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lectric rates going up 12.5 percent

RANKFORT – The Kentucky ic Service Commission loved a settlement Monday granting Kentucky Power Company an annual revenue increase of \$63.7 million, a 12.5 percent increase in total. The amount is about half of what the company was seeking.

Under the settlement, the aver-

age bill for an typical resident would increase by about 17 percent. Had the company been given its original amount increase that percentage increase would have been at about 34 percent.

Representatives with PSC conducted public hearings in Ashland, Pikeville and Hazard in April to gather comments on the increase and followed this with another public meeting in Frankfort on May 25 before the agreement.

In the commission's order said the rate increase was "fair, just and reasonable.

Many of the public comments received by the commission leading up to the agreement dealt with the desire for Kentucky Power to be made to better maintain vegetation and overgrowth along power lines throughout the region. Part of Monday's agreement included sections that requires the company to spend more money on this over the

course of the agreement period.

The company says the increase in spending on clearing the vegetation, which many said caused extra hardships during snowstorms that fell across the region this past December, will enable them to "achieve a four-year cycle" in clearing the overgrowth from power lines.

"We are pleased the commis-

Murder victim identified as Martin man

The body of a man found in the basement of a home in Louisville last week has been identified as that of former Martin resident James Carroll.

Carroll, who was 37, was dis-

covered in the basement of a home on South Fourth Street in Louisville last week. Two men who lived there, Joseph Banis and Jeffrey Mundt, were arrested following discovery of Carroll's body and have since pleaded innocent to charges of murder, robbery and tampering with physical evidence.

Police were called to the residence over a domestic dispute between the two lovers. During his arrest, Banis gave statements concerning Carroll to investigating officers.

"He did give a statement to implicating detectives boyfriend, Jeffrey Mundt, in a

homicide and that the body was located in the basement where they had been staying," Louisville police officer Barry Wilkerson told local media. "Kind of an isolated area of the basement, very far away from where anybody would be able



End of an era

The passing of the longest-serving senator and the longest-serving member in congressional history leaves a void hard to fill.

Sen. Robert C. Byrd leaves behind many years of dedicated service in which the West Virginia statesman was loved and hated for holding a wide variety of liberal and conservative political views.

His career catapulted Byrd to many roles including those of Senate Conference Secretary, Majority Whip, Minority Leader, and twice Majority Leader.

He is among a quickly vanishing breed of fine orators, and his keen memory enabled him to quote prolifically from the most notable works of literature, philosophy, religion and history.

With his legendary filibusters, Byrd could wear down the best of his colleagues with endless prose, poetry and political rhetoric. Called upon often to speak at commencement ceremonies, celebrations and newsworthy events, Byrd would most likely pull at least one quote from Cicero and would recite long passages from Tennyson or Keats with his unique dramatic flair.

His backers made sure the Mountain State Democrat never lost an election from the day he was elected to the U.S. House in 1952. Supporters held him in high esteem for his work through the Senate Appropriations Committee to fund scholarships, schools, federal courthouses, highways and prisons and for making sure West Virginia got its share of federal complexes, most notably the FBI Fingerprint Center near Bridgeport.

Admired by many for his stage presence, Byrd also made his share of political enemies during his eventful career. Outsiders, such as the Citizens Against Government Waste crowned him the "King of Pork," dismissing the billions of federal dollars he sent to West Virginia as worthless "Byrd Droppings."

But Byrd left his mark — and his name on dozens of places that bear their benefactor's name, from the Robert C. Byrd Regional Training Center for soldiers at Camp Dawson in Kingwood and Robert C. Byrd High School in Clarksburg, to the 17-mile, four-lane Robert C. Byrd Drive near his hometown of Sophia. Those are just a few.

He held West Virginia and its people dear to his heart. Byrd always did what he thought was best for the Mountain State.

A legislative perspective

The three lines in the state's 283-page budget may have taken up little space, but the study they authorized on Kentucky's corrections system could have a big impact in the years ahead.

My colleagues in the General Assembly and I set this in motion because it will give us a chance to work with the Pew Center on the States, an independent and highly reputable non-profit organization that has undertaken in-depth looks at various government programs across the nation.

It was this organization that showed Kentucky having the highest prison growth rate in the nation in 2007, giving us a wake-up call that has already

started to pay dividends. As proof, consider the fact that we are one of about two dozen states that saw a decrease in its prison population from 2008 to 2009. This coincides with an overall drop in the number of state prisoners nationwide, the first time this has happened since 1972.

This downward trend at the state level is driven by several factors. For one, the country is becoming safer, with the crime rate 25% lower in 2007 than it was in 1997. The difficult economy is also causing states to look for more savings, especially as their prison costs continue inching toward \$50 billion annually, and there is greater reliance on technology and better use of such things as counsel-

The General Assembly has taken additional steps to control costs during the last two years. For example, we increased the use of home incarceration and drug-treatment programs while increasing the financial limits on some felony theft crimes to reflect inflation.

Our Judiciary Committee has considered additional changes through a subcommittee that spent 2008 and 2009 looking at our penal code, which has not seen a major update since the mid-1970s. One suggestion from the subcommittee is to follow other states and create a fifth level of felonies for nonviolent, non-sexual crimes. Under current law, someone convicted of stealing \$500 could cost the state up to \$100,000 to incarcerate, if that person spends five years in prison.

During our legislative session earlier this year, the General

Assembly voted unanimously to create a broader task force to study the prison issue. This expanded task force will include representatives from the Kentucky Supreme Court; the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet; county judge/executives; and prosecutors and public advocates.

Surveys indicate the public supports this move toward alternative punishments for those convicted of non-violent crimes. In Texas, more than 80 percent surveyed favored going this route versus spending \$1 billion on new prisons.

One direction we may opt to take in Kentucky is a risk assessment of convicted felons about to be sentenced. While I was Attorney General, my office pointed out the effectiveness of pre-sentencing risk assessments; we noted Virginia's success in using a variety of factors to help determine the proper punishment for those convicted of nonviolent crimes, rather than taking a one-size-fits-all approach.

Being smarter on crime and improving public safety, while saving tax dollars, promises to be a leading topic of discussion for years to come in the legislature. With the right information in hand, the kind the Pew study can provide, we are poised to continue building on the gains we have already made.

■ blood glucose - Level of sugar in the blood. Studies have shown those with diabetes are at increased risk for vascular disease.

electrocardiogram (EKG) - A non-invasive test to measure electrical activity to the heart by attaching electrodes to the skin.



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EVERYBODY'S SCIENCE

Falling through Alice's looking glass

I've been thinking a lot lately about "Alice in Wonderland" — yes, the Lewis Carroll classic. It's meant to be a book for children, but sometimes I wonder if children's books aren't really written more for adults.

I would be willing to bet that you've never really thought about how much of the dialogue of "Alice" (the actual name of the book was "Alice's Adventures in Wonderland") has seeped into our everyday life. Have you ever caught yourself thinking, "Curiouser and curiouser," or "I'm late, I'm late, for a very important date!" or perhaps "Off with her head"? All from Alice!

"Alice" has been on my mind lately because of one of the book's basic premises: Things aren't always what they seem, or at least what they appear to be. Or, to quote The Duchess, "Never imagine yourself not to be otherwise than what it might appear to others that you were or might have been was not otherwise than what you had been would have appeared to them to be otherwise."

Sometimes research can be like that. You think a story is headed one way and it veers off in a totally different way, or you think that something's supposed to be bad, and it turns out be quite good.

We all know viruses are bad, right? Turns out that's true, except when they're good! Agricultural Research Service (ARS) scientists have shown have shown that enzymes from bacteria-infecting viruses known as phages actually could have beneficial applications for human and animal health.

Phage enzymes called endolysins attack bacteria by breaking down their cell walls. And unlike antibiotics, which tend to have a broad range, endolysins are comparatively specific. This means non-target bacteria could be less likely to develop resistance to the endolysins.

Studies by ARS scientists have shown that the phage enzymes could be used to wipe out multi-drug-resistant pathogens that affect both animals and humans, such as the dreaded MRSA (methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus).

The scientists also showed that the enzymes can knock out pathogens in biofilms, which are matrices of microorganisms that can attach to a variety of surfaces. Biofilms are resistant to antibiotics, and contribute to many human infections.

And the scientists have shown that using two endolysins — lysostaphin and LysK — together can inhibit the growth of staphylococcal strains that cause mastitis in cattle and staph infections in humans.

Turning a totally different direction, ARS scientists and their university colleagues have just published a new study on the possible causes of Colony Collapse Disorder (CCD), the mysterious problem that's plagued beekeepers over the past few years. You remember this one: It's the disease that causes bees to simply disappear

The research team looked more than 200 individual variables in 91 bee colonies from 13 apiaries in Florida and California, where many beekeepers overwinter their honey bees. Among the factors for which the researchers screened were bacteria, mites, protozoan parasites called Nosema, viruses, the nutritional status of the bees, and yes, 171 pesticides. Adult bees, wax comb, stored and processed pollen, and young bees, called "brood," were all sampled.

Now, some folks who have followed the CCD story for a while have been quite insistent that the problem is pesticides, plain and simple. But this

latest study suggests the answer is neither plain nor simple. While the researchers did find detectable levels of residues from 50 different pesticides in all the sampled colonies, they found no association between increased pesticide levels and CCD.

In fact, the pyrethroid insecticide Esfenvalerate, which is used to control a wide variety of pests on vegetable, fruit and nut crops, was actually more prevalent in the wax of the colonies that had never suffered from CCD. This insecticide was found in 32 percent of the non-CCD colonies, compared with 5 percent of the CCD colonies. And coumaphos, used to treat varroa mites in



CCD colonies. However, the researchers did find a higher total load of pathogens - viruses, bacteria and fungi - in the colonies that had suffered CCD, providing some good clues as to where to look (or



Although managed primarily for wildlife habitat and hunting and fishing access, any citizen of the state may use these thousands of acres to hike, watch birds, picnic, photograph wildlife and pursue other outdoor-related recreation, as well as hunt and fish.

Kentuckians may use these lands whether or not they help pay the bill by purchasing a hunting or fishing license. These wildlife areas are a gift to the rest of the state provided by hunters and anglers.

Shooting ranges are another service provided on some of Kentucky's wildlife management areas. Most Kentuckians don't have easy access to a private gun club where they can sight in their deer rifle or practice their wingshooting.

Wildlife management areas across the state have public shooting ranges for target shooting with a rifle, pistol or shotgun. On Curtis Gates Lloyd WMA in Grant County and Miller Welch-Central Kentucky WMA in Madison County, shotgunners may use the self-serve trap ranges to hone their skills.

Kentucky Fish and Wildlife approved clubs operate skeet and trap ranges at Curtis Gates Lloyd WMA, Miller Welch-Central Kentucky WMA and West Kentucky WMA in McCracken County. Participants in the club event may use these facilities.

The Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commission recently passed new regulations to improve safety at public shooting ranges on wildlife management areas by banning certain types of weapons and ammunition.

Users may not discharge cannons, artillery or any replica of those weapons on public shooting ranges on wildlife management areas. Mortars, grenades, incendiaries, explosive devices or explosive bullets are prohibited as well.

Modern firearm bullets 500 grains or larger may not be used at these public shooting ranges. Shotgun slugs larger than 10-gauge or muzzleloader balls or bullets larger than .78 caliber are also prohibited from use. Also, people may not fire rifles that are not shoulder-mounted or pistols that are not hand held.

"The impact of those rounds creates significant damage to the safety backstops at those ranges," said Brian Clark, assistant director of public affairs for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife.

Feel free to use these public shooting ranges this summer as you prepare for the coming hunting seasons. Enjoy these public areas and appreciate them as gifts. They belong to you; treat them as you would your own.




