Group protesting nukes marches through county

IVEL — With banners rippling in the cold morning wind and the sound of drums mixing with the passing traffic on US 23, a group of activists passed through Ivel on Tuesday on their way from Tennessee to New York City to protest the use of nuclear power.

The group, known as Footprints for Peace, started walking at the V-12 Nuclear Weapons Facility in Oak Ridge, Tenn. on Feb. 13. The group

hopes to arrive in New York on May 1.

According to information provided by Footprints for Peace, the group hopes to raise awareness about alternative energy and sustainable lifestyles while exposing the effects of the nuclear industry. The walk is open to all those who wish to join.

"We are walking to the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty Review at the United Nations," said Marcus Atkinson, international coordinator with

Footprints for Peace. "We want to make people aware that this conference is happening. The governments of the world should make progress on their agreements that they made three decades ago on nuclear disarmament. The public will have to become involved in this. Our leaders will not disarm their nuclear weapons if we don't stand up and demand they do so."

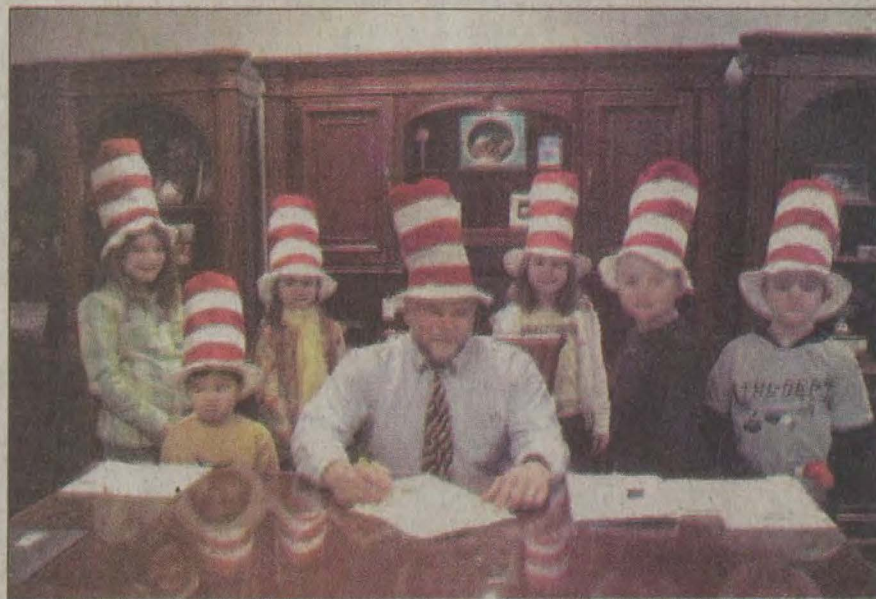

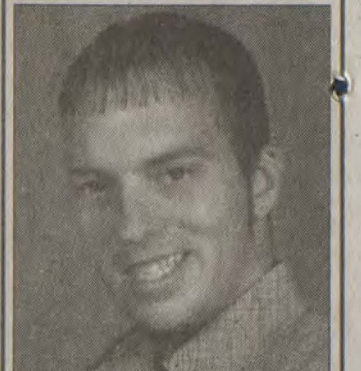

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Bible literacy course wins Senate approval

FRANKFORT - Kentucky schools could offer courses on the Bible within a historical context under legislation passed Thursday by the Senate.

Senate Bill 142, sponsored by Sens. David Boswell, D-Owensboro, and Julian Carroll, D-Frankfort, directs the state Board of Education to develop guidelines for courses on the Old Testament and New Testament as well as a course that covers both.

"The Bible is the most influential book ever written," Boswell said. He noted works of literature and film that reference the Bible in addition to historical figures such as Abraham Lincoln and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who quoted scripture in their speeches.

"I want to emphasize that it should be taught, not preached," Boswell said. The bill requires the courses to be taught in a religiously neutral context with a focus on

history and literary techniques in addition to its influence on government and culture.

Under the bill, high school-based decision making councils would have to approve the courses before they could be offered at each school. The courses would be electives, not graduation requirements.

The measure, which passed 37-1, now moves to the House for its consideration.

'Bye baby Bunning' can't come too soon

Kentucky's junior senator, Jim Bunning, is retiring from politics this year, which is one of those bittersweet moments that is a mix of both good news and bad news.

It's good that he's leaving; it's bad that he isn't already gone.

It's particularly bad for 14,000 jobless Kentuckians and 1.2 million other Americans, who now face losing their unemployment benefits during the worst economic downturn since the Great Depression, solely because Jim Bunning has chosen this particular moment to throw a temper tantrum.

Here's what's happened: Bunning employed an obscure bit of parliamentary procedure to single-handedly tank a routine piece of legislation that would have extended jobless benefits. Not only that, but Bunning's roadblock also brings billions of dollars worth of transportation projects to a screeching halt and sends thousands of construction workers and Transportation Department employees home for unexpected, unpaid and indefinite vacations.

You see, Bunning has suddenly found the religion of fiscal responsibility. He didn't have it during the first five years of his term, or during his career in the House of Representatives, as he was more than willing to simultaneously slash government receipts while at the same time funding two wars and saddling the country with an expensive and unfunded Medicare prescription drug benefit. But he has it now, just in time to place those who have already been victimized by the "Great Recession" in further jeopardy.

