Born in the wake of tragedy, the Floyd County Emergency & Rescue Squad came to be when Floyd County residents Graham Burchett and James B. Goble signed official documents on the

Prestonsburg fire rating in jeopardy

PRESTONSBURG -The city's fiscal woes continued Monday when Fire Chief Bobby Carpenter announced to the city council that the city's fire insurance rating is in danger if one of the engines is not either repaired or replaced.

According to Carpenter, the aerial ladder fire engine failed its most recent inspection and declared unsafe for use.

"Essentially what that means, presently the city of Prestonsburg does not have an aerial truck. The truck is

out of service," said Carpenter. "As far as firefighting ability, for all practical purposes, we are without a ladder truck."

Carpenter said the lack of that truck limits the fire department's ability to fight a fire in any building over two stories tall.

"The timing of this thing couldn't have been at a worst time," said Carpenter, holding up the package for the annual ISO rating which he reportedly received on Monday.

Carpenter said that without the truck, the city's ISO





Unintelligent design

Urban planning isn't exactly a topic that weighs heavily on the minds of Eastern Kentuckians, but it should be.

Never is that more apparent than when skyrocketing gas prices force each of us to become acutely conscious of every extra mile we are forced to drive. Poor planning leads to more time on the road, which in turn leads to more dollars flying out of our wallets.

That may seem like a "big city" problem, but there is a very real impact in rural areas as well, and the economic effect is compounded by the fact that incomes are generally lower in rural areas than in urban ones, and that there is little if any access to public transportation.

Every time a school or other government building is placed in an out-of-the-way location, away from population centers, that places an additional strain on the public.

Consider the new post offices built in Prestonsburg and Paintsville in the last 10 years. In each instance, centrally located, downtown facilities were replaced by new buildings on the outskirts of town, in locations accessible only by car.

Now, instead of downtown residents being able to walk a block or two to get their mail, they are forced to drive two or three miles to get to the post office and back. That might not seem like a lot, until you consider that over the course of a year, a daily trip to the post office turns into 600 or 900 miles a year, or roughly the equivalent of two or three tanks of gas. With the price of a fill-up now between \$50 and \$75 in most cars, that is money that could be better used elsewhere.

The same can be said for school locations. In recent years, Floyd County has built Prestonsburg Elementary and South Floyd High School away from population centers, virtually eliminating the time-honored tradition of walking to school for all but maybe a dozen students. Instead, students must now be taken by their parents — taking extra money away from their families - or ride the bus - requiring the school system to spend more on transportation and leaving less for instruction.

Far more sensible is the "neighborhood" approach to urban planning that is common in European cities — and was also common in the United States until the last 50 years. In such an approach, residents are able live, work, shop, play and go to school all within a few blocks' radius, making it possible for people to ditch their cars in favor of bicycles, scooters or even old-fashioned foot power.

Instead, the trend in the U.S. since the 1950s has been to segregate our cities so that people live on one side of town, work on another and shop on yet another. This type of development has made each of us slaves to the automobile, placing additional demand — and subsequently additional cost — for

Unfortunately, this is a problem that is at least 50 years in the making and which will probably require even longer to solve. However, the solution will never arrive until government leaders first recognize the problem and resolve to alleviate it in future construction projects.

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

There's help for people who can't afford health care services

Affordable access to medical care is at the heart of a continuing national debate about the future of healthcare. Nowhere is this issue more clear than in eastern Kentucky.

Many healthcare providers in Appalachia have made it a part of their mission to provide medical care to people who cannot afford it. Working through state programs like Disproportionate Share Hospital (DSH) coverage and the Medicaid program, hospitals and clinics in Central Appalachia can help patients in need get healthcare services. This is an essential part of our not-for-profit mission at Appalachian Regional Healthcare (ARH) as it is in many of the hospitals and clinics throughout Kentucky.

ARH, operating nine hospitals and a network of clinics, home health and other services, goes far beyond state and federal support to provide care to people who simply can't afford it.

Helping our neighbors who are eligible to understand how to use state and federal assistance programs can help improve the health of our entire region. So can changing people's awareness about the importance of preventive healthcare.

Many people who haven't grown up with regular doctor visits and health screenings don't realize these visits can save lives. The Courier-Journal featured a front page article recently titled, "Eastern Kentucky Bears High Rate of Cervical Cancer."

While this article focused only on cervical cancer, it points to a larger overall problem - the lack of obtaining timely healthcare. According to the article, the reasons behind the higher incidence and deaths of cervical cancer are poverty and lack of health insurance combined with doctor shortages, transportation problems and a cultural tendency for women to care for others while neglecting their own health.

