For those who could not due to inclement weather, namely rain and fog, there have been rescheduling dates set.



Smoke evacuates courthouse

PRESTONSBURG - The U.S. District Courthouse in Pikeville wasn't the only courthouse to be evacuated in the area on Monday, as smoke and a strong odor in the Floyd County Courthouse forced employees and the public out on the sidewalk just after 9

According to Floyd County Judge-Executive R.D. "Doc' Marshall, work on the elevator in the courthouse caused smoke to enter some of the offices, which led to the decision to evacuate.

"They are removing the old elevator and they were cutting some bolts with a torch, Marshall said. "There was a slight amount of oil that had

None hurt after anthrax scare in federal court

PIKEVILLE - Federal officials continue to investigate a white powder substance found at the federal courthouse in Pikeville Monday afternoon.

The courthouse was evacuated Monday and nine occupants were taken to nearby Pikeville Medical Center, where they underwent decontamination.

According to reports, the area has now been cleared and the source of the white powder was from a letter sent to the courthouse Monday.

Similar letters containing white powder, which has yet to be identified, were sent to U.S. District Court locations in both London and Frankfort, the Associated Press reported. Also, at least four congressman in Kentucky were targeted -U.S. Rep. Geoff Davis, Brett Guthrie, Ed Whitfield and John Yarmuth received letters, reports said.

Officials have released only limited information about the nature of the letters or the substance, except to say that

During a regular meeting last month, the city council heard from advocates of a smoking-ban ordinance. Members of the Floyd County Breathe Easy Coalition presented testimony from several people as to effects of secondhand smoke, including Jean Rosenberg, who has been working with the effort through her position at the Floyd County Health Department

One point Rosenberg brought out during the meeting last month was to say that 70 percent of Floyd County residents

The reopening, he said, will help promote golf in the region, ultimately helping the city's championship-caliber golf course at Stonecrest, while will operate the Jenny Wiley course.

Highlands Regional Medical Center is working to reach out to the youth of the Big Sandy region. 

Wal-Mart joins call for health reform

The nation's largest employer thinks big companies should be equired to provide health insurance for their workers.

Wal-Mart, the country's biggest retailer and the second-largest corporation in the world according to this year's Fortune 500, this week endorsed the idea of a so-called employer mandate.

That's a key -- and controversial -- part of President Barack Obama's health reform plan. It's also a feature of the bipartisan Massachusetts health reforms that cut in half the number of uninsured in that state.

Under such a mandate, all but the smallest businesses would be required to make a "fair and reasonable" contribution toward workers' insurance premiums.

Wal-Mart CEO Michael Duke sent a letter to congressional eaders and the White House this week in which he expressed support for the mandate. It was co-signed by Andrew Stern, presdent of the Service Employees International Union, Wal-Mart's unlikely health care ally in recent years.

Wal-Mart didn't always have such a progressive approach to nealth care.

In 2005, about a quarter of Wal-Mart workers were either uninsured or on state Medicaid programs with the costs of their care absorbed by taxpayers.

Half the children of Wal-Mart workers were in the same boat. In part, that's because the company offered workers information on applying for Medicaid instead of offering them health insurance.

Wal-Mart workers who were insured were paying about twice he national average in out-of-pocket costs. Four-in-10 were payng as much as 16 percent of their wages.

That changed in part because those shameful facts were outined in a letter written by a corporate vice president to Wal-Mart's Board of Directors, which was leaked to reporters.

Stung by the bad publicity and by anti-Wal-Mart campaigns junded by unions trying to organize workers, the retail giant changed its ways. Today, more than half of its workers have nealth insurance provided by their employer, compared with about 40 percent of retail workers nationwide.

Wal-Mart's support comes as Obama's health reforms are under attack from Republicans. The GOP pays lip service to the need for change, but they have no real plan to fix the system.

