

# Stranded motorist escapes abduction attempt

HINDMAN - The car was overheating, but she wasn't worried. It does this all the time, and all she needs to do is pull over and let it cool down before she puts in some water.

She popped the hood to make sure everything was okay. It was around 10:30 a.m. on Sunday and she was heading to the walking track at the Knott County Sports Complex.

That's when the truck pulled over to the side of the road and backed down to the front of her car. It was a stranger offering assistance to a stranded motorist. It wasn't an uncommon sight, and she had no reason to be suspicious. She told him everything was okay and thanked him for his concern. He didn't

"I'll be fine," she said. "I just need to wait for it to cool down.'

The next thing she knew, a gun was pressed hard into her ribs and she was being pulled toward the truck.

"Get in the truck or I'll shoot you right here," he said.

The woman, who prefers to remain anonymous due to concern for her safety, walked toward the truck for a moment before realizing that the man would probably kill her.

"I started to go along with him," she said. "Then I just thought that he was going to take me somewhere and kill me, and that my daughter would never find me.'

She decided to fight back. A quick elbow knocked the man off balance, and she tried to run.

"He grabbed me and started hitting me everywhere," she said. "He was hitting me with something hard in the face, and he punched me in the stomach with his fist and knocked me down. I was able to kick him and put him on the ground. That's when I ran into the highway and started waving my arms.

# All county schools show gains, but Martin school leads the state

All Floyd County schools either met their two-year goals or showed some progress, according to the latest standardized test results released this morning, but one school in particular blazed an unprecedented trail.

May Valley Elementary, in Martin, soared to the top, recording the highest two-year combined score among all 1,174 schools in the state.

Under the state's Commonwealth Accountability Testing System, schools are measured for progress in two-year increments.

"We take great pride in May

Valley Elementary being the numberone P-5 school in the state for the second year," said Supt. Henry Webb. "We want to commend the students, staff and community for their commitment to student achieve-

#### Principal, teachers say they expected excellence

MARTIN — May Valley Elementary is number one, achieving the highest CATS test scores out of 1,174 schools in the state, but it comes as no real surprise to Tonya Williams.

Williams, principal at May Valley, knew that the school performed well, although she didn't know they would top the list. .

'Anybody can walk in the school and see what is going on in the classrooms," Williams said. "We scored really high last year, and I knew that we would perform well this time. We don't lose a moment of instruction time during the day. We don't waste a

The high expectations that the teachers and administrators have at May Valley is one major factor in the school's success, according to Williams.

"We don't accept anything less than proficient," Williams said. "We don't move on without making sure that every student has the concept mastered."

May Valley also utilizes team teaching, where

# County gets \$40K refund

PRESTONSBURG - The Floyd County Fiscal Court will be getting a refund of \$40,741.67 from the Department of Natural Resources as part of mining permits and acreage fees collected by the organization.

Gov. Steve Beshear announced the funds on Monday, saying that 33 counties in the state will receive refunds totaling \$550.678.

"Our administration is making every effort to assist the mining industry to extract coal in a manner that is safe, efficient and protective of our environment," Beshear said. "Our coal-producing counties are partners in this endeavor and these funds provide a direct benefit for their efforts.'

The Floyd County Fiscal Court was one of nine counties that will receive more than \$24,000. The largest amount will be going to Pike County, with \$114,983.33 heading to one of Kentucky's top energy producing coun-

The money can be used for any general purpose determined by the fiscal court.

## State still working to scale back road projects

FRANKFORT — Facing rising costs and dwindling finances, Kentucky officials think they could save hundreds of millions of dollars in road construction with a little frugality.

The plan is simple, sort of.

Instead of building a road with extra turning lanes and expansive shoulders, transportation officials are scaling back where possible. Think fewer lanes on some less traveled roads, or rumble strips or narrower medians to separate lanes.

"It's building a Chevy that's very serviceable instead of building a Cadillac with all the frills," Transportation Secretary Joe Prather said.

State officials are still working to identify which projects will be scaled down. But a decision is expected before the end of the year, Prather said. Maintaining safety and traffic flow is key, he said.