Cost of care was an issue for each of the women featured in the article. "You either buy your child something to eat or go to the doctor. A lot of times, you don't go to the doctor," one woman was quoted as saying.

After reading the article, many ARH employees, including myself, thought it was important to spread the word to our communities in the mountains on how to qualify for assistance programs that would benefit the health of our community.

Fortunately, DSH and Medicaid are designed to help with preventive care too. DSH is available to Kentucky's low-income citizens through hospitals, including those in the ARH system, that participate in the Kentucky Medicaid program. To qualify for DSH, a person must be uninsured, ineligible for Medicaid and have a total family income no greater than 100 percent of the established Federal Poverty Guidelines. For a family of four, that's about \$21,200 per year.

If you have a neighbor, friend or family member who could be assisted by these programs, ask them to contact the local Health Department, family physician or community hospital to find out if they're eligible. Regular doctor checkups, preventive health screenings and healthy lifestyles can make a big difference in a person's quality of life and life expectancy.

Observers say Kentucky could K matter in presidential race

FRANKFORT Kentuckians, especially around Kentucky Derby time, the only thing better than a good horse race is two.

They've got just that with the Kentucky Derby on Saturday followed shortly later by a race of a different sort the neck-and-neck scramble for the Democratic presidential nomination between Sens. Hillary Clinton and Barack

"They're always enthusiastic about the Kentucky Derby, but this is the first time in a long time that Kentucky could play a significant role in the presidential race," said Kendra Stewart, a political scientist at Eastern Kentucky University.

Traditionally, because its primary falls late in the cycle, Kentucky has fallen to the back of the pack when it comes to the national presidential scene. But this year, as one of the last states holding a primary, Kentucky is finding itself

increasingly in the spotlight.

What in the past has rendered Kentucky voters essentially voiceless in picking the Republican and Democratic presidential nominees could this year become a blessing in the campaign's final stretch. At least for Democrats.

Not since 1988 has Kentucky had much of a voice in choosing a presidential nominee. That's the year the state joined with others in the South for a Super Tuesday

While other states rushed to hold early primaries this year, Kentucky election officials chose to keep the traditional May balloting, saying that doing so could strengthen the state's political muscle in a tight race. Maybe it has.

Kentucky's primary is May

With the Democratic nomination still up for grabs, Clinton has already campaigned in the state, making stops in Louisville and Madisonville, and dispatching her husband, former President Chelsea Clinton, to campaign in other Kentucky towns. Obama has opened campaign offices in Kentucky, and presumed Republican nominee John McCain visited Kentucky last week.

Jennifer Moore, chairwoman of the Kentucky Democratic party and a superdelegate, predicted there would be a higher turnout than usual in this year's primary. And, more people Kentucky seem to be getting enthusiastic about the presidential race, Moore said.

"We're one of the last primaries and that is going to have a significant factor in who becomes the Democratic nominee," Moore said. "And Kentuckians have the opportunity to make their voices heard loud and clear on May 20."

Secretary of State Trey Grayson, the state's chief election official, predicted early last year that keeping the traditional date could make Kentucky a player in the presidential race, though he

Bill Clinton, and daughter, acknowledged at the time that such a scenario was a longshot.

> "Ironically, it probably did benefit us, although we will know for sure after the Indiana and North Carolina primaries happen," Grayson said.

> A sweep by Obama in those two states on May 6 could cement his nomination. If not, Grayson said, Kentucky remains relevant.

> In Kentucky, political campaigns typically go into high gear only after the derby winner is decided. Republican National Committee Chairman Mike Duncan, a former Inez banker, calls the Derby "the demarcation" that signals the start of primary campaigns in the state.

> "In any election, the focus comes toward the end," Duncan said. "You start running your ads on a more intense basis during that time, and it's more on people's

Joe Gershtenson, director of the Center for Kentucky

Kentucky University, said he is concerned that the excitement could wane before voters go to the polls.

"It's clear that neither of these candidates can wrap this thing up," he said. "There's a feeling that, gosh, no matter what happens in Kentucky and some of these other states, that it's not going to be decided until the convention anyway."

But Jonathan Hurst, state director for Clinton's campaign in Kentucky, said the race here is being taken "very seriously." The campaign was opening headquarters throughout the state, and the senator is expected to make more visits to the state in the coming weeks, Hurst said.

"Kentuckians by and large are very excited that they are going to be major players in the presidential race," Hurst said. "They're one of the few states remaining in a very closely fought primary. That, I think, is a real positive.'

