Shelbiana man killed in wreck

PIKEVILLE - An accident on an unopened portion of highway in Pike County claimed the life of a Shelbiana man on Sunday.

According to the police report, Michael Prater, 20, was killed when the 2006 Lincoln sedan he was driving struck the median at a high rate of speed and overturned. Prater was ejected from the vehicle and pronounced dead at the scene by a representative from the Pike County Coroner's Office.


The accident took place near 3 a.m. on a section of highway that is currently under construction in the Robinson Creek area of Pike County. Officials haven't released any information regarding the reason that Prater was traveling on the road.

David E. Blackburn, 19, was a passenger in the vehicle. Blackburn was transported to Pikeville Medical Center with nonlife threatening injuries.

Prater was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the accident, while Blackburn was.

Kentucky Vehicle Enforcement, DHP Ambulance Service, Millard Fire Department and Pike County Emergency Management responded to the scene of the crash.

Toxicology reports are pending to see if drugs or alcohol were a factor.



Pike man sought for 1975 murder

The search is on for a Pike County man charged with murder for a 1975 shooting at an

Billy Ray Crisp, 59, of Johns Creek, is listed as a missing person, and the Kentucky State Police are attempting to locate

him based on a warrant issued by the Ohio Highway Patrol Bureau of Investigation.

According to the Kentucky State Police, Woodrow Perroud was shot in the head at the Wakefield Mounds Rest Area on U.S. 23 over 30 years ago. At the time of the shooting, Perroud and Crisp were brothers-in-law, with Perroud married to Crisp's sister.

Both men were orginally from Johns Creek, with Perroud moving to Galipolis, Ohio.


According to Kentucky State Police Det. Mike Goble, one possible motive cited by investigators is an insurance policy.

"I don't know all the details of the investigation that led to the warrant," Goble said. "It was a cold case and the Ohio Highway

Patrol asked for our assistance."

Crisp allegedly went missing around the same time that the warrant was signed for his arrest. The warrant was signed on August 28, which is also the Perroud's birthday.

According to Goble, this is the second time that Crisp has gone

MIDDLE CREEK - The Middle Creek Fire Department was borne out of tragedy, but its mission continues to provide hope and safety to the people that depend on the volunteers that staff the rescue and fire squad.

Twenty-four years after, forming to ensure that a tragedy like Hackworth's wouldn't occur again, the Middle Creek Fire Department is going strong and getting ready for an open house to showcase its second station, complete with its own rescue vehicles.

The new building will be dedicated to the founding members and officers of the department.

Shooting interrupts Founder's Day

SALYERSVILLE - A domestic violence altercation allegedly led to a shooting in Salyersville on Saturday.

According to Kentucky State Police, Terry Lee Arnett, 40, was arrested and charged with first-degree assault for allegedly shooting Rita Blanton, 31.

Blanton also sustained other injuries from the altercation, and was airlifted to St. Mary's Medical Center, in Huntington, where she is currently listed in fair condition.

KSP responded to the incident after receiving a call from the Salyersville Police Department at 3:17 p.m. on Saturday requesting assistance on a domestic violence complaint.

When they arrived at the scene, officers discovered

Class to teach basics of wilderness survival

PRESTONSBURG — The recent popularity of television shows like "Man vs. Wild" have spurred a new interest in survivalism, and one Floyd County man believes that it is time for people to learn about the real thing.

Shawn Conn, a resident of Drift, will be teaching a course in wilderness survival on the Prestonsburg campus of Big Sandy Community and Technical College on Friday.

"It's something that I've always

enjoyed and grew up learning," Conn said. "Like a lot us that grew up in Eastern Kentucky, I played in the hills. This is the perfect area to teach a wilderness survival class. I want to teach people that everything doesn't have to come from a store and you can survive in the worst possible situa-

Conn hopes to teach those that attend his class about such survival skills that include learning how to navigate by using a watch in the shadow of the sun, finding water, and building a fire without matches, fuel, or paper.