And, not content to simply leave well over a million Americans in economic limbo, Bunning is doing so with a newfound flair for the vulgar. ABC News reporters attempting to question him about his stance have received a middle finger in response. That's a bit better than his fellow senators got when, after they implored him to change his mind, he responded with a hearty "Tough sh--."

Such callous disregard for his fellow man makes it evident that our sociopathic senator could learn a few lessons about compassion from Marie Antoinette.

In the past, we could overlook Bunning because he has been worthless, but largely harmless, to Eastern Kentucky. In fact, we are uncertain whether he is aware that there exists a Kentucky outside of the golden triangle of Covington, Lexington and Louisville.

But his recent hostility toward, well, pretty much everybody makes it clear that Jim Bunning is a cancer on Capitol Hill. We would urge him to end his political gamesmanship for the sake of the country, but his childish behavior makes it clear that there would be no point in doing so.

A legislative perspective

In recent days, the Kentucky House of Representatives has made significant progress in completing a two-year budget proposal that provides funding and guides state government through these difficult economic times.

I'm proud that our plan does not raise taxes, and that we continue to maintain the necessary funding for education, Medicaid and public safety; many states have been forced to make drastic cuts in these areas. Although the deficit is estimated at \$1.2 billion, I believe we can overcome it in ways that preserve government's core functions. We will not close our state parks, lay off teachers or leave our prisons unguarded.

Our plan relies in part on reductions in the number of political appointees and on reducing the cost of non-essential service contracts. We would like to see the numbers for both return to 2007 state government levels.

The House proposal also reduces payments to higher education by two percent and removes two elementary and secondary school days that were added in 2006 but not made perma-

nent. Districts would have the option to keep these days if they are locally funded.

We are making an informed assumption regarding a six-month continuation of extra Medicaid funding from the federal government. We believe this is reasonable based on conversations with our U.S. Congressional delegates and the assumptions President Obama has made in his budget proposal.

Our plan also relies on some of the same efficiencies contained in the governor's budget.

It is critical to note that our plan does not rely on non-existent revenue from expanded gaming, and it does not take money that would short-change future lottery-based scholarships. There is no support in the House or Senate to go this route.

If all goes as planned, the House will vote on a budget during the first week of March, and it will then be sent to the Senate for consideration and passage. We should have a final compromise bill ready for a vote by the end of that month, with the two-year budget then taking effect in July.

As we wait for that to move forward, the House has voted in recent days for other major pieces of legislation. Included in the recent bills passed is my House Bill 1 (Amanda's Bill), which would give judges the authority to require electronic monitoring in domestic-violence cases (DVO). A little over a week ago,

another bill passed that brings together several related issues such as allowing victims in dating situations to obtain DVOs, something already possible in about 40 other states. Under current law, victims have to have been married or engaged to the offender, lived together or had a child together to qualify for having a DVO issued.

This legislation would also add penalties for those who trespass at domestic violence shelters, increase law enforcement training and better track domestic-violence cases in the legal system.

Another bill that made it through the House recently would crack down on drunken driving. In this case, those convicted of this crime would be called upon to use an ignition lock that would keep the vehicle from working if they have alcohol on their breath; about a dozen states already require something similar.

My colleagues and I were proud to welcome the leader of Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), who came to the Capitol in support of this bill.

Although the 60-day legislative session is more than half over, there remains a considerable amount of work to be done. I have already heard from many of you. House week in review

House leaders spent last week fine-tuning their plan to plug the state's more than \$1-billion revenue shortfall with a variety of strategies — including anticipated federal stimulus revenue, fund transfers, and cuts in spending, state political hires and public-school days — as they planned for a budget vote on the House floor by early March.

While wording of the budget plan was still being refined last week, some draft provisions have been publicly rolled out and are getting a lot of attention. They include, among others, an additional two-percent cut in most state agency and university spending — excluding Medicaid, base per-pupil SEEK funding and corrections — along with savings in public-employee health insurance costs, state personal-service contract expenses, two fewer school days, and a reduction in the number of political appointees working in state government. An anticipated \$200-\$250 million in additional federal stimulus dollars would also be used to balance the budget under the plan.

None of the provisions are set in granite, as key lawmakers have indicated. I have no doubt that any budget we consider this session will have two or three incarnations before session's

end. What is not likely to change is the House's resolve to balance the budget without broad-based tax increases or relying on any potential revenues from expanded gaming — two issues that appear to have the proverbial fork stuck in them, at least for this session.

Whatever budget bill clears our budget committee is expected to make it to the House floor by early March. It will then go to the Senate, where any changes that chamber makes will be combed through by House and Senate lawmakers in a conference committee where a final bill will be hashed out in the final days of the session.

The budget is the main focus in the House right now, but it's not our only focus. Recent days have been spent passing energy legislation that addresses the potential impact of greenhouse-gas regulation on our energy market as well as our broader economy.