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Chandler endorses Obama

LOUISVILLE - U.S. Rep. Ben Chandler, heir to a famous Kentucky political name, endorsed fellow Democrat Barack Obama on Tuesday, likening it to his grandfather's support of John Kennedy, a generation ago.

Chandler, who represents a central Kentucky district fea-Fring a mix of farms and small towns as well as Lexington, said he was impressed with Obama's message of "change and hope" and his "quiet strength."

"Now is not the time to be timid," Chandler told a group The Chandler name is one downtown park. "It is instead a time to be bold, and to support the candidate who has the ability to transform our future.'

The endorsement heading into Kentucky's May 20 primary gives Obama the support of the state's two Democratic congressmen. U.S. Rep. John Yarmuth, whose Louisville district is a Democratic stronghold, previously endorsed Obama and introduced Chandler at Tuesday's event.

Still, Chandler conceded that Obama faces a "difficult climb" in Kentucky, which has received attention from fellow Democratic presidential candidate Hillary Rodham Clinton. Unlike Obama, Clinton has campaigned in Kentucky this year, and her husband and daughter also have stumped for her in the Bluegrass state.

Clinton's Kentucky cam-Tuesday that the New York senator will overwhelmingly

carry Chandler's district next campaign month.

"I think the people of Kentucky are going to make their own minds up," said Jerry Lundergan, the Clinton state campaign chief. "They're not going to be influenced by either congressman."

Obama, In backing Chandler said it wasn't easy to possibly "go against the tide."

"That's not the most enjoyable place to be in your home area," he said. "But I did it because I believe that it was the right thing to do. I believe that our country needs this kind of change, our country needs this kind of boldness."



McConnell ready to take fight to Democrats

tlo LOUISVILLE - Senate Republican leader Mitch McConnell says he's ready to whee the fight to his next chal-Plenger as the four-term incumbent awaits the Democratic nominee for the fall campaign.

Seeking re-election amid an ongoing war and sputtering economy, McConnell said his campaign will scrutinize the Democratic candidate who emerges from Kentucky's May 20 primary election. Another target will be the Democratic presidential nominee whether it's Hillary Rodham Clinton or Barack Obama.

"It's going to be about the next six years; who can do the Cost for Kentucky," McConnell told Associated Press in an interview Friday afternoon at his campaign office.

whether "And also Kentuckians are comfortable with either Clinton or Obama and the direction they want to take the nation. Because my opponent will be inevitably linked to that agenda."

In a wide-ranging interview, McConnell said conditions have improved in wartorn Iraq but wouldn't estimate how long U.S. troops will remain. McConnell has been a key supporter of President Bush's Iraq policy.

McConnell also tried to put the blame on Democrats for sky-high gasoline prices, saying they have resisted efforts to increase domestic oil production.

And he expressed disappointment that the current Congress has failed to tackle any overarching issues such as shoring up Social Security or revamping immigration law. "In terms of big issues con-fronting the next generation, no, I think it's been unproductive on that front," McConnell said.

McConnell conceded that Republicans' chances of regaining control of the Senate are "pretty slim" this fall, noting that the GOP has numerous more seats to defend than Democrats.

"I do think we have a very good chance of staying roughly where we are," he said.

As for his race, McConnell wouldn't predict which Democrat will challenge him in the fall.

The pack of Democratic candidates includes two wealthy Louisville businessman - Bruce Lunsford and Greg Fischer — as well as Michael Cassaro, a Louisvillearea pain doctor; David Wylie of Harrodsburg; David L. Williams of Glasgow; James Rice of Campbellsville; and Kenneth Stepp of Manchester.

McConnell has one challenger in the GOP primary truck driver Daniel Essek of Whitley County.

who has McConnell, tapped his massive campaign treasury to run TV ads since late last year, said he thinks he's become more of a national target because of his Senate leadership post.

"It sort of goes with the turf," he said.

Last year, McConnell was targeted in a series of commercials by outside interest groups. Some ads blasted him for supporting the Iraq war while others hit him on domestic issues.

McConnell's Democratic challengers in Kentucky have linked him with Bush, who carried the Bluegrass state twice but whose national approval ratings have sunk as the war drags on and the economy sours.