"My grandparents taught me a lot about living off the land and how to survive," Conn said. "My uncles taught me how to hunt. I learned a lot on my own through years of trial and error."

The course will be taught in the post-secondary education room number 220, and Conn hopes to fill the room to its 25-person capacity. Conn started planning the course around a month ago and said that he has received plenty of phone calls and emails inquiring about signing up for the class and getting more information on wilderness survival.

"I hope enough people show up that we actually have to change rooms,' Conn said. "If enough people show an interest, I might be able to get wilderness survival added as a community class. I know how many people in this area like to watch Bear Grylls, so I hope they will also be interested in the

Conn also has a long-term goal of opening the first wilderness survival and training school in Kentucky.

"I want to teach people things that



Legalized price fixing

It's amazing how American business, which sings the praises of competition, so often tries to escape market competition when it comes to its own products.

The latest example is the boom in "minimum pricing" agreements between manufacturers and retailers. Under minimum pricing, retail outlets must agree to sell goods for no less than a price specified by their manufacturer. If they don't, the producer can cut off the supply of the product. Goods can go on sale - but only to a point.

It's a form of price fixing, and it was made legal last year by a court ruling that hits consumers in the pocketbook at a time when they need price breaks more than ever.

For retailers and manufacturers, on the other hand, the results can be miraculous. Store managers no longer have to worry whether a competitor might cut prices and lure customers away. Less discounting makes it easier for manufacturers to keep their own wholesale prices up as well.

And makers of luxury goods get to maintain their nose-in-theair cachet, which can disappear fast when high fashions land on a 50-percent-off rack.

Minimum-pricing agreements were illegal until a year ago, when the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the practice doesn't automatically violate the Sherman Anti-Trust Act. That reversed a Supreme Court decision that had stood since 1911.

It's still illegal for manufacturers or retailers to scheme together to fix prices. But manufacturers are effectively free to demand that retailers keep prices up.

America has experimented with minimum pricing in the past. From the 1930s to 1975, a federal law allowed states the option of permitting the practice within their borders. Then the Department of Justice found that prices were 19 to 27 percent higher in states with minimum pricing.

No wonder Congress repealed the law that granted states permission to allow it.

Since the Supreme Court's 5-4 ruling in June 2007, however, minimum pricing has been making a comeback. For example, The Wall Street Journal reported last week that the practice is taking hold in the baby furnishings, pet food and rental car industries.

In its 2007 decision, a majority of the high court accepted the argument that artificially high prices can be pro-consumer. Manufacturers said minimum prices allow retailers to invest more in customer service and that the potential for higher revenue encourages new competitors to enter the market. The argument further held that minimum prices could encourage retailers to spend money on advertising without worrying that discounters will get all the sales.


There's probably some truth to all of that. But it doesn't outweigh the established fact that, in practice, consumers will be short-changed.

"The only safe predictions to make about today's decision are that it will likely raise the price of goods at retail and that it will create considerable legal turbulence as lower courts seek to develop workable principles," wrote Justice Stephen Breyer in a dissent.

The real pressure for minimum prices might be coming from retailers, not manufacturers. "The stores are telling manufacturers, 'Keep those prices up among my rivals, or we won't buy from you," says Tim Greaney, a St. Louis University law professor and former Justice Department anti-trust lawyer.

The next move is up to Congress. It should ban minimum pricing. Inflation already is picking the pockets of American families. The government shouldn't compound the pain by allowing price fixing.

House week in review

Two months after a special session that reformed the state employee retirement systems for current and future state employees and teachers, a legislative committee heard a report on the health of the systems from the state Finance Cabinet.

We were aware when we passed House Bill 1 in special session in June that it would be several years before the benefits—an anticipated savings of nearly \$500 million for state and local governments—would be realized, except for a one-time savings of around \$55 million for local governments and school districts this year. But it was data shared by the Cabinet with the Interim Joint Committee on State Government last week that helped explain part of the reason the under funded retirement systems are in the predicament they

One reason is that investment returns for the state employee retirement systems and teachers' retirement system have underperformed for at least the past 10 years. With returns accounting for 60 to 70 percent of total funding on an annual basis for the pension plans, the picture became clearer in lawmakers' minds why HB 1—which will be implemented on Sept. 1--was necessary.

