State budget contains Floyd projects

FRANKPORT - The General Assembly finalized a two-yearbudget and road plan over the course of Friday and Saturday nights that will see Floyd County receive \$66 million in funding for various projects over the course of the time

Most of the money, \$62.6 million, able to keep basic services intact and will be used for road projects such as the continued efforts on the Minnie-Harold connector, which will alone make up \$40 million of that amount, said House Speaker Greg Stumbo who has been part of that project since its beginning several years ago.

"Although we wish we could have done much more for education and the economy, I am proud that we're that, here at home, we were able to do a lot of positive things," Stumbo said.

Some \$3.21 million of the funding will be used for a variety of coal-severance tax projects and yet remaining amounts will be used on projects in the southern end of the county, Stumbo added.

"We included more than \$40 miltion for the Minnie-Harold connector.

Wheelwright with its gym and swimming pool," Stumbo added, saying also he was pleased to see funding go to scholarships to the Highlands Center for Autism to help families cover tuittion costs. More charity golf touraments are also in the works for the center, Stumbo said, in order to bring the total of school or personal donations to \$100,000 a year.

\$8 million sewer project

PRESTONSBURG - As summer settles across the city of Presionsburg with temperatures peaking at more than 100 degrees in the past week, Mayor Jerry Famin is, for once, optimistic about a reoccurring problem during this time of year.

In the past several weeks, city workers have been tearing up the old sewer system and replacing it with new pipes and other equipment. The work has focused so far along South Lake Drive, but turned the corner onto West Graham and beyond to Westminster and Deep Streets in the last few days.

"By replacing the open grates with closed grates and just an overhaul that's long been needed, but lacked funding," Fannin said. "Anytime you've got one of these old systems, you've got a problem with smell, especially in summertime and when the rains move the sewage and then it dries out and it's not moving

fast enough." The outdated sewer system that has served the city for several decades has long been a problem for residents during hot weather and heavy rains. Open sewer grates, constructed

decades ago under earlier guidelines, have consistently created an odor throughout parts of the city that even became the focus of one opponent's campaign against Fannin for the mayor's seat eight years ago when Thomas Hereford ran advertisements that criticized the prob-

"One of the guys who ran against me said we needed to fix the problem," Pannin continued. "It's easy to say that, but it's hard to come up with the funding and we're not the only city that has had this problem."

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



State needs action on pension reform

It's been nearly two years since lawmakers met in special session to pass a first stage of reforms to the state's public employee pension system.

At the time, the system was underfunded by \$27 billion due to the generous package of benefits Kentucky has offered state workers and teachers that for years hasn't been fully paid for by

That 2008 special session was supposed to be the start of the work to bring pension costs under control. House Bill 1 passed during the session was supposed to just be a first step to avoid the long-term bankrupting of the state that would come by fulfilling the promises made but not paid for by the General Assembly.

Instead, that's been the last serious attempt at pension reform, and there's been little indication from legislative leaders that they plan to finish the job.

The consequences of continuing to ignore pension reform, and the challenges of finally addressing it, become more prevalent each day. Look to Europe, where the government of Greece faced collapse due to the heavy burden of public employee pensions there. Efforts in Greece to raise the retirement age and freeze benefits prompted riots even while the Greek government's debt threatened to bring down the economy of the country and Europe.

Kentucky isn't the only state facing the prospect of owing far more than it can pay to its employees as its public work force ages and state revenues dry up. States are raising retirement ages for new hires, like Kentucky did in 2008, and considering moving away from defined benefit plans toward defined contribution plans like 401(k) plans offered in the private sector. No state has found the right long-term solution, and reforms have faced opposition each step of the way despite the growing threat to state

In February, the Pew Center on the States released a report that said states are \$1 trillion short of the money they need to pay for public pension and retiree health care benefits. The situation is even more dour than what lawmakers faced in 2008 when they met in special session to enact initial reforms.

But at least in Kentucky, the response to the impending financial crisis brought on by its pension promises is more handwringing rather than problem-solving.

