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Review of the Year 1930 at Home and in Other Lands

Unemployment and Economic Depression Generally Prevail—Steps Toward World Peace—Democrats Win in United States Elections—South American Revolutions.

DISPERITY, which was just around the corner, began to grip the world in more than an occasional glimpse of hope during the year. Business depression, however, continued, continuing low hopes for agricultural products and leading markets for securities generally.

Skilled laborers professed to see clouds again gathering over the nations, but many nations were taken in the direction of world peace and disarmament. The United States, Great Britain and Japan signed the London naval limitation treaty, and toward the close of the year there were indications that France and Italy, settling their past disputes, would make a new power pact. Some progress was achieved by the preparatory disarmament commission of the League of Nations. The revision of German reparations, known as the Young plan, was adopted by all nations concerned and led to the signing of the Locarno pact, which, although Germany was not a part of its ultimate success, the evacuation of the Rhineland by the allied forces was completed.

China's long, bloody and confused civil war ended in victory for the Nationalist government. Republican and military revolutionaries were driven out of the Latin American republics.

Though governmental and other agencies in the United States strove throughout the year to relieve the unfortunate conditions of the unemployed, these efforts were slow in appearing. Consequently the voters went to the polls in November and expressed their dissatisfaction in the election campaign. There was a Democratic landslide that swept most of the country into the hands of the party which had been in power for some time to revise the tariff and pass in June.

Industrial and financial distress in the United States was greatly increased by drought that prevailed all summer in the Mississippi and Ohio river states and extended as far east as the Virginia mountains. State governments afforded speedy relief to the sufferers. As winter neared, numerous organizations were organized to help the unemployed. The relief work was in part to alleviate the unemployment situation, their aim being to supply those out of work with light rather than heavy clothes. Pottery, building and highway projects were started and stocked up and great industrial and agricultural projects were sought means to increase the number of their employees.

All in all, 1930 was not a happy year for the world.

INTERNATIONAL

THESE months of intensive debate, diplomatic negotiation, study of experts' reports and mutual expressions of opinion with the London naval treaty, which was signed on April 22 by the delegates of the United States, Great Britain, Japan, France and Italy, as this pact the first three powers agreed to the extension of the Washington treaty to their navies should apply to cruisers and lesser vessels. France and Italy failed utterly to reach an accord as to what their relative naval strength should be. Consequently they agreed to only three parts of the London treaty, that provided for a battleship building "holiday" and prescribed various rules designed to humanize submarine warfare.

France and Italy held international conversations during the rest of the year, but could not settle their differences. The one international obstacle was Italy's demand that her right to naval parity with France be admitted, and France's refusal to yield this point.

League Receives Briand's Scheme. In September the assembly of the League of Nations, held at Geneva, while M. Briand, French foreign minister, expounded his pet scheme for a federation of European states, other nations cautiously listened to him and it was accepted in principle by the assembly and referred to a special committee which will report in the 1931 session.

Twenty-eight of the nations represented at Geneva signed on October 2 a treaty guaranteeing financial aid to any signatory state that is the victim of warlike aggression.

Late in August most of the summer session of the League of Nations conference in Warsaw and agreed on a concerted program of action leading to furthering of their economic interests. The pact was signed by Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Estonia, Finland, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Rumania, Yugoslavia, Lithuania was absent because of her political differences with Poland. 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The roundtable conference opened in London November 12. It was a compromise and a gesture to the native British, the Hindus, the Muslims and even the "autonomous" being represented by their allies by two British women. The Indians made it clear they would accept nothing less than dominion status and the British method of rule in India. The problem before the conference and the government was a conundrum that there was no chance for the solution for many months. The definite decision reached was that a round table should be held in London.

In the Canadian national election on July 28 the Conservatives completely routed the Liberal government headed by Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King and secured a comfortable majority in the dominion parliament. The Liberal government, however, became prime minister. The new government took steps at once to relieve the distress of the farmers, who had been the farmers, one being the almost complete discontinuance of immigration from Europe.

As in most other countries, political events in Germany reflected the economic depression. The unemployment and there it was aggravated by the feeling that they were oppressed by the reparations. Chancellor Brüning resigned in December 1930 because of dissatisfaction with the reparation of the Young plan and with the budget and financial reforms.

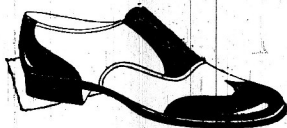

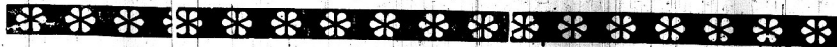