Bush headlined a fundraiser for McConnell in Louisville early last year. Asked if he'd like the president to campaign for him close to the election, McConnell said, "I really haven't given any thought to

As for the Democratic strategy to tie him to Bush, McConnell said:

"Elections are about the future, not the past. If they want to run about the past they can. My campaign is going to be about what my opponent stands for, what he could possibly do for Kentucky in the next six years and what the agenda for America's future

If re-elected, McConnell said he remain aggressive in landing federal money for Kentucky. Another priority would be the destruction of chemical weapons stockpiles

near Richmond. On other issues, McConnell

said: Progress has made been in Iraq but "it's hard to know" how long U.S. troops will remain. "I think it's important to finish the job. I would define finishing the job as having a reasonably stable government by Middle Eastern standards and an ally on the war on terror. All of that is clearly achievable.'

Conservation alone won't solve U.S. energy problems, and criticized Democrats for blocking efforts to ramp up domestic oil production as gas prices skyrocket. "They have done everything they could in the last year and a half to prevent us from having any kind of improvement in the domestic production situation.'

Congress has had some successes, such as passing energy legislation and block-

■ Momentum by Kentucky Democrats has dissipated since last November, when Democrat Steve Beshear unseated Republican incumbent Ernie Fletcher in the governor's race. "I think the skip is out of the step of the Frankfort Democratic crowd. Whatever sense of hubris they may have had after winning

the governor's race I think is pretty largely dissipated in the wake of a largely ineffective performance by the administration and the General Assembly." Both major political parties have a share of power in the legislature, with Democrats in charge of the House and Republicans in control of the Senate.

Cowgill was former Gov. Ernie Fletcher's state budget director before becoming the council's interim president in September.



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
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The world's biggest dump

Editor's note: The following is the third installment in a series of stories concerning environment month.

Historically, waterways are recipients of some of man's most toxic wastes. Here in Kentucky, for instance, wastes from mining & mountain top removal empty directly into rivers and streams. It wasn't too long ago, either, when straight pipes took sewage from our bathrooms right into the backyard creek. All such industrial & domestic waste, farming pesticides, fertilizers & animal dung, medical waste, etc. ... seem to just 'magically' disappear into the currents of our waterways. But, where does it all really go?

The answer: into our oceans. All world water systems are in some way connected to them. They have become mankind's biggest dump... from sea to shining sea. Considering that oceans cover two-thirds of Earth's surface, that's a heck of a big dump! And three-quarters of the pollution insult is from human activities.

Today, all major bays and estuaries of the world have runoff, landfills & development. Nearly a quarter of the silt and sand dredged from rivers, canals, and harbors is dumped into oceans, and 10 percent of it contains toxic heavy metals, hydrocarbons from heavy oils, organochlorines from pesticides, and nutrients like phosphorus and

nitrogen. All are deadly to concentrated...and unhealthy. marine life in one way or other. Among the many lethal consequences that fisheries suffer from silt build up is unsuccessful spawning of certain marine animals, such as herring and lobster.

Then there is waste dumping by cruise ships, tankards, military aircraft carriers and submarines. Radioactive wastes, chiefly from nuclear power processes, as well as the research, medical and industrial use of radioisotopes, are a big problem, too. Even if they are dumped into the oceans in concrete drums (sometimes they're not), they remain radioactive for decades. Who knows what happens to those drums in the meanwhile? The long term effects of nuclear dumping aren't really known.

We personally feel the impact of sea contamination by toxic materials (mercury, lead, cadmium, etc.) at the grocery store when we go to buy seafood. There's less variety available, and the prices are extremely high. Imagine how it must be for consumers in other parts of the world whose staple foods come from the marine environment.

There is also a consequence 'dead zones' from pollution of marine coastal pollution for human recreation. In the U.S. alone, 12,000 beaches have been quarantined and deemed unsafe for swimming because of pollution. Over 60% of world populations live and play in coastal areas, so when toxic waste, especially raw sewage, is dumped near the coast, as it often is, it's very

A global ban on ocean dumping is thought to be unrealistic, because it would not likely eliminate the practice. particularly in international waters. Some strides, however, have been made over the past 20 years to regulate it. In 1988, the Ocean Dumping Ban Act tried to prohibit all municipal sewage sludge and medical & industrial waste dumping by 1992. In 1996, the International Maritime Organization came up with a Protocol for regulating ocean dumping in general. Offshore gas and oil exploration drilling, which used to leak very high levels of toxins into oceans, has been abandoned, and in 2000 the Oceans Act was implemented to protect marine resources, although it still needs work, especially

regarding legal enforcement. Possible alternatives to

ocean dumping being discussed but still given too little attention are: recycling or reusing more materials, producing less wasteful products, saving energy, converting dangerous materials into harmless waste, reducing and regulating coastal development, requiring double hulls for oil tankers, and creating separate sewage and storm lines.

