15 deaths on state roadways last week

FRANKFORT -Preliminary statistics indicate that 15 people died in 15 separate crashes on Kentucky roadways from Monday, July 20, through Sunday, July 26.

Thirteen of the crashes involved motor vehicles and seven of those victims were not wearing seat belts. Single-fatality crashes occurred in Boone, Breckinridge, Christian, Daviess, Franklin (2), Gallatin, Graves (2), Hardin, Jefferson, Marion and Spencer counties. Two of the crashes involved the suspected



Smoke ban gets put on hold

PRESTONSBURG - Start and stall. That was the story at Monday's meeting at Prestonsburg City Hall that should have resulted in a second reading and passage of an ordinance relating to a smoking ban within city limits.

Start and stall, and still no answer to the details or if the city will have a smoking ban at all, as city leaders tabled the second reading of the ordinance until its next regular meeting and effectively took no action of any kind on the issue.

This time around, city leaders made it roughly 45 minutes into discussion of an ordinance aimed at regulating smoking throughout pubic buildings in the city before the first council member said what might have already been on the minds of those attending.

"I don't think it's ready to be voted

Dr. Hieronymous dies at 63

PRESTONSBURG - Charles Jerome Hieronymous Jr., popular local physician, died Thursday, July 23, at Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington.

Hieronymous started his local tenure as a well-known Prestonsburg doctor with the medical staff at Highlands Regional Medical Center in 1973 until his departure from that facility in 1999 to work at Paul B. Hall Regional Medical Center.

A member of the Floyd County Board of Health for more than 20 years, Hieronymous was born in Frenchburg and graduated from the University of Kentucky College of Medicine. Before returning to Eastern Kentucky, he interned at a hospital in Savannah, Ga.

Interviewed in this newspaper a few years ago, Hieronymous displayed the humility that many remember so well in his character.

Social Security Benefits and Unemployment

There is much confusion regarding this very important topic. Simply stated, your receipt of unemployment benefits does not keep you from getting Social Security disability benefits for the same period that you received unemployment benefits. Your statement on your unemployment application that you are able to work is merely one factor to consider in deciding whether you should receive Social Security disability benefits. You can make application for unemployment benefits and Social Security disability benefits without necessarily making contradictory statements. This is because the legal standards for receiving unemployment benefits and Social Security benefits are different.

The Social Security Administration is not bound by the findings or decision of another agency. The reality is that no one makes a medical determination regarding your eligibility for unemployment benefits. A person may say he or she feels that he or she is able to work but the medical evidence may prove otherwise. The legal standards for receiving unemployment benefits and Social Security disability benefits are significantly different. The Listings are federal regulations which are found at 20 C.F.R. Part 404. The Listings contain different physical and mental impairments. If you have a medical problem that meets or equals the criteria of a listing for your problem you will be found disabled even that you could actually be able to work.

The policy of denying or offsetting unemployment insurance benefits to Social Security recipients is not widely understood nor widely known. Less than half of the states take some or all of a jobless individual's unemployment benefits back when the individual is also receiving Social Security retirement benefits. Fortunately, Kentucky does not have a Social Security offset in its unemployment laws. This means that in Kentucky you can get Social Security disability benefits and unemployment benefits without having either of these valuable benefits reduced.

Wal-Mart saves green by going green

General Electric ran TV commercial a few years back in which a young executive pitches improved energy efficiency to his corporate board.

"Why should we care about this stuff," his boss demands. "Because it can save us 40 percent on our energy costs," he

With that, Disneyesque animated birds and rabbits appear to playfully nuzzle board members who suddenly discover the joys of going green.

Something very similar — absent the animated birds might have taken place four years ago in Arkansas. At a twoday conference, America's largest retailer, Wal-Mart, committed to a greener course.

It's taking suppliers like GE, as well as competitors and retailers, along on the journey.

The latest evidence of Wal-Mart's eco-evolution is its work to develop a universal sustainability index.

Appliance buyers can now get information on energy efficiency before making a purchase. In the future, Wal-Mart hopes consumers will base buying decisions for everyday products on labels detailing their environmental and social sustainability.

That's quite a departure for a company that once was known for low prices and scorched-earth capitalism. But Wal-Mart has proven that it can do well by doing the right thing.

Last year, it earned \$12.7 billion. Those profits come not only from its traditional cost-cutting, but by savings from reducing packaging and improving energy efficiency.