Duke indicated that Wal-Mart's support is conditioned on how well reforms actually control health costs. "There has to be some sense that the promise of the bill to reduce health costs will actually occur," one of the company's lobbyists told The New York

Specifics of the national mandate, or even whether it will be enacted, remain to be seen. In Massachusetts, all companies with 11 or more workers must contribute to employee health insurance premiums. They must also offer a plan that employees can pay for with pre-tax dollars.

Companies that fail to comply face a fine of up to \$295 per worker per year. That's far below the \$4,700 national average cost of individual coverage in 2008. That makes it cheaper for some companies simply to pay the fine than provide health benefits.

Adults in Massachusetts also are required to get coverage. Those who don't lose a substantial income tax deduction.


Even with Wal-Mart's support, health reform is far from a done deal. But Duke, the giant retailer's president, got it exactly right in his letter to the White House.

"Not every business can make the same contribution," he wrote, "but everyone must make some contribution."

House week in review

We have all heard the watchword "war on the middle class", but hearing and believing are often two separate things.

Ask the nation's most conservative talk show hosts if there is a war on the middle class and they are likely to interrupt you with a guffaw and a pshaw. After all, a 2007 Brandeis University study did define the middle class as a household earning at least twice, but not more than six times, the federal poverty level-for between \$49,600 and \$148,800 a year for a family of five. You could also ask the top five percent of wage earners, but the fact that they pay less taxes proportionate to income than the middle class and working class might not make them ware converted.

make them very sympathetic. It might be better to ask the 45 to 50 percent of Americans classified as middle class--including the 30 to 45 percent so-called lower-middle class Americans that a 2005 sociology study described as mostly collegeeducated workers with household incomes ranging from \$35,000 to \$75,000--and see if they feel under attack. You could ask the Desmond-Zeuli family near Boston, or thousands like them, who have maxed out their credit cards even though they have cut spending, drive old cars and have an combined income of about \$60,000 or so to support themselves and their three kids. The couple told

The Boston Globe in 2008 that they are running out of ways to save money.

"Twenty bucks isn't there anymore after all your expenses are paid," said Joe Zeuli.

Or you could look up the Brandeis University study from late 2007 called "By a Thread: The New Experience of America's Middle Class" that uses a middle-class security index developed by the school and the Demos nonpartisan policy center to gauge the financial health of the middle class. If you are middle class, the results probably won't surprise you. But that doesn't mean they aren't worrisome.

Consider these index results:

Financial security eludes all but around 31 percent of families considered middle class by income;

Over half of middle class households have no net financial assets;

■ 21 percent of middle class homes live from paycheck to paycheck.

Then there is a story posted by Reuters news service last January about the effect of the 2008 deep recession on the middle class. Unable to pay the rising cost of debt they assumed in better financial times, middle class families are finding themselves part of a new working poor characterized by college educated, middle-class wage earners. One young single mother in Washington, D.C. who makes \$2,200 a month as a volunteer coordinator at a hospital told Reuters she had to take a second job delivering pizzas to make ends meet

Education typically means higher salaries in a healthy economy, and middle class Americans know it. No

matter how hard the struggle is now, studies typically show that it would be even harder without a college degree. But skyrocketing tuitions and the mountains of debt that many middle class parents now live under make it hard for them to save for their child's college education. The best option-student loans--seems like no option at all to middle class workers who cringe at the thought of their children spending years paying off debt just as they are struggling to do now. Just ask Joe Zeuli outside of Boston.

"I don't want to say the only way they can go to college is through the military, or have them pay student loans until they are 90," said Zeuli. Apparently neither do a lot of other middle class parents or their children.

That brings us to three key findings in a Kentucky Long-Term Policy Research Center study based on Kentucky and U.S. trends in college attendance comparing attendance trends for 18-24 year olds for the periods 1993-97 and 2003-07. Last but not least among the three was, and I quote from a release on the study, the discovery that "Those in the highest-income group show a statistically significant higher probability of attending college than those in the lowest-and middle-income groups."