Every project in the pipeline is up for review. The plan, which was first announced in early August, has the poten-

# New state Supreme Court justice takes seat on bench.

FRANKFORT — Daniel J. Venters officially took his seat on the Kentucky Supreme Court Monday, nearly a month after being selected to replace the state's retired chief justice.

Venters, a 58-year-old attorney, succeeds Joseph Lambert on the seven-justice panel that represents the state's 3rd Supreme Court District.

"This is, judicially speaking in Kentucky, where the buck stops," Venters said from the bench in his first formal remarks to the public. "And I feel awed by that responsibility, but at the same time I'm comforted here by the fact that

there are six other honorable and brilliant people with whom I share that responsibil-

Venters was sworn in during a public ceremony that attracted state constitutional officers, U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers and Gov. Steve Beshear. It was just for show, however, because Venters took his oath of office last month.

Venters had served more than 20 years as a district and circuit judge in southern Kentucky. He also had been a prosecutor who once worked for Rogers.

Beshear appointed Venters last month to replace Lambert, who retired in June. John D. Minton Jr. succeeded Lambert

as chief justice.

Beshear, a first-term Democrat, said he picked Venters based on his more than two decades as a judge.


"He listens," Beshear said. "He treats people with respect and dignity and he follows the



# Americans stay tuned, nation triumphs

The conventional wisdom not so long ago was that political conventions didn't matter much any more. They were seen as old-school exercises that excited only partisans and the hordes of reporters dispatched to cover them.

My, how two weeks can change perceptions.

Consider that Democratic presidential nominee Barack Obama attracted 38.4 million TV viewers for his acceptance speech in Denver on Aug. 28. It was a record audience for a convention speech, according to Nielsen Media Research.

Then along came Republicans a week later. Vice presidential nominee Sarah Palin drew more than 37 million viewers, just shy of Obama's mark.

The night after Palin wowed her audience, Republican nominee John McCain set a new record, with 38.9 million Americans watching his acceptance speech. That was a 41 percent increase from President George W. Bush's viewership at the 2004 Republican convention.

Why the sudden interest in political speech-making?

Well, the stakes have seldom appeared higher for many Americans, who are worried about the economy, frustrated with high energy prices, concerned about national security.

This year's presidential nominees also provide voters with a clear choice about which direction the nation should head. Both speak about change, but that change will look very different depending on whether McCain or Obama prevails in November.

And then there is the Palin factor.

Introduced to an American public that knew virtually nothing about her only nine days ago, the Alaskan governor, a hardnosed political reformer and a self-proclaimed hockey mom and moose hunter, has enraptured conservatives, frightened liberals and piqued the interest of millions of Americans in the middle.

This election also is historic for its diversity, with the major parties promoting an African-American and a woman for peak positions in the nation's civic life. Voters who in the past felt forgotten now have hope that their interests will be advanced.

For years, good government types (including newspaper editorial writers) have begged the public to pay closer attention to politics, promising that, like spinach, the taste wasn't nearly as bitter as it appeared. There's no need to beg this year.

In 2008, Americans sense that their nation needs them to listen intently to each candidate's plans and vision, and then make a careful, informed choice.

That development isn't just good for the future of civic engagement. It's good for the nation.

# Copper theft can kill

A recent death on the electrical facilities of Kentucky Power has driven home the most serious aspect of copper theft in our area — the unfortunate, untimely and avoidable death of a 28-year-old Knott County man.

In the early hours of Sunday morning, August 24, one of Kentucky Power's employees responded to a service call in an isolated hollow off of Route 80 in Knott County. Upon his arrival, he found the horrifying sight of a body hanging from a utility pole, the victim of electrocution. On the ground below the victim were tools of the copper theft trade — pliers, flashlight and a gym bag of copper wire scraps.