The changes aren't just good for Wal-Mart; they're good for the environment, too.

In 2007, Wal-Mart made a commitment to highlight sales of environmentally friendly compact fluorescent light bulbs that last longer and use less electricity. Doing so meant suppliers like GE had to ramp up production.

Wal-Mart still sells more traditional incandescent bulbs. But the potential energy savings from compact fluorescent bulbs are staggering, especially with sales juiced by Wal-

In 2008, it began selling only concentrated liquid laundry detergent. The giant retailer says customers have saved more than 400 million gallons of water as a result. The switch also saves 95 million pounds of plastic resin that would otherwise have been used in packaging. And, not coincidentally, Wal-Mart saves more than 500,000 gallons of diesel fuel by not having to transport heavier, bulkier products.


A universal sustainability index has the potential to be even more important. It would let consumers see the true costs of wasteful packaging and products; they then might make better buying decisions.

Not all customers will take that into account. But where Wal-Mart goes, other retailers will follow. It's showing them that there's real money in going green.

Should charity hospitals be charitable?

As Lily Tomlin says, "No matter how cynical you get, it's almost impossible to keep up.'

The truth of Tomlin's observation struck me when I read that lobbyists for America's charity hospitals are campaigning to kill reform legislation that would require charity-care hospitals to provide - get this - charity care. I sat there blinking for a while, thinking: You mean they don't?

As it turns out, no. Although

they're called "charity hospitals," and although they are tax-exempt and they get some \$6 billon a year worth of special tax breaks on the grounds that they provide free health care for lowincome folks - they either don't, or provide very little. In fact, it's hard today to tell the difference between these non-profits entities and your run-of-the-mill for-profit hospital chains. The charitable outfits often turn away the poor from the hospital doors, and when they do provide treatment, they're likely to use nasty, bullying tactics to try to collect money from the poor.

They've gotten away with this by claiming that they meet the charitable standard by holding some health fairs, offering occasional screening days for cholesterol, and doing medical research. A bipartisan proposal in Congress, however, says that taxexempt hospitals could no longer refuse service to charity cases, and the bill also would rein in the hospital roughhouse bill collectors. In other words, this reform provision would require the non-profits to put the "charity" back in charity care - or lose their tax exemption.

Hospital lobbyists are squealing like stuck pigs. They recently sent an astonishingly cynical call for charity hospital executives to "oppose charity care." Rogers announces \$2.75 million for PRIDE

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Rep. Harold "Hal" Rogers announced last week that the House of Representatives has provided \$2.75 million for PRIDE to continue its valuable environmental initiatives in southern and Eastern Kentucky.

Rogers secured the funding to promote environmental volunteerism and education, as well as water treatment efforts in the region. These funds were approved this summer during consideration of three separate federal appropriations measures.

"I applaud Congress for approving this important funding. PRIDE has made a significant difference throughout our region as it cleans up our land and restores our countryside to its natural beauty," Rogers said. "PRIDE has empowered Kentuckians to value the breathtaking landscape and rid our forest, rivers, and roads of litter and trash. Today in our classrooms, because of PRIDE's important education programs, our children are taught the value of personal responsibility, conservation, and taking care of the environment that surrounds them. Southern and eastern Kentucky will also benefit from the vital water treatment funding which is part of our ongoing effort to eliminate straight pipes and failing septic systems so that our citizens have access to safe, sanitary water."

PRIDE, which promotes Personal Responsibility in a Desirable Environment in 38 counties, was launched by Rogers and the late General James Bickford, former Secretary of the Kentucky Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet. To date, PRIDE has recruited more than 287,000 volunteers logging over 1 million volunteer hours, provided 28,089 homes with access to sanitary wastewater treatment, and cleaned up 135,884 tons of trash. Since this program's inception, Rogers has secured over \$195 million for PRIDE and PRIDE-related sewer and water infrastructure projects.

The 2010 PRIDE funding passed by the House of Representatives includes:

\$1 million for stream clean-ups, debris removal, recycling efforts, stream monitoring and habitat improvement initiatives was included in the FY 2010 Commerce, Justice, Science and Related Agencies Appropriations bill which passed on June 18, 2009.

\$1.5 million for water infrastructure projects to be administered by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in southern and eastern Kentucky was included in the FY 2010 Energy and Water Appropriations bill which passed on July 17, 2009.