Concern with possible adverse economic effects caused by non-statutory U.S. Environmental Protection Agency regulation of greenhouse gases was the focus of House Resolution 132, passed 76-16 by the House last Tuesday. Supporters of the resolution hope to change how the issue is handled by encouraging Congress to put a hold on the EPA's efforts to regulate CO2 and other greenhouse gases from sources like power plants and factories until the matter is statutorily handled by Congress. Opponents of the resolution voiced concern with the effects of global warming and the need for swift

action to curb greenhouse-gas emissions in the atmosphere.

Carbon dioxide is also the issue behind HB 213, which would permit companies to use Kentucky's eminent domain laws to build carbon dioxide transmission pipelines to move the gas to states where it can be stored. The bill, which cleared the House by a 91-5 vote and now goes to the Senate for consideration, is part of Kentucky's move toward clean-coal technology. Supporters say it would also help the state deal with any future regulation of carbon dioxide by allowing it to be moved and stored. Similar legislation has been passed in 12 other states.

At least two House bills are one step closer to becoming law last week after being passed by the Senate. HB 51, which now goes to the governor for his signature, would enhance suicide prevention efforts by requiring public middle and high school to distribute suicide prevention materials to their students every fall and required the state to post suicide prevention information on its web site. The other bill, HB 19, would allow military veterans who have returned home from deployment a year's extension to renew their state concealed-carry permits, and would allow permits for active-duty military to be renewed and sent to the troops' stations. The bill now returns to the House for concurrence with Senate amendments.

Concern for the welfare of

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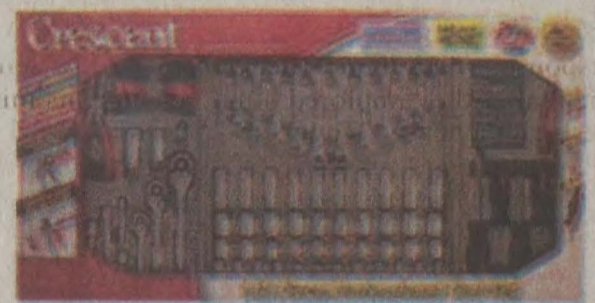
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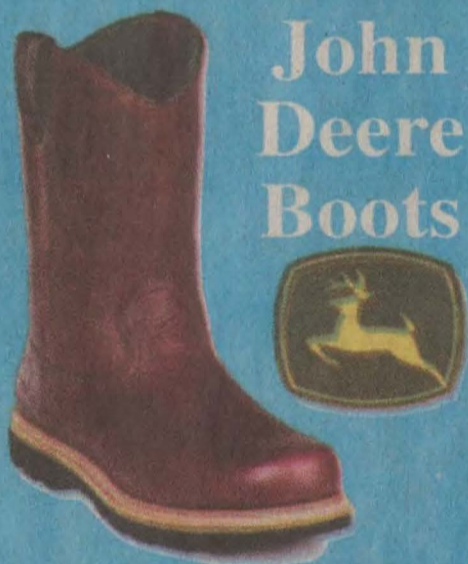
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Pikeville College presents 'Perpetua Perplexita' art show

Kentucky's children was the focus of a bill addressing "sexting" — the practice of sending sexual images or imagery through text messages — which cleared the House Judiciary Committee last Wednesday. Under HB 143, teens under age 18 would have to perform community service and pay a \$100 fine the first time they caught sending or possessing nude images through text messages. Supporters said the bill would both protect victims and prevent teens from facing possible felony charges later by making first-time offenders aware of the consequences of their behavior.

The month of March will be an extremely hectic time at the Capitol as lawmakers try to reach agreement on House and Senate bills now between chambers and work toward agreement on a budget before the end of the month. It will be a daunting task but, working together for the good of all

Kentuckians, we're confident we will make the best choices possible.

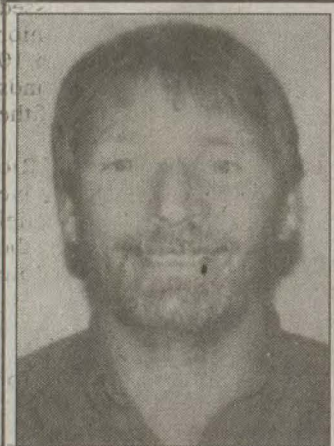

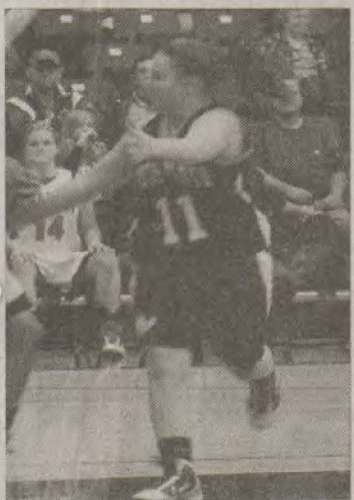
South Floyd established a new school record for wins this season, exiting the campaign 15-11.