Our 'out of sight, out of mind' mentality prevents us from understanding the magnitude of the problem, and that, vast as they are, oceans have a limit as a universal toilet. The most important change to be made, therefore, is in our attitude and habits. Both the environment and we would benefit.

Rachel Carson once said, "Man is part of nature and his against nature is inevitably a war against himself. We are challenged as

mankind has never been challenged before to prove our maturity and our mastery, not of nature, but of ourselves."

In other words, if we don't choose now to live sustainably, we will be forced to do so in the future

Gov. Beshear vetoes transportation funding bill

FRANKFORT — Gov. Steve Beshear vetoed a twoyear, \$3.8 billion transportation plan on Monday, saying the legislation would have hampered his administration's ability to adequately manage road projects in the state.

Beshear, a Democrat, said his administration would continue with an alternate transportation plan that would be compiled within the coming months. It would include projects authorized by the General Assembly and more, and would give his administration more flexibility, Beshear said.

"This legislation would have severely limited the Transportation Cabinet in its ability to deal with project cost overruns and any potential emergencies," Beshear said. Without this veto, some critial projects may have to sit dle because the actual cost could exceed the amount set forth in the legislation."

Kentucky lawmakers earlier this month approved a twoyear, \$19 billion state spending plan but authorized the state's transportation construction plan in separate legislation. Beshear vetoed that measure in its entirety on Monday.

The plan authorized federal and state transportation construction projects, including hundreds of road and bridge plans throughout the state. Beshear noted the plan listed more projects than the state could pay for.

Transportation Cabinet Secretary Joe Prather said the state would have up to about \$150 million available to spend on road projects during next two years. Meanwhile, the federal government would have about \$1.3 billion available during that period, Prather said.

The move sparked a debate over whether Beshear, a Democrat, missed a veto deadline set out by the constitution and whether the state could continue building roads after the current state budget expires on June 30.

By law, the governor has 10 days - not counting Sundays - to veto or sign into law legislation passed by the legislature. The governor may allow legislation to become law without signing it.

Senate President David Williams, R-Burkesville. claimed Beshear had acted outside the parameters outlined in the Kentucky Constitution. Williams said the veto may have jeopardized road projects pending further

Williams said he did not believe the veto would stand and expected it to face a legal challenge.

action by the legislature.

"I believe that he (Beshear) has put at serious risk the building of any roads within the next two years," Williams said in an afternoon conference call with reporters.

Williams said the deadline for Beshear to veto the legislation ended on Saturday. Beshear said his last day to veto the bill was Monday.

Left to stand as law, the administration would not have a way to handle projects that cost more than expected, Beshear said.

House Speaker Jody Richards, D-Bowling Green, said he supported Beshear's veto and felt it came within the constitutional limits.

"It's the right thing to do upon reflection, because the way the bill was written, there was no provision for critical needs or emergency situations," Richards said. "There's so little money this time that the governor should have, in my opinion, the flexibility to apply it where it's needed

[Insurance Service Office] rating of 4 would be lost. "Without that truck, it would be hard for the city to get an ISO of 6," Carpenter said.

Carpenter continued saying that if the cities ISO rating goes up, that could mean as much as 15 percent raise in residential fire tax, and anywhere between 15-to-33 percent for commercial buildings.

According to Carpenter, the aerial truck is a requirement when a city has more than five buildings over 35 feet tall.

During the meeting, Carpenter told the council that the current truck had been purchased in 1984 during Mayor Ann Latta's first term, and was now five years beyond its service life.

Carpenter said that the cost to repair the current truck sould be in excess of \$20,000.

"We can spend the \$20,000 and hope that it passes the test," Carpenter said. "If it passes the rest of the test, then we spent \$20,000 and we don't have an ISO impact."

"However, " Carpenter added, "this is a yearly test on a 25-year-old piece of apparatus"

Carpenter showed the council initial figures of trying to replace the truck, which would cost the city roughly \$650,000.

Carpenter said that he and Director of Public Safety Mike Ormerod had spoken to ISO several times, examining alternatives and manufacturers, and had come up with three options.

"We can do nothing, and take the ISO hit; we can replace the ladder; or we can repair the ladder, and hope for the best," Carpenter said.

Carpenter acknowledged the city's woeful financial situation and offered one solution of raising the fire tax by 4 percent to help cover the cost of

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the new ladder, as well as fund future replacement of apparatus and vehicles.

Councilman C.E. "Shag" Branham said that Prestonsburg is already the most taxed city in the region, and the city continues to lose revenue yearly.

"We've lost almost a million in revenue in the last two years," said Branham.