\$250,000 for environmental education and awareness programs in local schools was included in the FY 2010 Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education Appropriations Bill passed on July 24, 2009.

These legislative measures await further action by the U.S. Senate.

Through his role as a senior member of the House Appropriations Committee, Rogers works to secure valuable funding for important initiatives in the Fifth Congressional District.

"We appreciate Looney's service to the college and wish him well," said board chairman Terry Dotson.



nonsmokers," Nunnery said. "I believe this is too much of a governmental intrusion. I don't feel like it's the government's right to tell me I can or cannot allow legal activities to go on in my own building."

Some of those amendments included striking language to include the ban to any outside structures at restaurants similar to the outside seating area already in place at establishments such as Taco Bell and under construction at Reno's Roadhouse, to include a ban on smoking in what was referred to as service lines leading into establishments though they exist outside the actual business, and also a change the 20-foot restriction at any entrances to public buildings to "a reasonable distance."

Before a motion was made by council member Gormon Collins to table the second reading, the full council voted to accept these amendments, leaving only one hanging an amendment that would allow a restaurant, established or newly opened, to institute an 18 or older policy. This policy would then leave room for that location to allow smoking in that particular business.

Yet another amendment would adjust the fines as they existed in the proposed ordinance. Currently individuals would be fined \$50 per violation while businesses would see progressive fines of \$100, \$200 and \$500 per violation.

Continued from p1 Nunnery proposed an amendment to adjust the third offense fine of \$500 to \$300 for busi-

ness owners. Nunnery's concern with "governmental intrusion" stemmed, he said Monday,

from the urge to find a common ground on the issue. "This, to me, is a compromise," Nunnery said, adding that he was against the ordinance as it stood without these

amendments. Council member Harry Adams, also a local business owner, agreed with Nunnery's compromise.

"Being a business owner I can say we're losing money every day," Adams said. "But I can't sit here and tell another business owner what he can or can't do when it's legal. This is a start. It's not a cure for all of it, but it's a start."

Others say money has nothing to do with the issue. Collins has said the issue is and should remain about secondhand smoke. Some, like Jim Goble, a longtime Prestonsburg resident and community fixture, were more to the point in their views.

"I'm totally in favor of the smoke ban," Goble told council members Monday. "I am opposed to the exclusion of any one group. It's not about money. It's about quality of life. Life and death.

The council will revisit the issue again two weeks from now at their next regular meeting on Aug. 10 at 6 p.m.



Teacher pay, tech subjects, leadership are keys to education's role in economy

by JOHN JAMES SNIDOW

Those with competing visions of the economic future of Eastern Kentucky agree on at least one thing: education is central. Almost every county school district in the state's eastern coalfield has test scores below the state average, and the region has Kentucky's lowest share of high-school graduates.

Even when they do attend college, Eastern Kentucky students often lag behind, especially in science and mathematics. In Carter County, "Two of our valedictorians went to UK last year, and both of them had to take remedial math," Rep. Robin Webb of Grayson says, annoyed. "They're brilliant children, and there's just no excuse for that."

There are such stories all around the state, but East Kentucky remains the biggest challenge for educators, says Gov. Steve Beshear. And he and others point to an exception that gives them hope for the region.

"Johnson County," he says. "There's a group of people there that are dedicated to delivering quality education to their kids, and they're making a huge difference." Lisa Gross, spokeswoman for the state Department of Education, calls it the "finest school system" in Kentucky.

Johnson Central Elementary has the secondhighest test scores in the state; U.S. News and World Report named the high school one of America's best last year; and the county's academic teams have dominated state competition for years. The teams are the New York Yankees of acacompetition demic Kentucky: not just well-trophied, but well-funded.

"We pay our academicteam coaches as much as the head football and basketball coaches" for their non-classwork, says Superintendent Steve Trimble. "And that made people think, 'Well, academics must be important to the folks in

Johnson County." The county high school regularly finishes in the top five of the Governor's Cup academic competition, and the middle school has won seven state championships - including the last four years in a row, beating out selective schools in much wealthier districts.

In Johnson County, income is \$14,051 per person, 22 per-

cent less than the state average. Two-thirds of students qualify for free or reducedprice lunches and 36 percent of children live below the poverty line.