Here's a snapshot of what the two systems' underperformance looks like, based on actuarial data shared by the Cabinet: Over the last three years, the median return on investment for state employee and teachers' retirement systems was 8.4 percent. In comparison, the Kentucky Retirement Systems, which manages benefits for

over 316,000 state and local government employees, earned 6.6 percent in the past three years. For the Kentucky Teachers' Retirement System, which serves over 72,700 active members and 39,300 retirees, the return was 4.6 percent for that period.

In terms of rankings, the poor returns on investments handled by the two retirement systems put their performance in the bottom 25 percent of 58 public pension plans over the past 10 years, the Cabinet said. That places the two systems somewhere between 40th and 58th by rank.

The reasons for the poor return on investment are currently under study, Cabinet officials told the committee, although some are becoming apparent. One reasons, officials said, is the Kentucky systems have had less exposure to international equities and alternatives compared to peers in other states. Another reason is asset allocation, which is how investments are distributed among stocks, bonds and other options.

A third possible reason that actuaries have found, according to Tom Howard with the Cabinet's Office of Financial Management, is what he called "governance barriers," such as members inexperienced in investment matters serving on various system boards, and regulatory requirements that affect investing for certain systems. KTRS, he said, has faced delays entering certain equities markets because of state regulatory requirements.

The regulatory question is definitely one to consider when the system's investment returns are not giving us the results we want and need. But I think more than a few lawmakers would agree that regulation of such major policy as retirement benefits that affect the futures of hundreds of thousands of Kentuckians is more of

a plus than a problem. As one law-maker at last week's meeting said, no oversight over the funds except by those charged with making the investments means no transparency. And no transparency means no balance.

A group that is trying to find solutions to retirement system issues that were not able to be addressed in HB 1 will definitely keep the need for transparency into consideration, we hope. That is the 27-member Kentucky Public Pension Working Group created by Governor Steve Beshear at the end of May to study ways to improve investment returns and other issues related to the pension systems.

Reports from the Working Group's five subcommittees, which are studying investments, securities lawsuits, possible reorganization of the County Employees Retirement System, state funding of the retirement systems and defined contribution plans as opposed to the state's current defined benefit plans, will be written soon and used to draft the Working Group's recommendations. Those recommendations will then be used by the 2009 Kentucky General Assembly to make further changes to the retirement systems.

You have probably read many times over than the state pension system now have over \$26 billion of what are called unfunded liabilities, meaning it does not have the money to meet all the needs of future retirees. HB 1 was one piece of the puzzle to solving this crisis. Improving investment returns, and other areas under review of the Working Group, is another. As we begin to put all the right changes in place, the health of our systems will gradually be restored for those employees who will retire in the next 10, 20, 30 years and beyond.



School shooter seeks a second chance

LOUISVILLE - A high school shooter who killed three classmates and wounded five others is asking Kentucky's Supreme Court for another chance.

Michael Carneal, now 25, claims he was too mentally ill to plead guilty in 1998 to going into Heath High School in west Paducah and shooting eight students gathered for an informal prayer service. He is serving a sentence of life without the chance of parole for at least 25 years for the shooting Dec. 1, 1997, when he was 14.

the spotlight because the Kentucky Court of Appeals last year sent it back to McCracken County Circuit Court to decide if he should be granted a new hearing. The ruling said if Carneal is determined to have been incompetent when he pleaded guilty, he should be allowed to enter another plea or go to trial.

Prosecutors appealed, setting up the Kentucky Supreme Court's hearing on Sept. 11. The Supreme Court will decide whether Carneal should get a new competency hearing and trial.