As sad as the scene was, perhaps sadder is the extent some people will go to get a few bucks. At three-something per pound, it takes a good amount of copper to add up to "big money." Sadder still is that loved ones and others who knew individuals are

stealing copper allow it to continue. They are, in effect, enablers of illegal activity that can, and in this case did, lead to someone's death. It's a sad situation, certainly, but one that is completely preventable.

In recent months, Kentucky Power employees have been meeting with law enforcement officials and commonwealth's attorneys to address the issue of copper theft. Kentucky Power takes the problem seriously and works with law enforcement and prosecutors to punish copper thieves. We have also taken measures to safeguard our facilities, but in the end, we cannot protect every inch of our more than 11,000 miles of power lines. We need your support and assistance.

We encourage members of the public and anyone who has information about the activities of copper thieves to report it to their local law enforcement agency of Kentucky Power at (866) 831-5845. Kentucky Power offers a cash reward to anyone providing information that leads to the arrest and conviction of persons stealing copper from our electrical facilities.

Please join us in combating copper theft. It not only steals from Kentucky Power, it steals from all of our ratepayers, all of our employees and all the citizens of the communities we serve. Worst of all, as we witnessed Sunday, copper theft can steal lives.

# KSP awards \$350,000 in grants to enforce underage drinking laws

FRANKFORT — Kentucky State Police Commissioner Rodney Brewer announced today the agency awarded \$350,000 in federal grant funds to enforce underage drinking laws that prohibit the sale, purchase and consumption of alcoholic beverages by minors.

Funding is provided by the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP), Enforcement of Underage Drinking Laws (EUDL) block grant. KSP serves as the designated state administrator for EUDL grant funds and monitors each project. As part of this initiative, each state, territory, and the District of Columbia receive \$350,000 in the form of block grants. KSP has been administering the annual EUDL block grant funding since 2004.

"Our agency is fortunate to be responsible for distributing this federal grant money. EUDL funds allow communities to work together to identify local needs and sustain a successful strategy to combat underage drinking. Our goal is to make minors and their parents more aware of underage drinking laws and the dangerous consequences of underage drinking," said Brewer.

The awards support a wide range of activities including a strong emphasis on compliance checks of retail alcohol outlets to reduce sales to minors, crackdowns on false identification, programs to reduce older youth or adults from providing alcohol to minors, "party patrols" to prevent access to alcohol at large youth gatherings, "cops in shops" to deter minors' attempts to purchase alcohol and alcohol awareness programs targeted at schools and

"We believe that strong involvement community increases the odds of reaching community goal: Education is essential to this effort as well as enforcement of the law," added Brewer.

Kentucky EUDL programs have received national exposure for their efforts including the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control and the Bluegrass Regional Prevention Center. ABC received the "Law Enforcement Partner of the Year" award for their 91 percent retail compliance rate by the Underage Drinking Enforcement Training Center (UDETC) last month at an awards ceremony in Nashville, Tenn. The Bluegrass Regional Prevention Center presented their EUDL program "Keep It Real," an interactive video media project, to attendees at National Conference. The "Keep It Real" project challenges teens to create a 30-second public service announcement that depicts the prevention of underage drinking. The videos are then uploaded to a website where students across the state can vote on their favorite

# KFC shoring up security for secret recipe

LOUISVILLE - Pssst. The secret's out at KFC. Well, sort of.

Colonel Harland Sanders' handwritten recipe of 11 herbs and spices was removed Tuesday from safekeeping at KFC's corporate offices for the first time in decades. The temporary relocation is allowing KFC to revamp security around a yellowing sheet of paper that contains one of the country's most famous corporate secrets.

The brand's top executive admitted his nerves were aflutter despite the tight security he lined up for the operation.

"I don't want to be the president who loses the recipe," KFC President Roger Eaton said. "Imagine how terrifying that would be.'

The recipe that launched the chicken chain was placed in a lock box that was handcuffed to security expert Bo Dietl, who climbed aboard an armored car that whisked away with an escort from off-duty police offi-

Dietl, "Keep it safe."

So important is the 68-yearold concoction that coats the chain's Original Recipe chicken that only two company executives at any time have access to it. The company refuses to release their names or titles, and it uses multiple suppliers who produce and blend the ingredients but know only a part of the entire contents.