Such figures usually foreunder-achievement. Asked why Eastern Kentucky schools lag, Kentucky Education Association President Sharon Oxendine replies with a single word, "poverty." But at Johnson Central High, students from poor families do slightly better on reading and math tests, defying the conventional wisdom.

Why? A conversation with Trimble turns up three main reasons: valuing academics, maintaining strong leadership, and keeping bad teachers out of the classroom. "You have to instill a sense of pride in everyone and stop making excuses," he says.

The main reason for success, he says, is a culture change. "We created a situation where it's as much an honor to be on the academic team as it is to be a football star. ... I'd rather win a state championship in academics than in basketball or football," he says, grinning.

Trimble says every academic achievement should be celebrated, and in Johnson County, that happens quite a lot: "We treat them like kings," he says. "We even had a parade. We're talking more than a mile of vehicles.

This kind of culture is no accident, but is consciously forged through classroom leadership, Trimble says: "Every school district has good kids, but the people you hire to work with those kids are really crucial.'

Trimble takes a hands-on approach to teacher hiring and retention, sitting in on hiring interviews. "Sometimes we make mistakes, but we make

those people hurt kids," he says, and while tenure rules must be followed, he says a zero-tolerance approach to underperformance eventually "weeds them out until you get a whole team of people who want the system to be success-

The teenage son of one East Kentucky school superintendent says he has seen one principal's hands-on approach motivate faculty members to do better. "There are no bad teachers," he said, "only lazy teachers."

But many think getting the best teachers has become more difficult because teaching no longer attracts the best stu-"We're drawing from the bottom 30 percent instead of the top 30 percent of college graduates," says Cindy Heine of the statewide Prichard Committee for Academic Excellence.

Heine says a focus on teacher quality must be the centerpiece of future education reform. "The top students in Kentucky tend to go into business or law or medicine," she says, "and some of them Prestonsburg, created by locals

sure to get rid of them, because should. But if we can draw even some of those kids back into teaching, we can really make a difference.'

Johnson County gets better teachers by paying them more than surrounding counties, but most districts find it hard to get good teachers for science, technology, engineering and mathematics, which are called STEM subjects to signify their collective importance in an information economy.

Speaking to the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce July 15, Memphis tycoon Bob Compton said "Economic growth is correlated with one thing: the level of math and science education in a population," and Kentucky's kids aren't getting what they need to compete. "The result," he the audience of Kentucky's business elite, who listened in sobered silence, "is that your children will have a lower standard of living and may have to emigrate to China and India to find jobs.

Efforts are being made to improve teaching and learning in STEM subjects. The East Kentucky Science Center at

and adopted by the state, houses rotating exhibits and conducts programs in schools to promote science-related careers. Local lawyer John Rosenberg, a founder, says the center's goal is to create "silicon hollows," small, concentrated pockets of high-tech jobs like those in California's Silicon Valley.

The National Science gave Foundation University of Kentucky \$22 million for math education in the region. The program is run by math professor Paul Eakin, who saw the need first-hand. "I have had shocking experiences with what was going on - and not going on - in classrooms," Eakin says. "There was this one clown who had a TV in his desk drawer and had his students doing mindless worksheets all day.

Many think the STEM problem boils down to teacher pay. "I'm an engineer by training," says former Gov. Paul Patton of Pikeville, "and I think that teachers and engineers should have about the same education and intellect to do their jobs well - but teachers make \$35,000 to an engi-





FRANKFORT - Terms such as "Texas-rigged worm," "Carolina-rigged lizard" or "wacky rig" are part of a bass angler's everyday lexicon. But to a beginner, the experienced anglers might as well be speaking Chinese.

The Texas rig is probably the most popular fish-catching innovation in the evolution of bass fishing. The term stems from Nick Crème and Crème Manufacturing, the company given credit for inventing the plastic fishing worm. Crème created a double-hooked plastic worm with a straight tail. He tied the hooks to a leader, and then added a couple of red beads and a propeller out front. People called it the "tourist rig" because it was so easy to

catch bass with it. The rig worked great in open water, but snagged logs easily. Crème introduced an improved version of this rig in 1964. He replaced the propeller with a slip sinker and a bead, and the double hook with one large hook. Crème imbedded the hook point into the worm to make it weedless. He called this the Texas rig.

The basic design hasn't changed much since.

The Texas rig shines for bass around stumps, submerged trees and in weeds, because the hook is nearly snagless and 'the sinker punches through the cover. A medium to medium-heavy rod with a stiff tip is needed to drive the hook point through the worm and get the fish out of heavy cover.

