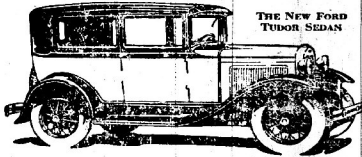

A PLEA FOR HELP

Two women walked fourteen miles a few days ago to Prestonsburg to try to get something to eat for their starving children. Another woman had her two daughters, aged about fourteen and sixteen years, walked about the same distance from Beaver Creek to town to try to get something to eat and clothes to wear. This old lady is very sick and her husband has not worked for several years on account of paralysis. The poor old lady said they did not have bedsheets or keep them warm at night, and they had to sleep by turns by the fire, while two slept at a time, as they only had one bed for four of them. They would sleep on pallets on the floor in summer, but it is too cold now.

We must heed the cry of the hungry and the shivering white of the freezing. How you would like to give if you are able. Give your old clothes, coats, hats, pairs of shoes, dresses, old clothes, sheets, quilts, blankets and anything you have. Now if every man, woman, boy and girl who has a steady job will give us one day's work or the price of one day's work for six months, we can take care of all the poor people with food.

I am sure every bank employee, every store clerk, every team driver, every doctor, every school teacher, every day employee, every farmer who is able to do so, every business house in Floyd county, will give us one day's work or the price of one day's work. County officials, every lawyer, every farmer, pool player, drug store proprietor, and all other business and professional people help. Send contributions to Dr. M. At once the most revolutionary and by far the most progressive step to be taken in the field of education during this generation is that proposed by Robert M. Hutchins, president of Chicago University...

This is the tearing down of the old fetish, the credit system, the ancient and cut-and-dried method of ascertaining who is, or who is not, a college graduate...

In other words, the student himself will determine when he shall leave Chicago University with a degree. If he is apt and industrious, he may leave in two years with a degree; inclined otherwise, he may find himself spending five, six or even more years there.

Thus is meaning given the title, "college graduate," or the affixes, "A. B.," "M. A.," and their kind. The system now prevalent in institutions of learning is an insurmountable handicap to education.

Let the old order pass. The new as proposed by the University of Chicago, will banish those dullards and nincompoops who disport themselves about the country behind resounding degrees. Education will emerge from nebulosity into the realm of reality, if this movement spreads as it should.

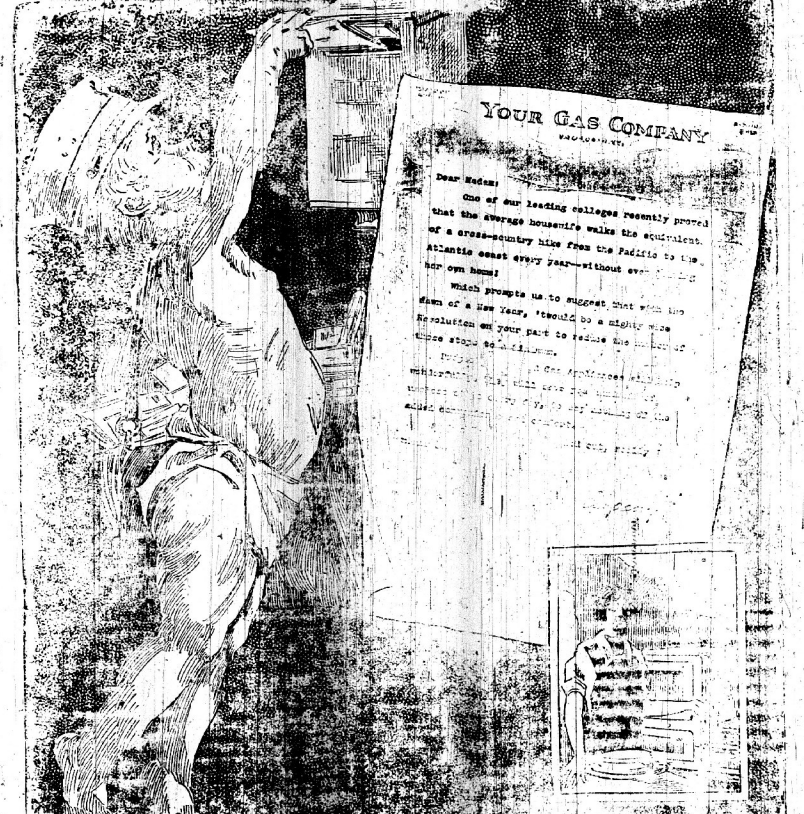

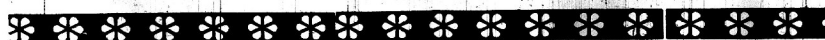