What the study tells us, in part, is that middle class access to a college education has fallen behind access that lowest- and highest-income groups have to a college education nationally. Next week, I want to explore if the same trends analyzed in the Kentucky study hold true for the Commonwealth and, if so, what if anything can be done about it. See you next week.

EKCEP provides those who left college an opportunity to 'Finish Up For Free'

Hundreds of Eastern Kentuckians who left college just short of earning an associate degree will have the chance to complete their educations at no cost with the help of "Finish Up For Free," an initiative of the Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program, Inc. (EKCEP).

"What we're offering with Finish Up For Free is an opportunity," said EKCEP Executive Director Jeff Whitehead. "Those who are within 18 credit hours of finishing their degree can get financial assistance from Finish Up For Free to pay for tuition, books and fees. It can also provide assistance with other needs such as

childcare and transportation."

Working in partnership with the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS), Finish Up for Free expects to help up to 750 people who need 18 credit hours or less to finish an associate degree. EKCEP's Finish Up For Free is funded by American Recovery and Reinvestment Act funds.

"Eastern Kentucky CEP has been helping people finish school, train for careers, and find jobs for more than 40 years," Whitehead said: "We understand as well as anyone that 'life happens,' and sometimes people find themselves unable to complete an associate degree for reasons beyond their control, such as family, financial or personal issues.'

This is their opportunity to go back and finish up," he

The deadline to enroll in Finish Up For Free is July 31 and spaces are limited. Classes at the KCTCS schools will begin August 17. However, Finish Up For Free is not strictly limited to KCTCS schools. Students who were pursuing associate degrees at other institutions may also



State. He helped guide the Aggies to a 21-14 record in 2007-08.





FRANKFORT - A halfnaked boater shivering in plastic serves as a reminder to Kentucky Fish and Wildlife's Sgt. John Anderson why it pays to be prepared while on the water.

Problems started early for Lake particular Cumberland boater, who started his trip clothed, but had to jump-start his boat's motor at the marina.

"He went fishing assuming everything would be fine," explained Anderson, boating education coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' law enforcement division. "But, his starting battery was bad to begin with. Then he fished for a few hours."

Alone, the unlucky angler tried to start his big motor. The starting battery was too weak to fire the motor, however. The angler ran his trolling motor battery down while trying to

get across the lake in the wind. "I got to him at 3 a.m. He

was cold and the temperature was below 60 degrees," Anderson said. "Plus, he had gotten soaked to the bone and had taken all his clothes off, except for a yellow rain jacket. He had wrapped plastic around his waist in an effort to keep warm. So I had to take a half-naked guy wrapped in plastic back

to the dock at 3 a.m."

Boaters only need to carry a few required safety items on board. For example, all boats must have a readily accessible personal floatation device, commonly called a lifejacket. for every passenger on board. All boats with gas and fuel on board must have a working fire extinguisher. All boats 16 feet or longer must also carry a sound producing device - such as a boat horn or loud whistle and a throwable personal flotation device.

But boaters should also

include some common-sense items in their storage holds to ensure they get back to the marina, campsite or boat ramp safely. Remember the naked boater. "If you assume every-

Anderson would have found the boaters within minutes if they'd had a flashlight to shine on his boat. Instead, he searched 3-4 hours before spotting a tiny glimmer of a flame from a lighter held aloft by the missing boaters. "If they didn't have that BIC lighter, I would've never found those people in the dark," Anderson said. "That's why I recommend boaters

well." Boaters should also carry a towrope and an anchor. "Less

than 50 percent of small boats have an anchor on board," Anderson said. "If your

boat is disabled and drifting, you can get run over at night."

Anyone who's boated long enough knows the importance of a tow rope. You'll eventually need it. You can't rely on a Good Samaritan to have one.

'You need several ropes on board for towing, to secure things, to secure bumpers to the side of the boat and to tieoff with," Anderson. "I've seen boats with just a piece of parachute cord tied on the

front of the boat." It's a good idea to run through a checklist of essential items before leaving for the lake. Make sure you have enough lifejackets on board. They must also fit the intended occupants, such as a large per-

carry some safety flares as son or a child. An adult size lifejacket won't help a small child in an emergency.