Five psychologists exam-

Carneal's case is back in ined Carneal before his 1998 guilty plea and determined that he was competent and understood the consequences, according to court records. Three were hired by Carneal's attorneys.

> "Many factors go into whether anyone pleads guilty. Here, one of the factors that Carneal relied upon was illusory," said Tim Arnold, one of Carneal's public defenders.

> Prosecutors say Carneal was competent and his plea was backed up by evidence.

"Carneal and his experts can change their stories all they want but they cannot make substantial evidence dis-

appear," Assistant Attorney General David Smith said.

The case has brought back memories for 26-year-old Missy Jenkins Smith, who has been in a wheelchair since the shooting with a condition known as spinal shock. Smith plans to attend the hearing at the University of Louisville law school.

Smith visited Carneal in prison in July 2007 and came away feeling like her former classmate was doing better, but still belongs in prison.

"I'm sentenced for my life. I still have to deal with the consequences of his choice," said Smith, who has forgiven Carneal. "He needs to deal decided nine years ago." with the consequences of his choices.'

Former Heath Principal Bill Bond said Carneal should serve his sentence for killing 14-year-old Nicole Hadley, 17-year-old Jessica James and 15-year-old Kayce Steger.

'Anyone who would take a gun ... and shoot classmates, obviously, there's some mental illness there," said Bond, who now counsels principals for the National Association of Secondary School Principals. "Does that give you a pass on that crime? I think that was

Bond wasn't hurt in the shootings, but still carries an emotional scar from watching three students die. He remains angry enough that he wouldn't speak Carneal's name during a recent interview.

"He may be a different person, but the lives he took, they're dead forever. Those girls are dead forever," said Bond, who has no plans to attend the hearing or see Carneal. "I recall the names of the girls who died very often. His name never crosses my lips. I never use his name."





PRANKFORT - The plans to review two cases involving the state's new selfdefense law that allows people to shoot dangerous home invaders without fear of prosecution.

National Rifle Association had championed the measure that was enacted in 2006, saying it simply codified a rule of law already observed by judges in Kentucky and elsewhere: That people have a right to use deadly force to defend themselves and their families when their lives are in danger.

NRA spokesman Andrew Arulanandam said the socalled "no retreat" self-defense laws enacted in 22 states over the past three years are important because some jurisdictions have held that crime victims have a responsibility to flee rather than to defend themselves.

"We think that's wrong," he said. "It is vital for these crime victims to have as many options as possible available to them, whether it means they retreat or whether they feel it's in the best survival interest to stand their ground and defend themselves.

ments Sept. 10 in appeals of separate Jefferson County murder and manslaughter Kentucky Supreme Court cases in which defense attorneys claimed their clients acted in self-defense.

Public defender Elizabeth McMahon is asking the Supreme Court to reverse the murder conviction of Phillip Leroy Wines and order a new trial. McMahon contends that the trial judge should have instructed the jury that Wines, who is serving a 45-year sentence, had no duty to retreat when he stabbed James Lee Hamilton on June 12, 2005.

Assistant Attorney General Samuel J. Future of home heating looks to the sky and ground

cost of electricity and natural gas are on the rise.

The proof is in your utility bills, where even budget payments experienced a bump this summer. As the price of oil has risen, the price of coal has followed, which means that even Kentucky, which has the lowest electricity costs in the nation, is seeing increased charges.

"It's always painful when we have payments go up, even fixed payments like electricity and natural gas budget plans." said Don Colliver, a professor at the University of Kentucky.

Colliver is in a perfect position to observe the impact of increasing energy costs. The biosystems and agricultural engineering professor is the co-faculty adviser of UK's student team participating in the 2009 Solar Decathlon, a national competition to design and build environmentally sound solar energy powered houses.

Colliver sees alternative energy sources in our future.

There's no escaping it: The relied basically on natural gas and electric space heating for our homes. But there are developments in solar power and geothermal systems that are proving to be competitive," Colliver said.