Dietl, a former New York City police detective, assured Eaton that the iconic recipe would be safe.

"There's no way, shape or form ... that anybody is going to get their hands on this recipe," he said. "And if they get their hands on this recipe, they have to take me with them.'

His security firm is also handling the security improvements for the recipe at headquarters, but he wouldn't say what changes they're making.

KFC executives said they decided to upgrade security after retrieving the recipe amid preparations to add a new line of Original Recipe chicken strips.

The recipe has been stashed Eaton's parting words to at the company headquarters for

decades, and for more than 20 years has been tucked away in a filing cabinet equipped with two combination locks. To reach the cabinet, the keepers of the recipe would first open up a vault and unlock three locks on a door that stood in front of the cabinet.

Vials of the herbs and spices are also stored in the secret filing

"The smell is overwhelming when you open it," said one of two keepers of the recipe in an interview at company headquar-

The biggest prize, though, is a single sheet of notebook paper, yellowed by age, that lays out the entire formula — including exact amounts for each ingredient — written in pencil and signed by Sanders.

Others have tried to replicate the recipe, and occasionally someone claims to have found a copy of Sanders' creation. The executive said none have come close, adding the actual recipe would include some surprises.

Sanders developed the formula in 1940 at his tiny restaurant in southeastern Kentucky and used it to launch the KFC

chain in the early 1950s.

Sanders died in 1980, but his likeness is still central to KFC's marketing.

"The recipe to him, in later years, was everything he stood for," said Shirley Topmiller, his personal secretary for about 12

Larry Miller, a restaurant analyst with RBC Capital Markets, said the recipe's value is "almost an immeasurable thing. It's part of that important brand image that helps differentiate the KFC product.'

KFC had a total of 14,892 locations worldwide at the end of 2007. The chain has had strong sales overseas, especially in its fast-growing China market, but has struggled in the U.S. amid a more health-conscious public. KFC posted U.S. sales of \$5.3 billion at company-owned and franchised stores in 2007.

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

May Valley actually had the second-highest single-year scores in both 2007 and 2008 among all elementary schools in the state, but the combined score was just enough to put the school at the head of the pack.

Today's release marks a crowning moment for schools in the wider region, with Big Sandy area schools claiming the top three spots statewide. Perennial testing superpower Central Elementary, in Johnson County, once again tallied the highest score in the state for 2008, but the school slipped just behind May Valley when

that score was combined with a fourth-place showing in 2007. In Magoffin County, Middle Fork Elementary had a slight dip from its first-place showing in 2007, but still recorded the third-highest two-year score in the latest results.

All three schools far exceeded the state-mandated goal of reaching a score of 100 on a 140-point scale by 2014, and, along with Veterans Park Elementary in Lexington, were the only four schools to score higher than 120.

Two other Floyd County schools, Duff and McDowell elementary schools, also crossed the 100-point threshold, and both scored in the top 10 percent in the state. Duff ranked 43rd out of 727 elementary schools in the state, while McDowell ranked 71st.

Osborne Elementary was the only other Floyd County elementary to score in the top half of Kentucky schools, ranking 269th.

Three other elementary schools in Floyd County met their two-year goals, with Betsy Layne Elementary ranking 403rd, Prestonsburg Elementary ranking 426th and

Allen Elementary ranking 524th. Stumbo Elementary was the only Floyd County elementary school to not reach its twoyear goal, but the school still showed some progress over the previous biennium and ranked. 637th in the state.

All three Floyd County middle schools ranked in the top half, with Allen Central Middle School ranking 47th out of 224 middle schools statewide, Adams Middle School ranking 68th and South Floyd Middle School ranking 110th. Both ACMS and Adams met their two-year goals, while South

Floyd showed progress despite not meeting its goal.

High school results, however, still remain an area of weakness for Floyd County. None of the district's four high schools met their two-year goals and all four scored in the bottom 50 percent statewide. Prestonsburg High School ranked 150th out of the state's 231 high schools, Betsy Layne High School ranked 162nd, Allen Central High School ranked 165th and South Floyd High School ranked 206th. All four schools did, however, scored higher than their results in the previous two years.