Branham asked Carpenter to put together some figures for the council to review. "Bring us some numbers, bring us some options," Branham said.

Also during the meeting, the issue of the alleged boycott of a special called meeting was raised, with a number of councilmen voicing their displeasure and the city attorney saying it was just a misunderstanding.

"The purpose of the meeting was for general info," said Jimmy Webb who added the meeting was intended to be just a "heads up."

"Misunderstandings, misconceptions, place it on my head," said Webb.

Mayor Jerry Fannin noted


another special meeting in which no one reportedly showed up and defended his position that he felt his meeting was being boycotted.



The most heated remarks were between Duncan and Palumbo with regards to statements Sen. Obama made recently that rural Americans were 'bitter.'

"Obama doesn't understand small town America," Duncan said. "I take exception to those comments. The American people are not bitter."

Representatives were asked whether or not they believed that the people were beginning to count more than big business

Palumbo responded saying that during the President George W. Bush administration, "paychecks are going down and the cost of living is going up, that's why Americans are bitter.

Lundergan said, "I do think the pendulum is swinging back. People are tired, and they want results.'

Many of the questions from the panel focused on the current rising costs of gasoline and diesel fuels and what, if anything, the candidates could do to stem the rising costs.

Duncan discussed McCain's proposed gas tax holiday as a short term solution to help motorists take vacations during the summer months.

Duncan added that the longterm solutions were more difficult. "It's about supply and demand," said Duncan, saying that America is overly dependent on foreign oil, and that conservation is needed.

Lundergan said President Bush needs to do something now, noting that an independent truckers strike is imminent. "Independent truckers are running this country," said Lundergan, adding that a strike by the people who transport goods across the country could be disastrous.

Palumbo said that Obama plans to cut U.S. consumption of foreign oil, as well as increase research and development spending into green energy for a little "homegrown Ad

innovation."

The final question from the panel dealt with how the representatives think their candidates can make America great again in the eyes of its people and those around the world.

Duncan said that McCain believes that a strong national defense and leadership are key, noting that, "It's not our role to be loved, but respected."

Lundergan said that the current administration's foreign policy has hurt America's reputation at home and abroad. "We're considered a big bully," Lundergan about American foreign reputation, adding that Americans wonder "why we have to be the guy who solves all the problems."

Lundergan said Clinton has the diplomatic ties to foreign nations to help take the tarnish off America's reputation.

Palumbo said Obama plans to "restore our standing in the global community, by recognizing the equality, dignity and worth of other people, by providing for our common security and our common humanity."

TALLADEGA, Ala. - Kyle Busch fell a lap down midway through the race, and after racing his way back into contention, needed an awesome save to keep himself from triggering a massive crash.

"Typical Talladega," he thought.

Only this time, the crash happened behind Busch. Instead of leaving Talladega Superspeedway with smashed-up car, he drove into Victory Lane. The kid who couldn't conquer Talladega

finally won at the harrowing track Sunday, and in this breakout season for Busch, it was only fitting that he coasted to

the victory.

"I'd like to say that I'm smarter than I look, but that's certainly not the case," Busch said. "Today was just due to having a great car. Getting a lap down, that was like, 'Oh, typical Talladega' there. But I didn't wreck today and I was definitely happy of that, and I was greatly appreciative that I was able to win today because it's certainly been a struggle for

"I don't think I've ever finished one here yet without some sort of damage. We still had damage, but it wasn't enough to keep us from Victory

Busch came back from a lap down, then survived a near wreck with Jamie McMurray for his first win at Talladega. It was won under caution when a 12-car accident brought out the yellow flag on the final lap, freezing the field and allowing Busch to slowly make his way across the finish line — a rare completion considering his history at the track.

In six previous Cup races, Busch failed to finish four times and wrecked out of both events last season. His accident in last spring's Cup race was so hard, he cracked his head-andneck restraint while finishing 37th. And his wreck in the fall officially ended his championship hopes.

But this year, he can't seem to do anything wrong. His victory was his second Sprint Cup win of the year, seventh spanning all three of NASCAR's top series, and gave him wins four weekends in a row dating to a Nationwide Series victory in Texas earlier this month.

He has victories this season on a road course, an intermediate track, a pseudo-short track and a superspeedway.

It's made for an incredible start to the season for the sometimes bratty Busch, who was Hendrick fired from Motorsports last year despite his immense talent because the

team couldn't tolerate his often through the race when he irrational temperament.

So Joe Gibbs Racing snatched him up, and the team couldn't be more thrilled with its find. Busch, who turns 23 next week, has given the organization assurance it has a strong future even if two-time NASCAR champion Tony Stewart opts to leave the team when his contract expires.