A Carolina rig is an evolu-

employs a 1/2- to 1-ounce egg or bullet-shaped slip sinker slid onto the main line from the reel, followed by two red glass beads. Brass is the preferred material for the weight. Brass makes a better clicking sound than lead when it contacts the glass on the retrieve.

The main line is tied to a barrel swivel. An 18- to 36inch leader of monofilament or fluorocarbon line goes on the other loop of the swivel. The leader material is usually a lighter pound test than the main line, such as a 17-pound test main line with a 12-pound leader. A wide-gap offset worm hook goes on the business end.

This rig is versatile because it presents soft plastic worms, jerkbaits, lizards, creature baits and even live bait to hungry bass. The heavy weight of the rig allows the angler to follow contours of the bottom while covering water quickly. The Carolina rig is highly effective for fishing large mud flats, channel drops, ledges, sandbars and submerged humps. It is the go-to bait for many bass anglers fishing deep water, especially in summer and early fall.

You can also toss a Carolina rig onto a brush-covered flat or in the middle of a large weedbed. The heavy sinker on the front of the rig punches through the weeds and brush down to the bottom with the soft plastic bait hovering just above it. This method works wonders for bass on Kentucky Lake.

The wacky rig is a departure from both the Texas and Carolina rig. Several theories tion of the Texas rig. It abound on the origin of the

wacky rig, but one of the most often cited involves two novice anglers bass fishing one of the large reservoirs in Texas. They didn't know how to thread a plastic worm onto a hook properly, so they impaled the middle of their Crème Scoundrel worms and let the ends dangle. The worms hung on the hook like a clown's frown.

The pair threw their worms over weedbeds and caught large bass after large bass. When they returned to the dock, a couple of onlookers asked how they did. The two anglers opened their livewells and showed off some huge bass. The onlookers asked what they caught them on and the anglers held up their funny-looking worm rigs.

After some, mighty guffaws, one of the onlookers exclaimed that it was the wackiest looking rig they'd ever seen. This was the birth of the wacky rig.

The wacky rig is great for fishing docks and up and under overhanging or flooded trees because you can skip it across the water. The undulating action of the worm drives a bass hanging under a dock or in a flooded tree crazy.

Soft plastic jerkbaits such as the Senko work great for this technique. They also draw strikes fished over weedbeds or stumps by pulling the worm up and allowing it to flutter back down.

Don't let terminology stand in the way of learning to fish for bass. Get out this summer and toss one of these rigs in a lake near your home. You'll soon become addicted.

EVERYBODY'S SCIENCE

Cracking Mother Nature's codes

It's high summer, it's hot enough to fry an egg on the sidewalk, and I can't stop thinking about those little "weather sayings" that we've all heard ad nauseum: "Hot enough for you?" and "It's not the heat, it's the humidity," and "Everybody talks about the weather, but nobody does anything about it."

Well ... almost nobody.

It turns out that there's a scientist at the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) who has done something about the weather. No, he hasn't found a way to guarantee comfortable temperatures on the day of your family picnic, or developed a system to ensure perfect "beach weather" for your vacation.

But he has worked out a way to use the weather — climate patterns, to be precise — to predict corn yields. That could benefit not just corn farmers, but all the rest of us who want to help preserve a healthy environment for our kids and grandkids.

This ARS scientist teamed up with colleagues at Penn State to gather more than 50 years of data on corn production in Iowa. They were looking to see if they could identify key correlations between the day-to-day weather, climate indices and corn yields

They figured out that high levels of radiation from the earth's surface and low temperatures early in the corngrowing season, followed by enough rainfall later in the year, often produced high corn yields. In fact, that simple formula accounted for about 89 percent of the variation in corn yields from one year to the next!

While these weather variables may seem like just a day-to-day phenomenon to us, in reality they're often associated with long-term climate trends. The researchers plugged in all sorts of climate indices and came up with an average difference of 19 percent in yields between the years when the corn plants really crank it out, and the years when production is just so-so.

Even more interestingly, they detected a cycle of about two years between the high-production years and the low-production years. That's where this research gets really useful.

Why is that? Because thanks to this mathematical model, if farmers know they've got a low-production year coming up, they can scale back production practices, such as putting out

a bit less fertilizer.

