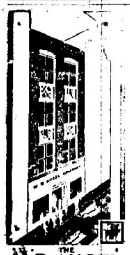

### THE LABORER vs. THE MACHINE

If all gas appliances are properly and permanently connected, there is little danger from leakage of natural gas into the house. Occasionally an accident occurs from gas being blown out of a gas cook burner or from

danger comes from the use of rubber connecting hose, which soon becomes porous, and allows gas leakage. In some instances accidents have taken place as a result of the gas hose becoming disconnected.

When gas is burned in the presence of plenty of air there is less danger than when insufficient air is supplied. In this case a cold surface, the

In dangerous amounts. It is for these reasons that everyone should see that his gas appliances are properly adjusted and that gas ovens, space heaters and gas heating devices are connected by tubes with the chimney or the outside air.

For safety's sake, observe the following suggestions:

In using gas appliances of any kind, see that they bear the stamp of

the American Gas Association, showing that the safety requirements of this organization have been met.

Have all adjustments made by a person trained for this work. Many gas companies now make regular inspections which they serve.

Have all gas heating appliances connected by gas with the chimney.

Never use a gas heater in a small closed room. Always have some ven-

MAKES NICE PROFIT FROM 310 CHICKENS (Big Sandy News-Recorder) Total profit \$138.50.

That is what Luther Copley's bank book reads for the month of November. And from a flock of 310 White Leghorn hens.

Mr. Copley, who lives in Lower Lousis, gathered 525 eggs which he set for \$108. His total feed cost for the month was \$47.17, leaving a clear profit of \$138.50.

The flock was hatched early last spring and began laying in August. With the assistance of the county agent he culled them himself twice, removing all birds which did not show promise of earning their feed.

Mr. Copley is following the accepted rules of good poultry raising. He has a good house and keeps the birds enclosed except on good days. Laying mash is placed in troughs and kept before them at all times.

Large in the afternoon he gives them scratch feed. Birds given this kind of treatment cannot lay but they, if there are any eggs in them. The flock is culled once each month.

The principles which are making poultry raising profitable to Mr. Copley are: (1) good stock; (2) proper wintering; (3) good housing; (4) good feeding; and (5) good management.

Anyone who follows this formula will find it profitable.

Mr. Copley plans to enter big flock in the state egg laying contest, and according to County Agent J. E. Harbison, he stands a good chance to take first honors.

**INTERMEDIATE CREDIT TO HELP AGRICULTURE**

In communities of Kentucky where credit reserves have become depleted because of short crops, farmers can secure credit on satisfactory terms from the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank at Louisville, Ralph G. Sims, manager of the bank, told the annual conference of county and home demonstration agents at the University of Kentucky.

Money from this source is available to local banks and agricultural credit corporations at 4 per cent interest. The latter agencies, in turn, make loans to farmers for agricultural purposes. A month of 2 and 2 1/2 per cent, and certain other incidental amounts are allowed to these credit

agencies in making loans to farmers. In Kentucky, however, because of the local intermediate bank, farmers cannot be charged more than 10 per cent on loans. That is, the interest rates provided in the central money market. It is a major difference in the credit policy of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank compared with other banks.

Not only is the interest rate low, but the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, in addition, there is no charge for the loan. The loan is made on a non-repayable basis, and farmers are not required to pay the interest on any part of the loan.

There is a growing interest in and appreciation of this source of credit, is evident by the fact that during the past two months agricultural credit corporations have been organized at Arlington, Murray, Procter and Frankfort; that two such corporations are in process of organization at Cynthiana and Merton; that a beginning has been made in the direct discounting of local banks; and, finally, by a large daily correspondence of inquiries and requests for direction and information.

This line of credit will not only aid the solvent, but temporarily hard-pressed farmers, individually, but will allow local banks to maintain their deposits lending power, and in this way the entire community will share in the benefits to be derived through the judicious use of Federal Intermediate credit. Mr. Sims stated.

If a "furriner" went "sepherin" down in the hills, a decade or so ago, he was not making mathematical calculations but was snuggling invariably. If he should be shot from ambush, which is not likely he would "th-wayen" in other words, he would be left in a fix.

"You" formerly was a word little used in the hills. A hill was usually "old man Jones' boy" instead of "his son." When a boy grows up, he is then said to be an "overgrown stunk" and if very slender, may bear the happy sobriquet of "hanger stunk." A young woman may be some "old" woman, providing they are not divorced, and to use a common expression, she is "old man."

When it came to love in the 90's of years, the young folks were wont to "set me" and "square" in "dickens row" and if the young lady's "flier" was fortunate, he would get a "hug" which does not mean a corrective back home, but a kiss.

The "water" is now almost extinct in the hills. He floundered in the "good, old days" in the days when the beds furnished inside for the Old Virginia Road in the mountains, and it was the who used two round, small pieces of wood to keep upon the bass string of the instrument while the fiddler played, thus contributing a pronounced rhythm to the music.

When school in session it is "shades." The children of college are scholars, as elsewhere and those who are exceptionally quick to learn are "sharp as tack" or their ideas may be "bright as the sparks from a hot log."

But to be clever in the hills one must be generous and then the word is pronounced "cheer." "This" is always used in the sense of "to cry." "Kiver" is "lover." And for things to be scattered to the four winds is for them to go "ward" "shades," which, we are told, was pronounced "ward."

If you say something which meets with the approval of a hillman, you will be told that "Pant's pitam-bink the truth." "Pitam-bink" comes from "pita-bink." A word which has kept its Anglo-Saxon pronunciation in the hills is "mought" (night). And "servise" among other things, are "high" palatable berries which grow on the arbutus tree.

In the days of the hushin' bee a word which was unusual in its significance, especially to those of the younger set, was the "sensibel" but not so a foreword to that it was the name applied to an otherwise wicker of corn, a patch of whose grain were red. And to the hushin' bee, was the large privilege of dining "the hushin' set on the barn floor."

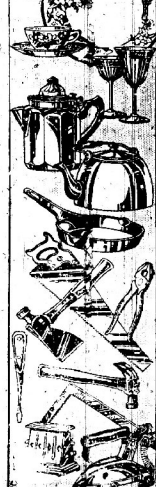