As a district, Floyd County ranked dead center statewide, ranking 78th out of the state's 175 school districts. From year to year, Floyd County fared even better, rising from 86th in

tial to save Kentucky millions that could be used for other construction projects throughout the state.

A souring economy has Kentucky state government facing a \$900 million revenue drop during the next two fiscal years that started in July. Lawmakers earlier this year approved a two-year \$19 billion budget that included significant cuts to health services and education spending.

Engineers in district offices across the state have been reviewing each project, but no final decisions have been made, Prather said. But changes under consideration on a single project could save the state \$17 million to \$18 million by shrinking the median, narrowing the shoulders and reducing the amount of necessary land, Prather said.

Prather declined to get into specifics and said there's no firm dollar amount of projected savings for the overall plan they're calling "Practical Solutions." Nevertheless, Prather expects it to be "several hundred million," he said.

"The goal is to build the roads that we need and not what we might like to have," Prather said, "which means that safety wouldn't be compromised and drivability wouldn't be compromised, but we would be looking to eliminate any frills so that we could contain cost."

The plan in Kentucky is a spinoff of something started in Missouri four years ago. Missouri has saved about a half-billion dollars in three years, said Kevin Keith, a chief engineer with the Missouri Department of Transportation. Kentucky lawmakers,

Prather said, should like the plan because it offers them a way to get more road projects done sooner.

"The indications are that the General Assembly will look very favorably on this," Prather said. "It means that more legislators are going to have more projects done than they would have otherwise."

Calloway County Judge-Executive Larry Elkins said he favors the idea.

A four-lane project on an eight-mile approximately stretch of highway in western Kentucky was nearly scaled back earlier this summer before transportation officials changed their minds, Elkins said. Transportation officials, however, have planned to pare down some proposed bridges over Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley, Elkins said.

"What they've decided to do is instead of having a fancy bridge, they're going to have a four-lane serviceable bridge that will serve the purpose," Elkins said. "And my personal opinion is that during these difficult times, that was the best decision that they could come up with."

State Rep. Hubert Collins, D-Wittensville, said lawmakers need to take a "very close look" at the proposal and consider motorists' safety. Also, building some two-lane roads now — rather than four lanes - could eventually cost the state more money, Collins said.

"I still think we should continue on what we're doing even though it may take longer to get it done," said Collins, chairman of the House Transportation Committee. "This all has to do with money."

putting the Wildcats (2-0) in

position.

"When we made that substitution, he gave us a real spark running the ball with some speed and athletic ability," coach Rich Brooks.

But as popular as that move was, the reverse was true in the second half when Hartline returned to the lineup to a spattering of boos. Brooks alternated the quarterbacks the rest of the game and scolded the fans afterward for their reaction.

"Our running game looks good on paper at the end, but it wasn't good when it needed to be early in the game,"

Brooks said. "We have some work to do still, but awe have a lot of backs that got in there today.'

The Hilltoppers covered 43 yards on the ground and kept it on the ground for the final nine plays of the drive. Thrust into the starting quarterback role by default, Placco ran for a 38-yard touchdown and helped the Ravens beat the Cincinnati Bengals 17-10 Sunday, making a Harbaugh a winner in his first game as a head coach.

"It could have gone better," said Harbaugh, ever the perlectionist. "We've got a long way to go, but this is a good

For Harbaugh and his rookie quarterback, who last year was playing against the likes of Rhode Island and West Chester for the University of Delaware, it was day to cher-

Flacco went 15-for-29 for 129 yards and no interceptions. His unexpected touchdown run around right end on

a busted play put Baltimore up 17-3 in the third quarter.

"The whole time I was thinking, 'Please, if somebody's about to run and hit you, just slide," center Jason Brown said. "But the kid, he has so much heart, I knew that he wasn't going to do that.'

If Flacco was unnerved playing in his first NFL game, he sure didn't look like it. Or feel like it.