Geothermal systems essentially pull heat out of the ground in cold months and use the ground temperatures in summer to help cool homes,

Using a combination of traditional heating and air conditioning systems with geothermal systems "is much more efficient than any other heating and cooling system," Colliver said.

Hot water heating can be as much as one-third of the energy bill and more new homes will be built with solar hot water heating systems that replace current types of water heaters, he predicted.

"These solar thermal systems are cost competitive with conventional hot-water heating," Colliver said.

Innovations in solar panels that convert sunlight to elec-"Historically, we have tricity also are increasing their

"It's going to make sense to use passive solar energy to let sunlight come in during the wintertime and heat the house. In summer months, homes will use more shades to help cool the house," he said.

Homes also will be constructed with more efficient insulation in floors, walls and ceilings. Even the windows will be chosen based on how they help maintain desired comfort levels at reduced

"Building a 'tight' house is important, because one-third to one-half of heat loss in a well insulated house is due to drafts and other air leaks," Colliver said.

Builders and homebuyers also will be more aware of the importance of sealed ductwork. "Leaky ducts can also lose a lot of warm and cool air," he said.

potential for being used in of Kentucky may choose to install wind turbines to reduce the amount of electricity they buy by generating their own power. "These are being used in many parts of the United States. Last year 30% of all new electrical generation capacity came from wind power. It's one of the most cost effective renewable energy sources" Colliver said.

However, some areas in the Bluegrass State may not be suited for wind power.

"A 'wind atlas' Kentucky has been prepared to help determine where wind turbines will be useful. Wind power isn't applicable everywhere in Kentucky. There might be enough wind in some local areas but it's not strong enough everywhere," Colliver

Colliver believes the increased interest in alternative energy sources across the nation is evidence of a sea change in Americans' attitudes

about the wise use of power.

"This isn't a fad," he said. The heightened interest in new energy sources has prompted a wave of innovations that Colliver likens to another development that the American changed lifestyle.

"I compare our current situation to the period in the early 1980s, when personal computers first started coming out. Today, home computers are amazingly commonplace," Colliver said.

"We're now in a new era of opportunity for people who are involved in the green movement and for entrepreneurs. There's a great movement today in looking at energy and the environment on Spaceship Earth," Colliver said.



Court records overflowing in storage

LOUISVILLE — Kentucky's state archives and courthouses around the state are overflowing with court records after the state's top court administrator called for Kentucky to retain all records forever.

The deluge of paper has officials looking for a different solution.

Kentucky Chief Justice John D. Minton Jr. has form a committee that includes judges, court clerks, prosecutors and a representative from the Department of Public Advocacy, to review how the state retains, destroys and archives court records.

The handling of court records by the Administrative Office of the Courts emerged as an issue two years ago after the disclosure that it had destroyed misdemeanor and traffic records in Jefferson County that were at least 5 years old.

Kentucky dominates Louisville Feature

LOUISVILLE - Rich Brooks knows Kentucky's young and inexperienced offense isn't going to scare anybody.

The way the Wildcats' defense played against Louisville, it might not have

Kentucky returned two Louisville fumbles for touchdowns and set up another mscore with an interception in the Wildcats' 27-2 victory Sunday in the Governor's Cup.

"We thought we had a good defense and we do," Brooks said. "Our defense took it upon themselves to score points. Our defense kept making play after play after play."

Kentucky (1-0) forced five turnovers and stuffed Louisville's retooled offense, playing with the kind tenacity Brooks said the Wildcats would need early in the season while the offense found its footing.

Kentucky held Louisville (0-1), which averaged 416.5 yards per game a year ago, to just 205 yards and the Cardinals failed to score a touchdown for the first time since a shutout loss to Florida State in 2000.

"We were able to come out and execute everything we wanted to," Kentucky linebacker Micah Johnson said. "I

was expecting us to have a great performance and we did. I just wasn't expecting all of those turnovers.

Neither were the Cardinals. Louisville coach Steve Kragthorpe was hoping for a fresh start after a disappointing debut last season. Instead, the Cardinals appear to have plenty of work ahead if they want to climb back toward the top of the Big East.