Because of the "inviolable contract" that Kentucky has with its employees to provide pension benefits, there's no clear path how to avert the financial disaster that the cost of these benefits could cause on the state treasury. Lawmakers should be held accountable for putting the state on the hook for billions of dollars in benefits while putting off paying the bill that grows larger

The need for pension reform won't diminish even as the economy improves, and for now Kentucky has no way to meet its obligations. The balanced budget just passed that brought acrossthe-board cuts to most state agencies includes only a portion of what's required to make the pension system whole in the future, and stepping up payments into the system in future years will bring even more tough choices.

The public, including public employees, can't continue to let the legislature push pension reform off into the future or state workers will be left with no retirement security and taxpayers will faced with a bankrupt Kentucky state treasury.

House week in review

Talk of a budget impasse turned to talk of budget passage in Frankfort on Friday as lawmakers neared the end of a sixday special session by passing a \$17 billion two-year spending plan that slashes spending by at least \$1 billion from 2009 levels and doesn't raise a single tax.

The bare-bones 2010-2012 Executive Branch budget package, which includes the state spending plan and a revenue plan, includes virtually all the recommendations in the governor's latest compromise budget, along with specific House and Senate provisions required to help the state weather a budget shortfall of at least \$1 billion over the next budget cycle.

Both the governor and the General Assembly agreed early in the 2010 Regular Session which ended last month — that there would be no new taxes in any budget that was passed. The plan, instead, was to reach a deal that would avoid a government shutdown while plugging the expected two-year shortfall.

The budget, passed and sent to the governor for his signature on Friday, accomplishes these goals through cuts of 3.5 percent in fiscal year 2011 and 4.5 percent in 2012 for most state agencies-with lesser cuts for postseceducation ondary Corrections-increased government efficiencies, limited new bond indebtedness (which means no newly authorized water or sewer projects for Kentucky communities this next budget cycle) and funding from the revenue plan. Exempt from across-the-board cuts that most agencies will face are Medicaid, merit-based KEES scholarships earned by thousands of Kentucky high school students each year, and per-pupil funding that public schools receive through the state's SEEK formula designed to equalize education funding among school districts.

The two-year spending plan maintains all 177 instructional days currently on the public school calendar (with one day

paid for by school districts and the rest paid for by the state), holds down additional General Fund-supported debt, limits agency-fund debt for universities and other entities to around \$515 million, adds around \$20 million to the state's "rainy day" budget reserve trust fund, and allows the governor to order furloughs without disproportionately targeting lower-paid workers. Changes to employee and teacher health insurance alsoordered by the budget are expected to save the state around \$94 million over the two years.

Added to the budget in the final hours of the special session was a mechanism for school districts to fund aging schools most in need of replacement. Under that plan, the state will match funding for districts that levy what is called an "equalizing nickel", or 5 cents per \$100 in property value, to fund facilities construction. The money would only go to so-called "Category 5" schools— those facilities considered to be in the worst

The revenue plan, also given final passage and sent to the governor Friday, is expected to save the state upwards of \$89 million over the budget cycle through tax code changes, including modifications to the state's new home tax credit and a credit for the film industry. Tax incentives to benefit rural and low-income communities through business investment are also part of the revenue legisla-

tion. The Executive Branch budget was the top priority this special session, although other state priorities were also taken up and approved. One of those priorities was a bill to shore up the state's ailing Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund. That measure-which is similar to a bill that passed the House but stalled in the Senate in the recent Regular Session-gained success on Friday when it was given final passage in the Senate. The bill now goes to the governor for his signature.

Supporters of the unemployment bill say it will help balance the fund that pays weekly benefits to Kentucky's thousands of unemployed by gradually reducing the percentage of weekly benefits paid by the state and

raising the taxable wage base that determines employer premiums paid into the fund. Employers are expected to save money under the measure, which became necessary after months of high unemployment forced Kentucky to borrow hundreds of millions of dollars from the federal government to keep the fund afloat.

Agreement on a two-year state road plan and a bill that will fund operations of the Transportation Cabinet was reached on Saturday. The bills, passed late Saturday night, will provide funding in several key transportation areas through 2012, and lawmakers were determined to see the measures passed. Important work on roads, bridges, aviation and other areas can continue because of action taken on these bills in special session.