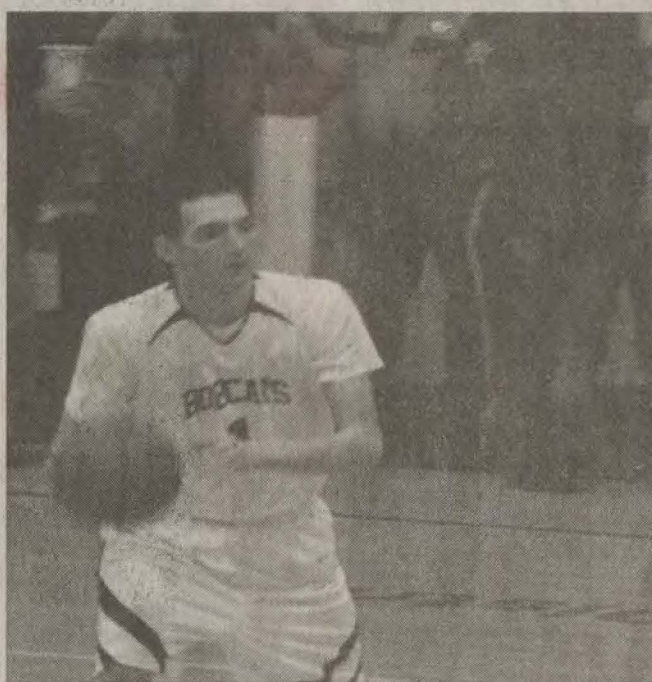
Claiming some much-needed momentum early on in the second half, Prestonsburg outscored Betsy Layne 15-7 in the third quarter.