TALLADEGA, Ala. Maybe Joe Gibbs can afford to let Tony Stewart go.

The ol' coach already seems to have NASCAR's next star on his roster.

Kyle Busch did it again Sunday, this time conquering a track that had always given him fits, As he pulled into Victory Talladega at Superspeedway, there appeared to be nothing this 22-year-old phenom can't do - even it means filling the shoes of his teammate Stewart, a two-time NASCAR Sprint Cup champion.

Busch has already won twice in nine races on the Cup circuit, trailing leader Jeff Burton by just 22 points. He's third on the second-tier Nationwide Series, right on the tail of Clint Bowyer and Carl Edwards, and was leading the Craftsman Truck Series until he missed a conflicting race in Kansas City, dropping him to

sixth in the points. In all, Busch has won seven races in the three series on tracks of all varieties - a road course, an intermediate track, a pseudoshort track and now a super-

speedway. "He's red hot," Gibbs said.

The Super Bowl-winning coach has put together a race team that rivals his glory years with the Washington Redskins. Busch, Stewart and Denny Hamlin are all in the top 10 a quarter of the way through the season.

But the Talladega weekend began with reports that Stewart wanted out, possibly as part of a deal to run his own team. Naturally, Gibbs wants to keep his dream team together - and his senior driver is under contract through 2009 - but he may face some hard financial decisions.

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


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Wildcats taken in NFL Draft; Tamme first to be

LEXINGTON - Four University of Kentucky football players were selected in the National Football League Draft on Sunday: TE Jacob Tamme, fourth round by the Indianapolis Colts (127th overall); WR Keenan Burton, fourth round by whe St. Louis Rams (128th overall); QB Andre' Woodson, sixth round by the New York Giants (198th overall); WR Steve Johnson, seventh round by the Buffalo Bills (224th overall).

Four players chosen marks the most Wildcats selected since 1989, when David Johnson, Ivy Joe Hunter, Chris Chenault, and Charlie Darrington were picked. The draft was longer then, as Chenault and Darrington were taken in the 8th and 9th rounds, respectively. The last time Kentucky had four draft picks in season, Burton still led the team in tions over those two campaigns. He the first seven rounds was 1979, when a total of eight Cats were taken, five of whom went in the first seven

The Wildcat action began in the fourth round when Tamme was taken by Indianapolis Colts. Tamme was a first-team All-Southeastern Conference honoree his junior and senior seasons. As a senior, he caught 56 passes for 619 yards and six touchdowns. Tamme was the first UK tight end to be drafted since James Whalen was a fifth-round pick of Tampa Bay in 2000. The last Wildcat picked by Indianapolis was defensive lineman Vincent "Sweet Pea" Burns

On the next selection after Tamme, the St. Louis Rams tabbed Burton. Despite multiple injuries last

pass receptions with 66 catches for 741 vards and nine touchdowns. His best season came as a junior when he snagged 77 balls for 1,036 yards and 12 TDs, earning first-team All-SEC accolades. The last Kentucky player chosen by the Giants was running back George Adams, the team's first choice in 1985. The last Kentucky QB taken was Tim Couch, who was the first pick of the 1999 draft by the Cleveland Browns. Ironically, in New York, Woodson will rejoin former Wildcat Jared Lorenzen, who is a backup QB for the current NFL champions. Woodson and Lorenzen were members of the 2003 Kentucky likely to get their chance in the NFL

Among other things, the greening of the landscape means another school year is winding down. Not that anybody is counting, but this makes 14 senior classes that have filed across the stage to snatch their diplomas since I decided enough was enough.

Sometimes it doesn't seem all that long ago, but when I stop to realize this year's crop of seniors were just

four years old when I left, it also seems like a life-

Actually, it's been 47 years since I first walked into a classroom and realized I had the big desk. And, believe it or not, certain incidents

of that long-ago first year of teachings-and the names and faces that go with them-still linger, just as if they had happened yesterday.

In that regard, one such incident that has become one of my favorites to tell-matter of fact; I told it in my first book, "Muddy Branch"involved an elementary art class at Meade Memorial. (For my first 20 years of teaching, I taught art.)

Since art was new to the curriculume there was no art room, so I loaded my supplies in a big paste board box and toted it from room to room. I had been teaching for only a few months when I walked into a classroom filled with bright-eyed first graders. It was time for their weekly art class and their desks had been cleared in eager anticipation of the arrival of Mr. Art. (Few could remember so call me Mr. Pack, but Mr. Art was fine with me.)