Sunday, the Wildcats emphatically proved the Cardinals weren't even the best team in the state.

"You've got to take good care of the football," Kragthorpe said. "We just didn't do a good enough job on offense. Our defense gave us opportunities but we didn't take advantage."

While Louisville's defense showed significant improvement under new coordinator Ron English — holding the Wildcats to 210 yards - the offense looked overwhelmed

Hunter Cantwell, who spent the last three seasons as an understudy to former Louisville star Brian Brohm, turned it over four times in the fourth quarter as the Cardinals tried to rally. His first interception led to Tony Dixon's 7yard touchdown run that put the Wildcats up 20-2, and Kentucky's Myron Pryor later pounced on Cantwell's fumble and rumbled 72 yards for a

score to send the third-largest crowd in Cardinal Stadium history streaking to the exit.

Cantwell finished 20-of-43 for 152 yards and three interceptions and hardly looked like the polished passer that filled in so capably for Brohm during Louisville's breakout season in 2006. He hurried passes and forced others, perhaps trying too hard to fill in the gaps for a unit that has new starters at every skill position.

"It seemed like anything that could go wrong did go wrong," Cantwell said. "We had stops or stupid mistakes, penalties. I was very disappointed in myself and the way the offense moved the ball."

Louisville's offensive output was its lowest since it gained just 176 yards in a loss to Cincinnati in 2002 and the Cardinals took just one snap inside the Kentucky 20.

The Wildcats were hardly any better on offense, but they didn't need to be.

Hartline, who won the starting quarterback job almost by default after Curtis Pulley was dismissed on Aug. 5 for a violation of, team rules, played efficiently if not spectacularly, completing 16 of 31 passes and 147 yards. While he didn't throw for a touchdown, he avoided mistakes. Rather than force the issue, he mostly settled for underneath passes and smartly threw the ball away when nothing developed.

"I was really relieved to win and get this one out of the way," Hartline said. "I didn't try to put too much pressure on myself. I just wanted to manage the game."

Hartline's only major mistake came early in the fourth quarter when he was called for intentional grounding in the end zone, resulting in a safety.

The Wildcats forced a punt on the ensuing possession, but Louisville appeared to get a break when the punt glanced off Kentucky's Dicky Lyons and the Cardinals recovered. Officials, however ruled Louisville's Bilal Powell interfered with Lyons even though replays showed Powell backing away from Lyons when the ball landed.

Kragthorpe argued vehemently, but was told by officials that the play was unreviewable.

Kentucky turned the reprieve into Lones Seiber's field goal, and the Cardinals. continued a self-destruction that began in the first half when they had a 38-yard field goal blocked. They later giftwrapped a Kentucky touchdown when Powell fumbled while trying to switch hands as he was tackled. The ball bounced right into the arms of Kentucky's Ashton Cobb, who ran in 28 yards for a score to give the Wildcats a 10-0 lead they never came close to squandering.

Easy goes it: Brooks cautiously optimistic after Louisville rout

Rich Brooks isn't one for compliments. After 45 years coaching, there isn't much he hasn't seen a dozen times over.

Still, even Brooks had to marvel at the way his defense dominated Louisville in Sunday's 27-2 blowout victory in the Governor's Cup.

"I think defensively I don't know how we could have played much better than we did," Brooks said. "Myron Pryor played as good a game as anybody I've been around in terms of a defensive lineman in a long, long time. He was a dominant player up

Pryor stripped Louisville's Bilal Powell in the second quarter, and Ashton Cobb picked up the ball and raced 28 yards for a touchdown to give the Wildcats a 10-0 lead. Pryor sealed the game in the fourth when all 300-plus pounds of him chugged 72 yards to the end zone.

The Cardinals turned the ball over five times and were held to 205 yards, their lowest

total in six years. Brooks, however, isn't worried about the Wildcats getting a little full of themselves.