Less fertilizer on the ground means less likelihood of excess fertilizer running off the fields the next time there's a good rain. And less runoff from farm fields translates, ultimately, to less runoff downstream, which could help control the condition called hypoxia—low oxygen levels—in the Gulf of Mexico. The lack of oxygen in the water forces shrimp, fish and crabs out of the area; animals that can't get away simply die.

So now you know how math could wind up helping save the shrimp in the Gulf of Mexico!

Another saying that's been going around in my mind lately is AOne man's trash is another man's treasure@—again, very applicable to some intriguing research by an ARS scientist.

Anyone who's watched a crime show in the past decade or so knows what DNA is; it's the genetic material that makes things happen in every living organism, including us. But it's always been thought that all DNA was not created equal.

For example, there's what's called "intergenic DNA," which is located between genes. For the past 30 years, scientists assumed that particular DNA was essentially worthless; supposedly, it took up space, but didn't really do anything.

It turns out that's not quite true.
When the ARS scientist and his colleagues began studying the so-called

PHS teacher receives training at Forward in the Fifth's 2009 Teacher Academy Network

While students enjoy time off from classes this summer, social studies teachers from south-central and Eastern Kentucky hit the books to learn what it takes to strengthen their students' understanding of government and civic content taught in the classroom.

Forward in the Fifth, a non-profit educational organization that helps the educational community meet standards set by state and national reforms, selected 54 middle school teachers — including one from Floyd County — to receive professional development training this

summer at one of two regional sessions of the 2009 Teacher Academy Network.

"Forward in the Fifth professional development is the place to go," Brenda Minix, a social studies teacher at Prestonsburg High School, said, "to gain more in-depth understanding of deconstructing the core-content standards; to become more aware of how to create proficient multiple choice and openresponse questions with higher depth of knowledge levels; and to teach our students to become more civic-minded thus becoming better citizens."

Minix and 18 other professional educators representing 16 Kentucky school districts attended the second — and final — regional training session held July 7-10 at Rural Law Enforcement Technology Center (RULETC) in Hazard.

At the session, participants dissected each of the grade-level content standards and teaching strategies to increase their knowledge and understanding impacting future student comprehension. They also constructed classroom assessment items which can be utilized throughout their teaching of core content areas of government and civics.

"Forward in the Fifth is committed to be a catalyst for educational change across Kentucky," Jim Tackett, the organization's executive director, said. "Parallel to our mission of uniting educators, students,

parents, and community leaders for improved educational attainment is the need to better equip students and the general public on civic awareness and knowledge within their local community and state."

The training was funded by a U.S. Department of Education Civic Literacy Grant and included both online and onsite professional development strands.

"This professional development experience enables our educators to strengthen their content knowledge and skills in the areas of government and civics," Tackett said. "Research illustrates when teachers understand their content and the standards to

Retired with children?

Did you know that if you receive Social Security benefits and have minor children who depend on you, you might be able to receive benefits for them, too? This is true whether you receive benefits as a retiree or you receive Social Security disability or survivors benefits.

The idea of someone being "retired with children" may seem like the seed of another television sit-com or reality show. But the fact is that it's becoming more and more common for older people to have minor children in their care - whether by bringing new children into the world, taking over the care of grandchildren or adopting children who need nurturing par-

To get benefits, a child must have a parent (or in some cases a grandparent)

is disabled or retired and entitled to Social Security benefits; or

died after having worked long enough in a job where he or she paid Social Security taxes.

The child also must be:

■ Unmarried; and

Younger than age18; or ■ 18-19 years old and a full-time stu-

dent (no higher than grade 12); or

■ 18 or older and disabled. (The disability must have started before age 22.)

Within a family, a child may receive up to one-half of the parent's full retirement or disability benefit; or 75 percent of the deceased parent's basic Social Security benefit. However, there is a limit to the amount of money that can be paid to a family. The maximum family payment can be from 150 to 180 percent of the parent's full benefit amount. If the total amount payable to all family members exceeds this limit, each child's benefit is reduced proportionately until the total equals the maximum allowable amount.

For example, if you are retired with a minor child and your benefit payment is \$1,000 a month, your minor child could

get up to half of that each month, or \$500. However, if you had two minor children in your care, the maximum your entire family could receive would be between \$1,500 and \$1,800 - that's \$1,000 for you and between \$250 and \$400 per child.