Their eagerness was no less than mine for I couldn't wait to pull the brightly colored construction paper from my art box, hand out the glue and scissors and begin the project I'd decided was the next logical step in helping these youngsters become true creative artists.

After their regular teacher had left the room, I began to explain the names of simple geometric shapes. Not only were these children learning what circles, squares and triangles were, they were going to cut out these shapes free-handed and use only the three primary colors. A red circle, blue square and yellow triangle were to be pasted to a large black sheet of construction paper.

Now, in order to have time to cut and paste, my little introductory talk to the meaningful exercise needed to be very concise. Furthermore, I had to say the exact things so that not only would these kids know what to do, they'd also have a keen awareness of-yes, even an appreciation forwhy they were doing it.

Three or four minutes is all I allowed myself, so after an absolutely perfect oral presentation, followed by an enthusiastic discussion on things that are round, things that are square, and things that are triangular, I looked into those beautiful freckled faces and asked, "Now do you have any ques-

A little girl with pigtails and a smile worth a million dollars raised

Wow, I thought, just like it's supposed to be. They're all so interested, so involved in this lesson. Looking in the direction of this budding young artist, I said, "Yes?"

The question she asked will forever be a part of my vast store of memories as a teacher.



Keeping pets safe as the weather warms

It's spring and for many, that means lugging out the buckets, mops, and cleaning supplies needed for the annual task of sprucing up our homes. The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. Animal Poison Control Center, says that spring cleaning can bring spring illness to many pets if allowed too near some cleaning

products. Among the most common household cleaning items to watch out for are medications and products containing harsh chemicals such as bleach and ammonia. Mothballs and fabric softener sheets also top the list of

potentially dangerous products.

The key to using household cleaners in a way that is safest to pets is to read and follow label directions for proper use and storage. If the label states, "Keep pets and children away from area until dry," those directions should be strictly adhered to in order to avoid potential problems. Many household cleaners can be used safely when the directions on the label are followed exactly. Products that contain bleach can be very effective in safely disinfecting certain household surfaces when used appropriately, but if your pet is exposed to them, they can cause upset stomach, drooling, vomiting or

diarrhea. There is even a danger of severe oral burns if ingested in a high enough concentration. Also, be aware that some laundry detergents can produce similar signs in pets, and cats, especially, can be particularly sensitive to certain ingredients, such as phenols.

Additionally, in regard to dogs, kitty litter products can pose potential hazards. Most kitty litter products are made out of organic materials such as bentonite clay or silica. These substances are considered to be chemically and biologically inert, and do not pose a toxic concern for pets. Cats may ingest small amounts of litter when grooming themselves after using the litter box, and these amounts pass through the digestive tract easwithout problems. However, if an animal ingests a very large amount of litter (as can happen when a dog "cleans out" the litter box), gastrointestinal upset, constipation, or in rare cases, intestinal obstruction could potentially occur. Try to keep kitty's toilet positioned in an area that your canine pets do not have easy access to.

While on the subject of

dogs and their "habits," the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center advises that it's best to prevent your dog from drinking from the family toilet bowl, as well. Bacterial-related gastrointestinal problems can occur from drinking stagnant toilet water, so it's a good idea to discourage your dog from seeking refreshment there. For those who use dropin toilet bowl cleaning tablets: If you follow label directions, most toilet bowl cleaning tablets would not be expected to cause problems beyond minor stomach upset, should your pet take a drink of the diluted water in the bowl. To be on the safe side, however, advise all family members to put the lid down after using so as not to tempt the family dog.

Warm weather also brings sunbathing, pool parties, barbecues and such. ASPCA experts offer the following tips to keep pets safe when the mercury rises: Keep citronella candles, insect coils, and oil products out of reach of pets. If ingested, these products can produce stomach irritation in pets, and possibly even central nervous system depression.

Do not apply sunscreen or

your pet unless specifically labeled for use on animals. The ingestion of sunscreen products can result in drooting, vomiting, diarrhea, excessive thirst and lethargy in pets.

·Always keep matches and lighter fluids out of the reach of pets. Certain types of matches contain chlorates, which if swallowed could result in difficulty breathing, or kidney disease in severe

·Never leave alcoholie drinks unattended where pets can reach them. Alcoholic beverages can be poisonous to pets and, if ingested, the animal could become extremely weak, severely depressed, or go into a coma.

·Cats react very differently than dogs to some insecticides because of this, some flea-con trol products that are safely used on dogs, particularly those containing permethrin, can be deadly to cats, even in small amounts.