"We'll point out the things that they did really bad," Brooks said. "Believe me, even on defense there were enough of those. We should be able to get their attention. They can't live on one game."

Maybe not, but the schedule sits up favorably over the next month. Kentucky hosts three straight games beginning on Saturday against Norfolk State and won't leave the confines of Commonwealth Stadium until October.

By then perhaps, the offense will have made some inroads on the defense. Though Brooks credited quarterback Mike Hartline's play, he knows the Wildcats will have to learn to stretch the field if they want to be competitive in the SEC.

constantly Louisville stacked eight or nine defenders near the line of scrimmage and stuffed Kentucky's running backs with a series of blitzes designed to plug the holes.

It worked. The Wildcats ran for just 63 yards and Derrick Locke, Tony Dixon and Alfonso Smith struggled to find any room to move.

"Our line was out of sync a little bit," Brooks said. "Sometimes our backs didn't hit the hole. They were running to darkness sometimes when there was a little light. ... We need to run the ball much better than that.'

Getting into a rhythm on the ground should loosen things up for Hartline. His longest pass of the day was a dump-off to burly fullback John Conner that Conner took for a 20-yard gain. Louisville kept star receiver Dicky Lyons mostly under wraps, and most of the team's young receivers failed to deliver a big play.

"I don't think our receivers played very well, overall," "If we get better, Mike Hartline's job will be a our work between now and little easier."

Brooks did find time to praise true freshman Randall Cobb, who split time at receiver and quarterback during training camp and was rumored to be the backup plan in case Hartline faltered. Cobb, however, may have proven himself too valuable as a receiver to put in the backfield. He caught three passes for 31 yards and even got the ball on an end-around once.

"You could tell his speed and athletic ability on a couple of those," Brooks said. "I think you'll see his role expand. He'll play more snaps at receiver and returns in the next game.'

While the Wildcats escaped the game without a major injury, Brooks said offensive lineman Christian Johnson, older brother of linebacker Micah Johnson, will likely be redshirted due to back problems. Otherwise, the Wildcats are relatively healthy, and Brooks is eager to move for-

"We've got four weeks before we open league play, and we've got a lot of work to do," Brooks said. "Hopefully then will show that we've improved."

Up Next: Kentucky will host Norfolk State Saturday in a first-ever meeting between the two schools.

NASCAR SPRINT CUP: Johnson gets third win of season "I'm just not sure how it's Johnson's jackman got tangled

Reigning champ has eyes set on another Sprint Cup title

FONTANA, Calif. Jimmie Johnson had enough time to think about how good his car was - and worry that he might blow it.

"I'm just happy that we all did our parts tonight and didn't let this great opportunity slip away," the two-time reigning NASCAR Sprint Cup champion said after an overpowering victory Sunday night at Auto Club Speedway.

Johnson's third victory of the season served notice that he is not to be taken lightly with the start of the Chase for the championship only two weeks away.

"It was an awesome race car all night long," Johnson said after leading 228 of the 250 laps in the Pepsi 500. "We really didn't touch much all night long and the car was fast and good. And the track just

came to us.

"More than anything, I'm just happy to close the deal. It's very, very rare to have a car that dominant and it's easy to do something stupid to spoil

Asked if he has had a car this superior before, Johnson said, "I think this is the most dominant car and victory we've had, but I can remember one other time, and I blew the opportunity. My rookie year at Lowe's (Motor Speedway), I think we led 580 miles of that (600-mile) race and I slid through the pits and lost us the Runner-up Greg Biffle also

had a fast car, but barely kept in touch with Johnson's No. 48 Chevrolet on the 2-mile oval, finishing 2.076 seconds behind the winner.

"The 48 was phenomenal," Biffle said. "We see that happen every once in a while a guy gets it set up right, gets the car running good.