The final item on the governor's special session agenda was a call to allow distilleries and wineries to offer free samples of their product at locations other than their private grounds. Both the House and Senate took up separate measures to allow the businesses to offer samplings-or tastings-of beverages like Kentucky Bourbon and wine at such events as the upcoming Alltech FEI World Equestrian Games and Kentucky Derby, although neither bill was passed into law by the end of the session. It is possible, however, that some expansion of sampling will be addressed by the governor through executive order.

My colleagues and I are very pleased that we were able to finish this special session within the one-week time period lawmakers had set for ourselves (although we had hoped for five days instead of six). But the good thing is the extra day enabled us to take care of the transportation issues left hanging Friday night as midnight approached.

The budget is stark, given our state's economic situation, but we have hope that our finances will have improved enough by the 2011 Regular Session that more money can be put into education, human services and other critical areas that have suffered this recession along with so many Kentuckians.

Let the sunshine in

I'm sure you've all seen that TV commercial where the young man is talking on his cellphone and keeps asking over and over again, "Can you hear me now?" In a slight variation on that theme, I'm just glad that you can't see me now — because I look more like a raccoon than any human being should look!

If you're a regular reader of this column, you know that my husband and I love to sail. And this past Saturday was one of the most perfect sailing days we've ever experienced: pleasant temperatures, winds just right, bright blue sky with big fluffy clouds. Since it wasn't overly warm, I was covered head to toe - hat, sunglasses, long sleeves, long pants and I didn't even think about sunburn until day's end.

Then I discovered that even on cool days, you need sunscreen! I'm your classic redhead with pale skin and freckles, and when I took off my sunglasses, the part of my face that they had covered was still pale and freckled — but the rest of my face is red as the proverbial beet. The result: a red-and-white raccoon mask! (Although it doesn't take much to sizzle me; I could probably get a sunburn from my makeup mirror light.)

So I definitely got too much of a good thing on Saturday ... but in fact, sunshine really is good for you (heads-up to all the computer geeks out there who get the bulk of their light exposure from their computer screens).

Did you know you can get a vitamin from sunshine? That may sound like an old wives' tale, but it's true. According to the National Institutes of Health, vitamin D is known as the "sunshine vitamin," because the body manufactures this particular vitamin after exposure to sunshine. Now you certainly don't have to do what I did on Saturday; just 10 to 15 minutes of sunshine three times a week is enough to produce the body's requirement of vitamin D.

Yet, odd as it may seem, even people living in sunny climates don't always make enough vitamin D naturally, and may need to acquire more through their diet or dietary supple-

Vitamin D isn't hard to find in the foods we eat; it's in cheese, butter, cream and especially milk, which in this country is typically fortified with vitamin D. It's also in fish, oysters, fortified cereals and margarine.


And if you're a "lady of a certain age" (as I am), you might even find your doctor prescribing a super-dose of vitamin D — as much as 50,000 International Units (IU) — to be taken once a week or perhaps once a month.

Why all the emphasis on vitamin D? It's because this particular vitamin helps your body absorb calcium and the older we get, the more impor-

tant that is. In fact, among older adults, the popular thinking often runs that boosting calcium intake is a good way to reduce the likelihood of a bone fracture in case of a fall. But a study funded in part by the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) has shown just how important vitamin D is in the equation, versus just loading up on more calcium.

Our current calcium intake recommendations are not tied to vitamin D. Here in the United States, that recommended amount is 1,200 milligrams (mg) daily for adults aged 50 and older.

The study funded by ARS involved about 10,000 men and women aged 20 and older. The study leaders looked at the participants' blood levels of 25hydroxyvitamin D as the primary indicator vitamin D adequacy. Among the participants, a large fraction of the younger as well as the older adults



were below the suggested vitamin D concentrations in the blood of at least 75 nanomoles per liter (nmol/L).

The bottom line from this study? Correcting inadequate blood levels of vitamin D could be more important than boosting your dietary calcium intake beyond an additional 566 mg a day for women and 626 mg a day for men to achieve better bone mineral density.

So, just like we learned in elementary school-if you want to do right by your bones, drink your milk every day, but be sure to go out and play in the sunshine,