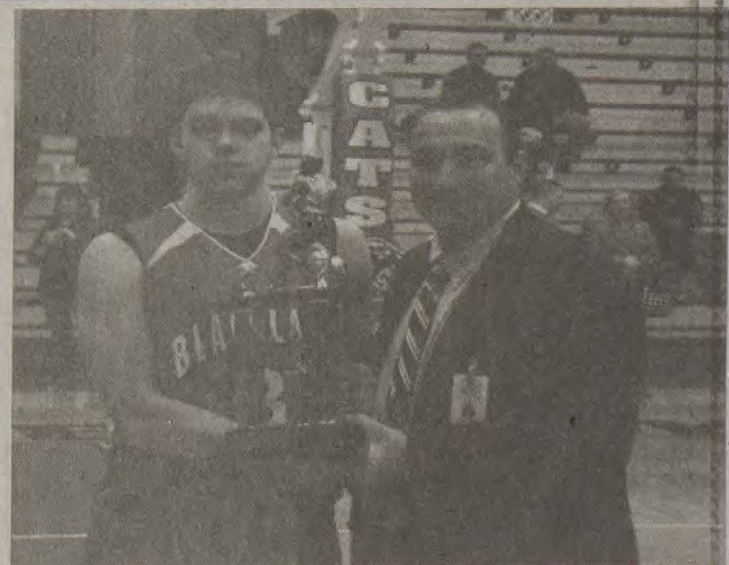

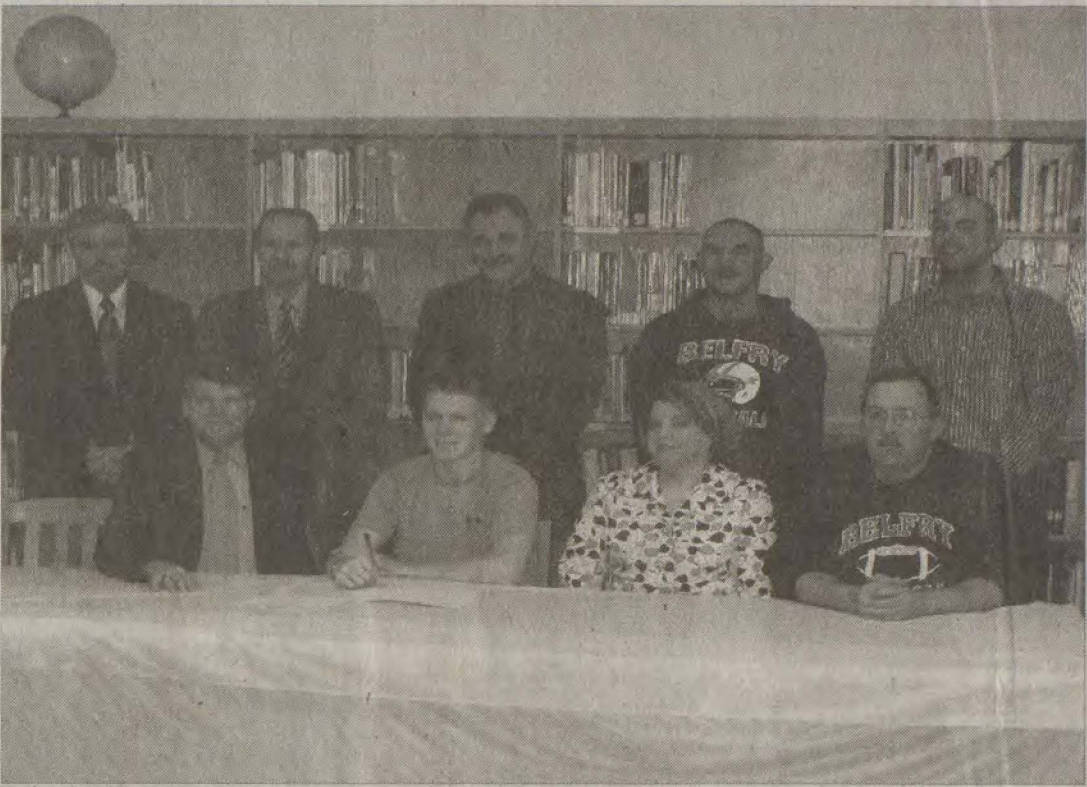

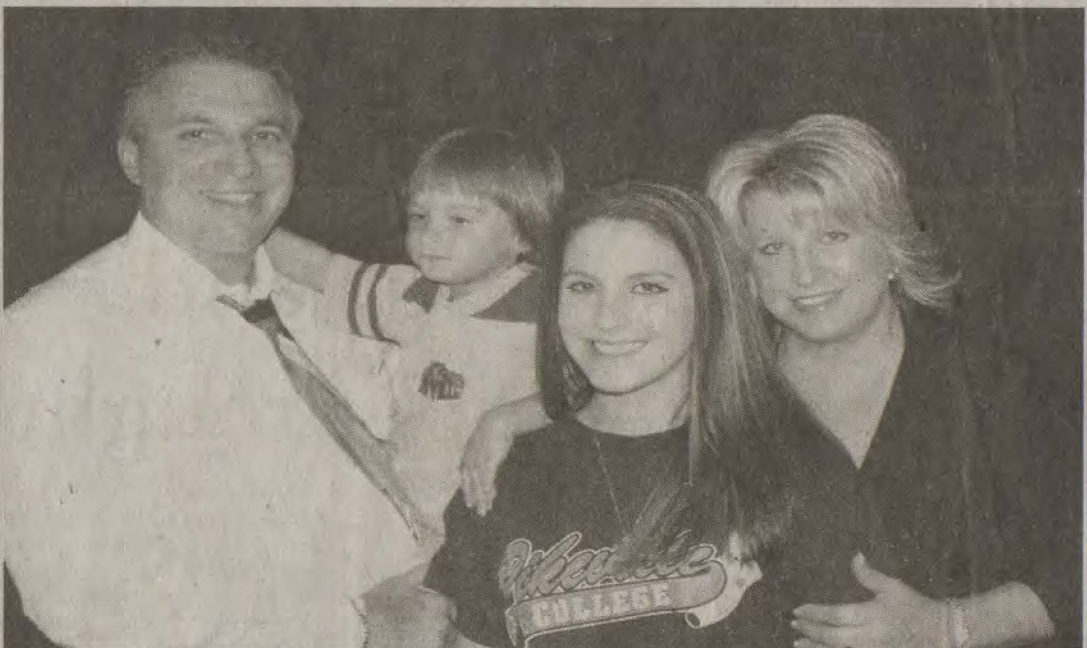

The secret
weapon you
don't know
you have

You're a parent or a grandparent — and you're worried.

It seems like these days, there are so many more threats to your child's (or grandchild's) nutritional health than in years gone by: fast-food "combo meals" for kids that completely fail the grade on keeping your youngster healthy; a world awash in soft drinks and sugary juices, which once were a rare treat but now are a non-stop river; breakfast cereals that are sweeter than some desserts.

Looming over this gloomy landscape is a genuine epidemic of childhood obesity among American kids, and the horrifying prospect of an early diagnosis of Type II diabetes for your beloved youngster. Where can a concerned adult turn to for help?

Fire up your computer, because you'll be amazed at the resources that are available to you right there in your den, living room or wherever you make your connection to the Web. These goodies are definitely "take-out," and they're all free!

For starters, use your search-engine-of-choice to look up "Beltsville Human Nutrition Research Center" (or you can follow this link: http://www.ars.usda.gov/main/site_main.htm?modecode=12_35_00_00). That's a lab operated by the Agricultural Research Service (ARS), and these are the scientists who work in tandem with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to conduct and analyze the "What We Eat in America" food surveys. You've probably read about that survey in popular magazines.

Most likely you're a lot more interested in what's in the foods that your children and grandchildren (or you) eat than in what other folks are eating. You can find that easily on the Web at: http://www.ars.usda.gov/Services/doc_s.htm?docid=17032

You'll be looking at "What's In The Foods You Eat Search Tool, Version 3.0".

Want to know exactly what your child is consuming when they wolf down a whole "snack bag" of their favorite potato chip? You can find out with this search tool — regardless of whether we're talking barbeque-flavored, unsalted, reduced fat, or even "cheese & bacon flavor" — by simply picking a chip, plugging in a serving size (which can be as simply as specifying "20 chips"), and clicking "View Nutrients." In return, you'll know everything about those chips: water, energy, protein, fats, carbohydrates, sugars, fiber, vitamins, antioxidants, even whether there's any alcohol in them!

What about those breakfast cereals? Here's a link to the easy-to-use USDA-ARS Nutrient Database: <http://www.nal.usda.gov/fnic/foodcomp/search/>

There's a separate category for "breakfast cereals" (click on "Select Food Group"), just as there is for baby foods, baked goods, fast foods, lunch meats, snacks, sweets, even spices and herbs!

I admit it, I love poking around in this database — and it's not shy about "naming names," either. Going back to our "breakfast foods" group, you can put in an actual brand-name product (we won't name names here, though), specify a serving size and — in the flicker of a screen — get the lowdown on all the carbs, sugars, fats, nutrients and lots of other details on that particular food.