Whether you receive Social Security benefits because you have a disabling condition, due to the death of a spouse or because you've reached retirement, if you have minor children, you'll want to read Social Security's online publication, Benefits for Children at www.socialsecurity.gov/pubs/10085.html.



Child Find for Children with Disabilities in Need of Special Education or 504 Services

The Floyd County School District keeps educational records in a secure location in each school and Board

The Floyd County School District obtains written consent from a parent or eligible student (age 18 or who is attending a postsecondary institution), before disclosing personally identifiable information to an entity or individual not authorized to receive it under FERPA.

For students who have been determined eligible for Special Education, educational records will be destroyed at the request of the parents when they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services. The Floyd County School District may destroy the educational records of a child without parent request years after they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services. Parents are advised that data contained in the records may later be needed for Social Security benefits or other purposes. The Floyd County School District may retain, for an indefinite period of time, a record of the student's name, address, telephone number, grades, attendance records, classes attended, grade level completed, and year completed.

Children eligible for Special Education include those children with disabilities who have autism, deafblindness, developmental delay, emotional-behavior disability, hearing impairment, mental disability, multiple disabilities, orthopedic impairment, other health impairment, specific learning disability, speech or language impairment, traumatic brain injury, or visual impairment and who because of such an impairment need Special

Children eligible for 504 services include those children who have a current physical or mental impairment that currently substantially limits some major life activity which causes the student's ability to access the school environment or school activities to be substantially limited.

The Floyd County School District has an ongoing "Child Find" system, which is designed to locate, identify and evaluate any child residing in a home, facility, or residence within its geographical boundaries, age three (3) to twenty-one (21) years, who may have a disability and be in need of Special Education or 504 services. This includes children who are not in school; those who are in public, private, or home school; those who are highly mobile such as children who are migrant or homeless; and those who are advancing from grade to grade, who may need but are not receiving Special Education or 504 services.

The District's "Child Find" system includes children with disabilities attending private or home schools within the school district boundaries who may need special education services.

The Floyd County School District will make sure any child enrolled in its district who qualifies for Special Education or 504 services, regardless of how severe the disability, is provided appropriate Special Education or 504 services at no cost to the parents of the child.

Parents, relatives, public and private agency employees, and concerned citizens are urged to help the Floyd County School District find any child who may have a disability and need Special Education or 504 services. The District needs to know the name and age, or date of birth of the child; the name, address, and phone number(s) of the parents or guardian; the possible disability; and other information to determine if Special Education or 504 services are needed.

Letters and phone calls are some of the ways the Floyd County School District collects the information needed. The information the school District collects will be used to contact the parents of the child and find out if the child needs to be evaluated or referred for Special Education or 504 services.

"Child Find" activities will continue throughout the school year. As part of these efforts the Floyd County School District will use screening information, student records, and basic assessment information it collects on all children in the District to help locate those children who have a disability and need Special Education or 504 services. Any information the District collects through "Child Find" is maintained confidentially.

Written Policies and Procedures have been developed that describe the District's requirements regarding the confidentiality of personally identifiable information and "Child Find" activities. Notification of FERPA Rights

Distribute this notice annually to parents and students.

The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and "eligible students" (students over 18 years of age or students who are attending a postsecondary institution) certain rights with respect to the student's education records. They are:

1) The right to inspect and review the student's education records within forty-five (45) days of the day the District receives a request for access.

Parents or eligible students should submit to the school Principal/designee a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The Principal will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the record(s) may be inspected.

2) The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of the student's privacy or other rights. Parents or eligible students may ask the District to amend a record that they believe is

inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of privacy or other rights. They should write the school Principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of their privacy or other rights.

If the District decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the District will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise him/her of the right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

3) The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

One exception that permits disclosure without consent is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A "school official" is a person employed by the District as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the school Board; a person or company with whom the District has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his/her tasks.

A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his/her professional responsibility.

Upon request, the District shall disclose education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll or to other entities authorized by law.

Notification of FERPA Rights

4) The right to prohibit the disclosure of personally identifiable information concerning the student to recruiting representatives of the U.S. Armed Forces and its service academies, the Kentucky Air National Guard, and the Kentucky Army National Guard.

Unless the parent or eligible student requests in writing that the District not release information, the student's name, address, and telephone number (if listed) shall be released to Armed Forces recruiters upon their request.

5) The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA is:


