taught me the right way to race them. It's made me a lot more mature over the year and I think it's definitely taken my learning curve and cut it in half."

It looks like Dennis Hamlin can relax. He should have lots of good memories when he eventually sits down in that rocking chair.

FRANKFORT — Kentucky hunters who want to participate in deer, pheasant and waterfowl quota hunts must apply for these hunts by calling toll free at 1-877-598-2401 before Sept. 30. Applications for all three types of quota hunts may be made at the same time. A representative will assist in the application process. Hunters must tell the operator you are applying for a Kentucky quota hunt.

Any resident or nonresident may apply for a standard quota deer hunt. Only the person successfully drawn may participate. Substitutions are not allowed. Adults may only apply once and may choose the option of picking a first and second hunt choice, but will only be drawn for one hunt. Each hunter that applies correctly, but is not chosen, receives a preference point that increases the odds of being drawn the next year. The hunter loses all previously collected preference points if they do not apply the following year.

Applicants are selected based on individual preference points and up to five people may apply together with one call. If one person in the group is drawn, the others in the group are drawn as well. The non-refundable fee is \$3 for the hunter to apply for a standard deer quota hunt.

Hunters may take two deer on quota hunts, one of which may be antlered, except for quota hunts listed under the "Special Instructions for Quota Deer Hunts" listed on page 26 of the 2006-2007 Kentucky Hunting and Trapping Guide. Application instructions and quota hunt choices

are listed on pages 22, 23 and 24 of the same guide. Hunters may also log on to fw.ky.gov and click on the "Hunting" tab for more information on deer quota hunts. Statewide licensing requirements apply to quota deer hunters.

You don't have to drive to Kansas or Nebraska to hunt pheasants. Kentuckians may choose from six hunts in November and December on Green River and Clay Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs). The first three hunts will be held at Green River WMA on Nov. 17, 18 and 19, 2006 with 100 hunters per hunt. The second three hunts will be held at Clay WMA on Dec. 1, 2 and 3, 2006 with 70 hunters per hunt.

An individual may apply once for each of the six hunts with one phone call. Up to five people may apply together with one phone call under one person's social security number, but each slot still costs \$3 apiece. The person who calls to apply for the group is responsible for the entire party's application fees.

If drawn, a pheasant quota hunter must pay \$25 for a pheasant permit for each quota hunt day. The day following the quota hunts, November 20 for the Green River WMA hunts and Dec. 4 for the Clay WMA hunts, is reserved for drawn pheasant quota hunt permit holders to hunt the remaining pheasants.

Waterfowlers may also apply for a waterfowl quota hunts on the Ballard, Boatwright and Sloughs WMAs on the same phone call. A hunter may apply for only one hunt per area. As with the other quota hunts it costs \$3 to apply. The dates of each hunt may be viewed by logging on to fw.ky.gov and clicking on the "Hunting" tab.

It is recommended to pick up a copy of the 2006-2007 Kentucky Hunting and Trapping Guide before applying for quota hunts. The guide is a beneficial tool in eliminating confusion about how to apply for quota hunts and includes all regulations regarding fall hunting in Kentucky.

Scary Ghost Cookies

Prep time: 10 minutes
 Decoration time: 25 minutes

- 1 (11.4-ounce) bag Twix Caramel Cookie Bars Fun Size
- 1 (9.5-ounce) bag M&M'S Minis Milk Chocolate Candies Halloween Mini Packs
- 3/4 cup peanut butter
- 1/3 cup confectioner's sugar
- 1 (16-ounce) container vanilla frosting
- 1 cup ground chocolate wafers (approximately 20 thin wafers)

1. In food processor or blender, pulse 10 graham crackers and 1 bag Twix until fine.