Under "snacks," for example, you can use "cheese" as your keyword and get an eye-ful about everything from cheese puffs or twists to cheddar-cheese pretzels, cheese-flavored popcorn, cheese-flavored potato chips, even tortilla chips. Diving further into

HORROR SHOW

Prestonsburg duo hit the silver screen

Is the silver screen ready for Prestonsburg's own Deadpit Radio? If all is right in the world of film festivals, the answer will be a blood-soaked affirmative.

"Into the Pit: The Shocking Story of Deadpit.com" is a documentary featuring Wes "Creepy Kentuckian" Vance and Aaron "Uncle Bill" Frye, both of Prestonsburg.

Focusing on the rise of Deadpit, a horror talk internet radio show, the documentary includes interviews and comments from Lloyd Kaufman, of Troma Films fame, and an abundance of horror actors, directors, and fans. Local officials, such as Fred James, director of tourism for Prestonsburg, and family and friends of Vance and Frye also appear.

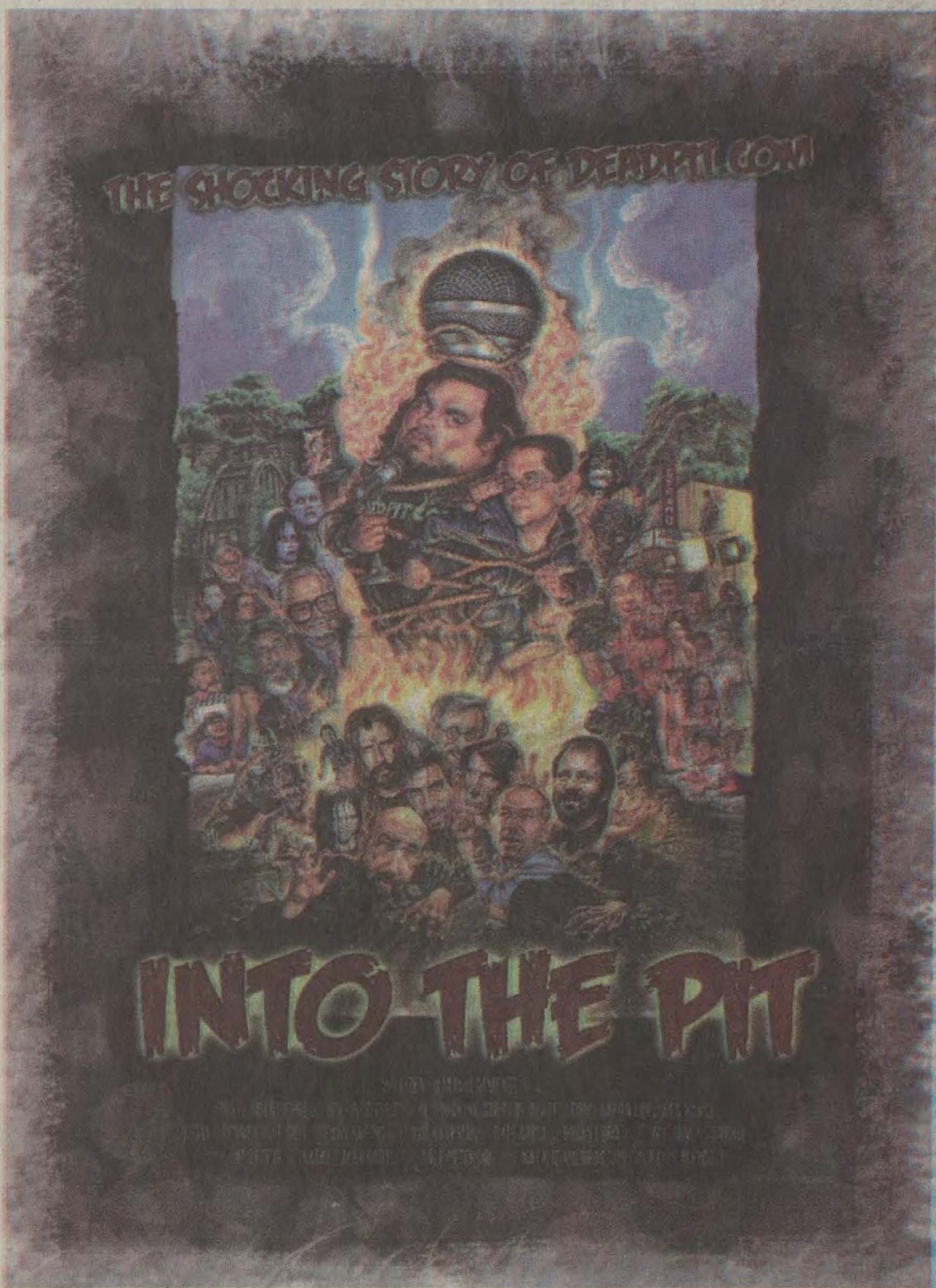
Along with focusing on the success of the show, the film follows Frye as he works on obtaining his master's degree in counseling. The push and pull of his professional life and the work and fun he has doing Deadpit serves as the main narrative for the documentary.

The film is professionally shot and Vance and Frye are naturals in front of the camera as they talk about the genesis of Deadpit and what it takes to produce the show and interview guests, including legendary horror directors John Carpenter and George Romero.