'It's just football, It's a lot of fun, though, just like it's always been," said Flacco, the 18th overall pick in the NFL draft. "Our offense was in control all day. And obviously we had a lot of help from our defense."

Rex Ryan, retained as defensive coordinator when Harbaugh replaced Brian Billick, put together a game plan that rendered the Cincinnati offense helpless. Chris Perry gained 37 yards on 18 carries and Carson Palmer was 10-for-25 for 99 yards and an interception.

Palmer's 35.2 quarterback rating was the lowest of his

"It's not demoralizing, it's disappointing. Disappointing and frustrating," Palmer said. "But you've got to move on.

In this league, in this division, there's going to be teams that go to the playoffs possibly with eight wins, with nine, at the most 10 or 11. In our division, with who we play this year, it's going to be a battle, week in and week out."

#### ohnson wins 2nd straight to charge into

RICHMOND, Va. - This was supposed to be Kyle Busch's runaway championship. Then Carl Edwards turned up the heat.

Not to be overlooked, though, is Jimmie Johnson. He's thrown his experience and some momentum into the fray, and is now a legitimate threat to win his third consecutive title.

The two-time defending NASCAR champion held off winless Tony Stewart on Sunday Richmond at International Raceway to grab his second consecutive win, fourth overall this season, and take a big boost into the Chase for the championship.

Johnson is trying to become the first driver to win three straight titles since Cale Yarborough (1976-78), but doesn't want to focus on the historical possibilties in front

"I do think about it," admitted Johnson, "but the less I think about it, the better I'm going to be. The less I can think about all this stuff the

going to be. I just need to fall back to the confidence I have in my race team and my abili-

"If you show up and you're swinging for the fences every time, you're going to make mistakes."

Johnson hasn't of late, chasing down Busch and Edwards to arguably claim the role of championship favorite.

Busch, winner of eight Cup races this season, is the top seed in the Chase. Edwards is second based on his six victories and Johnson is third. They are the only three drivers in the field with multiple wins, and five of the contenders start the Chase winless on the season.

Edwards, however, believes all 12 drivers will have a shot at the title when the 10-race Chase begins next Sunday in New Hampshire.

"Anything can happen," he said. "I think it's going to be defined by your bad days."

And there were plenty of them on Sunday: Busch was wrecked twice - once by Dale Earnhardt Jr. while leading — and David Ragan had numerous on-track miscues to contention in a race delayed a day by NASCAR because of Tropical Storm Hanna.

Ragan and Kasey Kahne were the only two drivers mathematically eligible to race their way into the Chase field. Ragan put on a gutsy push before contact with other cars ended his run with a 32ndplace finish.

"Regardless of how we ended today, I told everyone before the race whether we made the Chase or not, it wasn't going to be solely on the Richmond race," Ragan said. "I can look back at three or four races earlier in the year where we didn't do a good job and resulted in the loss of a

few points.' Kahne finished 19th, giving the final Chase spot to Clint

"I drove everything I could all day," Kahne said. "It was a long day in the pits - we came out close to last almost every time. But we were never going to beat Clint."

The Chase field according to seeding is Busch, Edwards, Johnson, Earnhardt, Bowyer, Denny Hamlin, Jeff Burton,

Gordon, Kevin Harvick and Matt Kenseth.

Busch had a rough day at Richmond in his final tuneup for his title run, starting with the wreck with Earnhardt that delighted the crowd. It was a reverse of the May race here, Busch wrecked when Earnhardt when Earnhardt was

Earnhardt said Sunday's contact wasn't deliberate or

"If I wreck somebody, I ain't going to leave him in good enough shape to come back and get me in the same race," Earnhardt said. "I really ain't never wrecked anybody on purpose. If I wanted to do it, I would do it really, really

Busch, who was later wrecked by Elliott Sadler, finished 15th and downplayed the Earnhardt incident.

"Was that revenge? Who knows," Busch said.

Edwards also had a long day after an early tire problem. He finished 13th.