Johnson won the race at the former California Speedway for the second straight year and showed points leader Kyle Busch and Carl Edwards the two hottest drivers in the series coming into this race that he remains a serious con-

tender for a third straight title. "I hope so," Johnson said. going to shake out. The weak spot for us has been the mile and a half and two-mile tracks and the Chase is loaded with "We've been getting better

each week. I'm happy to be on a big track and win on a big track. I really think we're doing the right things to have a fighting chance at the championship and that's all we can ask for.'

In February, Johnson led the most laps here but lost the race when Edwards passed him with 23 to go. This time, nobody could touch Johnson.

Time after time he built leads of between 5 and 12 seconds, only to see them erased by yellow flags. But it didn't faze Johnson, who just rebuilt the margin after the next

On a pit stop on lap 162, during a caution period, Johnson took four tires and found himself in sixth on the restart, trailing five drivers who had each taken two tires on the stop.

After the restart on lap 166, Johnson was fourth after one lap, second after two trips around the 2-mile oval and back in the lead on lap 168. On the next pit stop, on lap

182 during another caution,

up in the air hose in a rare pit misstep by the team. Johnson again came out of the pits in sixth. And, again, he rocketed back into the lead in just three laps after the green flag waved.

"The car was really good, especially the first 15 or 20 laps," Johnson said. "When you have a car like that, it doesn't really matter where you are on the track.'



Ky. delegate hopes Palin influences energy policy

LOUISVILLE Kentucky Secretary of State Trey Grayson is hoping Sarah Palin puts her imprint on national energy policy by persuading John McCain to support drilling in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge.

Tapping oil reserves in the refuge would be good policy amid high fuel prices and would score points with many voters, Grayson said Tuesday from the Republican National Convention in Minnesota, where McCain will accept the GOP president nomination later in the week, with Palin as his running mate.

"We have hope that he'll come around on the issue," Grayson said in a conference

As Alaska's governor, Palin supports opening the refuge's sliver of coastal tundra in northeastern Alaska for oil production. McCain opposes

drilling there, but said recently he's willing to re-examine the

Grayson, a convention delegate, said he hopes Palin presses the issue when talking with McCain.

'My hope is that he'll have that conversation with Sarah Palin, if he hasn't had it already, and he'll see that the circumstances have changed and that he ought to support drilling" in the refuge, Grayson said.

"I think it's a responsible position and it needs to be part of our comprehensive energy policy.'

McCain and Palin already agree on lifting drilling bans covering the federal Outer Continental Shelf off the Atlantic and Pacific coasts and the eastern Gulf of Mexico.

Grayson said the party platform written in advance of the GOP convention is the "greenest" the party's ever had. Republicans are promoting the right energy plan with a broad

that includes approach expanded domestic oil production and more nuclear power plants, he said.

"We need those fossil fuels to bridge us to a future where alternative fuels become our main source of energy," said Grayson, who played a key role in drafting the platform's energy and environmental policies.

Grayson, seen as a rising GOP star, was elected to a second term as secretary of state in 2007, a year when Democrats dominated the statewide elections. He is eying a possible run for governor in 2011.

Meanwhile, Grayson said GOP delegates are "still ecstatic" with Palin being placed on the ticket. He said he was confident her background was properly checked beforehand by the McCain campaign.

Since Palin joined the ticket late last week, news surfaced that her unmarried teenage daughter is pregnant. It was also was revealed that

the governor has retained a private attorney to represent her in an investigation into the firing of the state public safety commissioner.

Grayson predicted the investigation will fade among voters more concerned about the economy, gas prices and the country's standing in the world. As for the pregnancy, Grayson

said, "these things happen," adding that he hopes the pregnancy will "go through with as little publicity as possible."

He said the focus should be on Palin's performance as governor and a vice presidential candidate. He expects Palin will lure few Hillary Rodham Clinton supporters to the GOP ticket, but predicted she'll be

influential with women who backed Democrat Bill Clinton in the 1990s and Republican George W. Bush this decade.

'Nothing I've heard that has come out about her ... has given me any concern that those voters, as well as the other swing voters, won't view her as anything other than an asset," Grayson said.