Not only does the documentary provide ample



amounts of information for fans of the show, but it also allows a glimpse into eastern Kentucky and the particular cultural stigmas associated with the area. It's an excellent film that will appeal to horror hounds and fans of documentaries alike. The screener version of the film is 95 minutes, but it never feels like it is running long. With appearances at multiple film festivals, along with promotion at horror conventions and online, "Into the Pit" should have no problem finding an audience and bringing new fans to the fold.

"Into the Pit: The Shocking Story of Deadpit.com" was produced by Rusty Robot Productions. The film is an official selection of the 2010 A Night of Horror Film Festival in Sydney, Australia, and also the 2010 Wisconsin Film Festival. It is also under consideration at other festivals.

An autopsy showed Hall was shot in the back of the head and not accidentally in the face, as was claimed by his alleged killers.

The Floyd County grand jury dealt with a full docket this session, deciding on a variety of cases ranging from attempted murder to failure to pay child support.

Information provided to the US Supreme Court about the case of a diabetic Floyd County teenager, who was unable to receive federal disability or health care benefits, was one of several cases impacting the court's decision last week to open eligibility to such benefits for hundreds of thousands of disabled children from low income families across the country.

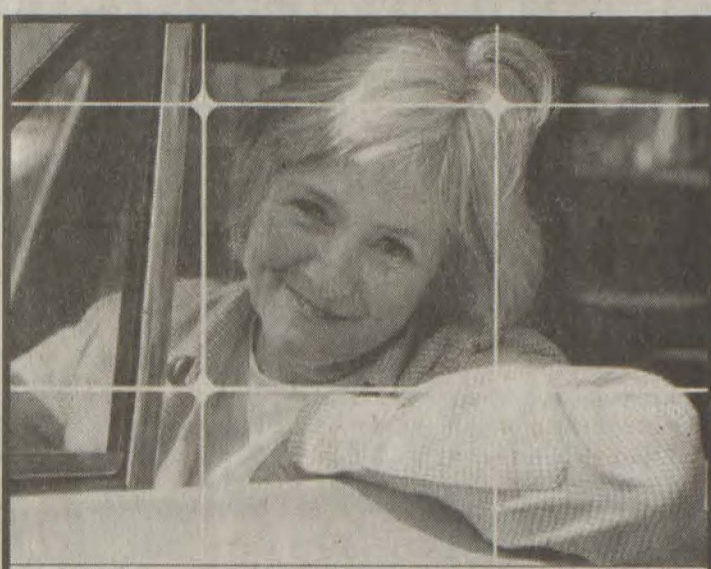

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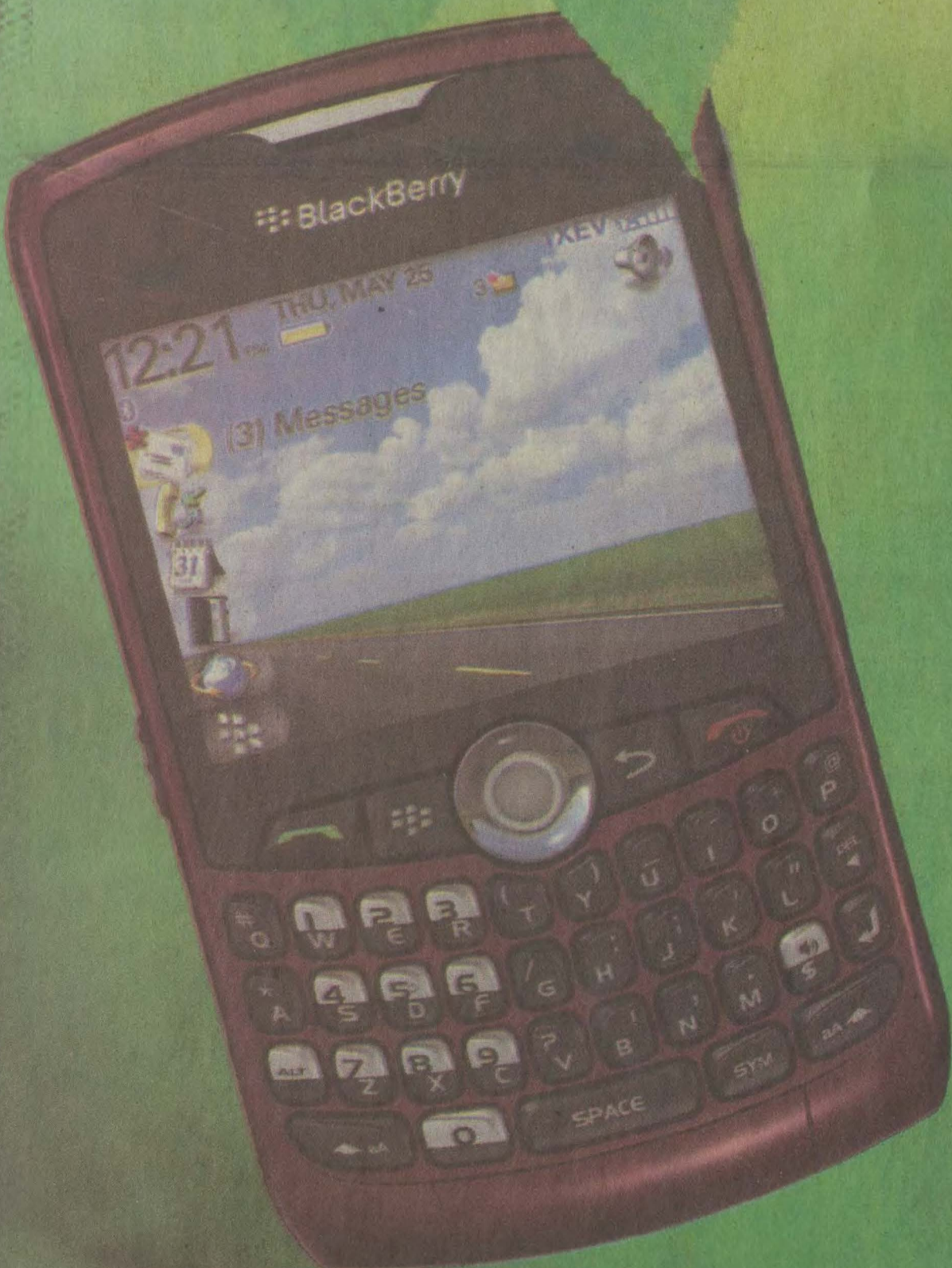
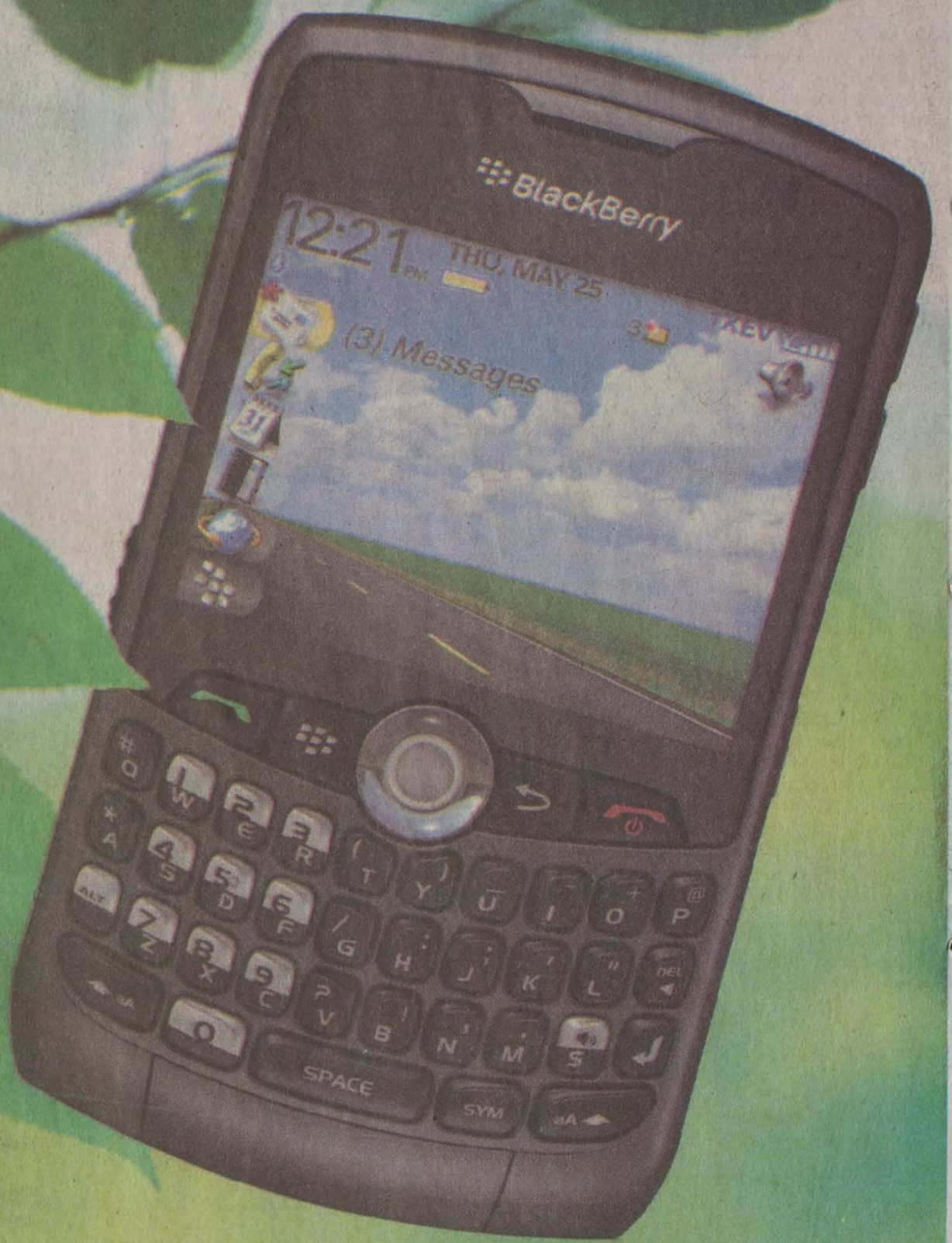