Johnson, meanwhile, was steady and eventually passed Stewart and Martin Truex for

last 10 races, the better I am eliminate himself from Chase Tony Stewart, Greg Biffle, Jeff the lead with 34 laps to go. He then had to hold off Stewart's late challenge over the final 10

> "That's how you want to win a race — going against the best in the business, and Tony is certainly one of those guys," Johnson said.

winless streak.

RICHMOND, Va. — David Ragan's chances of making the Chase for the championship went from reasonable to terrible and then to hopeful before he faded late in the Chevrolet

Seventeen points behind No. 12 Clint Bowyer to start the race, Ragan's chances took a hit when he and teammate Matt Kenseth both spun out 123 laps into the race and sustained damage.

But the Roush-Fenway Racing driver moved back into contention for the playoffs when he stayed out on the track as most of the leaders pitted on the 243rd lap, actually climbing over Bowyer and into the top 12 before Bowyer's stronger car proved better in the last 150 laps.

Kasey Kahne, who was 14th to start the race and 48 points behind Bowyer, never was a factor at Richmond International Raceway and missed the Chase for the third

straight season. Bowyer won the spot by 69 points over Kahne, and Ragan finished 77 points back.

Kahne had a stretch midway through the season that including both of his victories and a second-place finish in a span of four races, but said it was disappointing to have an eighth- to 15th-place car for most of the rest of the races. He finished 19th on Sunday.

"We just have a lot of work to do. We need to get better to run with Kyle, Jimmie Johnson, Tony Stewart and all those guys," Kahne said.

"We've got to get better."

Ragan does too, and knows it. He said this weekend he knew five top-five finishes showed he isn't ready to contend for a championship, but he still would have liked the chance.

"I felt like the first 100 or so laps we had a top five car," Ragan said, speaking of the time before the spin on lap 123. "It just seemed to turn a corner after lap 100 and we didn't have the speed. Running back there 30th, 25th, you don't deserve to make the

Ragan said it was unfair to blame his failure on one race. "Our speed has been in the race car; it's just a matter of making good decisions on Saturday or Sunday," he said.

On Sunday, Busch was leading when Earnhardt cut inside him bidding to take the top spot. Earnhardt said the mid-race contact was purely accidental.

# Native built impressive resumé in education

Floyd County has produced its fair share of successful citizens, with politicians, musicians, artists and authors all claiming their own version of fame brought on by their careers and talent, but one of the most prolific writers from the area doesn't get the recognition of his contemporaries due to the unglamorous nature of the books he

Jack Allen was a textbook author.

Allen, a native of Prestonsburg who died in 2004 at the age of 89, authored over 50 books during his illustrious career as a scholar.

Along with his publications on a national scale, many Kentucky kids packed his books around with them during school, as Allen wrote textbooks for elementary and secondary schools on the subjects of American history, social studies, government, and civics.

In 1941, Allen earned his doctorate in history from Peabody College, which would later merge with Vanderbilt University. Allen's wife, Cherry Falls Allen, also graduated from Peabody, and the two married shortly after graduation.

Allen served a faculty member of the history department at Peabody College for 33 years, retiring in 1980 as the college became part of Vanderbilt University. Allen was also a past president for the National Council for the Social Studies, and he was named Distinguished Educator by the Center for History of Education at the University of Texas.

For a large part of his tenure at Peabody College, Allen served as chair of the history and social science department. He was also on multiple committees and helped refocus the training of educators in academic programs at the college.

One look at Allen's curriculum vitae shows his dedication to teaching and forming relationships with professional organizations that helped to further the cause of social studies and history education. As part of his international relationships, Allen worked with the U.S. Department of State in Europe and Asia, and helped to develop social studies curricula for elementary and secondary schools in South Korea, and his work led to the establishment of the Korean Council for the Social Studies.

In 1992, Allen was honored with the Distinguished Alumnus award for his contributions to education and for his service to Peabody College.

Delmas Saunders, who went to Prestonsburg High School with Allen, has very fond memories

# Weber Gallery features works of photographer Chuck Summers