Check the condition of the fire extinguisher and make sure the running and trailer lights work. Always bring extra water, food and a light jacket. A first aid kit for treating burns, cuts and insect bites is essential equipment.

"It is easy to assume those things are on board or in good working order until you get out on the water and find out they aren't," Anderson said. "You must check that equipment every single time. The captain is responsible for the equipment on board. If you are running the boat, you are the captain.

Don't overlook these items when you go boating this summer. You don't want to be escorted back to the marina by a conservation officer in the wee hours of the morning, soaking wet, half-naked and wrapped in plastic.





EVERYBODY'S SCIENCE

A helping hand for hard workers

This is the time of year when things start to get wild in my back-yard.

No, I'm not talking about au natural pool parties (we don't have a pool) or even high?voltage volleyball; I'm talking about the bees.

Over the past few years, I've made a real effort to fill my backyard flower garden with plants that will appeal to, and attract, bees. One of the best of these plant varieties is monarda, also known as "bee balm." These are fabulous plants, tall and slender with spiky flowers in astonishing colors??and even before the flowers have bloomed, the plants themselves emit the most wonderful, soothing fragrance. No wonder the bees love them!

Of course, I'm a latecomer to the bee balm admiration party. Species of monarda have been used as medicinal plants for centuries by various Native American tribes. The Native Americans made poultices of the plant to help heal skin infections and minor wounds, and brewing the leaves is said to produce a natural remedy for headaches.

Bee balm can work wonders for your vegetable garden, too, because it's great at attracting pollinators that will benefit other plants, and also attracts certain predatory insects that hunt garden pests. If you live in an even wilder setting, you might be interested to know that deer don't like bee balm, so planting monarda is an easy way to keep Bambi & Co. from grazing your garden right down to the ground.

For me, though, the attraction is the bees. It's nothing unusual at my house to walk out onto the deck when the bee balm is in full bloom and see a dozen or more bees methodically working their way across the blossoms, picking up pollen and enjoying themselves immensely.

It seems to me we should all do our bit these days to help out pollinators, especially honey bees. I'm sure you've read about Colony Collapse Disorder (CCD), an absolutely baffling syndrome that began sweeping through the nation's bee colonies in the fall of 2006. At that time, some beekeepers were reporting losses of up to 90 percent of their hives.

It hasn't been that easy to diagnose or study CCD. You're not going to find a lot of dead bees lying around with this one; instead, a hive that's been hit with CCD may have no adult bees left at all. The bees simply ... vanish.

It sounds like something straight out of a bad science fiction flick, but CCD is no laughing matter. We all rely on bees to pollinate our food crops, from almonds and berries to fruits and vegetables. In fact, about one out of every three mouthfuls of food in our diet directly or indirectly benefits from honey bee pollination.


Certainly the scientists at the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) are taking CCD seriously. They're in the midst of a multi?year CCD Action Plan that focuses on a range of possible culprits behind CCD: environmental stresses, the bees' nutrition, pathogens and parasites.

pathogens and parasites.

Among the latter, one focus of the ARS scientists' attention is an invasive parasite called Nosema ceranea. The scientists have just finished sequencing the genome of this particular pest. Nosema is actually a fungus?related microbe that produces spores that the bees consume when they forage. Infection spreads from the bees' digestive tracts to other tissues, and within weeks, the bee colony is either wiped out or has lost much of its strength.

For years, the chief culprit in the Nosema family??at least, among the bees in this country??was Nosema apis, our "homegrown" Nosema. But recently, Nosema ceranae, a very





ornery cousin of N. apis, has jumped from Asia honeybees to the European honeybees widely used in the United States to pollinate our crops.

The scientists say that sequencing the genome of N. ceranae can help them figure out how it gained dominance, trace its migration patterns, help resolve how the microbes spread infection, and develop diagnostic tests and treatments to help save our bees.
